Cappoquin Farmers Donate Fodder To Relieve Crisis

In The West

Farmers from IFA Mount Melleray Branch in Cappoquin have this week donated in excess of 100 bales of silage and hay to fellow farmers in the West of Ireland in a gesture to help relieve the fodder crisis.

The baled silage and hay, donated by the 30 farmers in the Mount Melleray IFA Branch, was transported in a convoy of lorries from Mount Melleray Abbey Farm, Cappoquin to Abbeyfeale and Bruree, Co. Limerick where it was distributed to farmers from local IFA branches facing the worst effects of the current fodder crisis.

This is the first of a series of donations of fodder from farmer to farmer being coordinated through IFA's 925 branches nationwide. IFA has established 12 points in

Co. Wexford where fodder will be donated free and transported to County Clare later this week

Speaking in Cappoquin, Waterford IFA Country Chairman, James Coughlan said the donation of fodder by farmers in the south reflected the deep concern of farmers for the plight of fellow farmers in the west who are in the midst of the worst fodder crisis in living

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION: I delayed in claiming my Old Age Pension. Recently I heard that I may be eligible for payment of the arrears. Is this correct?

ANSWER: If you were late claiming your Old Age Pension you may now be entitled to some arrears. The new provisions apply to late claims for Contributory Old Age and Retirement Pensions and Widows/Widowers Contributory Pensions made before January, 1997. (Previously claims for late arrears only applied to claims made since January, 1997).

To make your claim for late arrears you must write to the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs, Pension Services Office, College Road, Sligo. Your letter should provide necessary evidence to substantiate your claim for backdated payment.

A backdated payment will be considered if the delay arose because you were incapacitated by sickness; you experienced a life event which was so overwhelming as to render it impossible for you to satisfy the requirement of making a claim on time; or your failure to make your claim was due to false or misleading information supplied by staff of the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs to you or a person acting for you.

Applications will be reviewed on an individual basis and circumstances like current financial hardship and debts may strengthen an applicant's case for payment of

Kid's Stuff Pancake

It's Shrove Tuesday on the 16th, but have you ever thought of why we have Pancake Day?

Traditionally, Christians made pancakes to use up all the fat, eggs and dairy products in the house before the start of Lent - a time when they go without such luxuries. It was intended to symbolise the feast before the "famine" of Lent

(when Jesus went into the desert

without food for 40 days and 40 nights).

The tradition of Shrove Tuesday lives on to this day. Pancakes are easy to make and taste great. Here's how to make them:

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 cup of flour,
- 2 teaspoons of baking powder, Half a teaspoon of sugar,

A tablespoon of melted butter, One

3/4 of a cup of milk.

METHOD:

Place the ingredients in a mixing bowl and stir well.

When they are thoroughly blended into a smooth paste, gently pour them into a heated, greased frying pan. Cook the pancakes until bubbles


start to break on the surface. When one side is done, quickly flip them to cook the other side.

Pancakes are traditionally served hot with syrup, honey or thick sour cream - but marshmallows, lemon juice, sugar, ice-cream and chocolate sauce are also popular.

Parrots and Budgerigars

Parrots are very noisy. brightly coloured birds. There are over 300 species of parrot and most of these live in tropical jungles.

The parrots beak is hooked, so is useful when climbing. Most parrots live in trees and many have loud piercing voices. Most parrots nest in holes in trees or termite mounds where enemies will not spot the chicks. They will often use holes left by woodpeckers or other birds. Groups of monk parkeets collect thorny branchand twigs. With t build a shared nest and each pair has its own nest chamber and entrance hall.

The largest parrots are the Macaws. They have long tails which jut out behind them when they fly. There are six species of pygmy and these are tiny parrots. They have long claws and stiff tails and these enable them to climb up and down trees.

Most parrots have a thick, fleshy tongue. They can hold a seed or nut in the top part of their beak with their tongue and they crack it with the lower part but specially bred ones are of the beak.

Another type of parrot is a lorikeet. They feed on the nectar in flowers. They have brush-like hairs on their tongues and this picks up the pollen. This pollen is brushed on to another flower, thus helping to pollinate it.

A cockatoo is like other parrots in the way it uses its claws like a hand to pick up food. They live in flocks, and feed and roost together.

Some parrots talk as know. One parrot probably imitates human speech better than any other and this is the African Grey. It does not understand the meaning of the words it copies

Budgerigars live in Australia and collect in very big flocks. They live in big flocks. because they have a bigger chance of not being caught by birds of prey.

Budgies like to eat grass seeds and drink at water holes together. Thousands of them can die if a water hole dries up as this prevents their food from growing.

They were first brought to Europe in the 1840's and are now popular pets. In the wild, budgies are always green, always blue and yellow.


The winners, Grenagh of Seandun and Ladysbridge of Imokilly put on very enjoyable performances. Congratulations to them and best of luck in the final.

Fenor Farms had legitimately requested a deferral of the planning decision. Chinese roast Leader pork

THIS roast pork dish has an authentic Chinese taste that will make your mouth water.

Ingredients:

1.25kg lean boned and rolled pork loin, shoulder or leg joint, rind removed 1.25cm fresh root ginger, peeled and cut into thin strips

For the stuffing: 8 spring onions, finely chopped 1/2 red pepper, seeded

and finely chopped 1 clove garlic, crushed

1 x 5ml sp oil 100g breadcrumbs 1 x 15ml sp Hoi Sin sauce

For the glaze:

3 x 15ml sp honey 2 x 15ml sp brown sugar

1 x 15ml sp Hoi Sin sauce

1 x 5ml sp ground ginger 1 clove garlic, crushed

Method:

Cut slits into the joint and push in slithers of ginger. Weigh the joint and calcu-

late the cooking time using the panel on the right. Place joint on a rack in a roasting tin.

Open roast in a pre-heated oven (Gas 4-5, 180°C, 350'F)

Meanwhile, make the stuffing, fry the spring onions, red pepper and garlic in the oil for 3-4 minutes or until soft.

Stir in the breadcrumbs and Hoi Sin sauce and mix. Shape into seven or eight stuffing balls.

Place on a baking tray and bake for the last 20 minutes

of cooking time For the glaze, mix all of the glaze ingredients together. 20 minutes before the end of cooking time, remove the joint from the oven and brush with the glaze. Return to the oven. Reglaze the joint 10 minutes later. Serve the joint with the stuffing, stir fry vegetables and new potatoes.

Alternatively slice the joint thinly and serve in Chinese pancakes drizzled with Hoi Sin sauce and garnished with shredded lettuce and cucumber strips

Tip the flour and walnuts into a food processor and mix until the nuts are ground. Add icing sugar and butter and blend in a stop/start motion until butter and flour have combined evenly. Add the egg yolks and water and mix until it is just

forming a ball. Knead lightly and wrap. Chill for about 15 minutes.



Reserve some pastry for decoration and roll the remaining pastry large enough to cover the pie. Pinch the pastry edges together. Brush the top of the pie with some egg white.

Use reserved pastry to decorate the top. Brush with egg white and sprinkle with caster sugar. Bake for 40 to 60



Broad beans - still so popular

BROAD beans are one of Ireland's oldest cultivated vegetables - they have been grown in this country for centuries.

They have large seeds - white or green, depending on vari-- and will grow in almost any soil. Broad beans like moisture and an open but not exposed position. Classed as an annual vegetable, they are also lime-lovers and enjoy plenty of light and spring sunshine.

They are classified into three groups - longpod, windsor (late-sowing longpod) and dwarf. All but dwarf grow 3ft or

Longpods are very long – 15in or more – each carrying seven to ten kidney shaped beans. They are the hardiest and the best for early cropping and top yields

Windsor varieties have shorter pods, making them the broadest of the broad beans - with four to seven round beans in each pod. They are regarded as the best for flavour, but



BEST BEFORE THEY GET TOUGH: For the periect taste, broad beans must be picked while the pods are still green.

they are not hardy enough for autumn sowing and take a long ime to mature.

Dwarf varieties, by definition, make the smallest and shortest plants - no more than 18in high. They are best for growng under cloches.

The two out-of-doors sowing periods are early to mid winter November to December) for an early crop; and early to late spring (February to April) for a maincrop harvest.

The main reason for winter sowing is to avoid attacks of black bean aphid. Only longpod beans are suitable for sowing in both periods. Outdoor crops may succeed in warmer areas, but cloches are probably necessary until late spring (end of March) in colder regions. Don't sow cloche crops until mid

If you are going to sow your beans under glass, they can be sown in a slightly heated green house in the first week of February or in a practically unheated greenhouse in the first

Seedlings can be hardened off in early April, gradually accustoming them to the full exposure by the second or third

They can be planted out as soon as they are ready. Plant them in rows, with 15cm (6in) between each plant and 60cm

By the second week in June bean plants should have about three clusters of pods each. It is wise to stop them growing any taller by pinching out the tip of each plant. This may also prevent an attack by blackfly.

Broad beans must be picked while pods are still green and before the skins of the seeds begin to get tough.

Pests that bother broad bean crops include slugs, bean fly maggots, aphids, anthracnose of dwarf bean, black root rot and rhizoctonia.

REOPENING OF BALLINACOURTY RAILWAY LINE UNLIKELY

At a presentation to the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council regarding Waste Management Disposal for the south east, it was pointed out that the rail network would be an important element of this disposal of domestic waste. The plan outlines that such waste in the county area would be taken by rail from Waterford City and Clonmel to the Great Island Power Station where the waste would be incinerated and the energy generated used to make electricity. However when Cllr. Billy Kyne expressed the view that it would be feasible to reopen the railway line from Waterford City to Ballinacourty in order to transport the county of Waterford, the C.I.E. representative replied that it was intended that only the existing rail network in the south east region would

be utilised. According to this new plan, landfill sites would only be a minor factor in overall waste disposal. In the future Waste Energy Technology would be a Public Private Partnership and this is welcome news for all those who felt threatened by the prospect of having a huge landfill site adjacent to their homes or land.



Radical Quota Changes Being Examined - ICMSA Following a meeting of the Milk Quota Review Group recently, ICMSA


Dairy Chairman Mr. Jackie Cahill welcomed the fact that the Group has agreed in principle to recommend that part of the temporary leasing pool be transferred to the Restructuring Scheme. This will acquire a detailed examination of all the milk quota schemes. The Department of Agriculture will now examine the legal issues and the likely quantity of quota involved. A further meeting of the Quota Review Group will be held after this examination to consider the details of any proposed new Scheme.

Mr. Cahill restated ICMSA's proposition that the 40 million gallons temporarily eased by non-active producers should be given a permanent home through the Restructuring Scheme. To this end we should phase in new rules as and from April 1, 1999.

Mr. Cahill said "ICMSA has suggested that serious consideration should be given to confining the temporary leasing scheme to producers who have supplied milk in the past two to four years. Individuals who have not done so would clearly have the option of selling their quotas to the Restructuring Scheme. This could result in up to 20 million gallons extra quota being offered to the structuring Scheme for the coming quota year. A further flow of quotas of the order of another 20 million gallons could become available for the year 2000. I believe that if we act now in a rational and fair way, that we can get a permanent home for this 40 million gallons of quota while at the same time protecting the legitimate interests of the quota holders and active producers," concluded Mr.

DAIRY

* Cows undergo a big change in diet at or after calving which can result in Ketosis/acidosis or other digestive upsets and lameness. They will then go off food, give less milk and lose more weight.

Why does this happen? - Cow is under stress due to calving. Meal results in a complete change of diet and is very "explosive" by comparison with silage resulting in some indigestion.

* Avoid problems by: Introducing 1-2 lbs. meal to cows 7-10 days before calving. Or slowly build up to full meal ration 10- 1 4 days after calving. This latter option can be difficult to operate with cows at different stages of calving. So a little meal before calving with straw and silage is a good practice before calving.

With silage of 70% DMD feed 7 kgs meal/cow/day. For every 5% DMD change in your silage quality increase or decrease the meal by 1 Kg. Reduce meal if over quota to 3-4 kgs but cows must have plenty of good silage. Reduce meal by 2 kgs. for every 3-3.5 kgs grass being fed. If on reduced meal post calving feed extra minerals.

 Prevent milk fever by not feeding calcium rich meals, such as dairy or beef nuts, beet pulp, before calving. Spread 2 oz. calcined magnesite/cow/day or a good precalver mineral, on the Silage before calving. Drench with 80-120 grams of limestone flour any cows susceptible to milk fever, within 12 hours of calving and again 12 hours later.

' Aim to get grass in the cow's diet soon after calving. It is the cheapest feed. Protein and milk yield will increase. She will lose less body condition.

This is the time of year when mastitis poses the greatest risk. Dirt, draughts, stress, infections etc. cause all the trouble. Be alert to preventative procedures. Because there are so many strains of mastitis around during Spring a sensitivity test may be useful if your present "tube" isn't doing the job.

SHEEP **LAMENESS**

A particular problem this year - undoubtedly to the poor ground conditions. If not already done, pare and footbath. Separate out lame sheep - they find it difficult to compete at the trough. Severely affected sheep may require antibiotic injections. To reduce incidence of lameness sheep should be footbathed about every 3 weeks during housing period. In the case of straw bedded sheds spreading builders lime along the standing area in front of the feed barrier seems to give good results.

THIN EWES

In contrast to this time last year there is a higher proportion of thin ewes in flocks.

Separate out particularly those carrying multiples. Feed best quality forage and a small increase in meals immediately. The worst scenario is to delay feeding and in order to compensate to over feed in the last two weeks (large lambs).

The main reason for separating them out is that they will be able to compete for trough space.

After lambing reserve the best grass fields for these thin ewes (they have little body fat and are unable to milk off their backs).

Announcement On Turf **Cutting In SAC's** Move In Right Direction -ICMSA

Mr. John O'Connor, Chairman of ICMSA's Farm Services Committee, speaking recently on the cessation arrangements for turf cutting on raised bog in Special Areas of Conservation (SAC's) announced by Minister for Arts, Heritage, Gaeltacht and the Islands, Ms. Sile De Valera, said that the announcement was certainly a step in the right direction but that some further changes would be necessary.

Mr. O'Connor in particular welcomed the continuation of turf cutting for domestic use for 10 years as a positive development but said that 10 years would be insufficient as many rural dwellers are dependent solely on turf for domestic heating and thus these rural dwellers should have the right to cut turf every year.

IFA Call On Minister Walsh To Compensate All Farmers Fully For Farm **Retirement Losses**

Waterford IFA Development Chairman, Mossie O'-Connor has called on the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh to compensate farmers fully for the losses that they will incur as a result of new Euro exchange which has resulted in reduced payments to farmers in the Early Retirement Scheme.

Mr. O'Connor said that over 8,000 farmers have suffered a reduction of 5% in their retirement pensions. The new maximum rate for the pension from January 1, 1999 in is £9,509 which is a reduction of £507 from the rate that has applied for the last four years.

Mr. O'Connor said that the Department of Agriculture has confirmed to IFA that farmers will be 100% compensated in 1999 for the loss, 66% compensated in the year 2000, 50% of which the EU will pay with 33% compensation in the year 2001, again 50% which

IFA is now calling on the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh to confirm that all farmers will be fully compensated in the middle of this year for the loss that they are now incurring.

Inadequate **Response To** Fodder Crisis -IFA

IFA President, Tom Parlon has said that the new fodder aid package is inadequate to deal with the most severe fodder crisis in living memory.

Mr. Parlon acknowledged the Government response to the crisis but said unfortunately the level of funding provided does not reflect the scale of the hardship that up to 50,000 farmers are experiencing on the ground. He said that already farmers have spent in excess of £110 million on extra feed costs this winter and the critical time for feeding is over the next couple of months as it is most unlikely that farmers will be able to let out their animals to graze in most parts of the country until April 1.

Mr. Parlon expressed disappointment that the level of top up was only 50% of what those farmers had received already. The £300 limit for the other farmers will be inadequate to meet the increased costs of fodder and meal feeding required. IFA had identified the need for a targetted scheme and it is vitally important that sufficient funds are provided in the special hardship fund for the many critical cases that exist in most

Mr. Parlon welcomed the earlier announcement that the Farm Assist Scheme will apply from April 1 and he called on the Government to immediately make application forms available for the scheme. He said the new Farm Assist payments should be backdated to the date of application by the farmers.

Retired Public Employees

Retired public employees from all parts of Co. Waterford met in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan recently for a briefing on the recently formed National Association of Retired Public Employees, comprising of retired civil servants, local authority employees, health board employees, nurses, teachers etc.

The capacity attendance was addressed by national executive member Donal Kelleher and former SIPTU member. He stated that the aim of the association was to maintain pension parity for retired public employees. These public employees had been recruited on the understanding that they would be paid a decent pension on retirement and could look forward to a sense of security in their old age having paid substantial pension subscriptions in the course of their careers.

Mr. Kelleher said it was sad to say that in 1993 strenuous efforts had been made to

deprive pensioners of part of their pen-

Were it not for the fighting spirit of the Dublin Retired Public Employees the pensioners lot today would be a sorry one. He paid tribute to the astute political awareness of Bertie Ahern and Mary Harney in the run up to the last general election when they recognised the potential of the grey vote. Ahern and Harney gave a written commitment that they would restore pension parity to retired public employees, thereby underlining the voting potential of the grey electorate.

In 1997, the Minister for Finance Charlie McCreevy issued a statement confirming the restoration of pension parity but the Department of Finance began to raise obstacles. other hand create a happier and more satisfying life.


Everybody has within them the negative and the positive but if negative feelings are such a large part of our thinking that they contaminate it, then it is time to take stock and begin a change process. 
"This will help many farmers survive this spring at a time when both fodder and finance are scarce. Today's gesture shows the extent of the goodwill that still exists between farmers in times of need."

IFA President, Tom Parlon congratulated the efforts of Waterford farmers and said it clearly illustrated the cooperative spirit that exists among farmers at this time of great hardship.

He said the effort by Waterford farmers is only part of many other similar initiatives which are being repeated between farmers in the south and south east where fodder is not as scarce, to farmers mainly in the west and north west of Ireland who are in dire need and where fodder is both scarce and expensive.

Mr. Parlon said it is clear that many farmers in the worst situation in the west and north west who will benefit from the IFA initiative are not getting the level of support from the Government in either of the fodder packages that have been announced to date.

"IFA has put forward a number of key proposals for a hardship scheme to run in parallel with the broad based scheme which was announced last week. IFA has sought a special allocation of £3 million for such a scheme to apply to all areas of the country to operate in a targeted way to meet the animal welfare problems that are arising in many parts of the country."







It is with deep and profound feelings of sadness and loss the locality learned of the passing of Patrick (Paddy) Hallahan, Knockenpower, Colligan which occurred on Tuesday, January 19 after a duration of illness that was borne with great courage and dignity at the Naas County Hospital.
