Lightning Storm Plays Havoc With County **ESB Network**

The sudden and unpredicted lightning storm last Friday evening caused considerable damage around the county. During the heavy thunder and lightning storm, the ESB transmission station at Shandon, Dungarvan was struck by lightning and 12 transformers and 3 high tension wires were destroyed.

The supply in the town itself was interrupted for a five minute period on Friday evening affecting 3,000 customers, while elsewhere around the county many households were without electricity until last Monday ESB workers worked around the clock to replace fallen poles and damaged transformers.

Camphire, Cappoquin, Garranturton, Kilmacthomas, Tinniscart, Aglish and parts of Ballinamult were the most badly hit areas with only some localised damage around Dungarvan including the high winds on Sunday at Clonea which took down the ESB network and destroyed two mobile homes at Ballinclamper.

Stafford Miller Creates Another 180 New Jobs In Dungarvan

A major jobs boost for Dungarvan was dramatically announced last Friday when An Tanaiste Mary Harney paid a personal visit to the town where she revealed that 180 new jobs are to be created in a £15 million IDA backed expansion of Stafford Miller (Irl.).

broke the story at the start of May when we reported that the project was then on the Minister for Enterprise and Employment's desk awaiting ratification by the cabinet. Senior Department officials however remained tight lipped on the expansion until its official announcement last week.

Freak Winds Destroy Mobile Homes At Ballinclamper Beach

Two mobile homes parked at Ballinclamper, Clonea were destroyed by freak winds in the early hours of Monday morning.

The high winds left a third unoccupied mobile home untouched at the beach as they ripped end in mobile homes at the through two private caravans just after 3 a.m. with destructive force. Nine people who were holidaying in the two mobile homes were taken to hospital suffering minor cuts and bruises. They were extremely lucky to escape with their lives as the mobile homes were reduced to rubble while a 1998 Primera car owned by one of the families involved was also totally destroyed.

Know Your Rights

Question:

I live with my sister in what was our family home. The house is in my name, valued at £80,000. We are both retired, single and we have a small amount of savings. I have willed the house to my sister. If I die before her will she have to pay Probate Tax, or Capital Acquisitions Tax?

Answer:

Yes, she will have to pay both. If your estate amounts to more than £10,820 (it does), your sister will be liable to Probate Tax. Assets which do not pass under a deceased's will or intestacy are excluded from the Probate Tax. So, if you were to put the house in your joint names, and your savings in a joint account (unless they are willed to someone else), she would be exempt from Probate Tax.

Capital Acquisitions Tax (CAT) comprises two related taxes namely (1) Gift Tax (2) Inheritance Tax

The rules for calculating the taxes are essentially the same (1) Gift Tax

Is payable on certain gifts made during the lifetime of the donor (the person making the gift). The person making the gift is called the donor or disponer. (2) Inheritance Tax

Is payable on certain gifts referred to as inheritances received after death by the done generally by way of a will. The tax like gift tax is payable by the person receiving the inheritance.

CAT is a self-assessment tax, and obliges the person receiving benefit to make a return to the Revenue Commissioners and to pay the tax.

You do not escape the tax by not making a return. There are stiff penalties for failing to do so and the Revenue Commissioners can make an assessment in the absence of a return being submitted by the tax payer. The difference between Gift Tax and Inheritance Tax is that Gift Tax is 75% of the Inheritance Tax payable. How the taxes arise.

Tax is payable if the gifts or inheritances exceed certain totals called thresholds. These thresholds can be reached either by a single gift or inheritance or by a collection of a number of gifts or inheritances over a period of years. There are different thresholds depending on the relationship between the person receiving the

gift and the person making the gift.
So putting the house in your joint names will make your sister liable to Gift Tax now. She would be obliged to make a return within four months of the date of benefit. If you put the house in your joint names you are giving your sister half the value of the house i.e. £40,000. The first £500 of a gift received in a tax year is exempt from Gift Tax. Also there is a "threshold" below which you do not pay Capital Acquisitions Tax, depending on your relationship with the person - for brothers, sisters, nephews, nieces of the giver this is £25,120. Presuming she had received no other gifts, her tax liability would be on £39,500.

First £25,120 (Class B Threshold)	=	£mil
next £ 1 0,000 @ 20%	=	£2,000
balance £4,380 @ 30%	=	£1,314
	=	£3,314
Gift Tax is 75% of £3 314	- 10	C2 485

If you put the house in your joint names then if your sister predeceases you, you may be liable for Inheritance Tax on half the valuation of the house as above, i.e. her half, and vice versa. However, where a brother or sister is aged 55 or over and has lived in the house for at least five years with the brother/sister from whom they have inherited the home the market value of the house may be reduced by 80% or £150,000 whichever is the lesser.

(In the 1998 Budget, relief for elderly brothers/sisters inheriting increased from 60% of value of the family home (or £80,000) to 80 % (or £150,000, whichever is the lesser) from 3rd Dec. 1997).

If you did not put the house in joint names, and you did predecease her, the position would be as follows

She would only be due to pay inheritance tax on £80,000 - 80% = £16, 000, which is below the threshold for Class B, so no tax would be due. However she would be due to pay Probate Tax of 2%, as the house would have to pass to your sister under a will. This would amount to £1,600.

In this type of situation, it is often worth taking financial advice before making a decision.

Keep all documents and always get a receipt for repayments made.\

Do not take on too much - interest rates may increase.

Try saving the amount you would be repaying for a while beforehand. If you cannot afford this then you cannot afford the credit.

The Doctor Who Loved To Care For

THE famous children's organisation Barnardos was founded by Dr Thomas John Barnardo who came to London from Dublin in 1866 to study medicine.

Dr Barnardo was a devout Christian and during his spare time he used to teach children from London's poor families in Sunday schools.

He discovered there were thousands of homeless children roaming the streets of London – and this led him to start his

Homeless Children

famous orphanages which were originally known as Dr Barnardo's Homes.

It is estimated that, during his lifetime, Dr Barnardo took in more than 60,000 homeless and destitute children, caring for them in his homes.

Thomas Barnardo died in 1903 but the work that he started continues to the present day.

He was so highly thought of in the East

End of London that, on the day of his funeral, crowds lined the streets to pay their last respects.

An eyewitness described the turn-out of people as so massive that the event resembled the state funeral of a king.

The Barnardo organisation has always led the way in caring for unwanted and homeless children and teenagers and today it continues to provide love and

care - mostly for severely disabled youngsters.

The organisation started because one night a homeless youngster called Jim Jarvis wanted to stay the night in the school where Dr Barnardo was teaching because it was warm.

At first Barnardo refused to believe the child was homeless – and so the boy took him to the docklands and showed him where hundreds of homeless children were sleeping rough. That led the Doctor to embark on his great life's work.



PUBLIC NOTICE

SOUTH EASTERN HEALTH BOARD

Tobacco (Health Promotion and Protection) Act 1988 specifically

- 1. Prohibits the sale of tobacco products to persons under 16 years of age.
- 2. Places the onus on the owner, manager or person in charge of a tobacco vending machine to ensure that it is not used by persons under 16 years of age.
- 3. Prohibits the sale of cigarettes in packets of

Tobacco (Health Promotion and Protection) Regulations 1995.

The above regulations prohibit and/or restrict the consumption of Tobacco Products in various public areas and in various facilities, example of which

- 1. Privately owned transport vehicles which seat eight or more.
- 2. The areas to which the public has access in hairdressing salons and barber shops.
- 3. The areas to which the public has access in banks and building societies etc.
- 4. Specific areas (including playing areas and circulation space) within premises which are used for the playing of bingo and bridge.
- 5. The indoor spectator and games areas in sports
- The auditorium of a cinema.

Over 320 Waterford People Take Part In Nationwide Survey

A postal questionnaire has been sent to 321 people throughout Co. Waterford seeking information on a range of key lifestyle factors including exercise patterns and frequency, smoking habits, alcohol consumption, use of other substances, history of accidents and a comprehensive profile of nutrition habits etc.

The individuals surveyed will also be asked about their general physical and mental health, regularity of visits to the GP and very importantly, they will also be asked to detail any obstacles they perceive which may hinder them from exercising more or eating healthily.

The 321 people from the county invited to participate in the nationwide survey, all aged over 18, have been randomly selected from the electoral register.

Every individual returning a questionnaire will have their name entered into both a regional and national draw for a weekend away.

Nearly 50% of all deaths in people over 14 years in the South Eastern Health Board region are due to heart disease. Deaths due to diseases of the circulatory system for young to middle aged people (i.e. 15-64) are lower in the South East for males compared to the national average, but are higher than the national average in females. The same is true of cancer deaths. The death rate in the region from injuries and poisonings is higher than the national average. Approximately one out of five hospital admissions in people between 14 and 35 years in the South East, and two thirds of all death in this age group, are due to injuries and poisonings, with two out of five of these deaths due to motor vehicle accidents.

Árd Scoil Students 'Step Into Marketing'

Dungarvan students are leading the way in marketing! The Marketing Institute is very impressed with the initiative and enthusiasm of students in Ard Scoil na nDéise in Dungarvan in adopting its 'Step Into Marketing' programme. The programme was run for the first time this year and Ard Scoil na nDéise was one of just thirteen schools in the country to adopt it! Twenty-four students from the school received their certificates in the school on May 28 at 7 p.m. The programme was consored by Ryan's Super Valu, Dungarvan.

'Step Into Marketing' is a nationwide self-directed learning programme devised by the Marketing Institute for Transition Year students and is implemented in association with County Enterprise Boards. Twenty schools nationwide will run the programme in the 1998/99 academic year.

On successful completion of the programme, students receive a Step Into Marketing certificate from The Marketing Institute.

Welcome For Dept. Of Marine Promise To Get Tough On Foreign Trawlers

A Waterford Co. Councillor has welcomed indications from the Dept. of the Marine that a new drive would be made to revoke the fishing licences of foreign trawlers which fish illegally in Irish waters.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair says such a move is overdue and would be of great assistance to those seeking to make a living

out of fishing along the Co. Waterford coastline.

"There have been problems down through the years on this issue. Fishermen in Helvick and Dunmore East know only too well the inconveniences being caused. Revoking the fishing licences of foreign trawlers would effectively ban them from fishing in these waters. There has

been overfishing by Spanish flagships registered in the U.K. There is a lack of a fair playing pitch and excessive qualities of fish are taken by a proportion of such boats."

"One hopes the indications are a sign of a 'get tough' policy and not just talk to calm the anger that is out there among Irish fishermen."

Now that an official application has been received by Waterford Co. Council seeking planning permission for an Esat mast at Ardmore Garda Station, the case for opposing it should be made stronger than ever.

This is according to Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who has been speaking out against the proposal since a site notice appeared on

April 1st last.
"It's heartening to see how Ardmore people have been organising to prevent a mast being placed in such a residential area. I understand that the Board of Management of the Primary School adjacent to the College Rd. Garda Station have added their voice to the objections, as have other community groups. If Esat were sion on several grounds, not

proposing to put a mast in a remote area away from housing or a school it would be somewhat a different story. As it is, Esat are seeking to put their mast in the most residential part of Ardmore and Grange parishes.

"At present the ball is in the court of the County Manager. I will be asking him to refuse this planning permisleast the visual effect and apprehension of residents. Another proposal I had opposed on environmental grounds, the Kilfarissey Wind-farm project, was actually refused planning permission in the last month by the Manager. This was a good and sensible decision. The people of Ardmore are hoping for a similar outcome in their case."

Protection River **Emphasised**

Seeing as the Environmental Protection Agency report publicly on regular testing of the quality of bathing water in Waterford's beaches, a similar mass disclosure of whether or not there are pollution risks in the Colligan river should occur.

This is according to Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who has been expressing concerns about the proximity of Dungarvan's dump to the Colligan river. On Friday morning, May 29 last, Cllr. O Ceilleachair and a number of local residents and those using the river were received by Waterford Co. Council officials during a visit to the town's landfill site.

'We're told that leaking leechate is not finding its way into the river to the point where it might be considered pollution. The Environmental Protection Agency carried out 10 tests throughout last year at Ardmore beach, relying on very stringent methods and criteria. If this is being done in the river along the edges of Dungarvan dump, then all that information needs to be communicated in a better fashion."

"It is widely acknowledged that Dungarvan dump, which is a very traditional landfill site, is not satisfactory. The proximity of banking to the river is among several concerns people have. In fairness, Council officials have a difficult task there and have made strides to improve its management. The changes promised in the Waste Management Stragety adopted by Waterford Corporation and County Council cannot come quickly enough. In the meantime we need to be vigilant."



Utterly Butterly And Easy Eating

BROAD BEANS are a cool season crop, growing satisfactorily only at temperatures below 15 degrees (59 degrees F). Some types are very hardy - surviving at minus 10 degrees on well-drained soil.

The crop should be sown in autumn in a sheltered site in fertile well-manured soil. The plants need low nitrogen levels because their root nodules fix atmospheric nitrogen. Seeds can be sown in the spring but autumn is usually the best time to sow broad beans.

The seeds should be sown about two inches deep and nine inches apart. They can be grown in double rows or evenly spaced in blocks across a bed.

The taller cultivars may be supported with strands of wire attached to strong canes or poles placed around the rows or blocks of plants.

Over-wintering crops may be protected with cloches or floating mulches during the early stages of growth.



Early Crop: Broad Bean Aquadulca Claudia

Do not allow the plants to dry out. Watering is important once the crop begins to mature and should be watered at the rate of two gallons per square yard twice a week.

Once flowering starts, pinch out the growing tips to encourage pods to form and to combat blackfly. Earth up the over-wintering plants to protect them against the elements.

Mice, wood pigeons, tropical root rots, blackfly, and chocolate spot are the pests and diseases which may attack broad

The beans can be harvested about 30 weeks after sowing. Pick them while the pods are plump with the swelling beans and before they become leathery. The beans may be frozen or dried at the end of the season for use during the winter

BUTTER BEANS - also known as Lima beans - are tender annuals and short-lived perennials.

Some forms are climbers while others are dwarf and branching. Climbing cultivars can grow to a height of 10 feet while dwarf cultivars spread over 18 inches.

The young pods and mature seeds are eaten cooked. The seeds may also be dried or germinated in the dark for use as bean sprouts.


The butter bean is a tropical plant which needs a minimum temperature of 18 degrees (64 degrees F) for germination. It is best to sow the seeds in trays in a greenhouse during the spring then transplant the seedlings into well-prepared beds

The beans need low to medium nitrogen levels and should be planted in rows 12 inches apart. Allow at least two feet between the rows. Climbing varieties should be supported by stakes at least six feet high. The plants should be watered regularly and protected with plastic screens or covers. A general purpose fertiliser or liquid feed should be applied every two

Lima beans are ready for harvesting about three to four months after sowing.

Mr. Holmes was speaking following a recent meeting between IFA and senior officials in the Department of the Environment on the issue of dog controls. "Each year marauding dogs inflict severe damage on hundreds of sheep flocks throughout the country. As well as financial losses running into millions of pounds, these dog attacks inflict horrendous suffering on sheep flocks."

Commenting, Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, Harry Gray, said the real culprits for these attacks are not the dogs but their irresponsible owners who are breaking the law by not having their dogs under control.

Mr. Gray said Minister Dempsey must introduce a compulsory system of iden-

order that owners can be made fully responsible. In addition more dog wardens should be employed, self financed by increasing the number of dogs under licenses. He said "of the 750,000 dogs in the country, it is a scandal that only 170,000 or 23% are licensed. If a proper financial incentive scheme was put in place for dog wardens, by increasing the number of dog licences, a much more comprehensive service could be provided na-tionwide." Mr. Gray pointed out that the dog wardens currently operating do an excellent job and make a huge contribution to the safety of the country's 8 million sheep. He said "it is ridiculous that 22% of the current dog licence fee of £5 goes to the



I.F.A. Welcomes Trail Shipment

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Maurice Donovan has welcomed the trial shipment of livestock on the Irish Ferries boat, the Normandy, sailing between Rosslare and France.

Mr. Donovan said Irish Ferries have a strong commitment to live exports and it is vitally important the Department of Agriculture immediately pass the Normandy for four loads of livestock per sailing. He said in the absence of Galic Ferries it is essential that exporters are allowed maximum capacity on the Irish Ferries boat "The Normandy". In addition exporters are also using Pandoro.

On the fundamental issue of market access for live exporters from Ireland to Europe, Mr. Hennessy said IFA will not allow Agriculture Minister, Joe Walsh, the Government and the EU Commission walk away from the problem. Mr. Donovan said it is the responsibility of the Minister, the Government and the Commission to provide uninhibited market access and IFA will insist that they fulfil their obligations in this regard. Mr. Donovan said he was very concerned at the Minister's silence on the issue since the last Galic Ferries sailing on Friday, May 15, 1998.





SLURRY SPREADING

★ If you are in REPS, remember the spreading precautions. Slurry cannot be spread within 11/2 M of a hedgerow or 10 M of a small water course. In the case of lakes and main rivers, the buffer strip is 20 M, for domestic wells 50 M - and up to 300 M in the case of a public water supply.

★ Be sensitive about spreading too close to dwelling houses. Be conscious of wind direction and spread early in the week so that the smell is gone by the week-

end.

★ Finally, be safety conscious when agitating slurry tanks. When silage effluent is stored in the slurry tank, take extra care as lethal gases can be produced. Agitate on windy days with plenty of ventilation in the shed and never attempt to enter or partially enter a tank without using full breathing apparatus.

DAIRYING

Graze Quality Grass

★ This is harder than you believe.

Grass quality in June is poorer than May because of stem and grasses going to seed.

★ Quality grass results in cows milking to potential and cattle gaining 1 kg live weight per day.

★ Because cows have passed their peak yield, milk yield will decrease by 10% from one month to the next.

Or a quarter of a gallon (0.25) every 2 weeks.
 One pint from week to week.

- Look up your daily "Creamery Book" to check this

— Take any two-day average (say Wednesday/Thurs-day) of this week and

check with the same 2 days last week.

★ If milk has decreased by more than 1 pint per cow, then you had better start asking yourself a few questions.

- Is grass scarce?

- Am I grazing too tight?

- Is grass going rotten at the "butt"?

— Did I graze the headlands on the silage fields?

— Is grass strong and stemmy?

★ If grass is scarce because rotation is too short, you had better get back to a rotation length of 21-23 days.
— Introduce grass from silage area if possible for a few

Or feed extra meals.

Or feed high quality round bales of silage.

But slow down to get out of the tail spin you are in.
 Remember the amount of grass on the paddock doubles in the last seven days of a twenty-one day rotation.

- Nitrogen requires time to work.

★ High to very highly stocked farms will now be down to 30 Units of nitrogen per acre after each grazing.

- CAN will be the N of choice now.

Use Urea if ground surface is damp.
 ★ Use Sulphur (15 Units per acre):

- Gives more grass on light soils.

* Don't graze too tight.

 going below 6 cms is likely to lead to cows eating more stem.

— Also results in cows working too hard because each bite of grass results in smaller intakes thus requiring more bites to reach full appetite.

CERTIFICATE IN FARMING

Farming is going through a period of major change at the moment. The profitability of many enterprises is poor at present and the "tiger economy" roaring outside the farm gate looks very attractive.

However, I believe that young people leaving school in the next few weeks, who have the initiative to acquire proper training in farming and then follow this with a commitment and determination to grow and develop their farms, have a bright future. Quotas and limits on production are likely to disappear in the foreseeable future thus allowing those with capacity, energy and training to prosper.

NEW IFA GUIDE TO ASSIST LOW **INCOME FARMERS**

recently said that a new "IFA Guide on Schemes Targeting Low Income Farmers', will help to improve the incomes of many farm families by providing easy access for farmers to information on their full entitlements.

Speaking at the launch of the Guide in Portlaoise, Mr.Parlon said it brings together all of the important schemes and measures which can benefit low income farmers. "It is vital that farmers maximise these schemes to increase their household income. The Guide will help farmers check all of the options open to them in a simple and straightforward manner," he said.

The Guide, which was sponsored by AIB and launched by Minister of State for Agriculture Noel Davern, will be a key reference document for up to 50,000 farmers throughout the country.

Mr Parlon said that many measures both through the Social Welfare system and EU support schemes like REPS, Early Retirement, Forestry, Headage etc., can play a crucial role in helping low income farm families to improve their income situation. However, it is clear that some farmers are not securing their full entitlement in this regard at

He said this will be done either directly or through the various agencies that are targeting this sector which has been highlighted in many reports as suffering severe disadvantage.

IFA ACTION **SUCCEEDS IN** SOLVING AREA AID PROBLEMS

James Coughlan, Chairman, Waterford IFA, has said that recent pressure exerted by the IFA on the Department, had resulted in complete premia payments to 10,700 farmers.

While partial payments have been made to a further 2,700 farmers, Mr. Coughlan insisted that complete payments be made to this group immediately.

Referring to a further 3,000 still awaiting mapping resolution, Mr. Coughlan said IFA would not tolerate being penalised due to the Department continuing digitisation problems and insisted that all payments still pending be processed.

Female Movement Permit Gone At Last Says John Hobbs


Mr. John Hobbs, Chairman Waterford IFA Animal Health Committee, has welcomed the fact that the pressure exerted by the IFA on the Department of griculture has resu ed in the removal of the Femi Movement Permit.

Mr. Hobbs said that it had long been maintained by farmers that this document was a bureaucratic paper trail serving no useful purpose.

Mr. Hobbs said: "The fact that a female movement permit is no longer required will mean farmers don't have to devote precious time to this useless exercise and also the staff in the DVO's will be able to concentrate on more urgent issues."

Mr. Hobbs said: "The lifting of the ban on the export of beef from Northern Ireland had positive repercussions, not only for farmers in the six counties but also for farmers in the Republic who no longer have to put up with the bureaucracy of the Female Movement Permit."



OUR LOCALITY An Boithrín Caoch- The Blind Road

An Boithrín Caoch (The Blind Road) is now named King Street, the street where Michael Carroll's Motors is located. King Street Upper and King Street Lower was one street until the building of the railway in 1865 transected it. The turn from King Street into Sexton Street must have been constructed at the time the railway was built.

Cul A' tSailín — The Back Of The Sea Pond

This is now known as Home Rule Street. It is the street opposite Strandside South travelling from Minnies direction.

Bothar A' Choileara - Quarry Lane

It was later called Humble Street and it was a hollow green field opposite where Shears Street is now located. Some of the houses in T. J. Murphy Place are now built on this site. Shears Street was once known as Humble Street after the local landlords, the Humble-Nugents whose burial plot is in The Clogas.

Slate Lane

Slate Lane was the home of many of the old Abbeyside families. It was built opposite the quarry mentioned above. Again some of the houses in Murphy Place are built on this site. For the information of people who have recently become resident in Abbeyside, Shears Street is the street to Abbeyside School from the Shell Cottage.

Abbeyside Reference Archive

Since we set up the archive one of the things we planned to do was a survey on the thatched houses in the parish of Abbeyside. While there is only one in the village itself, we think there are ten or twelve in the whole parish.

So, if you live in a thatched house we hope to give you a call with a small questionnaire and a camera, sometime in the near future

We also plan to have a talk on "The Irish thatched House" sometime in the autumn - more about that later.







Double Defeat At Clonmel

The late sitting of the Special Congress kept a number of us from getting back to Clonmel in time for our championship engagements with old rivals, Tipperary. The results in both cases were disappointing as will be read from the reports by our correspondent at the games.

In the junior tie we were decidedly unlucky and deserved a draw after a very spirited performance by the team who had done very little preparation for the match. Losing by a point is always disappointing but having tried their very best, who can complain.

SENIOR DEFEAT

Seventy minutes of testing football against a very fit Limerick side was a big factor in helping Tipperary to a deserved win by 12 pts. in the senior game. It was obvious from the beginning that the home team with huge support meant business and were 0-8 to 0-

3 ahead at halfway. Their second half goal killed off any hopes that Waterford might have had of making it a close contest. We were outplayed by a better team and there can be no other explanation for our defeat.

The result does highlight the problems affecting football in the county at the present time and perhaps for a number of years. The full blame for the situation must be put clearly on the shoulders of the players and the clubs who just don't seem to care about how badly we fare, year in and year out.

No blame can be attrib-

uted to the men who manage the team. Joe Curran, Jim McGrath and company have given freely and generously of their time and energies in preparing the panel and the County Board have also given generously to the cause. But as I have written before, all this goes for nothing when too many of our clubs and players just won't co-operate.

It is also a factor I suppose that club standards of football here in Waterford are poor by outside standards and in such a situation, it is difficult to mould a panel into a team that can challenge for honours in the league or championship. It was the subject of comment last week that the two clubs who contested the County Football Final last October did not have a player on the team which lined out against Tipperary.

It is time that Coisde Na Peil took a very serious look into the whole matter of the lack of club and player loyalty to the county teams. This suggestion does not take from the very dedicated and loyal players who continue to give it their best shot, year after year. These people can feel proud of their commitment to the county.


De La Salle Centre Opened

RULE 21

al debate at the Burlington Hotel, Dubl Saturday last, three hundred delegates representing every county and the G.A.A. boards in Britain decided to defer a decision to remove Rule 21 which prohibits members of the British Forces and police from being members of the G.A.A.

The proposition to remove the ban which came from Central Council, had overshadowed all other G.A.A. activity over the past few weeks and events like the Cork/Limerick and Kilkenny/Dublin provincial championships were pushed very much into the background.

The Special Congress was held in camera and the motion, having been proposed by the President was opposed by the nine Northern counties each of whom addressed the Convention and attracted support from speakers outside the

province. The standard of debate was top class with many of the best orators in the G.A.A. making their views known.

In order that no division would result to the association, compromise won in the end and in a statement to the media at around 7 p.m the following was issucd -

arrangements envisaged in the British/Irish Peace Agreement

After the Congress, Association President, Joe Mac-Donagh said he was pleased with the result in which the Association were united and totally committed to the continued search for peace and reconciliation in Ireland. Waterford were represented at the Special Congress by Pádraig S. O Riain (County Chairman), Paddy Walsh and Anthony Walsh (Chairman and Secretary of the Western Board), Jimmy O'Gorman (Munster Council representative), Denis Hanrahan (Secretary of Eastern Board) and John O'Leary (County Youth Officer). The majority of the three hundred delegates were pleased that the issue had been resolved in this matter but it failed to satisfy some sections of the media, some of whom did not know what was involved anyway.
