Spectacular Debut For John Deasy

Following Friday's local elections, this week the 'Leader' brings you an up-to-date report on the weekend results and a breakdown of how the electorate voted for the new, incoming members of the various local authorities. Over 56% of the electorate in the county cast their vote at polling booths throughout Friday and the arduous task of counting began at 9 a.m. on Saturday continuing until after 10 p.m. The results of the Dungarvan UDC elections were finalised by 7 p.m. on Saturday while a recount of the Suir electoral area delayed the results of the County Council elections until mid-day on Sunday.

DISAPPOINTMENT FOR SOME CELEBRATIONS FOR OTHERS

DEASY & WILKINSON IMPRESS

Fine Gael newcomer John Deasy, son of longstanding Waterford Deputy Austin Deasy made a sparkling debut in local politics. The UCC law student topped the poll in the Dungarvan electoral area for both the Urban and County Council elections. His party colleague and another new face in the political arena, Dr. Tom Higgins of Ballinacourty, scored second highest in the polls in the

Dungarvan area for the County elections on 855 first preference votes.

Ollie Wilkinson of Fianna Fáil again attracted a formidable vote in the west of the county reflecting his popularity in the Dáil elections in 1997. Standing in the four-seat Lismore electoral area, Ollie amassed a huge 1,859 first preferences, almost double the

quota which was set at 965.

Delighted with the result, Ollie told the 'Leader' he was stunned at such a 'fantastic vote' and expressed his grateful appreciation to the voters in the West Waterford area. He was also delighted that the Fianna Fáil party fared so well in the local elections. The party increased its representation

Know Your Rights

Question

I am 67 years old and have been self employed for the past ten years. I heard recently that I may be entitled to a Pro-Rata Old Age Contributory Pension?

Answer

A special Pro-Rata Old Age Contributory Pension will be introduced in October, 1999 for self-employed contributors who were over the age of 56 when social insurance was introduced for the self employed and therefore did not qualify for a contributory pension.

You may qualify for this pension if you were aged 56 or over on April 6, 1988 (i.e. born on or before April 6, 1932). You must also have started paying PRSI contributions as a self-employed person on or after April 6, 1988 and have 260 paid contributions since April 6, 1988.

The pension will become effective from April 9, 1999 but it is expected that there will be a delay in payments due to a heavy administrative effort involved in processing the claims involved. However arrears due will be backdated to April 9, 1999 (arrears will only be paid to those who apply for a Pro-Rata Old Age Contributory Pension for self employed before April 9, 2000).

Applications should be made by completing an Old Age Contributory Pension Claim form (RP/CP1) which is available from local social welfare offices or from post offices nationwide.

MORTGAGE ARREARS

"Life is not just a matter of always holding good cards but simply of playing a poor hand well." - Robert Louis Stevenson.

The roof over your head is the most important of all. When it comes to repossessions some people say "It will never happen to me." However mortgage arrears are a fact of life for some people and repossessions do happen. However, provided you talk to the lending institution it need not lead to repossession.

It is very important as soon as your financial situation changes that you notify your lending institution of this fact and make a new arrangement regarding your monthly repayments. Payments towards the mortgage should be ones you can reasonably afford. The lender may also agree to extend the repayment period.

The most important thing is to keep in touch with your lender and if you need help to get independent advice. With the cost of housing today and the fact that many people have hefty mortgages, letting payments slip for a month or two can amount to a high level of arrears. The longer you leave it, the more difficult it is to address the problem.

Remedial Service For Co. Waterford Schools

The Minister for Education, Michael Martin has announced that a remedial service is to be provided for an additional nineteen schools in Waterford from September 1st next.

Among the schools are - Scoil na Rinne, Scoil na Leanaí and Baile Mhic Airt, in Ring; SN Gobnait, Coolnasmear, Dungarvan; St. Mary's NS Touraneena; Scoil Garbháin, Dungarvan; Garranbane national school; Stradbally Convent; St. James Church of Ireland, Stradbally; SN na Croise Naofa, Stradbally; Kilrossanty national school, and Fews national school, Kilmacthomas.

Commenting on the Minister's announcement, Waterford Fianna Fail Deputy Brendan Kenneally said he was delighted with the provision of these additional resources to the schools involved. Many of them, he said, have been looking for this service for a considerable period of time.

"It further underlines the Government's commitment to approve the pupil teacher ratio and to make all the necessary services available in all schools throughout the country. While some of the schools involved will share a new remedial teacher, nevertheless this announcement will bring about a significant improvement in all the schools involved", stated Deputy Kenneally.

£2,500 Grant For County Council Earthwatch

The Minister of State at the Department of the Environment has announced that he has allocated £200,000 in grants to 71 projects under the 1999 Environmental Partnership Fund. Included in the projects is Earthwatch Waterford County Council which will receive £2,500 in funding. This allocation will go towards highlighting environmentally friendly methods of transportation through the Electric Car Roadshow and the preparation of a local authority handbook on road traffic reduction.

The Environmental Partnership Fund was introduced in 1997 to provide funding for awareness projects at local level involving partnership arrangements between local authorities and local community groups.

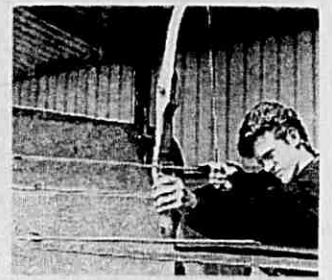
2nd YEAR TRIP

Waterford Community Groups Allocated £54,000

The Dungarvan Family Centre at Mitchel Street, Dungarvan is one of several voluntary and community groups in Waterford city and county to receive funding from the Department of Social Welfare.

A total of £54,000 is being allocated by Minister Dermot Ahern to groups in the area which deal with marriage preparation programmes and both child and bereavement counselling and support services.

The Dungarvan Family Centre will receive £7,000,

ACCORD will receive £12,500, St. Brigid's Family & Community Centre will receive £33,000, and the Family Ministry Office will receive £1,500.

Welcoming the an-

nouncement, Minister of State Martin Cullen said this allocation is extremely important in terms of providing better support services for couples and families who meet difficulties.

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Junior Encyclopaedia

CATTLE

When cattle are young, they may threaten each other to find out who's leader. A cow that is going to threaten another one, stands with its head lowered and its hind legs forward, eyeing the other. Sometimes it may paw the ground.

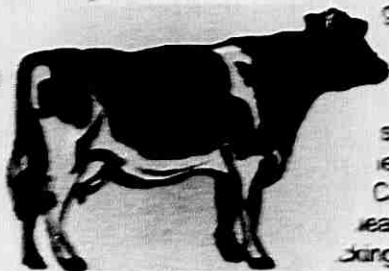
If the other cow makes a threat as well, they fight. They will try to knock one another and push with their heads. The fight will end when one cow loses interest and walks away.

In winter, cattle eat hay or silage and sometimes kale. All through the year the

farmer feeds them a cow cake which is made from barley, soya, fish meal and molasses.

The cow needs to drink about 60 litres of water per day. They drink most after evening milking. While they are drinking, they keep their nostrils above the surface of the water.

In a herd that is established, there is usually one cow which leads the others



when going in for milking. It is not necessarily the oldest or strongest cow. The older cows are usually at the back of the herd, along with the weak ones.

Nowadays, most milking is done by machine. In hand-milking the farmer grasps a teat in each hand and squeezes it with his thumb and forefinger. Then, gently but firmly, he pulls his hand down the teat to get the milk out.

Cattle try to keep themselves clean. They groom themselves by jing. They scratch the parts they

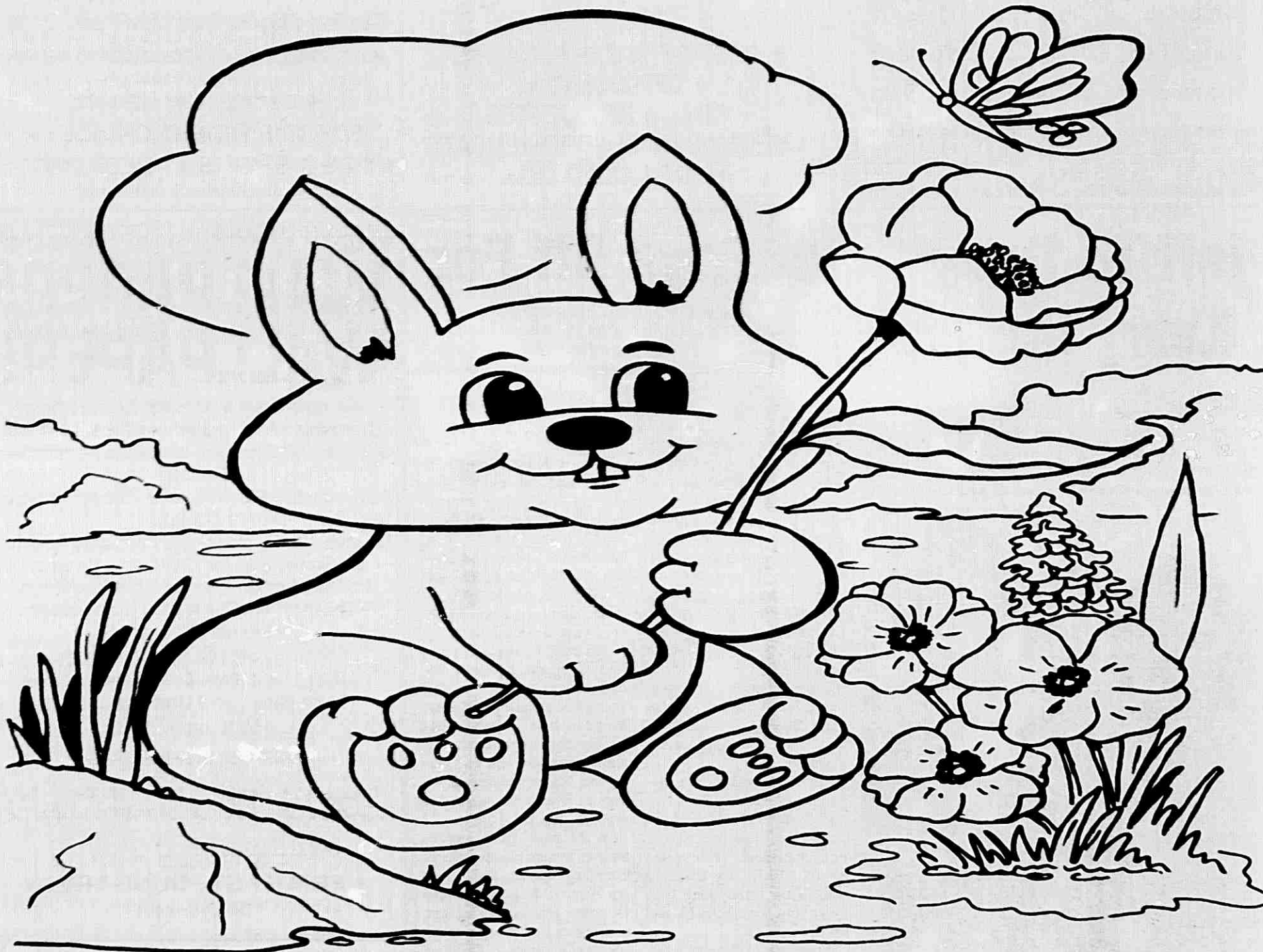
cannot reach by rubbing against fences or trees.

They use their tails to brush their skins and also to flick off flies. You might see one cow grooming another on the head and neck. They also do this to please one another.

While the cow chews, it moves its head about looking for the next patch of grass to eat. It can walk up to 4km a day while grazing. Cattle avoid grazing near dung pats. When the cow is finished grazing it sits down or stands still and chews the cud.

Another thing you might see is a lump of salt in the field. The farmer puts it there for the cows to lick and this gives them the minerals they need in their diet.

Moussaka For Cheats

A QUICK and easy recipe for a delicious spicy dish that even the most hard-nosed microwave dinner maniac could make!

Ingredients:

Serves 4
450g lean lamb mince
1 onion, chopped
2 cloves garlic, crushed
400g can ratatouille
2 x 15ml sp tomato ketchup
1 x 15ml sp tomato purée
1 x 15ml sp fresh mixed herbs, chopped, or 1 x 5ml sp dried mixed herbs
4 pitta breads
2 beef tomatoes, sliced

Method:

In a large non-stick wok or frying pan, dry fry the lamb mince until browned. This will take four to six minutes.

Add the chopped onion and the crushed garlic and cook for a further one or two minutes to flavour the mince.

Add to the pan or wok the

tinned ratatouille, tomato ketchup, tomato purée and chopped dried or fresh mixed herbs.

Bring the filling mixture to the boil and cover. Simmer for five to six minutes.

After simmering, fill the ready pitta breads with the hot mince mixture and tomato slices.

Serve the finished moussaka with a greek salad, extra pitta bread wedges and pitted olives on the side.

TIPS: Try using baked beans instead of ratatouille.

Always make sure you dry fry mince as it is healthier - mince contains its own natural fats to cook in.

Try using the small pitta breads which can be found in any supermarket. They are ideal for a miniature version of the meal, a hand-held snack, or even appetisers at summer barbecues.

Heat the pitta breads before trying to split them. Give them 10 seconds in the microwave and they will come apart much more easily.



Mushroom and Mint Kebabs

A ZINGY yoghurt marinade adds succulence to this mushroom dish.

Ingredients:

Serves 4
KEBABS:
20 large button mushrooms
150ml natural yoghurt
1 garlic clove, crushed
Juice of 1 lemon
1 x 15ml sp freshly chopped mint
1 x 15ml sp paprika
RICE:
50g butter
1 x 15ml sp olive oil
2-3 red peppers, diced
450g cooked weight, American long grain rice
Salt and pepper

Method:

Divide the mushrooms on to four

skewers, and place in a dish. Mix the yoghurt with the garlic, lemon juice, mint and paprika.

Pour over the mushrooms, then turn them until they are coated.

Cover the dish and refrigerate for at least two hours.

To serve, grill kebabs for six to eight minutes, turning once, until tender.

While the mushrooms are cooking, heat the butter and the olive oil in a wok or large frying pan.

Add the red peppers and cook for a few minutes until tender.

Add the rice, increasing the heat to give a stir-fry finish.

Cook for a few minutes and season with salt and pepper.

Serve with the kebabs, garnished with fresh mint and lemon wedges.

TIP: Try adding tomatoes, peas or even a splash of tabasco sauce to liven things up.

Strawberry and Apricot Soufflé

A FRESH fruity dessert for a summer dinner party.

Ingredients:

Serves 6
500g fresh apricots
125ml unsweetened apple juice
1 x 5ml sp orange liqueur
1 x 5ml sp orange zest
Vegetable oil spray
6 large egg whites
1/4 x 5ml sp cream of tartar
Pinch of salt
3/4 x 15ml sp fructose

COULIS:

350g fresh strawberries
2 x 15ml sp fructose
2 x 15ml sp unsweetened apple juice
2 x 5ml sp orange liqueur

Method:

Pre-heat the oven to 180°C/350°F / Gas Mark 4. Cook the apricots in the apple juice for about 15 minutes, until soft. Cool and

purée with the liqueur and the orange zest in a blender. Spray eight 240g soufflé dishes with the vegetable spray, taking care to coat the inside of each dish so soufflés will rise.

In the bowl of an electric mixer, combine the egg whites, cream of tartar and salt. Beat together until the whites form soft peaks. Add the fructose sugar and beat until the whites are stiff but not dry. Fold the whites into the fruit purée.

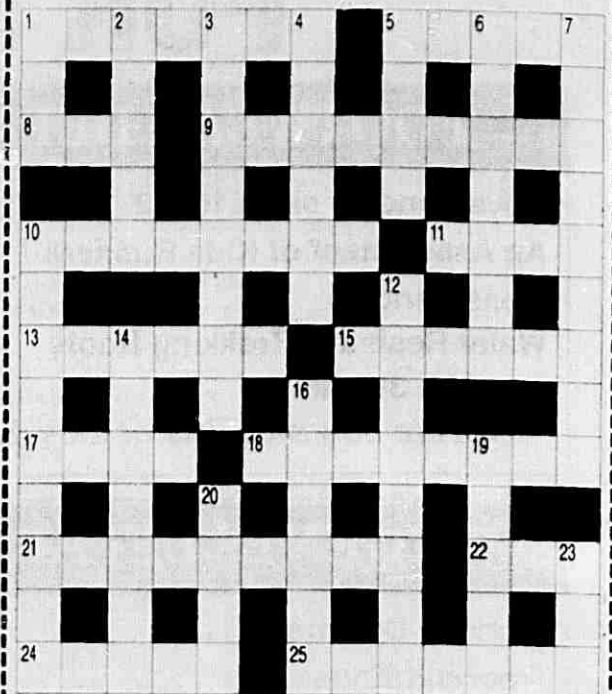
Combine all coulis ingredients in a mixer and blend until smooth. Strain through a fine sieve. Stir in orange liqueur. Spoon one 5ml spoon of strawberry coulis into the bottom of each soufflé dish.

Spoon the apricot mixture into the dishes and level with a spatula. Bake for 25-30 minutes, until risen and golden brown.

Do not open the oven during baking. Serve at once.

tation on the 23 member Council from ten to eleven seats - just one seat short of an overall majority. The party received 10,350 votes representing 41.6% of the electorate followed by the Fine Gael party which received 32% of the vote share.

Another Fianna Fáil candidate Nuala Ryan (Dungarvan) scored an impressive double when retaining her seat on the UDC and winning a seat on the County Council. Following uproar from FF supporters in the area, Nuala was only added to the County Council party ticket in the eleventh hour and had a few weeks in which to complete her canvass.

COFFEY TO RESIGN FROM FG

The weekend brought many celebrations, surprises and shocks for candidates. One of the major upsets was the failure of five sitting councillors to retain their seats. Both Austin Flynn (FF) and Fiachra O'Ceilleachair (Lab) lost out in the UDC elections while Oliver Coffey (FG), Paddy O'Callaghan (Lab) and Lar Hart (Lab) both lost their seats on the County Council.

With some 4,000 new voters in the enlarged Kilmacthomas electoral area, Oliver Coffey started his campaign as early as possible, covering Ballylaneen, Bonmahon, Kill, Dunhill, Newtown and part of Kilmeaden. He looked a certain bet for the new Council until a second FG candidate was put forward for the elections in his own area against Cllr. Coffey's wishes.

Speaking to the 'Leader' on Monday, Cllr. Coffey thanked his wife Mary, the people who canvassed for him and all who voted for him. After serving twenty years with the Fine Gael party on the Co. Council, Oliver has done sterling work for the people of Leamybrien, Kilrossanty and Kilmacthomas down through the years.

Deeply disappointed with his own party, Cllr. Coffey said that adding a second candidate to the party ticket in the Kilmac' electoral area was a 'crazy' and 'stupid' decision.

"The people behind the move are from my own parish", he stated. "It was a stupid decision made by people who hadn't a clue of what was happening on the ground".

He said he will be resigning from the FG party shortly.

LABOUR PARTY BACKLASH

Holding 15.5% of the total votes in the county, the Labour party lost out in the County Council elections with the unexpected defeat of sitting Councillors Paddy

O'Callaghan (Tramore) and Dungarvan's Lar Hart. They still retain three seats on the Council however.

Speaking to the 'Leader' in the aftermath of Friday's elections, Lar Hart condemned Waterford Labour TD Brian O'Shea for his lack of support for the Labour candidates, particularly in the Dungarvan area.

As the leading Labour figure in the constituency, Cllr. Hart said it was up to O'Shea to organise election campaigns both locally and nationally.

In the event of a Dail election, Cllr. Hart said the local Labour party members would immediately offer their services to him.

In the run up to last weekend's elections however, Cllr. Hart said O'Shea was noticeable only by his absence and only put in an appearance in Dungarvan on Saturday June 12th during the count.

"He did nothing in Dungarvan", stressed Hart. "Even the advert he took out in the local papers failed to mention the Dungarvan candidates".

He was quick to point out however that this matter was not simply a case of 'sour grapes' towards Nuala Ryan who took a Co. Council seat for FF in the Dungarvan area. Cllr. Hart wished her every success and was delighted she had won the seat.

While disappointed to have lost his County Council seat, Lar was happy that his vote increased substantially overall, particularly in the UDC elections. He thanked all who supported him and the media for their coverage since being elected onto the County Council.

"I'll be back", he vowed. In the interim, Lar says he will have to consider his options over the next few days and who he will support for Chairman of the UDC into the next millennium.

UDC - ROLE MODEL FOR LABOUR

Fresh from the weekend elections in the Dungarvan area, Labour's Billy Kyne said Dungarvan UDC should be a role model for the Labour party headquarters with regard to the ability of the existing team to hold the 3 outgoing seats in what was a very competitive electoral contest.

"While the campaign was fought on two separate fronts (post DL/Lab merger), I welcome and recognise that a 9 seat Council with 4 Labour members must be a record for the party nationally", he stated.

With 640 first preference votes in the County elections and 427 votes in the Urban (second highest), Billy said

these results were particularly satisfying given the fact that he had to spend a lot of time securing a new work position in his role as trade union official which put great demands on his personal time. He is confident however that he can expand his service as a councillor in the future.

On a constituency basis, Kyne said there are probing questions for the constituency council to consider. To the forefront of these must be the failure of the party to increase its Council representation and the loss of councillors Lar Hart and Paddy O'Callaghan as well as Liam Curham who stepped down in the city. These issues, he stressed, must be of great concern to Deputy Brian O'Shea.

"My personal view is that Dungarvan and other outlying urban centres are being treated as clinic operations without any overall plan to build on party activists or to have a broader focus on the development of the party", said Kyne. "These are ominous signs that not enough is being done by the main players in the party which are the constituency council and Brian O'Shea".

CONFUSED VOTERS

The referendum to give constitutional recognition to local government was passed by an overwhelming majority in Co. Waterford despite reports of confusion among voters. There were 894 spoiled votes with 9,599 voting 'yes' and 2,756 voting against. Following passage of the referendum, local elections will have to be held every five years.

The lack of sufficient information on the details of the Bill meant that many voters were puzzled when they got their ballot papers and some even asked officials what was involved.

INDEPENDENT HOLDS BALANCE OF POWER

A former member of the Tramore Town Commissioners is expected to hold the balance of power within the newly elected 23 member County Council. Independent member, Betty Twomey, formerly of Fine Gael will hold all the aces when it comes to filling the positions of authority within the Council as well as the nominating of councillors to the various other bodies.

LEDDY TOPS LISMORE ELECTION

Labour's Bernard Leddy topped the poll in the Lismore Town Commissioners election with 144 first preference votes - double the quota of 71 and enough to elect a second party member Mark Khan. Others to impress

were Fianna Fail's Jimmy O'Gorman on 134 votes and David Whelan of Fine Gael on 115 votes.

Soft Fruits Can Be Really Hardy



Peaches: Hardy enough to succeed in the open in most areas.

SUCCULENT and juicy, with a delicate skin and gentle double curve, peaches, nectarines and apricots have all these things in common - so where do they differ?

The one main physical difference is that apricots are significantly smaller than peaches and nectarines. Also, there are no noticeable differences in skin texture. Nectarines are smooth and shiny, peaches are furry and apricots fall somewhere in the middle.

Apricots have been grown in Britain for the last 400 years, although not widely until the last century.

There are three main points to consider in the culture of apricots: the flowers appear in early spring, and are there very susceptible to frost damage; many fruits may fall if the trees are dry at the roots; and fruit set may be thin spread unless the flowers are hand pollinated because there are few pollinating insects about when the flowers open in spring.

Soils that apricots relish in have a pH a little above neutral on the alkaline side. Good drainage is essential.

The nectarine is in fact the smooth skinned form of the melt-in-the-mouth peach. Technically, it is a mutation, or bud sport, which arose more than 2,000 years ago.

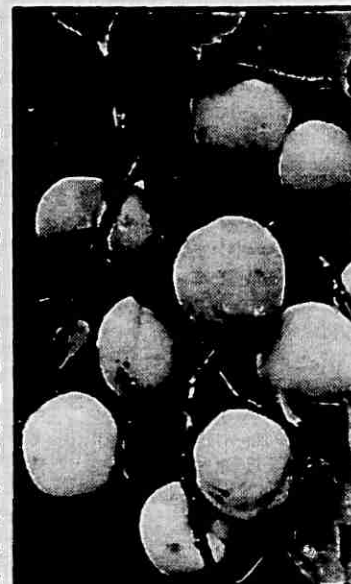
As a bush tree, the nectarine has not proved popular in Europe, as it is said to be somewhat less hardy.

Far from being tender subjects, peaches are hardy enough to succeed in the open almost anywhere except the really cold regions in Britain, such as northern Scotland.

They need no special soil requirements, but the soil must be of normal garden fertility and adequately drained.

Nectarines should be grown and cultured in the same way as peaches.

Recommended varieties of peaches include 'Peregrine' and 'Rochester,' 'Hale's Early' and 'Bellegrade' of the fan-trained varieties. Varieties of nectarines that are recommended include 'Early Rivers,' 'Lord Napier' and 'Elruge.'

The Family



We have a crisis in our family systems and structure that needs to be addressed. The family is society's most important institution and yet so many people marry and start families without fully understanding the key role the family plays in society. It is true to say that most people enter marriage without understanding what it entails - its never ending responsibility, its perpetual goal of nurturing and enhancing the lives of our partners, our children and ourselves.

Let's define certain known facts of what a family is. The family is a union of persons, it's our world and the cornerstone of society. It is not a utopian state but rather a focussing and planning the future together in the same direction.

We all have one thing in common - we start life as vulnerable dependent children. The home is the primary training ground for life and it is here we learn respect for life, for others and the self. These values are either born, fertilised and nurtured or conversely they are destroyed in the family.

So our family of origin has an impact on us that stays with us for the rest of our lives. I often explain that from infancy we are developing mental maps and tapes of learned behaviour. As a child we believed what our family told us and this information is indelibly imprinted on our minds. If we were nurtured as children we feel full of high self esteem and confidence as adults. But if we were wounded psychologically one of our beliefs is that we are not good enough and that we do not measure up. Inside every stressed adult is an unbalanced inner child driving him/her to prove to their parents that they are good enough - even if the parents are not around.

In family relationships (as in any relationship) there should be three fundamentals - trust, truth and clear expectations. Trust is the feeling of safeness and security within the bosom of the family. Truth is about open and honest communication. With trust and truth we can now set realistic expectations and whether we admit it or not we all expect

something from a relationship. In an emotionally healthy family these ingredients will be present. Healthy families promote openness and foster good communication. They sit together and advance a 'can we talk?' situation where parents will ask their children how they feel - are they sad? - are they happy? - tell me about your friends, school etc. This allows children to 'emote' or move out their feelings and thus live in true identity and reality.

DYSFUNCTION

One of the most persistent myths in society is that the 'normal' family does not experience problems and stress and of course that isn't true as problems are part of living. However there is a difference between the healthy family and the destructive, dysfunctional family. In the healthy family problems become challenges and an opportunity to grow whereas in dysfunctional families the express train of terror, pain and emotional abandonment never stops.

Unfortunately a great many family systems operate in dysfunction i.e. an emotionally unhealthy way. A dysfunctional family may have an alcoholic, rageaholic, hypochondriac, depressive or excessively controlling person as a member. These are but a few familiar examples. In a dysfunctional family there are certain rules - the 'No Feel Rule' and the 'No Talk Rule'. When negative emotions such as fear, sadness or anger are repressed the ability to feel positive emotions such as excitement, interest, curiosity is shut down. This explains the constant air of pessimism and gloom which dominates an unhappy home, lighting only when the 'problem person' is absent.

Victims of dysfunctional families feel emotional abandonment and this causes deep seated shame. Shame is the feeling 'I am not good enough', 'there is something wrong with me'. This shame engenders rage and hurt. When parents fail to nurture their children, they suffer emotional abandonment. In dysfunctional families parents often use their children to supply their

unfulfilled needs. This causes great anxiety for children and so as they become very fearful and spend a lifetime looking for their parents love and approval, they can never just be themselves and go through life 'people pleasing'. Abandonment is emotional death and when a child feels abandoned he goes through three psychological phases - protest, despair and detachment. The protest phase is often characterised by acute distress. Then despair sets in which is a feeling of hopelessness. Finally there is detachment where the child doesn't trust anymore. In adult life this causes problems in forming enduring relationships as the fear of abandonment looms large. As abandonment leads to shame, this in turn leads to addictions - alcohol, drugs, food, sex, workaholism.

Let's examine a scenario - the Alcoholic Family. The alcoholic parent severely disrupts the happiness and harmony of his/her family and throws the family out of balance. In dysfunctional families one person is the controlling, dependent person while another is the enabler. The enabler tries to present an acceptable public image of the family while the private self is full of fear and anger. He/she calls work and makes excuses. So a whole system of delusion gets going. Everyone has to adapt to make the family system rebalance. In these situations children are prevented from expressing themselves freely, very often through fear and thus they learn early on to adopt roles to survive.

Next week I will write about roles within the family system and the characteristics of an emotionally healthy v unhealthy family.

Autumn Reseed - Thinking Ahead

You should start planning now for your Autumn Reseeding Programme practised on all grass farms. It is widely recognised that efficient production and utilisation of grass, grazed or ensiled, is top priority to reduce farm costs. A prerequisite of producing 'milk' and or 'live weight gain' economically is to make maximum use of productive, nutritious, palatable swards.

How have your swards performed to date this season? Has there been a large difference in output between fields? Are some paddocks more palatable to stock than others? If so check your swards. Determine if the previously sown varieties, principally ryegrass - have largely disappeared to be replaced by unsown species like meadow and bent grasses.

Having identified the fields you would like to reseed, plan your summer grazing and silage programme with the 'aim' of being able to release these fields for reseeding by mid-autumn.

Costs Involved

At up to £270 per hectare (£110 per acre) depending on the treatments required, reseeding is costly. To attempt to reduce the frequency of reseeding it is well worthwhile assessing the reasons for sward deterioration. In particular grazing swards under 'top' management can be maintained in a 'pure' state for many years. The following factors influence the life of a sward:

Inadequate soil fertility - low phosphate, potash and lime levels.

Poor soil structure - caused by compaction or slurry 'seal' on the surface.

Bad sward management - poaching, poor grazing control or infrequent cutting.

Experimental work has demonstrated that yields and digestibility of meadow and bent grasses are 25% lower than perennial ryegrasses under the same growing conditions. In fact silage made from these 'worn out' swards has greatly reduced 'intake potential' as well as a lower 'nutritive value'.

Start by checking your swards now. Select fields you aim to reseed. Make arrangements in good time to test soils.

The results and recommendations will enable lime, phosphate and potash to be applied, if required, to correct any deficiency.

BREEDING POLICY FOR SUCKLERS

While most immediate progress will be got through selecting Continental bulls with high genetic merit for lean meat production (high index for growth rate and carcass leanness), good bulls alone are not capable of passing the required conformation and leanness to their progeny if these traits are lacking in the dam. Therefore, much more emphasis is being placed on selecting high quality replacement heifers. This is very much a long term project but the sooner we start the sooner we will arrive at the destination.

Most people can't replace their herd over a short period and, even if they could, quality of replacements are not available in such large numbers. For a start aim to have all cows in the herd at least 50% Continental blood and move from there to 75% Continental. In most suckler herds, there is enough Friesian breeding to allow one generation of replacements to be taken, using a Continental bull, without depleting milk yield.

For example putting a Limousin bull on an Angus/Friesian or Hereford/Friesian cow will give a 50% Continental heifer with adequate milking ability to rear a calf well. A stock bull can be used to breed a generation of replacements this way.

Maintaining a crossbred herd in the long term is more difficult. It could involve changing the bull breed every 2 - 3 years, having a bull of two different Continental breeds (feasible in large herds) or using AI to breed replacements - the best option from a quality breeding point of view where feasible.

Most farmers prefer to buy-in replacements. For the specialist, this is unsatisfactory as it is difficult to source replacements of the standard required and the breeding background is unknown. However, it is an area where dairy farmers could do more and provide a profitable enterprise.

The better conformation dairy cows should be put in calf to selected Continental bulls, (Limousin HTA, FL18, BHH, BHY, Simmental - FBX, DD1, HRG) to provide suitable first-cross replacement sucklers.

A further generation of suckler cows can then be bred from these giving adequate milk-maintaining crossbred vigour and excellent beef merit when mated to a terminal sire of a third breed such as Charolais or Belgian Blue.

South East ICMSA News

DAIRY RESEARCH CRITICISED

Commenting on the Moorepark Open Day Seminar ICMSA President Mr. Frank Allen said that the Teagasc researchers had failed to face up to the big issue when advocating a higher level of winter milk production.

The ICMSA President said the key issue to be faced was could an adequate price be obtained for products manufactured from this winter milk which would more than cover the higher milk costs. As of now most Irish dairy products would not give a return from the market to pay adequate winter milk. It is not acceptable that summer milk prices would be reduced to pay for winter milk.

It seems likely that the seasonality of Irish milk production will continue for the foreseeable future. In that context our research into new product developments must bear this in mind. We must improve what we have to the maximum before we suggest a significant move to winter milk.

However we must have an open mind on any possible new developments. If products can be identified that yield market returns that would sufficiently compensate the farmer for winter milk production then we must be prepared to look at such options.

ICMSA Welcome Extensification Announcement But Express Concern For 2000

Mr. Liam Heverin, Chairman of ICMSA's Beef and Cattle Committee welcomed the announcement by the Minister for Agriculture and Food that the extensification premium which is worth £80m annually to Irish farmers will be paid out from this weekend.

However Mr. Heverin expresses concern regarding the future of this £80m premium given that new rules are likely to be introduced for extensification next year. From informal discussions with the Department, it would appear that a very complicated system of determining a farmer's eligibility for extensification will be introduced which may mean farmers would lose out on extensification unfairly.

"One of the key objectives of Agenda 2000," Mr. Heverin said "is the simplification of legislation. To date all we have seen is complications not simplification. The rules for extensification for next year will have to be simple and clear to ensure that no farmer unfairly loses out on extensification premium".

"It is up to the Minister to ensure that the rules for extensification and method of measurements are clear and understandable," Mr. Heverin concluded.

IFA Raise Commonages And Headage With Dáil Agricultural Committees

At a meeting in Dublin last week with the Agricultural Committees of the two major parties, IFA raised the issues of commonage framework plans, destocking and national funding for headage for the next seven years.

IFA Deputy President John Dillon who led the delegation said that IFA was particularly concerned with the way the Government is carrying out the commonage framework plans to determine sustainable stocking levels. IFA presented an eight point plan which covers such areas as the inclusion of green land and sheep sheds in the stocking calculation, inclusion of leased land in the stocking regime and the eligibility of dormant shareholders to join the REPS Scheme in the future.

Mr. Dillon also raised the issue of national funding requirement for headage payments under Agenda 2000. He pointed out to the TD's

that following the recent Berlin summit, £400m has been allocated for the headage mechanism from EU resources for headage over the next seven years. This must now be matched pound for pound by the Irish Government.

Mr. Dillon also pointed out the changes to the headage mechanism from a per head basis to an area basis from next year onwards. He called on the Government to introduce a system which does not discriminate against those sectors which are significantly dependant upon headage payments. He pointed out that suckler cow and sheep farmers have a high dependency on headage payments ranging from 20 - 27% of their income.

IFA met both the Fine Gael and the Fianna Fáil Agricultural Committees and it was agreed that there would be further discussions over the coming weeks in relation to the issues raised.

Waterford Federation I.C.A. OPEN DAY

Waterford Federation ICA held their bi-annual Open Day on May 29 in the G.A.A. Centre, Tramore. Members from all over Co. Waterford competed in various competitions and the results of their endeavours were then displayed. The public display was officially opened by Maureen O'Carroll, a member of Tramore Town Commission. Ms. O'Carroll praised the standard of the work on display. She referred to the role of the ICA in widening its members' horizons whilst at the same time the association always has care for the individual and her needs.








On Friday last at the local and European elections, there were eleven candidates who sought election for the nine seats on Lismore Town Commissioners.

There was a turn out of 68%, from a total electorate of 1048. The quota was 71. The following is a breakdown of 1st preference votes; Peter Aherne 56, John Campion 37, Dick Canning 62, John Heneghan 33, Noel Hickey 21, Mark Khan 53, Bernard Leddy 144, John Madden 35, Jimmy O' Gorman 134, Ml. O' Leary 17, Dave Whelan 115.

Leddy, O' Gorman and Whelan were elected on the first count. The other six to be elected in the following order were 4th Khan, 5th Canning, 6th Aherne, 7th Campion, 8th Heneghan, 9th Madden. F.G. 3 David Whelan, John Heneghan, John Madden. F.F. 2 Jimmy O' Gorman and Peter Aherne. Labour 2 Bernard Leddy and Mark Khan. Independents 2 Dick Canning and John Campion.

Of the nine, four are new commissioners - O' Gorman, Aherne, Khan and Campion.

The 687 was in national terms a good vote and we take this opportunity to wish all the Town Commissioners the very best over the next five years. Their first meeting will be held this coming Monday night when the election of Chairperson will be the highlight.

CO. COUNCIL ELECTIONS

For the Council election there were six candidates and there will be a breakdown of their performance in the Lismore Electoral area elsewhere in this paper.

We will concentrate on the four booths in Lismore, which had in and around 1800 on the register. There was a total of 1027 valid

votes cast, with Ollie Wilkinson taking 461, Bernard Leddy 285, Nora Flynn 118, Willie McDonnell 103, Dick Tobin 40 and James Tobin 20.

As we now know Ollie Wilkinson had an outstanding vote in West Waterford with a total of 1859 1st preferences, which proves his popularity in the entire electoral area.

For local candidate Bernard Leddy who after transfers ended up with 565, this was a good showing in his first outing, and we believe Bernard can now really establish himself as a very strong candidate for next time. For another first timer Dick Tobin of Tallow it must have been very disappointing to lose out by only 37 votes to sitting Councillor Willie McDonnell. Indeed McDonnell was elected without reaching the quota. As expected Nora Flynn was elected with 1048 while James Tobin was elected with 936, 29 short of the quota.

So, we congratulate the 4 elected Councillors - Wilkinson, Flynn, Tobin (James), and McDonnell and commiserate with Leddy and Tobin (Dick) on a wonderful performance, and when they sit down to analyse their figures they can see where they can improve next time out.

But I'm sure the other five candidates will not mind this correspondent writing that this election belonged to Ollie Wilkinson, who had almost two quotas. On this showing Ollie has to let his name go forward next time a general election is called, and while he was disappointed last time, on last week's showing he will be a very strong candidate. But all this is for another day.

Next week we will write of the election day and how complicated it was for most people with three or four papers to mark.

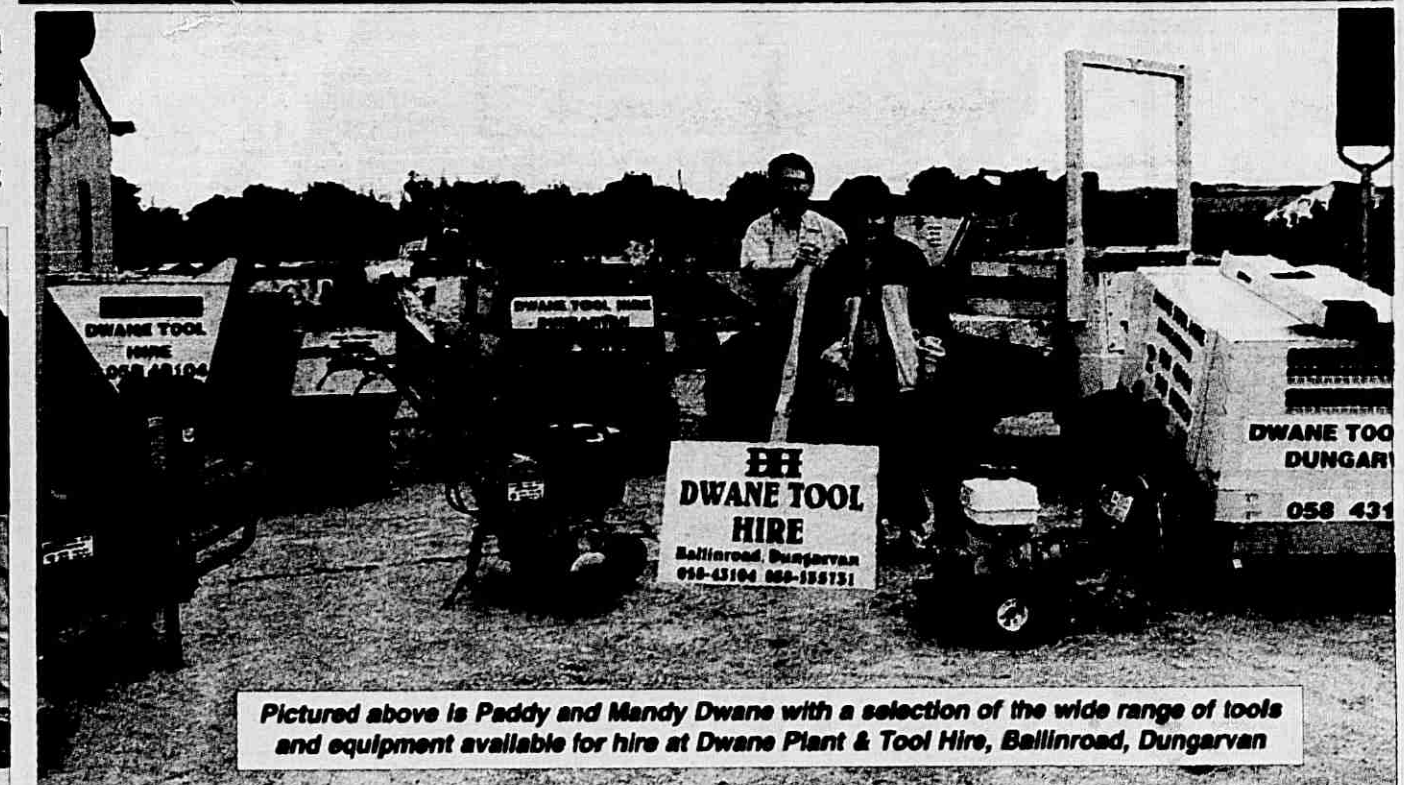

Joseph O'Donnell For Europe

Joseph O'Donnell of 2 Kyne Park is one of the most medal-laden athletes in the County. The count in April 1998 was about 600 and the number has increased since then and now the big news is that Joseph has been notified that he is to represent Ireland in the European Youth Olympic Games at Esbjerg in Denmark when the Championships are staged between 10th and 16th July.

Last year he made the headlines when running in the A.A.A. British Indoor championships in Birmingham. On that occasion he broke the Irish record for the 400 metres when com-

peting in the U-17 (although still U-16). His new record time was 51.32 seconds.

IRISH TRIALS

Two weeks ago when the Irish Trials were held in Tullamore, Joseph was invited to compete and he "skated" home, seconds in front of his nearest rival. One week later he was notified that he will be one of the National 18 man team to participate in the European Olympics and as well as representing Ireland in the 400 metres, which is his speciality, he will also be a member of the Relay team in the 4 x 100 metres.

TRAINING

This is undoubtedly a great honour for the young

Abbeyside Athlete, for his family and for St. Augustine's College, where Joseph is a student. He is trained, as he always has been by his father Tommy and this means visiting the track at Waterford Institute of Technology twice a week as well as training for one and a half hours twice daily at the St. Augustine's College grounds.

The Dunhill Tournament was the glamour event for clubs in those days and in 1962 Abbeyside won their way to the final of the Secondary Tournament. They were thrashed by Ballygunner in the final but the set of togs and stockings the players received were excellent prizes.

SENIOR HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP

Abbeyside had no championship game until Sept. 9th when they scored a comfortable win over Colli-

gan Rockies (3-4 to 0-4). But after that, in the county semi-final, they lost to Erin's Own by 5-8 to 1-6. There was no stopping Erin's Own that year for if Mount Sion were to win it would have been ten Senior Hurling Championships in a row, beating the nine-in-a-row record long held by Erin's Own. Though it took a replay to do it they beat Mount Sion and maintained their honour.

Thursday, June 3

This was the day we were all waiting for. It was time to pack the bikes and luggage and head for West Cork. Upon arrival in Skull, we were greeted by our host for the evening, Dorothy Roche of the East End Hotel. After an excellent evening meal, we headed for a good night's sleep in preparation for the 400 mile cycle that lay ahead.

Friday, June 4

After an early morning call and breakfast, we all headed to Mizén Head for the start of our cycle. At 10 a.m. we got underway. The weather was perfect, sunshine and a tailwind. In fact we had a tailwind for the whole of the 95 mile trip to Tralee.

We headed north to Bantry via Toormore and Durrus. On arrival in Bantry we had a Garda escort through the busy town. Friday was market day in Bantry and we were given a great reception by the people of West Cork. Onto Glengarriff where we stopped for our first break. The tea and sandwiches provided by the Eske Hotel went down well. Back on the N71 heading towards Kenmare, we cycled over the famous Cahah pass and tunnel road into Co. Kerry. Words could not describe the scenery around this part of the country. To say it was spectacular would be an understatement.

After Kenmare our next climb was up to Molls Gap. At Molls Gap we stopped for a few minutes to take a look at the spectacular scenery and prepare for the descent into Killarney. Passing through Killarney

we headed towards Tralee for the final part of our day's cycling.

Saturday, June 5

After overnight stay and breakfast in the luxurious Earl of Desmond Hotel we headed north towards Lis-towel and Tarbert. Again the weather was kind to us with sunshine and tailwinds. During the fifteen minute ferry crossing from Tarbert to Killimer, we realised one cyclist was missing. We met him later on the road to Tuam. It turned out that his map was upside down!

After a tea and sandwich break at the Old Ground Hotel in Ennis, we headed north on the wide open and very busy N18 towards Galway. Passing on through Gort and Oranmore, we got on the N17 to Tuam where Stage 2 of the our challenge ended. Overnight stay in the Imperial Hotel, Tuam.

Sunday, June 6

At 9 p.m. we set off on Stage 3 of our journey. This was to be the toughest day with a strong crosswind/headwind for the 104 mile trip to Donegal. Passing through Ballyhaunis we headed north to Charlestown where we stopped for soup and sandwiches at the Yeats Country Lodge.

Continuing on the N17 towards Sligo passing through Tobercurry just outside Sligo Town on the foot of Benbulbin we stopped at W. B. Yeats grave and read the famous epitaph on the headstone. Cycling around Benbulbin and the Dartry Mountains we passed through the popular seaside resort of Bundoran en route to Donegal Town. At this stage we were tired but we knew we were nearly there so it made us feel somewhat better. On Sunday night in Donegal Town we celebrated Joe's birthday (21 again!) with a sing song in The Scotsmans Pub and a sample of the local brew. The more energetic of us finished off the night at the disco in the Abbey Hotel.

Monday, June 7

After our overnight stay and breakfast in the Abbey Hotel, we headed off on the final 85 mile stage of our 400 mile trip. After passing through the beautiful Finn Valley into Ballybofey, we headed on up to Letterkenny. After a brief stop in Letterkenny, we took the N13 towards Derry. Turning off for Burnfoot, we then cycled along the quiet country road to Muff and then up the Coast Road to Quigleys Point. We

stopped again for a quick break and prepared ourselves for the final 22 miles. Passing through Carndonagh and Malin Village, we finally arrived at Malin Head, Ireland's most northerly point.

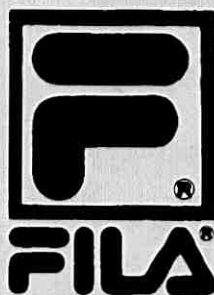


Sorcha Nic An tSaoir, Scoil Garbhain, winner of the girls U-12 100 metres at the West Waterford Primary Schools Sports.

DISAPPOINTMENT AT THURLES

Waterford Outclassed By Cork In Semi-Final

CORK 0-24 WATERFORD 1-15

Defeat has been our lot on so very many occasions before, that one more should not send us into the dumps but that is how it was when we left Semple Stadium after losing by six points to a Cork team who were brilliant in all sectors of the field and fully deserved their victory.

From the start their midfielders, Mark Landers and Mike O'Connell controlled this sector of the field and remained on top throughout the game. Fergal Hartley suffered a broken finger in the 3rd minute of the match and continued to play until halftime. His partner, Tony Brown was but a shadow of the man who led Waterford to so many splendid victories last year. He was way below his best and was not fully recovered from his ankle injury that had made him doubtful for the Limerick match.

We had no answer to Brian Corcoran who was a tower of strength in defence and set up a series of attacks throughout the game. Also, we did not seem able to cope with the threat posed by Joe Deane, Timmy McCarthy and Sean McGrath.

In the circumstances, maybe it was a tribute to the team that they were able to keep their opponents winning margin to six points. No Waterford player can be blamed for not trying as every single one of them played themselves to a standstill in search of a win.

We did test Cork to the limit and it must be conceded that the Rebels withstood that test in the best traditions of the county.

It would be folly to deny that the result is not a setback to our hurling ambitions and that is going to take time, effort and a lot of soul searching before we recover the impetus that took us to the All Ireland semi-final last year.

The result is a pity for the team and all connected with their preparation as everything that could be done to win this game, was done. We obviously did not have the wherewithal to overcome Cork on the day.

SUPPORTERS

It is a great pity too for our supporters who are the very best in the land. There must have been well in excess of 20,000 of them in Semple Stadium on Sunday and again one of the most memorable

features of the occasion was the tumultuous reception given to the players when they pranced out on to the field for the start. These followers, the vast majority of them bedecked in white and blue shirts or emblems of some description were all part of the carnival and the occasion and brought pride to the county while we progressed in the championship and league over the past eighteen months or so.

On Monday you found that people did not want to talk about the defeat. It was a day of mourning. But it was very encouraging to find that so many people were philosophical about the thing and saying we can look forward again to the league and championship next year. I'm sure that as the season wears on, we will all recover and will find ourselves eagerly awaiting the restart of our inter-county hurling activity.

THE ATMOSPHERE

There was a great carnival atmosphere about the place as the thousands made their way to the stadium with the usual friendly banter between the supporters on the way. With only two counties involved there were just the two colour styles — a sea of red, white and blue. The official attendance was 45,806.

The weather was excellent, dry but cloudy and the breeze was blowing away from the Killineen end.

PLAY

Both teams fielded as selected and when Brian Flannery won the toss he decided to play against the fairly strong breeze.

The first big cheer of the game came in the first minute when Dave Bennett pointed Waterford into an early lead with a score from play. Tony Browne, from 70 yards, sent wide and an attack on the Waterford goal from the puck out saw Brendan Landers bring off a great save from Deane. Joe Deane brought Cork level when he pointed a 5th minute free.

Paul Flynn in the 8th and 10th minutes pointed frees

and Waterford were 0-3 to 0-1 ahead just on the 10th minute.

Mark Landers pointed for Cork and Paul Flynn sent wide. Another great save by Landers was inspiring Waterford, but the rebels levelled the score when top scorer and best midfielder Mike O'Connell had a point from a 14th minute free. Donal Og Cusack made his first save which denied Billy O'Sullivan a score in the 15th minute. Frampton sent over for the lead, Landers had a good save at the other end before the first yellow card of the game was shown to Ken McGrath in the 17th minute.

In the 18th minute Mike O'Connell pointed from 80 yards and 3 minutes later the majestic Brian Corcoran pointed Cork into the lead for the first time. A Ken McGrath point brought them level again but scores by O'Connell (2) and Joe Deane put Cork 3 points up before Ken McGrath and Dan Shanahan brought 2 points back. A sideline ball cut over the bar drew a huge cheer from the elated Cork supporters in the 31st minute. Just on the call of time Fergal McCormack had a great Cork score to leave the state of play at 0-10 to 0-7 at the break.

SECOND HALF

A change on the Waterford team saw Pat Walsh replace Fergal Hartley, who had sustained a broken finger very early in the match. Within a minute Paul Flynn pointed a free and this was followed by

a fine point by Dan Shanahan a minute later. Now just a single point separated the teams, but Cork fought back with points by Joe Deane who was playing at full forward and proving a handful for Sean Cullinane and Ml. O'Connell, put Cork four points clear by the 42nd minute. Michael White and Ken McGrath brought two back and Cork replied with points by O'Connell and Timmy McCarthy. The same player had a further Cork point to put them 5 in front for the first time.

Dan Shanahan reduced this to 4 points and a change on the Waterford team saw Brian Greene replaced by Anthony Kirwan. Tony Browne moved to left half back and Ken McGrath came to midfield. Paul Flynn moved out to the centre forward berth where Billy O'Sullivan was in trouble trying to mark Brian Corcoran. McGrath and O'Connell had points and Joe Deane had another white flag raised.

With just 13 points remaining Waterford were awarded a 21 yards free and Paul Flynn made no mistake in blasting the ball to the Cork net. Dan Shanahan pointed and now just a single point separated the teams and there was still 12 minutes remaining. The game was now in the melting pot and from here on every puck of the ball would count. Seconds after Shanahan's point a high lobbing ball was fought for by Tom Feeney and Sean McGrath and each seemed to

have his hand on the sliotar when they both fell to the ground. Amazingly referee Aoiden Mac Suibhne awarded a free to Cork and which was pointed by Joe Deane. It was the turning point of the game and after this Cork never looked back. There was another debatable free to Cork just in the 60th minute and this brought another score to Cork. After this the Waterford challenge continued to fade and Cork, in rampant mood, went on to add points, while our only response was a 70th minute point by substitute Michael Molumphy.

The Cork forwards scored a total of 13 points and the midfield duo scored 10, with a point coming from centre back Brian Corcoran.

Brendan Landers left nothing through and in this respect he was well protected by Tom Feeney who made some fine clearances as did team captain Brian Flannery. Sean Cullinane had a rough time of it from Joe Deane but still managed to keep the Killleagh fireball from getting too many shots at goal. Peter Queally was again great in his favourite berth and Stephen Frampton defended well against the highly rated Fergal McCormack. Brian Greene was not on top of his game all the time, but just the same he coped well against McCarthy.

We were never happy in the middle of the field where Tony Browne was way below his best form and is obvious-

ly not yet sufficiently fit following his angle injury three weeks ago. Fergal Harley was nursing a broken finger for most of the half hour and it was will power which kept him going for 30 minutes until replaced. Junior Footballers Take On Limerick At Pairc Ui Caoimh

By all accounts the prospects of beating Limerick in Cork on Saturday are pretty good and all going well we should see ourselves contesting a Munster final against Kerry in mid-July.

After our splendid first round display and victory, questions were being asked

in Cork as to why they allowed Waterford to beat them. Only two weeks before the game the Waterford side travelled to play Cork Divisional team, Imokilly, in the run-up to the first round and lost by 5 points. The Cork team which lined out at Fraher field included 8 players who had been given

a run in recent national league games.

Now they play Limerick who had a bye into the semi-final and have trained well and played a number of challenge games against outside teams. Team manager John Kiely is very happy about the way players have responded to training and he feels confident that they are good enough to beat Limerick, as we have done many times in the past. He said that all the players feel that win over Limerick would give a badly needed 'lift' to football in the county.

The selectors feel that they have strengthened our challenge by including new names on the panel. Players brought onto the panel include Nial Geary, Shane Bergin, Emmet Doherty and Alan Power. There are injured players whose fitness is in question and their availability cannot be confirmed until early in this week. Because of this, the management team have deferred the final selection until Monday evening after a final trial match against Kilrossanty in Lemybrien.

It is certain however that Alfie Kirwan, who played brilliantly against Cork, will be retained as goalkeeper.

No doubt either but that Roger Power will fill the pivotal position in defence and Michael Burns of the Nire will again play in the left corner back position. Karl O'Keeffe of Clashmore played in the other corner against Cork and this position may be given to Alan Power of St. Saviours if the Clashmore

man is not fully fit.

The return of Nial Geary is considered to be a boost to the panel and the selectors believe that the Railway Cup player will fit the bill admirably in the centre half back position. David Ryan, who has played well in a couple of challenge matches since the first round, is certain to be retained on the wing and the position on the other wing will rest between Bobby Lyons and Alan Reynolds.

In the middle of the field Dermot Melody, who was selected for the Cork match but had to cry off because of an ankle injury, is likely to be partnered by the vastly experienced Shane Bergin. In attack too changes may be seen and I expect to see Kevin Walsh, centre half forward and free taker, Tony Corcoran at left half forward retain their positions and with Connie Power or Paul Fitzgerald on the other wing.

In the full forward line Jack Kiely will again wear the number 14 shirt and Derek Wyse will be in one corner and probably P. P. Ferncombe or Emmet Doherty of Butlerstown, in the other.

All the players on the panel are taking the challenge very seriously and are determined to battle their way into a provincial final.

I feel that they are good enough to overcome this untried Limerick side and if they succeed it will, as I have already written, be a big boost for football in the county.
