BY AISLING CONROY June ended in yet further offices at Davitt's Ouav. Dungarvan, this historic occasion was marred by a heated debate on the County Manager's decision to house a traveller family at the Burgery, Abbeyside.

Chairperson Cllr. Nora Flynn felt she was again left with no option but to close the meeting much to the chagrin of Cllr. Billy Kyne on whose proposal an important vote was about to be taken. The controversial debate could now face the newly elected Council members when they take up June.

The matter was raised near the end of Monday's proceedings by Cllr. Kyne. He proposed that the Council do not approve of the procedure in which the dwelling at the Burgery was acquired and if the support of the Council members was forthcoming, details of the case be sent to the Department of the Environment for their assessment and a directive to be issued.

Know Your Rights

I am a full time worker with a small income from the farm and I am wondering if we would be eligible for Farm Assist Scheme?

The Farm Assist Scheme was introduced in the 1999 Budget to provide financial assistance for low income farmers (aged 18-66). It replaces the existing arrangements for farmers' entitlement to Unemployment Assistance (UA - known as Smallholders Assistance). The means test for Farm Assist will take account of 80% of your farm income (80% of gross income less any expenses incurred in earning that income). There will be a disregard of £100 per year for each of the first two children (£1.92 per child per week) and £200 for each subsequent child. Other income will also be taken into account in the means test.

To apply for Farm Assist Scheme you will need to complete the application form Farm 1. A Social Welfare Inspector will visit you at your home and you will be required to produce supporting documentation relating to income and expenditure such as accounts, mart receipts, wage-slips and bank statements.

The maximum weekly rate of payment will be the same as the long-term rate of Unemployment Assistance payable from June 1999 (£73.50 for a single person). Those eligible for Farm Assist will get Butter Vouchers, Fuel Allowance and a Christmas Bonus. Also, depending on overall income, they will be entitled to a Medical

The scheme is effective from the first week in April, 1999. You should apply for Farm Assist now and if you are eligible you will get your payment in the first week in June, 1999. If you apply before the end of May, 1999 your payment will be backdate to April 7, 1999. People who are currently in receipt of Smallholders Assistance should apply now and if they are entitled to an increased amount under Farm Assist Scheme they will get a refund of the difference in June, 1999.



REPEAT PERFORMANCE?

His proposal however received a strong reaction from Cllr. Garry O'Halloran. Many readers will remember that an earlier Council meeting was abandoned as a result of a near unbelievable outburst by O'Halloran when he climbed onto a table shouting racist allegations. His antics eventually led officials to contact Dungarvan Gardai.

Objecting "in the strongest possible fashion" to Kyne's proposal, Cllr O'Halloran told Monday's meeting that it was time for

people to be held accountable for their own specific conduct. He said a complaint has been lodged with the Gardai regarding alleged claims made by members of the Burgery Concerned Residents Association.

He claimed that Cllr. Kyne's proposal was based on "racism and prejudice" and added, "if he (Kyne) wants to be the Slobodan Milosevic of Waterford County, he's going the good way about it".

Cllr. O'Halloran said the traveller family who have been allocated the Burgery house are now adopting a 'wait and watch' attitude.

"I fear for the future of the Council if they go down the road", he warned.
WON'T BE BROW
BEATEN SAYS KYNE

With the meeting running over time, Cllr. Kyne stressed that he would not be brow beaten by threats or have his name vilified by O'Halloran.

He suggested that officials and members could come to some legal process whereby the Council and elected members are protected from such threats in the future.

Cllr. Kyne's proposal received the verbal support of Cllr. Lar Hart, Paddy Kenneally and Austin Flynn who was particularly supportive of Kyne's right to raise the matter.

County Manager Donal Connolly was fully supportive of Kyne's prerogative to raise any matter with officials.

"It's within any councillor's right to raise any matter", he stated. "I see nothing wrong for Cllr. Kyne to raise this matter and it's up to the members if they want to support it".

Mr. Connolly went on to say that he was satisfied that the acquisition of the site and its allocation is justified and will not cause any problem for local residents.

In hindsight however, Mr. Connolly said it was remiss of him that there was no consultation with local residents prior to the acquisition of the house.

He confirmed that the property will remain as a single family unit and the family will be the only people to occupy it.

Local Convent Shortlisted For Kosovar Refugees

ready been approved on a self-catering basis in former convents, privately owned hostels, and in former barracks throughout the country.

A well known landmark in the town, the Presentation Convent has already been the source of much debate, particularly when it was recently targeted for demolition by Dungarvan Urban Council to be replaced by 15 local authority houses for senior citizens.

Members of Dungarvan Museum · Society have strongly recommended that the building be retained as part of the Council's housing programme for the elderly but indications from officials are that it would be more practical to demolish the property.

Should the building be approved by the Government to house Kosovar refugees, then some investment in the property will be retained which could well make a long term investment in the property more viable.

150 REFUGEES FOR WATERFORD

place last Monday to Co. Kerry while on Thursday 13th May, another group of 150 ethnic Albanians will arrive. Subject to accommodation being ready, it is intended that following groups will go to Waterford and Cork city and other areas of the country.

If the Presentation building is approved, it would have its own small management team, comprising of a manager, up to 3 assistants, 1 or 2 project workers who would provide interpreter services as well as general duties, a receptionist/general office worker and a small number of domestic and security staff. The centre would be headed up by the Refugee Agency which is under the auspices of the Department of Foreign Af-

On arrival the refugees are taken immediately to their accommodation and supplied with a starter welcome pack (soap, toothpaste, toiletries, other necessities, etc.). On the plane, they are receive in-

formation about Ireland and their entitlements while they are here.

The refugees will be given permission to stay in this country for one year but this period will be extended for as long as the need for temporary protection continues.

Under this status the Kosovar refugees will have the right to remain in this country, the right to work or to engage in business and the right to education and health services. They will also have the right to social welfare if they are unable to support themselves.

In addition, refugees will be entitled to apply to have their family admitted to Ireland and the state will pay for their transport costs.

Funding for the refugees will come from the Department of Finance as part of the Government's response to the Kosovo crisis. While precise costs are impossible to estimate, preliminary estimates are £13 - £14 million per year which is approximately £14,000 per person. The cost of heat, light etc. will be met by the Government.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Sir,

I have been reading your reports about the many changes occurring in Dungarvan with an increasing sense of bewilderment and disgust.

The destruction of historical buildings, the plans for a multi-storey car park and more supermarkets, the pig monstrosity planned for Stradbally and all the other follies and abomination I have read about in your paper will surely deter the tourists from coming anywhere near the place. But maybe that is the intention. With its new found wealth, Dungarvan doesn't need tourists. Smash down the old buildings, build a shopping mall and more sprawling housing estates and then there will be no more tourists clogging up the streets. But it is not only the tourists who will disappear. The big businesses of the future, such as the IT and Biotechnology companies, will choose towns of character for their employees to work in. Why would they choose Dungarvan when it will look just as ugly as any other town which has been redesigned for the short term benefit of car owners. Look at nearly all the town centres in the UK. They destroyed their town centres in the 1960's with inner ring roads and multistorey car parks and now these towns find it was all in vain because the fickle car owning shoppers now travel to the out of town hypermarkets.

John Seymour, who was mentioned in your Abbeyside Topics last week in connection with a search for one of his books about country crafts, visited Dungarvan about a decade ago. The visit is described in his book "Enchanted Isle". He was a pioneer in the movement back to natural farming. For more than fifty years he has been writing about how the "agribusinessmen" and property speculators are destroying the countryside and the towns. In the 1970's he gave up on the UK and moved to a part of Ireland where the "money men" had not yet started their rampaging and the traditional ways were still respected.

During his trip to Dungarvan, his car broke down on the bridge and he was delighted when he found that the drivers behind him got out of their cars to help him instead of impatiently beeping their horns. The only negative comments in the book were about an intensive pig breeding unit that he spotted near Tramore. I dread to think what he would say about the Stradbally monstrosity.

The Town Clerk in your old picture last week was probably Thomas McCarthy. He would have witnessed far worse scenes than the recent spat in the Council meeting. In his day punch ups between the Town Commissioners were common place. Those men felt strongly about the town. They would not sit back and let the "money men" destroy the place. In those days the elected officials called the tune and any municipal employee who did not act in the interests of the ratepayer would be dealt with. John Curran, Chairman of the Town Commissioners in the 1890's physically attacked the Town Clerk and the Borough Surveyor for what he saw as omissions in the performance of their duties. What would Captain Gibbons, Thomas Power, Michael J. Casey, James F. Ryan, John Wall and all the other Commissioners who loved Dungarvan think of the disastrous plans for the town? Their constant refrain to any proposal was 'Gentlemen, what would the ratepayers say?' I hope the more intelligent members of current the electorate are taken into consideration before any drastic changes are made. Yours faithfully,



Dungarvan Welfare Officer Under Consideration The South Eastern Health Board is currently considering relocating the Community Welfare Officer in Dun-

garvan from Mary Street to more suitable premises elsewhere in the town.

According to the Minister for Health Brian Cowen, the Health Board feels that the existing offices are unsuitable and isolated from the community care services in St. Joseph's Hospital.


The Minister made these comments in the Dáil recent-Gael Deputy Austin Deasy who enquired after the provision of new community welfare offices in Dungarvan and whether they will be located centrally in the town to facilitate the public.

Minister Cowen said the Board is looking at the possibility of opening outreach Community Welfare Office clinics nearer to the current premises such as at the new Waterford County Civic offices at Davitt's Quay.

Minister Cowen added that proposals to upgrade the facilities at St. Joseph's Hospital are at an advanced stage and these will improve the overall facilities for the public availing of all community care services.

Deputy Deasy said he will continue to demand that the service for the general public will be in a central location in the town and that the outclinic referred to in the Minister's reply will service the needs of the public as is presently carried out in Mary Street.

Doctor's

Q: I am middle-aged, a little overweight and on tablets for mild high blood pressure. A friend of mine is keen for me to start going to a badminton class with her. Do you think this is a good idea?

A: Regular exercise has a beneficial effect on blood pressure. It should also help you lose some weight which indirectly should also lower your blood pressure. Ideally the exercise should last for a minimum of 20minutes and be taken at least three times a week. It would be best to consult your G.P. first to make sure there are no other problems which might be made worse by exercise. Also, be sure to start slowly. It would be best if you did some fast walking and gentle jogging to improve your overall health.

Q: I am pregnant and do a lot of driving for work. I now find the seat belt very uncomfortable. I also worry that if I had a collision the seat belt would harm the baby. Do I

have to wear one? A: Doctors can give exemption to patients who they think are better off not wearing a seat However, it has been found that a correctly worn seat belt is safer for both woman and her baby.

In pregnancy the lap strap should go across the thighs and the shoulder strap should pass between the breasts. In time this may be uncomfortable and almost impossible. There are special belts available that attach to the existing seat belt and give some valuable extra room.

Q: Our 12 year old son says one of his classmates had roundworms. The school has said nothing officially, but should I take any ecautions?

A: Roundworm usually gets into the human as an egg in contaminated soil on vegetables or in contami-nated meat. The egg is swallowed, hatches and grows in the intestine where it may produce the occasional stomach ache. The worm migrates to the liver, then the lungs, climbs the windpipe and throat, where it is swallowed and the cycle restarts. The effected child and his or her family contacts will be easily treated, but there is nothing you need to do for your son.

Bread and **Butter Pudding**

Preparation: 15 minutes standing Cooking: 30 minutes Serves: 6

50g/2oz butter, softened 100g/4oz milk chocolate, melted 10 slices thick-sliced white bread 50g/2oz caster sugar 75g/3oz sultanas 600ml/1pt chocolate-flavoured

300ml//pt double cream 3 eggs, size 3, lightly beaten grated nutrneg to sprinkle

· Mix the softened butter with the chocolate. Spread one side of each slice of bread with the chocloate butter, then quarter the bread slices diagonally.

• Sprinkle the bread with some of the sugar and sultana mixture. Repeat layers with remaining bread, sugar and sultanas.

 In a jug, beat together the chocolate milk, cream and eggs and slowly pour over the bread. Leave to stand for 30

 Ten minutes before the end of the standing time, preheat the oven to 180 C/350 F/Gas Mark 4. Sprinkle the top of the pudding with nutmeg and bake for 30 minutes until risen and set. Dust with icing sugar and serve warm with

Tuna Tuscany Style

Preparation: 5 mins. Coolding: 10 mins Serves 4.

30ml (2 tbsp) olive oil 1 large onion, peeled and thinly sliced 210g (71/2 oz) can red kidney beans

226g (8 oz) can butter beans 283g (10 oz) can broad

396g (14 oz) can tuna in brine 396g (14 oz) can passata

100g (4 oz) cherry tomatoes, halved 30ml (2 tbsp) fresh, chopped herbs (eg basil, oregano, or

50g (2 oz) black olives, pitted Freshly ground black pepper

Heat the oil in a large pan and gently saute the onion for 5 mins, or until soft and transparent. Drain all beans, rinse thoroughly, then add to the pan and mix well. Drain tuna, break into large chunks, then add to pan together with passata, tomatoes, 1 thep of fresh herbs and the pitted black olives. Season with pepper to taste. Heat the mixture through gently, stirring occasionally until hot, then sprinkle with remaining herbs. Serve with warm garlic bread or, for a more substantial meal, with jacket potatoes and a green salad

Marbled Sponge

Preparation: 20 minutes Cooking: 11/2 hours Serves: 8

225g/8oz butter, softened, or soft margarine 225g/8oz caster sugar 4 eggs, size 3, lightly 225g/8oz self-raising flour, sifted

1 tsp baking powder 2 tsp vanilla essence 75g/3oz milk chocolate, melted

75g/3oz plain chocolate, melted Sauce

100g/4oz plain chocolate, 2 tbsp golden syrup 25g/1oz butter 1 tbsp comflour mixed to a smooth paste with 2 tbsp water

6 tbsp double cream

 Place butter or margarine, sugar, eggs, flour, baking powder and vanilla essence in a large bowl. Using an electric whisk or wooden spoon, beat until smooth and creamy.

 Transfer half the mixture to a separate bowl. Beat milk chocolate into one bowl of mixture, plain chocolate into the other.

• Thoroughly grease a 1.2 litre/2pt pudding basin and line base with a circle of greaseproof paper. Place alternate spoonfuls of the chocolate sponge mixtures into the basin.

· Level the surface then cover the basin with a piece greaseproof paper, pleated down the middle. Secure with string then cover with foil secured with string.

· Place in a steamer set over a pan of simmering water. Steam for 11/2 hours or until a skewer comes out clean when inserted into the centre of the sponge

· To make the chocolate sauce, place chocolate, golden syrup, butter and 300ml/1/spt water in a large pan. Heat gently, stirring, until chocolate has melted and syrup dissolved.

 Add the cornflour paste and slowly bring to the boil, stirring, until thickened. Stir in double cream and remove from heat.

 When pudding is cooked, invert on to a serving plate. Gently heat through chocolate sauce and spoon some over the pudding. Serve hot with extra sauce.

Age Of Beauty

Dry skin is caused by many different factors such as too much sun, central heating, harsh wind, poor diet, ageing and lack of fluid intake. Incorrect skin care and perhaps even soap may also contribute to dry skin.

Dry skin that is lacking natural oil known as sebum may be classed as oil dry. This is due to the sebaceous glands being sluggish and failing to produce sebum. The skin may have oily and dry areas which must be treated separately. Salon treatments can be done to help eliminate dryness by stimulating the sebaceous glands to produce the skins natural oils. The use of heavy oils or creams may only interfere with the production of sebum.

Dry skin which lacks moisture is also known as dehydrated skin. This is caused by a lack of water in the skin rather than oil. The skin will usually appear thin and be prone to fine lines and wrinkles. Dehydrated skin may be caused by incorrect diet, lack of fluids or medication, in such cases medical advise should should always be sought.

However, salon facial treatment will help to improve the health of the skin and help to retain moisture. Dehydrated skin may be a temporary condition, varying from season to sea-

Dry skin is flaky in appearance and it may also be sensitive. It may also look and feel tight and stretched. especially after cleansing. It usually fine in texture and in some cases small capillaries may be seen near the surface of the skin.

1. — Avoid too much sun and central heating.


2. — Use cleansers, toners and moisteurisers which are specially formulated for dry skin.





It's the biggest show on earth!

THE Chelsea Flower Show has been running for 111 years. It has seen war and peace, coronations, torrential flooding and hailstones, and the response has always been the same... the show must go on.

It all began in the Temple Gardens on the Embankment in 888, when the Royal Horticultural Society's three-day Great Spring Show was a hit with gardeners across the country. Back then, a charge of £1 was made to the public for admis-

By the turn of the century, the show had outgrown the grounds, so in 1913 the organisers re-launched the Great Spring Show at the Royal Hospital, Chelsea. It was a massive success despite the threat of war just around the corner.

Royal visits to Chelsea were back on track following the war by 1920 as they have been ever since. In 1925 the show increased from three to five days in length.

This decision met with a negative response from exhibitors and it was decided to open to the public for three days, with private viewings for RHS members before that - the arrange-

ment we see today at the Royal Hospital. This year's show is open to RHS members on Tuesday 25 and Wednesday 26 May, and to the public on the two days following.

The show has seen a huge change in horticultural fashion across the years, from bonsai to flower-arranging and new scientific inventions. Bonsai trees were first seen at the show in 1913 when a display of Japanese dwarf trees was exhibit-

Flower arranging was introduced to the show in competition form in 1948. The commotion caused was massive as gardeners at the time thought the craft was not worthy of space at Chelsea. Today, the Floral Arrangement Marquee at Chelsea is hugely popular with gardeners and visitors alike.

The show today is one of the most important events in the year. Caterers can expect to sell 6,000 bottles of champagne. 2,000 lobsters, 70,000 ice-creams, 60,000 cups of tea and coffee and more than 8,000 rounds of sandwiches across the

The Great Marquee at the Chelsea Flower Show holds the ord for being the largest in the world. It weighs a mas 65 tons, covers three and a half acres, takes 19 days to put up, 10 days to take down and 20 men to do it.

Exhibitors in a wide variety of gardening fields spend months preparing and designing displays and cultivating plants. An estimated £20 million is spent on creating the magnificent displays.

Twenty-one show gardens will be on show this year, along with nearly 120 exhibitors in the floral marquee, 35 educational and scientific exhibits and over 250 horticultural sundries exhibitors. By the time the public get to see them, they will have been judged and awarded gold, silver and bronze

The sufferer experiences overfear, often accompanied by shortness of breath, palpitations, tension and cramps. He/she is exhausted and limp and is drained of both emotional and physical strength. Although he knows that his anxieties are irrational, he is powerless over them. Tension is the central moti-

vant of anxiety and occurs when emotions cannot be felt or confronted in the mind. The brain is alert for a danger that does not exist and so the heart rate accelerates. The victim becomes incoherent, confused and anxious and these emotions are transferred to the body, wreaking havoc on the organs. Muscles become tight, resulting in conditions such as backache, headache, stomach ache and so on. Many medical experts now believe that those most prone to illness, even cancer, are people who deny emotions and it is found that a high proportion of cancer patients exhibit hopelessness and helplessness. Ironically the North American Indian band, the Sioux, who are experts at venting emotions freely have little incidence of cancer.

BEHAVIOUR THERAPY

Behaviour therapy is very effective in the treatment of anxiety disorders. The first stage is going back in time and reliving past experiences so as to find the root cause of the obsessivenext step in the recovery is offender's shame and guilt tion. Here the person learns to reduce the rituals or behaviours gradually over a period of time with a view to eliminating them entirely eventually.

> Deep relaxation is a very important part of recovery. Through progressive relaxation sufferers learn to offload some of the tension and anxiety and this helps them to return to calmer, more controlled patterns of thinking. Sufferers of anxiety disorders find sympconcentrating on stress reduction they can be stopped before the behaviours spiral out of control. Thus while anxiety disorders can control a person's life and limit normal functioning, with insight, perseverance and faith the sufferer can learn to manage his anxiety.

Control Silage Costs

At this stage of the game there are few ways of reducing first cut silage making costs.

Go for bulk if you are a late calving spring herd, so delay cutting until late May-early June. A contractor who allows you cut down your silage may be available. Silage additive adds £8-£24 per acre on to the cost of silage making. If you can cut in situations where no additive is required big savings can be made.

Use 1,500 gallons of slurry for second cut to save on fertiliser costs and so 2 3/4 bags 24:211/2:10 should be adequate for this cut.

* Which additive ?

Only acids (Sulphuric or Formic), sugars (molasses or pulp) preserve silage during difficult conditions but of these only formic acid will enhance the feeding value of the silage.

Under good silage making conditions (normally no additive needed) enhancer additives improve the feeding value of the silage. But the response is not economic for cattle (returns so poor) or for Spring carvers but there is £4 per cow advantage for winter milk producer whose cows are milking during the period they are eating it.

* Do not cut too low.

Dirt will be brought in. Recovery for second cut will be too slow. Dandelions will start to grow.

Cut in the afternoon.

Sugar are highest. Check the levels of sugar in the grass with a refractometer. If sugars are high the level of nitrogen does not matter.

Nematodirus worm infections currently pose a problem to young lambs particularly on ground grazed by last year's lamb crop. Control infestation through avoiding pasture grazed last year. Alternatively use white drench anthelmintics at six and ten weeks of age. With persistent drugs such as moxidectin or doramectin, one treatment may suffice. Nematodirus displays similar symptoms to Coccidiosis infection. Consultation with your veterinary surgeon is advisable to obtain an accurate diagnosis and appropriate treatment.

Foot Rot

Failure to tackle this common cause of lameness can lead to loss of body condition and poor thrive in ewes. Control is best achieved through regular foot trimming, moving sheep through a foot bath and rotational grazing. Ideally those sheep with foot rot should be separated from the rest of the flock. Where the problem is persistent, consult your veterinary surgeon who will advise on an eradication programme.

WARNING ON THE FUTURE OF THE **DAIRY PROCESSING SECTOR - ALLEN**

ICMSA President, Frank Allen has strongly advised dairy farmers to think very carefully about the future of the dairy-processing sector.

Mr. Allen said, "We have a vital interest in the processing sector because it is a major determinant of milk price. I am fully convinced that Irish dairy farmers should not allow themselves to be seduced down the plc road in the area of processing their milk.

In the pic system, there are three claimants on company profits: (a) institutional shareholders, (b) fund required for re-investment in the business and (c) milk price. In this scenario milk price comes out at the bottom of the league particularly as institutional shareholders expect increased profits every year. This can be achieved by paying a reduced milk price. In a co-op it is sometimes necessary to reduce profits to support milk price."

The ICMSA President continued, "The co-operative system is the best movement to supply the maximum milk price to dairy farmers provided the system is run efficiently at assembly, processing and marketing levels. Dairy co-ops, individually and collectively, must look at themselves to see how can perform better to ensure dairy farmers get the highest possible milk price.

To obtain the maximum benefit from the Agenda 2000 Agreement, then the achievement of the maximum possible milk price must be set as our absolute priority - all decisions aimed at improving the dairy co-op sector must revolve around that principle," concluded Mr. Allen.

NATIONAL ENVELOPE MUST BE USED TO FUND **HEIFER PREMIUM**

Mr. Liam Heverin, Chairman of ICMSA's Beef and Cattle Committee, following last week's meeting of the ICMSA National Council, said that ICMSA is proposing that the Beef National Envelope to be introduced under the Agenda 2000 agreement should be devoted totally to providing a premium on heifers.

Mr. Heverin said "Under the Agreement, beef heifers will only be eligible for a £63 slaughter premium, whereas other categories of animals will be eligible for significantly higher premiums. As can be seen from the heifer trade over the past year, support must be put in place to ensure that heifer beef production is a profitable enterprise into the future. A situation where 20% of the national kill are slaughtered at a loss cannot be allowed. The Minister for Agriculture and Food must ensure that heifer beef production receives the necessary support by using the National Envelope to their benefit.

"Unless additional support is made available, the heifer may become a worthless animal given the impact it will have on extensification. The National Envelope, which will be worth £25m on full implementation of the Agenda 2000 agreement must be fully devoted to the provision of an additional premium for heifers," Mr. Heverin concluded.

Flynn Asks Consumers to Support Irish **Pigmeat Products**

Waterford IFA Pigs Committee representative, Joe Flynn has appealed to consumers to support Irish pork and bacon producers by purchasing pigmeat products of Irish origin. His comments came when local producers in Cork were promoting Irish pork and bacon at retail

Mr. Flynn said, "While we cannot object to imports we have a legitimate right to promote the sale of product of Irish origin and this is what was being done in Cork recently."

Mr. Flynn continued, "A recent independent research study clearly shows that Irish bacon has less salt and less water than imported product. This is the best reason why Irish consumers should support Irish pigmeat."

Mr. Flynn expressed concern about the problem of improper labelling of pigmeat. "We will continue to pursue this problem until it is resolved properly," he said.

Mr. Flynn declared, "Pigmeat imports were around 33,000 tonnes in 1998 equivalent to 15,000 pigs per week. With the support of the consumer and the catering sector this could be drastically reduced."

Mr. Flynn declared, "Pigmeat imports were around 33,000 tonnes in 1998 equivalent to 15,000 pigs per week. With the support of the consumer and the catering sector this could be drastically reduced."

ARMY HIT BY SALVO FROM CIVILIAN POPULATION

The Department of Defence who were forced to pay millions of pounds for army deafness compensation claims have been hit by another salvo over noise, this time from the civilian population.

People who live near Kilcoran Army Shooting Range some five miles west of Cahir claim that an increased level of activity at the range over the past years is upsetting their peace and quiet at weekends and after tea-time in the evenings. A request to reduce the noise levels have fallen on deaf ears but the residents have been assured by commitments from the Defence Forces that they will take action to muffle the sound of the firing guns and files.

This range is used by F.C.A. and the Gardai but the big problem is when the army brings out its heavy artillery for competitions. A nearby resident who had visitors at his house said that when the shooting started, they thought they were in Yugoslavia. He said that the range has been upgraded during the last few years and activity there has increased.

In recent years many 50' high trees which acted as sound barriers have been felled and when the wind blew from the north, the noise was further amplified. Locals say they don't want the range closed and they have no intention of initiating any legal action. A local man stated that the noise took from what was a beautiful area and it meant that few people were likely to consider building in the vicinity of the range.





Have you ever wondered why the same grass that provides excellent milk yields when grazed, suddenly requires the addition of substantially more concentrates to provide the same yields once it's turned into silage?

Well, you're not alone. Forage scientists have been asking the same questions for years and up until now have not been able to find the answer. Obviously the nutritional value of the forage has been reduced in its conversion to silage but identifying which nutrients have been lost and how has been elusive. Most importantly - once we know what has been lost, we can go about preventing the losses from occurring.

Raymond Jones, silage expert at the Institute of Grassland & Environmental Research (IGER) believes that work carried out at the Institute over the last few years is leading them very close to the answer. They have found that much of the grass protein appears to be partially broken down during a natural silage fermentation into its constituent building blocks called amino acids. This type of breakdown is not detected in the typical measurement of protein in a silage analysis, so everything has appeared relatively normal until now. However, it is almost certain that these breakdown amino acids in silage are used as food by the bacteria in the


If this answers the question of what is causing the loss of nutrient value in protein story from IGER now seems to provide an explanation of this as well! silage, then we are also close to finding out why it is happening. The protein High quality inoculants are known to accelerate the fermentation and IGER has now shown that this prebreakdown occurs during the silage fermentation and the slower the fermen-serves the quality of the protein over that of silage which is untreated. This is very likely then to be the reason tation is, the greater the losses seem to be. The conclusion of this is that the for inoculated silage giving improvements in animal performance. speed of the fermentation is the critical factor in preserving intact protein in the resultant silage. Indeed it is the speed of the fermentation in the first few hours which appears to be most critical of all - and the more this can be accelerated, the better the silage will perform through the animal.

Silage additives often claim to have an effect on speed of fermentation and animal performance, so what role do they have in this new concept of silage \% of 'intact' quality? Well, the weight of evidence supports the use of the inoculant-type additives to provide the rapid fermentation now seen as being of such importance. Indeed, one of the perplexing aspects in the use of inoculants has been that in controlled trials, the good ones may show no difference in typical silage analysis to untreated silage but then go on to consistently show significant improvements in milk yield, milk quality and liveweight gain. Well, the

performance and hence to the quality and value of silage additives which type of inoculants are the best to use? Very nearly all of the inocuants on the market are of the freeze dried type and whilst these are better to use than none at all, they do take many hours to re-activate once they are put on the grass. This "lag phase" is now seen as potentially very detrimental in preserving the quality of protein.



In the past few years, however, IGER in Wales and Hillsborough in Northern Ireland have carried out extensive work on a new type of inoculant called Pharmor. In conclusion, the day may never come when silage feeding is as efficient as grass grazing but advances being made by Institutes such as IGER and Hillsborough, combined with new developments in silage additives, are certain to lead towards that particular holy grail!







IN REPLY TO ARDMORE NOTES

I have no problem with this rule as my allegiance has and always will be to the Gaelic Athletic Association and the promotion of its aims and objectives.
