Bord Pleanala To Rule In Dispute Over Abbeyside House Extension

A group of residents in Abbeyside have lodged an appeal with An Bord Pleanala against the decision by Dungarvan UDC to grant planning permission for an extension to a house in King Street Lower which they claim, would encroach on the public roadway.

According to Cllr. Paddy Power who lives in close proximity to the proposed development, the same application was previously lodged with the UDC in March and he inquired as to why permission had now been granted for the exact same project five months later.

While accepting that the owner has to renovate the building, Cllr. Power however said the residents simply wanted him to move the development back from the road.

The matter was raised at last week's meeting of the Urban Council where a

fiery Cllr. Power claimed it was time the Council called in the planning tribunal. Pointing to a similar situation on the quay where McInerney's were allowed build on a public roadway,

Cllr. Power said people in the town believe the Council has no control over planning applications. He said the residents in Abbeyside now have to fork out money to appeal the matter when it should have been dealt with originally.

Decision On Dungarvan's Traffic Problems Deferred Yet Again

Despite previous assurances by Dungarvan UDC that the trial one-way traffic system (introduced in May) would be reviewed after an initial 3 month period, traffic problems in the town are set to spin out even longer as the matter has now been handed over by the Council to a newly established traffic management committee.

No wonder beleaguered motorists think the Council are dragging their heels on the matter - a belief even held by some of its members, not least Cllr. Billy Kyne who himself expressed disappointment that the Council is still starting from scratch.

Pointing to the ongoing problems of parking on the Causeway and the fact that the much talked about load-

ing bays have yet to materialise, Cllr. Kyne said the Council hasn't done enough so far. "We're still kicking for touch", he felt.

Sharing his views Cllr. Paddy Power said people have been waiting for the past 3 months for action from the Council.

"It's about time the Council made a decision", he declared. "The Causeway is a deathtrap... Western Terrace and O'Connell Street are all a disgrace and loading bays should have been put in".

Cllr. Austin Flynn who previously lacerated the traffic management plan and declared that the town is in 'total chaos' said people in the town are saying that the members cannot or

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Know Your Rights

QUESTION

What are the income guidelines for a loan from the local authority?

ANSWER

If you can show the local authority that you are unable to get a loan from a bank or building society and you are in need of housing and satisfy the means test you can apply to your local authority for a house purchase loan or home improvement loan.

For a single income household, multiply your gross income (before tax) in the last income tax year by 2.5. If the result is £50,000 or less, you qualify. For a two income household take 2.5 times the higher earnings before tax, and once the secondary income. If the total is less than £50,000 you qualify.

If you are an approved applicant for local authority housing, or a local authority tenant or tenant purchaser, you are exempt from the income test.

The Department of the Environment have produced a series of leaflets which are available free from your Local Authority/Urban District Council. These leaflets look at all the options available for those people looking for housing.

I have tried at the Public Library, the Garda Barracks, the Post Office, the local bookshop and two newsagents to no avail. One newsagent told me they did stock it in the past but was not planning to stock it again.

If this situation prevails in other towns and cities of our country then the state is failing our young would be drivers.

LOBSTER THEFT

A reward is being offered for information concerning the theft of approximately

five lobsters from (Boatstrand Pier) Dunabratinn on Monday night September 14th. Thirty-five of these were egg bearing females and were being held for v-notching and would have been released again in a restocking programme operated by the East Waterford Lobster Co-op. The fact that the majority of the lobsters were egg bearing females may help to identify them as this would be an exceptional number in any one batch.

A spokesman for the fishermen in the area stated that the theft was a big loss to their efforts to boost lobster stocks and would appeal to any restaurant, hotel or exporter who may have bought them in good faith to contact (051) 396229. He also appealed to people in the trade to help protect fishermen's livelihoods by ensuring as far as possible when buying shellfish that they are dealing with genuine fishermen.

A number of the boat owners in the harbour are also concerned about the level of vandalism to their boats this summer and they are now considering installing a security camera on the pier.

OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH

Thank you for your entry form and map which was most helpful on adjudication day. It is good to note the large number of people on your Committee who work hard to improve and make your village most attractive for those who live in it and for visitors to the area. Well done to those who support you in forms of sponsorship and card nights, etc.

Perhaps you might bear in mind over the next couple of years the need to promote greater visibility of the Irish language in signage and place names, etc.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

The School built in 1986 is very well maintained and has a lovely selection of shrubs and trees which are well cared for and are maturing nicely. The Church and Garda Station continue to be well presented as is the Post Office. The Bridge Pub looked very smart with a nice colour scheme of yellow and green. Excellent work is being done with the old graveyard. Again the Muintir na Tire Hall is well presented.

LANDSCAPING

All plants and trees throughout the village are very well maintained and the management of the open green spaces again are very well maintained throughout. The area across the road from the Church and into the village which is a raised

area is very well maintained with a lovely selection of roses and trees maturing.

The triangular area is again a delight with the pump being a lovely feature, with some very good planting of flowers done there. You have achieved a good variety which is important. Perhaps if putting in some more shrubs or replanting you might consider the year round effect.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

I note that your Committee is encouraging wildlife on the trees opposite the Creamery and this is to be commended. The adjudicator would think that the stream would be an ideal area to encourage some more wildlife in the village. A good starting point would be to identify the wildlife habitats of that area and see what species of fish, birds, animals and insects that this area attracts.

LITTER CONTROL:

Your control of litter was very good throughout and it was good to see that school children do play their part. Very little litter was evident on the day of adjudication apart from 1 or 2 small pieces.

TIDINESS

Overall the village had a tidy appearance to it. Control of weed growth at kerbs and at the base of buildings was very good. The absence of fly-posting and graffiti was also noted. The overhead wires do need attention and hopefully in the future this will be attended to.

Almost all properties continue to be maintained to a

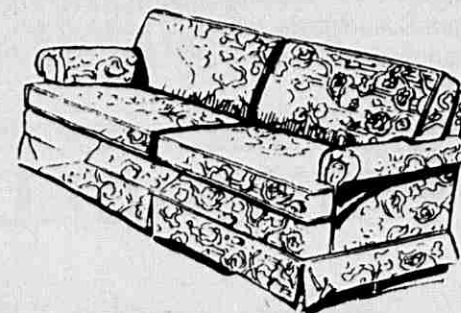
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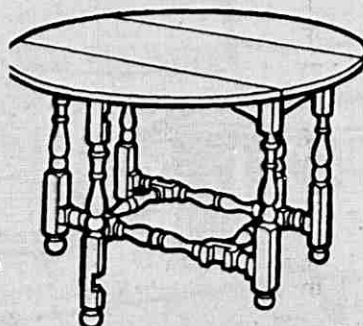
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Tallow/Knockanore Select Candidate Who Refuses

Sweeping changes are envisaged in the make up of the 23 members of Waterford County Council following next June's elections. It is understood that well over one third of the sitting County Councillors have applied for the Golden Handshake offered to them by the Minister for the Environment, Noel Dempsey.

Under the Local Authority Members (Gratuity) Scheme Councillors who announce their intention to retire before next June will qualify for lump sums of up to £25,000 depending on how long they have served on the Council. The deadline for lodging application was the 14th September.

The Minister when first announcing the scheme last July estimated it would cost £1 million, although he admitted he did not know how many Councillors would avail of this once off package. It is now feared it will cost the Irish Taxpayer £7.5 million.

One of the first sitting Councillors in Co. Water-

ford to show his hand is Fine Gael's Willie McDonnell, who has confirmed that he has not applied for the Gratuity Scheme, and has recently been selected by the Tallow/Knockanore Fine Gael branch members as their candidate for the forthcoming election. His name will go forward for convention in Lismore next month. Cllr. McDonnell, was first elected to Waterford Co. Council in 1979 and under the new package would qualify for up to £20,000. However, when asked regards the new scheme introduced by the Minister he stated that when first selected and elected by the people of West Waterford money was never an issue, and that remains the same today. "I like the Council, and it is now a part of my life. However, I feel the new scheme is a foolhardy move, there is a real danger it will result in decimating invaluable experience which has served local Government exceptionally well over many years. Experienced Council-

lors are vital to the efficient operation of our local government system, and is an important link and sometimes a buffer between officials and the people they represent", said Cllr. McDonnell.

Welcome For Helvick Harbour Works

Works to improve facilities at Helvick Head pier in Ring is to be carried out over the coming weeks.

Welcoming the news, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair says the provision of a floodlight on the breakwater, the extension of water supplies, the strengthening of ladders, varied concrete works and the removal of silt will alleviate some of the inconvenience currently being faced by fishermen operating from the harbour.

KIDS STUFF Snowy Owl - Large and attractive member of the family

THE SNOWY owl, whose latin name is *Nyctea scandiaca*, is one of the largest members of the owl family.

It is also one of the most attractive, with its white plumage and its small black bars.

As its name suggests it came originally from Scandinavia, where its colour helps camouflage it in the snowy landscapes as it hunts for food.

Snowy owls now live in Asia and North America as well Scandinavia, Russia and northern Europe. A few can be seen in captivity in zoos in the British Isles.

Like other owls, the snowy owl hunts at night. It feeds mainly on small mammals and swallows them whole. It has very acute sight and hearing.

Other members of the owl family include

the barn owl and the eagle owl. Most varieties of owl grow from 12 to 73 centimetres and can be found in nearly every country on earth. But the snowy owl is confined mainly to the countries which have a colder climate.

The snowy owl is now classed as an endangered species, but attempts are being made to encourage it to breed. Chicks born in captivity are being taught how to hunt for food so they can be released into the wild when they are fully grown.

are not willing to do something about the traffic problem.

He claimed that 80% of the traffic problems are in O'Connell Street, which was originally earmarked as a one way street in the original traffic proposals. The gridlock on this street, he said is due to the fact that trucks are parked there on both sides.

Urging the Council to take action and enforce the law, Cllr. Flynn maintained that the town's current problems are "purely down to the fact that there's no implementation of the rules".

FINAL REPORT DUE IN OCTOBER

Meanwhile the new traffic management committee,

comprising of representatives of the Gardai, Chamber of Commerce, O'Connell Street traders, Town Engineer, Town Clerk and members of the Council, are expected to report back to the Council with a final synopsis in time for the next monthly meeting in October.

The committee will examine submissions made to the UDC from individuals as well as the Chamber of Commerce and traders in O'Connell Street dealing with various aspects of traffic management including one way traffic, loading bays, additional car parking requirements both long and short term and pedestrian crossings.

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nally by the Council.

Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly however totally rejected any inference made by Cllr. Power regarding irregularities in planning applications and stressed that no inappropriate plannings have ever been granted by the Urban Council.

Town Engineer Joe Brennan explained that the original planning application for the house at King Street had not been refused, rather the applicant had been asked to reconsider the project. An old extension built onto the house is already on the roadway and the application would simply entail its replacement. The front line of the building, added Mr. Brennan, would not come out any further onto the road. He said the planning section deals with all cases on its merits and in accordance with the proper planning and development of the area.

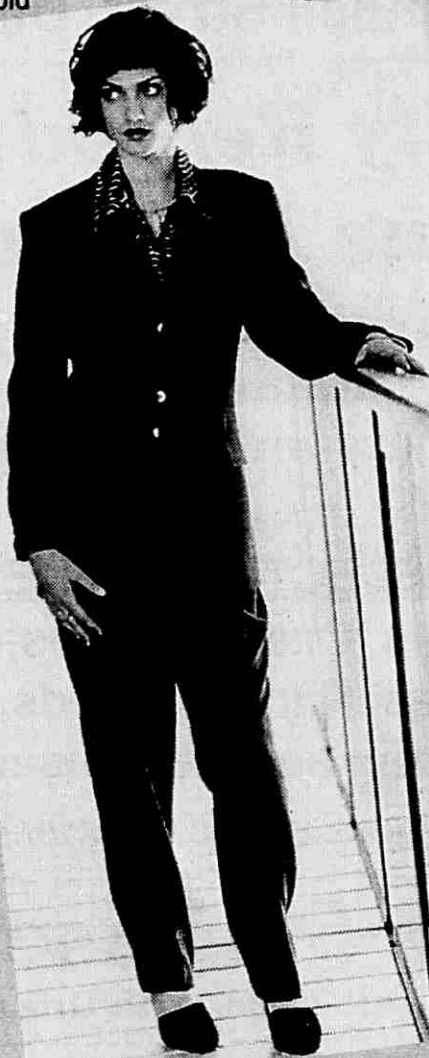

Projects Granted Planning Permission Around

Planning permission has been granted by Waterford County Council to East Cork Oil for an extension to their existing office at Ballinaparka, Aghlish. They also received approval for the construction of new oil and petrol storage tanks and a new canopy over the loading bay at the site.

Permission was also granted to Michael Hanrahan of 'The Lodge', Park's Road, Lismore for the construction of 5 two storey houses consisting of two pairs of semi detached houses and one detached house at Main Street/Park's Road.

Tallow based company, Imperial Tobacco Ltd. has been given the go ahead to erect a sign at the entrance and the front of the building and to retain the existing cladding colour on the factory building currently under construction at the IDA industrial estate in Tal-low.

Elsewhere, the Waterford Manor Hotel in Woodstown is to undergo a radical facelift after receiving permission for alterations to the existing hotel building as well as for the erection of a new two storey extension comprising of 14 bedrooms,

gym, conference rooms, carpark and sewage treatment plant.

Last month, Rathgormack/North Waterford Community Development Ltd. received permission from the Council for a new tourism/community development centre at Carrowleigh, Rathgormack which has been designed by Dungarvan architects Damien Dillon & Co.

In Cappoquin, the local boat club has been allowed to proceed with alterations to the roof covering at their clubhouse on the Blackwater. Permission has been granted to the club to renew the side cladding and construct a 30 metre gabion wall to the river edge and concrete ramp at the boat house.

Permission however was refused to Co. Dublin based Signways Holding Ltd. for the retention of an advertising sign at Knockeylan, Lemybrien. The reasons given by the Co. Council were that the development would be contrary to the County Development Plan policy, interfering with the visual amenity of the area and giving rise to traffic hazard on the national primary route.

Old Parish Road To Be Resurfaced

A major resurfacing and structuring work on a main roadway in the Old Parish Gaeltacht area is set to be undertaken and completed in October.

The stretch of road lies between Loskeran Cross which features the local Health Clinic, Post Office and Udaras na Gaeltachta factory and the bend at Ballymacart National School which also features the Parish Church and the Community Hall.

Local County Councillor Fiachra O Ceilleachair said he welcomes assurances from the Council that this major work is to be attended to promptly and effectively. In all 1,569 metres of road is to be strengthened. There will be a rolled double seam tar and chip structuring, which should eliminate the bumps and hollows and retention of surface water which the stretch is currently prone to.

"Seeing as the Council committed themselves to housing schemes at both Gates and Knockanore in Old Parish in recent times, it was only fair that it would follow through in strengthening the main route serving these and other developments in the area", said Cllr. O Ceilleachair. "It would be my hope that other stretches of the Ring-Ardmore road from Robert's Cross through Old Parish and from Lios Caoille cross can be attended to in a similar manner in the future".

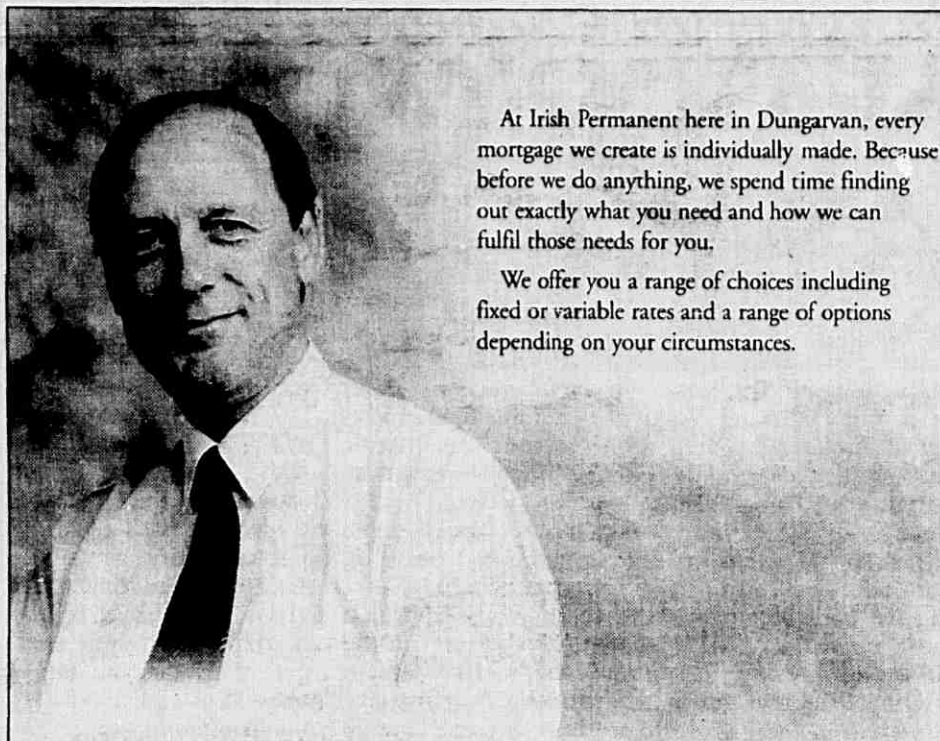
Originally from Roscom-mon, Martin keeps himself busy with work and he also owns three mares, two males and two greyhounds.

NATIONAL TIDY TOWNS AWARDS '98

The National Tidy Towns Awards were announced recently with the title of Tidiest Town in Co. Waterford going to Stradbally. There was however extremely good news for Dungarvan. We increased our score by 15 pts. from 191 in 1997 to 206 for this year and in so doing we had the second highest single increase in our category, only being surpassed by Wicklow Town who increased their score from 179 to 195 (an increase of 16 pts.). This increase in turn meant that we leapfrogged up the table from 18th to 8th in our category.

The Chamber is most proud of these results and we feel it augurs well for future years. Our Tidy Town's Sub-Committee chaired by John Walsh (Horticulturist and local businessman) have worked extremely hard with a number of other bodies to bring about this success. A special tribute must be paid to our Town Clerk, Ray Moloney and our Town Engineer, Joe Brennan, the Parks Division and members of the U.D.C. for the strong support, both financial and otherwise, throughout the past twelve months. We owe a special word of thanks to the business community, local residents associations and private householders for all of their hard work and determination in contributing to the overall effort.

The timing of this year's event was most opportune given that the adjudication took place on July 3 (just ten days before the arrival of the Tour de France). The Tour Committee pulled out all the stops to ensure that the town was at its very best for this event and great credit is due to all concerned.

For future years the Chamber is determined to increase its efforts and to build upon this year's success. As part of our plans, we intend to create stronger links to the schools and other organisations who, we believe, have a very significant role to play in determining the future development and appearance of the town. One of the recommendations put forward in the report is that the Chamber should invite all other interest parties to become members of our Environment Sub-Committee. I hereby extend an open invitation to one and all to contact our offices if you feel you or your organisation have a role to play in local environmental issues.

I include hereunder a copy of the official Tidy Towns Report on Dungarvan:—

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

The commercial properties overall are maintained very well. There is some plastic signage in evidence and no doubt over the coming years that will be replaced by more traditional looking shopfronts. The hotels are maintained in good condition with Lawlor's Hotel in the town centre, looking particularly attractive. It is also nice to see Irish language signage being used over the shops and they include An Poc ar Buille, Bean A'Leana and An Gabha. Well done to all those who replaced their shopfronts during the year and removed the plastic signage. The entrance to the GAA pitch was finished off to a very high standard with lovely stone piers and nice signage over the gate. Part of the Shopwell building would need some screening and suggest perhaps that trees be planted here. The schools were maintained to a high standard with Ard Scoil na Deise looking particularly well. At the primary school in Abbeyside, the grounds were very well kept but the wall and building does need freshening up. The churches and their grounds were well maintained. The Market House did need to be painted. Perhaps it could be restored to its original stone if it is in good condition underneath and if it was originally unplastered. The commercial banks were very well maintained and presented to a high standard and that included the Bank of Ireland which appeared to be freshly painted and the AIB Bank. When all building at the quayside is completed it should enhance that whole area. No doubt the developers have plans to landscape the entire area. The Grotto at the junction of the Youghal road by the roundabout was well maintained and had a lovely selection of shrubs and plants.

LANDSCAPING

All open areas are kept very well. The roundabout on the Youghal road had a lovely colourful selection of flowers planted there. The open space at the Causeway was clean, neat and tidy. The open green spaces by Abbeyside Church again was well maintained but would need a little more attention around the edges where there was some weeds and grass. The trees planted at George's Court are maturing nicely but the grass was a little untidy and did need a cut. The landscaping throughout is of a very high standard and in

most cases the species of trees and shrubs selected is excellent.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

Areas such as Abbeyside Beach and at the Causeway are ideal areas as a starting point to identify the wildlife habitat of your catchment area and see what species of animals, birds and fish these attract. Perhaps you might invite a local wildlife expert in your Community to get involved and provide you with the expertise which would help you enormously. When you have completed this exercise, to make it more enjoyable and accessible for the members of your Community, why not provide information signs (bilingually where appropriate). The U.D.C. are to be commended for their plans to eliminate all untreated discharges into the Harbour by the construction of a sewage treatment plant. Properly managed natural areas and wildlife would add greatly to the Dungarvan area.

LITTER CONTROL

Dungarvan is a large town and it is difficult to control litter throughout all the areas. The U.D.C. launch of their action against litter is to be commended. Students in schools have a huge contribution to make in keeping their town tidy and fitter-free. Overall the litter situation was very good. There was no huge or vast amounts to be seen on the day of adjudication. A few bits were scattered on the by-pass coming from the Youghal road and continuing out towards the Waterford road. Some under the seating on the N25, a few odd bits on the streets in the town and on the road to the hospital.

TIDINESS

There was an absence of fly-posting throughout the town and very little graffiti in general. The control of weed growth at kerbs and at the base of buildings and walls was extremely good throughout. Your bottle and textile banks are indeed to be welcomed and this adjudicator is delighted that these have been very successful for you. It is a very good idea to extend this to the other carpark. The location, screening and signage is important when providing this type of facility. The approaches to the town and the town itself by and large had a tidy look about it.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

The new housing estates both private and Local Authority housing are presented to a very high standard throughout. In the older housing estates the boundary

walls and palings do need attention in some instances but again by and large these houses are very well kept. The older stock of housing throughout the town is well maintained overall but do need some brightening up. Perhaps window boxes would help enormously here in this situation. The older Local Authority housing estates are making a good effort to bring up the standard of maintenance throughout. All the residents are to be congratulated on having a pride in presenting their properties in the most attractive and best possible way.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS

The approach road from Waterford and Cork are maintained in excellent condition. Well done to the U.D.C. for presenting the entrances and exits to the town in the best possible way. The trees in these areas, the approach roads and on the by-pass, are maturing very nicely. The grass was neat and trim and the verges were perfectly maintained. The Causeway

YEAR 2000 COMPUTER PROBLEM: GUIDELINES FOR BUSINESS

Over the next 2 weeks I intend to concentrate on the "Year 2000" problem in relation to who it should concern, what effects it may have on individual businesses and how to tackle these problems in advance.

The advent of the Year 2000 brings with it a threat which, if ignored any longer, could have very serious implications for the future of your business. There has been much publicity about what is variously described as Millennium Timebomb, Millennium Bug, Year 2000 Meltdown, etc. Despite awareness campaigns in Ireland and world-wide on the issue, many businesses have failed to take action to deal with the Year 2000 computer date problem.

Since the early days of electronic computing, only two digits have been used in many cases to represent the year in date fields. For example, 1998 is represented as 98. The other two digits (the century), are commonly assumed to be 19. As a result, in many applications, the year 00 (intended to mean 2000) will be interpreted as the year 1900, causing failure in date based calculations and date sorting. Failures will occur whenever a system uses a date on or after 1 January 2000. Applications must be in place and working correctly by 31 December 1998 to allow for proper processing of future dates and to ensure that your accounting systems cope with the changes correctly in the last financial year before the change of century.

WHAT CAN GO WRONG

Software applications could fail or data become corrupt, resulting in:

- ★ Loss of contracts from inability to meet just-in-time deliveries.

★ Cancellation of orders of new stock.

★ Inability to issue stock invoices or track debtors and creditors.

★ Incorrect processing of payments.

★ Disruption of supply chains due to Year 2000 problems suffered by key suppliers and customers.

Automatic controls could fail to operate leading to overheating, fire and perhaps explosion.

Rapid and uncontrolled shutdown of processors may lead to damage to process machinery and other possible consequences.

Safety guards on machines could malfunction, increasing the risk of injury to employees.

Failure could arise in fire alarms, sprinkler systems, air conditioning, heating, lifts, telephone exchanges, photocopiers, fax machines, VCRs, refrigeration units, ovens, etc.

FROM AWARENESS TO ACTION

Being aware of the problem is not sufficient. Every company, large, medium and small, across all business sectors, must examine its vulnerability, prepare a plan of action, and implement it before the deadline. Whatever your business, the time to start fixing the problem is running out.

It is important to remember that IT consultancy services may not be available on demand during 1998 and 1999 and the costs for consultancy, where available, may increase as the compliance deadline approaches.

For some businesses it may already be too late to complete the necessary work on time. No one can get an extension to the Year 2000 deadline, but you can decide not to waste more time. The good news is that the Year 2000 problem can be fixed.

Chairperson of Waterford County Council Nora Flynn said '98 had been a great year for the county with the tremendous performance of the hurlers, the ladies football team, the Tour de France, the building of new Council offices and above all Waterford being chosen as the county with the best litter control record in the state.

She said the county award scheme recognises the hard work and effort put in by individuals and communities to achieve excellence in their chosen field and spreads examples of achievement to show the way for others to follow.

Continuing, Cllr. Flynn paid tribute to young people who carried out many tasks and environmental projects as well as the principals and teachers who instill a sense of environmental awareness amongst their pupils. She thanked the Tidy Towns groups, residents associations and parish councils who have done so much to enhance the physical appearance of towns, villages, church yards and open spaces as well as the supportive role played by FAS, and other agencies such as Waterford Partnership.

"Without your trojan efforts the litter free status and the million pound factory promised by IBAL would not have become a reality", she added.

FAMILY HEALTH

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

Q: My 14 year old daughter has put on nearly two stone in the past year. She eats a lot anyway and now binges on crisps and chocolates. She says she's unhappy and that's why she overeats. How can I help her?

A: Your concern is justified. This pattern of self harm is hard to change. First tell your daughter you're worried and you've decided to get some help for her. It's important not to ask whether she wants help. She's doing herself harm and needs parents who will take a firm stand in acting on her behalf. Contact your G.P. He or she can provide a general health check for your daughter and advise where she can get help with her diet. He may be able to refer you to a dietitian who can talk

to your daughter about developing healthy eating habits. She also needs practical help with her emotional problems. Don't delay, this is a very serious problem. Start helping your daughter now.

Q: My 12 year old son has suddenly developed a phobia about dirt and bugs. He's forever washing his hands, checks the crockery before he eats and doesn't want to ride on the schoolbus with other children. He says he's not having problems at school and still wants to play with his friends. My husband thinks it's a joke but I'm getting very worried.

A: This is not a joke - it's probably the beginning of an emotional illness which needs to be taken seriously. The three of you should make an urgent appointment to go and see your doctor. Ask for an assessment by a consultant in child psychiatry. This is a common condition but people often cover up and don't admit what a problem it can be. Your son may need help in admitting he is in trouble.

Q: My son is only 10 but snores for hours every night. He shares a room with his younger brother who can't sleep.

A: Ask your doctor to check for ear, nose and throat infections. Even if there's no obvious cause, your son should snore less as his nasal cavities reach full size. A study of over 1,500 children between the ages of 6 and 13 showed more than half snored. Occasional snoring was linked with colds, coughs, tonsillitis and smoking by parents. In fact three-fifths of the habitual snorers lived with parents who smoked. To overcome the problem of your younger child missing out on sleep, perhaps you could stagger their sleeping times (if a separate bedroom is out of the question) so your younger child is asleep when the older one goes to bed.

Chef's Corner

Menus for the week

St. Clements Flan

- 2 eggs (size 3)
- 50g/2 oz caster sugar
- 50g/2 oz plain flour
- Grated rind and juice of one orange
- 2 tbsp caster sugar for syrup
- 1 tbsp Grand Marnier (optional)
- 1/2 orange, sliced with each slice halved
- FILLING**
- 2 tsp powdered gelatine
- Grated rind and juice of one small lemon
- 1 egg (size 2) separated
- 25g/1 oz caster sugar
- 2 tbsp double cream
- Mint leaves to decorate

METHOD — Preheat the oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas Mark 5. Grease a 20cm/8 in diameter sponge flan tin. Place a circle of greaseproof paper in the base then dust with flour.

Put the size 3 eggs in a large heatproof bowl with the 50g/2 oz sugar. Set over a pan of simmering water and whisk until thick and creamy and the mixture leaves a trail when the whisk is lifted. Sift in the flour and gently fold in with the orange grind.

Pour into the tin and bake in the preheated oven for 15 mins. until risen and golden. Turn out on to a wire cake rack. Remove lining.

Meanwhile place the orange juice, 2 tbsp sugar and Grand Marnier (if using) in a pan. Warm until sugar has dissolved. Add orange slices and simmer gently for 2-3 mins.

Remove slices with a slotted spoon, cover and reserve. Spoon the warm syrup over the sponge flan. Leave to cool completely.

To make the filling, sprinkle gelatine on to the lemon juice in a heatproof bowl. Leave until spongy. Stand the bowl in a pan of simmering water until the gelatine has dissolved. Cool slightly.

Place the size 2 egg yolk, sugar and lemon rind in a heatproof bowl. Whisk over a pan of simmering water until thick and creamy.

Remove from heat and whisk in the cream. Stir in the gelatine. Whisk the egg white until stiff and fold in. Spoon into the flan case and chill for about 30-35 mins. until set. Decorate with the reserved orange slices and mint leaves.

Health Tips from "Remedies"

Slippery Elm

The bark of this small American tree is usually sold powdered to use in herbalism.

Slippery Elm is a gentle and effective remedy for irritated states of the mucous membranes of the stomach and intestines. It is a particularly soothing herb and can bring instant relief to indigestion, heartburn, wind and diarrhoea.

A teaspoon of Slippery Elm powder stirred into a glass of water or milk is also used as nourishing drink during convalescence. It has a strongly mucilaginous "slippery" taste and texture.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

1. Keep good quality wooden furniture out of direct sunlight and well away from damp walls.
2. Whiten yellowed knife handles by rubbing them with a cut lemon dipped in salt. Rinse in warm water and dry. Apply a little silicone cream. Never immerse such handles in water when washing.
3. When sewing on plastic, put wax paper over the seam and the sewing machine will not stick to the plastic nor pucker. The wax paper will tear off easily when the job is done.

Age Of Beauty

SUPERFLUOUS HAIR

Many women have a problem with unwanted hair on the body. The most common factors which influence hair growth are puberty, pregnancy, menopause, surgical, medical and emotional problems. During puberty an increase in hormones may result in hair growth on the face or other areas of the body. They are usually just long fine fair hairs and may only be temporary. In such cases it is advisable not to touch these hairs.

Pregnant women undergo many hormonal changes which may result in unwanted hair growing on the chin, upper lip and sides of the face. Not long after childbirth the hormonal imbalance is restored and the new hairs will disappear. Therefore it is not advisable to have these newly acquired hairs treated.

Unfortunately excessive hair

growth is a frequent accompaniment of the menopause. Not all the hairs which grow will remain but some of the stronger hairs will have to be treated. The surgical removal of sex glands in women after puberty brings about an artificial menopause which frequently results in facial hair growth.

Some hormonal medications can cause unwanted hair growth; for example cortisone is a common cause of the problem as are birth control pills. It has been found that people under extreme stress often develop heavier growths of hair than they would in normal circumstances. In such cases hairs that are not lost should be treated.

Some medical problems may cause excess hair growth. In such cases medical advice should always be sought.

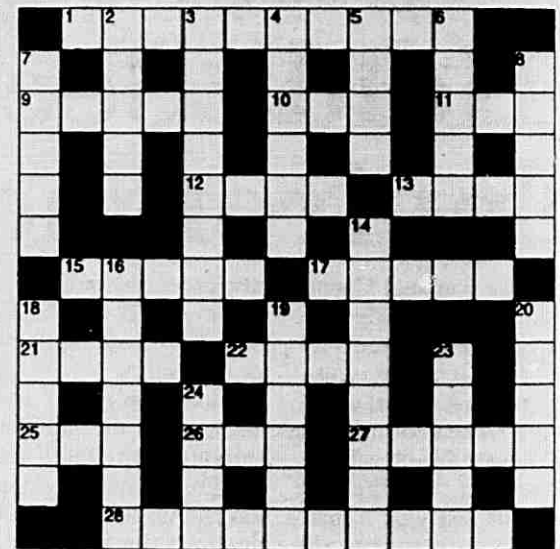

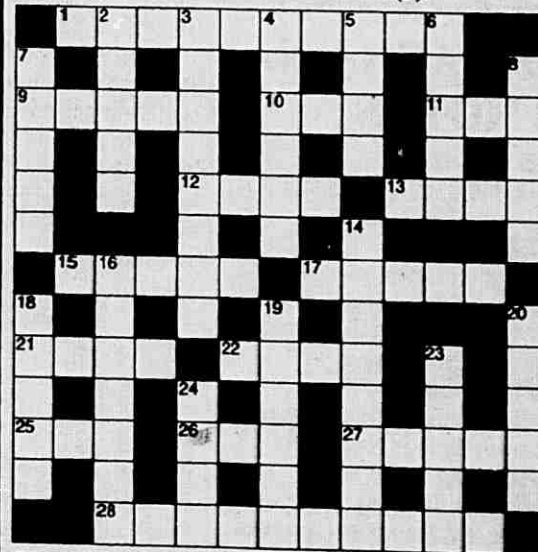

Council Calls On Minister To Reopen Live Cattle Trade

There was unanimous backing recently by the members of Waterford County Council for a motion calling on Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh to reopen the live export of cattle particularly to Libya and Egypt.

Proposing the motion, Cllr. Oliver Coffey said farming was going through a crisis with marts close to collapse because of the

plummeting cattle prices due to a lack of competition. "The meat factories have it all to themselves, because there are so few cattle for shipment", he stressed.

"I am bitterly disappointed with Minister Walsh", declared Cllr. Coffey who claimed that when in opposition the T.D. had promised that if returned to power, Fianna Fail would reopen these vital export markets without delay.

"The current situation within the industry is frightening and farmers are facing a repeat of the disaster of 1974 when the cattle trade totally collapsed".

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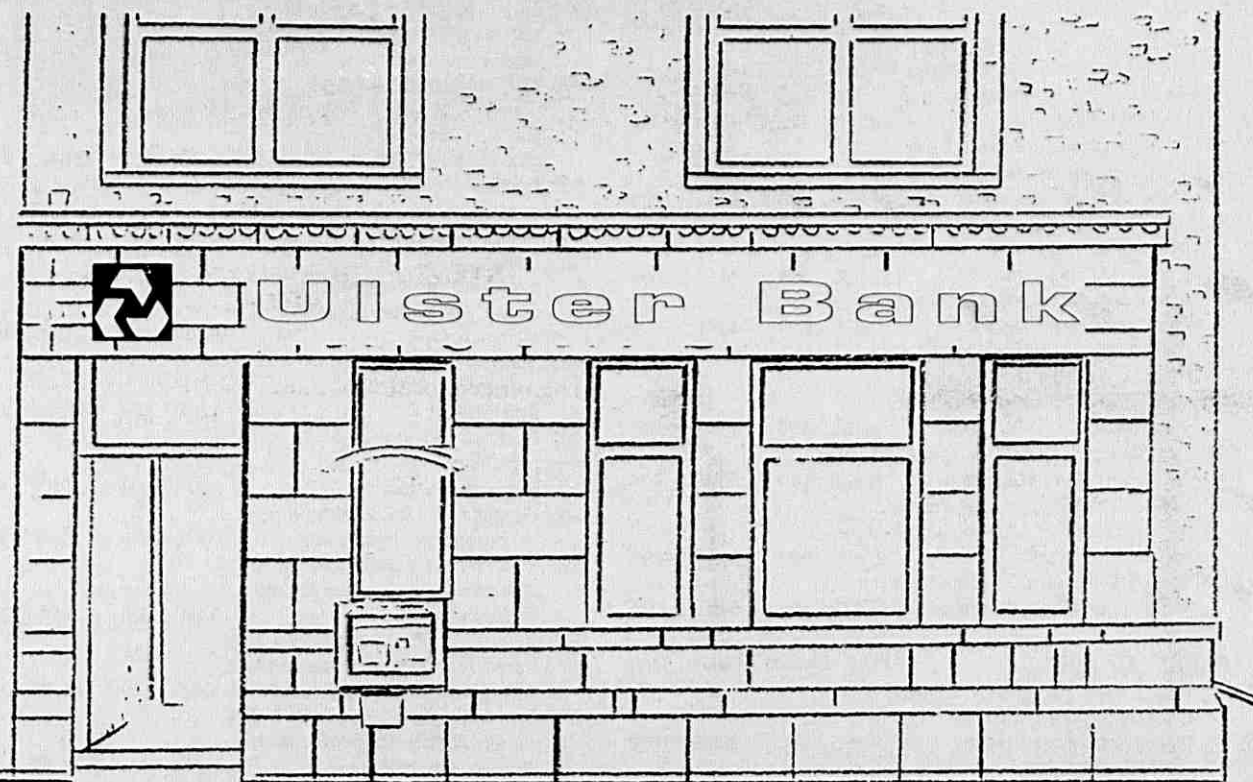

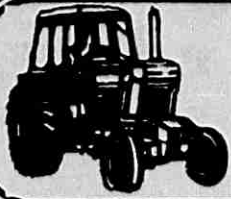

Emergency Meeting Calls For Government Action Plan To Tackle Livestock Crisis

PURCELL CONFIRMS RE-OPENING OF LIBYAN CATTLE TRADE

At an emergency meeting of the IFA National Council in Dublin last Tuesday, (22 Sept), IFA President, Tom Parlon called on the Government to acknowledge the gravity of the income crisis in the livestock sector and implement an immediate strategy to tackle the problem. Mr. Parlon said the income situation affecting many farm families depending on livestock was now so serious that the Association was calling for the immediate extension of the Family Income Supplement (FIS) to eligible families and a substantial increase in headage payments. The IFA President said

payment of the FIS to low income farm families was necessary to offset the extremely low incomes of many families who under present rules did not benefit from this income safety net. "Under the scheme the income threshold for a family with three children is £252 per week and many farm families are now way below this figure."

The IFA President called for a substantial increase in headage payments to give immediate aid to livestock farmers in serious difficulty due to the collapse in the price of cattle and hill lambs. He emphasised that headage payments to hill sheep farmers must be maximised.

Mr. Parlon also outlined Government measures which were required to assist pig producers and farmers with a severe fodder shortage.

Referring to the needs of the livestock sector, Mr. Parlon said the government must take immediate action at EU level to secure the reopening of the critical beef export trade to Russia. "This will involve the government getting the EU to provide export credit insurance for the Russian market

combined with increased export refunds to help maintain volumes to this £100m. market."

The emergency meeting was addressed by Mr. Seamus Purcell of Purcell Exports who announced the reopening of the Libyan live cattle trade with shipments due to commence by October and prospects for the export of up to 90,000 head by the Ramadan period in December.

While welcoming the restart of the Libyan trade, IFA President Tom Parlon said Autumn cattle prices would be determined by a combination of beef and live markets, and the reopening of the Russian beef market was essential.

The IFA President also demanded government action on financial measures to assist pig producers. Mr. Parlon estimated that 25,000 farmers were facing severe shortage of winter feed and said that direct government support was necessary to help these producers to provide for over wintering of stock.

In conclusion the Council kept open the prospect of further public demonstrations, depending on the Government response.

M.V. CAROLINE — A WELCOME CHANGE OF MIND

Welcoming the announcement on approval for the M. V. Caroline for the carriage of live cattle to the continent, ICMSA President Frank Allen said: "I am delighted to see that the Department of Agriculture and Food has changed its mind as regards the suitability of the M. V. Caroline for live cattle exports."

Mr. Allen said: "I have campaigned for the approval of the M. V. Caroline for almost two years. The department along with many others blocked it every step of the way. I am pleased indeed that my support for the M. V. Caroline has been fully vindicated."

"If the M. V. Caroline had been approved a year and a half ago, a greater number of live cattle could have been exported earlier in the year, and thus established more secure long term markets."

"It is vital that the commitment to live exports to Europe is a long term one and not just an immediate short term response to the present crisis in the cattle trade. Our primary and long term strategy must be to expand our market share in Europe for beef and live cattle," Mr. Allen concluded.

Department Refuse To Give IFA State Of Play On Area Aid

James Coughlan, Waterford IFA Chairman, has said that after a meeting of the Charter Review Group that the Department's refusal to supply precise figures on the current state of play in the area aid section is worrying.

Mr. Coughlan said "in August IFA Deputy President, John Dillon, wrote to the Minister asking for an update on the level of progress with area aid applications. Given the disaster that occurred in Area Aid last year, it is reasonable that IFA be told the current state of play. However, at a recent meeting the Department of Agriculture refused to give IFA details of the number of applications processed to date."

During the course of the meeting, the Department conceded that at the last Charter Review meeting they had agreed that area aid updates would be made available to IFA. However, at the recent meeting, the Department changed their policy and said that while internal statistics were available, they would not give them to IFA.

"This is a worrying development" said Mr. Coughlan. "While the Department say that progress in the area aid unit is satisfactory, their unwillingness to give figures does not inspire confidence. IFA is not looking for forecasts, we just want to know the current state of play."

Purchase of Ship Suggestion Unacceptable — ICMSA

Responding to the suggestion of Ned O'Keeffe, T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture & Food that farmers co-operatively should purchase a ship to service the export of cattle, Pat O'Rourke, Deputy President of ICMSA said that such a suggestion was totally unacceptable.

He continued: "Farmers are the producers of food material which is processed mainly through the co-operatives. Farmers are not shippers and the suggestion that they take over part of the role of Government in the provision and operation of shipping off the island is just not realistic."

"Part of the function of the Department of the Marine & Natural Resources is 'the regulation and development of marine transport sectors'. Therefore, where there was an absence and a shortfall in shipping facilities for the export of livestock, it is the function of Government to rectify that position."

"The provision of a conveyance route for Irish livestock to UK and European markets is no different from the provision of adequate roadways within the country. The Government is totally abdicating its responsibility for transport facilities within the country and to outside destinations, and attempting to shift this responsibility onto the shoulders of farmers", concluded Mr. O'Rourke.

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Fruit trees are sure to appeal

EXOTIC fruit trees can give your garden real appeal. Here are some varieties that will really make your mouth water:

Peaches and nectarines - Peaches and nectarines are grown in many temperate regions. They have a chilling requirement of 600 to 900 hours below 45 degrees F. Sunny, dry summers are essential to produce good crops. In cooler climates they may be grown under cover. A range of cultivars is available for different climates. Nectarines generally prefer warmer growing conditions to the peach.

Peaches flower early in the year and should be protected from frost. A south facing wall site is usually ideal for growing peaches. Maximum sun in a sheltered site is necessary,

so in cooler climates a sunny wall or greenhouse is needed. Deep, fertile, acid soil is ideal for growing peaches and nearly all cultivars are self-fertile. Peach trees should be planted by midwinter as growth starts early. Bush trees should be staked for the first two years.

Peach trees grown under cover are best fan-trained. With proper care and cultivation and the right pruning and training your peach trees can be expected to bear fruit within the first three years of planting.

Mulberries - Mulberries have been grown in the British Isles for centuries and they are quite abundant in the south of England. The juicy purple berries are just as succulent as raspberries and strawberries and it remains a mystery why the growing of mulberry trees has not been more popular. The correct term is mulberry tree and not mulberry bush as in the nursery rhyme.

The trees do, in fact, grow to a height of 30ft. The chilling requirement is high and the trees begin growth late in the season. Moist, slightly acid soils are preferable. They should be planted in late autumn to winter, but in cold areas they can be planted in the spring. Cultivation is similar to that of apples and they can be grown alongside most apple trees. They should be mulched and watered in dry weather, but they usually remain untroubled by pests and diseases.

The trees should be pruned when fully dormant in winter. The fruit should be picked when fully ripe in late summer or allowed to drop on to a suitable surface, such as a sheet of plastic, to keep it clean. Mulberries are delicious eaten fresh and they can be frozen. They are excellent in most dessert dishes using fresh fruit and they can be cooked or used in jam or preserves. They are at their very best eaten fresh with cream or ice cream.

Passion fruits - Passion fruits are climbing plants with individual stems reaching many metres in length. The soft round fruits are either yellow or purple when ripe and may be up to three inches in diameter. The optimum temperature range for the purple passion fruit is 68 to 82 degrees F. The yellow passion fruit prefers temperatures over 75 degrees F and does not tolerate frost. Purple types may withstand frost for short periods. Moderate to high humidity is required for satisfactory growth and in the British Isles they are normally grown in a greenhouse.

Passion fruits require support in the form of a wire trellis which should be in place before planting. Soils may vary but must be well drained with a pH of about 6. Cross-pollination by bees is normal, but hand-pollination may sometimes be necessary. A general purpose fertiliser should be incorporated into the compost before planting.

A minimum temperature of 68 degrees F should be maintained along with a humidity level of 60 to 70 per cent. Pick fruits when they begin to change colour from green to either purple or yellow.

This was a major undertaking at the time but Biddy, being of adventurous disposition took it all in her stride. During her time in Chicago she saw the many ethnic movements, at first she had Polish, Irish and Italian communities as neighbours, but in latter years of her stay she was the only white inhabitant of her neighbourhood, her residence being known affectionately as 'The White House'. She was employed at La Retrait Childrens Hospital on the southside of the city. Among the many visitors to that centre for the ill she made the acquaintances of both Mohammad Ali of boxing stardom and Msg. McDermot who was renowned for his charitable works on skid row. Only last year the same Msg. McDermot wrote personally and invited Biddy to America to celebrate his sixty years in the priesthood. She often related that she always voted for Major Richard Daley who was of Old Parish origins and witnessed the major political victories of Jack Kennedy. In 1979 she returned to her beloved Ardmore where she spent the next fourteen years with her own, Henry O'Reilly and family of Tigh Beag Uí Raghailigh on Main St. It was very obvious, talking and conversing with her nephew Michael for this obituary tribute that Biddy was much loved by the O'Reilly's. She was the essence of loyalty and the main people of Ardmore were her greatest friends although she felt at ease in the company of such notable writers and artists as Molly Keane and Patricia Cookburn. Sadly Michael informed me that Biddy's passing closed an important chapter in the lives of the Dolan, Twomey and O'Reilly families both in Ireland and America, as Biddy was the last of her generation. Despite her failing health, Biddy could up to when she breathed her last talk freely of happenings and events that took place over a half century ago. Her 86 summers failed to stop or hinder her as she sang 'Cill-Chais'. A charitable woman, a religious woman who loved her dogs, Biddy was held in the highest es-

Childers Estate Residents Outline Reasons For Judicial Review

The following is a statement issued by a group of residents in Childers Estate, Dungarvan outlining their position in relation to the upcoming Judicial Review which they have sought for the vacant site in Quanns adjoining their estate.

"In 1982 the V.E.C. acquired a green field site at Ringnasillogue from the U.D.C. This site lay dormant for a very considerable period of time while the V.E.C. were 'looking' at other potential sites including one adjacent to the existing V.E.C. known as Dr. Anne's. This site was looked at as recently as 1994. Rumours persisted at that time that negotiations were going well and that a deal was imminent. Unfortunately nothing materialised. Various other sites in the area came on the market in places such as the Beeches and Wolfe Tone Road. Regrettably no action was taken for fifteen years from the date of acquisition of the site at Ringnasillogue, then in 1997 it was decided to utilise said site. Before any development could take place the land had to be rezoned by Material Contravention from Sports and Recreation thus resulting in the loss of a valuable amenity. At this juncture we, the Childers Estate Residents Association, became active and we commenced airing our grievances.

From the very outset we stated in no uncertain terms that we were not opposed to a new V.E.C. school but that we were against the proposed location of said school. For the record we would once again like to reiterate this fact. If anything we would welcome such a new school however said school would have to be in an appropriate location. At all stages we have been unambiguous in the stating of our case. Furthermore we have always dealt with the issue on an open basis following legal advice from the outset. Our decision to apply to the High Court for an application for Judicial Review was not taken lightly. It is a very serious decision made by us to preserve the Status Quo of our position and to ensure that we are not barred by strict legal time limits from taking the matter further. As a result of this decision we have been subjected to a fresh barrage of criticism from various V.E.C. members and Councillors. As we see it the position is far from clear:

(a) They state that they have been given the green light by the Department of Education to go ahead on an alternative site namely the Presentation Ground. This was not conveyed to the Childers Estate Residents and we can only wonder why this was the case.

(b) We last received correspondence from Mr. Kyne in March of 1998. In this letter he assured us that planning permission should be in place for the development by August and that works should start by the end of the year. To date no application for planning permission has yet been made.

(c) Mr. Kyne stated that a meeting with the County Manager, Town Clerk and elected members would have confirmed that the former Quanns/V.E.C. site would not be built on and an agreement could have been drawn up to that effect. Such a meeting and agreement was not arranged in the seven month period since the making of that statement. We agree with Mr. Kyne when he says that local dialogue could easily have removed the need for such a measure as a Judicial Review. Unfortunately we were not contacted for such discussions despite the fact that we have always made it known that we are available for same.

Our principal concern is that the Presentation proposal may not materialise. This is particularly so in that we have seen no evidence of any constructive action to implement the plan.

We now publicly call upon the V.E.C. committee and councillors to give meaning to their words by drawing up a concrete agreement in writing with us the Childers Estate Residents Association. If such an irrevocable assurance is given, then it would be unnecessary for us the Childers Estate Residents Association to pursue a Judicial Review."

Dungarvan Scouts Celebrate Their 30th Anniversary

**1968
1998**

This year our local Scout Troop celebrates its 30th anniversary since being reformed in 1968. Over the years many changes have occurred, scouts, leaders and committee members etc., but the tradition of scouting in the town carries on. There is an age old saying in scouting "once a scout always a scout". Whether its true or not is debatable but for many past members scouting will always have a special place in their hearts. Memories of past camps and hikes, camp fires, etc., are fondly remembered.

Since 1968 the Unit has grown from strength to strength. It began with a scout troop, the introduced a cub section and now a beaver section. Scouting itself caters for boys between

the ages of 6-? There are still some 60 year olds who are scouts at heart. The Unit is now going strong with up to 90 members.

IN THE BEGINNING

The 11th Waterford was first formed in the early 1930's. The Scoutmaster during the 1930's was Mr. Con Wall and he in turn was succeeded by Mr. Liam Comerford (R.I.P.) a teacher in the local C.B.S. Secondary School. It was disbanded in 1946. In the log of the 4th Waterford Troop the last mention of the old 11th was on 15th September 1946. This was the occasion of the Farrell Cup competition held in the C.B.S. Grounds, Dungarvan. The 11th took part in this competition and were placed third behind De La Salle (Waterford) and Abbeyside.

In these earlier years the den was a room in the C.B.S. and the Brothers field was the main venue for most of the outdoor activities. One of the 1st annual camps was to Ardmore

for a duration of 10 days.

In March 1968 a public meeting was held in the C.B.S. with a view to reforming the Troop, the outcome of which was the 11th Waterford was reborn and a charter was granted on May 8th, 1968, under the guidance of Rev. J. Murphy C.C. (Troop Chaplain) and Mr. J. McCarthy N.T. (Scoutmaster). A local committee was appointed in June 1968. On 25th July 1968 a colourful and impressive ceremony took place in St. Mary's Parish Church when 35 boys presented themselves for investiture in the presence of a very large and representative congregation. Those attending included Mr. J. D. Hally, National Commissioner, Mr. Billy Smith, A.D.C., Mr. Tom Kyne T.D. (R.I.P.), Chairman Dungarvan U.D.C. A running commentary on the proceedings was provided by Mr. Jimmy Nagle, as many of the congregation were not familiar

Brilliant Results For Lismore Tidy Towns

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Lismore is extremely lucky to have some very fine public buildings and they include the Castle, Heritage Centre, the Church of Ireland and the Catholic Church. The commercial bank buildings were presented to a very high, standard and looked well. The Library is situated in delightful grounds which are maintained and presented very well. The Garda Station is well presented and the Grotto which is maintained in excellent condition had a lovely selection of shrubs and plants. The white seats here — one needs to be repaired and both needed painting. The house at the top of Gallows Hill between the two roads, was delightfully presented and well maintained. Buildings at the back of this do need some attention. The tennis courts again were well maintained. The Public Toilets were maintained very well. Both churches looked extremely well as were their grounds. The Teagasc offices are again presented to a high standard. A good effort is being made by the business Community to present their properties to the highest possible standard. The new shopfronts including 'The Acorn' and 'Maddens' do help to improve the overall appearance of Main Street. Hopefully before the year is out work will commence on screening the ESB sub-station and Telecom Eireann will do some work on the Exchange.

LANDSCAPING

The landscaping throughout Lismore is one of a very high standard and great care and attention has been taken to present it in the best possible light. Great care has been taken with new planting. The choice of species overall is very good. The maintenance and management of them throughout is extremely good. The street nameplate at Hospital Lane looked most attractive on the stone wall as did the flowerbed which had a lovely selection of plants and shrubs. The Pump area received lovely treatment which looked delightful, very tasteful and stylish. The trees planted are maturing throughout the town and in the open green spaces. The open green spaces are maintained to a very high standard. Across the road from the Esso Station there was some delightful planting to be seen. The planting

done on the Tallow Road in 1997 is maturing very well, was in good condition and well maintained. A geranium bed at the base of a tree in the Mall area looked extremely well.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

Congratulations and well done to the Lismore Tidy Towns Committee for inviting the Conservation Volunteers of Ireland to visit the town in October last. Properly managed wildlife will add greatly to the Lismore area. There are wonderful plans outlined for the canal, riverwalk/strand, Beech Grove, the Library grounds and Deerpark Road. When this plan is implemented over the coming years it will be a wonderful amenity for both the Community of Lismore and visitors to the town. You have a wonderful wildlife habitats throughout including the river, the hedgerows, the canal and the Library grounds among others. It was wonderful to see the ducks in the canal and all appeared to be having a great time!

LITTER CONTROL

Your plan for litter control throughout is working extremely well. There was just a few small pieces in Hospital Lane; a few pieces scattered throughout the entrance area to the Church of Ireland on the green area on both sides and a few pieces in the carpark by the hotel. It is great to see the Tidy Towns Committee and the local Community co-operate on an on-going basis to ensure that all areas are maintained in a litter-free state. The Community is very anti-litter aware and with the provision of fitter bins in the right places it does help to keep it almost litter-free.

TIDINESS

The control of weed growth at kerbs and at the base of buildings throughout the town was extremely good. The odd black spot was mentioned last year and there are slight improvements.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

The presentation of almost all residential properties throughout the town are presented to a very high standard. There was a lovely mix of different types of houses throughout the town. The period houses in the South Mall have been restored carefully in some instances with some nice colour schemes being used.

Well done to the residents in Mountain View, Ashley Court, the Parks Road, the Bank Field and Town Park who continue to put great effort in presenting and maintaining their properties to a very high standard. However, in some areas boundary walls and railings would need attention. A seat at the Bank Field housing estate does need to be repaired and the grass around the trees to be tidied. The houses in Chapel Place are maintained to a very high standard and the colour scheme used on the houses is most attractive.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS

All the approach roads are maintained to an extremely high standard and are neat and tidy looking. The Bridge does look well, is maintained to a very high standard and the street lamps look most attractive. You have done quite an amount of work including the improvement at the entrance to the river, cleaned the area in front of the small thatch on the Vee road which now looks delightful. You have tidied the Strand Walk and also cleaned the Bridge at the end of the Canal on the main Cappoquin road. You have also painted some gateways and some areas of the town. Perhaps you might get the Lismore Estate to treat the timber gates which are erected on the Vee road and the Tallow road. There is a white gate on the Vee road which needs painting. The carpark at the hotel is maintained to a very high standard with the trees and shrubs planted there are maturing very nicely. The overall handling of signage is extremely good and no doubt you will handle any new signage in the appropriate manner and do not overlook the usage of bilingual signage. I do hope that you will succeed with your

plan for providing suitable access for persons with disabilities at the Church area.

GENERAL IMPRESSION

The Tidy Towns Committee have put in a huge amount of effort over the past few years and continue to do so. You continue to present the town very well and are making great efforts to overcome some difficult problems. Your work over the years has done much to improve the presentation of the town of Lismore. No doubt the Community do appreciate the trojan efforts you are making on their behalf. With the amount of effort and hard work which that is being put in by the Tidy Towns Committee assisted by the various agencies, Lismore can only continue to

improve and prosper in this Competition. Well done to you all on a fine achievement to date in making this town a delightful place to live and to visit!

SECOND ADJUDICATION

Lismore is going from strength to strength and is now well into the top league of the Competition. Litter again was not a problem, similarly weed growth (on the whole). The consistent manner by which so many public and private buildings are adorned with flowers is highly commendable. The main approaches, especially where work has been undertaken on the fine stone walls were admired. The picturesque view on the Dungarvan approach could scarcely be rivalled. Other recent work including upgraded shop fronts, the ducting of services, the tackling of derelict sites and the provision of new footpaths all are evidence of an extraordinarily active community led by the Tidy Towns Committee. We definitely look forward to returning next year!

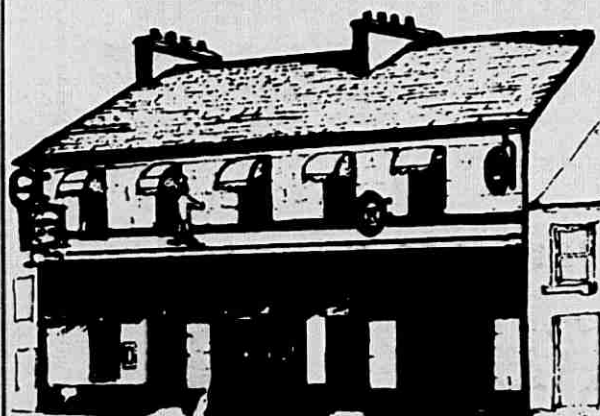

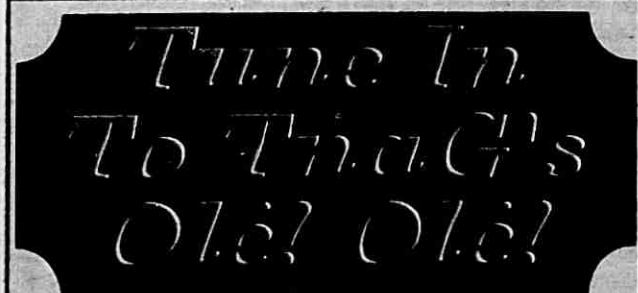
experiences that will directly involve you in a variety of communication situations. The principles you learn are basic to any form of interpersonal communication, whether your audience consists of one person or one thousand.

MONEY MATTERS

CHILD BENEFIT

Many benefits and allowances are not claimed each year. It is important to find out about any benefits to which you are entitled and one of those benefits may be Child Benefit.

You should apply for Child Benefit within 3 months after the month in which your child is born or becomes a member of your family. You can get a claim form from your local Social Welfare Office or Post Office.

Child Benefit is paid for each qualified child normally living with you and being supported by you. There are no PRSI conditions and you do not have to satisfy a means test.

Payment is made on the first Tuesday of each month by a book of payable orders which can be cashed monthly at a Post Office chosen by you or by means of Direct Payment into a Bank/Building Society/An Post Savings Account.

Child Benefit is paid every month for each qualified child who is under 16 years of age, or is under 19 years and is in full-time education or on a FAS course where an allowance is not payable.

Rates of payment:— 1st and 2nd Child — £31.50 per month; 3rd and other children — £42.00 per month.

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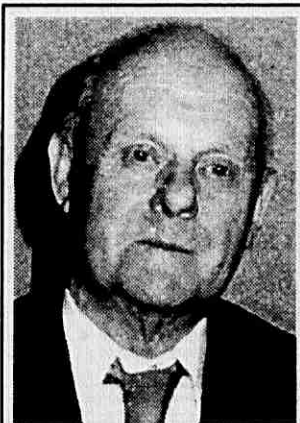

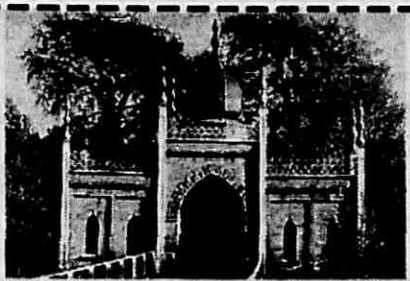

"THE SWAN OF AVON" COMES TO BLACKWATER

Macbeth at the beginning of the play has just fought loyally (but brutally) in support of his King. He is near enough to the throne to be ambitious, yet his ambition is checked by a politician's hesitations, a fear of consequences, an unwillingness to take the final step, that step is the murder of King Duncan while he is on a visit to Macbeth's castle. To accomplish it Macbeth needs his courage screwed to the sticking place by the prophecies of the witches and the taunts of his terrible wife, but once the deed is done Macbeth gains a fearsome confidence from the success and plunges from convert to open slaughter.

It might be asked what is tragic in Macbeth's downfall since one of the emotions the spectator feels at the end of the play is exultation at a tyrant's downfall. Yet in the first half of the play for all Macbeth's shuffling ruthlessness, one is conscious of an-

other side of him. Macbeth has an imagination of a poet - it ranges beyond the sordid greed of the immediate crime, it comprehends a limitless universe which shrieks with outrage at the deed in prospect.

For this presentation of Macbeth, Ballyduff Drama Group have joined forces with students from the Openmind Performing Arts Group at Coláiste an Chraoibhin, Fermoy. These students are embarking on a two year course aimed at the professional theatre. Ballyduff Drama Group always strives for professionalism and usually achieves it. In succeeding to mount a production of this nature, this group has certainly reached new heights and gained further recognition. Brendan Dunlea's characterisation of Macbeth is fresh, forthright, energetic and very powerful. He considers it his greatest role to date and when

BALLYDUFF FESTIVAL IS TOPS

SURVEY OF DRAMA LEAGUE OF IRELAND

There are some 35 full-length drama festivals in Ireland and recently the DLI conducted a survey among all the groups who travelled to and performed in these festivals. Points of examination were all aspects of festival business including venues, facilities, financial matters, hospitality, audiences and adjudicators - basically all the major components which make for a well-run festival.

The survey was very detailed in some aspects and threw up some interesting statistics. For example the average cost to groups who travel on the circuit was over £2,000. In other aspects the outcome was very straightforward. When all the components were brought together, one basic question was asked which are the best-run festivals in the country? In this, in joint third place were Derry and Mount Mellick with the West Cork Festival in Roanmore in second spot. Top of the pile however is the West Waterford Festival at Ballyduff, a source of tremendous pride to all involved in its administration. The eighteen years of the Festival has seen it grow from being a small local event into being a national one of some significance.

The first festival in 1981 was called the Avonmore Drama Festival and was small in its execution but not in its ambitions. Audiences were scarce, groups were local, the adjudicator was from up the road and the whole thing was operated on a stage slightly larger than a matchbox. In the meantime, sizeable investment has been made in building and facilities, top groups from all over the country have played at the venue, adjudicators have come from all of the four home nations as well as from the Continent and upwards of 3,000 seats have been filled during festival runs.

So when the groups vote West Waterford as the best-run festival, it is not by fluke that such reward is given but by many years of hard work and no little ambition.

ALL-IRELANDS IN BALLYDUFF

In the year 2000 the Munster region is due to hold the All-Ireland Confined 3-Act Finals and in a recent vote by all our fellow festivals, West Waterford ousted our colleagues in Kerry and in Clare to win the right to host them in Ballyduff in that, the most significant of years. This vote was highly significant as it was achieved against the backdrop of alternate venues in Kerry such as Siamsa Tire and a magnificent new venue in West Clare.

The Festival will take place in April and will prove a marvellous opportunity for the Blackwater Valley to display itself in all its springtime finery to groups from all the four provinces. The Festival was held this year in Enniscorthy to coincide with the 1798 Bicentenary celebrations and next year will be held in Derry.

In the meantime the machinery of planning has to crank into action with financial planning being of the utmost importance. Ballybridge Utd. were one of the favourites to go up last season and after an encouraging start which saw them lead the table for a while, they slipped away dramatically. The mentors will be keen to avoid a repeat, although the introduction of so many young players will benefit from last season's efforts and Utd. will be expected to start well. If they can sustain the early form, then they have a great chance of success.

Rangers, at one stage, looked doomed last time but a good run of performances got them out of trouble. Consistency has been a problem for Blackwater and you could see them beat the top team as easy as lose to the bottom team. The loss of some influential players could be disastrous and this could be a long season for Rangers.

Just down the road, Clashmore Ramblers will be hoping for better things after a couple of poor seasons. Apart from the first few games last time, they were never in with a chance of going up and they need to tighten things up at the back if they harbour any thoughts of promotion. On their day, Ramblers can beat most sides but a big effort is needed if they are to achieve promotion.

Gortroe, the third division champions, look like they have a more settled side and results went their way last season. They finished up as one of the highest scorers in the league and their firepower alone should see them stay out of danger. If their defence can be a little meaner, they would have definite claims for a promotion spot. Likely to do well on good ground as they use their pace to good effect, Gortroe could have a second successive promotion campaign.

Inch must have a great chance and would have won the league easily were it not for the first four games. The East Cork side lost their four games and although they came with a storming run, they just failed to make it in the end. Some of the younger players will have come on and Inch must be ranked as one of the top two or three teams.

Mogeely lost their place in Div. 1 after a number of years fighting relegation. They are a capable side but their problem lies with the number of goals they concede and despite dropping down a division, they might find it hard to overcome against some free scoring teams. Mogeely are another team who are unpredictable but if they solve their defensive problems, they should go close.

Youghal were relegated along with Mogeely last term but their end of season form was a major improvement and they also had the problem of introducing several new faces which did not help matters. Youghal play an attractive brand of soccer and will win more than they lose. A good start should give them the encouragement to go all the way.

As we said at the start, it is anybody's guess who will win promotion or be relegated but we have divided the teams into two sections with Inch, Youghal, Ballybridge and Gortroe in the top half and Clashmore Ramblers, Mogeely, Blackwater Rangers and An Gaeltacht in the bottom half. It should be a terrific season and we wish all the clubs, players and supporters the best of luck. Next week Div. 1.

Waterford Hope To Turn Clock Back On Monaghan

When referee Finbar O'Driscoll eventually got around to blowing the final whistle at the end of last year's controversial All-Ireland Senior Ladies Football Final, it did more than signal the end of a game. It captured the imagination of the entire country and whet the appetite for this year's championship.

There was little doubt that the two best teams in the country - Monaghan and Waterford - would again qualify for the final. Whether they can match last year's thriller is another matter. Monaghan, bidding for three in a row in their fifth consecutive final appearance or will Waterford win the fifth title since 1991. Sunday next will provide the answer.

The build up to the game has been electric. Live television coverage and the Bank of Ireland sponsorship deal has boosted the game enormously. Three separate T.V. crews visited Dungarvan recently - TnaG, Sideline View and RTE News.

It's only a very short time ago that the Association was crying out for media attention. Recent events have changed all this and a good final would improve things even more. However both teams won't be too bothered about the quality of the game. When you cross the white line in Croke Park, it's all about the result. A good game was no consolation to Waterford last year. In truth the final is all about winning. Waterford have tasted the sweet scent of victory on four occasions before swallowing the bitter pill of defeat last year. They have no doubts about which feeling they would like to experience come 5 p.m. on Sunday evening.

Monaghan too have seen both sides of the coin. Two consecutive defeats in '94 and '95 both at the hands of Waterford before they were victorious in 1996 and 1997. The stories coming out of the Farney County tell of tiredness, loss of appetite and lack of in-

terest. Time to take out the pinch of salt. When a team marches behind the Artane Band on All-Ireland Final day the appetite returns, the tiredness disappears. Fair enough, Monaghan are appearing in their fifth consecutive final but for half of the Waterford team it's their sixth final appearance in eight seasons. End of argument.

Likewise the favouritism tag doesn't exist between these counties. There's no need for motivation. The rivalry is fierce, the sight of the jersey brings out the best in

both teams. They will fight tooth and nail to bring back the cup, you can rest assured of that. They have already clashed twice in 1998 in the fourth round of the league and in the league semi-final. Both ties were won convincingly by Waterford. Again those results will have no bearing on the outcome. The championship is the real test. It's do or die, the intensity is far greater.

The first championship clash of the team came in the 1994 final when Waterford edged home by 2-10 to 0-12. Monaghan are likely to include seven of that particular side. Waterford will have ten on duty. Monaghan have well and truly proved their worth over the last two years. They are a battle hardened team with good players in key positions.

Jenny Greenan, Angela Larkin, Diane Dempsey, Edel Byrne, Niamh Kindlon, Linda Farrelly and Eileen McElvan-

ney need no formal introductions on the big stage. They have been there - done that. Monaghan will look to those accomplished players to lead the way.

Greenan, although only 20, is a veteran. A wingback on the 1992 All-Ireland junior winning team, she is the hub of every Monaghan move, a player who will cover every blade of grass prompting col-

leagues, creating openings. It was Greenan who popped up to notch the equalising

point in last year's final. It was Greenan who faced up to a vital free in this year's senior final when Monaghan were in serious trouble against Meath.

In attack Angela Larkin and Edel Byrne are the key players. Larkin leads Byrne as a lethal finisher. Although only 17 years of age, Byrne is a rare talent both from play and placed balls and if she is held then Waterford are in with a great chance.

Like any other team Monaghan too have their weaknesses. Their defence is eminently beatable indeed I would venture to suggest that if the Waterford attack got a decent supply and play to their potential, then Waterford will win the match.

The inside trio of Claire Ryan, Aine Wall and Geraldine O'Ryan have the ability to destroy any defence. They are able to make and take scores and powder the keg to this game. The half forward line of Caitriona Casey, Rebecca Hallahan and Fiona Crotty are also very capable performers well capable of making a major contribution. Olivia Condon and Martina O'Ryan resume their successful midfield partnership and the defence has a solid look about it. It contains several changes, positional and otherwise from last year's line-up. Only Siobhan O'Ryan, the team captain and Julie Torpey retain their positions. Paula Walsh comes in at No. 2 with Noirin Walsh at No. 4, Deirdre O'Rourke moves to centre-back while last year's goalkeeper Annalisa Crotty wing-back Sarah Hickey swap positions.

Judging a result to date, the positional changes have worked. Waterford are just

one step away from a league and championship double, a feat they previously achieved in 1992 and 1995. To capture that league title, they defeated Monaghan in the semi-final before pipping Clare by a single point last May.

The first round championship game was a stroll against Cork at Páirc Uí Rinn. Clare provided a much stiffer test in the Munster Final at Fraher Field but Waterford won comfortably 4-11 to 3-7. Well below their best in the semi-final, they were still too good for Mayo, the victory margin being 1-15 to 1-4.

Monaghan's only championship game was an All-Ireland senior final victory over Meath 0-14 to 1-9, a game in which they struggled for a long time. Thus both teams will be hoping to improve dramatically on the semi-final form.

In summing up it has to be said that this game will probably go down the wire. It may

well be a touch of genius or a strike of luck that ultimately decides it. Let's hope that the sun shines on Waterford. Ref-

eree for the game is Christy Haughey (Carlow) who took charge of both the '94 and '95 finals. A good omen perhaps.

Waterford Ladies Football Has Arrived

Waterford have been part of the Ladies Football story since the very beginning. They took part in the inaugural championship in 1974 and although the early year didn't bring much success, the seed was sown and the efforts of Fr. Percy Ahearn, Margaret Foley, Ann McCarthy and their colleagues should be remembered. In those days they always gave the big guns, Tipperary and Kerry a good game but failed to make the breakthrough.

Players such as Nora Cunningham, Joan and Bridget Behan, Carmel Ryan, Mary Walsh, Ann McCarthy etc. were more than a match for the best but never enjoyed the fruits of success. Things took a change for the better in the eighties and slowly but surely the wheel began to turn.

Michael Ryan took over as manager in 1982. Noel Murray organised the County Board and Waterford won the All-Ireland junior title in 1986. The next four years brought consecutive defeats at the hands of Kerry before the elusive breakthrough was made in 1991 with a five point victory over the Kingdom in Listowel.

Waterford went all the way defeating Laois in the final to add a new name to the Brenda Martin Cup. Patricia Butler, Cleona Walsh, Ann Dunford, Ann Fitzpatrick, Sinead Walsh, Bernie Ryan, Marie Crotty and June Whyte have retired but Martina O'Ryan, Regina Byrne, Catriona Casey, Noirin Walsh, Geraldine O'Ryan, Fiona Crotty and Aine Wall continue in pursuit of All-Ireland glory, despite the fact that they have won four All-Ireland senior titles and three National Leagues.

In 1992 Waterford retained their senior title defeating Laois 2-10 to 3-4 in a thriller. Kerry spoiled the party the following year in what was the great Mary Jo Curran's Swan Song, a single point the margin at Fitzgerald stadium, in a game that was as good as was ever played.

The Déise girls were back in 1994. Monaghan pushed them all the way. Aine Wall and Catriona Casey shot the vital goals and their experience pulled them through 2-10 to 0-12. 1995 brought the same pairing. Waterford were expecting a real battle but a great start helped the reigning champions to an easy victory.

It was Monaghan's turn in 1996 defeating Waterford in the semi-final before overcoming Galant Laois, after a replay in Croke Park. 1997 was a year that will never be forgotten, a great game, 11 mins. of injury time, a spectacle that captured the imagination of the nation as Angela Larkin finally lifted the cup.

Thus once again for the fifth consecutive year and the seventh time in 8 years, either Waterford or Monaghan will win the title. In addition both counties have almost totally dominated the underage scene in recent years. It seems the rest have a bit of catching up to do.

When measuring Waterford's success, they lead the combined roll of honour

in all grades. The massive contribution of Bridget Grant deserves to be highlighted. An All-Ireland junior medal winner as a goalkeeper in 1986, her knowledge of underage football is vital at senior level. Bro. Pat Lennon of the famed St. Augustine's College has also played his part, particularly early in the year and the college facilities have been crucial.

Marie Crotty, whose career was not short of injury, looks after the Dublin based players and will ensure that they are ready for the fray. Maybe she took the cue from Micheál Ó Muircheartaigh and his contribution to the great Kerry team's success.

Lawlors Hotel have been the team sponsors since 1993, the proprietor Mick Burke was a member of the Cork team beaten by Meath in the 1967 All-Ireland Football Final. Lawlors have been generous in their financial support. Waterford Crystal have also helped considerably in the preparation of county teams. Likewise the County G.A.A. Board, the Divisional Boards and the Dublin branch of the Waterford Supporters Club have also played their part. Michael Ryan, a native of Kilgobinet now based in Dublin, has supplied the tracksuits. Other companies and individuals have also helped on and off the field, it's been a real team effort.

When Fr. Ahearn and co started 28 years ago on any available level field, they couldn't have envisaged the progress that was subsequently made. Croke Park, 20,000 spectators, live television - yes indeed, Ladies Football has arrived.

The impact made by this man is not likely ever to be forgotten by Ardmore. May he rest in peace.

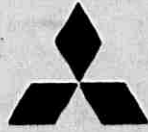
