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Traffic Problems Highlighted In Expanding Ballinroad

Once a small crossroads settlement, Ballinroad is fast developing into a residential suburb of nearby Dungarvan. Traffic problem, such as speeding, inadequate signs and road markings long been highlighted by local residents and elected representatives alike. The additional volume of traffic generated by new housing developments in the areas of Ballinroad, Ballinacourty and Clonea have served to highlight the inadequacy of the local road system.

The 90 house development opposite Ballinroad Church is currently nearing completion and the County Council are now examining an application by Novacourt Construction for a 51 house estate nearby.

Meanwhile a planning application has also been lodged by the builders/developers of Knocknagrannagh Park - James Moroney, McGrane and

Partners - for the construction of a pub, three shops and six apartments in Ballinroad.

WORK AT CASEY'S CROSS

Speaking to the 'Leader' this week, Waterford County Councillor Nuala Ryan said the fine summer just past has again highlighted the need for improvement work to be carried out at the junction at Tallaghcool-

more, known locally as Casey's Cross, on the road between Ballinroad and Clonea. With an almost continuous stream of traffic using this road, she said that exiting from the junction has been hazardous at best. This is particularly noticeable for traffic coming from the Gold Coast and turning right to go to Clonea beach.

Cllr. Ryan met on site recently with the Area Engi-

neer Joe Brennan to discuss the matter. They agreed that the sight distance was inadequate for traffic coming out onto the junction from the Gold Coast. Cllr. Ryan asked that as a temporary solution, a mirror be erected to improve the view for motorists.

Negotiations are ongoing between local landowners and the Council with a view to setting back some of the fences at this junction which would be a more permanent solution.

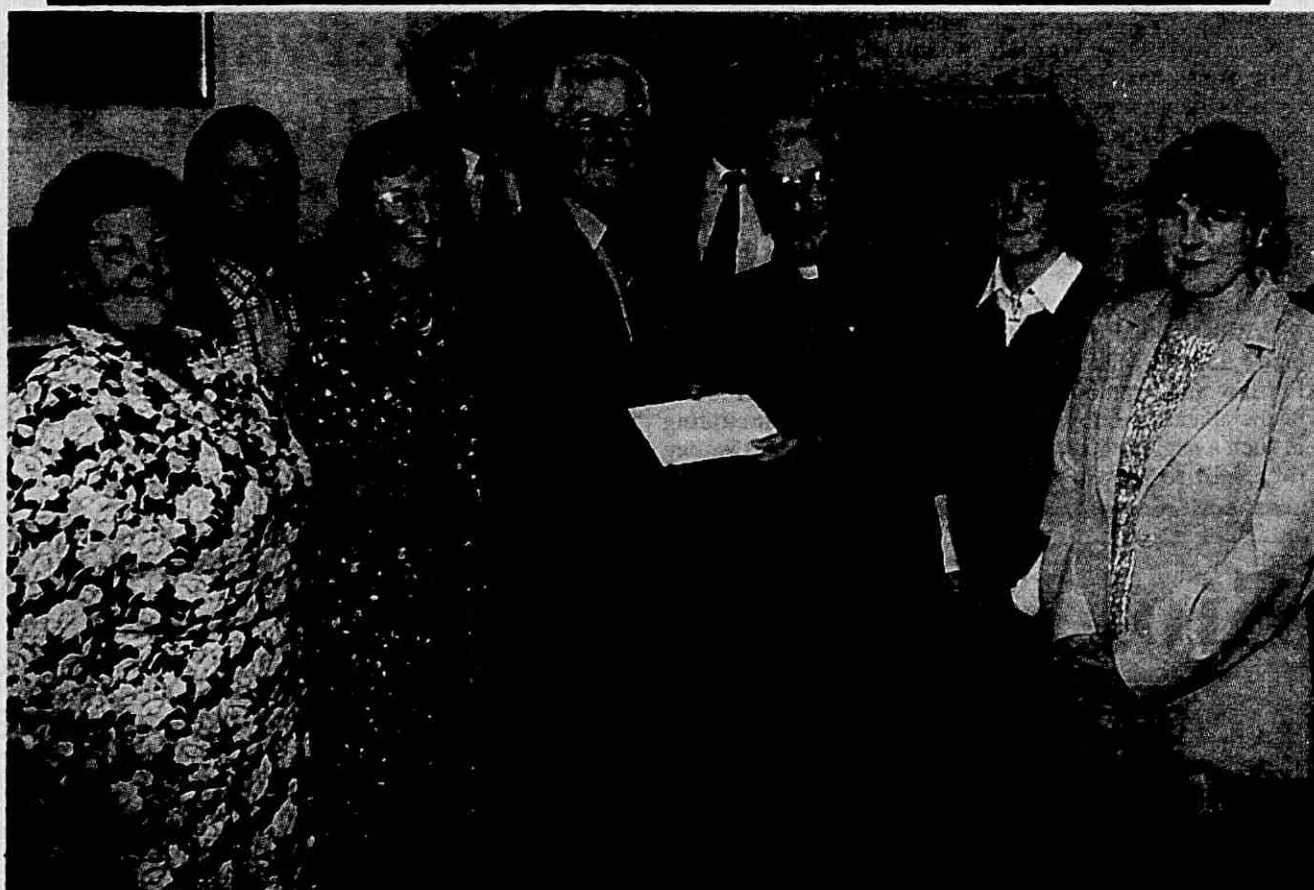
"The mirror is now on order", says Cllr. Ryan, "and will be in place shortly. I realise that this is only

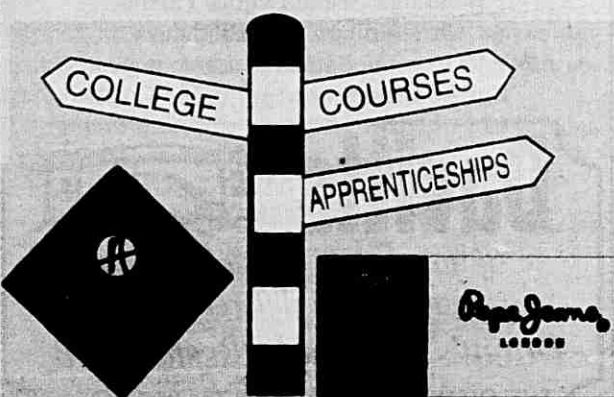

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Twelve Dogs Found Abandoned In Space Of Two Days

A plea has been made to all owners of unwanted dogs to contact the Waterford pound rather than simply abandoning their animals.

Waterford Dog Warden Ollie Walsh has appealed to owners of unwanted dogs not to leave them at the side of the road.

His plea came after he recently collected twelve abandoned dogs within the space of just 48 hours from various parts of the county. Mr. Walsh found the mixed breed dogs at Mahon Falls, Portlaw and Tramore. Four of the abandoned dogs were in such a neglected state that they had to be put down

while two others were successfully rehomed.

"It is very sad to see animals being abandoned like this", said Mr. Walsh. He reminded owners that the city pound at Bilberry is open every morning from 9.30 a.m. to 10.30 a.m. and can be contacted anytime at (051) 872247.

"If there is anyone who has a dog that they don't want, I would ask them to please contact us and we will come and collect them", he added.

The Dog Wardens are currently inspecting areas in West Waterford, including Tallow, Dungarvan, Lismore and Cappoquin.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question:-

I am a student, working full-time in a supermarket since June. I get paid £3 per hour but do not get a wage slip. Am I entitled to a wage slip even if I'm only in summer work?

Answer:-

All employees are entitled to a wage slip under the Payment of Wages Act 1991. The wage slip should state your gross pay and any deductions made. Employers failing to comply may be fined up to £1,000 on conviction. As you are a full-time worker and have been in employment for over one month you are entitled to protection under the Terms of Employment Act. Under this Act an employee working not less than 8 hours per week who has one month's service is entitled to be given a statement in writing, within a month, containing details of the basic terms and conditions of their employment. This would cover items like pay, hours of work, holiday entitlements, sick pay entitlement (if any) and the existence or otherwise of a pension. Anyone who works for an employer for a regular wage or salary has automatically a contract of employment whether written or not.

The Organisation of Working Time Act 1997 entitles you to the minimum holiday entitlement of either full-time or part-time employees. The current full-time entitlement is 20 days. For part-time employees it is currently 8% of hours worked. Employees are also entitled to a minimum of 9 public holidays and for part-time workers, if they are not due to work on a public holiday, they are entitled to half day off in lieu or a half day's pay.

All employees are entitled to receive a P45 when they leave the job.

Council Chairmen Call For Support for Waterford Ladies

In the run-up to the crucial Ladies Senior Football All Ireland Semi-Final next Saturday, the Chairmen of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban District Council call for full support for the Waterford women who have already achieved so much in what is becoming a highly competitive sport.

On Saturday the women of the Deise take on Monaghan and such is the rivalry between the two counties and the skills of the two teams, it is only the very unwise who would venture a big bet on the outcome of the game.

Though the Waterford camp are committed to giving their all in this crucial clash, and have it within their power to humble the Monaghan women, Michael Ryan and the team know that they cannot relax until the final whistle blows.

Which is why Cllr. Lar Hart, a keen supporter of all the Waterford Ladies teams and Cllr. Patsy Kenneally, a former County footballer have decided to publicly call for support for the team.

They are agreed that support on the terraces could well be the final difference between the teams and don't wish to see this group of stouthearted players short-changed in any way.

"They deserve the full might of a Waterford crowd behind them", they said

after a team training session last Friday night, "and we are urging everyone who has any feel for the Waterford colours to board a bus, drive their car, hitch a lift, or even walk to Parnell Park in Dublin to cheer on their side. That is the least they deserve after giving their full commitment to the game for over a decade and coming together on over sixty occasions this year alone."

Such dedication should be rewarded they agree and the best way of showing the

public's appreciation is by being on the terraces in Parnell Park to lift them if they flag through the hour.

"Monaghan are pulling out all the stops", it is reported "and we must at least match anything they can muster."

The excessively robust Monaghan tackle on minor player Niamh Barry, which ensured a Sunday night visit by her to Waterford Regional Hospital last week, may well be a strong weapon in Waterford's armoury next Saturday. While no one is suggesting that there was any malicious intent, the bottom line is that Waterford may not have the services and speedy legs of this up and coming, highly talented young player, which would be tragic indeed.

Last weekend Michael Ryan was not willing to write off the young player from his list, hoping for at least some of the match from the Dunhill-Fenor stalwart. The loss of the young player would be as much an inspiration to her colleagues as her valued contribution and on this occasion, Monaghan may well have overplayed their hand.

NOTE — Those travelling to Parnell Park from the south should take the Croke Park route through Dorset Street and Drumcondra, past the Skylon Hotel, turning right into Griffith Avenue. At the end of Griffith Avenue turn left onto dual carriageway. After about 500 yards, on the right hand side is a church and Parnell Park is behind that church.

a stop-gap measure but it will have a major effect on people's confidence using the junction".

She said she will be pressing for a comprehensive review of the roads in the Clonea, Ballinacourty and Ballinroad areas, which, she claimed, are now totally inadequate to deal with the traffic generated by all the new housing.

NEW STOP SIGNS AT BALLINROAD CROSS

On a positive note, Cllr. Ryan welcomed the erection of stop signs at Ballinroad Cross which is just the first element in the improvement of traffic control at that busy junction. Even before her election to the County Council last June, Cllr. Ryan has been actively pursuing this issue.

"This is just the first of many improvements needed", she said, "and I am confident that the Council will continue to implement whatever measures are necessary to cater for the growing needs of Ballinroad".

NEW DEVELOPMENTS SHOULD HAVE POSITIVE EFFECT

According to Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, new developments in the area should have a positive, not a negative effect on the area.

He claims that Ballinroad has developed dramatically in recent years to a suburban tract of housing without either a recognisable village plan or any significant overhaul of what he sees as sub standard and badly aligned roads in and around the area.

"If further intensive hous-

ing development in Ballinroad proceeds, there should also be an 'in tandem' improvement in local infrastructure. Community facilities should also be analysed as part of the process. The effect, for instance, on Garranbane School should be examined", he stated.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair added that several locals are now referring to Ballinroad as 'Ballinbadroad' as approaches to it from Knocknagranagh, Kilminion, Clonea, Knockyhoulihan and Garranbane sides are on narrow, winding roads. Roads which were never designed for the vehicular and pedestrian traffic generated by either intensive development or the demand due to the nearby Clonea Strand.

You can help your new kitten get settled in by making sure there is a bowl of food and water on his arrival. Food is a sign of safety and security and is a good way to greet your new pet.

This will make his new home feel

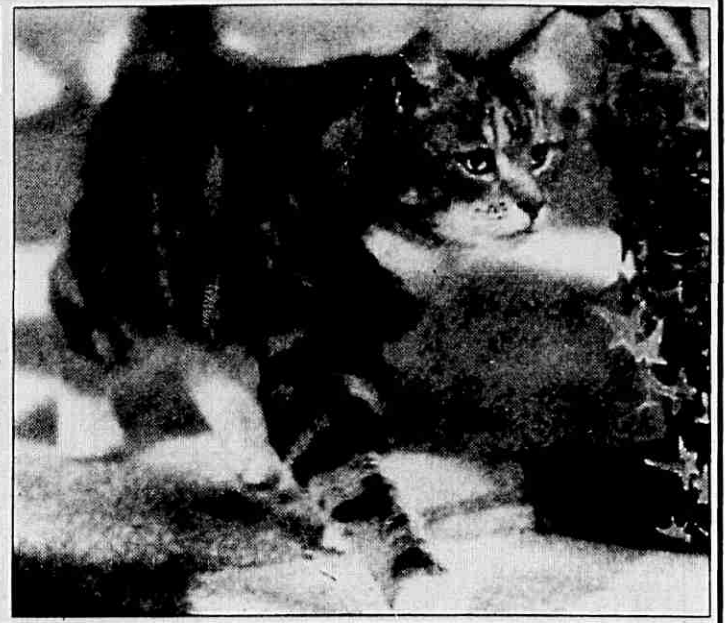
less daunting and reduce the chances of losing him.

County Cllr Questions Tax On Plastic Bags

The effectiveness of a tax on plastic shopping bags has been called into question by a member of Waterford County Council.

Whilst accepting that some step to reduce the use of plastic bags is necessary, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair feels that a wider strategy to cut down on plastic, tackle

litter and encourage recycling is needed.

The Labour Councillor told the 'Leader' that the banning of excessive packaging and more use of paper bagging in supermarkets would achieve far more than charging people for plastic bags.

Plastic bags given out in

supermarkets, he added, are only one part of the littering that's going on.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair said he has been pushing Waterford County Council for a house to house collection of recyclable items. On average, households in Co. Waterford produce about a tonne of waste every year. Approximately 26% of that is paper, 8% plastic items, 5% glass and 4%

metal or cans.

"A pro-active service, with a truck and depot, collecting boxes of recyclable items from households has the potential of Department grant aid, private sector funding, EU aid, FAS employment grants and revenue generated from selling recyclable material. Surely the authorities should look seriously at such a service", he added.

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Councillor Highlights Inequities In Farming

The fact that many farmers on middle and low incomes have not benefitted as much as the richest and biggest of farmers from either EU funding or the economic boom, has been cited as a factor underlining difficulties faced by farmers in Co. Waterford and elsewhere.

That's according to Waterford County Councillor Fi-

achra O Ceilleachair who feels the most recent CAP reform has driven farming closer to a free market model. This, he believes, will inevitably result in a reduction of the number of farmers with damaging consequences for rural life.

"Many people assume that land ownership and EU agricultural subsidies ensure that

all farmers are affluent, when in fact a minority of farmers receive incomes above the average industrial wage", stated Cllr. O Ceilleachair.

"There is a strong case to be made for a radical new approach to land distribution and the allocation of production quotas in order to favour smaller middle sized farmers".

Last term 3rd and 4th Class did art lessons after school. During the eight sessions the students did many different types of art, painting, card making and clay modelling.

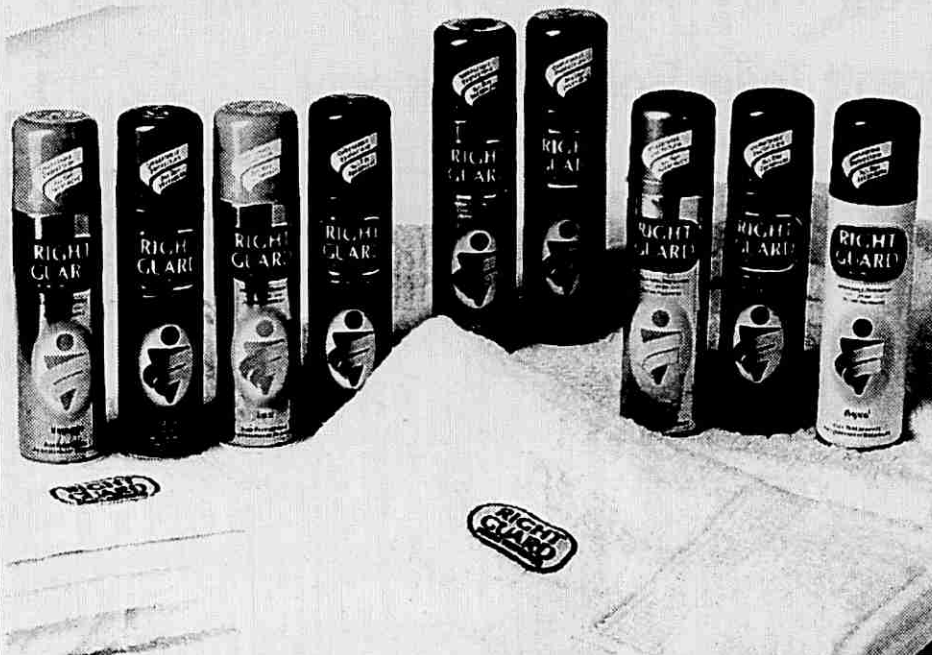

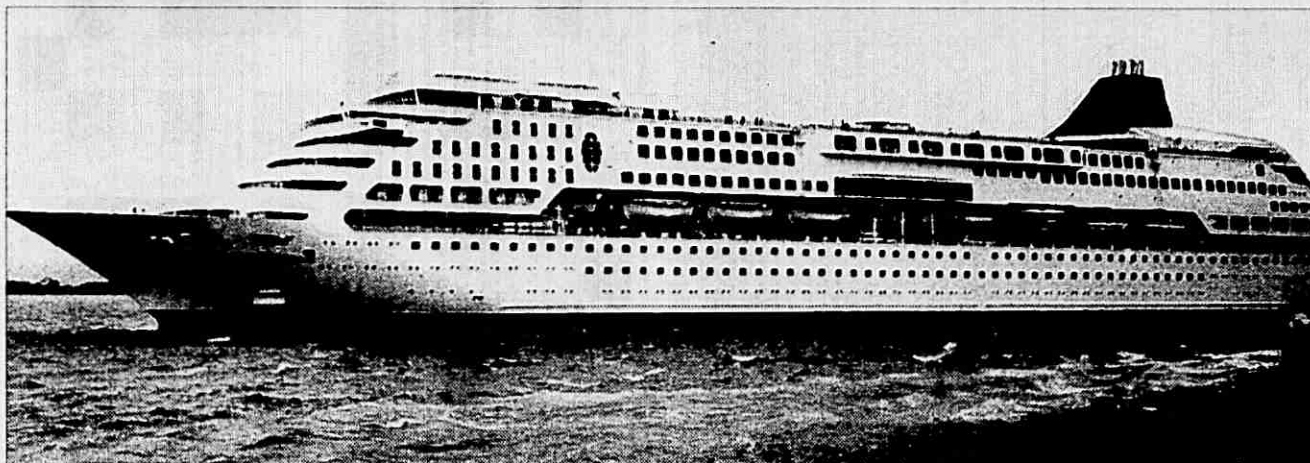

Dungarvan Girl Serving Aboard Norwegian Dream Cruise Liner

Dungarvan born Mary Wall, hotel director, played an important role recently on board the M/S Norwegian Dream cruise liner when it was involved in a collision in the English Channel.

Daughter of John and Winnie Wall of Mapstown, Mary has worked on board the Bahamas registered liner for the past two and a half years. She was one of 700 crew members serving on board the liner last week when the collision occurred.

Thankfully none of the 1,750 passengers or crew were seriously injured on the Norwegian Dream when it collided with a huge container vessel, the Ever Decent, at around 1 a.m. on Tuesday, August 24th off

the coast of Margate.

The entire team on board received worldwide praise for the excellent way in which the emergency was handled. They responded calmly to the situation and continued as normal with their daily duties. Mary oversaw the important breakfast preparations to the passengers and with the emergency behind them, breakfast was served on time. The damaged cruise liner suffered a 30 ft. gaping hole in its hull and arrived

back safely into Dover early on August 24th. A Thanksgiving Mass was held on board the ship before she set sail for Bremenhaven, Germany for repairs.

MARITIME INQUIRY

The force of the collision threw three shipping containers from the deck of the Ever Decent on to the cruise liner. The container ship was carrying a hazardous cargo of chemicals and suffered damage to the ballast tanks. Other containers fell in the water while several more caught fire.

The international maritime inquiry is now trying to establish how the two vessels, with highly sophisticated warning systems, crashed into each other.

The cruise liner was on the last night of a 12 day cruise around the cultural capitals of Europe. When the collision occurred some of the passengers were enjoying a nightcap at the bar, others a last stroll on the deck while a few had gone to bed.

Built in 1992 and refurbished last year, it has two swimming pools, five restaurants, a casino and a multitude of bars. Earlier this summer, the Norwegian Dream came into Cobh where Mary met up with her family and friends on board the liner. We look forward to welcoming the M/S Norwegian Dream back again to Ireland next summer and we wish them safe sailing.

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Caramel Lamb With A Redcurrant Sauce

CARAMELISED lamb chops with sweet redcurrant sauce and sharp minty green beans.

Ingredients:
Serves 4
4 thick lamb chump chops
Salt and pepper
50g granulated sugar
1 x 15ml sp cooking oil
Butter
1 medium onion, thinly sliced
100g mushrooms, thinly sliced
1 x 15ml sp flour
2 x 15ml sp red wine vinegar
2 x 15ml sp redcurrant jelly
210ml lamb stock
1 or 2 fresh sprigs rosemary
Dash of Worcestershire sauce
25g butter (to fry beans)
200g green beans
1 x 15ml sp mint sauce

METHOD:
Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6.

Season chops with salt and pepper and coat with sugar. Heat oil in a frying pan, add chops and fry for five minutes, turning halfway through until golden. Remove chops and place on a greased baking tray. Bake for about 12-15 minutes.

Meanwhile, melt a knob of butter in the pan and fry the onion and mushrooms until softened. Add the flour to the pan and cook for one or two minutes.

Increase the heat, add red wine vinegar and boil to reduce.

Add the redcurrant jelly, stock, rosemary and Worcestershire sauce, if using, and bring to the boil. Cook until thickened and season to taste with salt and pepper.

For the minty green beans, heat the butter in a frying pan, add the green beans and mint



sauce. Fry for 2-3 minutes then season with salt and pepper.
To serve, spoon the minty

green beans into the centre of four plates, place a lamb chop on top and spoon the sauce over the top.

Healthy Hake With Beetroot Meringues and Whipped Cream

HEALTHY, low fat, fast food. A tasty meal which won't pile on the pounds.

Ingredients:
Serves 4
250g cooked beetroot, cut into matchsticks
Fine strips from one orange
Juice of one orange
4 hake fillets, approx 100g each
30ml fresh, chopped herbs, dill, chervil and tarragon
Salt and freshly ground black pepper

METHOD:
Pop the beetroot strips into a pan with the orange strips and half the orange juice. Heat gently for eight to



10 minutes or until piping hot, stirring frequently. Arrange hake on a grill rack, and sprinkle with the remaining orange juice. Cook for 3-4 minutes or until the fish is cooked through. Divide the beetroot between four warmed plates. Carefully arrange the hake on top and sprinkle with herbs and seasoning.

WHO can resist a light, sugary snack that melts in the mouth?

Ingredients:
Makes 6

3 medium egg whites
180g caster sugar

FOR THE FILLING:
450ml double cream
50g icing sugar, sifted
1/4 x 5ml sp vanilla extract

Method:

Preheat the oven to 110°C/225°F/Gas Mark 1/4. Line a baking tray with baking parchment.

Whisk the egg whites with an electric whisk until they are stiff - this will take about five minutes.

Check that the egg whites are stiff enough by turning the bowl upside down. If the egg whites stay in the bowl, then it's the right time to add the sugar. The

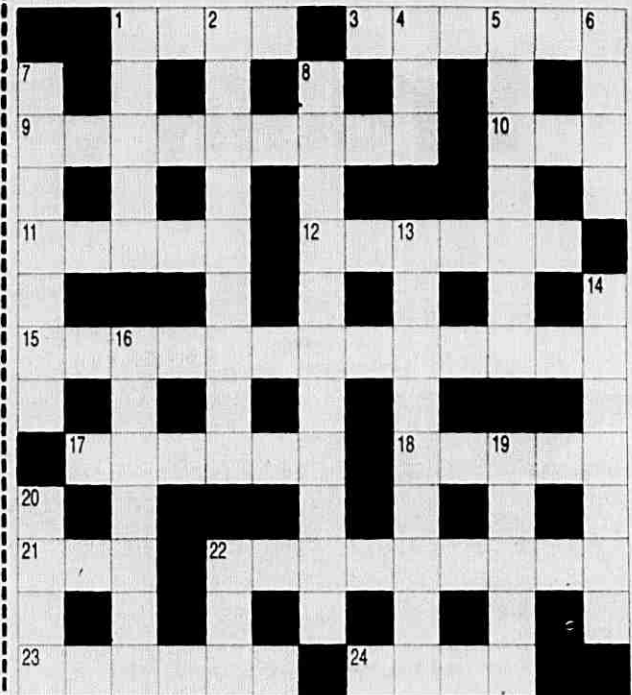
mixture should be stiff and glossy. With the whisks running, add the sugar a tablespoon at a time, making sure that all the sugar is absorbed before adding more.

Using two dessert spoons, spoon the meringue mixture on to the prepared baking sheets - there should be about 12 mounds of meringue in total. Bake in the oven for 1 1/2 hours, or until dry and crisp. Turn off the oven and leave meringues to cool in the oven.

Lightly whip the cream, and fold in the icing sugar and vanilla extract. Spoon the flavoured cream on to the flat surface of the six meringues. Top each with a plain meringue. Serve in paper cases.

Valerian is a wild plant with divided leaves and pink flowers, growing to 1.2 m in damp places. The Valerian root has been used as a sedative and relaxant at least since Roman times. Its name is thought to come from the Latin *valere*, "to be well".

Valerian was known to Dioscorides in the 1st century AD, who named it "phu", the sound of the word reflecting its unpleasant smell. The volatile oil in the plant gives it the characteristic smell that cats love.

This Week In The Garden

Prune Rambler Roses

Most rambler roses will have finished flowering and may be pruned. If they have made a great deal of new growth, much of it from near ground level, you can cut out all the old canes that have just borne flowers. But if there is not much young wood you will have to keep the best of the old and simply remove that which is obviously worn out or diseased. If you have to do this you must be careful to cut back all faded flower trusses, together with any hedges they may be bearing. Weeping standard roses are pruned at the same time and in a similar manner. After pruning, train the long shoots round the umbrella-shaped training frames, which should be securely fastened to the stakes supporting the plants.

Lift Main Crop Carrots

Lift the main crop carrots sown in April. If they are left in the ground any longer the roots might begin to crack. Dig them up carefully with a fork, cut off the tops and store the roots in a heap in the shed or cellar, or other frost-proof place. They will keep better and be less likely to shrivel if they are covered with sand or sifted ashes.

Lift Main Crop Beetroot

The main crop of long beetroot sown in May should be lifted and stored at about this time. Twist off the tops without injuring the skin of the beetroot in any way and store them in a cool shed.

Prune loganberries

By now loganberries will have finished fruiting and they should be pruned as soon as possible. Simply cut out to the base of the plant all canes that have just borne fruit and train the young canes to the wires in their place.

Continue To Pick Apples and Pears

Keep a close eye on apples and pears and continue to pick them as soon as they are ripe. With certain varieties of pear, such as Beurre Hardy, it is even advisable to pick a little before they are ripe and to complete the ripening process in a dry, fairly warm shed or room.

TOMATOES

Dance Music Is Top Of The Crops

IF you want top tomatoes, check out the dance music at your local record store.

New research from the British Tomato Growers' Association has shown that repetitive beats and banging bass lines will improve your tomato crops.

Top advice from the experts is to pump up the volume until the greenhouse glass starts to rattle. Vibration from loud bass tones helps distribute pollen and is more effective than shaking or misting.

Tomato plants self-pollinate, only bearing fruit after the pollen and the female ovules come into physical contact. Vibration assists that process by dislodging pollen so that it falls on to the stigmas.

Before bees were introduced into glasshouses 10 years ago, growers attached electric toothbrushes, and sometimes vibrators, to the sticks, and directly to the flower heads to encourage pollination.

In the end, these techniques proved to be far too much work and were abandoned. Today, growers are actively seeking ways to improve crops and fight off foreign competition.

Alan Parker, chairman of the British Tomato Growers' Association, said: "Music with a good, strong beat is best. Even growers whose taste inclines more towards Radio 3 recognise the merits of drum and bass.

"We haven't compiled a tomato top of the pops yet, but it is safe to say that Simply Red will be in there somewhere!

The bees are doing an excellent job, but with the research published in March showing that nearly half the population prefer the taste of British tomatoes, we must do everything we can to satisfy demand."

The Science of Farming and Food

DAIRY OPEN DAY IN CLASHMORE

An Open Day will take place at 2 p.m. on Wednesday, September 8 on the farm of Tom and Margaret Keevers, Coolbagh, Clashmore. This farm is one of three monitor farms in Co. Waterford which are part of the Teagasc Glanbia joint programme.

Over the past two years Tom and Margaret have worked very closely with Teagasc and put all of our current advice to farmers into practice. The outcome has been closely monitored and much very useful information has been assembled which will be made available to all farmers on September 8. The standard of grassland management and of breeding and fertility management is very high on this farm day.

The Open Day will feature stands on Grassland Management, Milk Production Costs, Beef Production Costs, Breeding and Fertility Management. All farmers and family members are welcome. Bus transport will be provided from Clashmore Village. Cars will not be allowed entry to the farm.

RESEEDS

I make no apologies for returning to the topic of reseeding again this week. It is vital that all grassland farmers who are serious about their business, reseed a minimum of 10% of the grassland each year.

On light soils reseeding can be done during the first weeks of September. Early is a must if you are to avoid weed grasses in next year's pasture. When the new grass has two leaves and the clover has one permanent leaf, the field should be carefully assessed for reseeding docks. This should be done regardless of whether the field was pre-sprayed before sowing. Use Acumen, Alistell, Legumex Extra, Nintex so as not to kill clover.

By knowing the things that result in poor reseeds you can endeavour to avoid them and so have a good 'take'.

Poor reseeds result from:-

Late sowing (from mid September).

Poor seed bed preparation.

Seed sown too shallow or too deep.

Lack of P, K and lime.

Too little Nitrogen (needs 50 - 60 units).

Slug or frit fly attacks with minimum cultivation practices.

August reseeds should be grazed in September. Helps to kill off 'soft' weeds and thickens the pasture by tillering.

FARM SAFETY - SLURRY

Deaths result from (a) slurry gas, hydrogen sulphide (rotten eggs smell or no smell), (b) falling into open tanks, (c) becoming entangled in the equipment.

Obey the following guidelines:-

Don't agitate in still air conditions but choose a windy day.

Remove all stock from building or adjacent side of slatted house.

Open all door and ventilation outlets.

Have two people working together especially during the first hour which is the most dangerous.

Keep children away from this activity because they may fall in or else be gassed.

Never, ever stand on slats or go back into the building, particularly that first hour.

Avoid rigorous agitation in confined spaces.

Empty tanks before slurry reaches 1 ft of the surface.

Do not use matches or cigarette lighters.

Never enter a tank at the end of emptying without a breathing apparatus (special B2 canister).

PTO shafts and slurry attachments must be covered.

Chains and cog wheels on muck spreaders and side spreaders must be covered.

Slurry agitation points should have temporary covers or guard rails which should be secured in between spreading each load.

Merchants Paying £5-£10/t More To Growers Who Bargain Hard —Heskin

Waterford IFA Grain Committee Chairman, Alex Heskin has warned grain growers to make a price before delivering grain to merchants premises. He strongly advised growers "Do not settle for the ridiculously low on-account prices being quoted by some mer-

chants as this would seriously undervalue your grain this harvest. Behind the scenes, branch managers are frequently paying the IFA target of £82 - £85/t to growers who bargain hard." Mr. Heskin said, "It is critical that farmers agree a price before delivering grain

into a merchants premises. Premiums of between £5 and £10 a tonne have been obtained over and above the quoted on-account price. If a merchant sees that grain is not coming across his weigh-bridge, the purse strings are more likely to loosen."

Mr. Heskin said, "Three of the main grain buyers in the country are making desperate efforts to scuttle a realistic market price for this year's grain. They have even tried to blame their low prices on the good weather!

Every attempt has been made to ignore the reality of our market-based research, supporting prices of 382 to £85 per tonne for green barley and £85 to £87 for green oats, prices which the trade themselves have already paid to growers. The reality the same people are paying £5 to £10 on top of their officially quoted on-account prices in private deals

New crop dried barley is currently trading at £5 to £7 over last year's price, UK ex-farm prices are £8 sterling harder and the strength of sterling is adding a further £4 to the cost of imported grain."

He said, "It is totally unacceptable that grain growers should be asked to subsidise major grain traders. We have set a realistic market price for all growers, not a totally ridiculous discounted price.

I am advising growers to discount the cost of their inputs to the same extent when it comes to settling up their harvest accounts."

ICMSA Call On Marts To Provide Clearer Information To Farmers

Mr. Liam Heverin, Chairman of ICMSA's Beef and Cattle Committee said that the livestock marts will have to provide clearer information on livestock to farmers. While acknowledging that many marts are providing excellent information to farmers in the sales ring, there are other marts which up to now provide poor and inaccurate information to farmers on the livestock they wish to buy.

Mr. Heverin said that ICMSA has received many complaints from farmers on this issue and poor information has resulted in many difficulties for farmers. For

example, Mr. Heverin said, in some marts it is announced that no premium is drawn on an animal in which case a farmer assumes that the animal is eligible for both premium only to find that the animal is too old for the ten month premium. This is totally unacceptable, Mr. Heverin said, and farmers should insist that they receive proper information.

At a minimum, Mr. Heverin said, the date of birth, premium status, date of last test and the name of the seller should be clearly shown in the sales ring. Where animals are sold in a batch, the date of birth and test of the

oldest and youngest animal should be shown. Farmers should insist on this, Mr. Heverin said. At a time when farmers are being swamped with regulations on transparency, the marts should provide this simple information.

Mr. Heverin said that ICMSA have lobbied the marts groups to provide clearer information and will continue to do so. If marts fail to provide this information, then the Department of Agriculture and Food should put in place regulations to ensure that the marts do so, concluded Mr. Heverin.

HERITAGE COUNCIL REPORT FLAWED

Responding to media reports that farm methods were 'destroying the environment' based on a Heritage Council report, ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen said that such statements were not only wrong but dangerous as well.

During the past ten years farmers have invested hundreds of millions of pounds in pollution control work. Farmers will continue to invest their own money to protect the environment. New policies have been put in place to eliminate over-grazing and excessive sheep numbers on the hills.

Farmers work their land to produce food in order to earn an income to keep their families and as well to invest in their farms to maintain their job. Modern farming practices are necessary so that we can compete in the market place. There is no point in thinking that we can have a competitive farming sector by going back to a time when we had hay-making only, no phosphate application and no silage, and poor grassland management.

The Heritage Council must realise we all agree that the wildlife habitats are important but they must be managed in the context of modern farming practices. No one can claim any special moral high ground as regards environmental protection. It is totally wrong and unacceptable for anyone to blame farmers as a group as if they were a major point source for pollution. All sectors of the economy need to work together towards the objective of improved environmental protection.

The Heritage Council should sit down and discuss all these issues with farmers so that we can all understand one another a bit better.

Leahy Says Factories Failure To Implement Beef Task Force Agreements Risks £120m Investment

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Thomas Leahy has said the failure of the meat factories to abolish the £3/head SRM levy as agreed in the Beef Task Force risks wrecking the Task Force initiative and potential investment of £120m in modernising the processing sector.

In line with the Beef Task Force implementation plan, Mr. Leahy said IFA wrote to the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh over three weeks ago requesting him to obtain a date from the factories for the abolition of the SRM levy. "Apart from an acknowledgement, we have heard nothing from Minister Walsh or the factories. IFA will not be part of a charade on the Beef Task Force implementation. It is high time the Minister and the Department put it up to the factories to honour what they agreed to."

Mr. Leahy said IFA pushed very hard on strong state aid for investment in the beef processing sector at the Task Force. "IFA believes that a strong Government investment programme based on marketing success is much more beneficial than a narrow rationalisation policy." He said, "This investment programme is based on the development of an integrated partnership approach to marketing success involving producers and processors. However there can be little or no partnership if one side fails to implement what they agreed in the Task Force."

Murphys' New History An Excellent Read

The prolific pens of Comeragh historians, Sean and Sile Murphy have again been active and the resulting two hundred odd pages about 'Heroes, Poets and Villains' of County Waterford is as interesting a read as one could wish for.

This husband and wife team of historians has been responsible for five previous volumes, set mainly in 'Comeragh's Rugged Hills', but this latest volume may be their best work to date. It covers an enormous amount of historical ground, a wide range of subjects, and 'characters' from all over the county abound between the attractive covers designed by the Murphys against a background of a photograph by Richard Fitzgerald.

All the expected stories are there, together with some not already told and there is an extensive account of those who went to the Great War (1914/18) from the district. These included Mikie Keily of Old Road, Kilmachomas, who went to Cahir to join the South Irish Horse and was there for two weeks when his mother went for him and brought him home as he was under age. When he reached the proper age, he took off again to Cahir and joined up.

In Kilrossanty, the Fife and Drum Band assembled the volunteers at the mill to march to Kilmachomas to see Pat Daly of Cutteen join up. They marched the seven miles to Kilmachomas railway station led by Pat Harris on a racing cob.

Those who went to war took part in one of the most horrendous events of all times and were part of the force which shed its blood in Flanders Fields, the battle of Mons and the dreaded Somme campaigns. Many did not return, including Thomas Cummins whose family were notified of his death by telegram on Christmas Eve. His brother, Fr. Cummins was saved when a bullet hit the cross he was wearing.

A complete chapter is accorded to the Pallisers of Comeragh House then

called Roxboro "the most famous of Waterford families of the 19th. Century". These included Frederick Hugh Palliser, born 1826, who married the daughter of wealthy banker, Sir William Price and inherited her fortune when she died, thus ensuring a secure future. Most of the Palliser family joined the services in turn and fought in India, America, the Crimea and most trouble spots of the world. They usually returned to take up their family estates in Ireland and become Governors, Captains of Militia or Justices of the Peace.

William Palliser, born 1830 became an inventor and produced many of his inventions in the forge at Mahon Bridge. He produced the Palliser gun, bolts for securing armour plating, chilled shot for piercing armour and devised the conversion of smooth fire guns into rifled barrels. He was a contemporary of Anthony Trollope who based his book "the Pallisers" on Sir William.

There is an excellent account of Crotty the Robber, who was reputed to be a cannibal and who kept a huge store of human flesh in his cave. This earned him the name of the "Irish Sawney Bean" after the Scottish robber of that name who was also reputed to have been a cannibal.

Two versions of a poem describing the view from his hideout are included and the longer second version is very scathing of the various townlands described. It is in Irish, but one need not be a scholar of the Gaelic language to understand the sting and sarcasm in his various descriptions.

The chapter closes with the final verse of the lament for William Crotty

"Oe'r Coumshingaun the dark clouds gather,
You'll sleep no more among the heather,
Through Comeragh's Hills night winds are sighing
Where oft you sent the Redcoats flying.
Och-one, Oh!

Sean and Sile have researched extensively and cover subjects centuries apart. A story from more modern times is that of 'Lackendarra Jim', the Hermit of the Comeraghs. Jim Fitzgerald was born in Lackendarra on the western side of the Comeraghs in 1886 and at the age of twenty-three had to leave home and fend for himself. He joined the British Army, fighting in France and Mesopotamia and saw some dreadful atrocities during those years.

On his return home, carrying the mental and physical scars of battle, he couldn't find peace among the people of County Waterford, so he withdrew to a little hut near Kilclooney where he lived out his life until he died in 1959. While he did not encourage visitors, he was patient and courteous to all who turned up in his isolated place. He lived on his 2 pounds per week British Army pension, subsisting on 'yellow meal stirabout, milk and potatoes'. He occasionally allowed himself a black pudding.

There is also a comprehensive account of the life and times of the Hollywood actor, Tyrone Power, born on the 5th May 1913 in Cincinnati, Ohio, whose father, William Grattan Tyrone Power was born at Kilmachomas in 1798. Some sources say he was born of noble birth from the house of Curraghmore, though this is just one theory about the parentage of one of the most successful actors of the 'Thirties, 'Forties and 'Fifties. It is just one very interesting story from a most absorbing book. It is a must for lovers of local history and an invaluable contribution to the written history of the County.

There are many more stories, tales, legends, half-truths, poems, pictures and myths about County Waterford contained in this excellent volume. It is on sale in all bookshops of the County and City and retails at £7.99

The Psycho-Sexual Development Of The Adolescent Male

In many families adolescent boys are in crisis. Crisis is best defined as having reached a crucial stage or turning point. Boys are frequently confused by society's mixed messages about what is expected of them. Societal myths force boys to toughen up but yet there is a modern emphasis on them developing sensitivity and empathy. Eric Ericsson stated that during adolescence boys must choose between creating a coherent identity or falling prey to despair and confusion. Not quite sure what it means to be a man many adolescent boys are ambivalent about growing up.

SEPARATION

The trauma of separation from the mother is one of the most acute developmental experiences boys must endure. Here boys harden and bury their empathetic and vulnerable sides. By nature boys are more emotionally expressive than girls and respond more to situations. Sadly these responses are often misinterpreted as a sign of being a 'sissy'. Research has shown that in infancy some mothers blindly dampen their sons emotions because of the worry that the showing of negative emotions may indicate that they may have a psychological problem. These women are not neglectful or uncaring but are confusing their son's expressive sides with the fear that he will be less than a 'real boy'.

Mothers raising boys are frequently influenced by their own unresolved confusion as to what masculinity is, their role models being their fathers. This ambivalence affects their sons, giving them a sense of shame and an inability to live up to what a man should be. Most women out of fear pull back from being close to their sons at adolescence, a cast back to the oedipus complex. This is Freudian concept based on the Greek myth of King Oedipus who slew his father to marry his mother. According to the myth males are destined to direct their first sexual impulses towards their mothers and their first violent impulses towards their fathers. The tragedy has its roots in the dream that many adolescent boys have of having sexual intercourse with their mother and it is as relevant today as it was in ancient Greece:-

"For many a man hath seen himself in dreams his mother's mate/ but he who gives no heed to such like matters bears the easier life." (Sophocles' "Oedipus Rex"). However boys need closeness with their mother at this critical stage as they make the move into being a man.

They also need closeness with their father. Studies show that when a father is actively involved in his sons lives, boys grow up less aggressive and more able to

express emotions. Consequently it diminishes the need for boys to act out to win their fathers attention. Boys growing up with warm empathetic relationships with their father learn from him how to deal with the various ebbs and flows of life. They develop flexible attitudes and increased self esteem.

Studies have proven the more time fathers spend with their sons the better boys did in school and later in their career.

SEXUALITY

During adolescence boys are forced to face the daunting complexities of their physical, emotional and sexual growth without much guidance or support. The boy is becoming a man with a man's sexual appetite. Again society's double standard confuses boys as their mission to comply with peers and their maleness ('boys pursue girls') conflict with parental advice to respect girls and in the next breath to make sure they wear a condom. Boys have told me that they were taught nothing about sex and sexuality, yet data shows the majority of adolescent boys begin having sex in their teens. When boys develop crushes on girls it helps them experience tender feelings and it allows them drop their screens. This climate of fancying girls allows boys to get in touch with the forbidden half of themselves and at last they feel liberated from the boycode of self sufficiency. There is the enigma of being frightened to connect with girls and fearing rejection but inwardly desperately needing this connection. Unfortunately because of society's strait jacking code many boys don't feel comfortable with girls and I promote and encourage parents and schools to introduce open communication between genders.

MALE FRIENDSHIPS

Society suggests that boys don't need close male relationships, in fact it views such friendships as inappropriate and sadly those boys are labelled as 'queer' or a 'fag'. Very often boyhood affection is linked with homosexuality and these kind of judgments undermine male friendships and engender homophobia.

Among our adolescent male population some boys still discover that they are homosexual. These feelings are a gradual discovery. One boy I know of recounted how he first knew he was 'different' when he was attracted to a young male lead in a stage production. Caught in this turmoil homosexual boys feel unable to talk to their parents or peers about their plight. Gay boys I've worked with have told me of threats they have received and these boys are flowing over with feelings of fear, shame and

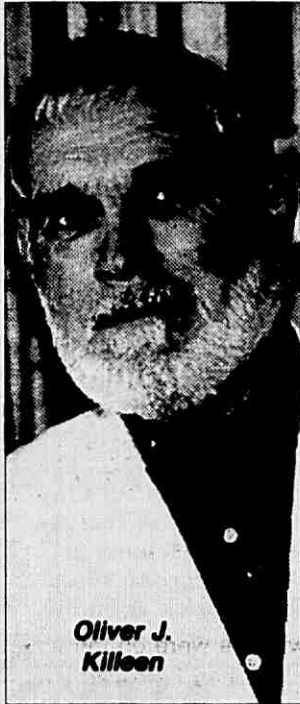
profound isolation. A survey in the U.S. revealed gay youths account for 30% of suicide. A misinformed society will declare that being homosexual must be the reason so many kill themselves but in fact it is society's judgments and misunderstandings of homosexuality that cultivate the irrational homophobic fears.

Parents generally find it difficult when their boys confront them with this sexual preference because they have their fears, confusions and ignorance about homosexuality. For too long homosexuality has been widely regarded as unnatural and given a taboo label. In 1935 Freud stated that being homosexual cannot be classified as an illness or as a psychological disorder. He went on to say that being homosexual is a natural unchangeable part of what a boy is inside. When parents approach me I tell them to learn as much as they can about homosexuality. Then I advise them to examine how their own feelings are affecting their son.

In discussing sex and sexuality, I'd be remiss in not pointing out the worldwide impact of AIDS. Parents owe it to their children to talk openly about being sexually active and the fears they have. AIDS needs to be discussed, how it is contracted and the potentially deadly consequences of promiscuity.

One of the greatest confusions boys face is how the private self would like to behave and how they believe the public self must behave. Robert Weiss, the renowned sociologist, concluded that men feel they must be 'doing' so as to prove their manhood. He added 'satisfactory work provides men with a sense of worth and place that provides a foundation for their lives.' The challenge is to integrate the 'doing' aspect of the self with emotional expression. Every boy needs to cry and be able to be himself, then and only then will he connect with his inner voice. When boys are forced to repress feelings many cross an emotional threshold and are thrust into turbulent, hostile and violent acting out on themselves and others. Behind these external displays lies a boy in trouble.

NATIONAL SAFETY COUNCIL

Appeal To Motorists To 'Expect The Unexpected' As Children Return To School

The National Safety Council is asking motorists to check their frustration and increase their concentration this week as 21,802 kids return to school in Waterford this week.

The Council warns that driver stress, heightened by traffic congestion, can affect concentration levels, limiting a driver's focus to the car in front. The unpredictable behaviour of schoolchildren on the roads demand maximum concentration on the part of the motorists.

"This is a testing time for drivers," comments Pat Costello, Chief Executive, National Safety Council. "Aside from grappling with the usual traffic problems, they face thousands of young and inexperienced pedestrians and cyclists. They need to be doubly attentive from this week onward."

The National Safety Council recommends that motorists:-

Look out for children getting on/off buses.

Be mindful of children crossing at all times.

Give cyclists room.

Expect the unexpected.

The Council also recommends that parents sit down with their children and discuss the rules of the road including deciding on the safest route to school. It further suggests that parents exercise reasonable

caution when choosing a 'drop-off' point for schoolkids so that there is no danger to children exiting the car and obstruction to traffic is at a minimum.

The following additional guidelines for parents:-

Children under seven should not cross roads on their own.

Set a good example by choosing a safe place to cross the road - explaining why.

Children walking on country roads should wear reflective armbands.

Teach children to take special care getting on or off a bus or mini-bus.

While waiting for a bus, children should stand well in off the road.

Ensure that your child is old enough and responsible enough to cycle to school.

If your child does cycle, make sure they are highly visible and wear a helmet at all times.

Children should sit in the back seat of a car and always wear a seatbelt.

Don't park within twenty yards of the school entrance. Copies of the leaflet Going To School are available from the National Safety Council and public libraries nationwide.

After training race horses for the best part of thirty eight years trainer Peter Walwyn who was champion trainer in his own country back in 1974 and 1975 will retire at the end of the current flat season. Among his many classic victories were Humble Duty who captured the 1000 guineas in 1970 while Polygamy tasted success in the 1974 Oaks Classic. In 1975 Peter Walwyn saddled 121 winners which made him the first trainer to send out more than 100 winners in the 20th century.

U.S. GROUP BUY IRISH RACING T.V. RIGHTS

The profile of the Irish horseracing industry is set to take a major hike following the sale of broadcast rights to U.S. Group Track-Power.

Track-Power after an agreement with International racing media will gain exclusive rights to all live Irish horseracing, as well as some major English fixtures including the classics.

The U.K. and Irish meetings will be broadcast through Echo Stars Dish Network Satellite T.V. Service.

"Distribution of their racing signals via Track-Power is an important advance into the U.S. market for the racecourse associations of both England and Ireland" said John Sanderson, Chief Executive of International Racing Media Ltd.

"As in-home distribution of horseracing continues to grow, we believe this agreement will become both significant and very beneficial for all parties" he said.

Irish race meetings are all ready broadcast live, following a move last year by Paddy Power Bookmakers to secure live coverage of Irish race meetings.

Up until then Irish meetings enjoyed only sporadic live T.V. coverage on S.I.S., the network which beams its racing service into Bookmakers offices in Ireland and Britain.

While the development will raise the profile of Irish racing it is unlikely to have much of an impact on the betting scene here.

Track - Power is owned by American Digital Communications which provides live horseracing broadcasts throughout continental America.

It has contracted Penn National Gaming, a licensed racing facility in Pennsylvania which will provide information and betting services to subscribers.

KING WINS

In last weeks column we related how the Pat Flynn trained King Of The Wire was an unlucky loser when veering off a straight line at a recent Leopardstown meeting. Well the Danzig Connection gelding made amends at the Curragh last Sunday gaining a narrow victory over Nordic Isle. With John Reid taking over in the saddle from Danny Grant, King Of The Wire was backed down from 5/2 to 7/4 before scoring by a short head.

The feature race at the Curragh last Sunday was the £150,000 Tattersalls Breeders 2 year old stakes. British trainer Richard Hannon maintained his excellent record in this competition as he sent out the 5,000 guineas purchase Halland Park Girl to a length and a half victory over The Tatling. The winner was partnered by Cork born Dane O'Neill.

The progressive Giants Causeway continued on his winning ways in the group 3 Fortuity Stakes. He was never in any danger of defeat, breezing in two and a half lengths clear of Stablemate Brahms. Until the winner steps up in company we won't really know how good he is although it must be said that he is certainly going the right way.

TRALEE UPDATE

The Tralee six day meeting run of course in conjunction with the Annual Rose of Tralee Festival proved a resounding success. The Tramore form held up really well during the week and a good number of winners had performed with distinction at Tramore the previous week.

Tony McCoy came over on the Tuesday afternoon to ride the Dermot Weld trained Moving On Up in the listed Patsy Byrne extended handicap hurdle and favoured by the cut in the ground he came home three and a half lengths clear of Afro Star. The winner may now revert back to the flat at Listowel.

The feature event on day two was the Guinness Gold Cup handicap of £30,000. The Paddy Mullins trained Bob What was an impressive winner at Tramore and he followed up on that victory this time. With seven pound claimer Timmy Houlihan in the saddle this 7/1 shot scored by a short head from 7/4 favourite Quinze. This was Bob What's fourth victory in a row and his veteran handler is mustard keen to launch his Bob Back gelding over hurdles and a maiden hurdle beckons for this five year old at Listowel at the end of this month. Incidentally Sainly Thoughts who finished a close up second to Bob What at Tramore captured the showcase event, the Cork Dry Gin Ulster Cesarewitch, at Downpatrick last Monday.

Goresbridge based Paddy Mullins also captured the featured Denny's Gold Medal chase on the Thursday as Siberian Gale 5/4 jumped from fence to fence for Tommy Treacy to beat Lucky Town by two and a half lengths. The winner is owned by the trainers son George and this seven year old is certainly on the upgrade. Trip To Dicks finished fourth in this contest but on the yielding going failed to get in a blow at the leaders.

It was nice to see the John Kiely handled Cirvin gain a winning bracket over hurdles on Friday evening. Sent off at 5/1 Cirvin ridden by Norman Williamson ran on strongly to beat Eduardo by three and a half lengths. The winner is a seven year old son of Executive Perk and Biddy's Opinion.

The game that the entire country has been waiting for, since last year's epic draw and replay, unfolds at Parnell Park on Saturday afternoon when the greatest of rivals clash in the All Ireland Senior Semi Final, part of a double header with Mayo and Meath meeting in the other semi.

The rivalry and the quality of the football has prompted RTE to televise live both games, no doubt inspired by last year's thriller. It all adds up to some great entertainment at the compact Parnell Stadium.

Monaghan will take consolation from the league final victory 10 weeks ago when a scoring blitz that included 4 goals secured a 6 point victory. Waterford's consolation will probably come from the fact that there is plenty of room for improvement, indeed they could have won that league encounter had they taken their chances at the other end.

The profile of Ladies Football has improved dramatically in recent years thanks in no small way to Waterford and Monaghan. Last year's game attracted over 300,000 viewers to the RTE broadcast and has whetted the appetite. The winners will fancy their chances in the final but then again the winners of the Mayo - Meath game will have something to say about that.

Monaghan had their problems early in the season. Manager Mickey Morgan was ousted, Michael McKeown took over, the players objected, bedlam reigned for a while but player power won the day and Morgan returned when McKeown resigned. Those problems are long behind them as they proved in the League Final.

That game was their last competitive fixture, Waterford haven't fared much better, a stroll against Cork in the Munster Final after getting a walk over from Clare, hardly amounts to ideal preparation. Indeed Meath are only one of the 4 semi finalists after testing preparation, with tough games against Longford, Louth and Laois.

Monaghan possess a number of very good individual players such as Jenny Greenan, Niamh Kindlon

and Diane Dempsey but the key to this clash is Edel Byrne. If Waterford curb Byrne successfully they are half way there. She is a prolific goal scorer, carries the ball well, links with her team mates and has tremendous pace. In last year's replay Siobhan O'Ryan put a stop to her gallop and Monaghan were in serious trouble. In the minor semi-final two weeks ago she struggled against Marion Troy and it was only when she moved to midfield that she got more room and came really into the game.

Monaghan play a short passing support one another type of game laced with the odd long ball. Very tight marking would put that type of game in trouble and that's something which Waterford must do on Saturday. Space will have to be denied, pressure applied and concentration at an all time high. The tackles have got to come in from every conceivable angle at the speed of light.

Monaghan are likely to include 5 or 6 minors although 3 of these, keeper Grey, Byrne and Kindlan played on the successful side in '97. They will also include team veterans Brenda McAnespie and Mgt. Kieran and hopefully McAnespie's lack of pace is something which the Waterford girls will be able to expose.

Despite the fact that Waterford have a very experienced outfit the average age of the team is just under 23. Monaghan's is identical although it has to be said that Waterford have a lot more miles on the clock.

Caitriona Casey, Aine Wall, Geraldine and Martina O'Ryan and Noirin Walsh all made their championship debuts in the late eighties, they along with Olivia Condon, and Fiona Crotty lined out in the '91 success. Claire Ryan and Julie Torpey played in '92 whilst Siobhan O'Ryan, Annalise

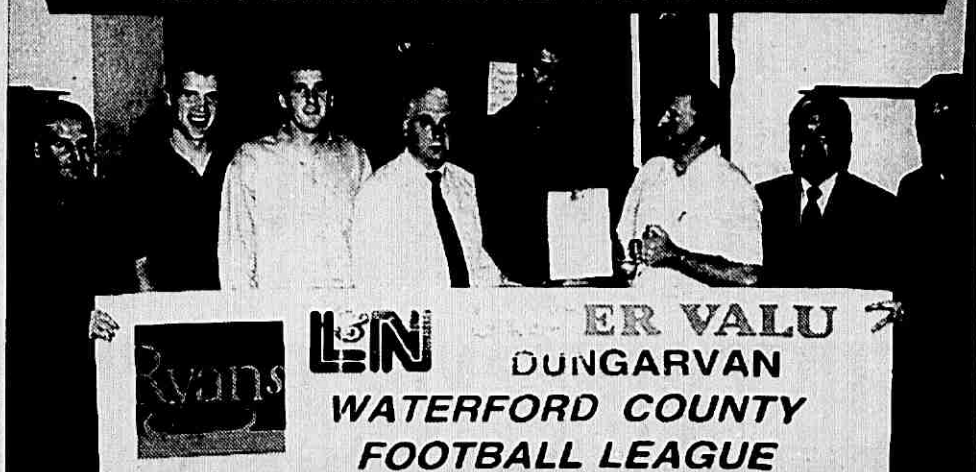

The attractive junior hurling replay of the Kilgobinet v. Clashmore tie at Fraher Field, and the first intermediate hurling semi-final between Ring and St. Marys are the two big games on the Western Board weekend programme and which also includes the divisional 'A' minor hurling final between Dungarvan and St. Olivers at Fraher Field on this, Wednesday evening at 7 p.m.

SUNDAY AT FRAHER FIELD

The afternoon programme here is the most attractive of the season to date and as far as monitoring attendances is concerned, this will be a test case. With no TV counter attraction and

given a fine day, the attendance should reach record proportions for a club championship programme.

STRADBALLY V. ST. SAVIOURS
