Danger At Old Railway Bridge

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I am planning to buy a new car in January and I am wondering if I will be liable to pay an increase in VRT from 1 st January, 1999?

From I st January, 1999 there will be a new three tier structure of VRT (Vehicle Registration Tax) on cars. The current VRT rate of 22.5 per cent will apply on cars up to and including 1,400 ccs. Cars between 1,400 and 2,000 ccs will be liable for a 25 per cent rate and cars over 2,000 ccs will be liable for VRT at 30 per cent.

Housing and Industrial Land Acquired in Ardmore

Confirmation that Waterford Co. Council has purchased lands to be used for housing and industrial purposes in Ardmore has been warmly welcomed by county councillor Fiachra O Ceilleachair.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair said the purchase of eight areas at Farrangarrett is a significant acquisition both for the council and for the community in Ardmore.

"I understand that approximately five to six areas of this land will be used for local authority housing and private sites. The remainder of the land, approximately two acres, will be used for industrial purposes. This is a positive example of Waterford Co. Council acting to improve the prospects for a rural community and I look forward to playing my part in ensuring that more examples will be forthcoming for Ardmore and other rural parts of West Waterford", he stated.



Dolphins and whales are some of the world's most beautiful creatures.

But some species of these magnificent mammals are under threat from extinction, because of illegal poachers and fishing accidents.

Overfishing of some stretches of sea also deprives whales and dolphins of food - so many die of starvation.

Pollution and other human disturbances account for hundreds of deaths each year.

So what do you do if you want to save them? There are a number of charities which help to save the endangered species.

But for them to do their very best - they need your help.

The Whale and Dolphin Conservation Society is one organisation which you can join. It helps keep the ban on whale hunting, and rescues whales

and dolphins caught up in fishing nets and traps. It also funds many projects to help save whales and dolphins, and researches the effects of pollution on these creatures.

The WDCS also runs many campaigns to stop the slaughter of pilot whales, which kills more than 1,500 whales every year.

It has persuaded many supermarket chains not to stock fish from where the whales are slaughtered.

The Whale and Dolphin Conservation Committee has more than 60,000 members around the globe, and costs £14.50 a year to

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ARDMORE ENTERPRISE NOTES

Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op Looks Forward With Confidence To The New Millennium

Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op held its Annual General Meeting in the I.C.A. Hall, Ardmore on Monday, December 14. It was a well attended meeting which reviewed the many activities undertaken by it over the past year or so. The mood of the meeting was upbeat given the progress made and the ambitious plans proposed for the future.

Following almost ten years in the chairman's post, Dick Lincoln resigned and was replaced as chairman by Ms Currie Hosford. Two new committee members were elected namely Aidan Quirke and Ian O'Sullivan.

The financial report showed that the organisation was in a financially healthy situation. The Hon. Secretary's report reviewed progress on the many projects undertaken.

TOURISM PROMOTION

We reprinted 20,000 of the Ardmore colour brochure. Another 20,000 copies of the Cliff Walk brochure were also printed. These brochures are issued free of charge and are available in all the nearby tourist offices as well as being used extensively in the various promotions in which we participate.

We co-operated in a number of promotional events with Dungarvan and Waterford Tourism. These were Holiday World '99, Hubbies & Baby Show in May '98, calendar of events for the area, Tour de France Press Stop and Exchange to

Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op initiated the tourism stand on the Rosslare Stena Ferry. This was subsequently taken up by Waterford Tourism and is now operated by them. This is a very successful promotion for the area.

TOURIST OFFICE SERVICES

We again operated our tourist office here in Ardmore. The figures for 1998 were somewhat disappointing. Overnight bookings were 19% down on 1997. Callers were 7% down on 1997. The Bureau de Change was 42% up on 1997. We operated for 15 weeks from May 29 to September 13. We employed two staff via the Student Job Summer Employment Scheme. We thank Lisa Dolan and Christy Baker for being excellent ambassadors for Ardmore. There were 6373 callers to the office for services such as accommodation, activities and travel information.

TOURISM SEMINAR

A tourism seminar was held in the White Horses Restaurant in Ardmore in October, 1997. The speakers included Garry Breen of SERTO and Jean Duffy of Waterford Leader Partnership. About 40 attended and all were very pleased with the informative content of the seminar.

OPENING OF ROUND TOWER

The major tourism event was the provision of temporary steps and the opening of the Round Tower during Pattern Week, in cooperation with the Ducas, The Heritage Service. This was a fantastic success and we were amazed with the interest level shown. About 5000 people visited. The visitor book had 3000 signatures, the over-

whelming opinion was that it was a great idea. We are glad to announce that the Round Tower will again be opened to the public for Pattern Week 1999.

ARTS WEEKEND

With the help of the County Arts Officer, we organised an Arts Weekend in Ardmore in September, 1998. Twenty participants attended and we had two tutors, Ann Carlton and Eddie O'Connor. We would like to thank both of them and Margaret Fleming, County Arts Officer.

MOLLY KEANE CREATIVE WRITING AWARD

The Molly Keane Creative Writing Award was presented to Richard Cahill in the Round Tower Hotel in May, 1998. This event was jointly organised by Ardmore Enterprise Co-Op and the County Arts Officer, Margaret Fleming. **ROAD SIGNAGE**

Further improvement in the road signage on the main N25 route for Ardmore was achieved following long and detailed discussions between us, Waterford County Council and the National Roads Authority.

FAS WORK

We would like to thank P. J. and David Coyne for their work on behalf of the Co-Op, in addition to their supervisor Noel Conway. Most of our work is undertaken outside the village. We have purchased a strimmer which now makes work more effective. The St Declan's Way Walk had ongoing maintenance carried out from Ballinameela to Ardmore. A new gate and stile were erected at the Lickey. The stepping stones at the Lickey were repositioned. Discussions are ongoing with the Heritage Council about upgrading the walk as part of their Pilgrim's Paths Millennium Project. Separate Co. Waterford and Co. Tipperary committees have been formed to advance this project. The Cliff Walk and other paths in Ardmore were maintained each week during the summer. We also cleared the old grave yard in Grange on two occasions this year. We were delighted to facilitate the local

FAS administration with an office in the lifeguards' hut for the winter months.

MAJOR INFRASTRUCTURAL IMPROVEMENTS

Following the major improvements in the water supply which we achieved in the last number of years, we are endeavouring to resolve the sewerage treatment problems in Ardmore in a similar fashion. In September 1996, we got the item on Minister Howlin's desk. This resulted in a major study being carried out by the County Council. Since then we have met officials and elected members of Waterford County Council on many occasions to push the project forward. The loss of our Blue Flag Beach status in 1998 was a major blow. (Hopefully Ballyquin will become a Blue Flag Beach in 1999 following our suggestions to Waterford County Council to include it in the scheme). The loss of the Ardmore Blue Flag spurred us on to try harder. This resulted in a delegation from Ardmore, meeting with Minister Dempsey in August 1998. He was very receptive and sympathetic to our case. We now await the

outcome of discussions.

February Sees Introduction Of Control Of Dogs Act

February 1st has been fixed as the day on which the Control of Dogs Act will come into operation throughout the country. This legislation updates and strengthens existing provisions in relation to the control and licensing of dogs. Among the changes from 1st February is the increased fee for a dog licence from £5 to £10.

The new regulations require owners to ensure that dogs at all times wear a collar bearing the name and address of the owner. The scope of the on the spot fine system has been extended to include - failure to produce a licence, failure to ensure that a dog wears an identification collar and failure to deliver to the warden a stray dog believed to have worried livestock. The maximum fine on summary conviction has been increased to £1,000 and/or imprisonment for a term not exceeding 3 months.

The powers of dog wardens in relation to the inspection of premises and in relation to destruction of dogs has also been increased in certain circumstances.

The leashing and muzzling requirements have been slightly amended and apply to breeds or cross breeds involving the following; American Pit Bull Terrier, Bull Mastiff, Doberman Pinscher, English Bull Terrier, German Shepherd (Alsatian), Japanese Akita, Japanese Tosa, Rhodesian Ridgeback, Rottweiler, Staffordshire Bull Terrier and to every dog of the type commonly known as a Ban Dog. A person will not permit such a dog to be in a public place unless it is securely muzzled, being led by a sufficiently strong chain or leash not exceeding 2 metres in length and being led by a person over the age of 16 who is capable of controlling the dog.

Site Acquired For Kilmac' Garda Station

A derelict piece of land in Kilmacthomas has been earmarked as the site for a new Garda Station.

This was revealed at last week's meeting of Waterford County Council where the issue was raised by Cllr. Oliver Coffey.

County Engineer John O'Flynn said it is intended to acquire the site which is adjacent to the bridge and the fire station, under the Derelict Sites Act. The matter will then be handed over to the Office of Public Works.

Welcoming the acquisition of the site, Cllr. Coffey said the existing Garda Station in Kilmac' is in terrible condition and is virtually 'falling down'.

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
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
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
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

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Secret of a cool salad essential

NEARLY all cucumbers and gherkins are annual trailing vines that can grow up to ten feet long - although there are a few compact bush varieties.

The immature fruits are eaten raw in salads, cooked or pickled. They can also be used to make a tasty soup.

Outdoor or ridge cucumbers are characteristically rough-skinned, spiny and grow to between four and six nches long. The modern improved cultivars - mainly of Japanese origin - are smoother and grow up to 12 inches

These have improved tolerance to cold and resistance to disease. Cucumbers are grown mainly outdoors or in frames and are insect pollinated.

Gherkins are ridge cucumbers with short, often stumpy fruits up to three inches long. They are harvested young and are mainly used for pickling.

Cucumbers are warm-season vegetables grown best at a mean temperature of 64 to 86°F. They have no frost tolerance and are damaged below 50°F.

Cucumbers and gherkins should be grown in a sheltered site in fertile, humus-rich soil that is well drained but

moisture retentive. The roots must not be allowed to dry out. Very acid soils need to be limed and the plants need low nitrogen levels.

Cucumbers transplant badly so seed should be sown in situ after all risk of frost has passed. Alternatively they can be sown in small pots or modules.

If sowing outside prepare holes at least 12 inches apart and 12 inches deep with plenty of well-rooted compost or manure as you back fill. Cover with about six inches of manured soil made into a small mound to ensure sharp

Seeds should be planted on their sides, two or three together about one inch deep. Seeds germinate at a minimum soil temperature of 68°F. Thin to one seedling after germination. Seeds sown in pots need a minimum night temperature of 60°F until seedlings are planted out (about four weeks after sowing). Climbing varieties should be placed about 18 inches apart. In cool climates plants should be protected using a cloche or fleecy film.

The vines should be grown up supporting nets, fences or canes. Nip out the growing point after five or six leaves have appeared and rain the resulting stronger growths up the supports. These may be tied if necessary.

As fruiting continues, feed plants every two weeks with a high potash fertilizer or an equivalent organic liquid feed. Regular watering is essential during the growing period. Cucumbers may be affected by snails, aphids, powdery mildew, cutworm, glass house red spider mites, white flies, cucumber mosaic virus or root rot and these problems should be treated in the usual way.

Harvest cucumbers regularly from about 12 weeks after sowing when the sides of the fruit are parallel and about six to eight inches long. Gherkins should be harvested when they are between one and three inches long or when they have reached a size suitable for pickling.

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


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

Gerard Collins, Munster Fianna Fáil MEP and Vice-President of the European Parliament, has declared his intention to seek to be renominated as a candidate for the Fianna Fail party at its forthcoming European Parliament Selection Convention, which will take place on January 31 next.

DAIRYING

January is traditionally the time when many people make their plans for the coming year. High on the list of priorities for dairy farmers should be to take steps to improve milk protein levels. Increased milk protein will increase the value of the milk and there is no quota limit on protein. Teagasc adviser, Brian Hilliard has outlined the facts which must be considered when planning to improve milk protein.

Protein Improver Plan

- Dry Cow Feeding Good body condition at calving (3.5).
- Compact calving near grass (higher protein, better health, more money).
- Early Lactation prevent excessive protein (< 3.10) drop by having cows calving down in proper condition, good silage (grass/maize) fed properly, good quality meal, early grass.
- Genetics Use high RBI/high protein bulls on cows with good protein content. 1 Generation neg. Protein bull destroys gains from 5 generations. Crossbreeding
- Culling Cull low protein cows/milk recording, sufficient well bred/well reared heifers.
- Grassland Management Early, mid and late lactation, quality and quantity offered, multiple access to paddocks in wet weather, good central roadway and spur roadways, flexible water system/good pressure.
- Match cows to quota Push cows in early lactation/better protein, health and fertility, opportunity for valuable autumn milk.
- Good quality Buffer Feeds Baled silage/maize/pulp/pulp and brew.
- 9. Animal Health.
- Pricing Policy 1 Kg protein double value of 1 kg fat and rising.

SUCKLER COWS

About 50% of the national suckler cow herd calves during the months of March and April. Now is the time to take a look at the suckler herd and carry out some pre-calving management operations. Suckler cows on moderate quality silage, 64-67% DMD will gain about 0.5 kg per day when fed to appetite.

Condition Scores

Cows in good condition (condition score 3 or better) can afford to lose some weight if not calving until late March or April. These cows should be at condition score of about 2.5 at calving. A loss of half a condition score represents about 40 kgs of body weight and a saving of up to one tonne of silage. If silage quantity is good, cows in good condition and calving in late Spring should be restricted if this is possible under the feeding arrangements.

All animals must be able to feed at the same time if restricted feeding is practised. Cows that are in good condition and close to calving should be held in condition as the demands of milk production post-calving will cause body weight loss.

The use of surplus body reserves to produce milk before grazing helps to keep feeding cost low. Overfat cows (body condition score of 3 - 5 or more) should be restricted to reduce the risk of calving difficulty.

The above indicates that the herd should be assessed at this stage and action taken accordingly. Very thin cows may need to be segregated and given good silage ad lib or some supplementary feeding where silage quality is poor e.g. 1 - 2 kgs meal/day. These are most likely to be cows in their second pregnancy, old cows and cows with twins.

Look out for a cow losing condition while the rest of the herd is stable or gaining weight - she could be carrying twins.



FARMING LEADER

O'Rourke Calls for Measures to Prevent Panic and Despair **Amongst Farmers**

£145 million will be spent this Spring on cattle feed, The Deputy President Mr. Pat O'Rourke said that a joint effort was required from Government, compounders, banks, Teagasc and farmers to get through one of the most difficult springs for cattle farmers in living memory.

Mr. O'Rourke said: "The Minister for Agriculture and Food must act now on a number of issues to prevent the growing level of panic and despair amongst farmers. I am calling on the Minister to provide another package of aid of at least £20 million and that this should be announced this week. In addition, the Minister should now allocate sufficient resources so that all of the suckler cow and special beef and extensification premiums can be paid before the end of the month. The outstanding amount per suckler cow qualifying for the extensification premium is £58 per head and the amount outstanding under the special beef premium, including extensification, is approximately £40.

"I believe that the feed compounders should be reducing rather than increasing the prices being charged for animal feed. Price increases of up to 5% have taken place recently. These increases cannot be justified given the unprecedentdemand which compounders are enjoying at the moment. It is worth noting that the recent increases could swallow up more than half of the fodder aid paid out by the Department before Christmas.'

Mr. O'Rourke said that he would like to see the Coons, who are involved in feed compounding, leading the way by reducing the price of the special rations they are producing for farmers who are short of animal fodder. He believed that compounders should be able to sell these special formulations at about £115 to £120 a tonne where the farmer collects the feed. Mr. O'Rourke said this is based on the cost of approximately £100 per tonne for imported non serial feed ingredients.

With regard to credit, Mr. O'Rourke said the com-

ICMSA has estimated that pounders, both Co-ops and farmers at this time and that private companies, should take a long term view to help their farmer customers by providing credit at this difficult time. However, the rates of interest being charged are grossly excessive being up to twice the annual rates being charged by banks. Mr. O'Rourke said that the local Credit Union may be a good source for

Finally, Mr. O'Rourke said that he would like to see Teagasc expanding the excellent service they have few months. He also suggested that neighbouring farmers can provide impor-

Hill Farmers Challenge **De-Stocking Policy**

At a recent meeting of the National Hill Farmers Association held in Ennis, hill sheep farmers were united in the fact that they were extremely unhappy with the situation that has arisen to date with regard to destocking. 'Over 110,000 ewes have been given to meat factories, free of charge and over £1 million has been given to them to slaughter them, said James Brosnan, the Association spokesperson.

ILLEGAL AND UNCONSTITUTIONAL

The meeting felt that de-stocking was basically illegal and unconstitutional and seemed to have no bearing whatever on the degradation of mountains. To give one example, farmers with a share in commonages but with no sheep on it were forced to de-stock.

COMPENSATION

The compensation to the farmers is £23 per ewe which is £8.50 less than the last compensation for de-stocking. That same farmer could lose more in next year's headage and premia. Take a farmer with 200 ewes. He had to de-stock 60, he is promised £1,400. Next year he will lose nearly £1,600 and that does not take into account any increase in the '99 premia owing to the price of lamb being down in '98.

The meeting felt that we should demand fair compensation, i.e. £30 per ewe for premia and where headage is lost £10 more. It was also felt that the method used can never again be tolerated, the time span allotted to get rid of sheep and the time of year it was implemented.

In these times an injection of capital into rural areas is badly needed and this could be done in the form of doubling the rural world premium.

UNFAIR SYSTEM OF CALCULATION

It was felt that if extensification is not paid on sheep they should be removed from the calculation. They system of calculating the premia is grossly unfair to the hill sheep farmer as only the prices at Fermoy and Enniscorthy are taken into account and prices in the marts where hill sheep are sold will have to be taken into account in the future.

OWN PLAN

The framework plan for the mountains came in for some criticism with regard to the fact that the farmers can have no say in what they can or cannot do with their mountains according to the Department plans.

The Hill Farmers Association will be hiring experts to draw up a sensible plan for mountains that would prevent over-grazing and degrading and also take into consideration the livelihood of the owner and it was felt by many speakers at the recent meeting that in the light of this plan not being accepted that owners will have to take another look at the way they allow people to walk freely over their property.

IFA Resists Fertiliser Price Hike

Waterford IFA Industrial Committee Chairman, Gerry Murphy, has rejected a proposed substantial hike in fertiliser prices for the 1999 season.

He said: "Proposals from fertiliser manufacturers to increase prices between £6 and £8 per tonne over the 1998 year average price for CAN (271/2%N), with similar increases across the range of other fertiliser compounds and straights, are completely unjustified in the current difficult farming climate. For many farms facing fodder shortages, it is critical that early grass is available to feed stock as soon as possible this spring. This will require applications of nitrogen to pastures as soon as grass growth commences and ground conditions allow.

However, fertiliser prices, as with other key farm inputs, must reflect the difficult income situation for farmers. Price increases of the order being considered are not acceptable and must be resisted.

Cross on Pond Wall. Kevin Donovan, Dungarvan. Aged 14 years. Drowned 20th June 1989. Erected by D. Kiely. 3. Monument at Burgery to Pat Keating and John Fitzgerald who were shot dead in the Burgery Ambush, March 1921. 4. Monument at Tarrs Bridge also in remembrance of above. 5. Monument at Ballyvoile in remembrance of John Cummins an Irish Volunteer who died for Ireland fighting the English Soldiers on the 5th June 1921. 6. Monument at the Old Abbey adjacent to Abbeyside Church. This abbey of the Hermits of St. Augustine's was founded C 1290. The surviving buildings consist of the 13th century chancel and the 15th century tower. After the suppression of the monasteries in the 16th century the friars were driven from the Abbey and Lands and by 1654 the building was ruined and destroyed. The present Church was build C 1820 and the chancel was repaired in 1923. The ruin is known locally as The Clogcas. The inscribed monument attached to the wall of the Old Abbey was erected by the Augustinian 700 committee in the year 1990. 7. Plaque over the entrance to the Clogcas which was erected by Abbeyside Pattern 1990. It states - 'According to authentic sources the families of McGrath and O' Brien were the founders and benefactors respectively of the Abbey. 8. Abbeyside National School 1891. Scoil Mhuire, Dun na Our Parish Priest Fr. Do- Mainistreach, Scoil Naisiain Bháin, Scoil Naisiunta School 1939. 10. Cllr. Warns of **Dangerous** Roundabout on Bypass

The roundabout on the Dungarvan bypass road at Springmount has been branded dangerous by local Urban Councillor Austin Flynn.

Cllr. Flynn said traffic travelling from the Cork direction does not slow down on entering the roundabout but goes straight through along the main Waterford road. Heavy vehicles in particular fail to slow down, he added and enter the roundabout at considerable speed.

Traffic unfamiliar with the area, are unaware of cars approaching from the Spring road, continued Cllr. Flynn who claimed that some minor accidents have already taken place at the junction and it was only a matter of time before a serious accident occurred.

Agreeing that the roundabout in question is dangerous, Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly said proposals exist for traffic calming measures on the approach road near Lisfennell to reduce traffic speed but are subject to funding from the National Roads Authority.



Disappointing Housing **Allocation For** County Council

The Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal Robert Molloy last week notified Waterford County Council of the number of houses they are authorised to build or acquire under the 1999 local authority housing programme. This year's programme provides for 40 new housing starts in the county an increase of only three from last year's allocation of 37 houses.

Aggrieved at this year's allocation, Cllr. Oliver Coffey told the 'Leader' that this was bad news for those currently on the Council's housing waiting list. The Council had expected a substantially increased alloca-

Cllr. Coffey went on to say that only a month ago in his Budget speech, the Finance Minister had spoken of additional millions of pounds being pumped by the Government into local authority housing.

"This is disappointing news for new areas in the county such as in Learnybrien where the Council acquired 3 acres of land for local authority housing", he added. 'This has now thrown the whole project backwards".

Declaring that it was a miserable way that the County Council was being treated, Cllr. Coffey said he will be raising the matter at the February meeting of the local authority where no doubt his views will be shared by many of his fellow Council members.





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

Waterford County Council is to spend over £100,000 ensuring that computers, equipment and machinery in its use, is not adversely affected by the so-called "millennium bug."

Cllr. Fiachra Ó Ceilleachair, who requested a report on the issue, has welcomed news that over 70% of the Council's system re-writing has been completed and that its computer network will be in order by May of this year. Cllr. O Ceilleachair is also pleased that an extensive examination of equipment involving microchips is under way in order that nothing is left to chance.

"Adverse effects due to malfunctions caused by the 'millennium bug" can be considerable. In addition to computerised records that could be thrown into chaos by a microchip's inability to read the year 2000 into its systemisation, there is a wide range of everyday functionalities that could be going wallop if the right preparations aren't completed. Traffic lights, water reservoiring, vehicular and other motorised equipment, essential to the daily regulation of infrastructure and maintenance work undertaken by a council, are in the equation."

For example dry and mature skin needs a cream or moisturised emulsion whereas combination skin needs a liquid or semi-liquid, all in one

When choosing a foundation, pick a colour nearest the skin tone to give it warmth. A foundation should be no more than one shade lighter or darker than the skin colour. In order to test the colour against your skin, apply a small amount of foundation on the jawline to make sure it will blend well.


Foundation can be applied with the finger tips or a makeup sponge. However, it is sometimes easier to use a sponge as it is easier to blend the make-up around the hairline. It also gives the make-up a natural look. The sponge should be damp but not too

A small amount of foundation is applied to the forehead, nose, cheeks and chin and then blended with the sponge until it is smooth and even in colour. If more coverage is needed in some areas, extra foundation can be applied using the fingertips. Foundation should be applied to the eyelids and lips if corrective work is needed.

Disc Parking Changes Introduced

New bye-laws for the regulation and control of onstreet car parking in the Dungarvan Urban area were introduced with effect from Monday last, January 18. The Dungarvan U.D.C. (Parking Places) Byelaws 1999 make provision for the operation of disc parking in and around the town centre. Persons parking in a disc parking area are required to display a valid parking disc on the vehicle. Parking in these areas is restricted to a maximum of one and a half hours with the first half hour free.

The Council have introduced a new style of 'scratch card' type parking disc. The disc is marked by scratching the year, date and time to reveal the coloured panels beneath which are more clearly legible from outside the vehicle when put on the dashboard. Discs which retail at 30p each or £3 per book of ten are available from most retail shops in the town centre. Parking discs may also be used in the Council's car parks at Davitt's Quay and Friary Street. However the free half hour does not apply in the car parks.

Following the commencement of the bye-laws the Council's two traffic wardens will be patrolling the streets from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. including lunch hour each day Monday to Saturday. Persons found not observing the bye-laws or parking indiscriminately on double or single yellow lines will be liable to an on the spot fine of £15.

Persons requiring further information on any aspect of the bye-laws or retailers wishing to stock parking discs should contact the Road Traffic Section at the Town Hall, Dungarvan.

Denis Cassidy, who later became a well known professional in Castletroy, designed the course on The Cunnigar, a sandy spot of land in Dungarvan Bay. The only access to the course was by rowing boat and as the crossing is tidal, this presented not inconsiderable problems. Also being bounded by the water on both sides, the fairways were long and narrow and as the name (Coinigear) suggests the balls in an Alice in Wonderland fashion kept disappearing down rabbit holes.

However the pioneers battled on, built a pavilion of sorts and enjoyed the game for a few years until 1928, by which time erosion by the sea and hazards of some storm-tossed crossings, to say nothing of balls vanishing down rabbit holes the members decided that the time had come to move on and look for a more suitable

location for their club. More next week.


