New Enterprise Centre For Ardmore

Ardmore Enterprise Co-op released details this weekend of its proposal to build an Enterprise Centre in Ardmore. This is great news for local employment in the area. The proposal is to form a new local community company, which will build an enterprise centre on County Council land, recently acquired adjacent to Ardmore N.S.

The Enterprise Co-op is circulating a document this week to all homes in the parish informing them of the details of the proposal. They are also seeking the encouragement and financial support of the community for this very worthwhile community project.

It is proposed to build a 10,000 square feet enterprise centre, which will be used to attract new industry to the parish and encourage new local entrepreneurs to set up business there. The project is being undertaken in two phases, Phase 1 and 2, each consisting of a building unit of 5000

square feet. Should the tender prices be competitively low and the community response to the funding request be high, then the Phases 1 and 2 will be constructed simultaneously. Waterford Co. Council have agreed to sell one acre of their site adjacent to Ardmore N.S., to Ardmore

Enterprise Co-op, for the purposes of constructing the enterprise centre. Ardmore Enterprise Co-op have retained Flynn & Associates Architects, to advise on the design and cost estimates for this project.

The cost of acquiring the land and constructing phase 1 is estimated to cost £217,000. The overall project cost if phases 1 and 2 proceed together, is estimated to be £310,000.

Sporting Legend Laid To Rest

Willie Barron, Keating Street, Dungarvan was laid to rest last weekend. Willie was one of Dungarvan and Waterford's great sporting personalities winning Senior Hurling and Football titles for Dungarvan. Before his death he was current President of Dungarvan G.A.A. Club. He played numerous times for Waterford and was on the county team which won Waterford its first Senior Hurling Munster Final and also he played in the All-Ireland Final in which they were defeated by Dublin in 1938.



Willie enjoyed a wide range of sports and in latter years he became a keen golfer and served as first President for the Gold Coast Golf Club.

In his eighties Willie was a sporting legend in his own lifetime. A talented hurler and footballer who served his club and county with distinction, he will be sadly missed by his family and wide circle of friends who mourn the passing of an outstanding Gael. See reports on pages 21 and 54.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am the father of a three month old baby. My partner and I were not married and are no longer in a relationship. Could you tell me what I should do to ensure guardianship rights in respect of my child?

Answer

Where both parents are in agreement about the father becoming a joint guardian then both parents can complete a statutory declaration to this effect in the presence of a Peace Commissioner, Commissioner for Oaths or Notary Public. The Statutory Instrument S.I. No. 5 of 1998 which is required for this procedure is available from Government Publications or the National Information Centre of Treoir.

Where the parents are not in agreement with the father becoming a joint guardian then the father can apply to the District Court to become a joint guardian with the mother of his child, whether or not his name is entered in the Register of Births.

Information on guardianship and related issues is available in two recently published booklets: 'One Parent Families Information Guide' and 'Information Pack for Unmarried Parents', (Treoir). Long Term Unemployment Still A Major Issue In Co. Waterford

Figures prove that long term unemployment is still a major problem in Waterford city and county and needs urgent political action.

That's according to Labour Cllr. Fiachra O Ceil-leachair who says the fact that over 6,700 people are on the live register throughout the county, the majority of them being long term unemployed, is something that should be considered before assuming that there's a continuing good performance by the Irish economy.

"There was a time when

our Governments were being condemned for over-seeing a situation whereby over 100,000 people were on the live register. The fact that an administration might be slowly bringing the numbers back to that figure from the 300,000 mark is not cause for celebration."

"Interest rates are down, inflation is down, borrowing is down. We are told by certain economists that all of these were key factors in the battle against unemployment. All the targets have been met, but unemploy-

ment and poverty remain at a high level. It is time to challenge the economic orthodoxy which says everything is fine if figures on a balance sheet look well irrespective of the social cost of unemployment and poverty.

A new departure in economic policy to transform the benefits of an improved fiscal performance into a major drive for jobs, improved access to skills acquisition and the establishment of a minimum wage is what's needed. The facts are that while people and places in this county might be benefiting from the economic boom, there are also people and places who are simply plugged out from that economic boom."

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. — WHAT IS LOAN PROTECTION INSURANCE?

A. — Loan Protection is insurance the Credit Union takes out on its borrowing members. Like Life Savings Insurance the Credit Union pays the premium, so there is no direct cost to the individual member. Every member, who takes out a loan is eligible for cover, provided they: —

- (1) Have not reached their 80th birthday.
- (2) Have signed a Promissory Note
- (3) Are actively at work (or able to carry out the normal duties of their occupation)
- (4) If not working, are in good health

Other members may be eligible providing satisfactory evidence of good health is submitted.

Like Life Savings Insurance, benefit is payable on the death of the member. If the member is eligible for cover, the outstanding loan balance is cleared in full.

In the case of joint accounts, cover attaches to the member who signs the Promissory Note first.

Improvements To Roadway At Kilgobinet

Following representations made to him during the local elections regarding the condition of the roadway from the ball alley to the church at Kilgobinet, Seamus O Domhnaill pursued the matter with Waterford Co. Council under the Local Improvements Scheme. He is glad to report that Waterford Co. Council are prepared to carry out improvements to the road to the extent of £7,500.

Another issue that arose during the local elections was the lack of public lighting in the Moinfionn area of the Sean Phobal. Again he is pleased to announce that the Co. Council are prepared to rectify this problem in the near future.

A very pressing problem at the minute is the condition of part of the roadway leading to Glencorran Strand. Seamus has approached the Co. Council about this and impressed upon them the urgency of carrying out remedial work immediately.

County Enterprise Board and Enterprise, Ireland (formerly IDA). This is probably the last opportunity for the community to avail of the enhanced EU grants, as Co. Waterford will no longer be in an EU Objective 1 region, after 1999. A loan facility has been secured from Credd, a social funding agency set up by religious communities in Ireland. The local community funding being sought for phase 1 is £60,000 and for both phases £140,000. Already, significant loan commitments within the community have been secured prior to the public announcement.

Ardmore Enterprise Co-op is a local voluntary community enterprise group. It was set up in March 1989, with the objectives of improving the economic and social life of the parish. It has been motivated by a vision and desire to initiate improvement projects, which add value to what is a very attractive place in which to live, work and visit.

Why Were Schools Started? | Junior Section | Who Were The First Barbers

From the time of civilisation, human beings have always taught what they knew to their children. If they did not do this, the children wouldn't have known what plants they could eat or what animals were dangerous.

Hundreds of years later, people learned how to write and so wrote down what they knew. In this way, more knowledge could be accumulated and this was passed down from generation to generation.

Once the system of writing started, the first schools began. The first schools we learned about were in Mesopotamia and Egypt, three to four thousand years ago.

So schools were started to educate children and to prepare them for living in the outside world. But in ancient times, society was set up in such a way that it was felt that all children did

not need to be educated. Using Egypt as an example, young men who were going to study for the priesthood or to be a doctor, etc., got educated to a very high level. Only a very small minority of men received this level of education.

The Hebrews, another ancient people, had a very long tradition of education. While they were an independent nation, the father of the family taught his sons everything they needed to know about their history, laws and religion. Later, when the Hebrews were taken over by outsiders, they were afraid that their customs and beliefs would be lost. They set up schools where their children, rich or poor, were educated in their language religion and history. This was probably the first time ever recorded in history that rich and poor children were educated alike.

There have been barbers since olden times - so long ago, we cannot remember or know who the first ones were. The first records of them go back to ancient Egypt. A while later in Greece, the barber's shop was a place where men went to talk about the business of the day.

We all know what the barber's pole looks like. The red-and-white stripes have something to do with what barbers did in ancient times. In those days doctors were different to what they are now. They didn't want anything to do with surgery. It was the barber who did this: treatment of wounds, teeth extraction and bleeding people.

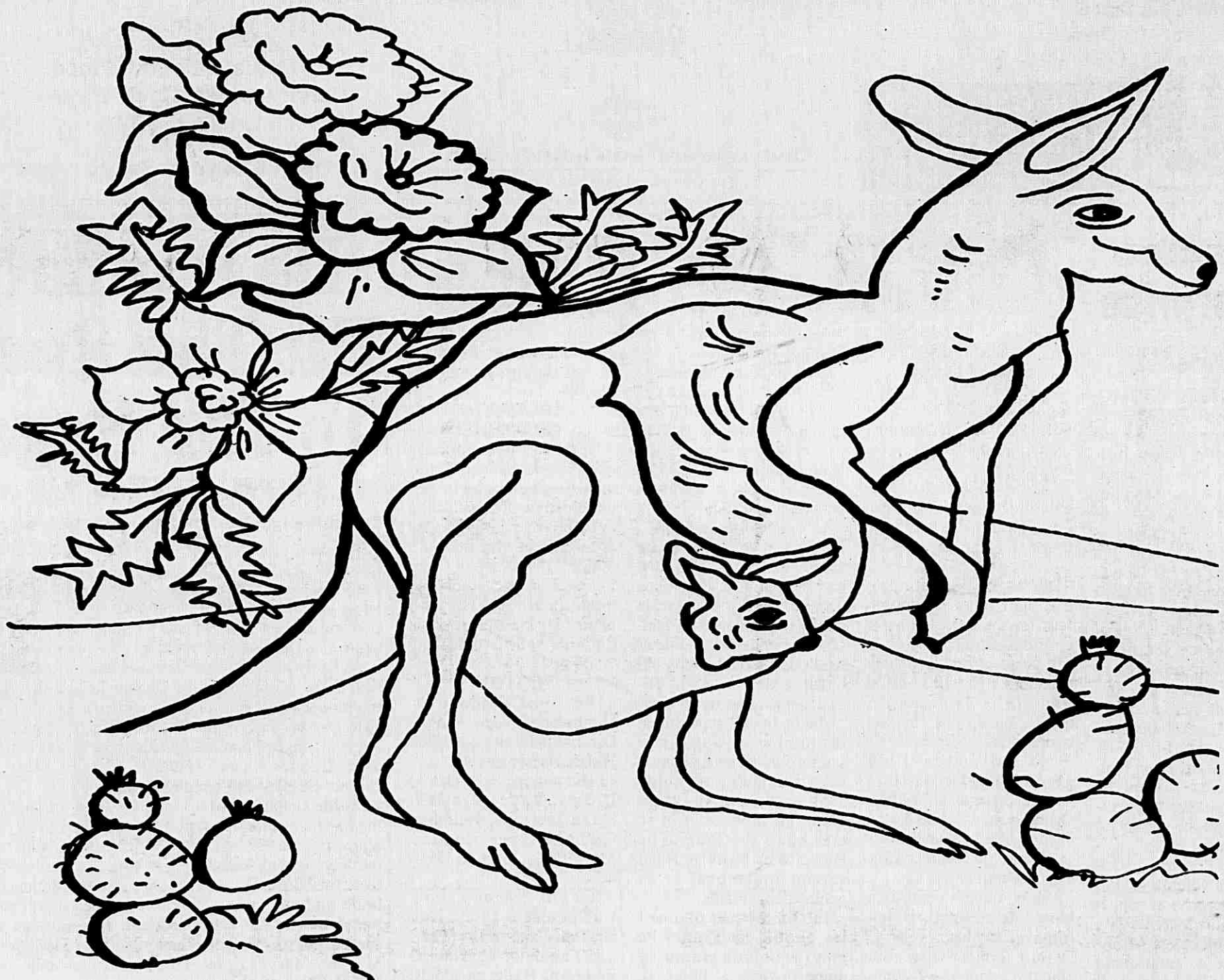
The barber's pole goes back to those days - red for blood and white for bandages.

As far back as 1462, barbers were chartered as a guild. In the year 1540, the guild was merged with the guild of surgeons. By this time though, the king of England had forbidden barbers who shaved people and cut hair to perform surgery.

Over the next two hundred years, the work of the barber was separated more and more from surgeons. In time the only work they were allowed to do was give haircuts and shave.

The word "barber" descends from a Latin word "barba," which means "beard." To them the work of trimming beards may have been more important than cutting hair.

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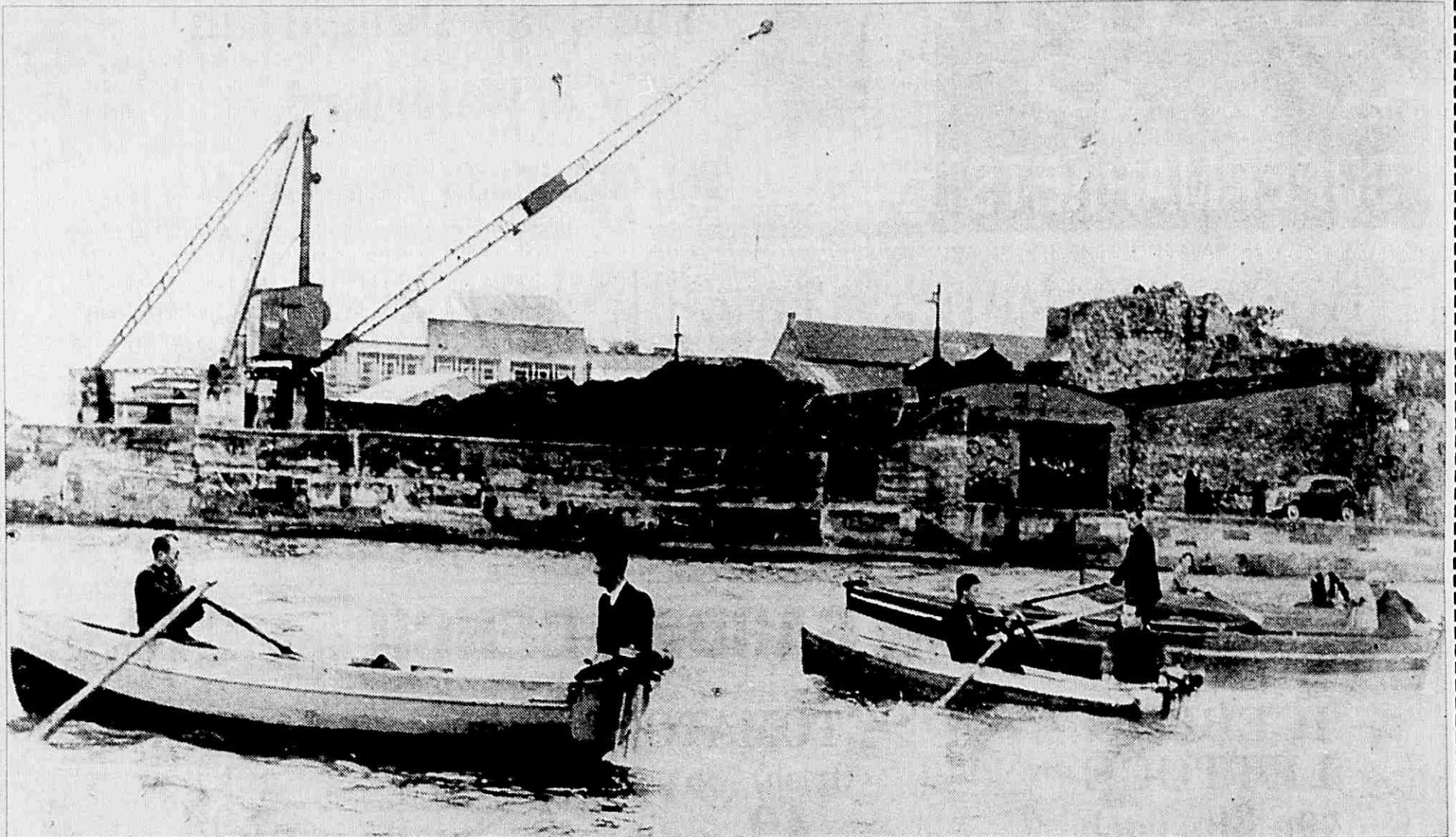

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REMEMBERING OTHER DAYS



The Abbesside Pattern is again featured in our "Remembering Other Days" series. This week we go back to the early 50's. The photograph shows a scene now long gone as the event, the boat race, is no longer a feature of the modern Pattern. The picture shows the four boats, powered by outboard motors, being steadied by the oarsmen as they wait for the start of the race at the entrance to the quay, just off the Pond in Abbesside. Identified in the boat nearest is John Elsted of Ballinacourty on the oars and Butch Kiely, working the outboard. Two boats in is Paddy Kenneally's boat, a familiar sight during the summer in those days, plying between the Cunnigar and The Look Out. Paddy himself is at the engine while Tom Kenneally is on the oars. The other boatmen have not been identified. In the background is Moloney's Coal Yard with crane, also a familiar landmark in those bygone days.

Modeligo 'Bids' To Help Kosovo

The generosity of the people of Co. Waterford towards the displaced and suffering people of Kosovo continues apace and in Deckie's Lounge in Modeligo last week a cheque for over £800 was handed over to Carole Wiley for her work against the suffering Kosovars. Carole Wiley is the leader of Carole Wiley Humanitarian Aid, an organisation which operates in several of the world's most troubled areas.

This substantial cheque represented the proceeds of an auction evening held in the popular West Waterford hostelry by the members of the Modeligo Pattern Committee and by any standards it was a most generous return from a small community.

Chairman of the Pattern Committee, Paddy O'Donnell said that the people of the parish and surrounding area had been anxious to respond to the misery which they had seen nightly on their televisions and that they had been pleased to follow the lead of their committee in this fundraising event.

"As a result of the generosity of those in attendance, the hospitality of Deckie Walsh and his family in making their premises available and the personality and hard work of WLR FM's Nichola Beresford," said Paddy, "we are tonight able to hand over a very respectable cheque to Carole to help relieve some of the suffering of the people of Kosovo."

He thanked the donors of prizes, their many other sponsors and all who had a hand in the successful evening. "It was a great community effort," he said, "and I am proud that the people of Modeligo and district have responded in such a way."

He then presented Carole Wiley with the cheque to the loud applause of those present, many of whom had been part of the fundraising effort.

In reply, Carole Wiley said that she was extremely

thankful and very appreciative of 'this magnificent contribution' though not in the least surprised by the ongoing generosity of all sections of the Irish people.

"We have an enviable record in this country in relation to humanitarian aid," she said, "and the people of Modeligo and district are continuing proof of this. Dungarvan and many of the communities of West Waterford have been very good to our organisation," she continued, "not only on behalf of the people affected by the Kosovo conflict but also during the Bosnian and Rwandan wars as well." She detailed some of the atrocities inflicted on the communities in which she worked which, she said, were little different between each of the conflicts. She said that war, misery and suffering were no respecters of boundaries, religions or races and expressed the wish that those responsible for the atrocities would, in time, be brought to justice. She pledged that the money would go straight towards the purchase of aid for the people most in need and that it would reach them at the very earliest moment.

Tom Keith said that the Modeligo initiative was another generous gesture in the midst of many generous donations. He said that the people of Modeligo, like many others, had come together as a community, as a result of which tangible help could be given to people in need. He thanked Carole Wiley for the lead she had given nationwide in this and other conflicts and that without her and others like her, it would be difficult for individuals to be able to make their own significant contribution.

Fisheries Minister Must Give Fair Play to Small Fishermen

Marine Minister Michael Woods should avail of an opportunity to redeem his poor reputation with small fishermen along the Co. Waterford coastline by extending the salmon fishing season into the month of August.

That's the view of Labour Councillor Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who says confidence has been eroded in the fishing industry by the inability of the smaller operators to survive. Cllr. O Ceilleachair says the salmon season, now restricted to a four day week over the months of June and July, is of critical importance to smaller fishermen in communities along the Waterford coastline. He says the Minister should take account of factors such as weather and compensate accordingly by extending the season for a limited period. "I am challenging Minister Woods to produce independent scientific evidence to prove that an extension of a number of fishing days would make any significant difference to fish stocks. Clearly, if fishing was meant to be done on a certain day — but couldn't proceed due to poor weather — it shouldn't make any material difference to allow it on an alternative compensatory day. It all fits in. All the Minister is being asked to do is allow a bit of fair play and give small and part-time fishermen an opportunity to maximise the limited chance they have to benefit from the salmon season. I sincerely hope that he responds positively to my request."

Honey Roast Duck

Serves 4

Time to prepare: 23 mins. plus 1 hour marinating.

Time to cook: 30 mins.

Marinade

1 tbsp (15ml) finely chopped fresh root ginger
3 garlic cloves, crushed
2 tbsp (30ml) yellow bean sauce
2 tbsp (30ml) light soya sauce
2 tbsp (30ml) dry sherry
4 star anise
4 boneless duck breasts
2 tbsp (30ml) runny honey
Sweet and sour sauce
3 tbsp (30ml) dry sherry
2 tbsp (30ml) light soy sauce
2 tbsp (30ml) tomato ketchup
4 fl. oz (100ml) orange juice

2 tsp (19ml) arrowroot mixed to a smooth paste with 1 tbsp (15ml) water
1 bunch spring onions
3 oz (125g) thread egg noodles.

Household Hints

1. If you are making onion rings, add a pinch of bicarbonate of soda to the mixture. The batter will puff up when deep fried.
2. When you are cleaning the insides of whole peppers, use a grapefruit knife. The curve of the knife makes an excellent job of it.
3. After wearing pastel coloured shoes, wipe with damp cotton wool or a cloth to remove dirt and stains. Rinse, dry and apply recommended polish.
4. If you have stock left over from the Sunday roast, freeze it in small pie containers to use as a gravy base for sausages or burgers.
5. If you are doing dirty chores around the house, cut a head and arms in a black sack. Your clothes will be protected and you can throw away the bag when you are finished.

Mix together the ginger, garlic, yellow bean sauce, soy sauce, sherry and star anise. Arrange the duck breasts in a shallow glass dish and pour over the marinade, making sure the mixture thoroughly coats the meat. Cover, chill and marinate for at least 1 hr.

Remove duck breasts from marinade and arrange skin side up, on a rack resting over a roasting

tin. This allows any fat to drip down into the tin during cooking to guarantee crispiness. Drizzle honey over meat. Roast at 400°F, 200°C, Gas 6 for 30 mins.

To make the sauce, simmer the vinegar and sugar together for 2 mins, then add sherry, soy sauce, tomato ketchup and orange juice. Stir and bring to the boil, then reduce to a simmer.

Add arrowroot paste and stir until thickened smooth and clear.

Shred the spring onions into very fine strips. Plunge into cold water until required. Put the noodles into a large pan of boiling, salted water and boil for 3 mins. Drain. Cut duck breasts into thin slices and serve on a bed of noodles with spring onions and sauce.

All-American Pancakes

Preparation: 15 minutes.

Cooking: up to 25 minutes.

Serves: 6.

Coulis:

225g/8 oz raspberries (thawed if frozen).
25g/1 oz icing sugar
1 tbsp lemon juice.

Pancakes:

225g/8 oz plain flour
1 tbsp baking powder
1 tbsp sugar
3 eggs, size 3
240ml/8 fl oz milk
50g/8 oz raspberries, fresh or frozen (unthawed) oil for frying
Ice-cream to serve.

METHOD

To make coulis, puree the raspberries in a food processor with the icing sugar and lemon juice. Alternatively, press the raspberries through a nylon sieve and stir in the sugar and juice.

Transfer to a serving bowl and chill until required. Sift the flour, baking powder and a pinch of salt into a large bowl. Stir in the sugar and make a well in the centre.

In a measuring jug, beat together the eggs, milk and half the butter. Gradually pour the milk mixture into the centre of the flour and, using a wooden spoon, beat well, drawing the flour in from the sides. The batter should be smooth.

Gently stir in the raspberries. Heat stir in the raspberries. Heat some of the remaining butter with a little oil in a large frying pan and spoon in enough batter to make 2 (7.5cm/3m) pancakes.

Cook for 3-4 minutes, turning over once, until golden on both sides. Place on greaseproof paper. Repeat to make 12 pancakes in total, adding extra butter and oil to the pan as required. Serve the pancakes warm or cold with scoops of ice-cream, drizzled with the raspberry coulis.

Tagliatelle with Broccoli and Tomatoes

Serves: 4.

1lb/450g broccoli, chopped
2 tbsp olive oil
2 large onions, sliced
2 cloves of garlic, crushed
½ tin chopped tomatoes
and 1 tbsp tomato purée or
½ cup sun-dried tomatoes
2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil and tbsp pine nuts or 2 to 3 tbsp pesto

sauce
14oz/410g tagliatelle.

METHOD

Boil, steam or microwave the broccoli until it is just tender. Drain and keep warm. Heat the oil in a pan, add the onions and garlic.

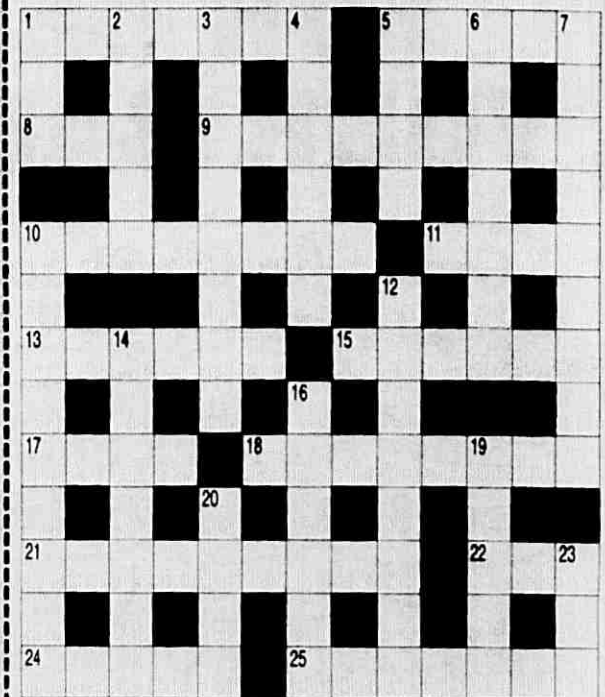
Cook, stirring until the onions are soft. Add the

tomatoes, basil and nuts or pesto and cook until heated through. Keep warm.

Meanwhile, add the tagliatelle to a large pan of boiling, lightly salted water or home-made stock, and boil, uncovered, until just tender. Drain and serve topped with the broccoli and the sauce. Serve at once.

This Week in the Garden

TOWN GARDENS: TIPS FOR THE WINTER

A LITTLE town garden can look grey and dull in the winter. To liven it up head down to your local garden centre. You will find a wide choice of colourful winter shrubs - in a sheltered garden, most will flourish.

Try making a feature of the autumn cherry - its masses of pale pink blossoms clothe its bare branches.

Recommended shrubs: Viburnum x bodnantense, Mahonia lomarifolia.

Recommended climbers: Jasminum nudiflorum, Lonicera fragrantissima.

Also, try heathers, cyclamen and snowflakes.

PLANT MADONNA LILIES

This is the ideal time to plant Liliun condidum, the Madonna lily. It differs from almost all other lilies in making quite a lot of new growth in late summer, and it should be planted before this starts. Another peculiarity is that the bulbs grow practically on the surface. You should plant them 20cm apart and only cover them with 5cm of soil. After a while they will probably work themselves out until they show; make no attempt to cover them again. This lily prefers a sunny position and reasonably good, but not freshly manured, ground.

LIFT DAFFODILS AND BULBOUS IRISES

Daffodils and narcissi, also the various bulbous irises, will now have completed their growth and may be lifted and cleaned off if they are overgrown or you need the ground for something else. Otherwise leave them undisturbed for another year. They do not gain anything by annual lifting and drying, as do tulips and hyacinths. If you do lift them, get them replanted as soon as possible and certainly before the end of September.

CUT BACK HELIANTHEMUMS

Sun roses tend to get rather straggly if left to their own devices, but if cut back a little each year at about this time they can be kept quite neat and tidy. You can do the work with a large pair of scissors or garden shears.

START TO FEED CHRYSANTHEMUMS

It is a mistake to begin to feed chrysanthemums of any type too early, but you can start now with safety. The more varied the feed the better. Give very small doses every five days or so mixed with plenty of water and used in place of the ordinary water. Liquid manure, made by steeping a small sack of cow, horse, or sheep droppings in a tub of water, can be varied with soot water and any good chemical fertiliser made for chrysanthemums and used as directed by the manufacturer.

SOW SPRING CABBAGE

Now is the time to make a first sowing of cabbages for use in spring and early summer. Do not sow all the seed. Keep some for a further sowing in the second week in August, as the later seedlings often do best in the long run.

LIFT AND STORE AUTUMN SOWN ONIONS

Autumn sown onions should have completed their growth and ripened their bulbs, so you may just as well lift them and have the ground free for some other crop such as winter greens. Lift carefully with a fork and lay out in a sunny place for a few days to dry off. Shake the soil off and store in shallow boxes in a cool dry place.

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The Kennedy Family's Dungarvan Connection



John F. Kennedy Jr.

The tragic death of John F. Kennedy Jr. his wife Carolyn and sister-in-law Lauren Bessette in a recent plane crash off the island of Martha's Vineyard, prompted the 'Leader' to look back to July 1967 when members of America's famous Kennedy clan visited Dungarvan.

A photo of young John Kennedy Jr. leaving Lawlor's Hotel was published in the 'Leader' on July 22nd, 1967. The photo was taken after the family had lunched at the hotel. The visiting group included JFK Jr.'s mother, the late Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, wife of US President John F. Kennedy who was assassinated in 1963, his sister Caroline and family friends. The group were on their way to visit Lismore Castle.

During their short holiday in Co. Waterford, the

Kennedy family stayed at Woodstown House. They also visited the Aghlish Gymkhana which was taking place at the time at the Lawn in Aghlish. J. F. was led around on a white pony but did not compete. His sister Caroline did take part in one of the competitions but without success. The organising committee had been asked to make everything as normal as possible for the Kennedy's, something which they succeeded in doing, according to a spokesman. Their visit was surrounded by the tight security of the Secret Service.

FR. MICHAEL KENNEDY CONSOLES BEREAVED

JFK Jr. and his wife were travelling to the wedding of his cousin Rory, youngest daughter of the late Senator Robert F. Kennedy last Friday when the tragedy occurred.

Some 275 guests had been

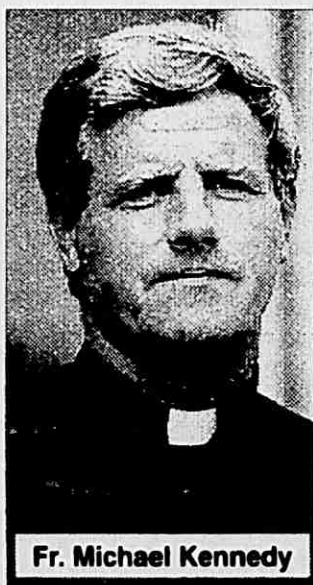
expected to attend the private wedding ceremony including family members from all over the world. Former Dungarvan curate, Fr. Michael Kennedy, a third cousin of the late President Kennedy, was one of the priests expected to perform the wedding ceremony at the Kennedy family's summer home in Massachusetts. He flew to the US two weeks ago to assist at the planned wedding and has since played a vital role in helping the Kennedy family grieve the loss of the three crash victims.

As news of the missing plane reached the guests last Saturday week, Fr. Kennedy said a special Mass of Hope on the porch of the house owned by Eunice Kennedy, Bobby's widow.

The popular Dungarvan curate was moved to Kill in the Kilmacthomas parish last month.

He conducted last Friday's funeral ceremony for JFK Jr., Carolyn and Lau-

ren Bessette on the deck of a US destroyer, not far from where they had plunged to their deaths. A group of about 15 family members, including Fr. Kennedy carried the cremated remains on board the ship. The ashes were later scattered off Martha's Vineyard in a private sea burial ceremony.

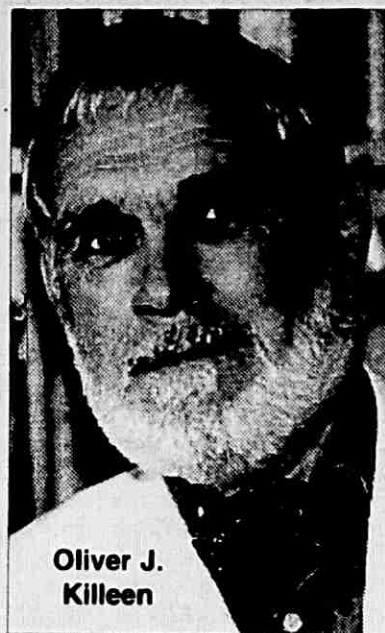
Sibling Love And Rivalry

When the late Princess Diana was a child her mother lost custody of her and her three siblings because of the powerful influence of their father. Because of this separation from her mother who was the prime love giver, Diana and her brother suffered great psychological trauma. Her brother would cry bitterly for his mother and Diana would listen to this abandonment protest sadly. This early separation from her mother was pivotal in her decision to play a major role in the emotional well being of her own children. The difficulties most parents experience in dealing with their children are due to the fact that they don't understand how a child's mind works. Many fail to recall their own childhood, perhaps because it was marked by too much pain and emotional hurt. But every family and every member in it is unique. I frequently compare the family to a symphony orchestra. There you have a collection of string, wind, bass and percussion musicians, each playing a distinct sound but in complete harmony with the orchestral score. The maestro directs the various rises and falls in the sound delivery and in the back stands a musician with a triangle waiting for the conductor's cue. This one ding is as essential to the symphony as the constant music of the other musicians. It is not only essential, it is unique. It celebrates the work. So also are the children in a family, all unique, all a celebration of the family. However many parents expect children to think, reason, feel and behave in ways they themselves consider rational from the viewpoint of adult logic.

When a child misbehaves some parents interpret this as the child being stubborn or spiteful. Every parent has discovered that there is no guarantee a child will always do as he is told. When parents opt for discipline they assume the child understands that he should be punished. However any effort to control a child's behaviour with a punishment has only limited success. In fact this approach often backfires and the child will defy the parents regardless of what stronger disciplinary measures they impose. Walt Disney talked to the child in all of us by getting in touch with our fantasies and imagination. He appealed to the mind of children by engaging their vivid imaginations. Jean Piaget discovered that intelligence followed a distinct developmental pattern and that children perceive and experience the world differently from adults. Children are preoccupied with satisfying their emotional needs and having a better understanding of what triggers a child's 'bad' behaviour allows parents the most efficient way of handling their child's behaviour which is

to win their co-operation. Parents often try to raise their children to fit in with their needs and social environment and this too fails because children are more concerned with their social instincts and perceptions. Children are inherently led by their fundamental basic need for love and nurturance and this drives them toward self centredness. The drive for love bonds the child with its prime love source and that instinctively identifies his closest competitor for love and threat to his security. The sharing of love is at the heart of sibling rivalry. All children are convinced that to be favoured by the prime love giver is paramount and to be disfavoured is equivalent to rejection. This pushes children towards securing a greater share of love and attention and making constant evaluations of his standing in the family. Feelings of rivalry influence children's perception of the world and this influences their behaviour.

Some parents are unable to interpret the emotional signals of their children and end up angry and annoyed at their children's bizarre behaviour. Problems are created on two fronts - the parents react in an appropriate punishing fashion and the children feel resentful and misunderstood. Freud called the child's self centredness egotism and identified this behaviour as narcissistic and indulgent. Piaget called it egocentrism and stated that the child sees himself at the centre of everything and that if he is emotionally nurtured - not pampered - the child will easily outgrow and abandon self centredness. However if a child is not emotionally nurtured, maturity will be retarded and delayed. This behaviour can often be expressed in forms such as "May I please have a chocolate bar?" to "I want a chocolate bar NOW" followed by a tantrum when the initial request is not acquiesced to immediately. If a child is unable to control self centred urges, he may develop secretive devious ways to satisfy his urges like stealing. Selfishness exists in all humans but parents by encouraging their children to share enable them to control their selfish urges. When children are not loved unconditionally they develop a 'pleaser' personality and so they are deeply motivated to gain love and attention by pleasing. This drive is so intended that even a negative reaction is often cherished. Through their behaviour, children manage to lure adults down a path that will lead to the trap of favour or disfavour. Parents whose children fight constantly are usually awed when they visit a house where children don't fight. However let me point out that this household calm does not mean there is no rivalry between the children. Fighting is an external mani-

festation of rivalry but there are many more covert rivalries such as intellectual competition or a dominance/submission pattern between siblings.

Sibling rivalry is a universal fact and nobody with children can escape it. From birth to death how we are favoured by the prime love giver is the key to our emotional highs and lows. Many parents who have problems with their children often ask me in counselling "Is there something we have missed?, Is there a part of our child's development we failed to understand?" Looking for answers to problems with their children parents often resort to blaming the black cupboard of heredity. So often parents compare their outgoing daughter to her Aunt Patricia or their rebellious son to his black sheep uncle. Many a parent has exclaimed, "My Tim was born with a terrible temper. He was cranky, cross and crabby from birth and he has never changed. He reminds me so much of my brother who was just the same as a kid and who is still irascible and a cranky old sod." But if parents get caught up in these fatalistic attitudes towards their children's behaviour they will become trapped and victimised by their own children. This heredity behaviour theory forces parents to accept whatever behaviour a child throws out and in fact because of these very hereditary beliefs, many parents themselves have difficulty in changing "after all my mother told me I was just a rotten kid and it is just the way I am." So it's important to put aside these beliefs and take a serious look at parental favouritism and how it drives children towards behaving in a certain way. The Kennedy family included nine siblings. Even without an indepth analysis of each child, it's possible to decipher a pattern of favour and disfavour among children. In this family Joseph Kennedy was the prime love giver. Joseph Jnr. was the much favoured golden boy and rather strangely John was disfavoured as was Robert. Edward, the baby of the family and nicknamed Teddy, was much favoured and his father would light up when he saw him.

Next week I will look at how position in the family and gender play an important role in the family game.

The Science of Farming and Food

August-September Grazing:-

- Grass growth (40 kgs. DM/Day) in late August will only supply enough grass for 2.2 cows/ha (0.9 cows/acre)
- So the run down of grass cover has started.
- Therefore special efforts will have to be made to grow more grass.
- Keep the rotation long 24-28 days, and longer if in REPS, but if growth rate is very good don't let grass go stronger than 17 - 18 cm before grazing.
- Protect regrowths, by allowing all animals, not alone cows but calves and cattle, only spend 2 days grazing any one block of grass.
- Spread 30 units of Nitrogen immediately after grazing or even 2 days before grazing.
- Paddocks or fields that have many dung pads and tall grass areas should be topped now.
- This facilitates easier Autumn grazing because the quality will be better.
- Another way of coping with decreased growth rates at this time of year is to reduce stocking rates.
- Sell off butchers heifers now if "fit"
- Sell off beef cattle as they become "fit"
- Sell off some store cattle now instead of Oct.-Nov., when there may be a glut of cattle on the market.
- Dry off poor yielders (less than 2 gallons) and only allow them access to toppings or bare pastures.
- Poor yielders in good condition should be culled and sold to factory.
- The introduction of meals to cows, if under quota, or calves can also allow grass build up.
- Baled silage offers the same opportunity.
- But milk yield could decrease too much.
- Protein % will be lowered.

RE-SEEDING: Re-seed in August:-

- August reseeds will be much better than September reseeds.
- Clover will be a lot better, and that is important.
- Less weed grasses will inhabit the new pasture this Winter, because, some sown crops will have over 20% weed grasses next spring - a disaster!
- They will be plenty good enough to cut for silage next year as they will have been grazed at least twice this Autumn.
- As there is a lot of late second cut silage being taken in August, these crops could be sprayed with Glyphosate (Roundup, Gallup, etc) 7 days before cutting.
- One pass of a rotospike will adequately prepare the seed bed.
- Ploughing (if field needs levelling), stitching or surface seeding could be considered.
- Whatever system of preparation is embarked on, the seed bed must be firm.
- You should be able to ride a bike on it.
- Roll before sowing the seed, harrow after sowing and roll again.
- Lime must be applied if necessary.
- Otherwise failure will result.
- Fertiliser ensures fast establishment.
- Phosphate is essential for root development.
- Nitrogen promotes tillering and thicker swards.
- Use soil tests to establish exact requirements.
- But, in most situations, 3 bags 10:10:20 plus 1 bag 27.5% N should be spread on prepared soil before sowing.
- Dock control 4 - 5 weeks after sowing is a must if seedling docks are present.
- Even though it will cost £15 per acre, it is a great investment.
- To avoid clover kill, it must have one true leaf before spraying.
- Legumex Extra, Acumen or Nintex do the job.

FARM SAFETY

- Don't be casual when handling cattle.
- Dosing can present great risks for injury.
- Bulls at this time can be very "cross" and people should stay away from them.
- Children must not be asked to handle and control animals in difficult situations.
- When driving cattle on the public road have one person in front and behind to alert on-coming traffic.
- Handling and storing bales can be a lot more dangerous than one thinks.
- So be alert to the dangers and tell your workforce.
- Remember young people and children don't see danger.
- You must not allow children ride on moving machinery.
- You have to be cruel to be kind.
- You must not allow children operate machinery.

FARM ASSIST MEANS TEST - NOW IS THE BEST TIME TO APPLY - IFA

IFA Waterford Rural Development Chairman Mossie O Connor this week said that low income farmers should now apply for the Farm Assist as the means test used by the Department of Social Welfare will fully reflect the severe low income situations that farmers experienced in late 1998 and early 1999.

The means test is done

over the previous 12 month period at the time of application and the low income position and high animal feed costs that farmers encountered in that period will be fully reflected if farmers apply now for Farm Assist.

Mr. O Connor said over 2,000 farmers have so far applied for the Farm Assist Scheme with a further 4,000 farmers having transferred

from the old Smallholders Assistance Scheme. The average payment payable under the Farm Assist to date is £64 per week or £3,328 per annum.

Continuing, Mr. O Connor has expressed concern that in some local Department of Social Welfare offices that a significant delay is developing between the time farmers apply for Farm Assist and when the assessment takes place. IFA has written to the Minister for Social Welfare, Dermot Ahern on these delays which in some cases date back to the time the scheme was introduced in early April.

IFA Rural Development Chairman said that it is early yet to assess the impact of the Farm Assist as the scheme has only been up and running for 4 months. Many low income farmers are endeavouring to either farm their way out of their low income situation or alternatively are seeking off-farm employment. However, he said the likelihood was that the uptake will increase towards the latter half of 1999 with a greater likelihood of the targets originally set for the scheme being met.

Mr. O Connor has expressed concern with regards to the means test being carried out on some farms. IFA have already got

examples of costs associated on individual farms not being fully taken into account and also an inflated income being assessed on some farms due to a misunderstanding by the Department of Social Welfare officers as to how income should be calculated. IFA is continuing to take up these cases with the Department of Social Welfare.

FARMERS SHOULD BE ALERT TO FARM ACCIDENT RISKS AS HOLIDAY APPROACHES

IFA's County Industrial Committee Chairman, Gerry Murphy, has urged farmers to be alert to accident risks on their farms, particularly as the holiday weekend approaches, with many visiting friends and families, including children.

He said: "There were 26 deaths on Irish farms in 1998, which was 26 too many! This figure was up by 11 fatalities on 1997. Around 2000 accidents take place on farms each year, 20% of which are serious and half of these result in hospital stays. The average hospital stay is 10 days.

South East ICMSA News

RULE CHANGE GETS SUPPORT

ICMSA said they were confident that the rule which prevents medium scale dairy farmers from receiving suckler cow premia, would be changed.

The Chairman of the ICMSA Dairy Committee, Mr. Jackie Cahill said that the Department had accepted the need for change in this rule. Furthermore, Mr. Cahill said there was support from the full Quota review group for the ICMSA proposals and that the current threshold should be increased to 35,000 gallons, or whatever new threshold will be brought in for the priority category under the milk quota system.

"Given this level of support for the ICMSA proposal the Minister should now act and change the rule so that medium scale farmers can plan and develop both their dairy and suckler cow enterprises. The current threshold is too low and is causing a major bottleneck for progressive medium scale dairy farmers," concluded Mr. Cahill.

TEAGASC TAKING OVER 5% OF FARMERS GRANTS

Mr. John O'Connor, Chairman of ICMSA's Farm Services Committee said that the fees Teagasc are charging farmers for completing a Dairy Hygiene or Control of Farmyard Pollution Scheme application are totally out of order and it would appear that Teagasc have very little regard for the needs of small farmers. A farmer, Mr. O'Connor said, could be charged up to £560 on top of his/her annual client fee and soil analysis charges to complete his/her application which represents over 5% of the total grant.

These charges, he said, are totally excessive and will put another obstacle in front of many farmers who are struggling to survive and develop their farms. Remember, Mr. O'Connor said, that these two schemes are only open to farmers with less than 100 income units, which are the smaller scale producers. Figures from Teagasc's own survey last week reveal the precarious income position of many of our farmers but yet Teagasc appear to have no problems charging these very same farmers exorbitant amounts. In the Teagasc 2000 Strategy document, Teagasc claim that "the programme will proactively encourage, stimulate and support farm families who are under financial pressure to become viable through maximising income from farming and direct payment." It is about time that Teagasc put this statement into action and actually actively help these farmers become viable. Teagasc receive significant amounts of exchequer funding every year, Mr. O'Connor said. Unless Teagasc start to use this funding to assist small scale producers, then the Government should consider giving this funding to another advisory agency which will actually be committed to maintaining the maximum number of family farms. Teagasc are going to have to realise the problems on Irish farms and address them, Mr. O'Connor said. Teagasc, Mr. O'Connor said, should immediately review their fees for these two schemes and bring them back to a realistic level. Farmers should also check with private consultants to get a better deal, Mr. O'Connor concluded.

ICMSA Call For Increase In Early Retirement Pension

Mr. Maurice Harvey, Chairman of ICMSA's Rural Development Committee called on the Minister for Agriculture and Food to increase the Early Retirement Pension for farmers. Mr. Harvey said that since the pension was introduced under 1992 CAP Reform, the value of the pension has not only fallen in real terms but the value of the pension has also been cut as a result of the introduction of the Euro for which compensation has yet to be paid. People who receive the contributory and non-contributory pensions have seen some increase in their pensions since 1992 but the farmers in the Early Retirement Scheme have seen none.

Under the Agenda 2000 Agreement, an increase in the Early Retirement Pension will be allowable and Mr. Harvey said the Minister for Agriculture and Food should ensure that this increase is put in place for farmers in the current scheme as well as the new scheme.

In addition, Mr. Harvey said, that there should be an annual increase in the pension to reflect the level of inflation. It is not acceptable, Mr. Harvey said, that a retired farmers standard of living actually declines over the life of the pension. At the very maximum, Mr. Harvey said that the Early Retirement Pension should increase in line with the current State pensions.

IFA SAYS AGENDA 2000 IMPLEMENTATION MUST BE KEPT SIMPLE

IFA Waterford Livestock Committee Chairman, Tom Leahy this week said, the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh must guarantee that the new implementation rules for Agenda 2000 on premiums in the livestock sector are kept simple and avoid additional bureaucracy and red tape. He said "Farmers are overburdened with paperwork and will not tolerate additional bureaucracy which will be used to deny them their premium entitlements."

Mr. Leahy said the EU Commission have tabled new proposals on extensification premium qualification which they intend to agree at the next Beef Management Committee meeting on July 30th. The Livestock farmer said IFA is demanding the 94,000 applicants who currently benefit from extensification must continue to receive payment under any new system. In addition, he said the overall level of extensification premium payment must increase from its present level of £76m to £105m, as promised by Minister Walsh in Agenda 2000.

Mr. Leahy said IFA is demanding farmers have the option of a simple system of extensification premium qualification through self declaration. "IFA has made it clear to the Department of Agriculture that we will not tolerate the requirement of having to list all the animals tag numbers five times per year as originally proposed by the commission."

The Dungarvan man said the system must be simple, practical and ensure that all 94,000 farmers receive the full benefits of £105m in extensification premium payment.

Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce & Industry Notes

Snippets From Dungarvan UDC

Housing Crisis Needs To Be Tackled

The escalating housing crisis must be tackled as a matter of urgency by Dungarvan UDC. That's according to Labour's Cllr. Billy Kyne who proposed at last week's meeting that the Council initiate a programme that would identify and agree strategies to provide joint venture housing as a matter of urgency. This strategy, he explained, would include liaising with present and future private developers as well as the purchase and development of sites for subsidised disposal to suitable applicants.

Cllr. Kyne said the housing crisis has not been tackled by the Government despite the publication of two Bacon reports. The conditions laid down by local authorities in relation to Council housing, debar some people from getting on Council housing lists despite the fact that their wages are insufficient to get a mortgage for their own house.

"We must have an agreed policy to get a designated site for joint venture housing as a matter of priority", he stated. He also suggested that where a private develop-

er is building an estate that the County Manager approach the builder and target a site which could be developed at a subsidised price for people on low incomes.

"We have to be very determined and innovative", he stressed. His proposal was seconded by Cllr. Paddy Power.

Also supporting the proposal was Cllr. Damien Dillon who once again put forward the notion of a local task force or think tank on the subject - a group of people who could 'figure out' how to tackle the housing problem. "There is a scarcity of housing around town", he stressed, "it's time we did something radical about it".

Fully supportive of members views, County Manager Donal Connolly said he was concluding an agreement on land in the town for local authority housing and affordable housing.

He had also approached developers regarding the idea of joint venture housing.

PROJECTS GRANTED PERMISSION

Dungarvan UDC has granted planning permission to the Park Hotel, Dungarvan for the conversion of the existing attic space in the hotel to ten dormer style bedrooms and a residents lounge. Permission was also granted for the conversion of an existing redundant staircase into two bedrooms - one on the ground floor and one on the first floor - and the construction of a lift shaft.

Meanwhile, planning approval was granted to Liam and Josephine Morrissey, Ballinclammer, Ballinacourty for 47 houses at Skehacrine, Abbey-side while the Bon Sauveur Sisters of Carriglea were given the go ahead for the construction of a garage at the Mount Odell Training Centre, Shandon.

Rybo Partnership of Dublin have been granted permission for the erection of a 52 bed 2 storey nursing home and ancillary buildings as well as access off the N25 on a site opposite the entrance to the Duckspool road at Parkatluggera, Abbey-side.

The Council also granted permission to Dungarvan Credit Union to demolish the former Ducey and Mulcahy buildings at Main Street and to erect a three storey credit union office in their place. The development also includes the provision of a pedestrian walkway between Main Street and the Friary car park and car parking to the rear.

CLEAN UP ABBEYSIDE STRAND

The poor condition of the strand at Abbeyside, which was particularly noticeable during the fine summer weather earlier this month, has been highlighted by Cllr. Nuala Ryan. Speaking to the 'Leader', Cllr. Ryan said she has brought the matter to the attention of Council officials. She was approached by a number of concerned parents who said they noticed a layer of scum forming on the water's edge at the popular strand and later had to shower their children as a result.

Cllr. Ryan also pointed to the problem of abandoned shopping trollies on the beach and the accumulation of stones on what was once a sandy area of the strand.

MUSEUM SOCIETY MOVE TO TOWN HALL

The Urban Council have reached an agreement with Dungarvan Museum Society regarding tenancy of the Town Hall at Friary Street. The ground floor of the vacant building has been reconstructed to accommodate the Museum Society and a draft caretakers agreement was signed last week between both parties.

The Town Hall formerly served as the headquarters for Dungarvan UDC for the past century and has lain idle since the Council's relocation to the new Civic Offices at Davitt's Quay last April.

The County Manager is expected to report back to Council members at the September meeting with a formal lease proposal for 10 to 20 years.

The Museum Society formerly occupied the first floor of the Old Market House building at Lower Main Street which is expected to be developed into an arts centre.

Call For Replacement Of Doors At Kyne Park

Cllr. Lar Hart proposed that the Council replace the front doors to houses in Kyne Park, Abbeyside. He said the doors were of an inferior quality from day one and asked that the Council replace them now or provide for their replacement in next years budget.

"If it is not possible to do them all together, I would like to see them done on a phased basis", he added.

His proposal was seconded by Cllr. Nuala Ryan who requested that windows in the estate also be included.

VOTE OF SYMPATHY

At last week's Urban Council meeting members extended their deepest sympathy to the Curran family on the tragic death of Theresa Dunphy, Currabaha, Colligan. Following the formal vote of sympathy, the meeting was adjourned for a short period as a mark of respect.

Amenity Area At Fr. Twomey's

He said this area of the town is lacking in such facilities and urged officials to consider the proposal.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said previous proposals were drawn up some years ago to pipe the stream down from the Spring and build bridges to make the area safer.

RELIGIOUS CEREMONY AT GLENDINE

The monks of old felt closer to God through the beauty of nature and that is why some of our most important monasteries were built in such scenic places as Glendalough, Maville, The Skellig Rocks in Co. Kerry and in the last century, in Mount Mellerey in the heart of West Waterford.

It must have been the same urge to commune with nature and so form a special relationship with God that prompted St. Gehan to erect a church at beautiful Glendine, close to Tarr's Bridge, in the parish of Abbeyside, Ballinroad and Garranbane.

Annual Mass

Last Friday night, July 23rd a group of approximately 100 people attended Mass and joined in a procession to the Holy Well of St. Gehan. It was a beautiful warm, summer evening which enhanced to perfection the stunning beauty of the surrounding countryside. The temporary altar was erected under two stately horse-chestnut trees.

Our senior citizens sat on the chairs provided while younger people knelt and sat on the grass in a field that a few weeks beforehand had been cut for hay.

Proceedings commenced with the Brass and Reed Band playing in harmony while the congregation present sang 'Nearer My God To Thee'. Our Parish Priest Fr. Doherty welcomed everybody present and hoped we would all benefit spiritually from the ceremony. The readings and responsorial psalm were read by residents of the area.

Homily

During his sermon, Fr. Doherty stated that the Church of St. Gehan was a monastic orientated church and there were a number of these in every area. Very often the choice of place was determined by the existence of a well in the area with special healing qualities in the water and in this instance, it involved the gift of sight. The Church brought with it a system of values - "Blessed are the peacemakers, blessed are the pure in heart".

In these modern times it was the loss of an acknowledgement of the existence of God in our lives, that was at the root of many of the problems in society. St. Gehan was a man of God who led an austere life and achieved closeness to God through work and prayer.

Conclusion

The Band gave renderings of 'I'll Sing a Hymn to Mary', 'Hail Queen of Heaven' and finally 'Abide With Me'. The priests led a procession to the well at the left of the centre of the field. The rosary was recited while walking to the well. The majority of people drank the water from the well in the plastic cups provided while those with sight complaints rubbed the holy water to the afflicted parts. All in all a very prayerful and peaceful ceremony.

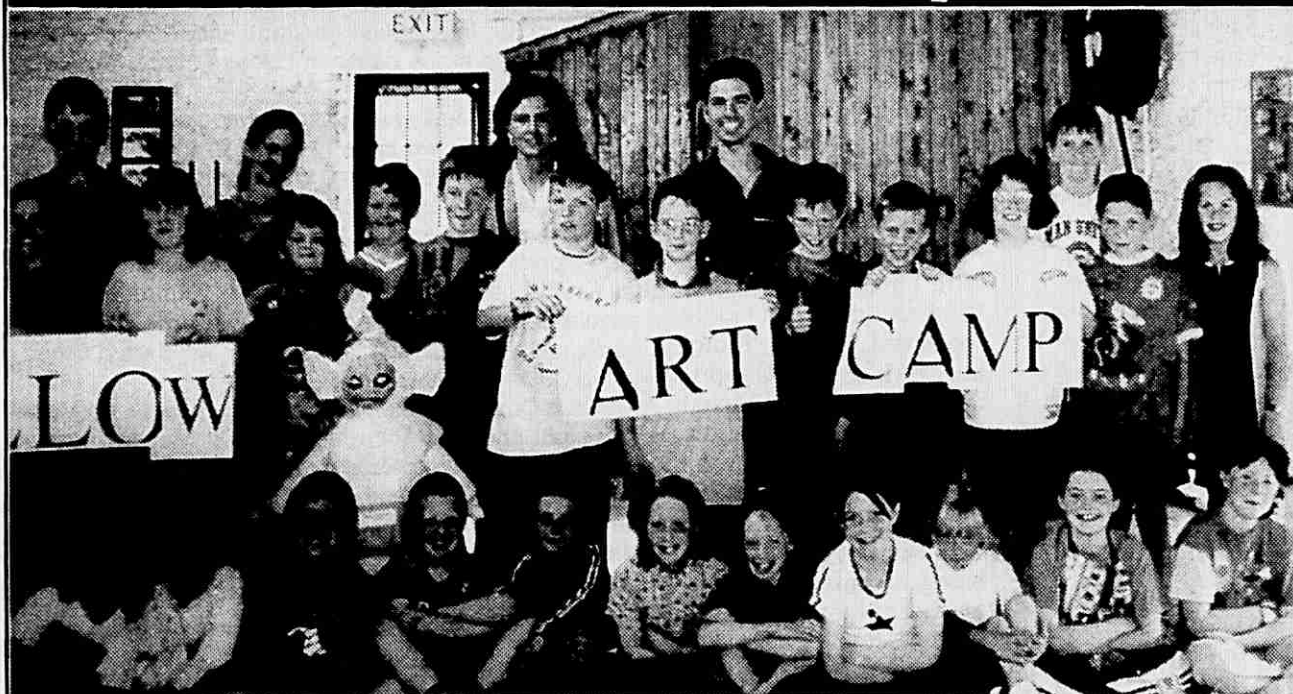

The Mass at the Mass Rock on the Knockmeal-down mountains at Monatouke will be celebrated on Saturday 31st July at 3 pm, the feast of Saint Ignatius of Loyola. It was in 1975 that Rev. Fr. Paddy Hallinan, a local priest home on holidays with the help of local farmer Willie Morrissey that they identified a site ideally suitable for the historic Mass Rock on the local hill to be called Cnoicin an Aifrinn (Little Hill of the Mass). Stories of Mass on the mountain side and the exact location was a bit hazy, they came to the conclusion that the Mass was more important than the site. A clump of huge rocks, somewhat like a collapsed pre historic tomb provides the back ground for the Mass Rock shelf on which Mass has been said since 1975, beneath flows a sparkling mountain stream, with turf banks on either side. Ferns and wild heather clothe the mountain side where flocks of sheep browse in peace. From that part of the mountain on a clear day one can see many parts of Tipperary, the Nire Valley and the Comeragh's and if you climb a little higher one can see Sliabhnamon. The ceremonies begin at 2.30 pm. Location

A lover of all kinds of sport, he was a keen follower of soccer and hurling, he also had an interest in horse racing and enjoyed a regular flutter. In 1966 he moved to Glenconor to look after his father and mother and at that time he took up employment at Prendergast's Garage where he remained until they closed. In 1969 his father died and his mother in 1988. The following year he went back to England to live with his brother Ted. When his health began to fail he returned to Clonmel, where following surgery in January he was in intensive care for three months after which he went to Melview Nursing Home where he was for a few weeks before being moved to Saint Joseph's Hospital where he sadly passed away. His remains were removed to S.S. Peter & Paul's Parish Church, Clonmel where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. John Treacy C.C., S.S. Peter & Paul's. Gaelic games over he took up the game of Golf at which game he became a first class player, he also had time to lend a hand to coach Gaelic games. Over the years he never lost contact with the place where he grew up as a boy, Ballymacarbry. He also had a great love for old time dancing and it was not too long ago I saw him dancing an Irish Set at the Oriel Bar and was he able.

The term 'natures gentleman' was coined with men like Willie in mind. He was a true sportsman, a loving husband and father, a man whose integrity, courtesy and outgoing sincere nature commended him to young and old alike, and a host of friends who appreciated his company, advice or assistance in any way now truly and justifiably grieve for the void his passing leaves. AN APPRECIATION

BRO. AENGUS BRODERICK O.C.S.O.

Late Of Mount Melleray Abbey

Born in Lismore, Michael Broderick entered Mount Melleray just eight miles from his hometown in August 1959 when he was 34 years of age.

Before entering, Michael had worked in Allison's Drapery for eighteen years. Being of a friendly disposition, he was very popular and took part in all the activities of the town, social and athletic. He was also a very dedicated member of the Legion of Mary. It was during his years as a legionary that he felt the call to enter Mount Melleray.

Bro. Aengus never lost his love for Lismore and for everything connected with the place. He kept up a life long interest in Lismore hurling teams at school, club and county level. In recent years he had good reason to be proud of Lismore's achievements in the County Championship, league and the Sargent Cup as well as of the county senior hurlers and the lady footballers who still do the county proud. He never lost his own love for the game and followed the matches with undisguised enthusiasm. This interest in sport in no way interfered with his dedication to his monastic vocation. He gave himself wholeheartedly to it. Bro. Aengus could not be other than completely dedicated. He lived his monastic life with unswerving fidelity for forty years. On December 19, 1995 another Lismore man died in hospital after a brief illness. Paddy Flynn, known in religion as Bro. Gregory, had been a legionary with Bro. Aengus. His decision to enter Mount Melleray surely helped to turn Bro. Aengus' thoughts in that direction also.

If I were asked to name the characteristic Bro. Aengus and Bro. Gregory shared in common, I should unhesitatingly say it was 'doggedness'. They were outstanding examples of unswerving commitment to the 'heroicity of the humdrum'. Bro. Aengus and Bro. Gregory spent years of their monastic life looking after the livestock. Bro. Aengus had been under medical care for some months. The day before he died he asked the doctor for permission to go back to the milking parlour. He was refused but it does show the spirit that animated him. He had already returned to the Office of Vigils and was there the day he was called 'to be with the Lord forever'. 'Happy the servant whom the Lord when he comes finds vigilant.'

On June 26 the community had gone to the refectory as usual, immediately after the midday office in choir. Halfway through the meal, Bro. Aengus slumped forward at his place and died instantly. That was a fitting way to go for one who had always lived community life to the full.

His brother, Fr. Richard, Missionary of the Sacred Heart, was chief celebrant and homilist at the Mass whilst the Abbot, Dom Eamonn officiated in the cemetery. The Gospel was read by Fr. Willie Ryan, Adm. in Waterford Cathedral and close friend of Bro. Aengus whose brother significantly is currently chairman of Waterford County G.A.A. Board. Other priests from the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart as well as the Parish Priest of Cappoquin Very Rev. Fr. Robert Arthure and local clergy also concelebrated. There was a very large attendance at the funeral, a tribute to the esteem in which he was held. Among his relatives were his sister Mrs. Mary Fives, his sister-in-law Mrs. Kathleen Broderick, his nephews and nieces.

No account of Bro. Aengus would be complete without a reference to his devotion to the Mass and the rosary. In addition to the community Mass, he daily served for years the 8.45 a.m. Mass for our neighbours. He was noted for his regular attendance at the rosary as well as for the rosaries he said in private. When some of his close friends came to see him, they were sure to be invited to join him in a rosary as they walked about. His monastic life had an apostolic dimension in so far as he helped Fr. Richard and the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart by prayer and fundraising on their behalf.

We may well hope that Bro. Aengus and Bro. Gregory are together enjoying the reward of a life generously lived in the service of the Lord.

By and large the picture which emerges is that it is the 'ordinary' person in the community who is using the service. Statistics may be one thing, the reality in people's lives is another. Statistics often hide the genuine worry which is experienced when a person feels that they just cannot cope with debt and there seems to be no way out. We are there precisely for that reason, to help the 'ordinary' person sort out their financial problems.

Futuristic Fashion Show

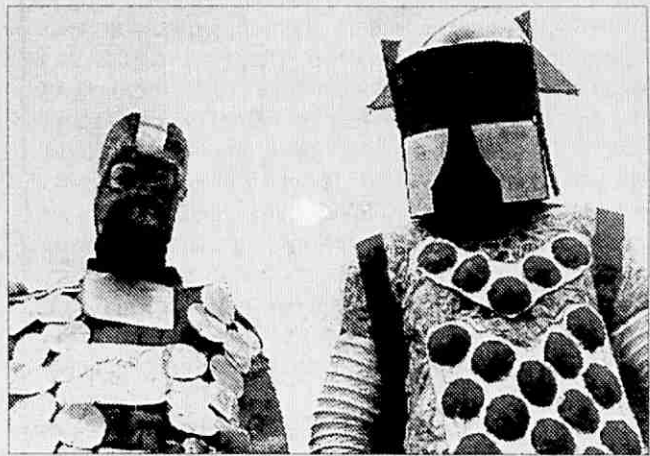

John O'Brien

DUNGARVAN Certified Reflexologist

A certified practitioner with the Association of Irish Reflexologists, John O'Brien's healing hands have helped many patients with various illnesses over the past twelve months.

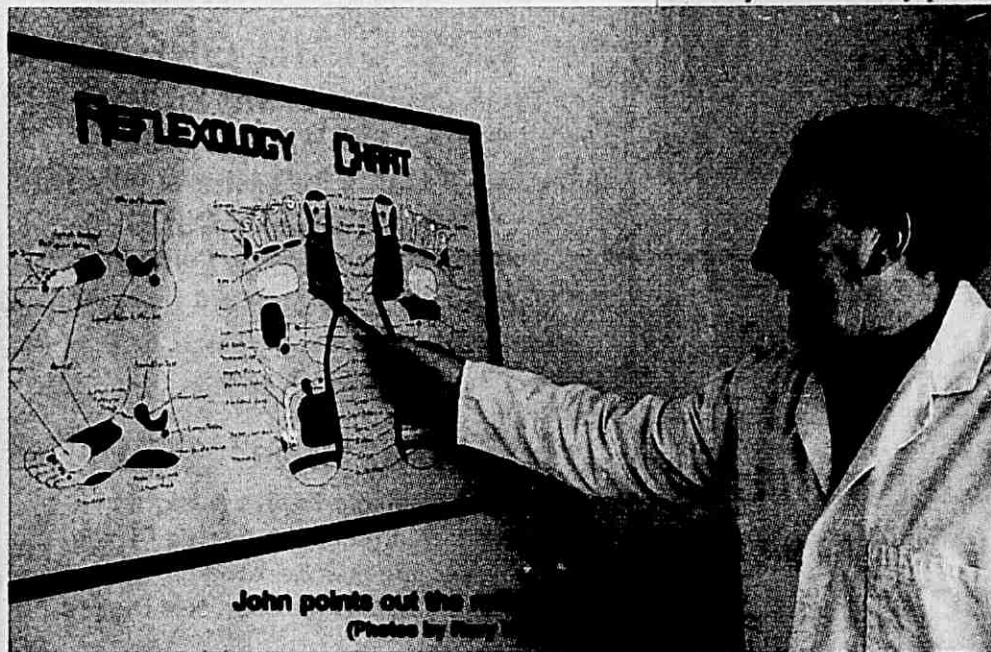
For example a 'fire' person will be outgoing and energetic and will most likely experience problems with the heart and circulatory system.

Through soothing music and relaxation therapy at the start of each session, John helps people to train their mind and get in tune with their body.

Although reflexology has been described by some as a form of alternative medicine, John stresses that he is not a medical practitioner and helps people to heal themselves.

"You have to feel good on the inside to feel good on the outside", says John. "I help people to look at their lifestyle and themselves and see if they can come to terms with who they are and their path in life. 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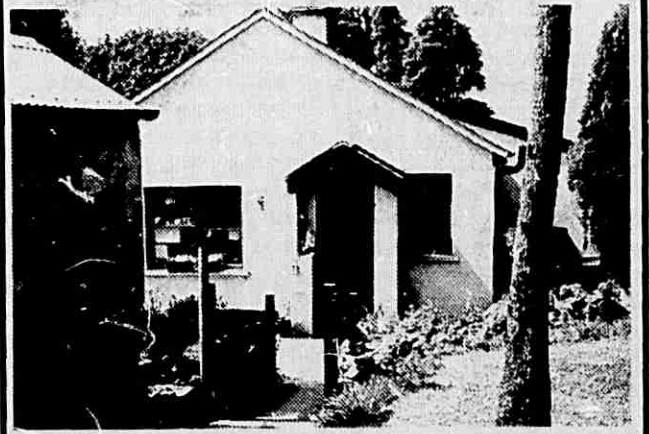

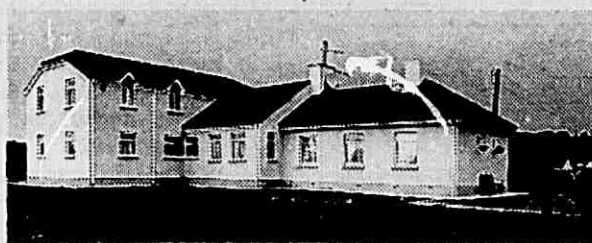

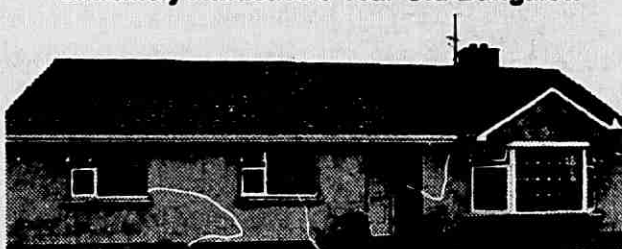

Interviewed by the racing channel owner Lucey confirmed that Martin Pipe purchased Maquise Honor (Hero Honor - Maquise) and the connections of this mare have high hopes that she will make a decent chaser in time.

DAVID'S WOE

Waterford jockey David Casey made a brief journey to Sedgefield in the north of England last Thursday to take the mount on the Tony Martin trained David's Lad in a novice chase over an extended three mile three furlongs. Despite making a number of minor jumping errors David's Lad appeared to have gained the upperhand off the hometurn. It all went wrong, however at the next fence as David's Lad took off too early and crashed through the fence - giving his rider no chance of staying in the saddle.

Meanwhile Hollow Suspicion was left all along to race to a clear cut victory. Had David's Lad stayed on his feet I think he would have opened his account over the larger obstacles and if brushing up on his jumping technique is sure to score in the not too distant future.

NAAS - WEDNESDAY JULY 21ST

Local trainer John Flynn is certainly keeping L. Tucker's Anna Elise busy of late and after her promising effort behind Sea Leopard, she made a quick reappearance at Naas last Wednesday in the Clane extended handicap over a mile. Once again the Niall McCullagh partnered filly ran a cracker but for the second successive outing she was forced to settle for the runner up spot behind the Jason Behan ridden Markskeepingfaith who scored by half a length. Incidentally the winner is trained by Tommy Carmody who was a top class flat and national hunt jockey for a long number of years in Ireland and England where he rode many top class horses for the Dickenson family.

John Queally introduced the four year old Patsy Veale to racing in the concluding bumper and the M. A. Ryan owned runner made a pleasing debut finishing in second spot just a neck in arrears of 13/2 Shot Ojay (Phardante - Touchdown).

DAYLAMI TOPS

They said that he could struggle to stay the mile and a half trip but the Frankie Dettori ridden Daylami (Doyoun - Daltowa) destroyed a top class field in last Saturday's King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Diamond stakes at Ascot. The grey colt left such as this years derby winner Oath in his wake as he strode on majestically for a five lengths defeat of Nedawi also running for the Godolphin outfit. Daylami will continue to race on for the rest of this year. When he eventually retires he will stand at the Giltown Stud which is one of many stud farms owned by the Aga Khan, not alone in Ireland but the rest of the world.

FRENCH VICTORY FOR ROSSINI

Tipperary trainer Aidan O' Brien turned his attention to Maisons - Lafitte in France last Saturday afternoon and he plundered a group two victory with Rossini, this Miswaki colt running right away from his four rivals inside the final furlong to inflict a five lengths defeat on the Ger-

man raider Auenklang. Rossini may now go for a group one race at home or he may return to France next month to contest the Prix Morny.

MICKS MAN

Irish jockey Mick Kinane's agent in the UK is the well known racing commentator John Hamner. John's distinctive voice is well known on Martell Grand National day where he calls the race down the back stretch through the Melling Road.

NORTHERN CALL FOR IMPERIAL

While he may well make his seasonal comeback at either Clonmel or Gowran Park next October, Imperial Call's main target for the final quarter of this year is Northern Ireland's richest ever steeplechase, the £100,000 Ulster Champion Chase at Down Royal on November 6th.

GLEN'S TORMENT

U.K. based rider Glen Tormey tasted the high and lows of jump racing in England last Wednesday afternoon. After partnering the Philip Hobb's trained Brush With Fame in the handicap hurdle he had high hopes of going on to record a double with the Peter Bowen trained Ross Quay in the following novice chase. Easing his way into the lead with a circuit to go Glen was only cantering on his mount passing the stand but disaster struck shortly afterwards as Ross Quay jinked when coming to a clay path. Glen Tormey was duly dislodged taking a crashing fall in the process. He was taken to Worcester Royal infirmary. It later transpired that the young rider had fractured his right thigh which required an operation.

PAT MUST WAIT

Flat jockey Pat Eddery who broke his hip in a fall during the Austrian Derby last month may delay his return to action for another couple of days. Due to make a comeback last week Pat was advised to delay his comeback for a little while longer after speaking to his consultant.

GALWAY TRAFFIC RESTRICTIONS

Those racing fans heading for the Galway Racing Festival should watch out for traffic restrictions in the city. Gardai have been given permission to switch off traffic lights at key points in the city whenever they feel it necessary during race week.

PIPE AND GREEN SPLIT

One of Britain's top owners Paul Green had a major falling out with top trainer Martin Pipe. As a result Green removed all of his horses from Pipe's stable last Thursday so top class horses such as Unsinkable Boxer and Hors La Loi will operate from a new national hunt yard next winter.

TRAMORE GO SOLO

As we predicted last week all racing is cancelled in the UK on New Year's Day in the year 2000. Fairyhouse who traditionally raced alongside Tramore on New Year's Day have decided to move their fixture to January 3. As a result of all this shifting around of fixtures, Tramore will be the only track to race in the British Isles on January 1 next. There is also a distinct possibility that the Turf Club may grant Tramore an extra fixture in September of this year.

Elaine's winning time was 4.16.99. She has already qualified for Saville. Ferrybank's John Hallssey took gold in the Senior mens Polevault with a jump of 4.50 from D. McDermot (Borrisokane) 4.40. All in all a great championship for Waterford athletes.

Diary Of An Ultra Distance Runner

West Waterford's only ultra distance runner Ray McConnell has been busy over the last couple of months since his fantastic exploits when he smashed the Irish 100 mile road record on a memorable Saturday evening in the West Waterford village of Cappoquin. Of course that is all part of history now and Ray, a man always looking for the next challenge, was on a three man Irish team in France on May 15 for the World 100km international road race but Ray, by his own admission, was unhappy with his performance at this race running a time of 9 hours and 25 minutes on Saturday, June 19. Ray ran in the Phoenix

Park in the Anglo Celtic Plate 100km but once again he ran under par with a finishing time of 9 hours and 17 minutes which left him wondering would he ever again see the magic under 9 hour mark for the 100km but Ray being Ray buckled down to some big mileage training over the next couple of weeks and while on a family holiday with Sylvia and the children in Scotland where Ray's brother lives, he just happened to hear of an ultra race in Hull in England on the same weekend and yes you guessed right, all down to Hull, both families lock stock and barrel on Saturday, July 10. This time it was a 24 hour track race and there were 13 competi-

tors entered in the race. The organisers were delighted to leave Ray enter and twenty four hours later after covering an incredible 115 miles on a 400m track (you can get the calculator out for that one) Ray McConnell, after 12 years of competing at ultra distance running having competed in 32 races in all, he finally won his first ultra race and for good measure took two big scalps while doing so when he beat into second place the 1000 miles world record holder and holder of various national and world records down to the marathon, Eleanor Robinson and also that of Sharon Gaytor who is ranked in the top ten in the world for 24

hour events. Both these athletes are full time training and are funded by the G.B. National Lottery.

Back in the car, back up to Scotland to enjoy the final few days of their holiday, but before the McConnells came home Ray picked out another race when on Tuesday the 13th in Moffat the Edinburgh Woollen Mill 9.25 mile road race was being held so even though somewhat under Ray's usual racing distance, he decided to have a go along with 200 other mortals. Ray's finishing time was 1 hour 6 minutes and 55 seconds in 75th place. What an interesting holiday, just as well he packed the old runners!

The semi-finals will be staged on Saturday, September 11 together with the semi-finals of the Ireland On Sunday Irish Derby and the final will be held on Friday, September 17 as part of the special Ireland On Sunday Derby Irish Festival Week.

Prizemoney for the final of the Stud Dog Owners and Agents Open Unraced 525 will provide for the winner's prize of £5,000 and trophy (of which the breeder will receive 10% and a special breeders trophy), second will earn £1,000, third £500 and three unplaced finalists at £200 each. The fee for direct entries is £250 per greyhound.

His pride and joy within the Club were the young boys whom he coached up to a short time before his death. He had a great rapport with them and they had a great respect for him. He loved the ground hurling and always encouraged them to play same.

Willie was a great charac-

ter always in good form and he lived life to the full. He will be greatly missed by all his friends in Cumann Luth Chleas Gael, Dungarvan, but none more so than his wife, Maureen and family to whom we extend our sincere sympathy on their loss. As a mark of respect all club activities were postponed last week-end.

May the sod of his beloved Dungarban rest gently on his soul.

Waterford Junior Footballers Through To All-Ireland Final

WATERFORD 2-11 ROSCOMMON 1-9

Waterford Junior footballers remain firmly on course to lift the county's first ever All-Ireland football title. A thrilling 5 pts. win over Roscommon in the semi-final at O'Moore Park, Portlaoise has set up a final meeting with Meath on Saturday, August 7 probably at the same venue.

The scenes at the final whistle last Saturday evening were reminiscent of the minor and under-21 hurlers success for 1992 when at least 20 mins. after the final whistle the team and supporters (at least 3,000 made the journey) were still on the pitch savouring what had been achieved.

It was Roscommon who opened the scoring when John Hanley pointed before Jacko Kiely had Waterford on parity by the third minute. The Connacht champions missed two scoring chances before the tall dangerous full-forward Martin Keena put them back in front.

The first of Jacko Kiely's two goals came in the 8th min. after a good outfield move with Alan Reynolds playing a vital part. The sides were level 1-1 to 0-4 by the end of the first quarter. Brendan O'Brien (Roscommon) and Kevin Walsh exchanged points with Walsh converting a 45. Pepe Ferncombe converted a free in the 22nd min. to restore Waterford's lead after a foul on Connie Power. Three minutes later Kevin Walsh, who had an outstanding game, pointed a free to put the Déise side 1-4 to 0-5 in front. Roscommon finished the half the stronger kicking three unanswered points to

The impressive full-forward capitalised on a mistake by the opposition 'keeper for a score that sent the Waterford supporters wild as they now sensed victory and history in the making. Shane Bergin and Ferncombe pointed to leave Waterford in front by 2-9 to 0-8 with ten minutes remaining. Roscommon hit back with Martin Keena pointing a free and the same player goaled in the 55th min. after he rather easily soloed through the defence. Connie Power restored Waterford's four point lead 2 mins. from time before fittingly deep into injury time

Pepe Ferncombe pointed from play to ensure Waterford's place in the All-Ireland Final.

The final whistle brought scenes of great celebration as the supporters raced onto the field to salute their heroes.

WILLIE BARRON R.I.P.



His playing days began when he was a pupil at Dungarvan CBS and for more than three score years he served the GAA, mostly as a player, but lately on the coaching and administrative side of things in his beloved Dungarvan club. He first came to prominence when winning a county senior hurling championship with Dungarvan who defeated Mount Sion in 1941. Subsequently he won three county football titles with the Blues.

In 1938, Willie was on the county team which won our first senior hurling Munster final and he played again in his favourite wing forward position against Dublin who defeated us in the All Ireland final in that year. In 1938 too, he was named as a reserve on the Munster Railway Cup team.

Some idea of the link between the Barron family and the GAA scene in Waterford around the 1938 era can be gleaned from a brief passage in Tom Keith's book, "The Blue & White" which reads: "Teenager Josie Barron (Willie's sister) came home from work in Clonmel to help her mother cater for the Waterford team who had defeated Cork in the semi-final in the Shandon Field. The county board had arranged to have a post-match meal for the team in the Barron household in O'Connell St. Five years later Josie married Mick Curley (the goalkeeper) and who was feted at her home on that afternoon. Unfortunately, Willie missed out on an All-Ireland medal ten years later as he had been suspended for playing soccer with Waterford. Later he moved to London and became deeply involved in GAA affairs and activities there. Three years ago when the London County Board published a magazine to commemorate the holding of the first congress in London, they paid a glowing tribute to the excellent service rendered by the Dungarvan hurler to the games across channel. He won London county hurling titles with Sean MacDermots and also he played hurling on the London county team.

In recent years he devoted his time to coaching underage teams in Dungarvan and became Club President on the death of Bríd Ní Christeóir. He was chairman of the juvenile section of the club at the time of his death.

At the removal of his remains to St. Mary's Parish Church on Friday evening a guard of honour by the Dungarvan club members included several colleagues from other days and from other clubs who had come to pay their respects to a player who had served his club and county with distinction.

One of those to pay tribute was former bishop Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, who had played minor hurling with Tipperary against Cork (with Christy Ring) on the day on which we defeated Cork at Dungarvan in 1938. The attendance also included former GAA President Padraigh O Fainín. Willie's coffin was draped in the blue and white of his club and county.

Sponsors of the hurling championships, Guinness Ireland have published the following official attendance figures which show that interest in the game is on the increase.

This year the total attendance for the hurling in Munster was 213,267, but when the replay between Tipperary and Clare was taken out of the equation it was 179,237. In 1998 with the Waterford/Clare replay taken out, it was 169,958. In 1977 it was 145,070 and in the previous year it was 130,415.

In Leinster this year the grand total was 104,117.

In Munster the figures for 1999 are: Tipperary v. Kerry 6,279; Waterford v. Limerick 30,216; Clare v. Tipperary 42,382; Replay 34,030; Waterford v. Cork 45,806; Cork v. Clare

54,554.

The grand total from all four provinces for the season is 326,000.

The increased figures indicate the increasing popularity of the game at intercounty level, but it would be foolish to read into this that things (hurling) were never better. The other side of the story tells of reduced attendances at club championship level. The intercounty programme is shop-window stuff and I'm sure this is very important, but what happens at ground level is far more important. This is something that must be carefully monitored and the importance of the club championship, if diminished in any way, or for any reason, can spell trouble down the road for the whole Association.

CO. BOARD MEETING CHANGED

Due to the death of Bill Ryan, father of County Board Chairman, P. J., the July meeting of the County Board is deferred and will now be held on Monday, August 9th. It is expected that at this meeting, the Runai will report that every club in the county will have submitted details of the Development payments to clear the debt on the development account.

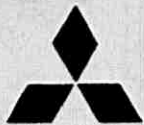
