Manager Rules Out Incinerator Plant

BY AISLING CONROY

The threat of an incinerator plant has been unambiguously ruled out by the County Manager after he publicly gave his assurances this week that the draft county development plan does not provide for an incinerator plant to be located in any part of the county.

Manager Donal Connolly told members at their meeting on Monday that any proposal for waste management facilities would have to go through full public procurement procedures and would be subject to the normal environmental impact assessments, planning approvals etc.

On the strength of these assurances members for-

mally adopted the draft development plan on Monday with the exception of councillors Ger Barron and Tom Cunningham who were against the plan and five members who abstained from voting - Cllrs. Tom Higgins, Fiachra O Ceilleachair, Paudie Coffey, John Carey and Betty Twomey.

Just under two years ago, the Council engaged the services of CAAS to work with the Council's planning staff in carrying out a major review of the County Development Plan which expires later this year. Extensive consultation took place at local level with various community groups, statutory bodies and elected members etc.

Council In Process Of Acquiring Land In Tallow

There was hopeful news this week for those currently waiting on the housing list in West Waterford when it was revealed that the County Council is currently in negotiations with a landowner in Tallow with regard to the acquisition of land for housing in the area. That's according to County Manager Donal Connolly who was replying to a query raised last Monday

by Cllr. Willie McDonnell.

Cllr. McDonnell said the number of people currently on the Council's housing list in Tallow is close to thirty and he asked officials what plans were in place to tackle the situation.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question: I am getting Domiciliary Care Allowance and am wondering would I be eligible for the new respite care grant of £200?

Answer: To be eligible for the new respite care grant of £200 you must be in receipt of Carers Allowance in June 1999. People in receipt of Domiciliary Care Allowance will not be eligible for Carers Allowance until August, 1999.

The grant was automatically paid to those in receipt of Carers Allowance in June. It was also paid to carers of those in receipt of Prescribed Relatives Allowance and Constant Attendance Allowance.

The Carers Allowance is a means-tested payment with a £150 income disregard applied to a couple's joint income. A £75 weekly income disregard will be applied to a single person's income from August, 1999.

Furthermore carers social insurance records are to be protected with the award of credited PRSI contributions to eligible carers getting the Carers Allowance or caring for those getting Constant Attendance Allowance or Prescribed Relative Allowance. Credited contributions will also apply to carers of children getting Domiciliary Care Allowance if they are eligible for Carers Allowance from August, 1999.

Eligible carers are those who have been in employment or signing for credits within the previous two years. Those who have never worked or who have been out of the workforce and not signing for a social welfare payment in the past two years will not be eligible for credited contributions. However if you are not due 'credits' you may be entitled to have 'Homemakers Years' taking into account for Old Age (Contributory) Pension.





The SE regional waste management strategy recommended a 'central integrated waste management facility' comprising thermal

treatment (incineration) among others. It also identified the preferred location for such a central waste management facility as an area comprising parts of South Kilkenny, East Waterford and West Wexford.

This reference to the SE waste strategy in the Waterford draft plan led many to believe that an incineration plant could be located in the county at a future stage.

Cllr. Tom Higgins said he would object to the inclusion of a thermal plant provision in the plan. A thermal



past, Deputy Deasy said it never ceases to amaze him how indifferent people are to the preservation of wildlife, in particular of endangered species, and of wildlife habitats.

"Hedgerows in particular are as important a part of our heritage as listed buildings. We have so much wildlife that we have a very careless and indifferent attitude to it", he stated.

The Waterford Deputy claimed that a number of wildlife species have been lost to the country and that in time to come we will deeply regret the loss. Hedgerows, he stressed, are the most obvious habitats for wildlife species and they are currently hedgerows

"I drive from Waterford to Dublin and back each week and see hedgerows being cut in May and June. Hedgerows are the habitats for birds which are nesting and breeding. For years I have been campaigning and I thought I was quite successful in getting local authorities to desist from cutting hedgerows during the nesting season", added Deputy Deasy.

NEW WILDLIFE BILL In reply, the Minister for Arts, Heritage, Gaeltacht

Having raised the issue on Valera said that in the absence of native woodlands, hedgerows form important features in maintaining wildlife diversity, particularly for birds. The commonest nesting birds found in hedgerows, such as wrens, bunnocks, robins and willow warblers depend entirely on insects during the summer months. In general, untrimmed, thorned hedgerows containing species such as blackthorn, whitethorn and holly are favoured by birds as they serve as a protection against predators.

Minister De Valera said the Wildlife Act from 1976 provides protection against the cutting, grubbing and burning of hedgerows on uncultivated land during the nesting season from 15th April to 31st August. In the forthcoming Wildlife Bill however, these restrictions will apply from 1st April and will remove any doubt that the destruction of vegetation growing in hedges or ditches during this period is prohibited. Only public bodies such as local authorities will be allowed to cut hedges during this period for reasons of public health or safety.

Dúchas, the heritage service, has already written to all local authorities requesting that works to hedgerows be undertaken outside that crucial nesting period.





The Gardener's Guide To Tulips



VARIETY ACT — There are more than 100 species of tulip

TULIPS – famous for their huge blooms and wide variety of colours – have been bred into many different varieties, making it very confusing for the average gardener to work out what to do with them.

There are, at present, more than 100 species of tulip available on the market.

In the wild, they are usually found in hot, dry situations from sea level to alpine areas, growing mainly in Europe, Asia and the Middle East.

Modern tulips are hybrids, and breeders are constantly adding new varieties. Because of their vast numbers, the hybrids are classified in various divisions characterised by flower type and flowering period.

Each division contains numerous named varieties, often in wide range of colours. The chart below lists commonly used divisions and the characteristics of each.

Bulbs should always be planted so that their tops are covered by the specified depth of soil. In clay soil, aim for the shallow end of the range. In sandy soil, aim for the deeper end of the range.

If you are unsure about which category the soil falls in, cover the bulbs with the shallowest depth of soil.

FEED PLANTS IN GROWTH

You should feed all plants that are making rapid growth as you were doing in May and June.

REMOVE GRASS BOX FROM LAWN MOWER

During July and August, when the weather is hot, it is a good idea to remove the grass box from the lawn mower and let the tiny clippings fall on to the lawn. They will act as a mulch and protect roots from scorching.

SUMMER-PRUNE WISTERIAS

Wisterias that have filled their allotted space can be induced to flower freely year after year without making a lot of new growth by summer and winter pruning. Now is the time for the first of these operations. Shorten all side growths formed on the main branches to six leaves each.

SUMMER-PRUNE ROSES

Bush and standard roses of the large flowered type need a light summer pruning now the first flush of flowers is over. Cut stems that have flowered back to about two leaves. Then give the beds a dusting of any good compound flower-garden fertiliser and hoe this in.

PRICK OFF AND POT PRIMULAS

Greenhouse primulas sown in mid-June will need pricking off. Return them to the frame or greenhouse after potting and shade from strong, direct sunshine.



The Science of Farming and Food

RESEEDING

Mentally Prepare For Reseeding:

- ★ We recommend you reseed 10% of your farm this August.
- ★ It will not happen unless you plan in July.
- ★ The July plan for reseeding involves:-
- * Identifying the fields for reseeding.
- ★ Planning to cut silage or round bales off them, as this clears off rubbish (rotting grass etc.) before tilling.
- ★ Spray these fields 5 7 days before cutting with Roundup or Gallup.
- ★ They can be tilled with a rotovator, rotospike or direct drilled within 1-2 days of cutting. These methods require only 1-2 passes but ploughing remains the method of choice.
- ★ Because the grazing area will be reduced by 10% you could be short of grass:
- ★ To compensate apply 5-10 units per acre more after each
- * Be particularly generous on fields cut for silage.
- ★ Decide on your varieties of grass so that you will have them when you need them, but make sure to take independent advice on this.
- ★ As clover makes a big contribution to the performance and quality of grassland we must make sure it establishes when we sow it.
- ★It needs to be sown in August.
- ★It needs to be sown one eight inches or less in depth. (Not too deep).

SHEEP: Early Lamb:

Easter Sunday 2000 falls on April 23rd – three weeks later than this year.

There is demand for new season lamb from mid March onwards with prices falling off from early May. Easter is still a very strong market period for local markets.

Over the past three years, average price for early lambs has been about £55/head. Do your sums on this basis. What system is best suited to you? – indoor early weaning or outdoor? Contact Teagasc regarding your options.

Aim for a lambing date around January 10th – which means a mid August mating date.

Rams:-

Very often the forgotten animals. To get compact lambing and high pregnancy rates, rams should be prepared 10 weeks before turning out with ewes. Take them in now, examine mouth, feet, testes, brisket and penis area. Give 8 in 1 vaccine and a worm dose. Start a little meal feeding at least 6 weeks before turnout. Make sure the meal contains some soyabean meal.

Treatment of wounds etc. with antibiotics can be done now. However, make sure that the antibiotic products do not contain cortisone as such products can cause infertility for 8 weeks.

CATTLE:

Parasites:-

- ★ Bucket reared calves and autumn born sucklers: If on strategic dosing programme (suppression system) continue the full programme.
- ★ If not already treated, dose now and move to clean aftergrass.
- ★ Dose spring born suckled calves when moving to new grazing. Dose, again in September.
- * Watch for hoose, especially during warm wet weather.

Weanlings for Sale:-

★ Keep weanlings thriving at over 1 kg per day.

- Creep grazing (allowing calves access to good grass ahead of cows) improves growth rate and makes weaning less stressful.
- Where grass is good and cows have enough milk, calves will achieve target weight gain without meal. With moderate grass and/or low milk producing cows, calves will require creep meal feeding from about 4 months of age.

price in recent years. Dairygold is likely to be a market leader when the 1998 Audit is published. It is too soon to judge what the overall price for 1999 paid by Dairygold will be. Farmers are extremely disappointed at recent price reductions but there is no doubt that returns from the market place have reduced by 6p per gallon.

There is only one pot of money in Dairygold and it must be shared equitably between those who depend on Dairygold for an income. Employees cannot expect ever increasing wages and salaries while at the same time farmers income continues to fall dramatically. Farmers are only getting what remains when everyone else is satisfied. This is not acceptable into the future.

Dairygold Board and Management must draw up a plan immediately to cut costs including a redundancy package to control labour costs. This is needed to give farmers the necessary confidence to continue producing milk by helping milk price.

If the Dairygold processing plants do not get milk, there will be even less jobs. It is a time for more realistic expectations about future prospects.

ICMSA Meet Minister For The Environment And Local Government On Rural Roads

Development Committee, speaking after a meeting with the Minister for the Environment and Local Government, Noel Dempsey said that ICMSA expressed deep concern regarding the restrictive planning conditions on rural housing in many counties. In particular Mr. Harvey said that he was deeply concerned that in many counties rural people are unable to provide building sites for their children because of the restrictive planning laws being operated.

Such restrictions, Mr. Harvey said, have many consequences for rural Ireland both social and economic. Rural Development seems to be a key objective of Government but yet restrictions are being placed on people building houses in rural areas.

Mr. Harvey said ICMSA told the Minister that ICMSA were not advocating a free-for-all policy but a reasonable policy which does not discriminate against the building of houses in country areas.

As a consequence of the meeting with the Minister, Mr. Harvey said ICMSA would be contacting County Councils with a view to ensuring that the planning conditions in place are reasonable and do not discriminate against country areas. A person, Mr. Harvey said, should be allowed to provide building sites for his/her children and also sell sites provided such sites are approved under reasonable planning laws. All County Councils should immediately re-examine their planning strategy, Mr. Harvey said, to ensure that it does not discriminate against rural areas.

Regarding derelict houses in rural areas, Mr. Harvey said that ICMSA proposed the introduction of an incentive scheme to encourage the restoration of these houses. In parts of rural Ireland there are many derelict houses left abandoned which could be restored. The Government should be encouraging people to live in these areas and a key issue, Mr. Harvey concluded, is the provision of grant to restore these derelict houses.

For some years he had not enjoyed the best of health with a sight problem.

Job Loss Fears At Job losses are believed to **Tallow Plant** be imminent at a cigar manufacturing plant in Tallow.

Management at Cadena (Ireland) Ltd. in Tallow met with senior SIPTU representatives at the weekend and spelled out the serious difficulties that have developed as a result of the loss of one major order.

Management's proposal is to close down the night shift which involves almost 30 employees. However, while redundancies are said to be unavoidable, the union is hopeful that at least some of the night shift

workers can be redeployed. Last April, a mystery illness outbreak at the Tallow factory affected up to fifty employees. Skin rash was the most prominent visible feature of the illness, but workers also suffered sevomiting

headaches.

Management installed a new, ultra modern, air conditioning system within the plant while the affected workers received medical attention which included the taking of blood and urine samples.

The assistance of the Health and Safety Authority was also called upon, but the exact cause of the illness has never been positively identified. For the past several weeks there has been a resumption of full production at the plant.

High Number of Jaundice Cases in Dungarvan Since 11th May there have been a number of cases of

Hepatitis A (Jaundice) in the Dungarvan area reported to the South Eastern Health Board. This is a higher figure than average and the SEHB is giving advice on how to reduce the chance of becoming infected this summer. During the height of summer the warm weather allows the Hepatitis A virus to multiply more easily and spread more quickly. Hepatitis A is an infectious disease that is spread easily through person to person contact due to infected faeces or urine. In children and adults the symptoms include a flu-like illness, gastrointestinal upset and jaundice which usually lasts for one to two weeks.

Dr. Maire O' Connor, Public Health Specialist, says "As the infection can be spread easily it is essential that people wash hands thoroughly before eating and drinking and after using the toilet. Small children should be supervised when washing their hands. In affected households towels should not be shared as infection can be passed on. As a number of people can have mild symptoms, yet be infective to others it is important to focus attentions on prevention and in particular on thorough washing of hands. If people have any doubts or fears about symptoms they should contact their family doctor. If Hepatitis A is diagnosed early and treated promptly, people usually make a complete and speedy recovery".

Know Your Rights -Message To Summer Job Teenagers

With the growing economy creating more opportunities for school-going teenagers to take up summer jobs, the National Youth Council of Ireland has said that young people at work should be aware of laws to protect them. There has been a huge increase in the number of Summer jobs available and while they can be very enjoyable experiences, offering young people the chance to earn extra money, the NYCI works to ensure that young people are

The main law relating to the employment of young people is 'The Protection of Young Persons (Employment) Act 1996. It covers all those working in full or part time jobs who are under 18 years of age. It ensures that young people do not have to work late hours and allows them to take breaks from work at regular intervals.

Responsibility for enforcing this Act rests with the Department of Enterprise, Trade and Employment. Young people can make enquiries about the law and complaints about its enforcement to the Department at (01) 6614444.

Some of the Rights and Obligations under the Act are as follows;

16 and 17 year old workers

- Are entitled to a 30 minutes rest break after working for four and a half hours.
- Can not be asked to work after 11 p.m.
- Should have 2 days off every 7 days.
- Can not be asked to work more than 40 hours per

Young workers Under 16 Years Old

- Are entitled to a 30 minutes rest break after working for four hours.
- Can not be asked to work after 8 p.m.
- Have 2 days off every 7 days.
- Can not be asked to wok more than 35 hours a week. All Employers Of People Under 18
- Should display a poster detailing the rights of young people in the workplace.
- Must keep a register containing the following particulars of each person employed; full name, date of birth, time work begins and finishes each day, wage rates and the total amount of wage paid to each person.



Ring And Old Parish Voters To Expect Another Election Before End Of 1999

Elections for a Waterford representative to Udarás na Gaeltachta, the state's social and industrial development authority for Gaeltacht areas, are now expected in November.

Welcoming last week's publication of the Bill to give effect to the necessary legislative reform to bring this about, Cllr. Fiachra O'Ceilleachair said it was important that the Bill be treated with priority upon the Dáil reconvening in the Autumn. Cllr. O'Ceilleachair is anxious that the electorate of 660 in Ring and 390 in Old Parish be given their first opportunity in the 20 year history of the Udarás to have a local representative sitting at the decision making table. Cllr. O'Ceilleachair has, however, in response to plans to reform Gaeltacht boundaries warned that any 'tinkering' with the present constitution of the Waterford Gaeltacht will not be tolerated.

"Minister de Valera may have well laid plans to exclude some of the suburbs of Galway City from Gaeltacht status, from a money saving point of view as much as any cultural reasons. I'd be anxious that the criteria used there not be applied in other parts of the country. An exclusion of a substantial group of townlands in Old Parish in the 1956 Act, put right subsequently in 1974, should have learned us lessons about the damage which can be done to a community by splitting small local entities. I will be vigilantly ensuring that no such policy is revisited on the Waterford Gaeltacht region and that all of Ring and Old Parish will continue to benefit from the assistance of Udarás and Roinn na Gaeltachta. Keeping the communities of Ring and Old Parish together as a Gaeltacht is essential for the prospects of language develop-



Irish punters bet more on horses last year than ever before. Minister of State, Noel Davern was a guest at the National Hunt Awards in Co. Limerick last week and he went on to say that 1998 had been another excellent year for Irish horse racing with total betting up by more than 10%, attendances of over one million, up by almost 5% and sponsorship prize money showing significant increases of up to 15.3% and 10.5% respectively. More than £57m has been invested by the Government in the last six years.

ENTRY FEES DECREASE

The Irish Horse Racing Authority has announced that owners entry fees on all races closing under the six day entry system are to be reduced to 1%. Based on current statistics this reduction will reduce owners costs by almost £400,000 in a full year.







Vintage Black just loves this circuit however and railing tightly she came through to lead at the third bend. To her credit the early pacemaker Regal Betty kept on well only to taste defeat by two lengths in 30.41, a healthy return over this five fifty yard distance.

Hopes Are Good, a full sister to the aforementioned Cill Dubh Amber was the best backed 7/4 to 1/1 to capture the opening event but she was distracted by possibly a flash from a camera on the run up and virtually took no part in this contest.

Meanwhile the Alan Walsh owned and John O'Mahoney trained

Tom's Loss (Shanless Slippy - Sycamore Lucy) 4/1 bounced away smartly from trap 6 to run out a comfortable four and a quarter lengths winner over Carrow Mary in a career best effort of 29.63.



Waterford Junior Footballers Take Munster Title In Exciting Final

Those who were present in Semple stadium on Thursday evening last felt that they were witnesses to a bit of history in the making when watching our junior footballers bridge a gap of half a century by defeating Clare in a tremendously exciting Munster junior football decider.

CLARE



The junior football championship has never been a high profile competition and rarely does it produce top class football, but for a title starved county like ours, this was a big occasion and the twelve hundred, or so supporters who travelled in support got good reason to celebrate when the final whistle ended that put us into the record books for the second time this centu-

Clare had gone into the game as hot favourites following their recent win over Kerry and also because their side included such players as Dermot Coughlan, Colm Clancy, James Hanrahan and a few others who had helped Clare defeat the mighty Kerry in the senior Munster final in 1992.

The result, unexpected as it was, brought Water-

ford level on results.

They have now met on no fewer than 18 occasions since this championship was inaugurated in 1910 and now they each have 8 wins and 2 draws to their credit.

The standard here could hardly be described as top class, but no one could fault the game as a contest. They were level on three occasions and at no stage was there more than two points between them.

Over the hour, and particularly in the early stages, Clare had most of the play, but failed to capitalise on possession and on their shooting for points they had 13 wides in the game while we had only 3. At the same time we certainly created more goal scoring chances and missed three opportunities which should have been goals. Our sup-

port outnumbered that of Clare by about six to one and I felt that the great vocal support had a motivating effect on the players. After the final one player stated openly that the supporters gave them great

Waterford have now qualified to play Roscommon on next Saturday week (July 24th) in the All Ireland semi-final at a venue to be named (probably Portlaoise). On the same evening, Meath will play Warwickshire in the other semi-final. The All Ireland will be played two weeks

The game started five minutes late due to an amount of some unnecessary messing around.

Clare were first to attack, they were also second and third to attack, but this

yielded nothing as the ball was kicked wide each time they attempted to score. In the 5th minute Connie Power hit the upright and we missed our first score. When Waterford were awarded a free in the 11th minute, P.P. Ferncombe shot straight between the posts for the first of his six points. Two minutes later P.P. was once again on target to put us two points ahead of the favourites who by now were beginning to realise that this Waterford team were going to be a difficult bunch to han-

In the 15th minute Clare were awarded a free and corner forward Ronan Slattery opened their account. They were playing with a stiff breeze.


