Abbeyside Crib Vandalised In Senseless Attack

One senseless act of vandalism was all it took to dampen the time honoured tradition of the Christmas Crib at the Causeway in Abbeyside.

The festive village spirit lay strewn in tiny shards of pottery following a mindless and ferocious attack on the near 100 year old crib it hours after the incident. figurines in the early hours of Wednesday, December 30th.

Following an investigation by Dungarvan Gardai, a local youth has been questioned in connection with the incident. A file has been prepared to be forwarded to the Director of Public Prosecutions.

As can be seen from the photograph, vandals fully achieved the objective of smashing every figurine beyond repair or recognition. It is believed that the incident occurred sometime between 2.45 and 3.30 am. Some of the crib figures were smashed off a nearby steel ESB pole while others were hurled with force against a concrete wall.

Widespread condemnation has followed in the aftermath of the attack. The crib is a familiar landmark at the 'Poor Man's Seat' each Christmas and has delighted generations of local children over the past 25 years. Urban Councillor Paddy Power who lives

within yards of the vandalised crib said he was disgusted with the scene of vandalism when he visited

"I couldn't get over the damage", he stated. "People were completely stunned and there was a feeling of resentment against the van-

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am in my late fifties and am considering early retirement. Can I continue to pay PRSI, or should 1?

ANSWER

If you take early retirement before 65, you should contact your local employment exchange and enquire about getting "credits".

You should ensure that you take the necessary steps to keer) your insurance record continuous until the 5th April before your 66th birthday. If you have been paying Class A PRSI you can claim Unemployment Benefit or Disability (Sickness) Benefit if you are ill. You should continue to sign on for credits when your Unemployment, Benefit is finished.

Credits are awarded under various circumstances by the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs (formerly the Department of Social Welfare) and have an equivalent value in certain circumstances as paid PRSI contributions. They ensure you have a whole insurance record. You will only get a credit similar to the last PRSI contribution you were paying. So if you were paying A Class contributions you get A Class credit, B, C, or D Class, B, C, or D credit.

If you have mixed insurance A and B, C or D, then it may be to your advantage not to sign for credits. You should get further information on this from the Records Section of the Department or your nearest CIC, where you can get the latest edition of "Entitlements for the Over 60's.

Although very hot by day and freezing by night, the inhospitable sea of sand is home to nomadic tribes like the Tuareg and the Tedas. 

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

INTRODUCE a little variety into an original English meal.

Ingredients:

(Serves 2)

2 lean beef, lamb or pork steaks

For the beef steak:

2 x 15ml sp cranberry sauce 50g Camembert cheese

For the lamb steak:

2 x 15ml sp tomato relish Pinch of chilli powder (for each steak)


1 x 15ml sp fresh mint, chopped

For the pork steak: 50g Gruyère cheese 50g lean bacon rashers

Method:

Grill one side of the steaks, according to the chart on the right. Turn over the steak.

Grill for half the cooking time. For the beef and lamb steak, spread over the cranberry sauce or tomato relish and top with remaining ingredients. For the pork steak, place the cheese on top



of the steak and grill the bacon separately on the grill pan.

Grill the steaks for the remaining time.

Cut the cooked bacon strips and sprinkle over the pork steak.

Serve the steaks with a mixed green salad, asparagus and new potatoes.

A DELICIOUS sweet and sour dish that goes well with roast chicken.

Ingredients:

(Serves 4)

25g unsalted butter 2 shallots and 2 garlic cloves, finely diced 2 x 15ml sp orange juice

1 x 15ml sp raisins

1 x 15ml sp cider vinegar 1 x 15ml sp vegetable oil grated zest of half an

orange and 1 lemon 2 x 15ml sp black treacle

1 x 15ml sp tomato ketchup

1 x 5ml sp English mustard 1 x 5ml sp Worcestershire

1 x 5ml sp Tabasco 1/4 x 5ml sp soft thyme 1 x 15ml sp snipped chives

1 x 15ml sp flat-leaf parsley 1 x 15ml sp toasted flaked almonds

Method:

Melt the butter in a pan and add the shallots and garlic. Cook over a medium heat for 6 mins. Base:

Blend orange juice, raisins, vinegar and oil until smooth. Add to saucepan with citrus zest, treacle, ketchup, mustard, Worcestershire sauce, Tabasco and salt. Bring to the boil and simmer for 10 minutes.

Place carrots and onions on baking tray and pour sauce over them. Bake in a preheated oven at 175°C/350°F/gas mark 4 for about 45 minutes. Turn and baste every 10 mins. Just before serving toss

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lt's a rose

THERE are hundreds of roses growing in the wild along with many natural hybrids - but after 2000 years of being cultivated, there are now thousands of varieties available. The ancestry of nearly all roses is so mixed it is impossible

to classify them all precisely and the borderline between groups has become blurred.

In recent years the World Federation of Rose Societies decided that long-established terms such as Hybrid Tea and Floribunda had lost their original meaning and agreed on a new rose classification so the groups could be readily under-

The new system is regarded as the official classification by most rose growing bodies throughout the world including the Royal National Rose Society in the UK. These are the classifications:

MODERN GARDEN ROSES

Large-flowered bush (Hybrid Tea) - Upright remontant (repeat-flowering) shrubs with large flowers carried one to a stem or in small clusters in summer and autumn.

Cluster-flowered bush (Floribunda) - Upright remontant shrubs with better continuity of bloom than large flowered bushes; the smaller flowers are carried on large sprays in summer and autumn.

Dwarf cluster-flowered bush (Patio rose) - Similar to cluster-flowered bush roses but with smaller, neat habit. Miniature - Tiny counterparts of large and cluster-flowered

Ground-cover - Low growing, trailing or spreading roses

flowering in summer or in summer and autumn. Climbers - Roses with long strong shoots are large flowers borne singly or in small clusters. Some flower in summer and

Ramblers - Vigorous climbing roses with long flexible shoots that bear small blooms in large clusters, mostly in early

Shrub roses – A varying group impossible to classify further. This group ranges from low mound-forming cultivars to wide-spreading shrubs and giant cluster-flowered bushes.

OLD GARDEN ROSES

Alba - Large freely-branching roses with flower clusters and abundant foliage borne in mid-summer.

Bourbon - Extremely vigorous open remontant roses that bear double fragrant flowers, often three to a cluster, in sumner and autumn

China - Small to medium shrubs of twiggy, airy growth that bear small, mainly double flowers (singly or in clusters) in summer and in autumn.

Demask - Open shrubs bearing loose clusters of very fragrant flowers, mainly in summer. Gallica - Dense shrubs that produce rich coloured flowers.

Health Board Considers Relocation of Local Welfare Office

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy tabled a question in the Dail recently asking the Minister for Health whether proposals exist for the upgrading or provision of alternative accommodation for the community welfare office in Mary Street, Dungarvan. Deputy Deasy asked the Minister to ensure that this office is retained in the town centre.

Minister Brian Cowen said the South Eastern Health Board is aware of the limitations of the premises at Mary Street for the delivery of Community Welfare Services.

The Health Board, he added is considering possible alternative locations such as the relocation of the office to St. Joseph's Hospital where it would be integrated with other community care services. The relocation of the Community Welfare Office to St. Joseph's however would be dependent on the upgrading of facilities there. In the event of such a relocation taking place, the Board is also considering the establishment of an out-reach Community Welfare Officer clinic in the town centre.

Helvick Lifeboat Launched 12 Times In 1998

Provisional figures released by RNLI Ireland this week show that Irish Lifeboats launched more than 500 times in 1998 saving 145 people from death and assisting a further 528 people from dangerous situations.

The station at Helvick Head launched 12 times in the past year, bringing seventeen people from potentially dangerous situations. 58% of the Helvick stations services went to commercial and fishing craft while pleasure craft (sail, power and manual) accounted for 25% of all calls for help to the station during 1998.

Persons without craft, i.e. cut off by the tide or in trouble at sea accounted for over 16% of the calls.

The RNLI lifeboat stationed at Youghal launched 13 times, saving six lives and bringing a further nine people to safety.

In 1999, the RNLI celebrates 175 years of saving lives at sea. Celebrations will take place locally and nationally during the year and the continued support of the public would be greatly appreciated.

> GRASSLAND Spread Nitrogen

But Christmas is only just over. Yes but Spring is round the corner. Nitrogen must be spread 6 - 8 weeks before expected let out date. Farmers who are planning to let out cows between February 15 - 20 should apply Nitrogen in early January. Farmers planning to let out cows in mid March should apply Nitrogen in late January. It is so easy to forget.

But what about frost? No it doesn't adversely affect the fertiliser. But it can burn some young grass and the cold will restrict growth. Losses are minimum due to this but if one is to get cows out early you have to go for it. Heavy rain after spreading is disastrous. You need 2 -3 fine days after spreading. Use weather forecasts to be reasonably sure.

How much N? 40 - 50 units of urea is advisable on all the grassland. If weather is good there is no point in delaying as you will never end up with too much grass in March or April. Use urea as it is more tightly bound in the soil and so there is less risk of leaching. Of course it

Have the Nitrogen in the yard. Be ready for the fine day when it comes and not to waste time on the fine day looking for Nitrogen. An increasing number of larger farmers are using merchants to bulk spread their Nitrogen and early fertiliser. This usually results in the Nitrogen being spread for free. Time saving, and the job is over and done fast. A neighbouring small farmer could also do this for you.

Phosphate and Potash?

It seems as if they aren't wanted anymore. All the publicity seems to have resulted in this attitude but of course they are. If they are low poor yields of grass result and weed grasses infest pastures. It would be best to confirm the real P & K level by a soil sample.

Grazing fields in fair fertility only need 1 bag of 0:10:20 per acre while silage fields only need about 1 -1.5 bags 0:7:30 with slurry. But fields that are deficient need two to three times more.

Lime must be used. Anyone using low levels of Nitrogen people in REPS, must make sure the lime status is okay. Lime isn't as critical on farms where 250 - 300 units of N are being used. Lime does help to maintain perennial ryegrass and clover in pastures.

Cattle Care

When cattle are in the field you usually 'herd' them carefully every day. Do you do it when they are in the house, why not? At least get into the pens every 3 or 4 days to 'herd' your stock more closely. You will identify problem animals sooner so that they ran be removed to a straw bedded recovery area.

Strong weanlings (including bulling heifers) need no meals from now on if on good silage. The target bulling weight is 300 to 330 kgs (in May). That is well over 100 days away. So weanlings that are now 270 kgs. will easily make it without meals.

Small weanlings should be fed 2 - 4 lbs of meals per day. The meal story indoors to weanlings is best illustrated by the response and subsequent weight retained at grass. At one kg of meal per day the response is 4.5 to 1 (or 4. 5 kgs of meal being required to give 1 kg weight gain) and 65% of this weight gain is retained at grass. To the end of the next grazing season the response is 7

At 3 kgs of meal per day, the response is 7 to 1 and only 45% of this weight gain is retained at grass. To the end of the next grazing season the response is 5 to 1. That's compensatory growth so do not overfeed weanlings indoors with expensive meal otherwise they will underperform at grass next summer when it is a lot cheaper to get weight gain.

It is going to be more difficult to sell dirty cattle. Overstocking will lead to trouble. Examine all animals again for lice and scouring. Take action if necessary. Record all medicine/antibiotics used as quality assurance is becoming more and more important.



Waterford Walkers For Malawi On TnaG

How Waterford walkers beet and poultry keeping. helped raise £500,000 in a 9-day walk through Malawi with Micheal O Muircheartaigh was seen on TnaG on Sunday, December 27.

Con Lane from Ballyduff, Dungarvan and Peter Kiely of Ballytrisan, Old Parish, Dungarvan each raised £3,000 from sponsors for their October walk for the Self Help aid agency based in Carlow which has been providing practical aid to poverty-stricken countries since the 1984 famine in Ethiopia.

The Waterford walkers were among a group of 45 from counties who accompanied top G.A.A. commentator and Chairman of Bord na Gaeilge, Michael O Muircheartaigh on the 9day walk through one of the poorest countries in the world.

The 30th minute documentary, narrated by Michael O Muircheartaigh, recounted how hundred of villagers waited for 5 hours to greet the delayed walkers and then danced and sang for more than 2 hours. Later the local villagers performed a short play telling the story of how Self Help came to the aid of the Chiradzula area.

The TnaG film followed the work of Self Help in bringing new varieties of groundnuts, sweet potatoes, soya beans, mushrooms and other vegetates to a country where 3 in every 5 of its 10 million people live below poverty level. Cramped into holdings of less than a hectare per family, the people of Chiradzula are also being encouraged to try

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

Following the collapse in the price of hoggets in Spring, IFA secured an APS scheme to support the market, IFA has tackled the lamb factories head on over the issue of lamb imports this year. IFA made it very clear sheep farmers will not tolerate factories who place the integrity and health status of Irish sheepmeat at risk through imports.

At the national sheep forum, IFA has vigorously pursued the reform of EU Sheepmeat Policy particularly securing a fairer system of ewe premium compensation, payment of extensification premium and the suspension of the stabiliser, worth £4.68/ewe.

For hillsheep producers IFA secured a £4/head increase in sheep headage under the fodder aid scheme. In addition IFA negotiated a cull ewe scheme worth £ I 0/ewe on 70% of each individual's production quota in five designated counties.

PIGMEAT

The pigmeat sector has been dealt its hardest blow in twenty years with losses sustained by all farmers regardless of size. The situation was exacerbated in June when the Lovell and Christmas plant in Ballymoney was destroyed, removing a major slaughtering source for farmers in the border region. IFA persuaded processors to increase their kill by 15% easing the backlog of pigs which had built up over the summer. The Association also successfully lobbied the EU for the early introduction of an APS scheme and several increases in export refunds to help ease the difficulties.

GRAIN

This year's harvest was disappointing for many growers although prices were on average £3/t. higher than in 1997. Malting barley premia were up £4/t. as a result of IFA's campaign during the spring. In August IFA mounted a week long harvest price protest at merchants' premises throughout the country. This campaign secured higher prices for growers than they otherwise would have received from merchants. Both campaigns were worth an additional £7 million in to growers.

IFA REVIEW OF THE YEAR

FARM BUSINESS Outside of IFA's main

commodity policy areas, we have also had some notable other successes. The 1999 Budget contained a number of proposals which IFA campaigned on, including an allocation from national funds to reopen the Control of farmyard Pollution Scheme and the Dairy Hygiene Scheme. These schemes, worth an additional £36 million, had been suspended since April 1995. IFA succeeded in having the Young Farmer Installation Aid reopened worth an estimated £4 million to farmers as well as having the maximum headage limit increased from £3,000 to £4,000 in payments per annum. The IFA also led a strong campaign at European level to have the REPS\NHA Scheme agreed, benefiting those in REPS to the tune of an additional £15

ECONOMICS

The impact of Ireland's entry into European Economic and Monetary Union has seen interest rates fall by up to 2% for farmers. This will have some small effect in easing the serious income situation for many farm families at the end of 1998.

SANTER **PROPOSALS**

Negotiations on CAP Reform 11 - the biggest change facing farmers in Ireland in the next decade - will commence in the new year. IFA submitted its reaction to the initial set of proposals to EU Agriculture Commissioner Franz Fischer at a meeting in Dublin last March and a major priority for the Association in the new year will be to finalise our strategy for the CAP Reform 11 negotiations. Already we have begun our European campaign with a protests outside the EU Farm Ministers' Council Meeting in Brussels last Spring. IFA will continue to campaign strongly in Europe against price and production cuts. At home we are pressing the Irish Government to focus on the key strategic priorities for Irish farmers if we are to secure the best possible deal in the negotiations

SUGAR BEET

Last year the Sugar Beet Section negotiated a guaranteed premium of £2.75/t above the EU price for sugar beet. For 1998 this premium is guaranteed plus a half tare bonus costing Irish Sugar 25p/t, equivalent to £345,000. The cut in contract tonnage in 1997 from 1.425m to 1.38m tonnes is worth a further 15p/t in 1998, equivalent to £207,000.

FORESTRY


In response to IFA pressure, Minister Woods gave a commitment to eliminate the delays experienced by farmers in getting pre-planting approvals, planting grants and premium payments, and has put IFA on a review group to improve efficiency in the Forest Service. As a result of IFA pressure all premium and grant payments due on shell marle sites will be paid by the end of the year. The Forest Service is engaging agricultural contractors to estimate the cost of returning these sites to grass. IFA will ensure that maximum compensation will be paid to farmers.

POTATOES

Investment in the potato sector is estimated at £25 million over the last eight years. In order to protect Irish growers from the growing strength of multiples, IFA took on a number of supermarket chains and ensured that the percentage market price received by growers was not diminished. IFA held a series of meetings with the multiples and succeeded in preventing them squeezing margins at growers' expense.

LIQUID MILK



New controls on dogs which will come into effect on 1st February next were announced recently. The principal effects of the new Act are to; increase dog licence fees, from £5 to £10 for an individual licence and from £100 to £200 for a general licence. Increase the fines payable in court for breaches of the Control of Dogs Act to up to £1,000. Require the production of a dog licence and the payment of costs before recovering a seized dog. Restrict a general dog licence to dogs kept at the same premises.

The Act also gives additional powers to dog wardens

which allows them to enter muzzled at all times while in a premises where a guard dog or more than five dogs are kept and to make wider use of the on-the-spot" fines system.

The new Regulations require that; All dogs will be required to wear collar identification and certain specified types of dogs must be leashed and





He received 164 votes as against 152 for his opponent, Michael O'Brien.



COUNTY

As was seen on the balance sheet at Convention, the long standing County Board debt (it was £165,000 four years ago) has been cleared and the board has now returned to the 'black.'

This is very good news, but is overshadowed to a considerable extent by the news that the County Development debt is still around three quarters of a million pounds. The scheme outlined at Convention whereby clubs would borrow from 8 to 12 thousand pounds, depending on size, and repay the total debt with almost immediate effect, is now being considered by the clubs throughout the county and a decision is expected on this within the next two months. The outlay by clubs would be recovered by participating in a planned county fund-raising scheme.

As was outlined by Greg Fives, Treasurer of the Finance/Development Committee at Convention, the repayment of bank interest on the borrowing is strangling the efforts to clear the debt.

The recent fund-raising effort was a huge success when the target of 10,000 members was reached. After the prizemoney was paid out, a figure in excess of £70,000 was available to the F/D Committee. A repeat fund-raising scheme is being mentioned and may take place around Whit weekend.

Meanwhile the monthly £1 Lotto goes on with clubs continuing to benefit.

County Senior Hurling Team News

The appalling weather conditions over and after Christmas raised a doubt about the availability of a suitable venue for our S/E League match against Cork on next Sunday, but at the the time of writing I have been given to understand that Pairc Ui Rinn is likely to be playable.

PATRICK RYAN R.I.

One time Treasurer of the Western Board and a referee of high standing, the late Patrick Ryan was very popularly known as "Sweeper" Ryan. He was so nicknamed because he played in the same era as the late and great Sweeper Ryan who won fame as a great Tipperary defender. He was a very highly respected official and because of his integrity, he was popular on and off the field. He also served as chairman of the Abbeyside hurling club for a time.

To his wife, Sheila and brother Martin, we offer our profound sympathy. May he rest in peace.

JAMIE MOLONEY R.I.P.

There were few more popular administrators to hold office at divisional or county level than the big man from Ballymacmague, Dungarvan and those who had the privilege of knowing him and serving with him will now acknowledge the extent of his contribution to our games and our culture since he first became involved well over 70 years ago.

Jamie, as he was very popularly known, served first as a player, then as a referee and later as an administrator. His first county medal was won while playing junior hurling with Kilgobnet and up to the time of his death he was the last surviving member of the 1931 Kilgobnet team who took the honours in that year.

His lifelong friend and former team mate Johnnie Hickey, died some weeks earlier. He also played with Dungarvan in hurling and football and won senior championships with the Old Boro team in 1937 and 1938.

On his retirement from the playing fields he took an interest in the administrative side of GAA affairs and became chairman of the Western Board in the mid fifties and remained if office until he took over as county chairman when Padraigh O Fainín retired from that position to become President of the Munster Council in 1963.

That was the year in which Waterford senior hurlers last played in an All Ireland final. He remained on as county chairman until 1969 when he retired and handed over to Padraigh O Fainín again.

One colleague who served with him on the Western Board described him as a fair and firm chairman who was admirably suited to dealing with the "rough and tumble" of administration during that period in our history. In those days, club rivalry was far more tribal than it is today and objections, appeals, investigations, etc., were all a feature of GAA activity. In those days, too, all the skullduggery that went on was dealt with at the open board meetings, but Jamie had the style and ability to take these in his stride.

On his retirement from the GAA he maintained a keen interest in all that was happening on the playing and administrative front, but his activities switched to the revival of Irish music and dance and such other things that are of cultural importance and interest.

At the removal of his remains to Touraneena Church on December 28th, members from all levels of the Association were present to pay their respects. Former GAA President, Padraigh O Fainín, County Board Officers, Paddy J. Ryan (Chairman), Seamus Grant (Secretary), Tony Morrissey (Treasurer), Jimmy O'-Gorman (Munster Council), as well as many others who were his colleagues in days gone by. Very Rev. Fr. Connie Kelliher, P.P. paid him a nice tribute in his homily during the Mass on the morning of his burial.

Jamie is survived by his wife, Maura, daughter Mary, by his sister Mrs. Ellen Scanlon and brother Paddy and other members of an extended family. to all of whom we offer our very sincere sympathy.
