Know Your Rights

At the moment I am coming to the end of my maternity leave and I have just heard that I may be entitled to some additional leave under an EU Directive about Parental Leave. May I take this leave and how would I apply for it?

Answer

Parental Leave is a term used to describe leave from work taken by parents to take care of their young children. Under EU Directive on Parental Leave (94/34/EC) Ireland will introduce its own Parental Leave Scheme from 3rd December, 1998.

The leave will apply to parents of children born on or after 3 June, 1996 or new born children adopted on or after that date. Each parent will be entitled to a total of 14 weeks unpaid leave for each child but it must be taken before the child is 5 years old, subject to modification in the case of an adopted child. Public holidays which fall during the period of parental leave are added on to the end of parental leave.

Each parent has a separate entitlement to parental leave from his/her job and the leave is not transferable, i.e. the mother cannot take the father's leave or vice-versa.

To be eligible you must have one year's continuous service with the employer before you take parental leave.

If you wish to avail of parental leave you must give six weeks advance notice to the employer. The notice must specify the date you intend to commence parental leave, the duration of the leave and the manner in which you propose to take the leave. The 14 weeks may be taken as a continuous block or by agreement between employer and employee in separate blocks.

Parental leave is unpaid but is reckonable for the purposes of employment rights other than superannuation. After parental leave you are entitled to return to the same job and if this is not considered practical by your employer, he/she must provide suitable alternative employment.

Safety Of Rail **Passengers** Must Be No. 1 **Priority**

A confidential report on the country's rail network is currently being considered by the cabinet. The safety of the Waterford/ Dublin Line is also believed to be questioned in the report.

Cllr. Maurice Cummins, Fine Gael, has expressed grave concern at the lack of finance to upgrade the Waterford/Dublin line which could put the lives of passengers at risk. Cllr. Cummins contacted CIE both locally and nationally and they agree that the line needs upgrading. "What concerns me is that finance is in place presently to upgrade from Dublin to Kilkenny but no provision has been made for the section between Kilkenny and Waterford and I am calling for an immediate injection of funding to upgrade this line in the interests of safety."

Cllr. Cummins said he is aware of the excellent safety record of CIE and the fact that they check the line three times weekly and have reduced the speed of the trains on the line, but accessibility to Waterford and South East is hindered as a result.

The majority of the Waterford/Dublin line is made up of old jointed track on sleepers which is outdated and is not as safe as continuous welded track which is in operation on the Cork/Dublin and other lines.

Couple Celebrate Homecoming Of Their **Brave 2-Year-Old Toddler**

Swindon based couple Lindsay and Eugene Kiely, both originally from Co. Waterford, are finally enjoying some time at home together with their two year old toddler Tyrone and 8 month old baby girl Clodagh.

Little Tyrone was the first child under five in Britain to undergo a lifesaving new operation to reduce the growth of a pineal blastoma - a malignant brain tumour.

"Clodagh's ecstatic to be with him. Until now she's only been able to see him through glass at the hospital".

A former employee of the L&N, Dungarvan, Eugene (25) now works as a sales executive with GWC marketing. He and his wife Lindsay (20), who is a former student of Ard Scoil na nDeise, moved to England 3 years ago where they later married. Lindsay's parents Dot and Gordon Johnson live at Ballinaclash, Youghal.

Speaking to Swindon newspaper, the 'Evening Advertiser', Lindsay said; "All I want to do is return to a normal life and enjoy



Add A Taste Of Spice To Salad

A BIENNIAL plant that grows about 12 inches high with a spread of about 15 inches, Celeriac is used in salads and can also be cooked.

The leaves are used for seasoning and garnishing and the bulb at the base of the stems can be grated for use in salads or can be cooked in stews or casseroles as an alternative to the more conventional celery.

It is a cool temperature crop withstanding minus 10 degrees if the crowns are protected with straw. Plants tolerate light

shade if the soil is moist. Celeriac needs low nitrogen levels and a six month growing season for the bulb to develop.

Germination may be erratic so seeds should be sown indoors in the spring. They should be planted at least a foot apart with their crowns at soil level and not buried. Mulch after planting and water well, particularly in dry conditions.

Plants may be fed during the growing season and towards the end of the summer the coarse outer leaves should be removed so the crowns are exposed. This encourages the bulbs to

To protect from frost, spread a layer of straw, about 6 inches thick, around the crowns. Celeriac is grown for winter harvesting and may be gathered anytime from autumn until the following spring.

The bulbs are ready to be used when they are about four inches in diameter. The flavour is best and the bulbs will keep longer if the roots are left in the ground over winter.

ASPARAGUS

Asparagus is perennial and may be productive for up to 20 years. Its light, fern-like foliage grows over 3ft tall with a spread of about 18 inches.

It is cultivated for the delicious young shoots or spears that push through the ground in spring.

The plant is a cool-season crop growing best at 16 to 24 degrees centigrade in regions with cool winters that provide

the necessary dormant period. Asparagus should be planted on an open site avoiding exposed situations and frost pockets. The plant tolerates a wide range of moderately fertile soils although acid soils should be limed. Good drainage is essential.

Do not make a new asparagus bed where asparagus has been grown before since soil-borne diseases may persist. Remove all perennial weeds from the site and dig in manure or

Asparagus is traditionally grown by planting one-year-old purchased plants or crowns in the spring. The crowns should never be allowed to dry out before planting. They should be grown about 15 inches apart in single or double rows

The crowns should be planted about four inches deep. The roots should be spread out evenly then covered in soil up to the crown. Asparagus requires little attention other than keeping the beds weed-free. When the foliage turns yellow in tumn, cut the stems back to about one inch It should be allowed to build into a strong plant before harvesting in the spring. Good modern cultivars may be cut lightly in the second season.

The following year, limit cutting to a six-week period. Subsequently, cutting may continue over eight weeks if the plants are growing well. Harvest the spears when they are about six inches high and fairly thick. Cut at an angle taking care not to damage other nearby spears. Remaining spears will continue to grow.

Asparagus freezes well and can be used in a host of recipes.



VITAMIN C (Ascorbic Acid)

Vitamin C is a ubiquitous compound, present in almost all plants and animals. Humans cannot produce their own bodi supply of Vitamin C, and consequently require a regular dietary intake.

The classic Vitamin C deficiency disease is scurvy. A prolonged deficiency of Vitamin C may not lead to clinical symptoms, but may predispose towards heart disease and lowered immunity.

Studies have shown that Vitamin C levels become depleted during the course of an infection. There is also evidence that large doses, at least 1000 mg/day, can help symptoms of the common cold.

Cooking — 35-40 minutes Serves - 6

Pastry:

225g/8oz self-raising flour

100g/4oz butter, chilled and cubed

2 tbsp caster sugar 11/2 tbsp milk

4 small oranges

3 fresh figs

2 egg yolks, size 3

1 tbsp plain flour 50g/2oz ground almonds

50g/2oz caster sugar 50g/2oz butter, melted

Method

 To make pastry, sift flour into a large bowl with a pinch of salt. Add butter and rub into the flour with your fingertips until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.

• Stir in sugar and milk. Bring mixture together to form a dough. Place dough on a floured surface and knead gently until smooth. Cover and chill for twenty min-

• Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4. Place a baking sheet in the oven to preheat. Meanwhile remove the skin and pith from oranges. Trim off fig tops then cut the oranges and figs into quarters. In a clean bowl add the egg yolks, flour, ground almonds, sugar, butter and cream. Beat together until smooth.

 Lightly grease a 23cm/9 ins. pie plate. On a floured surface roll out pastry to a 25cm/10 ins. circle. Gently lift the pastry over the pie plate, pushing pastry into the dip of the plate and leaving the surplus to hang over the rim.

 Add fruit to the pie plate and pour over the almond mixture. Roughly fold in pastry edges over the fruit. Brush the pastry rim with milk.

 Place the pie on the baking sheet in the oven and bake for 35-40 minutes until the pastry is golden and the filling set. Dredge with caster sugar and serve warm with cream.

Q: My son is 13 months old. Apart from some asthma for which he is being treated, he is otherwise well but what worries us is that he seems to drink so little even though I try and force it. The district nurse tells me he is all right but when he was smaller he once became dehydrated - that's why I'm concerned.

A: Your concern is understandable but you need not worry. When a child is healthy, he will take all the drink that he needs. It's likely that your child was very much younger and unwell when he became mildly dehydrated. Doctors will always look for dehydration in a very young baby who is unwell because their bodies water-contentcontrolling mechanisms are still developing and are more easily disturbed as a result. But your child is thriving. While he continues to do so and with the advice that is regularly given to you by the nurse, I should just relax about his fluid intake as she has suggested. Should you continue to worry do consult your doctor again.





CHANGEOVER TO EURO

For the past number of weeks I have written on the computer Year 2000 problem and how it will affect your business. This week I would like to concentrate on another major issue which will have serious ramifications for all businesses, particularly those who are in the export market namely the forthcoming introduction of the Euro Single Currency.

Timetable

On May 2, 1998 the European Council formally announced the EU member states that have qualified to join EMU. As had been expected, Ireland has qualified for entry and will be one of the eleven countries participating in EMU from the

The timetable for EMU and the changeover to the Euro is as follows -On January 1, 1999 EMU will begin. The Euro will come into being as the single currency of the participating member states and the conversion rates between the Euro and the currencies of those member states will be irrevocably fixed. The Euro will be usable for non-cash transactions but Euro notes and coins will not become available until January 1, 2002 so Irish notes and coins will continue in use. This period from January 1, 1999 to December 31, 2001 is called the transitional period

On January 1, 2002 Euro notes and coins will be introduced into circulation and Irish notes and coins will begin to be withdrawn. By July 1, 2002 at the latest, Irish notes and coins will been have completely withdrawn from circulation and the changeover to the Euro will be complete. This period, when both Euro notes and coins and Irish pound notes and coins are in circulation together, is called the dual circulation period. The length of this period will be determined at national level and is likely to be a good deal less than six months

The Transitional Period - January 1, 1999 To December 31, 2001

Bear in mind the following key points about the transitional period Irish pound notes and coins will be the only form of cash in circulation.

Irish pound dominated cheques and electronic means of payment will continue to

If your retail business is largely cash based, the impact of the single currency during the transitional period is likely to be limited. However you should consider the following issues -

Some customers may wish to use Euro denominated cheques and credit cards during the transitional period. You should therefore review the procedures and

services available and wholesalers may decide to change over to the Euro shortly after January 1, 1999 so you should find out what their changeover plans are now. As an exercise in customer service from January 1, 1999 you should gradually familiarise your customers with the Euro by beginning to display the prices of at least some items in both Euro and Irish pounds at some point in the pricing chain (e.g. shelf edge labels, prices on products and/or till receipts). This information should be provided especially in the period close to January 1, 2000 when Euro notes and coins will be introduced The Dual Circulation Period - January

1, 2002 To July 1, 2002 At The Latest On January 1, 2001 Euro notes and coins will be introduced into circulation. Irish pound notes and coins will remain in circulation for a maximum period of six months (and probably a good deal less) before the national currency is finally withdrawn

Bear in mind the following key points about the dual circulation period -Irish pound notes and coins will be in circulation alongside Euro notes and coins but in diminishing numbers as their withdrawal proceeds.

Bank accounts denominated in Irish pounds and other participating currencies will be automatically converted to the Euro from January 1, 2002.

Banks and building societies will ensure that ATM machines will be converted to Euro in as short a time as possible following the introduction of Euro notes and

A customer will be able to tender either Irish pounds or Euro when making a purchase during the dual circulation period. In order to accelerate the withdrawal of the Irish currency, retailers will probably give change back only in Euro. The handling of both Irish pounds and Euro will have a significant impact on the cash management of your business. For example you will be able to accommodate both sets of notes and coins in your existing till or will you need to invest in a second cash drawer or find some other way of catering for the two currencies? To help your customers become familiar with prices in Euro as well as to familiarise your own employees, you will need to have dual pricing (i.e. displaying prices in both Irish pounds and Euro) in place. For example on shelf edge labels, prices on products and till receipts.

Staff will need training to become familiar with the new notes and coins as well as the new Euro pricing system. Remember your staff will need to be able to respond to customer queries.



Winter Feeding

The level of Winter feeding required will depend on issues such as animal type, quantity and quality of forage available and proposed sale date of the animal. **SUCKLER COWS**

Feeding regime will depend on forage quality and cow condition. Cows in good body condition can be restricted on silage only to 40 kg/day (80% of their ad-lib intake). One roundbale of silage (700 kg) when restricted should last 17 Suckler cows a day. Cows in poor body condition will require silage ad-lib or I roundbale per 14 cows per day. Dry suckler cows being fed straw require between 2 - 3 kg of 18% crude protein concentrate per day.

WEANLINGS Target gain: 0.5 - 0.6 kg per day or 70 -80 kg over the Winter. Heavy Weanlings (+ 300 kgs), Good Quality Silage + I kg Concentrates. Light Weanlings (250 kgs) Good quality silage + 1.5 - 2 kgs Concentrates. Animals intended for sale next Spring should receive 2 kg of con-

centrates per day. STORES

Target gain 0.5 kg/day. Silage ad-lib only. (If you intend to graze cattle next Spring). Silage + 2 kg of concentrates where cattle are to be sold next Spring. FINISHING

Target gain: Steers 0.9 - 1.1 kg/day heifers 0.8 - 0.9 kgs/day. With good quality silage 0.75 kg concentrates /100 kg of liveweight. Where silage is scarce 1 kg concentrates / 100 kg of liveweight. Split feeding of concentrates is needed once you exceed 3 kg / day. **POINTS ON RATIONS**

* Energy is the main requirement in cattle rations. Aim for a ration with an energy content of mj ME/ as fed or 12.5 mj ME/kg on a DM basis.

* Protein is normally adequate in most finishing cattle diets (I I - 13 %). Protein in rations may have to increase where young bulls are being fed to 16%. Straw diets also require higher levels of protein. Diets containing fodder beet will also require balancing for protein.

* When buying in pelleted compound rations, avoid paying more than £125 -135/tonne. Home mixing; coarse rations and purchasing in bulk will obviously reduce costs.

 Main energy feeds are barley, wheat, oats, maize, beet pulp and citrus pulp. Of these, barley and beet pulp offer the best value this year.

 Most protein sources are good value: Feeds such as Soya, Maize gluten. Maize distillers and rapeseed meal are worth considering. Soya in terms of price and quality represents the best

* Add a vitamin/mineral mix at 25 kg per tonne of straight feed.

SOIL CONDITIONS/SEEDING RATE Rainfall for the end of October is above normal with areas in the northern half of the country getting up to 4 times the normal pattern. Soil traffic ability and temporarily halted. The opportunity for

workability is very poor and sowings are reducing seed rates has now passed. Poor soil conditions and high populations of both slugs and leather jackets demand a seeding rate of at least 188 kg/ha (12 st/ac) for both wheat and oats. It is now too late to sow winter barley. When conditions recover continue to sow wheat up to early December and oats to mid November.

BYDV CONTROL

Aphid numbers are high Crops sown Up to early October should be sprayed by now. Follow up with another application mid November to early December. Spray crops sown from mid October at the 2 - 3 leaf stage. Use any of the contact aphicides such as Decis, Cypersect, Surni Alpha, Cyperkill, Toppel etc.

The risk of infection of crops to be sown from now onwards will depend on temperature and aphid counts through the winter

ICMSA WELCOMES PROPOSED CHANGES IN PRSI PENSION RULES

ICMSA has welcomed the proposed changes in PRSI Pension rules, which will benefit farmers and other self, employed. Mr. Donal Hynes, Chairman of ICMSA Taxation Committee said that ICMSA had lobbied for these changes over the past ten years.

Mr. Hynes said that the current rules exclude anyone who has less than 10 years PRSI contributions. In effect any farmer who was over 56 on 5 April 1998 was deprived of PRSI even though he may have made a

PRSI contribution for up to 9 years.

ICMSA estimate that in 1998 up to 25,000 farmers were potentially excluded from the PRSI pension because of this rule. ICMSA had proposed the Pro-Rata Pension system as the way of removing this blatant discrimination against farmers and other self employed. The current higher rate of Pro-Rata Pension is £62.30 plus the normal £56.90 payout for an adult dependent, giving £119.20, compared to a full PRSI pension for a married couple of £139.90.

However, Mr. Hynes expressed dissatisfaction that persons with less than five years PRSI contributions are still excluded from a PRSI pension under the Minister's proposals. ICMSA has proposed the lower rate Pro-Rata Pension for these individuals.

Mr. O'Rourke said "The Department of Agriculture and ICMSA had agreed last August on the payment of compensation due to farmers prior to September of last year. Despite the fact that all of these cases have now been fully documented and quantified, the Department will not make these payments without first cutting the level of disease compensation due to farmers generally. This is totally unacceptable to ICMSA. Furthermore the Minister has apparently decided, without full consultation with farmers, to force farmers to pay for cattle tags. This is a new cost on farmers who are already finding it impossible to support their families financially." Mr. O'Rourke concluded that the Minister must directly address these issues and he is calling for a full meeting of the Animal Disease Forum as soon as possible.

LISMORE **MILLENIUM JOURNAL**

A millenium miscellany has been published recently in Lismore, The Lismoreian. It is very wide-ranging, a 'catchup' journal as the Foreword says. There are over 200 A4 pages of articles, interviews, profiles, proposals for restoring antiquities, poems, a brilliant hurling survey, short stories, and photos - some rare.

Local publications can sometimes be slipshod; this journal is not. It ranges easily from the scholarly to the humerous not faltering in orthography or syntax. In an age of declining literacy it is a delight to read. The articles 'as Gaeilge' often a test of a journal's literacy credibility - are exemplary. One criticism might be the foreshortening of the Ptolemy map on p. 15, but this is to quibble. Apart from the contents, the miscellany is handsomely turned out with a black and amber soft-board cover, perfect binding, and arresting graphics.

One critic said the book was an artifact worthy of the great city of St. Carthage. The most impressive critique was by a local lady. She said she was 'beaten to the grab' every night for a month to get her read of the book by her husband - and he a Tallow man! Though mainly of Lismore interest, it can, because of the historical importance of Lismore, appeal more widely e.g. many of the 'character sketches' have universal appeal. The uniform high standard of items is remarkable; some are gems e.g. a beautiful appraisal of Joe Whelan, athletics guru, a perfectly modulated mystic tale of priest hunting in penal times, great chit-chat from a farmermusician, a definitive article on the brosna tradition in Lismore, a chilling story in the thirties by George O' Brien Snr. and gold nuggets too, e.g. a classic bit of serendipity regarding C.S. Parnell, and Mall Seat and Tostal photos and so on and on.

The miscellany would make a fine December 25th gift and at £7.99 is a snip considering there are no advertisers or sponsors. A feature of the book apparently is its protracted shelf-life revolving round the millennium idea. It is available now at shops locally, including Meacher's of Ballysaggart and at the Library and Heritage Centre. The editor (E. Dennis) and his writers are to be congratulated on doing a fine job, may they all live to produce another such effort next millennium! Finally, a launching is expected to which all are welcome (craic, ceoil, ol!) at a date to be announced locally later. Go n-eiri adh leis.

Minister Under Attack As Farming Crisis Continues

The beleaguered Minister for Finance, Charlie Mc-Creevy came under a barrage of criticism at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council after he accused farmers last weekend of exaggerating their problems in advance of next month's budget.

The Fianna Fáil Deputy's comments were labelled "outrageous" and it was alleged that he was clueless as to the problems facing Irish farming by some Council members who expressed their anger and dismay at the deepening crisis in the agricultural sector.

It was unanimously decided to write to the Taoiseach conveying the Council's concern at Minister Mc-Creevy's remarks and to highlight the Council's concern at the overall situation within the farming commu-

This crisis has gradually worsened with the economic recession that has hit Middle East markets and has been further compounded by the BSE crisis and the collapse of the Russian economy. The entire debate was originally raised by Council Chairperson, Nora Flynn who accused the Government of turning its back on rural Ireland. The dwindling number of farmers, she stressed, will ultimately have an adverse effect on rural towns and villages and small shops will be forced out by the larger supermarkets as rural populations decline.

"JUST NOT CAPABLE"

Having attended Dungarvan Mart prior to Monday's meeting, Cllr. Willie Mc-Donnell spoke of rapidly falling prices whereby cattle is now £120 cheaper and lambs £20 a head cheaper than this time last year. In addition he revealed that pig farmers were finding it difficult to sell their animals in some places and grain growers are making do with a price of £80 per tonne - "barely enough to buy a decent pair of shoes."

Cllr. McDonnell quoted figures of up to 100 young farmers a week leaving the land. The average income in 1997 for 40% of farmers was £200 per week while another 40% averaged less than £100. Only recently 40,000 farmers from around the country, including himself, had demonstrated their concern at the decline in farming incomes at a massive protest march in Dublin.

"The situation has never been so bad," he slammed. "We have a man in charge who's just not capable. He hasn't a clue about what's going on in Irish farming."

Cllr. Oliver Coffey said Minister McCreevy's comments were outrageous and downgrading to farmers, particularly as the Minister represents a rural constituency in Kildare.

Having also attended that morning's Mart which he described as depressing, Cllr. Coffey said prices were so bad that livestock had actually cost more when they were initially bought.

DEATH WISH ON FARMERS

McCreevy's infamous comments were also lambasted by Cllr. Garry O'Halloran who said it seemed that the Minister has "some kind of death wish" on farmers. He said the latest Teagasc figures revealed that of the current 150,000 full-time farmers, in another ten years this figure will be reduced to 75,000.

Fianna Fáil's Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan said he was also deeply disturbed by the Minister's remarks and was of the opinion that the current crisis in farming is the greatest since the economic war with Britain.

Cllr. Fiachra Ó Ceilleachair pointed out that despite the Celtic Tiger, there is now more poverty in Ireland than ten years ago. He claimed that this isn't the first time that Minister Mc-Creevy attacked farmers as he previously brought in the 'dirty dozen' measures which introduced a tax on unemployment benefit and sick pay etc.

Laying the blame for the current farming crisis firmly with the Fianna Fáil party, Labour's Cllr. Billy Kyne warned that if the present Government cannot control the building boom or the farming crisis, then it should not be in power.

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson however said it was over simplification to blame the farming situation on the Minister. The crisis, he felt, has been happening with the past ten years. Even if farm families are allowed to qualify for Family Income Supplement, this in itself, he stressed, would not be a long term solution. Farming organisations need to get together with the Government to plan what needs to be done in the fu-

TOO ALARMIST

Cllr. Paddy Kenneally maintained that people are being too alarmist about the farming situation. The whole market for livestock and grain, he said, is governed by supply and demand and at this point in time there is an over supply on the part of farmers and a drop in demand for meat.

"Things can only improve," he added. "In the present economic climate, people will leave the land,' he asserted adding that it is now an economic reality that 500 acres are needed to maintain a farm.

Sharing his views, Cllr. Michael Queally put the

farming crisis down to overproduction which, he claimed, started in 1992 with the introduction of the

McSharry proposals when farmers deliberately increased herd size to qualify for subsidies.

Prime Lands Targeted As Site Of 200 Acre Landfill

Agency would then take the project into the new millennium. The first construction phase of the landfill will require capital investment of up to £5 million.

County Secretary, Peter Carey said the 50 - 60 landowners involved in the three aforementioned sites will all be approached by Council officials by the end of this week. Ownership details of all the landholdings within the three candidate areas will be acquired by the consultants and aerial photos and maps will be prepared.

Arrangements will then be put in place by the Council for a walkover survey of the sites by the project team which will include a detailed visual assessment.

It may arise that none of the three sites are suitable for use as a landfill based on further site testings such as boreholes etc. in which case the next ranked candidate areas will be evaluated. The landfill itself will replace the outdated dumps at Dungarvan, Tramore and Kilbarry which have a remaining capacity of just three years

In stark contrast to these dumps, the County landfill will be developed to the same high standards of other modernly engineered facilities in South Dublin and Athlone which were visited earlier this year by a group of Council

The concept of a clean 'dump' which doesn't have an adverse impact on the natural environment will, however, prove a hard sell to the landowners and residents living close to the eventual landfill site. The issue will, no doubt, have a major bearing on next year's local elections particularly for those in the Kilmac' electoral area.



New Book On Fr. Patrick Fogarty (1791-1866)

On Wednesday, 18 November, Dungarvan Museum Society will host a talk and book launch by the Rev. Robert Arthure P.P. Cappoquin. Father Arthure has just written a biographical account of noted 19th c. priest Father Patrick Fogarty and his times.



As far as I am aware, John Mitchells were the last "second string' football team to win the county championship about 25 years or so ago, and it will be very interesting now to see if their forebears, Kilrossanty can manage to repeat the achievement. This has been an odd year for Kilrossanty with success in both their junior grades and their senior side losing by a

solitary point to St. Saviours.

It is now 61 years since Kilrossanty won the junior football championship, due mainly to the fact that they have been concentrating on the senior grade. Amazingly, four of the team who won the title back in 1937, are still around and are all hale and hearty.

Pat Veale (who celebrated his 90th birthday in January

of this year) also played on their 1926 team. The others are his brother Michael Veale (Dykie) Monnie Guiry and John Kett. All four won senior championship with Kilrossanty in later years.

This season, Kilrossanty have an exceptionally good second team and succeeded in overcoming some strong opposition to win the Western title. In very poor con-

ditions, they overpowered Emmetts in the final.

They are unlikely to change from the team. which won them the western championship.

Ferrybank, who won their divisional title when defeating Rathgormack at Walsh Park on Saturday, are reported as being a strong and lively team who, like Kilrossanty up here, had to overcome strong opposition to take the divisional title.

Ferrybank are around since the beginning of the century and until the seventies their success related to hurling, they having supplied many fine players to the county team in the senior grade.

In 1979 they lost to Ballinacourty in the senior county final and again in 1983 they were beaten by a single score by Kilrossanty in the senior football county final.

Given a fine day, this could be a very enjoyable final. It is a very open game and either side can win. I think that Ferrybank will need to have a lot of luck on their side if they are to beat Kilrossanty, if the western champions play as well as they have been doing in their last four or five matches up here.
