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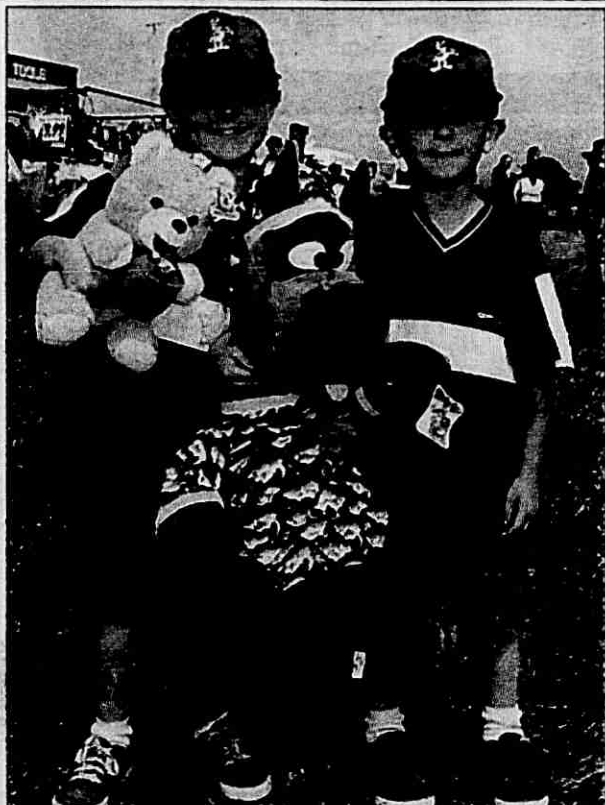

West Waterford Receives Boost as Gourmet Region

West Waterford's drive to become a gourmet region has received a boost in a

positive report by Georgina Campbell, Chairwoman of the Irish Food Writers Guild.

Her report for the West Waterford Good Food Tree this year shows an improvement across the board on a range of criteria including quality of food, use of fresh ingredients, welcome and hospitality, service, menu presentation and value for money.

Georgina Campbell is consultant to the West Waterford Good Food Tree, an innovative initiative which aims to promote the area as a good food region by producing an annual guide to quality eating in West Waterford, and by developing standards in local pubs, restaurants and hotels.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I start college as a mature student in October 1999. Could you give me some information in relation to higher education grants for mature students?

ANSWER

Higher Education Maintenance Grants are payable by your Local Authority. To be eligible for a Higher Education Grant you must be at least 23 years of age and will be subject to a means test. Your course must be a full-time undergraduate course of not less than two years duration or a full-time postgraduate course of not less than one year duration pursued in one of the approved institutions (you will get a list of approved institutions from the Department of Education).

In assessing means for Higher Education Grants mature students are assessed either as an independent candidate or as dependent candidate. An independent mature candidate is one who was not ordinarily resident with his/her parents from 1st October 1998. A mature dependent candidate is one who was ordinarily resident with his/her parents from 1st October, 1998.

The rate of grant is generally determined in relation to distance from the college and full or part maintenance grant will be payable at either adjacent or non-adjacent rates. (adjacent grant is payable when normal residence is 15 miles or less from the college which the student will attend).

However, the recently published Higher Education Grant Scheme 1999 states that the non-adjacent rate of maintenance grant will be payable to all mature students who qualify, whether they are assessed either as a dependent or independent mature candidate.

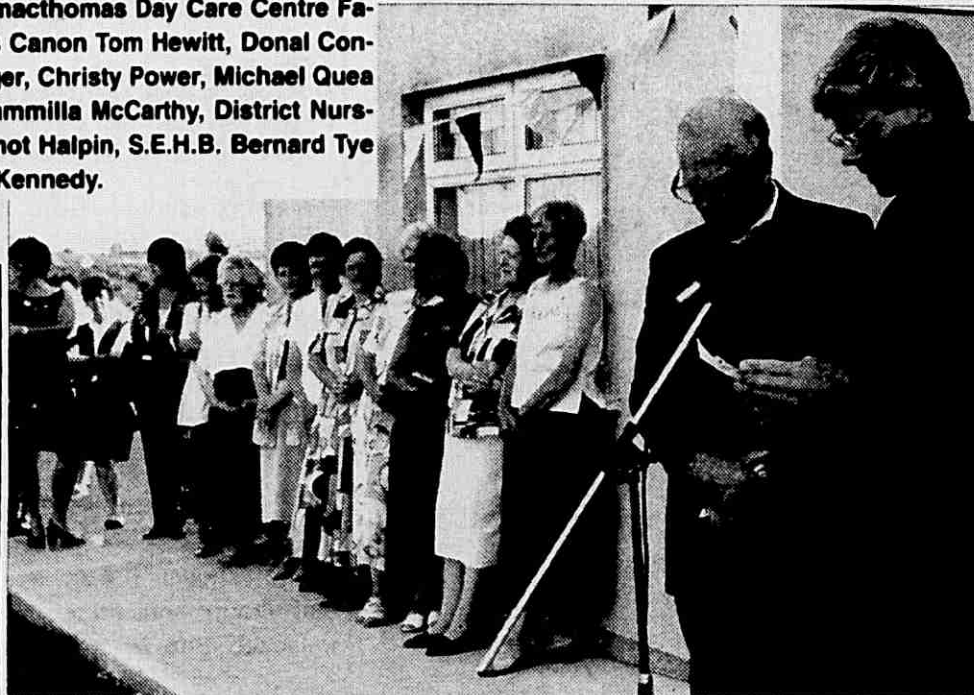
Grant applications for all students should be made on the official application form which is available from the Local Authority. The completed form must be received by the Local Authority not later than 6th August, 1999. The Local Authority may however accept an application which is not received on time and may, at its own absolute discretion, treat such application as if it had been received on time.

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Protest To Minister For Sport

A motion of protest to the Minister for Sport and Recreation Mr. Jim McDaid with regard to the low allocation of Lotto Funding provided for sporting organisation in the South East was proposed by Oliver Clery P.D. Cllr Waterford Corporation and seconded by Cllr. R. Alyward, Kilkenny Co. Council and passed by the South East Regional Authority at their meeting in Clonmel last Monday 26th July. Cllr. Clery stated that the £1.24 million for 400,000 people in the South East was the lowest funding of any region and less than that allocated counties - Dublin, Cork, Galway, Donegal, Kildare and Limerick.

This continued neglect of the voluntary sporting organisations in the South East is not acceptable.

He now calls on Government to form an Independent Body outside Ministerial control to allocate this funding on an open and transparent basis.

ANSWER

Each year the members as owners of the Credit Union elect a Board of Directors from among the membership to run the Credit Union until the next Annual General Meeting.

In addition, the members also elect a Supervisory Committee, whose responsibility it is to check the books of the Credit Union and evaluate its operation, and an independent Auditor to audit the annual accounts and report on same to the members at the Annual General Meeting.



Following the Annual General Meeting the newly appointed board elects a Chairman, Secretary, Vice Chairman and Treasurer as officers for the year ahead. It is also elects various sub-committees to carry out specific tasks, e.g. Credit Committee (To consider Loan Applications), Promotions Committee, Membership Committee, Delinquency Committee, Insurance Officer and Money Laundering Reporting Officer.

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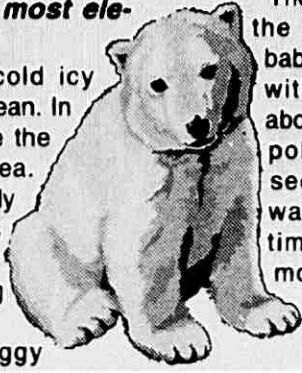
Junior Encyclopaedia

Polar Bears

POLARS BEARS are one of the biggest and strongest animals in the world. Standing on its back legs, a polar bear is taller than most elephants.

They live on the cold icy shores of the Arctic ocean. In winter they live where the pack-ice meets the sea. Polar bears feed mainly on meat. It catches seal by creeping over the ice and pouncing on it.

It has a thick, shaggy



coat and a layer of fat under his skin to keep him warm. Hairs on the bottom of his feet stop him sliding about on the ice.

The females dig dens in the snow to have their babies in. The cubs stay with their mother for about ten months. Baby polar bears do not seem to like the cold water at first. By the time they are six months old, they are expert swimmers and follow their

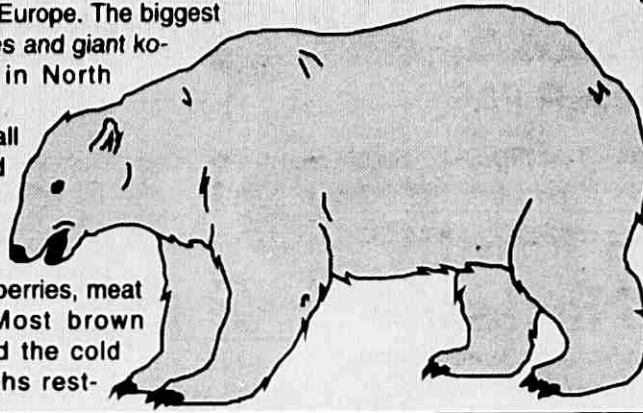
mother about in the water.

BROWN BEARS

Brown bears are found in Asia and parts of Europe. The biggest ones, grizzlies and giant Kodiaks, live in North America.

Bears eat all kinds of food - fruit, ants, roots, honey from wild bees nests, berries, meat and fish. Most brown bears spend the cold winter months rest-

ing. They find a quiet, warm spot such as a cave or hollow tree to live in or they dig dens



in the earth.

Some of the female bears wake up in January or February to have their young. The tiny cubs are blind when born, have no teeth and hardly any hair.

The mother bear and her cubs leave the den when the weather is still quite cold. They play together in the snow and slide down slopes. The mother is very watchful over her cubs and stays with them happily as they play. She also teaches them to catch fish.

Dog Warden Inspections Throughout West Waterford

As seen in last week's edition of the 'Leader', the dog wardens are now carrying out inspections throughout West Waterford including Abbeyside, Ardmore, Lisimore, Cappoquin, Ring, Tallo, Dungarvan, Ballymacarbry and all surrounding areas. During these inspections, the wardens will issue a £25 on-the-spot fine to any owner of an unlicensed dog.

Dog warden Ollie Walsh, who is inspecting this area over the coming few weeks told the 'Leader' that there is a considerable number of stray and unlicensed dogs in the county. Likewise many unwanted dogs are still being dumped by their owners while other pets are left to run free in public places such as beaches.

"The Tour de France last year was excellent in promoting public awareness of unlicensed and stray dogs",

said Ollie. "Since then however the level has dropped but we have now started a major campaign to ensure that owners licence their dogs, keep an ID collar on them and keep them on a leash when in a public place".

STRICT REGULATIONS

In addition to the area based inspections, renewal notices for licences have been issued and, where required, on-the-spot fines notices will be followed up with prosecutions.

Pointing to a recent High Court case in which a girl was awarded over £35,000 after being mauled by a dog, Mr. Walsh stressed that dog owners need to be aware of their responsibilities.

Breeds such as Bull Mastiffs, American Pit Bull Terriers, German Shepherds (Alsatis), Japanese Akitas, Rhodesian Ridgebacks, Doberman Pinschers, Rot-

weilers, English Bull Terriers, Japanese Tosas and all cross breeds must be kept muzzled and leashed in a public place and led by a person over the age of 16 who is capable of controlling it.

Such new regulations were introduced last February under the Control of Dogs Act. The maximum fine on summary conviction was increased to £1,000 and/or imprisonment for a term not exceeding 3 months. The scope of the on-the-spot fine system was also extended to include - failure to produce a licence; failure to ensure that a dog wears an identification collar; and failure to deliver to the warden a stray dog believed to have worried livestock.

Ordinary dog licences are available at a cost of £10 from any post office. A general licence for a large number of dogs kept on one

premises costs £200 and is available from Dungarvan or Waterford general post offices.

The Dog Control Unit is based in Waterford city and is managed by the ISPCA on an agency basis for Waterford Corporation and the County Council.

COUNCIL'S MESSAGE TO DOG OWNERS

County Secretary Peter Carey said Waterford County Council is committed to increasing the level of compliance with the Control of Dogs Act.

"Too often, on the national press, we see horrifying photographs reflecting the damage caused by uncontrolled dogs. Dog owners must take their responsibilities seriously", he urged.

Despite the wardens best efforts, Mr. Carey said that uncontrolled dogs inflict considerable cruelty to sheep and lambs each

year with resultant loss to farmers.

"Much more serious is the risk of damage to children or adults", he warned.

"The Council's message to

dog owners is - 'don't wait for the visit from the warden and on-the-spot fine or prosecution. Licence and control your dog and ensure it wears an identification collar'.

Tallow Enterprise Group Supports Reopening Of Library

A recent call on Waterford County Council to reopen and upgrade the library at Tallow has been fully supported by the Tallow Enterprise Group.

At the July meeting of the County Council, Cllr. James Tobin put forward a notice of motion that the library in Tallow be reopened as a fully functional entity in its own right.

His proposal received the acknowledgment and appreciation of the Tallow Enterprise Group who took over the local library during 1996 on a three year lease term, in partnership with the Council.

Chairman of the Enterprise Group, Sean Tobin outlined the various projects they have undertaken to date. These include a capital expenditure programme in

order to keep the building up to present day standards. The Group has also facilitated the ongoing part-time opening hours of the library with the much appreciated support of the local community on a voluntary basis.

Mr. Tobin noted that the library has been extensively used by the public for items such as the procurement of books and study and grind classes by students.

"We were also very fortunate to have received from the local community and surrounding parishes very large donations of books. We have presently been presented with a collection of books for this voluntary service from UCC. At present we have our own Mary O'Brien running Storytime Classes for children", he stated.

"Tallow Enterprise Group Ltd. feel that Waterford County Council will have to rescind their decision of 1995 of closing the library. In the meantime however, this group is more than happy to play its part in delivering to the community the service that they are entitled to", added Mr. Tobin.

Vintage Cars At Lismore Castle

On Sunday, August 15 a large selection of vintage cars will be on display at Lismore Castle. Visitors to Lismore Castle Gardens will have the opportunity of seeing these fine old cars in the Lismore Castle Courtyard which is not normally open to the public.

The vintage cars from the twenties to the sixties belong to members of the Shandon Vintage Wheels Society plus a selection of cars from the Bianchinia Club from Italy.

This is a rare opportunity to view the cars in these magnificent surroundings. The Castle Gardens are set in seven acres within the 17th century outer defensive walls and have spectacular views of the castle. A recently planted herbaceous border aligned on the Cathedral's spire gives an impressive show of colour.

In the last few months several pieces of contemporary sculpture have been installed in the Gardens including one by Anthony Gormley famous for his sculpture of the massive 'Angel of the North' overlooking the motorway at Gateshead in the North of England. 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Orange-glazed Lamb

MINI loin steaks in a tangy Seville orange glaze are a delightfully different alternative to plain meat on a barbecue.

Ingredients:

Serves 2
6-8 lamb mini loin steaks
2 x 15ml sp (Seville) orange marmalade
Pinch ground ginger

Method:

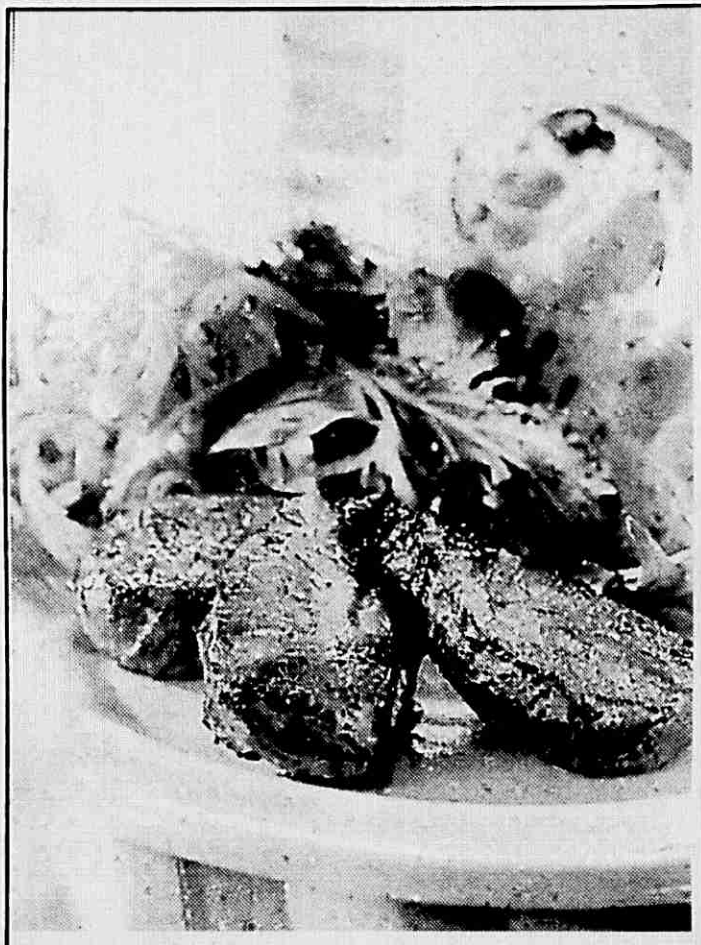
CHOOSE which cut of steak you would like to glaze and place under a pre-heated grill or barbecue heated to the correct cooking temperature. Cook for the time allocated

ed to each side according to the table below.

About one minute before the end of the cooking time, brush the marmalade glaze over the steaks and sprinkle with ginger to taste.

Continue cooking the glazed steaks for the remaining cooking time. Serve immediately with fresh mixed salad, coleslaw and your choice of crusty white bread or garlic bread.

TIP: Try using alternative simple glazes such as redcurrant sauce and mint jelly.

Lamb leg steaks	1-2cm	4-6 minutes
Mini loin steaks	1cm	2-3 minutes
Skewered lamb escalopes/leg steaks	1-2cm	4-6 minutes

Old-fashioned hot potato soup

THIS recipe for old-fashioned potato soup will have you wandering off into a childhood land of home-cooked meals and beautiful country cottages.

Ingredients:

Serves 6
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1 large onion
6 medium potatoes, peeled and diced
2 carrots, diced
3 cups water
2 x 15ml sp chicken soup base or 2 boullion cubes
Ground black pepper
3 x 15ml sp all-purpose flour
3 cups milk
1 x 15ml sp dried parsley
1/4 x 5ml sp dried thyme

Method:

In a large stock pot, melt the butter, add the onions

and cook over a medium heat until the onions are translucent.

While the onions are cooking, place the diced potatoes, carrots, water and chicken soup base in another stock pot and bring to the boil. Cook until tender, about 10 minutes. Do not overcook. Season with ground black pepper to taste.

Add the flour to the cooked onions to make a paste. Gradually add the milk and stir well. Cook over a low heat, stirring constantly until warmed through. Add the potato and carrot mixture. Stir in the parsley and thyme and heat through. Serve hot with crusty bread.

TIP: Try making the soup using broccoli or cauliflower instead.

Moist and fruity summer cake

A MOIST, light, fruity cake to get your taste buds tingling with summer berries.

Ingredients:

Serves 8-10
275g self-raising flour
65g plain flour
1/4 x 5ml sp bicarbonate of soda
65g cocoa
100g butter
175g sugar
75g jam, any flavour
90ml hot water
2 eggs, lightly beaten
1 x 15ml sp jam (extra)

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/ Gas Mark 4. Grease a 23cm tin, line with greaseproof paper, then grease the paper. Sift the flours, bicarbonate of soda and cocoa in a large mixing bowl. Make a well in the

centre.

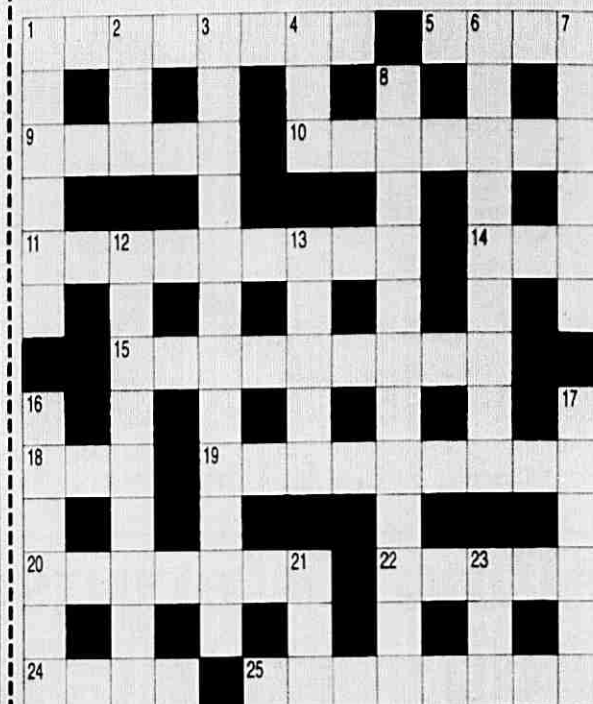
Place the butter, sugar, jam and water in a small pan. Stir over a low heat until the butter has melted and sugar has dissolved. Remove from the heat and add to the dry ingredients in the mixing bowl, along with the eggs. Stir with a wooden spoon until just combined. Do not overbeat.

Pour mixture into prepared tin, smoothing the surface. Bake for 35 minutes or until a skewer comes out clean when inserted into the middle of the cake.

Leave cake to stand in tin for 15 minutes before turning out to cool on a wire rack. Heat extra jam in a small pan and brush it over the cake. Serve with whipped cream.

Health Tips from "Remedies"

The Aromatic Bath (Part 111) TEA TREE

Taken just at the start of a cold or flu, a bath using 3 drops each of Tea Tree and Lavender is most helpful. Provided you go straight to bed after it, this bath can stop a cold developing or at least reduce its intensity. Most of the common essential oils can be used in the bath. (Note: Lemon scented essential oils should be diluted in vegetable oil before use as they can irritate the skin).

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Summer Tips For Success



Time for a rest: Nip problems in the bud, then enjoy some well-earned relaxation outdoors.

TO THE untrained eye, summer is the time when a garden is at its best - so take a closer look.

A summer garden has to suffer a multitude of batterings from various sources. Days are scorching hot and nights, icy cold. Kids are playing games and trampling on flower beds, smoke and ash from barbecues pollute the air, and bugs and pests are taking advantage of plants weaknesses. Follow these top tips on how to look after your garden in the warmer months.

Watering can be fatal to some species if you do it at the wrong time. Water, just like glass, magnifies the sunlight and burns, so avoid watering during the day. Early morning, 6am to 8am, is optimum watering time, but if you aren't a morning person, go for early-evening watering.

If you want a colourful garden full of life and bloom, try sprinkling Epsom salts everywhere. Salts will stimulate new growth, and can be sprinkled in solid form or dissolved in water and applied to the plant.

More delicate plants should be covered at night to protect them from the cold. When it has been a warm day there is usually little or no cloud cover, meaning the earth loses its heat very quickly.

Feed your flowers all summer long with a liquid fertiliser that is rich in the phosphorous department - your plants will thrive when it comes to blooming.

August is also a great month for drying flowers and herbs. For lasting beauty, after cutting, place the flowers in a vase with an inch of water in a cool, dry place. As the water slowly evaporates the flowers will dry and stay lovely for months.

Snails and slugs are everyone's least favourite pest. In wet weather they will attack your garden and destroy your plants, so use a natural slug/snail repellent to combat the problem. Keep the application fresh by re-applying every week or so, more often during rainy weather. Apply sparingly, but scatter well - snails and slugs can travel amazing distances considering how slowly they move!

Ponds need extra care in the summer too. Keep your pond in the shade as much as possible - this will help prevent a blooming of algae, and also provide a good growing atmosphere for plants like lilies and water lettuce.

When mowing your lawn, first check for items such as sticks, rocks and toys. Make sure nothing is hidden in the grass.

Raise your mower's height setting to help prevent and control weeds. Longer grass is healthier, develops a better root system and stands up through drought. Follow this easy rule - never cut off more than one third of the leaf height at any one time. When you cut grass short, there is less leaf to bring sunlight and water to the roots.

Water your lawn to keep it healthy and prevent burning. Never cut grass when it is wet.

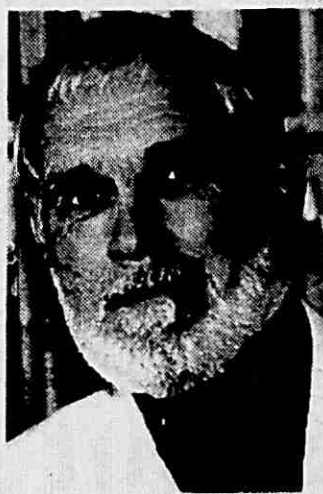

The family:

Some Myths Examined



Family life has traditionally been shrouded in such secrecy that the only comparisons that could be made were with the parents own upbringing. Resulting from this were often misguided notions of what family life is, among them that love and loyalty are the only emotions at play. In fact family life is as complex as the individuals within it. In this article I set out to examine some popular myths and replace them with facts.

Parents believe that preferring one child over another reflects badly on them. In fact our children are as different as chalk and cheese. When parents recognise favouritism they are tilted with guilt and shame and it concerns them particularly if a disfavoured child has problems in life. These parents experience sadness, a loss of self esteem, anger, denial and anxiety. They regret that this has happened and fear it may never be repaired. They become buckled by a sense of failure and are devastated by painful memories. They blame themselves for the poor relationship they have with the disfavoured child, for having misunderstood the emotional signals and for not being more alert to the veiled calls for attention of this child. On reflection they recognise having been disfavoured themselves and make the mistake of seeing their actions as a repetition - a falling into the cyclical trap of their own painful past. Many parents out of guilt and shame secretly worry about the plight of the disfavoured child and imagine his difficulties at home being perpetuated in their adult life. The disfavoured child reacts to this with anger and anxiety and because parents don't know how to deal with this they too become confused, angry and anxious. This causes many parents to fight amongst themselves. Confused by their children's fighting they blame the other for not handling the situation, often becoming alienated from one another to such a degree that they separate.

Children are fixated on parental love. It affects the entire sense of purpose in life and is fundamental in their

sense of self esteem. Children tend to express their need for love in disguised and indirect ways. Children often irritate parents by demanding attention when the parent is busy whilst others will do whatever to please the parent so as to get that attention. Children are born with the power to reason but they have no knowledge about the direction their reasoning should take so they develop according to their individual experiences whether that be in a positive or negative pattern. The phenomenon of sibling rivalry reaches to the very heart of the human condition and is the foundation for personality traits that characterise individuals for the rest of their lives.

When we examine the animal world we see that animals too have pecking order and that they push weaker ones out of a group. Families who have a domestic pet may notice if a new pet is brought into the home the established pet will become hostile towards it.

The Sibling-Loyalty Myth. Siblings born in sequence are much more likely to be rivals than devoted friends. According to the tale of Hansel and Gretel siblings should feel a deep sense of love and commitment towards one another. However Hansel and Gretel have a wicked step mother who is their common enemy as they were abandoned to fend for themselves. When children are deprived of their prime love giver they will bond together superficially out of a need for survival and dependence. Unfortunately a lot of parents get caught up in the illusion that their children will always love each other and they will grow up as close friends and remain so for the rest of their lives. The reality is often far different and more difficult. The comedian Benny Hill fought a great deal with his brother Leonard. They fought so badly that when their cousin Chris would come to visit Mrs. Hill would often get him to sleep between them and Chris fell foul to many a misdirected blow. Benny Hill's father was so autocratic that he liked to be referred to as captain and completely obeyed so that at 15

Benny Hill left home. His feelings about his brother never improved - in adulthood they had a complete falling out and didn't speak to each other for 35 years. They were eventually reconciled but they could never agree on the whole cause of their alienation. Leonard Hill died soon afterwards and Benny attended his funeral with raw feelings of great loss and sorrow. So many of us can relate stories of similar feelings. The powerful emotions in the relationship between siblings are the most antagonistic and explosive of all human experiences in relationships.

The Myth Of The Perfect Family — This confuses people about what they might expect from their spouse and children. The fairy tale of living happily ever after has perhaps diminished somewhat as society is taking a more candid view of family life. Parents who subscribe to the myth of a perfect family imagine if the disfavoured child weren't there that their idea of perfection would exist. Hidden deep is the belief that the disfavoured 'bad' child stands between them and the happy ever after ending and so they feel resentful towards this child who is ruining their happy family life. Alas if the disfavoured child were to disappear another child would take his place.

A Child's Behaviour Is Determined By Heredity — I believe that environmental influences play a much more important role than heredity in shaping young people. Research tells us that proximate siblings are routinely different and that the children's environment leads to this difference. Whatever characteristic one child has the other seems to have exactly the opposite. If one child is stubborn the other is co-operative, if one is organised the other will be untidy. This results from the drive to be individual and to gain attention. Next week I will write about how to cope with and repair sibling struggles. Perhaps the awareness of the impact of favouritism and how to handle it may make many homes a little brighter.

SHEEP

Lamb Thrive:

Weight at weaning is critical to the sale of lambs.

Effect of weaning weight on Lamb Sales Pattern

Weaning Weight (kg)	% Lambs Sold by Sept. 1st
Flock Average	50
32	35
30	20
28	

Aim for 60 percent of all your lambs sold by Sept. 1st.

Feed meal if necessary to ensure this.

- 10 kgs of meal will put on 1 kg of carcase
- 10 kgs of meal @ £120/tonne = £1.20
- 1kg of carcase @ £2 (90p/lb) = £2.00

Early Lamb:

Easter Sunday 2000 falls on April 23rd - three weeks later than this year.

There is demand for new season lamb from mid March onwards with prices falling off from early May. Easter is still a very strong market period for local markets.

Over the past three years, average price for early lambs has been about £55/head. Do your sums on this basis. What system is best suited to you? - indoor early weaning or outdoor? Contact your local Teagasc advisor regarding your options.

Aim for a lambing date around January 10th, this means a mid August mating date.

DAIRYING

3rd Last Rotation:

- ★ Yes, it is vital to manage it carefully.
- ★ Topping or tight grazing should be the norm, because:
 - It will be hard to graze out the strong grass areas the later we go in the autumn.
- ★ Last month you were advised to put on 60-70 units on nitrogen on 2nd cut for aftergrass.
 - This will be fit for grazing in early September.
 - 30 units of nitrogen should be enough on the paddocks after each grazing in August if you are setting up the aftergrass as advised.
- ★ If your rotation is not 23-25 days during August then:
 - You are starting to run short of grass
 - You won't have adequate grass in Oct/Nov.
 - You must either feed, meals, good baled silage, introduce aftergrass, de-stock, or dry off autumn calves earlier than usual.
- ★ During this rotation you should be trying to set the paddocks up for next springs grazing:
 - The first paddocks grazed next spring will be closed up first this autumn in early October.
 - Consequently, they will be grazed sometime around early September and again during early to mid August.

RESEEDING

Reseed Now:

- ★ Reseeding must be done in August.
 - September is too late because reseeding done in that month results in more weed grasses.
 - Clover will prosper when sown before mid August.
- ★ Reseeding pays its way, even though it will cost £130-£150 per acre to sow.
 - You will have much earlier grass
 - You will have more grass in the autumn.
 - Overall you will grow 10-20% more grass each year.
 - Silage quality will be 6-8 DMD units better and it will be easier to preserve.
- ★ Reseed at least 10% of your farm each year.
- ★ Because late heading perennials are much more persistent, they should be the predominant grass in each mixture.
 - Antara (gives very good ground cover) Millenium Tyrone, Portstewarts are worth including.
 - Aran clover at 2-4 lbs. should be included in all mixtures.
 - Because clover is very expensive, reducing the seeding rate to 22-24 lbs. per acre should work, particularly if sown in August.
- ★ Those farmers who wish to promote a clover rich sward should sow 20 lbs. ryegrass plus 4-5 lb. of clover per acre.
 - Use mid-season old tetraploid grasses, such as Twins, Respect, Tivoli, Condessa.
 - Use Aran and Avoca clovers.

NATIONAL COUNCIL MEETING

The Southeast region was well represented at an ICMSA National Council meeting held in Limerick recently.

The main issues discussed were:

- partnership 2000 - condition for agreement;
- animal disease;
- report from the chairman ICMSA dairy committee on milk price calculation and water policy.

ARE WE FOREVER CONDEMNED TO LOW FARM INCOMES?

Commenting on the Teagasc Analysis of the Berlin Agreement, ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen, said that the only conclusion to be drawn was that individual farm income could only increase by means of a reduction in the total number of farmers in the country. The Teagasc report states that the Berlin Agreement on CAP reform means that overall national farm income in 2007 will be similar to 1998. The ICMSA President said that taking average levels of inflation, this would mean that real farm income would be down 15% by 2007.

Employment in agriculture in 1998 was less than one third of its 1961 level, while farm output was one third higher than 1960. We can no longer increase output at farm level, but we must continue to strive for greater efficiency and maximum cost savings. There is no doubt that the trend of reducing farm numbers will continue, encouraged by the booming non-farm sector.

If the Teagasc analysis that overall farm income will remain static is correct, then we had better face reality and plan for the future of rural Ireland, where agriculture will still play a central economic role but employing a lot less people.

As regards our future plans, we need to help those farmers with potential, who wish to become viable and stay in farming. We will need to provide a significant number of off farm jobs for an increasing number of part-time farmers.

We need to further encourage restructuring within farming. At present we have 32,000 farmers over 65 and only 18,000 farmers under 35. Greater incentives are needed to encourage long term land leasing. Tax incentives must be targeted at farmers who need extra land in order to become viable.

The other major issue that we must decide is whether to allow market forces to exclusively decide who remains in farming, or alternatively, do we intervene to help those who wish to remain farming and who have the potential to become viable provided that they are given direct help.

We have a window of opportunity at present to prepare for the future - we must start planning now - tomorrow will be too late.

New Vet Declaration And Certification Form Being Received By Farmers

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murphy has said that most co-ops were currently distributing the new Declaration and Certification form which every dairy farmer must co-sign with the Vet of their choice by 30th June, 2000.

"This form is much more workable for both farmer and veterinary surgeon than the previous dairy herd certificate," Michael Murphy said.

"A good number of farmers all around the country have already had the form signed by their vet in the last couple of weeks in conjunction with their annual TB herd test," he added.

"It makes perfect sense for farmer and vet alike, as it minimises cost and time for both without compromising on the proper carrying out of the scheme. Farmers should make their vets aware that they expect

them to co-sign the form on completion of the TB herd test. All animals on the farm are put through the crush by the farmer and inspected twice in detail by the vet on that occasion. This is recognised clearly by the EU dairy hygiene regulations which the cert scheme is implementing, as these state that inspections for the scheme may be carried out at the same time as other veterinary work on the farm," he said.

"This is very much part of the normal vet/client relationship in which the farmer receives a comprehensive animal health service from his vet all year round on a commercial basis. I have no doubt that where that relationship is good, and that is in the majority of cases, the Declaration and Certification scheme will be signed in conjunction with the annual herd test," he concluded.

GRAIN TRADE WILL NOT SUCCEED IN TALKING DOWN HARVEST PRICES

— HESKIN

Waterford IFA Grain Chairman, Alex Heskin has said that IFA will continue to press for a realistic market price of £82 - £85 /tonne for quality Irish barley which was based on accurate market analysis and prices paid to date. He said today's rejection by the Grain and Feed Association of this justified price increase ignored the market fundamentals and was based on a very distorted representation of harvest prospects which cannot be accepted by grain growers.

He said current Irish harvest on account prices are already harder than last year by IR£5. New crop barley in the Midlands, Cork and North East is currently making £80/tonne plus, collected ex-farm, and the collection allowance is worth at least

£2.50/tonne extra.

Mr. Heskin said that contrary to the statement by the IGFA the landed price in Belfast is IR£6-£8 harder than 1998 levels.

He said sterling is currently trading 2p stronger on average than the punt for the same period last year.

UK ex-farm prices are £5 sterling or IR£6 firmer and this will give us a competitive advantage over UK grain imported into the North. The current low level of trading is a normal feature for early July or August when many buyers are on holidays.

Mr. Heskin said growers can have confidence that their grain is worth £82-£85 / tonne and it is therefore essential that they drive a hard bargain before delivering grain into merchants yards.

Department Should Pay For Sheep Tags Says Macra

Macra na Feirme has called on the Department of Agriculture to meet some of the costs of the proposed new sheep tagging regime.

Macra Sheep spokesperson Dermot Kelly said that the cost of sheep tags will place a burden on sheep farmers at a time when things are already difficult.

"Sheep farmers are very unsure of their future in the wake of the Agenda 2000 agreement in which they were ignored and now they are being hit with extra costs and bureaucracy", he said.

Mr. Kelly went on to point out that cattle farmers had access to free tags for a number of years after the cattle tagging scheme was launched and that sheep

farmers should be afforded the same treatment.

"Cattle farmers still receive a quantity of free tags each year, yet there are no plans to provide sheep farmers with any free tags which is unfair", he said.

Mr. Kelly concluded by pointing out that some concession from the Department on this issue would be of great assistance in ensuring maximum awareness and compliance with the new scheme.


"Everybody agrees that a traceability system is required to protect our industry and I believe we should learn from the system employed in relation to cattle tags where tags were provided free of charge until everyone as familiar with the system", he added.

HOLY WELL

This account of the Holy Well in Knockgarraun, Modeligo is given in the Royal Society of Antiquaries of Ireland dated 31st March 1911.

In the parish of Modeligo, on the right bank of the Finisk, there may be found

a remarkable specimen of the many holy well's in Ireland. The name "Well" is really deceptive, for the water is merely rainwater and does not derive its existence from any Spring, but is simply contained in a bath shaped receptacle in a piece of limestone jutting up from the surface of the land. There are generally about six inches of water in it, and a legend asserts the existence of an inscribed cross and in inscription on the bottom. Tradition asserts that this well formerly existed some distance from its present position and that a trooper of Cromwell's led his blind horse in mockery, around it in order to find out and test the miraculous powers of the place. The horse was cured, but the soldier became blind. The following day the Well had taken up its present position. The place is known to the natives as the Tobar Beannuighthe and is marked on the O.S. as "Lady Well".

Tradition continues today as the Pattern Day still takes place on the 15th August as in olden times. This Saturday night the eve of the Pattern, a rosary procession will take place after Mass to the Holy Well. You are invited to join us and continue to fulfil the old custom of visitation to the Well.

Amendments Made To Local Authority Tenant Purchase Regulations

A Waterford County Councillor has welcomed changes in regulations governing Tenant Purchase Schemes operated by Dungarvan UDC and Waterford Co. Council.

Cllr. Fiachra O'Ceilleachair says that a number of local authority tenants adversely affected by previous regulations can now benefit from the Dept. of Environment's decision to amend the scheme. Periods of tenancy of a local authority dwelling (other than of dwellings previously purchased), regardless of any breaks in tenancy will now be reckoned in calculating discounts under the scheme. Cllr. O'Ceilleachair was concerned that under previous regulations, periods of

tenancy had to be continuous when calculating discounts under the scheme - except where an authority required the termination of a tenancy in a marriage breakdown situation.

"I'm pleased that the Housing Minister now recognises that tenants should not lose their entitlement to discounts under the Tenant Purchase Scheme due to a break in their tenancy. Problems were being encountered by a number of prospective tenant purchasers, where sometimes breaks in tenancy were quiet small. I'm also glad to see that the new amendment has immediate effect and is applicable to transactions completed from now on between tenants and the local authority concerned."

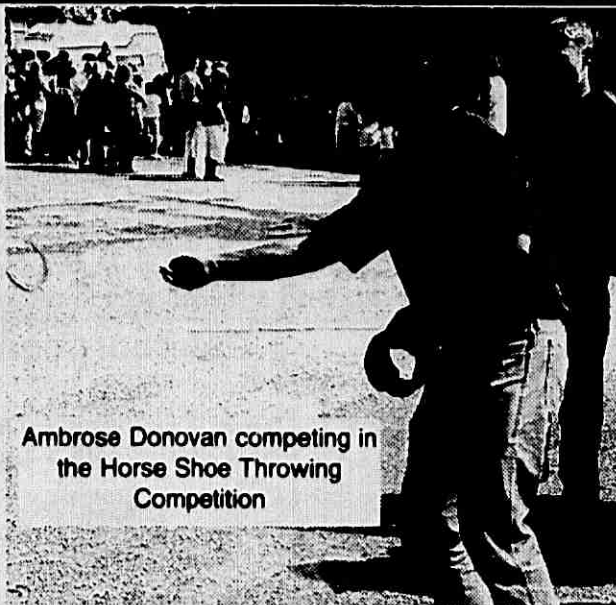

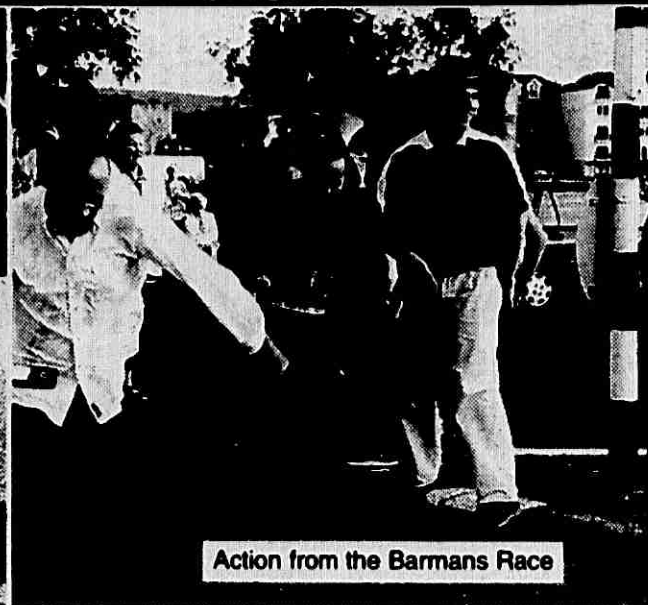

Romantic Music In Lismore Cathedral

'Mainly Romantic' is the title of the third summer concert in Lismore Cathedral on Weds., Aug. 18 at 8 p.m. This title refers to the character of music to be performed by the choir St. Carthage's Singers and Cathedral Organist Jan Van Putten. Most of the works date from what is generally called the Romantic Era, mainly the nineteenth and the early twentieth century when emotions were allowed to play an important role in music, literature and the arts.

Romantic composers in this concert are Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdi, Johannes Brahms, Anton Bruckner, Josef Rheinberger, Max Reger and Sergei Rachmaninov. Centrepieces are two compositions by Josef Rheinberger (1839 - 1901), his sensitive *Missa Brevis* in D minor and his impressive *Organ Sonata* in A minor. Rheinberger composed his first Mass when he was eight and became a teacher at Munich Conservatory when he was twenty. During his lifetime he was highly respected as a composer, choir conductor, teacher and as a person. In our days we see a revival of interest in his works. Rachmaninov will be represented by the *Ave Maria* from his famous *Vespers*.

In addition the choir will sing works by Richard Lloyd (*'The Call'*), John Tavener (*'Song For Athene'*) which was performed during the Funeral Service for Princess Diana two

years ago), Thomas Tallis (*'If Ye Love Me'*) and John Amner (*'Come Let's Rejoice'*).

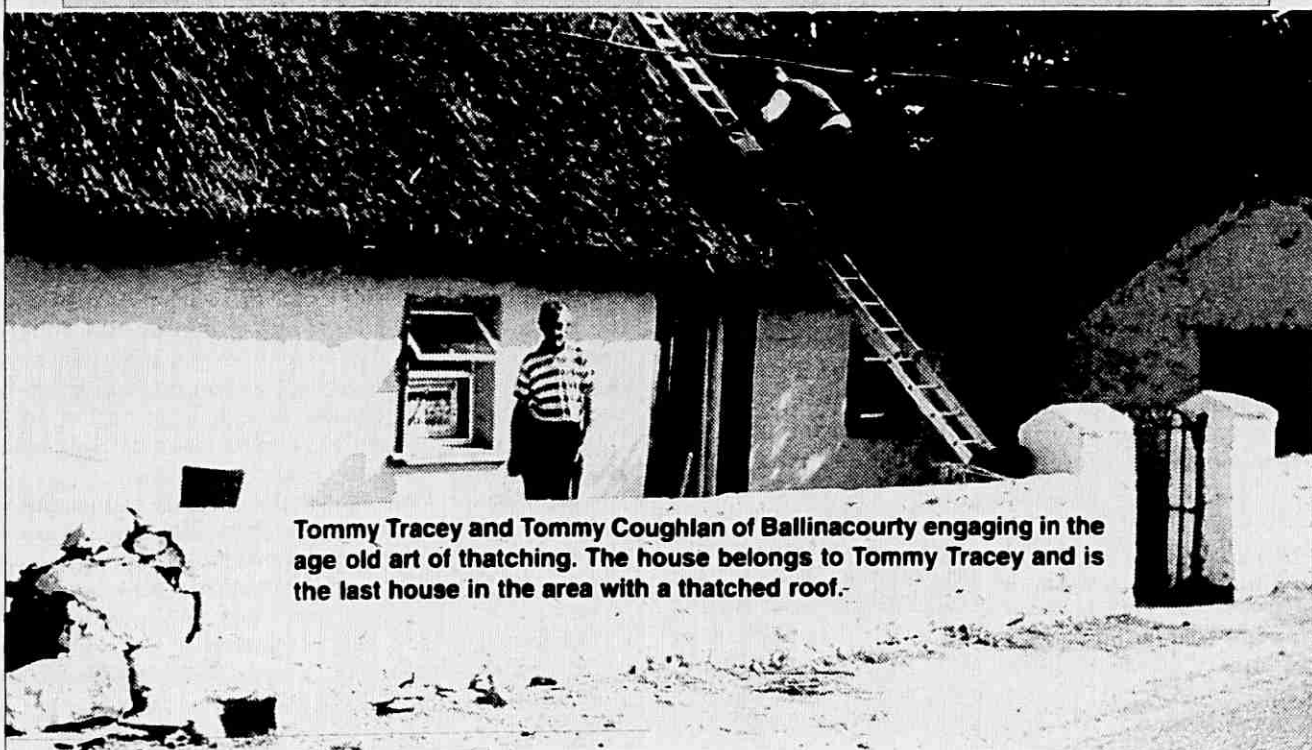

Waterford v. Cork At Fraher Field On Sunday

The celebrations are long finished. The last five months have been very much back to reality. The road to this year's final begins on Sunday afternoon at Fraher Field at 2.15 p.m. with surprisingly Cork the opponents.

This is Cork's first appearance in a Munster Senior Final since 1986, the year that Waterford won the Junior All-Ireland title. The contrast between the teams couldn't be greater. Waterford have appeared in every Munster Final since 1986, thirteen on the trot and are bidding to win their eighth title in nine years and their sixth in a row.

The early nineties was a depressing period for Cork football before regrading led to a Junior All-Ireland success in 1995 and since then Cork have made steady progress. A good solid founda-

tion has been put in and they served notice four weeks ago when they defeated Kerry in Killarney, a Kerry team that reportedly had been showing definite promise were deservedly beaten 0-11 to 1-7 by the Leesiders.

Team manager Charlie McLoughlin has been working steadily for the last few years concentrating on fitness and improving the brand of football that Cork has been playing. That improvement has been evident in the performances. Camogie is very strong in Cork but they also have, by far, the largest number of registered football players in the country, over twice as many as Waterford, so it's inevitable that good management and dedication from the players will bring results.

Their County Board is superbly organised and the

seeds are beginning to bear fruit. Victory over Waterford would be a huge help and it's certainly something that Cork are quietly confident about. This is by and large a young Cork side so great pace and movement are likely to be their key assets.

Waterford were due to play Clare in the semi-final last month but Clare incredibly conceded a walkover citing poor attendance at training and lack of interest as the reason for their failure to field. The loss of three successive Munster Finals and a League Final had taken its toll. Waterford could have done with the game.

It's difficult to get worthwhile challenges down south. Everybody else are busy playing one another in an effort to unseat Waterford and it's hard to blame them for that. The league campaign saw the best and worst of Waterford.

Victories over Laois, Monaghan, Wexford, Meath, Mayo and Longford eased Waterford into a semi-final against Mayo in mid May. A poor performance led to the sides being level at normal time and it was only in extra-time that Waterford improved, eventually winning by eight points.

The League Final against Monaghan at Dublin's Parnell Park saw the old defensive ills return. The concession of three first half goals against a sharp hungry Monaghan team coupled with the fact that Waterford's forwards were also disappointing, ensured that Waterford lost their first game in two years and served as a warning for the future.

For the last eight weeks Waterford have been training four times a week so fitness shouldn't be a problem. They played Mayo in a challenge last Sunday and without sparkling, had eleven points to spare at the end of a tough encounter. The defeat of overwhelming camo-

gie favourites Cork by Kilkenny last weekend should serve as a warning to Waterford. Only a top class performance will do.

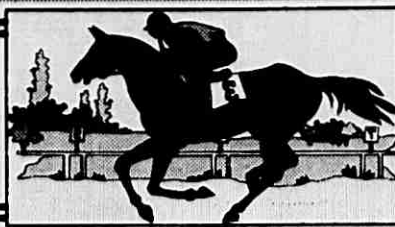

Former European Horse of the Year Dancing Brave has died at the age of sixteen in Japan where he stood as a stallion since 1991. As a three year old, Dancing Brave captured the 2000 Guineas Coral Eclipse Stakes and the Prix de L'Arc de Triomphe back in 1986 in France.

Eleven times champion jockey Pat Eddery said of Dancing Brave that he had a wonderful temperament and was a beautiful mover. Dancing Brave died of a suspected heart attack.

TWO DAYS FOR BARRY

Jockey Barry Geraghty will miss the final two days of this week's Tramore Festival of Racing having picked up a two day ban at Sligo last Thursday afternoon for excessive use of the whip on the third placed Celtic Serenade.

PHILIP'S FIRST AS A PRO

Paul Carberry's younger brother Philip (18) recorded his first ever winner as a professional jockey when he partnered the ex Owen Weldon trained Clanlucky to a runaway victory for current handler, Noel Meade in a handicap hurdle at a well attended Kilbeggan last Friday night. This was Philip's eighth victory in total as he rode seven winners as an amateur before turning pro.

CHARLIE IN THE WARS

Former champion jockey Charlie Swan was involved in a horrible accident at Roscommon Races last Tuesday night.

Riding in the first three year old hurdle of the new season, Charlie's mount Hot Bunny was lying a handy second down the back stretch when his horse slipped up on the flat and brought down the Conor O'Dwyer partnered Rooftop in the process. While Conor O'Dwyer got to his feet uninjured, nine times champion jockey Charlie Swan was not so fortunate as he was shifted by ambulance to the nearby County Hospital. Charlie later returned to the track with his two arms in plaster.

It was on to Navan Hospital on Wednesday where Charlie was operated on. His left arm suffered a clean break but his right arm, broken in two places, required surgery to expedite the healing process. Charlie could be out of action for at least two months. He gave up riding over fences late last year to concentrate on riding horses over hurdles and building up his yard, has no plans to retire as a jockey and why should he as he has the likes of Istabraq to look forward to come Cheltenham time in March of next year.

AUSSIE VICTORY FOR IRISH

The Irish jump jockey team consisting of Paul Hourigan, Jason Maguire, Kieran Kelly and Donal Bromley made a bright start on their annual Australia trip to take on the Aussie jockeys in their own backyard. Donal Bramley drew first blood at Adelaide Country Track Gawler last Wednesday when steering 15/1 outsider Cospura to a facile eight lengths victory. The minor placings were all filled by the home team with the remaining three Irish lads finishing out of the money.

COMEBACK WINNERS

It was good to see the following Irish born jockeys make a successful return to action after enforced lay-offs for one reason or another. Those lucky enough to ride winners included John Reid, Pat Eddery, Daryl O'Donohoe and National Hunt Pilot David Walsh who was riding his first winner on British soil since leaving the sport back in 1997.

RAY IN TROUBLE

Northern Ireland born flat jockey Ray Cochrane is to face charges under two separate rules by the U.K. Jockey Club. The 'Club' have spent nearly the last three months investigating Cochrane's riding of the filly, Keld the uneasy 2/1 favourite in a race at Lingfield. A disciplinary committee inquiry will judge whether or not he broke the non triers rule by failing to give his horse the best possible chance and secondly if he was in breach of a rule concerning actions prejudicial to the integrity, proper conduct or reputation of horse racing.

OATH ON THE MEND

After cracking a knee bone in the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Stakes, this year's English Derby winner Oath continues to make slow progress at Henry Cecil's stables. He is currently confined to his box and a decision on future plans for this colt will be taken in the near future.

RUSS RETURNS

Northern based National Hunt jockey Russ Garrity is expected to resume race riding this week after a six month break following a heavy fall. He fractured a vertebra in his back after a fall at Sedgfield last February and while he avoided any surgery he was advised to take a complete rest from the sport. After riding out this week Russ was feeling fine and he will ride as a freelance jockey this season.

KIERAN SPEAKS OUT

Sacked jockey Kieran Fallon has finally ended his silence on his recent split with Henry Cecil and has denied reports of him having an affair with Cecil's wife Natalie. A statement issued over the weekend by his London lawyer said, "Mr. Fallon understands that Mrs. Cecil has recently been quoted in the national press to the effect that she has had a relationship with a top jockey. For the avoidance of doubt, Mr. Fallon would like to make it clear that he is not the top jockey involved." The statement added.

U.K. TRAINER DIES

Confined to a wheelchair since he broke his back in a riding accident in 1982, trainer Mikey Heaton-Ellis died aged 41 over the weekend. He had been suffering with Motor Neuron Disease for some time.

HIGH COURT AWARD FOR JIM

Co. Carlow horse trainer Jim Bolger who is an accountant by trade, won his case against the Irish Turf Club in the High Court in Dublin last Friday. Mrs. Justice Macken ordered the Turf Club to pay £11,000 special damages to trainer Bolger. The Turf Club had originally fined the Derby winning trainer £1,000 over the running of his runner Pozzolin at Naas Races who they deemed not to have run on its merits. The High Court however stated that the decision of the steward inquiry which was upheld on appeal was unsustainable. Jim Bolger also had his £1,000 fine quashed and refunded while he was also awarded legal costs.

DARRYLL IN TROUBLE

Trainer Mark Johnston was none too pleased with jockey Darryll Holland in Malmo, Sweden over the weekend. Johnston had booked the jockey to ride a number of his horses but Holland was late arriving at the meeting and to add insult to injury the rider was then barred from taking two rides on his eventual arrival at the track after failing an alcohol breath test.

A far from happy Mark Johnston was forced to use a replacement local rider for his runners.

Trainer Tommy Stack received a nice boost in the following Maiden Hurdle over two miles as the long time absent Effusive under Co. Wexford born jockey Conor O'Dwyer defied a 7/1 starting price to easily account for Native Marsh Kodabad, the 11/10 favourite for this event was held back in second place when crashing out at the final hurdle. The winning trainer Tommy Stack is recovering from a recent operation. The popular Tommy suffered a bad attack of meningitis late last year and he underwent surgery in a Manchester Clinic last week to aid his hearing.

HEINZ DASH FOR FASLIYEV

As expected the featured Heinz 57 Phoenix Stakes proved easy pickings for the Michael Tabor owned, Aidan O'Brien trained and Michael Kinnane ridden Fasliyev justified odds of 2/7 beating the often placed Yara. The Jolly appeared all set for a Sunday afternoon stroll but his dislike of soft going saw him swerve violently in the closing stages reducing his winning margin to just a length and a half. The runner-up Yara must be the most eligible maiden in the country having finished second on no less than seven occasions. The Flynn Stable have gone through a desperate patch with the dreaded virus but hopefully they have now turned the corner and wouldn't it be nice to see him have a winner or two at this week's Tramore meetings.

A National Dream For Robert Widger

Michael Street in the heart of Waterford City on a busy Saturday afternoon in the month of July is a far cry from a summer jumping meeting in Exeter or Newton Abbot in the U.K. but that is where we finally catch up with one of National Hunt's emerging young talents three pound claimer Robert Widger. After calling in to his father's Tosh's Butcher shop and a quick visit to David Cunningham's Fresh Food Hall we take the short car ride out to Harry Boyle's Cove Bar on the Dunmore Road. Permit holder Harry is not at home and he is occupied with his racehorses and greyhounds but Robert and I sit down to have a chat about racing against a backdrop of Channel 4's coverage of Newmarket.

Robert Widger was born twenty years ago and lived with the rest of his family at Lacken on the outskirts of Waterford City. He was really bred for the racing game though as his gran uncle Joe rode Wild Man From Borneo to victory in the 1895 Grand National. Robert went to the local De La Salle College but opted out at thirteen, his love of horses proving too much. As a teenager he excelled as an International Junior Showjumper with his native Ireland and while he has never ridden as a National Hunt jockey in any other countries bar Ireland and the U.K. his showjumping exploits have taken him to such places as Holland, Germany and Italy.

As an amateur Robert went to work for Cavan based trainer Shane Donoghue but from a limited number of mounts that elusive first victory remained but a dream. This writer was under the impression that Robert had ridden well to finish third on one of the Widger family horses at Clonmel but young Robert was quick to point out that I had mistaken him for his brother Tony who later emigrated to join the Foreign Legion.

As people in racing do Robert took a gamble and headed across the Irish sea to the West Country in the U.K.

He set up base in Minehead, Somerset where he rode a number of horses for top trainers Philip Hobbs and Robert Alner but amazingly though he failed to ride a bumper winner in the U.K. Jumping was his game however, and when he campaigned as a professional over the obstacles the winners began to flow. Able to do 9 stone 11 lbs Robert amassed a total of 36 winners. He therefore requires a further twenty nine winners before losing his valuable three pound claim.

Quizzed as to whether or not he models himself on any of the top N.H. jockeys Robert hesitates for a second and says that while he doesn't model himself on any one particular jockey he has the greatest respect for the likes of Tony McCoy and Richard Dunwoody, the Prince as Robert calls him.

Robert Widger has very little interests outside of horses and racing and when asked if he wasn't a professional jockey what other kind of work he would do, a polite reply of "I never really gave it a thought" was forthcoming.

This young man's favourite course in England is Exeter. It's a fine galloping track he says with well presented fences encouraging the most moderate of horses to jump.

I put it to Robert that he enjoyed an upsurge in the number of rides he had last year and while he agreed with this point he was quick to acknowledge the part played by his hard working agent Chris Broad a former jump jockey himself.

Bouchalon proved a trusty servant to Robert this year scoring at Ayr in Scotland on Scottish Grand National day and also coming up trumps for the young Waterford man at the prestigious Punchestown Festival meeting. He is however looking forward to riding one horse in particular this coming season. His name is Sadlers

Realm. This Sadlers Wells gelding was a progressive type over hurdles but Robert predicts an even brighter future when he goes novice chasing.

Roberts main ambition is to follow in his gran uncles footsteps and taste success in the Grand National. He partnered Choisty in this years great race but the duo came to grief at the famous Beechers Brook on the second circuit.

Compared to most other jockeys in the game Robert has been relatively lucky injury wise. Taking his Show Jumping career into consideration he suffered broken wrists and cracked a shoulder and ribs.

The reason for his current visit home however, is the fact that he fractured his ankle in a fall at Hereford on the last day of the jumping season. To make matter worse he was due to have his first ever ride for one of Britain's top trainers David Nicholson in the following race but alas it was not to be. Spending a holiday at home in Waterford and taking in a ten day break in Brazil with fellow jockey Seamus Durack and friends has given the ankle plenty of time to mend. On the morning of this interview Robert rode out for Kilmachthomas trainer Paul Lenihan and after a thorough workout he reported no adverse reaction to the injured limb.

Being a National Hunt jockey in such a competitive sport in England is not everybody's cup of tea but Robert Widger wouldn't swap it for any other occupation. Over two hours have passed since we started this interview and on taking leave of the Cove Bar we exchange pleasantries with Eamon Griffin, one of the hard working band of people behind the revitalised Waterford and Tramore racecourse. I bid farewell to Robert and wish him the best of luck for the upcoming season where who knows he may well realise his ambition of riding the winner of the Grand National just like his gran uncle did over a hundred years ago.

Whatever the standard, the contests should produce exciting fare and this is what the patrons are asking for. People will pay money for excitement, in whatever shape or form. Once upon a time a game was not rated wonderful unless there was a good fight on the field, and all the better if it spread on to the banks/terraces. This would swell the crowds for the next game, but, as the man said, civilisation has

caught up with us and changed all this.

Anyhow, we look forward to an exciting championship that will be sporting and enjoyable.

A number of the clubs in the division are without players for a number of reasons. One of the reasons being the American problem, whereby players can obtain an authorisation to play with a club in New York or in the North American Board area and play there for the summer months. Players availing of the privilege must remain for 60 days before they are legal to play back here again. According to reliable information there are more than 59 players from this county playing there at present.

**Waterford 2-12
Meath 2-11**

I don't know if any Waterford people have experienced such joyful celebrations after a football game, as those witnessed when the final whistle sounded at the end of this pulsating sixty minutes of splendid football which was the All Ireland Junior final at Portlaoise on Saturday.

Ten seconds before the final whistle, David Ryan scored the point which kicked us into football history, and the huge Waterford crowd rose to their feet and continued the cheering until the game ended. Immediately the park became a sea of white and blue as the supporters rushed out to greet the players — everyone a hero.

It was certainly an occasion to savour and even the President, Joe MacDonagh, seemed to get a bit carried away in the euphoria that enveloped the stand area where the trophy was presented to team captain Alfie Kirwan. In the immediate aftermath of the game everyone seemed to have gone a bit wild, a bit emotional and not a little bit amazed.

FAVOURITES

Meath were the hottest of favourites, having defeated Dublin, Westmeath, Offaly and Warwickshire and the bookmakers had quoted them at impossible odds: Meath 1/4

and Waterford 3/1. It was disheartening, but it did not deter more than three thousand Waterford supporters from travelling. The Meath county P.R.O. Brendan Cummins told me that although Meath had won the title on several occasions, they had never beaten the Munster champions who were always either Kerry or Cork. They were confident that this was going to change here.

THE CROWD

It is estimated that more than ninety per cent of the crowd of around 4,000 were Waterford supporters and by comparison with the reception given to the Waterford players, the greeting given to the Meath team was little more than a murmur. Meath people had obviously expected the result to be a foregone conclusion. Most of our support came from the football areas of the county, but the city supporters didn't let the side down either. County champions club, St.Saviours ran a bus.

THE GAME

Two goals within 2 minutes of the start set the tempo for what was to be an electrifying contest.

A 6th minute free was converted by the team's ace sharp shooter P. P. Ferncombe and the side's leading scorer did likewise a minute later to make it 1-2 to 1-0 after 7 minutes. Meath were now realising that it would take a mighty effort to overcome this fiercely determined Waterford side who were playing better football than they had thought possible. A super point by Peter Queally increased our lead to 5 points in the 22nd minute.

Carey pointed again for Meath and Alfie Kirwan brought off a splendid save at the expense of a '45' which was sent wide. Play was entering the 34th minute when Paul Neston scrambled home a goal for Meath and half a minute later David Whelan kicked over a splendid score to leave the halftime tally at 2-5 to 2-3 in our favour.

SECOND HALF

The team resumed unchanged and after two minutes Shane Bergin increased our lead to six points. But after this what looked like being a dream swiftly turned into a nightmare that shattered us for the next twelve minutes in which Meath took complete control and kicked over six

points without reply — Carey (2), Crampton (3) and McMahon took them from three points behind to three in front. It was 2-9 to 2-6 and Meath were cruising.

The final quarter was beginning when P. P. Ferncombe pointed a free that steadied the Waterford nerves, but back came a very determined Meath for a point per McMahon. There followed a Meath onslaught and Waterford team captain Alfie Kirwan brought off a 'life-saver' from a rocket by Shay Duff.

Then the turning point in the match came when Connie Power pointed twice and the teams were level by the 56th minute. Ger Walsh and Karl O'Keeffe had been introduced and both fresh players were causing problems.

ELECTRIFYING FINISH

A replay looked certain at this point with both teams throwing caution to the wind in a desperate effort to prevent the other side from scoring. The tension was unbearable. Meath were awarded what seemed a doubtful free and sharpshooter John Carey made no mistake in sending it over for the lead coming up to the

60th minute. From the fast kick out Waterford attacked and a defender was pulled down and Connie Power (who took over as free taker when the injured P. P. went off) made no mistake with the equalising point. The final was in time added on when the Meath kick out went over the sideline. Jacko Kiely kicked a long ball which was well fielded by David Ryan who never hesitated in kicking it over for the most important score of his life — the winning point in this memorable and historic All Ireland junior final.

The Meath team and their supporters were numbed into disbelief as the ecstatic Waterford supporters celebrated in the traditional Deise style of hugging (and belting) the players and shaking hands with every one within reach. It is so seldom that the chance comes our way, every one was making the best of it. It was Waterford's final intercounty championship game of the 2nd Millennium and everyone who was present and part of it will want to remember it always.

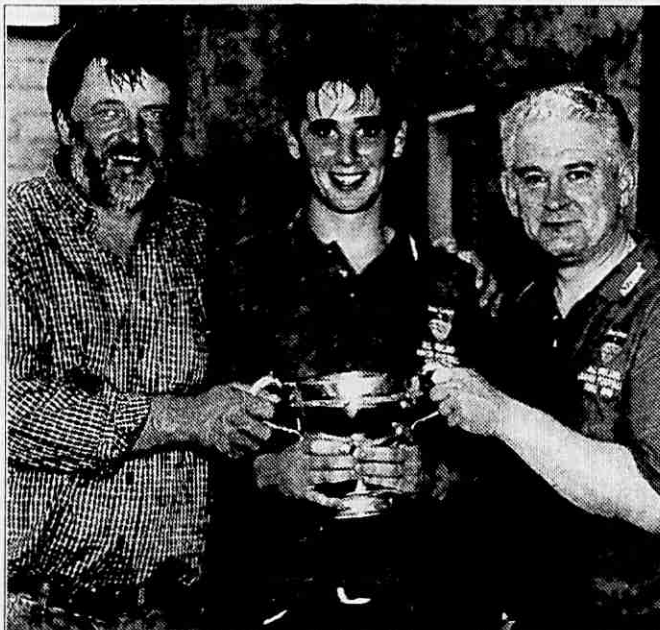
HEROES ALL

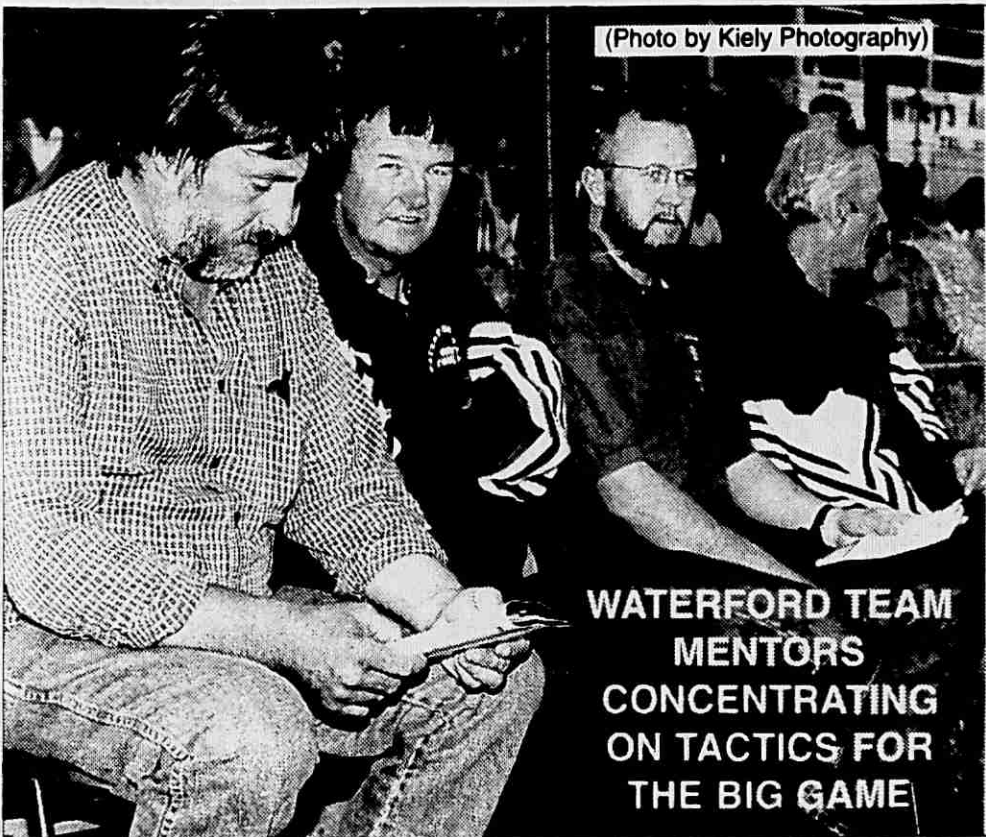

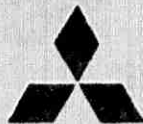
