

Council Defers Decision On 226 Private House Proposals In Abbeyside

Despite assurances by Waterford County Engineer John O'Flynn that all impediments have been removed regarding two proposed housing developments in Abbeyside, members of Dungarvan UDC have deferred making a decision on whether or not to consider granting planning permission to the project until the new year.

this week on whether to rezone lands at Tournore and Skehacrine from agricultural to residential which would require a material contravention of the Dungarvan Development Plan.

A special meeting will now take place in January where members will discuss the proposed developments with Council

Members were to decide officials before formally making a decision on the matter at their subsequent monthly meeting,

The developments at Skehacrine and Tournore are within a short distance of each other on a tract of land between the main Waterford road and the Clonea road. Together, they represent a combined total of 226 private houses.

Outlining details of the proposed developments at last Monday's Urban Council meeting, Mr. O'Flynn explained that following extensive discussions with the developers of the Tournore project, John Daly and Ian O'Leary and their representatives, the number of houses set out in

the proposal has been reduced from an original 192 to 179 on a site size of just under 29 acres. This, he revealed, gives a very low density of housing of just 6.2 houses per acre (the Government recommendation is 12 per acre) with a high percentage of green space at 14.7% (the norm is approx. 10%). KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I recently regained my driver licence, having lost my original licence due to a drink driving charge. The problem now is that I have been unable to get any insurance company to provide me with motor insurance. Is there anything I can do about this?

ANSWER

If you have a valid driving licence and wish to drive your car you are entitled to obtain motor insurance.

If you have been experiencing difficulties obtaining insurance from motor insurance companies you should contact the Insurance Information Service and give them the details of your complaint. The Insurance Information Service is the professional body for insurance companies. They give a free information service on all types of insurance and provide assistance to people having difficulty in relation to insurance issues. They deal with queries from policy holders and mediate between them and the insurance company concerned. The Insurance Information Service will make telephone enquiries and seeks to address the issue in an informal and conciliatory way.

If the conciliation process between the Insurance Information Service and the insurance industry meets with no success your case will then be referred to the Insurance Ombudsman of Ireland. The Ombudsman will continue to conciliate but in a more formal manner. Christmas Tree Lights designed for indoor use should under no circumstances be used out of doors.

- Instructions for use must be in English
- Boxes must bear the CE mark
- Should be marked EN 60598-2-20
- Lights must have the

correct fitted plug attached.
The attention of Traders is particularly drawn to Christmas Tree Lights sets (indoor and outdoor) and to their responsibility to ensure that such sets meet the requirements for the Low Voltage Electrical Equipment Regulations. It should be noted that Irish Standard, I.S. EN 60598-2-20 would be deemed to meet the requirements of the regulations.

The Director wishes to draw the potential danger, posed by lights which fail to meet the requirements of our legislation, to the attention of parents and guardians of young children especially over the festive







New Company's Move To Dungarvan Imminent

Monaghan based company, Century Homes is expected to take up tenancy of the advance factory at Clogherane, Dungarvan in the near future.

Rides Birds of Prey — Beautiful Creatures Stuff Now Under Threat

EAGLES, hawks, vultures, buzzards, falcons, owls and kites are all classed as birds of prey. With the exception of vultures, all are able to catch and kill their prey and all have vision which is far superior to that of man.

Owls are able to fly silently because they have soft fringes to their feathers. They are unable to swivel their eyes but can turn their heads 180 degrees.

Nearly all owls hunt at night. They have exceptional hearing which helps them locate

Vultures rarely kill. They tend to feed off the kill of other animals and are known to gorge themselves when they find a carcass because they are unable to carry meat like other birds of prey. Their young are fed on regurgitated food.

The most common bird of prey in Great Britain is the kestrel which is also the smallest member of the hawk family. The kestrel has long been a common sight alongside motorways, country roads and cornfields, hovering as it seeks out its prey in the grass below.

Although it has always been the commonest hawk in the country, wildlife experts fear that the kestrel, too, is now under threat. The kestrel was made famous by Barry Hines' book - Kestrel for a Knave - and Kes, the film that was made from the book. It told the story of a small boy who raised a baby kestrel and taught it to hunt.



Cook up a Christmas with a difference

Boozy **Christmas** Cake

Ingredients:

- 2 lbs dried fruit 2 oz shredded almonds
- 1 cup plain flour 1 cup butter
- 4 eggs
- 5 oz Single Malt Whisky 4 oz mixed peel
- 3 oz maraschino cherries chopped
- 1 cup soft brown sugar
- 1 tbsp molasses
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp ginger
- 1 tsp vanilla extract Extra Whisky to taste

Method:

Grease and line a 8' cake tin.

Cream butter and sugar until soft. Add molasses and beat in eggs, one at a time, each with a spoonful of flour. Mix the rest of the flour in a large bowl with the dried fruit, almonds, peel and cherries. Add the cake mixture together with spices and grated rind and mix well. Finally stir in the Single Malt Whisky and vanilla extract. Put into cake tin, pressing down

Bake in a moderate oven (350 F, 180 C, Gas Mark 4) for 11/2 hours, then lower heat and bake for a further two hours until when a knife is placed into centre of the cake it comes out clean.

Let the cake cool for about 15 minutes before removing from tin. Turn upside down and make several holes in the bottom with a skewer and pour in the extra Single Malt Whisky. You can repeat this operation over several days.

We have compiled recipes from different countries which cover a boozy cake, dips, sweets, and of course the turkey.

Turn out a Terrific Bird Here are some tips on picking and preparing

stuffing.

Buying the Bird

palette pleasing poultry.

If possible, get a fresh turkey. Be sure the breastbone and joints are flexible, a sign that the bird is young.

If you buy the turkey frozen, let it defrost for 2-3 days in the refrigerator so it will retain more of its juices.

Preparation Pointers:

Turkeys should be well oiled, especially the breast which can tend to dry out.

Before roasting, rub the bird inside and out with seasoned salt.



Irish Cream **Mousse Pie**

Ingredients:

14 oz milk chocolate with almonds

3 cups sweet biscuits - coarsely crushed

11/2 cups of Irish Cream Liqueur, divided 2 cups double cream

Method:

Melt the chocolate in a saucepan, set aside. Pour 1/4 cup of Irish Cream Liqueur over the crushed biscuits and mix with a fork. Press mixture into buttered 10 inch dish.

Whip the cream, fold in the chocolate mixture, then fold in the remaining Irish Cream Liqueur. Gently pour mixture into pie dish. Freeze for four hours or overnight.

Use dental floss to sew up the turkey after stuffing. It holds better than thread and won't tear the bird.

Cooking

Roast a 10 - 13 pound turkey at 325 F, 160 C or Gas Mark 3 for approximately 20 minutes per pound.

To test for doneness, see if the drumstick moves freely. You can also pierce the thickest part of the thigh. If the juice runs clear it's done.

Bacon Horseradish Dip

Ingredients:

1 cup mayonnaise or light reduced-calorie mayonnaise

dressing 11/2 cups sour cream

1/4 cup real bacon bits 1/4 prepared horseradish

Stir all ingredients until well mixed. Cover and Chill.

Christmas Cognac Truffles

Ingredients: 31/2 oz. milk chocolate

1 tbsp milk 1 tbsp Cognac 31/2 oz softened butter 2 egg yolks

1 tbsp double cream 1% oz unsweetened cocoa powder for rolling

41/2 oz icing sugar, sieved 1 tsp. Vanilla essence

Method:

Melt the chocolate on a very low flame with the milk and cognac. Add the vanilla essence, butter, egg yolks, double cream, cocoa powder and sugar. Mix thoroughly. Allow the resulting paste to sit in the refrigerator for several hours.

Remove from refrigerator and, with a spoon and the palm of your hand, roll the chilled mixture into oneinch balls. Roll the balls in the cocoa powder to coat thoroughly. Always keep the truffles refrigerated until ready to serve. They will keep for several days in this manner

Makes about two dozen truffles.

Ingredients:

6 egg yolks 6 egg whites

% cup granulated sugar 2 cups Cognac

1 tsp. vanilla extract 41/2 cups double cream

31/2 cups milk nutmeg to taste







know that they are being used to get grant The recent news item in the Dungarvan aid at any price - the price of down grading their estate!

Cathal Brugha is not perfect but there is much to be proud of in the estate. The residents are playing their part in making the estate a better place to live in. A resident's action plan was drawn up with the Urban District Council, aimed at enhancing the physical appearance of the estate and reducing the anti social activities of a small minority of the residents. Recently, the residents painted the outside of their own houses and are co-operating in every way with the UDC.

Children of Cathal Brugha are attending all levels of education including Third Level. The recent newspaper report did little to help the self-esteem of the young people of the estate. The adults and children of Cathal Brugha would love to read about the many good events that happen in their estate and not just the negative one sided picture painted by some who do not live in Cathal Brugha. They would love to be proud of their estate. This will only begin to happen if people understand that everyone cannot be painted with the same brush! The truth is that the people of the estate are striving, like people of all other estates, to improve the quality of their lives.

Winter is here -be meningitis aware

Now that the winter season is upon us again the South Eastern Health Board is launching a meningitis awareness campaign to ensure awareness and vigilance amongst health professionals, parents and the public generally.

In the South East last year there were a total of 58 cases, this year to date there are 49 cases of meningitis and no deaths occurred. 16 of the cases were aged less than two years of age. Greater awareness of the disease, early diagnosis, early admission to hospital and appropriate treatment is believed to have led to the reduced mortality rate from

the disease. There are two forms of meningitis - bacterial and viral - bacterial meningitis is usually the most serious form of the disease. On average it is estimated that 1 case in 10 cases of bacterial meningitis may be fatal and 1 in 7 may have long term effects such as deafness or brain damage.

Initially meningitis may produce symptoms similar to flu - a temperature or include fever, vomiting, severe headache, neck stiffness and joint pains, dislike of bright lights, drowsiness or coma. A rash of tiny red pin prick marks can sometimes develop. If a glass is pressed firmly against the rash the rash will remain visible through the glass. The condition of a person with meningitis will deteriorate rapidly, sometimes in a matter of hours. If meningitis is suspected, medical advice should be sought immediately.

Gaeltacht Roadworks Receive Warm Welcome

Brendan Kenneally, T.D., has informed Seamus O Domhnaill, P.C., of an Sean Phobail that Roinn na Gaeltachta are providing a grant of £30,000 to repair the road leading to Ballymacart Strand. This road was severely damaged by recent flooding.







How To Grow A Good Grapevine

GRAPES have traditionally been one of the choicest fruits for eating or for wine-making.

The European grape - Vitis vinefera - and its cultivars are considered to be of the highest quality. The American grape (vitis labrusca) tolerates colder climates and has been hybridised with the European grape to widen the choice for dessert and wine grapes in cooler climates.

Vines require warm sheltered positions for successful fertilisation and to ripen their fruits. In cool areas they should be given a sheltered environment or they may be grown under glass.

Vines fruit on long flexible stems of one-year-old wood and need to be pruned after fruiting each year to encourage them to produce a supply of new shoots. These grow rapidly and need to be carefully trained into their supports so they receive the maximum amount of light and air.

In the UK grapes are grown in a greenhouse, preferably with heating. In a lean-to greenhouse the warmth from the back wall is particularly beneficial, especially if there is little or no direct heating. Greenhouses with both top and side ventilation give the best results.

The soil must be fairly fertile, weed-free and welldrained with pH of six to 7.5. Any drainage must be 2ft 6ins deep as vines are deep-rooted.

Cultivate the soil thoroughly before planting, using plenty of well-rotted manure or compost, then firm the

area and water well. The vines may be planted at any time of the year.

Hand pollinate by tapping the rod around mid-day or drawing the hand gently down the flower truss. Train the vines onto the back wall or on support frames or

In free-standing greenhouses the vines should be planted at one end then trained up and along the roof

Control ventilation carefully. Keep it at a maximum in winter to ensure adequate winter chilling of the vines. Reduce to a minimum in late winter to induce growth. Vary the amount according to the weather to maintain even temperatures. Slight ventilation is always advisable and adequate warmth is needed at flowering to aid pollination.

Vines are affected by problems such as scale insects, vine weevils, wasps, downy mildew, and grey mould/Botrytis. Under cover they are affected by red spider mites, whiteflies, mealybugs and powdery

The Normans arrived in the 12th Century bringing with them their custom of endowing monastic settlements in places where they established themselves. As Dungarvan had already had the Celtic foundation of St. Garvan, the conquerors decided on the leper hospital site across the water for the location of their new monastery, thereby creating the name Abbeyside. Literally 'the Abbey side of the harbour'. Subsequently we find it referred to in royal papers as the 'Abbey side of Dungarvan'

Griffin

The friars brought material as well as spiritual benefits to the people. They developed a fishing industry and in particular shell fishing. Their coat of arms, now displayed in stone on the west wall of the church, consisted of three scallop shells and a griffin. The griffin or dragon is a Welsh emblem and indicates a connection with Wales.

Local Myths

There is a local tradition that the monks came by sea and that on entering the bay, they were at a loss to know where to land. They set a stone effigy of St. Augustine afloat in a small boat and the tide brought it ashore. Where the Abbey now stands, there is a carved image of an abbot or monk set into stone close to the coat of arms. It is said that it is the same one set afloat by the friars long, long ago.

There is another tradition which claims that it caught fish for the friars during the famine. By the 16th Century the Abbey owned property in the Burgery and at Ballinroad.

near existing houses in the widen the Boherwillin link area in a bid to alleviate the privacy concerns of existing residents. The green spaces are divided into seven different crescent type areas with playing facilities for children.

With regard to sewerage facilities, the Department of the Environment has already approved a substantial grant allowing the Council to extend the town sewer out along the main Waterford road as far as the speed limit sign. This willeffectively service both the Skehacrine and Tournore developments.

The water main will also be extended from Seapark out to St. Augustine's College and the additional costs involved in these works will be covered between both developers. All storm water arising from both estates would be drained into a sealed pipe which would cross under the Clonea road and be discharged into the tide.

To alleviate traffic concerns which were also highlighted by several residents in the area, Mr. O'Flynn said the Council intends to

road between the Burgery and Duckspool and provide footpaths and public lighting in the area. Within the past fortnight, the Council acquired land in the area to enable them commence improvement work at the college end of Boherwillin. Indeed Mr. O'Flynn said all these aforementioned services could be put in place before both housing developments were completed.

With regard to the Skehacrine application for outline permission for 47 private houses on just over 10 acres, Mr. O'Flynn said the density of houses in this case is 4.5 houses to an acre with 9.7% of the land devoted to green space. The applicants behind the development are Liam and Josephine Morrissey.

The public lighting along the road from Seapark to Duckspool would need to be upgraded as part of the proposal while the site itself would need to be raised by up to 8 feet in places to enable service to be laid more economically.

"In my view all of the impediments have been removed in so far as possible", said Mr. O'Flynn. "The town needs proper land for new housing"

He added that both proposals involved good quality housing with 6 different house types in the Tournore project and 5 different types in the Skehacrine proposal.

AREA OF **ABBEYSIDE**

Stating that an environmental impact study of the area should be done prior to any development, Cllr. Billy Kyne said the land involved in the two projects is a critical area of Abbeyside and a sanctuary for various types of wildlife including herons.

He stressed that he needed further information before he would be willing to rezone the land from agricultural to residential.

Cllr. Kyne also claimed that the Boherwillin road is currently a 'nightmare' serving locals as well as two schools while only a few hundred yards away in Ballinroad, planning permission has been granted by the County Council for a 95 house development.

"I'm not sure these developments will button together in a critical area". he urged adding that he was also unsure if the proper infrastuctural 'checks and balances' were in place.

Proposing that the matter be adjourned to the new year, Cllr. Paddy Power said he was wary of making any decision on both proposals. The boglands, he stressed, are a preserved area and a proper impact study is needed before he would ever agree to the proposals.

His proposal was seconded by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan who also voiced concerns about the implications of developments on local wildlife in the area.

While he had no major objection to either proposal, Cllr. Austin Flynn felt that the Council should be careful it doesn't inherit the same problem of sea water flooding as in Seapark. He said he would have concerns about the elevation of the sites with regard to the problem of flooding.

mation technology to deliver a public service. The process commenced back in 1987 and the provision of a countywide network in virtually all branches has been implemented. The library's database has an index, not only to every poem, play, short story and journal article but also to the register of elections, civil death records etc.

With over 20,000 items in stock including C.D.'s and musical stock, the new library features a self service checkout - 'Self Issue' which allows members to check books and other materials out themselves with their cards without assis-

CREATIVE FLAIR

Many of these innovations are due to Waterford County Librarian, Donal Brady who had a clear vision of the type of services which he wanted to provide for the new flagship library. One of his plans was to convert over 700 rolls of microfilmed Waterford newspapers dating back to 1750, onto CD-Rom. Thanks to the assistance of IMS, an Irish microfilm and scanning company, Dungarvan library users can now locate, view and print any historical local newspaper using the new computer system. Future plans include using the Internet to provide access to the newspaper files which would

make the files available to anyone throughout the world. This is the first comprehensive project of its kind undertaken in Ireland or

Another historic first for the library is the public availability of its photographic collection on-line. Apart from the National Library, no other library has undertaken a similar project.

ACCESSIBLE TO EVERYONE

Commenting on all the aforementioned services, Minister Davern said it demonstrates the library authority's commitment to modern technology and their recognition that information and knowledge belong to each member of the public. He also referred to another way in which Dungarvan Library is leading the field.

"The baby changing and feeding facilities here are a clear statement that the library service is a service for all of us and that no one should be excluded from full enjoyment of the service because of parenting commitments or for any other

reason," said the Minister. Acknowledging that the old library was not the most schoolchild friendly of places and had poor facilities for children to do their homework research, the Minister went on to say that this had now changed utterly as "the library authority is

putting children to the forefront with a children's area that is larger than the whole of the old library.'

facility is well placed among a number of developments which resulted along Dungarvan quay from urban renewal designation.

This scheme, he said, has had a major impact on the built environment in Dungarvan and the town is now witnessing a major enhancement of the visual appearance of its streetscapes.

While thanking Minister Davern for his Department's invaluable support under the Urban Renewal Scheme, Cllr. Hart said the Council will be calling on the Minister for further designation based on the integrated action plan. The Council will also be looking to the Department to provide funding to develop the roadway from Davitt's Quay up to Dungarvan Castle, thereby complimenting the developments along the quay as well as the new library.

The people of Dungarvan and indeed Co. Waterford owe a great debt of gratitude to all involved in providing this state of the art facility," he added.

To mark the occasion, Michael O'Riordan, Chairman of the County Library Committee presented Minister Davern with a copy of "Hansard's History of Waterford" while Cllr. Flynn made a presentation of a piece of Lismore pottery.

Suckler Cow — Model 365

Farmers often ask what is the best type of suckler cow. The first answer to that question is a cow that produces a calf every 365 days. How many 365 models have you got in your herd? Without keeping good breeding records you cannot know for sure but the 400 day model is far too common. She costs you £50 in lost profit.

The easy part in this is that you do not have to replace the cow in order to change the model from a 400 day one to a 365 day one, you just change the herd manage-

Calving Interval

The number of days between one caving and the next s the calving interval. In order to maintain a compact calving, reproductively efficient herd, the target is 365 days. You do not have to achieve a calving interval of exactly 365 days as there is some leeway available if heifer replacements are bred to calf 2 - 3 weeks before the main herd.

Many factors affect calving interval but the interval between calving and first heat (post partum interval) is of major importance. A short post-partum interval is necessary to achieve a 365 day calving interval.

The Teagasc Belclare Research Centre have identified two factors that have a major influence on the interval between calving and first heat -

(i) Body condition score at calving, (ii) The suckling effect (cow calf interaction).

Body Condition Scores (BCS)

When thin cows (BCS - 1.75) and cows in good condition (BCS 2.5 and 3.5) were compared at Belclare, the thin cows took an average 12 to 16 days longer to reach first heat than the cows in good condition.

This means that cows in good condition at calving can be expected to go back in calf on average two weeks sooner than cows in thin condition. In normal suckling conditions, the thin cows were 71 days calved before showing first heat.

Allowing for heat detection difficulties and normal repeats (60% conception rate to first service), a 365-day calving interval cannot be maintained in a herd of cows at condition score 1.75 at calving.

Target Condition Score

At calving is 2.5 to 3.0 at mating, 2.0 to 2.5 (Spring calving herds).

Feeding

In well managed spring calving herds, supplementary concentrate feeding is not necessary. The total feed requirements should come from quality grazed grass and moderate quality silage. A small amount of meal (50 kg/cow) may be fed as a carrier for minerals (Magnesium) or to first calved heifers between calving and turnout to grass. Target body condition should be achieved cheaply from grass by -

(a) Having quality pasture in spring to prevent excessive weight loss post calving and

(b) Adequate summer pasture to produce a recovery in weight so that cows enter the winter with a reserve in body condition (condition score 3.0 or better at weaning). However if some cows are thin at present, then meal feeding may be necessary to prevent further weight loss and consequently no breeding problems.

DAIRYING **Prevent Mastitis**

We are now moving into the time when the dry cow treatment effect is wearing off. The cow's immune system is getting lower so keep cubicle ends very clean. Hydrated lime, sawdust, paper, etc. will help to keep beds dry where less bugs grow.

Passage ways and yards leave a lot to be desired. Muck up to the @s is not acceptable. Draughts caused by broken doors, windows and even open doors can cause mastitis outbreaks.

Get the calving boxes ready. Clean, disinfect and white wash the wall. Be able to prevent seepage from boxes going into the cubicle area.

Most infection (Brucellosis in particular) is spread at this time. You need at least 4 - 5 boxes per 100 cows, more if very compact calving is expected.





Call For Ballymac' Garda Vacancy To Be Filled

Following a notice of motion by Nire Valley Councillor, Kieran O'Ryan, Waterford County Council is to request the Minister for Justice John O'Donoghue to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Sergeant Maurice Walsh in the Ballymacarbry area.


Speaking at last week's Council meeting in Cappoquin, Cllr. O'Ryan said three Garda members have always been based at the Ballymacarbry station in the past - two Gardaí and one sergeant and he felt it was therefore very necessary to have the vacancy filled.

Stretching from Newcastle in Co. Tipperary right in to the Dungarvan area, Cllr. O'Ryan said it is by far the largest rural area in the county - an area that is very difficult to police.

Many people who live in this area, he added, are in very remote parts.

"It shouldn't be very difficult to fill this vacancy with a big relocation of manning the border areas. It is very necessary to have a very rural part of the country properly policed", he stressed.

On Friday, Christmas Day 1914, an extraordinary event happened. The European War was supposed to be finished by Christmas but was now in stalemate with opposing sides entrenched along the Western Front. 44,000 Irishmen were involved at this time as members of the British army and many were at the front. One eyewitness account is from Captain de Stacpoole of the 2nd Leinsters regiment.

On Christmas night, lanterns were said to have lit up the German trenches and they called for a truce. The next day was bright and blue. All along the front line Germans came out of their trenches to bury their dead. The British followed suit. Chocolate, cigars and cigarettes changed hands. Impromptu games of soccer began in no-mans land. Songs were sung in turn by both sides and applauded by all. At the end of the day, both sides sang "Auld Lang Syne". In some places the truce lasted until the New Year.

Sadly the fraternisation which occurred on a vast scale was not to last. The authorities on both sides discouraged it. Men were ordered "to fire their rifles...... actually had to shoot some Germans before they realised we actually meant business"

Never again in the following years of the War were Christmas feelings of goodwill able to triumph over the rising tide of hatred.

G.A.A. Commemorative **Book Launched Last** Weekend

This is indeed a special occasion for the Association here in Waterford, especially on this, our Convention evening and the occasion of our Convention Mass celebrated by our Patron, Bishop William Lee.

So stated P.S. O Riain, Cathaoirleach of Waterford County Board, GAA at the launch of "The Colours Blue and White", a new book commemorating the successes of Waterford's Hurlers and Footballers in 1938 and 1948, compiled by Dungarvan author, Tom Keith.

The launch was also attended by the Cathaoirleach of Dungarvan Urban District Council, Cllr. Lar Hart; Cathaoirleach of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Nora Flynn; Padraig O Fainin, Uachtarán, CLG, Co. Phortlairge; Co. Manager, Donal Connolly, officers and members of the Executive, Waterford Co. Board, CLG; officers and members of the Western and Eastern Boards, and members and relatives of the team about which the book is written.

Cllr. Lar Hart, welcoming the distinguished gathering said he was pleased to have been in attendance at the launch of three books in as many weeks in the town and that it was essential that the history of the area be properly recorded for the benefit of people today and for generations to come. He congratulated Tom Keith on the successful completion of this, his sixth book.

Mr. Willie Barron, who was the 'flying wing-forward' of the 1938 Hurling team, speaking on behalf of all the players, said he was pleased that the events of those years had finally been committed to paper.

"We players talk of the events of those years. The sporting public often refer to them, but now at last, the facts are in print and the young players who wish to know what happened back then, have a ready reference in this book".

Co. Manager, Donal Connolly said that the colours Blue and White were the colours we had all grown to love and admire through our lifetimes.

Padraig O Fainin, Uachtaran CLG, Co. Phortlairge, said that this is an important publication, in that it is 'an attempt to capture and set forth for the youth of today and tomorrow, something of the glory that was ours in those years'.

He complimented the author on his detailed research for the book and said that it is now essential also, to record the next great period in glorious hurling history, the years from 1957 to 1963.

The Chairman of the County Board then formally launched the book and commended what he described as most interesting and essential reading to the public of the County and beyond.

In reply, Tom Keith said that while he may not have been in the mainstream of GAA activities over the years, he did feel that it was important that those historic events in 1938 and 1948 should be recorded and brought alive again in these special anniversary years. He thanked the Chairman and Executive of the County Board and the many individuals who had assisted him in the project and also his family whose support and understanding was so necessary in such a large undertaking. He thanked the many players of the time and their families who had facilitated him many of whom had come to the launch as well. He apologised for not having got to all of the forty-four players still with us from those campaigns, or the families of those who had passed on since. He promised that each should have a copy of the book, as they were properly the ones who had written the history of the time.

"I offer this book to the public for what it is", he concluded, "a genuine effort to bring into the public domain the reports, stories and photographs of those great campaigns, so that when children ask their parents about the great GAA years of the past, the story will be readily to hand for them to read."




