The campaign was organised by the Comeragh Community Development Group, with assistance from Waterford County Council and marks their participation in National Spring

Clean, 1999.

Over 300 people braved the inclement bank holiday weather and divided into numerous groups organised by team leaders to clean up various areas of the scenic Comeraghs.

The anti-litter blitz has gained widespread support from volunteers and groups all over the county and has proved to be highly effective in promoting anti-litter awareness among the public. The campaign won the County Council's Best Environmental Project of the Year for the last 2 years and also scooped the March AIB Bank/Waterford News & Star monthly community award.

Each year hundreds of volunteers take part in the Comeragh clean up collecting everything from household appliances dumped in fields, abandoned car wrecks and all types of rub-

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

Would you explain what is meant by tax credits? I am a PAYE worker and a little confused by the new system.

Tax credits are being introduced in order to promote greater equity in the tax system. At present tax free allowances are worth considerably more to higher rate taxpayers than to those who pay tax at the standard rate. The standard rating of allowances will mean that they have equal value for all taxpayers.

The new tax year starts on April 6, 1999 and it is intended that tax credits will gradually replace tax free allowances. The first steps are being taken this year with the introduction of standard rating for personal tax allowances. The effect of standard-rating is that even if you pay the higher tax rate (46%) on your income, you will only be allowed to claim tax allowances at the standard rate (24%).

This will lead to an actual decrease in the value of taxfree allowances for those people who have, until now, been able to effectively claim allowances at 46% but the standard rate tax bands have been widened to compensate those on the higher rate of tax.

The tax year 1999/2000 is an interim period during which a combination of both systems is in operation and this may cause confusion to some taxpayers.

Minister Launches Spring "Clean Up"

This year the campaign coincides with the National Spring Clean which is a national anti-litter awareness and actions initiative promoted by An Taisce with financial support from the Department of the Environment and Local Government and commercial sponsorship from Coca Cola Bottlers and Wrigleys Ltd. Its primary aim is to encourage people and groups from all walks of life to take part in cleaning up their local environment.

Speaking at the launch of the Clean Up The Comeraghs on Monday, Minister Wallace said: "Local partnerships must be at the core of our efforts to combat litter - we simply cannot expect local authorities to deal with the problem on their own. A clean environment benefits everyone therefore we must all play our part to keep our locality litter free."

The launch was also attended by Waterford Co. Manager Donal Connolly and Council Chairperson Nora Flynn as well as the County Engineer John O'Flynn and local public representatives.

The Minister commended the Comeragh Community Development Group on their initiative to clean up the Comeragh Mountains. 



DUNGARVANI FARES ---

PIGS can be kept indoors or outdoors. Pigs that are used for breeding are usually kept in fields where they can run about son and search for food, although the farmer will also feed them. They are strong and healthy because they are so active.

Pigs that are kept for meat (pork, bacon and ham) are kept in pens. The farmer can keep their diet controlled. They eat wheat, barley, potatoes, corn, fish meal and skimmed milk. Because the pigs are enclosed, they do not use much energy and become fat. Their bristles are made into brushes.

Domestic pigs are bred from the wild boars that used to roam the woodlands. Their diet consisted of acorns,

roots and worms which they dug out of the soil with their snouts. The boars only joined females for the mating sea-

Pigs live outdoors in areas provided for them by the farmer. The area is usually fenced in with a shelter, drinking trough and a feeder, so the pigs have all they need. Pigs cannot sweat, so in hot weather they wallow in wet mud and sleep stretched out to cool themselves. They are very clean ani-

They sleep in a place where it is warm and dry and go to the toilet in a different area. Pigs will root for food in the ground no matter how well fed they are. To stop this from happening the farmer usually puts a metal ring through the pigs nose.

The pigs that live indoors, live in an area called a piggery. A female pig is called a sow and she can produce more than two litters a year. These litters consist of about fourteen piglets.

Young female pigs are called gilts and are first mated at the age of eight months. They are sometimes mated with a boar from a different breed to produce cross-bred pigs, which sometimes grow faster and are often healthier than pure-bred pigs.

The gilts give birth 16 weeks after mating, the process is called farrowing. A few days before a sow is due to farrow, the farmer puts her into

a farrowing pen, where he puts down straw, which the sow paws into a heap. If a sow has to give birth outside, she finds a hollow and lines it with chewed-up leaves and straw.

Sows give birth mostly at night. a few hours before the birth the sow lies down and loudly grunts and squeals. Before the birth of each piglet, she swishes

the piglet out. As soon as the new piglets are born, they stagger around until they find a teat to suck milk

her tail and may kick

and lift her leg to help force

from. The temperature of the udder is high and the piglets huddle around it


for heat as well as for food. When the piglets are born, they are enclosed in a birth sac from which they have to free themselves or else suffocate. The farmer puts up an infra red light which provides heat for the piglets and this keeps them away from the sow as she is recovering. They only go near her for milk.

The sow is kept in a farrowing crate to help keep her gilts safe as she lies down. The piglets meanwhile feel cold and huddle under the light with their limbs tucked under their bodies.

After a week the farmer gives them sweet food, which are first they play with but soon learn to eat. The last piglet born is often so small that it cannot survive. It is known as the "runt."

REVENUE COMMISSIONER OFFICE IN DUNGARVAN

The Revenue Commissioners have decided to open a local office in the new civic office complex currently nearing completion at Davitt's Quay, Dungarvan. The Revenue facility will include a vehicle registration office and a customer service and local collection unit.

It will be staffed from existing resources by two executive officers and two clerical officers and will be under the management of the Collector of Customs and Excise, Government Buildings, Waterford.

The Revenue Commissioners pending move to Dungarvan was announced in the Dail recently by the Minister for Finance Charlie McCreevy. Minister McCreevy was responding to a question tabled by Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy.

It is understood that the Commissioners have decided on this move as part of their general policy of providing services locally and directly to the taxpayer whenever possible. The new office will provide people in the town and surrounding areas with enhanced customer services, including an on-the-spot facility to register new and used cars on payment of vehicle registration tax.

ROAD MARKINGS & SIGNS AT BALLINAMEELA

Waterford County Councillor Willie McDonnell has recently received confirmation from the County Engineer that the existing signs at Ballinameela School are to be replaced as soon as feasible.

Following an investigation of the area by Council Engineer Ann Kiely, it was also agreed that road markings will be put in place as soon as the white lining crew are in the Ballinameela area.

PUBLIC LIGHTING IN KILMAC'

An order has now been issued by the County Council to the ESB to proceed with improvements to the public lighting system at Kilmacthomas.

In a recent communiqué to Waterford FG Deputy Austin Deasy, Co. Engineer John O'Flynn said the work includes the replacement of existing defective mercury lights and the erection of new lights at a number of locations in the town. An extra light is being provided near the national school, 3 additional lights towards Newtown and 4 extra lights towards Dungarvan as far as the entrance to Hillside Crescent.

UDARAS OFFICE IN RING

The Board of Udarás na Gaeltachta has agreed to explore the possibility of establishing a satellite office in the Ring Gaeltacht. Representatives of the Rinn and Sean Pobail communities met with the Board in Dungarvan and discussed various issues relating to the economic and social development of the Waterford Gaeltacht.

DUNGARVAN ROADWORKS FOR COMING YEAR

Dungarvan UDC has been allocated a total of £185,000 towards this year's roadworks programme. The roundabout at Crotty's Corner, which was included in last year's programme, is due to be completed this year at a cost of £22,000. Traffic calming measures to facilitate pedestrians at Grattan Square, Mitchel Street and Ard Scoil na nDeise will also be undertaken as well as pedestrian crossing facilities at the Causeway and Grattan Square. In the case of the crossing at the Causeway, the existing traffic lights will be adjusted to include a pedestrian 'Green Man' phase.

Among the footpaths to be upgraded are parts of Silversprings, Springfield, Keating Street, Davitt's Quay, Parklane and Bridge Street. It is understood that the next area of the town in line for cobblelocking is Mary Street.

Surfacing works will be carried out from Lands End to Kyne Park junction at a cost of £44,000, Murphy Place (£15,000) and Wolfe Tone Road (£23,000).

Among the right-of-ways to be tackled this year are St. Garvan's Terrace, Congress Villas East, Congress Villas West, Fitzgerald Terrace, St. Martins Terrace and Congress Villas - Springfield. Special maintenance work will be carried out at a cost of £30,000.



Minty Pea Soup

MOST people keep frozen peas in the freezer - in ten minutes you could be serving up a delicious pea and mint soup as a starter for your guests.

Ingredients:

15g butter 1 x 15ml sp oil 1/2 onion, finely chopped 1 clove garlic, finely chopped 450g frozen garden peas 50ml dry white wine 600ml vegetable stock 6-8 mint leaves, roughly chopped

Method:

Heat the butter and oil in a pan and add the onion.

Gently sauté for one minute, then add the garlic and cook for one more minute. Add the peas and the wine.

Turn up the heat, and cook until the peas are nearly defrosted.

Add the stock and season with salt and pepper to taste.

Simmer for ten minutes, then add the mint leaves and liquidise.

If you are serving the soup hot, keep a few whole peas to add character.

Cold soup should be as smooth as possible. To eat cold, leave it in the pan to cool, then chill.

Just before serving, stir in the cream, and adjust the seasoning

Serve with a slice of warm, garlic or herb bread.

TIP: This dish is great as a vegetarian dish or as a starter before a meaty meal. Try experimenting with a variety of herbs instead of mint - tarragon and rosemary work well.

Rich Coffee Cake

UNASHAMEDLY rich Austrian coffee and walnut cake with coffee cream.

Ingredients:

(Serves 8)

11/2 x 15ml sp instant coffee -75g walnut halves 175g self-raising flour 11/2 x 5ml sp baking powder 175g softened butter 175g golden caster sugar 3 large eggs

For the syrup: 15ml espresso coffee powder 50g demerara sugar 55ml boiling water

For the filling and topping: 15ml espresso coffee powder 1 x 15ml sp golden caster sugar 10 walnut halves from cake 250g Mascarpone

Method:

Toast all the walnuts on a baking

200ml low-fat fromage frais

sheet in a preheated oven for 7-8 mins. Reserve 10 halves for the topping and chop the rest.

Sieve the flour and baking powder into a bowl.

Add all the other ingredients (except the coffee and walnuts) with 2 x 15ml sp boiling water and whisk everything together until smooth.

Fold in the coffee and walnuts then divide the mixture equally between two 20cm sandwich tins.

Bake on the centre shelf of the oven for 30 minutes.

For the syrup, mix the coffee, sugar and boiling water together until dissolved.


For the filling and the topping place all the ingredients except the walnuts and blend and chill until needed.

When the cakes are cooked. skewer and spoon over the syrup.

When cool, turn out on to a plate, fill and cover with topping, arrange the walnut halves on top and chill until ready to serve.



How to create a perfect lawn

GRASS to most people is the easiest plant to grow - but the perfect Wimbledon stripe takes a lot of hard work and loving care.

Despite many gallant attempts, most people never achieve a pristine condition lawn. Like so many things, the more effort you put into a lawn the more you get out. Here are a few simple steps to follow set by the lawn experts:

Choose a general fertiliser such as Growmore to use all year round - apply in early April, June and late September.

Treat lawns with weedkiller in May and June.

■ Never try to level an uneven lawn with a heavy roller, and never use a roller when the lawn is wet or very dry.

Follow a calendar of tasks to do throughout the year. In spring, rake out bits of old and dead grass, moss and debris, and lightly roll. In autumn, give a high potassium feed. Spike compacted areas and rake out debris from the

Mow the lawn to a height of three-quarters of an inch, regularly from April through to November.

Traditionally, the best grass to buy is Cumberland seawashed turf - but it does take quite a lot of looking after.

For a hard wearing turf in a family or pet-owning household, buy a turf local to the area.

Laying lawns and turfing are usually best carried out in the autumn on a site well prepared the previous spring.

As for achieving that striped effect - it's actually not that difficult once you have done all the hard work that goes into getting the grass into condition. The elegant stripe is caused by the grass being pushed in opposite directions by the roller at the back of the mower as you mow up and down the lawn.

The best effects are produced by cylinder mowers. After the mower, the most important factor is a good eye. A striped lawn is only smart if the lines aren't wiggly.

AGRICULTURE AND FOOD DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY **DAIRYING: Fertility Plan**

The following is a suggested fertility plan for a farmer starting to bull cows on May 10 -

- On April 15 (25 days before start of bulling) tail paint all cows calved 14 days with red or pink paint.

- Collect your friend (fertility notebook) from the house and record the dates of all heats in the notebook during the next 3 weeks.

- Touch up paint every week but more often in wet

- As well as tail painting, observe the cows at least 3 times daily. 1st: 30 minutes before leaving the field for mornings milking, 2nd: 3 - 4 hours after the mornings milking and 3rd: at 9 -10 p.m. in the evening when up to 30-40% of herd can be bulling.

- When the paint has been removed (indicates she has been bulling with other signs) she can be left with no paint or a change of colour should be used. This could be used to confirm that the heat was true.

- Any cow carrying red paint on May 9 (the day before start of breeding) should be presented to the vet for examination because she has not been bulling.

- The vets' treatment should bring her bulling within 2 weeks. This means she will be bulled during the first 3 weeks of the breeding season. Otherwise it would be 2 - 3 weeks later still.

Is It Worth This Effort?

Yes because 10% of the cows will be calving 4 - 5 weeks later next year if this procedure is not followed. That is worth 20 gallons (£19) per cow in the whole herd and also prevents the calving getting so late that they are culled.

Therefore April 15 (pick your own) is the most important day in April on your farm.

CATTLE

Suckler cows are at high risk from grass Tetany on lush Spring grass. Cold wet weather conditions or ground which received a heavy dressing of potash (K) fertiliser in Spring can all increase the incidence of Tetany. Ensure cows are getting Mg daily either through the water, in meals, or high Mg licks.

Even cows that have calved and are still indoors should receive adequate magnesium daily. Although unusual, several cases of Tetany have been reported in cows that are housed.

AREA AID

All farmers should have received their area aid forms by now. For livestock farmers who have no change in the area farmed from 1998, completing the form is very straightforward.

The net area declared is an extremely important item. This is the area on which stocking rates are calculated for premium purposes. The gross and net forage areas of each land parcel declared in 1998 are pre-printed on your application form. Check that all of your land parcels are included and that the net area of each one is correct. Get the total net forage area by adding the area of each land parcel in column 5. Write the total net forage area on the front of the page and sign it at the bottom. Keep a photocopy. Place the form in the pre-addressed envelope and post it to arrive not later than Friday, April 23. Be sure to obtain a Certificate of Posting from your post office.

Members from the ICMSA South East region met with Glanbia recently. The ICMSA delegation consisted of Tommy Cooke, Mary Kenny, P. J. Malone, James Hennessy (Kilkenny), John Skehan, Milo Murray (Waterford), Michael Kehoe (Wexford), Tim Fitzgerald, Brian Oxley, Danny Cass (Laois), John Hempenstall, John Burke (Wicklow) and John Quigley, Area Officer with ICMSA in the South East region.

The Glanbia team included John Dwyer, Tom Corcoran, Michael O'Reilly, Michael O'Neill, Billy Murphy and John Fitzgerald.

The main issues raised included milk price, restructuring and temporary leasing, milk collection, dairy hygiene, trading - competitiveness and beef.

Overall Mr. Tommy Cooke, who led the ICMSA delegation, said it was a very constructive meeting and both sides discussed very important issues including the future of the dairy sector.

ICMSA put forward a number of proposals on the payment of leasing and restructuring to be phased over three months (June, July and August) thus giving farmers a chance to clear other feeding and fertiliser bills from their April and May milk cheques.



Healing Child Sexual Abuse

Research proves that even mild childhood abuse can produce severe and long-standing psychological change. Post-traumatic stress never had much credence until veterans of the Vietnam conflict forced medical experts to stop blaming the victim and recognise that no matter how well adjusted a person is, if they are subjected to enough stress, they can suffer psychological damage. Prior to Vietnam, veterans who were emotionally disturbed because of their horrific war experiences were labelled weak, cowardly and lacking moral fibre.

It is interesting to note that even the father of psychology, Sigmund Freud made the mistake of disbelieving female patients who claimed sexual abuse by fathers and family friends. He suggested these abuse victims were lying and prone to fantasy. However we have come a long way in our thinking since Freud (he died in 1939). It is my opinion that when in mid-air. a child is sexually abused by the very person he or she relies on for protection, the victim suffers irreparable life-long trauma. Some victims become television addicts as a means of escaping their trauma. Others unfortunately self-mutilate. They inflict physical pain on themselves so that they can escape their great emotional pain. As they cut themselves, they imagine the bleeding draining away their psychological torment. This ritual of

self-mutilation becomes addictive as the physical pain releases the victim from deeply ingrained feelings of powerlessness. Victims feel that although they are in their physical bodies, they have no control over their feelings as they oscillate between reality and fantasy. Many describe this as feeling of looking down at their bodies as if they are suspended

Healing can only occur through the reliving of earlier trauma. This needs to be done in a safe and confidential environemerges. There is a desperate need in ment where all the emotions - anger, fear, guilt, shame - that are buried deep inside can be poured out. 





Wine Club Notes

By AONGHUS WALSH

The third meeting of the year was held in Lawlors Hotel on March 9. A very healthy turnout made for a very enjoyable tasting of wines from California. First up was a Berringer Zinfandel Blush (Rose Wine) 1997 £9.99. This style of wine is very popular in America and indeed it would be more popular here if we had half decent summers as it is the ideal summer's drink on a warm day. A lovely pale pink colour with very low alcohol gives this wine a fresh crisp taste with good light red strawberry fruit characteristics. Being so low in alcohol, we didn't get a huge finish but with this particular style we are not meant to. Overall it was a very good Zinfandel Blush and if good weather and the barbecue season sets in, it is just the bottle to be reaching for! Good wine verdict: 8/10.

Next up came Fetzer Sundial Chardonnay 1997 £8.39. This was chosen because, as a large producer, it consistently gives quality wines with not much deviation of styles but at the same time gives very good examples of Californian Vairitals. A clean refined nose with tropical fruit flavours of apples and citrus fruits. On the palate there is massive ripe fruits combined nicely with subtle use of American Oak giving spicy nuances intermixed with good acidity leaving a well balanced wine with a good firm structure and a long, crisp finish. Verdict: 7 1/2/10.

Next up came Kendall-Jackson Sauvignon blanc 1997 Vintners Reserve £11.99. Again this wine was chosen for a reason. Producing Sauvignon blanc is a trying experience especially in countries with hot, humid climates. At its best in cool climate countries such as New Zealand and the Loire Valley in France, they have no problems producing ripe fruit with zippy acidity for which this grape is famous for. In very hot climates, it tends to be over-ripe with flabby acidity and not very good. This wine was in fact very good as it was grown on the cool coastal vineyards thus ensuring good acidity and ripeness. There was good zippy green fruits like gooseberry which is always associated with Sauvignon and yet the most important thing was that the green fruits were in glorious harmony with the acidity giving a fantastic wine with a great crisp, dry finish that lingered and lingered forever. A great example. Verdict: 9/10. Wine of the night.

The first of the red wines was Talus Cabernet Sauvignon 1994 £6.99. This wine is fantastic value for money. Already five years old, this oak-aged wine has a clear pronounced nose of blackcurrants and bramble fruits with soft oak also coming through. On the palate it is dry and well structured with lots of the above fruit coming through supported with firm tannins which suggests it has a couple of years left in the bottle. It finishes well with a good dry long finish. A superbly well made wine for the price. Verdict: 8 1/2/10. Next up came an old favourite. Again from Fetzer-Eagle Peak Merlot 1997 £8.99. This is a real smoothy. Velvety ripe plums and berries on the nose with careful use of oak give a dangerously seductive aroma which leads onto the palate with the same intensity balanced with just the right amount of acidity and tannins that are evident but not overblown give an enormous wine that has everything

Finally we had a Shiraz from Ironstone Vineyards 1995 £10.99. Again chosen for a reason, that Shiraz is normally produced in Australia and therefore having previously tasted Shiraz, we could compare styles and see how they fare. In fact the description on the back said it all -"Enticing nose of blackcurrant, pepper spice (always associated with this grape variety), cherries and warm plums (ripe plums) yielding to racy flavours of black fruits and a toasted oak finish with a rich aftertaste and finish." We couldn't have put it much better ourselves! All in all a top quality Shiraz well made and worth the price. Verdict: 8

and a great length and finish to boot. Verdict: 8/10.

The blind tasting wine was kindly donated by Patrick McLoughlin who purchased the wine while abroad. I knew the wine so we tested on the rest of the class who, to be fair to them, are coming along in leaps and bounds. Displaying some colour variation, they guessed it was between 2 - 3 years old and possibly a blend as fruit concentration was quite difficult to define. It was in fact a 1996 blend from Che Cluero in Spain called Abadia Retuerta Rivola, not available in Ireland. If it was it would probably be around £10. Incidentally the blend was 60%, Tempranillo + 40% Cabernet. A good wine. Verdict: 7 1/2/10.


Tallow Area Credit Union RECORD BREAKING DAFFODIL DAY





Total betting was up by 11% and attendances were up almost 5% to well over one million people. He added "the new arrangements being put in place to replace the oncourse betting levy should provide a further boost for the industry."

TRAINER AND JOCKEY IN TROUBLE

Trainer Ben Hanbury was fined £1,750 sterling and Irish born rider John Stack suspended for 12 racing days over the running and riding of 'Quiet Millfit' in a Maiden race at Catterick in the north of England last week. In addition 'Quiet Millfit', who finished in 11th spot in a 14 runner field, was banned from running in any race for 40 days from April 7 to May 10 incl.

After a prolonged stewards inquiry Secretary Nick Vigors stated, "It was there for all to see." The stewards considered that jockey John Stack did not make sufficient efforts to put the horse in the race and that the horse was not ridden to obtain the best possible placing.

Trainer Ben Hanbury later ruled out the possibility of an appeal against the fine imposed. Initially the trainer refused to comment on the whole affair but after speaking to jockey John Stack he decided to accept the punishment. He went on to say "it was just one of those things and we live to fight another day."

Mr. Roughan Banim, counsel for the company, informed the court that Patrick Hartney and Patrick Wilmott had placed a place pot wager at Paddy Power's betting shop in Charleville, Co. Cork on a number of races at Cork Track at Mallow on October 10 last. The bet was successful and the two men claimed that they were owed £11,000. Paddy Power's, on the other hand and in accordance with rules displayed in the shop, had calculated the winnings to be just £903.

Counsel for the company stated that the company had offered to have the matter resolved in accordance with its rules at arbitration but the defendants had refused. He said they had picketed the Charleville shop and had threatened to escalate their protest to other shops within the Paddy Power chain.

LOGAL athletics

TRIATHLON CORNER

So you've decided to do your first triathlon but you're a bit worried about the swim because you heard that everyone will be doing the Freestyle whereas you will be doing the Breaststroke. Don't let little things like that bother you. At the start of the race you will be asked to predict your time for the 1km (pool) swim so whatever time you put down will determine what lane you're going to be swimming in. A little word of advice, say a time that is normally faster than you could do but no more than 30 secs. to a minute so if it is possible that you could do the swim in 20 mins. put down a time of 19 mins. just so you won't be held up to much.

You're also a bit worried about the bike. Do I bring a spare tube and pump with me? Do I bring food and a water bottle with me? What about getting the wheel and tyre off, do I bring along a spanner and tyre leavers as well? The answer to all these questions is yes. The spare tube, tyre leavers and spanner (to open the wheel) can be kept in a bag attached to the saddle or frame or alternatively you could sellotape them to the frame along with a little bar of chocolate (not essential) but the most important thing to have on the bike is the water bottle and keep sipping it the moment you get on. This will prevent dehydration later in the race.

You're also a bit worried about the run because you're afraid you might stop in the middle to stretch your legs. If that's what it takes to get you round the course then do so. Walk, even crawl if you have to but when the finish line is in sight, nothing will stop you.

Next week we'll look at a four week training programme for the novice triathlete.

WEEK 6 (Part 1) STRENGTH AND ENDURANCE

In Part 6 of Triathlon Corner we're going to look at the first two weeks of a four week training programme, working specifically on strength and endurance. This type of training will target the cardiovascular system and work on increasing your cardiac output i.e. the ability of the heart and lungs to supply oxygen to the working muscles of the body.

It is this system that gets progressively more efficient over a period of time with regular exercise. (Lung volume only increases by around 5 or 10%). Let us take just the first two weeks of our training programme for the beginner triathlete.

TIP FOR THE WEEK

When training for a triathlon always try to increase the duration of exercise not the intensity. For example build up from 5 to 10 mins. Runs from 30 to 40 mins.

European One Wall Handball Championship '99 **An Outstanding Success**

On visiting the tranquil grounds of St. Augustine's College on Good Friday evening at 6 pm, the only indication of the International invasion to follow was the flying of the 6 National Flags. By nightfall National youth handball teams from France, Holland, Belgium, England and Wales as well as the native Irish gathered to do battle for their respective countries in the traditional One Wall handball courts and to vanquish all opposition in so far as possible

After two days of intense handball competition amid good social interaction off the court the battle was won by the Irish team and the widespread consensus amongst all participants and visitors was that the Dungarvan hosting and running of the Internationals was an all round resounding success.

The European One Wall Handball Championships were officially opened by the Chairman of Dungarvan Urban District Council, Councillor Lar Hart. It was a very colourful and most impressive opening ceremony with the teams and mentors immaculately turned out parading in their national colours behind their respective flags with the music provided by the Dungarvan Pipe Band. The punctuality of this ceremony set the trend for the games and with all participants parading in the gym at 9 am. Tom Keith acted as Master of Ceremonies and the dignatories present Cllr. Lar Hart, Mr. Peter Carter president of the handball council and Fr. Moran principal, eloquently and briefly extended a warm welcome to all players, managers and supporters. Standing in the Friary complex last Saturday morning amongst so many international visitors, one could be justifiably proud of the outstanding facilities so well prepared at this great sporting venue. The attention to detail was a credit to Bro. Finbarr Spring O.S.A. and his organising committee.

The competition proper commenced at 10 am and was confined to the three indoor courts due to inclement weather. Each National team fielded players in the U-19, 16 and 13 grades, and due to their hosting of the competition St. Augustine's College were also allowed to enter a team. The last European One Wall Championship held in Ireland was in Roscommon in 1997 and was an open competition for singles and doubles. St. Augustine's players acquitted themselves with distinction in that championship with two of their number getting to the last 4, with one being narrowly beaten in the final itself. A number of our players who featured in Roscommon lined out over the weekend for St. Augustine's, Kenny Keane captain, Ciaran Shiels, Barry McAndrew and Aidan Russell.

The hosting of these games was a major organisational challenge given that a total of 64 doubles games had to be run off Saturday and it is noteworthy that the immediate past handball students of the college, now in University, shouldered much of the practical organisational responsibilities over the two days being assisted by the younger members of the St. Augustine's Handball Club.

The handballers themselves got down to business straight away and spectators were treated to a great feast of handball. All teams were seeded and it was obvious from early on that every available energy, enthusiasm and commitment was going to be forthcoming from the respective teams to try and lift the overall title. As this was the greatest ever gathering of International youth one wall handballers, there was great interest in the style, skill and speed that the different countries might bring to the game.

It was expected that the Irish national team comprised of Ali Ireland winners in the different age groupings from the 40 x 20 and 60 x 30 games would set a high standard and they certainly did. There was great interest and anticipation to see what type of handball the English team would produce because they also were champion players in their own games known as the "Eton" and "Rugby" codes and for the first time ever players from both games had been brought together and trained as a National team under the management of and national team manager Howard Wiseman. It became obvious from early on that the English had a very well prepared team, superbly fit, particularly good at the overhead lob shots and that they would be serious contenders to lift the title. Wales have a strong association with One Wall Handball and while they certainly produced some lively players, and contested every ace to the last, they fell behind to the stronger teams.

The French teams participation added greatly to the championships as they played with great flair and passion but they seemed to lack the same strength and capacity to kill off shots that the stronger teams had. That they had strong support with them soon became obvious through the whole hearted cheering of their representatives, the sound of French accents and their general participation which added greatly to the colour and atmosphere of the championships. Belgium and Holland found it hard to come to terms with the strength and skill displayed by the stronger teams and fared poorly as regards clocking up scores.

Having secured the hosting of this prestigious championship for 1999, Bro. Finbarr Spring O.S.A. made strong representations that as the host club be allowed enter a team, that given their track record in the 1997 European Open Championships and that the clubs involvement could only add interest and vibrancy at a local level. Following deliberations at an International level their participation was agreed upon and over the weekend the St. Augustine's Club representatives certainly did themselves proud by giving a great account of themselves. At the end of day one the league table was as follows; Ireland 543 pts. England 405 pts. St. Augustine's 400 pts. Wales 289 pts. France 268 pts. Belgium 86 pts. Holland 61 pts.

Following competitions on Saturday the visitors were mainly catered for within the school complex with local live entertainment laid on. It is understood that a great night was had by all.

The championships resumed at 10 am Sunday and thankfully the weather permitted the use of all seven courts indoor and outdoor as a total of 96 singles matches had to be played.

The large attendance witnessed handball at its best with great skill, speed and stamina on weekend both from a handball display. The Irish team, all champions in their own right, managed to keep their lead but were severely tested in several matches particularly by a number of the top English and St. Augustine's players. Given the closeness of the courts, the intensity of play and healthy rivalry, there was a terrific standard of sportsmanship. It is noteworthy that the Irish team had the only female player Lydia Doolan playing under 16 and from

Roscommon. Lydia is an All-Ireland title holder and also won the American open championships in December. She is a most impressive player.

From noon on Sunday there was a general acceptance that the Irish National team would emerge winners of the overall competition. Attention immediately focused on the English National team and on St. Augustine's who were relatively close on the score board. As the afternoon wore on there was a palpable air of tension as supporters gathered around the main score board to collate the latest result of both teams. The English National team with their stronger and more balanced line up edged ahead and at the end of play proved themselves very

deserving runner ups. The final scores at the end of the championships were as follows; Ireland 1153 pts. England 935 pts. St. Augustine's Club 850 pts. France 601 pts. Wales 520 pts. Belgium 163 pts. Holland 148 pts.

The Irish Team Manager, Mark O' Gara from Roscommon expressed himself as being delighted with the win but equally so at the effective and efficient way in which the whole championships were run. He particularly admired the fact that the tournament seemed to be administered by well disciplined and personable young handball club members with no hitches whatsoever, and that while he had attended many championships in America, Belgium and throughout Ireland, the standards prevailing at the St. Augustine's venue was way above anything he had ever experienced.

The English Team Manager Howard Wiseman stated that he was delighted in the way that his players adopted to the one wall game and that it was their first togetherness really in bringing the opposing codes together, "Eton" and "Rugby" and that the and social perspective was a fabulous success. He forecasted that the competition could only go from strength to strength on the International scene.

Kenny Keane, captain of the St. Augustine's team, said he was thrilled with his teams performance and the whole weekend was a great experience.

The weekend was brought to a fitting close on Sunday night at a banquet dinner at St. Augustine's College with a Civic Reception

afforded to the visiting teams and officials and presentation of prizes there after. Councillor Lar Hart, Chairman of the Dungarvan UDC, in addressing the International gathering stated that he hoped all visitors had a thoroughly enjoyable stay and that the Civic authorities in Dungarvan saw it as most important to fully support Championships such as these were International youths gather in top class competition, bringing themselves and other very welcome visitors into the town. He was fulsome in his praise for St. Augustine's College who were always pro-active in seeking out and hosting prestigious National and International events and that they always acquitted themselves with distinction in the running of same. He thanked the youthful gathering for their great participation and wished them well in the future. The Chairman then presented to each of the team managers a specially prepared framed scroll to mark the participation in the championship and their visit to Dungarvan. He also presented a special scroll to Bro. Spring and to Lydia Doolan, the only female participant. The new President of the Irish

Handball Council Mr. Peter Carter discharging his first official function paid glowing tributes to all involved in the weekend and said that what he was witnessed in Dungarvan gave great encouragement for the development of handball both Nationally and Internationally in the years ahead. He particularly thanked Bro. Spring and his youthful committee, some of whom were immediate past pupils for so ably running the championships. He said he had never before witnessed the youth of a single club discharging administrative refereeing and other duties in such numbers and so competently without any fuss or excitement and that he was leaving Dungarvan with several pointers for this three years in Office.

The Irish team were then presented with the magnificent trophy kindly donated by St. Augustine's College and they and all other participants were in turn presented with specially commissioned medals having a Dungarvan and European element to them. Following the presentation ceremony traditional Irish Entertaining dancing and music "Le Cheile" was laid on for the visitors.

All in all the 1999 European One Wall Championships were a tremendous success and the host club St. Augustine's juvenile handball club can take a well deserved bow for showing remarkable cohesion, teamwork and organisational flair that has brought credit to themselves as individuals, their manager Bro. Spring, to the town of Dungarvan and the County in general. Well done to all involved.

G.A.A. NOTES

The annual Congress of the GAA will take place at the Burlington Hotel, **Dublin on Friday and Sat**urday of next week.

Much of the interest will focus on the election of a new president and who will succeed Joe MacDonagh at Congress in the following year. Sean MacCaigue, Monaghan, who was runner up on the last occasion, is favourite to beat Munster's Noel Walsh and Leinster's Albert Fallon. For the first time ever, the voting will be by proportional representation. This election will take place on Saturday of next week

All delegates attending will sit in at Workshops on Friday afternoon and practically every one attending will be hoping that there will be more interesting than they were last year.

The other big interest in the Congress will focus on the proposals to change the

Disciplinary Code.

Among the major changes proposed are in the case of a sending-off for a Category D offence shall stand suspended for the duration of the game only. If he repeats the offence within the next 48 weeks, he shall be suspended for 2 weeks. The idea behind this is that a referee will more readily send off a player when he knows that a suspension will not result.

A player sent off for an offence which merits 2 or more weeks, shall not serve his suspension during the months of December and January. This means that a player sent off at the end of November will have his suspension dating from the 1st February, unless the competition in which he is playing continues through the winter months.

Juvenile Grades — Up until now the General Rules dealt with the under 16 grade only and the other

juvenile grades were dealt with regulations decided on by Central Council. This is also to change. It is proposed that the suspension applicable to under .15 downwards will now be extended to include under 16 grades. Therefore, all underage players who offend under the category D rules will be suspended for one week. For underage Festivals a player sent off shall stand suspended for the next match in that competition, but if his team are no longer engaged in that competition he will be suspended for one week.

From now on, an under 16 juvenile cannot be called before a Disciplinary Hearing, unless he requests such a hearing, in which case he shall be accompanied by a full adult member and while giving evidence, he cannot be heard by more than 5 members. There are other changes of lesser importance also proposed.


This was Waterford Institute of Technology's first ever camogie victory in the Ashbourne series and for the hurlers their third Fitzgibbon title.


