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Man Charged With Abducting Local Girl (8)

ACCUSED REMANDED IN CUSTODY

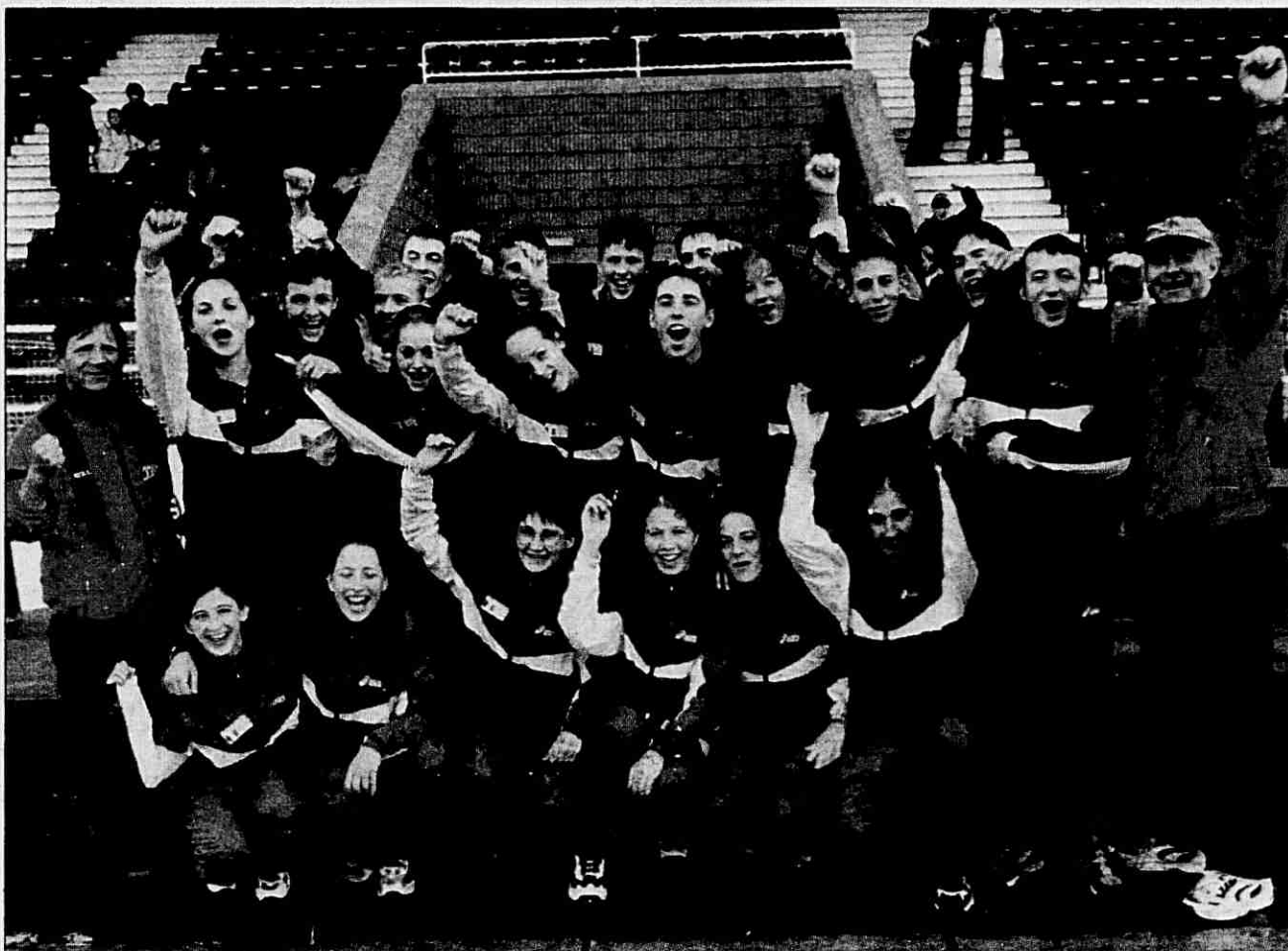
The 51 year old Scotsman, who appeared in custody before a special sitting of Dungarvan District Court on Sunday morning last, charged with the attempted abduction of an 8 year old girl close to her home at the Shandon Halting Site the previous night, was further remanded in custody, with consent to bail, at Cork District Court on Monday.

The accused, John McDonald, with a Glasgow address, is also charged with assaulting the girl on the same occasion. McDonald had been staying in bed and breakfast accommodation in

Abbeyside prior to the incident which sparked off intense garda activity resulting in the speedy arrest of McDonald.

He was detained in custody at the local garda station overnight on Saturday before his brief appearance before Judge David Riordan at Sunday morning's special sitting of the District Court. The actual wording of the attempted abduction charge is that McDonald "attempted to take or detain the 8 year old girl so as to remove her from the custody of her

Brilliant St. Augustine's Win In Euro Games

"Ecstasy unbounded" are words inadequate to describe the scenes of joy and elation which greeted the announcement of St. Augustine's as the overall winners of the Superschools '98 competition in the Assembly Hall of their college last Thursday evening.

For three days last week they had battled on home turf to retain the title they had captured last year in Wales and were eventually convincing champions on a scoreline of 461 pts., a clear 33 ahead of their Scottish rivals, Carluke High School. The victory this year added to last year's success in Wales in the same competition and will surely merit them a trip to Helsinki in the year 2000 to represent their country for the third successive occasion.

When MC Tom Keith announced the winner to an

eager and packed Assembly Hall, some of the broadest smiles were on the faces of team captains, Marion Troy and Shane Briggs, who had led by example and were true inspirations to their colleagues and had coaxed the very best from their nineteen team mates to write another glorious chapter in the history of the College.

All week, the students, representative of the eight teams from six European countries had battled it out in a variety of indoor and outdoor sports and realistically, as they went into the

last day of the Games, the trophy was there for the taking by a number of different teams. However, with a show of character and sporting skill, the young athletes from St. Augustine's fought off a brave challenge from their opposition, particularly their Scottish counterparts, to run out worthy and decisive champions.

School Principal Fr. Moran, in congratulating his team on their deserved success, stressed that the Superschools Euro Games is about much more than winning a trophy.

"These eight national teams," he said "representing their countries and their respective schools and colleges, have done their nations proud and there is not one team among them of which I would not wish to be a part."

"The spirit of Eurathlon has prevailed here all week", he continued, "and instead of rivalry, bitterness and antagonism which can so often be present in international competition, we have had good sportsmanship, warmth and goodwill. When the teams shook hands, the gesture was generous and genuine and the meeting and mingling during the social programme and free time was in an at-

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

My mother-in-law has come to live with us. She requires constant care and attention. My husband is working earning £200 a week. Would we qualify for the Carer's Allowance?

ANSWER

There are a number of conditions which must be met in order to qualify for the Carer's Allowance. The person being cared for must need full-time care and attention - a Medical Certificate is required. The person concerned must be 66 or over or if under 66 getting one of the following social welfare payments - Invalidity Pension, Disability Allowance, Blind Person's Pension or the equivalent from an E.U. country. You must be available to provide full-time care. You must satisfy a means test which will take account of any income you or your husband may have, including savings/investments. As regards your husband's earnings, the first £150 are disregarded by Social Welfare, as are travel costs to work, and half the balance is assessed as means. Details of the means test are available in a Social Welfare booklet - SW41 Carer's Allowance, which is available from your nearest Social Welfare Office or Citizens Information Centre. If you have no other income you will qualify for a reduced Carer's Allowance. You will also qualify from this month for a free travel pass in your own right.

Irish Heart Foundation Supports Heart Failure Research Project

The IHF has allocated over £ 140,000 this year to support vascular research in Ireland in line with its mission to reduce cardiovascular disease. In addition to existing projects, five new projects have received support. As more and more people are now surviving heart attacks, the burden of heart failure is increasing in society which puts considerable pressure on health care resources. It is now generally accepted that one of the major reasons behind the difficulty in caring for patients with heart failure is the lack of a focused intensive approach to its management. This approach, which involves a multidisciplinary team, ensures that patients' diet, drug therapy, rehabilitation and understanding of their condition is optimised. The Irish Heart Foundation have provided grant support to St. Vincent's Cardiomyopathy group under the direction of Dr. Ken McDonald to initiate a protocol to objectively assess the value of an intensive inpatient and out-patient management strategy on morbidity in heart failure. Other research activities support by the Foundation relate to improving the understanding of heart disease risk factors and investigating the feasibility and safety of rapid treatment options for patients with heart attacks in remote communities.

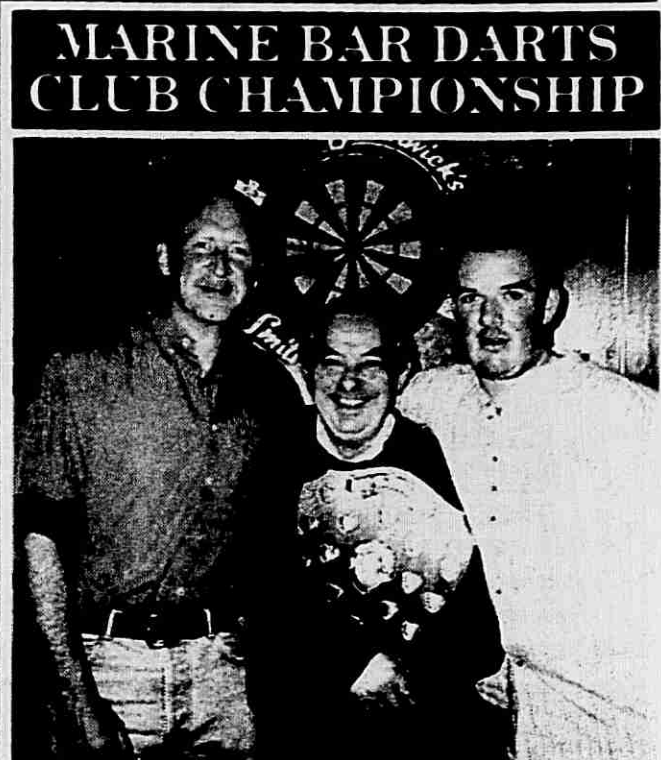
Tidy Towns Results For Ballyduff

The village of Ballyduff Upper scored a total of 182 points in this year's national Tidy Towns competition as opposed to 177 last year. The following is the adjudicators report on their visit to Ballyduff on June 22. Last year's marks are in brackets:
 The Built Environment 26 (24) max: 40 — The Garda Station, which is in a delightful location, is a building of great character. There is great scope to do some planting in front of this area. The church was well maintained. The graveyard was at the stage of the grass needing a cut. The school again looked neat and tidy and perhaps some more planting of trees and shrubs could be done here. The Community Hall is a lovely new building and enhances the whole village. The white railing does need painting and I would suggest that some planting be done in front of the railing with the plants being native to the area.
 The commercial buildings throughout the village were very well maintained and that included the shops and pubs. Well done to all.
 The Co-op Stores do need attention and the adjudicator would suggest that tree planting be done inside the wall, which should act as a screening when the trees begin to mature.
 Landscaping 22 (21) max=40 — Some nice planting done at the river Blackwater sign and at the Ballyduff signs and looked very well on the day of adjudication. The tubs containing flowers throughout the

village looked very well and a lovely selection was used. The adjudicator notes that you plan to have large stone flower beds over the next few years.
 Wildlife and Natural Amenities 16 (16) max=30 — There is great potential in Ballyduff Upper to explore and develop under this category. The river is a most important habitat for wildlife and it should be used to the full in any development of this category. A good starting point would be to identify the wildlife habitats of your area and see what species of fish, animal and bird that it attracts. You will be both surprised and delighted at discovering the number and extent of these.
 If you need help in identifying local wildlife habitats or getting the project off the ground, do invite your local environmental expert in to advise you and provide you with the necessary knowledge you will require. Additional guidance is available from the Conservation Volunteers of Ireland.
 Litter Control 29 (28) max=40 — Overall, it is very good and very little was in evidence on the day of adjudication with the exception of small amounts outside the school and near the housing estate. Well done to all concerned.
 Tidiness 15 (14) max=20 — Overall the village does look tidy. As mentioned already, the Co-op Stores certainly require attention as does the area around the Community Hall. Open

spaces in some areas would need to be tackled. The farmyard storage and small transport centre again need attention.
 Residential Areas 23 (23) max=30 — All residents take great pride in having their properties looking attractive. The houses in Marian Terrace are well maintained and there were delightful displays of flowers and shrubs.
 Road, Streets and Back Areas 25 (25) max=40 — In general the approach roads were tidy. Regarding the stone wall to the school — the adjudicator would suggest that you would clean the

top of this wall. The Ballyduff sign and the Blackwater sign would need to be cleaned. It is suggested that you remove the weeds from the stonewall on the Lismore road. Some of the footpaths and walls are fine, others, as you indicated in your report, would need improvement. Do liaise with the County Council who will in time assist you with this.
 General Impression 5 (5) max=10 — Your Committee is making a very good effort and you are to be congratulated on this. You have a very good base to start with and you can only go from strength to strength. It will help you enormously to have your 3 to 5 years plan in place and where you can achieve a number of improvements each year.



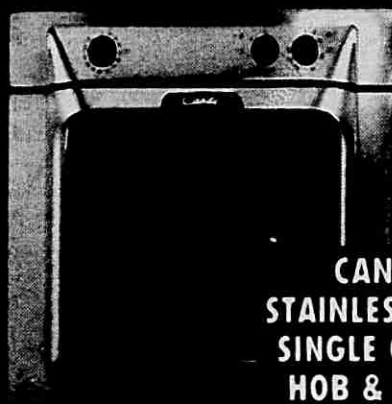

JAMES DEAN - A SCREEN LEGEND 43 YEARS AFTER HIS DEATH

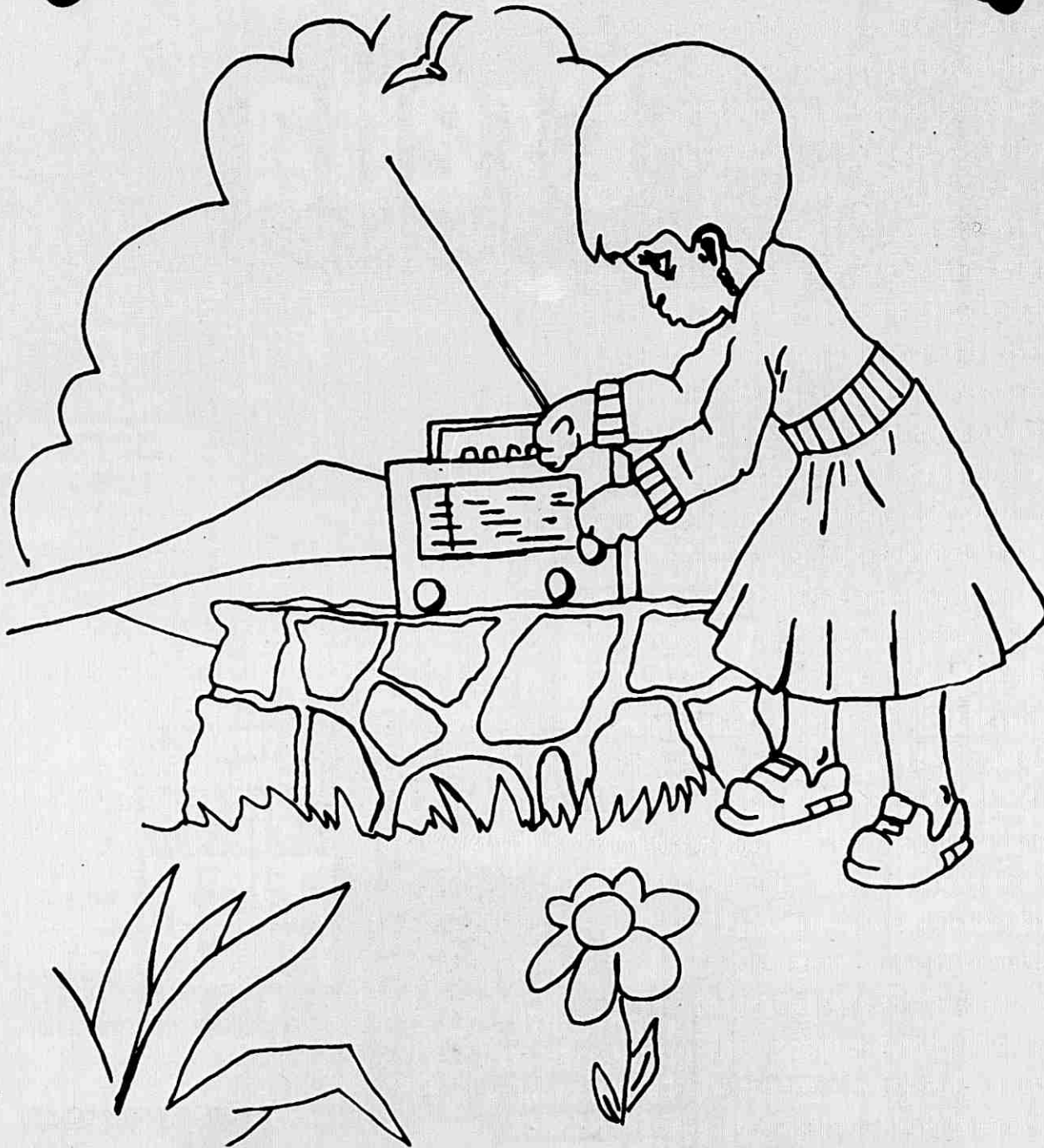


JAMES DEAN only starred in three films. But even today – more than 40 years after his death – he is still a teenage icon. James Byron Dean was born in 1931 and by the time he was 21 he was starring in plays on the New York stage and making television appearances. His first film, East of Eden, was released in 1954 and Rebel Without a Cause followed in 1955. His third film, Giant, which also starred Elizabeth Taylor

and Rock Hudson, was due to be released when he met his death in a car crash towards the end of 1955. On the eve of his death he was showing off his new Porsche to Alec Guinness. An inexplicable chill came over the British actor, who told him: "You must not drive that car." The following day he was killed in a 100 mph crash. A cult following began and the legend has been kept alive by three generations of fans.

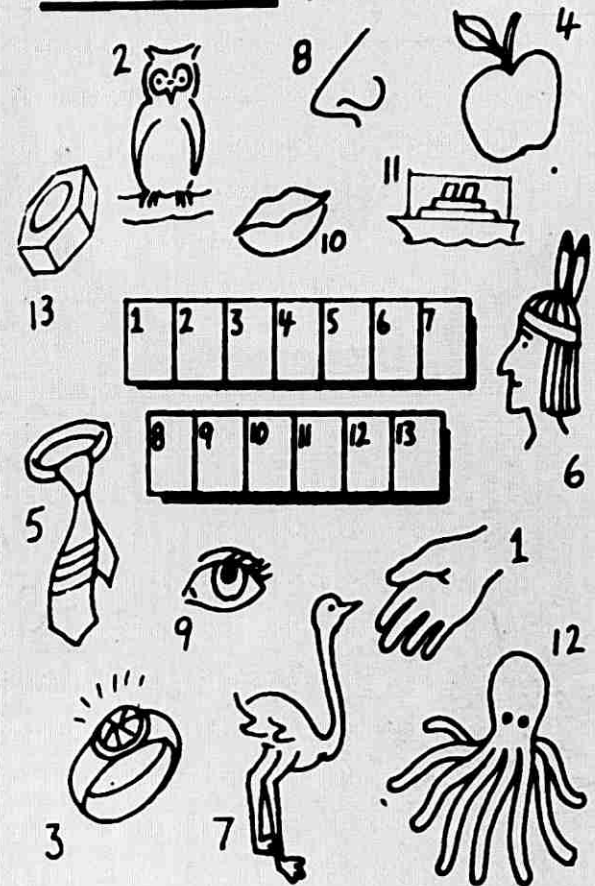

Council Rejects Claim Of 'Lukewarm' Approach To Road Sign Thieves

Waterford County Council has rejected claims it was not doing everything possible to pursue thieves who are stealing local road signs.

For the last year, road directional signs have been vanishing from many parts of the county as part of a lucrative trade to Irish pubs abroad.

More recently up to 20 of the signs disappeared in the Lismore, Tallow and Knockanore areas of West Waterford. However a number of them were later dumped at the entrance to a farm in Knockanore.

Cllr. Willie McDonnell who has strongly con-

demned the stealing of the signs, told last month's meeting of the County Council that the people in his area of West Waterford are greatly angered by the interference with the signs. He asked if Council officials had any information into the most recent incidents in his area.

Acting Co. Engineer Eamonn Mansfield said the local authority are still unaware of who had removed them and they hoped to replace all the signs. They had informed the gardai who started an investigation.

When Cllr. McDonnell suggested that the Council officials were 'lukewarm' in

their efforts to bring the matter to a head, County Manager Donal Connolly retorted that he would not accept the assertion under any circumstances.

Mr. Connolly said he and the other officials were very concerned about the removal of signs. "There is

little enough we can do about it however without hard evidence", he said, "but we will do everything we can to ensure that the practice ceases".

Cllr. Pat Coffey praised the Council for replacing all the road signs that had been stolen.

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Ballymacarbry Tidy Towns Report

The following is the adjudicators report following a visit to the village on August 1st for the National Tidy Towns Competition.

Ballymacarbry increased its point total significantly from last year jumping a massive 15 points to 204.

OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH

Thank you for your entry form for this years Tidy Towns competition. Apart from the information contained in section A, the other sections were not filled in possibly it was an oversight. All Tidy Towns committees are now required to produce a plan which will guide their Tidy Towns activities. A plan should be a simple three to five page document. Your objectives for each year should be set out clearly. Do not adopt unrealistic targets. Your Committee should liaise with the Local Authorities, FAS, the Regional Tourism Authority, the ESB, Telecom Eireann and the National Rehabilitation Board who will all have valuable advice to give you in preparing the plan. Look on it a a guide for your Committee and as something which can be built on over the coming years.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Almost all buildings in Ballymacarbry were very well presented. Doocey's Filling Station had some lovely displays of flowers and shrubs. The Post Office and the Garda Station were well presented. Both pubs were well presented with Melody's looking particularly outstanding. Any plastic, signage should be removed and no doubt that will be done over the next few years. The Waterford Foods building needed to be painted and this adjudicator would suggest that some type of screening be erected where the fertiliser is stacked and stored. Perhaps trees could be used as screening. The Grotto was beautifully presented with some new planting done on one side. The lamps do need repair and perhaps that could be tackled before next year. St. Patrick's Hall needs painting and that includes the walls, the windows and repairs to broken glass.

LANDSCAPING

Some lovely landscaping was observed throughout the village. A delightful effect has been created at the Grotto with planting blended in beautifully with the natural vegetation surrounding, and in the grounds of the Grotto. Do cut the odd stray briar and grass coming through the plants. The shrub bed to the right, towards the village

was in the process of being cleaned. The landscaping in the car park opposite Melody's was very well cared for and blended in again with the natural environment behind it. A lovely selection of shrubs and plants were used. The picnic areas were a sheer delight and most pleasantly situated overlooking the river. The other smaller one was also kept beautifully. Lovely planting was done on top of the wall at the picnic site and across from St. Patrick's Hall. Well done to all concerned.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

You are extremely lucky to have the river in Ballymacarbry, where there should be an abundance of wildlife habitats. The river at the car park has some lovely vegetation with a whole variety of plants and trees. Perhaps it might be an idea to identify the plant life there. No doubt it also has some fish, birds and animals. If you need help in identifying the local Wildlife habitats why not get somebody locally who has an expertise in this area to get involved and to provide you with advice. You as a Tidy Towns Committee have an important role to play in protecting, enhancing and increasing the wildlife value of your Community which will add greatly to the area you are presenting. The area of the river across from St. Patrick's Hall again would have the same potential as the car park end of the river.

LITTER CONTROL

The control of litter overall in the village is extremely good. At the river area across from St. Patrick's Hall, at both entrances on the steps, there was some litter to be observed. Among the pieces observed were some plastic wrappings. Your litter bins are in excellent condition and the litter was not over flowing from any bin.

TIDINESS

All areas of the village have

a tidy look about them. Everything is well cared for. The control of weeds at the kerbs and at the base of buildings is very well controlled.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

Overall, residential areas are maintained in very good condition throughout. The residents of St. Martin's Place are to be congratulated on presenting their properties so well. There is a delightful display of flowers in their gardens. The centre triangle at the entrance had a delightful collection of shrubs and all were kept very well. Some boundary walls would need attention. The seats in this area were freshly painted. Other houses throughout the village were well presented but a few need to complete their walls, fences, etc.

ROADS, STREET AND BACK AREAS

The bridge at the entrance to the village from the Clonmel side was in first class condition and the black and amber markings were newly painted. The car park was in excellent condition but this adjudicator would suggest that you talk to the County Council about resurfacing it. All the approach roads were maintained in excellent condition and were neat and tidy without interfering with the natural vegetation. Most of the signs were maintained in good condition but a few do need replacing or repainting. The seats in the car park were well maintained and again were freshly painted.

GENERAL IMPRESSION

It would be very much appreciated if the form could be completed for next year's Tidy Towns Competition. We had no information on the activities undertaken by the Tidy Towns Committee and the level of assistance and co-operation from the public bodies. Ballymacarbry is a pleasant, tranquil village and it has a great future in this Competition. A great effort has been put in and no-doubt the hard work will pay off in the years ahead. Well done to all concerned.

Slovakian Delegation Looks At Local Development In County Waterford

Waterford LEADER Partnership Ltd. recently welcomed a delegation from the National Labour Office in Slovakia to County Waterford. Four official delegates travelled from the region of Zelizovce to look at examples of local development in Ireland.

Zelizovce is a small region in eastern Slovakia, close to the Hungarian border. It is a fragile area economically, with an average unemployment rate of 17% (in one area it is 70%). In this context, the Slovakian group was very keen to get an insight into the type of successful developments underway in Ireland at local level.

To accommodate this, Waterford LEADER Partnership Ltd. (WLP) organised a workshop outlining different aspects of rural development in County Waterford, from rural tourism to enterprise development and computer training. Examples of EU funding in the County were also presented to the visitors.

The Slovakian group received this information with great interest. Indeed, they

were keen to examine the rural development context even further which led to their decision to invite a representative from WLP to talk at a Workshop in Slovakia on 16th and 17th September.

As the European Union moves to include Central and Eastern European countries on a more operational level, Waterford LEADER Partnership intends to develop practical regional links between East and West.

Traffic Calming Measures For Baile Na nGall

Plans have been finalised to introduce traffic calming measures in Baile na nGall village in the Ring Gaeltacht.

Welcoming the measures proposed, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair said it would be the culmination of several years campaigning by local residents worried for the safety of children on the roadway serving the village, the Tigh An Cheoil pub and Baile na nGall pier and strand.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair explained that the works planned for Baile na nGall is the construction of four bricked speed cushions and appropriate road lining and marking. The projected cost of these works is £4,100, which has been budgeted for.

"This is a most important undertaking", he stated. "With children constantly availing of the green amenity space of the Baile na nGall Beag side of the street, it was important to address the concerns about cars approaching the pier end at speed".

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DARRERS DUNGARVAN

Minister Refutes Myth Of Underpaid Nursing Students

Financial supports for nursing students compare extremely favourably with funding for ordinary third level students. That's according to the Minister for Health Brian Cowen who was responding to a notice of motion raised recently by Waterford Co. Councillor Lar Hart concerning the pay and working conditions of student nurses.

The Minister said major changes have taken place in pre-registration nursing education and training. The traditional apprenticeship model has now been replaced by the nursing registration/diploma programme.

As a result, the concept of a student nurse as a salaried employee of a health agency no longer applies. Such nursing students, he said, are affiliated to a third level institute and have student status only. Nursing students are therefore not

paid a salary, but receive a package of financial supports including an annual maintenance grant.

Minister Cowen emphasised that student nurses participating in the nursing diploma programmes receive a far higher level of financial support than other third level students. Each student nurse receives an annual maintenance grant of £3,000 which is not subject to a means test. In contrast, other third level students are required to satisfy a means test in order to qualify for a maintenance grant, the maximum rate of which is £1,624 per annum.

Since the abolition of third level fees does not extend to the nursing diploma programmes, the student nurses' fees continue to be paid by the relevant health agency on their behalf. The average annual fee is about £1,300.

A book allowance of £200

and a uniform allowance of £120 is also provided for each student commencing the diploma programme. They are also entitled to receive free meals on a 7 day per week basis in designated restaurants in health institutions.

In addition, a new allowance of £20 per week was recently introduced to assist students undertaking external clinical placements. This is payable where it is necessary for the student to find accommodation for the duration of the placement. Students undertaking such placements who don't require accommodation receive a free weekly travel pass.

"The average annual total value of these supports is some £6,000 per student nurse, which I believe compares most favourably with the level of funding available to other third level students", he added.

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Clashmore Tidy Towns Results

The following are excerpts from the adjudicators report from this years National Tidy Towns report.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

The Grotto is exceptional. Unfortunately the proposed waterfall was not in position on adjudication day but we look forward to seeing it in 1999. The school grounds were well presented but unfortunately the area in front of the rockery near the school detracted from this very nice facility. St. Mochuas Well is a lovely amenity but needs interpretation. This could be done by a simple display board (not unlike the one at the Grotto but smaller) giving details of the history of the Well. The old graveyard and church were also very well presented but again need interpretation. Perhaps this could be done in conjunction with the flood-lighting. The Distillery Chimney is a fine example of industrial archaeology and was extremely well presented on adjudication day. However, it has to be said that the advertising sign for "The Old Still" does nothing to enhance this wonderful feature. Perhaps the owners could be persuaded to have it removed or provide a better type sign in keeping with the surroundings. The church and cemetery looked well on adjudication day.

LANDSCAPING

The riverside park and walk and Raheen walk are delightful. However, in the case of the latter it is disappointing that, at the end of the walk, there is an unsightly collection of old rusted farm machinery in full view. The riverside walk would benefit from the removal of the working sheds but we feel certain this will come in time. Excellent work has been done on the walls, particularly on the approach from Youghal. Considerable work still remains to be done on the walls on the Clonmel approach which are very unsightly. The tubs of flowers and hanging baskets looked well and are ideal where open spaces are not available.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

This is one of the newer categories in the competition with the emphasis on the conservation and enhancement of wildlife habitats and the environment. Woodland, rivers, ponds, hedgerows, grass margins, open spaces, graveyards and walls are important habitats. In the case of Clashmore you are exceptionally well endowed with many of these features and while it would be desirable to develop a specific wildlife habitat such as at the Raheen Walk, it is, nevertheless, im-

portant that similar habitats are preserved for wildlife in your graveyards, hedgerows, walls, etc. If there is a local wildlife expert or a member of your community with experience in this area please do draw on this knowledge.

LITTER CONTROL

The streets of Clashmore were completely litter free on adjudication day. However there was litter to be seen in the mill race, along the river walk and in one or two outlying areas which need attention. You are to be congratulated on the fact that the litter warden has visited your school and spoken to the children. It is important to constantly monitor the river area as such facilities tend to become a litter dumping area.

TIDINESS

In most cases approach roads are very well kept. It would be important to keep the verges of these approach roads in good trim as they tend to set the tone for the rest of the village. Commercial premises in the village were very well presented but there are a number of protruding advertising signs which the owners should be encouraged to remove or to replace with more suitable hanging signs in keeping with the village architecture. It is important also that paths be kept clear of advertising hoarding which might interfere with the passage of elderly or incapacitated people or those with failing eyesight. Commercial premises however, in general, looked exceptionally well, most notable being The Old Still, The Rising Sun, The Co-operative and Decies Bar. Street furniture and in particular seating needed a coat of paint. In this connection the village pump is a very nice feature and is being very well maintained.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

There are no housing estates in Clashmore but individual houses were exceptionally well presented with lovely gardens, which, as last year, were again bright and cheerful. In this

connection Riverside House was exceptional but congratulations to all concerned on a splendid effort. As far as the main streets are concerned perhaps, as part of any future plan, you might consider enlisting the aid of a colour consultant for any painting schemes which might take place. By nature of its architecture, the village would lend itself to a planned colour scheme. While many of the premises of Clashmore were very well presented, such a colour scheme would further complement the appearance of the village and would gain you extra marks in the competition.

ROADS, STREET AND BACK AREAS

Generally speaking the roads in and around Clashmore are being very well maintained by the Local Authority as indeed are the back roads leading to such facilities as the Raheen Walk, church etc. Try to keep verges weed free and there was some evidence of this on adjudication day. It is important to note that the adjudicator does venture into the back streets and lanes when carrying out the adjudication and the condition of these areas is a consideration when allocating marks.

GENERAL IMPRESSION

Clashmore is a delightful village and has benefited considerably from the Tidy Towns effort over a number of years. To make further progress in the competition it is advised that, as already mentioned, you draw up a 3-5 year plan which sets out specifically to deal with outstanding problems on a phased basis. However, do not allow such work to cause neglect to what you have already achieved which must be maintained as a priority. You should consider giving more attention to colour schemes, judicious planting (not over-planting) of trees and shrubs, the removal, where possible, of advertising hoardings and continuing the great work you have done on the walls.

Aquaculture Investment Welcomed For Ring

A substantial injection of funding into the aquaculture industry in the Ring Gaeltacht has been welcomed by local County Councillor Fiachra O Ceilleachair.

He said the fact that Dept. of Marine and EU funding of £94,538 is now to be made available to match an investment of £141,462 from the existing resources of Meitheal Trá na Rinne Teo., represents a massive boost to the aquaculture industry's prospects of success in the Waterford area.

"This investment has been planned for some time. Meitheal Trá, operating from a small facility at Pollaphuca in Ring, have utilised foreshore stretching from Baile na nGall across to the Cunnigar bank in Dungarvan Harbour to add a new dimension to Ring's harnessing of the sea to create employment. There will be £11,800 coming in national funding and £82,738 of EU funding under the Aquaculture Measure 3 programme with the company's own resources and respects supported by Udaras na Gaeltachta. Meitheal Trá na Rinne Teo. is a medium sized company, currently having a capacity to produce 420 tonnes per year of oysters. This new injection should create better conditions and lead to a production capacity of 1,000 tonnes per year".

MONEY MATTERS

CAUGHT IN A MORTGAGE TRAP ?

Householders are happy at the moment when they hear about possible reductions in mortgage interest rates. However, this good news may ring rather hollow with mortgage holders who feel locked into fixed rates.

A particular problem which we have identified at the Money Advice Service is the situation where people on relatively low-incomes took out a Local Authority housing loan some years ago at a fixed rate of 12.5%. This seemed fine at the time, but now with commercial rates at their present low levels, some people feel that they are paying over the top at the 12.5% rate.

The good news is that there may be a solution. If your income has improved and if you are in a position to take out a mortgage with a financial institution, then it may be in your interest to look at re-mortgaging. Normally in the Money Advice Service we are very reluctant to advise on re-mortgaging, but those locked into the 12.5% local authority rates may prove to be the exception. However, it is not just a simple matter. A whole new mortgage is needed and this involves legal fees etc. etc., which can amount to a hefty sum. It is important to work out which is the cheaper option - to grin and bear the 12.5% or to re-structure. Also, some people may find that if their regular income is low or insecure they may be unable to get a new mortgage.

However, it is worthwhile taking a look at your own situation, particularly if your local authority loan was taken out some years ago. In Waterford county, check the details with the Housing Officer at Waterford Co. Co. You can also speak to us, free of charge, at The Money Advice & Budgeting Service.

The Money Advice & Budgeting Service is based at 36 Lower Main St., Dungarvan (Tel 058-44922) and provides a service throughout the West Waterford area. It is part of the national MABS Service and is free, confidential and independent.

Snippets From Dungarvan UDC

PRaise FOR O'SULLIVAN CELTIC SIGNING

Dungarvan United AFC striker Vincent O'Sullivan who recently signed a contract with famed Scottish club, Glasgow Celtic was strongly praised at the September meeting of the Council by Cllr. Billy Kyne.

Son of John and Caroline O'Sullivan, Kilrush, Dungarvan, Vinnie was originally on a 6 week trial with the Celtic youths team and showed great promise before getting the official call up to the squad.

Well known for his prolific scoring ability, Vinnie holds the Dungarvan club's record for the most hat tricks scored in a season.

Cllr. Kyne said he believed that Vinnie will take this chance with both feet and he said he owed a debt of gratitude to the Dungarvan club.

He proposed that the Council send a vote of congratulations to Dungarvan United, John and Caroline O'Sullivan and to Vincent himself on his great achievement.

MILLENNIUM PROJECT

Following the popular trend in cities and towns nationwide to mark the turn of the century, Dungarvan is no exception as Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly is currently considering plans for a suitable local millennium project such as a theatre development.

SKEHACRINE HOUSING PROPOSAL

The planning section of the Urban Council is currently considering a planning application for the construction of 47 houses at Skehacrine, Abbeyside. Entrance onto the development, which is currently waste ground, would be from the Clonea Road. Further information has been

sought by the Council from the applicants Liam and Josephine Morrissey and County Manager Donal Connolly said he intends to further examine the proposal taking into account an existing application for a major housing development at Tournore and the consequent effects such projects may have on the natural environment of the area.

PARKING IN CAUSEWAY PARK?

As reported in a previous edition of the 'Leader', the possibility of opening up the Causeway Park in Abbeyside for car parking purposes to alleviate the chronic traffic congestion in the area was put forward by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan.

Speaking at the September UDC meeting, Cllr. O'Riordan said the old disused courts in the park would be an ideal solution to the excessive car parking on the Causeway and would benefit the entire local business community. An entrance to the park already exists both from the Causeway and from Strandside North. The cars would be concealed within the park behind the privet hedge.

The sole voice of dissension to the suggestion however was Cllr. Billy Kyne who voiced reservations about bringing cars into a public park.

The feasibility of the proposal is being investigated by the Council engineering staff.

MURPHY PLACE PARKING

Meanwhile replying to a query raised by Cllr. O'Riordan regarding the removal of a section of footpath in Murphy Place to create extra car parking spaces, Town Engineer Joe Brennan said the work will be undertaken as soon as the footpath at Southways is completed.

'CAN'T EVEN CHANGE A BULB'

The policy adopted nationwide by the ESB whereby a centralised system now exists for the repair and maintenance of public lighting throughout the county, including Dungarvan, has been strongly criticised by Cllr. Nuala Ryan.

Speaking at the September meeting of the Council she claimed that as a result of this centralised system, ESB workers in Dungarvan, through no fault of their own, 'can't even change a bulb' in the town and have to rely on repair crews sent out from Waterford city.

She referred to one occasion when public lights in Kyne Park, Abbeyside were out for 9 weeks before crews from outside the county came to repair them.

The same situation, she added, now applied to public lights which were out for some time in upper O'Connell Street.

"We never had this problem when Dungarvan were in control", she added.

EDUCATION FOR DRIVING

Referring to the huge death toll this year on Irish roads, Cllr. Damien Dillon felt that the educational system of teaching people to drive is the main problem. "We see it here in the town every day ourselves", he stressed, "drivers being discourteous and impatient".

CONGRATULATE PATTERN

Dungarvan UDC has sent a vote of congratulations to the Chairman and committee of the Abbeyside Pattern on the successful organisation of this year's festival. Proposing the vote of congratulations was Cllr. Michael O'Riordan who said the Pattern is one of the oldest festivals in Ireland and it was great to see it going from strength to strength each year.

VOTE OF SYMPATHY

Council members have expressed deep sympathy to the relatives of the late Liam Curtin, Thomas's Terrace, Dungarvan who died recently. Proposing the vote of sympathy was Cllr. Billy Kyne who said the late Liam Curtin gave trojan service to the underage and youth players of Dungarvan soccer club during the 70's and was extremely committed to the club itself. His death, he added, marked the end of an era.

Seconding the proposal was Cllr. Paddy Power who himself was involved with Liam and the soccer club when it was first established.

DANGEROUS ROAD

The problem of speeding along the busy road from Seapark to Scoil Mhuire and to St. Augustine's Church in Abbeyside was highlighted at the meeting by Cllr. Billy Kyne. In all he said he counted 9 double entrances onto this straight road, many of which are estate entrances, while more housing developments are currently under construction in the area.

Cllr. Kyne said he was gravely concerned that cars are going exceedingly fast along the road and he asked the Town Clerk to contact the gardai in relation to speeding in the area.

The whole area, he added, needs to be slowed down through a range of traffic calming measures.

Cobh athlete Sonia O'Sullivan, courageous abuse victim Sophie McColgan and Northern Ireland party leaders David Trimble, Gerry Adams and John Hume are the nominees put forward by Dungarvan UDC for this year's People Of The Year Awards.

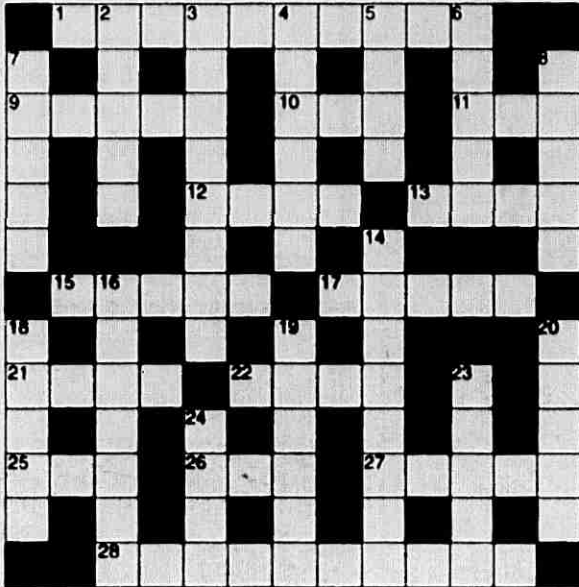

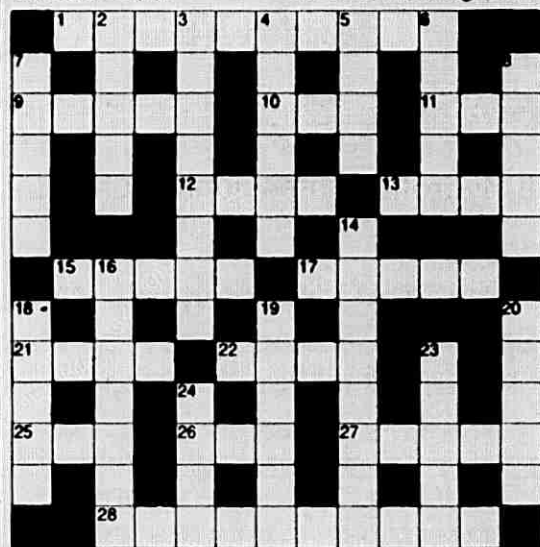

Age Of Beauty

HAIR REMOVAL

Waxing

Waxing has become very popular in recent years. It is a quick and easy way of removing large amounts of hair with little discomfort. Leg waxing, under arm and bikini waxing are most popular. But waxing can also be done on the facial area and eyebrows.

Warm or cool wax is usually used on large areas such as the legs. A very thin layer of wax is applied to the leg with a spatula in the direction of the hair growth. Then a fabric or paper strip is placed over the wax and rubbed so that the wax sticks to it. The fabric is then pulled up against the direction of the hair growth and the hairs come with it. Usually after waxing an antiseptic soothing lotion is

applied. The skin may appear red and blotchy for a few hours so it is important not to put any body lotions on or have a hot bath until the following day.

Bikini line, under arm and eyebrow waxing can be done in the same way. Sometimes hot wax is used on these areas. Hot wax is applied the same as warm wax only there is no need to use a fabric strip to remove the wax. The hot wax is simply allowed to cool and it is then pulled off against the direction of the hair growth. Allergies rarely occur from using wax. The regrowth of hair after waxing is usually fine ended and feels soft in texture.

Waxing is relatively low in cost and is done in most beauty salons. It is an easy way of removing large amounts of hair quickly.

FAMILY HEALTH

Q: My husband and I are separated and he now has a four-month old baby with the woman he has set up home. My youngest, who's six, has become very sullen and bad-tempered. She insists on phoning her Dad daily and refuses to settle at night unless he comes over to tuck her in. She also complains about living with me and says she wants to stay with her Dad. This is all very distressing. Should I agree to her demands even though it would break my heart?

A: This problem is not uncommon. Your daughter's behaviour shows that she misses her father and is worried about her place in his affections now that he has a new baby. Try not to take her anger personally. She has to express her feelings to someone with whom she feels safe. She is trying to cope with her jealousy and her hurt at what, in her

mind, feels like being left out and replaced by another baby. Giving into her demands would only increase her anxiety. Instead you and her father need to talk about how to reassure your daughter that although you have separated, you have not stopped loving her or caring about her.

Q: I get a pain in my lower abdomen in the middle of the month between my periods. I have been examined and was told that there was nothing wrong but I still get the pain each month. Is it related to my periods?

A: It certainly is. It's likely to be pain that can occur in a few women when ovulation occurs when one of the two ovaries in the lower abdomen produces its monthly ovum (eggs). It's called mittelschmerz pain and providing it's not severe enough to warrant taking pain tablets, it should go quickly on its own.



Chef's Corner

Menus for the week

CHERRY COOKIES

Preparation — 15 minutes
Cooking — 10 minutes Makes — 20

- 175g/6 oz butter
- 75g/3 oz soft brown sugar
- 45ml/3 tbsp clear honey
- 1 egg
- 100g/4 oz glace cherries
- 225g/8 oz self-raising flour
- 100g/4 oz porridge oats
- Pinch of salt

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas 4. Place the butter and sugar in a bowl and beat together until mixture is light and fluffy. Add the clear honey. Cream again until well mixed.

Beat in the egg.
Chop the cherries into small pieces and fold into the creamed mixture with the self-raising flour. Reserve 15 ml (1 tbsp) porridge oats. Add the remaining oats along with a pinch of salt into the creamed mixture and stir to give a stiff consistency.

For each cookie, place one heaped tablespoon of the mixture onto an oiled baking sheet. Leave plenty of room between each one to allow the biscuits to spread. Carefully flatten each biscuit slightly with the back of a spoon. Sprinkle the top of each one with the reserved porridge oats.

Bake just above the centre of the oven for ten minutes or until the cookies are lightly golden. Leave on the baking sheet to cool for five minutes then lift onto a wire rack and cool completely. Store in an airtight container for up to five days.

CARAMEL SHORTBREAD

Preparation — 20 minutes + setting
Cooking — 25-35 minutes
Makes — 16 bars

- Shortbread**
- 100g/4 oz butter
 - 50g/2 oz caster sugar
 - 100g/4 oz plain flour sifted
 - 40g/1 1/2 oz ground almonds

- Caramel**
- 175g/6 oz butter
 - 75g/3 oz caster sugar
 - 3 tbsp golden syrup
 - 1 1/2 (397g/14 oz) cans condensed milk

Topping

- 225g/8 oz plain chocolate broken into squares
- 25g/1 oz flaked almonds toasted
- Cocoa powder for dusting

● Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4. Grease and line the base of 20cm/8 in square, loose-based cake tin.

● To make the shortbread, put the butter and sugar in a bowl and beat together until pale and creamy. Add the sifted flour and ground almonds and mix to form a soft dough.

● Press the dough evenly into the prepared tin. Prick several times with a fork and bake in the preheated oven for 20-25 mins. until pale golden in colour. Leave in tin until cold.

● For the caramel, place all the ingredients in a nonstick, heavy-based saucepan. Slowly bring to the boil and cook over a gentle heat, stirring constantly for 5-7 mins. until the mixture thickens and turns a pale caramel colour. If it starts to burn, remove from heat, discard burnt bits, stir vigorously to cool slightly then continue to cook until thickened.

● Spread the caramel over the shortbread and leave to set (about 40 mins.). Melt the chocolate squares in a heatproof bowl over a pan of gently simmering water. Spread over the set caramel layer, sprinkle with the flaked almonds and chill until set.

● Remove shortbread from tin. Cut into 16 bars and dust with cocoa powder to serve.

Dairying: AUTUMN GRASS

- Keep grass in the diet for as long as possible by careful rationing.
 - A combination of grass and Meal (quota permitting) is ideal.
 - Autumn grass is generally low in:
 - (a) Dry matter 12 - 14% — this means there can be more water in Autumn grass than milk!
 - (b) Sugar and Energy — due to short dry length. But it can be high in:
 - (c) Digestibility - if well managed
 - (d) Protein
- Intake on such pasture is likely to be in the 12 - 13 kg dry matter range (100 kg fresh).
Poor ground conditions and sward quality will reduce intake to 10 - 12 kg.

HERD PERFORMANCE

Spring calvers yielding 3 gallons/day and putting on 5 kg L wt. require an intake of 14 kg.

Hence spring calving cows require 2 - 3 kg meal per day and Autumn calvers 5 - 6 kg.

Rations made from reliable ingredients like cereals, pulps, gluten and distillers work well.

PASTURE CONDITIONS

Pasture growth rates for 1998 are likely to be only 80 - 85% of 1997 levels. However, poor ground condition reduces utilisation to perhaps 60% - this is the real problem.

For the next 4 - 6 weeks the aim must be to graze out the swards and set tip the paddocks for the spring of 1999.

Tillering is a vital process for sward renewal and late autumn is the optimum time for this.

Tight grazing will help ryegrass to tiller and thicken.

On dry land this is relatively easy by grazing to about 5 cms or 300 kg cover. This should be achieved by about mid-October on paddocks earmarked for early grazing.

Cows will graze out grass swards better where the covers are not too high (1600 kg) but higher covers (1800 kg+) are acceptable in clover based swards.

On wet heavy soils, techniques such as grazing from the back, on/off grazing, use of a back fence or using light stock (weanlings) will have to be used. These soils require a better network of farm roads, narrow tracks so that grazing is no further than 75 - 90 yards away from a roadway.

Sheep: STORE LAMBS

Continue to feed 0.5-0.75 kg meal. On average 10 kg of meal will produce 1 kg of carcass. The cost of this meal could be £1.20 @ £120/tonne) while the current value of 1 kg of carcass is approximately £2.05. In this situation meal feeding pays.

The economics of meal feeding will change where meat is more expensive or lamb prices lower. However, the value of having sufficient grass for flushing must also be counted.

MEAT TYPE

Use a high energy feedstuff e.g. barley/pulp and include a store lamb mineral mix. Corn gluten or distillers are also suitable, but limit to 33% of ration due to high copper levels.

Monitor level of finish on lambs by handling lambs. Meal fed lambs will handle well and show increased killout, check your market requirements and ensure no carcass go overweight or overfat.

Ned O'Keefe, Dept. of Agriculture and Food. Oliver Byrne of Ballyquirke, Gowran, Co. Kilkenny won the overall first ever milk quality

award for suppliers to AWG. The new award programme, introduced after the merger, recognises the best of the 8,000 milk suppliers to the Group in the

Republic.

The winner in the West Waterford area was Liam Beresford, Ballinakill, Ballinacult while in East Waterford John and Nuala Harney of Ballydurn, Kilmactomas were the quality milk winners.

The top quality suppliers to AWG in the Snowcream Waterford area were Liam and Kathleen Farrell of Kilmure and in the Castlelyons area the winners were Patrick and Maureen Higgins, Tinegeragh, Watergrasshill.

Speaking at the presentation, Ned Sullivan, Group Managing Director Designate, paid tribute to the Group's suppliers for their commitment to quality but called for efforts to intensify even further. "One of our great advantages as an organisation is the high level of integration of our farmers into the supply chain," he said. "This gives us tremendous scope to deliver the traceability standards required by leading customers and consumers. Inevitably these standards will become even more stringent over time and it is vital that we can respond to these changes. Quality and food safety are now the cornerstone of successful production and marketing strategies."

"What Are We To Do With Our Cattle"

Speaking at the Ploughing Championships last week, ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen accused the Government of failing abysmally to deal with the income crisis for livestock farmers.

Mr. Allen said the key issue was to get Irish beef back into the Russian market. The Minister for Agriculture & Food, Mr. Joe Walsh, T.D., has rightly looked for export credit insurance from Brussels. It is his right to look for it in Brussels, then the Irish Government should introduce it immediately as a bridging method to enable the market to open right away. The Irish Government can then seek a refund from Brussels as soon as the Brussels scheme is finalised.

"It is time to nail the lie about export credit insurance. In the past no claims were made against such insurance so the allegation that this would cost the Government a fortune is totally wrong.

"The Irish Government should approach IMS to ensure that when IMS loans are granted to Russia that Ireland will have first claim on this money in order to be paid for the beef.

"At present farmers are finding it almost impossible to sell their cattle as factories are only killing one day a week. If the Government fail to act immediately farmers might as well go out and shoot their cattle."

Mr. Allen concluded: "The responsibility now lies with the Minister to help cattle farmers in their hour of need — otherwise he might as well not be Minister. This Government will be judged on whether it is serious about helping agriculture or not."

ICMSA Concern At New Aid Package

"The new aid package must apply to all farmers with a fodder problem, including dairy farmers". This was stated recently by Mr. Pat O'Rourke, Deputy President of the ICMSA.

Mr. O'Rourke said that serious concern has arisen based on the Department of Agriculture press release, that the aid package will not apply to dairy farmers. This would be totally unacceptable to ICMSA. Mr. O'Rourke said that he had discussions with Minister Walsh about this issue and the Minister confirmed that dairy farmers are not excluded.

A meeting has been arranged by the Minister for early next week between senior Department Officials and ICMSA to consider the details of the aid package.

Mr. O'Rourke concluded by assuring dairy farmers with fodder problems that ICMSA will insist that they are fully covered by the aid package.

Liver Fluke

Warning To Farmers

Ned O'Keefe Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture and Food has advised farmers that losses from liver fluke infection in both sheep and cattle are likely to be higher than for many years. These losses could take the form of higher sheep deaths and lower production levels in cattle, including reduced milk yields in dairy cows. This dangerous situation is due to the unusually mild winter and wet summer this year.

Where fluke is present, sheep should be treated immediately. Acute liver fluke disease requires urgent treatment with an appropriate flukicide. Treatment should be carried out and repeated as necessary in accordance with veterinary advice and manufacturers' instructions.

Cattle should be treated first at housing or before mid October again in accordance with veterinary advice and manufacturers' instructions. Out wintered cattle should be treated as advised having regard to local conditions. Dairy cows should be treated for liver fluke at drying off.

Minister O'Keefe reminded farmers and flockowners that bought in animals should always be treated for liver fluke. He also appealed to producers to be mindful of the environment when disposing of used containers. Furthermore, he urged farmers to contact their veterinary practitioners for further advice where problems occur.

Elises provide a feast of colour

THE genus Iris includes some of the loveliest of all the flowering plants.

Their intricate blooms offer a rich spectrum of colours as well as satin or velvet textures. Species can be selected for diverse locations ranging from woodland to rock garden, waterside to herbaceous border.

These beautiful flowers were originally named after Iris – the Greek goddess of the rainbow – as the shades of their colouring and marking are reminiscent of those on the rain-

bow. Their distinctive blooms often have "beards" – short hairs – or crests along the centre of the falls.

The genus is classified into many divisions. Of these the easiest to grow are the bearded, crested, Xiphium and dwarf Reticulata types. Others – such as Juno, Oncocyclus and Regelia irises – are less easy to cultivate but their flowers are among the most beautiful of all blooms.

Bearded irises are characterised by a "beard" of hairs along the centre of the falls. This group includes the common irises that are grown in gardens flowering mainly in early summer. Suitable for herbaceous and mixed borders, they are easy to grow in rich, well-drained alkaline soil in sunlight. Many varieties also tolerate poorer soils and partial sun.

Oncocyclus irises are natives of areas with little summer rainfall and need the protection of a greenhouse or frame in climates like ours. They have large, beautiful and sometime bizarre blooms but they are exacting in their requirements and they are not easy to grow. They need fertile, sharply drained soil and full sun with a dry dormant period after flowering.

Regelia irises, with their bearded standards and falls, are related to the Oncocyclus irises but are easier to grow. Some species may be grown outside given good drainage and a hot dry site in summer.

Crested irises enjoy the same growing conditions as bearded irises but they have ridges or cockscomb-like crests instead of beards.

Evensia irises are usually found in damp woodland. Larger species require a sheltered position in humus-rich soil. They need shade to be provided in warmer climates. Smaller species are ideal for planting in peaty pockets in a rock garden.

Beardless irises do not have bearded falls but usually have crests. Most have similar cultural requirements to bearded irises but some prefer heavier soil.

Pacific Coast irises are a group that are useful for cutting. Many good, free-flowering hybrids have been produced which are excellent in humus-rich acid soils. They can be grown in sun in cooler climates or in the shade in warmer climates.

Water irises are a group of elegant, moisture-loving plants that thrive in pond margins or rich, permanently damp soils. They can be difficult to establish.

Siberian irises have slender leaves and beautifully formed, delicately-marked flowers. They are easily grown in borders in rich soil that does not dry out and are particularly suited to very moist waterside soil.

Spuria irises have narrow reed-like foliage and elegant blooms. They are suitable for use in sunny herbaceous borders and need well-drained soil. They tolerate drier conditions than the Siberian irises.

Reticulata irises are a dwarf, hardy bulb iris which flowers early. They prefer a sunny position in well-drained acid or alkaline soil.

Juno irises need similar conditions to the Oncocyclus irises and are also difficult to grow. A bulb variety, most types grow well in warm outdoor sites.

Xiphium irises include the brightly coloured Dutch, English and Spanish irises which are often grown for cut flowers. They grow well in any alkaline, well-drained soil in full sun. In cold areas lift the bulbs in the autumn and replant in the spring.

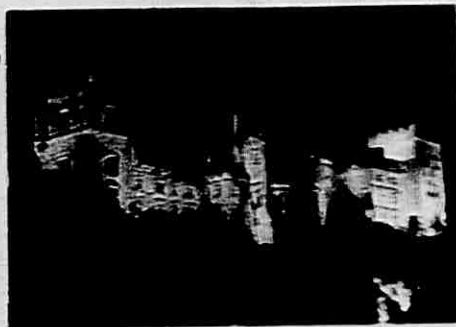

mother."

McDonald was remanded in custody by Judge Riordan to appear again at Cork District Court twenty four hours later. Bail was however set in the accused's own bond of £100 and an independent surety of £15,000 or a cash lodgement of that amount.

McDonald was granted free legal aid to which there was no objection by Inspector Michael Blake representing the Director of Public Prosecutions. He was assigned the services of local solicitor Niall King of J. F. Williams & Co.

When McDonald appeared before Cork District Court the following day, there was no defence objection to an application by Inspector Jim Griffin that McDonald be remanded in continuing bail to the same court again on October 19 with consent to bail in the same conditions set by Judge Riordan at Dungarvan court. Diarmuid Kelleher solr. representing Mr. King for the accused, consented to the application.

When the question of bail was mentioned, Mr. Kelleher asked to have the accused's brother, Jim McDonald called. This was done but he was not present in court. McDonald told the Judge Uinseann MacGruairc that he had no money, passport or assets in this country but that he did have a job in his native Glasgow. Judge MacGruairc then renewed the free legal aid to him and he was remanded in continuing custody for another two weeks.

Inspector Griffin told the Judge that it is hoped that by that date, October 19, they will have had specific directions from the Director of Public Prosecutions as to how they should proceed further against McDonald.

The feat of organisation, crowned as it was with a local victory, represented a triumph for the College authorities, who have worked tirelessly on the project for the last fourteen months. Leading the organisational team was Athletics Coach, Bro. Patrick Lennon who, along with the physical arrangements, patiently moulded his athletes and fashioned this famous victory.

"There has been tremendous support from all quarters for this event", he said. "We have had 36 members of staff working exclusively on the games this week, 100 students acting as liaisons on administrative duties, cleaning and maintenance, as well as a host of other helpers on specific tasks or in the various centres where we held the games."

He paid tribute to the generous sponsors and patrons, without whom they would not have been able to host the Games and to the community at large who had risen to the occasion, lending financial, physical and moral support to the College.

This victory should hardly come as a complete surprise considering the track record of the school on the field of play. Under the guidance of Bro. Lennon, who is in his seventeenth year in Dungarvan, they have captured the College of Science Cup five times in ten years and been runners-up on three more occasions in that decade. Bro. Lennon has also been the Manager of the Irish Schools Athletic team for the Home Internationals for the last three years, with a great measure of success accruing to those under his care.

The Games commenced on Tuesday morning last with Basketball and Cross Country in the College, Indoor Soccer in Dungarvan Sports Centre, Badminton in Touraneena and Modeligo, Swimming in Clonea Strand Hotel and Cycling over part of the recent Tour de France route.

At the end of the day, St. Augustine's had established a lead of 6 points and going into their strong disciplines, the Track and Field events, in Waterford the following day, were expected to stretch their lead, which they duly did to 16 points.

With a repeat of the Tuesday programme, reversed for girls and boys on Thursday, it was hoped that the local representatives could hold onto their lead on what was expected to be their weakest day. In the event, they doubled it and left their Euro colleagues struggling in their wake.

Medal presentations took place each evening when the young participants received their awards from some of the main sponsors. St. Augustine's final tally came to 36 Gold, 28 Silver and 13 Bronze averaging four per person, a creditable tally by any standards.

The Gaeltacht Group, Danú (which featured past pupils of the College) were equally popular on Wednesday night and each evening's programme concluded with a disco to the music of the Mad Hatter.

All the visitors were greatly impressed with the Irish hospitality and good humour as well as the beautiful countryside and already plans are afoot among some schools for a return trip in the future.

This week, as the final 'wash-up' is being done on the event, the bottom line on the expenditure side is expected to reach £50,000 and the final headache will be in matching that to the credit side. However with patronage and sponsorships in, undertakings which have been given and a favourable view from Europe, it is hoped that the

books will eventually balance.

This week too Fr. Moran will sit at his desk - perhaps for the first time in a while - to make out his final report for Eurathlon, the European authority which devised and oversees the Games.

He will also be appraising Brian Crowley MEP and the other European politicians on the success of the Games and should have little difficulty in conveying just how satisfied the participants were with the arrangements for, and quality of, the event.

With this prestigious commitment successfully completed and conveyed to the pages of College history, together with their successes in other sports at Provincial and National level, thoughts will turn to the forthcoming trip of the College handball team to Chicago. Under their Coach, Bro. Finbarr Spring, twelve students will travel over Christmas to the US to take part in the World Championships there. The College is presently fundraising for that trip too and have other events planned to bring in the necessary cash.

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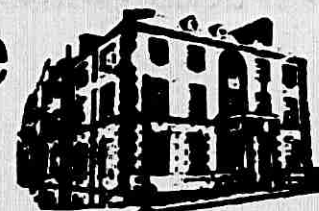

JOIN IN THE TERRY FOX RUN - HELP SUPPORT CANCER RESEARCH

Terry Fox, a young Canadian who had his leg amputated because of cancer died in 1981, during his famous attempt to run across Canada to raise funds for Cancer Research. Today annual runs are held in fifty eight countries world-wide making the Terry Fox run the world's single biggest fund raising event for cancer research. The Irish Cancer Society, the major fund raiser of cancer research in Ireland introduced the run in this country in 1993 and to date the event has raised over a half million pounds for Irish Cancer projects.

MARATHON OF HOPE

Before Terry started his marathon of hope on April 12th 1980 in St. John's, Newfoundland he had run over 3,000 miles in training. After dipping his foot in the Atlantic ocean Terry started on a journey that would take him through six provinces, for the next 143 days he ran an average of 26 miles "the full marathon distance". A day before he had to stop outside Thunder Bay Ontario on September 1st 1980. Cancer had spread to his lungs long before that day. Terry had captured the hearts and imagination of the nation, he had become a Canadian hero.

Terry Fox died on June 28th 1981, one month be-

fore his 23rd birthday. He left with us a legacy of hope that continues to inspire so many today.

County Final Snippets

BALLYDUFF MENTORS '98

When Ballyduff and Mount Sion met in the S/H Co. Final in 1983 the gate receipts totalled £6,118. The game ended in a draw and the replay gate was a disappointing £4,711. Today's gate receipts will more than equal the combined totals of 1983.

When Ballyduff won the very first playing of the intermediate hurling championship back in 1964, their opponents were Ballyduff East. Now, 24 years later, Ballyduff (west) are back in the senior county final and Ballyduff (east) are waiting to play in the intermediate hurling final once again.

Today's final is the 14th match in the 1998 senior hurling championship and in the 13 games played so far a total of 55 goals and 297 points have been scored by the 16 participating teams. This gives a match average of 4-24 and which must be a record. Mount Sion, with 6-17 against Gleann na Brid and Ballygunner who had 7-14 against Gleann na nDeise, are joint leaders on the list of top scoring clubs. The Group team, Gleann na nDeise, had the lowest score at 0-8 v. Mount Sion.

Ballyduff's All Star, Mossy Walsh, has the distinction of having been chosen as the Hurler of the Year on two occasions - 1978 and 1980 and it was back in the family again in 1983 when brother Michael was awarded the distinction.

Mount Sion and Waterford hurling legend, John Keane, captained his club on no less than a record seven winning occasions. His clubmate Frankie Walsh who also captained Mount Sion to a couple of county titles, was the first All Ireland captain to accept the McCarthy Cup on the present Hogan Stand, which was completed at the end of the previous year.

If Ballyduff win the 1998 title here this afternoon, Paudie Prendergast will become the first captain from

the Western division to accept the Waterford News & Star Cup on the New Stand in Fraher Field.

Mount Sion will be trying for a record 30th county senior hurling title here and even if they fail to achieve this, their proud is unlikely to be reached by any of the others in the lifetime of those playing hurling at the present time. Mount Sion won their first in 1938 and their 29th in 1994. Fourteen other Eastern clubs have won 50 titles between them. Sion have won titles in every decade since the thirties.

Ballyduff's selectors are Liam Power, who captained Ballyduff for their first senior title in 1982 and also won a county medal with the club in 1987, Dave Barry, who is club chairman and played hurling and football with the club and won county junior medals for both codes in the finals of 1953 (in fact the bold Tom Cheasty was his opponent in the hurling final that year).

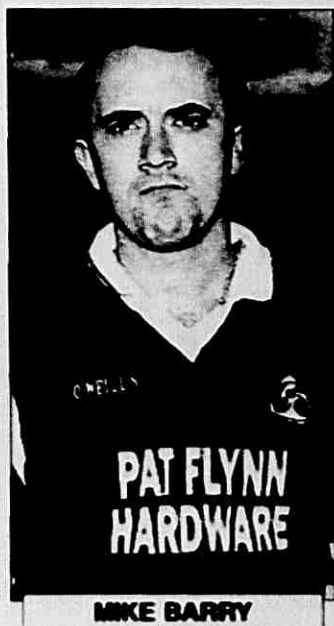
The great Mick Beecher will one day become a Ballyduff legend because of the extent of his involvement with the club. He lined out with the club in the mid thirties and at the end of his playing years he operated in the role of trainer/coach/selector and had a major impact in the club, winning the very first intermediate title in 1964. Mick played a major role when Ballyduff won their first senior title in 1982 and their next in '87. These three very wise men masterminded the dethronement of the three-times champions, Ballygunner three weeks ago (and they say they are not finished yet!).

Ballyduff And Serve Up A

Ballyduff Undaunted By Reputation Of Mt. Sion

After a season of exciting and unprecedented intercounty hurling activity, supporters will look to this county final with special interest and will come to the Fraher Field expecting to see a final in keeping with the high standard set by our county players already this year.

So far in this championship we have seen little to excite our interests as the 13 matches played so far, with a couple of exceptions, have been one-sided and rather disappointing. One of the exceptions was the Ballyduff/Ballygunner semi-final and in which we saw some splendid hurling and commendable team work by both sides. Now with Mount Sion providing the opposition for Ballyduff in this decider, we can look forward with confidence to another top-class contest that will produce the side which will lead Portlárige into the national league and championship in the final year of the millennium.

At the commencement of the season, most of the hurling experts regarded this championship as being a three-horse race and Ballyduff did not figure in that highly rated trio and in truth, very few people, outside the Ballyduff camp, had expect-

ed to see this far Western club survive to the final stage.

But in dethroning the champions, Ballygunner, who were going for their fourth title in a row, they shot quickly to prominence (fame almost)

and gave clear notice that they are very worthy contenders for the title against the star-studded Mount Sion who are attempting to bring their total of championship wins, to 30.

1998 must go on record as the year of the outsider. The season in which the book-makers, the pundits, the forecasters and the public at large, got it all wrong. So far here in Waterford, Ballyduff have proven the media to be

wrong in their forecasting of the hurling championship results and they are confident that they are good enough to do that just one more time this year.

This will be Ballyduff's 9th appearance in a county senior hurling final in 21 years. After winning the intermediate title in 1975, they qualified for the senior county final just two years later, but lost by 4-10 to 1-10 to Portlaw. Two years later they lost to Dunhill by 2-17 to 2-8 in the 1979 final, but it was third time lucky for them when in 1982, they scored 0-20 to defeat a fancied Dunhill side in a splendid county final. This was their finest hour and what it meant to Ballyduff is expertly described in the club's history, which was published in 1989. They got to the county final once more in the next year (1983) and played a thrilling draw with next Sunday's opponents, Mount Sion. Ballyduff lost the replay and this was not surpris-

ing because of Mount Sion's splendid record in replays.

Many readers will recall the battle of the neighbours when Ballyduff, having been well in front at half time, lost by a single goal to Tallow (3-8 to 2-8) in a thriller at Fraher Field.

Then came the start of the Roanmore saga. The sides met in the county final of 1987 and drew. Ballyduff won the replay by 4-7 to 2-11 and took their second county title. Ballyduff lost to Roanmore in the 1989 and 1990 county finals. Since then, the far Western club have lived in obscurity and have failed to make the headlines until this year, when defeating the hot favourites, Ballygunner in a great semi-final.

It certainly was not to their advantage that they were forced to line out against the 'Gunners with only one championship game to their credit. Having defeated Fourmilewater in the first round, they received a walk-over from the group team, the Faughs. Against the county champions, Ballygunner, they gave their best display of hurling since the county final of 1989 when they lost to Roanmore. It was a match in which several players enhanced their hurling profiles, but essentially, it was team performance par excellence.

Mount Sion's record has been told over and over again and they have been in county finals, or semi-finals so often, that very few people don't know their illustri-

ous record. They have won 29 titles since they first hit the headlines by winning the 1938 county final. They won their most recent final in 1994 and 1998 being the 60th anniversary of their first, they mean to celebrate it by bringing their total to 30, thus giving them a winning average of a title every second season.

Their path to the final did not pose any problems as they overcame all opposition in a very decisive fashion. They scored a 27 points victory over Gleann na Brí in their first game and had 15 points to spare over a disappointing Lismore side in the quarter-final. They also had fifteen points to spare after meeting Roanmore in a rather poor semi-final match in Walsh Park.

Every player on the Mount Sion team has won hurling

Players like the great Tony Browne (who is unquestionably of All Star quality), Ken McGrath, Brian Greene, Brian Flannery, Anthony Kirwan, Michael White, John Meaney, Gary Gater, have all worn the county jersey this year and they have others like goalkeeper Philly Flynn, Barry Browne, young Eoin McGrath, Roy McGrath, Padraic Fanning, Tommy Browne, Jamie O'Meara, Tommy Browne, Paul Hammond, Davy Power, etc., who are well worthy of inclusion on any senior team. There are those who reckon that this panel of players is as good as the best that the famous Monastery club have ever produced. What a great tribute.

I repeat here again that 1998 is the year of the under-dogs. A year of shocks, drama and surprises. I believe that having played such top-class hurling against a team of Ballygunner's quality, I would be doing less than justice to them by saying that a victory for them should be described as a shock. I would not for a moment discount their chances of winning, but if they are the new county champions, it will be recorded as a surprise.

When I tried to get the "feel of things" in Ballyduff, I rang their most efficient secretary, John Jackson for a comment and he advised me: "Before we played Ballygunner, I told you not to write us off and I'm telling you the same thing now." That pretty sums up their attitude and approach.

Before penning these notes, I was informed that there are no injuries in the Ballyduff camp and that their full panel will be available for selection. The actual team is not expected to be named until tonight, but the expectations are that there will be no

change from the side which beat Ballygunner. This will have Michael Leamy in goal. Few players have given better service to a club than this 33 year old former Rockwell College player and who holds 2 Waterford S.H.C medals. A very sound keeper. Full back Mossy Casey is soundness personified in defence. He was on the county winning panel in 1982 and captained the winning side in 1987. He is flanked by Tom and Pat Molumphy, whose reputations reached new heights after their brilliant performances against the Gunners.

Although starring at minor and under 21 level, it was at senior level that Tom Feeney hit the headlines and won the accolades this year with the county. His brilliant form was maintained with a sterling display in the semi-final where he played in between Michael Drislane and Ger Feeney and all three (who won county JF medals last year) helped repulse several Ballygunner onslaughts in the semi-final.

Paudie Prendergast is cap-

tain of the team and hopes to lift the cup this time after being denied the honour in 1989 when he was captain of the side which lost to Roanmore. A member of a great hurling family, Paudie has given wonderful service to Ballyduff and holds 2 county medals. He is partnered by John Twomey whose great display in the semi-final enhanced his reputation as a hurler with a great future.

The return of Michael Molumphy has had a decisive effect on the team and the former minor and under 21 player with the county is certainly growing in stature as a class hurler. Here he is flanked by Donal Hannon, who has county medals from 1982 and 1987 and Ger Hickey, who scored two fine points against Ballygunner and the first of which shot Ballyduff into the lead.

The inside line of Kenneth Geary, Michael Walsh and Brendan Hannon between them scored 1-10 of their 1-18 total in the semi-final. Full forward Michael Walsh first wore the Ballyduff senior jersey when he was a mere 16 years old back in 1979. With his brothers Mossy and Richie, he holds 2 county senior medals and the contribution of all three to the hurl-

ing scene in the county and at club level is incalculable. I have not gone through the scoring records, but I think it might be a safe bet that a score of 1-7 against Ballygunner is a record in this county? As well as achieving this, Brendan Hannon, like Kenneth Geary in the opposite corner and who contributed a skilful point in the last game, between them, "manufactured" the opportunities that brought other scores. Fortunately, the club has an impressive panel of substitutes as a back-up if required.

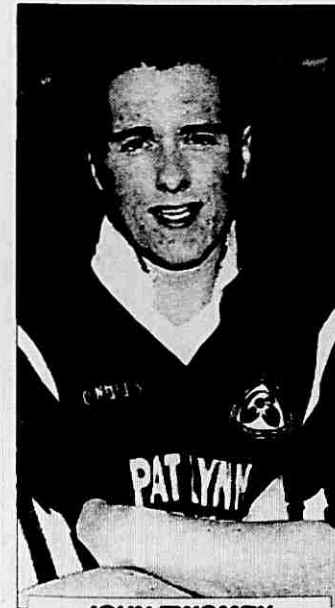

Launch Of Deise Special Christmas Draw

There was a very satisfactory attendance of club delegates present for the official launch of this once-off draw which is scheduled to take place at Lawlors Hotel on Friday night, December 18th, at 8.30 p.m.

Declan O'Meara, Chairman of the Deise Development Committee spoke briefly about the draw before introducing P. S. O Riain, County Board Chairman, who expressed himself delighted at the good attendance and the interest shown in this innovation by the very hardworking committee who were now functioning for their sixth year. He urged all clubs to give their maximum support as otherwise the problem of paying the debts on the county grounds will not go away. He said that if this draw and the other fund-raising ideas that were in the pipeline were successful, the debt would be cleared within a few years.

Greg Fives, Treasurer of the Deise Development Committee, said it was a sad state of affairs that this year his committee were not in a position to give the normal grants to the schools because funds were not available and this situation arose because too many clubs were not putting their shoulders to the wheel. Support for the County Lotto was way down on what it should be, even though it was the best lotto in operation in the county at the present time. He said that some clubs had responded magnificently and this was not being forgotten.

Giving an outline of what was on offer in the Christmas Deise Draw, he said it was attractive enough to sell itself, but nevertheless clubs must go all out and leave no stone unturned in an effort to maximise the returns from the sale of the £20 tickets. He said that with the tremendous support given to our hurlers this year it was obvious that there was enormous goodwill in every corner of the county for the GAA and he was absolutely confident that sellers would experience no problem in disposing of the tickets if the clubs approached the problem in the proper manner.

He said that the public were fully appreciative of the development work done so far and were delighted with the stands in both grounds. He said the prizes were very attractive, the County Board and the schools will benefit, and, financially, there was a lot in it for the clubs.

Tickets were then issued to all clubs, who were reminded that all unsold tickets must be returned, or paid for.

APPEAL

What is being described as an extraordinary development is contained in the news that Stradbally Club have appealed to the County Board in the case of the senior football semi-final which was won by Kilrossanty by 1-6 to 0-8 on Saturday evening week.

The basis of the appeal relates to the sending off of Stradbally player, Nial Curran some minutes before the end of normal time. Some time after the particular match, the referee, Brian Power, discovered that he had made an error as he had confused Nial Curran with another Stradbally player

whom he had booked earlier. As a result, the county GAC cancelled the suspension and declared the player legal to play immediately.

Stradbally club now submit that the loss of the player for several minutes gave their opponents an unfair advantage and as a result, they feel that the semi-final should be re-fixed.

The matter will likely be referred to at the County Board meeting on Monday night.
