Popular Ballyduff Man Dies After Fatal Assault

Residents of the small West Waterford community of Ballyduff Upper are coming to terms this week with the death of well-known local man Patrick (Patsy) Molumphy of Marian Terrace following a vicious assault in the area. Mr. Molumphy, who was aged 51, died of his injuries in Cork University Hospital last Sunday following a week long battle for survival.

A well known and respected member of the community, Mr. Molumphy worked as a self employed lorry driver. His sudden and shocking death has stunned the entire Ballyduff area and cast a wave of sad-

ness over the parish. A devoted family man, he is survived by his wife Mary and five sons Patrick, Michael, Tom, Edward and Stephen - all playing members of Ballyduff GAA Club. Indeed his son Michael is a

member of the Waterford senior hurling panel.

Mr. Molumphy had been in a critical condition since being the victim of a serious assault which took place at around 1.30 a.m. on the

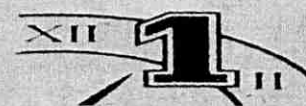

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Local Osteopath Receives Registered Status

The General Osteopathic Council is pleased to announce that Patrick Power of the Dungarvan Healing and Osteopathic Centre has been listed on the statutory register of osteopaths having satisfied the Registrar that he is a legal, safe and competent practitioner under the conditions of the Osteopaths Act 1993.

In meeting these require-

ments Mr. Power has proven high standards of clinical competence, is properly insured and has agreed to work within a professional code of practice.

The Statutory Register is the essential element by which the General Osteopathic Council will regulate the profession and protect the actions of unqualified

practitioners. At present there are no laws preventing anyone calling himself or herself an osteopath and setting up in practice. The Statutory Register opened on May 9, 1998 and existing osteopaths now have a two-year period in which to apply for entry on the Register. When the Osteopaths Act is brought fully into force in May 2000, it will

be a criminal offence for an individual not on the Statutory Register to call himself or herself an osteopath and to practise as such.

The General Osteopathic Council is the new body responsible for regulating, developing and promoting the profession in the UK. It replaces the previous voluntary registration schemes.

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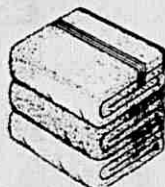
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Where Do Penguins Lay their Eggs?

Where can penguins lay their eggs? Because we know that they live in the Antarctic and this area is mostly covered by deep snow and ice.

During the winter in the Antarctic (February to October) the penguins live at sea. In early spring, which is October, they come away from the sea and start the long trek to their breeding grounds or rookeries.

The penguins get there by any means they can — walk, slide and toboggan across the sea ice to reach the rocky Antarctic coast.

The males usually get there first and go directly to the nests they occupied last year. The nests are usually made of

stone. Deep snow is not usually a problem in this rocky area.

Before the female lays her eggs, the male and female make a nest together. They go collecting stones and carry them in their beaks. When they have a small pile of stones, the male and female collect and guard the stones in turn. As the stones are dropped by one partner, the other arranges them into a neat pile.

Around the middle of November, the female lays two bluish white eggs. An interesting process begins then. Both parents take it in turn to guard and hatch the eggs. They take it in turns to go out to the sea to feed.

The female usually returns just as the chicks are ready to hatch. This guarding and feeding goes on for about four weeks after the young are born.

Junior Encyclopaedia

The chief means of communication we have is by talking to each other. No animals can communicate with one another by words, but they are able to communicate.

Many animals communicate by making certain kinds of noises. For example, when a horse neighs and paws the ground, this is a message meant for other horses and one they understand.

Another example of communication between animals is a hen giving a warning noise to her chicks if there is danger present.

Dogs can communicate in different ways; they growl, bark, whine and howl. Other dogs can understand what these sounds means.

Bees have fascinating powers of communication. If a bee finds honey he will go back to the hive and do a dance. The way the dance

is done indicates the direction of the source of food.

Birds, we know, communicate by singing. There are 'dialects' in bird song. The song of the same kind of species of bird is different in Switzerland than it is here. It even differs in different parts of the country.

We all think our pet dog can understand human language. The dog only knows what our tone of voice means and not what the words say.

Domestic animals have learned how to communicate with their masters. A cat will mew at the door until it is opened or a dog will stand on its hind legs to beg for food.

Wild animals don't seem able to express their wants, such as begging food from each other.

Even when animals communicate, the most they can do is express their feelings and intentions. They cannot converse like us.

Tragedy As Four Killed In Air Corps Helicopter Crash

Air accident investigators from the Department of Transport are still trying to determine the cause of an accident which claimed the lives of four Air Corps personnel in Tramore in the early hours of last Friday morning. A Dauphin marine search and rescue helicopter which had been stationed in Waterford Regional Airport just 24 hours, crashed in dense fog on Tramore beach at approximately 4 a.m. causing the deaths of its four man crew.

The helicopter and crew had been called out on their first mission since being stationed in Waterford. They assisted in the rescue of four men and a child on board a small pleasure craft in the Dungarvan area which had made a distress call.

Following the operation, the crew attempted to land three times at the Regional Airport base but each attempt was aborted due to low and heavy fog. The last communication between the crew was that they were attempting to land the Dauphin at Tramore beach or a field nearby.

The charred wreckage of the twin engined helicopter was discovered shortly after 4 a.m. after it disappeared from radar. The helicopter burst into flames after it crashed down into a large sand dune at the beach. All four bodies were later recovered and transferred to the mortuary at Waterford Regional Hospital where a post mortem was carried out.

The crew members were Captain Dave O'Flaherty from Lucan in Dublin, Captain Michael Baker from Enniscorthy in Wexford, Sergeant Paddy Mooney from Meath and Corporal Niall Byrne from Dublin. They were aged between 27 and 33. Three of the men had been stationed in Waterford for the past year with the Alouette helicopter and would have been familiar with the locality.

On Friday morning, air accident investigators began studying the remains of the helicopter and the entire area was sealed off. Parts of the helicopter were later removed for forensic examination. It is expected that the investigation will continue for a number of weeks.

The tragedy was particularly poignant as last week marked the first anniversary of the Air Corps Search and

Rescue base in Waterford Regional Airport. Only the day before the tragedy the Search & Rescue facility was greatly enhanced by the replacement of the existing Alouette helicopter with the Dauphin.

The Dauphin was one of five such helicopters in the country and is the first to have crashed in active service. During the past five years this particular Dauphin flew over 450 missions and saved 150 lives.

TRAGEDY PRECEDED BY SUCCESSFUL SEA RESCUE

The RNLI's Atlantic 21 Lifeboat from Helvick Head was launched shortly after 10 p.m. on Thursday night to the assistance of a small pleasure craft which was drifting in heavy fog. The three crew members were Michael Hayes, helmsman, Alan Kelly and Páidí Breathnach.

The vessel with four adults and a 12 year old child on board became lost in fog with visibility being just twenty yards. The 15 ft fibre glass boat, the 'Realt Or', was equipped with a basic VHS radio, mobile phone and distress flares. All those on board the troubled craft were from the Dungarvan area.

The lifeboat located the craft just after 11 p.m. three miles north-east of Helvick. At that stage both the ill-fated Dauphin and the Ballycotton Lifeboat had also been called out. The entire operation was coordinated by the Irish Marine Emergency Service (IMES). The call out of the Dauphin was normal procedure in conditions of dense fog and poor visibility. For the entire operation the Dauphin was monitoring the situation.

Because of the dense fog, visibility was down to only 10 yards and the vessel was put on tow by the Helvick Lifeboat. The fog density however made progress to

the harbour extremely slow and the passengers were transferred to the Ballycotton Lifeboat which arrived into Helvick shortly before 1 a.m.

On transporting the rescued group safely to harbour, the Ballycotton Lifeboat was then called by the IMES to Tramore Bay to search for the missing Dauphin helicopter.

PRO of the Helvick Head RNLI, Dolores Uí Cheallaigh told the 'Leader' that the unfortunate tragedy resulting in the deaths of the four Air Corps crew was a thing anyone in the lifesaving services wishes never to see.

"The news is devastating for everyone", she stated, "and we extend our heartfelt sympathy to the families of those who have died".

Many of the volunteer crew members based at the RNLI Helvick Station had previously met with three of the ill-fated Dauphin crew while taking part in exercises on several occasions during the past year.

TRIBUTES POUR IN FOR BRAVE CREW

Last Friday, the President Mary McAleese and the Taoiseach Bertie Ahern led the messages of sympathy to the families of the four Air Corps personnel. The President said her thoughts and prayers were with the families of the bereaved at this tragic time while Mr. Ahern said the untimely death of the men was all the more poignant given that they had helped to save the lives of people on a vessel in distress a short time before the crash.

An Tanaiste Mary Harney expressed her deepest sympathy to the families of the four Air Corps crew members.

"The four men lost their lives in the course of carrying out selfless and courageous duties. It is a tragic loss in the first instance to their families but also to their colleagues in the Defence Forces and to this country", she stated.

Waterford Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea extended his deepest sympathy to the relatives of the four members of the Air Corps.

"Their deaths are all the more poignant in that they were returning from a rescue

mission when this terrible accident occurred", he stated. "We will always be in debt to men such as these whose life's work is dedicated, at great risk to themselves, to the rescue of those in distress".

Waterford Fianna Fail TD Brendan Kenneally said he was appalled and deeply saddened by the tragic deaths. The four Air Corps members, he said, have upheld the finest tradition of our defence forces who have always been ready and willing to come to the assistance of those in need.

Minister of State Martin Cullen TD also expressed his shock and devastation at the tragic deaths of the four Air Corps crew members.

Paying tribute to the courage and bravery of the men, Minister Cullen said that the crew had earlier guided a boat in difficulty and the rescue lifeboat to safety.

Dungarvan To Benefit From Commercial Tax Breaks

Following the approval of the EU Commission, it is confirmed that the commercial and industrial incentives to be applied under Dungarvan's new Urban Renewal Scheme were brought into effect last Thursday. The climate of uncertainty which had existed for some time regarding the extent to which commercial tax incentives could be applied for has finally been re-

moved and Dungarvan UDC can now go full steam ahead with the implementation of the approved Integrated Area Plan for the town. Since early this year the Competition Commissioner Karl Van Miert has been examining the incentive proposals to ensure that they complied with strict EU competition laws on State aid.

These new business incentive projects will allow for many attractive tax breaks encouraging development in several designated parts of Dungarvan. These areas include Bridge House (commercial office), the Town Hall (commercial office/retail/etc.), and various sections of the following streets - Church Street, O'Connell Street, Grattan Square, Mary Street and Main Street. Capital allowances have been increased from 50% to

100% for commercial development to counteract the non availability of the double rent and rates remission which as expected were not approved. Certification and monitoring guidelines for the new scheme have been issued to the Urban Council and with the announcement there should be no reason for any further delay in bringing forward projects. The termination date for all tax incentives under the scheme is 31st December 2002.

Co. Waterford Arts Bursary

For the second year, the Co. Waterford Arts Office is offering a special bursary award to an artist born or currently living in the Waterford County Council administrative area. The bursary is open to practitioners of all the arts, and there is no age limit. This prestigious award will enable the chosen artist to spend two weeks at the Tyrone Guthrie Centre at Annaghmakerrig, the artists' workplace in Co. Monaghan; covering all board and lodging expenses plus the use of a studio if required. Co. Waterford Arts Officer Margaret Fleming says: "We are pleased to be able to offer this opportunity to both established and emerging artists who might benefit from working at Annaghmakerrig. last year's recipient was the writer Mary Carney from Ballyduff Upper and this year yet another artist will be supported in the development of their work". Sean Kelly to Launch Dungarvan MS Sponsored Cycle

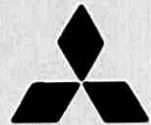

Kiwi And Ginger Salad

Serves: 4

1 Ogen melon, halved and seeded

2 kiwi fruit, thinly sliced
 250g (8 oz) green grapes, halved and pipped

15g (1/2 oz) stem ginger, thinly sliced

2 tablespoons ginger syrup (from the ginger)

4 tablespoons apple juice

METHOD: Scoop the flesh from the melon halves with a melon baller, or cut into cubes, and place in a bowl with the kiwi fruit, grapes and ginger.

Mix the ginger syrup and apple juice together and pour over the fruit. Serve in individual dishes.

Irish Stew

Serves: 4

Preparation Time: 20 mins
 Cooking time: 2 1/2 hours

2 1/2 to 2 3/4 1.25kg lamb neck chops

4 medium onions, peeled
 4 medium-sized carrots, scraped or peeled
 1 pt/600ml lamb stock salt and ground black pepper
 4 potatoes, peeled
 1 tbsp butter
 1 tbsp chopped parsley
 1 tbsp chopped chives

• Cut off most of the fat from the chops and place it in a heavy-based pan or casserole and melt it down. Cut the onions and carrots into quarters and set aside.

• Brown the onions and the carrots. Return the chops in the fat, remove and reserve. Then lightly brown the chops to the pan, pour the stock over and season to taste with salt and pepper. Place the whole potatoes on top, cover and simmer gently for two hours or until the meat is tender. Pour off the cooking liquid, skim off the fat, then re-heat the stock in a small pan. Adjust the seasoning, mix in butter, parsley and chives. Return the stock to the casserole and serve.

• Originally a 'white' stew made from about 1 lb/450g neck of mutton or bony bits of pork, to 1 lb/450g onion and at least three times that quantity of potatoes, the meat went into the pot first with water to cover and it was boiled up and skimmed until no scum arose, before

Family Health

Q. I'm in my mid 40's and notice my hair is thinning considerably. Could this be due to the menopause and if so, will going on HRT help to thicken it up again. The only menopausal symptom I have experienced to date is the occasional hot flush. What do you think?

A. A lot of women at the time of the menopause and beyond, experience hair thinning - sometimes alarmingly so. While prescribed oestrogen should prevent any hot flushes and can also in the long term, prevent the onset of bone softening osteoporosis, there is no scientific proof that it has a dramatic effect upon the loss of hair. The feed back though, from many women is that their skin looks fresher and their hair thicker since being prescribed HRT. I suggest you discuss your symptoms with your own doctor and see what his/her recommendations are.

Q. My two sons, aged 10 and 8 both have verrucae on the soles of their feet. They go to the local swimming pool a lot and I think they may have picked it up there. Should I get them seen to, or will they go of their own accord? They do not seem to be bothered by them at all.

A. Verrucae are extremely common and the virus that causes them is easily picked up from swimming pools, bath-room floors, changing rooms and anywhere where they are a lot of wet or sweaty feet. Some children seem to be impervious to the virus, others pick it up but soon become immune. The verrucae on your sons feet will very likely disappear of their own accord within a few months. If they persist and cause any discomfort, I suggest you take the boys along to a registered chiropodist. It will prove quicker and more effective than trying to deal with them yourself.

HOUSEHOLD TIPS

1. If you are moving house, wrap your delicate china in damp newspaper. It will dry into a mould giving your china extra protection.
2. To prevent your brush from falling over while leaned against the wall, cut a finger from your rubber glove and slip over the top of the brush.
3. Keep the small plastic bags you get in

- shops, put them on your feet inside your boots and your feet will be snug all winter.
4. When you are doing your vacuuming run the pole around the inside of your tumble dryer. This will remove all the fluff lodged in your machine.
5. To clean white training shoes, use a no-rinse bathroom cleaner and the dirt will just wipe off.

Diet For Children

To encourage children to develop healthy eating habits they must be given nutritious foods from the very start.

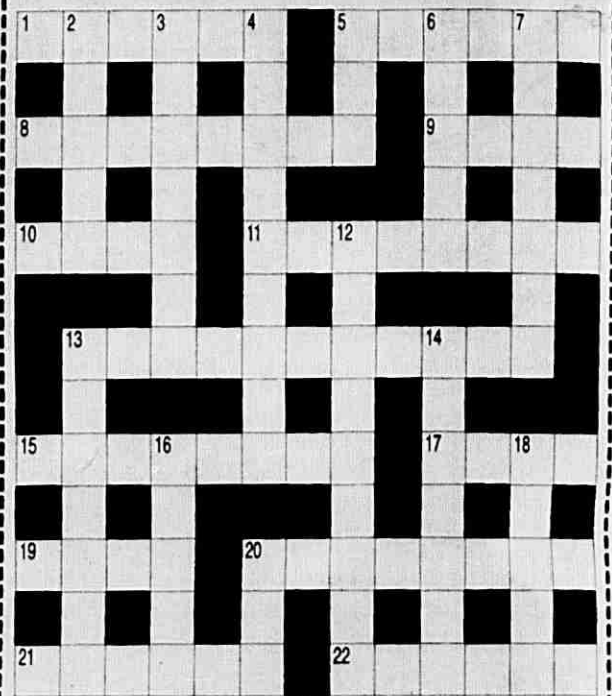
Newborn babies will receive all the nutrients they require from milk. Breast feeding, which is once again becoming very popular, has many advantages over bottle feeding, the most important being that breast milk contains just the right amount for nutrients for babies needs. It is important for nursing mothers to remember that certain foods such as garlic and of course alcohol and drugs will affect the milk.

There are various formula milks for babies on the market which are based on modified cows milk. The levels of proteins, fats and carbohydrates are changed to resemble human milk. Cows milk should not be given to children under six months. If possible try not to give cows milk to a baby under one year, especially if there is a history of a milk related allergy in the family. Skimmed milk should never be given to babies as it lacks some fat soluble vitamins.

Most children's doctors do not advise semi-skimmed milk for children under five and even thereafter, unless they are eating a nutritionally adequate diet. Condensed and evaporated milks should not be given to children as they do not contain essential nutrients which are needed. Soya milk should not be given to children either as it is low in calcium. However, for children who are allergic to cows milk, there are suitable infant formulas available based on soya protein, supplemented with vitamins and minerals.

Dungarvan Jockey Keeps The Flag Flying In US

Apprentice jockey Fenella O'Flynn of Dungarvan has represented Ireland with pride this racing season. Daughter of John and Diana O'Flynn of Ballinamuck, Fenella has ridden three winners from just 14 rides to bring her US total to five victories.

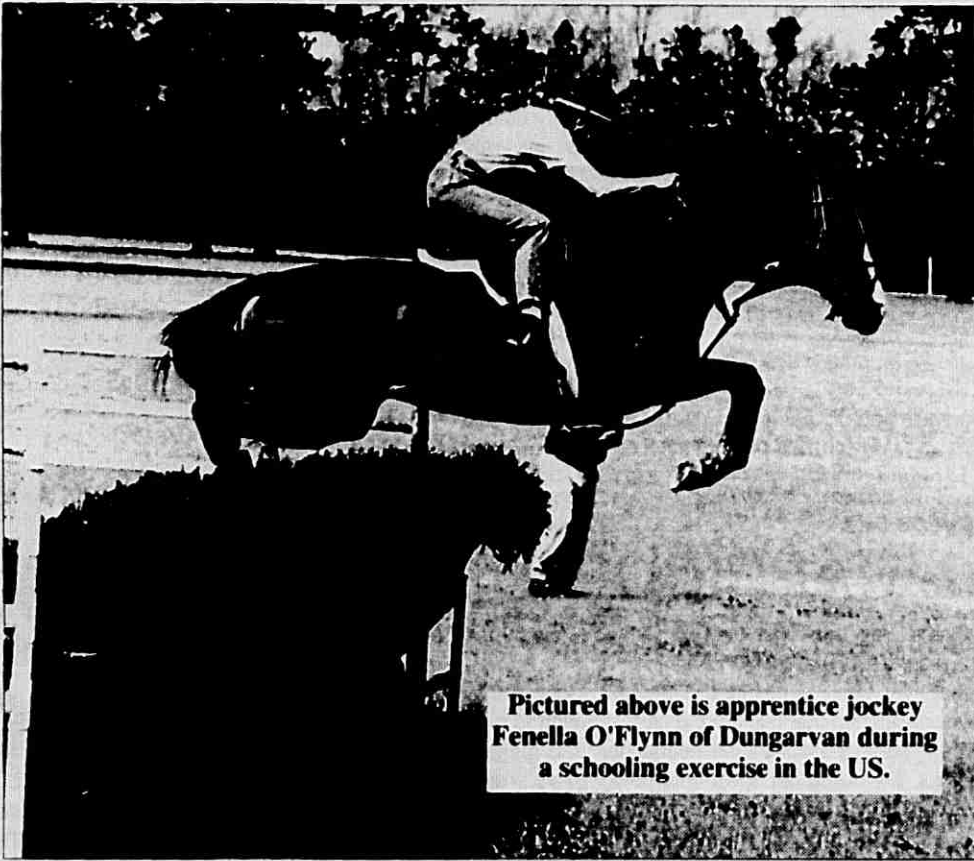
Since moving to the US in 1997, she has spent most of her time as assistant to trainer Toby Edwards who maintains a base in South Carolina.

"She's a good rider and she works hard", Edwards told 'The Irish Field' recently. "The second part is the most important. That's what sets her apart from other inexperienced riders".

Fenella has used the National Steeplechase Association apprentice programme as a springboard to success. She won two of the restricted races - one in 1997 and one last year.

Success at that level has also led to other opportunities for the Dungarvan rider including a double at Brookhill, North Carolina in May. She scored in a maiden claiming hurdle with 'Chasing John' for top trainer Jonathan Sheppard and then took the featured \$20,000 handicap hurdle with 'Rain Alert' for owner/trainer Linda Klein.

Fenella recently left trainer Toby Edwards to go to work for Sheppard. The career leader among American steeplechase trainers, Sheppard trains a large stable of flat and jump horses at his farm in Pennsylvania

and at Delaware Park racetrack.

"There's a chance to do a lot more riding and that's what I want to do", Fenella told 'The Irish Field'. "I can get on seven or eight horses a day and I will have a chance to go to Saratoga and it should work out that I'll get a few rides in races too".

Her debut with Sheppard will have to wait however as Fenella is currently recovering from a fall which occurred at Fair Hill in May.

"Nothing's broken, just some bruises on one arm and my back", she said. "I'll be back soon".

street at Ballyduff on Sunday, June 27th. Gardai described the attack to the media last week as 'violent'. He sustained serious head injuries during the assault and together with another man from Ballyduff, was taken by ambulance to Cork University Hospital. The other male was discharged later on Sunday, June 27th.

Two men from the Conna area of neighbouring East Cork were arrested following the attack and later released without charge. They are currently helping Gardai with their enquiries. A file on the matter is being prepared and will be forwarded by the Gardai to the Director of Public Prosecutions.

A post mortem examination on the deceased was carried out by the Assistant State Pathologist last Monday at the Cork Hospital.

It is not expected that murder charges will be brought against anybody arising out of the fatal assault.

sunbathers and swimmers.

A routine inspection of the area by a Waterford County Council overseer led to the discovery of the wreckage on Sunday. Vandals had set fire to two life saving lifebuoys, as well as a number of litter bins which were completely destroyed. A specially erected display cabinet, maintained by the Co. Council was also badly damaged. This display contained information on Stradbally Cove as well as the results of compulsory water samples taken from the area.

A number of local youths have been questioned and interviewed by Gardai in Stradbally in relation to the malicious fires and a file on the matter is being prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions.

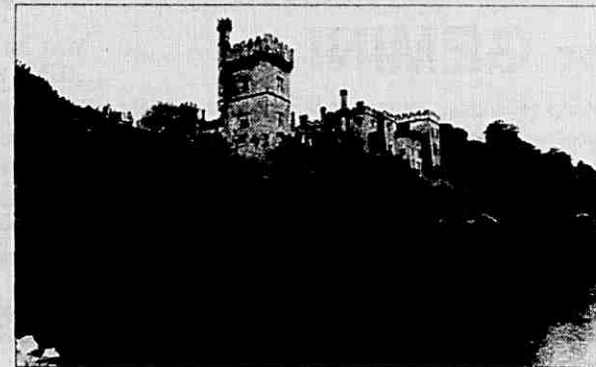

GARDENING

What does it mean to you?



Hobby, leisure or choice — While millions of people flock to garden centres and DIY stores, some of us just like pottering about in the garden and others steer well clear of it.

THERE are 20 million household gardens in the UK and Ireland, but only a few basic types of gardener.

Fascinating new research from Mintel Marketing Intelligence classifies the gardening market into four categories.

About half of all adults in Britain and Ireland claim gardening as a hobby.

Eighteen per cent of all adults can be categorised as "horticultural hobbyists". These people are mostly aged over 45 and keenly enjoy gardening as a hobby. Nearly twice as many people can be classified as less dedicated, but interested, "leisure gardeners".

Those who view gardening itself as a chore, but have gardens to maintain, amount to some 16 million people, or 33 per cent of the population. They are classified as "reluctant gardeners". That leaves seven million adults (15 per cent) who have absolutely no connection with gardening.

The research also shows that large DIY centres like B&Q and Homebase are outstripping garden centres when it comes to selling garden products

Only a small minority of the 2,500 garden centres in the UK and Ireland are part of larger garden centre chains.

The leading specialist group is Wyevalle with nearly 60 centres.

Gardening represents 0.53 per cent of the consumer market — nothing to laugh at when you consider that it is worth £2.8 billion.

But the industry lost out to other leisure activities last year. This was blamed on the exceptionally poor weather.

The report also found that 55-70-year-olds, considered to be less adventurous in their gardens, dominate the market.

Recent years have seen lots of media coverage of gardening, with TV programmes such as Ground Force and Home Front becoming popular.

This has been bringing younger people into the market, often interested in televised garden make-overs and options for low-maintenance gardens.

PROTECT VINES FROM MILDEW

Thinning of the fruits will now become general with outdoor vines. A thick mulch of well rotted manure spread over the border will help the vines a lot at this time of year. If there is the slightest sign of mildew, dust the foliage and fruits with flowers with sulphur.

LATE MR. THOMAS TOBIN

With deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Mr. Thomas (Tom) Tobin, O'Rahilly Avenue, Clonmel which occurred recently.

Tom was a member of an old and respected Co. Waterford family. He was a familiar figure as he strolled around Clonmel with his pipe and his dog Sparky. He loved to stop and have a good chat with someone which prompted the humorous comment that he did more talking than walking. There was much more to Tom, of course, than perhaps that public perception of him as he was most of all a great family man who also possessed a deeply religious fervour inculcated in him by his parents.

Born in Co. Waterford to William and Catherine Tobin who moved when Tom was just two and a half years old to Lisnatubrid, Ballypatrick where they had a modest farm at the foot of Slievenamon, Tom often recalled what it was like for his parents trying to rear a large family and edge out a living in those days on the side of a mountain without electricity or running water in the house, but they did it admirably. Of a family of seven (four boys and three girls), he had happy memories with his brothers and sisters helping out on the farm from an early age. Tom received his education in Killurney School then he worked around with farmers before going to England from where he returned after a short while and then he commenced work with the Forestry. In 1952 he married Nellie Gibbs of Ballypatrick. They set up home under the shadow of Slievenamon and there they reared twelve children in a cottage which had the basic facilities. His family had the happiest of childhoods, the older ones bringing their dad's lunch to him in the forest where they enjoyed meeting his colleagues, Mick Duggan, Mick Halpin and Jackie Cahill. They remember also cutting up timber they bought from the Forestry which they sold in bags in Clonmel. Tom bid adieu to the Forestry in the late 1960's due to an allergy to timber which gave him dermatitis. He then worked with builders on sites around Clonmel. For the past 25 years he worked as a handy man. Then twenty years ago they moved house to Clonmel where they were all very happy but he never forgot the friends and neighbours he grew up with near Slievenamon. He was a lover of our Gaelic games, many the game he replayed with his friends, although his heart was split in two when his native Waterford were playing Tipperary.

Tom was a man of great wit and one would have to pay attention to what he was saying in order to be in tune with the conversation. A few months ago his health began to decline and he was housebound for the last few weeks before he died. His remains were removed from Condon's Funeral Parlour, Clonmel after the rosary was recited to the parish church at Gambonsfield, Kilsheelan where they were blessed and received on arrival by Rev. Fr. James O'Donoghue C.C. Kilsheelan. On the following morning requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Fr. James O'Donoghue C.C. assisted by Bro. Philip. Amongst the large attendance at the funeral and the removal of his remains were members of the Capuchin Order. To his family we tender our deepest sympathy.

South East ICMSA News CHARGES NEEDED

The Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mr. Joe Walsh T.D. should remove the current rule which excludes medium scale dairy farmers from receiving suckler cow premia. Mr. Jackie Cahill, Chairman of the ICMSA Dairy Committee said that the EU had changed the regulations which remove the restriction on dairy farmers.

ICMSA are opposed in principle to any restriction that applies solely to dairy farmers. The restricted access to suckler cow premia for dairy farmers is an example of such a rule. Only small scale dairy farmers, with quotas less than 25,638 gallons can obtain cow premia.

Medium scale and larger scale dairy farmers are currently totally prohibited from obtaining a suckler cow premium. No such restrictions applies to any other farmer or indeed to part-time farmers who may have substantial off farm income.

"This anomaly has been consistently highlighted by ICMSA and we have made detailed submissions on this issue to the Minister for Agriculture. The opportunity now exists for the Minister to change the Irish rule, following the recent relaxation of EU legislation."

Mr. Cahill proposed, as an

interim measure, that dairy farmers in the priority category, currently 35,000 gallons, should be allowed to receive beef cow premia. This would allow medium scale dairy farmers to develop their dairy and suckler cow enterprises in tandem if they so wished. Mr. Cahill said that the ICMSA proposal is strictly in an interim measure to be adopted for two years and to be reviewed at the end of two years with a view to further relaxation of the re-

striction.

Mr. Cahill said that many farmers had to sell their beef cow quotas when they obtained additional milk quota from the Milk Quota Restructuring Scheme. This is an unacceptable situation and is preventing farmers from developing their farms with both dairy and beef enterprises to earn a viable family farm income.

The Minister must not be placing artificial unfair obstacles on developing dairy farmers, concluded Mr.

Cahill.

NEW DAIRY DECLARATION AND CERTIFICATION FORM MUCH IMPROVED

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murphy has said that the new dairy Declaration and Certification form just issued by the Department for distribution to farmers by co-ops was far more practical and workable for both farmers and vets than that circulated in the last couple of years.

"IFA had recommended that the Declaration and Certification be amended in a number of respects. The new form, now a carbon-copy triplicate, has enough space to list up to 76 milking cows, and it bears the official harp emblem, which gives it official national status," Michael Murphy said.

"The new deadline for first signature of the form by both the farmer and the vet of his/her choice is 30th June, 2000. This gives every farmer a full 12 months, as requested by IFA, to get the Certificate signed. As the EU hygiene regulations provide, we have recommended that farmers would get the form signed by their vets at the same time as their next TB test. This makes a lot of sense and is both practical and cost efficient," he added.

Michael Murphy ex-

plained that he had requested that the Department would make blank forms available from the local DVO offices, and that another copy would be sent to farmers with the notification of their next TB test. This, he said, would be a timely reminder.

"I would also recommend that farmers would do their homework, namely that they would fill in the ear-tag numbers of the milking cows in advance of the vet's visit, and that they would have available for inspection their herd and animal remedies records (which is a legal requirement already) as well as a copy of their most recent SCC and TBC result from the co-op," he said.

"I have just written to co-ops to call on them to supply the farmers who are reluctant to show their milk cheque a special print out outlining only the SCC and TBC results," Michael Murphy added.

"I am quite confident that, with co-operation from all parties, the Declaration and Certification, which puts equal weight on the farmer's and the vet's professional judgement, will be carried out in a common sense and cost efficient manner," he concluded.

MALE DEPRESSION

RECOGNITION AND RECOVERY

Dante wrote "In the middle of the journey of our lives I found myself upon a dark path." A great many people will, I know, identify with this statement as most of us at some stage have experienced a dark path, a time of sadness, despair, a questioning of the future and of the meaning of life.

Depression is a mask for very deep and painful feelings that men are dissociated or 'split off' from to a great extent. Because of this each new criticism or rejection sets off childhood pain. These victims feel totally alone and unwanted, so reminiscent of how they felt as children and to cope with this they go into denial. Rather than acknowledge the real pain of their current rejection they project their feelings on to others, accusing them of having a problem.

Males will frequently minimise or rationalise their depressions by making statements such as "I'm down" or "I've got a tightness in my chest." This denial has its roots in boyhood conditioning which discourages expression of feelings so in adulthood they create smoke-screens to mask the fact that they were not nurtured. In fact no matter what they did it was never enough to get their parents to love them. This creates feelings of rejection, of being no good and unlovable and these feelings trigger buried emotions. However because the sufferer is dissociated from real feelings, behaviours are set in motion to cover the feelings of rejection. Many men, dissociated from real feelings, come to rely on alcohol. Depression lifts its ugly head at night and overwhelms its victims. These men start drinking more and often go to bed sodden with alcohol, sleep only for a few hours, then awaken in fear as the mind continues its endless churning. The inescapable feelings of worthlessness, all the mistakes of the past haunt them. Details of past deeds and omissions occupy the mind,

sinking the sufferer into darkness and despair. Deeply depressed men are almost incapable of having a relationship with anyone including themselves as the self turns against the self.

One common denominator links men to depression and that is childhood emotional violence which is often coupled with physical violence. Boys growing up in homes where there is dysfunction and abuse take on the parents pain thus creating a fusion between the boy victim and his parents. All boundaries are violated between child and parents as the parents rage out of control. These children cling to this attachment even at risk to their own welfare. Only in human relationships is a victim damaged and abused by the very person he relies on. Incidentally this internalising by victims of the abusers shame is one of the characteristics of sexual abuse victims.

Boys on the receiving end of violence act out are disruptive and likely to commit assault. What they learn in fact is what they have suffered they must dish out. Boys learn in abusive homes that in order to be closer to their father they must be like him. Often men who experience childhood abuse, grow up so much wanting to explode their anger on to others. One road rage perpetrator told me how he would cruise the roads inciting other drivers to anger until he found a misguided man willing to take him on. When this unfortunate stepped out onto the road he was beaten into a pulp. He told me that as he beat up his victim he actually saw his father. His rage and assault was his actually beating the father he dared not oppose in childhood. Others have told me as they beat up 'marks' they took on their fathers identity and toughness and in doing this they felt a union with their fathers.

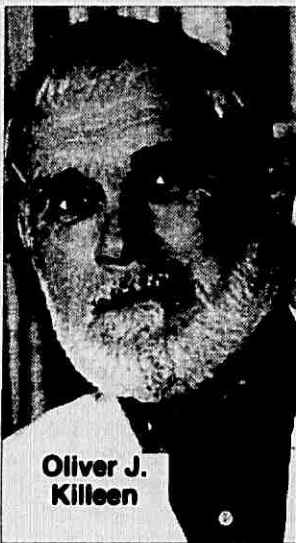
It is only when a man begins the

return journey into childhood trauma that healing begins. In doing this he must abandon defences used in his covert depression. When a man uses defences

to hide his depression he cannot get close to those around him because his primary concern is holding on to his emotional crutch. Many men fear being vulnerable as they interpret that as an invitation to be attacked. In relationships or in marriage they fear that their partners will 'act like men'. As more and more women enter the work force it has become clear that the paradigm of man as the breadwinner no longer holds true. The dynamic of dominance and submission which for many men is their crown of masculinity embryos depression.

However when defences are laid aside depressed men can get in contact with all the wounded parts of themselves. They go deep into their childhood darkness and release all the anger, all the shame, all the guilt they have buried within and, like a chrysalis, emerge transformed. Depression is like a state, a numbness and the antidote to this is feelings. If men allow themselves the luxury of experiencing their feelings they will taper off. The goal of therapy is to get men to live in the present without bringing demands from the past.

After peeling back the many layers depressed men find that the blackness inside lightens and the rays of light filter through. Hope is born and hope is the beginning, love is eternal and happiness is our birthright!

DAIRYING

Grass Growth Down 20 - 40%:

Grass growth rates in recent weeks have been 20-40% below normal. Walk all your grassland and make an estimate of farm cover. Targets are:

- Average cover-grazing area 700-1000kg DM/ha.
- Grazing cover/LU 200kg DM.
- 10-12 grazing days ahead of cows.

Short Rotation Length a Major Cause of Grass Shortage:

If your rotation length is less than 21 days you will quickly run out of grass. In a 21-day rotation the grass in a paddock doubles in the last 7 days. Short rotation length in poor growth conditions halves an already low growth rate and therefore must be avoided.

5 Steps to Build Up Grass Cover:

1. In poor growth conditions increase rotation length to 25 days by:
 - Increasing grazing ground available to cows, e.g. graze some 2nd cut silage.
 - Feeding high quality surplus silage.
 - Supplementing with up to 8lbs of a cheap meal - costing less than £130/tonne.
2. Continue to use CAN at 1_ bags per acre and include Sulphur where necessary.
3. Avoid topping as this slows down recovery.
4. Avoid very tight grazing, i.e. not less than 6cms.
5. Allow silage aftermath's to recover to a reasonable cover (1400kg+) before grazing.

CATTLE Reduce Cattle Costs:

- It costs 20-30 pence per day to feed cattle at this time.
- The higher the weight gain per day the lower the cost of producing a Kg of meat.
- Quality grass, just like you give the cows, is all that is required.
- Stock cattle at 800-900 Kgs per acre.
- Only leave them 2 days in any area of ground, otherwise, regrowths will be eaten.
- Top as they leave it if necessary, but if there is a lot of topplings, that indicates you gave them too much.
- Apply 20-40 units of CAN after each grazing.
- Stick to a 24-25 day rotation.
- Calves must be given quality grass and no meals.
- Look after the small ones with quality grass and 1-2 lbs meals.
- It would be an advantage to castrate bull calves now:
- Less stress on man and beast.
- No reduction in lifetime performance.
- Less risk of weanling heifers going incalf.
- But don't if you expect a good bull trade in Autumn.
- Parasite dosing can be minimised by good grazing management.
- That is 'clean grass' (not previously grazed by calves this year) should be provided as often as is possible.
- Do not leave calves in any field for 8 days or more (prevents hoose), really only leave them there 2-4 days.
- If an aftergrass, (keep them rotated on it as long as you can), they don't need any dose for 5-6 weeks, if they got a dose before starting on it.
- However, the last of the ivomectin doses is due around now (13 weeks after let out).
- Recently bulled, small incalf heifers should be given prime quality grass by rotating in front of main cattle bunch.
- Adds a little work to your day but it will be worth it.
- Copper deficient farms may need to give a bolus at this time.
- Talk to your Vet or Adviser.

The objective of this competition is to recognise and acknowledge the extra effort being made by many farmers in Co. Waterford to enhance the environment in which they live and work.

The competition this year is being sponsored jointly by Hibernian Insurance and Cement Roadstone. The prize for the winning family is a cheque for £500 plus a Waterford Glass Trophy.

All farmers in Co. Waterford are eligible to enter. Application forms are available from your local Teagasc Office or through any ICMSA Committee member. The closing date is Friday July 23rd 1999.

NEW FARM GRANT SCHEMES

Two grant schemes are now in operation for small and medium size dairy farms. Grant aid for improvement of dairy hygiene standards of 40% in less favoured areas and 35% in other areas is available to a maximum grant of £7000 per farm. Grants are for upgrading or building of dairy and milking facilities.

Under the Control of Farmyard Pollution Scheme the same grant rates are available up to a grant ceiling of £10,000 for the construction of waste storage, silage storage, animal housing and associated farmyard pollution control facilities.

To be eligible for grant aid a Nutrient Management Plan must be prepared.

Sean Quinn and Seamie O' Neill are a case in point. The legend and myself met the 2 Brackaville clubmen (serious football men) from east Tyrone in Cashel on Saturday. "We wouldn't be hurling men", Seamie told us "but we've seen the games on television and wanted to

experience a Munster Final in Thurles".

Grudgingly in awe - but in awe the Ulster men certainly are of the small ball game. As we parted ways we directed them towards 'Mecca' and the shrine of Semple where we assured them they would find the 'experience'.

Perhaps the inevitable downside to television exposure is a drift towards an intercounty culture to the detriment of the core and most important unit in the game - the club. It need not be so however, and it is incumbent on all county boards to ensure that the club championship and the club unit where ticket allocation is concerned, is accorded its rightful place of primacy within our association.

Had our county team remained in contention, admittedly a predicament we would embrace with relish, it is conceivable that we would begin our club cham-

pionship in October.

How can you plan or prepare your club team for Championship hurling with such uncertainty coupled with the seasonal haemorrhage of players on holiday or travelling abroad to work for the summer. It affects all clubs but particularly smaller clubs who are working off limited panels. To begin with, Tallow for example will now field without 5 or 6 players who would have been available had the club championship gone ahead on the original date. The system as it operated this year was also grossly unfair to the subs on the Waterford panel who because they were not allowed to play even league matches with their clubs have spent the past few months in limbo - with no competitive hurling.

Getting back to our own game against Erin's Own on Sunday week our senior Bannaisteoir Johnny Geary informs me that the team has played in excess of 20

LISMORE — THE NEW MILLENNIUM

A few weeks back we wrote here that Lismore was once a thriving university town. This was shortly before the local elections when Cllr. McDonnell had moved a motion at a County Council meeting for Lismore to have a university.

Well we did some small research since and also at the commencement of the 8th century Lismore had a university of national and

European fame and was attended by students from all over Europe and was in the zenith of its fame at that time. St. Carthage founded a monastery and school in 631 and the school became a celebrated seat of learning and also head of the diocese. The establishment in the 8th century was flourishing and there were no less than twenty churches in its immediate vicinity. But as we learned from our history books in school, the Danes arrived in 812 and the town was plundered. This more or less destroyed the education facilities.

A very interesting item of interest we came across in Lismore was that in 1831 there were a total of 366 houses. One wonders was there a housing shortage at that time? The above is just a very short history which we intend returning to in the next few weeks as we know there are many very interested in such history of the town.

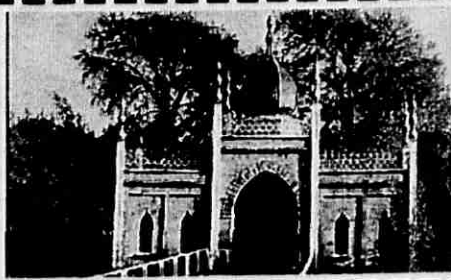

The apathy of their performance was as apparent as it was unexpected and it is beyond the writer's recollections to pinpoint a previous occasion when they failed so ignominiously in such an important engagement."
Tourin Too Strong
The primary hurlers emulated the feats of the footballers when reaching the Western Final in which, however, they suffered a heavy defeat at the hands of Tourin. Little progress was made in 1963 in the development of the club ground, although on the financial front, good work had been

clocked in.

The result sheet (full list of all games played by the club during the year) was first produced for the 1963 Annual General Meeting. Stop 21 Of The Town Trail
Walton Causeway Park And Moresby Buoy

On the left as we come over the bridge is Walton Park named after Professor E.T.S. Walton who was born in Abbeyside and was awarded the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1951. Here, one can relax and enjoy the view of the harbour. In the green area at the end of the Causeway is an unusual looking object and this is known as the Moresby Buoy which was restored and placed there as a memorial to commemorate the ship 'Moresby' wrecked in the harbour in 1895. This buoy was used to mark the site of the wreck which was a danger to ships entering the harbour.
Turn right just beyond the buoy and this will bring you over to Shell Cottage and the Augustinian Abbey. This part of the town is known as Abbeyside (Dún na Mainistreach - Fort of the Monastery). The fort refers to McGrath's castle. Before the bridge was built, the river was fordable at low tide and there was also a ferry at Cúl an tSaifín opposite the castle.

His maternal grandmother was born in Dungarvan in 1881 and was named ELLEN. Her father's name was DENIS, and she had 5 brothers and 2 sisters. Their names in birth order were JOHN, MICHAEL, OWEN, DAN (nicknamed Buffalo), MARGARET, ELLEN (his grandmother), JAMES and KATE.

At some point the father Denis took his wife (name not known) and children to live in Merthyr Tydfil in Wales. When Ellen got married in 1905 to JOHN QUIRKE (from Ballinamursagh, near Tipperary), their marriage certificate shows that her father Denis was already deceased. Minister Launches Summer Visual Arts Programme In Ring Ghaeltacht

Minister of State at the Department of Arts, Heritage, the Gaeltachta and the Islands, EAMON O CUIV, TD, joined by officials from Udaras na Gaeltachta, officiated at the launch of Ealaion na Rinne - a programme of weekend courses in art, which are taking place throughout the summer in the Ring Gaeltacht. He was presented with an oil painting by Blawinn Clancy. Blawinn, a graduate of NCAD, is the eldest daughter of Joan and the late Tom Clancy internationally renowned as an actor and as an entertainer with his brothers, The Clancy Brothers.

The Ring Gaeltacht on Dungarvan Bay, is a place and state of mind. The locals call it "Draiocht na Rinne", the magic spell of Ring.

Famed for its strong tradition of music and song, where the performing and creative arts are an intrinsic element in the community, it is now becoming a place where art flourishes and artists thrive.

The weekend courses of Ealaion na Rinne are being given by West Waterford born Ed O'Connor. A consummate artist whose work hangs in collections around the world, he has recently retired from teaching art in Toronto, to devote his energies full time to painting and comes from a talented family: his brother Pat is an award winning film maker, his sister Anne sang with the Bards, and his sister Rena is a respected songwriter.

Speaking at the launch of Cumann Ealaion na Rinne, Ed O'Connor said "I am delighted to work here in Ring because the history and culture are in my mind when I paint the landscape.

"Bernard Shaw claimed his education came from studying art in our National Gallery. And art contains much unintended information. Art History is full of passionate people everywhere who attempted in beautiful and sometimes revolutionary ways to apprehend the various environments in which they lived. I have enjoyed exploring these worlds and lives.

"I have painted in many landscapes, such as Tuscany, the South of France, Cornwall, Yorkshire and Lancashire. I have worked in Vermont, Quebec and Northern Ontario, and this year I drove 10,000 km to the US Southwest to paint in Arizona and New Mexico. I painted the landscapes

of Georgia O'Keeffe near Ibiq and Ghost Ranch. These places have long Native and Hispanic histories which can be seen and felt on the landscape, also.

"For many summers I have painted here in County Waterford, and recently in Connemara with my friend Walter Verling.

"I wish to thank the community for the help they have given in facilitating me

set up these weekend courses. I intend to do my best to ensure their success. Finally, I make no claims for my own work. The pursuit for me, is an end in itself and I do know something about art and its processes, which is what brings me here to the Ring Gaeltacht. Go raibh maith agaibh."

The weekend courses, which are grant-aided by Udaras na Gaeltachta, will

continue to take place July 10/11, 17/18; August 7/8, 14/15 in Meanscoil San Nioclás by invitation of Coiste na dTuismitheoiri, and run from 10 am to 1 pm with a break for lunch, and from 2 pm to 4 pm in the afternoon. The fee of £60 includes a packed lunch and morning and afternoon snacks. There are several B&B's and self-catering apartments in the locality.

Answers Sought On Ardmore Scheme

The community in the Ardmore area have crucial questions that remain unanswered in relation to how or when a promised sewerage scheme will proceed.

That's the view of Cllr. Fiachra O'Ceilleachair who says Waterford County Council will have a responsibility to provide answers. The Department of Environment, in an announcement prior to the recent local elections, said £1.02 million was now available in approval of the plans to effect a modern treatment system. Cllr. O'Ceilleachair says, however, that there is speculation as to whether this contribution will be sufficient and as to whether the Council can commit necessary resources to begin the project sooner rather than later.

"The case for an overhaul of Ardmore's sewerage scheme is, and has been, clear. Between 1991 and 1996 the census showed the population of Ardmore village increasing by 15%. Presuming at least a similar growth between 1996 and

2001, it means the population will have gone up by a third inside ten years. Add the massive annual increase in Ardmore's population and infrastructural demand during summer months and it's clear that a sewerage scheme tailored for the Ardmore of forty years ago has to be replaced urgently. The Council must spell out the envisaged timeframe in delivering this essential infrastructural investment, not only to cater for the present but to make it more possible for worthy development which might be in mind for the area. I am also calling on the Council to engage in a consultation process with local residents as there is some apprehension about what is involved in having a treatment plant located in a part of their area. The Council can work together with locals to keep everyone informed on how an essential environmental improvement can proceed in an unobtrusive manner. Recently a planned business project for Ardmore was the subject of

a public meeting called by the developer concerned. There's no reason why the local authority cannot follow suit and involve people in planning their locality."

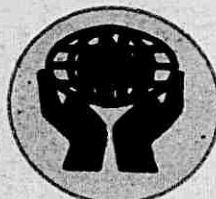

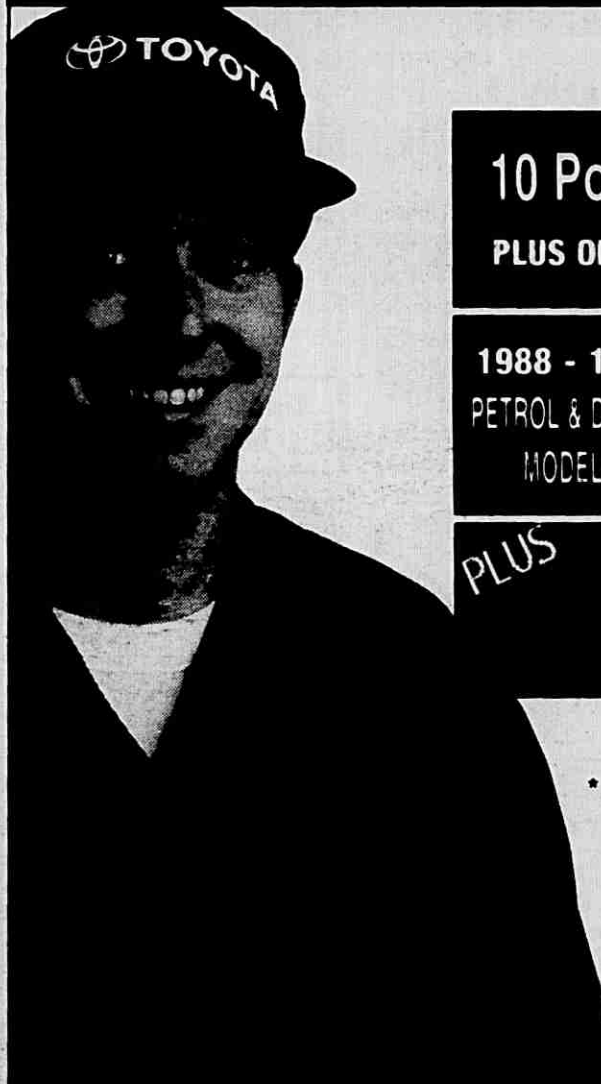

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RIGHTS****QUESTION**I am dissatisfied with the quality of alterations
made to my wedding dress by a local dressmaker. As
a result of her work, I will be unable to wear the
dress and I will have to purchase another. I asked her
to compensate me for the financial loss but she re-
fused. Could you give me some information about the
small claims procedure because I would like to take
this issue further?**ANSWER**The small claims procedure is for dealing with
claims under £1,000 (up from £600 to £1,000 from
July 1, 1999) within the District Court structure. It is
designed to handle customer claims speedily, cheaply
and informally without the need for solicitors.You can use small claims procedure for bad
works/service, faulty goods or goods bought on credit
for example, or indeed for most everyday transactions
for goods and services.To make a claim you need to complete a special ap-
plication form which can be obtained from the Small
Claims Registrar at your local District Court Office
where you can get assistance in completing the form.
The completed form with the fee (£6) should be
lodged with the Small Claims Registrar. A copy of the
form is sent to the person against whom you are
making the claim by the Registrar who also keeps a
copy.If within 15 days of receiving your application the
other party does not reply to it, your claim will be au-
tomatically treated as undisputed and the District
Court will make an Order in your favour for the
amount claimed to be paid within a short specific pe-
riod of time. But if your claim is disputed the Regis-
trar will contact you and let you have a copy of the
reasons why the other party is disputing your claim.If you win your case, the other party will be allowed
about four weeks to pay the amount to the Court. But
both parties to the case have the right to appeal an
Order or the District Court to the Circuit Court
where the judge in question may decide on the sub-

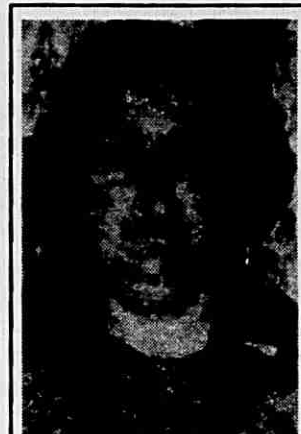

New Home Support Service For Alzheimer Patients

The Waterford Branch of the Alzheimer Society of Ireland in association with FAS will shortly commence A Home Support Service to provide relief for Carers of Alzheimer patients in Waterford, Dungarvan and Clonmel. This new service will train Care Workers to go into the homes of Alzheimers patients and look after the patient for a number of hours thereby allowing the Carer a much needed break.

There are 33,000 Alzheimer patients in Ireland and most of them are looked after at home by a spouse or other family member. Carers place themselves under great emotional, physical and psychological pressure and often get no break for months on end. In order to ease this burden and therefore allow the Carers to continue to care for their patients, The Alzheimer Society of Ireland, Waterford Branch is about to train eleven Care Workers in Alzheimer Care.

The training each Care Worker will receive will include on Alzheimer's Disease through all its stages, managing with dementia and communication. But it will also include training on various therapies which have proved to be very effective in stimulating Alzheimer patient including Reminiscence, Music and Sonas techniques. Fintan Walsh, Acting Chairperson of The Alzheimer Society of Ireland, Waterford Branch said today; "This is a very exciting development and we are delighted to have the support of FAS on the implementation of this project which is very badly needed in all parts of Ireland. This new service will greatly enhance the quality of life of Carers of Alzheimer patients in the Waterford, Dungarvan and Clonmel Region. It will give them a few hours a week free from catering, so they they can do some of the normal everyday things that most of us are lucky enough to take for granted".

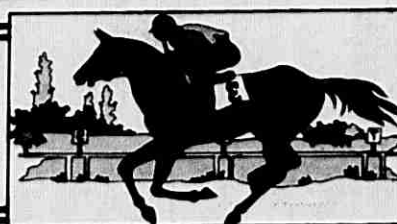

FAIRY KING DEAD

Fairy King the sire of this year's Epsom Derby winner Oath was recently put down after developing laminitis in his right fore foot. When trained by Vincent O'Brien Fairy King made his only appearance as a three year old in a listed race at the now defunct Phoenix Park where he trailed in at the rear of the field. It was as a sire that Fairy King made his name producing top class thoroughbreds throughout the world. Fairy King stood at £50,000 guineas and he was a full brother to the great Sadlers Wells. While he had been in retirement shortly after the beginning of the 1998 covering season he accounted for over 700 race winners which accumulated £17.7 million in prize money.

TRIP TO DICKS SECOND

Trainer David Kiely is certainly keeping his nine year old mare on the move of late and why not as she loves the current firm going. Shooting up in the weights however, 2/1 chance Trip to Dicks was forced to carry eleven stone seven pounds in the Low Low Handicap Chase over three miles at Cork last Tuesday but despite producing her usual game effort she was forced to settle for the runner-up spot behind the Tom Taffe trained Dazzling Guest, a seven year old son of Naheez and Northern Gift. The winner was in receipt of nine pounds from Trip To Dicks and should the pair meet again at Galway there should be very little to choose between the pair especially if Dazzling Guest is forced to carry a penalty for his Cork Victory.

Leading Point to Point pilot John Thomas McNamara took the ride on the John Morrisson owned and trained Crimson Flower in a twenty six runner bumper and the Tallow entry ran quite well finishing in fourth spot about eight lengths in arrears of the 7/2 winner, Very Tempting ridden by Miss E. Doyle. John Morrisson will surely find a winning opportunity for Crimson Flower before the end of the summer.

SUNSHINE STREET

After running quite well to finish in fourth spot in the hardwicke stakes at Royal Ascot Co. Meath trainer Noel Meade is plotting an ambitious course for his stable star Sunshine Street over the coming month. Entered in all the major races in this country Sunshine Street could well take in the King George at Ascot which is certainly a tough race to win while he also has the option of going for the Geoffrey Freer stakes at Newbury.

UNFORTUNATE INCIDENT

There was an unfortunate incident at Southwell racecourse last week as Amber Music trained by Bill Turner reared up in the stalls prior to the Docklands Selling Stakes before breaking her neck when she hit the steel bar at the top of the stalls. As a result of this death a number of English owners and trainers have called on the British Jockey Club to introduce the type of stalls used on the vast majority of the Irish country tracks. These type of stalls originated in New Zealand and basically they are free from the ironwork on top. Jockey Club Public Relations Officer, John Maxse has reacted cautiously to the request for the

Irish type starting stalls, pointing out that the open topped stalls are only used on the smaller and minor Irish courses and added that the Curragh have just ordered some new stalls and the design they chose is similar to the recently developed race tech stalls currently in use at Wolverhampton.

NEW AWARD

The Irish National Hunt Steeplechase committee is to present an annual award for outstanding achievement in National Hunt racing. The award is to be known as the Shane Broderick Perpetual Trophy in tribute to the jockey whose promising career was cut short by injury. The award was presented for the first time at the National Hunt awards dinner held in Adare, Co. Limerick last Saturday.

TAX FREE FARCE

While off course punters are now able to avail of the reduced betting tax of 5%, on course punters must wait until later on this month to avail of tax free betting. This decision is clearly very disappointing and provoked an angry reaction from punters and on course bookmakers alike. As one disgruntled punter said to me over the weekend, "When the Government wish to increase the excise and duties on drink and petrol they can do it overnight but when it comes to reducing taxes they take up to six months to implement same". Hopefully the tax free betting will be up and running for the Galway Racing Festival in late July.

KEN IS BACK

Good to see Lismore jockey Ken Whelan back in action. Returning after a lay-off due to a serious back injury, Ken rode over hurdles at Roscommon and it shouldn't be too long before the popular rider is back in the winners enclosure.

BARGAIN BUY

Expensive purchases do not always guarantee success and this point was clearly illustrated at Leopardstown last Saturday afternoon. Costing one million dollars Brahms, representing the all conquering Aidan O'Brien stable was sent off the red hot 1/4 favourite to capture the two year old maiden but after striking the front close home the Mick Kinane ridden favourite was outbattled by 14/1 chance Miss Bidder, a daughter of Shalford and Hench Woman. Miss Bidder was ridden by D. P. McDonagh and after the contest winning trainer Edward Lynam revealed that Miss Bidder cost only 500 guineas as a yearling compared to the one million dollars splashed out by John Magnier for Brahms.

TIPPERARY

Tipperary's mixed card next Thursday boasts a jackpot carryover of £2,113 with the first race underway at 6 p.m.

JOSH WAITES

Amateur Josh Byrne, who is attached to the Grangecon Stable of Francie Flood, will now wait until after the Galway Festival before moving on to the professional ranks. He originally planned to turn pro immediately after Galway but he intends to wait until he joins the English yard of Paul Webber some time in the middle of August.

PAUL SIDELINED

Those owners and trainers wishing to avail of the services of jockey Paul Carberry for the upcoming

Galway Racing Festival will have to look elsewhere. Paul, who damaged his spleen in a schooling accident last April, has decided to take some extra-time off and will not return to the saddle until next September.

WEXFORD

The action turns to the south coast at Wexford on Friday night and Saturday afternoon. Friday night's programmes start at 6 p.m. while 2.30 p.m. is the start time on Saturday afternoon. There are flat and jump races on both programmes. Any owners, trainers and punters approaching the races from the Waterford side can expect traffic delays due to road works on the N25 between Ballinaboola and Carrigbyrne. These road works will continue until the end of September this year.

CURRAGH OAKS

The £200,000 Kildangan Stud Irish Oaks is the centre-piece of the Curragh's programme on Sunday afternoon next. There is a strong overseas entry for this Group 1 event but hopefully the John Oxx representative can produce a class display to keep the first prize at home.

KEVIN'S DERBY

North of England jockey, Kevin Darley is in a tremendous winning run at the moment and he maintained his current impressive strike rate in Hamburg, Germany on Sunday last where he partnered 14/1 chance Belenus to victory over the Ray Cochrane ridden Acambaro in the German Derby which was run in record time. Jockey Michael Hills was dislodged from Tamitas during this classic but was reported to be unhurt after his unexpected tumble.

MR. MULLIGAN

Trainer Noel Chance suffered a major setback last week when he lost his chaser Mr. Mulligan, a previous winner of the Tote Gold Cup.

STRAVINSKY TO SCORE

Stravinsky appears as Irish trainer Aidan O'Brien's best opportunity for a winner in Newmarket this week. This colt runs in the July Cup on Thursday.

FRANKIE'S APPEAL

Frankie Dettori, the leading flat jockey, was only partially successful in his appeal against a twelve day ban imposed by the Curragh stewards on the Budweiser Irish Derby Weekend. His five day ban for improper riding was reduced to three days but the seven day ban imposed for wearing a defective back protector was upheld.

Frankie was reported by Walter Halley, the Turf Club's Medical Officer for removing the tailpiece of the back protector to avoid aggravating a piles condition. Incidentally the aforementioned Walter Halley is originally from Waterford. Frankie Dettori was represented at the Turf Club Hearing by solicitor Andrew Coonan who is himself a well known amateur jockey in this country.

DARRYL'S BACK

After enduring his fair share of suspensions this year, jockey Darryl Holland bounced back in tremendous style last Saturday at Sandown Park taking the featured Choral Eclipse stakes aboard the 20/1 outsider Compton Admiral (Suave Dancer - Sumoto) for Irish born rookie trainer Ger Butler. Frankie Dettori, on the well exposed Xaar, tried to steal a march on his seven rivals but despite dropping the reigns, jockey Holland was alert to the move coming with a well timed challenge to triumph by a neck. The winner would surely have won easier but for his jockey apparently mistaking the winning post and easing up his mount in the last twenty yards.

REMEMBERING OTHER DAYS

Piece taken from the local paper dated June 30, 1978, it read as follows -

Tony Ryan's Long Standing Record

The longest standing record on the Munster Track and Field lists belongs to Dungarvan athlete, Tony Ryan now a teacher in his hometown.

Tony, back in 1971 clocked 9 mins., 15.7 secs. for the 3000m and although Munster records have a habit of falling like ninepins with every championship fixture, Tony's record still stands. KILROSSANTY WOMAN'S RARE FEAT

'Climb every (highest) mountain' may well be the theme tune of Waterford woman, Phyllis Flynn over last weekend as she attempted to run the four highest peaks in these islands in just 48 hours.

Fifty teams consisting of

three competitors and one driver make up the Vauxhall Four Peaks Challenge and they set off at 4 p.m. on Thursday, July 1 to climb Ben Nevis in Scotland, at 4406 feet the highest mountain in the UK or Ireland. They then drove to Scarfell Pike in the Lake District to tackle that summit of 3205 feet at 6 a.m. on Friday morning. Next in line is Mount Snowdon in Wales (3560 feet) which they scaled on that same afternoon before sailing to Dublin, driving to Killarney and setting off at 7 a.m. on Saturday on the final 3415 foot of the journey to the summit of Carrantuohill and back.

Thirty-seven year old Phyllis, a native of Kilrossanty near Kilmacthomas where her parents Michael and Hannah Prendergast and other family members still reside, is among the leading road runners in the South of England. Along with her husband, Declan, she is a regular competitor in Irish races when home on holiday. She went to England 19 years ago to train as a nurse and is now a Community

Mental Health Manager in Epsom. In preparing for the Four Peaks, she recently won the Dorking 10 mile road race and also finished second in the South Downs Way, a cross country race of 30km (18.6 miles).

Each team is required to raise a minimum of £3,000 and the challenge is in aid of the Wooden Spoon Society which helps families of patients struck down with cancer and also supports projects that benefit disadvantaged and sick children.

Founded at a rugby weekend in Dublin back in 1983 when, after suffering defeat by Ireland, a group of English fans were presented with a wooden spoon they decided in an effort to get over their loss to form a charity to help children. Now boasting 6000 members, they have raised over £3 million in the ensuing period.

"I've done a lot of running including the Dublin Marathon but never anything like this before", says Phyllis. "The charity is such a good cause as well. We are grateful to all our sponsors and they include McDonalds in Roscrea who are

opened specially in the early hours of Saturday morning to provide all the teams with doughnuts and hot drinks".

And as we go to press this morning we learn that Phyllis' team, the Vauxhall Stragglers had a superb performance to finish in the top six out of fifty teams and they completed the run in under 48 hours which was a remarkable achievement after meeting snow on Ben Nevis, rain on Carrantuohill and sun on Scarfell Pike. Well done, Phyllis from all at West Waterford A.C.

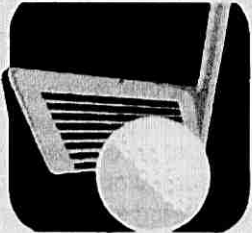

The race itself produced a very worthy winner in the Arthur McLaughlin owned and Paul Hennessy trained Mr. Bozz (Cry Dalcash - Terry's Whisper), this half brother to Mr. Pickwick, destroying a top class field in an excellent time of 28.57. The youngest runner in the race, the July '97 whelp, took the initiative right from the start powering his way into a clear lead over Tiger's Eye. 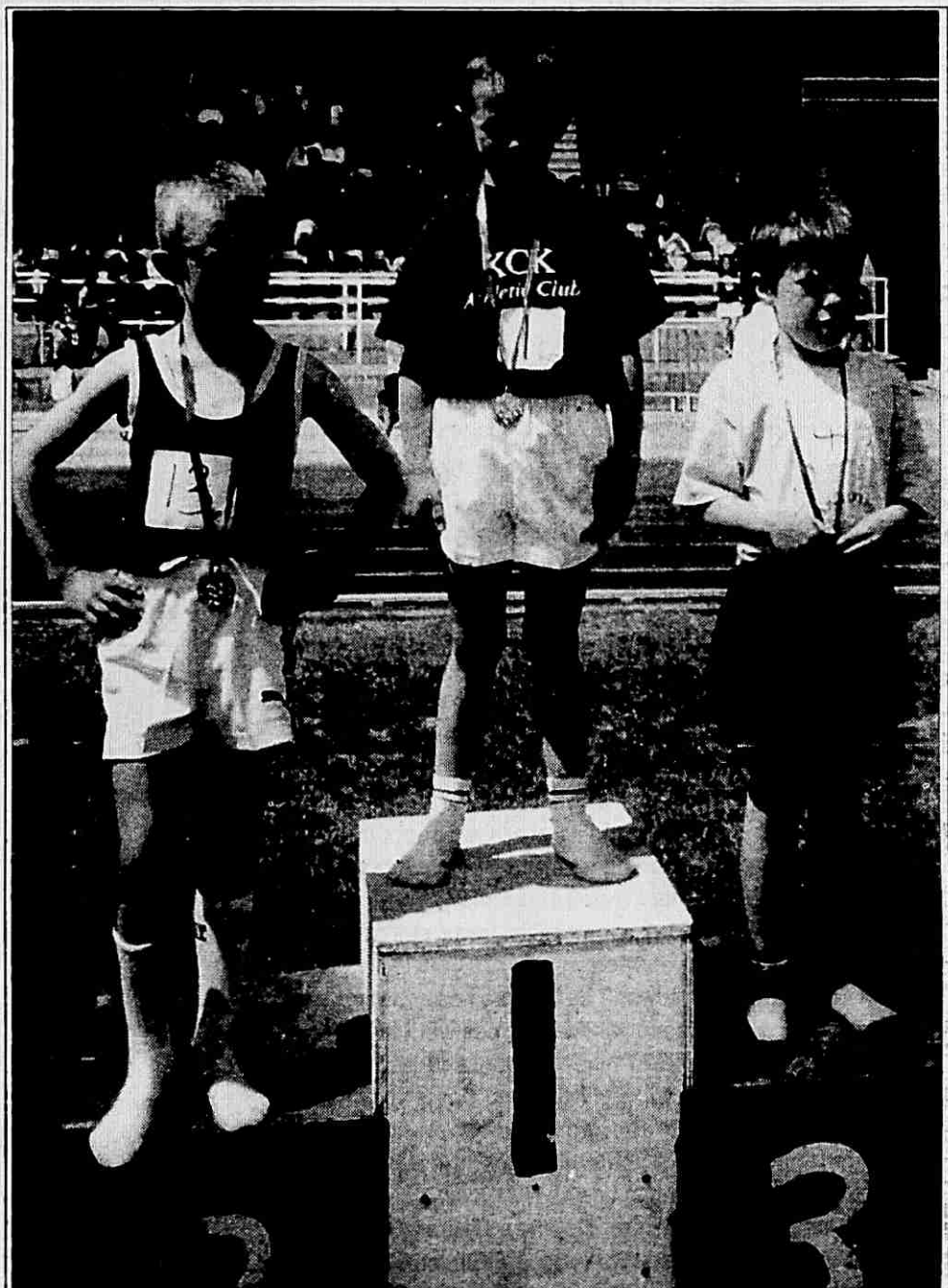

Under 21 Hurlers Prepare

No stone is being left unturned in an effort to field a team good enough to beat Tipperary when they visit Walsh Park on tomorrow, Thursday evening week, for semi-final meeting with Waterford in under 21 hurling Munster championship. But from inside the home camp the news is certainly not good in that a number of key players are almost certainly out.

Injuries picked up in training and including challenge matches have taken their toll. Also a few very eligible and badly needed players are away and not available to the selectors.

David Ryan, Colligan, who played very well against Cork in the championship last year, is currently in the U.S.A. Another

loss is the absence of James Murray, who had trained with the panel and played in challenge games against Kilkenny, Limerick and Offaly. He has gone to the U.S.A. and has played with Los Angeles. He is ruled out.

Nickey Jacobs, thought to be a good prospect is also ruled out. The St. Saviours man sustained a fractured finger in a challenge against Limerick recently. Regular defender Gary Cullinane (Ballygunner) is very doubtful also, as a result of an injury picked up in a challenge game against Kilkenny last week. This challenge was played in atrocious weather conditions in Walsh Park and was won by Waterford on a score of 1-10 to 0-6.

This will be our eleventh meeting with Tipperary since the under 21 hurling championship was inaugurated in 1964. Only once have we beaten them and that was at Walsh Park in 1994. In a thrilling game of hurling we beat them by 2-16 to 2-8 before we went on to win our third Munster final in the grade. Interestingly, Waterford defeated Clare in all three provincial finals which we won. We subsequently lost to Kilkenny in the All Ireland semi-final in Thurles.

Tipperary hammered Kerry in the first round, but one could hardly rely on that form in assessing our chances.

Three years ago when we met Tipperary in minor hurling they beat us by 2-19 to 1-11 before they went on to defeat Galway

by 0-20 to 3-11 in the All Ireland final. Most of that Tipperary team including Eugene O'Neill Sean Ryan, Donncha Fahy, Fergal Heaney, Willie Hickey Paul Kelly, Michael Kennedy Declan Browne (only a sub. in the 1996 team) and Willie Maher, etc. etc. Having managed to keep so many of their minors together for three years must be a big boost for the Premier county.

The Waterford team will not be named before the weekend and it is expected to include Brendan Landers, Ken McGrath, Paul Hammond, Andrew Kirwan, Seamus Prendergast, Victor O'Shea, Stephen Curley, etc.

The official line-out will be published in next weeks issue.

Ballinacourty Take Div. 2 Ryan Super League Title

WESTERN BOARD MEETING

Paddy Walsh, Chairman, presided at last week's meeting of the Western Board which was held at Lawlors Hotel. When the minutes of the previous meeting were adopted unanimously, the Runai, Anthony Walsh notified delegates that there were three slight adjustments to the comprehensive fixtures programme which had been circulated to clubs. He also stated that the fixtures committee had done everything possible to accommodate every club who had looked for free weekends, etc.

The chairman stated that after first rounds have been played and subsequent fixtures are made, no postponement applications will be entertained as we now have deadlines to meet.

In giving an update on the leagues, the secretary said that he was disappointed that some clubs had withdrawn and in one section, four out of eight had pulled out. He said that clubs had shown little interest in the proposed minor leagues.

Michael Lyons, Dungarvan, complained about the postponement of their under 21 hurling game versus Shamrocks which had been fixed for Easter Monday. The secretary apologised for an oversight relating to the notification.

STAND TICKETS

James Tobin expressed his clubs anger at not having been given an allocation of Stand tickets for the Munster hurling final. He said they had been allocated 20 terrace tickets and they could not understand why no Stand tickets were allocated to clubs. Several other delegates were also critical of the distribution for last Sunday.

The chairman explained that the Western Board had no member on the select committee who decide on the allocation and therefore had no control over what clubs got. He pointed out that sponsors and board officers had to be accommodated and when our county was not involved, we got a very reduced allocation from the Munster Council.

A number of clubs stated that they intended raising the matter again at the county board meeting on Monday July 12th.

REFEREEING

A proposed two-way communication experiment involving two referees was submitted by the county Referees Committee and was discussed. What was envisaged was to have a regular referee in the Stand and in constant communication with the trainee referee while a game was in progress.

Several delegates including Jack Cullinane, James Tobin, Bernard Shields, Sean Sheehan, etc. said they were a little unsure about what was being proposed and would like to hear of the proposal in greater detail. The chairman said the committee would be asked to oblige.

YELLOW & RED CARDS

On the invitation of the board officers, Eddie Cunningham accompanied by John M. Kelly attended to give delegates a further briefing on the disciplinary measures related to the use of the colour cards during matches.

Acting as spokesman Eddie Cunningham explained that all cautionable fouls i.e. Pulling down an opponent, Tripping, Rough Play, are punished in the following way. First offence a Yellow Card. Second offence a second Yellow Card followed by a Red Card. The player is then ordered off for the remainder of the game only. If he repeats the same offence within 48 weeks he will be suspended for 2 weeks.

Persistent Personable (non cautionable) Fouls — i.e. Pushing, Holding, Jersey, Pulling, Illegal Charging

First offence. Players name taken (ticking, Second offence, Yellow Card. 3rd. offence, Yellow followed by Red card and player sent off for duration of game. Penalty same as above.

For a combination of per-

sonal and cautionable fouls the rule is that if the player is shown a Yellow card for a cautionable foul and subsequently commits a personable foul, his number is noted only (ticked). Only after another personal foul is he shown a Yellow card followed by a Red card. He is then sent off for the duration of the game.

Immediate Ordering Off Fouls — When a player strikes an opponent with his fist, or kicks, strikes with the hurley or behaves in a dangerous way, he is immediately shown a Red card and dismissed. He is then suspended for a period of one to three months, depending on the actual offence.

Following the talk, there followed a brief question and answer session.

The Board Chairman appealed to every club to familiarise their players with these rules as outlined here in good time before the start of the championship. Eddie Cunningham proposed that the document outlining the changes and circulated here, be posted in all club dressing rooms.

SYMPATHY

Votes of sympathy were passed with members who had been bereaved since the previous meeting. The chairman announced that in future sympathy notices must be submitted in writing before the start of the meeting.

WLR FM Live Broadcasts

WLR have announced that they will do live broadcasts of the Munster junior football final involving Waterford and Clare from Thurles on tomorrow evening and also on next Wednesday from Walsh Park when we take on Tipperary in under 21 hurling. A tremendous facility for supporters who will be unable to travel.
