KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

What are the new Medical Card income guidelines and the improved guidelines for older people announced in the Budget on 2nd December, 1998?

Medical Card income guidelines will be increased on 1st January, 1999. There will be improved income limits for people aged 70 and over as announced in the budget, but this change will not be introduced until March, 1999. (The Government's intention is to double the income guidelines for over 70's within the next three years).

Medical Card income guidelines from 1st January, 1999 will be as follows:

Medical Card Income Guidelines January, 1999 Weekly (before tax) Income Limit

Allowance on house (rent, mortgage) excess over £16.00 per week

Cost of travelling to work in excess of £14.50 per week The assessment is based on income after PRSI deductions but before tax.

The allowance for a child over 16 will be doubled where the young person is in full time education and is

Lone parents (with dependent children) will be treated under the same income guidelines as a married couple with dependents.

Family Income Supplement is not counted in the means test.

If you are over the income limit but have a lot of expenditure related to your health, G.P. bills, drugs etc., you should get information from your G.P. on the monthly cost to you and submit these with your application for a Medical Card. The Health Board has the discretion to award a Medical Card where undue hardship would be caused if someone did not have one. If you do not qualify for a Medical Card you may be eligible for some assistance with the cost of prescribed drugs. You will get more information on Drug Refund Schemes from your local Health Board.

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
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Michael Blake Appointed Dungarvan Superintendent



Chimpanzees

Chimpanzees are the animals most like humans and are clever. They are a kind of ape. The ape differs from the monkey in that it does not have a tail. Chimps eat seeds fruit and leaves Sometimes they kill and eat small animals.

They spend most of the day on the ground playing and cleaning each other. When looking for food, they use sticks and stones as tools these are used also for fight-

Chimps are very affectionate and demonstrative animals. When they meet, they often hold hands, kiss and hug each other.

If one is very upset or frightened, it runs to the other chimps for comfort. They touch and pat it to calm it down.

When they are very excited. chimpanzees bark loudly and jump up and down waving their arms in the air. They talk to each other by making grunting and hooting noises.

A mother chimpanzee is very protective of her baby and takes great care with them. She feeds and cleans it and teaches it to do lots of dif-



ferent things. The baby sucides and sleeps close to her for at least four years. Grown-up chimps like insects called termites. They get the termites out of the mound by poking a long stalk of grass down the

They also use grass stalks and long, thin sticks to col-lect honey from bees nests and to get ants out of ant-

holes to catch them.

At night all chimps, with the exception of the babies, make nests of twigs and branches to sleep in. Sometimes they make pillows out of clumps of leaves. Chimps usually run and walk on all fours. Sometimes they run downhill swinging their legs between their arms. They can go much faster like this.

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

undertake a brief review of 1998 and what we should look forward to in the coming year.

RETAIL SALES 1998

Initial results of a telephone poll of a number of the larger retailers in the area would indicate that 1998 was a good year. Different sectors reported varying levels of increase from 6 - 8 % to as high as 20% on their previous figures. What is apparent from these figures is that items that might be considered luxury goods showed a far higher percentage increase than the more everyday requirements. This is a sure indication of the buoyancy in the local economy as it represents a greater level of disposable income. Confidence is high amongst the retailers that 1999 should prove to be another good year.

INTEGRATED AREA PLAN

We still await a final approval from Brussels for scheme, the Irish govern-

ment is confident that approval will be forthcoming probably sometime in March 1999. The Department has strongly indicated that Dungarvan's application will be approved in its entirety, if this is the case the next 3 years should see between £70m - £100m being invested in further development of the town centre. The past 3 years has seen in excess of £70m invested in the Quay and surrounding areas which has totally changed the appearance and brought new life to what was previously a derelict and run-down area. The UDC is currently installing new paving and lighting which should act as a considerable attraction for both tourists and locals

TRAFFIC AND PARKING

The recent introduction of new traffic by-laws has seen a major improvement in traffic flow around the town centre but considerable fine-tuning still rethe go-ahead for this mains before all of the problems are ironed out.

The single greatest difficulty in solving the towns traffic problem is the lack of parking spaces available particularly for long-term parking. The UDC has recently acquired a parcel of land just off the town centre which when developed will provide circa 70 long-term spaces, whilst this will alleviate the problem it is by no means the solution. It is estimated that a further 400 -500 will be required over the next couple of years.

AWG PLANT SITE DEVELOPMENT

ine long-term economic future of the town lies in developing this site in such a way so as to maximise the benefit to the people of the town, both in terms of its job creation potential and the re-generation of the Western part of the town as a major shopping venue. The existing outline plan makes provision for a shopping centre with car parking facilities for up to 500 cars. Cllr. Kyne said some type of deflection barriers are urgently needed at this section of the quay before a more permanent solution is put in

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
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
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
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

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Glorious Colour For All Seasons

AS a group of plants heathers are remarkable because there are species and cultivars available to provide colour and interest at all times of the year.

Several species are grown for their golden foliage which turns a deep burnt orange in winter, while others flower for a longer period during the summer, autumn

Flowers come in a variety of colours - the most common being white and purple - but there are also shades of pink, red, blue and yellow. Occasionally flowers can be bi-coloured and those with double flowers may be dried for winter decoration.

Heathers can vary from tree-heaths up to 20 feet to dwarf forms which provide excellent ground cover.

Most species need to be grown in acid soil but otherwise they need little attention.

Evergreen, woody-stemmed shrubs, there are three genera - Calluna, Daboecia and Erica.

Calluna has only one species, Calluna Vulgaris, but it contains a large number of cultivars which flower mainly from mid-summer to late-autumn.

Daboecia has two species, both of which are sum-

Erica is the largest of the three groups. Although it is divided mainly into two sub-groups - winter and sum-

mer flowering species - it has other species which flower in spring and autumn.

Heathers are fully hardy and prefer an open sunny position and require humus-rich well-drained soil. Calluna and Daboecía dislike lime and must be grown in acid soil. Some species of Erica tolerate lime

but all are better grown in acid soils. Heathers should be pruned lightly after flowering each year to keep plants bushy and compact.

Propagate species by seed in spring or by soft wood cuttings, division or layering in summer. Seed cannot be relied on to come true. All cultivars should be vegetatively propagated.



Up to now census returns on Irish were regarded with some degree of scepticism as respondents were only asked whether or not they could speak Irish. In the most recent census, taken in 1996, people who claimed to be Irish were further asked how often they used the language, allowing a much more accurate picture to emerge of the real state of the language," according to Mr. Ó hÉallaithe.

CHRISTIAN **BROTHERS** LISMORE

This week we give a brief history of the Christian Brothers in Lismore as promised in last week's issue, as sadly the Brothers will be leaving the town during 1999.

Rev. Fogarty was P.P. of Lismore in 1836 and made provision in his will for a school for boys to be placed under the care of the Irish Christian Brothers. Fr. Fogarty died in 1866 and the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore held the money (£2,623) until such time as the school could be built. There was an endowed school in the town at the time but clergy and people were not satisfied with it. The Earl of Cork was its patron and he was reluctant to close it when he was approached about the new school. However, the people kept pressing and finally the Earl yielded and kindly gave a contribution. The Presentation Sisters were already catering for the girls. Finally in 1871 two Christian Brothers came and opened the first school where Foley's Bar is now on the Main Street. The Brothers lived in rented quarters. Later a site was given by The Earl of Cork for a nominal rent and the two priests in the Parish and the Presentation Sisters helped greatly with the plan. The new school and house was blessed and opened in 1872. Maurice Healy, father of the famous M.P. Tim Healy was secretary of the Building Fund. In 1892, a Secondary School was started and a Manual Department later. Mr. Edward Walsh, a native of Lismore, but living in Germany was a generous benefactor. The Golden Jubilee of the school was celebrated in 1921 and the Centenary in 1972.

In 1972 a new Primary School was built and in 1979 a new Secondary School opened. In 1984/85 the wheels were set in motion for the acquisition of a Community School in the town which would serve Lismore, Cappoquin, Tallow, Ballyduff, Knockanore etc.

It is hoped that Community School will open in the year 2000. In September 1998 the two Primary Schools - C.B.S. and Presentation Convent amalgamated and the new school opened in the Convent as 'Scoil Naisiunta Bothar na Naomh'. Bro. Liam Mullally became first principal but resigned on 31st Dec. last to undertake a religious renewal course in India

To acknowledge the wonderful record of education in Lismore by the Christian Brothers, the Lismore Town Commissioners have decided to grant the Brothers a civic reception on this Friday 15th Janu-

U.D.C. Takes First Step Towards 226 House Development

by County Engineer John O'Flynn and Town Engineer Joe Brennan. Addressing issues previously raised by members and residents in the area, Mr. O' Flynn said the proposed housing estate at Tournore is divided in two halves linked by a pedestrian access and cycle lane. The development is accessed by two entrances onto the Boherwillin link road between the Burgery and Duckspool.

Proposals exist for the realignment of this junction road to create a 7 1/2 metre roadway (similar to the N25), grass verges, footpaths and possibly a cycle

The existing heron sanctuary on the site would be retained in a large green area containing the original trees. After seeking advice on the matter, Mr. O' Flynn said the herons will not be disturbed provided that construction does not take place in the vicinity of the heronry between November and April when the trees are

The water supply to both the Tournore and Skehacrine estates would be provided by an extension to the Deelish line out the Clonea road. All storm water would gravitate towards a certain point in both estates and drain under the Clonea road into the es-

The storm water system proposed in the project is designed to take up to 3" of rain an hour while the pressure pipe would also ensure against a backflow of tidal

In a bid to alleviate privacy concerns of existing householders on the main Waterford road, bungalows are proposed to be constructed near existing houses. Mr. O' Flynn also pointed to the low density of houses per acre — 6.2 in the Tournore project and 4.5 houses to the acre in the Skehacrine project. This' compares with 9.3 in Seapark, 7.2 in Silversprings, and just under 6 in Strandside. The proposed development at Skehacrine includes two main green areas with parking spaces for two cars to each house. One main entrance into the estate will be located onto the Clonea road near the Friary field. It was also noted at the meeting that a planning application has been lodged with the Coun-.

Poor Representation of Women in **Council Staff**

Although women constitute the majority in Irish Society, it's been revealed that of the total number employed by Waterford County Council only 14% are female.

Cllr. Fiachra O' Ceilleachair, who requested a report on the gender breakdown of over 490 whole-time or part-time employees of the Council, says the figures suggest there may be a distance to go before it can be said that equality of opportunity exists beyond the for-

Cllr. O Ceilleachair feels the Minister for Environment should develop on equality focus in local govern-

The figures show 4.6% of part-time employees and 15.1% of full-time employees are women. With due regard to the promotion and appointment system, none of the more senior managerial or senior staff officers are female. Women are also poorly represented among senior engineers and planning officials. In the administra-tive side of things, the only place where women seem to dominate are in clerical positions where they make up 80% of clerical officers. The concentration of women in traditional occupational roles may be reflected in the fact that all office cleaners employed by the council are

"Outside the office, virtually none of the skilled operatives, crafts people, overseers or drivers are women. Less than 3% of firefighters are female. I'm not advocating a gender quota and would agree that the present council staff are giving good service. I would also accept, to a point, that men and women are naturally suited to different roles. Nevertheless it's worth asking if the figures represent imbalance. Nationally, only one of the 34 County Managers is a woman. At a local level, of the 58 people who are in membership of the 5 local authorities in the County of Waterford, only 6 (10.3%) are women. Will the politicians or perhaps the electorate, deliver change in that next June?"

Traveller **Problems** Highlighted In Cappoquin

Officials of Waterford County Council are to follow up on a situation involving the indiscriminate parking of four caravans at Shanbally, Cappoquin.

The matter was raised at this week's meeting of the County Council by Chairperson, Nora Flynn who warned of the danger posed to residents in the estate by untethered horses.

Complaining of the dogs and litter in the area, Cllr. Flynn said local residents have borne it for a long time. She claimed the travellers parked at Shanbally are tradespeople rather than traditional travellers and "would say to your face that they have houses in Wex-

Cllr. Jackie Fahey said such individuals do not come within the category of the travelling community and seem to be immune to the law.

Acting County Manager, Peter Carey said the Council has served notices on the travellers at Shanbally and have met with local residents regarding the development of the green area. "We are now following up on it," he added.

Meanwhile Cllr. Flynn, who is a member of the Traveller Accommodation Committee, said a report will be submitted to the Council in the near future outlining progress made todate.

YOU AND YOUR MONEY

Since the opening of the Money Advice & Budgeting Centre in Dungarvan, there has been a steady stream of people using the service bringing with them a range of issues arising from difficulties in "making ends meet". The use of credit is expanding rapidly in Irish society. It is estimated that two in every three households use credit, with an average of three credit commitments per household where credit is used. The other side of the coin is that the level of indebtedness has grown hand in hand with a rapidly growing credit market.

All social categories use credit, including those with low incomes. Research by the Paul Partnership in Limerick found that almost half of low income families had to borrow in order to meet basic school-related costs. The pressure to turn to credit to meet basic necessities is enormous. For people on low income, there is a very high risk of subsequently falling into debt. For them access to credit is limited and "collected credit" (cheque traders, moneylenders, tallymen and loan sharks) is often their only option. This is by far the most expensive type of credit, information is solely lacking and borrowers are frequently unaware of their repayments. Additional loans are offered and indeed at times required even when people are clearly not in a position to pay

The message from the Money Advice Service is think carefully before entering into any credit agreement. Borrowing and buying on impulse often brings hardship and worry in its wake. Try saying the amount you would be repaying for a while beforehand. If you cannot afford this, you cannot afford the credit. Finally if you find yourself in financial difficulties, take early action to deal with the prob-

This time of year is a time to make new resolutions. It may be opportune to resolve that 'this year I will get the family finances straightened out once and for all'. It may take some time to do so but now is the time to start.

Stich, 28, used a time of 2 hrs. 48 mins. and 41 secs. at the December 6 California International Marathon in Sacramento to qualify for the Na Rinne in record time in 2000 Olympic Marathon Trials in Columbia, S.C. That's quite an accomplishment all by itself. Now take into account that Stich finished under the marathon trials' qualifying time of 2.50 while competing in her 10th marathon of the year - after spending Thanksgiving week battling the flu' - and her performance in Sacramento is even more impressive.

Stich is the first area woman to earn a position in an Olympic Marathon Trials field.

"I have to tell you that I'm

On the right Paddy Ryan bewildered the opposition with his speed. On the left Killian Lannon, troubled with an ankle injury, was replaced by Vincent Dromey, who was unlucky not to score a goal. Corner forwards and brothers, Lar and Tom Cummins each had a game while Joe Walsh at full-forward enhanced his reputation with that all important winning point. After the victory the team, surrounded by well wishers, paraded from the Gaelic Field through Bridge Street to the Square where capt. Michael Lewis was raised shoulder high and the townspeople with terrific cheering shattered the otherwise peaceful scene.

The Departure Of The Christian **Brothers** From Lismore

On this weekend, Friday, January 16th and Saturday, January 17th, there will be a special function in Lismore to mark the departure of the Brothers from the town and also to thank and honour them for their massive contribution to education in the area for the past 128 years.

The Christian Brothers first came to Lismore in February 1871 at the invitation of the Parish Priest, Very Rev.Canon Fogerty (who died in 1869).

The Brothers are set to leave Lismore in 1999. All the surviving Brothers who have taught in Lismore are invited back for the week-

Proceedings will get underway at 7 p.m. on Friday with the unveiling of a plaque on Main Street where the Brothers first resided in rented accommodation when they first came to the town (now Bill Foley's Public House), while awaiting the building of the present Monastery.

Concelebrated Mass will be celebrated in the Parish Church at 7.30 p.m. and will be followed by a reception in the Lismore Hotel and to which all the townspeople, pupils (past and present), are invited. Many, of course will recall times past with some of their teachers, etc.

At noon on Saturday, the Lismore GAA Club will honour the occasion with the unveiling of a plaque at the Community Centre and following which the Brothers will be guests of the GAA at a special dinner.

As has been published on many occasions before here, the Christian Brothers in Lismore have had a very close relationship with the club down through the years. In fact the records show that the Lismore GAA Club was founded in the school and in the early days, club meetings were held in the school.

Former GAA President, Michael O'Donoghue was a

teacher in the school after coming here from Galway.

All the present Lismore hurlers are past pupils of the CBS and no fewer than seven members of the 1998 county hurling panel for the championship are ex Lismore pupils. i.e. Tom Feeney (Ballyduff), Brendan Landers, Dan Shanahan, Sean Daly, David Bennett, Mark O'Sullivan and James O'Connor - all Lismore club players on the present panel.

It is certainly a very sad occasion, not only for the town of Lismore and the surrounding districts, it is something of a tragedy for the entire educational system in Ireland, to find that their numbers are diminishing and their schools clos-

It is the end of an historic era and a very sad day for the GAA, who were among the beneficiaries of their major contribution to Irish life in the towns in which they served.


