Motor Cycle Escapee Charged

A motorcyclist who, it is alleged, passed through a Garda checkpoint at high speed near Moonamean on the N25 managed to escape handcuffed from custody last Saturday morning.

The man, who is from the Newcastle area of South Tipperary was driving a stolen motorcycle with a pillion passenger on board when he passed through the checkpoint on the main Waterford/Cork road at very high speeds. The Garda operating the speed checkpoint subsequently gave chase and the motorcyclist left the main road before eventually crashing.

The pillion passenger was taken to Cork Regional Hospital while the driver was arrested and handcuffed at the scene. He managed to make good his escape however and was at large in the Ardmore/Grange area for a number of hours before he was detained by Gardai.

The man appeared at a special court sitting in Carrick-on-Suir last Monday night where he was charged on two counts of dangerous driving, unauthorised taking of a motorcycle and escaping from lawful custody.

He was due to appear again at a sitting of Clonmel District Court last evening (Tuesday).

In the case of joint accounts, cover attaches to the member who signs the Promissory Note first.



Cappoquin Tidy Team To The Fore



The Tidy Team was formed in the school year of 1996/1997 and consisted of 15 girls, pupils of the Convent of Mercy Primary School from 5th and 6th Classes. Under the Leadership of a member of the Cappoquin Community Development Company, Tom Hackett and with the encouragement of teacher Maire Kearney the team met weekly to clear out streets of litter. Yellow jackets and pikka sticks for this purpose were provided by Waterford Council. The team's efforts were rewarded by the award of Best Environment Project 1997. A number of members departed to secondary education in 1998 and new and younger members came forward. Members ages range from the youngest at 5 years to the oldest at 13 years with a total strength of 18 members.

The team assists in the daily clean-up of their school area and with the Team Leader carry out a litter clearance programme on our streets on Saturday mornings. This video is intended to focus attention on the team's efforts and to promote a sense of environmental awareness. Fund raising to defray production costs is being carried out by team members with the help of 3 students from the Convent Secondary School.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am getting a Carer's Allowance and have been offered 10 hours work per week. Will earnings from the 10 hours work be assessed as means?

ANSWER

The Carer's Allowance Scheme has recently been expanded and improved to enable people in receipt of Carer's Allowance to do up to 10 hours work per week and still maintain their allowance.

A carer may attend an educational or training course or take up voluntary or community work for up to 10 hours per week. They may engage in limited self-employment from home or employment outside the home for up to 10 hours per week but these earnings will be assessed as means. The work must first be cleared with the Department of Social Community and Family Affairs and during the absence, adequate care for the person requiring full-time care and attention must be arranged.

From August, 1999 up to £75 for a single person and £150 for a couple will be disregarded in the assessment of earnings

All carers who claim a Carer's Allowance must satisfy certain conditions of award. If you need more information about these conditions you should contact The Carer's Allowance Section, Department of Social Community and Family Affairs, Áras Mhic., Dhiarmade, Dublin 1. 





LATE BILL RYAN — AN APPRECIATION —

Most clubs can look back on the folded page of history and recall the exploits of great, exceptional players. Players who have contributed handsomely to important victories and great occasions. Bill Ryan fits readily into that category.

Born in the twilight of 1920, the same year as another great sportsman Christy Ring, Bill has earned his place in Fourmilewater hurling club's hall of fame. In a career spanning the late thirties, forties and early fifties, he earned the respect of colleagues and opponents throughout the county with outstanding performances, great leadership but above all, superb sportsmanship.

His championship debut came in 1939 against Abbeyside in Dungarvan and although the game ended in defeat, the next 16 seasons saw Bill on the cornerstone of the club. In the early years his colleagues included such staunch clubmen as John Joe Moore, Paddy John, Willie and Johnny Grant, Tom Fitzgerald, John Moloney and Paddy Ormonde and as the years progressed Paddy Halpin, Liam and Eamonn Ryan, Billy Grant, Mickey and Dan Desmond, Kieran O Ryan, Ned Sheehan and many others joined him in the fray.

His display against Brickey Rangers in Modeligo in 1943, versus Eire Og in Cappoquin in 1951 and two epic clashes against Brickey Rangers and St. Mary's in 1953 will rank amongst his finest hours. But, in truth, he had many fine hours.

Tussles with worthy opponents have often been recalled but the consensus amongst friend and foe has always been that Bill was a great player. He played intercounty hurling and football for Waterford and also served the Nire Football club with distinction, the winners of the County Junior title in 1942 being perhaps the highlight. Two great hurling clashes against Ballyduff in 1953 will also be recalled when the reds inspired by Mick Beecher win the replayed Western Finala game that inspired Beecher to say "Ye'll make it next year".

Make it they did as Fourmilewater defeated Colligan, Brickey Rangers and then Tallow in the Western Final. His last game for the club was the 1954 County Final against De La Salle and although it wasn't crowned with a county medal as De La Salle took the honours, it certainly wasn't Bill's fault. Bill subsequently retired and when Fourmilewater win their first county title in 1955 nobody was happier than Bill.

He served as club secretary in the late forties, as selector, fundraiser and finally as a great supporter. When we were researching the club history in the late 80's, our travels took us outside the area and we recall the many individuals who referred to Bill Ryan and his prowess on the playing fields.

The huge crowd that turned out at his removal and burial spoke for itself much more so than any penned tribute can tell. One of Fourmilewater's greatest sons has gone to his reward. To Madge, family and extended family goes our deepest sympathy. His loss is great but the many great memories of his life and times are a mighty consolation. A great gentleman, may the heavens be his bed.





Mouth-watering Minestrone

THE homemade version of this tasty, famous and extremely healthy Italian soup is a delicious revela-

ingredients:

Serves 4

1 large leek, thinly sliced 2 carrots, chopped

1 zucchini, thinly sliced 100g whole green beans, halved

2 celery sticks, thinly sliced

3 x 15ml sp olive oil 11/2 quarts vegetable

stock or water 500g chopped tomatoes 1 x 15ml sp chopped fresh thyme or 1/2 x 5ml sp dried

400g can cannellini beans 1/4 cup small pasta shapes

Ground black pepper Chopped fresh parsley Finely grated parmesan cheese

Method:

In a large saucepan, place the olive oil, leek, carrots. zucchini, green beans and celery.

Heat until sizzling. Cover, lower heat and cook for 15 minutes, shaking the pan occasionally.

Add the stock or water, iomatoes, neros and sea soning.

Bring to the boil, replace the lid and simmer gently for 30 minutes.

Add the beans and their liquid together with the pasta and simmer for a further 10 minutes

Check the seasoning and serve hot, sprinkled with fresh parsley and parmesan cheese, if desired.

TIP: Try to make the Minestrone a day early and refrigerate, as improves the flavours.

Blackcurrant Cheesecake

Preparation: 10 minutes + cooling. Cooking: 5 minutes.

Serves: 6

350g/12 oz cottage cheese 100g/4 oz cream cheese 50g/2 oz caster sugar Grated rind and juice of 1 lemon 2 tsp powdered gelatine 150ml/4 oz double cream 1 (214g/71/2 oz) can blackcurrants in fruit

iuice

1 tsp cornflour 1 tbsp caster sugar

Sprigs of mint to decorate Shortbread fingers to serve

METHOD

Press cottage cheese through a fineholed sieve into a bowl. Beat in cream cheese, sugar and lemon rind and juice. Place 2 tbsp water in a small bowl.

Sprinkle the gelatine over and leave for 5 minutes.

Place bowl in a pan of hot water and leave until gelatine dissolves. Cool slightly, the beat into the cheese mixture. Whip cream until it holds soft peaks. Carefully fold into the cheese mixture. Divide mixture between 6 small ramekin dishes until set.

Strain the blackcurrants, reserving the fruit juice.

In a small pan blend a little of the juice with the cornflour. Add the remianing juice and 1 tbsp caster sugar.

Cook, stirring for 2 minutes, until thickened. Allow to cool for 15 minutes. Spoon the blackcurrants ove r the cheesecakes. Cover with the thickened syrup. Chill until ready to serve. Decorate with mint and serve with shortbread fingers.

Rich Scottish Chocolate Cake

A HICH Scottish recipe for a 150ml milk chocolate sandwich cake 150ml vegetable oil with a difference.

Ingredients:

Makes 20cm cake Butter for greasing Flour for dusting

FOR SPONGE:

175g plain flour 50g cocoa powder 2 x 15ml sp black treacle

2 medium eggs 1 x 5ml sp baking powder 1 x 5ml sp bicarbonate

of soda 75g caster sugar

FOR FILLING:

75g plain chocolate, crumbled 25g butter, cubed 150ml double cream, lightly whipped Icing sugar for dusting

Method:

the oven Preheat 170°C/325°F/ Gas Mark 3. Butter and flour two 20cm cake tins.

Whisk the sponge ingredients together and divide between the two tins.

Bake for 30-35 minutes. Let the cake stand for 10 minutes then turn out on to wire racks until quite cool. For the filling, melt the chocolate in a bowl over a saucepan of hot water. Stir in the cubes of butter until melted.

Leave to cool then spread to on top of one cake layer. Top with double cream then second sponge.

Dust with icing sugar. Serve cool with fresh strawberries on the side for a rich and succulent treat.

Progress Sought On Affordable **Housing Scheme**

Local authorities throughout Co. Waterford are being urged to follow the example of Carrick-On-Suir U.D.C. who are currently proceeding with an initial sale of ten houses on land available to them under the new affordable housing scheme.

Commending the Carrick-On-Suir initiative, Cllr. Fiachra O'Ceilleachair says their decision to seek qualifiers to purchase their own house at a significant discount from the market value of comparable houses in the area is an important move in alleviating difficulties being encountered by young couples with the housing market. Cllr. O'Ceilleachair is pressing both Waterford County Council and Dungarvan U.D.C. to identify lands suitable for the implementation of similar ventures in West Waterford.

"Under this scheme houses are offered for sale to low income households and tenant/tenant purchasers at cost price. There is 95% mortgage finance provided by the local authority, available at favourable rates. A subsidy is available for households with incomes of up to £16,000. A £3,000 house grant is available to first time purchasers. The maximum income in question is under £20,000 for the year ended April 5, 1999. Effectively participants are given a chance to purchase their own home for £65 a week, based on a mortgage of £65,000 with an income of less than £16,000 getting a weekly subsidy of £19. A variable interest rate of 4.52% including mortgage protection is also available. I know of plenty of people throughout West Waterford who would love to avail of this scheme."



Grower's Guide To Sweet Peas



A GREAT BUNCH: Sweet peas grow easily - and look great

AS plants go, sweet peas aren't too fussy, yet gardeners everywhere struggle to achieve impressive blooms.

Sweet peas are frost-hardy plants which enjoy fertile, welldrained soil in full sun. They are not to be confused with the sweet pea shrub which should be planted in light, well-drained soil in a sunny to part-shaded spot, or the sweet pea bush which needs light, well-drained soil in full sun.

One of the most common mistakes to make is not to realise which type of sweet pea you are attempting to cultivate.

SWEET PEAS

Sweet peas are native to Italy but the original plant has been much improved on by gardeners. They are vigorous climbing annuals, grown usually for their sweet scented flowers.

The flowers grow in a wide range of colours - blue, brown, white, cream, pink, orange, mauve, lavender, maroon and scarlet - and make excellent cut flowers. The plants usually grow to about 1.8m or 6ft or more in height, although there are dwarf and non-climbing cultivars available.

Climbers will need support such as wire netting or lattice. They are ideal for covering sunny walls or fences.

Sweet peas flower in the summer and prefer small hedge or

Dead flowers should be removed regularly. The plants may be affected by mildew and the fungal disease botrytis. Sweet pea bush:

This species grows to be a rather open, small tree about 3.5m or 12ft high and nearly as wide.

The silver-grey foliage is as much a feature as the masses of

This is an undemanding and reliable plant in mild climates. This type of plant thrives in a seaside garden (or similar coastal conditions), in a sunny or semi-shaded position.

A light trimming after flowering keeps the bushes compact. **SWEET PEA SHRUB**

The shrub is a hybrid of two South American species and bears soft magenta flowers almost non-stop in mild regions.

It forms a mound about 1 to 1.5m tall and wide and has slender, light green leaves. It may become bare at the base. It will tolerate shearing to encourage more dense growth. This should be done after the main flowering has finished. These shrubs are suitable for pot culture.

THE FUTURE DIRECTION OF IRISH FARMING Part 2: Farm Investment

Capital Allowances For Pollution Control, Dairy Facilities And Animal Welfare

In the four year period 1994-1997, £645m was invested by farmers in farm buildings. Most of the investment now required is related to environmental protection and new standards and as such will not yield an increased income to the farm family. The investment required cannot be funded from declining farm incomes. Total onfarm investment as a percentage of income has increased from 22.5% in 1993 to 34% in 1997.

The restriction on capital allowances is severely affecting farmers who have to undertake on-farm development work to control pollution, to upgrade their facilities to comply with the EU milk hygiene regulations or to meet new animal welfare regulations. The current rules on capital allowances for on-farm investment need to be changed. The special depreciation rules introduced for three years from April 6, 1997 extends the normal writing down period from 7 years to 8 years and places a limit of £20,000 on expenditure for the farm pollution control allowance. Furthermore the special 50% allowance can only be taker, in the first year as no part of the special allowance can be carried forward to other years. These restrictions should be changed.

PUBLIC CAPITAL PROGRAMME AND FARM INVESTMENT

In the programme for Government "An action Programme for the Millennium" the Government undertook to restore the Control of Farmyard Pollution Scheme (CFP) and to put in place a new scheme to encourage on-farm investment. The re-allocation of £20m within the structural funds for the CFP scheme and the allocation in the last 1998 budget will be used on meeting existing commitments under this scheme. The level of funding will be grossly inadequate, having regard to the scale of new investment which must be undertaken.

While the overall public capital expenditure for the agricultural and food sector has increased since 1994, the level of net Exchequer capital expenditure allocated for the Department of Agriculture has declined.

ICMSA PROPOSALS

1. It is essential that worthwhile Control of Farmyard Pollution and the Dairy Hygiene Improvement Schemes are re-introduced as a matter of priority and that these schemes are properly and adequately funded.

2. Exchequer capital expenditure for the agricultural and food sectors should be increased by at least £30m for 1999 in order to provide funding for the reintroduction of CFP, Dairy Hygiene and other on-farm grant schemes.

THE COST BURDEN IN IRISH FARMING

Irish farming and the food sector accounts directly for 33% and net foreign earnings. Given the high level of export from the sector and its importance as a generator of foreign earnings, the cost competitiveness of Irish agriculture must be a key consideration in public policy in this area. Specifically the burden placed on farming with regard to compliance with the various national and EU Regulations must not be such as to make Irish agriculture less competitive. In this regard specific account will have to be taken of agriculture in any measure to impose a carbon or energy

A TAX INCENTIVE SCHEME TO ENCOURAGE CATTLE SUPPLY CONTRACTS

Restricted access to intervention, further reform of the CAP and the impact of GATT commitments on reducing subsidised exports will result in major changes and challenges to the Irish beef sector in particular.

The Irish beef sector must develop more markets within the EU. This development is not alone an important issue for the agri-food sector but it has major economic implications in terms of employment, value added and exports. The development of sustainable markets for Irish beef will require longterm commitment to supply the customer in an even pattern throughout the year. Supply contracts between farmers and the processor should be actively encouraged so that the processor will have greater certainty of supply of cattle of a particular type to meet specific market outlets and demands.

In addition, the farmer would have greater certainty of income and could be fully rewarded for the specific breeding and feeding programme he has adopted to meet the specifications of the market place as set down in the supply contract

ICMSA PROPOSALS

1. A 12.5% tax rate, similar to the agreed single corporation tax rate, should apply for farm profits arising from the sale of cattle made under a supply contract.

2. The details of the contract could specify the pattern of supply throughout the year.

3. Each supply contract scheme could be subject to prior Revenue approval. The Competitive Marketing Of Irish Agricultural And Food Products

Irish farmers have suffered constantly the lowest prices within the EU for milk and beef. The two sectors account for apparently 70% of the total agricultural output.

Unfortunately the unfavourable price gap has widened in recent times. Many measures of competitiveness can be used but the acid test as far as producers are concerned is the return to them in terms of price per litre of milk or kilogram of beef supplied for processing. An Bord Bia in particular must become more focussed in promoting and providing market support in the beef sector.



The Science of Farming and Food Dairying

PROTEIN TARGET 3.5%:

The target for this month is 3.4 to 3.55%.

This is being achieved by farmers who have participated in the protein 350 competition.

Because milk yield is decreasing, it should be possible to get large lifts in protein over July but this doesn't happen because:

Grass quality can be very disappointing.

Tom Shanahan in the Teagasc/Kerry PLC survey showed that grass DMD in August was 2 DMD units poorer than July and the variation was 13 units between farms.

This 13 DMD units would reduce milk yield by more than 2.5 gallons/cow and protein by nearly 0.2%.

Some penalty to pay for poor quality grass.

Be generous when offering aftergrass to cows.

Don't make them skin it below 5 cms.

Don't make them walk over huge areas to search for small quantities of aftergrass.

This will adversely affect protein and also the recovery of the aftergrass.

 Be careful not to let watery-milk (rinse wash) onto the bulk tank.

Some Co-ops say that 1.6% of rinse wash will reduce protein by 0.6% or 1.6 gallons of water per 100 gallons of milk which is easily let in.

That day is gone: you don't get paid for water, so, be more than particular not to let any rinse water into the bulk tank.

Mastitis, in the form of high SCC, won't help protein either.

If grass is getting scarce introduce meal in time.
 to 4lb. can work wonders but a cheap pulp/gluten mix will be adequate.

CALF THRIVE

Grass is the cheapest way of getting this.

Some farmers are achieving 0.8 kgs/day during this period from grass only.

● The basic principle with calf management must be to keep them on the move:

Every second day or at worst every 5 or 6 days.

This ensures quality grass for them and a lower chance of infection from hoose worms.

• Rotate the calves in front of bigger cattle. But you must allow enough acres for them during August:

Allow one acre for every 3 calves and put 600-700 kgs of animal on each acre. Therefore 30 calves and 30 stores (400 kgs each) require 30 acres for grazing in August.

● If grass is getting scarce you could justify meal feeding: Because the response is 4 to 1, this means that every 4 lbs. of meal (costing 26pence) gives one lb. gain (worth 40-50p.),therefore feed 2-3 lbs.

Small calves definitely need 3-4 lbs. to push them on. This meal can also allow grass to build up so that it will be in

the animal's diet for longer in the autumn.

Dose for stomach worms every 3-4 weeks with yellow or

white doses. But it is more important to have 'clean' grass (grass not previously grazed by calves in the last 2 months) for them.

Watch carefully for hoose

Dose at the earliest signs of coughing, even long acting doses may not guarantee safety from hoose.

The penalty is lack of thrive and even deaths will result.

 Copper deficiency could begin to manifest itself in bucket reared calves from now on. On farms with severe copper deficiency a bolus may be necessary.

Cattle

EXTENDING THE GRAZING SEASON

The response to nitrogen declines rapidly during September. By late September or early October, there may only be a break-even response of 3-5kgs grass dry matter per kg of nitrogen applied. Therefore where grass is scarce, spread nitrogen now. As each paddock or field is grazed out, apply up to 40 units of nitrogen per acre. Continue to do this up to late September. The response to this late September nitrogen may be close to break-even, but it could be much higher on nitrogen deficient soils. To extend the grazing season as far as possible, good utilisation of whatever grass is available will be necessary. Use temporary electric fencing to ration out grass to animal requirements. In this way there is less trampling and wastage; fields can be grazed out cleanly; the grass ahead of stock in the areas not being grazed continues to grow and you can get back faster with nitrogen on the part that was grazed.

Suckling farmers that are short of grass should start creep feeding the weanlings immediately with a view to early weanling. A dry cow similar to a dry ewe needs much less feed than a suckling cow.

Dairy Herd Declaration And Certification Form Is Only About Animal Health

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee, Michael Murphy said he was concerned that there may be confusion among farmers and vets regarding the new Dairy Herd Veterinary Certificate, now referred to as the Declaration and Certification.

"The Declaration and Certification is to be co-signed by the farmer and the vet of his/her choice by June 30, 2000. I want to make it absolutely clear to farmers that the vet's role in signing the form is only about proper handling by the farmer of animal health issues. Veterinary surgeons have no role whatsoever in relation to milk quality, which is controlled and tested by Co-Ops nor to hygiene of milking premises, which is checked by Department of Agriculture inspectors under a separate scheme,' he said.

"For many dairy farmers, this is the time of year when their annual TB herd test is due. This is the most logical time for the D & C form to be co-signed by the farmer and the vet of his/her choice. As soon as they engage a veterinarian to carry out their annual herd test, farmers should inform the vet that they expect the D & C form to be

signed in conjunction with the TB test. This ensures that the scheme is operated in a cost-efficient way without compromising on the quality of the vet's assessment, as every cow is examined twice in detail on this occasion.

This was anticipated by the EU legislation which makes it quite clear that a special veterinary visit is not required and that the inspection for this purpose of this scheme can take place at the same time as other veterinary work on the farm," he added.

Michael Murphy stated that a good number of veterinarians all around the country had accepted this and signed the Declaration and Certification in conjunction with the TB test.

"Farmers should remember that, while the vet signs the form based on their inspection of the animals on one day of the year, the farmer's signature testifies to the farmer's professionalism for the remaining 364

days," he said

'Farmers are fully committed to ensuring that the Declaration and Certification scheme is operated properly. Equally though they do not want it to develop into an unjustifiably costly exercise. I have no doubt that where the vet/client relationship is good, which is the case between most farmers and their vet, the D&C form will be co-signed at the time of the TB herd test," he concluded.

Glanbia On-Account Grain Price Attempts To Defy Logic

IFA's National Grain Committee Chairman, Mr. Ruaidhri Deasy has described Glanbia's announcement of an on-account price of £76 per tonne for green barley and £78 for green wheat as "an attempt to defy logic of the market place."

He said, "Market analysis carried by the IFA and others shows that a price of £82 to £85 per tonne for quality green barley with quality wheat worth a premium of £2 to £4 more, is justifiable as buyers in market have already paid these prices. New crop Irish barley is currently trading £5 to £7 per tonne above last year's price and UK ex-farm prices are running £9 sterling higher than last harvest.

All in all the market fundamentals are pointing to a sustainable rise in the price of grain this year, yet two major buyers are attempting to scuttle this year's trade by declaring a ridiculously low on-account price."

Mr. Deasy said, "I am urging farmers to take a similar approach to these merchants when settling up their accounts. Take a critical look at what you are being charged for your inputs and credit charges and then decide what price you can afford to pay for them. A totally unacceptable situation has developed over the last few years whereby some of the major players will not give you a price on your inputs, or if they do, it is a totally unrealistic one. By the same token, when farmers go to sell their grain, they are quoted an unrealistically low price and expected to deliver it into merchants yards."

"If needs be, I will personally go around to information meetings and advise growers what the competitive prices for inputs are. Farmers should drive a hard bargain before delivering or selling their grain to merchants. Ideally they should tip their grain and auction it to the highest bidder," concluded Mr. Deasy.







STRIKING SIMILARITIES BETWEEN CASES

Gardai have stated that there are striking similarities between the Tallow case and two unsolved abduction attempts in Co. Kilkenny earlier this year. A red Opel car was used in all three attempts. The serial murder investigation known as 'Operation Trace' is now examining a possible link between the Tallow abduction bid and 11 unsolved cases.

Operation Trace officers will compare details of the abduction attempt with other cases. The details are fed into a computer programme designed to note similari-

The inquiry was set up after the disappearance of student teacher Deirdre Jacob (18) in Newbridge, Co. Kil-

The team is also examining the baffling disappearance of a number of young women in the midlands over the past number of years. At least six are believed to have been murdered and a number of highly publicised disappearances happened on roadsides in broad daylight.

Some unsolved cases include the disappearance of Fiona Sinnot (19) in Broadway, Wexford 1997; Fiona Pender (25) in Tullamore, Offaly 1996; Jo Jo Dullard (20) in Castledermot, Kildare 1995 and Ciara Breen (17) in Dundalk 1997.



They should learn something from this meeting in advance of next year's fixture by dropping some of these flat events and replacing them with National Hunt races. Just take Kilbeggan Track in Co. out a trainers licence before the end of the year. Westmeath for example. They cater exclusively for jumpers throughout the summer months and the place is packed.

Another disappointing aspect during the week was the absence of starting stalls for the flat races. In this day and age I cannot understand how starting stalls Tommy, Paul is pleased with his progress and is lookwere not available for the one mile one furlong races. 
