# Lar Hart Retains Chairmanship Of Dungarvan UDC

A little bit of local authority history was made last Monday night when the outgoing Chairman of Dungarvan UDC, Cllr. Lar Hart was voted in to retain the position for a further twelve month period.

On the longest day of the year, June 21st, the first ever meeting of the newly elected members proved to be one of the shortest and most straight forward.

Cllr. Hart, who lost his seat on Waterford County Council in the recent elections, pledged to equal his work rate of the past year and hoped for unity among all nine members of the Council, irrespective of any pacts made between parties.

An unusual six member pact between the four Labour members (Billy Kyne, Teresa Wright, Paddy Power and Hart), Fianna Fáil's Nuala Ryan and Independent councillor Michael O'Riordan ensured an overall majority in each

of the nominations to various public bodies.

John Deasy (FG), Damien Geoghegan (FG) and Damien Dillon (Ind) found themselves on the wrong

end of a 6-3 vote when Cllr. Dillon proposed Deasy for the Chair, seconded by Cllr. Geoghegan.

The position of vice-Chairman went to Cllr. Michael O'Riordan who was proposed by Paddy Power and seconded by Nuala Ryan. He successfully saw off the challenge of Cllr. John Deasy who was proposed for the Vice-Chair by Cllr. Dillon, seconded by Cllr. Geoghegan. The vote however was again split 6-3

in favour of pact member O'Riordan. He will take over the reins from Lar Hart in the new millennium and the Chair will then be rotated between the pact members over the subsequent years up to July 2005. One of the six pact members however will inevitably lose out on their term of chairmanship, there being only five years in the life of the existing Council.

## Leddy To Chair Lismore Town Commissioners

Labour poll topper Bernard Leddy has been unanimously elected Chairman of the Lismore Town Commissioners for the coming year at the first annual meeting of the newly elected Town Commission held last Monday night.

The nine incoming members all decided to rotate

the Chair democratically on an annual basis between political and non-party party members following the pattern of Labour, Fianna Fáil, Fine Gael and Independent. Fianna Fáil's Jimmy O'Gorman was elected to the position of Vice-Chairman.

Pleased to have headed the poll in the Lismore

Town Commissioner elections on 144 first preference votes, Commissioner Leddy however said he was sorry not to have been elected to Waterford County Council. He received 456 votes in the Lismore electoral area and was eliminated on the second count. Looking forward

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# Know Your Rights

**QUESTION**

My 15 year old daughter wants to take up part-time work in our local grocery. Is there legislation to cover young people in work?

**ANSWER**

The employment of children under 16 is generally prohibited by the Protection of Young Persons (Employment) Act, 1996. However there are some conditions under which children under 16 may take up employment. But an employer wishing to employ anyone under 16 must get written permission from the parents or guardians. A child over 15 is permitted to take up a job for up to eight hours a week during school term provided the work is light, not harmful to health, development or the child's schooling.

Over 14's are permitted to do light work during school holidays but the work may not exceed seven hours a day or 35 hours per week. Light work means work which is non-industrial and not harmful to the safety, health and development of children and which is not harmful to their attendance at school or other approved training.

Over 14 year olds may also be employed as part of an approved work experience or education programme. Any child under 16 may be employed in artistic work on film, theatre, sports or advertising activities under licence.

Employers who employ young people under 18 years of age must display a summary of the Act and also give a summary of the Act to the employee.

**GOING TO COURT FOR DEBTS**

Sometimes, for many different reasons, people are faced with going to court because they have fallen behind in their payments to lending institutions.

If the case is going ahead, then the most important piece of advice is go to the court hearing. The judge will want to hear all the facts of the case before he makes a decision and this can only happen if you are at the hearing.

But before the lender takes you to court, he will have made attempts to contact you about your arrears and how best to pay them. Our advice is try to come to an arrangement before it goes to court. Most creditors are happy to make an arrangement that is within your means to pay.

Remember each new court date may mean that you will be liable to pay more court costs.

The Money Advice and Budgeting Service will be glad to act as an intermediary between you and your creditors to help solve your financial difficulties.

If you have to go to court -

Check that you have copies of all legal documents.

Allow plenty of time to get to court. Arrive on time.

Get up-to-date statement from your lender.

Behave in a businesslike manner in court.

Bring someone with you for moral support.

Attend the hearing.

Finally — Our advice is don't overlook your debts, they will not go away by turning a blind eye to them.

# LEAVING CERT APPLIED - A Different Way

Dungarvan Technical College is now one of over two hundred schools in the country providing the Leaving Cert Applied Programme. It is a two year course and is suitable for students who favour a practical approach to their education. Students will do nine subjects and they will be assessed on their work throughout the two years so that when they reach their final exams they will have a lot of the marks acquired already.

Success in the Leaving Cert Applied means students can go directly to employment or go into a Post Leaving Cert course of their choice. They can also go into apprenticeship training with FAS or Hotel and Catering training with CERT. The Leaving Cert Applied Programme encourages students to work on a steady, continuous basis throughout the course which is very similar to the way Post Leaving Cert courses are assessed - this gives Leaving Cert Applied students a major advantage when they go on to further education.

Another feature which the Leaving Cert Applied Programme has in common with Post Leaving Cert courses is the work experience module - students are assigned to an employer during the year and this gives them a chance to experience first hand what the world of work is like.

Furthermore students who successfully complete a Post Leaving Cert course can be eligible for admission to a range of third level courses.

 Maths - Practical Applications of Maths.

English - Developing good communication skills,

Irish - Conversational and daily usage

French - Conversational and daily usage.

Information Technology (IT) - Proficiency in computing.

Engineering - Follow on from Junior Cert metalwork.

Construction Studies - Follow on from Junior Cert woodwork.

Art - Emphasis on art in the community.

Social Studies - Community, social and health education.

Leisure and Recreation - Theory and practice of fitness and sport.

Hotel and Catering - preparing students for CERT.

Work Experience and the world of work.

There is a strong emphasis on computers in the Leaving Cert Applied and students will be competent in several areas of computers e.g Information Technology (IT), Computer Aided Design (CAD) and Computer Numerical Control (CNC) Machinery. The facilities in the college are excellent with each room fitted out with modern equipment.

Another key factor in the course is attendance and each student must have an attendance record of 90% or better - this level of attendance is critical in ensuring that the students carry out all their key assignments and tasks which will count towards their marks in the final exams.

The students work is assessed by a system of credits and 67 credits are available for the work done by the students during the year (atten-

dance is rated at one credit) plus 33 credits which are available from final exams. The pass rate is 60 credits, therefore it is possible for a student to have a high percentage of credits before they sit their final exams.

Having successfully completed the Leaving Cert Applied Programme, the options for students are as follows: -

Direct to employment.

Post Leaving Cert course

then Institute of Technology

Apprenticeship / Training with FAS or CERT

The Leaving Cert Applied Programme is a major new initiative in Irish education

and is a much fairer and less stressful way of assessing the abilities of the 'whole' student. In its own way it is a challenging and exciting way to complete second level education.

Application forms are available from the college and should be returned by the end of June. Interviews for admission to the course will take place on Wednesday, September 1.

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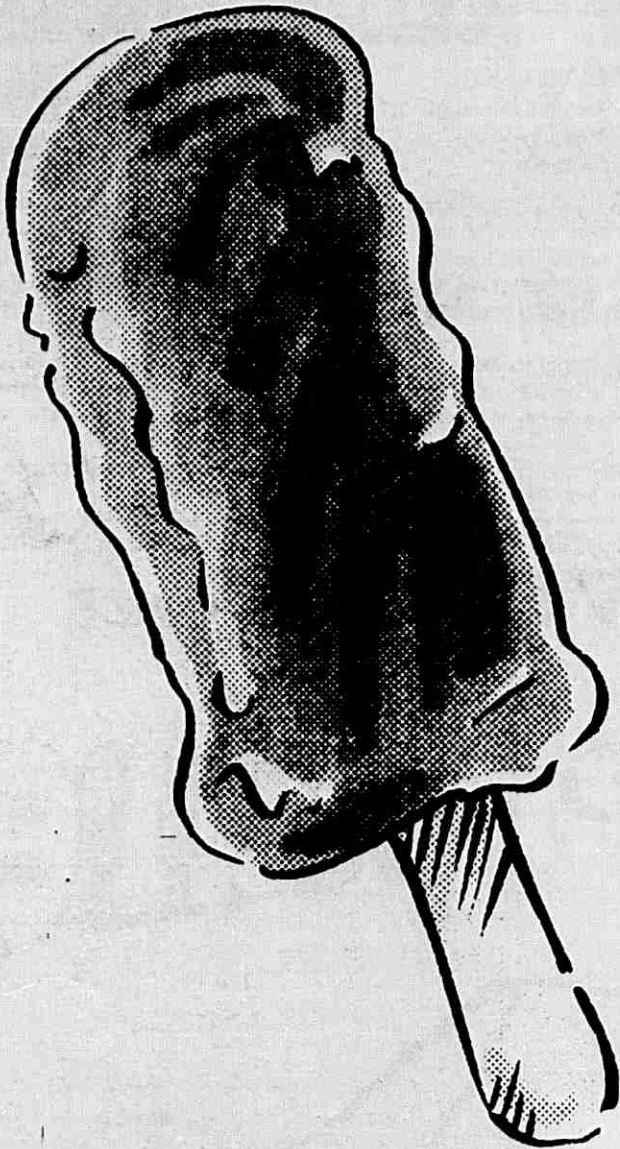

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## Swim Committee Donates £15,500 To Waterford Hospital

The Michael Power Memorial Swim Committee handed over a cheque for £15,500 to Waterford Regional Hospital last week to provide cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training and equipment.

Waterford Regional Hospital established a CPR committee in 1997 to develop a hospital policy for the management of all cardiac arrests within the hospital. Part of that policy is to train all staff within the hospital in basic life-support techniques. Many people think that the safest place to have a heart attack is in a hospital. But if someone collapses in for example, the hospital shop, library or restaurant, they may be as vulnerable as if they collapsed elsewhere. The hospital is providing a training room and a training officer was appointed.

Over 16 years ago Michael Power collapsed suddenly and died of a cardiac arrest. Because of this tragic event the people of Kill organise a sponsored Christmas swim every year and the proceeds are donat-

ed to a different charity. The money donated to the CPR committee this year was used to buy CPR training mannequins, a crash trolley, a heart model, advanced life support airway trainer and other equipment. All of these training aids will be utilised fully in the training centre for training hospital staff initially and it is then intended to extend the training to staff working in the community and other hospitals in the region.

Millie Power, chairperson of the CPR committee says; "We are delighted with the very generous donation from the Michael Power Memorial Swim Committee. Our intention is to train as wide a range of people as possible in basic life support as that they can keep a collapsed person alive until the emergency services take over. We would like to announce that one of our first training sessions will be given over to members from the Michael Power Memorial Swim Committee as a way of thanking them for their hard work and dedication".

# The Hyena

*Shore crabs are common scavengers of the beach. They can be found under bundles of sea-weed. As soon as you disturb it, it will run away towards the sea, with a darting side-ways movement. It is not able to walk straight ahead like other animals, which is unusual because it appears to be symmetrically balanced.*

The shape of the crab is not the determining factor. Its leg joints are peculiar, allowing it to move in one direction only. When the crab is on land, it is quiet and defensive. But once back in the water it becomes more animated and aggressive.

The crab hunts mainly at night. It uses its front pincer-like claws to grab food. The crab is a very strong animal and has the ability to

move objects weighing up to thirty times more than itself.

Because the crab is a scavenger, it will help itself to dead fish and sometimes tears the bait from an angler's line.

If the crab catches its claw in anything, it sheds the limb and moves away fast. The wound heals quickly and a new claw grows.

Every so often the crab needs to change its shell. This is a stage known as moulting. During this time it is very vulnerable and is easy prey for large fish. In order to moult, the crab blows itself up so that the shell will become strained and will crack. The shell breaks and falls away from the body, but sometimes before a new shell has had time to form, the soft exposed body of the crab is snapped up by a passing fish.

### DO HYENAS REALLY LAUGH?

**There is a hyena which is called the laughing hyena. It is the spotted hyena and is the biggest member of its family.**

When this hyena is on the prowl, or gets excited over something, it makes an eerie howl and chuckling gurgle that sounds like a laugh. It is not laughing in the sense that human beings laugh. It makes a shrieking noise that sounds like laughing to us.

The laughing hyena is an angry looking animal that is about 1 metre in height and about 1.85 metres long. A big hyena may weigh up to 80 kilograms.

The hyena sleeps during the day in a cave or burrow. When it gets dark, it comes out to get

food. They usually hunt alone, but if there is a kill left by lions, or other beasts of prey, there will be a pack of hyenas gathered.

Hyenas have keen sense and this leads them to kill. When they do this, they usually clear up all the remains.

The hyena is a cowardly and sneaky animal and it prefers to eat leftovers from another beast's kill. It likes to hang around villages or camps and can attack people sleeping in the open. It also follows herds of cattle or antelope and will pick on a crippled, old or very young animal to kill and eat.

The laughing hyena belongs to the African species and can be found in areas from Ethiopia to the cape of Good Hope. In this species of hyena the female is larger than the male, which is very unusual.

## Helvick RNLI Lifeboat Assists In Four Local Call Outs

four fishing vessels in separate incidents.

Just before midnight on Monday 14th June, the Helvick Head lifeboat and crew were called to the assistance of a fishing vessel which had encountered difficulties off Helvick while fishing.

The lifeboat with its 3 man voluntary crew reached the vessel within minutes as it was located approximately four miles south of Helvick Head. The fishing vessel the 'Fort Ranger' with three men on board was found to be drifting as its propeller had become enmeshed with ropes and netting.

Helvick Head lifeboat took the fishing vessel on tow and brought it back safely to Helvick harbour where they arrived at 1 a.m.

On Tuesday, June 15th at approximately 8.30 a.m., the lifeboat answered a second call out when it was launched to the assistance of a 38 ft. fishing vessel from Dunmore East, the 'Jennifer Anne'. The skipper of the vessel called for help when he encountered difficulties with the boats gear box while fishing 7 miles south-east of Helvick.

On arriving at the vessel, the Helvick Head lifeboat took the vessel, with its two men aboard, on tow. They arrived back at Helvick harbour at around 10 a.m.

Later that same day, at 11.20 p.m., the Helvick Head lifeboat was launched for the third time in 36 hours - this time to the assistance of a locally owned 36 ft. fishing vessel, the 'Muir Eanna'.

The skipper of the ship radioed for help when the vessel was found to be taking water while fishing four miles south-east of Helvick. The troubled fishing vessel had managed to cut off the incoming water but was meanwhile without power. The water was thought to be due to a burst pipe on the engines cooling system.

The three man crew of the lifeboat took the vessel on tow and arrived back in Helvick harbour after midnight.

Last Wednesday the lifeboat was again called into service when a locally owned 32 ft fishing vessel the 'Stephen-Anthony' called for assistance shortly after 5 p.m. The vessel had lost power due to battery failure while fishing four miles north-east of Helvick.

The Atlantic 21 with its 3 man crew under helmsman Alan Kelly took the boat with its two man crew aboard on tow. They were unable to start the stricken vessel's engine. On arriving safely back at Helvick harbour at around 6.30 p.m., repairs were later carried out on the vessel.

## Leaving Cert Vocational Programme

The Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme has been running in Dungarvan Technical College for the past three years. This programme has a strong vocational dimension and enhances the traditionally academic Leaving Certificate. This popular option combines the usual seven Leaving Certificate subjects:-

- Irish
- English
- Maths
- French/
- Building Construction
- Business Studies
- Home Economics/
- Engineering
- Drawing
- Religion
- Physical Education

As well as three link modules - Enterprise Education, Preparation for Work and Work Experience. The intrinsic value of these modules is underpinned by the modes of assessment which allocates 60% of the marks for the portfolio. The remaining 40% is attained through a written examination of the course.

### Further Education

A major bonus of this programme is that students can gain high points in this subject for college entry. The recent announcement by the Conference Heads of Irish Universities of their decision to recognise the LCVP Link Modules in points terms for entry to courses in the 1999/2000 academic year is a welcome addition to the programme as up to now it was solely recognised by the Institutes of Technology. The growth of this programme from 1250 students in 1995 to an expected 40,000 in 1999/2000 is an indication of the value placed on this new approach to education by schools and school managers.

## Swedish Walker On 2,000 Mile Walk Of Irish Coastline

Known as 'The Coastwalker' or simply 'The Walker', Erik Reutersward of Sweden is currently completing a 2,000 mile walk around the coastline of Ireland. Having started on June 16th last week from O'Connell Bridge in Dublin, Erik hopes to finish there just ten weeks later on August 24th. Each day he aims to walk

between 25 and 30 miles, as close to the count as possible. His equipment is jogging shoes, shorts and a rucksack weighing approximately 8-10 kilos.

This walk is the last leg of a project covering all the coasts of Europe including Great Britain, Spain, Portugal, Gibraltar, Norway and Iceland (roughly 25,000

miles) between 1991 and 1998. 'The Walker' is listed in the Scandinavian edition of the Guinness Book of Records.

Last Tuesday, June 22nd, Erik arrived in Dungarvan, having walked from Tramore - a distance of 38 km. He will rest for a day in Dungarvan on Wednesday while tomorrow (Thursday 24th), he will set out on a 40 km walk to Youghal.

# Helvick Residents Fed Up With 'Sickening' Slurry Smell

At this time of year the common practice of slurry spreading is prevalent in farming communities around the county. While the majority of treated land does not normally interfere with residential dwellings in

the locality, exceptions however do occur. Such was the case in Helvick last week where residents in the area of Helvick Bridge and Baile na nGall Upper had to contend with a powerful stench

of pig slurry which was being spread close to their homes. One resident described the smell as 'sickening' and said it had pervaded her entire house despite shutting windows in what was extreme-

ly 'heavy' weather. She said the disgusting smell was so powerful that it turned her stomach.

The pig slurry odour lasted for several days causing great inconvenience and annoyance to householders. Numerous complaints were made to the Environmental section of Waterford County Council and an engineer was sent to examine the matter.

While acknowledging the discomfort experienced by local residents, Brian White, Council Environmental Officer, told the 'Leader' that unless the slurry was polluting a watercourse there is nothing the Council can do to intervene.

"We get a lot of complaints about slurry spreading at this time of the year", said Mr. White who stressed that farmers do not need planning permission to spread slurry on their land and as such this practice is not subject to any conditions laid down by the Council.

The County Council have already been in contact with the landholder and asked if he would utilise injection spraying whereby the slurry is injected below ground level reducing the associated smell. Mr. White however said the landholder complained of the cost involved and claimed that this method is not used by local contractors.

The local authority has agreed to keep the situation monitored.

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## Deasy Slams Lack of Sewage Treatment Facilities

Speaking in the Dail recently where members were dealing with the Sea Pollution (Amendment Bill), Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy raised the issue of pollution caused by inadequate funding provided to local authorities. The Government recently allocated £44 million towards various sewage schemes in coastal towns and villages around the country including Ardmore.

Deputy Deasy said the lack of sewage treatment plants in the country is a disgrace. The provision of a sewage treatment plant, he added, makes an enormous difference to an area.

With regard to the EU blue flag scheme which classifies beaches according to the purity of the sea water, Deputy

Deasy said that in his constituency of Waterford only three of the numerous beaches - Clonea, Counsellors Strand and Dunmore East - qualify for the blue flag under that scheme.

"A number do not qualify because raw sewage is discharged into the sea directly from septic tanks. What will the Minister do about this problem", he stressed.

"We need a programme to ensure that every village or town with a beach has a proper sewage treatment plant. It is frightening to think that one of the largest resorts in the State, Tramore, does not have a modern sewage treatment plant. Will the Minister bear in mind the necessity for such a basic facility?", added Deputy Deasy.

aubergines. Spread a layer of meat sauce over the base of the dish, then cover the meat with some of the slices of aubergine. Continue to layer the meat and aubergines until both are used up. Whisk together the soured

## Vegetables in red wine

Preparation: 15 mins  
Cooking: 35 mins  
Serves: 4

2 tbsp oil  
1-2 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed or chopped  
1 large onion, peeled and chopped  
1 (400g/14oz) can chopped tomatoes  
150ml/¼ pt red wine  
2 tbsp tomato purée  
2 tbsp lightly crushed coriander seeds  
2 medium courgettes, trimmed and thickly sliced  
150g/6oz baby carrots, trimmed and scrubbed  
2 medium leeks, trimmed and thickly sliced  
100g/4oz baby corn, halved widthways  
boiled rice mixed with chopped parsley to serve  
tzatziki to serve

**METHOD**  
• Heat the oil in a large, deep pan and add the garlic and onion. Cook for 2-3 minutes until soft. Stir in the tomatoes, wine, tomato purée and corian-

der seeds. Season well with salt and freshly ground black pepper.  
• Bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Add all the vegetables and continue cooking for a further 20 minutes until the vegetables are tender and the juices have thickened slightly.  
• Divide the rice between 4 serving plates and spoon the vegetables and sauce on top. Serve hot with tzatziki.\*

\* This dish tastes really good with garlicky tzatziki (Greek yoghurt dip). You can buy it ready-made from supermarkets and delicatessens, or make your own. Mix 1 (450g/1lb) tub Greek yoghurt with 3 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed; 1 small onion, peeled and grated; and ½ cucumber, grated. Keep chilled until required.

## Moussaka

Preparation: 30 mins  
Cooking: 1 hr 30 mins  
Serves: 4

30ml/2 tbsp olive oil  
2 large onions, sliced  
1-2 cloves garlic, chopped  
15ml/1 tbsp ground cumin  
15ml/1 tbsp ground coriander  
15ml/1 tbsp ground paprika  
5ml/1 tsp ground cinnamon  
450g/1lb lean minced lamb or beef  
15ml/1 tbsp plain flour  
150ml/¼ pt dry red wine  
45ml/3 tbsp tomato purée  
salt and freshly ground black pepper  
30ml/2 tbsp chopped fresh mint

2 medium aubergines  
For the topping  
150ml/¼ pt soured cream  
300ml/½ pt strained Greek yogurt  
2 eggs  
pinch of grated nutmeg  
100g/4oz mature Cheddar cheese, grated  
freshly ground black pepper

**METHOD:** Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4. Grease a 2.25ltr (4pt) shallow, ovenproof dish. Heat the oil in a large saucepan, add the sliced onion and cook, stirring, until soft and golden. Add the garlic and spices and cook, stirring, for 1 min - this releases the flavours from the spices. Add the mince and cook, stirring, for 5-6 mins, breaking it up with a wooden spoon until the meat is evenly browned and crumbly. Sprinkle the flour over and cook, stirring, for 1 min. Add the wine gradually, then stir in the tomato purée. Bring to the boil, stirring, until the juices start to thicken. Reduce the heat and simmer, uncovered, for 15 mins, or until the juices are thick. Season to taste, then stir in the mint and remove from the heat. Wash, then thinly slice the

Sticky, sugary foods help plaque to form, therefore eventually destroying your teeth.

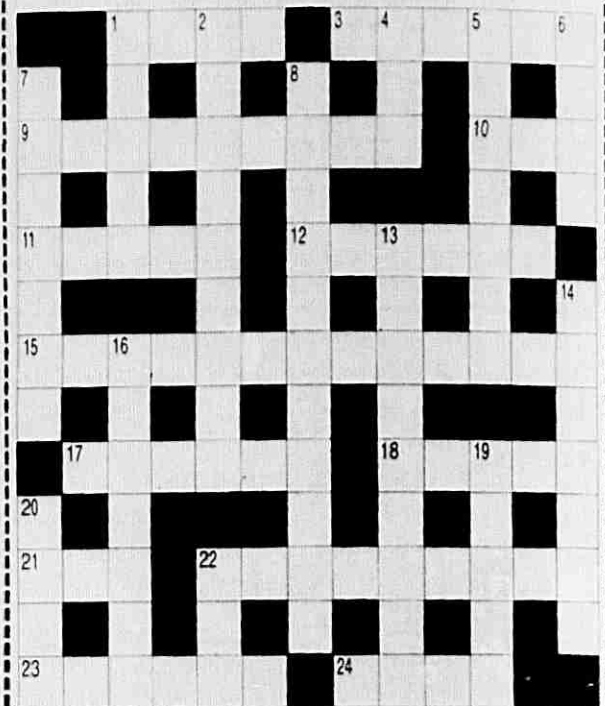

## Family Health

By Dr. DAVE BARRY

**Q.** I'm 46 and for the last two years I've had to go to the toilet 20 times or more a day. Recently, I was rushed into hospital when I was unable to pass any urine and I had to have a catheter. Could you please explain why this happened?

**A.** Urinary retention (the inability to empty the bladder) is common in men but rare in women. In men, its invariably due to some problem with the prostate gland which lies at the base of the bladder. In woman, it can occur after surgery in that area - eg. vaginal repair, a difficult labour or a hysterectomy. Pressure on the base of the bladder from fibroids or ovarian cysts can also have the same effect, and a vaginal prolapse may also interfere with normal emptying. Your own doctor should be able to reassure you.

**Q.** My eight-year-old gets very nauseous and there are some mornings when she actually gets sick. The doctor gave her a thorough examination and can't find anything wrong

with her. She missed a lot of school before the holidays because of this and my doctor suggested I send her to school regardless. I think this is cruel. Do you think a second opinion is warranted?  
**A.** The holiday period would have been a good indicator whether this is a kind of school phobia or not. If the sickness is worse on Sunday nights and Monday mornings but clears up when she's at school would also indicate a kind of school phobia. A child psychiatrist would be a good professional to get your second opinion from. This condition is a form of separation anxiety and is often caused by worry about parents health or wellbeing. The child therefore is not so much anxious about school as about leaving home. Reassurance from you that you will be fine while she's at school and will be there when it's time to collect her may work. Then insist that she goes to school. This way, I think over time she will gradually feel less anxious and the nausea should disappear.

## Health Tips from Remedies

### Sore Throats and Coughs

For those suffering from a sore throat, often the start of a cold, gargling with a tincture of Sage will ease the pain and strengthens the body's resistance to infections.

If the cold has progressed to the stage where hacking coughs rend the air day and night, a natural cough bottle is a swift way of soothing the troubled bronchial tubes. A combination of honey and herbs that relax and disinfect the airways, added to expectorants that help shift the mucus from the lungs. It has been shown to work within two to six days.

It is safe for children and prevents the discomfort and lethargy that come from sore chests and disturbed nights. There is also a tincture of herbs without honey for diabetics and patients prone to bronchitis.

## WRIGHT EXPRESSES RESERVATIONS

The sole note of discord at Monday's meeting was expressed by Cllr. Teresa Wright. Although voting in line with the 6 member pact, Cllr. Wright voiced strong reservations and issued the following statement.

"As a newly elected member of Dungarvan UDC and the first woman to ever represent Labour on this authority, I'd appreciate if my comments were entered on the record.

"Firstly, I will be supporting the nomination of my party colleague - Lar Hart - for the position of Chairperson and wish him well. Nothing will be gained by me, my party or the people of Dungarvan if I were to abstain or vote against that nomination.

"I have strong reservations however about the manner in which the pact and the sharing out of posi-

tions has taken shape. My politics is not about prioritising appointments to positions or committees, nor is it about the domination of one political party. I'd be as comfortable with all groups sharing power or with the direct public election for the Chair of the UDC and the positions on the VEC. I'm committed to inclusiveness and democratic practice.

"I'm deeply disappointed that someone took it upon themselves to represent the Labour group on this Council and assemble a six member pact - when a five member pact would have sufficed. Another forum on another day will examine how an unwritten and un-

signed 'fait accompli' was put before me just hours before this UDC meeting - without being given the opportunity to meet my party colleagues to discuss all the options.

"That said, I reiterate tonight my determination to fulfill my mandate as a Labour member of Dungarvan UDC and resolve to work with colleagues of all persuasions to improve life in this town.

"I hope lessons will be learned from the mishandling of events subsequent to tonight's meeting and that we can proceed from here with the respect for each other that the people of Dungarvan and Abbey-side expect of us".

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# A Nodding Head Of Winter Colour



*Colour in the shade: Cyclamen are ideal for planting in shady borders or beneath trees.*

**CYCLAMEN**, with their beautiful heart shaped leaves, can be found in habitats ranging from alpine woodland to dry sands — from the Mediterranean east to Iran and south to Somalia.

The nodding, sometimes fragrant flowers have five twisted petals, ranging in colour from pure white to pink and on to carmine red or mauve.

Although cyclamen are probably best known for winter flowering, different species could bloom at any time of the year. It is possible to grow cyclamen outdoors, in greenhouses and as houseplants, provided you choose the correct species.

*C.persicum* are the best species to grow as house plants. They are sweet scented and have pink, red or white flowers. There are several series in this species of cyclamen, which flower at all times throughout the year.

Outdoor and greenhouse cyclamen should be planted in well-drained soil containing plenty of leaf mould or peat, in shady areas.

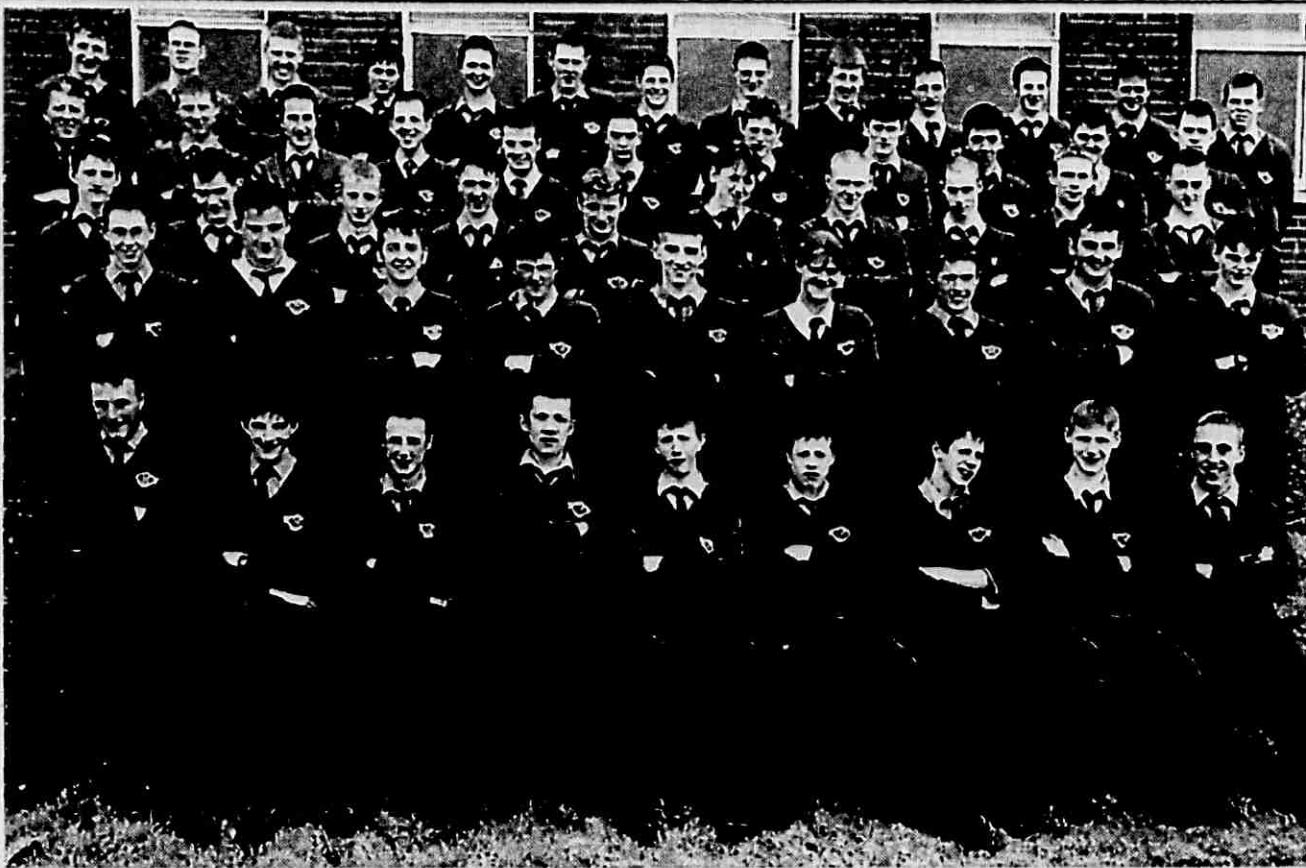
A top tip for healthy cyclamen is to mulch with an inch deep layer of leaf mould annually.

Pests and diseases cyclamen suffer from are aphids, mice, vine, weevils, tarsonemid mites, black root rot, cucumber mosaic virus and grey mould.

Aphids not only weaken plants by feeding on them, but also carry all sorts of diseases which can cause poor health and cause the plant to wilt and die. Spray with a contact insecticide such as malathion or derris as soon as you notice insects on your crop.

Tell tale signs that you have vine weevils include stunted growth, wilting and collapse. You can prevent this by adding HCH dust to compost before potting.

# Waterford VFI Chairperson Slams Liquor Bill Proposals

The Waterford Chairperson of the Vintners Federation of Ireland (VFI) has described the Government's suggested intoxicating Liquor Bill as "utterly ridiculous".

Cappoquin based publican, Nora Flynn expressed her dismay and disappointment with Minister O'Donoghue's Bill and said it fell far short

of his intention to reform the licensing hours.

The VFI has continuously called for an extra hour to be added to trading hours all year round bringing them into line with Irish peoples' lifestyles and social habits.

Speaking to the 'Leader', Cllr. Flynn who was also recently re-elected onto Waterford County Council, said

nobody was asking to stay open 24 hours a day.

While welcoming the abolition of the Holy Hour closing on Sundays between 2 and 4 p.m., Cllr. Flynn however pointed out that a serious inequality still exists between night club owners who are allowed serve for extra hours and publicans who have to 'throw adults out on the street' after 11.30 p.m.

Sharing her views, John Mansworth, VFI President said the Minister should re-

member that the reason pubs want to stay open later is because publicans want to provide customers with the service they want.

"The announcement is a miserable piece meal result after many years of comprehensive consultations with the Minister", he added.

A meeting of the national executive of the VFI which will be attended by Cllr. Flynn will take place later today (Wednesday) at which it will be decided what action the federation will take.

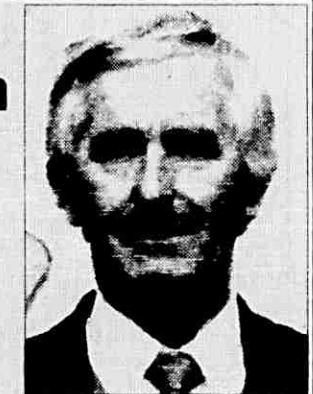

# THE FAMILY

When a family system is dysfunctional, that is where there are issues that are not fully recognised nor acknowledged, you will often find co-dependence. In a functional family there is interdependence where members love and support one another but can also function well as individuals. Co-dependence on the other hand means that there are feelings of attachment to another in such a way that the dependent person finds it difficult to do without the other. There is a desperate clinging and when the other person isn't around the dependent suffers, often causing jealousy and possessiveness.

## ROLES

In dysfunction negativity is the predominant characteristic and children react in different ways to family problems depending on a number of factors including their personality make-up and their position in the family (eldest, middle, youngest, twin). Let's look at some common and easily recognised roles acted out in many families.

One child may become the Good Child. Let's call her Mary. Mary never causes any trouble, she goes to her room and does her homework every night. She is trying to take the tension out of the family but she never gets a chance to be herself and she can never work out any of the anger she feels for being thrust into this position of being good so she has lost herself. Studies have shown us that in adapting to survive the Good Child is super independent, rigid in thought and behaviour and often overweight.

Another child may become the Scapegoat. This child feels very hurt and will act out - he will play truant from school, take drugs or whatever. He will rattle

the system and get the family confused but will also bring the family together in trying to do something about the situation. The Scapegoat carries all the conflict and disorder in

the family and what he/she needs so much is to be told that he is okay and loved.

In the dysfunctional family there will probably be a Hero. This is the person who gives the family dignity by becoming a high achiever. The family will be proud of his success but the sad part is, though he is an achiever in his field, as a person he is numb - he is unable to feel good about himself as a human being.

Another member of such a family may be the Clown. He/she becomes the joker and will do anything to attract attention, to raise a laugh, thereby masking for a moment or two the family's turmoil.

## LOSS OF IDENTITY

Whatever role a child assumes, one thing is certain, he is not being himself and he will carry this loss of identity into adulthood. You see until we go back into that Lost Child within us, we may not know who we are. We become an act, a performance, a human doing and not a human being. Everything is external, a showing off that's caused by shame when we live in a dysfunctional family. Dysfunction is cyclical and is the baggage and legacy handed down from generation to generation.

The following is a summary of the traits to be found in emotionally healthy v unhealthy families

## HEALTHY FAMILIES

A basic positive friendly attitude. Emotional independence. A strong equal coalition between the parents.

Free and open communication - no feelings are unacceptable or forbidden.

Problems become challenges and an opportunity to grow.

Each member is in the process of becoming a whole person.

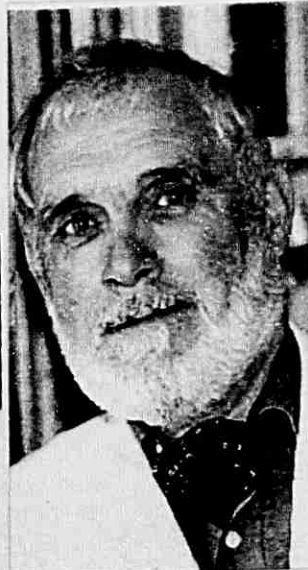
There is the ability to perceive the world clearly.

There is the ability to cope with change.

## UNHEALTHY FAMILIES

Relationships are very controlling.

## PART II



There are no boundaries or respect for another's identity.

Family members are very vulnerable to emotional atmospheres.

Independent thoughts are considered disloyal.

Problems are not recognised, ignored or buried.

Dysfunctional families cling to each other out of fear of abandonment.

Children play off one parent against the other.

The Armenian philosopher, Kahlil Gibran wrote the following verse which expresses so well our role as parents and our children's right to be individuals.

"Your children are not your children, They are the sons and daughters of life's longing for itself.

They come through you but not from you,

And though they are with you yet they belong not to you.

You may give them your love but not their thoughts for they have their own thoughts.

You may house their bodies but not their souls for their souls dwell in the house, of tomorrow which you cannot visit, not even in your dreams.

You may strive to be like them but seek not to make them like you.

For life goes not backwards nor taries with yesterday".

## CALVES ON AFTERGRASS?

If you want calves to thrive to their maximum they must get to best grass on the farm, it will pay. It is the next 2-3 months that drive up weight gains. Let calves into 6 inches high grass, probably grazed 14-16 days ago by cows or let them graze directly in front of the cattle which is the leader-follower system.

But through good planning, aftergrass can and should be given to the calves for the remainder of the year. This will result in quality grass always and little or no dosing being necessary.

On a money saving and no less effective basis, yellow or white doses could be used. The cost is 20-30p per dose per calf, no dose need have been given before now. It is 11 to 14 weeks since calves were let out and the last dose of the labour saving doses should be given now.

No meals should be given to calves unless very young. The response to meals at grass now is 8 to 1. This is totally uneconomical as you would have to buy 8 cwt of meal (costing £56) to get 1 cwt (worth £50) of liveweight gain.

## DOCK CONTROL

From now until early September is the best time to spray docks. They are growing actively while grass growth has slowed down, therefore, subsequent reduction in grass yield due to the spray will not be great. The best time is 4-5 weeks after a silage crop.

As you know docks are difficult to control and will almost certainly require a 2-spray programme. Spray now and again next year. Each dock plant produces 40,000 (curled dock) to 60,000 (broadleaved dock) seeds per year. So open, poached swards produce new dock plants every year.

If you have clover you must not kill it with sprays. Azulox, Prospect and Eagle will not kill clover. Azulox will damage some old grasses such as Cocksfoot, Yorkshire Fog etc. Prospect will not kill the curled leaf dock. Where clover is not important, all other sprays can be used such as Dockstar, Foundation, Baddock, Condox, Dockmaster, Grazon, CMPP etc.

## SHEEP

### After Grass For Lambs

Most March lambing ewes are now in their fourteenth week of lactation. Milk is contributing very little to the growth rate of the lambs and ewes are consuming a considerable quantity of grass. Allowing ewes to graze quality grass at this stage of lactation is wasteful.

Weaned lambs on aftergrass will give good lamb thrive. If this aftergrass was grazed by ewes and lambs, there may be a shortage of quality grass for lambs when they are weaned.

### Lamb Growth Rate

The growth rate of lambs after weaning is affected by pasture height, clover content and previous grazing management. The effect of post-grazing height on growth rate (g/day) of weaned lambs under rotational grazing is shown in the table.

Highest growth rates are associated with leafy pasture, rich in clover. Aftergrass will also give high growth rates, over 200g/day. The lower parasite level on this pasture will also contribute. It is difficult to get more than 150-160g/day from pastures which were grazed in spring by ewe/lambs. Tight grazing, less than 6 cm, will also reduce lamb performance. Lambs will be forced to eat a layer of poor quality herbage at the base of the sward. A leader/follower grazing system is useful where dry ewes or cattle can follow the lambs to graze what is left over. Tight grazing in May/June (5-6 cm) will provide a leafy sward after weaning. However if not tightly grazed, grass will be stemmy in July.

There may be 10-12 cms of grass which is all stem and very little leaf. These type pastures should be grazed down by ewes after weaning. This will give leafy regrowths for August. With rotational grazing after weaning, lambs should not be grazed tighter than 6 cms even on leafy pastures. With set stocking, lambs should have a continuous supply of 8-9 cms of leafy grass.

## ICMSA Reject Milk Price Reduction

Dairy farmers should strongly reject the ongoing attempts to talk down the milk price. The fact is that Irish farmers are paid the lowest milk price within the EU.

Mr. Jackie Cahill, Chairman of ICMSA's Dairy Committee said that he completely rejects the suggestion that the current milk prices should be reduced by

5p per gallon. This suggestion which was made recently by a senior figure in the dairy industry could set a dangerous precedent.

Mr. Cahill continued, "It would seem that senior management of some milk processing firms can embark on massive expansion plans in the comfort that dairy farmers will finance this expansion in the first instance and will pay again if things go wrong by being forced to take a lower milk price."

Mr. Cahill said that the days when management and indeed banks could assume that dairy farmers will have to pick up the tab for bad investment is over.

"Better run milk processing farms, be they Co-ops or Plc's have shown that proper investments can actually boost milk prices. In the poorly managed firms, the lower milk price was subsidising inefficiency and very poor, if not reckless, investment decisions," contended Mr. Cahill.

"Firms who cannot pay a competitive price should commence a massive programme of cost cutting and efficiency to regain the ability to pay a proper milk price," stated Mr. Cahill.

Mr. Cahill said he was pleased that the independent milk price audit would be continued and he called on all milk processors to partake in the most important and independent measure of real performance.

A major overhaul of how firms set milk prices and how this information is reported back to dairy farmers is required, according to Mr. Cahill.

"I am convinced that a deliberate policy of confusion has been followed by some firms to hide their poor performance. For manufacturing milk, the price paid per kilogramme of fat and protein is a direct way of comparing prices within Ireland and between EU member states. ICMSA is currently undertaking a study on this issue and will be publishing recommendations shortly," concluded Mr. Cahill.

### South East ICMSA News

#### ICMSA/HIBERNIAN INSURANCE FARM PACKAGE

## New Strawberry To Beat The Irish Weather

A new variety of strawberries which can withstand dull, dark, rainy summers has been developed by Teagasc. The new variety, which was bred at the Teagasc Soft Fruit Research Centre, Co. Wexford has consistently outyielded currently available varieties in trials conducted over the past five years. It performed particularly well during the dull wet summers of 1997 and 1998. Teagasc researcher, Finnain Mac Naeidhe, who developed the new variety, said it has great potential as a fruit for processing.

"In addition to its ability to perform well during cold wet Irish weather, it is also red fleshed thereby avoiding the use of artificial colorants in processing. It is also resistant to root diseases which can play havoc with existing processing varieties.

"The introduction of this variety will ensure that growers have at least one variety which will not be damaged by severe weather and wet summers," he added.

The new variety was demonstrated at the Soft Fruit Open Day, run by Teagasc at Clonroche Research Centre.

Speaking at the Open Day, Finnain Mac Naeidhe said the soft fruit industry has doubled in value during the past five years. This was due to new technologies which has enabled fruit to be produced from May to November. While production for the fresh market has shown rapid growth, production for processing has almost halved. The growing shortage of labour for picking has been a significant contributor to this decline.

## New IFA Campaign to Heighten Awareness On Farm Safety

IFA President, Tom Parlon recently encouraged farmers to take special care to help reduce the tragic toll of farm deaths and injury on Irish farms. Mr. Parlon was announcing details of a new IFA farm safety campaign comprising of prime time TV advertising, a national local radio campaign and advertisements in the farming press to take place over the coming weeks in the run up to the busy summer period and school holidays when most farm fatalities occur. This is the first time IFA used the medium of television in such a campaign.

The IFA President said that the new awareness campaign, sponsored by FBD Trust, aims to graphically highlight the potential dangers on farms by creating a greater awareness of the need to make farms safer work places.

"So far this year there have been twelve farm related fatalities, six sadly involving children. The impact of any farm death or serious injury is devastating not alone for the family involved but for their friends, neighbours and wider community. Often it is only after a serious or fatal accident that dangers are clearly identified, but by then it may be too late".

"The nature of the family farm, the complexity of modern farm machinery and changing farming systems mean that many things can go wrong on the family farm. Summer can be particularly dangerous because of the level of activity on farms and the presence of children and their friends. The campaign launched today has one clear message "THINK SAFETY, FARM SAFELY".

Waterford IFA Farm Family Chairwoman, Marian Looby said there is a need for extreme care and vigilance at all times on our farms. "Over the busy Summer period and particularly if the weather is fine all family members become involved in the work on the farm. In this context, it is important that all the dangers associated with machinery, animals, slurry gasses and falls are clearly recognised and that children in particular are made aware that the farmyard is a working environment".

To prevent further accidents, Ms. Looby called on each individual farmers to identify the hazard on the farm depending on the work going on and to exercise care and caution at all times. Mrs. Murphy acknowledged the generous support of FBD Trust for the new advertising campaign which aims to reach the maximum number of farmers, their families and visitors to farms especially children.

## No Justification For Milk Price

— ICMSA

ICMSA expressed extreme concern that Dairygold, one of the major Co-ops, has cut the milk price by 3p per gallon for milk supplied in May.

Mr. Jackie Cahill, Chairman of the ICMSA Dairy Committee said that the reality was that the Irish Dairy Board has not reduced its on account price which it pays to Co-ops. The Irish Dairy Board on account price was increased last February on the opening up of intervention for SMP. The price paid to Co-ops has not changed since then. There is no justification now for the 3p cut in the Dairygold milk price.

Mr. Cahill said that Co-op Board members should reject the daily pressure in the media to force down milk prices. Based on the current returns from the market place which are underpinned by intervention and the Irish Dairy Board on account price, Mr. Cahill said that ICMSA was calling on all Co-ops to hold their current milk prices.

Ballinroad Soccer Club was also a club he served well acting as Chairman and selector and one has great memories of his famous phrases during games of "be hard but fair". He was also very much part of the famous Pike tug-o-war team 'The Geese' and was never found wanting when the chips were down.

He was known throughout the county for his work with his uncle, the late Jimmy Power in the era of sheep dipping and many yarns

were told of those days.

Paddy Joe was involved in lots of activities in the community, it was his love and knowledge of the sea that endeared him to so many people. Popularly known as "The Harbour Master" he gave endless hours of pleasure to many people on his fishing trips to the Black Rock and beyond and the people of Ballinacourty were always well supplied with mackerel.

Paddy Joe was a man who had deep Christian values and had always time for his God. He was a kind and caring neighbour and always visited the elderly of the area. His passing leaves a deep void in the lives of his family and friends.

His remains were removed from Drohan's Funeral Home on Monday evening, 14th June to Ballinroad Church where the coffin draped in the Ballinacourty colours was received and blessed by Rev. M. Keogh C.C., assisted by Very Rev. R. Doherty P.P. and Rev. Fr. Aherne P.P. Powerstown/Kilronan and in the presence of a large cortege of mourners.

Newly elected County Councillor, Kieran O'Ryan (FF), Knockalishen, Ballymacarbry has made representations to the County Engineer, John O'Flynn to have the ancient burial grounds in his area cleaned immediately. They are Killoonan, Bennetts Church, Cill Seagain and Churchtown. Those places, when they are overgrown, are a sorry sight and many people who come from foreign parts to visit the resting place of their ancestors fail to find their graves.

Cllr. O'Ryan has also made representations to the County Council to have the road from the ball alley to Clonmel (known as the High Bush Road) cleaned and scarfed. This road is a very narrow one and with the recent growth, it is almost impossible to travel.

Another problem which the councillor has highlighted is the sending of people who need care from the Ballymacarbry, Nire Valley and Rathgormack areas to St. Patrick's Hospital in Cashel. All of these people would prefer to be cared for in Dungarvan.

## DOCTORS WORK 100 HOURS PER WEEK

Junior doctors working at St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel joined with their colleagues around the country last week in a protest against the Government's delay in implementing a recent European directive on working hours.

Dr. Matthew Murphy, a doctor at St. Joseph's Hospital, claims he and his colleagues work an average of 74 hours per week which can vary between 60 and 100 hours per week. Those doctors have to study and do exams on top of the hours worked. He said it was important to point out that the doctors felt their conditions there were better than in some other hospitals. The doctors are asking the Government to resolve the problem before they worsen any further.

## Victory For Labour In Lismore Town Commissioners

Labour entered uncharted territory in the Lismore Town Commissioners when it recorded a remarkable 27.59% in first preferences in the recent local elections.

Bernard Leddy polled an amazing 144 first preferences, topping the poll and easily carrying in running mate Mark Khan and independent Dick Canning with his surplus in the second count.

It was a far cry from 5 years ago when Labour's combined vote totalled Khan's first preference alone this time out.

"I feel vindicated after several years hard work, to see my personal vote increase five fold, and the total Labour vote more than trebling, we have made one of the only Labour Gains in the country, and we took the seat from Fine Gael who nationally are on the increase", said Leddy after the election count.

When asked about his showing in the Council elections he replied, "While I may not have won a council seat this time, it was my first time out, Labour did not run a candidate in the 91 elections, they have not held a seat since the '40's,

and the Labour vote in Tallow and Cappoquin was squeezed between the number of candidates in those areas, and yet we scored the highest Labour Vote in the area ever, speaking both numerically and on a percentage basis".

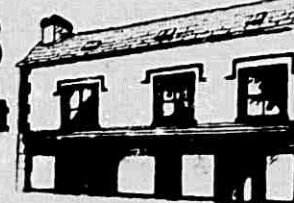

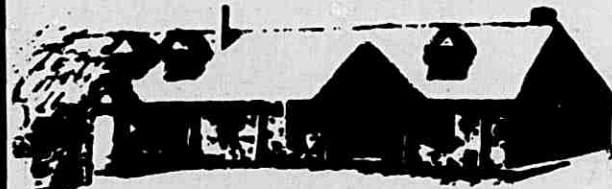

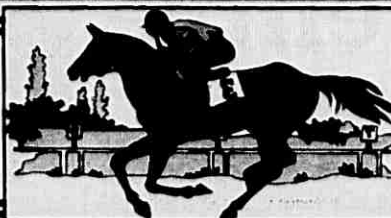

## ALAN'S HOMECOMING

Amateur jockey Alan Dempsey who captured the British Amateur Jockeys title returned home to a hero's reception to his hometown of the Ragg in Co. Tipperary last week. Hundreds of well wishers gathered to welcome Alan who is attached to the Mary Revely yard in the North of England. Alan rode 47 winners in the UK and among those present at the reception were well known racing personalities Ted Walsh and Dessie Hughes.

## ROYAL ASCOT - TUESDAY

Aidan O'Brien who mounted a strong raid on Ascot last week started off the week in fine style as he sent out the Michael Tabor owned Fasliyev to an impressive victory in the Coventry Stakes. Pilot Michael Kinane had the son of Nureyev and Mr. P's Princes in the firing line throughout and he ran on strongly inside the final two furlongs to beat Sir Nicholas. Fasliyev is now priced at 8/1 for next season's 2000 Guineas. Earlier in the day jockey Mick Kinane partnered 20/1 chance Lear Spear to a shock victory in the Prince of Wales Stake for David Elsworth.

The Aga Khan had his first victory in the UK for quite some time as 2/1 favourite Sendawar, ridden by Gerald Mosse, raced to a deserved victory in the featured St. James' Palace Stakes, the winner having earlier captured the French 2000 Guineas. Orpen, the main Irish hope, ran a disappointing race finishing towards the rear. Killer Instinct would surely have finished in the first three home but for losing valuable ground on the home turn clipping the heels of one of his opponents.

## ROYAL ASCOT - WEDNESDAY

No Irish winner on Day 2 as plenty of outsiders came up trumps to keep the bookmakers happy. In the opening event Cork born jockey, Dane O'Neill rode 33/1 outsider Lots Of Magic to victory for his gunner Richard Hannon. The only favourite to oblige came in the final race of the day as the Gary Stevens partnered Blue Print, this 4/1 shot proving a length and a half too good for the 16/1 outsider Banbury.

## ROYAL ASCOT - THURSDAY

Last Thursday's meeting at Ascot was a great day for the Irish with victories for the John Oxx trained Enzeli 20/1 and the Aidan O'Brien handled Bach 5/2. The two mile four furlong Gold Cup is always a difficult race to win but wearing the second colours of the Aga Khan, the Johnny Murtagh ridden Enzeli (Kahysai - Ebaziya) was set alight early on in the straight running on in fine style to beat Invermark by a length and a half. Bach, a son of Caerleon and Producer, was well fancied at 5/2 in the Chesham Stakes and this well built colt was always in the firing line throughout in this seven furlong contest before sprinting clear for a deserved half a length win over Hastenby.

## ROYAL ASCOT - FRIDAY

Curragh based jockey Michael Kinane certainly enjoyed mixed fortune at this fixture. Three of his intended mounts, including our each way fancy Lavery, failed to enter the starting stalls and all three were withdrawn at the start. The day ended on a high note for Mick as he guided the Michael Grassick trained San Sebastian (Niniski - Top Of The League) 4/1 to a thrilling head victory over Jaseul in the two mile six furlong Queen Alexandra Stakes. This was the second year in a row that saw Sebastian capture this race although last year's event was run over the slightly shorter trip of two and a half miles. San Sebastian would normally be ridden by Eddie Ahern but alas Eddie was serving a three day suspension and missed out on a big pay day. Michael Kinane tied with

Frankie Dettori as the leading jockey at the royal meeting but the Italian born rider took the title on the basis of a superior number of placed efforts. 1999 will go down as the most successful Royal Ascot since 1978.

## IRISH JOCKEYS DOWN UNDER

An Irish team of national hunt jockeys head off to Australia at the end of July to take on the A home brigade of riders in a number of international fixtures. Top conditional rider Barry Geraghty heads up the team and he is joined by Kieran Kelly, Jason Maguire and Paul Hourigan who are representing their country for the first time in this annual challenge. The competition takes place at Adelaide and at Flemington, the home of the famous Melbourne Cup.

Racing concluded with a win however for the Laurence Gavin owned and John Kiely trained Slieve Bernagh (Phardante - Clashdermot Lass) who absolutely hacked up at odds of 8/1. Ridden by the Point-to-Point find of the season Davy Russell, Slieve Bernagh seized the initiative early on to race on for an impressive eleven lengths win over Hazy Supreme.

The jackpot pool of £2113 wasn't won at this meeting and the pot is carried forward to the next evening meeting on Thursday, July 8. This meeting is advertised as a great mixed card with children's entertainment and something for everyone with the first race underway at 6 p.m.

## HOLLY FAILS IN FRANCE

The Ferdy Murphy trained French Holly failed in his bid to land the French Champion Hurdle at Auteuil in France over the weekend. In the race itself French Holly ran on strongly up the home stretch but could only manage a close up fourth placing behind the eventual winner Vaporetta. French Holly was returned a red hot 6/4 favourite. French Holly may return to France in October for a hurdle race but his future now lies over fences and he is certain to prove one of the star novices of next season.

Bouncing off the fast ground, this daughter of Sheer Grit and Sheipel Bawn was given a beautiful patient ride by Ruby Walsh before justifying odds of 11/8 by beating a gallant Padre Mio by three and a half lengths. I bet the winning connections cannot wait for the Galway Festival to start where if the ground remains dry they must have high hopes of lifting some major prize money with the nine year olds.

Trainer John Queally entertained high hopes of landing the beginners chase with Sean Connors but jockey Garreth Cotter was hard at work on this six year old from an early stage and staying on at one pace he could finish only a moderate third to the impressive front runner Coillte An Ceoil who did well to avoid a loose horse over the final three fences. Joe Mercer, a former top class jockey in his own right and now racing manager to Arab owner Saed Suhail, confirmed that the Epsom third Beat All would now be supplemented for the Irish Derby at a cost of £75,000. Should any more rain fall, however it may pay to row in with the French Derby winner Montjeu.

## AUSTRIAN FALL FOR PAT

Irish born jockey Pat Eddery was in the wars in Austria over the weekend taking a heavy fall in the Austrian Derby. Pat was involved in a four runner pile up and while he was taken to hospital as a precautionary measure he is expected to resume race riding by the middle of the week.

## KEN OLIVER DIES

One of the best ever National Hunt trainers Ken Oliver passed away last week in the North of England. Aged 85, Ken Oliver trained a long list of winners down through the years and his stable jockey for a long period was Irish man Barry Brogan.

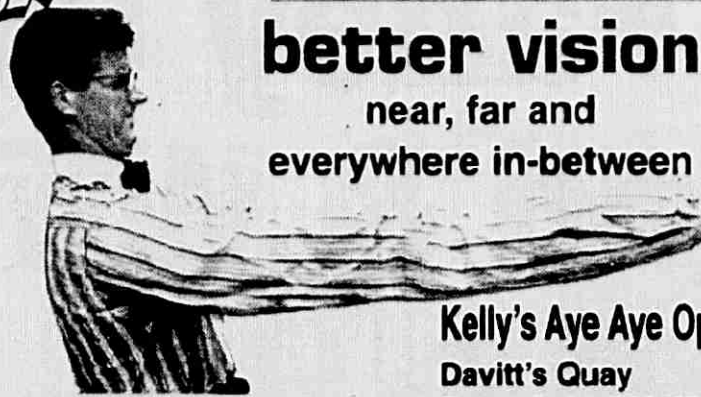

The big guns of ladies football clash once again at Parnell Park in the National League Final and this latest episode is likely to prove just as entertaining as previous encounters between two evenly matched and fiercely committed teams.

Since 1992 when the sides first met in a league quar-

ter-final at Portlaoise, the counties have clashed on 17 occasions Waterford have won 11, drawn 2 whilst the spoils have gone to the Northerners on four occasions. Since 1991 Waterford have won five senior All-Irelands and three National League titles and Monaghan have two senior All-Irelands and three leagues to their credit.

Likewise both counties have dominated the underage scene, Waterford annexing one under-14, six under-16 and four Minor titles and Monaghan have won two under-14 and two Minor titles. Thus it's likely that both sides will be to the fore in the senior grade for some years to come.

However it's the All-Ireland Finals of the last two years that will stick in peoples minds. In 1997 Monaghan came from behind deep in injury time to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat. Twelve months later, after a thrilling draw, Waterford returned the favour in front of the television cameras.

Since then Monaghan have

gone through a bit of turmoil. Team manager Mickey Morgan was removed by an action described as a coup. The player objected and after a second temporary appointment Morgan returned in late April to take up the reins once more.

Apparently the response has been very good but in truth when it comes to playing Waterford, a manager is scarcely needed such is the rivalry between the teams. Both sides took a holiday in the Canaries and returned to begin serious preparation in February.

Waterford's season began with a trial game against the minors at the Friary College on February 21. A week later came a trip to Meath where a 6-10 to 5-3 victory was recorded with Aine Wall notching four goals. In a keenly contested game played on a very hard surface, the Déise side fully deserved their win. Limerick, playing with the strong wind, opened the scoring with a point after three minutes. Waterford had to wait ten minutes for their opening score - the only goal of the game. Top scorer Derek Wyse found the net at the end of a seven man move which started in the winners full-back line. Points from Jack O'Kiely and Wyse saw Waterford lead by 1-2 to 0-2 after 20 mins. of play. Points from Damien O'Connell and Shane Kelly saw Limerick cut the deficit to a single point but Waterford finished the half the stronger with points from Jack O'Kiely and Derek Wyse to lead by 1-4 to 0-4 at half-time.

It was Limerick who started the second half the more impressive with points from Dave Stapleton and Declan White to leave their side one point adrift after only four minutes of play. After this Waterford took control scoring five points in an eleven minute period with Tony Corcoran (free), Shane Bergin, sub David Whelan, Jack O'Kiely and Wyse on target. After an exchange of points by Limerick's Brian Costelloe and Waterford's Connie Power, the Déise side finished the game the stronger with points from Wyse and Kevin Walsh. Waterford had a goal disallowed a minute from time when Jack O'Kiely fisted to the net but by then the Déise side had firmly secured their place in the provincial decider.

# COUNTY BOARD MEETING

P. S. O Riain, Chairman presided at the June meeting of the senior Board which was held at Lawlor's Hotel on Monday evening of last week.

The result in Thurles on the previous afternoon was well reflected in the mood of the delegates and while an atmosphere of despondency did prevail, there was no question of despair and at a later stage of the meeting members expressed the wish and the hope that all concerned would continue to work for the success of the team.

## S.H. — WATERFORD V. KILKENNY

Permission was granted for a benefit match in aid of a very worthy cause and everything going well, this game will be played in Dunhill in early October and before the South Eastern League gets underway.

## LOTTO DRAW

A proposal to dispose of the Lotto Jackpot by holding a draw and to allow free entry to all members who had participated in the last, was discussed, but no final decision was taken as clubs did not have an opportunity of discussing the matter. Clubs will now discuss the proposal and a decision will be taken at the July meeting.

## DEISE DEVELOPMENT DRAW

The director, Declan O'Meara told delegates that a total of 11,626 members had joined the first draw which was run off very successfully in Ballymacarbry. He appealed to clubs to increase their membership, pointing out that it would be considerably to their advantage to bring in new members. He said that it is possible that the club share of the profit will increase, depending on the total membership over the next couple of months.

Speaking about the Club Repayment Scheme, the Chairman said that clubs were slow in making their arrangements for the handing over of the agreed amounts. Only 3 clubs had so far responded and all clubs should attend to this as a matter of urgency.

## TICKETS FOR MUNSTER CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES

When Western Board Secretary, Anthony Walsh com-

plained about bundles of the best Stand tickets being available for sale under the Old stand in Thurles shortly before the Waterford/Cork semi-final, a big number of delegates became involved in a debate, which, to say the least, was very critical of the Munster Council.

Liam Moroney, Tallow said that the members of his club were angry at the poor quality of the tickets and for some strange reason people who had no connection with the club had far better tickets.

Delegates would not accept a situation in which the two participating counties received inferior tickets to those which were allocated to the host county. That was the basis of the criticism and it applied equally to Pairc Ui Caoimh and Thurles. It was decided that the Munster Council will be requested to examine the matter before next season.

Note — When Pairc Ui Caoimh was being redeveloped, Munster Council, as a means of helping the Cork County Board financially, agreed that the Board would be allowed to retain a section of the seats which could be sold as term-tickets (5 years) and the money retained by the Cork Board. I understand that the number was in excess of 2,000. These are centre seats in the Stadium and entitles the purchaser to free admission to all Munster Council, senior intercounty matches, etc. It is not clear why the Council allowed the scheme to continue indefinitely. A scheme something similar to this operates in Semple Stadium. This is the reason why the best seats are not available to the competing counties.

## CONDITION OF PITCH

When the tickets were being discussed, the matter of the condition of the playing surface in Pairc Ui Caoimh was raised (as it was at the Limerick County Board meeting) and it was agreed that this was altogether unacceptable for an intercounty senior hurling championship game.

## REPORTS

The senior hurling report was not in as the Cork game had taken place only on the previous afternoon and will be available for the July meeting.

Referring to the game in

Thurles, James Tobin proposed that Gerald

McCarthy be asked to continue with the team as coach/trainer and that the entire group including players, etc., be asked to stay together and give it one more 'go' next year.

It was clear that this was the feeling of the meeting and the chairman commented that it was a nice gesture from the delegates and he was pleased that this was the mood of the meeting and that there were no recriminations about yesterday.

He did say that Gerald McCarthy had pressures at home, due to the illness of his father, etc. and that he would very likely ponder on the matter over the next month or two. He personally would like to see Gerald stay on and lead Waterford to a Munster and All Ireland next year, or the year after.

## CHAMPIONSHIPS

The chairman told delegates that the GAC met earlier to decide on dates for the commencement of the championships and that the S/H championships will commence on the weekend of July 19th and the football on August 1st. Tommy Hennessy, Munster Council, complained that August 1st was the bank holiday weekend and also the start of the annual holidays and clubs would have problems in fielding teams.

The chairman said that it was possible that we will be involved in a provincial junior football final and that we have an engagement against Tipperary in under-21 hurling championship in mid July and there were not all that many dates available.

## CONGRATULATIONS

The chairman, on behalf of the members, offered congratulations to the members of the Association in the county who were successful in the local elections, regardless of their political affiliations.

## MUNSTER COUNCIL REPORT

Tommy Hennessy gave details of the new grants which are available for purchase and development etc. He stated that Waterford had been fined for failure to have the ground properly marked for the football tie against Cork. He said the Council warned all counties about proper marking and sign posting, etc. He also

told the meeting that Jimmy O'Gorman had been appointed to monitor the provincial championship games for the season.

He also gave details of the 33% increase in Property Insurance

In connection with the Property Insurance club premiums, the chairman said that a select committee will be set up to examine these and the make up of the committee will be announced at the July meeting.

S. O'Brien said that he had requested Central Council to issue guidelines for club payments and the President undertook to take the matter up with the Insurance Work Group. Several clubs described the increase as outrageous.

## CENTRAL COUNCIL REPORT

All National League finals will be played at Croke Park and participating counties will not in future be allowed to agree on a venue and there will be no 'home and away' agreements.

Tramore club were given permission by Central Council to borrow £100,000 for club development.

As the Catholic Church has named May 21st of next year as the day on which the Millennium will be celebrated, the date will be free from all GAA activity.

## CHOMORTAS PEIL NA GAELTACHTA

The chairman, on behalf of the county board, complimented the Ring club on the splendid success of the football festival which was held over the bank holiday weekend. He thanked them for their invitation to attend and for the presentation made to him on the occasion. He said it was much appreciated.

## FINANCIAL REPORT

Treasurer Tony Morrissey, in giving his monthly report, told delegates that the Board were back in the red following a very considerable amount of expense related to the training of the county teams. He said it was a time when there was little or no income, but this will change when the championships commence in a few weeks time.

On the proposition of Sean Whelan, County Bord na nOg Chairman, De La Salle were granted £400 towards their costs of attending Feile this year.

## RULES INTERPRETATION

For the benefit of clubs, Referee Co-ordinator Noel Dalton attended to outline the changes resulting from the introduction of the Red and Yellow cards by referees. Following his talk, there followed an interesting discussion.

# THE AFTERMATH

With supporters still trying to cope with the awful disappointment of our defeat by Cork on June 13th, many are trying to figure out just what went wrong on the day. Not everyone is prepared to accept that Cork were the better team on the day and that our match strategy was a factor in losing. With post mortems being held at every street corner and on every factory floor, the 'findings' are producing a variety of verdicts. Some are interesting and a few are quite bizarre.

The majority opinion seems to favour the view that we lost control in the middle of the field where Cork's Mike O'Connell and Mark Landers scored a total of 10 points between them. They scored 5 in each half. Fergal Hartley was carrying a hand injury from very early in the game and Tony Browne certainly had not reached the state of fitness that helped to win him acclaim and distinction last year.

Many will argue that if the midfield weakness had been remedied at an early stage, that we might have won. Those who do not agree with this school of thought point out that with just 12 minutes remaining (58th minute) Waterford were a mere point in arrears and at

this stage we had a new midfield pairing and that it was after this that the game was lost. I do not agree with that point of view as I believe that with midfield control for the first 35 minutes, we should have been well ahead by halftime.

And so the arguments go on and on, but nothing will now change our situation. We are out of competition until the South Eastern League commences in October.

During the weekend, I spoke to one of the players, who, like all the others, was devastated. He said it was a more bitter experience than losing to Kilkenny in the All Ireland semi-final last August. He said that the first hour after waking on Monday morning was the worst hour of his life. He said it was agony turned to grief and a nightmare which had come true.

This, I am sure, reflected the feelings of all the panel and it all goes to show how things can change almost over night. Last year at this time we were on top of the hurling world and now things have suddenly fallen apart.

Someone also pointed out to me that if we enter the business of comparing disappointments, we should first of all look to the situa-

tion in which Tipperary found themselves in all within a six day period. They were the league champions and rated to be the best, or certainly one of the best hurling counties in the country, and rightly so. They were the league champions going into their first round against Clare and after proving that they were outstandingly the better side, were forced to a draw in the closing seconds of a thrilling game of hurling. Six days later and against all predictions, they were demolished by the same Clare outfit.

To say that this was a very bitter pill to swallow would be the understatement of the season. Their feeling of total devastation was expressed in different ways by different players and people associated with the team. Brendan Cummins, having publicly expressed his feeling of despair, said that he could not bring himself to see the Waterford/Cork match in Thurles on the following day. He did not look at it on the Sunday game and did not listen to the broadcast. And that, more or less, reflected the feeling of all the Tipperary panel, who probably had more reason than Waterford to feel down in the dumps after the defeat.

We must also spare a thought for counties like Limerick who have experienced more hard luck than any other Munster county in the nineties and several other counties who have gone out in a first round.

From several quarters there has been a call for change in the system of organising the championships, having in mind the fact that counties train for up to seven months and go out of business (maybe by a single point) after just one match. I don't know what style of restructuring would remedy the situation or what, if anything, could be done while the present provincial council structures are in place. But it is a subject that deserves a lot of thought.

Here in Waterford the search for new talent will go on and the upcoming championships will provide an opportunity for players with intercounty potential to express their skills, etc. Unfortunately again, half the players will be given just one hour in which to prove themselves here as half of the clubs will go out after the first rounds.
