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Call To Close One Of Tallow's Public Roads

The changing of the road structure and new developments at Tallow Bridge by Waterford County Council has brought a wave of criticism not alone by people in Tallow but by motorists in general. Most people now see it as only time before a fatal accident occurs.

Fifteen years ago a proposal by local Fine Gael Co. Councillor W. McDonnell requesting the council the acquire a private house, farmyard and land at Tallow Bridge was agreed to, with the re allignment of the road structure in mind. The Council received the green light for this work earlier this year costing in

the region of £200,000. Work commenced in early June and it was the general opinion of the public that a round-about be put in place at Tallow Bridge.

However, the position now is that traffic coming from Tallow must yield before coming on to a busy N72 Rosslare-Killarney road and while it is temporarily closed it will cause further difficulties for the Council when re-opened for traffic.

The matter will be publicly raised at next Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council by Cllr. Willie McDonnell who has been successful in restricting traffic on this, one of the steepest hills in the

However he, now in the interests of safety will request the closing of Tallow Hill as a public motorway, as certain regulations must be put in place such as advertisements and giving the public the right to appeal.

"I will be requesting that traffic be allowed up Tallow, but not down as a short term solution, and that a round-about be put in place at what is now a most dangerous junction" said Cllr.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

My wife and I have decided to separate and have been advised to contact the Family Mediation Service. Could you tell me about this service?

The Farrilly Mediation Service is a free and confidential service. It is a service to help couples (married and unmarried) who have decided to separate or divorce, or who have already separated, to negotiate their own terms of agreement, while addressing the needs and interests of all involved.

The mediation process assists parents to work out mutually acceptable arrangements on any or all of the following issues which need decisions: parenting children, financial support, family home and property and any other problems related to the separation.

You can make an appointment for a mediation session by telephoning your nearest location for the Family Mediation Service. Services are available in Dublin (two services), Limerick, Cork, Galway, Wexford, Dundalk, Athlone and Tralec.

For an appointment both parties must contact the service and confirm willingness to attend. When a couple has reached agreement, a session is offered to parents to invite their children in to discuss their new family arrangement in a hopeful and positive way. Mediation usually takes between two and six sessions. Each session lasts approximately one hour.

Most mediations end with a written document that sets out the details of the couple's agreement. This can then be taken to solicitors to be drawn into a Legal Deed of Separation and/or a Decree of Divorce.

Most birds have preen glands and often mix preening with water or dust bathing. You may see ducks dipping their heads under water, flicking their wings and moving their bodies while preening. The duck gets pleasure and fun out of this.

When Does Sheet **Lightening Occur?**

This usually occurs during a storm as a result of a discharge of over the amount of electricity within one thundercloud. The outline is partly hidden and the result is a diffused light spread over a big area of sky in comparison with what we usually see.

Sheet lightening will occur when conditions are favourable - when the electric field is equal throughout the area.

Fork or zig-zag lightening will reach the ground, unlike sheet lighten-

Sometimes the sky is lit up by flashes occurring beyond the horizon and this is often referred to as sheet lightening.

When there is a large accumulation of electric charges in the atmosphere, it will discharge in the shape of lightening. It can take place between the clouds and the earth, or between the clouds alongside each other. The clouds electric potential can be built up by the action of raindrops or other natural processes just before the discharge.

A TROPICAL oasis of flavour - try this fruity chicken curry.

INGREDIENTS:

Serves 4 to 6

20ml groundnut oil 4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts, cubed Salt and freshly ground black pepper

1 large onion, chopped 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped

3cm root ginger, peeled and finely chopped 1 stick lemon grass, trimmed and chopped 100g baby corn, trimmed and sliced diagonally

3 x 10ml sp Malaysian mild curry powder 20ml Thai green curry sauce

1 x 5ml sp ground turmeric

1 x 10ml sp plain flour 400ml can coconut milk 150ml chicken stock 2 x 15ml sp freshly chopped coriander 227g can pineapple pieces in natural juice 1 small ripe mango,

peeled, stoned and sliced

1 banana, peeled and sliced

400g Thai jasmine or Basmati rice to serve

METHOD:

Heat half the groundnut oil in a large pan. Season the chicken with salt and pepper, add to the hot (almost smoking) oil and cook, turning until brown on all sides.

Remove from the pan. Add the remaining oil to the pan. Lower the heat and then fry the onion, garlic, ginger, lemon grass and baby corn, stirring occasionally, for about five min-

Add the chicken. Mix together the curry powder, curry sauce, turmeric and flour, add to the pan, stirring all the time, and cook for two minutes. Gradually add the coconut milk, stock and

200g blueberries 125g quality white chocolate, coarsely chopped

FOR THE STRUDEL:

100g butter, softened 75g light muscovado sugar 1/2 x 5ml sp ground cinna-

75g plain flour

METHOD:

For the strudel, beat together the butter and sugar. Add the cinnamon and flour and combine




For the muffins, mix the flour and sugar. Beat together the eggs, oil and milk then add to the flour, combining gently but thoroughly. Stir in the berries and chocolate. taking care not to bruise the fruit.

Spoon into 16-20 muffin cases. Using your fingers, crumble the strudel mixture over the top. Bake at 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6 for about 20 minutes until golden brown and risen. If you can find large American-sized muffin cases, bake for 2-3 minutes longer.

This Week In The Garden

Sow Hardy Annuals

Some of the hardy annuals can be sown outdoors now which will stand the winter and flower in May and June next year. Sow them thinly where they are to flower and cover lightly

> with soil. Thin the seedlings out to 8 or 10 cm apart as soon as they can be

handled, but leave any further thinning until March or April. Among the best varieties for sowing now are alyssum, calendula, candytuft, clarkia, cornflower, godetia, larkspur and cardinal poppies.



Sow Annuals For The Greenhouse

Many annuals make excellent pot plants for the cool greenhouse. If sown now they will start to flower in early

spring and continue until May. Sow thinly in well drained seed trays and germinate in your unheated greenhouse or frame.

Plant Anemones

Make a first placing of anemones. If these are put in in

successional batches, it is possible to extend the flowering season. The tubers should be planted 8 cm deep and 15 cm

Pot Up More Freesias

Make a potting of freesia corms. If these are placed in a frame, and are protected from frost with lights, but no attempt is made to force them, they can be introduced to the warm greenhouse a few at a time from November onwards. They will supply a succession of flowers in winter and early spring.



Pot On Primulas and Calceolarias

There may be quite a lot of potting on to be done if

growth during August was fairly good. Greenhouse primulas from the April sowing should be about ready for their final pots, while the June sown primulas are also likely to need potting singly into 8 cm pots of John Innes potting compost No. 1.

Pot **Hippeastrums**

Pot specially Christmas flowering hippeas-

trums, one bulb in a 10-13 cm pot of John Innes potting compost No. 1 or a peat-based equivalent, and put the pots in a light room or greenhouse.

REPS TRANSITIONAL RULES UNACCEPTABLE -IFA

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Mossie O'Connor has described the new transitional arrangement for REPS as unacceptable and has called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to seek a more workable solution from the EU Commission in the coming

Mr. O'Connor said that farmers will be very reluctant now to join REPS as they do not know what the new specifications and payments for the scheme will be from 2000 onwards. Farmers, he said, "need to know what the long term future of REPS is as they will be incurring costs in year one, first of all in planning charges, and secondly in compliance costs."

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman also expressed serious concern with regard to the new REPS / SMA Commonage Scheme which had only recently begun to apply. Farmers with commonages were debarred from joining REPS for the best part of 1998 and early 1999 as new arrangements were being discussed with Brussels. Farmers in commonage areas will have to destock based on the Commonage Framework Plans with uncertainty as to the long term compensation for income loss that will apply.

Mr. O'Connor said that he feared the transitional rules worked out between the Department of Agriculture and the European Commission is an attempt to stall the REPS scheme which over 43,000 farmers have already applied for to-date. IFA estimate that a further 20,000 farmers could potentially join REPS over the coming years. However, these farmers will now be very reluctant to do so due to the transitional rules now in place.

Mr. O'Connor also called on the Department of Agriculture to clarify the situation with regards to plans drawn up before July 30th and where applications were lodged with the Department of Agriculture.

Concluding, Mr. O'Connor called on Minister Walsh to ensure that there is adequate funding for the new REPS scheme in the National Development Plan to ensure that payments can be improved as many farmers find the cost of compliance and participation in REPS excessive. IFA has already made a detailed submission to the Department of Agriculture on this matter.

ACREAGE BASED HEADAGE PROPOSAL MUST BE POSTPONED

IFA President Tom Parlon has recently called on the Agricultural Minister, Joe Walsh to postpone the introduction of the new acreage based Disadvantaged Areas system which was agreed at the recent Agenda 2000 negotiations. This deferral is necessary for the 100,000 farmers involved so as to allow sufficient time to devise a fair and equitable system to be put in place so as to ensure that low income farmers are not discriminated against under any new payment arrangements.

IFA believes that the postponement can be sought by the Government as a result of transitional arrangements which can apply to the implementation of the EU's Rural Development policy under

Mr. Parlon said that the change to an area based system rather than the current per head of livestock payment will have significant negative impact on the incomes of dry stock and sheep farmers whose incomes are highly dependent on Disadvantaged Areas Headage payments. Disadvantaged Areas payments in the past have been geared to those sectors on lowest income which include suck-

Continuing, the IFA President said the Minister for Agriculture must urgently secure £115 m annually over the coming seven years under the National Development Plan to implement the Diandvantaged Area Scheme. This level of funding is necessary to ensure that there are no cuts in payment and IFA will not accept any reduction in headage payments over the coming years. Headage payments represent a significant income support for low income farmers. This has been clearly illustrated in the recent Tengasc Farm Management Survey where direct payments represent over 100% of income on cattle and sheep farms with headage payment in se-

The average price received by pig farmers over the period was 78.3p per kg. The break-even cost including financial charges is 95p per kg. This represents an average loss of 16.7p per kg or sold. Producers made a fact losses average £75,000 for each producer".

Mr Parlon said "The sector badly needs to recover from this position but it will take a long time. Current price levels at 87p per kg are 8p per kg or £5.60 per pig below break-even".

Mr Parlon called on all parties at the seminar involved with the sector, pigmeat processors, feed compounders and financial shoulders to the wheel to asate pig price increase of 4p Mr Parlon.

Mr. Liam Heverin, Chairman of ICMSA's Beef and Cattle Committee speaking after a visit to the Beef Carcase Grading Trial at Dawn Meats, Midleton said that he hoped that the trial would identify a number of machines capable of providing an objective measure of quality under Irish conditions which could replace the current subjective measurement of quality which has been a major bone of contention for farmers since its introduction.

Farmers today, Mr. Heverin said, simple cannot afford errors in grading cattle so this is why the introduction of an objective system is so important. An objective system should provide a farmer with a greater guarantee that he/she is getting fair grade for his/her cattle. Following an inspection of the Trial, Mr. Heverin said, that he was very impressed with the commitment being shown by all parties involved in ensuring that the trial is a success, in particular the commitment of Dawn Meats and the Department of agriculture and Food. The farming community, Mr. Heverin said will await the final results of this Trial with much interest by the farming community.

MILK PRICES

The ICMSA President Mr. Frank Allen said that it was his opinion that milk prices should remain stable for the rest o the year. Intervention for skim milk powder has just ended. However the expectation is that skim powder will continue to trade at intervention prices, in contrast to last year when powder prices came down over £100 per ton when intervention ended.

In the current year because of the weak Euro and the strong- dollar, significant exports of powder have gone to third country markets because the currency situation made European powder quote competitive.

In addition there has been demand in Europe for powder for use in animal feed. These developments have encouraged a more stable market.

Looking into the future the significant increase in oil prices should encourage increased demand for dairy products in Third Country markets. Low oil prices meant that many countries reduced the quality of dairy products that they purchased.

We must also hope that Russia will commence purchasing butter and cheese sometime next year when their economy should begin to recover with the aid of international loans.

"It is difficult to predict future prospects but I do not expect dairy markets to get any worse, and if the Russian situation were to improve it would certainly have a very positive impact on the market" concluded Mr. Allen.





Childhood Trauma

As we approach the new millennium and we look back on how far we have come in the last hundred years one word comes to mind - awesome. We can land a man on the moon, science has developed to such a degree that it is now possible to clone an animal, we can communicate in ways undreamt of through the information super-highway. Yet on the personal level so many resist change. However the more people can grasp the need for individual growth the greater their chances are of meeting the challenge for their own survival.

A person's personality is determined by his relationship with other people. To understand this we must examine the vulnerability of the infant and its dependence on the mother's nurturance. Without this nurturance an infant could not integrate the basic physiology so necessary for survival. After birth most mothers experience a degree of anxiety and infants who operate on empathy are aware as mother in her post-partum psychosis withdraws somewhat in emotional strain. Mother's anxiety and confusion is transmitted directly to the infant and he learns quickly how to adapt to this anxiety. The infant develops skills to tolerate and deal with this panic of his mother and limit his own awareness of his very own anxiety. So in infancy an infant has its very first confrontation with its mother. The infant's fear confronts the mother with her anxious thoughts and the infant becomes preoccupied with getting over this fear which it internalises as death.

Children who suffer childhood trauma in their early developmental years may never remember what happened but these cumulative buried traumas have a direct influence on how they live their future lives. In adulthood, when exposed to certain stimuli, these people suffer anxiety attacks, obsessive-compulsive behaviour, depression, addiction problems such as substance abuse or engage in abusive addictive relationships. in relationships they will try to regain the control lost in childhood and behave with perfectionist behaviour or go through life malingering in chronic illnesses. As parents they over-protect or become permissive, vowing to give their children everything they were denied. Others may try to recapture their lost childhood through their children. These victims are conditioned to feel it's not O.K. to have needs and feelings. In order to be approved they learn quickly to please, be good, stay out of the way, shut up and think like an adult.

Real childhood experiences are not allowed, they can't be vulnerable or spontaneous. This conditioning deprives kids of identity formation.

Many children learn from this that they are bad and so they act out because of a lack of security and then externalise their parents' denied hidden feelings. If parents are unable to deal with their own internalised feelings children in turn learn to bury their feelings and later on this develops into self-hate, dissociation and isolation. This causes confusion and causes a rift in conflict between the real self and the injured, shame-based self.

HEALTHY DEVELOPMENT

In normal development as children grow and develop they learn how to sift through the real and make-believe. They do this through having the ability and sense of self to ask lots of questions such as 'where do babies come from?" -when Grandpa died where did he go?" but children growing up in trauma and dysfunction don't explore like that. They are exposed to fear, shame and pain and they absorb further shock and traumas with conditioned defences. They have an external crust that allows them take further painful situations in their stride

In order to develop healthily children must have a sound basic trust in the security of their family and environment which is paramount to a sense of positive identity and self esteem. When children can experience emotions with spontaneity and vigour with no fear of abandonment, abuse or shame they have a capacity to be themselves. When parents exhibit unconditional love children develop a sense of security fostered by the continuance of this love. This security becomes imprinted on the child's mind and even when the parents may be absent the child feels safe. Children internalise this positive sense and this is the cornerstone of a child's sense of self esteem and worth. This allows a child the opportunity to accept the disappointments and frustrations of life. The parents positive force teaches the child self discipline and self control and further enhances their sense of worth and esteem. When a child experiences encouragement he becomes confident, giving him the courage to take further risks.

SHAME-BASED FAMILIES

However in families where this autonomy is absent or denied children are unable to resolve the ups and downs of everyday life. Sadly those who experience put-downs and criticisms become critical of themselves and deny their needs. Fearful and anxious parents teach their children to be fearful and some children compensate for this by engaging in overly risky behaviour. Many children of such environments in adulthood live out their internalised identities as a tough 'bad apple'. After all throughout their young life they have memorised the many negative mantras ranted by parents 'you're no good', you're a bastard' so now in adulthood life they must become what their parents see in them. A further sad spin-off from this is that as they have internalised being bad they believe they will get the punishment they deserve. These parental reflections are lived out time and time again. You see for children of trauma to drop their defences could expose them to their reality - a frightened

Anna Freud, In her work 'The Ego and the Mechanism of Defence' stated that the ego's defensive system acts as a protection against traumatisation. She went on to say a Phobic individual who is forced to meet the object of his fear or anxiety instead of avoiding it is forced undefended into a traumatic situation and breaks down in panic.

Children growing up in abusive homes become further victims to teasing and taunting when they move outside the home or go to school. For these children there is an acute conflict between the desire to be loved by the parents and the shame they feel inside. Many abused children, torn in family confusion become pseudo-family ambassadors protecting the family from their sense of failure. If children sense the parents are suffering from low self esteem and are denying the experiencing of feelings the child may become guilty and in identifying with the abusive parents inhibit their own sense of success.

SPECIAL NEEDS IN SCHOOL

All children in one way or another will experience some trauma in their life but parents have a duty to protect children from the damage of unresolved trauma. Many children for example experience the powerlessness of a learning difficulty such as dyslexia. In school their teacher may not pick up on this. The child suffers ridicule by being called lazy or stupid. These teachers pass on their remarks to parents and so the child is further criticised or ridiculed. This labelling is internalised by the child and this causes more behavioural problems and depression. However I must add that most schools have competent perceptual screenings and testings.

VALIDATION OF EVENTS


With children it is vitally important to acknowledge and validate feelings and happenings. Many women who have been victims of sexual abuse have told me of their failure to be believed was more painful and devastating than the actual assault. This is true also when there is a death in the family. Children who have experienced the loss through death, perhaps of a sibling, have had their feelings denied, ignored and invalidated. In fact in many such instances the deceased, out of family fear, is never a topic of discussion again. In fact this emotional withdrawal leads to further problems. With the loss of a sibling, clinging to the dead brother or sister is the only way some children can actually validate themselves. The sociologist, Bob Berkus, wrote grief makes no comparisons nor judgments nor has it any understanding or degree'. I have experienced death first hand in the death of my first wife and more recently in the death of my son. In both situations I, myself and children acknowledged the grief and loss.

When children grow up forced to adapt to the parents' needs rather than the other way round the consequences are detrimental. Alice Miller wrote in 1981 'The impossibility of consciously experiencing feelings of his own either in childhood or later in adulthood is a direct result of having to adapt to the parents' needs.' In the growing up stages the child moves from 'I am', that is total dependence without boundaries to 'Who I am', an individual separate from parents. If parents are emotionally healthy they help their children to learn trust.

When children feel they belong unconditionally they feel loved, wanted and approved and they internalise everything the parents do with them from a

loving look to loving strokes. This allows the children love themselves. Eric Erickdeclared that in the early months of infancy children learn basic trust and this trust develops as the child grows and will be with them

even if situations change.



In dysfunctional families, mistrust is ever present and is learned and cultivated. Through this a child learns self contempt, fear of aloneness, and they go on into adulthood in fear, total isolation and without trust in himself or others. In adulthood this victim will move from relationship to relationship, terrified of being alone and his only security As in total fusion with his parents. This need for enmeshment is fertilised in childhood as a child learns that he has to be good to he approved otherwise risks rejection or abandonment. In adulthood this disables persons so much that they don't trust their own achievements without checking with others. An infant of about a year and a half explores the world on his own with his newly acquired skills. At about two years he further asserts 'I am' in language such as 'NO' and 'I want'. This is the emergence of a child determined to become a person in his own right. In Barney Baby Bop has a yellow 'blankey'. This blanket for many children is really the security partition between the parents and the child's need to connect with a separate reality. This blanket is the child's first milestone between the world of 'me' and 'not me.' The relationship the child has with the blankey is so important as the child dumps and retrieves the blankey in a type of unconditional love-hate situation. It teaches the child that you can love and be loved, be angry, and accept others can be angry with you and that you can have intimacy with out loss of the self. This process is fundamental for a person to exist in their own right. Emotionally damaged parents demand their children to be good, perfect and adult so as to meet their needs. Unfortunately they deny the child the need for a yellow blankey. This child will be conditioned to repress anger and expressions of self and be denied the right to know that love and conflict can co-exist simultaneously. This childhood abuse develops so much that as adults these victims are hostage to their own emotions.

In conclusion I read 'once in a while when I allow the feelings stored for childhood to bubble to the surface I have a hard time keeping them under control. I immediately want to fight or flee, destroy someone, something, sometimes even me.'



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

DENIS IS NO MENACE

Sunday racing in England is not that long established. But Dungarvan born trainer Denis Coakley certainly wasn't complaining about racing on the sabbath as Sharp Spice at 14/1 flashed by the winning post at Goodwood last Sunday week providing forty year old Denis with his initial training success.

While his racing exploits have taken him around the world Denis didn't have to travel too far for his introduction to horse racing as he commenced his career as assistant trainer to Dungarvan's very own John Kiely. Denis also doubled as stable amateur and he partnered a number of winners for the J. E. Kiely stable. Eager to broaden his racing knowledge Denis at the age of 22 headed off down under to Australia where he worked as a stud hand in New South Wales. It was here that he met Lord Huntington, who at that stage was still using the name William Hastings Bass. Denis teamed up with Hastings Bass as assistant trainer in 1983 until such time as his visa ran out. Young Coakley also had spells with such well-known trainers as Gordon Richards, Barry Hills and former American jumps trainer Janet Elliot before rejoining Lord Huntington in 1988 as assistant trainer in Newmarket and then with the same trainer when he re-located to West Isley in 1989. Since that date Denis spent some time with Neil Drysdale in Hollywood while he also travelled with Drum Taps for both the Melbourne and Japan Cups, taking responsibility for his training and it was back for a return visit to Melbourne, Australia in 1997 with Arabian Story.

With Lord Huntington calling it a day as a trainer his assistant of ten years, Denis Coakley decided to take out a trainers licence in his own name. He has a string of about a dozen horses under his care and his former employer Lord Huntington has this to say of the new trainer: "Denis has been a first class member of the team and I wish him every luck. Needless to say if he does well I shall take the credit and vice versa." Indeed Lord Huntington will have a horse or two in training with this new trainer.

The English racing scene is one of the most competitive in the world but now that Denis Coakley has broken his duck courtesy of Sharp Spice, hopefully many more winners will flow through the Dungarvan born trainers hands.

KIERAN TO MISS LEDGER

Top flat jockey Kieran Fallon will have to sit out the upcoming St. Leger at Doncaster having picked up a five day suspension for careless riding at Ripon last week.

DAVID TO RETIRE

Leading National Hunt trainer David Nicholson has announced his intention to retire at the end of the current jump season. 60 year old Nicholson will not renew his licence next June. He started training at Condicote in 1968 but subsequently moved to his present location at Jackdaws Castle at Stow on the Wold near Cheltenham in 1992. He captured the trainers championship twice and sent out 100 winners or more in a season twice.



Cool Performance

Lived Up To His Name

With some excellent prize money on offer last Saturday night's benefit meeting in aid of the order of Malta Ambulance Corps attracted some quality entries and a large attendance were treated to some excellent fare. The feature race of the evening was the Tom Kearn's Landscaping Contractors event. Michael Gleeşon's Cool Performance (Mustang Jack - Pony Nikita) was sent off the 5/4 favourite and the Kilkenny Fawn did not disappoint streaking clear of the opposition running out an all the way 28.95 winner. Gerry My Boy ran a fine race in second but he could never get to Cool Performance who stayed on well to record a three lengths victory.

There was £500 on offer for the winner of the Guiness Marathon and it produced a shock but deserving 8/1 winner in the shape of Christine Marlin's Scallywag Doll (Moral Standard's - Denmark Darling) who flew around in a very decent 41.48. The heavily supported Kilcarrig House 4/6 to 1/3 somehow managed to lose her prominent early position at the first bend. Meanwhile Boher Lily motored into an early lead over Scallywag Doll. The latter struck the front on the back stretch and although Kilcarrig House made sound late headway "Scallywag" was gone beyond recall eventually scoring by a length.

Local owner Maurice Jackson sponsored the final of the Waterford Plumbing and Heating Services Sweepstake. Semi-final winners Like It Private 2/1 and Up Jenny 6/4 were best fancied here but the Christy Coady trained Sparky Elite (Deenside Spark - Rosehip Tricks) 4/1 quickly took control of matters to move into an early lead over the two market leaders. This order of running remained unchanged for the duration of this final with Sparky Elite winning out by a length and a quarter from Up Jenny in 29.21. The winner is owned by the Tallow based Elite Racing Syndicate

The Martin Kiely owned and John Cullinane trained Lakefield Mike (Phantom Power - Lakefield Lucy) came from behind to take a graded final in 29.71. After capturing his semi final in 29.35 "Lakefield" was sent off the red hot 4/7 Hot Pot and although headed briefly on the back stretch by Wee Jobber "Lakefield" was soon back at the head of affairs breezing in three and a half lengths clear of a staying on Scallywag Runaway who came from the rear of the field to claim the runner up spot.

Racing commenced with a very easy victory for the 2/1 shot Knockmoylan Deal (Shanless Slippy - Knockmoylan Lady) who scored a runaway 29.65 victory. Jointly owned by Gerry Kiely and Kevin Ayres "Knockmoylan" survived a rough passage around the opening turn before racing clear for a seven lengths success over Bolivian Queen.

Kathleen Stamp's 3/1 shot (18/1 on the Tote) Glenbrien Punt (Metric Prince - Glenbrien Baby) produced a strong finish to land the second event in a career fastest 29.45. A wide running Polerone Ruby was out in front for much of this race but the always prominent "Glenbrien" ran on strongly up the rails to defeat a staying on Lyons Dale by a neck.

Dillrock Drake (I'm His - Dillrock Nurse) 4/1 owned by Alan Carroll of Curracloe beat a good class field in the third

event in a Red Hot 29.00. Back in his favourite trap six "Dillrock" powered his way up to the first bend to lead at that point from a slow starting but early paced Airmount Prince. Terminal Flash ran a close second for most of the trip but it was the slow starting Romantic Dusty who ran on best at the finish to get within four and a half lengths of the front running Narabane Monica.

Alter capturing a graded sprint the previous Tuesday night the Ger Kirwan owned and Jimmy Frisby trained Arrigle Go (Arrigle Buddy - Geal Gayo Sandie) made the transmission to open class sprinting with the minimum of fuss running out an impressive winner of the concluding open sprint in 16.52. Prolific Sprint winner Dunsallagh Pride broke smartly from trap six but he was quickly challenged by Pearls Best. Producing a fine dash of early pace Arrigle Go somehow managed to drive up the inside of the two leaders at the first bend. There was sensation in the discus as American Anthony Washington jumped from fourth to first with his final throw to grab gold in the men's discus. Jurgen Schult and Lars Riedel were the vanquished pair.

Not the best days for the Irish - Peter Coghlan was pipped by three-hundredths of a second for a place in the 110m hurdles final, Ciara Sheehy failed to progress in the opening round of the women's 200m with Paul Brizzell and Gary Ryan missing out in the men's equivalent.





The Royals fired six unanswered points in an eight minute spell for a 2-9 to 2-6 margin and with 10 minutes remaining were 2-10 to 2-7 ahead and had the game

AMAZING

But it's amazing what the scent of the winners enclosure will do, especially if you have been waiting 100 years to gain entry.

With chants of Waterford, Waterford echoing around the ground, manager John Kiely rolled the dice for the last time and introduced substitutes Ger Walsh and Karl O'Keeffe.

Ger Walsh, a brother of intercounty hurler and centreback, Pat, sprayed the ball around and ignited a revival which will be talked about in the south east well into the next century as his side finished in style.

Waterford also started at a blistering pace and had the ball in John Curry's net inside 30 seconds from Connie Power, but Meath replied instantly when John Carey found Mark Crampton who fired past Alfie Kirwan to level. All this in a minute and a half.
