## County Gripped In Election Fever

With the dust now firmly settled on the many canvassing trails throughout the county, the majority of the electorate will have decided on the share out of votes as they go to the poll this Friday June 11th. With leaflets distributed, doorbells rang and countless hands shaken, candidates are now resting their feet in anticipation of the weekends events.

Polling booths around the county will open at 8 a.m. and voting will close at 9 p.m. on Friday night. As the official election headquarters, Dungarvan Sports Centre will be a hub of activity over the weekend as the laborious task of count-

ing takes place. Hours of tense, nail-biting suspense will culminate sometime on Sunday evening when the final results of the County Council elections will be announced by Returning Officer Peter Carey. Unfortunately for the staff deployed to the Sports Centre, the counting will clash with Sunday's vital senior hurling clash

between Waterford and Cork.

Every member of the electorate is urged to cast their vote this Friday in the local elections, European parliament elections and the referendum. This is the electorate's chance to have a say in who will be making decisions for their community, county and region over the next five years.

Not surprisingly, the sheer numbers of those going forward for the local elections this time round will seem overwhelming at first glance at the poll card.

A grand total of 48 hopefuls are down to contest the Waterford County Council

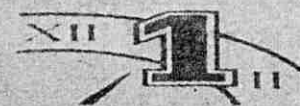

# Know Your Rights

## Question

I am planning to buy a three year old car from a neighbour and am wondering if it is possible to check if the owner has paid off the original loan?

## Answer

If the original car loan was arranged through a bank or lending institution you will be able to check the Hire Purchase Information register (HPI register) to find out if the loan has been cleared.

The HPI register holds information on motor vehicles, cycles, tractors, agricultural equipment and machinery, aircraft and motor boats which are subject to leasing and hire purchase agreements. To access the register you should call into Hire Purchase Information Limited, ICB House, Newstead, Clonskeagh Road, Dublin 14. Tel.: (01) 2600905 or write for an application form.

You will need to provide Hire Purchase Information Ltd. with the following information on the car: manufacturer's name, registration and chassis number. If the car has been subject to a hire purchase or leasing agreement Hire Purchase Information Limited will provide details of the financial agreement, the opening date of the agreement and the name of the financial institution and will tell you if the original loan has been cleared. There is a charge of £4.24 for the enquiry. Hire Purchase Information Ltd. is a commercial company.

If you buy a second hand car from a garage that is a member of Society of the Irish Motor Industry (SIMI), the garage will 'stand over' its own sale agreements and if necessary mediate on the buyer's behalf if there are outstanding debts.

## GLANBIA ANNOUNCES BUSINESS DISPOSALS

Glanbia has announced the disposal of two businesses which do not form part of the Group's future development strategy. The Group's UK liquid milk operations are to be sold to Express Dairies for over £120 million. In Ire-

land, Glanbia is to dispose of the business and fixed assets of its beef operations to Dawn Meats for £10 million. These transactions are expected to reduce earnings but will strengthen the Group's balance sheet.

Commenting, Group Managing Director Ned Sullivan said: "Our strategy going forward is to reshape the Group around businesses which have strong market positions and which offer real development potential. We are focussing Glanbia

for a new phase of profitable growth in selected consumer food markets and in global food ingredients".

Mr. Sullivan said the sale of the UK liquid milk and Irish beef businesses completes Glanbia's disposal plans.

# Junior Encyclopaedia

# SHEEP

**The farmer has a lot to do when keeping sheep. The person who minds the sheep is called a shepherd.**

In late summer the flock has to be checked over. The sheep's hooves grow all the time and usually wear down as they move around. Sometimes this does not happen, and the person looking after the sheep has to trim them. At the same time infection is looked for in the feet.

The next thing to be checked is the sheep's teeth. As the sheep grows older its teeth wear down to stumps and some may even fall out. This makes it very difficult for the sheep to eat. Sheep that cannot eat are of no use to the farmer and he sells them for their meat.

The last thing the farmer or shepherd checks is the ewes' udders to make sure that they will be able to feed their lambs properly.

Most ewes can mate only in autumn. Rams are kept in a separate group and will be put in with the ewes at this time. Each ram will mate with up to 60 ewes.

The rams in the field with the sheep have to get on well with each other, otherwise they will threaten the ewes by their constant fighting.

Usually an old ram is the leader of the group. A new ram may fight with the older one until he finds his

place in the group. When two rams fight they butt and charge each other.

Before the ram starts to mate with the ewes, the farmer or shepherd straps a harness with a piece of coloured wax attached to it around the ram's chest. When the ram mates with a ewe, he leaves a smear of the colour on her rump.

The process is called 'raddling.' The colour of the wax is changed every three weeks. The farmer can then make an estimation when the ewe will lamb by the colour on her rump.

During the winter and before lambing, the ewes are given extra food such as oats, hay or

barley. 150 days after mating the ewe will give birth. As soon as the lamb is born, the ewe will get up and lick it dry. She gets to know her lamb by its smell. It takes four or five days for the lamb to be able to recognise its mother.

During this time it may try to suckle other ewes, but they will push the lamb away. When the lambs are a few days old the tails of the lamb are removed. This is done to prevent disease. At about three weeks, the lambs become adventurous and form playgroups. They play around and their mothers call them by bleating.

As the weather gets warmer, the ewes naturally shed their wool. The farmer has to shear them before this happens and then he sells the fleeces. Sheep are dipped once or twice a year in a bath of insecticide. This is done to protect them from disease and parasites.

# Michael O'Riordan — His Voice, Your Choice

In the sixteen years since Michael O'Riordan first took his seat on a statutory body, he has proved himself, not just a hardworking public representative, but one who works tirelessly for all of the people of his constituency.

"We have to aim to build thirty to forty houses a year in the town", he says, "and instead we have completed only sixty houses in the last five years. The benefits of the present good times have to be passed on to the people in jobs, houses and services, otherwise it is of no use to any of us."

He is pleased to have been a member of the Council which sought and was granted the various Urban Renewal programmes which have transformed the face of the town. "Dungarvan is not just a prosperous town," he says, "but also looks a prosperous town and must appear a good prospect for the potential investor. The major attraction of the up to the minute technology provided by Casey Cablevision is a huge advantage to the town, and we must capitalise on these features by seeing that the best use is made of the old Avonmore/Waterford site."

Over the years Michael has been Chairman of the Urban District Council and in his term had the sad duty of bidding farewell to the Christian Brothers from the town. He has also served on the South Eastern Health Committee and the South East Regional Development Organisation and is presently a member of the Strategic Policy Committee of the UDC.

Michael O'Riordan has proved to be a long-term worker for the Community, with service on many voluntary bodies to his credit. As his children progressed through their various schools, he served in a practical way on the Parents

Committees or Boards of Management of Scoil Mhuire, Abbeyside, CBS Dungarvan and Ard Scoil na nDeise.

He is a patron of the proposed Abbeyside Community Centre, Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Brass Band and has taken an active interest in the fishing clubs of the area. He is central to the Boxing Club's effort to get new premises which he believes to be on the horizon. This is a project which is dear to his heart and in which he has invested a great deal of energy and time, but he feels that the benefits to the community in years to come will be great and he will have served a sport which finds it difficult to attract working members.

"If elected on June 11th, I pledge to continue to work for all the people of the town. I am confident they know the effort I have made on their behalf and stand on my record as their representative over the last two decades."

## Long Awaited Extension To Kilmac' College

Waterford Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea tabled a question in the Dáil recently asking the Minister for Education the position regarding the extension to St. Declan's Community College, Kilmacthomas.

Minister Michael Martin replied that his Department's post primary building unit is currently awaiting a combined stage 4/5 (detailed design and bill of quantities) submission for the proposed extension to the school from the Co. Waterford VEC. As soon as this report is received, Minister Martin said the matter will then receive further attention.

## Hormones In Beef A Major Issue For Local Farmers

Munster MEP Pat Cox visited Dungarvan and West Waterford recently during his canvass for the upcoming European Parliament elections.

Having met with farmers at Dungarvan Mart, Mr. Cox told the 'Leader' that one of the major issues he had encountered was that

of hormones in beef.

Mr. Cox predicted that there will be a stand-off between the EU and the United States over this controversial issue.

While scientific evidence

has found that the hormones are not injurious to human or animal health, Mr. Cox stated however that since the BSE crisis, consumers are increasingly conscious of how and

where their beef products are produced and have shown a massive preference for natural beef off grass. Hormones in beef are currently banned by law throughout the EU community and Mr. Cox felt that the incoming EU members will retain this hormone free formula.

### "Nothing Like An Election To Encourage Rapid Results"

So stated Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy in the Dail last week when learning of a £1.02 million funding for the Ardmore sewerage scheme.

Deputy Deasy had asked the Minister for the Environment Government if the provision of a sewerage treatment plant at Ardmore would be treated as a matter of urgency. He was subsequently informed by Minister Noel Dempsey that the funding for the scheme was recently approved under the rural towns and villages initiative. This initiative is designed to bring water and sewerage facilities to rural towns and villages.

"There is nothing like an impending election to encourage rapid results", said Deputy Deasy. "Two weeks ago I squeezed £112,000 out of the Department of the Marine for a new wall for the harbour in Ardmore.

Today we will obtain £1.02 million for the sewerage scheme, which is very welcome".

The Waterford Deputy stressed that Ardmore is one of the major tourist resorts on the south coast and badly needs a sewerage treatment plant.

According to Minister Dempsey, the commencement of the Ardmore scheme rests with Waterford County Council and is dependent on the speed with which the Council can finalise its proposals.

"There will be no delay in the scheme's commencement from the dept.'s point of view because the relevant funding has already been made available", said the Minister. "I understand that the Council is in a position to appoint consultants to prepare the contract documents. When that happens, it will be in a position to invite tenders", he added.

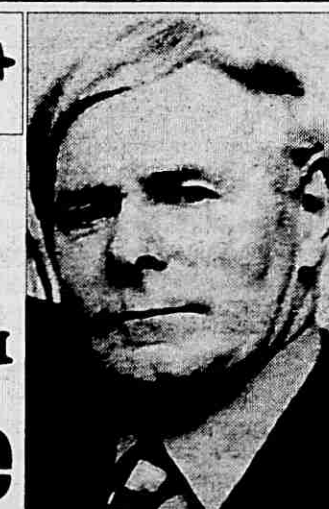

drizzle the paprika/oil mixture over this and sprinkle with parsley. *in natural juice, drained 2 tsp cornflour mixed to a paste with 4 tsp cold water*

## Sweet And Sour Pork

Preparation: 15 mins  
Cooking: 35 mins  
Serves: 4

1lb/450g lean pork fillet, trimmed and cut into 1in/2.5cm cubes  
1 tsp dry sherry  
1 tsp light soy sauce  
1/2 tsp salt  
1 egg, size 3, beaten  
2 tsp cornflour

### For the sauce

1 small red pepper  
1 small green pepper  
1 large carrot  
1/4pt/150ml chicken stock  
1 tsp light soy sauce  
2 tsp white wine vinegar  
1 tsp caster sugar  
1 tsp tomato purée  
6 spring onions, trimmed and sliced  
4oz/100g cubed pineapple

**METHOD:** Place the cubed pork, dry sherry, soy sauce and salt in a bowl. Mix together well, then cover and chill for 30 mins. Meanwhile, mix together the egg and cornflour. Drain chilled pork, discarding excess marinade, and coat meat cubes in egg mixture. Heat oil in a deep frying pan (hot enough to brown a cube of bread in 20 seconds). Add the pork and cook for 12-15 mins, or until golden and cooked through. Drain on kitchen paper, then place on a warmed serving platter and keep warm. To make the sauce, halve and deseed peppers. Slice into thick strips, then into rough diamond shapes. Peel and trim the carrot, then slice into thin julienne strips. Boil peppers and carrot in a pan of boiling water for 4 mins, then drain well. Mix together stock, soy sauce, vinegar, sugar and purée in a pan. Bring to boil, then add peppers and carrot, spring onions and pineapple. Simmer for 3 mins. Add cornflour paste and stir until thickened. Spoon sauce over pork and serve with boiled rice.

## Chicken with Walnut Sauce

Serves: 8-10  
1 chicken (3 1/2-4lb/1.5-1.8kg)  
1 carrot, roughly chopped  
1 stick of celery, roughly chopped  
1 onion, quartered salt and pepper  
**For the Sauce**  
3/4pt/425ml stock  
4oz/110g shelled walnuts  
2oz/50g white breadcrumbs salt and pepper  
**To garnish**  
1 tsp paprika mixed with 2 tsp olive or walnut oil chopped parsley

### METHOD

Put the chicken in a lidded saucepan which fits quite snugly. Add enough cold water to just cover. Bring to the boil and simmer for 2-3 min, skimming off any scum which rises to the surface. Add the carrot, celery and onion, season lightly. Cover pan and simmer for 45 min, or until just cooked.  
Remove chicken from the pan, and when cool enough to handle remove all flesh from the bones. Remove the skin from the flesh and return this, the bones and any giblets to the liquid in the pan. Simmer this stock for 30 min. Meanwhile pull the chicken meat into bite-sized shreds, arrange on a serving platter, cover with clingfilm and refrigerate.  
Strain the stock into a bowl, discarding the solids, and chill for at least 6 hours so that the fat can come to the surface, solidify and be removed.  
To make the sauce, reheat 3/4pt/425ml of the stock and pour into the bowl of a food processor or liquidiser. Add nuts and breadcrumbs and process until smooth. Return this to the pan and simmer for 5-10 min or until thickened. Season with salt and pepper and allow to cool.  
Remove chicken from fridge an hour before serving to bring it to room temperature. Pour over the sauce,

## Family Health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

**Q.** My young son has just gotten over a bad case of mumps. I'm worried because I've heard that mumps can affect male fertility.

**A.** The mumps virus can affect both male and female sexual organs - the testicles in a man and the ovaries in a woman. However, the swelling that the mumps inflammation causes is far more likely to damage a man's testicles. This is because the testicles are surrounded with a rough fibrous capsule and any swelling can't expand outwards, so it increases the pressure inside, damaging the testicular tissue itself. The lack of such a tough capsule in a woman usually allows the ovaries to escape such harm. Before puberty it isn't common for mumps to affect the testicles. When it occurs after puberty, there will be testicular pain at the time, and once the inflammation has gone down, that testicle may be smaller than before. In the less likely event that both testicles are affected, the man may subsequently be infertile.

**Q.** I have suffered with back pain for a few years now, and about a year ago I developed severe sciatica followed by numbness and weakness in my right leg. I had a laminectomy operation which alleviated most of the pain. I still get twinges of sciatica - how can I get rid of the pain once and for all?

**A.** The problem was that the soft centre of one of the discs between the vertebrae of your lower back bulged out of its jacket and pressed on the roots of the sciatic nerve in your spine. This usually occurs suddenly, but in your case it probably happened over a period of months until some very minor thing - perhaps a trip or a fall, or even a jolt finally forced it on to the nerve. Although the laminectomy (removal of a piece of vertebrae) has relieved most of this pressure, the sciatic nerve roots are still being irritated - which is why you still get sciatica down your leg. The answer is to be extremely careful about carrying, turning, twisting and lifting - and hopefully it will slowly settle down.

## Hypoallergenic Cosmetics

The skin can develop a rash as a reaction to different cosmetics or to cosmetics that you may have been using for some years.

Most cosmetic companies will try their best to produce cosmetics which will not cause a reaction. However, there are so many different substances used, it's almost a certainty that a few people will have an allergic reaction to a product.

Fortunately, there are now widespread hypoallergenic products on the market. Hypoallergenic, meaning low allergy causing cosmetics, therefore, there is less chance of causing irritation to the skin.

People who are most likely to benefit from hypoallergenic cosmetics are those who have sensitive skins which redden or itch occasionally after using some cosmetics.

Dry skin is usually the most prone to sensitivity but oily skin may also suffer allergic reactions to shaving foams and creams and even after-shave. There are now hypoallergenic shaving toiletries available.

If your skin does develop an allergic reaction to a cosmetic, try to avoid using any cosmetic other than moisturiser until the skin calms down. Itching can be relieved by cold water compresses or calamine lotion.

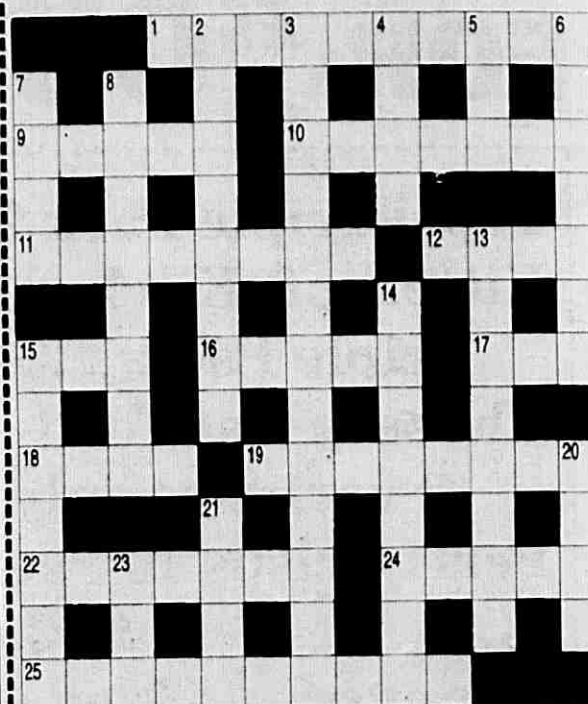
If the rash persists seek a doctor's advice. He will advise on the best medicated cream to treat the allergy.

## Nuala Ryan - Fighting The Odds At All Levels

The reluctance of women to enter the electoral fray cannot have been helped by the inauspicious start which Nuala Ryan experienced, when she signalled her intention to seek a Fianna Fail nomination in the Urban District Council and Waterford County Council elections.

## The New Drugs Payment Scheme

The New Drugs Payment Scheme will come into effect on July 1, 1999. This is an important new Scheme that covers families and individuals for the cost of their prescribed medication. Under the Drugs Payment Scheme, no individual or family will have to pay more than £42 in any calendar month for approved prescribed drugs, medicines and appliances for use by that person or his/her family in that month.

To avail of this new scheme you need to fill in a registration form.

Registration forms have already been sent to all current holders of Drug Cost Subsidisation Scheme cards and to all persons who have received recent payments from the South Eastern Health Board under the Drug Refund Scheme. If you have already received one of these forms please ensure that it is filled in and returned IMMEDIATELY to:-

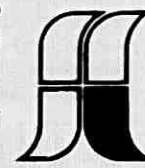

# Beans Mean So Much Variety

**BEANS** come in many different shapes, sizes, colours and flavours — so it's not too difficult to get confused!

Follow this step by step guide to telling the difference between the beans and you should encounter no problems in the garden or the kitchen.

### BROAD BEAN

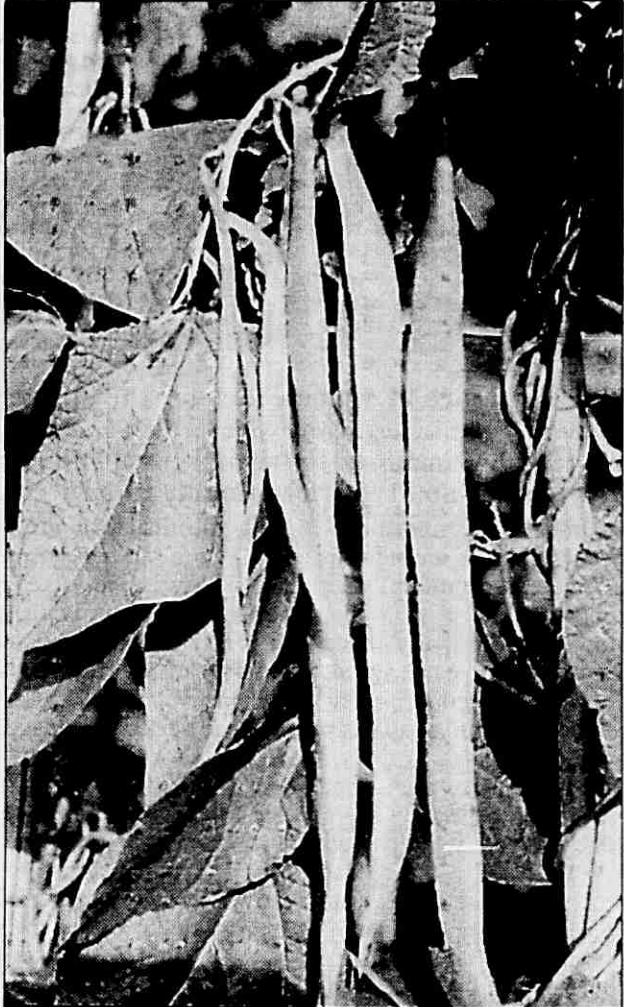
This is one of the oldest types of bean to be grown in Britain. It is an annual and has a stiff, quadrangular, hollow stem. The seeds are large and white or green in colour, depending on variety. Broad beans will grow in almost any type of soil, so long as it is adequately drained and fertile while remaining moist.

Recommended varieties include longpod Express and Meteor and Sutton and Green Windsor from the Windsor varieties.

### HARICOT

Haricot beans are usually grown for eating in the winter. They are special varieties of dwarf french bean grown for their dried seeds, not fresh pods.

This species of bean grows on almost any type of soil as long as it is warm and well-drained. When the beans are ready for harvest, they will look ripe and be turning yellow.



**RELIABLE RUNNERS:** They are popular and easy to grow

Recommended varieties include Chevrier Vert and Comtesse de Chambord.

### FRENCH CLIMBING

Climbing french beans can be cultivated outdoors in warm districts or in a greenhouse during winter and early spring elsewhere. They like a deep, well-drained soil containing a fair amount of organic matter. Recommended varieties include Kentucky Wonder and Violet Podded Stringless.

### FRENCH DWARF

Although these beans are named after the popular European country. It is believed that they originated in South America.

French dwarf beans are sometimes known as kidney beans because of the shape of their seeds, which can be eaten dried or fresh. Dwarf beans grow in warm, well-drained soil of any type. Recommended varieties include Black Prince, Masterpiece and Tendergreen.

### MUNG

The Mung bean is popular because of its high food value. It contains high protein and vitamin E levels. Mung beans are very popular in Chinese dishes.

These beans are grown indoors, in a peat filled bowl, covered with polythene and left in a warm, dark environment.

### RUNNERS

Most varieties of runner bean produce scarlet flowers. Others have white, pink or red and white flowers.

Runners can be grown as a climbing plant. They should be grown in very fertile soil and in a warm environment.

Recommended varieties include Crusader, Prizewinner and Scarlet Emperor.

### SOYA

Soya beans are an incredibly valuable crop to produce because of their high vitamin and protein content — they are sometimes used as a substitute for meat.

A soil containing plenty of humus and not lacking in moisture is ideal.

A National agreement between the 8 Health Boards and the Association of Optometrists will allow Medical Card holders to get immediate eye-tests from the Optometrist/Optician without a letter of referral from their G.P.

"This is a very welcome streamlining of the system that will be appreciated by everyone involved, most especially the Medical Card holder," said Cllr. Kyne. "Once the applicant is approved by the Medical Card number the eye examination can be immediately done with repairs or glasses supplied being paid direct to the optician by the G.M.S."

# "St. Joseph's" Second Phase Procedure Has Now Commenced - Cllr. Kyne

Councillor Billy Kyne confirms that the South Eastern Health Board have now contacted the Department of Health and requested that the original Project Team be reconvened to start the technical investigations necessary for consideration of the 2nd Phase Extension at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan.

"I welcome the information given by the Programme Manager, Mr. John Magnier at this month's Board Meeting, that now that the recent refurbishment has been completed, this very important decision to advance the Phase

2 project at St. Joseph's has commenced. The Project Team are well aware of the requirements of this site and it must be a big advantage to retain their expertise and commitment to advancing this 2nd Phase Extension.

This, the last Board Meeting of the outgoing Council members, is not only the full completion of 1st Phase Extension but confirms the start of the process that could see St. Joseph's become a modern health facility complex to serve all the West Waterford area."

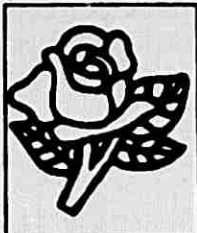

## New Community Warden System Proposed

A Waterford Co. Councillor has welcomed news that "Community wardens," empowered to report everything from dogs fouling the pavements to unauthorised building developments will be on the streets before the end of the year.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair says the Dept. of Environment initiative will enable a back up service to be provided for gardaí in some minor aspects of traffic management in places such as Dungarvan and Waterford city.

"According to the Minister, he envisages this new uniformed warden service as not being able to take actions themselves but will be able to report breaches of bye-laws to a higher level. Whereas no full detail is available on how many wardens are to be appointed, when the scheme will come into force or how much it will cost, I'm assured that Dungarvan UDC and Waterford County Council can avail of the scheme.

"The new warden service proposed by the Department should be viewed as something that will greatly benefit the community and complement the work being done by an Garda Síochána," Cllr. O Ceilleachair concluded.

## Council To Start Work On £200,000 Tallow Road Project

With just days to go before the local elections, an allocation of £200,000 has been set aside by Waterford County Council for the realignment of the main Lismore-Fermoy road at Tallow Bridge later this year.

Local County Councillor Willie McDonnell persuaded the Council some years back to acquire the house and adjoining land from the O'Connor family of Tallow Bridge with a view to constructing a new bypass road

from the Sweep road to the Fermoy road.

Speaking to the 'Leader' this week, Cllr. McDonnell said the Council are now in a position to start work immediately on this project and hope to have the road completed by December. The plan also provides for a tree/shrub layout at this location.

In welcoming the allocation, he said it will make a huge improvement to the flow of traffic in the area although it may have

serious consequences for traffic travelling up and down Tallow hill. Cllr. McDonnell went on to say that traffic coming from the direction of Tallow hill will have to yield at the bridge when the project is in place.

"On completion of the new Dungarvan roundabout at Kilrush, the Council engineers and staff will be in a position to commence work at Tallow Bridge within the next week", added Cllr McDonnell.

## Blue Flag Award For Clonea Beach

An Taisce have this week announced that Clonea beach has been awarded the prestigious European Blue Flag award, one of 77 recognised locations around the country including Bonmahon and Counsellor's Strand in Dunmore East.

Three Co. Waterford beaches however failed to make the grade. Ardmore beach, the main stand at Dunmore East and Tramore Strand were all rejected due to non compliance with bathing water criteria.

The Blue Flag is an environmental award given to communities that make a special effort to keep their beaches clean and manage them with consideration for the local environment. Visitors to a Blue Flag beach such as Clonea can expect to see an Environment Code of Conduct and information on protected sites or species in the locality.

Stringent criteria is taken into account when determining whether a beach has Blue Flag status. Criteria include - easy and safe access to the beach, no camping, unauthorised driving or dumping on the beach, beach cleaned on a regular basis, water quality compliance, no signs of gross pollution from oil, human waste or other sources, sufficient and clean public toilets, access of dogs and domestic animals must be restricted and controlled, first aid must be available on the beach and there must be sufficient lifeguards or lifesaving equipment, etc.

An Taisce, in partnership with the Government and Waterford County Council depend on the support of the local community to take the trouble to keep the county's Blue Flag beaches clean and litter free.

**Teagasc — Irish Forest Industry Chain****CAP REFORMS WILL CURTAIL FORESTRY EXPANSION, SAYS TEAGASC EXPERT**

The increase in EU direct payments for farmers will have a negative impact on afforestation levels in Ireland, according to Jim Reidy, National Forestry Development Officer with Teagasc.

Speaking at the National Forestry Conference organised by the Irish Forest In-

dustry Chain and Teagasc, Mr. Reidy said the new CAP reforms which come into effect from January 2000 will mean that farmers will be even more reluctant to consider forestry as an enterprise. This will have implications for the national strategy to more than double forestry

acreage.

"From a national economic point of view, a substantial amount of land could be planted with trees without any negative impact on agricultural production. However the increased suckler cow and cattle payments as well as the new incentives for more extensive farming and payments under the Rural Environment Protection Scheme (REPS) will force farmers to fill their quotas and retain land for agriculture in order to maximise benefit from the improved direct payments. The reality is that the new CAP reforms are not compatible with the national strategy to double forestry acreage," he said.

He stated that the new CAP reforms are likely to see a continuation of afforestation on larger farms.

"With the new payments in place, it will not make economic sense for the typical 60 acre drystock farmer who is not in a position to get an off-farm job, to divert land to forestry. Smaller farms are more likely to be planted at critical times during the life of the farmer, such as an inheritance or where potential successors are not interested in farming. However for farmers with over 100 acres, there will still be a major income advantage

in planting part of the farm with trees," he said.

"Also with the dramatic increase in off-farm employment in recent years and with the scarcity of labour everywhere, returns to labour for farm work will become more and more important. In this scenario it will make economic sense for small farmers who have an outside job to plant trees, provided they get the high premium payment," he added.

Mr. Reidy stated that 12,000 farmers had planted over 300,000 acres between 1990 and 1998. The five counties of Connaught with Clare and Donegal accounted for 40% of this. Currently afforestation is running at 30,000 acres per year, compared to a target of over 60,000 acres set down in the National Forestry Strategy.

"If current trends continue, a total of 20,000 farmers will have a total forestry bank of 0.5 million acres by 2006 compared to a target in the National Forestry Strategy of 30,000 farmers with 0.75 million acres of forestry. Irrespective of the level of planting, quality of timber production must continue to be of the utmost importance. In this regard, proper management of young forests is vital," he said.

**Support For Farm Contractors**

Mr. Paddy Cassidy who is the County Meath representative of the ICMSA National Council has said that farmers should support their local agricultural contractors because a good job carried out at a reasonable price year in year out was more important to farmers than a once off low cost job.

Mr. Cassidy said, "In fairness Irish Agricultural Farm Contractors have served our farmers very well. They provide reliable services all the year round. We should not turn our back on them just because tough times make a saving of up to £10 per acre on silage harvesting seem attractive.

Most Irish contractors are geared up with machinery for all the year round service and farmers would be unwise to jeopardise the availability of such services. Like the well, their absence would be greatest felt when they would no longer be available."

Mr. Cassidy went on to say that competition was, at all times, very welcome but in assessing the competitiveness it was necessary to take into account the nature of the service being provided.

Farmers know well that it is the reasonable prices, all times available services that are important to farming and not the low prices once off performance which leaves the job undone next year.

He concluded, "We should be very slow to cast aside a tried and trusted service."

**ICMSA Wish Dawn Meats A Successful Future**

Mr. Liam Heverin, Chairman of ICMSA's Beef & Cattle Committee speaking on the purchase of the Irish Country Meats plants in Ballyhaunis and Ballaghadreen by Dawn Meats said that he hoped that not only would Dawn Meats maintain these operations but would further develop the beef business in the West of Ireland and endeavour to improve cattle prices for farmers.

These two plants, Mr.

Heverin said, have played an important role in the development of the beef sector in the West of Ireland over the years and will be crucial to its further development into the next millennium. Finally Mr. Heverin wished Dawn Meats every success with their venture which he said he hoped would not only benefit the company but also the beef farmers of the West of Ireland.

**CALVES AND CATTLE**

Give the best grass to calves. Never give them grass older than 20 days. With good grass calves don't need meals. Late calves will benefit from 1 - 2 lbs. or alternatively 1 - 1.5 gallons of milk should be fed to them if one is going to be over quota. But all calves (young and old) must be at grass. However do not mix old and young calves.

Dosing will depend on the programme. Profits from cattle are very low therefore we must use the cheapest inputs. The cheapest doses are the yellow or white doses (costing £2 for the year). With good grazing management this could be reduced to £1 by dosing twice in the year. With these products there is no need to dose for stomach worms until late June or early July but be alert for hoose and dose at the first signs of coughing. Whatever system you operate, adhere strictly to the set times for dosing. Old cattle (1.5 years) and heifers may need a dose (white or yellow) particularly if they were on the bolus last year.

Stock cattle at 800 - 900 kgs. per acre and move to fresh grass after two days in a paddock. If you are overstocked sell some of the surplus now as the price may be low in the Autumn. Don't graze cows or cattle around the headlands of recently cut silage field.

**ENCOURAGE YOUNG FARMERS TO GO FOR TRAINING**

Applications for Agricultural Colleges are being taken now.

**DAIRY HYGIENE SCHEME 1999**

The Dairy Hygiene Scheme came into operation as from May 12, 1999. The objective of the scheme is to assist dairy farmers in meeting the cost of installing, replacing or upgrading the dairying facilities on their farms.

A grant of 40% in less favoured areas and 35% in other areas subject to a maximum grant of £7,000 per farm is available towards the construction and/or upgrading of the dairy and/or milking premises. The scheme is open to a dairy farmer who has not more than 100 income units. Income units are calculated as follows:

Cattle 6 - 24 months = 0.6 units, Cattle over 24 months = 1.0 unit, Ewe = 0.15 units, Milk Quota - 400 Gallons = 1.0 unit, Tillage Crops/Cereals = 1.0 unit per hectare, Intensive Crops = 2.00 units per hectare, Off farm-income £200 = 1.0 unit.

Each applicant must also submit a Nutrient Management Plan with the application unless he/she is already in REPS. Contact your Teagasc Adviser for more information and an application form.

Mr. Parlon who jointly launched the FBD Young Farmer of the Future Awards with Macra na Feirme President T. J. Maher, said now that the Agenda 2000 negotiations

have concluded the agricultural industry can plan for the future in a more stable environment.

Macra Na Feirme leader said "The agreement reached in March, under Agenda 2000 negotiations, now establishes agriculture on a more firm footing so that the industry can look forward with certainty for the next seven years. This is important for young farmers who are putting a farm

business plan in action and are planning for their future."

IFA President Tom Parlon said "One of the key issues that the Government must resolve in the future is the imbalance the age of profile of Irish farmers. 45% are over 55 years of age while only 12% are less than 35 years of age. While measures have applied in the past to encourage the transfer of farms, these need to

be improved and strengthened."

He said the buoyancy in the economy also means that many young farmers are chosen off-farm employment even on farms which are at the commercial end of the scale. The abolition of the enlargement clause, the recognition of part time farmers in the agricultural regulations and the return of the Young Farmer Installation Aid Scheme should ensure that the scheme will have more impact in changing the age profile.

Concluding the IFA President said "The investment in each job in agriculture is very low relative to that in the industrial sector". Agriculture faces many challenges in the future but I am confident that farmers can meet this challenge through the support of the various structural measures."

These news awards have been initiated by Macra na Feirme and IFA with the financial support of FBD Trust to highlight the vision and achievement among young farmers, and to encourage and promote a future in farming for Ireland's young people.

## South East ICMSA News

Mr. Michael Doody, Chairman of the ICMSA Taxation Committee advised low-income farmers to complete their applications for participation in the new Farm Assist Scheme.

He said, "ICMSA was very instrumental in getting this Farm Assist Scheme introduced and off the ground and I want to assure deserving farm families that it will be of benefit to them. It is very important that those presently in the Smallholders Assistance Scheme make their applications for inclusion in the new Farm Assist Scheme as otherwise their benefits will come to an end. Early application by all low income farmers before the end of this month will automatically backdate entitlements to April 7."

Mr. Doody advised farmers not to have any hesitation in getting their application forms from their local Social Welfare Offices.

He concluded, "Low income farmers are entitled to assistance. Those qualifying will get that assistance through the Farm Assist Scheme. If they do not apply they cannot get assistance."

ICMSA Call For Amendments To Telecommunications Bill

Mr. Terry O'Donnell, Deputy Chairman of ICMSA's Farm Services Committee said that ICMSA are deeply concerned about the proposed Telecommunication's (Infrastructure) Bill because of the implications it may have for landowners.

Mr. O'Donnell said that in particular, providing private telecommunications companies with compulsory purchase powers over land is totally unacceptable to ICMSA and said that the Minister for Public Enterprise, Mary O'Rourke should remove this provision from the proposed Bill. Removing this provision, Mr. O'Donnell said, would not interfere with the objectives of the Bill.

If, Mr. O'Donnell said, a telecommunication company requires land to site telecommunications infrastructure, they should like any other private company or individual negotiate with the landowner. Under no circumstances should a landowner have to negotiate under the threat of a CPO.

Mr. O'Donnell said that ICMSA have made a Submission to the Minister regarding amendments to the Telecommunication's Bill and said he hoped the Minister would take on board ICMSA's proposed amendments. Apart from the issue of compulsory purchase powers, ICMSA also proposed changes in relation to the obligations of telecommunication companies to landowners, Mr. O'Donnell concluded.

## IFA CALLS FOR NEW CODE OF PRACTICE ON DIRECT PAYMENTS

Waterford IFA Chairman James Coughlan has called on Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to introduce a new code of practice for the Department of Agriculture on the administration of direct payments to farmers.

Mr. Coughlan said a whole new level of bureaucracy and red tape have infiltrated the direct payment schemes since the Charter of Farmers rights were introduced in 1995. "This unnecessary this bureaucracy is clogging up the system and resulting in payment delays and excessive penalties being imposed on farmers."

The Waterford IFA Chairman said the Department of Agriculture have introduced a whole new level of regulations surrounding the tagging and identification system as well as a new register.

In addition the farm inspection procedure is now so policed and stringent as to be impossible to comply with in practical farm conditions where up to 5% of ani-

mals loose ear tags.

Mr. Coughlan said the current penalty system is excessive in the extreme and takes no account of common sense or proportionality.

Mr. Coughlan said IFA is putting forward a new Code of Practice for direct payments involving farmer friendly and practical inspection procedures. In addition the IFA code will involve an independent and fair appeal system to be chaired by a High Court Judge.

Mr. Coughlan said IFA is demanding that the excessive penalty system which could deny a farmer his entire income for a year on the back of a simple error be totally reformed. He said the penalties must be proportionate to the error made.

On tagging and registration Mr. Coughlan said technology must be utilized under the CMMS system (computerise movement and monitoring) to obviate the need for excessive paperwork in keeping farm registers.

## GLANBIA MUST BRIDGE MILK PRICE GAP

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murphy has called on the Board of Glanbia to bridge the milk price gap which has opened up between them and the rest of the industry.

Michael Murphy added that Golden Vale, the only other milk purchaser who had gone down by 5p in January last, had recently reconsidered their position and increased their price by 2p.

Michael Murphy said Glanbia were in any case committed to paying 3p above

the Farmers Journal Milk Price Audit average for this year.

Over the last three months a significant discrepancy has developed between the Glanbia milk price and most other milk purchasers'. Michael Murphy said "At the time of the merger Glanbia producers had been led to expect that they would not have to wait until the publication of the Audit in June of the following year for the fulfilment of this commitment, and that Glanbia would pay among the best milk prices at all times".

## Leddy Highlights Rural Roads Concern

I would like to highlight the three main areas of concern to voters in the Lismore Electoral Area in respect of the roads.

Secondly, lighting of villages and smaller conurbations has not kept up with the building of new houses and the next County Development Plan should include an automatic formula for the extension of public lighting in places like Glencairn, Affane and Touraneena. Finally the main cause of concern over road safety is speeding through villages like Touraneena and I am calling on Waterford County Council to provide adequate traffic calming measures throughout the area.

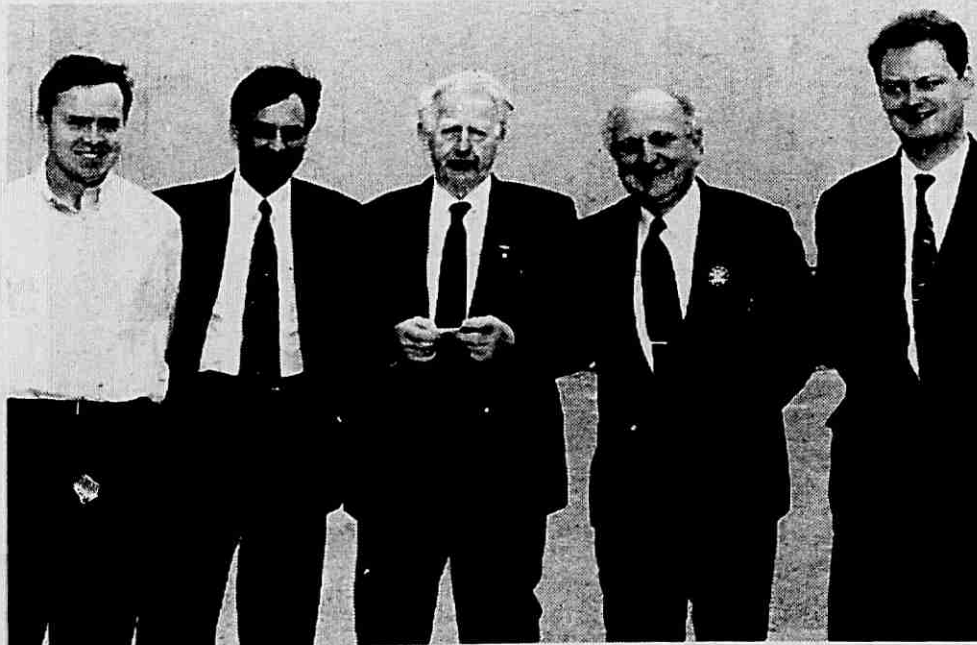

# Violence In The Home

In an ideal world every home would be a haven of peace and harmony where there is nurturing love and unconditional support. Unfortunately, for many, home is a smothering, unloving, battleground where anger, guilt, shame and too often abuse predominate. When psychologists or sociologists talk about abuse in relationships we usually deal with it under three categories - physical, emotional and sexual. In fact very often one will find more than one type of abuse within a relationship or group of relationships such as the family. In this article I will dwell specifically on the physical abuse of a partner in a relationship. Physical abuse is very common and more often than not suffered in silence.

Abuse and wife battering are unacceptable behaviours and show a total disrespect for the victim. They also indicate how out of control the perpetrator is. An abusive partner interprets battering, be it physical, emotional, sexual as permission to escalate the assaults into more frequent and violent acts. The victim will often suffer injuries which he/she will strive to conceal or in some cases tragically death.

## WHY DOES THIS HAPPEN?

Dysfunction is circular, that is we act out behaviours learned in childhood - unless we develop an awareness which enables us to create new and healthier patterns. As children violent individuals were most likely abused or emotionally abandoned themselves. By emotionally abandoned I mean that as a child they were not loved and nurtured. Most abusers are men, although some women do abuse their partners, something which is even more deeply hidden than abuse by men.

Men who batter are controlling dependent people. This dependence gives rise to deep anger which they direct at those closest to them, their wives. In the outside world the perpetrator of violence may project himself as a nice guy but at home he batters his wife to frighten and control her. Abusers are usually jealous and suspicious. They have few friends and are entirely dependent on their 'special woman' for emotional nurturance and sustenance. They do not like their wives mixing with other men, so much so, that often at social functions their jealousy will roll their 'wounded child tapes' and they will even lash out at their wives in public.

The first time a person loses control there will probably be immediate remorse and fervent promises not to do it again. These promises are sincere when uttered but the problem is that the abuser cannot control this hitting out. When rage builds up he will lose control and as his conditioned response is violence, all promises to change are forgotten. Eventually it is accepted as a normal occurrence in the household. Alcohol very often fuels

the rage as it loosens inhibitions but it does not cause an individual to be violent. A person who becomes violent after alcohol consumption has impaired judgment, a lower tolerance to frustration and poor personal controls. However the actual behaviours have their roots in shame which reinforces feelings of inadequacy. Guilt and shame are bedfellows and so create an acting out in abusers as they are unable to deal with emotions as they arise. As they are out of balance the abuser loses control.

## THE VICTIM

When a woman has been beaten and humiliated by her spouse, she will very soon begin to feel worthless and unlovable. Love and sharing turn to resentment - hate even - and alienation. But while nothing is done the situation will continue. The chronic physical injury from beatings creates an ongoing state of exhaustion and the victim feels emotionally and physically battered. If any of these feelings are expressed she may suffer more beatings. Eventually the abused woman believes she is incapable of taking care of herself. These feelings are compounded when the abuser comes through with some indulgence. Then the victim feels hope that the abuser will change and so she decides to continue in the relationship.

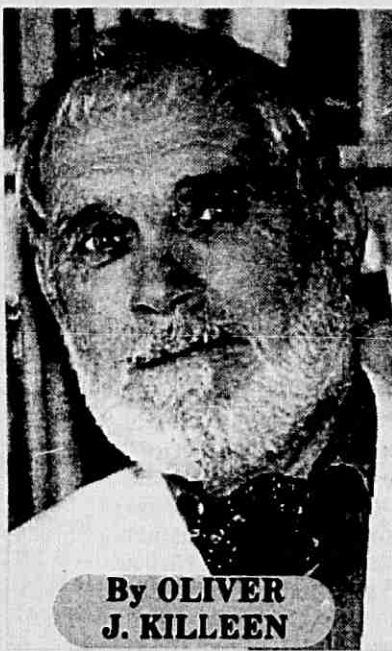
When abused women say 'I know I should leave him but I love him', they are in fact in an addictive relationship and are saying 'I accept being beaten'. This triggers victims of abuse to withdraw and fall into deep depression. Relatives stay away, not wanting to get involved or they may disbelieve the claims of the victim. When a battered woman sees this isolation, her husband's denial of guilt and his projecting the blame on to her, she begins to believe that there is something wrong with her and so the downward spiral into deep depression continues.

Abused and battered women who have threatened their husbands with 'If you don't change or get help I will leave you' are met with replies like 'If you leave me I will kill myself' or 'I will burn the house down' etc. Yes some husbands have committed suicide. Yes some have burned the house down and yes some have killed their wives and children. However if one is at the receiving end of emotional blackmail it must always be remembered that we are not responsible for another adult's actions and that fear of what they might do is no reason for continuing to suffer.

## EFFECTS ON CHILDREN

It is an established fact that abusive parents very often also physically abuse their children. Furthermore it's not unusual for men who batter to sexually molest children. The child will feel guilty or ashamed and afraid that he/she will be blamed so it becomes yet another dark secret.

Children suffer irreparable damage when they grow up in an abusive home. Each day a child is in a home

where violence occurs is a day the child learns that physical brutality is acceptable. Children cannot go through life and be fresh and strong if they live in constant express trains of terror.

## WHAT TO DO?

Women who are victims of abuse must never allow themselves accept violence and see it as their problem. The first step is to reach out for help. Victims should talk to a professional, someone who can understand what is going on and the possible reasons. This latter is essential - as a professional I often reiterate that if we are going to jump into somebody's life with an offer of help we must know what we are talking about and have a clear vision of what it is we can do. Both the abuser and the victim need help in these situations. The abuser will need to acknowledge that his behaviour is wrong and this can be a major step for many men who have developed this compulsive behaviour. For both parties there is the challenge of developing more effective ways of communicating and handling conflict.

Let's assume that the abuser is unwilling to accept help and the challenge to change. Then the other party has two choices - accept the situation or leave the marriage. Many people do remain in violent relationships out of fear of loneliness, the dread of coping independently, guilt at breaking up the family unit or perhaps loss of social status. For someone who is at a crossroads, it is very useful to make a written inventory of the advantages and disadvantages of separation. My advice to anybody who is suffering habitual abuse and where there is no hope of redressing the situation, is to get free so that you can create the future you deserve and want.

Marriage is not intended as a licence to push, punch and punish. When violence appears, it should be acknowledged and addressed. If it is denied, it will continue always and will bring more casualties with it.

# TV Revolution Must Not Prevent Access To Sport

Gerard Collins, Fianna Fáil MEP for Munster and vice-president of the European Parliament has called for a comprehensive list of sporting events to be drawn up which would continue to be broadcast free of charge.

"There has been a virtual revolution in broadcasting technology in recent years and it is in the public interest that certain activities remain free of commercial exploitation," said Mr. Collins.

"I welcome Minister de Valera's new Digital Television Bill insofar as it gives a clear definition of public service broadcasting which includes the provision of sporting and cultural activities. Sport is one of the main attractions for the new Pay-TV channels and we have seen many examples of attempts to buy up exclusive rights.

Major sporting events are part of our cultural heritage and everybody has a right to share in them. They can not be reserved for a privileged few. This was a cause championed by the European Parliament in the last term. The public can reasonably expect to see such major events on channels which are available to everyone."

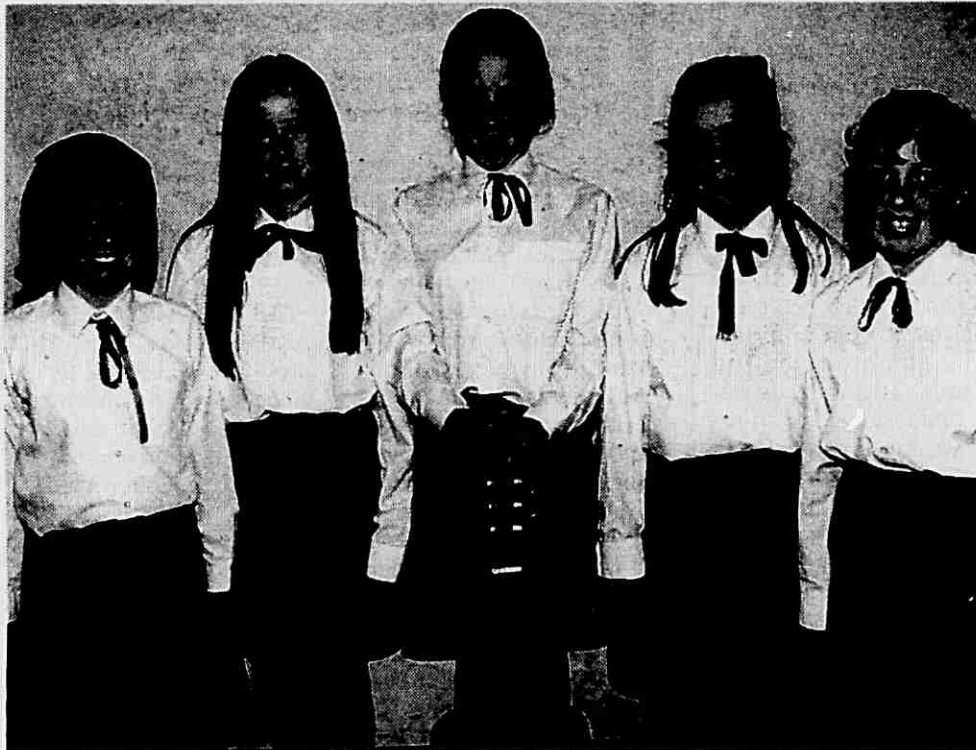

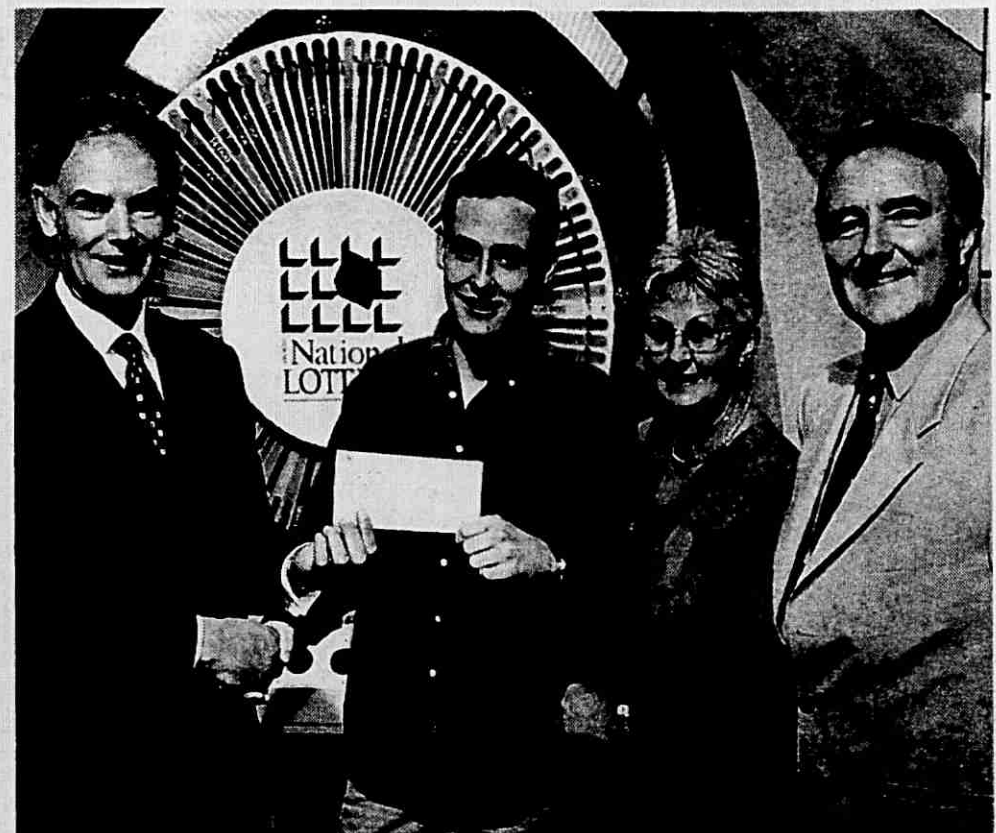

**Tobin Sets Out Top Election Priorities**

Cheaper motor insurance is something all young voters must hope for, Mr. James Tobin, candidate in the forthcoming local elections in June has been very vocal in his wish to achieve this. According to O Ceilleachair, the County Returning Officer, Peter Carey, intends proceeding with subsequent counts throughout Sunday afternoon.

"I don't think anyone would mind waiting until Monday for the results. People involved in all aspects of the county would be delighted to get to see the game and support their county in such a critical championship tie", stated Cllr. O Ceilleachair.

# Barnawee Bridge Black Spot

With yet another car crash chalked up at the Barnawee Bridge intersection with the road to Dungarvan Golf Club and to Ballinacourty, we should surely look at ways to make this particular junction less hazardous. Considering that it is already a notoriously dangerous spot for local motorists who are well aware of its potential for accidents, what hope then is there for the many visitors we are encouraging to come to this area.

A simple interim safety measure would be the erection of an appropriate road sign on the approach road from Clonea, just after the turn to Ballinroad. This would encourage drivers to slow down on the downhill gradient and thus allow more adequate reaction time for drivers at Barnawee Cross.

Ballinacourty residents are steadily acquiring the status of Grand Prix spectators as the Gold Coast road is used as a practice circuit by many aspiring

Formula One drivers. As this rapidly developing area struggles to cope with the triple roles that are agricultural, residential and amenity, traffic control is becoming all the more urgent. Residents are also concerned about the poor quality of the road surface, the unfinished aspect of the road widening and the total neglect of the Ballinacourty Pier Road. The roads in the Ballinacourty/Clonea are used by agricultural traffic, commuters, holiday traffic including caravans, cyclists, joggers, pedestrians and leisurely walkers.

All must be accommodated safely; basic to this is road re-surfacing and traffic control measures.

If the Dungarvan Tourism drive is to be taken seriously, basic maintenance cannot be left undone.

# Abbeyside Topics

## ELECTION FEVER

We are proud to record that Abbeyside is one of the highest places in Ireland as regards turnout for the local elections. Party activists forecast that it will be a tight battle between Billy Kyne (Labour) and John Deasy (Fine Gael) for the honour of topping the poll in the Urban Council Election.

The Quota will be around 360-370 votes and a candidate would need two hundred and fifty first preference votes at least in order to be elected. It is generally accepted that people do not vote on party lines in local elections and it is the individual candidates record and personality that count with the voters.

There are thirteen candidates in all contesting the local Urban Council seats and it looks like being a contest between Fianna Fail, Labour and Independent Mickey Riordan to decide who will take the last seat. The candidates will be extremely busy this week as they strive to complete their canvass and then it will be up to the voters to decide on Friday which candidates they will give preference for on the day. All in all it is going to be a very interesting election as Abbeyside, Ballinroad, Gar-ranbane and Ballinacourty people turn out in their usual large numbers to cast their votes in the polling booths in Abbeyside School and Ballinroad Hall.

### ELECTION ISSUES

According to independent candidate Michael O'Riordan the Community Centre in Abbeyside will be a reality within two years and so far six sites have been identified. A committee meeting will take place next Thursday to assess progress to date. The traffic problems at Crotty's Corner where a roundabout is necessary is an ongoing issue. The pedestrian crossing at Mulcahy's Supermarket with an island in the centre of the road which is necessary for older people will become a reality within 12 months. Micky Riordan was responsible in persuading the town engineer to erect the Abbeyside signs which has given the town an identity separate to that of Dungarvan. As Chairman of the Library Committee for the past eleven years he was responsible for the new state of the art library which was opened recently. He has been a member of the V.E.C. since 1985 and a new school will be built on the Presentation Convent site.

Dan Dineen is primarily concerned with Health matters and all those young and old who are sick at home and in hospital. He is also concerned with our road and pin points, the Ballinroad Church junction, the road junction at Kilminion Graveyard, Walsh's Cross, Ballinroad which leads to Clonea Strand and the Crooked Bridge at Garrnageeragh East where there is at least two accidents a month and speeding in estates like Seapark as areas that need to be attended to. The junction at Barnawee Bridge has become much busier since the construction of two eighteen hole golf courses at Knocknagranagh and the Gold Coast, Ballinacourty.

Councillor Nuala Ryan has found throughout her canvass that young people are very interested in the workings of the local authority. She met the students in St. Augustine's College, many of whom will be first time voters and she was very well received.

Issues that arose were the roundabout at Crotty's Corner, the pedestrian crossing at Mulcahy's Supermarket, the footpaths in Murphy Place and the fact that Ballinroad is a sixty mile zone area. Speed limits also need to be introduced on the road to St. Augustine's College, on the road to Clonea and to the Gold Coast as well as Duckspool.

Labour Councillor Paddy Power also emphasises traffic management and the safety of pedestrians. According to Paddy more land is needed for local authority housing. # Waterford Have 50/50 Chance Of Beating Cork In Thriller

Reading the odds laid by 4 of the leading Bookmakers tell us that they are installing Cork as favourites and they see us in the role of challengers. This is how we like it and it will help to reduce the pressure. We seem to cope better when we are the outsiders and we suffer when we are fancied to perform wonders.

## FULL HOUSE EXPECTED AT SEMPLE STADIUM

Like, for instance, for our match against Limerick in the first round, when the public and the media had made us hot favourites and this increased the pressure. We have a bit of a tradition too, of putting the pressure on ourselves and as we did last year with a lot of harmful hype and immaturity that proved so costly in the semi-final against Kilkenny.

One of the most pleasing things about our win over Limerick is that the county did not go crazy as we did after beating Tipperary last year. There was that bit of justifiable euphoria, but we all came back to earth in good time to adopt a low-key approach to the game against Cork on Sunday.

There are no leaks or rumours out of the camp and no injury problems to worry the management and supporters. Tony Browne is believed to be recovering very well and was being rested all last week.

He is back in training again this week and has been named to play in his favourite midfield position.

The panel travelled to Semple Stadium on Tuesday night for a trial spin on the pitch and will do light training in the Fraher Field on Friday evening.

Cork trained in Thurles on Saturday evening last and they say that they have a couple of injury worries.

When the team was selected and announced on Saturday evening last it showed to be the same as that which

started against Limerick. This is an expected vote of confidence, but there had been rumours that Billy O'Sullivan might be moved away from the centre half forward berth and be replaced there by a stronger opponent for the great Brian Corcoran.

Brendan Landers took over in goal from Stephen Brennar after the league semi-final against Limerick last year and was not at fault for the two Cork goals in the final. The Lismore man has played in every grade in goal with the county and is now a very experienced goalkeeper who inspires confidence in the team.

Very few hurling people will disagree with the statement that our six defenders are as good as there are in the country. They have played consistently well since they adopted their present formation last year.

The only change from the six defenders who played against Cork in the league final last year is that Brian Flannery comes on for Mark O'Sullivan.

Full back Sean Cullinane is playing in the position for ten years and has played very successfully against the best forwards in the game. Tom Feeney and team captain Brian Flannery have each contributed enormously to Waterford's progress over the past two seasons. Tom Feeney had a brilliant game against Limerick.

Back at right half, Peter Queally is playing in his favourite position. He had a whale of a game against Limerick. Stephen Frampton and Brian Greene (who missed the last 22 minutes of the first round), both played against Cork in 1991 and have continued to serve since with distinction.

Frampton will be at centre half and Greene on the other wing, where he also played nine years ago.

Fergal Hartley has played very well since moving out to midfield to partner Player of the Year, Tony Browne who is expected to be back at his best for the game on Sunday. Browne's fitness will be a crucial factor in this game where control of the midfield sector will be of major importance.

The selectors have given a vote of confidence to the six forwards and this should inspire confidence in this section.

Dan Shanahan, Billy O'Sullivan and Ken McGrath, Michael White, Paul Flynn and Dave Bennett have been combining very well for over a dozen games or so and are functioning as an efficient unit. Many followers would like to see Dave Bennett in the half forward line where he has operated very successfully through several tough encounters. We can be sure that the Cork defence will try to police Paul Flynn from the start and while we can be sure that he will figure in the scoring, he certainly will not find it easy to record his average score here. Dan Shanahan, Ken McGrath, Billy O'Sullivan (he will certainly have his hands full in coping with Brian Corcoran), and Michael White are also capable of taking their scores.

Since we played Cork in the 1998 league final, the great Ger Cunningham has retired. His replacement, Donal Og Cusack, has since played some brilliant hurling between the posts for Cork. He will be there on Sunday.

Their defence will likely include Brian Corcoran, who has opted for hurling in preference to football and is truly a majestic figure in defence. Around him will be John Browne at full back, Fergal Ryan, Diarmuid O'Sullivan, Mark Landers and possibly, Sean O hAilpin. Until their team is announced we cannot be sure of their midfield pairing, but a likely duo are Pat Ryan and Michael Daly.

In attack, the favourites will have the sharp shooting Joe Deane, Sean McGrath, Fergal McCormack (who is likely to prove a handful for Frampton), Sean Farrell, who got one of their goals against us in the league final, and Kieran Morrisson.

I see this as a 'mind' game as much as a hurling match and I believe that an awful lot will depend on the players' mental attitude going out on Semple Stadium. If this is right, I believe that we have the beating of Cork. It will be very agonising again if we have to experience a situation where our supporters and the media will be telling us that 'we left it behind us'!

We all have memories of the league final last year when Waterford, having been 2 points in arrears at half-time, took the lead after only 8 minutes of the second half and then sent six wides (some only inches wide) at a time when we were completely in control. The media told us on the Monday that we had left it behind.

To a lesser extent the same was said after the semi-final when we lost by a point to Kilkenny.

And again, in the league this year when we played Cork in Pairc Ui Rinn without Tony Browne (injured) and Paul Flynn (suspended) and level after 62 minutes, we lost a chance of taking the points (even with Aidan Mac Suibhne refereeing it).

Regardless of how the bookmakers see it, we are as good as Cork, if not better and with the right approach, we can make it to another Munster final.

In the ten years we have played 20 championship matches and we won 6, drew 3 and lost 11.

Over the same period Cork played 23, won 12, drew 2 and lost 9.

They have won a record 45 Munster titles and 27 All Ireland titles. They last won the McCarthy cup in 1990.

Waterford, on the other hand have won 5 Munster and 2 All Ireland titles. We won our last provincial title in 1963.

filled by Nial O'Donnell and Rory O'Sullivan, both from Ballygunner and both having played in the senior club championships.

Gavin Breen, Victor O'Shea and Eoin O'Sullivan all played splendid defensive hurling against Limerick.

The very experienced Dan Casey and Colin Fanning moved the ball very well around the middle of the field and may be named as partners there again.
