Drunken Teenagers Arrested Outside Junior Cert Disco

A group of drunken teenage students caused havoc outside a teenage disco in Dungarvan last Wednesday night, September 15th.

The fracas occurred at Quann's, near Dungarvan Sports Centre where the annual Junior Cert supervised disco was being held. As a result of their intoxicated condition and behaviour, eleven teenagers were arrested by Gardai outside

the disco. During the altercation, several teenagers aged between 14 and 16 assaulted and kicked Gardai. One Garda was bitten and another slapped across the face.

Two of the students arrested are likely to face charges

for assault and other offences under the Public Order Act while the remainder will be dealt with under the Juvenile Liaison Scheme.

Oblivious to the fracas outside, just over 900 students were celebrating their

Many students had joined their colleagues in Dungarvan from areas such as West Waterford, South Tipperary and East Cork.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question

My baby is due next month. How do I register the birth?

Answer

The birth of a baby must be registered before the baby is three months old. If this is not done a statutory declaration (form available from the General Register Office) must be completed and signed in the presence of a Peace Commissioner, and brought to the Registrar for the District where the birth took place for registration.

Married parents can generally register the birth of their child in the hospital or maternity unit. As there is an assumption in law that the mother's husband is the father of the child, his name can be entered by the mother in the Register while in hospital.

Generally, unmarried mothers can no longer register the births of their children in hospitals and maternity units and must attend the local registrar. If the father's name is to be entered in the Register of Births both parents can go together to the local registrar's office and register the birth, or either parent can go to the local registrar's office and register the birth, bringing a statutory declaration by the other parent, acknowledging paternity. If there is any court order which names the father of the child, e.g. an access, guardianship or maintenance order then either parent can have the father's name entered in the Register of Births on production of a certified copy of the court order to the General Register Office. Voluntary maintenance agreements or guardianship by statutory declaration are not acceptable for registration purposes.

A surname must be chosen for the child at the first registration and this is entered in the Register of Births. This surname can never be changed in the Register for Births. It is possible to change your child's surname by deed poll. You do not need a solicitor to do this. Contact the Deed Poll Section, Central Office, The Four Courts, Dublin 7. Contract Awarded For Kilmac' Realignment

On Monday 6th Sept. Waterford County Council completed the signing of contracts for the N25 Kilmacthomas Realignment Project. This scheme involves the provision of 8.5 km of a new wide carriage-way road which will form the national primary route N25 between Newtown Cross and the previously upgraded section at Leamybrien. The value of the contract is £13.5 m which is being funded by the National Roads Authority.

It is the first road scheme in Ireland to be carried out as a Design and Build form of contract. The planning and initial design of the

scheme has been carried out by the Regional Design Office at Tramore House. Both detailed design and construction will be carried out by the successful tenderer, BEC Freres S.A. and Priority Construction Ltd. joint venture in association with Scetaroute S.A. as designers.

The provision of the new road also includes the construction of four bridges, the realignment of approximately 2 km of side roads, along with the provision of accommodation works for affected property owners.

Work on the project is due to commence in mid November and will be completed in mid 2001.

Newsreel From Waterford County Council

PUBLIC LIGHTING IN TOURANEENA

The long standing issue of inadequate public lighting in the village of Touraneena was raised once again at last week's Council meeting by Cllr. Willie McDonnell.

He proposed a notice of motion that the Council erect five extra lights in the village this year. These would comprise of two lights in the car park and three in the village as well as upgrading the existing lighting system.

Co. Engineer John O'Flynn said the Council are currently waiting on the ESB to provide them with an estimate for the work although it is expected to be in the region of £2,200.

SPEED SIGNS BEING IGNORED

A proposal to introduce continuous white lines in speed limit zones around the county has been ruled out by County Council officials.

Cllr. Ciaran O Riain feels that all road markings where speed limits are erected, should be continuous white, unbroken lines to prevent speeding. The speed limit signs, he said, are being completely ignored by drivers.

However at last week's County Council meeting, Waterford Engineer John O'Flynn said it would be inappropriate to mix up lines and signs. Continuous white lines prevent overtaking where it is dangerous to do so while in some speed zones it is safe to overtake.

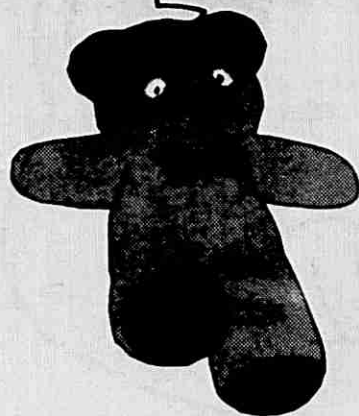
If the Council were to put down continuous white line markings in speed zones, Mr. O'Flynn said there would be up to two miles of white lines in some areas where towns are 'strung out'.

MIRROR AT GLENDINE CHURCH

Ollie Wilkinson who said he was asked by parishioners that a mirror be put in place at the entrance to this well used church.

Moving Pictures

Rails were in existence before railway engines. Horses were used to pull wagons up hills and followed behind on the way down.

The first engine was a steam one, but it was very slow and it took a long time to get up steam. Then Robert Stephenson invented a rocket. This was a much faster railway engine. It was the first train to go faster than 35 m.p.h.

There were springs on this engine because without them it could have been shaken apart a high speed.

The engine started more quickly because of the invention of a new

sort of boiler which heated the water up more quickly.

Some trains made a lot of smoke and on a couple of instances sparks showered out and passengers clothes caught fire.

When they were building railways through Indian territory they found it to be very dangerous. The Indians tried to stop the workers.

To make the first underground, whole streets were dug up, tracks were laid and tunnels were made. The streets were then put back on top again.

The first trains in the London

underground were steam engines and open carriages. People got very dirty when they travelled. First class passengers were very comfortable when they travelled, their carriages were closed in.

At first, second class railway carriages were open with holes in the floor to let the rain run out.

Railway lines had to be on the level because it was difficult for the trains to go up and down hills. The people who built the railways made cuttings and tunnels in hills for this reason. They made bridges over valleys and rivers.

The first cameras took pictures very slowly. To make a film pictures were taken seconds after each other and joined. As the years developed cameras became faster at taking photos.

Two men then made a camera which was light enough to carry about. It took photographs on rolls of film, so people made news films.

One of the first Hollywood epic films lasted for three-and-a-half hours. Hundreds of people had parts in it.

The story line attached to early films were very simple and usually had happy endings. A lot of the first comedy films starred the Keystone Kops. The film was speeded up to make them seem to move faster.

When the first cinemas opened, they often used to pay a person to play the piano during a film. If the film got exciting, so did the music.

There was one problem with the first talking pictures - they didn't know where to put the microphones. Actors found microphones hard to use at first.

Some of the first coloured pictures were cartoons - Mickey Mouse - created by Walt Disney.

The first television sets made had a tiny flickering picture. You had to sit right up at the screen to see it and only one person could watch. The electronic camera takes much better pictures than the mechanical one. The first television pictures were very patchy.

Major Investment Needed For Deficient Water Supplies

A grand total of over £118 million is needed to develop water supplies and sewerage schemes throughout the county in the foreseeable future.

A report drawn up by the County Engineer John O'Flynn has revealed that most of the water supplies within the county are deficient in one or more respects.

In the report, Mr. O'Flynn has set out the estimated requirements of Waterford County Council in respect of water supplies, which need almost £70 m of investment, and sewerage schemes, which require just over £48 m.

The Dept. of the Environment has already required that all local authorities prepare a plan setting out requirements for water services in the medium term 2000-2006 and in the long term over a period of 20 years.

While stating that the amount required seems astronomical, Mr. O'Flynn said there is no reason why the Council cannot apply for the funding. A programme of works to rationalise the Councils supplies and bring them up to the proper EU standard, has been prepared.

"The Government have the resources", he stated. "We are ready, all we need is the money".

REPORT REVEALS MAJOR PROBLEMS

The Co. Engineer's report shows that distribution systems in the county are old and subject to constant breaks and leaks. Most of the Council's water supplies are running at 50% leakage while many of the smaller schemes are running at 80 to 90% leakage.

Another problem is inadequate or no storage leading

to major supply problems. This is a major problem at peak summer for schemes such as the Ballynacourty/Deelish scheme which experienced severe reductions in the level of service for several weeks this summer.

The report also reveals that virtually all of the small schemes have no realistic fire fighting capabilities.

Increasing nitrification is another problem outlined in the report. Some groundwater supplies had to be shut down as a result of increased nitrates, for example the Crooked Bridge and Lefanta boreholes which provided necessary augmentation for the Ballynacourty/Deelish and Lismore/Cappoquin/Ballyduff schemes. In addition, Mr. O'Flynn said that elevating nitrates at the two boreholes (Monument and Lefanta) currently serving the Cappoquin part of the scheme are putting this service area at risk. Similarly, the three sources serving Kilmacthomas town are increasing in nitrate levels and are certain to cause supply difficulties in the next 3 to 5 years.

In the case of Dungarvan, Mr. O'Flynn said at present, the town does not have adequate storage capacity to service its present demand. The boreholes which supply the town are vulnerable to pollution and there is no alternative supply available.

Elsewhere, numerous complaints have been made from customers in areas such as Ring/Helvick regarding excessive colour especially after storms and high rainfall levels. Slow sand filtration plants, said Mr. O'Flynn, are incapable of removing colour.

The report also points to

the difficulty in the operation and management of supplies due to their age, diverse nature and extent. Five regional schemes are required for the county including one servicing West Waterford where over 50 schemes could be incorporated including Dungarvan.

"It is clear that immediate substantial investment is required if water supplies in Co. Waterford are to be modernised to a standard which embodies current practice and requirements", said Mr. O'Flynn, "and which will allow the increasing pressure for infrastructure capable of serving housing and industrial demand to be adequately met".

REPORT ON BALLINCLAMPER SHORTAGE

Meanwhile, at last week's meeting of the County Council, Cllr. Nuala Ryan requested a report on what permanent action is proposed to rectify the problems associated with the water shortage in the Ballinclamper area.

Temporary solutions were found for the shortage during the summer months but she warned that there has been excessive demand in last two years.

Mr. O'Flynn replied that the water is available but the piped works in the supply scheme are too small to convey it. Since last year, the Council have installed a pump and works are continuing on the scheme.

However to reduce water loss, Mr. O'Flynn stressed that major works are needed in the future instead of what he described as 'patchwork solutions'.

This depends on the Dept. of the Environment's response to the Council's needs assessment programme.

Shortage of Council Housing An Emergency

The fact that the newly published Urban Council Housing Waiting List shows a 50% increase in qualified applicants over the last twelve months alone has prompted one Dungarvan councillor to suggest there is an emergency situation in the Co. Waterford town.

Cllr. Fiachra O'Ceilleachair says that with less than thirty local authority houses being built in Dungarvan over the next year, it's likely that the first year of the new millennium will pass with over 200 applicants still in need of hous-

ing in the town. Cllr. O'Ceilleachair says the rate of allocated house starts cannot be allowed to continue at this rate.

"We now have 223 individual applications on Dungarvan's list, compared to 145 on last year's one. Essentially, that means 135 families and upwards of 600 people deemed to be in need of housing in this town alone. There are 52 applications on the three bedroom list, 65 on the two bedroom list, 58 on the single persons list, 30 on the senior citizens list and 18 applications on the transfer

SCRAHAN BRIDGE TO BE REMOVED

The dangerous overhead bridge at Scrahan, Kilmac-thomas on the main Waterford road will be removed by the County Council before Christmas.

That's according to Co. Engineer John O'Flynn who was responding to a notice of motion raised at last week County Council meeting by Cllr. Tom Cunningham that this area at the defunct railway bridge be declared a black spot.

list. It seems those at the halfway point on the three and two bedroom lists are being advised a four to five year wait, at the very least is likely before a reasonable offer comes up. Snippets from Waterford Co. Council

SLIM CHANCE OF FUNDING

A realignment project in Lismore costing between £200,000 and £300,000 has a slim chance of funding. That's according to County Engineer John O'Flynn who was replying to a request made by Cllr. Willie McDonnell that the railway bridge at the Tallow side of Hornibrooks Garage, Lismore be removed in the interest of safety.

Mr. O'Flynn said there is only one recorded accident at this location in the past 8 years. While the chances of securing funding were slim, he would include the project with the Council's normal application under the low cost safety improvement scheme next year.

NO CYCLE LANE FOR LEAMYBRIEN

A National Roads Authority inspector has ruled out the possibility of a cycle lane being introduced in Leamybrien. The Council previously made representations to the NRA for the provision of a cycle lane.

At the behest of the Council, the inspector visited Leamybrien recently and expressed satisfaction with what has already been provided in the village.

Expressing his disappointment with the NRA's negative response, Cllr. Tom Cunningham said local residents and cyclists in particular are very annoyed at the situation as they have to pass out on the main road to avoid

the traffic calming islands.

Mr. O'Flynn admitted that he himself would prefer to see a cycle lane being provided in the village and he agreed to take the matter up once more with the NRA.

PATIENCE WEARING THIN

Some councillors patience with the long running saga over the partial closure of the Tallow to Fermoy roadway is now wearing thin. Single lane traffic along part of this road has caused severe traffic problems in Tallow. Despite the efforts of Waterford County Council the matter has continued unresolved for a considerable length of time. The road is under the jurisdiction of Cork County Council who are still reported to be involved in a legal case with a landowner.

Speaking at last week's meeting, Cllr. Willie McDonnell said the entire situation is disgraceful.

"It's time we asked the senior engineer of Cork County Council to meet with us regarding the problem", he added.

YIELD SIGN AT BALLINTAYLOR

Following a request made by Cllr. Nuala Ryan, the Council has agreed to erect a 'yield right of way' sign at Ballintaylor.

Cllr. Ryan said drivers

travelling from the mountain road frequently fail to stop when coming onto the road from Knockmaun. She said there is some confusion among drivers identifying main roads and by-roads when outside the urban area.

WELCOME FOR £15,000 ROAD GRANT

A £15,000 grant allocated to the Glenlickey - Killatoor roadway between Grange and Clashmore has been welcomed by Cllr. Tom Cronin.

Cllr. Cronin said the money will be spent on surface restoration and he has been informed that the work will be carried out within a month.

ANGLERS REQUEST CAR PARK

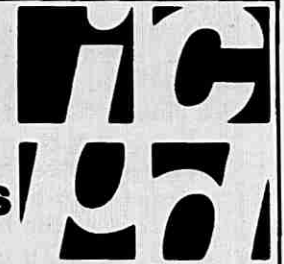
A request by the angling club in Tallow for car parking space and a small hut at a green area near the Brideview Bar at Tallow Bridge is currently being considered by Council officials.

Pear and Blueberry Crumble

Preparation: 20 minutes.
Cooking: approx. 40 minutes.
Serves: 6.

Ingredients:

Knob of butter
50g/2 oz demerara sugar
1/2 tsp cinnamon
2 tbsp clear honey
700g/1 1/2 lbs pears, halved, cored and thinly sliced
225g/8 oz blueberries

TOPPING:

175g/6 oz plain flour
100g/4 oz butter
75g/3 oz demerara sugar
50g/2 oz ground almonds
Cream to serve.

METHOD:

Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 8. Using a knob of butter, grease a 1.2 litre/2 pt overproof pie dish. Place the sugar, cinnamon, honey and 2 tbsp water in a pan.

Heat gently until the sugar dissolves. Add the pears. Gently bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer for 10 minutes until the pears are just tender. Add the blueberries.

Meanwhile, sift the flour

Crumble

into a large mixing bowl. Add the butter and rub into the flour with your fingertips until the mixture resembles fine bread crumbs. To speed up this process use a food processor. Stir

in the sugar and almonds. Spoon the pears and blueberries (juices as well) into the prepared dish and top with the crumble mixture.

Bake for 25-30 minutes until the topping is golden and crisp. Serve the crumble hot or cold with cream.

Sheery Trifle

Serves: 6-8.

4 trifle sponges
6-8 tablespoons cream sherry.

For the Custard:

4 egg yolks, size 3
1 oz (30g) sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla essence
1/2 pint (300ml) single cream
1/4 level teaspoon gelatine
4 oz (125g) ratafias or macaroons.

For the apricot puree:

4 good tablespoons apricot jam
4 ready-to-eat apricots, chopped
3 tablespoons water.

For the syllabub:

1/2 pint (300ml) double cream
3 tablespoons cream sherry
1 oz (30g) icing sugar
Grated rind and juice of 1 orange
Ratafias, orange peel and crystallised or fresh flowers, to decorate.

METHOD:

Crumble the trifle sponges into a serving bowl. Sprinkle over the sherry.

To make the custard: Cream the egg yolks, sugar and vanilla essence together until blended. Heat the single cream to just below boiling. Remove from the heat, sprinkle over the gelatine and whisk until dissolved.

Pour the cream, whisking it well, on to the egg yolks and sugar. Return to the pan and cook over a low heat until the custard has thickened. Leave to cool.

To make the apricot puree: Put all the puree ingredients into a pan and simmer for 2-3 minutes until sticky.

To make the syllabub: Whisk all the syllabub ingredients together until frothy.

To serve, spread the custard over the sponges, sprinkle with the ratafias. Spread the apricot puree over the top, then pipe or spoon the syllabub over the top. Decorate the trifle to your taste with some ratafias, orange peel and a selection of crystallised or fresh flowers.

Chicken in Mustard Sauce

Preparation: 5 mins.

Cooking: 30 mins.

Serves: 4.

Ingredients:

4 skimmed and boned chicken breasts
110g/4 oz cooked, sliced ham
25g/1 oz butter
1 tbsp oil
75ml/3 fl oz dry, white wine
150ml/1/4 pint double cream
2 tbsp wholegrain mustard
pepper

METHOD:

Remove small fillet from underside each breast and flatten it slightly with a rolling pin. Cut ham into thin strips and divide equally between each breast.

Cover with flattened fillet to make 4 neat parcels. Melt butter and oil in a large frying pan. Add chicken fil-

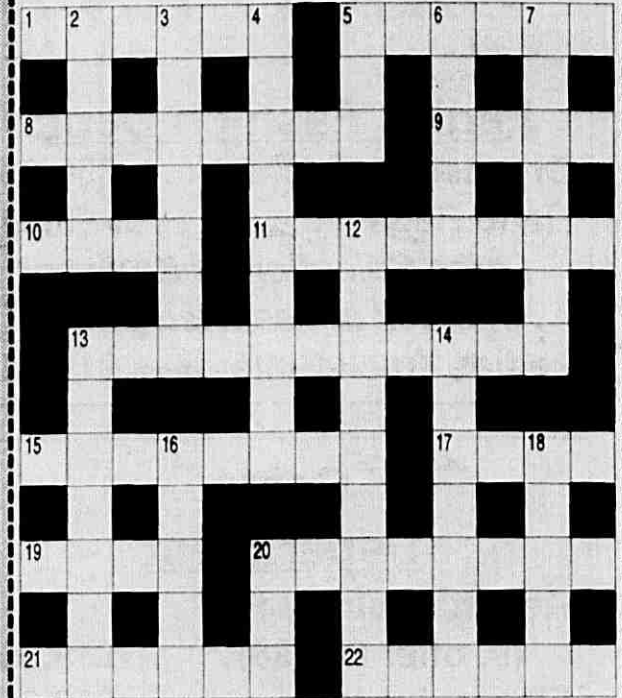
let side up, and brown for 5 mins.

turn over, reduce heat, cover and cook 15 mins. List out chicken breasts onto a plate and keep warm. Add wine to the pan and boil 5 mins. until reduced by half.

Add cream, mustard and pepper and simmer 3 mins. Return chicken to pan with any juices and cook 2 mins.

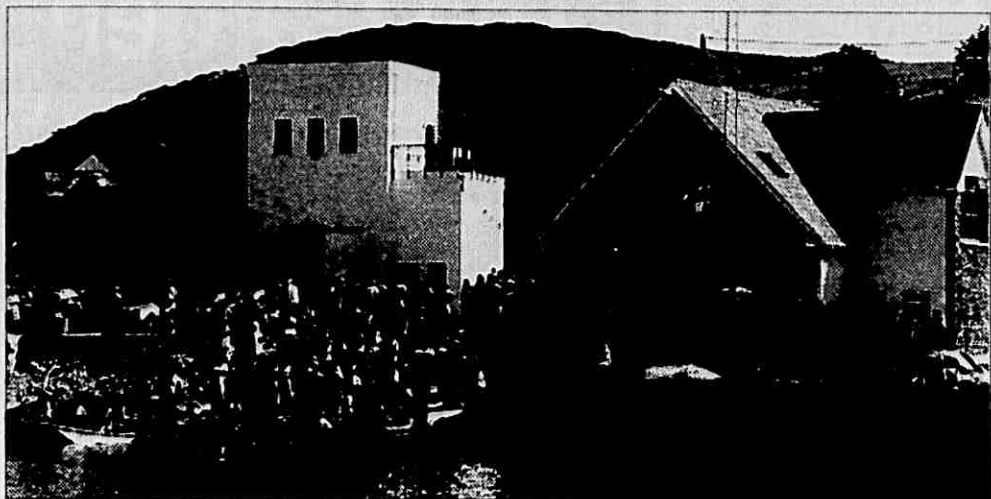

The Alzheimer Society Calls For More Funding

Ireland's leading dementia care organisation, the Alzheimer's Society of Ireland is calling for a more consistent and long term funding arrangement between the Department of Health and the Society to allow it to continue its current work and expand its services.

There are 33,000 people in Ireland today with dementia, the vast majority of whom have Alzheimer's and thousands more who, through sharing lives with those who have the condition, are themselves affected by it. The Alzheimer Society of Ireland aims to reflect their rights, needs and concerns. Dementia specific care is an absolute necessity for people with Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia. People with dementia have very special requirements which can not always be met adequately in a geriatric or psychiatric environment.

In Waterford and South Tipperary the Society's services includes a Day Centre in Waterford, a Home Sup-

port Service and local Support Groups. This branch of the Alzheimer Society of Ireland is currently negotiating with the local Health Board to provide funding to secure the future of these services and to ensure that the branch can continue to expand services to meet the growing needs in the area.

Waterford branch chairperson, Fintan Walsh said "Carers need support, both practical and emotional and our role is to ensure that these needs are met as much as possible. But we cannot do it without financial assistance from the local Health Board to augment the generous support we get from the local community."

Literature and information is available to Carers and people with Alzheimer's Disease and membership of the Society is open to all.

Today the Society announced two further innovative developments in its list of resources. The development of a Reminiscence Pack which is designed to help Carers and health work-

ers communicate with the person they care for. People with dementia often suffer a loss of short term memory but their memory for events and times long past can be surprisingly intact. Recalling these memories can offer comfort and support.

"For a person with Alzheimer's Disease whose sense of self is impaired, the world can be a bewildering place. Reminiscence can be of immense value, offering enjoyment and comfort to the person with dementia" said Ms Winifred Bligh who developed the pack. Ms Bligh went on to stress the importance of training before undertaking a Reminiscence Session and the Society will be offering workshops in the autumn for those interested in learning more.

The Alzheimer Society of Ireland also announced the launch of its own Website, which will provide access to the information and services of the Society to people both in Ireland and abroad.

This Week In The Garden

Pot and box bulbs for early flowering

Now is the time for potting or boxing hyacinths, tulips, narcissi, ixias, gladioli and bulbous irises for flowering in the greenhouse or house during this winter and next spring. If containers are provided with drainage holes use John Innes potting compost No1 or a peat based potting compost. If they are undrained bowls use special bulb fibre consisting of peat, crushed shell and crushed charcoal.

Place the bulbs of tulips and narcissi almost touching one another and barely covered with compost. Space the smaller bulbs and corms about 2.5 cm apart and cover to a depth of 1 to 2 cm. Then stand all the containers in the coolest place available. This can be outdoors at the foot of a north-facing wall if the containers are drained, but undrained containers must be kept under cover or they may be flooded by rain.

Pot cyclamen seedlings

Cyclamen seedlings from the August sowing should be ready for pricking off or potting. Often the seed germinates irregularly, so if some seedlings are too backward for potting now, leave them in the seed pans, lifting the forward ones with a sharpened wooden label.

House late flowering chrysanthemums

Now is the time to bring in all chrysanthemums that are to flower in the greenhouse before frost damages their tender buds.

Pot plants should be carried in and set on a hard bottom of ashes or gravel, or be arranged on staging. Plants that have been grown outdoors for lifting must be dug up with as much soil as possible and either be planted in the greenhouse borders or in suitable boxes and tubs.

Shelter tender plants

Give shelter to all tender greenhouse plants that have been outdoors during the summer. This includes pelargoniums, marguerites, fushias and camellias.

BAMBOO JUNGLE IN YOUR GARDEN

ORNAMENTAL grasses, bamboos, sedges and rushes have a variety of elegant forms which can make an outstanding display whether grown together, as specimen plants or in borders. The archy upright stems, feathery flowers and subtly coloured seedheads make them ideal for indoor or outdoor display.

True grasses - those of the Gramineae family - almost always have hollow round stems with solid nodes at regular intervals. The woody-stemmed perennial bamboos are good examples with the obvious hollowness of their canes.

GRASSES

These vary widely in colour and habit. The architectural qualities of the taller grasses make them a striking feature in the herbaceous border, while low-growing grasses provide a contrast at the front of the bed.

Most grasses prefer full sun, an open position and well-drained but moisture retentive soil. Very fertile soil encourages foliage at the expense of flowers. A few species, mainly the tall ones, need moist soil and grow well alongside water.

BAMBOOS

Evergreen and woody-stemmed with delicately attractive foliage, bamboos make ideal specimen plants. A few species flower regularly but most do not bloom for many years. Bamboos need ample space as they grow up to 12ft tall with an arch spread of 20ft and they often spread quickly. The canes take about three years to mature although some species, such as the Phyllostachis nigra, will develop its polished black stems during its second year.

Bamboos grow strongly in most soils once established and form excellent screens, hedges or windbreaks. Many are tropical, but a considerable number are hardy in temperate regions.

SEDGES AND RUSHES

Sedges have three-sided stems that are solid and pithy throughout. The leaf blades tightly encase the stem arising from each side in threes. They cannot readily be split or rolled back.

The family Juncaceae contain two cultivated genera both known commonly as rushes.

Woodrushes are most appealing when used to provide spreading ground cover in areas of shaded woodland. A number of sedges with their attractive gold foliage also offer fine colour contrasts in the border.

Tidy Towns Competition

- Result 1999

Congratulations to all concerned. This was the final comment of the Adjudicators regarding Dungarvan's entry to the National Tidy Towns Competition. Scoring 211

Points out of a possible 300, Dungarvan improved by 5 points on last year's figure.

In the 5,000 to 10,000 population category of which there were 35 entries,

Dungarvan secured 9th place, which indeed is a credible performance. There are four other towns in this category who finished ahead of Dungarvan

by less than three points, so with a little effort from everyone, fifth place is achievable next year and this is our goal on our way to eventually winning our category early in the new millennium.

We did not drop a single point in any of the nine sections of the competition.

We picked up one extra point under the heading General Impression, also under Residential Areas and Litter control. Two extra points were achieved in the Built Environment category,

which is not surprising with the dramatic changes taking place in this area in the past year. The report states that Dungarvan has many fine public buildings all of which were well presented on adjudication day. These included the Schools, the Chambers, the Library, U.D.C. building, the new Municipal Building - which looked resplendent, the Garda Station and the Court House. Commercial premises also looked exceptionally well, notably the three major banks and Lawlors Hotel. The development at the 'Look Out' is exceptional and will be entered for the Waterside Award. This development greatly enhances the appearance of Dungarvan and fits in very nicely with the other development work which is taking place in that area and the nearby Sports Complex. The Grotto on the Cork Road again looked very nice this year. Plastic signage came in for severe criticism.

Landscaping was described as one of the major planks in the Dungarvan Tidy Towns effort. Work is continuing on the landscaping of the by-pass road and will eventually greatly enhance this area. The area surrounding the Church in Abbeyside looked extremely well as indeed did the tubs of flowers which were in full bloom on adjudication day. The lovely hanging baskets and tubs of flowers were also noted at the bridge. The area around the Sports Complex was also praised.

Regarding Litter Control, the comment was that towns the size of Dungarvan were very difficult to control litter levels, however Dungarvan was highly commended in this area and that is gratifying considering the faith shown by IBAL in building its Advance Factory in Dun-

garvan which was chosen because of its litter free status.

Residential Areas came in for a lot of praise and open spaces were seen as being well maintained and individual houses, almost without exception, looked exceptionally well, many had wonderful front gardens.

Approach roads to Dungarvan, almost without exception, were exceptionally well presented. Street surfaces and pathways are very well maintained.

The general impression was that overall Dungarvan comes across as a very progressive town which has improved considerably in the last number of years - a matter which is reflected in its markings in the Tidy Towns Competition.

We, the Chamber of Commerce also say to all concerned: "Well done".

Strong Criticism Of School Bus Service

Waterford County Councillor John Deasy has asked that the Council investigate a bus service for children from the Aghish-Ballinameela area attending secondary school in Dungarvan.

"This is a notoriously bad service that has just got worse, operating in conditions that are Dickenson in nature and which may be threatening the health and safety of the children", he warned.

He said some parents drive their children six miles to meet the bus, the time of which has recently been put back by 20 minutes.

"The children are being picked up 20 minutes earlier at 7.40 a.m. and dropped off in Dungarvan at 8.10 a.m. In many cases the school doors don't open until 9.10 a.m. meaning the children are forced to hang around the streets of Dungarvan for an hour in the dark depths of winter", stressed Cllr. Deasy.

"It's like something out of Oliver Twist", he stated, adding that the bus being used is 20 years old, emits excessive exhaust fumes and is packed with 67 secondary school children.

While he was "certainly not blaming the bus driver", Cllr. Deasy said that for many young children the timetable means a ten hour day which is not conducive to good mental and physical wellbeing.

"Parents of these children pay £42 per term for the service. This is a good example all round of a medieval like transportation monopoly which needs to be told that it can't mess around with people's standard of life in this manner".

REPS 20 HOUR COURSE IN DUNGARVAN - A MUST

If you are in the REPS and you haven't yet attended a 20 hour REPS course you should try to remedy that situation immediately. We are holding a REPS course, which will run for 20 hours on 4 consecutive Fridays, October 8, 15, 22, 29, from 10.00 a.m. - 4.30 p.m. There are several good reasons why you should attend a course including:

- You will have a better understanding of the scheme and your own REPS plan.
 - You get an opportunity to visit other REPS farms to see how the various measures are put in to practice at farm level.
 - It will enable you to properly complete your REPS records which are essential when applying for second and subsequent payments.
 - Participants in REPS will receive £100 for successfully completing a REPS course.
 - Any family member involved in the running of the farm may undertake the course.

PREPARING FOR WINTER

REPS farmers can't take risks around the farmyard in winter, compliance checks on farms are still running at a high level and point source pollution from the farmyard will again be a major focus for inspectors.

● Check all gutters to ensure they are not broken or blocked. Make sure clean water is piped away from dirty yards.

● Inspect concrete floors in yards and ensure all cracks and joints are sealed. Make sure channels are not blocked and seepage tanks are empty.

● Get out farmyard manure now. It can be spread until the end of October. It should be stored in a compact heap 2 metres high and this may continue during the winter. However, having sheds cleaned early means ground won't be cut up in the emptying process. The deadline for emptying slurry tanks is still the end of September.

● Don't spread slurry on water-logged soil or when rain is expected within the following 48 hours. This is vital. Make sure you leave the appropriate buffer strips between watercourses, wells and rivers when spreading.

Cattle

The Ideal Weanling — The weanling sales are underway and those that are producing good Continental weanlings are again the people who are commanding the best prices. Every weanling producer must have the production of stock for export to the continent as a target.

For either Spain or Italy, the ideal weanling would be a purebred Continental whether Charolais, Limousin, Belgian Blue or Blonde d'Aquitaine. Both bulls and heifers are in demand (though not steers) and the preferred weight range is 250 - 350 kgs generally. The ideal animal would be healthy and not particularly prone to stress in travelling and would not be overfat, since European feeders feel that too much puppy fat impacts both on performance in the feedlot and on subsequent meat quality.

HOW CLOSE CAN WE GET?

(a) Breeds — We do not have purebred continental cattle for export. However, well managed continental cross (preferably at least 75% continental blood) weanlings fit the bill reasonably well. Colour is important in Italy, red Limousin and white Charolais are more in demand than the same breeds in different hue. Spain is probably less demanding in terms of quality than Italy, but continental types are the minimum requirement.

(b) Weights — Most spring-born weanlings will get into the desired weight range. Some autumn born cattle can be above the optimum weight and be discounted accordingly. While it is impossible to predict price trends for the next 3 months, from the point of view of market requirement, autumn born calves should be sold earlier rather than later in the season.

With spring-born calves on the other hand, selling very early and at light weights may reduce the overall farm output. Those calves could be gaining 1.3 kgs/day on a good milk supply on creep feed - 30 days produces an extra 40 kgs which could be worth £50 or more. On 20 calves this is an extra £1,000. The risk of course is that prices will slip over the period - the decision is yours.

FARMERS WAIT FOR OUTSIDE COMPETITION TO DRIVE DOWN INTEREST RATES

Waterford IFA Farm Business Committee Chairman, Patrick Power has said that Irish farmers expect real outside competition in the Irish lending market to bring the same level of benefits to Irish farmers as it has to home buyers in recent days.

"Farmers are waiting for real competition in the market for farmer borrowings to drive interest rates down to realistic levels. We have already seen, with the entry of Bank of Scotland into the Irish mortgage market what can happen in a few short weeks where a serious outside player comes in and shakes up the cosy arrangements Irish banks thought they had with each other and their customers. We need the same level of aggressive competition in the farmer lending market to bring long overdue savings to farmers on their borrowings," said Mr. Power.

He said: "Quoted variable lending rates to farmers and small businesses remain unchanged since May this year and continue to be bad value when compared with variable or fixed rate borrowings linked to Euro interbank interest rates. Variable interbank rates are at 2.6%. However, the majority of farmer borrowers are being charged between 8.125% and 8.65% on overdrafts and up to 10% on term loans. This is equivalent to bank margins on borrowings of over 7%. These levels of margins are totally unacceptable to farmers attempting to produce and compete in a difficult trading environment."

"While we wait for new hard competition for the banks to arrive in the Irish market, farmers need to be tough negotiators with on interest rates to get the best deal," says Patrick Power.

FIXED VERSUS VARIABLE RATE BORROWING

Mr. Power said we have now reached the trough in wholesale/interbank interest rates with short term interest rates bottomed out and expected to increase from the end of this year.

He said: "With many European economies showing signs of recovery, the European Central Bank is expected by analysts to start to increase interest rates for the Euro zone from the end of this year, with a 1/2% increase expected by mid-2000, and a full one per cent by the end of 2000. It is unlikely, however, that we will see rates return to pre-Euro levels."

Fixed interest rates bottomed out in March/April of this year, and borrowers are now paying a premium of around 2% to fix compared with variable interbank rate borrowings. However, fixed rates are usually better value than overpriced variable lending rates to farmers quoted by the banks. Mr. Power advises that unless farmers want the security of knowing exactly what their repayments will be for, say, a five year period, it is likely that variable interbank rates will be better value in the medium term.

IFA SAYS MAJOR SCOPE FOR FACTORIES TO INCREASE CATTLE PRICES

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman, Thomas Leahy has recently said there is major scope for the meat factories to substantially increase cattle prices to producers at this time.

Mr. Leahy said farmers are not getting a fair return from the factories based on the improved market returns over the last number of weeks. He said "Markets into both the UK and Europe are extremely buoyant and significantly ahead of

last year. International markets are also very strong and returning up to 10p/lb more than last year. Based on these strong market returns factories should be returning substantially higher prices to producers."

Mr. Leahy set out a comprehensive list of key market indicators which he said should underpin cattle prices this autumn:

- Total cattle disposals are 250,000 head up on this time last year.
- As a result of the good

weather, there will be no fodder problems on farms this winter/spring period.

- UK finished cattle prices remain strong with steers at 98p/lb and heifers at 94p/lb this week.

- Finished cattle supplies in the UK will remain tight as a result of the large calf cull in 1997 and 1998.

- Very strong demand for beef is expected for the millennium.

- EU prices continue to be very strong across Europe particularly in France, Holland and Italy.

- Supplies of finished cattle are also tight on the continent with no large surpluses for third country exports.

- Exceptionally strong demand for live cattle from Ireland to Europe is set to continue.

- On international markets, prices in both Egypt and Russia are significantly ahead of this time last year and rising.

- Despite Food Aid, demand in Russia has remained strong.

- The Ramadan feast falls prior to Christmas this year and will increase demand earlier than usual.

- International meat and live cattle prices are much higher than this time last year. (Australian cattle prices up £7/cwt).

- Oil prices have almost doubled from last year contributing to strong buying power on international markets.

- The dollar exchange rate is favourable for international trading. Last year

the dollar was \$1.49/£1R and today it is \$1.31/£1R.

- Asian and Far Eastern economies are recovering very well.

ICMSA - Food Price Increases

The President of the ICMSA, Mr. Frank Allen, today disputed press reports that food price increases was responsible for a surprise increase in inflation.

Mr. Allen said that of the total increase for the month of 0.6% food in total contributed only 0.07%. He said that it was important to realise that even this low contribution of food includes expenditure on meals out which has increased by 4.2% for the full year compared to only 2.7% for food generally.

Within the food sector, Mr. Allen said that lamb and poultry prices and fresh vegetables actually fell. However, taking a long term view over the twelve months, Mr. Allen said that the reduction at farm gate prices were not being passed on to the consumers. There is no excuse for this.

On a related issue Mr. Allen said that imported food items have shown significant above average price increases throughout the year reflecting in part the weakening of the Irish pound against Sterling.

SOUTH EAST I.C.M.S.A. NEWS

LIVE EXPORTS - INCREASE CAPACITY

ICMSA President, Mr. Frank Allen, called for increased capacity for live exports of cattle. "We are facing into the autumn after a year of depressed cattle prices. We will have increased numbers coming out to marts from now until Christmas. Every possible market outlet must be available to make sure that we have a place for every animal presented at the mart.

Farmers are entitled to avail of every market opportunity for their cattle. Farmers are facing increased costs, paperwork, tractability etc., and at the same time getting lower prices for cattle - there is little future for beef farming under this scenario.

We totally reject those who would try to stop, or limit live exports of cattle. We need competition in the market place in order to lift cattle prices - beef and suckler farmers need reasonable prices for their cattle - increased markets are vital and a vibrant live export trade is necessary to restore competition to this sector.

The market prospects have improved, as there are no excess cattle on the Continent. Factories should immediately increase prices so as to restore confidence to farmers. Factories continuously complain about live exports - we live in a single market, therefore all purchasers must compete for the cattle that are on sale.

Strong competition around the mart ring is the only way to improve cattle prices.

BALLYMACARBRY TIDY TOWNS REPORT

OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH

Thank you for your entry form and map, which was most useful on the day of adjudication. Your Committee is small, but you get through a lot of work. I would suggest that you contact all the sporting, cultural clubs and associations in your Parish and ask them to lend you a hand with the work of your Committee. As pointed out last year, Tidy Towns Committees are now required to prepare a plan which will guide their activities over a period of 3 to 5 years. It should be a simple 3 to 5 page document, and set out clearly your objectives for each year covered. The expertise needed with this plan will be found in your own community. It is good to see that you have a good relationship with the Local Authority and that you get wonderful assistance from them. Perhaps you might also talk to FAS, the Regional Tourism Authority, ESB, Telecom Eireann and the National Rehabilitation Board, who will all have valuable advice to give you. I would also suggest that you involve the young people in Tidy Towns. Their energy and interest can help in many ways. Seek involvement from youth organisations such as Foroige, Macra, Scouts and Youth Clubs, etc. It is good to see that the local industry - Pinewood Laboratories - is supportive of your activities.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Again this year almost all the buildings in Ballymacarbry were well maintained. Both the pubs are extremely well maintained and well done to the proprietor of the Oriel Bar for removing the plastic signage and replacing it with a lovely wooden sign. Well done! The Post Office and the Garda Station again continue to be well maintained. The Grotto looked very well and the lamps have been repaired and painted since last year. St Patrick's Hall does need attention, in particular the windows. The Waterford Foods buildings, as mentioned in last year's report, do need attention and that includes the walls, doors, and windows of the old building. Perhaps at the area where the fertiliser is stacked and stored, some type of screening could be used. The old mill which appears to be part of the Pinewood Laboratories buildings has received very nice treatment and does look extremely well. The vegetation surrounding this industry and the screening of the industrial building there is to be commended.

LANDSCAPING

The landscaping of the walls in the car park was delightful - there was a wonderful display of shrubs, trees and bedding plants. In each corner the stone beds contained a tree in each one, and also some lovely plants in wonderful colours. Again the area of the car park near the river and around the picnic ta-

bles is well maintained and presented. The Grotto continues to be well maintained with the more recent planting blending in with the natural vegetation surrounding and the grounds. This is an area which needs regular cutting and maintenance. At the picnic areas there is some lovely planting done on top of the walls and that area had some lovely shrubs and plants. Overall, you have achieved a good variety and also a year-round effect with the shrubs and trees planted. A lot of work has been done this year in the planting of trees, shrubs and bedding plants. So, well done to all concerned.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

You have a lot of scope to develop and enhance the wildlife aspect of Ballymacarbry. The river at the car park and picnic areas is an ideal place to start with. I would suggest that you look at the Tidy Towns Handbook which was sent out to you recently and which has some very useful information in it on wildlife and natural amenities (page 65). Also, as pointed out last year you may have somebody locally who has an expertise in this area and who would possibly love to get involved and provide you with the advice you need. You have an important role to play in the enhancing, protecting and increasing the wildlife value of your community. The Grotto area presents another opportunity for enhancing and creating a nature area both for wildlife and plant life. One does look forward to see you make progress in this area in the coming years.

LITTER CONTROL

This separate section relating to litter control carrying with it 40 marks reflects the importance of having and maintaining a clean outdoor environment. Control of litter overall in the village is very good. However, there is still litter in the area across from St Patrick's Hall, at the entrance on the steps and also down at the river. Also, the bin at the entrance of the Pinewood Laboratories was overflowing and had some litter on the ground. This is something which needs monitoring and a plan should be put in place to ensure the bins are emptied on a regular basis. There were some small pieces of litter around

the Grotto area. Perhaps you may need some more litter bins, in the right place, particularly down at the river area. The frequency of emptying bins must be tackled.

TIDINESS

Ballymacarbry was presented in a neat and tidy manner on adjudication day. The control of weeds at the kerbs and at the base of buildings is very well managed.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

The residential areas are maintained very well throughout the village and in particular the residents of St Martin's Place. Boundary walls were well cared for and there were some stunning displays of flowers and shrubs in the gardens. Individual houses throughout the village again are well maintained, as are the terrace of houses down from the Post Office. The seating throughout the village was maintained in good condition. An odd boundary wall may need attention but overall they were extremely good.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS

The resurfacing of the entire village roadways and the new footpath gives the village a very smart appearance. Also the surfacing of the car park at Melody's and the general upgrading of this area is most welcome. This is a very important element in the overall presentation of your village. Well done to all concerned and to the Local Authority for their work in this area. The signage throughout continues to be maintained in very good condition but an odd sign does need replacing. Seats and the picnic tables again were very well maintained throughout.

GENERAL IMPRESSION

Ballymacarbry as was mentioned last year is a delightful village, peaceful and pleasant. The work undertaken this year has enhanced the whole village and in particular the resurfacing of the road through the village and the car park. The inhabitants do take great pride in their environment and the efforts that your Committee are putting in is being reflected in the progress being made. Do endeavour to do a very simple plan for the next 3 to 5 years and also work on the wildlife aspect of the Competition. Encourage more people to join with you in the very worthy work you are doing for the community.

OWNERSHIP OF BLACKWATER RIVER

Waterford County Council and its members have agreed to seek has lent its support to neighbours Youghal UDC, the members of which may decide to challenge the legal ownership of the Blackwater River bed.

The matter was raised last week by Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson who proposed that the County Council support its local authority colleagues in Youghal and play its part in helping to negotiate a peaceful settlement.

Cllr. Wilkinson said the theory exists that the Duke of Devonshire is the owner of the bed of the river.

However Youghal UDC has already intimated that it is prepared to mount a legal challenge over the river bed ownership

and its members have agreed to seek funding for legal fees in their upcoming estimates.

"It's difficult to see how a decree or charter from the 1600's could hold water now", said Cllr. Wilkinson.

His proposal was put before last week's meeting of the County Council where it was seconded by Cllr. Nora Flynn.

Also supporting the proposal, Council Chairman Paddy Kenneally said Youghal UDC should be commended.

County Secretary Peter Carey said he will advise the Manager on the situation and initiate discussions with representatives of Lismore Estates who, he said, have always been cooperative with the Council in the past.

VOTE OF SYMPATHY

Members of Waterford County Council have extended their deepest sympathy to fellow Council member Mary Greene and family on the recent death of her father Gerard Greene, Rathgormack.

The vote of sympathy was proposed by Council Chairman Paddy Kenneally and seconded by Cllr. Ciaran O Riain at last week's local authority meeting.

Cllr. O'Riain described the late Mr. Greene as a man of the people. He added that Waterford has lost a great historian with his death.

She said some of these covered drains are higher than the footpath leading to flooding outside houses. After a recent spell of rain, Cllr. Ryan said the area was full of surface water and she asked that the Council rectify the situation sooner rather than later.

CALL FOR ATM IN KILMAC'



Waterford County Council is to call on Allied Irish Bank and Bank of Ireland to install an ATM service for customers in Kilmacthomas.

A notice of motion was raised at this week's meeting of the local authority by Cllr. Pat Leahy who asked that the Council request both banks to provide a cash dispensing machine in the town as soon as possible.

Cllr. Leahy said it was 'high time' that such a service was introduced in Kilmacthomas, particularly with the huge number of students in the area at St. Declan's Community College.

His proposal was seconded by Cllr. Tom Cunningham.

DISAPPOINTMENT AT LOTTO FUNDING



The level of Lotto funding allocated to the city and county this year, which totals approximately £300,000, has been strongly criticised by Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair.

He raised a notice of motion at last week's meeting that the Council express its disappointment at the level of lotto funds allocated to projects in Co. Waterford.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair said it was a disgrace that one athletic club in Kerry could receive more Lotto funding than the entire Waterford allocation.

Speaking at last week's meeting, Cllr. John Deasy asked that the Council determine from the Respond Housing Agency whether they expect further delays in the housing development proposed for Clashmore.

Co. Secretary Peter Carey said the delay is related to drainage matters in the site for the development and Respond are currently in discussion with the landowners.

The poor surface of the road between Geosh Bridge and Clashmore village was highlighted by Council Chairman Paddy Kenneally at last week's Council meeting.

He said that for tractor and truck drivers in particular the road surface needs to be improved.

Co. Engineer John O'Flynn said he would include this section of road in next year's surface dressing programme and in the interim some repair works will be carried out.

PLANS FOR THE MILLENNIUM

At last week's meeting, Cllr. Tom Higgins asked if the County Council has any plans to get involved in the national millennium celebrations.

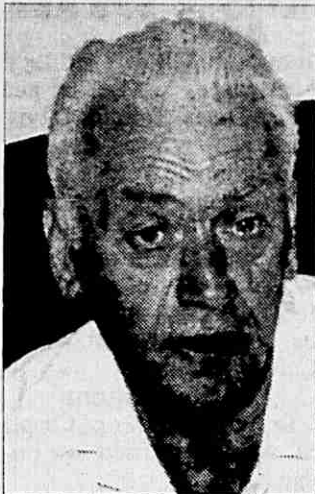

Manager of Dungarvan Sports Centre, Tom Keith told the 'Leader' that there was no evidence of teenage drinking inside the Sports Centre during the disco. He said it was only a small minority who had caused problems, arriving at the event 'unticketed, unannounced and uninvited'.

He regretted the inconvenience caused to Gardai and said they have always worked together extremely well.

Some days prior to the event, Mr. Keith warned students through the local media not to come to the Sports Centre if they did not have tickets.

The 900 or so students who attended the disco enjoyed themselves in a relaxed atmosphere.

"It's a small number who have destroyed it", he added.

Twenty two people were on duty for the disco comprising of five staff members, eight professional security and nine college students. The event was patrolled by these adults and Mr. Keith complimented all concerned stating that they did extremely well in the active job of supervision.

"They looked to the physical safety of the students, enforcing the no smoking ban and correcting any inappropriate behaviour", he stated.

The tiny minority who turned up drunk on the premises were sent home and their parents contacted, he added.

"We operate under a public service mandate", stressed Mr. Keith, "the children are brought in and looked after".

Mr. Keith further pointed out that the annual disco is not a profit generating scheme. The profit made from this year's event was £800 which will go towards local charities selected by the students. Last year, three years of profits totalling £2,400 were donated

to 14 different charities.

As Manager of the Sports Centre, which is operated under the auspices of Dungarvan UDC, Mr. Keith was asked by the local schools twelve years ago to put a package together for Junior Cert students to celebrate their results.

"On all occasions the event has been a very orderly affair", he stated.

For this year's Junior Cert disco, Mr. Keith began

working on the organisational details four weeks prior to the event in consultation with his staff and the student committees. Usual contact was also made with the Gardai.

Looking to the future of the event, Mr. Keith said that not for first time he will go back to the drawing board to see if the event is appropriate and if changes need to be made in consultation with the local schools and Gardai.

ping centre, car parking spaces, business park and commercial/retail development.

Reid Associates, who are currently preparing the first draft of the Dungarvan Development Plan for the Council are helping Clancy's with planning guidelines.

MULTI MILLION POUND DEVELOPMENT

The Shandon site, with the exception of the Shopwell facility, was bought by Clancy Construction for close on £5 million.

According to Billy Clancy, the site will be developed as a mix of retail, cinema, restaurant, hotel, car parking, warehousing, technology and business park and local amenity and residential areas.

The property however will remain in its existing state for the next eight months until it is transferred to Clancy Construction who can then start work on clearing the site. The company previously stated that the development of the site and the subsequent commercial operation will provide important additional employment to Dungarvan.

CLLRS NEED TO BE UPDATED

Speaking at last Monday's meeting of the UDC, Cllr. John Deasy urged that the Council be updated on the most recent talks between Clancy's and Council officials regarding the development of the site.

He said people in Dungarvan are uneasy regarding the future of a large tract of land which is the key to the future development of the town.

"This is a huge issue for everyone in the town", he said. "It may be more productive if Councillors have an ongoing role in the consultation process". Cllr. Deasy also suggested that on-site visits to the former

Waterford Co-Op property could also be arranged for Councillors to see at first hand what exactly is envisaged.

Likewise Cllr. Billy Kyne said the Council should take a proactive role rather than simply reacting to Clancy Construction's 'gameplan' for the site. Councillors should be briefed on the developers proposals to be fully apprised of the situation before an application for planning permission is lodged. He also urged that all efforts should be directed into industrial job creation on the site rather than retail and residential development alone.

Another former employee of Waterford Foods, Cllr. Teresa Wright said she worked for the company for 25 years and would hate to see the same scenario occur as with the closure of the Shandon site.

"I hope Clancy's will be more open with the community at large than Waterford Foods were", she stated.

NO DIFFICULTY

The County Manager said he had no difficulty in keeping the Council up to date on matters pertaining to the development of the Shandon site. He agreed to contact Billy Clancy and arrange a meeting between him, the consultants involved in drawing up the draft plan and the members.

He assured members that Clancy Construction want to work with the Council.

POSSIBLE CAR PARKING FACILITIES

A second notice of motion was tabled at Monday's meeting by Cllr. Deasy that members be updated on the status of negotiations between the Council and Glanbia regarding the leasing of parking spaces on the site.

Mr. Connolly replied that he has been in touch with Michael Quilty of Glanbia and Clancy Construction with regard to car parking at the Davis Road end of the site.

An agreement was reached and Mr. Connolly said neither Glanbia nor Clancy's have any difficulty in making an area available to the Council for public car parking on a temporary basis.

Cllr. Billy Kyne however said residents in the area should be informed of these proposals as they may object to excessive use of the narrow road.

Cllr. Deasy however said parking in the town has reached a critical point and while residents have a right to object, the Davis Road area is a prime location and that part of the town is not serviced by parking facilities.

Landscaping

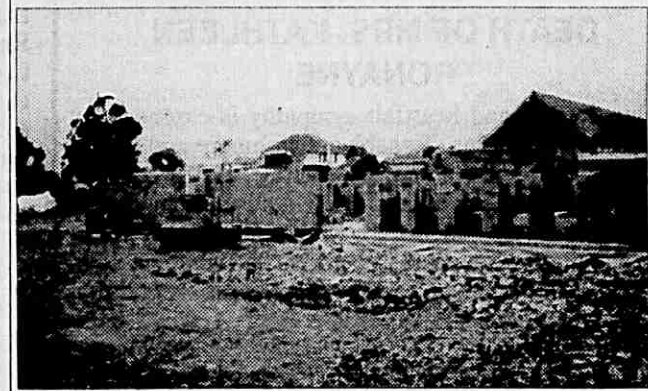

Grants Approved For Local Voluntary & Community Groups

The Minister for Social, Community and Family Affairs, Dermot Ahern has announced funding to voluntary and community groups in the South East. The grants constitute the first phase of the allocation in respect of community development and family support groups.

The following are among the schemes in Co. Waterford to be included in those approved of grant aid.

Locally based community groups - Dungarvan Family Centre, Mitchel Street, Dungarvan £2,000 to run various courses for groups within the centre; Dungarvan Mens Group, Ballyconnery, Dungarvan £1,000 for expansion and reorganisation of the group and practical skills development; Dungarvan Womens Group, 103 Childers Estate, Dungarvan £1,000 to set up a womens group and plans to run social, personal, practical skills development including parental and home management.

Voluntary organisations - Cathal Brugha Estate Management, 24 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan £1,500 for the purchase of computer and printer; ICA Ardmore/Grange, Lisarow, Ardmore £500 to purchase tables and install cupboards in the hall; Lismore Mochuda Development Group, Fernville, Lismore £1,500 to purchase computer system including scanner, modem and internet connection and software; St. Brigid's Hall Committee, Currahan, Leamybrien £1,000 for interior and exterior painting of the hall and rewiring of the hall.

From Trauma to Recovery

The adolescent is on the threshold of adulthood and the biggest question he faces is "who am I?". As young people search for an identity and the capacity to feel real, they begin a journey of self-discovery. As they vacillate between dependence and independence they face many conflicts with themselves, parents and others. Parents must understand the need for a balance between the drive for independence and the need to connect with the parents. It's this running hot and cold, this dance of adolescence that is so important for completion of this, the most important stage of development in one's life.

The first step in developing a boundary between the 'Me' and 'Not Me' is learned in the ability to trust parents and the self and learning to internalise that loving consistency so as to develop self confidence. This teaches a child that he is a separate person - "I am me" and develops in him a sense of right and wrong. The child learns that he can be angry, have personal power and needs without the fear of being abandoned. If children don't feel safe with this expression they conclude that feelings injure others and so will repress all their feelings, particularly anger.

Those who have unresolved childhood abuse and trauma never knew what normal adolescence or exploration was. These victims have no idea of the self, they don't know their likes or dislikes, their beliefs or aspirations. In abusive dysfunctional families adolescents do not experience healthy boundaries and so they often become confused between nurturing and sexuality, often thinking them to be one and the same thing.

Children need parents to set appropriate limits and adolescents who never had these boundaries will escalate acting out to find limits. In order to be emotionally healthy they need to know that as they move toward independence they can leave without losing the parents and that on connecting with the parents they will not lose themselves. Leaving home physically is far easier than leaving negative family emotions behind and many never succeed in cutting those ties. As author, Pat Conroy wrote in 'The Prince of Tides' - "I am not comfortable with anyone who is not disapproving of me. I never could do anything entirely right so grew accustomed to that climate of inevitable failure. I hated my mother so got back at her by giving my wife her role. Like my mother my wife had come to feel ashamed and disappointed in me. I hated my father but I expressed that hatred by imitating his life, by becoming more and more ineffectual daily, by ratifying all the prophecies mother made for both him and me. I thought I had succeeded in not becoming a violent man but it was subterranean... My wounded state would bring an ice age into the sunniest afternoon. With some aptitude and a little natural ability I figured out how to live a perfectly meaningless life but one that could have destroyed the many lives around me."

My own childhood was a war zone, as frightening and devastating as any battleground. It was an arena of fear. I always had to be on guard for the fist or slap on the face because I had spoken when I was supposed to be quiet. I never knew when the flack would fly nor had I any warning. I survived a childhood besieged by enemies and my

foes were parents and child abuse.

Normal anxiety is proportional to the perceived threat and it can be managed with conscious awareness and solutions. However debilitating anxiety is like fighting an unknown enemy. Most people inherently strive towards health and happiness but get snared in the trap of family loyalty versus personal happiness. Invariably these victims attempt to resolve their



abuse through conflict with authority figures or in relationships. They discover to their cost that this resolves nothing and only adds to their problems. Many also discover that just as with physical suffering they need professional help in order to heal their inner pain. The first step towards a better, happier life may be in talking with a professional who will listen, validate and empathise. This relieves the terrifying sense of helplessness and aloneness. One man said to me in session "after a lifetime of feeling I was constantly on the brink of going crazy I finally realise my painful life makes sense and I know for the first time that I am not alone".

During sessions many sufferers, as they peel off the layers of emotions, find themselves getting angry at parents or other family members. This peeling back is in fact the foundation and discovery of emotional boundaries. Part of recovery is taking the risk to grieve, to mourn, which is a healthy normal process.

Once this begins a person discards the mask, discovers the real self and begins to build internal boundaries. He then can give a face to others in his life for the first time. Life and reality take on a new freedom and awareness. This new freedom allows, a person to grieve the death of those no longer present for example, a person fused to a parent will not be able to mourn that parent's death as he/she remains alive for them as a fused part of the self. However when a person dares to grieve he no longer needs to live in a world of rigid control so as to feel safe. He is now on the road to a change in behaviour.

When sufferers let go of self-blame, guilt and intense shame they will discover self trust - I am me - I am valuable - I own my own feelings. As in all healing processes there must be a time to journey into the inner self through relaxation and meditation, a time to become one with the self.

Good luck and welcome to the celebration of self-discovery.

Local Implications Of CEP Job Cuts Highlighted

Fears have been expressed that the cutting by half of the amount of available Community Employment Schemes will effectively force people into unemployment and not into other employment as might be the desired effect of the move.

That's the view of Dungarvan Urban Councillor Teresa Wright, who says many people over 45 and in their fifties are doing great work in their communities on such schemes and shouldn't be forced immediately into an open labour market that would favour younger competitors. Cllr. Wright is also concerned that several clubs and organisations in her town are facing an anxious time over the next few months as they fear losing any entitlement to CEP employees. Groups including

the Sailing Club, the Causeway Tennis Club, the Commercial Club, the Abbeyside and Dungarvan Soccer Clubs, the Pitch and Putt Club and the Friary Hall committee could be affected. The GAA and schools could suffer she points out, in addition to the thirty or so places utilised each year by the County Council.

"The cessation of many people's entitlement to the CEP schemes between this and Christmas is causing anxiety to a lot of people I know. I'm also aware of the loss to the community it would be to have various clubs and organisations operating without such employees. I would appeal to Minister Harney and those in authority to seriously reconsider this damaging move", she added.

Waterford Ladies Look Forward To Mayo Encounter

With just a week and a half to go to the senior ladies football final in the Bank of Ireland, All Ireland series, the mood in the Waterford camp is positive and cautiously confident. The Waterford ladies are as fit as any regime can manage, their commitment is unquestioned and their mental preparedness almost complete.

Any team manager of Michael Ryan's experience would not possibly take anything for granted at such an advanced level and he, above anyone, knows that when a team steps onto the sod of Croke Park, all bets are off and that normal expectations do not automatically come true. He knows that however comprehensive the preparations in the Waterford camp, support on the terraces will again be vital. That support may well have been the difference between victory and defeat when the going got tough with fifteen minutes to go in the semi-final against Monaghan.

"Form counts for very little in an All-Ireland final," he says, "and once more the girls will have to produce the very best to meet what is something of an unknown challenge from Mayo. The big fear is that we may not know enough about Mayo yet. In the case

of Monaghan, the two teams grew together and we knew quite a bit about them. We came to know what to expect from their team each time we met."

"Mayo are another team altogether," he says, "and we mustn't in any way become complacent. Unfortunately, I am hearing on the street that the game 'is in the bag,' but people must be more realistic than that. If I am hearing that, then the team are too and that is counter-productive and dangerous."

Well, the girls may heed Michael's sound advice. Many a team perished on the altar of complacency, though the canny Ballymac' man is too long at the top to take chances. Many of the girls are seasoned campaigners as well and will not allow over-confidence to get in the way of the title they have firmly in their sights.

Bank of Ireland's Geraldine Keane, who 'has travelled the length and breadth of Ireland for the last two years promoting the game' look forward to a memorable day for the ladies of both teams on All-Ireland final day. Diplomatically, she steers clear of predictions of the result, but of one thing she is confident, neither the attendance in Croke Park nor the televi-

sion viewers will be disappointed with standards on the field.

"Waterford have proved worthy champions on five previous occasions," she says, "and naturally fancy their chances for back to back victories again. I'm sure that Mayo will have more than a thing or two to say about that," she says, with a smile, "but whatever the outcome, I have no doubt that both teams will have acquitted themselves very well, will have given a most entertaining hour's football and be worthy of the very best traditions of the game."

She added that the Bank of Ireland were delighted at the rising of the consciousness of the game countrywide through the live coverage of the closing stages of the All-Ireland series.

"The two semi-finals on 5th September were tense encounters and I know that we are in for a treat on 3rd October. The Waterford and Mayo pairing is something of an unknown quantity, but is eagerly awaited by both teams. I know that the spectacle will not fail for want of commitment from either team. We at Bank of Ireland are proud to have played our part in promoting the sport, and I know that there is a great future for the game in Ireland."

Two Possible Sites Identified For Dungarvan Playground

AISLING CONROY

The Causeway Park in Abbeyside and the land adjacent to Dungarvan Sports Centre at Quann's have been identified by Dungarvan Urban Council officials as among the two most suitable locations for a childrens playground in the town. More detailed costs for the development of a playground at one of these locations will now be prepared prior to the preparation of next year's Estimates.

However the County Manager has admitted that providing the money for a playground from the Council's limited budget won't be easy. After holding discussions with suppliers of playground equipment and with other local authorities who have provided a playground in the last 12 months, Town Clerk Ray Moloney said estimated costs are likely to be in the region of £60,000 to £100,000. He pointed to a playground provided recently in Clonakilty at a cost of £100,000 which included car parking facilities.

If the playground is to go ahead next year, funding will have to be allocated in the Council's forthcoming budget for 2000. Members

will meet in November to decide on the Estimate of Expenses.

Speaking at last Monday's UDC meeting, the Manager, Donal Connolly warned members that it won't be so easy to find £60,000 to £80,000 in the Estimates. Members will have to see if they have enough money for the project and if not, they will have to examine ways of getting the necessary funding.

Of course, one of the options open to them could be the unpopular decision to increase charges or commercial rates etc.

SUPERVISION & SECURITY ARE KEY ISSUES

The Causeway Park and Quann's are among six separate locations recently ex-

amined by the Urban Council to ascertain their suitability for the development of a playground. The other locations were the green areas at Fr. Twomey's Road, George's Court and Friars Walk adjacent to Abbeyside Church and the area on the seaward side of Abbeyside soccer pitch at Stuccolane.

The new owners of the former AWG site, Clancy Construction, have also been contacted by officials who suggested that a childrens playground might be included as part of their overall development of the site.

Of all these locations however only Quann's and the Causeway Park are central in the town, have easy access, ample car parking facilities and high visibility.

A former playground provided by the Council several years ago at Quann's was eventually destroyed as a result of vandalism. Learning from these mistakes, Mr. Connolly has stressed that with any future playground, supervision will play a major role as well as the ability to lock up the facility at night.

Once a site has been selected and a plan prepared, the Council will have a better idea of the cost involved in the project. The type and amount of equipment to be provided, the whole issue of public liability and type of safety surface to be used as well as public lighting, landscaping and boundary fencing will all be set out and defined in the plan.

Having carried out extensive research on the subject, the Town Clerk said that the more successful playgrounds have been underpinned by strong community involvement through fundraising or general supervision of the playground.

COUNCIL MUST COMMIT

Cllr. Teresa Wright said the setting aside of a sum of money in the annual UDC estimates is now the next priority as regards the provision of a childrens playground. She said that once the will to commit the UDC to such a project is there, procedural difficulties related to funding, management and insurance provision can be addressed.

She again highlighted the huge need for a playground in the town and said this was a major issue for people she met while on her canvass prior to the local election.

Cllr. Kyne Slams New Assessment Forms For Elderly Care

Speaking at last week's meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Billy Kyne said that in recent weeks and months there has been an extremely worrying development whereby assessment forms have been sent out to members of the public who have elderly relatives in care with the South Eastern Health Board. Many of these people in care have their pensions taken off them to subvent the cost.

Cllr. Kyne said the assessment forms are not legally binding and are only serving to 'terrorise' old people and their families.

"Families should not be harassed into sending their elderly relatives into private nursing homes with just a small subvention to pay the costs", he slammed.

"It's time that working class people stood up and



said to the Health Board to take care of the elderly who have spent their life working and refuse to fill out these forms".

Cllr. Kyne's sentiments were shared by Cllr. Ciaran O'Riain who said it was a scandalous situation. He claimed he knew of one individual on £24 a week who had been refused a medical card.

Chapple -Hyam had been on the look out for a new training base since he was given the elbow from his father-in-law's Robert Sangster's Manton training establishment last month.

The opportunity to move out to Hong Kong arose when French man Biancone was suspended until the middle of next year after two of his runners failed dope tests.

The new trainer will take over a sixty strong stable which houses Johan Cruff, a winner of the Hong Kong Derby.



GIANT RESTS FOR SEASON

After his group one triumph in the Prix de la Salamandre at Longchamp in France last Saturday, the Aidan O' Brien trained Giants Causeway is unlikely to race again this season. Aidan O' Brien said "the horse is home fine but he required better ground and as he knows his job well that is probably it for the season". "Giants Causeway would look a guineas type and we will see where he fits in next Spring", he added.



FRANKIE MISSES OUT

Globe trotting jockey Frankie Dettori was forced to give up all his rides at Kempton Park last Monday afternoon as he was feeling unwell, having ridden at Woodbine in Canada on Sunday.



GOWRAN MEETING

This meeting was forced to undergo an early morning inspection before finally getting the go ahead for racing. The going was described as yielding to soft and the punters had a miserable time as not one favourite obliged on the seven race card. County Waterford trainer David Kiely saddled the Ian Conroy owned, The Wiley Kalmuck for the Handicap Hurdle over three miles and this Bay Gelding drifted in the market from an opening show of 10/1 out to 12/1. After some lack lustre performances earlier this year the Wiley Kalmuck (Be My Native - Beecom Silk) was equipped with a pair of blinkers and it certainly had the desired effect on the five year as he bolted up under Barry Geraghty by ten lengths from Twotens



For a Five.

We fancied Paddy Mullins to win the bumper but he withdrew his charge. All was not lost for the Mullins clan however, as the Tony Mullin's handled Green Light (Lafontaine - Move Forward) under Robbie Walsh came good at 6/1 beating yet another local entry, Any Old Music by a length. The jackpot pool of £1,651 was not won and is carried forward to the next meeting at the venue on Friday Oct 15th.

TRAMORE UPDATE

With the weather on its best behaviour quite a healthy crowd flocked to Tramore last week where a seven race card provided ample entertainment for a sun drenched crowd. The aggregate for the day was up over £10,000 on the corresponding meeting last year. Jockey Paul Carberry returning after injury enjoyed a mixed afternoon. He enjoyed an armchair ride aboard the 6/4 favourite Very Tempting in the opening maiden hurdle breezing in four and a half lengths clear of Nurse Victory, trained by Paul Carberry's father and ridden by his brother Philip. Paul's luck ran out however, in the Novice Chase as he took a fall from Anker Ring injuring a knee causing him to miss out on a couple of days racing.

The first of the two local winners came in the third contest as the Ron Shaw owned and trained The Boy King obliged at a whopping 33/1 (50/1 on the tote). In the firing line throughout The Boy King (Roi Danzig - Susie Spangles) stayed on strongly on the climb to the winning post having a length to spare over a running on Shoeless Joe who was having his second outing in to days having proved successful at Roscommon on Monday.

It was nice to see David McGrath from Cappagh in Co. Waterford send out Irish Breeze the 4/1 winner of the Handicap Chase as the eight year old recaptured his best form to score for owner John Donovan. Rider Willie Slattery had this Fresh Breeze gelding well placed throughout and with the front running Miles Byrne tiring in the closing stages Irish Breeze came through smoothly to run out a four and a half lengths winner over a staying on Ozier Hill. Marty's Step the 5/2 favourite was well behind in the early stages and was noted doing his best work in the final half mile.

County Clare based trainer Donnie Hassett has his runners in cracking form at the moment and he sent out the 4/1 shot Dustin to capture the final event of the day, this Exodal gelding being driven in the last fifty yards to hold the late rally of Desperate Road who tasted defeat by three quarters of a length. There was no winner of the tote jackpot and the pool of £2,530 is carried forward to the same venue on Thursday November 18th. Going back to the Bumper young claiming amateur Gareth Power found himself in hot water with the local stewards. He misjudged the distance of this race and was seen riding out a finish on Land Of Time with a circuit to go. He did manage to get Land Of Time going again but he faded badly in the last half mile. Young Power was promptly up before the stewards and they handed him a 21 day suspension. Seven days of this punishment was for misjudging the distance of this race and 14 days for unnecessary use of the whip after his chance of winning had gone. Young Power wasn't the first jockey to



misjudge the distance of a race on this tight circuit and he certainly won't be the last. Was his crime though any worse than that of the clerk of the course who made a big blunder in the layout of the course for the novice chase. After passing the stands the riders were forced to go through a narrow gap to move on to the chase course. Most of the runners, with difficulty did manage to negotiate the bend but two didn't as they ran out and were forced to pull up. The course for the following Handicap Chase was altered but the point is that we could have had a very serious accident to a horse or jockey in the Novice Chase. It will be interesting to see if the stewards took any action against the clerk of the course for his error. Once again for the second consecutive meeting we had no starting stalls for the flat events.

CURRAGH SHOCK

There was plenty of good racing up at the Curragh in Co. Kildare over the weekend. The feature event on Saturday afternoon was the Jefferson Smurfit Memorial Irish St. Leger. Godolphin's Kayf - Tara (Sadlers Wells - Colorspin) and this 1/2 favourite was certainly not inconvenienced by the soft underfoot conditions as he quickened well clear of the opposition up the home straight under Frankie Dettori to run out an eight lengths winner over a second English raider Yavana's Pace. It's all systems go now for Kayf Tara as he heads to Australia on Oct. 11th to set up camp in advance of the Melbourne Cup.

Waterford owner Liam Queally ran his good money spinner Show Me The Money in a group three sprint and this 8/1 shot ran quite well to fill third spot behind the well backed Dermot Weld trained runner Major Force.

The ground was very tacky on the Sunday but it didn't prevent the general public wading into the Aidan O' Brien trained Bernstein as he was sent off the red hot 4/11 favourite for the National Stakes. Jockey Mick Kinane certainly put the gun to the Jolly's head right from the start but these tactics back fired in the soft under foot conditions as the favourite found precious little in the closing stages as the Johnny Murtagh partnered Sinnadar (Grand Lodge - Sintara) 7/1 swooped late to beat the always prominent 50/1 outsider Murawwi.

FOUR DAYS FOR RICHARD

Top National Hunt Jockey Richard Johnson appears likely to miss out on the first big meeting of the new jumping season at Chepstow in Wales, having picked up a four day suspension for a whip offence at Hereford earlier this week.

LISTOWEL

National Hunt followers are well catered for this week with six days non stop racing at the Co. Kerry track. The ground has changed dramatically over the past week or so and one can expect a good number of favourites to bite the dust. Only two favourites obliged there last Monday. John Queally's Cloda's Minstrel ran in the Bank of Ireland Handicap Hurdle and although unsuited by the yielding to soft ground conditions she did well to finish in third sport behind 20/1 outsider Proud Bishop. The Kerry National is always a great race to watch and while Doran's Pride is the class act in this years event, Function Dream could well reward each way supporters.

WATERFORD FRIDAY SEPTEMBER 17TH Sparta Was No Rogue

With the Ireland on Sunday Derby taking place on Saturday night Waterford Greyhound Stadium exercised the option of racing on Friday night. Owned by Phil Gough and John Fitzgerald Sparta Rogue (Airmount Rogue - Misty Grace) joined issue with Jason's Kid running down to the third bend and quickening the tempo, from that point onwards Sparta Rogue drew right away in the closing stages to record a facile seven and a half lengths victory over Jason's Kid with Ryfield Risk back in third. The winners time was a career best 29.23 and this victory for Sparta Rogue was a nice boost for young stud dog Airmount Rogue who stands in Waterford with Gerry Kiely. The eighth event on this ten race programme was the final of the Bill Maher Veterinary Sweepstake. The unbeaten Chance Wally was heavily supported from 4/5 to 1/2 but there was also support for Dawlish Davis and his odds were clipped from 20/1 to 10/1. Tiny Tidings broke well from trap five but he failed to clear the early paced Dawlish Davis. As Garryglass Sandy pulled up injured at the second turn Chance Wally raced up the inside to move right into contention. Mike Gallagher's Dawlish Davis (Lassa Java - Dawlish Olivia) refused to go away however and still continued in front turning for home. 5/1 chance Tiny Tidings put in a flying finish in the closing stages but he failed by a short head to overhaul Dawlish Davis with Threerocks Tiger A staying on third. Time 29.39.

Tom's Loss and I'll Fix It had the first semi final of the Sui Sios 30.00 stake very much to themselves from the outset. Tom's Loss 5/2 led early on but was passed at the third bend by a wide running I'll Fix It. With the latter losing ground on the bends the Alan Walsh owned and John O' Mahoney trained Tom's Loss regained the initiative on the run home to score by a length. Time 29.76.

Having only his second race out the Gerry Kiely and Phil Gough owned Airmount Yorke (Mount Leader Peer - Airmount Gunnel) 5/2 to 7/4 ran out a well backed winner of the second semi final in 29.37. Pushed all the way by Handy Thriller "Airmount" struck the front between the final two bends. However, Airmount Yorke had to be at his strongest on the run to the winning line to withstand the renewed challenge of Handy Thriller who tasted defeat by a length.

3/1 chance Gerpats Shanless (Shanless Slippy - Gerpats Grand) owned by Clonmel based John White got off the mark in the opener posting a 29.68 winning effort. When Hunting Hollow, Finnow Tiger and Stiff Whiskey all collided at the first bend a slow starting Gerpats Shanless got a dream run up the inside to shoot well clear of the pack. To her credit Stiff Whiskey quickly recovered her composure to go in pursuit of the leader but Gerpats Shanless went on to land the spoils by a length.

The Sylvia Curtis owned and Peter Bradley trained Sylvies Choice (Fly Prince - Harry's Gift) ran out a surprise 6/1 winner of the second event in a speedy 29.20. Despite giving best to 4/5 favourite Sleepwalker, on the back stretch Sylvies Choice battled back over the final fifty yards to beat a staying on Lobnamna Barney.

Narabane Monica (Moaning Lad - Narabane Lucky) owned by Vincent Moloney produced a gutsy display to capture the 730 yard marathon in a pleasing 41.49. Boher Lily and Romantic Dusty made the winner work hard for victory but the south Kilkenny fawn was full value for her three lengths success over the persistent Romantic Dusty.

Trainer Declan Byrne, away on a sun holiday missed seeing Peter Power's Seskin Mona (Boyne Walk - Louise Delight) oblige at a price of 2/1 in a graded sprint. A bet of £800/£200 was struck about Seskin Mona just before the off but she appeared destined for place prize money. As

Dancing Phantom set a hot pace up front, the Phantom drifted wide into the home stretch however, allowing Seskin Mona in for an opportunist length and a half win in 16.66.

Liam Walsh's well bred Ciabatta (Shanless Slippy - Ballyvalican) the 6/4 favourite notched a winning bracket in the second two bend dash. The Jimmy Scully trained runner grabbed a first bend lead from a wide running Clondara Huskey motoring clear to beat Doctor's Prince by a length in 16.55.

The Joseph Devine owned and Perry Aylward trained Jungle Trade (Trade Crisis - Jungle Chic) showed no ill effects from a winning outing at Enniscorthy track on Thursday night by capturing the final event of the night in an excellent 28.99. The remaining five runners only ever had a rear view of Jungle Trade as she cut an early dash over Europa Express. This order of running remained unchanged for the duration of this contest with Jungle Trade coming out on top by a length and three quarters.

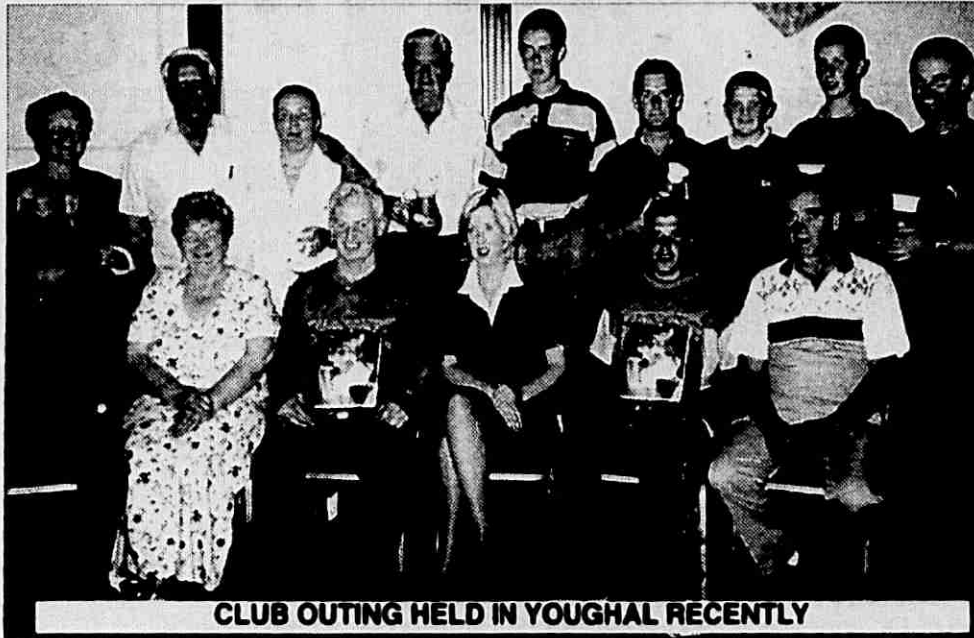

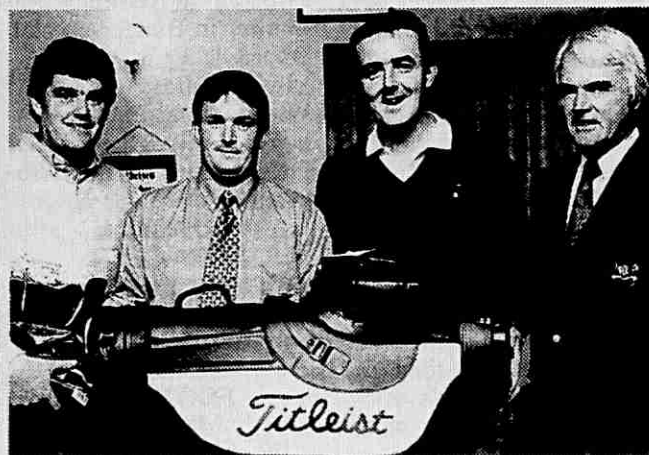

Ballygunner Win Splendid County Final

What a great pity the referee John Hunt did not blow the final whistle after 3 minutes of extra time in the second half when Ballygunner led by 1-17 to 2-10 and the final was virtually decided in favour of Ballygunner. Had this been done, we would not have witnessed the ugly scenes which followed when players from both sides became embroiled in fisticuffs and misbehaved in a way that brought discredit on the county and on a game of hurling which had been delightful to watch for 60 of the 70 minutes before John Hunt brought the affair to an end almost 41 minutes after the start of the second half.

After the game the county chairman promised a full investigation by the county board into the affair.

Up to this stage it was a great county final with displays doing credit to both teams. At no stage did a gap open up and they were separated by just two points at the interval and in the 56th minute when it was 1-14 to 2-9 a draw looked to be a distinct possibility and such a result would have delighted the neutrals in the record crowd.

By our club standards the hurling could be described as brilliant and most of those who have been going to county finals would rate this as one of the best in a very long time.

Once again Ballygunner team captain Paul Flynn will be given the man of the match award, but was pushed very strongly by Alan Kirwan who played at corner back for the 'Gunners and in my opinion did more to stop Mount Sion from scoring than any other defender on his side. Straight away, it must be conceded that Ballygunner's half back line of Frampton, Hartley and Rory O'Sullivan, defended magnificently all through.

Both goalkeepers, Ray Whitty for the winners and Philly Flynn for Mount

Sion, came away with flying colours and many of the saves were of the spectacular style and added to the excitement. Everyone was glad to see last year's hero and All Star, Tony Browne, back in action and having sparkled here and there he seemed to tire and was substituted early in the second half. Many were surprised that the champions, Mount Sion did not bring Brian Greene and Michael White home from the USA for the game, but obviously the club decided on a policy of sticking with the players who had taken them to the final.

CROWD

The attendance of 7,000 was a new record for a county final and the gate receipts of £20,000 was also a record. A first class programme was provided and sold out well in advance of the start. Weather conditions were excellent, but underfoot conditions were affected by the weekend rains.

Points by Barry Walsh and Ken McGrath gave Mount Sion a 2 point lead within the opening three minutes but by the 7th minute the sides were level after points by Paul Flynn and Billy O'Sullivan.

A 9th minute free from

around the 21 yards line was blasted to the net by Paul Flynn to give them a lead which was wiped out in a matter of 8 minutes as Eoin McGrath and Barry Browne (2) pointed for Sion. Points by Paul Flynn, Billy O'Sullivan, Michael Mahony and Flynn again gave the challengers a 4 points advantage by the 27th minute.

A minute later an Eoin Kelly goal for Mount Sion, closed the gap to a point until Paul Flynn sent over in the final seconds of this half (1-7 to 1-5).

SECOND HALF

Barry Browne and Paul Power exchanged points as did Tony Carroll and Barry Browne again. Then an unexpected goal by substitute Pádraig Fanning gave the champions the lead (2-7 to 1-9) in the 37th minute. A minute later Mount Sion were down a man when young Eoin McGrath was sent off. Three years ago when these clubs met in the county semi-final, the game ended in an 0-5 all draw and Rathgormack went on to take the title. The Nire won the title again in 1997.

Last year when these two clashed in the quarter final when they produced some of the best football of that championship before the Nire surrendered their title on a score of 1-10 to 0-11.

County Board Meeting

P. S. O Riain, chairman, presided at the September meeting which was held in Lawlor's Hotel on Monday of last week.

COISDE PEIL REPORT

In a lengthy report, all aspects of football were dealt with including a full account of the celebration at the Oriel Bar in Ballymacarbry when the Ryan Super Valu sponsorships were presented.

They recommended the following county football selectors for the coming year:

Senior. John Cummins, manager; Eamon Martin (Brickeyes); Tom O'Neill (Gaultier), Paddy Dee. (Kilrossanty) and one more to be appointed.

Junior Football — John Kiely will be manager with the authority to recommend his own selectors for County Board approval.

Minor Football — John Kiely (Kilrossanty); Michael Monahan (Butlerstown), Pat Nugent (Brickeyes), John Hennessy (Ardmore) and Tony Corcoran (St. Saviours).

Under-21 Football — Michael Ryan Manager (Nire), Tom Cunningham (Stradbally), Rev. Fr. Michael Kennedy (Kilmacthomas), Jim McGrath (Brickey Rangers), Declan O'Meara (Ferrybank).

When the minor selectors were recommended, the board chairman told the meeting that Bord na nOg had expressed their disappointment that the appointment in this grade was taken out of their hands, particularly in view of the success attained over the past couple of years. He said the right to nominate in this grade would revert to Bord na nOg next year.

SENIOR HURLING SELECTORS

The new management team for senior hurling (as published last week) was announced and was briefly discussed. Brendan Knox (Mount Sion), said that his club, who were county champions, were disappointed that they were not asked to nominate a member for a position on the committee.

The chairman, in response said that a good number of people who were considered suitable were interviewed. This included a member from Mount Sion and who had declined. Brendan Knox said that the club and not

the individual should have been asked.

The nominations were accepted unanimously

CORRESPONDENCE

A letter from the Ladies Football Committee requested financial aid because of the enormous expense associated with travelling to the All Ireland final on October 3rd. The meeting agreed to a figure of £500 and the chairman asked that the divisional boards donate a corresponding amount.

A letter from the County Scor Committee appealed to all clubs in the county to participate in Scor next year. The chairman stated that the qualifying requirements were recently reduced and now there should be no problems for all clubs. It was felt that there is an abundance of talent around the county and clubs should make the facility available and encourage members to take part.

A letter from the county's main sponsors, Glanbia, requested a meeting with the officers to discuss the matter of Sponsorship. This will take place within the next week or so.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Treasurer, Tony Morrissey, gave an update on gate receipts for the senior championships since the previous meeting. He said that the income is not keeping pace with the outgoings but with the increase in receipts from the attractive games to come and a slowing down of team training, things will balance out as the season progresses.

Bernard Shields asked about the club levies and if the list was now completed. The treasurer, said that the final details were not available at the bank, due to holidays, etc., but a full breakdown will be given at the October meeting.

MUNSTER COUNCIL REPORT

Tommy Hennessy gave details of the draws for the Munster club championships as already published and he told about the efforts to get the Council to agree to a round-robin system between the four weaker counties for the provincial championship. He said that no agreement had yet been reached as to whether or not the championship will be run on this system and he said that the late finishing of the national

football league was cited as the big problem.

CENTRAL COUNCIL REPORT

The restructuring of the 'B' All Ireland football championship in order to make it more attractive to the counties who are showing no interest at present and the proposed experimental rules which will increase the playing time for all football intercounty games to 70 minutes and allow 5 substitutions instead of 3, were among the matters reported on.

The decision regarding girls playing on boys teams and they being covered by insurance, the delay regarding the production of a final report by the Membership Registration Committee, Property Insurance, the Price Waterhouse report and the refusal of Central Council to allow Kilkenny to pull out of the national football league, were other matters discussed under the C.C. report.

NAMES ON MATCH PROGRAMMES

The chairman issued a warning to clubs about supplying the correct line-out for matches when involved in a match for which a programme is produced. He said that some clubs were neglectful in this respect, much to the annoyance of patrons, many of whom cannot identify players who are misplaced on a programme. Also, he said, it is unfair to players not to have their names recorded on the programme and in the correct position. It is also unfair to collectors of programmes, he said.

MILLENNIUM EXHIBITION

County PRO, Paddy Dunphy gave delegates some details of the proposed exhibition to be held in Waterford city, Dungarvan and Lismore next year to mark the millennium. An appeal was made to clubs to loan photographs, records, artifacts, etc. etc. for display during the exhibition. He said that a popular team of the century in hurling and football will be decided by competition and there will be other interesting features during the displays.

OTHER GAMES

Kilgobnet (1-7) had a nice win over Stradbally (1-5) in a very entertaining JF semi-final tie and later in the evening, also at Fraher Field, Lismore held out for a narrow victory over Ardmore in junior hurling.

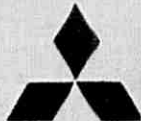
