Glanbia **Issues**





Question

I have two children, one aged three and an eighteen year old, who is a college student. At present I am on a Back to Work Allowance Scheme. Would I qualify for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance?

The Back to School Clothing and Footwear Scheme provides assistance for schoolgoing children for whom a child dependent allowance is payable. It is a means tested payment to assist with the costs of children's school uniforms and footwear at the beginning of the school year. The means test relates to income and a number of children. For example the income limit for a couple with two children is £179.90 - income assessed is gross

You may qualify for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance because you have two schoolgoing children (one pre-school and one at college) and if you are getting a social welfare payment (including Family Income Supplement) or a health board payment. You may also qualify if you are participating in an approved employment scheme such as Back to Work Allowance, Jobstart, Community Employment, Revenue Job Assist and Area Enterprise Allowance or if you are participating in a recognised education and training course such as Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme (VTOS) or receiving Back to Education Allowance or a PESP Area Partnership Scheme. People on a non-craft full-time FAS training scheme may also qualify.

A high proportion of people who qualify for this payment in respect of their dependent children in 2-4 age bracket and the 17-22 age bracket do not take it up. The payment is £43 for each child aged 2-11 years and £58 for each child aged 12-17. The payment for a child aged 18-22 in full time education for whom a Child Dependant Allowance is payable is £58.

The scheme runs from June 1 to September 30 and is administered by the Health Board as part of the Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme. Investment in Waterford **Sea Angling Equipment**

Two sea angling vessels in Co. Waterford are to get vital safety equipment in a £8.665 investment under a new Government grant scheme. The investment was announced this week by Dr. Michael Woods T.D., Minister for the Marine and Natural Resources.

The two Waterford vessels are among 56 sea angling vessels around the country to receive grant aid for a variety of equipment including emergency positioning beacons, radio telephones, fire extinguishers, lifejackets and life buoys,

and navigators.

The scheme, which provides Government grants of 50% of the cost of purchasing safety equipment, is part of an ongoing initiative to increase the level of safety on Irish vessels.

Commenting on the new scheme Dr. Woods said he wants to make safety the top priority for all involved in sea angling.

"This is another major step in my comprehensive programme to build a proactive culture of safety among those who go to sea to earn a living or simply distress flares, smoke floats for pleasure", he added.

Deasy Slams Lack Of Speech Therapy Facilities

The lack of speech and language therapy facilities for young children in the county has again been strongly criticised by Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy. He said the average 37 month waiting period for therapy to commence is an incredible period of time, particularly for young children in their informative years.

In a recent letter to the Minister for Health, Deputy Deasy claimed that primary school children are

being severely discriminated against and he asked if the Minister has any plans to make a reasonable amount of funding available to cater for them.

The Waterford Deputy has also raised the matter Officer of the South Eastern Health Board, John Cooney asking if there are any plans to introduce sufficient speech therapists to provide a service which could be considered reasonably comprehensive.

Programme Manager of the Community Care section of the SEHB, said in the region of 32 additional speech therapy posts would be required across the Board's area at an estimated cost of with the Chief Executive £762,720 per annum. This would be in the wider context of the provision of a more comprehensive service for children and adults. He also pointed out that the recruitment of trained personnel for these posts can be a problem for the Board.





No Mistake Against Rathgormack

Three members of the selection committee P. Daly, P. J. Morrissey and P. J. Dwan travelled to watch the Eastern Final and reported back to a special committee meeting held in Abbeyside at Lar Condon's. Normal committee meetings were held, of course, at Elstead's in Ballinacourty where Mrs. Peg Elstead always had a warm fire and an even warmer welcome for all.

The reports having been digested and plans laid accordingly, Ballinacourty faced the County Final against Rathgormack on a typically wet winter Sunday evening in November. They got off to a bad start but afterwards left no doubt of the outcome.

The Dungarvan Leader said nearly all the things that needed saying about that win and its signifi-

cance. "Congratulations to Ballinacourty who last Sunday took the Intermediate Football Championship by scoring what can only be described as a crushing defeat of the Eastern Champions, Rathgormack. The result was an achievement which took something like eighteen years to accomplish, but supporters who have followed the team through the years agree that this team was more than a shade above all the others that have represented the club and that its standard has never been equalled in the parish.

Sunday's victory which, incidentally, was the first Western win in the county championships this year and the first Intermediate Football title ever to come to the Division, was achieved by a team effort and by the very shrewd planning of the men who had successfully guided them through the West.



This week in the garden

Sow schizanthus for spring flowering

Sow now in order to have really large schizanthus for spring decorations in the greenhouse or conservatory. Sow seeds thinly in well drained seed boxes using a seed compost and germinate in a frame. The cooler the conditions the better.



Sow winter spinach and spinach beet

Choose a sheltered place and make a sowing of prickly-seeded spinach to stand the winter. Sow the seed thinly in drills 2.5cm deep and 30cm apart.

You can make a sowing of spinach beet now for use in winter and spring. This useful variety of beetroot is grown solely for its leaves, used as a spinach substitute.


Start to gather mushrooms from outdoor beds

If you were able to make a mushroom bed in the open in July you should exam-

ine it now for the first mushrooms. Gather the buttons (young mushrooms) as they form. The bed should continue well into the autumn.

Make new strawberry plantations

Strawberry runners pegged down early last month should have made good roots and can be severed from their parent plant. A few days later, lift them carefully and plant them in new beds. Choose a good open position and soil that has been deeply dug and well manured. Plant 30cm apart in rows 60cm apart.



Pick and summer prune apples and pears

During this month and through September you should continue to pick apples and pears as they ripen. Continue to summer prune the trees but strive to complete the work by the end of the month.

Treat vines

Vines, indoors and out, will be in various stages of growth. Early vines from which you have gathered the crop should be ventilated freely and sprayed with water if there is any sign of red spider on the leaves.



Ripen off onions

Onions from January and March sowings will now be approaching ripeness, and you can hasten this by bending over the leaves just above the neck of each bulb.

Pot winter flowering begonias

If you were able to root cuttings of winter flowering begonias in late winter, the plants should now be about ready for potting on into their flowering pots.

DAIRYING - Autumn Calvers:

- Issues to be addressed are length of dry period required.
- Quota management.
- Managing very fat and/or very thin cows.
- Preventing summer mastitis.
- The dry period will vary between 8-12 weeks.
- The longer dry period (12 weeks) may be necessary for thin cows, first calvers and where the farm could have a quota problem.
- Use the Teagasc quota planner if in any doubt about your quota situation.
- The shorter dry period should be used to use up body condition on fat cows (body score 4.0).
- Thin cows who are milking well should be on 5-6 lbs. meal, if they are not due to calve until late Oct. -November.
- Summer mastitis is a big worry not only for autumn calvers but also for spring calving heifers.
- If not identified in time it will result in loss of quarter and maybe animal death.
- As the high risk period is mainly August and Sept., the dry .cows and heifers should be checked twice per day.
- Flies are the cause of the problem.
- Keep suspect cows/heifers away from trees, tall rough grass, ponds or other areas that attract flies.
- Farmers think a lot of stockholm tar as a preventative but some doubt surrounds its' benefit.
- Pour-ons, such as Butox, Dectomax, Eprinex, Ivomec, Tigavon and Vetrazin seem to be of benefit and their effect lasts for 4-6 weeks.
- Ear tags, such as Flectron, have given positive results in preventing summer mastitis.
- Dry cow mastitis treatment is a must, at drying-off.
- Affected animals should be removed from the herd, strip the quarter often (every 2-3 hours even at night) if you want to save it and use antibiotics under veterinary supervision.
- Dry cows should be used to clean out the paddocks after the main herd.
- But both lots of cows must not spend longer than 2 days in any paddock.
- This procedure will ensure the dry cows will not get too fat and also allows the main herd to milk to full potential by not having to graze too tight.
- It will pay to feed late lactation autumn calvers 4-6 lbs of meal, particularly if grass becomes tight.

Changing Liners For Better Performance: **FARMERS**

Eddie O'Callaghan, Teagasc, Moorepark recommends that milk liners should be changed after 2,500 cow milkings. This is usually 4 months into the milking season on most Irish farms. Therefore most dairy farmers should have changed their milk liners in the past month. Research carried out by Eddie O'Callaghan shows a reduction in milk yield of 6% and an increase in Somatic Cell Count (SCC) due to undermile ing from July onwards.

Cattle and Sucklers - Grass For Cattle:

- Must be managed like the cow area.
- No stemmy grass (look at yours and confirm this state-
- Keep dung pads (tall grass area) to 20-25%
- At high stocking rates (700 kgs of animal/Acre) 30 units of nitrogen needs to be spread after each grazing.
- Allow adequate grass per day.
- 40 store cattle need 0.6 acre per day of very good grass (2000 kgs).
- This is a time of the year when incalf heifers suffer and don't put on much weight
- Allow them grass as per previous paragraph.
- These are much more important animals than store bullocks or even weanling males
- The target weight for incalf heifers for this month should be 430 kgs.
- If you haven't a weighing scales, buy a weight band (£13) from your Co-Op and it will tell you within 10-20 kgs their
- Keep an eye on them for hoose and stomach worms, especially if they weren't on the white/yellow doses as
- Copper must also be considered, as per calves, on deficient farms.

Suckling

If possible start creepgrazing the weanlings ahead of the cows. In some cases, the gate between the two fields can be replaced by a creep gate. The gap between the vertical bars in the creep gate should be 45-50cm (17-20 inches) with an adjustable horizontal bar 90 - 1-5cms (36-42inches) high. Creep grazing requires a rotational grazing system and good fencing.

"With continuing strong demand for beef and live cattle in Europe, Ireland is winning back our important share of EU markets. In addition, he said the key indicators on international markets are also positive.

On cattle prices the livestock leader said the beef markets in both the UK and across Europe remain very strong. He said "Cattle prices in the UK are ranging between 95p/lb and £1/lb for the last number of weeks. Across Europe, prices are also strong with 94p/lb in Holland and up to 118p/lb in France."

"The live export trade to Europe is extremely buoyant. To the middle of July, Ireland has exported 160,000 head of cattle to European markets, up 200% on last year. In addition, we have exported 44,000 head to the Lebanon, compared to only 9,000 head last year."

On international beef markets, Thomas Leahy pointed out that world market prices have increased significantly and the exchange rate with the dollar is very favourable for international trading at \$1.349 against IR£.

"Taking account of all these positive signals in the cattle trade at present, there is no reason why there should not be a buoyant trade for cattle for the remainder of 1999. He said

IFA President Says Sheep Farmers Under Extreme Financial Pressure And Policy Changes Essential

Following an IFA National Sheep Committee Meeting in Dublin on Thursday, 12 August, the IFA President Tom Parlon said sheep farmers are under extreme financial pressure and he called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to make sheep policy changes a priority on the Agricultural agenda.

Mr Parlon said "the financial situation on sheep farms is so severe that many thousands of producers will be forced out of production unless firm action is taken by Minister Walsh at European level in delivering policy change". Mr Parlon pointed out that lamb prices have fallen heavily this year and are now up to 25% behind last years levels.

On the market side Tom Parlon said the domestic market urgently needs a major promotional campaign by An Bord Bia on lamb. Mr Parlon also called on Minister Walsh to investigate the option of an APS Scheme for

The IFA President outlined six new policy proposals agreed by the National Sheep Committee led by Sheep Chairman Frank Corcoran. In summary the IFA proposals involve:

- Ewe Premium a fairer and more equitable level of direct payment for sheep farmers, in line with other sec-
- 7% stabiliser abolition of the 7% stabiliser, which will be worth an additional £4.35 per ewe in premi-
- Extensification exclusion of the first thirty livestock units of sheep from the extensification premium stocking rate calculation.
- Retention Period the retention period for ewe premium should be brought forward and the 100 day retention period should begin when the application is
- Imports no increase in sheep meat imports into the EU under the next WTO round.
- Headage low land sheep farmers must be given priority to benefit from future changes in headage and a higher headage payment paid in third tier areas.

OPPORTUNITY TO MAKE CHANGES TO **QUOTA REGIME MUST BE GRASPED -IFA**

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murphy has said that, CAP Reform provided an important opportunity to make badly needed changes from next April to the way the milk quota is managed in Ireland. "We must grasp this opportunity to address the serious shortcomings of the current regime. We can help restructure our industry to make it healthier and fitter to face into an era of greater competition, while offering committed active producers improved access to low cost quota" Michael Murphy said.

Michael Murphy said that several dairy farmers' meetings had already been held across the country, as part of the ongoing National Dairy Committee's consultation

process on milk quota management.

'So far, the meetings indicate strong support for the Dairy Committee view that quota must be put permanently into the hands of active producers. It is clear that most dairy farmers support breaking the land quota link to allow quota to be sold at the lowest possible cost to priority active producers who have a long term commitment to the dairy industry.

"In relation to the allocation of the 2.86% extra quota, there is total consensus that the quota should be allocated to active producers only on a "use it or lose it" basis. Also a reasonable portion of the extra quota should be given to the Quota Appeals Tribunal for hardship cases". Michael Murphy pointed out that the 2.86% quota will not attract compensation for CAP Reform price cuts from 2005. "Distributing this quota across the board would make relatively little difference to individual producers, while allocating it on a targeted basis could be of significant benefit to a smaller number of priority producer," he added.

Michael Murphy said that the National Dairy Committee would only finalise its policy on quota management and on the allocation of the 2.86% extra quota after the ongoing consultation exercise is completed in September.



defensive outer layers one gets more in touch with feelings. When parents open lines of communication with the disfavoured child they let the child know they didn't realise how unhappy he was.

Next the parents should set about building the disfavoured child's self esteem through demonstrations of love spending time with him, praising him, acknowledging his positive side, listening to what he is saying, hugging him, allowing him to be himself, letting go of trying to control him which wasn't working very well anyway.

In working through problems a parent must remember a favoured child has a vested interest in maintaining this image and parents should never discuss a disfavoured child or a family strategy with a favoured child no matter how mature this favoured child is. Doing this is inappropriate, counter-productive and fuels further rivalry.

Patience is also necessary on nessed with sadness many parents admonish their children for not adjusting instantly to new situations such as first experiences at school, whether it be infant or secondary school. When parents do this they are contributing to their children's low self esteem, maladjustment in later life and make statements like 'You comparable to a life rescuing considerable disappointment with self which leads to selfhate. 

County Board Meeting

P. S. Ó Riain, Chairman, presided at last week's meting of the County Board, which was held in Dungarvan. At the outset, the chairman referred to the victory of the junior footballers in the All Ireland final on the previous Saturday and at this point, the team manager John Kiely who arrived carrying both the Munster and all Ireland Trophies, was given a standing ovation. The chairman in referring to the historic achievement, paid tribute to the players, the management team and supporters and John Kiely, responding, paid tribute to everyone who had contributed to the victory in any way.

He said the whole affair can only do good for football in Waterford. Among those who paid tribute was Meath born Christy O'Brien, Lismore delegate, who said that although he was a loyal and proud Meathman, he was genuinely delighted for Waterford in bringing the cup here to Waterford for the first time ever.

THE MICHAEL **DUNNE CUP**

What could only be described as one of the most magnificent cups ever donated to the County Board was also on display on the night. The chairman explained that this trophy was presented by the Dunne family of Kilmacthomas in honour of their father, the late Michael Dunne and who had served the County Board and the Kilmacthomas Club in several roles during his lifetime of service to the GAA in the

Having thanked the Dunne family and paid tribute to Michael, who, up to the time of his death, was one of the best known GAA personalities in the service of the Board, said that the cup would be presented annually to the winners of the Intermediate football championship.

CO. S.H. **SELECTORS**

This item on the agenda aroused quite a discussion. The chairman explained that the Executive Committee of the board had discussed the matter. He said it was now proposed to the meeting that the three principal officers consider and discuss the subject before making their recommendations to the Executive. They in turn would consider such proposals and if acceptable to them, would recommend them to the September meeting of the County Board. He told the meeting that Gerald McCarthy was remaining as Coach/Manager. He said the number of selectors with the manager would be two or four and he thought that four would be the ideal number.

REPORTS

There were final reports from the county selection committees whose charges went out of the championships since the previous meeting of the board. These were the senior hurling, under 21 hurling and junior football. There was little comment on the reports apart from the chairman's expression of appreciation of the service given by the players and selectors in all cases.

ALL-IRELAND 'B' FOOTBALL

A letter from Coisde na Peil, which gave details of their annual meeting and selection of officers, referred in depth to the junior football All Ireland victory. The report asked for county board approval to enter a team in the All Ireland 'B' senior football championship which is due to commence in late September. In support of the request, Coisde na Peil delegate, Tom Cunningham said the committee and players were looking forward to playing in the competition before training for the league commences and having won the junior title, we would be expected to take part.

big number of clubs were still involved in the championships. And also because a similar decision had been taken in relation to a request from Croke Park to have the county senior hurling team play in a special intercounty tournament confined to teams beaten in the early rounds. The matter was eventually put to a vote and the proposal to take part was defeated.

CHAMPIONSHIP **DRAWS**

Lismore were drawn against Ballygunner and this semi-final will be played at Fraher Field on Sunday September 5th (the Sunday before the All Ireland hurling final). County champions Mount Sion will play Passage at Walsh Park on Saturday, September 4th

All going well, the county final will be played on Sunday, September 19th at Walsh Park.

The Chairman congratulated Stradbally on winning the county under 21 football final against Rathgormack. He said it was a splendid game and a credit to both clubs. Tom Cunningham asked why there was no programme for the county final. Treasurer Tony Morrissey said that members of the Communications Committee including the PRO, were away on holidays. He assured the delegates that there would be programmes for the other finals.

John Lyons asked about the recent failure to announce the names of the participating teams over the public address at matches. He said people sitting in the stands did not always know the players and when Tallow played recently, a member of the media came down from the Press box to get their line-out. He was informed that the public apparatus was out of order because of vandalism over a couple of weeks, but that right and would not be a problem in future.

FINANCE

The report by the Treasurer, Tony Morrissey, showed that expenses are running well ahead of income at the moment. It was pointed out that the overall costs of team training will run to about £100,000 before the season ends. There is very little revenue from games as the championships have only just begun. The treasurer stated that if the returns from the upcoming championship games are satisfactory, we may be able to remain in the black at the end of the year.

CLUB LOAN SCHEME

In response to a question, the chairman informed the meeting that the response was excellent and several of the outstanding clubs had come on board tonight. Now only six clubs were outstanding and it was expected that these would be with the Runaí within the next couple of weeks.

Declan O'Meara reported that the numbers in the Deise draw were holding up very well and if this is sustained additional prize money will be on offer. Also, he said, it was planned to give an incentive to clubs who continue to increase their member-

It was stated that a very serious look will be taken at team costings from now on and under no circumstances will panels be allowed to exceed the stipulated 24 members.

STAND **TICKETS** ALLOCATION

A letter from the Dungarvan Club complained about the distribution of tickets for the Munster final and stated that they had received no allocation. James Tobin, Shamrocks Club, said they had applied for 20 tickets and had received none. Jack Cullinane, Bernard Shields and others also spoke on the subject.

The chairman said that it is impossible to estimate the number of tickets required for any particular match, apart from the All Ireland finals. He said that the demand depends on which counties are involved and if they were distributed on a club basis, many clubs would hand them back to the board. It would help, he said, if clubs notified the board of their requirements

ALL-IRELAND **TICKETS**

Delegates were informed that Croke Park had notified the board that a ten per cent cut would have to be made in the allocation of tickets to all counties including the participating counties. This is a consequence of the Canal End stand (Phase 2) not being completed on schedule. The chairman stated that there will have to be a reduction in all allocations as a result. He said that our sponsors will have to be looked after as without their support we would not be able to carry on the activities of the board.

Tom Browne, Ballinameela said that clubs should be the first priority as without the clubs there would be no GAA and then there would be no need for sponsors.

John Lyons, Western Board, asked why there was no representative from this division on the three man ticket committee. The chairman replied that the committee comprised of the County Secretary, Treasurer and Denis Hanrahan, Secretary of the Eastern Board. He said that he had no problem about having a Western official included, but it was a matter for

county convention. The feeling came across very strongly that the allocation to clubs should not be reduced.

OTHER **MATTERS**

The problems in trying to organise group teams for the championships were outlined by James Tobin. He found that clubs were unwilling to release players and most players were more interested in their own club championships, etc. He would not be involved with a group team in future.

Jack Cullinane asked why more games were not being played in Cappoquin. The SHC game between Ballyduff and Lismore was well handled and took a gate of £2,600. The chairman complimented Cappoquin on the highly efficient manner in which that fixture was controlled. Their point about more games, would be taken note of.

In response to a complaint that the new electronic scoreboard was not in operation, James Hennessy, chairman of the Walsh Park Field Committee stated that the contract with the sponsors of the old scoreboard will not end until the end of this year and for legal reasons they had to continue with this.

Tom Greaney R

Tom was one of the last surviving members of the 1938 Waterford senior hurling team who played in our first ever All Ireland senior final. William (Doyle) Walsh, who played his club hurling with Portlaw, is now the last remaining member of the side which took us to Croke Park just on sixty years ago. The most recent member of the team to pass away was Willie Barron who died

Dungarvan's Tom Greaney was certainly one of the outstanding hurlers and footballers of his day and at centre forward, he played a major role in our first senior hurling championship victory in Munster. He was outstanding in the games against Cork (at Shandon Field), Clare in the provincial final , Galway in the semi-final and against Dublin who defeated us by 2 points in the

Tom Greaney, who played hurling and football for the county, was a member of the 1931 junior team which won us our first adult title. In 1935 he played football for Munster against Leinster in the Railway Cup final. This old Dungarvan man played hurling with Civil Service and football with Geraldines in Dublin. As a mark of respect to his memory, the tricolour was flown at half mast at all venues in the county over the weekend.
