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## **Go-Ahead For** By AISLING CONROY Dungarvan Bus Stop

A positive ending is finally in sight for a three year campaign to erect a bus stop on the main road at Lisfennell, Dungarvan near the Eden Garden Centre.

Putting party politics aside, Urban Council Chairman, Lar Hart (Lab) and Waterford County Council member, Jackie Fahey (FF) teamed up to secure both the finances and the commitment from the 'powers that be' to put

the project in place.

In addition to the new bus stop which should be in place by next year, traffic calming measures will also be undertaken on the bypass road to improve safety in the area together with a pedestrian crossing linking

up with the existing pathway through the green to Fr. Twomey's Road. This crossing will have flashing warning lights and enable children to cross safely to the Dungarvan G.A.A. pitch as well as facilitating residents of Lisfennell and workers in the nearby facto-

The matter has been raised continually since 1996 by both Cllr. Fahey and Cllr. Hart who both highlighted the huge public demand for a second bus stop on the opposite side of

the town. Rather than travelling over a mile to avail of the bus stop at Davitt's Quay, residents of such estates as Springfield, Caseyville, Western Bay and the Youghal Road will have much easier access to public transport when the bus stop and improvements are completed early next

Frustrated at the constant lack of action on the project and increasingly concerned over the safety of pedestrians crossing the busy and oft-times dangerous bypass road, Clirs. Hart and Fahey recently decided to take the matter into their own hands.

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## **KNOW YOUR RIGHTS**

#### QUESTION

Has there been an increase in charges in rates of private and semi-private accommodation in public hospi-

#### ANSWER

The rates from 1 January 1999 in respect of private and semi-private accommodation in public hospitals are set out below:

These charges are additional to the public hospital statutory in-patient charge which is set at £25 a day (subject to a maximum of £250 (10 days) in any 12 month period). If you are in 2 or more hospitals in the course of the year and exceed 10 days in a hospital you should bring this to the attention of the last hospital you

It is important to make clear to the hospital whether you are opting for public or private care. Everyone is entitled to public in-patient and out-patient services regardless of their income but subject to the statutory charges mentioned above.

There are a number of groups who do not have to pay the statutory charges: medical card holders, women receiving maternity services, children up to the age of 6 weeks, children suffering from prescribed long-term illnesses, or children referred from child health clinics and school examinations and people receiving treatment for long-term infectious diseases. In cases of undue hardship a health board may provide a service

#### **MANAGING YOUR DEBTS**

Everyone experiences debt at some stage in their lives but how you deal with debt is very important. Don't panic if you get into debt - talk to someone who can help. Consider the following points when you are trying to manage your debts

(1) Write everything down - all money coming in and all the money you spend each week.

(2) List all debts - compare what you are actually paying with what you can actually afford to pay. It is never too late to offer to pay a reduced instalment based on your present income.

(3) Tell your Creditors the full situation - be honest with

(4) Make sure you are claiming all your entitlements through Social Welfare or Tax.

(5) Contact your local Money Advice & Budgeting Service — they can negotiate with your creditors if you do not wish to do this yourself.

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# Pelicans

Pelicans and Cormorants are fishing birds and usually live in big groups or colonies. They can be found all over the world on both fresh water lakes and sea coasts.

They move slowly on land because of their short stumpy legs, although they fly well. After they have dived for fish, they stand with their wings spread out to dry.

White pelicans fish and fly together. They glide over the lakes with the help of their huge wings and use their large bills to scoop up fish. The pouch of the bill

can hold up to 13 litres of water. Pelicans can trap fish and eat them at the same time. They do this by swimming towards each other and joining to make a circle.

Adult pelicans regurgitate the fish to feed their chicks. The chicks put their heads inside their parents' pouches.

Another member of the family is the shag. They live in nests in crowded colonies on rocky cliffs. Their nests are made from twigs and seaweed. The female lavs


and her partner take turns to sit on them until they hatch.

When the chicks are born they are naked, but after a few days they begin to grow dark brown downy feathers and they open their eyes also. They learn to fly in up to seven weeks.

The Guanay cormorants live on a group of islands off the coast of South America. The ground is covered in their droppings and these are rich in nitrate.

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
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#### **Clonea-Power Macra Na Feirme Notes**

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The most inspired and enduring descriptions of love must surely come from the great poets. Robbie Burns wrote those immortal words which almost everybody knows:

We psychologists usually deal with love on a more prosaic level. We see it as an active, ongoing entity rather than a rhapsodical state. My definition is that love is the experience of true communication. It is the feelings of two emotionally secure people who enhance and expand the life of the other. When two people experience this true love, they are free to share their thoughts and feelings in an uninhibited, open manner and there is an intense feeling of contact and of having your life fulfilled by the other. Love is the centre of life. Love provides the foundation for happiness, peace and strength.

#### STAGES OF A RELATIONSHIP

A relationship is a live entity so it either develops or it stagnates and dies. It cannot remain static. In the early stages we enter what we call the Romantic Stage which is infatuation rather than true love. We overlook a lot of the imperfections in our partner and we want our partner to overlook our imperfections so we work hard at presenting ourselves in as attractive and interesting a light as possible to other person. We make profound professions "you're the answer to my prayers", "I can't live without you", "you're my whole life" and of course we fantasise about harmonious ever afters. We are intoxicated with sweet dreams and promises but unfortunately, as with all intoxicants, there is a crash - a hangover and pain.

When we move on from the Romantic Stage we can look at our partner in a more realistic way. The screens we have put up gradually come down and there is a certain sense of relief in this as it takes a lot of energy to keep these screens up all the time. Now we are seeing flaws in our partner and trying to change what we don't like. We begin to say "he/she is not what I thought." As we see the other sides of each; who may not always meet other, we enter the Power

Struggle stage. It is at this point that many abandon the relationship. However if the relationship continues, it will deepen and trust will grow. Trust allows us to speak out about the things we don't like. By expressing ourselves, we show our partner that we have integrity and self worth. If we avoid the power struggle at the early stage of our relationship, it will follow us throughout our life. Yes if we risk expressing ourselves the relationship may be lost but it can also strengthen and deepen it. What I am saying is we must risk expressing ourselves and in doing so we become vulnerable. Spite and retaliation often surface at this time. But these manipulative tactics never get us what we want. When we can let go of our demands and work out a way through, the power struggle will be balanced.

The roots of power struggle are in our childhood and so as we learned to manipulate in our family of origin we bring this trait along as our journey baggage. Many couples in this stage are so desperate for love as they did not experience unconditional love from their parents as children and so they continue to mask their feelings for fear of rejection. Thus they ride the roller coaster of destructive love to find themselves in persecutor-victim game that will go on forever.

Thank goodness there may be calm after the storm as we enter the Stability Stage of a relationship. Stability gives us an attitude of acceptance - an acceptance of our partner as a real live, unique person lows us to look inwards for the source of conflicts. We can let go of negative attitudes and allow a new awareness to enter. Stability enables us to accept the 'ups and downs' of our relationship and we learn how much conflict we can handle as a couple.

Finally we enter the Commitment Stage. This means taking responsibility for making the relationship work rather than "if only he/she would". Commitment means we have let go of all preconceived ideas and letting go of thoughts of having our own way. It means we trust our partner and we will not view differences as threats. We have moved beyond a right or wrong approach. We learn to accept our failures and be gentle on ourselves.



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# A Spot of Blue For Your Border

THE forget-me-not is most famous in its blue flowered, yellow eyed variety, and yet it has over 50 species.

The flower's original Latin name is Mysosotis. It comes in more than 50 species of annuals, biennials and clump- or mat-forming perennials. But it is usually grown as a biennial

In the wild, they can be found in woods, meadows, swampy soils and pond margins across Europe, Asia, Australasia and North and South America.

For garden decoration, forget-me-nots are useful for rock gardens, banks, scree beds, pond margins or alpine houses.

All of the varieties of forget-me-not have fragrant flowers, most commonly found in blue, white and yellow, and occasionally in pink. And again, most have yellow or white eyes.

They produce alternate, variably shaped hairy leaves and are fully hardy, although they may need gritty, sharply drained soil to survive wet winters.

Forget-me-nots enjoy moderately fertile or poor, moist but well-drained soil in full sun, with some midday shade, or in partial shade. The soil should not be too fertile as they become too coarse.

The forget-me-not should be planted into its flowering quarters between September and October, having previously been planted in cold frames or seed beds in late spring or early summer. Do not delay planting into flowering quarters any

longer than necessary - plant as soon as weather and soil conditions are right.

They should be planted 15 to 20cm (6 to 8in) apart. The only preparation that the ground needs is a dressing of hop manure at a rate of two handfuls per square metre, well forked in, and a top dressing of bonemeal.

They flower between April and June. But from the second week in July it is possible that forget-me-nots will be ready for pricking out. If not, do so at the first opportunity.

#### FORGET-ME-NOTS: Problem Pests

Powdery mildew looks like a kind of whitewash coating on the stems and leaves. It is not uncommon. The best thing to do is cut out and burn badly affected shoots and spray with

benomyl or thiophanate-methyl to give adequate control.

■ Downy mildew symptoms are yellowish patches on older leaves, grey or white spores on the undersides of the patches, later turning brown. There is no cure. To grow mildew resistant plants in the future, spray with mancozeb when they are at seedling stage.

Slugs and snails tend to cause a problem in the winter. The safest chemical method of getting rid of them is slug pellets or liquid, made from metaldehyde and methiocarb. The non-chemical alternative is to clean the plant thoroughly, clearing away thick foliage and debris. Pick off the slugs and snails by hand when they emerge at night and drop them in a bucket of water.

#### 1954 - BALLINACOURTY CONTROVERSY

For clubs with such a good record for self discipline and good behaviour, 1954 ended in a fierce and deeply felt storm of controversy. Indeed there are strong feelings that Ballinacourty did not get the full 'Cothrom na Féinne' in the matter which caused all the steam.

Few realised at the end of the Stradbally game that a whole load of trouble lay ahead. Most thought the game had ended quietly and uneventfully with Stradbally's high-rated forwards a big disappointment. **Objection** 

However there was an objection which said the referee had awarded a free to Stradbally just at the end but did not allow it to be taken. At Western Board level the objection was defeated on a vote.

Appeal

Stradbally then appealed to the County Board where the debate tended towards the view that the Western Board had underestimated the significance of the referee's decision in awarding a free and not allowing it to be taken in view of the fact that a referee, having whistled for a free, cannot subsequently change his mind. On a vote of 12-7 they decided on a replay.

**Fallout** 

Ballinacourty, infuriated, informed the Western Board that they would not take part in the replay. Then the referee made a published statement that he could not recollect giving a free and complained strongly that he had not been backed up by the County Board.

At this stage of the controversy the County S.F. Final came to be played in the Gaelic Field between Dungarvan and St. Otterans. Encroaching spectators caused the referee to abandon the game after 54 mins. Afterwards there was an amount of 'argy bargy' by Ballinacourty followers who seemed to shout a few words of more than encouragement to the County Board Chairman who was in the dressing rooms and with whom, at this stage, they identified their grievance.

Special Meeting

A special County Board meeting was called by the chairman who was, however, unable to attend and the Board voted to set up a committee to enquire into the situation. Meanwhile the Western Final went ahead, the Western Chairman holding that anything arising from then on was County Board business only. Ironically Geraldines beat Stradbally by 1-2 to 1-1.

The Investigation Committee - (i) Agreed that a referee's decision as to fact and time is final but was forced to the conclusion that the referee did actually award a free and subsequently changed his mind contrary to Rule 106 O.G. and terminated the game.

(ii) Deplored the press statement of the referee and its criticism of the County Chairman.

(iii) Found that the scenes at the County S.F. Final after the game were primarily caused by Ballinacourty spectators.



TEAGASC/AWG DAIRY SEMINAR

One of the interesting topics discussed at the recent Teagasc/AWG Dairy Seminar was the performance of the 17 monitor farms in the south east set up under the Teagasc/AWG discussion group programme. Tom O'Dwyer, Kildalton who, with the local adviser, measures and collects the data on these farms, presented some very interesting information.

The milk protein percentage increased by .07% in 1998 V 1997 because of better grassland management and utilisation. The average protein percentage for March was 3.02% and any farmer serious about improving protein must not let the level slip below 3.01% in march,

The common cost of production per gallon as measured by the Teagasc Dairy Profit Monitor averaged 39.2p and the range was 32.3 - 48.5p per gallon. Common costs are the total cost of milk production less hired labour, interest, land and quota leases.

Meal costs averaged 6.7p/gal. and the range was 3.6 -9.8 p/gal.

Fertiliser costs averaged 6.0p/gal. and the range was 3.9 9.9p/gal.

Net milk price varied from 100.2 - 108.1 pence per gal-Ion and milk protein varied from 3.25% to 3.43%.

There are three of these monitor farms in Co. Waterford. The discussion groups in the County will meet on these farms in April and have the opportunity to discuss these costs in detail.

#### CATTLE

Adequate biestings in the first few hours after birth gets the calf off to a good start in life.

I'm sure most farmers have heard the following recommendation several times in the past but it is important and worth repeating. Feed 2 litres of biestings to all calves in the first hour after birth and a further 2 litres in the next 4 to 6 hours.

At birth the calf has no immunity against disease but the biestings is very rich in antibodies which will provide the calf with a defence against diseases while it is building up its own immunity system.

The ability of the calf to absorb antibodies declines in the first 24 hours. There is almost 100% absorption at birth, by 12 hours it is down to about 50% and at 24 hours it has fallen to about 10%.

#### **Colostrum Quality**

Hence the importance of early and adequate Colostrum intake. Although absorption of antibodies via the intestine declines rapidly, colostrum feeding is still beneficial after 24 hours as it provides local protection in the intestine. The highest level of antibodies is found in the first milking and declines rapidly with subsequent milkings. The level is lower in high yielding dairy cows and in heifers than in suckler cows.

A short dry period also results in lower quality colostrum. Therefore the best concentrations of antibodies is likely to be found in suckler cows that have a relatively long dry period and low milk yield.

While some continental type sucklers may not even produce 4 litres of milk in the first 6 hours post calving, the higher quality will make up for the lack of quantity. In this regard, it is more important that calves from dairy cows get the required 2 litres in the first hour and another 2 -2 1/2 litres in the next 4 - 6 hours than would be the case with calves from suckler cows.

Take the first feed from all four teats if cow is being milked and try to get the calf to suckle more than one teat for the first feed where the calf is left with the cow.

#### Colostrum Storage

It is useful to have a small amount of Colostrum in storage for emergency cases. Store only the best quality from a first milking. It can be kept warm in a thermos flask for night feeding, it will last for 10 days to 2 weeks in a refrigerator, if stored at 20 - 41°C. Frozen Colostrum can be kept up to 6 months in a deep freezer.

For freezing, Colostrum can be stored in 2 litre used plastic milk cartons. Thaw slowly in warm water in the kitchen sink.

#### **GRASS BUDGETING COURSE**

A grass monitoring and budgeting course for dairy farmers will take place at the Teagasc Centre, Dungarvan at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, March 23. #### South East Region Supports Brussels Lobbying

The South East region was well represented in Brussels by Tom Cronin and Milo Murray (Waterford); Michael Kehoe and Betty Kehoe (Wexford); Tommy Cooke and James Hennessy (Kilkenny); Michael Browne (Kildare) and Danny Cass and Brian Oxley (Laois).

Mr. Frank Allen, ICMSA President outlined the following five key issues to the Minister for Agriculture & Food in Brussels during a recess in the negotiations. ICMSA held a full National Council meeting in Brussels on Wednesday, February 24. This was an unprecedented move by any farm organisation. Mr. Allen said that the purpose of this special Council meeting was to provide the maximum support to the Minister and at the same time to apply the maximum pressure on him to deliver a fair and balanced deal for Ireland.

#### **Five Key Issues**

- 1. Price cuts of 30% beef and 15% milk would penalise Irish farmers most. These cuts must be total-
- 2. Full permanent compensation for any price cut, no degressivity - reducing compensation over time.
- 3. Safety net intervention at 51p/lb is useless. Higher safety net intervention must be obtained to close the Irish price gap.
- 4. All animals including dairy cows, heifers and sheep should be paid extensification.
- 5. Ireland's milk quota and butter fat quota must be increased.

# Review Of Events By Cappoquin Community Development Company

A public meeting was organised by Cappoquin Community Development Company on Tuesday 23rd February in the Parochial Hall. There was a good turnout on the evening. Mr. Ollie Wilkinson, Chairman of the Company, chaired the evening. He began by welcoming everybody and saying that the purpose of the evening was to acquaint the people of Cappoquin with the activities of the Company since the last public meeting. He noted that the Company now had a membership of 15 people and extended an open invitation to anyone who wished to join with the main criteria being dedication and commitment.

Mr. Wilkinson then proceeded to review the projects the Company had been involved with in the last while which were as follows - private sites which are being developed at present, and adjacent is the site of the new amalgamated primary school which has been sanctioned by the Department of Education. Fr. Arthure P.P. intervened to give an update on the present position revealing that the Department had nominated the design team before Christmas who have since had a meeting with

the chairpersons of each Board of Management on the new site in January. Plans at present are being drawn up and first draft will be ready for submissions to the Department by the end of March at the very latest, Mr. Wilkinson then continued.

The old Calmark building was purchased as an Enterprise Centre from the IDA with the help of grant aid from Forbairt and Waterford Leader Partnership. It has subsequently been divided into two substantial units, with assistance from the Co. Enterprise Board. both occupied with ongoing leases. This has provided a number of new jobs in the area. Since the purchase of this building there has been further interest for available space. Planning permission has been granted for a further six units each of 1,000 sq. ft. Applications for grant aid is being processed at the moment.

Further improvements in the town are to be carried out this year. It began with the renovation of the square and some footpaths. Then in 1997, the Company donated £5,000 to the Council for the improvement of paths in the town. As a result of this initiative by the

ty Council invested £14,000 in footpaths in Cappoquin in '98 and a further £15,000 is to be invested in footpaths for the year 1999. The development of the Twig Bog area will be a further addition to the town, and is being carried out under the Urban and Village Renewal Scheme. This is a joint project between Waterford County Council with matching funding from Cappoquin Community Development Co. Ltd. A much needed carpark will be part of this improvement which is nearing completion.

**Ash Wanted** 

Many of our juvenile and senior players will be swinging (camán ó luascadh ar fud na páirce) home grown Tallow ash over the coming months as the club got almost 100 hurleys from the Ash Doyler and his chainsaw gang cut down last Spring.

Tipperary hurley maker, Tommy Hayes crafted the ash for us and he turns out a handsome stick. "It's getting harder to get good ash," he told me and he said he would be interested in hearing from any farmer in the area who would have suitable ash on the land.

The best age for a tree is about 25 years. Once a tree has gone over 35 or 40 years, the log itself and the grain gets light and thin. A huge big tree is of little use. What you get from these is called gross wood. You might get 15 hurleys out of the butt but they would be of little use, suitable only for childrens hurleys. A butt of a tree that yields 4 or 5 hurleys is best. If a tree is exposed facing south getting the sun, it will have a good grain. A tree that is grown in good conditions is your ?? The rings of the grain will be spaced evenly and the wood will be strong. The bark on the outside gives you clues. It should have a nice, healthy skin, light green and smooth. If wood is old the skin is rough and quarled and there will be old scars on it. We would like to hear from anybody who has suitable ash and remember the hurley maker only needs the butt of the tree.

## Dungarvan **Chamber Of** Commerce **Notes**

There was some good news announced during the week with confirmation by the Department of the Environment that much of the town was included in the latest tranche of the Urban Renewal Plan (i.e. IAP). It is estimated that under the original scheme circa £75 million was invested in domestic and commercial premises in what were previously derelict areas of the town. There is no reason to suppose that this latest scheme will see anything less than a similar level of investment. This investment represents many jobs for the locality both in terms of the construction industry and those long-term jobs which will be created in new developing businesses.

Those areas which are included in the IAP qualify for rent and rates allowances over a ten year period in line with the existing scheme. Unfortunately no capital allowances are included as this matter remains to be resolved by the Eurocrats in Brussels. Whether or not the Irish Government is successful in attaining this status will have a massive bearing on the future development of the town. The primary reason for this being that the forty seven acre site adjacent to the town centre which has recently ceased to function as an industrial and manufacturing plant. A draft development plan has been submitted to the department for this site which broadly proposes the establishment of a major shopping development, up to 500 car parking spaces, industrial units and a business park into which it is hoped to attract a major new telecommunications or hi-tech IT facility and it is envisaged that there will be a strong residential focus also included for the site. Given the overall cost of this development it goes without saying that the provision of capital allowances would make this a more attractive proposal.

The above developments when combined with the existing fast pace of expansion of the economic environment augurs well for the employment and financial future of the town. Much comment has been made recently on planning proposals for large residential estates to be built on the outskirts of the town, it is vital that adequate and affordable housing be available if we are to attract new industry. Whilst much of the skills base required to fill these positions is to be found within the local population, it stands to reason that a substantial number of executives and skilled craftspeople/technicians will need to be brought in and these people must be catered for if we are to enjoy success and fully exploiting Dungarvan's potential.

In agreeing that these substantial housing needs need to be fulfilled, the Chamber is not and would never advocate an unplanned suburban sprawl, it is vital that any developments must take into consideration the capacity of the infrastructure of the area so as to ensure that problems relating to traffic, sewage and utilities do not arise because of these developments. The UDC is presently drawing up a draft development five year plan which will determine how the town is to grow in the years 2000-2005. We know that our good friends in the UDC will give every consideration to these matters but the structural layout of Dungarvan creates an added difficulty in so far as expansion is only viable in a 180 degree arc due to the coast line. What is becoming ever more evident is that the Ring Road no longer lives up to its name as it is now more like an "Inner Ring Road".

In mentioning the Ring Road congratulations are very much in order to the County Council for the efficient and unobtrusive manner in which they have managed to replace what was undoubtedly a very dangerous junction with a marvellous new roundabout. Although far from complete the improvements in traffic flow which we are already witnessing begs the question as to why this was not included in the original plan.



## THE HONEY BEE IS IN DANGER

Claire Chavasse — Last summer the dreaded Varroa Jackcobsoni mite was found in Co. Sligo. This is a parasitic mite that lives off the blood of bees. A few mites in the hive do no harm but they are capable of reproducing very quickly and can wipe out all the bees in the hive.

The mite was discovered in Japan at the beginning of the century, on bees that are native to that country who can tolerate its presence. Unfortunately the mite managed to infest some European bees that had been brought to Japan to improve the honey yields there. Assisted by many moving bees, for breeding purposes, migratory bee keeping or some other reason the mite managed to spread throughout Europe and the United States. The mite was discovered in Devon in 1992, and since then it has spread steadily through England and Wales.

In Ireland we have been aware of this danger on our doorstep and the import of bees has been banned since 1982. The infestation in Sligo has come about through bees being imported either knowingly or unknowingly against the regulations.

The Department of Agriculture has undertaken an eradication policy in Co. Sligo, destroying all colonies found to have the mite. To date they have destroyed 300 colonies which have affected 55 beekeepers. If this operation proved successful the beekeepers of Co. Waterford can breathe a sigh of relief, but the possibility of the mite reaching us via another route is always there.

What would Varroasis in Co. Waterford mean? The Varroa Jacobsoni mite attacks all bees not just the bees living in hives. This would mean that in time we would lose the wild bees living in the trunks of old trees, the bees in our roofs (Hurryah, I hear some people say). They would be a sad loss to our countryside, as they do an excellent job pollinating our apples, pears, gooseberries, raspberries and other fruits.

What would the arrival of Varroasis mean to our beekeepers? More work and expense to produce honey, unless the beekeepers control the infestation of mites to a small number of their hives their bees will die. This control is achieved by placing impregnated strips in the hives early in the year and in the autumn. These strips have no effect on the purity of the honey because they are removed from the hives before the bees start collecting the nectar to make honey.

With deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Senator Percy Butler Barona, Cahir, Co. Tipperary which sad event took place at Melview Nursing Home, Clonmel. He had been a Fine Gael member of the Senate from '69 to '82. During that time he served as spokesman on agriculture and chief whip of his party in

Born in Dungarvan, Co. Waterford in September 1922, he was educated at Dungarvan C.B.S., Ballyhaise Agriculture College, Co. Cavan and University College, Cork from where he graduated with a Dairy Science Diploma. He worked for a time with Waterford Co-Op in Dungarvan and then moved to work as Creamery Manager in Cahir in 1951. He served for many years as president of the Irish Creamery Managers Association, the organisation which nominated him for successive Senate elections.

He was also a member of Macra Na Feirme from '52 to '65 and a member of the Executive Committee of Cahir Credit Union and chairman of the Dairy Organisation Council in 1973. His late father, John Butler had been a Labour T.D. for Waterford from 1922 to 1927. He left the party that year and lost his seat when he stood as an Independent in the 1927 General Election. He then joined Fine Gael and attempted, without success, to return to the Dáil in the General Elections of 1937 and 1943. He was a member of the Senate from 1937 to 1957 and from 1961 to 1965. Percy followed his father into politics and was elected to the Senate on the agricultural panel in 1969 and was returned in 1973, 1977 and 1981. He drew votes from his native Waterford as well as South Tipperary and from North Cork where he was well known through his work with Mitchelstown Co-Op. He retired from the Senate in 1982.

His funeral took place following requiem Mass in St. Mary's Parish Church, Cahir. To his family we extend our sympathy.

## TRIATHLON CORNER

This week we introduce a new column to our athletics notes. This column will tell us about the very popular sport of triathlons (the iron men of sport). Our expert in this field is West Waterford A.C. Triathlete, Eoin O'Riordan of Abbeyside. Eoin will explain to us the many aspects of the sport from training to equipment.

Week 1

What is a triathlon? What distances are involved? How do I get started? How do I train for a triathlon? What kind of races are on in Ireland and where's the



the first few questions. Q.: What is a triathlon and what distances are involved?

A.: A triathlon is a combination of swimming, cycling and running all done together as one event. It first came about in the late seventies in America and today has rapidly become one of the fastest growing sports.

There are a number of distances that can be covered in triathlon, the most common one being the Olympic Distance which consists of a 1.5km swim, 40km cycle and a 10km run. Most of the triathlons that take place in Ireland would be less than or equal to this distance. Some would even be less than half the Olympic Distance, an ideal triathlon for someone thinking of doing one for the first time (dates for upcoming events will be announced shortly).

When trying a triathlon for the first time, it's best to pick one that has a pool swim to start with rather than an open water sea swim. Distances usually vary between 250 - 1000m. There will be five lanes set up in the pool with anywhere from four to six people per

To save you having to count how many times you go up and down the pool, there will be someone on the pool deck counting the amount of laps you do. When you have just two laps to go, you will get a little tap on the head, this is to signal you to exit the pool when your last two lengths are complete and get ready for the bike section of the race.

Next week we will look at how to train in the pool and the equipment needed while swimming. We will also look at the upcoming events on throughout the summer as well as the fourth discipline in triathlon, the changeover from swimming to cycling.

## All Set For Three Day Cheltenham Festival

CHELTENHAM This week we feature two former winners of the Tote The home of National Hunt Racing takes place from Tuesday, March 16 to Thursday, March .

18. There is already huge interest in this year's event and the Gold Cup Day has been sold out. Read on to see how Adrian Maguire and Andrew Thorton expect to perform in the festival and their paths to national hunt racing glory.

## WINNING THE GOLD CUP WAS MY WILDEST DREAM

ANDREW THORNTON, winner of last year's Tote Cheltenham Gold Cup, talks about his path to National Hunt Racing's biggest three days, and his connection with the Race that made his career.

Seldom has a jump jockey ever looked in more urgent need of a parachute than the longlegged Andrew Thornton as he was apparently fired into orbit by the perilous last fence blunder of Cool Dawn at Ascot in November 1997.

Displaying an instinct born of survival the pair somehow defied the laws of gravity and emerged intact to claim a remarkable victory in the Gardner Merchant Chase. It was the start of a remarkable sequence of big race triumphs by the former amateur champion jockey which culminated in a famous double at last year's Festival on Cool Dawn in the Tote Cheltenham Gold Cup and the giant young hurdler French Holly in the Royal & Sun Alliance Novices' Hurdle.

"Winning the Gold Cup was beyond my wildest dreams. You have to treat every success at Cheltenham as if it is your last", he reflects.

Thornton believes it was his astonishingly athletic recovery on Cool Dawn at Ascot that pitchforked him into the limelight.

"In the past I would have fallen off Cool Dawn, no question", he admits. "But the eventing coach advised me to ride much longer by dropping my stirrups. Riding jumpers is all about finding your centre of gravity and I had to come down a bit because my balance was wrong".

Winning the Gold Cup has been top of his agenda since he began riding out for the late, great trainer Arthur Stephenson during the Christmas holidays as a 13 year old schoolboy. That was the Season that Stephenson broke the habits of a lifetime by entering a horse in the Cheltenham Gold Cup in the chestnut shape of The Thinker who claimed an improbable victory.

Thornton, a down to earth character from a farming background, was far too sensible to be carried away by his hard earned victories at the highest level last Season. Less than two months after Cheltenham his year of excellence ended with shocking abruptness in a grotesque fall at Fontwell whose legacy troubles him to this day.

His lower left leg was broken so badly that surgeons used seventeen screws and two metal plates to piece the shattered pieces of bone together. Five months of rehabilitation followed before the plucky Thornton returned to action.

Cool Dawn, regrettably, has lost his way completely this winter but his jockey resumed in vibrant form culminating in a formidable four timer at Kempton on 28 December, including another facile triumph on French

So now Thornton is involved in a race against time to ride at the Meeting that matters most to all jump jockeys. Cool Dawn, strangely out of sorts, is unlikely to be there to retain his crown but the heady prospect of partnering French Holly against Istabraq in the Champion Hurdle is unlikely to hinder his jockey's re-

"He had to do the donkey work when he was beaten by Istabraq in Ireland in January. Cheltenham will be a different track on a different day and I live in hope because things can change. This time Istabraq has to travel from Ireland and you should never be frightened of one horse", he reasons.

His first target for his latest comeback is the Racing Post Chase at Kempton on 27 February in which he would have sound prospects of a repeat success on last year's winner Super Tactics if the ground ever dries

"But everything is being geared for Cheltenham and I am well on course to be there again. I would not miss it for the world', he says.

## TO WIN THE GOLD CUP WOULD **MEAN SO MUCH TO ME NOW**

ADRIAN MAGUIRE, who won The Tote Cheltenham Gold Cup on his first ever ride in the Race, reflects on his tortuous route to National Hunt Racing's Championships, and the telephone call that changed his life.

Adrian Maguire arrived at the Cheltenham Festival with all the dramatic impact of a whirlwind. On his first ride at the Meeting as an 18 year old, unknown, 7lb claiming amateur he won the Kim Muir Chase on Omerta for Martin Pipe. A year later, by then a much sought after professional, he snatched the Tote Cheltenham Gold Cup on Cool Ground with an aggressive uncompromising finishing charge that brought immediate censure from the Stewards.

He scored a double at the Meeting in 1993 and a year later took the Queen Mother

Champion Chase on Viking Flagship and the Triumph Hurdle on Mysilv. When he did finally make it to the Meeting in 1998 he ended up in hospital after another sickening tumble from Zabadi in the Grand Annual Chase that left him unconscious for fully five minutes.

'It has been one bang after another ", he concedes. "That's why winning a race at the Festival this time would mean so much to me, falls are beyond our control. They are part of the risk that goes with the job. It's not a question of courage', he adds. "You fall and yes, it hurts but you just have to put up with the pain. Each time you are out you cannot wait to be back

Maguire's long time role as first jockey to the powerful stable of David Nicholson came under intense scrutiny at the end of 1998 as his understudy Richard Johnson forced his way into the limelight. An apparent rift between trainer and jockey was finally resolved after an urgent summit meeting.

The result is that Maguire is now riding as a freelance though he continues to partner a percentage of Nicholson's horses.

Since Christmas, Maguire has been riding like a man inspired and Nicholson has turned out a conveyor belt of winners.

"Top of my list is to win the Gold Cup again because I did not appreciate it the first time on Cool Ground. There's no denying I was hard on the horse but if I hadn't been hard on him he would not have won and he was responding the whole time".

"I had not been in the game very long and had no idea what the race meant to so many people. To win it again would mean so much to me now".

So much has happened to this cheerful and hugely popular little man that it is hard to believe that it was only eight years ago that he burst into our consciousness on Omerta at the Festival. One of nine children of the greenkeeper at the Royal Tara Golf Club in Co. Meath, he was expecting to be watching the 1991 Festival on TV at his home in Ireland until a late night call up for Omerta from Martin Pipe.

"I thought someone was pulling my leg and took

quite a bit of convincing that I really was wanted', he recalls. "I flew over with the owners in the morning and it was hard to take it all in when he

Iwenty days later he added the Irish Grand National on Omerta. It was an extraordinary way to launch a famous career.

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## MUNSTER CONVENTION

Very strong criticism of the infamous Loughnane/Lynch affair following the replay of the Munster senior hurling final was probably the highlight of this splendid annual report to the Munster Convention in Thurles on Friday night last.

Referring to the furore in Clare following the suspension for three months of Colin Lynch after incontrovertible video evidence of serious striking incidents in the first five minutes of the replay between Clare and Waterford, he said it became the most controversial disciplinary issue to come before the Council in 3 years. He said it was a most distressing affair for the Council members who exercised great dignity and restraint at the time, despite the unfounded and unprecedented allegations that were widely trotted out via Press and Local Radio concerning the integrity of its officers and members.

He also referred to the attempt to have the High Court grant an injunction preventing the Council from dealing with the matter and he said the Council was not an insensitive, corrupt body, as described by Clare F/M and had no hidden agenda against Clare or any other county.

Also on the matter of Discipline, Donie Nealon wrote "there is a compelling case to be made for the establishment of a Central Disciplinary Committee at Croke Park to deal with the appointment of referees for the SH and Football championships, right from the first rounds, to accordingly deal with referees' reports and other disciplinary matters that arise in games and to apply the appropriate penalties for breaches of match regulations which are being flouted habitually by team mentors."

Not everyone will agree with handing over all disciplinary control to headquarters.

#### **GRANTS FOR GROUNDS**

Todate the Munster Council have paid out a total of £5,269,885 in grants to counties for purchase and development of grounds. Of this figure, Waterford has received £215,795 for Walsh Park; £134,000 for Fraher Field and £290,545 for the other grounds in the county.

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
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
