Information Sought On Proposed RTE Mast At Ballymac'

As reported in a recent edition of the 'Leader', RTE are planning to improve the t.v. reception in the Nire Valley and to this end have applied to Waterford County Council for permission to erect an 18.3 metre tower and broadcast equipment at Knocknaree, Ballymacarbry.

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy has been in contact with RTE regarding the quality of tv and radio reception in this scenic area.

"They tell me that they are anxious to provide a satisfactory reception in the

Valley", Deputy Deasy told the 'Leader'.

After lodging a planning application with the Council, RTE were informed that the planning section require five additional points of information.

Details of the visual influ-

ence of the mast were requested by the County Council, as well as a map showing areas where the mast would be visible from public roads. The Council also requested a photographic survey with the mast superimposed to scale from locations in surrounding areas where the mast can be viewed. The survey should also be used to provide an elevational detail from the public road to the front of the Knocknaree site

Answer:

Death Benefit Insurance was introduced in January 1998 to relieve the burden of bereavement costs.

All Credit Union members over 16 years of age are eligible for cover provided:—

They joined the Credit Union before the age of 70, and have been eligible for cover under the Life Savings Policy and remained a member of the Credit Union.

Member who joined after the age of 70 years are not eligible for cover under the Death Benefit Insurance Policy.

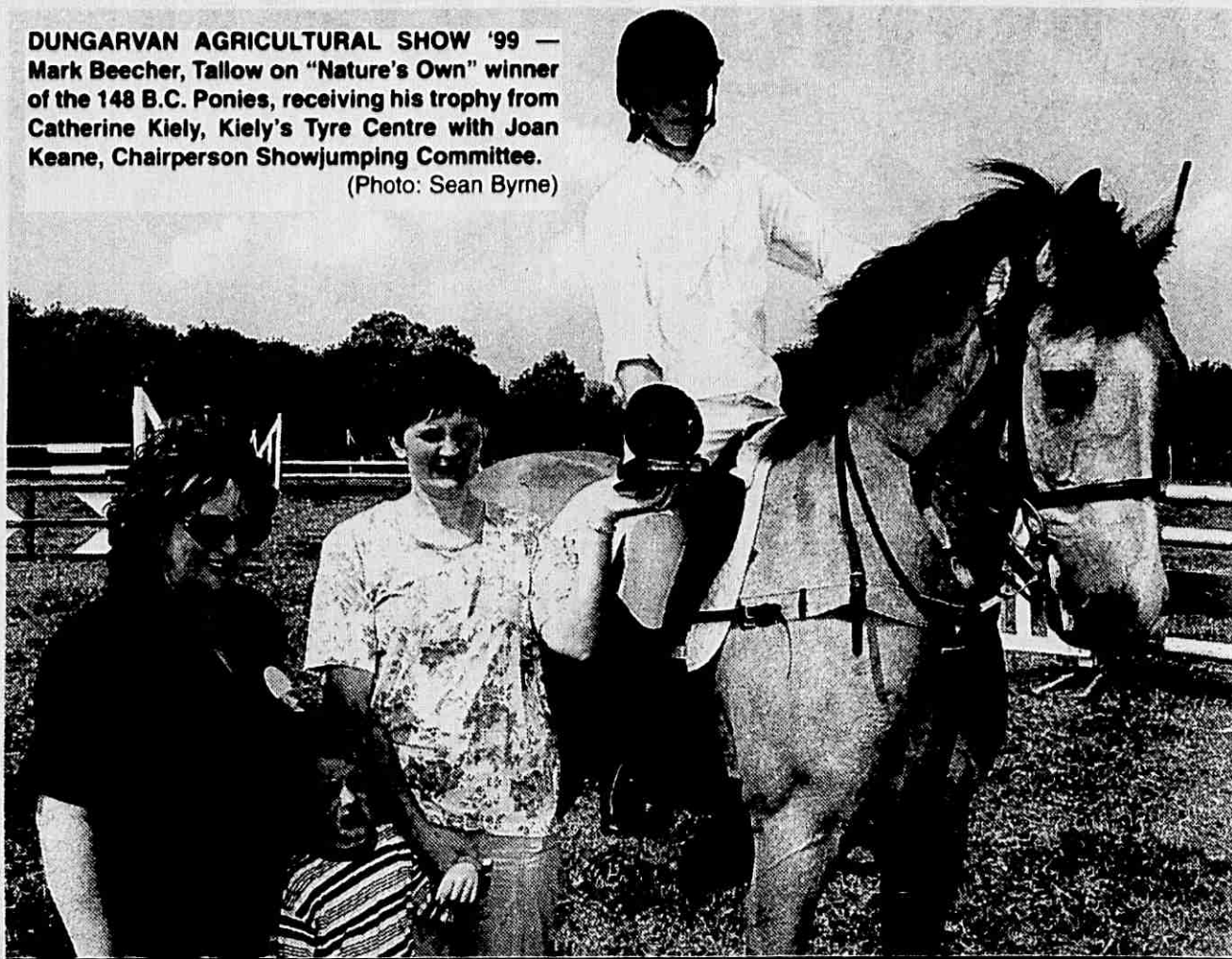
The current level of cover is £1,000 and the Credit Union's participation in the scheme is reviewed annually.

Waterford Regional Game Council

Regional Game Council A.G.M. is in the offing soon again. Most clubs have held or are in the process of holding their own A.G.M.'s at this stage as it is very important that insurance cover of members be maintained throughout the year. This means that all signed forms of application for Compensation Fund Membership should be with the Hon. Secretary, Mr. Ger Burns by the end of the month of July.

At the R.G.C. meeting of May 25 last arrangements were made for the dissemination of six week old

ducks to the applicant clubs. The demand for ducks was unprecedented this year and R.G.C.'s had to apply a quota system of 28/30 ducks to interested clubs. Nationally some 98% of clubs requested them. It is encouraging to see this interest level in the return of the mallard to our streams and rivers and good luck to all the clubs involved in this form of conservation. The unfortunate corollary may be that demand for pheasant chicks will wane and lead eventually to an imbalance in game bird numbers. Ducklings are so much easi-

er to manage that the change of emphasis is not at all surprising. All ducks were collected by clubs this year at Pol na Muc on June 5 and it was a pleasure to meet Dr. Douglas Butler in the thick of things on the day.

A pheasant rearing video is available to clubs from R.G.C. and the matter of wildlife posters for all our schools is being actively pursued with headquarters. The beautiful new '99 habitat stamps are also available and proceeds from their sale are fed back to clubs in the form of habitat grants towards work done on pond construc-

tion, planted areas and habitat conservation. With a little thought and effort, each club area could support a pond suitable for the rearing of a dozen duckling. Predator control is most important as newly-hatched ducklings are easy prey for the greyback and the mink.

Clubs are asked to make a special effort to have a delegate at the A.G.M. this year. Attendances in the past have been disappointing to the officer board which really needs support and encouragement in its tireless efforts for conservation and wildlife.

Work To Be Carried Out On Ring Water Supply

Waterford County Council is to spend £40,000 in initial attempts to improve the Ring Gaeltacht's water supply. Work on mains in the western part of Ring, from Maoil a' Choirne to Gort na Daiche, will be carried out during the month of August.

Following a meeting with Council officials to confirm the details, Cllr. Fiachra O'Ceilleachair says the work being done will be funded from the Department of the Environment's Small Water Supply Scheme. Although Cllr. O'Ceilleachair

accepts that the work will be a help towards addressing the many difficulties with the quality and quantity of the water supply in the area, he says that a complete overhaul is desired by the local community.

"The pipework in the Ring water supply is old and the 2km of old cast iron mains between Maoil a' Choirne and Gort na Daiche will be replaced by the plastic styled piping which is the case elsewhere in the area. Whereas the quantity issue in this part of the parish may be ad-

dressed by this work, we must be mindful that householders in townlands already served by plastic piping such as Baile na nGall and Helvic have continuously complained about the outdated supply.

Currently a draft report on the Assessment of Needs for Water Services Investment Programme has been prepared for the county with Ring being included in assessment for proposals for a new West Waterford Regional Water Supply Scheme. I will continue to prioritise this issue."

Helvick Lifeboat Launched Twice Over Holiday Weekend

 The craft, named 'Versatility', a Dungarvan owned boat, was reached in just a few minutes shortly before 8 p.m. The lifeboat with its three man crew under helmsman Michael Hayes stood by while temporary repairs were carried out and

then escorted the boat into Dungarvan quayside. Meanwhile, on Sunday, July 31st, the lifeboat came to the assistance of two stranded teenagers near Helvick Cove. The two youths, a boy and a girl, had walked out to the Island, a little rock just off Helvick Cove at low tide.

However the incoming tide quickly cut the couple off from the land. A local fisherman later spotted the two stranded on the rock and raised the alarm. The RNLI Helvick Head Lifeboat under helms-

man Alan Kelly quickly took the teens on board and returned them safely to Helvick pier at around 6 p.m. They were then sufficiently relieved to be able to return to Dungarvan.

 showing the impact of the mast and equipment building along with the backdrop of trees etc.

A map showing all existing RTE masts and their coverage of the whole area was also sought by the Council and information was required as to any proposals to provide additional transmission mast in the area.

The fourth point of information sought by the Council's planning section was clarification as to Coillte felling proposals for the forest plantation at Knocknaree in the immedi-

ate future. The Council will require that planting is maintained as a backdrop for the mast along with suitable screen planting provided to the front and side of the structures to minimise their impact in this area of high visual and scenic amenity. The planting should contain a mixture of evergreen and broadleaf tree types.

Proposals for the extension of ESB service to the site, if applicable was also requested.

On receipt of RTE's reply to these requests, Deputy Deasy said the application will be finalised without delay.

ARDMORE ENTERPRISE CENTRE

Ardmore Enterprise Co-op has been involved in a number of large projects during the past ten years involving state agencies. These include:-

Cliff Path Walk, Ardmore funding support from the National Lottery and Waterford County Council; St. Declan's Way Walk, a long distance walk from Cashel to Ardmore, EU grant aid via Bord Fáilte; Ardmore Tourist Centre, a new tourist office, lifeguard facility and public toilets, grant aid from Waterford Leader Partnership Ltd., Waterford County Council and Department of the Environment.

During the summer months it operates a tourist office including Bureau de Change facilities. It also operates a Local Employment Service office under con-

tract to Waterford Leader Partnership Ltd. This is a service to assist the long term unemployed to find work (and employers to find workers).

Ardmore Enterprise Co-op is very active in lobbying for infrastructural improvements in the parish. Recent examples are the upgrading of the public supply at a cost of £200,000 and the conservation work on the Cathedral and Round Tower at a cost of £50,000. Ardmore Enterprise Co-op has been to the forefront endeavouring to secure a new sewage treatment facility for Ardmore.

This announcement from Ardmore Enterprise Co-op is a request to members and friends of the parish of Ardmore and Grange to be generous and forward looking in relation to the future eco-

nomie and social health of the parish. They are seeking ten year loans on an interest free basis to help this project advance.

This will be a community asset. It will increase local economic activity i.e. more wage packets and spending in shops. It will help to maintain the social fabric of the community. In future years it will act as evidence of the ability of the community to undertake more ambitious community projects. It will prove to outside agencies that the parish has a capacity, will and ability to undertake large community projects successfully.

Everyone within the parish of Ardmore and Grange is now being given the opportunity to advance loans from £50 upwards towards this community project. All such providers of loans will automatically become members of the Enterprise Centre Company, regardless of the size of loan advanced.

The planning application was lodged on June 26, 1999. The grant approvals were finalised by the end of July 1999. The community loan requests will be finalised by the end of August 1999. It is hoped that a contractor will be in place and that work will commence on site in October 1999. The objective is to have the work on Phase 1 completed by May 2000 with hopefully the first tenants in residence by June 2000.

Although specific traffic calming measures will not proceed at Piltown Cross in Kinsalebeg on the main Dungarvan-Youghal N25 road, it has been established that designs for higher standard road incorporating safety features are nearing completion.

In a written response to representations by Cllr. Fiachra O'Ceilleachair, the Waterford County Engineer confirmed a Kinsalebeg realignment project which will include four safety provisions set to address concerns of local residents and regular users of the road. Cllr. O'Ceilleachair feels the Council should proceed sooner rather than later to correct what he has described as one of the most dangerous junctions in the south east.

"I'm glad to report that improvements to both the horizontal and vertical alignments of the N25 road will take place. Alterations to the layout of the existing cross roads junction to provide a preferred 'right-left' type staggered junction will also occur. There are to be significant improvements to sight distance and visibility on all approaches. It is further planned to provide right-turn lanes with ghost islands on the N25 road. Parishioners of Clashmore/Kinsalebeg and Grange/Ardmore have been highlighting the need to improve this very junction for years. It

Chocolate Almond Loaf

Preparation: 15 minutes.

Cooking: 1 hour.

Makes: 10 slices.

- 225g/8 oz butter, softened
- 225g/8 oz caster sugar
- 4 eggs, size 3, lightly beaten
- 100g/4 oz self-raising flour, sifted
- 225g/8 oz ground almonds
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 2 tsp cocoa powder, sifted.

ICING:

- 2 tsp caster sugar
- 100g/4 oz plain chocolate
- 4 tsp blanched almonds, roughly chopped.

Preheat the oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas mark 5. Grease and line the base and sides of a 900g/2lb

loaf tin. Place the butter and sugar in a large bowl. Using a wooden spoon or electric whisk, beat until pale and fluffy. Gradually beat in the eggs. Fold in the flour, ground almonds and baking powder. Divide the cake mixture into two equal quantities. Fold the cocoa powder into one half of mixture. Place alter-

nate spoonfuls of the mixtures in the tin. Pull a teaspoon through a mixture to create a marbled effect.

Bake in the preheated oven until firm to the touch. Allow a loaf to cool in the tin for 20 minutes, then turn out on to a cooling rack and leave to cool completely.

To make the icing, place the sugar, chocolate and 2 tsp water in a small pan. Heat gently until the sugar has dissolved and the chocolate has melted. Beat until smooth. While still warm, spread the icing over the top of the loaf. Sprinkle over the chopped almonds and leave to set.

Household Hints

1. After mincing meat, put a slice of bread through the mincer. It will clean a lot easier.
2. To remove plasticine from your child's clothes rub washing-up liquid into the stain. If the stain is stubborn treat with a grease solvent, rinse, then wash.
3. A light scorch mark can be removed by soaking the area in cold milk as soon as possible.
4. To restore socks to their former whiteness, add a teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda to the water you are washing them in.
5. If you have left something heavy on your carpet and it is flat, you can revive it by leaving an ice cube on the spot overnight. The following day Hoover the carpet using the suction nozzle.
6. To make inexpensive wrapping cord, crochet lengths of wool.
7. To hang your dress on the line, put it on a clothes hanger and tie the hanger to the line with a stocking.
8. When washing a nylon jumper, turn it inside out to prevent snags and damage to the jumper.

Mushroom, Leek and Potato Bake

- 4 tsp olive oil
- 1 onion, peeled and chopped
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 (397g/14 oz) can chopped tomatoes
- 1 tsp fresh chopped oregano or tsp dried
- 175g/6 oz flat mushrooms, wiped and thickly sliced
- 3 medium leeks, washed and thickly sliced
- 900g/2 lb potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced
- 100g/4 oz feta cheese, crumbled
- 50g/2 oz butter.

METHOD

Butter a large ovenproof casserole. Heat 1 tsp oil in a pan and add the garlic and onion. Cook for 3 minutes until softened.

Add the tomatoes and simmer for 10 minutes. Stir in the oregano. Season. Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas mark 6.

Heat the remaining oil in a frying pan and saute the mushrooms until lightly browned. Cook the leeks in boiling salted water for 5 minutes until tender. Drain.

Line the casserole with a layer of sliced potatoes. Top with the leeks and mushrooms. Season, then top with another layer of potatoes. Mix the feta cheese with the tomato sauce and spread on top of the potatoes. Finish with a neat layer of overlapping potato slices. Dot with butter and bake for 45-60 minutes, until golden brown.

Prune and Almond Tart

Preparation: 25 minutes + Chilling
Cooking: 45 minutes
Serves: 6.

- 225g/8 oz puff pastry, thawed if frozen
- 100g/4 oz caster sugar
- Juice of 1 orange
- 450g/1 lb no-need-to-soak dried prunes
- 1 cinnamon stick, broken in half
- 50g/2 oz blanched almonds
- 2 tsp clear honey
- Beaten egg for glazing
- Orange zest to decorate
- Yoghurt or cream sprinkled with cinnamon to serve.

Roll out the pastry on a floured surface to a 15 x

25cm/6 x 10in rectangle. Cut a 2.5cm/1in border. Lift out the inner rectangle and the border.

Lift whole rectangle onto a baking sheet. Brush the edges with water. Gently lift and place the border on top. Chill for 30 minutes.

Preheat oven to 220°C/425°F/Gas mark 7. Meanwhile, put 75g/3 oz of the sugar into a pan with the orange juice and 150ml/1/4 pt water. Heat gently to dissolve the sugar.

Add the prunes and cinnamon and simmer gently for 20 minutes until the

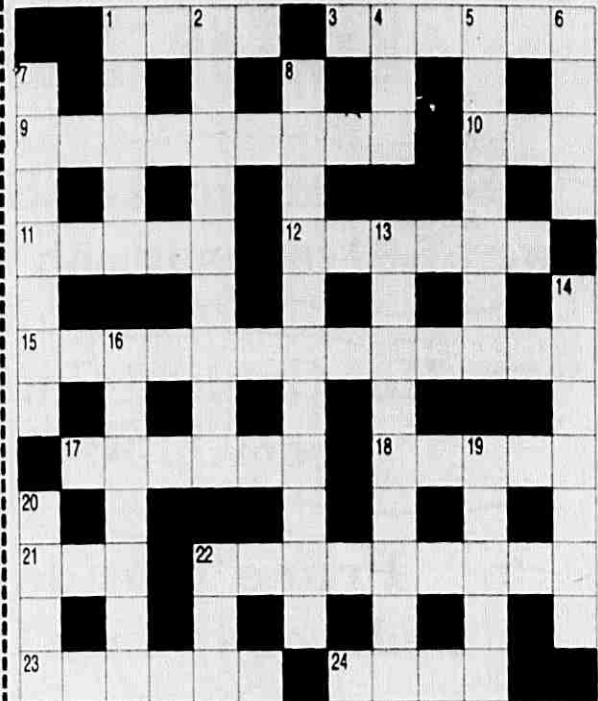
prunes are plump. Stir in the almonds and honey. Leave until cold. Using a sharp knife, score a criss-cross pattern on the border of the pastry rectangle and brush with beaten egg.

Sprinkle border with remaining sugar. Bake the pastry for 15-20 minutes until well risen and golden brown. Leave until cold.

To assemble, place the pastry case on a serving board and spoon in the prune mixture (discard the cinnamon sticks). Decorate with the orange zest and serve with yoghurt or cream sprinkled with cinnamon.

Have A Rest And Mow The Lawn!

IF there's one thing we loathe about gardening, it's got to be mowing the lawn. But thanks to new technology from the people at Friendly Machines UK Limited, that could all be a thing of the past as Robomow hits the shops.

Robomow is a robotic lawnmower, described by its creators as "the 'friendly', operator-free machine, which boasts the world's most advanced technology, enabling it to provide the best features of conventional operator-controlled mowers".

Super-intelligent technology instructs the mower to cut an entire lawn — including edges; produce perfect lines; recycle the cut grass; and recognise and avoid obstacles such as flower beds and garden furniture. And there are no complicated instructions to follow every time.

After a simple set-up procedure has been completed (either by you or your supplier), the world's first garden robot will cut grass to a height of 20mm to 50mm in a garden of up to 600 square metres.

Robomow weighs 55 kilos — that's about the same as an average lawnmower — and measures just 108cm long, 60cm wide and 43cm high.

The mower gets its power from two 12v sealed rechargeable batteries so it is safer than a conventional electric mower because there is no danger of running over leads and getting electrocuted.

The batteries will charge overnight on the fast-charging option. This has many advantages — it's cheaper because the mower isn't constantly running on electricity, and environmentally friendly because it doesn't use expendable fuels.

This Week in the Garden

SOW STOCKS FOR THE GREENHOUSE
 Make sowings of both Beauty of Nice and Brompton stocks for flowering in pots in the greenhouse. The Beauty of Nice will bloom from Christmas until February or March, while the Brompton stocks will follow on in late spring.

Sow very thinly in well drained trays filled with John Innes seed compost or equivalent and germinate in a frame, shading until the seedlings appear. Prick off or pot the seedlings separately as soon as they have two true leaves each.

POT FREESIAS FOR EARLY FLOWERING
 Provided the corms are ripened, the earlier freesias can be potted the better. The beginning of August is usually about as soon as you can buy the corms, so if you want a supply of flowers for Christmas put up some now in 13cm pots. You can place six corms in one pot.

Sow in a peat-based compost. Bury the corms 2.5cm deep and stand the pots in a frame. Water moderately and shade from direct sunlight.

POT LACHENALIAS
 Lachenalias for winter flowering in the greenhouse should also be potted or placed in hanging baskets, a delightful method of growing these beautiful South African bulbs. The method of culture in pots is the same as for freesias.

If you are going to grow them in hanging baskets, the basket must be well-lined with moss and then some of the bulbs placed at the bottom and around the sides of the basket as well as on top. Hang the baskets up in a cool place for the time being and water them moderately.

PRUNE SUMMER FRUITING RASPBERRIES
 By now the summer fruiting raspberries will have finished cropping and the sooner they are pruned, the better. Cut out, right to ground level, all the canes that have just fruited, and train in the young canes in their place.

SOUTH EAST ICMSA NEWS

ICMSA SETS OUT KEY DEMANDS FOR NEW NATIONAL AGREEMENT

It was stated that farmers would only support a balanced and fair new National Partnership agreement. National partnerships have provided a strong foundation for the unprecedented economic growth but this economic success has not lifted farmers incomes. This was stated by Mr. Frank Allen, President of the ICMSA at the plenary meeting of Social Partners in Dublin Castle which met to review the current Partnership 2000 Agreement.

While complimenting the Taoiseach and the Minister for Agriculture on the outcome to Agenda 2000, Mr. Allen said that there would be major downward pressure on farmers incomes over the next eight years of CAP.

Against this background Mr. Allen said that ICMSA had two key demands for any new National Agreement. The first ICMSA demand is that farm incomes should increase in real terms in line with income increases in the other sectors of the economy. Mr. Allen said that there were various means how this can be done by the Government within the constraints of the CAP.

"Farmers will not buy into a new partnership deal if they are faced with further income reductions while the Celtic Tiger roars ahead. There must be a balanced sharing of the fruits of national economic success," stated Mr. Allen.

The other demand set out by Mr. Allen was the need for tax incentives for investment in agriculture and for increased public expenditure on rural development. Mr. Allen was critical of the delay in publishing the White Paper on Rural Development and called for this to be published immediately so that it can be fully discussed in advance of the finalisation of the National Development Plan.

ICMSA CALL ON GOVERNMENT TO DECLARE POSITION ON LOCAL DEVELOPMENT GROUPS

Mr. Maurice Harvey, Chairman of ICMSA's Rural Development Committee, speaking after a meeting of the committee, said the Government should immediately state their intention for the future of the many local development groups throughout the country which have done much valuable work to promote rural development and halt the decline in the rural population since their establishment. The work of these groups, a lot of which is voluntary, Mr. Harvey said, can be seen in every country in Ireland and it has meant that many rural enterprises and rural families have managed to survive and prosper in their own areas.

Now the future of these groups is under threat due to a failure of the Government to declare its plans for rural development into the next century. This is creating huge uncertainty for the staff and voluntary people involved in these groups. Many experienced highly skilled workers who have contributed hugely to the development of rural areas will be lost unless the Government immediately declares its position. Properly funded local development initiatives are very important to the future of rural Ireland.

Waterford IFA Livestock Chairman Says Agenda 2000 Rules Must Be Kept Simple

Speaking at a recent meeting of Waterford IFA Co. Executive Waterford IFA Livestock Chairman, Tom Leahy said the new rules on implementation of the Agenda 2000 proposals in the beef and livestock sector must be kept simple and avoid additional bureaucracy and red tape on premium applications for producers. Mr. Leahy said IFA is demanding that the CMMS (Computerised Monitoring Movement System) must be in place and fully operational by January 1st 2000. He said this system will avoid the necessity for farmers having to make applications for extensification premium and the new slaughter premium from next year.

Mr. Leahy said the new rules on Agenda 2000 are currently being discussed by the Department of Agriculture with the EU Commission in Brussels. He said IFA is adamant that the new system for extensification premium qualification avoids more red tape and bureaucracy being imposed on farmers. He said "The proposed system involving five census dates and farmers having to make application for extensification premium is way too complex. If the Department of Agriculture introduce CMMS from January 1

2000 as promised by Minister Walsh, it will not be necessary for farmers to make applications for the new premiums. This approach will also avoid additional inspections and penalties being imposed on producers."

The Dungarvan Livestock farmer pointed out that IFA is also demanding that the retention period for the new slaughter premium be kept to a minimum. He said "IFA have proposed that Ireland should have an option of a one day retention period for the new slaughter premium. This is the only way to maximise cattle price competition and leave mart sales as an option for finished cattle disposals by farmers."

On the livestock trade for the remainder of the year, Mr. Leahy said to date an additional 250,000 head of cattle have been disposed of compared to this time last year. In addition, he said the fodder situation is much improved on last year and market prospects look a lot stronger. He said "The live export trade, particularly for younger stock, to continental Europe is very active at present. To date this year Ireland has exported 100,000 head of cattle more than this time last year to EU markets. With the new roll on/roll off ferry operating out of Cork directly to France, this trade should remain strong."



The Science of Farming and Food

COPING WITH GRASS SHORTAGE

Grass is getting scarce on many farms at present. It is essential to determine how serious the problem is before any action is taken.

Check Grass Height

If average grass height falls below 5cm (2") then grass intake will be restricted and performance will suffer. If the average grass height is at least 7 - 8cm (3") then animal performance should be satisfactory. Assess the height of the butt of grass rather than any stemmy material present. Grass dry matter is very high (up to 23%) at present therefore the volume of grass required to maintain performance is lower than normal. Grass heights should be checked in the following:-

In the fields/paddocks that have already been grazed in this cycle.

In the fields/paddocks where animals are currently grazing.

In the fields/paddocks that have not yet been grazed in this cycle.

If the average grass height is below 5cm (2") over most of the grazing area, there is a serious shortage of grass at present. Rotation length must be maintained at 25 days otherwise grass shortage will be worsened and prolonged.

Recommendations if Grass is Very Scarce

The main options for coping with grass scarcity are:-

Reduce stocking pressure.

Beef cattle that are at, or very near, finish should be sold off now.

Increase the grazing area.

Supplement with roughage. Big bale silage or hay are ideal for supplementing stock.

Supplement with concentrates. Concentrates should only be fed to priority stock at this stage.

Dairy cows: Feed 3.0 - 4.0 kgs. per head per day.

Calves: Feed 1.0 - 1.5 kgs per head per day.

Finishing cattle: Feed 3.0 - 4.0 kgs per head per day.

Store cattle: Stores will have a chance to compensate later. Do not feed meals for the present. Feed roughage if necessary.

Suckler cows: Do not feed concentrates at present. Very thin cows should be supplemented with roughage if grass is very scarce.

Suckled calves: Introduce creep feed to the calves and build up to about 1.0 kgs - 1.5 kgs concentrates per head per day.

Type of Ration: Any good energy supplement (cereals, pulp, molasses). Shop around for the best value and price.

Other Points

Apply nitrogen fertiliser (CAN) if rain is forecast.

Do not top pastures too close or it will slow the regrowth. For maximum utilisation let cattle eat any top-pings.

Ensure that all stock have access to an adequate supply of fresh drinking water.

TILLAGE

Pre Harvest Scutch Control

Trials at Oakpark have shown pre-harvest scutch control to be better than stubble treatment. This is because the regrowth can be uneven and because the stubble treatment is often left too late. Spraying conditions and plant uptake deteriorate after the end of October.

Apply Glyphosate when the cereal grain has less than 30% moisture content. This coincides with the 'hard dough' stage of grain maturity and a thumb-nail impression will remain on the grain. This should occur 10 - 15 days prior to harvest.

Glyphosate will also control other problem weeds such as Volunteer Potatoes, Thistle, Docks etc. The rate of Glyphosate depends on the weed density and weed flora. With more than 14 Glyphosate products on the market ranging from 180g/l to 480g/l concentration, remember to adjust the rate applied, depending on the concentration of the product. Treatment of milling and malting varieties is permitted but seed crops should not be treated.

He was also an officer of the club for many years.

A kind and loving husband and father his good wife Madge and his family of seven four boys and three girls were his pride and joy. A wonderful neighbour, his integrity, courtesy and outgoing sincere nature commended him to young and old alike. He was a true gentleman in every sense of the word and a host of friends who appreciated his company, advice or assistance in any way now mourn his passing. 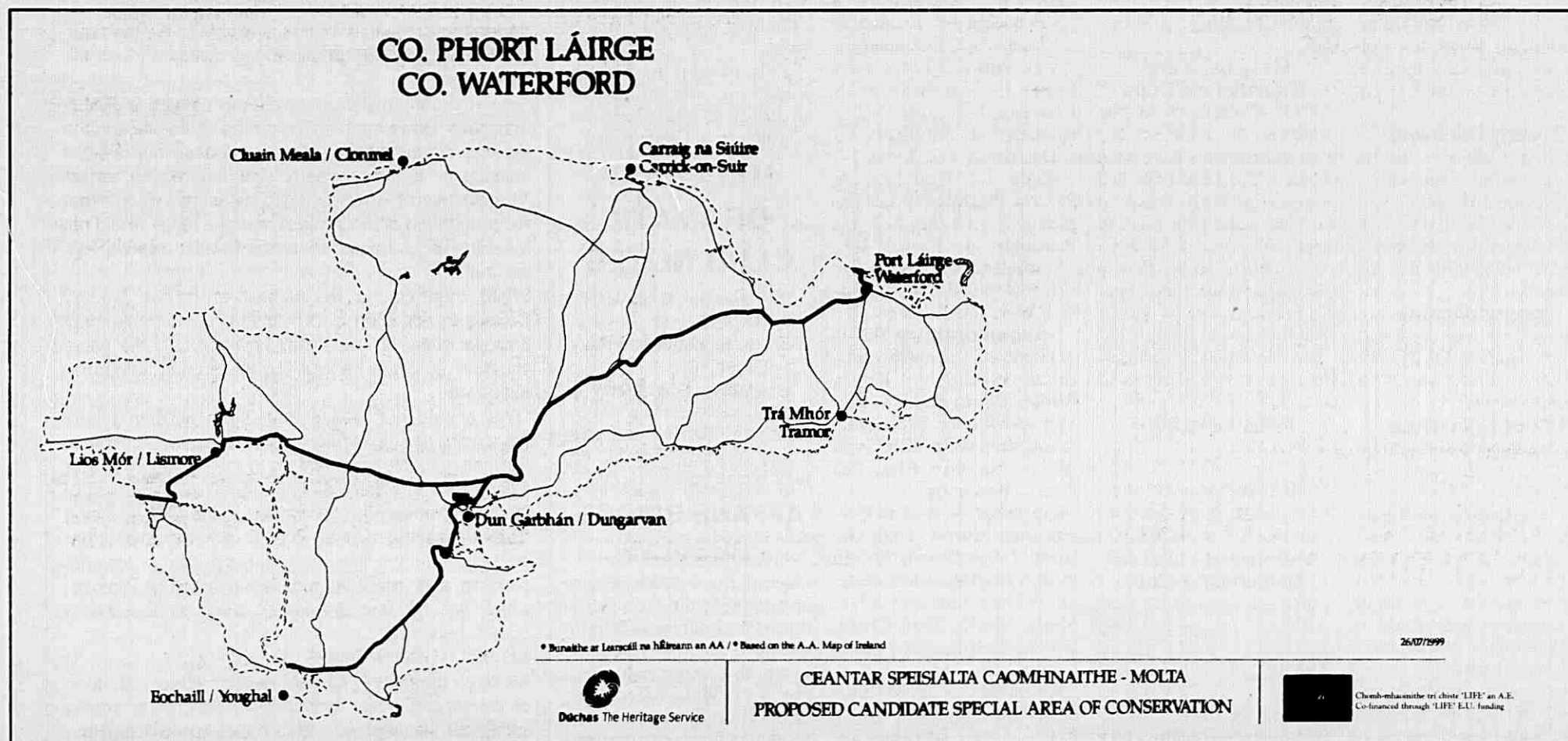

Munster Trout Council Demand Closure Of Dungarvan Dump

The Munster Regional Trout Angling Council has demanded the immediate closure and full reinstatement of the refuse dump at Ballinamuck, Dungarvan. The dump, which has warranted severe criticism in the past, is in close proximity to the Colligan river, one of the richest salmon and trout rivers in the country. Local angling interests are adamant that leachate leaks from the dump have the potential to destroy all fish life in the river. Leachate is the toxic substance that forms during the breakdown of rubbish in the soil.

A Waste Management Strategy Study commissioned by the County Council recommends the provision of a new waste disposal facility and claims that the current dump facility at Dungarvan no longer has any application today and indeed is not allowable under the EU Directive on the Landfill of Waste which requires all landfills to be of the 'containment' type with composite lining.

SITUATION CANNOT CONTINUE

In a hard hitting statement last week, the provincial angling body accused Waterford County Council of hypocrisy and double standards on environmental issues, particularly in view of the fact that the Council was recently allocated £6,500 for use in increasing public education and awareness of the environmental damage caused by litter pollution.

Barry McCarthy, Hon Secretary of the Munster Regional Trout Angling Council said they fully support the concerns expressed by the local angling groups relating to the Dungarvan landfill at Ballinamuck.

"Indeed from the information available to us, the present situation cannot be allowed to continue", said Mr. McCarthy.

"The environmental damage already caused is difficult to assess. However, both the nature of the site and the manner in which it has developed does not make it suitable for future use as a 'safe' landfill", he added. "Irrespective of what remedial measures were either recommended or put in place, the end result would not meet the requirements of relevant waste disposal legislation".

While appreciating the difficulties of the County Council in acquiring or providing proper containment disposal sites, Mr. McCarthy however said the same situation must now be faced by many other authorities nationwide.

"This should not relieve them from accepting their responsibilities in relation to the present situation at Ballinamuck. We have written to the County Manager asking for immediate closure and full reinstatement of the site. We have further written to the EPA licensing division seeking refusal of a licence for any further operations at the site, and their assistance towards ongoing and intensive monitoring following closure, which will be required for a considerable time to come", he stated.

NO SOLUTION IN SIGHT

Although the County Council is at an advanced stage of planning a major landfill in the county, it seems inevitable that vigorous local opposition will turn the project into a protracted and acrimonious saga.

With dramatically increasing volumes of waste to contend with and new EU regulations which frown severely on the Dungarvan dump, a solution in the form of a highly engineered landfill is being sought by the County Council and City Corporation to cater for the needs of the county and city for the next 25 years.

On the completion of this multi million pound project, the Council intends to close the dump at Ballinamuck and reinstate the site to its former state. Council officials have acknowledged that that the dump in Dungarvan is less than satisfactory and has outlived its usefulness but it must continue to operate until the county landfill becomes a reality.

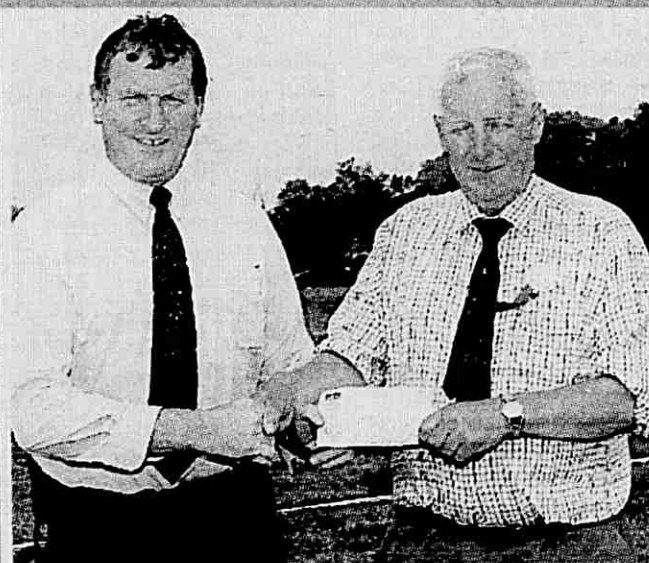

Abbeyside Topics

INNER HARBOUR PART OF ABBEYSIDE

The inner harbour is part of the mind set of many Abbeyside people who have always been interested in the condition of the harbour itself and down through the years it has been a recreational facility for a certain number of people whether it be sailing, boating, swimming and fishing. Recently, Fine Gael councillor, John Deasy, has called on the town's UDC to provide funding for the dredging of the local harbour from its own coffers.

"The longer we wait on this, the greater the opportunity that's being lost. The harbour is our biggest amenity".

He said that since 1997, the Urban Council has spent £100,000 on improving the channel and consultant's reports. He said the cost of dredging the inner harbour (which he estimated at £250,000 - £300,000 was equivalent to the cost of a new house at Land's End in Abbeyside. It was totally unacceptable to keep long-fingering the problem. "Another summer has passed us by. It's come to the point where rather than waiting any longer in the hope of getting funding from somewhere we should dig deep ourselves".

However, County Manager, Donal Connolly, said it wasn't "as simple as that", with a plethora of environmental legislation to be complied with before any physical work could be done on the harbour.

He said a number of options had been examined and revised proposals were being awaited from consultants, Malone O' Regan and he hoped to have these for the September meeting of the council. A submission for funding had been made to both the Department of the Marine and the Department of the Environment, he added.

ABBEYSIDE STAND

The condition of the strand at Abbeyside which was particularly noticeable during the fine summer weather recently, has been highlighted by Cllr. Nuala Ryan.

Speaking to the 'Leader', Cllr. Ryan said she has brought the matter to the attention of Council officials. She was approached by a

number of concerned parents who said they noticed a layer of scum forming on the water's edge at the popular strand and later had to shower their children as a result.

Cllr. Ryan also pointed to the problem of abandoned shopping trolleys on the beach and the accumulation of stones on what was once a sandy area of the strand.

SIGNPOSTING TO BALLINROAD

Recently two new signposts have been erected on the N25 and at 'Droichidin an Uisce' indicating the correct direction to the growing village of Ballinroad. The sign on the N25 was erected at the junction beyond Tarr's Bridge and is also the right turn to be taken off the N25 if the motorist wants to go to Dungarvan Golf Club. The Irish version of Ballinroad used on the signposts is open to contradiction for the name 'Baile an Rodaigh' should in fact be 'Baile an Róid'.

In Patrick's S. Power's "The Placenames of the Deise" the translation given for the townland of Ballinroad is 'Baile an Róid'. Baile an Róid states Mr. Power means the "Home-

stead of the Road. Bóthar is the ordinary word for road, the use of Rod being largely confined to poetry. Rod, however, seems to be not a borrowed, but a true Irish word and the English 'road' a derivation thereof. The Celts were, in fact the great road builders of pre-Roman Europe".

(The area of Ballinroad townland; 66 acres).

On consulting Dineen's dictionary 1927 we find Rod = road, route, line of way, a roadstead, anchorage or mooring place for boats.

Hence the evidence points that the wording on the two signposts involved should be 'Baile an Róid' and not 'Baile an Rodaigh'.

URBAN COUNCIL MEETING TIT-BITS

Planning approval was granted to Liam and Josephine Morrissey, Ballinclammer, Ballinacourty for 47 houses at Skehacrine, Abbeyside.

Cllr. Lar Hart proposed that the Council replace the front doors to houses in Kyne Park, Abbeyside. He said the doors were of an inferior quality from day one and asked that the Council replace them now or provide for their replacement in next years budget.

"If it is not possible to do them all together, I would like to see them done on a phased basis", he added. His proposal was seconded by Cllr. Nuala Ryan who requested that windows in the estate also be included.

NURSING HOME AT BURGERY

Rybo Partnership of Dublin have been granted permission for the erection of a 52 bed 2 storey nursing home and ancillary buildings as well as access of the N25 on a site opposite the entrance to the Duckspool Road at Parkatluggera, Abbeyside.

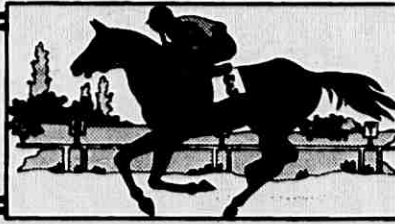

He has however, decided not to appeal the decision of the Worcester stewards last Saturday where he was stood down for three days for easing down prematurely upon 9/4 favourite Galix. Galix finished sixth after the champion jockey stopped riding as his mount appeared to tire before the last hurdle. I saw a replay of this race last Monday and had McCoy kept punishing his mount, fourth place was the best place the could achieve. In my opinion a three day ban was rather harsh under the circumstances and a warning would have been sufficient punishment.

TONY'S BAN

Any Irish trainers contemplating booking top jockey Tony McCoy for any of their charges at Tramore's upcoming festival of racing will have to make alternative arrangements as Tony received a four day ban for a whip offence at Bangor last Friday. The ban runs from August 8th to August 14th so that in fact means that A.P. McCoy could ride on the final day of the festival on August 15th, should his services be required.

The racecard stated that last Saturday night's meeting was a benefit meeting in aid of Glenmore G.A.A. Club but the bookmakers should also have been included with the word benefit as only two clear favourites obliged on the night. The punters were left licking their wounds after the featured first round heats of the M. A. Molloy Munster Oaks winner £2,500 which saw the shock elimination of Sporting Press Oaks runner-up Metric Flower in a four runner heat three.

More about that qualifier later as we concentrate on heat one where a fast starting Ballinclare Star (Adraville Bridge - Mount Leinster Star) 3/1 made every post a winning one in a speedy 28.99. Ticket Allocation Reduced

Because work on the erection of the new Canal End Stand is well behind schedule, there will be reduced accommodation at Headquarters for the All Ireland finals in both codes and as a result there will be an all-round reduction of ten per cent in the allocation of tickets to counties, including the participants. This cut will be restored next year, when it is expected that there will be an increase in the normal allocation.

New National Football League

The groupings for the football league which commences in October, have undergone a change and Waterford are now grouped with Carlow, Wexford, Cavan, Longford, Tipperary, Monaghan and Laois.

Dates and venues will not be announced until September.

Waterford Take On Meath In Junior Football All Ireland

One way or another history will be made at Portlaoise on Saturday next when Waterford play in their first ever All Ireland junior football All Ireland final. As I wrote previously, junior football is not a high profile grade, but it is a big occasion for a county like Waterford who will have waited for exactly a century to play in our second All Ireland final in football.

Everywhere in the county the progress of the footballers has aroused interest and now it is confidently predicted that the crowd following Waterford up to Portlaoise on Saturday will be far greater than that which went to the Munster and All-Ireland semi-final two weeks ago. With the Royal county, Meath as our opponents, not everyone will fancy our prospects of taking this title. With so many senior and junior football All Irelands under their belts, they must be regarded as very strong favourites to defeat Waterford. Sean Boylan hinted that a couple of weaknesses on the side which defeated Dublin in the Leinster final last Sunday may have to be mended and this in itself will provide plenty of motivation for the juniors who will see the junior final as a possible gateway to early fame.

They have won the title on five or six occasions, the first being in 1947 and the last in 1988. The first three victories were against London and as far as I understand, they have never won against a Munster team (most of the Munster teams were either Cork or Kerry).

Brendan Cummins, who is the Meath PRO, told me over the weekend that Meath are a pretty good outfit and are expecting to win. He said they were in sparkling form against Warwickshire in the semi-final. He said they knew nothing at all about Waterford, but were surprised that they beat Roscommon. I got the feeling, rightly or wrongly, that losing to Waterford would be an embarrassment to Meath (as was the case with us when we lost to Kerry in senior hurling).

So, it would appear that we are going into this All Ireland as rank outsiders. It is good to have it that way as with nothing to lose we are under no pressure and that is the way it will suit a team with no All Ireland final experience. Of course we must not forget that we took the field as outsiders against Cork, Clare and Roscommon and came off winners on all occasions!

It must also be acknowledged that the team is improving with every game and is now a far more settled side than that which beat Cork in Dungarvan ten weeks ago. In the Munster final and in the semi-final the improved team work was a noticeable factor in shaping our victories. The team, too, are playing with great confidence and the manner in which they came from behind to overpower Roscommon, is an example of this.

SCORING POWER

In the four matches played so far in the championship Waterford have earned themselves a respectable scoring record and the total of 5-40 is the best in the championship so far. Also, it is an important factor that most of our 'firepower' is in the full forward line as 5-21 was scored by the three inside men. Ten players, including all the forwards have shared in the scoring as follows: Jacko Kiely, 3-4 (13) P. P. Ferncombe (0-13), Derek Wyse (2-4) (10), Connie Power (0-6), Tony Corcoran (0-5), Kevin Walsh (0-3), Shane Bergin (0-2), Bobby Lyons, David Whelan and Peter Queally (0-1 each).

So far the team has scored a total of 5-40 and have conceded 1-35. This is a good scoring record for four championship games.

TEAM CHANGES

The team has undergone several changes since the campaign began against Cork in Fraher Field on May 23rd. Each round has seen changes and the line out for the Munster final saw a total of six changes in personnel from the Cork game.

The team selected for the final is the same as that which started against Roscommon, except for a positional switch in attack.

Alfie Kirwan has been Kilrossanty senior goalkeeper for several years. He is very experienced, played in all four matches so far and won the Munster campaign without conceding a single goal. He is captain.

David Ryan is one of the younger players on the team, has great experience, holds county championship medals with the Nire and is a versatile player. He played at left wing back in the first match.

Roger Power is another big name in the Kilrossanty club. He has much senior experience. He is son of Jimineen, one of the Waterford side who disposed of Kerry in the 1957 championship.

Michael Byrne is one of the two Gardai on the team. A very strong defender and is the holder of senior championships with the Nire.

Nial Geary — one of our regular senior intercounty players. He is playing his football with Nemo Rangers in Cork. Missed the first two games.

Pat Walsh — This dual intercounty player who has helped the Nire win county championships, was introduced after the Cork game. A great defender.

Alan Reynolds — The experienced Tramore man started off at centre half back and is playing great football on the wing.

Shane Bergin — Missed the first game, proved himself in the Munster final and against Roscommon.

Peter Queally came into the team in the Munster final when his powerful display was a factor in swinging the game in our favour. Also a dual intercounty player, he scored a vital point against Roscommon. He plays with Sarsfields in Cork.

Connie Power — Who will forget his three splendid points in the Munster final against Clare? He is the fourth Nire man on the side. He was a substitute on the opening match against Cork. A great score poacher.

Kevin Walsh — Proud to represent Kilgobnet, Kevin's displays in all four games has made him a strong force in attack. He has occupied the centre forward berth in all games. He is son of former county board treasurer James and so far he has contributed 3 points to our total.

David Whelan — The Sliabh gCua player missed out on the first match, and has been a tower of strength in attack since being introduced. Very unlucky not to have scored a goal against Roscommon, but nevertheless contributed in a big way to the team victory.

P. P. Ferncombe — His record stands out and speaks for itself. The three senior football titles won with Dungarvan is the basis for his great experience. His 13 points makes him joint leader in the scoring charts for this championship. His contribution so far has been monumental.

Jacko Kiely — He has been very good all through and

his inspiring display and his two goals against Roscommon have been major factors in taking us into this All Ireland. Jacko is the third Kilrossanty man to hold a pivotal position on the team.

Derek Wyse — The only man from the county champions club on the team and his contribution to our success so far can be measured by his contribution of 2-4 of our total. Derek scored a vital goal against Cork in the opening round and also had a major against Limerick

THE RESULT?

Having defeated Cork, Limerick, Clare and a Roscommon side who had already disposed of Mayo, Leitrim and Galway, they must be in there with a strong chance, regardless of the reputation of Meath.

In my opinion, the result as far as we are concerned, will depend on our approach and attitude to the game on the day. If these are right and if we treat it as just another game, then there is no reason why we cannot expect to beat Meath.

OTHER FIXTURES

Because the All Ireland is on Saturday, only a very modest programme is scheduled for the coming weekend on the home front.

Tonight three minor football ties will be played. Two are first round replays. Abbeyside and St. Olivers, who drew at Bushy Park, will replay their game at the Dungarvan Club grounds and the Nire And Ardmore will settle their problems at Fraher Field.

Affane and Kilgobnet will meet in their postponed minor football game and in minor hurling Ballyduff will meet Naomh Brid. In junior football, Ballinacourty will play Dungarvan.

The whole policy of postponing or deferring matches because the county is involved in championship action is something that will have to be seriously examined by the County Board. There is little sense in the County Board or the GAC bending over backwards trying to accommodate teams if the decision is to be flouted by individual players involved. No marks to the two junior football players who lined out in a pub league game on Friday night last after the county board postponing a full round of championship games to safeguard the players. This has certainly undermined the entire policy which must now be examined before any similar embarrassing situations arise.

BALLYGUNNER V. ERIN'S OWN

Erin's Own played very well against Tallow here in Fraher Field and deserved their 2 goals winning margin. Writing about that match, I wrote that had the day been fine, a different result might have obtained. Damien Byrne, Noel Kelly, David Robinson and a few other players gave strength to Tallow's challenge but in the over all Erin's Own would not match the skill of Tallow. 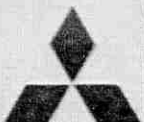

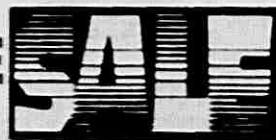
