

Know Your Rights

I am currently claiming Unemployment Benefit. Will I get the "Christmas Bonus"?.

ANSWER

The social welfare 'Christmas Bonus', an extra payment of approximately 70% will be paid in the week 25" November to 1st December, 1998.

* People getting a long term social welfare payment are eligible for the bonus:

Pensioners - old age, retirement and invalidity pensioners, Widows and Widowers, Lone Parents.

Long-term unemployed, i.e. people on the long-term rate of Unemployment Assistance and those on Pre-Retirement Allowance, People receiving the Carer's Allowance, People on Disability Allowance.

 Includes participants on programmes such as Community Employment, Back to Work Allowance and Jobstart who are eligible to retain the secondary benefits they had before coming on the programme.

Those who are long-term unemployed will get the extra payment with their regular payment at their local employment exchange. Those with pension books will be paid the bonus by means of a special pension order payable in the first week of December.

People on short-term social welfare payments do not qualify i.e. Unemployment Benefit, Disability Benefit, Maternity Benefit or short-term rate of Unemployment Assistance in the above week do not qualify.

Message To Landowners/ **Occupiers**

Owners or occupiers of land are obliged under the Roads Act, 1993, to take all necessary care to ensure that trees, shrubs, hedges or any other vegetation on their land is not, or could not be a danger to those using a public road or to somebody carrying out maintenance or improvement work on the road.

HEDGE MAINTENANCE

Where labour is available the most friendly method of hedge maintenance is by hand tools

A reciprocating cutting bar is very suitable for hedges which are in good condition.

A flail cutter is suitable for hedge growth of not more than 2 - 3 years and has the added advantage of mulching the cut materials. A flail cutter should never be used on heavy, woody growth.

A circular saw should be used on heavy growth and is ideal for shaping up overgrown hedges.

THE BEST TIME TO CUT

Trim during winter to fill slack periods of farm work. Avoid disturbing nesting birds by not trimming during Spring or early Summer, Autumn trimming can destroy birds winter food supplies.

Trimming can take place from late August to February with minimum wildlife disturbance.

Where a landowner/occupier fails to meet his/her obligation under the Roads Act 1993, a Notice will be served by Waterford County Council requiring him/her to take whatever remedial action is considered necessary to ensure public safety. Remedial action may range from felling to trimming lopping of branches or preservation. It is an offence not to comply with the terms of such a Notice. If you have not already done so, it is in your own interest to attend to hedge trimming on public roads immediately.



Artichokes and **Sweet** Potatoes

JERUSALEM artichokes are perennial plants that grow best in a temperate climate and are very hardy.


The distinctively flavoured tubers are two to four inches long and about two inches in diameter. Most cultivars are very knobbly, but the Fuseau variety produces a smooth tuber.

The plants themselves may grow up to 10 feet tall. The tubers are usually cooked but they may be eaten raw and can be grated to add variety of flavour to a salad.

Jerusalem artichokes tolerate a wide range of soils and require minimum nitrogen levels. They may be planted to provide a windbreak screen in your garden.

Tubers should be planted as soon as the ground is workable in the spring. Those about the size of a hen's egg may be planted whole. Larger ones can be cut into several pieces. but make sure each one has several buds. Make a drill planting about five inches deep and 12 inches apart. Cover with

When the plants are about one foot tall, earth up the stems to about half their height for stability. In late summer cut the stems back to five foot removing any flowerheads. In very

exposed sites, stake and support the stems. The plants should be watered in very dry conditions. When the leaves turn yellow cut the stems back to ground level.

The tubers should be harvested between 16 and 20 weeks after planting. They should be lifted only when required as they keep best in the ground. Take care not to damage the roots when lifting. Save a few tubers to replant or leave a few n the soil for the following year.

SWEET potatoes are tender perennials grown as annuals. They have trailing stems which grow up to 10 feet or more if unpruned. Cultivars vary considerably in leaf shape and tuber size. The tubers are eaten cooked and the leaves may be used in the same way as spinach.

Sweet potatoes are tropical and sub-tropical plants requirng a temperature of around 25 degrees (77F). In warm climates they need a sunny aspect; in temperate climates they should be grown under cover. High-fertile, well-drained, sandy loams with a pH of 5.5 to 6.5 and medium to high nitrogen

In the tropics and sub-tropics sweet potatoes would be planted at the start of the rainy season. In warm and temperate climates they would be planted in the spring. In the United Kingdom it is best to grow the plant under cover and sow from seed. They should be sown indoors in trays or eight-inch pots at a temperature of at least 24 degrees. When seedlings are four to six inches high they should be transplanted into growing bags or prepared beds. Maintain a minimum temperature of 25 degrees and a humidity of over 70 per cent by damping down regularly. Water and weed regularly and mulch to conserve moisture. Apply a general purpose fertilizer at two-to three-week intervals. Look out for whiteflies, thrips and glasshouse red spider mites which could be troublesome.

The crop should be ready for harvesting about 20 weeks after planting from seed (about 16 weeks if planted from tubers). The tubers should be lifted using a fork, but be careful not to damage them. In order to store sweet potatoes they must first be cured for seven days at temperatures of 30 degrees and humidity of \$2 per cent. They may then be stored in shallow trays for several months.





MAJOR ADVANTAGE FOR SCHOOL

When Dungarvan CBS gained access to the new service, their entire network of over 24 computers were subsequently connected to the system, providing internet access to all computers at speeds faster than those provided by an ISDN line. This enables each pupil in a class to have access to the internet simultaneously and allows them to access different sites independently of each other.

The teaching of information technology is not a recent development in the local CBS. It began back in 1985 long before the teaching of IT in schools was deemed to be essential. Twenty Commodore 64 computers at a cost of over £400 each were purchased and a compulsory double class period of "computers" was, and still is, taught to all Junior Cert. classes. In 1990, the school purchased 15 new 486 P.C.'s and last March, one of the school classrooms in the new building was converted into a room specifically designed for the teaching of I.T. Another major development this year for Dungarvan CBS was when their existing P.C.'s were upgraded to Pentiums and an additional seven new computers were purchased.

Information technology forms a major part of the CBS transition year program with two double periods if IT per week and extensive use of computers in many other areas.

Classes about the internet and its features can now be taught live on line and classes are able to use the net to research topics and download information. Up to date information on career choices and third level colleges, etc. can be accessed by students. Leaving

"Work is progressing on scaling back some of the banking most proximate to the Colligan river. I'm pleased that this work is to

IFA Calls On Minister Walsh To Act On EU **Agreement On Installation Scheme**

Waterford IFA Rural De- £4.60/ewe and the introducvelopment Chairman, tion of extensification pre-Mossie O'Connor has called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to implement immediately the major drive at European Young Farmer installation Scheme now that the EU Commission has approved the Irish submission.

Mr. O'Connor welcomed the EU Commis sion's decision to approve the Young Farmer Installation Scheme and called for the immediate implementation of the measure as young farmers have had no scheme available to them since August 1997 when the old scheme was suspended by the Government.

It is estimated that over a thousand farmers are ready to apply for the installation Scheme on farms handed over since the suspension.

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman said that as a priority Mr Walsh must accept all applications that were lodged in Teagasc offices at the time of the suspension but who were denied the aid as their applications had not been submitted to the Department of Agriculture. It is likely some of these farmers may not be eligible within the criteria laid down under the more limited scheme now being introduced. These farmers must be eligible for the £5,600 in the same way as they would have been eligible had their applications been lodged with the Department of Agriculture in 1997

Continuing, Mr. O'Connor said the new scheme now being announced must be seen as an interim measure in advance of the next round of EU Structural Funds when the possibility exists for a more flexible scheme with higher levels of grant aid. "This must be a priority of the Government in the negotiations with Brussels in the context of the next National Development Plan to draw down EU Structural funds 2000 and 2006," said Mr. O'Con-

mium for sheep under Agenda 2000.

He said: "There is now a level to suspend the stabiliser on a temporary basis to relieve the income problems for 1998. Minister Walsh must come out strongly and force this issue to the top of the European agenda and insist on delivery before Christmas.'




New Sign For **Ballyduff** Road

Kilrush Graveyard **Access To Be Improved**

Waterford Fine Gael TD, Austin Deasy, has revealed that an agreement has been reached to provide a pathway to the public road from the Old Graveyard at Kilrush, Dungarvan.

Secretary Says "Organisation Is Very Much On the Move"

wide ranging report to the Annual Western G.A.A. Convention which takes place this Thursday, December 10 at Lawlor's Hotel, Secretary Anthony Walsh tells the delegates that the organisation is "very much on the move and fully alive to its responsibilities.' However, he said that before looking back on 1998, he believed it only right to take an overall look at the organisation as they move ever so near the dawn of a new millennium.

With so many other influences at work, he says, and enticing demands made on our youth, the task of persevering with the promotion and development of the national games was never more daunting.

"No longer can we expect young people," he say, "to play hurling, football, handball, camogie, etc., simply because it is part of our heritage that they do so. We must continue to make them more attractive, appealing and competitive and it is not good enough to restate over and over again that our games are the best."

The roots of the GAA, he says, go deep and the real strength of the Association is founded in the club, the parish and the local scene. Unfortunately, he says, it would be foolish in the extreme to imagine that everything in the garden was rosy. However, he says, some clubs are there in name only and it is not sufficient to say that they in West Waterford can boast a club in every parish (some areas have more than one unit), they must also endeavour to ensure that the clubs strive more diligently towards perfection.

He goes on: "It is hardly in keeping with the spirit of the Association to be content with existence alone, go through the basic essentials associated with affiliation, field out a team when championship time comes around and after the inevitable exit be prepared to await the dawn of another season. Membership should entail much more and a good club must always be ready to pinpoint where necessary defects, suggest and implement remedies and possess the will and the determination to effect the sort and the degree of changes that will in the final analysis be for the improvement of our games and the organisation in general."

CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE

With reference to the above. the report says: "while it might be contended with some justification that indulgent refereeing and lack of clarity in the playing rules themselves are a reason for some acts of indiscipline on the field of play, the major cause however, in most instances, can be found in lack of self control and a failure of the result that the need is now club officials to be in the even greater. Worthwhile inivanguard when it comes to chastising such offenders. There is a need at all levels in fact to show that foul play must be punished without impunity and with consistency. The player who does not hold respect for his fellow players, or the official who attempts to suppress the truth, is doing a grave injustice to himself, his club and the Association."

However, the Secretary says that the number of breaches of good conduct on the playing fields during the year under review were virtually non-existent. However, some incidents did take place that necessitated Board action and while these were few and far between, the fact that they took place at all should be a good reason for greater vigilance and attention in the fu-

"Unfortunately," he says, "the incidence of referee abuse is still on the increase. Insensitive insults directed at referees form no part of the GAA make up and this unsavoury practice must be wiped out and the games rid of such unwelcome develop-

The aforementioned, he says, bring him to the broad question of referees and the availability of adequate numbers of people to act in such a capacity. While the situation has improved considerably over the last year, we are, he says, still dependent on a select band to officiate at the all year round series of matches. The introduction of leagues at practically every level has increased the referee work load to mammoth dimensions, with

Tony Browne Is An All Star and **Hurler Of The Year**

It would have been a shock and a shame if Tony had not been honoured, but just the same the whole listening public in Waterford held their breaths when it came to the naming of the midfield pairing and what a relief when Michael Lyster mentioned the name, Waterford. Judging by the applause, it was one of the most popular selections of the night. There was some disappointment that we received only one All Star, after having ten nominees. The delight of the other Waterford nominees who were present (and which was very obvious) showed how very popular Tony Brown is, not just as a hurler, but as a person.

The selection of the same player, Tony Browne as Hurler of the Year, was another honour which was also very well deserved and the rapturous applause which greeted this announcement clearly expressed the popularity of the decision which was arrived at following a vote of the players of the country, i.e., every player who played in the All-Ireland championship this year, had a vote for the Player of the Year.

It is a great honour for Tony, for his family, his club and county and we join with the thousands of supporters in the county in congratulating and complimenting the Mount Sion player on winning these honours for Waterford.

Tony Browne, having played minor hurling for Waterford, captained the county Under-21 hurling team which won the All-Ireland title in 1992.

Although only 25 years of age, he is the holder of quite an array of championship trophies which include: one All-Ireland Under-21 medal, 2 Munster Under-21 medals, 3 Railway cup medals, 2 senior as well as under 21, minor, under-16 and under-14 county championship medals.

The selection group were undoubtedly very impressed with his majestic displays against Tipperary, Clare in the drawn Munster final and against Galway in the All Ireland quarter final.

The selection process as well as the presentation of awards programme on television, came in for widespread criticism. It was obvious from the positioning of some players on the All Star teams, that they were just being "accommodated." This particularly relates to Anthony Daly of Clare and Brian Whelehan of Offaly on the hurling team. The exclusion of Brian Corcoran is another matter that is being criticised.

The organisers will certainly get a lot less than ten out of ten for the presentation of the programme which was messy, to say the least. Why they wasted so much footage showing the homecoming of Offaly and Galway, which everyone has seen on a number of occasions previously, when they could have shown 'shots' of the stars in action? I thought that the concentration on Offaly and Galway was overdone. The whole presentation needs to be re-examined and restructured, otherwise its rating will decrease even further. Again — well done Tony!
