Lismore Scoops Title Of Tidiest Town In County

The scenic Heritage town of Lismore has been awarded Co. Waterford's tidiest town. Lismore won the coveted top county prize last Monday at a ceremony in Dublin Castle. Scoring an impressive 240 points out of a possible 300 in this years Tidy Towns Competition, Lismore was just one point ahead of Ardmore.

After coming second in the county in the '98 competition, this year's success has come as a major boost to the local community. Back in 1995, Lismore won a plaque in the Entente Florale competition in Austria and the same year scooped an endeavour award in the Tidy Towns competition. This is the first time how-

ever that Lismore have won the top prize in the county.

LOCAL COMMITTEE DELIGHTED

Noel Dempsey, Minister for the Environment and Local Government was on hand to congratulate the members of Lismore Tidy Towns committee at the ceremony in St. Patrick's Hall, Dublin Castle. Chair-

man Patrick Fleming was present together with committee members Mary O'Brien, Mary McBride and William Roche.

The committee will be presented with a bronze plaque and a cheque for £250 at the South East regional award ceremony to be held in Rathvilly, Co. Cork in the near future. A celebratory party was

held in Roses West End Bar on Monday night where the returning committee members were greeted with a euphoric reception. by friends, supporters and public representatives.

Speaking to the 'Leader', chairman Pat Fleming said the committee are absolutely delighted at Lismore's win in the Tidy Towns Competition.

"The tremendous work that the committee and the community did showed great results", he stated, "and we hope for better

Roundabout At Tallow Bridge Ruled Out

ONE WAY TRAFFIC ON TALLOW HILL

The possibility of introducing a roundabout at the Tallow Bridge junction as a means of improving traffic safety in the area has been ruled out by Waterford County Engineer John O'Flynn.

Speaking at this weeks meeting of the Council, Mr. O'Flynn said a roundabout at this location would be extremely dangerous due to the sharp downhill approach to the junction.

He said there would be no question of the National Roads Authority, who are in charge of the road, approving of such a project. After inspecting the site, the Gardai are

in agreement with his recommendation.

Meanwhile, Mr. O'Flynn revealed that when the Tallow Hill road is reopened it will operate on a one way system uphill.

As reported in last weeks edition of the 'Leader', the changing of the road structure at Tallow Bridge has been strongly criticised by local road users. Work has been ongoing by the Council since early June on a major road realignment project costing approximately £200,000. Traffic travelling from Tallow must now yield before coming on to the busy N72 **Continued on page 3**

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Funding Cited As The Key To Tackling Local Roads

As the Government prepares a budget, with in excess of £1.7 billion of a surplus available for extra spending, an appeal has been made for increased resources to be given to Waterford Co. Council for the structuring and maintenance of rural roads.

Cllr. Fiachra O' Ceilleachair, speaking at a special meeting of delegates from Co. Waterford's 24 IFA branches in Dungarvan on Wednesday September 1st, said that poor community infrastructure was a major concern for those living in rural Ireland. Cllr. O' Ceilleachair pointed out that of the £22.6 million that the County Council will spend on roads in 1999, only £2.3 million will be specific to local roads. Cllr. O' Ceilleachair says the Government, which contributed £14.7 million to the Co. Waterford roads budget for 1999 and regulates and advises on road funding, should undertake to increase resources available for the by-roads and link roads between townlands that are so vital to the social and economic wellbeing of parishes throughout Co. Waterford.

"I've recently examined roads in Ballinroad, Kilgobnet, Kilbrien, Colligan, the Brickey Valley, Ballinameela, Aglish, Clashmore/Kinsalebeg, Ardmore/Grange and Ring/Old Parish and I've seen several examples of stretches that require a complete structural overhaul. The network of by-roads in

these and other parishes are in need of improvement if any of those dwelling off them are going to be expected to pass the M.O.T. tests being introduced from the start of next year. There's also an importance of agriculture to be considered. Some roads were never designed for the kind of traffic that's on them now and I can't see the Co. Council's current 5 year roadworks scheme making enough difference unless it is significantly boosted by a new injection of central funding".

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question

I have a disability and would like to adapt my house to my needs. Is there a grant to help with the cost?

Answer

In the 1999 Budget an extra £3m was provided for the Disabled Person's Housing Grant Scheme. This grant assists those who require alterations to their homes as a result of physical disability, a mental disability, or a severe mental illness for which they are receiving treatment. Alterations could include making a dwelling wheelchair accessible or installing a ground floor bathroom and toilet. The grant is funded jointly by the Department of the Environment and Local Government, and local authorities.

Application for the grant is made to the local authority which will provide guidelines in relation to procedures and information on works that will be grant aided. The maximum grant available is £12,000 (before 1999 it was £8,000) and the grant will cover up to three quarters of the cost of the works to private houses previously only two thirds of the cost was covered.

The grant is not available to people in rented accommodation or to those living in newly built accommodation. If you live in a local authority house the local authority will meet the full cost of approved alterations. The disabled person must occupy the house as his/her normal place of residence.

The Disabled Persons Housing Grant is not means tested though the local authority may enquire as to how you intend to meet your portion of the cost of the adaption. Local authorities will consider application for grants in cases where in the opinion of the local authority, the adaption or structural works are reasonably necessary to make a house more suitable for the accommodation of a member of the household who has a physical or mental handicap.

You must not do any of the work until your application is approved. Applications to the local authority must be accompanied by a detailed itemised estimate from the contractor together with specifications of the proposed work. The contractor's Income Tax Number and VAT number must be included.

When the local authority receives your application it will ask your health board to arrange a call from an Occupational Therapist who will be required to provide a report back to the local authority.

Criticism At Massive Rise In Home Heating Oil

Oil distributors around the country are facing a new wave of criticism this week following an increase of 5p per gallon introduced by oil producers last Monday night.

One Co. Waterford oil distributor told the 'Leader' that he has been inundated with calls from customers expressing their shock at the massive rise in oil costs compared with prices last year.

"There have been eight separate increases since April 1st this year", said the source. "This time last year 1000 litres of home heating oil cost approximately £200 - the same amount now costs almost £260. We the distributors have to face our customers and try to explain the rise while oil producers have cut

production by 20%".

The bad news is that oil prices are on the way up after world oil prices floated to their highest level in almost two years last week. The dramatic rise has come about after major OPEC producers decided to cut production by 20% last March. Since then the price of oil has steadily increased with the latest hike of 5p per gallon being introduced last Monday night. It is expected that OPEC producers will keep the supply cuts in place until March 2000.

The price of tractor diesel has increased by 25% since April 1st this year. A barrel of crude oil cost \$8 on March 1st and now costs \$21.

Rosslare/Killarney road. PUBLIC MEETINGS SHOW DIVIDED OPINION

Two public meetings were held in Ballinvella, Lismore and in Tallow over the weekend. At these meetings, the temporary closure of the road at Tallow Hill and the increasing volume of traffic using the alternative downhill approach road to Tallow, known as the Sweep, were discussed. The huge amount of traffic now travelling on the Sweep road with its dangerous hairpin bend, has led to serious concern.

According to public representatives who attended the weekend meetings, public opinion is divided on whether there should be two or one way traffic on Tallow Hill and whether a roundabout should be introduced at Tallow Bridge.

The matter was discussed at length during Monday's Council meeting where Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson claimed that the volume of traffic using the Sweep road has increased by 60%.

Cllr. James Tobin, who travels this road on a regular basis, said more trees on the hairpin bend need to be cut back and proper signposting erected to warn approaching motorists of the bend.

"Those going to Bridane cannot see traffic coming from the Lismore road", he warned.

Cllr. Nora Flynn said she had not been invited to either of the public meetings and was unaware of them. However, she received numerous phone calls from people extremely concerned with traffic safety at the Sweep, particularly as this road now serves such areas as Fermoy, Ballyduff, Monatrim, Bridane, Camphire, Ballinvella, etc.

Cllr. Willie McDonnell also voiced his concern and

asked that the Council improve the road signs and markings at this location.

COUNCIL TO IMPROVE SIGNAGE

On hearing the many concerns expressed by members, Mr. O'Flynn agreed to look at improving the road markings and signs on the Sweep and to cut back some of the trees at the hairpin bend with the permission from local landowners.

The entire N72 national

roadway is being signposted by the National Roads Authority over the next 12 months and Mr. O'Flynn said he will try to accelerate the Tallow part of the contract.

Meanwhile the County Engineer also agreed to a request by Cllr. Tobin that facilities within Tallow town be highlighted by way of symbol signposts.

He stressed that signposting is vital and claimed that the town of Tallow was 'lost'.



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Your Fountain Pen

A fountain pen is an instrument for writing which contains its own ink supply. Early this century they were still using pens which had to be continually refilled from outside inkwells.

When we talk about a fountain pen we usually mean a pen with a cartridge and ending with a nib.

There are many parts to your fountain pen — a nib for writing; a reservoir which holds the ink; a tube which carries the ink to the nib; a feeder which regulates the flow of the ink; the housing, the small cylinder that contains the pen, and a

cover for protecting the nib. A refillable reservoir is a small pliable rubber bag which holds that reserve ink.

Your fountain pen is loaded by the following method: a small control or another similar device, pushes the air out of the reservoir. Then when you insert the pen in the ink and free the control, the ink is sucked up into the reservoir. Instead of a control or lever, the device may be a screw which pushes a piston. In some models you have to create the pressure manually.

What you are trying to do is create a vacuum in the reservoir

so that the pen can be filled with ink using a process called aspiration. The reservoir empties as you write and this is what happens. The association between the nib and the reservoir is a network of tiny passages which carry air to the empty space at the top of the reservoir. As you are writing, the air is replacing the ink that is flowing into the nib.

Pens with ink cartridges are fountain pens that have their ink reserve in a small plastic container. The cartridge can be replaced as soon as it empties. This pen is the most popular as it lasts longer.

When Do Animals Become Mutants

Animals are said to be mutants when they show characteristics that are different from the rest of their species. Mutants occur when alterations occur in the reproductive cells.

In nature these changes take place spontaneously and no one knows when they will happen. These changes are rare and little is known about the cause beyond the fact that the longer an animal takes to breed, the less likely it is to give birth to deformed offspring.

Today the most common cause of animals producing deformed offspring are chemical substances and radiation. Radiation is becoming a rapidly increasing hazard. Offspring, born of animals who have been subjected to more than normal radiation, are invariably mutants. Cows have been known to grow an extra leg.

In the Pacific Islands, where nuclear tests have taken place, fish have been found on dry land and have forgotten how to swim. Birds have forgotten to fly and have been born with one wing.

Deformed animals have been the object of people's attention for a long time now. They have frightened people also. In Greek mythology, mutants were believed to have strange magical powers.

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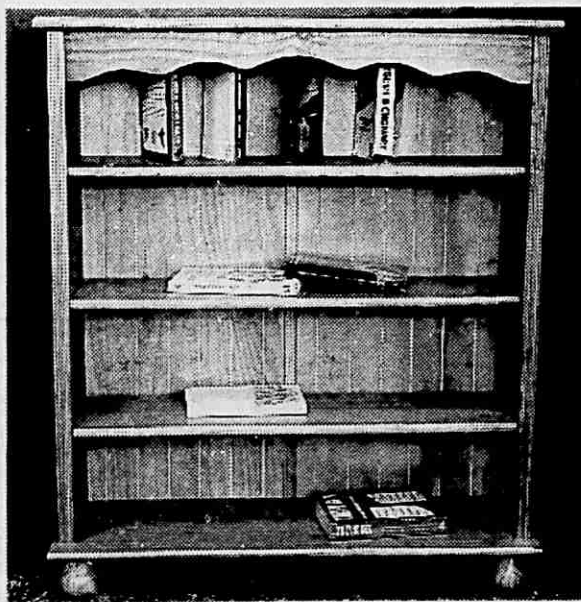
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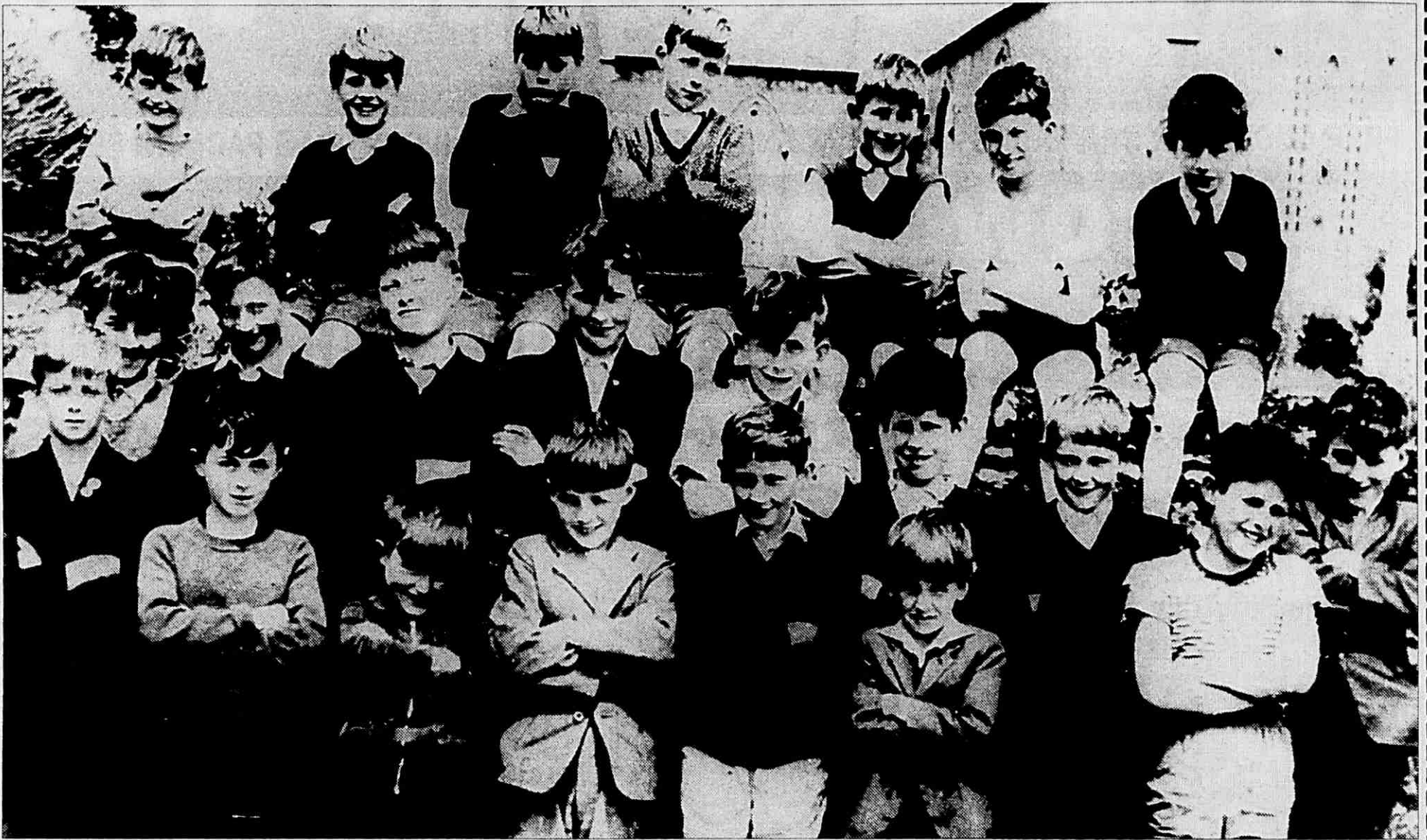

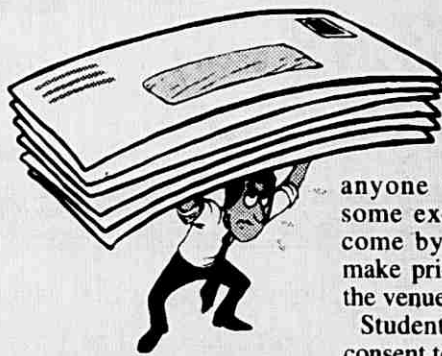
Dungarvan Junior Cert. Students Disco

Location Of Proposed Halting Sites Must Be Revealed -DEASY

A member of Waterford County Council has demanded that the whereabouts of proposed halting sites in the county be made known in the draft accommodation programme for travellers.

Fine Gael councillor John Deasy, who is also on the Traveller Accommodation Committee, said the specific locations of planned halting sites must be disclosed by the County Manager before Waterford County Council members are asked to vote on the matter.

Cllr. Deasy pointed out that only electoral areas are to be identified at this stage in the draft traveller accommodation programme while the actual locations of any proposed halting sites are not pinpointed.

"This is an absurd situation. How are people expected to make a proper submission on the location of a halting site if the location is not identified in the draft programme", he

slammed.

MANAGER COULD STEP IN

Under the Traveller Accommodation Act, a five year accommodation programme must be adopted by the members of the Council by March 31st, 2000. If members fail to adopt an accommodation programme the County Manager will be required to do so under the legislation. Before the final programme is adopted, a draft programme will be prepared.

After receiving submissions from the public, the Manager submits this report with the Draft Programme to members for their consideration.

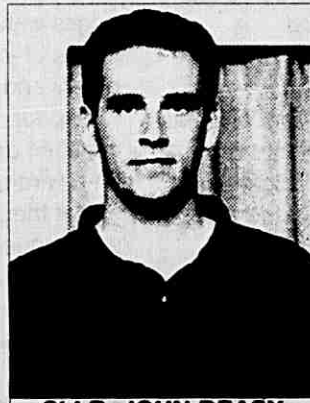
Cllr. Deasy said this was again an 'absurd' situation where councillors may not have the first notion about what they are discussing or voting for, because the County Manager will not have drawn up a proposed listing of sites for them to consider.

"At that point the Manager will step in and in all probability enforce the legislation against the will of a community that has no recourse to the process and may be subject to a compulsory purchase order".

Cllr. Deasy continued that unlike ordinary councillors, the County Manager and his officials are the only people who have the resources available to them to draw up a preliminary listing of proposed halting sites using criteria such as proximity to services, etc. Only after this listing is made will people in these affected areas be capable of making an informed submission on behalf of their own communities, he added.

'COUNCIL LOSING CREDIBILITY'

"The lack of consultation between County Council officials and the public has been non-existent on the traveller and landfill issues", claimed Cllr. Deasy. "The County Council is fast

losing credibility in communities that have had decisions rammed down their throats without any consideration given to their well-being".

"It is essential that communities have an opportunity to respond to plans that seriously threaten their standard of life and property values. At the very least, communities that are adversely affected must be properly consulted and compensated for the loss to their standard of living and property value. I have at present no faith that the County Manager and his officials are making genuine efforts in this regard", he added.

Cookery Corner



Summer Fish Soup

Preparation: 15 minutes.
Cooking: approx. 45 minutes.
Serves: 4.

1 tbsp olive oil
 1 garlic clove, peeled and

chopped
 1 onion peeled and chopped
 2 celery stalks, sliced
 3 tbsp freshly chopped flat-leaf parsley
 1 (400g/14 oz) can chopped tomatoes
 1 tbsp tomato puree
 300ml 1/2 pt. fish stock
 100g/4 oz squid, cleaned and cut into rings
 225g/8 oz monkfish
 225g/8 oz haddock
 175g/6 oz large peeled

prawns, thawed if frozen
 Crusty bread to serve
METHOD:
 Heat the oil in a large pan and fry the garlic, onion and celery for 3-4 minutes until softened. Stir in 2 tbsp of the parsley and cook for 1 minute. Add the canned tomatoes, tomato puree, wine and fish stock to the pan and bring to the boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for 15 minutes.

Add the squid to the tomato mixture and cook for 10 minutes.
 Cut the monkfish and haddock into large chunks and add to the pan with the prawns. Stir once, cover and simmer for 10-15 minutes until the fish is cooked through. Spoon the soup into a large serving bowl and garnish with the remaining parsley. Serve with crusty bread.

Beauty Basics

Sensitive Skin

Sensitive skin appears very transparent and blotchy. It may have broken capillaries which are small veins and blood vessels that can be seen beneath the skin.

This can be caused when the blood vessels are not elastic enough to handle the flow of blood which flows through them; they consequently stretch and break.

Broken capillaries are usually found on the cheek area. If you have sensitive skin you may be prone to allergic reaction from cosmetics and some foods. Therefore, it is very important when choosing cosmetics to make sure they are free from perfumes and alcohol.

Dry skin may sometimes be sensitive but does not necessarily react to cosmetics as sensitive skin does. Sensitive skin will redden very easily, even after gentle cleansing.

It is important to visit a beauty salon and have a specific treatment for sensitive skin. Broken capillaries can be treated, but not always completely cleared. However, correct treatment of the skin will help to prevent further damage.

Sensitive skin needs to be protected from many factors, such as the weather, central heating and open fires. A good moisturiser is needed to help protect the skin. Spicy hot foods should also be avoided if you have sensitive skin. A sensitive skin should always be treated with great care.

1. — Avoid cosmetics which contain perfumes and alcohol.
2. — Ensure that the skin is adequately protected from extremes of heat and cold.
3. — Avoid eating hot spicy foods.

Raspberry Pastries

Preparation: 20 minutes.
Cooking: 15-20 minutes.
Serves: 8.

2 (15cm/6 in.) square sheets frozen ready-rolled puff pastry, thawed
 1 egg, size 3, beaten
 4 tbsp raspberry jam
 225g/8 oz fresh raspberries, washed
 25g/1 oz flaked almonds, toasted and chopped icing sugar to dust.

METHOD:

Preheat the oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas mark 6. Cut the puff pastry into 8 squares, each measuring 7.5cm/3 in. Cut a 6mm/1/4in border around 2 opposite corners of each square.

It should look as if you've almost cut a square from the middle, but two corners

are still attached.

Dampen the edges with water. Lift the 2 cut corners of the pastry border and cross them over to overlap, so that they rest on top of the two free corners of the inside square. Repeat with the remaining pastry squares.

Carefully place the individual pastries on a dampened baking sheet. Brush the edges with beaten egg. Spread 1 teaspoon of jam in the middle of the each pastry and top with the raspberries.

Bake for 15-20 minutes until the pastry is puffed and golden. Remove and place on a wire rack to cool.

Heat the remaining raspberry jam in a small saucepan until melted. Brush over the raspberries, sprinkle with the almonds and dust with icing sugar.

Apple and Pear Puffs

Preparation: 20 mins.
Cooking: 20 mins.
Serves: 9.

Ingredients:
 300g/11 oz chilled bought croissant dough
 175g/6 oz canned stewed apple
 3 dessert apples
 3 dessert pears
 40g/1 1/2 oz butter
 40g/1 1/2 oz flour
 25g/1 oz chopped hazelnuts
 25g/1 oz ground hazelnuts

40g/1 1/2 oz caster sugar
 1/2 ground cinnamon

METHOD:

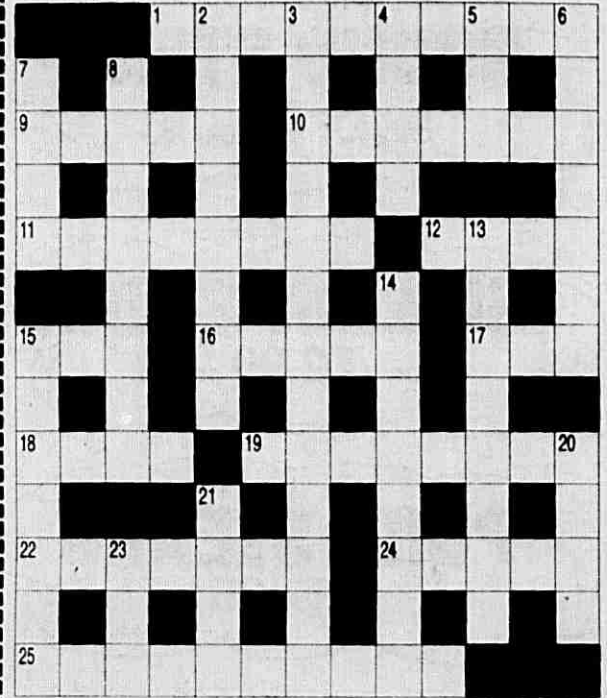
Preheat the oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas mark 5. Open out the roll of dough and fold into three. Roll out on a lightly floured surface into a rectangle and press into the bottom of a greased 20 x 30 cm/8 oz x 12 in. swiss roll tin. Spread the dough with the stewed apple to within 1 cm/1/2 inch of the edge. Quarter, core and thinly

slice the apples and pears. arrange the slices alternately and slightly overlapping on top of stewed apple.

For the topping, rub the butter into the flour until it just starts to stick together. stir in the hazelnuts, sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle the topping over the fruit and bake for 20 mins. until crisp and golden. Cool slightly, then cut into 9 pieces.

Best known as an effective ointment for bruises, sprains and muscle pain, arnica improves the local blood supply and accelerates healing.

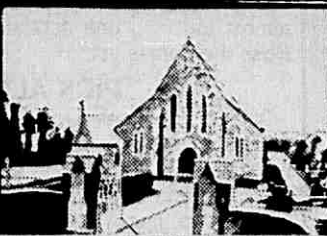
Generally the herb is now taken internally only as a homeopathic remedy, mainly for shock, injury and pain.

Call For Withdrawal Of Knockmealdown Wind Farm Proposal

As opposition continues to mount against a suggested wind farm in the scenic mountain area of the Vee, the Chairman of the Knockmealdown Protection Committee, Willie O'Donoghue, has called on the promoter behind the development to immediately withdraw his proposal.

Residents of Mount Melleray near Cappoquin are divided over controversial plans to develop a multi million pound wind farm in the Knockmealdowns. However the proposer behind the project, Charles Keane of Cappoquin Estates, is adamant that he will not proceed with plans for the wind farm without the full backing of the community. An application for planning permission has not been lodged with the County Council.

'WILL FIGHT TO THE END'

Speaking to the 'Leader', Mr. O'Donoghue said that up to 80% of the community is opposed to the notion of a wind farm as put forward by Mr. Keane.

Calling on Mr. Keane to withdraw his plans for the wind farm, Mr. O'Donoghue said the committee will fight the development 'to the end', even to the courts and An Bord Pleanala if necessary.

"This is not a farm, it's an industrial development in a rural setting", he stressed.

Such a development, he claimed, would destroy the scenic setting of the Vee.

Three years ago, when the notion of a wind farm was first mooted in the area, there was again huge opposition to the project. Mr. O'Donoghue stressed however that this opposition was not unanimous and that the same number of people were in favour of the wind farm as they are now.

At that stage, Waterford County Council planners indicated to the Keane family that they were not favourably disposed to the development of a wind farm in this general location.

FINANCIAL INCENTIVES?

The proposed site in the Knockmealdowns is on the southwest slope of Knocknafalia in the gap near Knocknagauv. The land is owned by Cappoquin Estates. The number of windmills proposed for the site is fifteen. Mr. Keane has confirmed that the 200 ft. turbines would be kept off the

top of the hills and at least 1,000 m from any household.

15% of the shares in the wind farm company will be allocated to the community while Mr. Keane has forecast a possible £1.5m cash injection indirectly into the community over a 20 year period if the proposed wind farm goes ahead.

It is understood that he has written to sheep farmers on the mountain range offering them £2,000 a year for 20 years to enlist their support for the project.

WELL ATTENDED MEETING

A meeting was held in St. Mary's Hall recently to discuss the development. Despite the lengthy discussion, locals were still undecided whether or not to support the venture.

The meeting was called to determine local reaction to a recent visit by a group of Melleray residents to a wind farm in Co. Donegal. The trip was financed by Charles Keane who hopes to allay fears among locals and who has urged the people of Melleray not to reject a project which could have 'substantial benefits' without having fully investigated the facts in a rational way. He initially wants their support

for a 40 metre wind test mast on the mountain to monitor the wind over 12 months, during which time an Environmental Impact Statement will be prepared.

Environmentalists and tourism interests used the meeting to make a case for preserving the scenic Vee area. Speakers representing such diverse groups as An Taisce, Earthwatch, the Comeragh Mountaineering Club and Friends of the Irish Environment, stressed that while there was merit in wind energy, the Knockmealdowns were not a suitable location for such a project.

SURVEY TO BE CARRIED OUT

Local Fianna Fail county councillor Ollie Wilkinson told the 'Leader' that he intends to carry out a survey of residents in the Melleray area and ascertain the public's general disposition to the wind farm proposal. He will then present his findings to Charles Keane.

Cllr. Wilkinson said the local community is clearly divided on the issue and he stressed that the people of Melleray need to sit down and try to come up with a definite yes or no answer which could be conveyed to Mr. Keane.

This Week In The Garden

START TO PLANT EVERGREEN SHRUBS

From now until mid-October is the ideal time for planting hardy evergreen shrubs lifted from open ground. You cannot do this if the weather is very hot or the ground is dry, but neither condition is likely to continue for long at this time of the year. Plant firmly and stake all big specimens. Later on, if winds are very cold and drying, erect temporary shelters of hurdles, evergreen boughs or sacking between stakes to protect the shrubs, particularly on the north and east sides.

PLANT VIOLETS IN FRAMES

Violets growing outdoors since April should now be removed to frames for winter flowering. The frames must stand in a sunny and fairly sheltered position and be filled with good loamy soil to within 20cm of the glass. Plant the violet clumps almost touching one another. Water them freely, but do not close the frames yet.

PICK ALL TOMATOES

Outdoor tomatoes are not likely to ripen any more on the plants now, so it is as well to pick all the fruits that are showing some trace of colour and stand them in a sunny window to ripen. Absolutely green fruits can be made into chutney. The summer tomatoes under glass will be coming to an end and as every inch of greenhouse space is likely to be needed in the next few weeks, it is a good idea to clear these, treating them in the same way as outdoor fruits.

Apples without acres of space

APPLES are one of the most widely grown hardy fruits – and both cooking and eating varieties offer a great variety of flavours and textures.

Tree size may now be considerably reduced thanks to dwarfing rootstocks that are widely available. This allows a number of different apples to be grown in small gardens where only one large tree could have been accommodated before.

Apple trees may also be trained into almost any shape. Fan-shaped forms are particularly useful for growing against walls and fences.

The extensive choice of cultivars covers a period of ripening from mid-summer to late winter, although we usually associate autumn with apple-picking time. Once picked, apples may be stored for several months given suitable conditions.

There are cultivars and rootstocks available for most climates, including those with severe winter temperatures.

For flowering to occur the trees must be subjected to at least 900 hours below 7 degrees centigrade. Apples are not grown successfully in tropical or subtropical regions as they do not receive adequate chilling.

When planting, make sure that each tree has sufficient space to develop to its full size. Select the most appropriate size of tree for your garden. In most cases more than one apple tree will be required for pollination.

A sunny sheltered site is essential for consistently good crops. Walls for trained fruit should not be shaded and should preferably be in full sun.

Apple trees will grow in most well-drained soils given adequate preparation. However, the more dwarfing the rootstock the more fertile the soil should be.

Apple rootstocks are prefixed by the letters M or MM, which stand for Malling and Malling Merton respectively. This indicates the research stations where the rootstocks were developed. A wide range of rootstocks is available, from the very dwarf M27 to the extremely vigorous M25.

For normal garden purposes M9 is recommended for dwarf trees, MM106 for medium sized trees and M26 for large varieties.

Cultivars on M27 trees bear fruit within three years of being grafted, but require good growing conditions to maintain high yields. Bare-root trees are best planted when dormant – preferably in the autumn because the soil is still warm. They may be planted until late winter, except when it is frosty, but keep them moist in the spring so that they establish well.

If the tree is to be trained, fit the supports and wires in place before planting. For all untrained trees, staking when planting is essential and should be permanent for those on dwarfing rootstocks.

Establish a regular maintenance programme to ensure your trees stay healthy and crop well. Feed and mulch as required. Blossom and fruit thinning are annual tasks required to ensure satisfactory cropping. Check trees regularly for signs of pests or diseases.

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TRIBUNAL OF INQUIRY

(Into the infection with HIV and Hepatitis C of Persons with Haemophilia and related matters)

WHEREAS a resolution in the following terms was passed by Dáil Éireann on the 2nd day of June, 1999, and by Seanad Éireann on the 2nd day of June, 1999:

"That Dáil Éireann",

Bearing in mind the serious public concern about -

- (a) the contamination of relevant products with HIV and Hepatitis C,
- (b) the number of infected persons, and
- (c) the consequences of infection for the health of those persons,

RESOLVES that it is expedient that a tribunal under the Tribunals of Inquiry (Evidence) Act, 1921, as adapted by or under subsequent enactments and amended by the Tribunals of Inquiry (Evidence) (Amendment) Act, 1979, the Tribunals of Inquiry (Evidence) (Amendment) Act, 1997, and the Tribunals of Inquiry (Evidence) (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1998, to inquire urgently into, and report to the Clerk of Dáil Éireann and make such findings and recommendations as it sees fit in relation to, the following definite matters of urgent public importance:

- (1) which relevant products caused, or probably caused, the infection,
- (2) the adequacy of the criteria, standards and procedures applied by the Board for the purposes of its processing and manufacture of any relevant products found by the Tribunal to have or probably to have caused the infection with regard to -
 - (a) donor selection,
 - (b) donor screening,
 - (c) donor testing,
 - (d) plasma quarantine,
 - (e) virus inactivation,
 - (f) product recall,
 and the timeliness of the application of such criteria, standards and procedures,
- (3) the adequacy and timeliness of the decisions of the Board and other relevant persons in the State in the selection of any relevant products found by the Tribunal to have or probably to have caused the infection,
- (4) the considerations that influenced the Board when deciding to implement a policy of self-sufficiency by using plasma collected or recovered within the State for the processing or manufacture by it or the manufacture by other manufacturers of relevant products, and the adequacy and timeliness of the implementation of that policy,
- (5) the considerations that influenced the decisions of the Board and other relevant persons in the State in the selection of the manufacturers of any relevant products found by the Tribunal to have or probably to have caused the infection and the adequacy of the criteria, standards and procedures applied by those persons in such selection with regard to -
 - (a) donor selection,
 - (b) donor screening,
 - (c) donor testing,
 - (d) plasma quarantine,
 - (e) virus inactivation,
 - (f) product recall,
 on the part of the manufacturers of those products and the timeliness of such application,
- (6) the time when the Board and other relevant persons in the State became aware, or ought reasonably to have become aware, that relevant products had become, or that there was a risk that they would become, a source of infection,
- (7) the adequacy and timeliness of the response of the Board and other relevant persons in the State to their becoming aware of the matters referred to in subparagraph (6) and, in particular (but without prejudice to

the generality of the foregoing)-

- (a) the actions taken by the Board and those persons to identify persons likely to have been affected by the matters aforesaid, to inform them of those matters and to offer them HIV or Hepatitis C testing, and
- (b) the action taken by the Board and those persons to reduce or minimise the risk of infection having regard to those matters,
- (8) the adequacy and timeliness of the response of the Minister, the Department of Health and Children, and other relevant persons in the State, when they became aware of the fact that there were infected persons,
- (9) the adequacy of the donor selection and donor screening procedures that -
 - (a) were employed by the Board from and including the year 1980 to and including the month of October, 1985, and
 - (b) were intended to exclude potential donors who had, or might have been exposed to infection with, HIV,
- (10) whether the introduction by the Board in the month of October, 1985, of donor testing for HIV was timely, having regard to international experience and any other relevant circumstances,
- (11) in respect of recipients of whole blood, blood components and blood products derived from donations made in the State prior to the introduction of HIV testing in the month of October, 1985, by donors who were subsequently diagnosed as positive for HIV, the adequacy and timeliness of the procedures adopted by the Board to identify those recipients,
- (12) the circumstances surrounding the issue by the Board on an emergency basis in the month of December 1985, of untested platelet concentrate and the adequacy of the response of the Board when the donor of the platelets was subsequently diagnosed as positive for HIV,
- (13) in respect of any relevant products found by the Tribunal to have or probably to have caused the infection, whether the Minister, the Department of Health and Children, the National Drugs Advisory Board and any other relevant person, carried out his, her or its functions (including, in the case of the National Drugs Advisory Board, advising the Minister on the granting of Product Authorisations and Licences for the manufacture, importation, distribution or sale of such products) adequately and properly and whether those functions were the appropriate ones having regard to international standards,
- (14) whether the supervision by the Minister of the Board and the National Drugs Advisory Board, in so far as relevant to any matter referred to in the foregoing subparagraphs was adequate and appropriate having regard to the functions, duties and responsibilities of the Minister,

and for the purposes of the inquiry the Tribunal shall investigate anything arising outside the State that it considers relevant to any of the matters set out in the foregoing subparagraphs in so far as the Tribunal considers it practicable, appropriate and reasonable to do so and considers that the procedures adopted for that purpose can be carried out without unduly delaying the completion of the inquiry and with a substantial expectation of being able to obtain the evidence necessary for the investigation

AND FURTHER RESOLVES that -

- (I) in performing its functions, the Tribunal shall have due regard to relevant medical and scientific opinion and practice prevailing at the relevant times,
- (II) bearing in mind the desirability that the interests of persons with haemophilia, their immediate families, and their next of kin, who wish to be represented at the

Tribunal by the Irish Haemophilia Society ('the Society') should, if possible, be so represented, the Tribunal shall, if it is satisfied that it is just and convenient to do so, accede to any application made by or on behalf of the Society for such representation and the Tribunal shall in its discretion determine whether such representation should be full or limited,

- (III) the Tribunal shall report to the Clerk of Dáil Éireann on an interim basis not later than four months from the date of establishment of the Tribunal and also as soon as reasonably may be after the tenth day of any oral hearings of the Tribunal on the following matters:
 - (a) the number of parties then represented before the Tribunal,
 - (b) the progress which will then have been made in the hearings and the work of the Tribunal,
 - (c) the likely duration, (so far as that may then be capable of being estimated) of the proceedings of the Tribunal,
 - (d) any other matters that the Tribunal considers should be drawn to the attention of the Houses of the Oireachtas at the time of the report (including any matter relating to its terms of reference),
- (IV) the inquiry shall be completed in as economical a manner as possible and at the earliest date consistent with a fair examination of the matters referred to it,
- (V) all persons employed in the Departments of State and State agencies concerned shall give their full co-operation to the Tribunal and those Departments of State and agencies shall themselves fully co-operate with the Tribunal by providing it with all the documents and information requested of them that are in their possession or power, and
- (VI) the anonymity of persons with haemophilia, other recipients of whole blood, blood components or blood products, donors, and their next of kin shall be preserved, if they so wish, unless the Tribunal considers it would be unjust to do so.

In this Resolution -

'infected person' means a person with haemophilia or any other blood clotting disorder who has been infected with HIV or Hepatitis C through the administration in the State of a relevant product, and 'infection' shall be construed accordingly;

'the Minister' means the Minister for Health and Children;

'person' includes a body corporate and an unincorporated body of persons as well as an individual;

'relevant product' means a blood product or a blood component for administration to persons in the State to treat them for haemophilia or other blood clotting disorders in respect of those conditions;

'the Board' means the Blood Transfusion Service Board."

IFA LEINSTER HOUSE PROTEST AS SHEEP FARMERS' INCOMES

Sheep farmers from all over the country brought their protest for Government action to alleviate the severe income problems in the sector to the gates of Leinster House in Dublin Tuesday last, 8th September.

IFA President Tom Parlon said the viability of the country's 45,000 sheep farmers was under serious threat with major income problems as a result of collapsed lamb prices and inadequate premium

payments. He said "Thousands of farmers are being forced to reassess their future in sheep because of low incomes and a flawed European sheepmeat policy."

The IFA President said 20 years ago in 1979, lambs were worth £44/head and the average industrial wage packet was £80/week. Today, he said wages are almost 4 times higher at £300/week while lambs are down to only £36/head.

Mr. Parlon said lamb prices have fallen severely

this year as a result of the collapse in lamb skin prices due to the problems in the Russian economy. He said skin prices are down to £1.50 each from £8 each this time last year, a reduction of £6.40/lamb.

The IFA President said lamb prices have collapsed totally in the UK, our major export competitor on the French market. He said light mountain lambs and cull ewes are being sold in live-stock marts for prices as low as £3-£5/head. "In these circumstances, it is incomprehensible that the EU allows huge volumes of cheap New Zealand lamb flood in to the European market at critical times such as Christmas and Easter."

Mr. Parlon said the failure of Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh to secure extensification payments on sheep in Agenda 2000 was placing severe stocking rate restrictions on thousands of mixed cattle and sheep farms. "These farmers are now being forced out of sheep and unless positive action is taken by Minister Walsh, they will exit in their thousands."

Mr. Parlon said IFA has put a comprehensive set of proposals to Minister Walsh and the Government to alleviate the financial difficulties in the sector. "On the market side, IFA is demanding the immediate introduction of APS (Aids to Private Storage) to lift lamb prices. IFA is also insisting that the live-stock carrying capacity on the new ferry boat operating out of Cork be increased from 10 to 20 livestock lorries to accommodate live lamb exports."

"Minister Walsh must get

An Bord Bia to increase its promotional activity on the French and Spanish markets to help boost demand for Irish lamb exports. The specialist light lamb trade desperately needs a promotional push in Mediterranean markets" according to Mr. Parlon.

On EU policy, Mr. Parlon said sheep farmers deserve the same level of direct payments as other sectors. He said the current ewe premium policy is utterly flawed and Irish sheep farmers are being shortchanged by £7/ewe in lost premium payments annually. Mr. Parlon pointed out that under Agenda 2000, the increased suckler cow premium is equivalent to a ewe premium of almost £25/ewe and sheep farmers are currently only receiving £18/ewe.

The IFA leader said Minister Walsh must insist that the penal EU 7% stabiliser mechanism used to reduce ewe premium payments is abolished. This would be worth an additional £4.36/ewe in additional premium.

Mr. Parlon said IFA has also put a number of specific proposals to the Government on extensification premium, a freeze on sheepmeat imports, increased headage payments and changes to the ewe premium retention period.

The IFA leader said he was determined the Government would respond positively to the IFA proposals. "The sheep sector has been ignored for far too long by Minister Walsh and IFA will not tolerate further inaction to resolve the difficulties in Ireland's third largest farming enterprise."

Teagasc

Dairying: SUCCESSFUL OPEN DAY

All of those dairy farmers who availed of the opportunity to visit the Teagasc/Glanbia Monitor Farm of Tom & Margaret Keevers on Wednesday last left impressed and with plenty of food for thought.

Initially the most striking aspect of this farm is the amount of high quality grass that is ahead of the animals. This did not happen by accident as in early August farm cover had been depleted to an average of 730 kgs. D.M./ha. However, at this stage, in order to avoid making a bad situation worse and getting into a tail spin, Tom introduced meal feeding and baled silage for a short period in order to slow up the rotation and allow the paddocks a chance to recover. The result was that last Wednesday average farm cover had risen to 1100 kgs DM/ha and the farm is now well set up for extended grazing into early December.

Tom finishes all of the male calves born as two year old beef. The figures from the beef unit showed that even though Tom had excellent performance and the level of meal feeding was relatively low, he only broke even in terms of the value of the beef versus the production costs. The profit on the beef unit was made up solely of the premia paid. This struck a particularly strong cord with many of the farmers present and they went home determined to take a much closer look at their own beef enterprises.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Tom and Margaret Keevers most sincerely for facilitating this open day and affording others the opportunity to learn from developments on their farm.

Sheep: COMPACT MATING

The lambing spread is too long on some farms. Aim for 85% of ewes to lamb to first service i.e. 17 day period. Ewe condition and flushing are crucial, the target score is 3 - 3.5.

Using the ram effect and sponging are additional considerations.

FLUSHING EWES

One condition score in a lowland ewe is equivalent to 12kg liveweight. The target score at mating is 3.5. It takes 6 weeks of Autumn grass, 9-10cm in height, to improve by 1 score.

Therefore a ewe at score 2.0 at present should be on good grass from now until late October i.e. 9 weeks flushing. The message is clear - build up ewe condition from now until mating.

RAM EFFECT

The ram effect only works at the start of the breeding season. Ewes will commence their breeding season over the next few weeks but there will be variation between ewes in a flock. Some farms report very good conception rates when used for October mating, maybe because individual ewes which are late are brought into line with the bulk of the flock which are in normal heat.

PROCEDURE

- Keep ewes away from sight, sound and smell rams for at least 4 weeks.

- Put rams in adjoining field for 3-4 days, this will trigger the onset of heat. Vasectomised rams could also be used.

- Introduce fertile rams 16-17 days later.

SPONGING EWES

This is normal procedure for early flocks. However some farms use it to minimise labour at lambing in mid-season flocks.

FEATURES

- 70 - 80% of ewes will lamb over 10 days.

- There will be a break of 5-10 days to repeats.

- Requirement for lambing pens / supervision is high but for a very short time.

- Cost of sponge & pens is £2-3/ewe.

- May suit part time farmers.

Cattle: LAST NITROGEN

Late autumn grass is a very cost effective way of reducing feed costs by substituting grazing for more expensive silage and meals. One month's extra grazing can save £10/head on feed. Research from Johnstown Castle indicates that we are now close to the final date for getting a worthwhile response from nitrogen. Obviously, the response will vary quite a bit, depending on weather conditions after application, the soil nitrogen levels and type of sward.

For late autumn grazing, September and October growth will be of the best quality and this can be boosted by nitrogen applied in early September.

On well-stocked farms, paddocks that are now being grazed or have been grazed in the past two weeks would benefit from about 30 - 40 units of Nitrogen (1- 1.5 bags CAN/acre).

Grass growth is slowing rapidly and therefore a period between grazing of 7 - 8 weeks is possible without loss of quality.

The best response to nitrogen will be got if it is applied immediately - late September application may only produce a break-even return on money spent - and if it is applied to fields that have a good proportion of ryegrass and had previously been cut for second silage.

Productive grazing pasture that did not get nitrogen recently should also give a worthwhile response.

For farmers in REPS, the regulations do not allow nitrogen application on established grassland after Mid-September.

Dairy Co-ops - Share Processing Facilities

Commenting on the future direction of the dairy industry, ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen called for a National Programme by the dairy-processing sector to share facilities in order to cut costs and improve efficiency. Do we need a multiplicity of butter making factories? The answer must be no. There is no doubt but that probably two butter making factories in the whole country would be sufficient to manufacture the butter requirements of every Co-op., both for the home and export market.

The dairy-processing sector has served farmers well. Now's the opportunity to move forward and meet the more competitive markets of the future. Dairy processors must cooperate with one another by sharing facilities. We cannot afford the luxury of wasteful duplication of facilities.

The manufacture of casein is another area that should be examined to see what cost savings could be achieved by centralising the manufacture of casein. Milk assembly must also be examined carefully so that any excessive cost and any inefficiencies are eliminated.

The new generation of dairy farmers are looking to the processing sector to examine new ideas in the area of shared facilities so as to protect dairy farmers incomes. Now is the time to plan so that we can start implementing a well thought out programme as soon as possible.

ICMSA Concerned On Embargo On Farm Grants

ICMSA said that the Department of Agriculture and Food was misleading farmers on the issue of farm grants.

Mr. Pat O'Rourke Deputy President of the ICMSA said that the scheme for the Control of Farmyard Pollution (CFP) was not being processed due to a staff embargo at local offices.

Mr. O'Rourke said that the embargo by staff was due to internal issues within the Department. Farmers who have applied for this scheme are being victimised. "The unacceptable aspect of this dispute is that farmers are being forced to carry out work by the Department to control pollution but the very same Department has a grant scheme for this purpose which it is not in a position to process. The Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mr. Joe Walsh. T.D. has an obligation to immediately resolve this internal dispute within his Department," concluded Mr. O'Rourke.



Cappoquin School Merger Approved By Department

The Department of Education has given the green light for the long awaited amalgamation of two primary schools in Cappoquin. The merger will involve the boys primary school and the Convent of Mercy girls school, both located in the Cornerstone town.

The new state of the art school will be funded mainly by the Department and will comprise of seven classrooms, a general purpose room, and other ancillary facilities. It will be built on a green field site on the outskirts of Cappoquin which was acquired by local parish priest Fr. Arthure from the nearby Cistercian Monastery.

The Dept.'s decision to approve the amalgamation has been welcomed by local county councillor Ollie Wilkinson who is a member of the board of

management of the boys primary school and the joint board of management set up between both schools.

Cllr. Wilkinson said he would expect to see the new seven teacher school open in 2001. He praised the efforts of Fr. Arthure, Chairman of the joint board of management, for his efforts behind the scenes in getting the project up and running.

Last year the two primary schools in neighbouring Lismore, the Christian Brothers school and the Presentation Convent were amalgamated with an enrol-

ment of almost 260 pupils. The new Lismore school, named Scoil Náisiúnta Bothar Na Naomh, is now fully functional in an extended Presentation Convent primary school building.

Meanwhile, a planning application has been lodged for the proposed amalgamation of all three of West Waterford's secondary schools - the CBS and Presentation Convent in Lismore and St. Anne's post primary school in Cappoquin. This new school will be located within the grounds of the CBS in Lismore and will have an enrolment of more than 700 students making it the largest secondary school in the West Waterford region. It is expected that planning permission for the school will be granted shortly by Waterford County Council.

Angling Council Sets Out Options For Dungarvan Dump

The difficulties facing Waterford County Council in locating and receiving acceptance for a county landfill site must not be used as an excuse for the Dungarvan dump at Ballinamuck to remain open.

That's according to Lismore based Barry McCarthy, Honorary Secretary of the Munster Regional Trout Angling Council.

Speaking on behalf of the M.R.T.A.C. and the Colligan District Anglers and Conservation Club, Mr. McCarthy said the responses they had received from the County Council and the

Environmental Protection Agency regarding the application for a licence for the Dungarvan dump contained discrepancies on a number of points. Some of these points, he said, are easily proven to be false by video and photographic evidence in the Angling Council's possession.

Mr. McCarthy also main-

tained that the claim by the Council of applying for a new licence for the dump is misleading.

"To the best of our knowledge there was never a licence to operate this landfill. Were this dump being managed privately in the same manner it would be closed down and the management would have been prosecuted by the very same local authority who are now running it", he stated.

"The local authority have now stated they are taking a series of amelioration works at the site. We in M.R.T.A.C. feel that this is too little too late".

'CLEAR CASE FOR COMPENSATION'

Mr. McCarthy also outlined what the Angling Council feel are the only options open to the County

Council with regard to the dump.

One of these options is for the Council to immediately withdraw their application for a licence to operate the site and issue a notice of complete closure of the site with immediate effect (or within a three month period).

The Council should also start extensive restoration works on the dump site and have ongoing monitoring as it will take some time to ensure the site is safe. Both the monitoring and restoration works must include the local interest groups especially the local angling club, to ensure it is done in a satisfactory manner.

"The Colligan river and the damage it has suffered through the years will not be easy to assess. We feel the users, especially the angling club, deserve consideration by the authority in light of all they have endured - we feel there is a clear case for compensation. As the authority are now admitting responsibility we now ask that they meet with the local angling club to discuss this matter with a view to funding efforts to restore this valuable local amenity - if it is possible to do so", added Mr. McCarthy.

Give Home Builders Every Support Say Cllrs.

Young people forced to build their own home in what is an extremely competitive property market should be given every encouragement by the local planning authority.

That's according to Waterford County Councillor Billy Kyne who highlighted the problems facing home builders in relation to planning permission at this week's meeting of the Council.

Cllr. Kyne said that while he acknowledged the difficulties faced by the Council's planning department in dealing with increasing numbers of planning applications, young people should not be turned down without any chance of getting planning permission.

"We must give recognition to young couples, working in local industry in the town who want to build in the area", he stressed. "They must be given encouragement to house themselves in outlying areas, particularly when the Government won't help them".

The whole situation, he

said, warrants reexamination, taking into account that builders of large 'mansion' type houses seem to come through the planning process with some ease.

BEND RULES SAYS O RIAIN

His comments were fully supported by Nire Valley councillor Ciaran O Riain who asked that planning officials be a little more 'flexible' and bend the rules - not exactly break them.

Pointing to his own electoral area, Cllr. O Riain said the town of Clonmel is expanding into Co. Waterford with many people trying to build homes in the area. The result is that all the prime sites are now taken and many applicants are being refused permission.

With so many people on the Council's housing list, Cllr. O Riain stressed that when people try to build their own home, they should be given every support.

Council Chairman Paddy Kenneally said it was also sad to see neighbours appealing planning decisions.

It is always hard to gauge a club's potential in this situation, but you can look at the success for the last two teams, Dungourney and Kilworth Celtic, that entered the league, to realise Accrington will be in with a decent chance, if they get away to a good start.

While it can be foolish to try and predict the outcome of any league, we will stick our neck out and go for Kilworth Celtic, Ballybridge United, Castlebridge Celtic and Valley Rangers 'B' to finish in the top four. Of course Glenview, Accrington Celtic, Brideview United 'B' and Modeligo will be doing their best to prove us wrong and may do so, but it's sure to be close and here's to an exciting season.

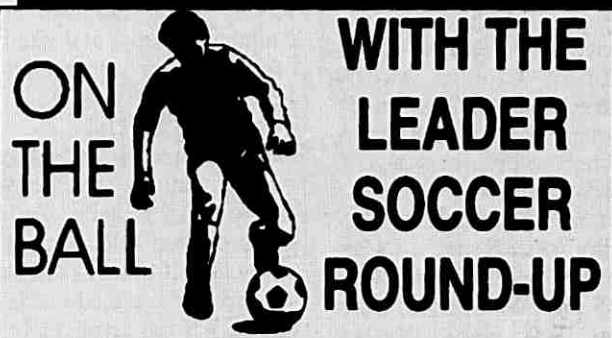

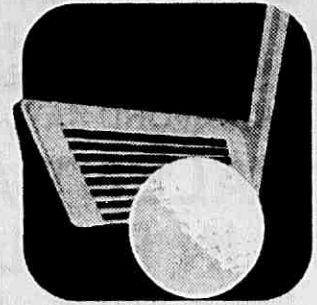

Despite his advancing years Oct. '95 whelp Boherduff Rogue (Right Move UK - Emmerdale Pine) availed of an ease in grade to capture the eighth contest in 29.38 at odds of 4/6. Raywee Ruby pushed the favourite all the way but Boherduff Rogue quickened the tempo in the closing stages for Sheila Drohan and trainer Ann Wade to beat 10/1 outsider Raywee Ruby by two and a quarter lengths.

After a number of placed efforts Tom Paul Barry's Lyons Jill (Mustang Jack - Lyons Lassie) came good coming from last to first to capture the ninth event at odds of 4/1 (14/1 on Tote). When 4/5 favourite Sparta Turbo shook off the challenge of Ciabatta at the half way point he looked the likely winner but Lyons Jill pounced close home to score by a length in 29.47.

Seamus Quirke's Shocking Spark (Deenside Spark - Hot Alert) 5/4 to 7/4 shed his maiden tag at the third time of asking, cruising to an all the way 29.14 victory in the tenth. Mops Spark went up very smart to the first bend but Shocking Spark forged his way into the lead on the rails between the opening two bends before making the best of his way home crossing the finish line with four and a half lengths in hand over a game Mops Spark.

In the final event of the session the Kevin Heatherington owned and Paul Kervick trained 5/2 shot Itakit (Ready About Nga - Gallows Quest) made maximum use of her early pace posting a deserved 29.53 victory. 5/4 favourite Handy Thriller ran a close second to the winner but Lyons Lassa put in a sound finish to get within a length of the all they way winner.

MELBOURNE CUP

Australia's most famous race the Melbourne Cup will take place this year on Tuesday the 2nd November. From an initial entry of 240, 131 horses still stand their ground. Ireland has four possible runners in Enzeli (John Oxx) Sunshine Street (Noel Meade) Campo Catina (Charles O' Brien) and Royal Ascot winner San Sebastian trained by Michael Grassick. Queen Elizabeth's hopes of capturing this prestigious event just fourteen days before the country votes on becoming a republic are over. Her entry Blueprint was scratched at the first declaration stage. Kayf Tara remains at the top of the handicap and is the likely runner for the Godolphin operation. Vintage Crop was a winner for Ireland in this famous race some years back. He was owned by Michael Smurfit, trained by Dermot Weld and ridden by Michael Kinane.

KIERAN'S FIVE TIMER

Kieran Fallon may have lost his job with Newmarket trainer Henry Cecil but it hasn't prevented the County Clare born jockey from booting home the winners. He displayed his current top form last Wednesday afternoon where he rode five winners at Lingfield. All five winners came to a total price of 154/1. Facing a spell on the sidelines due to suspension Kieran marched on to the opening day of the Doncaster Leger meeting where he partnered a further three winners bringing his total to eight in just two days.

GALWAY UPDATE

For the second Galway meeting in a row world class jockey Mick Kinane was seen at his brilliant best aboard the Aidan O' Brien trained Theatreworld. The Sadlers Wells gelding has oodles of ability but you have to kid him along throughout the races. The Waterford owned General Cloney made a brave effort to lead all the way in the listed Ardilaun House Hotel stake but after working overtime for the best part of this contest jockey Mick Kinane somehow managed to coax the best out of Theatreworld as the seven year old ran on strongly to defeat Maid of Kileen by a length.

Trainer Enda Bolger introduced Rio Grande (Un Desperado - Liffey's Choice) to the track proper in the concluding Bumper and under a strong drive from Philip Fenton the five year old got home by the minimum distance from Lord Of The Lob. For his pains Philip Fenton picked up a two day suspension for excessive use of the whip. The winner will next contest a novice chase and is unlikely to run over hurdles.

DORAN'S PRIDE BACK

Co. Limerick trainer Michael Hourigan confirmed during the week that his stable star Doran's Pride is on course to make his reappearance at the Listowel Racing Festival at the end of the month. The Guinness Kerry National is his target but riding arrangements are uncertain for Doran's Pride as both Richard Dunwoody and Paul Carberry are out of action through injury.

What a weekend it was for the Godolphin racing operation as the boys in blue plundered major prizes at Doncaster and Leopardstown. In the Doncaster Leger Ramruma was well fancied at 10/11 to pick up her third classic victory of the year after her Oaks victories in Ireland and England but after holding every chance in the

last quarter mile of the race she was outstayed by the Saed Bin Suroor trained and Richard Hill's ridden Mutafaweq (Silver Hawk - The Caretaker) 11/2 who went on to triumph by two lengths. The winner was very distressed after this contest staggering out of the winners circle but hopefully he will make a full recovery from his exertions. The runner up Ramruma lost nothing in defeat and all the indications are that she will stay in training next year where she will contest all the major events up to a mile and a half.

Three quarters of an hour later Daylami was the stables representative at Leopardstown in the Esat Digifone Champion Stakes. Our fancy for this race was Montjeu but he was withdrawn, his trainer John Hammond was forced to pay a £15,000 fine. The Gary Stevens partnered Royal Anthem was expected to push Daylami all the way but after running well to the home turn he ran out of petrol. Daylami 6/4 cruised into the lead on the rails and under the cheekiest of rides from Frankie Detorri, the grey colt strode on majestically for a facile nine lengths victory over 33/1 outsider Dazzling Park.

EXECUTIVE APPOINTED

The Irish Horseracing authority have appointed Martin Moore as their new Chief Executive. Aged 39 Mr. Moore was, up to his appointment, the I.H.A.'s Chief Financial Officer. The chief executive vacancy arose due to the untimely death earlier this year of Noel Ryan.

HILL DIAMOND OUT

Racehorse Hill Diamond who proved such a good servant to the Hill Diamond syndicate and Cappagh trainer Declan Queally last year is out of action due to injury for at least the next six months. By a strange coincidence Mallow amateur pilot William O' Sullivan who rode Hill Diamond to victory at the Kill Point to Point and later to a Bumper win at Tramore broke a leg in a schooling accident at the old Greenpark track in Limerick and he too, like Hill Diamond faces a spell of inactivity.

TIPPERARY REPORT

Last Thursday afternoons meeting at Limerick Junction in County Tipperary was a profitable one for Waterford owners. Margaret Flynn from Stradbally ran Paeandisplay in the TSC Hurdle and while he was no match for the odds on Khairabar this nine year old ran his best race for quite some time finishing a three lengths runner up to the impressive Khairabar.

The Griffin family who train just outside of Waterford in Slieverue ran their bumper winner Rua Lass in the supporters club Maiden Hurdle and this six year old produced a game display going down by a head in a twenty runner field to 2/1 shot Cappamore Girl ridden by visiting jockey David Casey. The runner up is sure to win her maiden hurdle before too long.

The concluding bumper was a straight match between west and east Waterford. On this occasion the east of the county came out on top as the Aoife Kent trained Calimantin (Phardante - Sanguine Sketch) the well backed 9/4 favourite powered his way to an eight lengths win over the John Morrison trained Crimson Flower. The winner was well ridden by the vastly experienced Philip Fenton while Davy Russell had the ride on the runner up. Waterford Accountant Frank Wallace is the owner of Calimantin and it was nice to see him have a winner as he has not enjoyed the best of luck with his runners over the past couple of years.

ROBERTS DOUBLE

Last week we informed readers how jockey Robert Widger would benefit from the unfortunate injury to Richard Dunwoody, well the young Waterford born rider popped up at Newton Abbot last Thursday where he recorded a short priced double courtesy of Eastdon Gold Dust 8/13 and Brush With Fame 3/1. And it didn't end there for young Robert as he marched on to Bangor

in Wales last Saturday for just one ride for trainer and former jockey Andy Streeter and despite a 2/13 favourite in the same race ridden by Tony McCoy, three pound claimer Robert Widger out battled the hot pot by sixteen lengths aboard the 25/1 outsider Faith Again.

GAULTIER GALE VICTORY UP NORTH

It was nice to see the Gaultier syndicate from Dunmore East in County Waterford gain a winning bracket over fences with Gaultier Gale (Ajraas - David's Pleasure). Gaultier Gale is still only a five year old but it feels as if he is going for years and years. He started off his career as a two year old with Aidan O' Brien where he was placed in a number of sprints before finally opening his account for connections at Galway. The syndicate refused a substantial offer for their horse but he failed to live up to expectations in later races on the level. He was later tried over hurdles and was totally unfancied when scoring in the mud at a big price in Clonmel with Johnnie Butler in the saddle. Once again he disappointed in subsequent hurdle events but his sporting owners persisted with their charge and pursued a career over fences. Gaultier Gale has taken some time to fine his mark over the major obstacles but it all came right at Downpatrick where 3/1 shot Gaultier Gale under Joe Casey adapted successful front running tactics beating the third man by a cosy seven lengths. The winner is trained in South Lodge just outside of Carrick On Suir by Ger Hourigan and while he started his career with Aidan O' Brien Gaultier Gale also had a spell with Curragh handler David Hanley.

TOP AUSSIE JOCKEY IN HOT WATER

The Australian racing industry was rocked to its foundation recently with the news that ace flat rider Shane Dye was suspended for two months being found guilty under the non triers rule. Dye was in hot water for his riding of Tie The Knot which finished a half a length second to Sunline in the Warwick Stakes. Shane Dye will now miss out on two of Australia's main races, the Cox Plate and Melbourne Cup.

LATE SHOW BY MONTJEW

Montjew missed out on last Saturday's Esat Digifone Champion Stakes in favour of the four runner group two Prix Niel Majestic Barriere at Longchamp on Sunday. Michael Kinane took a Sunday morning flight to France to ride the John Hammond trained runner. Biding his time, Mick came with a late run to shade a narrow victory over Bienamado. This performance by the dual Derby winner was more workmanlike than spectacular and trainer Hammond agreed after this race that his charge may have needed the run having gone ten weeks without a race. Bookmakers Corals and William Hill were not over impressed by Montjew's latest performance and he is now best priced at 5/2 with impressive Leopardstown winner Daylami heading the market at 7/4 for the Prix de L'Arc de Triomphe.

GOWRAN PARK

Gowran Park have the stage to themselves on next Thursday afternoon where there are three hurdle races and four flat races down for decision on the seven race card.

No doubt the executive were hoping for a Kilkenny victory last Sunday but alas it was not to be and the "Cat's" must wait another year or two for glory.

Back to the racing front where the feature event of the afternoon is the Denny Cordell Lavarack Memorial Fillies Race of £16,000. Carambola is the lone Aidan O'Brien entry and the Michael Tabor owned runner should figure in the shake up along with Dermot Weld's selection.

The Paddy Mullins trained Lord of the Lob boasts each way claims in the concluding bumper. He went down by the narrowest of margins at Galway to the well fancied Rio Grande and a repeat performance should see him reach the frame once again.

The 7th World Seville '99 Athletics Championships

This week William Downing concludes his comprehensive report on the 1999 World Championships with a day by day look at the athletic action from the sixth to the final day of activities in Seville.

SUPERMAN RULES

Thursday August 26th - Day Six

"Superman has done it again", declared the American commentators as Michael Johnson treated the world to another blistering great moment in sport, wiping Butch Reynold's 400m mark set in Zurich eleven years ago from the record books. Reynolds had run 43.29 seconds on that night in Switzerland eleven years ago, and nobody had come close since. Until now. With the rest of the field trailing in his wake, the Texan powered away with 200 metres to go. The gold medal was never in any doubt, and after 43.18 seconds, neither was the world record. In the aftermath of his amazing feat, Johnson said 42 seconds was a possibility. Now that would be superhuman. Australia's Cathy Freeman edged out Anja Rucker to retain the women's equivalent.

Ciaran McDonagh also entered the record books, by becoming the first Irishman ever to reach eight metres in the long jump. His national record was good enough to out him through to the final and possibly signaling the start of a spectacular international career.

Paula Radcliffe earned her first ever world championship silver in the 10,000 m finishing behind Ethiopian Gete Wami who set a new championship best of 30:24.56. James Nolan progressed past the opening round of heats in the 800m, qualifying as a fastest loser, but there was no such fortune for David Matthews, who was well down the field in his heat.

Maksim Tarasov became the first man ever not called Sergei Bubka to become pole vault world champion. On the day Bubka was honoured for his six world titles in his home town, Tarasov succeeded the great Ukrainian by vaulting a championship record 6.02 metres, better than even Bubka performed at this level of competition.

IT'S THE USA ON THE DOUBLE

Friday August 27 - Day Seven

If there's no stopping Michael Johnson, then the same can be said for Maurice Greene. He became the first man ever to claim the sprint double by adding the 200m title to the 100m crown he put under his belt on Sunday. Greene stormed past Claudinei Da Silva and Francis Obikwelu in 19.90 seconds. To complete an American double, Inger Miller took full advantage of Marion Jones' absence to finally win herself that elusive first gold medal in 21.77 seconds - the fastest time in the world this year. Second was Beverly McDonald (so that's where she went - it's Jack Duckworth for the hammer next year) with fellow Jamaican Merlene Frazer third.

Originally disqualified for stepping out of his lane in the semi finals, the reinstated Fabrizio Mori ended up being crowned 400m hurdles champion in a time of 47.72. Romanian Gabriela Szabo made the 5000m her own in a championship record time of 14:41.82 and Hongyu Liu won the arduous event that is the women's 20 kilometre walk. Ireland's Gillian O'Sullivan walked herself up to a creditable 32nd.

Elsewhere, Waterford's Elaine Fitzgerald made her

world championship debut in the 1500 metres. The 26 year old finished twelfth, eight seconds down from heat winner Regina Jacobs. The first but surely not the last we'll hear from her at this standard. James Nolan missed out in the 800m, only managing seventh in his semi final, while team captain Terry McHugh, recalled after controversially being dropped by team selectors, failed to make his mark in the javelin. His best throw of 77.23 may have been his best this year, but it was still 5 metres short of what he's capable of.

SPAIN TOPS IN A MARATHON SESSION

Saturday August 28 - Day Eight

Seville's Estadio Olimpico went wild with delight when Abel Anton earned Spain another gold to add to the collection, retaining his marathon title. Anton pounced near the stadium when his rivals visited the final water station. He pounded the remainder of the 26 miles plus in a torrent of noise, as Vincenzo Modica of Italy and Japan's Nobuyuki Sato trailed in his wake - 2 hours, 13 minutes and 36 seconds the winning time.

A story of inspiration and pure heart straight out of the Gail Devers Book of Recovery dominated the women's 100m hurdles. Devers, close to having both feet amputated eight years ago, won gold in a games best of 12.37 ahead of the almost aptly named Nigerian Glory Alozie, with Ludmila Engquist third. The Swede's battling breast cancer, and took a break from chemotherapy to take part. As radio commentator Bob Mackenzie said, sport can overcome any obstacle.

Ireland's direct interest in Sevilla 99 ended a day early when both Mark Carroll and the Irish men's relay team failed to shine.

Carroll, who claimed an unexpected bronze in last year's European Championships in Helsinki, was never on the running in the final of the 5000m. In a swift decider, Moroccan Salah Hisou took up the lead at the halfway mark and maintained his slim advantage for the remainder of the race, coming home in a new championship best time of 12:58.13. He ran the final thousand metres in 2.28 and still only managed to pip Kenyan Benjamin Limo by half a second.

The 4 X 400m relay team, who were making their major championship debut, battled gamely but were always struggling. Despite finishing fifth in a semi final which was won by the United States, they went the way of Britain, Canada and Brazil in bowing out.

Ivan Pedroso made it three in a row by clinching the long jump with a leap of 8.56, with Mirlea Manjani-Tzellili of Greece getting that on top of the world feeling by winning the women's javelin.

JUST MASTERFUL

Sunday August 29th - Day Nine

Svetlana Masterkova gave a master class to finally add a world title to her two Olympic golds. The Russian kicked for home with 200 metres to go in the 1500m, pulling away from Regina Jacobs who was always accelerating fast.

Honorary Dane Wilson Kipketer squeezed out South African Hezekial Sepeng to grab his third 800m title on the trot - just two hundredths of a second dividing the main protagonists. The women's marathon was a Far Eastern affair. In a race that began at half past six local time to facilitate Asian TV, Song-Ok Jong of South Korea pipped Japan's Ari Ichihashi to claim her golden prize.

Elsewhere, Finn Aki Parvianen caused a sensation by claiming the honours in the javelin, with the USA claiming both men's relays. The 4 X 100 team stormed home with Maurice Greene edging past Britain's Dwain Chambers on the anchor leg - the USA notched 37.59 with Britain setting a European record of 37.73. The women's relays provided a couple of shocks with the Bahamas beating a star studded American side to claim the sprint relay with Russia storming home in the 4 x 400. Out came King Juan Carlos to bring down the curtain on Sevilla 99, and with all the problems athletics was facing going into the seventh world games, the past week certainly seemed to have helped.

AFTERTHOUGHT

It's bye bye Seville and hello Edmonton, Canada as for the first time the World Championships will take place on the American continent in 2001. In a surprise move, the IAAF announced where all the championships of the first decade of the third millennium will take place.

Paris will host the games for the first time in 2003 - their first big athletics event since the 1924 Olympic Games - London will stage the 2005 World Championships with Wembley the front runner as host stadium, Tokyo will be visited for the second time in 2007 having already held the event in 1991, with Berlin the host city for 2009. Nothing wrong with a bit of forward planning...

Ciaran McDonald's relative success in the long jump means that he will pick up a £15,000 grant next year, not bad considering the Meath man has only ever picked up a thousand pounds in Government grant aid. His current wage? £90 a week from FAS. He's also due to make his Grand Prix debut in Brussels on Friday. You've come a long way, as the now hitched Fatboy Slim might say.

RTE's coverage consisted of half an hour's highlights each night with the commentators quite obviously broadcasting from a studio in Montrose. After the downscaling of horse racing, tennis and golf coverage, and the axing of Sports Stadium, athletics looks like its the latest to get the Dublin 4 bullet. At least it was good to hear Jimmy Magee's voice over the airways again after being very poorly earlier this year.

Steve Cram, Sally Gunnell and Roger Black were great additions to the BBC team, though the absence of the mustachioed one from Clare was noticeable, as was the gradual phasing out of David Coleman, now in his seventies, and who's been the excitable voice of athletics for over 45 years. It was a week where the Beeb could forget their recent problems about losing rights, but why was everyone hoarse on Friday? Had they been having a major sangria situation?

By the time the Sydney Olympics come around next year, the likes of McDonagh, Coghlan, Reilly, Carroll, Shinkins and Smith-Walsh should hopefully be in more of a position to challenge, and if they are, the sky's the limit!

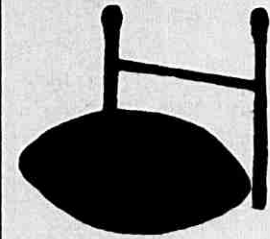

Points by Aine Ryan, Julie May Keane, Mary O'Rourke, Breda Morrissey and Keane again reduced the deficit to just 2 points after 37 minutes. 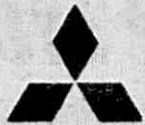
