I recently heard about 'force majeure leave' and I would like to know what this covers. Could you explain what it means and under what circumstances I would be entitled to take this leave?

Answer

'Force majeure leave' is covered under Section 10 of the Parental Leave Act, 1998. It refers to circumstances in which an employee is entitled to leave with pay from his/her employment for urgent family reasons owing to the injury or illness of a child or adoptive child of the employee; the spouse of the employee, or a person with whom the employee is living as husband or wife; a person to whom the employee is 'in loco parentis'; a brother or sister of the employee or a grandparent of the employee.

Force majeure leave cannot be treated as part of any other leave (e.g. sick leave, adoptive leave, maternity leave, annual leave or parental leave) to which an employee is entitled.

An employee may not be absent on 'force majeure leave' for more than 3 days in any 12 consecutive months or 5 days in any 36 consecutive months. Absence for part of a day is counted as one day of 'force majeure leave'.

Employees may also enjoy employment terms which are implied. 'Implied terms' relate to employment terms and conditions which are established by custom and practice in the workplace, for example, full pay while out sick or compassionate leave to attend the funeral of a close family member. Terms may be implied around tea breaks, hours etc.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS Helvick Head RNL Lifeboats **Lifeboat To The Rescue**



CREW MEN ESCAPE BURNING

The Atlantic Class 21 lifeboat based at the RNLI's station at Helvick Head was launched at 12.30 a.m. last Thursday, March 11th to the assistance of a fishing vessel which caught fire 7 miles south of Mine Head.

TRAWLER

Skipper Con Murphy and crew member Liam Og Kelly of the Helvick based MFV 'Glen Rover' took to a liferaft where they awaited rescue when the wheelhouse of the trawler became engulfed in flames. In accessing the liferaft however, both men suffered superficial burns as the raft was secured on top of the burning wheelhouse.

In addition to the Helvick Head RNLI lifeboat, Youghal lifeboat was also called to the scene while an IMES helicopter was on standby.

Just before 1 a.m. the two men on the liferaft were picked up by a local fishing vessel skippered by Michael Hayes with the Helvick Head's Atlantic lifeboat standing by having reached the scene.

The skipper and crewman of the stricken 40 ft. vessel were then brought to Helvick Harbour by the fishing boat, accompanied by the Helvick RNLI lifeboat arriving at around 2 a.m. An ambulance had been called to render medical aid to the two men and they were transported immediately to Waterford Re-Hospital. gional Fortunately, neither man was seriously injured and they were both released from hospital later on Thursday. Flames continued to engulf the stricken 'Glen Rover' and the vessel finally sank at approximately 4 a.m.

DRIFTING VESSEL OFF MINE HEAD

Meanwhile just five days earlier, the RNLI lifeboat was in action when called to the assistance of a 32ft. fishing vessel, the M.F.V. 'Golding' on Saturday, March 6 at 9.45 a.m. The vessel with its two man crew on board had encountered mechanical difficulties and was drifting without power two miles west of Mine Head.

The Helvick Head lifeboat, with its three man crew under helmsman Paudie Walsh, reached the vessel at 10 a.m. to find that its drive shaft had been broken. Lifeboat crew secured the stricken vessel and towed it to Helvick Harbour where it arrived at 11.35 a.m. The vessel was berthed at Helvick to allow repairs to be carried out.

Skipper of the fishing vessel, Richard Walsh expressed his relief at having been assisted by the lifeboat

as when the breakdown occurred, there were no other boats in the vicinity and his vessel was drifting quite close to the shore.

"The immediate response of the RNLI's Helvick Head Station rescued us from a very dangerous situation," he said.

Speaking to the 'Leader', local RNLI secretary Dolores Ui Cheallaigh said that in this the 175th Anniversary year of the RNLI, these call-outs illustrate the point that lifeboats and their volunteer crews are needed as much now as they were at their inception by Sir William Hillary in 1824.

Deasy Criticises Inaction Over Protection Of Wildlife Habitats

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy, Austin that todate, there has been no indication of Government's inaction in the lawful protection of Irish wildlife habitats and endangered wildlife species.

The Dungarvan TD has raised this particular issue on numerous occasions in the Dail and found his views to be fully backed up by a recent article in the 'Irish Independent' which reported that Ireland has been accused by the World Wildlife Fund of flouting an EU deal to protect wildlife and is already before the EU Court for a breach make it their business that the E land and water inhabitated by endangered animal, bird and fish species.

"The criticism by the European Union of our lack of protection of wildlife bears out my continued criticism of the lack of resources within the relevant Department i.e. Arts, Culture, Heritage & the Islands, for this purpose", stated Deputy Deasy.

He said it was 'an absolute disgrace' that one of the country's most valuable natural resources is being so neglected. Despite continually pointing out to Heritage Minister Síle de Valera about the Government's neglect in this area, Deputy Deasy claimed

Deasy has strongly spoken out against the any positive steps being taken to monitor the destruction of wildlife habitats and the protection of endangered wildlife species.

Referring to the situation in Co. Waterford, Deputy Deasy told the Dail that there is only one Wildlife Ranger available to monitor such activities, in a county which embraces two major mountain ranges together with vast areas of moorland and woodland.

"The Government and the Minister must of the habitats directive aimed at saving tives are adhered to and that the wholesale destruction of habitats is stopped and that endangered species of wildlife are properly protected", he stressed.

Meanwhile the World Wildlife Fund revealed earlier this month that Ireland is seriously dragging its heels on other aspects of the EU legislative package having nominated only a minimal number of wildlife sites (less than 1%) and has incorrectly transposed EU rules into national law. The WWF further maintains that important natural sites are being damaged by road building, over grazing, drainage and other problems.

The former creamery site, he stated, offers a unique opportunity for urban renewal and to change the character of the town.

While he had personally seen the plans put forward by the local consortium, this information he stressed must remain confidential.

Any consortium who acquires the 47 acre site however will have to lodge a planning application for their project with the UDC and will be required to take into account the proposals outlined in the integrated area action plan.

WS AND MARTINS

SWIFTS belong to a different family than the swallows and martins, but they all behave in the same way.

They all have long, swept-back wings and stream-lined bodies. These birds spend most of their time in the air, catching flying insects in their open beaks. A lot of species travel thousands of

miles north from Africa and South America to breed in Europe and North America.

Instead of making loads of trips while they are feeding their young, swifts collect a few hundred insects in their throats. They then take this food ball back to the nest.

To stop flying dust getting into their eyes, they are set deep in their heads. When swifts land, they cling to a standing surface such as a wall or tree. Swifts climb with their toes pointing forwards and take off by just dropping down into the

> They have been known to fly up to 95 kph, and have no problems escaping from birds of

prey such as hawks. They tuck their small legs into their feathers. Swifts can hardly walk because their legs are weak.

They are believed to sleep on the wing and only come down to nest chamber at the end. nest. To make its nest, the common palm swift sticks feathers and plant materials together with spit on a palm leaf. The eggs are then cemented into the cup-shaped nest.

Sand martins scrabble with their toes in sandy banks to scoop out their nests. The tunnel is usually about a metre long and has a little

Swallows build their nests in buildings. They make them on a beam or rail. Swallows make pellets out of mud and build these up into a

Birds in the garden

In winter, birds need all the help they can get when it comes to food and shelter. And by helping them, you can turn your garden into a hive of activity by following a few simple steps

The best way to feed birds is with a bird table. Not only can it be an attractive feature in your garden, but it can also act as an essential food source for your feathered visitors. Bird tables can be easily made from wood and simply consist of a pole in the ground with a flat section at the top.

The most likely types of birds to expect are starlings, house sparrows, blackbirds, blue tits, great tits, thrushes, mag-Another popular method of feeding is by using a nut feeder. This is simply a cage

full of nuts which hangs from the branch of a tree. It is important to separate old food from new food as this can cause diseases. There are a variety of foods you can offer garden birds. Sunflower seeds peanuts, coconut and bird seed mixture are all popular.

The cheapest and most convenient way to feed birds is by offering any leftovers from your fridge or larder. Bread, pastry, rice, oats, fat, bacon rind, cheese and potatoes will be welcomed by the local bird community - along with just about anything else you don't

Like any other animals, birds need drinking water. A bird bath is ideal as it can supply birds drinking and bathing. Never put anti-freeze in the water as this is highly poisonous to birds.

450g lean beef, lamb or pork, cubed

400g can chopped tomatoes 300ml stock

74g red or green lentils

Melon Appetiser Is A Real Pleaser

A LIGHT and refreshing melon appetiser to impress guests.

Ingredients:

Serves 4-6 DRESSING:

> 2 x 5ml sp wholegrain mustard 1 egg yolk

1 x 15ml sp white wine vinegar

4 x 15ml sp walnut oil

2 x 15ml sp groundnut oil Salt and pepper

SALAD:

1 small melon (preferably Charentais or cantaloupe) 1-2 bunches watercress 100-175g baby spinach leaves 2 x 15ml olive oil 1 lemon Salt and pepper

Method:

For the dressing, whisk together over before serving.

the mustard, egg yolk and vinegar. Mix the oils together and pour slowly on to the mustard mixture whisking vigorously. The oils will emulsify with the mustard, giving you a loose, mayonnaise-style dressing. Season with salt and pepper.

For the melon salad, cut the melon in half and remove seeds. With a melon baller, scoop the flesh into balls (alternatively, wedges or large dice), then place in the fridge. Wash the watercress and spinach. Mix the olive oil with a squeeze of lemon juice and season.

When ready to serve, mix the melon with the salad leaves. Add some of the mustard seed dressing to give a light coating and divide between four plates or bowls.

Trickle a little more mustard seed dressing around, then pour a little of the olive oil/lemon juice over before serving.



For topping, slice 6-8 apricot halves thinly, overlap around tops of pies, Dust with icing sugar and flash under grill. For glaze, simmer jam for 2-3 mins with 4-6 x 15ml sp apricot syrup, to a coating consistency. For a richer, thicker glaze, dice any remaining apricot halves, add to the jam and syrup. Serve pies, glaze poured over, with custard or cream.

Waterford Archaeological & Historical Society

The next lecture of the Society will take place at City Hall at 8 p.m. on Friday, March 19. Mr. David Pollock will speak on the subject of Dungarvan Castle in the light of recent excavations.

'Fenianism In Waterford' was the title of a recent lecture given by Waterford born Dr. Pat McCarthy who was educated at Mount Sion and National University of Ireland. A prolific researcher and writer on Fenianism, he is Hon. Correspondence Secretary of the Irish Military History Society.

Dr. McCarthy describes the Fenians as a secret, military, mainly urban based Nationalist movement whose base in this region was Waterford City, Dungarvan and Cappoquin. His talk was wide ranging but it must be said that he has a very special interest in the Dungarvan born Fenian leader, James Francis Xavier O'Brien (1828-1905) who had a rather colourful career. O'Brien, who studied in St. John's College, Waterford later studied medicine, then emigrated to the U.S.A. where he spent some time in the Confederate Army before returning to Ireland where he became deeply involved with Fenianism. He was sentenced to be hanged, drawn and quartered for his part in the attack and capture of Ballyknockin R.I.C. Barracks. This sentence was later commuted to life imprisonment and in 1869 he benefited from Prime Minister Gladstone's amnesty. In the 1870's he became disillusioned with physical force as a means to achieve Irish aims and entered constitutional politics. He became Nationalist M.P. for South Mayo and was later M.P. for Cork City until his death in 1905.

It is Dr. McCarthy's wish that some day the people of his native Dungarvan might do something to honour the memory of this illustrious Fenian.

Rhubarb -It's Not A Problem!

RHUBARB is all too often a forgotten plant in the corner of the garden, but look again, it's an ideal plant for any gardener, beginner or pro.

This easy-to-grow vegetable will crop heavily and regulary over a long period of time with the minimum of fuss and bother.

Until recently the choice of rhubarb varieties was very limited

Confined to a handful of established varieties developed before the Second World War, commercial designers only began to take an interest in the early 70's.

The Stockbridge House Experimental Horticultural Station near Selby in Yorkshire was responsible for introducing several of the popular varieties of today, many of which have names which include the words Stockbridge and/or Cawood.

The traditional 'Victoria' was replaced on commercial holdings by the 'Stockbridge Arrow' which can be grown outdoors and the 'Cawood Delight' which can be grown outdoors, but is not a very heavy cropper.

Rhubarb does not like water-logged land — but it will grow well in almost any other type of soil.

Its ideal location would be in a sunny, open site, with rich,



Often Forgotten: Rhubarb is ideal to grow - with rich crops

Several weeks before planting, dig the ground deeply and ncorporate plenty of garden compost or well-rotted manure.

Never pick rhubarb during the first growing season after planting. In the second season pick over each plant only two or three times. Thereafter pick normally.

When pulling rhubarb, slide a hand down the stem as far as possible and then detach the stalk with a quick, outward

In the off-season (autumn) take off the withered leaves and mulch the area with some good compost or manure. Repeat the procedure annually to help keep the bed in the best possible condition.

A rhubarb plant can produce good crops for 20 years. But ants after teri

The only pest likely to affect rhubarb is crown rot, this is a bacterial disease which causes the rotting of the terminal bud, and may extend right back to the rootstock. There is no cure for this disease. Affected plants should be dug up and

Never eat the leaves of rhubarb plants as they contain oxalic acid and are poisonous.

DON'T WANT FINAL SAY IN PLANNING

A proposal put forward by Cllr. Ciaran O Riain that the Council support legislation to give elected representatives the final say in granting planning permission failed to win the support of fellow Council members at last week's meeting.

Cllr. O Riain felt that planning powers should be given to elected representatives 'so long as they wouldn't be abused' but stressed that he had no axe to grind with the County Council's planning section.

His proposal however failed to secure a seconder with Cllr. Paddy Kenneally stating that he would be totally opposed to councillors having the final say in planning permission. Very few members, he added, know much about the granting of planning permission and overall he did not think that the local authority could get a better system of dealing with planning matters than it had at present.

Arts **Grants Approved**

County Council members have this month approved of the 1999 arts grants scheme totalling £4,050 recommended by County Arts Officer Margaret Fleming. Various drama groups to receive £200 towards specific productions are Lismore Dramatic Society, Modeligo Dramatics, Balli-Aglish nameela Dramatics, Dungaryan Drama Club and Ballyduff Drama Group.

A sum of £300 has been allocated for a summer series of classical concerts in St. Carthages Cathedral, Lismore while £200 has been set aside each for a December concert of the Blackwater Singers and the Cork Symphony Orchestra as well as a June concert of the Lismore Choir with a visiting choral group from England.

Ardmore Enterprise Coop which ran a successful painting weekend in Ardmore last year will receive £300 to coordinate a similar weekend later this year. A grant of £100 will be made available to Childers Estate community playgroup and Moveable Youth, Young Traveller Group in Dungarvan for the provision of arts materials.

A number of festivals will also benefit from the arts grants. These include the annual Feile na nDeise in Dungarvan over the May bank holiday weekend which has been allocated £750. Following on from the success of last year's street theatre, this year a reenactment of an eviction scene will take place in Grattan Square.

Daonscoil na Mumhan in Ring has been awarded £200 to maintain additional art workshops using local artists.

DISPOSAL OF PROPERTY

The County Council has this month disposed of 0.135 acres of land at Deerpark, Ballymacarbry to Daniel Desmond for a sum of £750 while 0.44 hectares has been disposed of at the Old Quarry site, Callaghan Bridge to John Noonan, Grantstown Village for a sum of £27,000.

Local Projects In Planning **Process**

Last month the County Council gave the official go ahead to Tallow GAA Club for the construction of dressing rooms, meeting rooms and an indoor sports arena at Townspark East, Tallow.

Planning permission was also granted in February to Malik Chohdri for a camping/touring caravan site, incorporating 40 touring including 3 static pitches, and associated facilities, effluent treatment plant and amenity building at Coolbeggan East, Knock-

Two separate planning applications lodged by Waterford & Tramore Racecourse Company Ltd. were also approved by the Council last month. The company can now change the existing 'Owners & Trainers Bar' at the racecourse to a public bar while occasional uses can be made of the race course to include markets, trade shows exhibitions, agricultural shows and point to point race meetings.

Elsewhere, an application by Páidí Breathnach for the erection of a restaurant at Baile na nGall Mor in Ring has been granted full planning permission while additional information is being sought by the Council regarding an application by Pinewood Healthcare Ltd., Ballymacarbry for the conversion of the first and second floors in the existing Old Mill building near the factory to office use.

Further information is also being sought regarding a planning application by the Respond Housing Association for the construction of 30 houses and a community building at Ballyheeny, Clashmore.

PUBLIC LIGHTING PROPOSALS

Twenty requests have been received by the Council for the provision of public lighting in various communities around the county. That's according to the Co. Engineer John O'Flynn who was responding to a notice of motion put down at last week's meeting by Chairperson Nora Flynn that the Council carry out a public lights service in Modeligo from the church to the community hall where a car park has been provided by the local community.

Mr. O'Flynn said he was waiting on the ESB to get back with a list of quotations for the projects after which he would submit a detailed report of public lighting proposals for the coming year to members.

SITE PURCHASED

Following on from a query raised by Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair at last week's Council meeting, County Manager Donal Connolly confirmed that the local authority recently acquired eight acres of land in Ardmore. Up to 2 acres of this site will be set aside for industrial use together with a site for a proposed fire station.

Agenda 2000 Proposals were detrimental to the legitimate rights of Ireland. Unfortunately the trend in the negotiations todate on the Commissions proposals both at Heads of State and Heads of Government and at Council level have worsened the prospects as far as Ireland is concerned.

As the representative organisation of Irish family farms, we are strongly of the view that the current proposals on CAP Reform and the very restrictive proposals on the future of Structural Funds are neither just nor acceptable.

COST OF DYING

When a lamb dies at or soon after birth, the loss to the producer is close to the sale value of that lamb. Much of the cost (around 90%) of producing the lamb for sale has been incurred before birth. Also as the ewe premium payments decrease, keeping lambs alive takes on a new significance. Some loss of lambs around lambing time is unfortunately unavoidable in any flock. That said, the level of loss in some flocks is unacceptably high. The majority of lamb deaths are avoidable but it requires effort, constant supervision, sound husbandry, disease prevention and skilled

LAMBING

While the majority of lambings occur between days 146 to 148 of pregnancy, it should be recognised that this gestation can range from 140 - 150 days for certain breeds and individuals. Single lambs are generally carried longer than twins or triplets which tend to be born somewhat prematurely. Also gestation length is influenced by diet quality, the better the quality, the longer the gestation period.

It is important to appreciate that the whole lambing process has evolved over thousands of years and while it may occasionally go wrong, it will proceed normally and without incident for the majority of ewes. Ewes will vary in the time taken to complete lambing. Ewe lambs may take half an hour compared to an hour for older ewes.

Too often lambers assist ewes too soon. If assistance is given too early, the ewe's cervix is unlikely to be dilated and it can result in tearing and damaging. There is an important difference between 'examining' a ewe as against 'assisting' her. As a guide if a ewe has been straining or has been uneasy for an hour or more and there is no sign of a lamb or part of a lamb being visible for some time, she should be examined and assisted if necessary. Always make sure your hands are clean and use plenty of lubrication.

Dairying AVOIDING COW PROBLEMS: MASTITIS

Mastitis will cause untold hardship to man and animal so take steps to prevent:

Clean cubicle bed, yards, passages at least twice per day. Clean out calving box after each calving and do not let urine seep out into the main yard where other cows can drink it. Get rid of or suckle high cell count cows or cows that had mastitis 3-4 times last year. Move the cows into the clean calving area 7-10 days before they are due.

A sensitivity test will identify your most prevalent bug and the best product to kill it.

If the milking machine has not been tested and serviced this year, then you are asking for trouble.

Watch out for residual antibiotics in cows due to late use of dry cow treatment as a mistake could cost you a lot of

MILK FEVER

Milk Fever can be prevented by:

Not feeding calcium rich minerals or meals before calving. Feeding 2 oz. calcined magnesite per cow per day on the silage before calving. Feeding 3-4 oz. of pre-calving mineral right up to calving.

Feeding 80-120 grams of limestone flour immediately after calving and again 12 hours later to cows with a history of milk fever

GRASS TETANY

Grass Tetany will arise at grass and even on silage. Prevent by feeding Magnesium in the meal, on the silage or in the water. Do not depend on licks. **KETOSIS**

Ketosis results in cows going off their food, milking poorly and having sweet smelling breath. It is prevented by: Overfeeding cows in good condition before calving.

Changing from one diet to the next gradually and so take 7-1 0 days after calving to build up to full meals.

If you 'run out' of your own good silage, be vigilant when introducing poorer quality bought in silage. Having constant easy access to the silage face.

Lameness results in thin cows, lower milk yields and poor fertility. It can be prevented by:

Careful introduction of meals after calving

Having good ventilation, clean yard (watch out for very dirty hind legs with scrapes) and not walking cows on rough, damaged yards.

Early use of the Farm Relief Service to look after cows' feet. BULL SALE

It is imperative that all suckler herds which are serious about staying in business in the future produce the top quality stock which the top markets demand. An important first step is that all suckler cows should be breeding from good quality pedigree bulls. Only about 25% have pedigree bulls of any kind at present.

The annual Bull Sale will take place at Dungarvan Mart next Saturday, March 20. This provides an opportunity for local herdowners to buy a quality bull and begin the long slow process of improving the quality of stock produced for sale.



Pig Trade Recovery **Commences But Long Road** To Travel -IFA

Liam Ryan, Chairman of IFA National Pigs & Pigmeat Committee said while it was very positive to see pig prices rising by 4p to 6p per kg. this week it would take a further 20p per kg. to reach a breakeven price.

Mr. Ryan said "This week's increase was the first rise of note that has taken place in pig prices in Ireland since March 1998."

Mr. Ryan added "The average nett price this week is around 74p per kg. but most producers on moderate borrowings need 94p to breakeven. There is a huge mountain to climb before pig farmers reach profitability again."

Based on the most recently available EU prices for weekending February 28, the Irish pig price was 12p per kg. below the EU average and the lowest price bar one in the EU league. The Irish price was 14% below the EU average.



COUNCIL OBJECTS TO FINANCE BILL POWERS

Waterford County Council is to strongly object to measures in the Finance Bill giving powers to the tax authorities to scrutinise small savings accounts.

The Government has already faced strong criticism over the sweeping powers given recently to the Revenue Commissioners to look into company and individual bank accounts without a court order. The Minister for Finance Charlie McCreevy has been lobbied by various organisations to reconsider the Finance Bill package and it is thought that an independent body may be set up by the Government to examine the Revenue's powers.

Speaking at last week's meeting of the Council, Cllr. Ciaran O Riain raised a notice of motion proposing that the local authority object to the Revenue Commissioners new powers with regard to small savings by ordinary members of the public.

People, he stressed, have a right to privacy and the new measures could result in some people withdrawing their savings from banking institutions and keeping it at home which could give rise to increased crime such as break-ins etc.

His proposal was seconded by Cllr. Pat Coffey.

Cllr. Jackie Fahey said that while honest people will have nothing to fear from the new bill, it was essential that the Revenue Commissioners are given the power to investigate the accounts of 'ill gotten gains'.

CONCERN OVER FIRE STATION FUTURE

Concern has been expressed by Tallow Councillor Willie McDonnell over the future of fire stations in Lismore and Tallow.

He recently attended a meeting with Council officials and fire service personnel regarding Tallow fire station where it was revealed that the plans and costings for a new station in the Brideside town drawn up 2 years ago had been refused by the Department of the Environment and that subsequent plans for a smaller station had also failed to get approval. Expressing his disappointment at the Department's response, Clir. McDonnell stressed the need to upgrade the existing stations at Tallow which employs 6 staff as well as Lismore and Cappoquin which employ 8 staff members.

The meeting was also attended by Council Chairperson Nora Flynn and Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson who said there would be 'ferocious' opposition to any attempts by the Dept. to take away the station in Tallow.

The Dept. has now requested the Council to undertake a review of all the existing fire stations in the county.

County Manager Donal Connolly has asked the Chief Fire Officer to draw up a report on existing stations and indicate where improvements are needed. He stressed that no decision has yet been made by the Department regarding the future of any fire station in the county.

The Boys From Loughmore

The recent publication of Joan Sandford-Kirby's book "Down Memory Lane" has prompted a native of Loughmore, Dungarvan (now called Congress Villas), Seosamh O Mathuna to put pen to paper to recall some of his memories of his birthplace. Seosamh, who has been domiciled in London for most of his life (he describes Joan's book as excellent), has put down in verse his recollections of the younger and older boys who lived in Loughmore from the mid thirties to 1945. Called "The Loughmore Boys" it is intended as a tribute to the families who lived there during that time. He tells us that Loughmore was built in 1934 so this is its 65th anniversary. Photos of the same period show some of the people who live in Loughmore at the time. A second poem describes Seosamh's memories of the Fair Days in Dungarvan around 1941 or 1942.



LISMORE SOCCER NOTES

On Sunday last at the Castle Farm grounds Lismore concluded their season in the Red House League when they were defeated by Blackwater Rangers 5-4 in the second round of the Dungarvan Tyre Centre Cup.

This was a disastrous result for Lismore. The second division conceded home advantage and this surely should have been the spur Lismore needed.

The game had just kicked off and the visitors were a goal ahead when a desperate defensive error left Lismore a goal down after just 20 secs., probably the quickest goal ever scored in league game or cup game in Lismore. Within ten minutes Lismore were level when a defence splitting pass found Mick Ormonde who equalised. The visitors equalised after 25 mins. A minute later man of the match, Caimen Radley had the visitors in front again. Five goals scored in 26 mins. On 36 mins. Paul Prendergast equalised with a brilliant free-kick from 25 yds. This was the half-time score - three goals each.

Ten minutes into the sec-

ond half Veale had Lismore in front for the first and only time in the game. At this stage Lismore were on top but lack of experience in defence saw Radley fouled in that area and from the spot kick Blackwater equalised. With just five minutes remaining, another defensive mistake gave the visitors their winning goal and Lismore made their exit from a competition that once belonged to Lismore.

When this game is analysed Lismore can only blame themselves for this defeat. A defence that leaked like a sieve while the forwards, scoring four goals, enough to win most games should have scored more. Lismore's best player was Paul Prendergast at midfield but the supply from himself and Michael Caples was constantly wasted.

Tribute To Mary Willoughby

Difficult though it is to believe, we write with deep regret of the recent passing of Mary Willoughby, late of Main Street, Lismore. Mary spent her last hours at the Regional Hospital in Waterford and passed peacefully away early on Friday afternoon on February 26, 1999.

Mary, or as she was better known to some of us, Auntie Mary, formed one half of an almost legendary and inseparable duo, the other half being her sister Nora. Mary shared a house and home with Nora for seventy four years of her life, longer than any married couple. To Nora especially go our deepest sympathies, along with her brothers Cornelius and James, her sisters-inlaw Joan and Nancy and to all her many nephews and nieces, grandnephews and grandnieces. There are too many to mention here, all of them precious to Mary. She regarded them all as her own.

To those of us who knew Auntie Mary and were familiar with her sharp mind and even sharper wit, the last twelve months have been particularly hard to bear as we watched her physical frailties gradually overcome her indomitably good spirits. Sisters-in-law Joan and Nancy were a real support to both Mary and Nora during that period. Yet only as recently as Christmas, amidst flu-stricken relatives, her good humour always shone through ... "Sure this is great craic, we're having a coughing competition."!

There were so many facets to Auntie Mary's life, it is hard to know where to start. First and foremost she was Lismoreian (of which she possessed an encyclopaedic knowledge). In the words of Fr. Walsh, woe betide anyone who chanced to call her beloved hometown a village rather than the Cathedral Town.

She was one of the founding members of the Lismore Dramatic Society and of Lismore Golf Club of which she became an Honorary member a couple of years back. Anyone who has seen her navigate the golf course could not but admire the efficiency involved and her many trophies will testify to that. She produced a newspaper clipping recently of a later competition victory and with that twinkle in her eye and a wink added "Not bad for an auld one, eh?"

Another image of Auntie Mary that will live in the mind's eye is of her taking off down the Green Road (one of her favourite walks) with her two dogs, a spring in her step, a golf hat perched on her head, a walking stick in her hand and an ever ready smile on her face. She was also a great woman for the cards, to which her Bridge partners will no doubt testify. She got such a kick too out of the family games of poker and 45 at

Not a day would go by but she would be across to the bookies office for a flutter on the horses, with no other form guide than to pick the horse which had a nephew's or grandniece's name in it. Many a 'David's Way', 'My Abbie' or 'Just Ben' were the subject of a ten pence flirt down through the years.

Auntie Mary sang regularly in the church choir too. She would have been proud of the choir's participation in her funeral Mass last Sunday, February 28 in Lismore Church and officiated by Fr. Walsh, who was assisted by Canon Nugent and Canon Queally (of the Modeligo Parish).

It is hard to appreciate how thoughtful and kind Auntie Mary was to everyone. Although her wit was sharp, yet her little Christian gestures were so subtle and understated. Who will ever know how many £20 notes were quietly slipped into the needful hand, whether it was a nephew returning to college or whatever cause she deemed worthy? There were many causes. She did not keep count.

True to say too that Auntie Mary's apple tart was renowned and a powerful tool in ensuring that every priest that ever came to Lismore was made immediately welcome. None more so than Fr. Walsh, who became a special friend to Auntie Mary in her latter years, and who spoke so movingly of his memories of her during her funeral Mass. Including her great love of animals and her absolute abhorrence at any sign of cruelty to any living creature.

Knowing Auntie Mary and the way she was, I'm sure she was looking down over us all during the last few days and muttering to herself "Sure what are ye all fussing about, didn't I have a great life ?" And she did have a great life.

But we were fussing about you, Auntie Mary, because we loved you. And we always will. You touched each and everyone of us in your own special way, you will forever live on in our memories.

Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce News

There was more good news on the jobfront for Dungarvan during the week with the recent announcement that the IBAL Advance Factory is to be located in Dungarvan. This decision is very much welcomed by the the Chamber as it represents a major vote of confidence in Dungarvan, particularly as the IDA and County Manager are currently involved in serious discussion with an industrialist who is most interested in occupying this unit. Although no guarantee exists that these discussions will have a successful outcome, the fact that this individual has already short-listed Dungarvan as a potential location must surely augur well for the future as it pin-points the town as an attractive and lucrative area in which to invest and do business.

If this industry does come to the town, it has the potential to create in excess of 100 high quality long-term sustainable jobs which will have a tremendous impact on the local economy. Even if these particular negotiations do not bear fruit, there is certainly no reason to believe that a similar project will be not found in the short-term, the Chamber is very confident that we will not see a repeat of the situation which existed with the previous Advance Factory, whereby it took 2 years to identify a suitable industry.

The town of Dungarvan has progressed so rapidly (in economic terms) in the past 3-5 years and given the level of investment which is envisaged in the next 3-5 year period in terms of the AWG site, the Urban Renewal Scheme and the Infrastructure that it now compares very favourably with neighbouring towns and

Much of the thanks for this development is due to the existing businesses and the ordinary people of the county for taking up the challenge thrown down by IBAL, i.e. to become more environmentally aware and to rid the county of unsightly litter. However a special word of thanks is due to our County Manager, Donal Connolly, for the level of commitment he has shown since this possibility came our way. He has been single-minded in his determination that this opportunity would not not be allowed to by-pass the county and he has proven that given sufficient effort, anything can be achieved. The IDA and the AWG Task Force have a

major role to play from here on in to attract a suitable industry and we in the Chamber have great faith in their combined efforts,

In mentioning Advance Factories, I would be failing in my duties if I did not take this opportunity to officially welcome Century Homes Ltd. to the town. Century Homes Ltd. is a home-grown indigenous industry which manufactures prefabricated housing for both the domestic and export markets. It has established an unrivalled reputation in it's field and it continues to take an ever-increasing share of the market, particularly in Northern Europe and Scandinavia where this form of housing is the norm. It's M.D. - Mr. Gerard McCaughey is typical of the Irish business entrepreneur in that he spotted an opening in the market and he went after it with such determined single-mindedness that he now heads up a major exporting business. Mr. McCaughey sees great room for growth in the domestic market, once he can overcome the Irish mentality that everything must be constructed of 'bricks and mortar. Given his level of success to date, the Chamber is fully convinced that before too long every second house in the country will be of timber-frame construction. We wish Mr. McCaughey and his company a very long, prosperous and profitable future with us here in Dungarvan.

As a follow-up to the Chamber's submission to An Taoiseach Mr. Bertie Ahern T.D., the Minister of State at the Dept. of Finance, Mr. Martin Cullen T.D. attended our March board meeting. 

Calling All Young Europeans!!

In response to the recent call from the European Commission for proposals to support communication schemes to advance the EU's information campaign "Building Europe Together", the Carrefour and Info Point Europe networks in Ireland including the South East Carrefour in Dungarvan have put together such a proposal.

The objective of this project, which will be carried out in partnership with the respective host organisations and the Commission Representation in Ireland, is to disseminate information as widely as possible on the EU, both before and after the Millennium. Mike Murphy Launches First Ever Waterford Music Report

The needs of music in Waterford were directly addressed by music, education, arts, community and business representatives at Monday's eagerly awaited launch of the Waterford Music Report by RTE broadcaster Mike Murphy. This significant document representing the first ever detailed analysis of music in Waterford city and county, has been compiled by Music Network, the ESB sponsored national music development organisation, and Waterford Music City & County, a body representing musicians, education and community development groups throughout Waterford city and county. Its publication follows a two year widespread consultation process involving close to 700 individuals, groups and organisations.

In his address, John O'Kane, Chief Executive, Music Network highlighted the report's emphasis on the urgent need for networking between musicians organisations, musicians, communities and schools, advanced training and employment opportunities for musicians in Waterford, greater training and resources for music teachers at both primary and secondary levels, a peripatetic music tuition service for schools and communities on both the city and county and special support mechanisms for people with disabilities and for communities currently excluded due to socio economic and geographical reasons.

Exciting challenges remain to be realised and these will be discussed at specially convened public fora for the city and county respectively. The Waterford County Forum takes place on Saturday, March 27 in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan from 2 to 5 p.m. This will bring the report back to the communities and groups from which it emerged in order to investigate their participation in the implementation of the proposed plan. Admission is free for all interested parties. The time is now for consolidating Waterford's musical future.





RAY McCONNELL'S **UNIQUE RECORD** ATTEMPT

On Friday next, March 26 a remarkable record attempt will take place along the lonely road between Cappoquin and Villierstown. Starting at 9 p.m. local ultra distance runner Ray McConnell will run right through the night in an effort to set a new Irish record for a 100 mile road run. Ray already holds the 100 mile track record so if he can add the road equivalent to his achievements, it will indeed be a unique 'double'

There cannot be many people in West Waterford who have not heard of Ray McConnell. His long distance solo runs for a host of charitable causes in the locality and beyond have made him something of a sporting celebrity. These runs have ranged from a relative 'canter' of 50 miles to a more mind-boggling 142 mile run from Dublin to Dungarvan a few years back.

Ray has been running consistently for over 17 years now and estimates that he has clocked up well over 63,000 miles since then - the equivalent of more than two and a half times around the globe! He has represented Ireland in ultra distance running on eight occasions in five different countries. Yet Ray's proudest achievement to date must be completing the world famous Athens -Sparta race in September 1997. This 155 mile event had twice thwarted him in the past through dehydration and injury but it was certainly a case of 'third time lucky' two years ago.

Several factors have currently conspired to bring about Ray's record attempt on March 26. Ray felt he needed a goal to aim at during the long winter training runs. At the same time, through his work as physical trainer to the Cappoquin/Affane G.A.A. teams last year, he came to realise that a camogie club was being started in Cappoquin and that funds would be a priority. Hence came the idea of doing the record attempt for the Cappoquin Camogie Club.

For a small contribution, anyone can guess how long it will take Ray to complete the 100 mile run and all cards must be in before the run commences. Ray's track best stands at 17 hours 41 minutes exactly, while the current road record is held by Eddie Harrison of Portmarnock at 17 hours 19 minutes and 56 seconds.

The choice of March 26/27 as the date for the run was inspired by the fact that it will then be twenty years since that famous day in Limerick when John Treacy won his second World Cross Country title. Thus it seemed appropriate to celebrate John's achievement by running along what was his old training route when attending school at St. Anne's, Cappoquin. On this occasion the five mile distance between Villierstown and Cappoquin has been precisely measured to ensure that it meets Irish record requirements. To run 100 miles, Ray McConnell will have to do the round trip ten times and hopes to finish sometime in the early afternoon on Saturday at the square in Cappoquin.

Ray has received the best wishes in his efforts from John Treacy himself, who unfortunately will have to be in Belfast that weekend for the 1999 World Cross Country Championships. Nevertheless a large crowd is expected in Cappoquin at 9 p.m. on Friday, March 26 to see Ray off and hopefully to see a new Irish record set by the following afternoon. R.T.E.'s "Nationwide" team intend to broadcast a special feature on Ray's record attempt between 7 p.m. and 7.30 p.m. on the Friday night of the run and radio coverage of proceedings will also ensure that the spotlight will be well and truly on this remarkable athlete. We all wish him well.

TRIATHLON CORNER

Week 3 — As mentioned from Week 2, the longest leg of nearly all triathlons is the bike section. After the swim you will probably have your singlet, helmet, cycling shoes and/or runners (cycling shorts, socks and a jersey are again up to the individual competitor) and of course the all important sunglasses beside or on your bicycle. When you're ready to start, you will be told to walk to a certain spot and mount your bike there. Only then may you begin cycling.

Before the start take time to see which way the bike section goes i.e. whether it's straight out and back or does it take you around in a circle. There is always a briefing before the race so listen up to whoever is giving it because if you get lost you only have one person to blame (the person you're cycling behind).

The Bike — Racers are the best bicycle when doing a triathlon as they have narrower wheels than mountain bikes. So if you don't want to feel as though you're carrying a tank around underneath you, an investment in any type of racer is always a good buy. Try to go for one that has no mudguards or carrier on it.

First Event — Well it's official ladies and gentlemen. The first triathlon of the year is the Joey Hannon Memorial. It will be held in Limerick at St. Enda's Pool. The race will consist of a 1km (pool) swim, 32km cycle and an 8km run. For more information and if interested in starting up a Triathlon Club, phone Eoin O'Riordan on (058) 44824.
