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Concern Over Massive Bird Cull At Dungarvan Dump

Over 400 rooks and gulls were killed by special contractors hired out by Waterford County Council earlier this year as part of a massive operation to cull the increasing population of scavenging rodents at the refuse dump in Ballinamuck, Dungarvan.

A report on the bird cull

SONGBIRDS MAY HAVE BEEN KILLED IN OPERATION

was presented to members at Monday's meeting of Dungarvan UDC amid increasing speculation that a large number of protected wild bird species such as

robins, thrushes etc., were unwittingly killed during the operation.

Cllr. Austin Deasy who originally requested the report on the damage to wildlife at the dump, said he had been reliably informed by regular users of the river Colligan that a considerable number of songbirds and other protected species at the dump had been killed during the operation. The people who came to him had been furious and he considered their claims to be highly reliable given their considerable amount of expertise in local environmental matters.

Abbeyside Housing Proposal Receives Negative Reaction

A planning application for a private 40 house development on the lands of the former Hermitage site in Abbeyside has come under strong criticism by Dungarvan UDC member Cllr. Austin Deasy.

Speaking at this week's Urban Council meeting, Cllr. Deasy declared that he was totally against any development on this land and said it was appalling that the town is being built up without any allowances for

open, green spaces.

"I can't believe that the Council would allow a housing project to be built there", he added. The 2.16 hectare lands at the Hermitage, he felt, would be much better utilised as

playing pitches and parks and would be a major asset for the 370 pupils of Abbeyside N.S., just across the road from the proposed development.

His views were shared by Cllr. Nuala Ryan who has constantly raised the subject of the Hermitage with Council officials. In the past, Cllr. Ryan strongly supported a deputation of local residents for the development of a 'People's

Park' and children's playing area on the Hermitage lands and was to the fore in getting the Council to take action against the structurally defective Hermitage building which was later demolished under the Dangerous Buildings Act.

The planning section of the UDC is currently considering the planning application by Patrick Mangan of Co. Kildare for forty pri-

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

My work involves using a computer all day. Are there rules or guidelines for breaks and where can I get information on this?

ANSWER

The Health & Safety Authority has a leaflet for employees on Visual Display Unit (VDU) Regulations which applies to computer and microfiche reader usage.

These Regulations which are laid down by law require your employer to consult with you on all issues affecting health and safety. Your employer is required to evaluate your health and safety at your workstation with particular reference to your eyesight, physical difficulties and mental stress. If you are using a computer all day your employer must carry out a risk assessment of your workstation and any others in a similar situation. This must be done by someone with the necessary expertise. Someone could be trained to do this or a consultant could be used.

Your employer must organise work activity to include frequent breaks from VDU work and inform you of the hazards associated with VDUs and of what has been done to protect you and must comply with the Health and Safety Regulations. The employer must provide eye tests if requested and glasses if needed for VDU work. You or your employer can get further information from the Health & Safety Authority, 10 Hogan Place, Dublin 2, tel: 0 1-6147000, or Regional Offices around the country.

Request For Council To Take Charge Of Cappoquin Road

It appears extremely unlikely that Waterford County Council will take charge of a private road at Drom-rue, Cappoquin. Despite repeated appeals by local county councillor Ollie Wilkinson, officials are adamant that expenditure of £6,000 is needed to bring the road up to standard before they would even consider including it in the county roads network.

Having raised the matter on a number of occasions, Cllr. Wilkinson requested a report on the condition of the road with a view to the Council taking charge of it at last week's local authority meeting.

Local residents, of which there are eight households on the road, contributed £4,000 in 1990 towards the upkeep of the road which was subsequently tarred. Cllr. Wilkinson added however that this job was not adequate for the large volume of agricultural machinery using the road.

Supporting Cllr. Wilkinson, Council Chairperson Nora Flynn said the road in question is vital to the area and is a special case.

Acting County Engineer Eamonn Mansfield reported that the road drainage is very poor, inlets need to be opened and surfacing is also required at a total cost of

£6,000.

County Manager Donal Connolly said if the Council were to take charge of this sub standard road, then similar cases around the county would also have to be considered.

Signposting Needed For Lismore School

A member of waterford County Council has called on the local authority to provide better school signposting at the Convent Primary School in Lismore. Cllr. Willie McDonnell said there is now double the amount of children attending the recently amalgamated school and better signposting is urgently needed on the Ballyea and Deerpark direction as drivers tend to speed into the area.

Acting County Engineer Eamonn Mansfield said a 'Caution Children' sign will be erected under the existing 'School Ahead' sign.

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KIDS STUFF

DICK TURPIN – HIGHWAY ROBBER WHO WAS HANGED AT 33

DICK TURPIN was a famous highwayman who lived in the 18th century.

Dressed all in black and armed with two flintlock pistols, he terrorised the travellers on the roads around London holding up stage coaches and robbing passengers of their cash and valuables.

Soon his exploits became legendary and he was the most famous criminal of

his day as people made up songs and ballads about his adventures.

Born in Essex in 1706, he turned to crime at an early age before graduating to highway robbery.

Dick Turpin lived in a time long before aeroplanes, cars and trains were invented.

So people of all classes used to travel the length and breadth of Britain by stage coach.

Goods were also transported all around the country using coaches pulled by horses.

Every day, hundreds of stage coaches would journey to and from London linking the capital with all the major towns and cities.

There was very little street lighting along the roads in those days, so the stage coaches were very easy pickings for the highwaymen who wanted to rob the passengers and steal the mail.

Dick Turpin was captured in York after

making a legendary ride from London on the back of his faithful mare Black Bess.

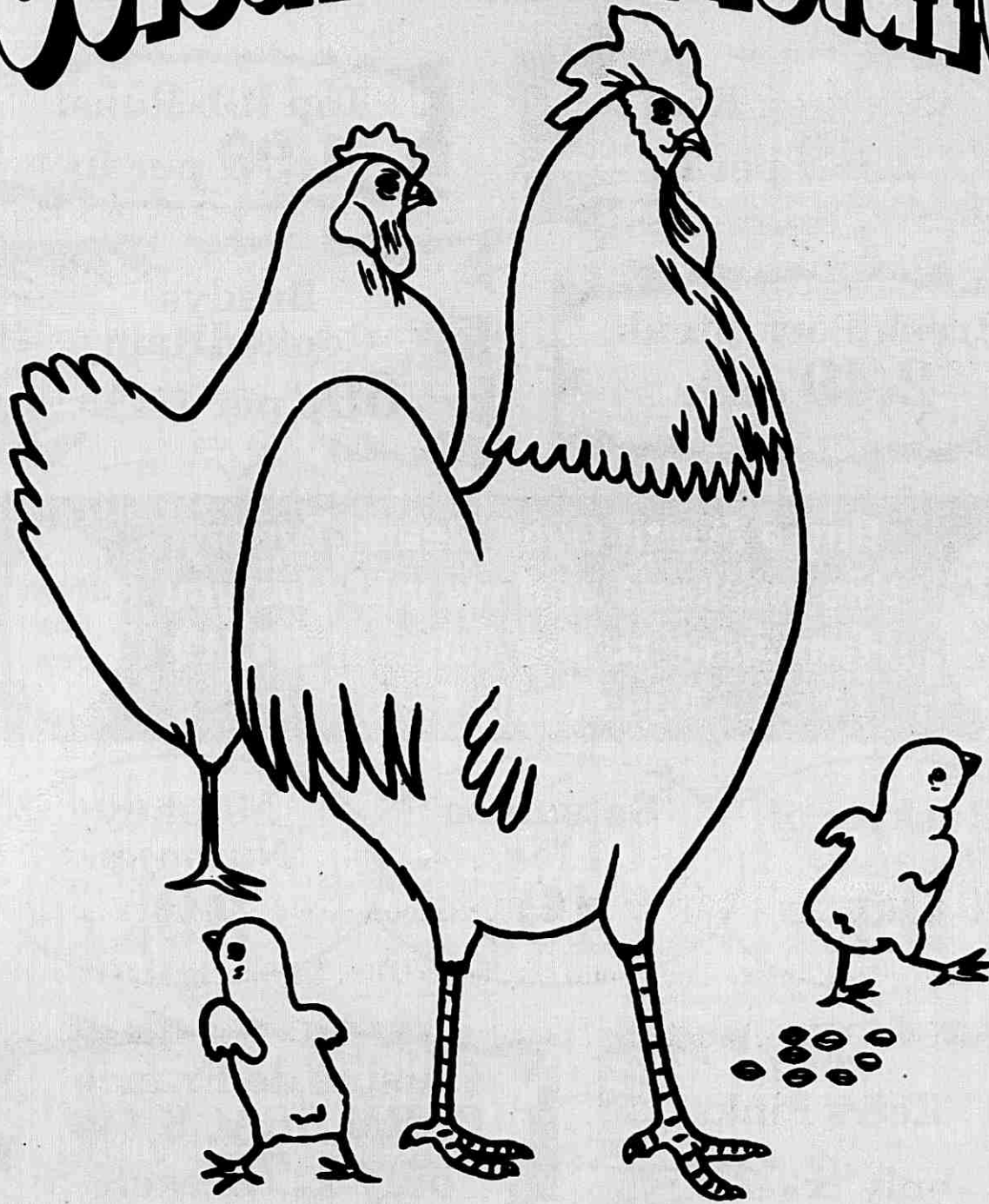
The poor animal is said to have collapsed and died at the end of the journey.

Dick Turpin was put on trial at York assizes (an old court house) where he was found guilty of highway robbery and sentenced to death.

He was hanged in York in 1739 when he was just 33-years-old.

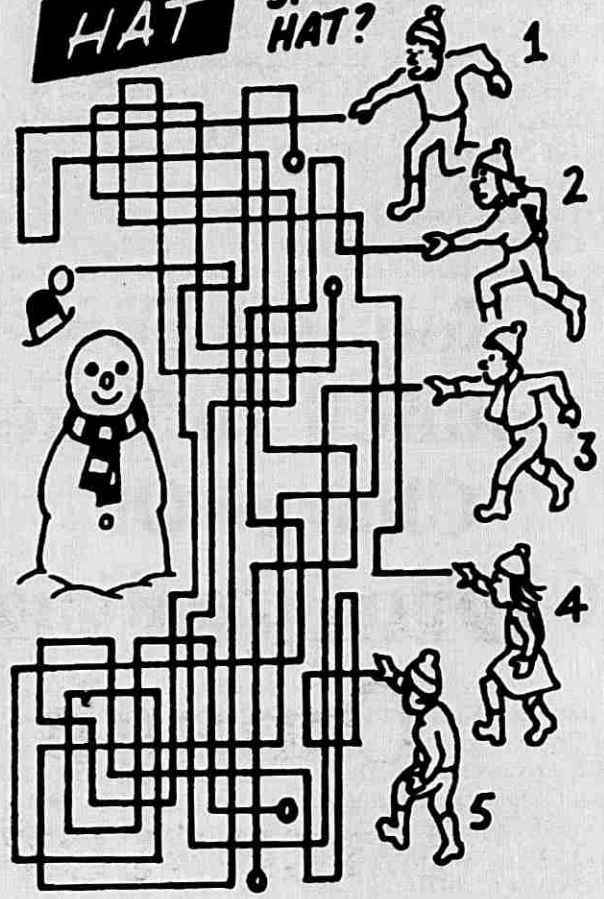

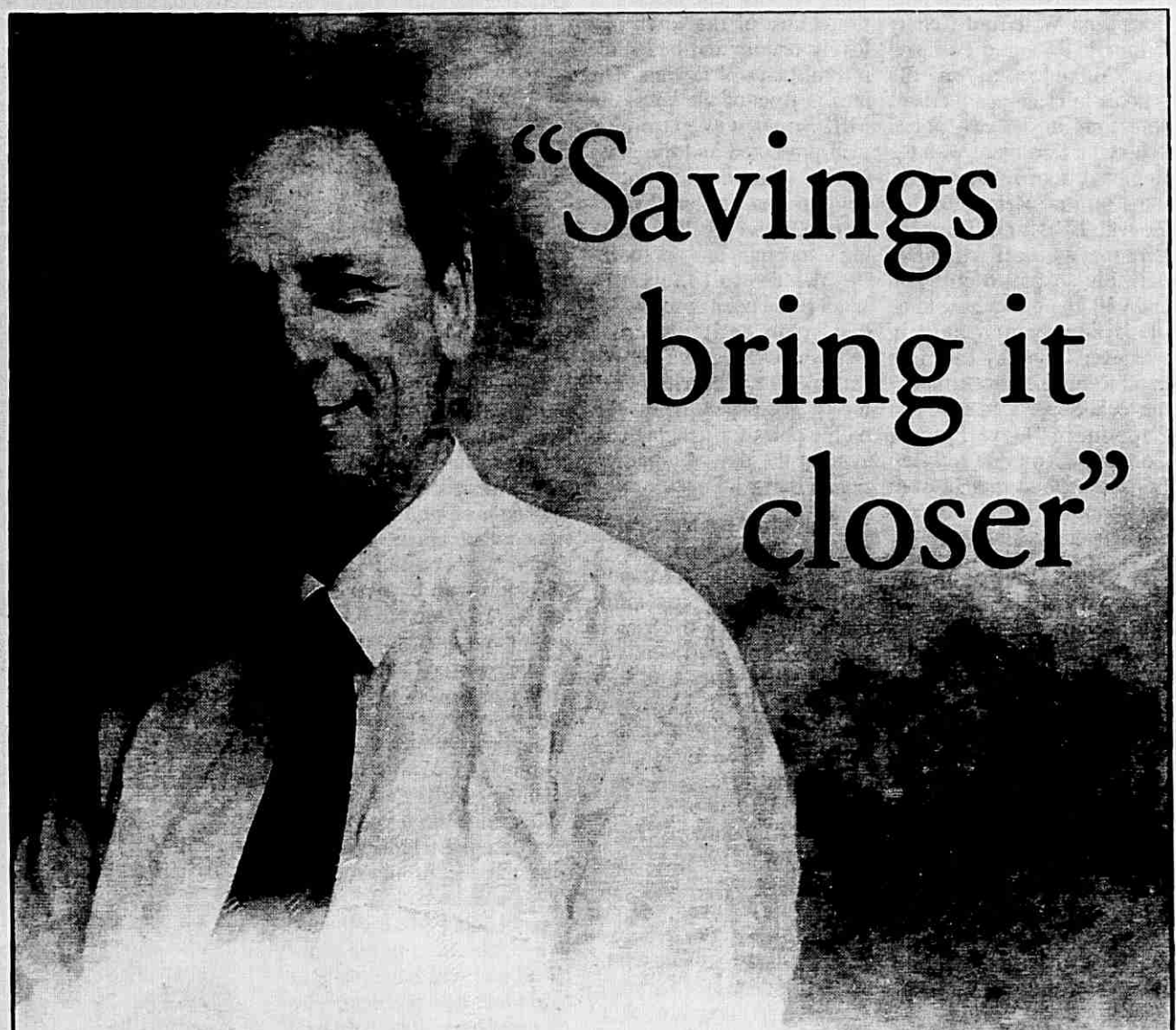

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CAPPOQUIN TIDY TOWNS REPORT

Cappoquin scored 202 pts. in this year's Tidy Towns Competition compared to 192 in last year's competition.

Overall Developmental Approach

Thank you for your entry form and very detailed map which was most useful and much appreciated. It is good to see that you have many members on your committee. This, no doubt, does help to spread the work load in a large area like Cappoquin. It is good to see that your committee has formed good relations with Waterford County Council, FAS and that you have also involved the schools in clean-ups. Perhaps sometime in the year ahead you could also liaise with the Regional Tourism Authority, the National Rehabilitation Board, ESB and Telecom Éireann who all will have valuable advice to give you and will be only too glad to be of assistance and help in whatever way they can. It is good to have sponsorship by the local Super Valu store and Cappoquin Development Company. You can only go from strength to strength with the community and the various agencies behind you.

The Built Environment

The overall standard of maintenance of business premises and public buildings in Cappoquin is quite good but there is more to be done. The Church of Ireland was well presented and its trees and shrubs looked very well. It was good to see that the clock was in working order. The Catholic Church alongside it, again looked well presented but it does need to be repainted. Both the Garda Station and the Fire Station were presented to a very high standard.

Again both banks, the A.I.B. and the Bank of Ireland, in particular the A.I.B., had a nice selection of roses and plants. The Bank of Ireland had some nice paving done. The Post Office was presented well as was the Super Valu supermarket. The Credit Union has been very tastefully decorated and had some very nice signage. The Grotto at the junction of the Melleray and Glenshelane walk route was again well presented.

The school buildings certainly do need attention. They appear to be no longer in use as a school, that may not be correct, but that whole area and buildings contained in it does need freshening up. The National School was again well presented but will need to be painted sooner rather than later. The bank at the back was untidy. Perhaps some planting of heathers or similar type shrubs in this area would make it easier to maintain.

Many of the business prem-

ises throughout the town are well maintained, others need new shop fronts with any plastic signage being removed. It was good to see that the County Council are renovating two derelict properties in Barrack Street. Well done to all concerned and no doubt further improvements will take place over the next few years.

Landscaping

The landscaping throughout the town is very good and no doubt you will continue to work on this. The Square in the centre of the town is a lovely feature and had some nice displays of flowers. The area in front of the houses in Mill Street was extremely well presented and the grass is very neat and tidy with a delightful selection of roses there. On the left side, leaving Cappoquin and approaching the Grotto, there is a small green open space which had some delightful rose plantings. Trees inside the railing are maturing very nicely. There were no flowers on the poles for hanging baskets on the day of adjudication in Barrack Street.

Wildlife And Natural Amenities

Your town is an ideal environment to promote wildlife due to it being on the bank of the river and also it is surrounded by trees and nice open green spaces. Your proposed plans for the Twig Bog are very exciting and no doubt when this project is completed it will enhance the town of Cappoquin in both terms of wildlife and as a natural amenity for the community. It is also noted that you intend to carry out improvements to Glenshelane Walk. As a Tidy Towns Committee you have an important role to play in protecting, enhancing and increasing the wildlife value of your community. No doubt part of your proposals for the Twig Bog will be to identify the wildlife habitats of that area and see what species of animals, birds and fish are there. Fully managed natural areas and wildlife will add greatly to your area.

Litter Control

The overall control of litter in Cappoquin is very good throughout. There were some pieces observed in the open green space on the left approaching the Grotto, some plastic bags, a foil container and just a few pieces here and there throughout the town. Your plan for litter control is working extremely well and congratulations to your 'Tidy Team'. Again well done to all concerned. This is a most important aspect of the competition, carrying with it 40 marks which reflects the importance of having and maintaining a clean outdoor environment

and it certainly helps to achieve higher results.

Tidiness

There is an absence of fly posting throughout the town and graffiti is kept to a minimum. The control of weed growth at kerbs and at the base of buildings was very good overall.

Residential Areas

The residential areas of Cappoquin are presented to a very high standard. The houses on the left going towards the junction to the Lismore Road had some lovely colour schemes and looked very well. I mentioned under landscaping how well the areas in front of their houses were presented. The housing estate at Shanbally does look very well and a great effort has been put in by the residents. Well done to all concerned and do keep up the good work in the years ahead. All the private houses throughout are maintained excellently. Do take care of boundary walls and railings which, in some instances, do need painting. Throughout the town there are some uninhabited houses and a few derelict ones. No doubt the committee will tackle these in the years ahead and will have plans to overcome this problem. The residents have done outstanding work in presenting their properties very well. It does help Cappoquin enormously in this competition. They have put a lot of time and effort into presenting their properties so attractively.

Roads, Streets And Back Areas

The approach roads, and that includes the Dungarvan Road, the Melleray Road and the Lismore Road, are presented to a very high standard. Again as was mentioned last year, the Main Street is very congested with parking on both sides of a narrow street which makes it difficult for one to negotiate driving through. The wall by the G.A.A. pitch, which has ivy growing and other types of creepers, is maturing very well and in another two years should have it almost covered completely. Some of the signs do need to be cleaned and repainted. The Twig Lane area is very run down and no doubt in your plans this will

receive consideration with the Twig Bog development project.

General Impression

Cappoquin Tidy Towns Committee are making an tremendous effort to improve the presentation of Cappoquin. You have identified the problem areas and hopefully over the next few years these will cease. No doubt the business and commercial community do appreciate your efforts as do the residents of the town. Do keep up the good work and well done to all who are making a huge effort to improve the appearance of your town, both for the people who live in it and for the visitors.

Call For Adequate Funding Of Waterford Primary Schools

A strong call has been made on the Minister for Education, Michael Martin, to adequately resource primary schools in Waterford county.

The call was prompted at last week's meeting of Waterford Co. Council by Labour councillor Paddy O'Callaghan who moved a notice of motion that the Council call on Minister Martin to adequately fund local primary schools, bearing in mind the difficulties they are encountering and the large amount of teachers and parents time that is taken up with fundraising.

Cllr. O'Callaghan said Government grant aid for primary schools stands at a mere £50 per capita and £170 per capita for secondary level. He stressed that primary school education was the most important educational foundation for children and added that even if the programme for Government were implemented school grant aid would be significantly improved.

Seconding his proposal was Cllr. Lar Hart who said the present Government had given a pre election promise regarding the adequate funding of education. In addition, he revealed that no remedial teacher has been appointed in Co. Waterford in the past year despite over 26 applications made by schools countywide. Cllr. Hart called on the Council to ask Minister Martin to address the matter immediately.

Tallow Issues Highlighted At Council Meeting

The Brideside town of Tallow was the subject of much discussion at this month's Waterford County Council meeting. Among the many issues raised were the local housing crisis, traffic problems on West Street, the

need for additional public lighting in Cockpit Lane and an extension of the refuse collection service for people in outlying areas of the town.

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said Tallow had grown enormously over the last two years and highlighted the serious shortage of local land for housing with 28 people from the area on the Council's housing list.

Stating that he was 'well aware' of the situation, County Manager Donal Connolly said he is currently looking at a parcel of land in Tallow with a view to acquiring it for housing purposes.

Cllr. Wilkinson subsequently highlighted the problems experienced with traffic along congested West Street and claimed that a number of cars on this street had been damaged. He asked the Council to take the initiative to meet with local people in a bid to resolve the issue.

Acting Co. Engineer Eamonn Mansfield agreed that some form of parking restrictions should be introduced along the street while

Mr. Connolly revealed that the Council is currently in discussions regarding the acquisition of land to provide car parking facilities off West Street.

Meanwhile, responding to representations made by Cllr. Willie McDonnell, the Council is to seek a quotation from the ESB for the erection of up to 4 additional lighting standards in the newly built Cockpit Lane.

While complimenting the Council on the recent tarring of the road into Tallow, Cllr. McDonnell asked when the wall along this route will be restored. He was informed that work will start on the wall before the end of the year.

Both Cllr. McDonnell and Cllr. Wilkinson raised the subject of the refuse collection service, proposing that it should be extended to the Ballyphilip area of Knockanore, (Wilkinson) and the Youghal-Tallow road between Kilmore and the Pike Cross, Knockanore (McDonnell).

They were subsequently informed by Mr. Mansfield that the Council intend to review the existing service in Tallow, Cappoquin and Ardmore as numerous requests have been received to extend the collection route.

Deasy Demands Equal Treatment For All Criminal Activities

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy has strongly condemned white collar crime and declared that those responsible for premeditated fraud should face the full rigours of the law.

In a statement issued last week, Deputy Deasy said it has been apparent for some time that some wealthy people have been evading tax but he was even more 'appalled' to think that executives and senior personnel of financial institutions have been directly responsible for advising and assisting people as to how they might avoid paying tax.

"This to me would be a far greater crime than straight forward tax evasion", he added. "If handbag snatchers and drug addicts who thrive to sustain their habits have to face the certainty of imprisonment, I see no reason why people who commit white collar crime involving millions of pounds shouldn't receive the same sanctions".

Deputy Deasy continued that the criminal practices which have been alleged, constitute a very serious indictment of the banking sector and the public, he felt, are entitled to see that the law is applied on an even handed basis throughout Irish society.

It's time to plan for winter veg

BRUSSELS sprouts are typical cool-season brassicas - the hardiest cultivars survive temperatures of minus 10 degrees C.

If sown in succession, Brussels sprouts provide a constant crop from early autumn to late spring. A general base-dressing may be applied shortly before planting as high nitrogen levels are needed.

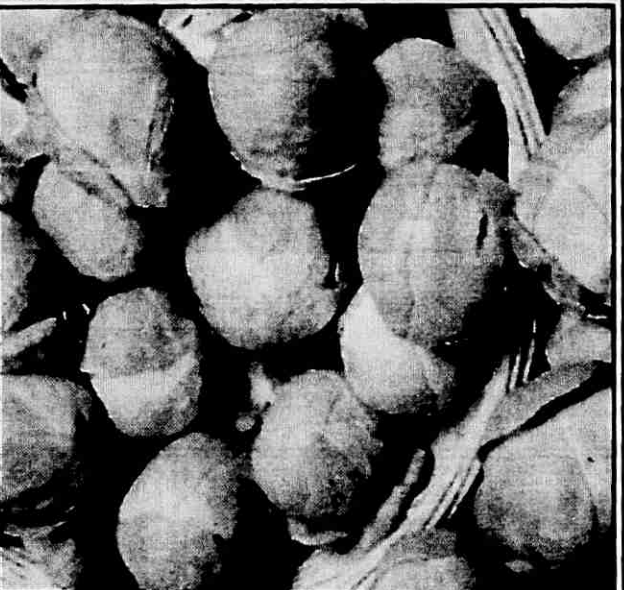
Sow in succession from mid to late spring as the soil begins to warm up, starting with the early-maturing cultivars. For a very early crop, sow in gentle heat under cover in early spring. Sow either in seed trays or in a seedbed for transplanting or in situ in firm ground. Most Brussels sprouts do not grow well in modules.

Thin out or transplant to the required spacing in early summer generally four to five weeks after sowing. Plant dwarf cultivars about 18 inches apart and tall cultivars 2ft apart.

Brussels sprouts, with their slow rate of growth, may be intercropped in the first few months with fast maturing vegetables.

Keep beds weed-free. Since plants are widely spaced, extra watering is required only in very dry conditions. A top dressing of a nitrogenous fertilizer or an organic liquid feed may be applied in late summer if the plants are not growing vigorously.

Your Brussels sprouts should be ready to harvest about 20 weeks after sowing. Their flavour is improved after they have been exposed to some frost. Pick the lowest sprouts first by snapping them off at the base. The upper sprouts will continue

to develop. Where winters are very severe, uproot the whole plant and hang them in a cool frost-free place. The sprouts will remain fresh for several weeks.

Leeks are a cool season crop and grow best below 24 degrees C. They need a long growing season and should be started as early in the year as possible. Seeds should be sown in an outdoor seed bed for transplanting when the plant is about eight inches tall. They should be transplanted in rows about six inches apart.

Leeks should be watered thoroughly until the transplanted plants are well established. Thereafter they should only be watered in exceptionally dry conditions. Make sure the beds are kept weed-free.

Leeks may be harvested about 20 weeks after sowing, but may be left standing for many months. Lift them as required from the summer onwards. The hardy cultivars may be lifted throughout the winter into spring except in very severe climates. Leeks do not store well out of the ground so it is best to leave them in the garden and harvest them as required.

The carrot is king of the root vegetables and comes in many varieties, both early and maincrop. The early types are usually small and slender and used young. Maincrop types are larger and can be used fresh or stored. Carrots can grow up to 2 inches in diameter at the neck and be up to 8 inches long. They are normally tapered but some varieties may be rounded.

Carrots are biennials grown as annuals and they are a cool season crop. They should be grown in an open site on light, fertile soil. Deep-rooted types need stone-free soil. Work in organic matter, preferably in the autumn, before sowing. Carrots need very low nitrogen levels, and the soil should be raked finely before sowing.

Concern Expressed On Situation For Cardiac Patients

A Waterford County Cllr. has said that political commentary over the length of hospital waiting lists should be secondary to the fact that patients on hear by-pass waiting lists are actually dying.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceil-leachair was reacting to reports that 110 patients nationwide had died during 1998 whilst he's aware of individuals in the Waterford area who have undergone very expensive private treatment in Dublin rather than take chances on awaiting public treatment through the South Eastern

Health Board.

"It's almost incredible in this so-called Celtic Tiger economy that 751 of those awaiting essential cardiac surgery nationwide have been more than six months on a waiting list. Patients are being made suffer unnecessarily, many saying to me that it borders on cruelty. I know of a consultant in one part of the country who has been unable to get beds for five of his patients — three with pancreatic tumours and two with liver tumours, where treatment is urgently required and should be provided within a matter of

days. One of the patients has been waiting for a bed since July last. The closure of 750 acute beds nationwide during the summer — including cutbacks at WRH is inexcusable given the numbers on waiting lists and would appear to make for unpleasantness for many people depending on public hospitals in all health board areas."

"All political parties must agree on an urgent strategy to bring order to the health service and, if required, amend legislation to give individual agencies such as the South Eastern Health

Board latitude to deal with crisis situations such as that presently pertaining."

FAMILY HEALTH

Q: Recently we have found our daughter of six either sitting up in bed wide-eyed or wandering around the upstairs of the house at night. At times it is very eerie and is beginning to worry both my husband and myself.

A: Sleepwalking rarely occurs with grown-ups and is more common with children prior to adolescence. The causes are not completely known, some incident could be playing on the mind.

A visit to your general practitioner is not really necessary, only if it persists, then he or she may prescribe a mild sedative. An immediate treatment would be to have a discussion with your daughter to discover what, if anything, might be worrying her. In the meantime for her own safety, secure all windows and doors at night both downstairs as well as upstairs as she may be able to negotiate the stairs in this state just as good as if she were awake. If you discover her sleepwalking again, do not wake her. It will not harm her contrary to a popular myth but it could frighten her and leave her feeling puzzled. Simply

guide her gently back to her bed which can normally be achieved without much difficulty.

Q: My young daughter recently had her hearing tested by a Medical Officer at her school. He told us our daughter's hearing was perfect but didn't ask her at any stage whether or not she could hear. The results were just read from a graph which was printed out from the machine she used. How does this work?

A: When a sound is received by the brain, a very small muscular reflex steadies the eardrum. By inserting the end of an instrument into the ear so it fits snugly, sounds of different frequencies and powers can be introduced and the eardrum reflex can be measured by the instrument. This detects and prints out the small pressure changes in the ear. It certainly provides an effective and accurate means of measuring and recording the hearing function and confirms that the moving parts of the ear, as well as the nerves of hearing, are working properly.

Chef's Corner

Menus for the week

Lamb Pasties

12 oz/375g short or flaky pastry
 1lb/450g stewing lamb, trimmed and diced
 1/2lb/225g peeled, diced potato
 1 onion, finely chopped
 1 tbsp chopped parsley
 Good pinch mixed dried herbs or chopped fresh thyme
 1 tbsp oil or butter
 1/2pt/300ml water or stock
 1 egg, beaten, optional

Method
 Brown the lamb in the butter or oil, add the chopped onion and cook for a few minutes more, stirring frequently.

Add the water and mixed herbs. Bring to boiling point, cover and simmer for about one hour until the lamb is tender, adding the diced potato for the last 20 mins.

Check from time to time and add more water if necessary to keep the mixture from sticking. Almost all the liquid should have disappeared when the mixture is ready. Add the salt and pepper to taste and the chopped parsley. Leave to cool.

Roll out the pastry thinly and cut into 4in/10cm squares. Place about a tablespoon of lamb mixture in the edge of each square and moisten the edges of the squares in the water.

Fold over to make triangles. Pinch the edges together and set upright on baking tray. Brush over with beaten egg or milk and bake in a preheated oven 400°F/200°C/Gas Mark 6 for 20 to 25 mins.

Serve hot with onion gravy or tomato sauce or cool. Wrap individually and freeze until required.

Alternative fillings: Diced chicken with onion, potato and a small diced red pepper or diced pork with onion, potato and quartered button mushrooms or green pepper.

Household Hints

1. Save the water in which potatoes have been boiled and when it is cooled, immerse any stained cutlery and leave until the water is quite cold. The cutlery will sparkle when wiped with a soft, dry cloth.

2. Use the foam only when using a detergent or soapy lather to wash upholstery. Overlap each area and rinse with a warm sponge well wrung out in warm water.

Unsatisfactory Answer By Minister On Hospital Funding Issue

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy raised a question in the Dail recently asking the Minister for Health if his attention had been drawn to the

chronic need for additional funding at Waterford Regional Hospital in view of the inability to provide essential services, particularly for the elderly during the winter months.

Minister for Health and Children, Brian Cowen, said the provision of services at Waterford Regional Hospital is a matter for the South Eastern Health Board which is obliged to produce a service plan for the year, (currently standing at £211.045 million).

Minister Cowen said it is the SEHB's responsibility to provide services within that allocation and to develop monthly expenditure plans and ongoing monitoring arrangements.

"I am aware from the SEHB that activity in the Board's general hospitals, including Waterford Regional Hospital, for the first 6 months of this year is well up on the same period last year and that this is giving rise to budgetary concerns", he added.

Quoting the Health Act, Minister Cowen went on to say that it is a matter for the health board management to take whatever budgetary measures are required to ensure that net expenditure is contained within approved levels by the year end.

Completely dissatisfied with such a reply to his question, Deputy Deasy said that if funding is not available from the Department of Health, then there is very little the Health Board can do, which, he added has even been confirmed just recently by the Medical Director of Waterford Regional Hospital.

AN APPRECIATION

Rev. John O'Regan, O.M.I.

Lesmurdie, Western Australia
and formerly of Abbeyside and Dungarvan

The death took place at Mazenod College, Lesmurdie, Western Australia of Fr. Jack O'Regan on Thursday, October 8, 1998. He had lived his 75 years to the full. He was born in Kilkenny and was a chap when his family moved to Abbeyside, his father transferring to Dungarvan Railway Station.

Like most of his pals in the Village at the time, Jack joined the 4th Waterford troop of scouts and went into the Wolf Patrol where his A/L was Tom Whelan. Jack was great with the pen, was a real wordsmith and could come up with a turn of phrase which would describe a situation to a 'T'. He was chosen to launch the Scout Notes in the "Leader" (when it was being launched) and they have continued since then for 60 years. He worked for a while at the "Observer" with his brother Pat, before leaving to take a clerical position with the GSR at Rathmore Railway Station, Co. Kerry.

When the troop camped in Killarney in 1943, Jack cycled to camp in his time off and spent some days under canvas. They were hectic days. Anyone who wasn't on cook duty, or some other important work, was rounded up for cross country, sprinting, long jump, hop-step-and-a-leap, etc.

Jack was a livewire and he was well known at sports meetings in those parts for cycling, running, pole vaulting and many other activities. When growing up in the Village, he was one of the group that swam from the slip to the "Pond" on fine summer days. The same group took part in the "greasy pole" competition and swam around the harbour after a duck during the Pattern.

It was no surprise to his friends when Jack left his position and entered the Oblate Novitiate in Co. Limerick. He later moved to Piltown where he was ordained. One of his guests was his Scout Leader, Liam Lanigan of whom he said: "It was his consistence and personal responsibility that made the greatest impression on me. For this alone I shall always be indebted to him" (letter to "Leader" 31/8/1978). Jack was assigned to Australia where he became well known for his magazine articles, radio broadcasts and religious retreats. Further studies led him to become a psychologist and candidates for the priesthood came to him for assessment.

Up to two years ago he was a professor at the Seminary in Jakarta, Indonesia, when a downturn in his health meant coming back to Lesmurdie. When Australia set up a separate Province from Ireland, Jack opted to transfer to the new Province.

His love for Ireland never waned; no letter was complete without some phrases as Gaeilge. His Irish holiday always included a stay as guests of Austin and Sybil at "The Fountain." From there he would walk to Ballinroad to visit the grave of his parents, Tom and Kathleen.

He was predeceased by his sister Kathleen (Murphy), Newbridge and his brother Tadhg (Athlone) and is survived by his brothers Pat in Cavan (formerly "Observer" and "Anglo-Celt"), Jim in Dublin (formerly "Leader") and their families. We offer them our sincere sympathy. May we all meet in the Lord's great campsite. — G.E.M.



SELLING/BUYING CATTLE ?

Some farmers have to sell while the low prices provide opportunities for other farmers with plenty of winter feed to profit by the situation.

Teagasc has budgets done for all types of cattle and you should contact your Teagasc Adviser to discuss these.

Where housing is available or even a dry rocky area for outwintering with minimum silage, as suggested above, no farmer need panic into "giving away" cattle.

But, do your sums. You know what they sell for now, calculate the extra meal costs and other items, estimate what he will make at selling in March/April and add on the premium if down.

Is it profitable - would want £50 per head at least. Maybe the first lost is the cheapest loss.

To sell or buy stores ?

Variable costs are estimated at £164 - £167 per head.

Fixed Costs at £34 per head.

Slaughter premium at £36 per head.

22 month premium at £90 per head.

Selling price (lb) expected: Friesians 78p, Hereford 81p and continental crosses 83p.

Profit required £50 per head.

72% DMD silage available.

Based on these figures the maximum price payable now per 100 kgs: Friesians £88, Hereford £94 and £105 for Continental crosses.

If you are selling and you get these prices or more then you should sell.

If you are buying and you get these prices or lower then you should consider purchasing to make £50 per head profit over 140 day winter.

To sell or keep weanlings ?

It will cost about £140 to keep him for winter.

Keep him if the price is less than £120 per 100 kg.

If premium and extensification payable.

If housing and labour available.

If enough winter feed available.

If bank is not pushing for payment.

MEAL FEEDING

If you can reach target let-out or calving down weights without meals, do not feed meals to push them on when it is not necessary.

You are wasting money.

Two-thirds of the extra weight put on in those circumstances is lost by next winter.

It is really worthwhile weighing stock now.

Condition score all cows now and divide out fat cows (score 3.5 plus) and thin cows (score 2.5 or less), both lots to get special feed treatment.

The following are suggested meal feeding levels per day with good silage -

Fattening Steers 4-5 kgs.

Fattening Heifers 2.5-3 kgs.

Fattening Cull Cows 3 kgs.

Strong Weanlings None.

Small Weanlings 2 kgs.

Dry Cow (Score 2.5 plus) None.

Dry Cow (Score 2.5 plus or less) 1-2 kgs.

Autumn Calver 7-8 kgs.

Spring Calvers 2 kgs.

Incalf Heifers/2nd calvers 1-2 kgs.

ANIMAL HEALTH

All the predictions are for a bad fluke year.

Even dry farms are vulnerable this year because of all the rain. Check out livers of animals slaughtered.

To prevent immunity it would be best to change dose products from year to year. Dose with Fasinex at housing or Ridafluke, Trodex, Zaniil or Flukiver 3-4 weeks after housing.

Milk and meat have withholding periods after dosing.

Dose all weanlings at housing for stomach worms (Type 11).

Panacur, Valbazen, Zerofen, Curazol, Systemex, Bovex etc. all do the job.

Lice is a big problem on some farms, even with dairy cows.

Treat at housing with Tigavon, Spoton, Renegade, Butox, Ectospec, Tixol etc.

It is a small cost (30-80p) but may have to be repeated.

Annual Report Shows Big Expansion of Teagasc Services

The number of contracted clients of the Teagasc advisory service in 1997 reached an all-time high of 37,000.

In addition 55,000 farmers attended national, regional and local demonstrations and a further 37,000 attend-

ed 400 seminars and conferences organised by Teagasc. These figures are contained in the 1997 Teagasc annual report which has now been published.

The report also shows the important role which Teagasc plays in helping farmers to comply with EU regulations for direct payments. The organisation's advisory staff provided specialised assistance to over 63,000 farmers on completing Area Aid applications.

Another significant development during 1997 was the establishment of "Cash in on Grass" beef demonstration farms in every county and at agricultural colleges. The use of Discussion Groups, as a method of disseminating new technology to farmers was further expanded with the number of groups increasing from 150 to 250. The majority involved dairy farmers but the development of groups in cattle, sheep and tillage also gained momentum during the year.

TRAINING

A total of 4,750 young people commenced different stages of training at 13 colleges, 50 local Teagasc training centres and with the Farm Apprenticeship Board during the year. Also, over 3,200 adult farmers and rural dwellers participated in courses on farming and rural enterprise and 2,000 rural women attended special women's courses.

RESEARCH

During 1997, Teagasc research staff undertook 295 research projects, of which 219 were in agriculture, agri-food economics and rural development and 76 were in food. Among the highlights of the research programme were:

An econometric model of the agri-food industry in Ireland was developed. This will become a vital instrument for policy development and analysis.

Beef research at Grange showed that up to five weeks additional grazing can be achieved through better grassland management.

Work on clover swards for sheep showed savings of 8p/kg carcass in lamb production costs.

Trials at Oak Park on a new range of fungicides showed yield increases of up to 80% in winter wheat, due to disease control and physiological yield-enhancing effects.

Research at the Dairy Products Research Centre resulted in new insights into the manufacture of added value cheese varieties and there was also a research breakthrough in optimising the flavour of lactic butter.

A new packaging system for beef retail cuts, developed by the National Food Centre, met with a keen trade interest in a number of countries.

Parlon Says Intervention Support For 100,000 Head Of Cattle Will Raise Prices

Following direct action by IFA involving a three day occupation of the Department of Agriculture offices and protracted negotiations with Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh and the meat factories on new intervention arrangements, IFA President Tom Parlon said recently cattle prices should now rise. He said prices should move up to 28p/lb for R3 grades for the next intervention tender commencing on Tuesday, October 27.

Mr. Parlon said there was no doubt that the new intervention arrangements must now increase cattle prices. He said this was a result of the direct action taken by the IFA through its three day and two night occupation of the Department of Agriculture offices in Dublin this week.

Mr. Parlon welcomed this week's 8% increase in beef export refunds announced at the Beef Management Committee in Brussels recently. "This is worth 4p/lb on third country beef exports. In total over the last three weeks, export refunds have increased by 9p/lb or over £70 a head. Coupled with the new intervention arrangements, cattle prices at the factories should rise immediately."

The IFA President said livestock farmers needed to sell hard over the next number of days to ensure that the factories pass back the full benefits of the new intervention arrangements and refund increases to producers.

The IFA President said the new intervention arrangements will provide an outlet between now and Christmas for up to 100,000 head cattle which otherwise would have been destined for the Russian market. "The new arrangements provide for the inclusion of 04 grade steers and an increase in the carcass weight limit from 340 kg to 360 kg."

Parlon Calls On Andrews To Visit Libya Immediately

IFA President Tom Parlon said recently that the latest difficulties in reopening the Libyan market have such serious implications for the livestock industry that the Minister for Foreign Affairs, David Andrews must personally intervene with the Libyan Foreign Minister and visit Libya immediately to secure this essential market for Irish cattle.

Mr. Parlon said he has been in constant contact with Mr. Seamus Purcell in Libya who is doing his utmost in the circumstances, but now requires the back-up support of the Minister for Foreign Affairs in the tussle to win the business for Ireland.

Mr. Parlon said he had been in contact with the Department of Foreign Affairs urging Mr. Andrews to move immediately to secure this outlet.

HUGE CROWD ATTEND CRISIS MEETING

Over 320 farmers attended the crisis meeting organised by ICMSA for the South East region. Mr. Pat O'Neill, Group Managing Director AWG, Mr. John Cusack MEP, Mr. Alan Gillis MEP, Minister of State Mr. Ned O'Keefe and Mr. Frank Allen President ICMSA addressed the meeting held in Hotel Kilkenny.

While all speakers acknowledged the present crisis and the reasons for it, there seemed to be no quick solution to the problem.

However County Chairman Kevin Connolly, who chaired the regional meeting said that the government are in a position to give some assistance by implementing the following immediately:

1. Press for intervention without the current eligibility conditions so those farmers are guaranteed an outlet for their cattle and to establish a floor price on the market.
2. Export credit insurance is required to reopen the Russian market.
3. Bring back grants for Pollution Control and Dairy Hygiene.
4. Re-introduce the installation aid for young farmers.
5. Extend the Family Income Supplement to farmers.

Mr. Connolly went on to say that the banks will have to adopt a lenient attitude as many farmers will have problems and the banks are now in a position to assist farmers during the present crisis.

If a farmer needs assistance from ICMSA he should contact any local officer, or our Area Officer John Quigley or our Head Office in Limerick, concluded Mr. Connolly.

"Shaughraun" To Be Staged As Part Of Centenary Celebrations In Lismore

If, by a quirk of history, a film company had been established in the last century called Nineteenth Century Fox, it would undoubtedly have been managed by the extraordinary playwright, impresario and man of many parts, Dion Boucicault (1820-1890).

Boucicault, perhaps the most influential and certainly the most popular of mid-nineteenth century dramatists, was born in Dublin. It was fitting that the wonders of the mechanical age should feature in his background, for throughout his career, Boucicault never missed a stroke in exploiting the trappings of modernity for dramatic effect in his plays.

The term "sensation drama" was first coined by Thackeray in 1861 to describe the heightened dramatic intensity of "The Colleen Bawn" (1860), the most successful of all Boucicault's plays.

It was his emphasis on the visual which has led cultural historians to see Boucicault as a major precursor of cinema, anticipating in his use of lighting, rapid scene shifts, multiple vantage points and so on. In Boucicault's main Irish plays, it is the eloquence not just of speech but of action, the choreography of the body, which animates his conception of Irish character.

Boucicault's third major Irish melodrama "The Shaughraun" (1874) has a provocative contemporary Fenian setting. The playwright used tours of the play to promote the cause of Fenian prisoners, including writing an open letter on their behalf to Disraeli, the British Prime Minister. So, far from evading the political realities of his native land, as is often alleged, Boucicault's idealised, even euphoric, images can be seen as Utopian gestures towards a new Ireland freed of its petrified past.

Other well known Boucicault's plays include "The Long Strike" (1866), "The Octoroon" (1859) and "Araah-na Pogue" (1864).

Lismore Dramatic Society, as part of its centenary celebrations, will stage "The Shaughraun" at the courthouse Theatre, Lismore on November 5, 6 and 7 and on November 12, 13 and 14.

This classic Boucicault play is a romantic, period comedy drama directed by James Lenane and is not to be missed. The production is a mixture of music, comedy and drama and includes a large cast of well known performers. No stone is being left unturned to ensure that the production will uphold a proud drama and musical tradition as the society enters into its second century.

Concern Over Massive Bird Cull At Dungarvan Dump

lem at the dump came to a head last April and May following complaints by a local farmer near the dump of damage to his crops by scavenging birds and litter being dropped into drinking troughs by birds flying to and from the tip. Some of the rubbish at the dump was subsequently covered which alleviated the problem of birds dropping litter into animal troughs. The damage to crops however continued and officials decided to engage the services of Rent-a-Kill who recommended that a bird cull be carried out.

A licence under the Wildlife Act was successfully obtained by the pest control company from Dúchas, the Heritage Service of the Dept. of Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht which enabled them to shoot, scare and use narcotised bait for the control of rooks and gulls, valid to the end of June.

During the bird cull in mid May, Rent-a-Kill used a narcotic drug in pretreated bait which was specially chosen to attract rooks and gulls. This drug put the

birds to sleep and they were later collected and killed. The report, which was prepared by Paul Daly of the County Council's Environmental Section, revealed that 400 of the target species were killed as a result of the operation. Mr. Daly himself said he witnessed only one dead blackbird in the dump during the cull. Since the cull was carried out, bird scares are now in operation at the Ballinamuck site to keep the remaining birds under control.

MINISTER RECEIVED NO COMPLAINTS

On raising the matter in the Dáil last week, Deputy Deasy was informed by the Minister for Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht Síle De Valera, that while there may have been "some non-target casualties" as a result of the operation, her officials had received no complaints in relation to the operation itself and she was satisfied that all reasonable efforts were taken to avoid such casualties.

The pest control company, added Minister De Valera, monitored the operation to ensure that casualties among non-target species were avoided or minimised to the greatest possible extent. Rent-a-Kill's application for a licence was investigated in a site visit by officials of Dúchas on May 17th which confirmed the nature of the problem and the damage caused to surrounding farmland.

SERIOUS RESERVATIONS

On hearing a report of the cull at this week's UDC meeting, Cllr. Paddy Power said it was a disgrace 'to go out and kill birds like that' adding that the Council were 'crazy to go ahead and do it' while Cllr. Billy Kyne also expressed misgivings about the massive bird kill. Cllr. Michael O'Riordan suggested that the pretreated bait may have put the larger birds to sleep but could well have killed the smaller birds.

County Manager Donal Connolly however was satisfied that the contractors had acted in the best interests of the area. The action was undertaken as a result of ongoing complaints and the County Veterinary Inspector was also satisfied that there was a major problem with rodents at the dump. Bird scares, he said, would not have worked without an initial cull. He asked Cllr. Deasy to contact the people who had first raised the matter to see if

they would meet with Council officials and discuss their concerns.

With regard to the future of the Ballinamuck tip, Mr. Connolly accepted that the site is inadequate and said it will be closed as soon as an alternative location is up and running.

He hoped that the consultants will report back to the Co. Council before Christmas with a final list of possible sites for a combined landfill for both the city and county.

When the final site for the landfill is chosen, a full public education programme will be put in place whereby residents in the vicinity of the landfill will be thoroughly acquainted with similar landfill sites around the country.

vate houses, comprising of 17 detached two storey houses and 23 similar sized semi detached homes.

The project has also sparked off concerns among local residents regarding the future of many old trees on the site. Cllr. Ryan said she had received numerous representations from people in the area who were concerned that many of these trees would be demolished while others were in favour of having them cut down.

County Engineer John O'Flynn said a tree survey is currently being undertaken by the applicant and any dead trees or those of no consequence will be removed.

A detailed map of the proposed development will be submitted to members at next month's meeting.

Traffic Plan For Dungarvan Finally Agreed

Described by UDC Chairman Lar Hart as the best thing that has ever happened to the town, the final revision of the traffic management plan for Dungarvan town was agreed upon last Monday night by members of Dungarvan UDC. Some minor changes were made to the recommendations put forward by the special traffic sub committee and the main provisions are listed under. A full report of the plan, which was the source of major dissonance among members, will appear in next week's issue.

It was made abundantly clear from Monday night's meeting that indiscriminate parking by car and lorry drivers alike will no longer be tolerated throughout the town, particularly along O'Connell Street where no parking whatsoever will be allowed along the single yellow line and lorries will only be allowed to unload up to 11 a.m. in specially designated bays.

ONE WAY SYSTEM

Friary Street and Strand Street are to revert to a two way traffic system while the traffic flow along Carberry's Lane (beside Ryan's Super Valu) is to be changed from Main Street to Davitt's Quay. The traffic flow along Galwey's Lane will be changed towards Main Street.

PARKING RESTRICTIONS

Double yellow lines will be introduced at Emmet Street, from the junction

with Strand Street to the junction with Buttery Lane.

On the Causeway, disc parking will be in operation along the north side (beside the park), with the exception of those spaces outside business premises, while on the opposite side (beside the quay), no parking will be allowed and double yellow lines will be put down from the bridge up to a space back from the Poor Man's Seat.

LOADING BAYS

Twelve loading bays are to be provided around the town and will operate each day until 11 a.m. In Friary Street the loading bay will be outside the church. Main Street - outside former Mulcahy/Ducey premises. Lower Main St. - near junction with Thompson's Lane. Cross Bridge Street - outside car park adjacent to TSB entrance. Grattan Square - at former Creamery entrance and in front of Paddy Foley's, Delaney's and Johnny Byrne's. Mary Street - outside Marie's hair salon, Darrers Stores and Tudor House. In Western Terrace, the owners of Herlihy's Super Valu have agreed to relocate the boundary wall of the car park at the rear of their premises to facilitate a loading bay on the eastern side of this street. In O'Connell Street, a loading bay will be located outside Kiely's Pub and another outside Darrers entrance, Quccally's bar and a private residence.

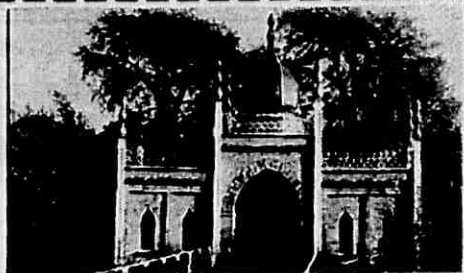

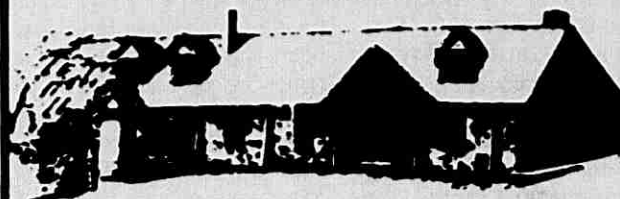

Councillor Speaks Out On Tax Reform

A Waterford County councillor has said that PAYE workers will expect the Government to use the forthcoming budget to honour the spirit and letter of promises on tax reform made not just under Partnership 2000, but in various speeches made by the Taoiseach and Tanaiste.

Cllr. Fiachra Ó Ceil-

leachair says workers he's been speaking to in the Dungarvan area are anxious to see a real difference in their situations being apparent.

"If you look at the growth in a town like Dungarvan, like the rest of the economy it's been due too pay restraint in social partnership and hard work by employees. Over half of one's pay packet is being taken away in income tax and it's about

time now that those keeping the show on the road felt the benefits of economic growth in their own incomes. In the 1980's and early 90's we were told that the PAYE tax burden couldn't be reduced because the economy was in such poor shape. PAYE workers can now hardly be expected to accept being told that real tax reform must be further postponed because the economy is doing so well."

"There's a feeling that the tax changes in last years budget favoured the better off, there is a particular obligation on the Government now to use the December Budget to benefit low and middle earners. This can best be done by substantially increasing personal allowances and widening the tax bands. The inflationary impact of tax benefits for the less well off are likely to be minimal."

It is of course hoped that the public will in turn look to these businesses when next they require a particular item or service. It is worth pointing out that the Chamber is a non-profit making organisation and all of the funds collected for the Promotion Campaign are ploughed back directly into advertising, promotion, etc.

Within the next few weeks the Christmas Lighting will be erected with a view to having them switched on for December 8th. We are hoping to considerably extend the area of coverage this year to incorporate the recently developed Quay area, more on this anon.

Work is well underway in organising our Christmas Wonderland, however we are experiencing considerable difficulty in locating a suitable venue in which to host this event. A number of possible locations have been looked at, while each in its own way would suffice, they each have their individual drawbacks. We would appreciate any suggestions other people have regarding this situation.

The latest proposals put forward by the Traffic Management Committee (details available elsewhere in this bulletin) would appear to offer good prospects of being successful in helping to control the flow of traffic into and around the town. As with previous attempts, these new by-laws are subject to on-going reviews and will if necessary be changed in the future as and if this is deemed appropriate. Naturally these new measures are only going to work if people pay heed to the regulations and of course this element must be followed up by strict policing and enforcement. The Chamber would like to thank the members and executive of Dungarvan UDC, the Garda Superintendent and his staff for all of the co-operation and assistance provided by them throughout this difficult and sometimes controversial period. I should also like to take this opportunity to thank Superintendent Eddie Finucane for all of the hard work and dedication he has put in since his move to Dungarvan and on behalf of all of us to wish him well in his new posting. Eddie's stay with us was far and away too short, the business community of the town are sad to see him leave, as one of our member's put it "Dungarvan's loss is Thomastown's gain."

Finally, as I was away for the past 2 weeks, I didn't get the opportunity to formally welcome our friends at WLR FM to the town. I would like to rectify that matter right now by thanking WLR fm for moving to the town, this move must surely represent a vote of confidence in the local economy and can only serve to heighten Dungarvan's stature in media circles. The local office is managed by Paul Byrne who is very ably assisted by Sinead Kiely. The station currently broadcasts one programme live each day from its Dungarvan studio as well as hosting many discussions on issues of local interest. We wish Paul, Sinead and all the lads every success for the future and we look forward to working with them for many years to come.

All-Ireland Ladies Football Final Replay

Waterford Women With A Mission



In a year of significant achievement for the county's hurlers, and yet one which ended without silverware on the sideboard, Waterford County GAA Board chairman, Paddy Joe Ryan, will be hoping for better fortune when the ladies contest Sunday's replay of the All-Ireland senior football final in Croke Park.

While there has always been a close relationship between the two county boards, Paddy Joe Ryan has a very special and personal interest in Sunday's ultimate decider. His 22 year old daughter Claire fills the right full forward berth in the team while identical twins Martina and Geraldine O'Ryan who play at midfield and left corner forward respectively are his nieces.

Paddy Joe said this year had been a memorable one for Waterford hurling. The hype, countywide, was a 'new experience' for most of them, and while the one point All-Ireland semi final defeat by Kilkenny was agonising, the amount of progress that has been made should not be underestimated.

"Right now however it is the ladies football final on Sunday that preoccupies all our minds and victory against Monaghan would bring a memorable year to a fitting end for the county", he said. "The hurlers have won one and lost one on their Croke Park visits this year and we are all hoping that by Sunday evening it will be two wins out of three".

The GAA chairman said there has always been close links between his board and the ladies board.

"We are greatly appreciative of the tremendous support the GAA board has always received from the ladies for our fundraising efforts and now we are only too happy to return that support on Sunday".

Paddy Joe makes no attempt to conceal the great sense

of pride he has in having his daughter and two nieces on the Waterford team.

"I'm very proud that there is such a personal involvement for me, but really what matters most is that all the players perform to their ability on the day and bring the cup back to the county for the fifth time this decade".

One All-Ireland medal has already found a resting place on the Ryan trophy table this year when younger daughter Marion was one of the stars of Waterford's thrilling victory over Meath in the under 14 All-Ireland final last July.

Confident of Waterford's success in Sunday's replay, Paddy Joe said the ladies will do the business and provide the county with the perfect ending to an already unforgettable year.

The Path To The Final

Monaghan are appearing in their fifth successive final and are seeking a hat trick of title wins. That awesome

record will justifiably make them favourites, but given the controversial nature of their defeat last year, there's a steely-resolve within the Deise camp to reclaim the title they last held in 1995. In fact, Waterford's domination of ladies football this decade has been decisive. They won the championship in 1991, 1992, 1994 and 1995 and suffered defeat in a Croke Park final in any grade for the one and only time 12 months ago.

Their path to the final has been impressive, with Cork offering nothing more than token first round opposition. Kerry's colours were lowered on a 4-11 to 3-7 scoreline in a cracking Munster final and while the semi final display against Mayo wasn't the team's best by any means, the 1-15 to 1-4 result fairly reflected their superiority against the westerners.

Since last year's final, Waterford have recorded first round victories over the All-Ireland champions and are now on course to repeat the championship double they also achieved in 1992 and 1995.

The time and effort Michael puts into his management role is now a way of life for him.

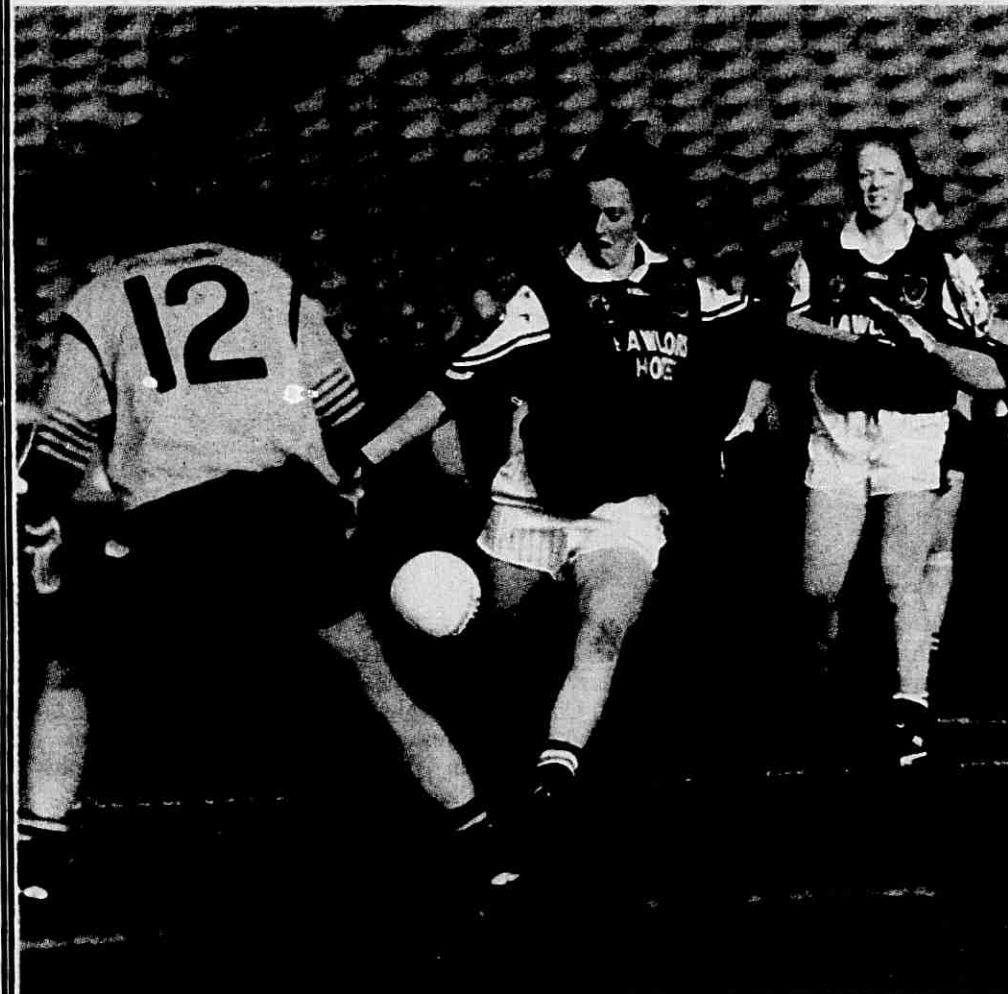
"In Ballymacarbry, home of my own club, ladies football is a religion", he says. "The motivation for me is that I like to be involved with good footballers. Over the years all the Waterford teams have been top class, and the players themselves are superbly talented footballers. There is no question of me losing my appetite for the job", he says. "Win, lose or draw I'll be continuing in the post next year and probably into the next millennium - if I'm wanted".

That's not an issue. Such has been his massive contribution to the game over the years, and most specifically to the county senior team, he has the safest manager's job in Irish sport.

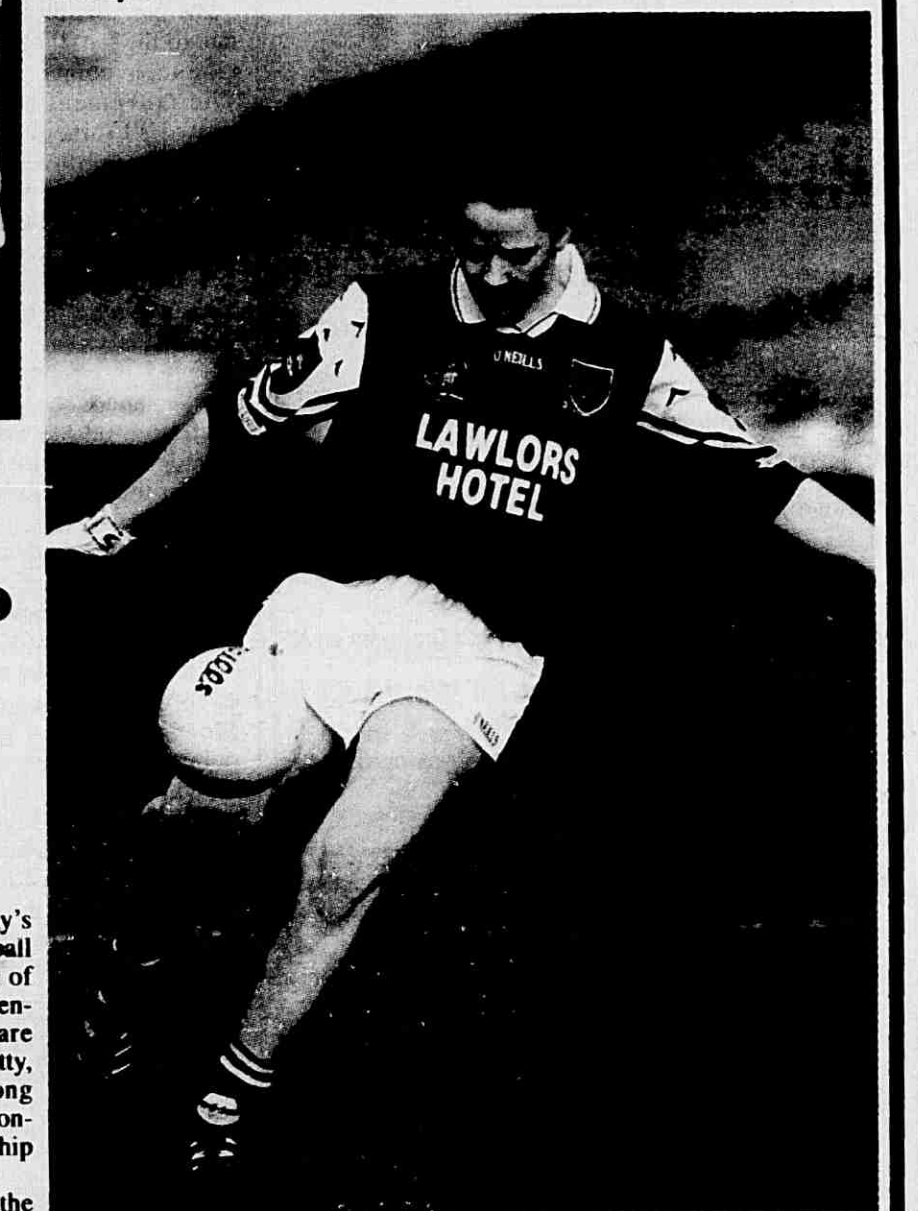
Mary O'Donnell (Ardmore) beats the Monaghan defence

LEARNING FROM MISTAKES

Waterford Need To Apply Greater Pressure

Three weeks have passed by but little has changed. Monaghan and Waterford meet in the All Ireland senior final replay at Croke Park on Sunday and the game is likely to prove just as close as that tremendous contest on Oct. 4 last.

Both of these teams have propelled ladies football to its current high profile. They have raised the skill and fitness levels and made the public aware of the great spectacle that ladies football is. The rivalry is intense and

brings out the best in both sides and whichever team learns the most from the drawn game will win the replay.

That drawn game was a thriller, Monaghan seized the early initiative and backed by a strong breeze raced into an early lead, three goals in the opening twenty minutes plus a couple of missed chances to show for their efforts. Edel Byrne hit the bottom of the post when it seemed easier to score, another effort hit the crossbar on its way over.

The fact that the interval lead was only six points was due to the fact that the Waterford forwards continued to take their points, seven in total, during the first half. The movement and pace of the Monaghan attack caused all sorts of problems. Lightning inter-changing of positions, direct football, delightful to watch, causing panic in the Waterford defence. Players such as Byrne, Kindlan, Dempsey and Larkin are very formidable and take some watching.

A number of switches including the introduction of Triona Whyte helped Waterford to settle down and it was Monaghan's turn to sweat. Four points in the opening three minutes of the second half set down a marker and Rebecca Hallahan's 42nd minute goal put Waterford into a two point lead. With five minutes left they led by 4 points when a total lapse of concentration in the Waterford defence led to a goal against the run of play.

Waterford were lucky to survive sustained pressure in the closing minute, yet they could have snatched it in the end and the crowd and the T.V. audience were more than happy to do it all over again.

What then for the replay? It's unlikely that either set of forwards will enjoy as much freedom in the replay. Monaghan shot 4 goals, Waterford replied with 16 points, clearly there are some questions to be answered on both sides.

The team shows two changes with the inclusion of Annalisa Crotty and Triona Whyte. They replace Paula Walsh and Fiona Crotty. Although fit for the replay it would be foolish to think that Annalisa Crotty is the an-

swer for all of Waterford's problems.

Certainly Waterford need a bit of extra pace in defence. Like most puzzles, it's not finding the problem that's difficult, it's getting the correct solution.

It must also be said that the ball sent in from outfield was top quality and contributed to the headache. Waterford need to apply greater pressure all over the field to make life difficult for the Monaghan team. This time round it's likely to be a much tighter affair. Both teams know each other very well, strengths and weaknesses will have been noted.

Before the game much was made about Monaghan's tiredness and apparent lack of appetite. It certainly wasn't very evident on the day. They looked like a team relishing the task in the opening half.

Waterford would prefer to dwell on the second half performance, however the key to the outcome this time round may well be lessons learned from the first half. It's absolutely fatal to allow Monaghan forwards a couple of yards space. They will destroy you. Also let it be noted that Monaghan are also well capable of kicking points, they scored 15 in last year's final and 13 in atrocious conditions in their semi final victory over Meath.

Waterford are also struggling to get goals, although it has to be said that Rebecca Hallahan's effort three weeks ago was a real gem. However if they keep notching the points the goals will follow.

Again conditions are likely to play a part — with the winter looming, dry conditions are scarce, a wind is probably imminent and this will make life difficult for both teams.

Once again the game is being televised live on Network 2, throw-in at 2.30 p.m. to allow for possible extra-time. Further coverage is being provided on R.T.E. Radio 1 and W.L.R. Proof indeed that the code has caught on. The last game has done much for ladies football. Another good game would do more. It's anybody's guess where the Brendan Martin Cup will end up. However 23 dedicated girls seem very determined that it will cross the Suir on Monday evening. The very best of good luck to them.

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

With a lot of people in the mood for talking, the October meeting, held last week in Lawlors Hotel, was a long drawn-out affair and took well in excess of three hours. Pádraigh S. Ó Riain, Chairman presided.

Initially the meeting spent a full hour debating the matter of Lismore's removal from the intermediate football Western championship after Jimmy O'Gorman had taken issue with the minutes of the GAC meeting, at which the club's appeal against the Western Board's decision, had failed. Having made a very strong case, he described the whole matter as being disgraceful and said the treatment meted out to Lismore was unbelievable. A number of speakers supported the proposition that the minutes of the GAC meeting should not be adopted.

The County Chairman stated that the GAC were left with no option as they found that the Western Board had not misapplied any rule. Jimmy O'Gorman said that rules were one thing, but common sense was another thing that should be taken into account.

On a vote the proposal was defeated by 10 to 9. The chairman said that the votes of the GAC members were not counted.

BACK DOOR SYSTEM SUPPORTED

Correspondence from Croke Park relative to the special Congress in Ross-lare on October 31st, sparked off a discussion on Waterford's attitude to the continuance of the system allowing the Munster and Leinster runners-up, back into the championship at the quarter-final stage.

The county chairman P. S. Ó Riain and Western Board Chairman, Paddy Walsh, both of whom had strongly opposed the introduction of the scheme two years ago, proposed and seconded a motion that we approve of the continuation of the arrangement.

Tommy Hennessy proposed and Eamon Murphy seconded a proposition that we oppose the the motion to retain the system. James Tobin proposed that we submit an amendment to have the arrangement extended for a further two years and this was also supported.

On a show of hands, James Tobin's proposition was carried by a big majority,

but it was agreed that in the event of the amendment being defeated, Waterford will support the motion for a change of General Rule to have the system made permanent.

OMAGH APPEAL

Correspondence from Croke Park referred to the Omagh Disaster Fund and all clubs were asked to contribute as generously as possible, with all donations being channelled through the county secretary and to reach Croke Park by December 8th. A number of clubs said that had already subscribed. The chairman said it would be better to have all club contributions come through the county board.

COUNTY HURLING FINAL

The chairman in complimenting Mount Sion on winning the SH title for their 30th time, thanked Ballyduff for their contribution to the occasion. Everyone, said the chairman, were to be complimented on the manner in which the fixture was organised and run. Having thanked the Fraher Field Committee, Tom Cunningham, who was chief steward on the occasion, paid tribute to the many clubs and individuals whose total co-operation made it possible for the final to be run without a hitch.

The chairman told the meeting that because of the enormous crowd who came to the fixture, it became necessary to admit cars to the Show Ground side of the field. This cannot continue and because of P/L restrictions cars cannot again be accommodated in the field.

DEC GOODE CUP

Referring to the senior hurling league final, the chairman on behalf of the board, congratulated and thanked the Goode family for having donated a Cup to commemorate the late Dec who had given a lifetime of distinguished service to the Association in Waterford. Ballygunner will be the first club to have their name inscribed on the beautiful trophy.

CORRESPONDENCE

Having reported on the installation of of the new Patron and Life-President, the chairman read letters of thanks from His Lordship, Dr. William Lee (Patron) and Pádraigh Uasal Ó Fainín (Life-President). Both Dr. Lee and Pádraigh

told of the honour and privilege it was to have been chosen for the positions.

A NEW BOOK?

Correspondence from Tom Keith referred to the 1948 period, the excellent manner in which the players of that era were remembered and of the need for the publication of a book to mark the occasion. His letter outlined the costings, the work which needed to be done by way of research, etc. etc. He said he was prepared to undertake this work with some financial help from the board.

Paddy Dunphy, of the County Comdex(?) Committee said that his committee will shortly take a decision on the publication of a book dealing specifically with 1998. This book will be mainly pictorial.

The meeting decided to refer Tom Keith's letter to the Communications group who were due to meet on the following night. They will make a recommendation to the Board.

OTHER BUSINESS

Noel MacDonagh reported on the launch of the Waterford Crystal/Blackwater Ash project in Croke Park and said the matter was handled splendidly, thanks to the co-operation of Michael Ó Mhuirarthaigh, Dermot Powers, Waterford Crystal, A.I.B. and others. A further announcement will be made shortly when the product goes on the market.

John Murphy, Gaultier, complained about the delay in playing the under 21 football county final and was told that the western final had been held up because of a postponement. The divisional final cannot now be played until Stradbally and Ballinacourty are free.

John Lyons referred to the involvement of county players in commercial activities around the time of the All-Ireland semi-final. He inferred that this activity was not conducive to proper preparation for an important game.

County Treasurer, Tony Morrissey when giving a financial update, said that so far £1,500 had been raised from outside sources for the hurling team's holiday fund.

Brother Spring was present to talk about Handball and asked about the erection of a 60 X 40 alley at the county ground and he was advised that the matter would be examined.

The success story of the Golf Classic in aid of the

hurling training fund was told to the board by Colm Bannon on behalf of the organising committee. He said there had been a tremendous response, but a number of clubs had failed to respond. There was still time for these to contribute. A cheque for £13,000 was handed over to the board. The chairman said the county board were indebted to the hard working committee who, once again, made a splendid success of this annual venture. He said this was the most successful golf classic to date. He thanked Waterford Crystal, who had been the sponsors once again and he thanked the firms, clubs and individuals who had sponsored teams.

John O'Leary, Youth Officer informed clubs that the Cairde programme for club officers will take place at Lawlor's Hotel on Thursday, November 14th and 24th.

Tommy Hennessy, Munster Council, told the meeting that the senior football draws had been deferred until further consideration could be given to the proposal to have a "Round-Robin" at senior and under-21 level. He gave details of the club championship arrangements and told about the new Club Property Insurance scheme. Some delegates complained about the introduction of this scheme which is intended to replace the private insurance cover on club property.

He also informed clubs who intend applying for development grants from the council that November 9th was the deadline for submission of applications.

Charlie Laphorne, Ballygunner asked about the grants paid to clubs participating in the county finals, etc. He said the rate of payment had not changed in a long number of years. In response, the chairman said that when the County Board goes back into the 'black', these and other payments to clubs, will be increased.

CONVENTION DATE

It was confirmed that the County Convention will take place at Lawlors Hotel, Dungarvan on Saturday December 19th at 7 p.m. It was agreed that the county board accounts will close on Saturday, October 31st for audit.

NEXT MEETING

Because of the fact that no meeting of the county board will take place in December, it was agreed to defer the November meeting until the last Monday.


