Tragic Weekend Road Accidents Claim Four Lives

Two separate road accidents over the weekend which claimed the lives of four people, have cast a wave of gloom over local communities in Youghal, Dungarvan and Stradbally. Extremely wet weather conditions leading to localised flooding played a significant part in both tragic accidents.

HEAD-ON COLLISION AT KINSALEBEG

Gardai have cited the weather as a major factor in the fatal accident which claimed the lives of two young women and a man at Kinsalebeg on the main N25 Waterford/Cork road on Saturday, September 25th.

Two sisters, Stephanie

Kiely (23) and 18 year old Karena Kiely of Atlantic Park, Youghal were travelling to a hurling championship game in Dungarvan. They died instantly when their car collided head-on with another vehicle travelling in the direction of Youghal.

The driver of the second car, Ambrose Bell of Mary

Street, Dungarvan, had to be cut from his vehicle by Youghal fire brigade personnel before being removed by ambulance to Cork University Hospital where he remained in a critical condition until his death on Tuesday morning, September 28th. Mr. Bell, who was single, worked as a District Court Clerk in Youghal.

The two-car crash happened shortly after 3.30 p.m. on a straight stretch of road between Piltown Cross and Youghal Bridge. Ambulances raced to the crash scene within minutes and though medical assistance was also on hand, the girls were pronounced dead.

Shortly before the crash there had been a severe thunderstorm in the area which resulted in flooding on many parts of the main road.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

My thirteen year old was seriously injured and is now in a wheelchair. Is there some tax allowance for parents in our situation?

Answer

There is a tax allowance of £800 per annum called Incapacitated Child Allowance which can be claimed by parent(s) of a child who has a physical or mental disability and is unlikely to recover.

The incapacity must have arisen before the child reached the age of 21, or while he/she was in full time education. The allowance can be reduced if the amount spent by the parents on the child is less than £800. If the child has income of over £2,500 the allowance will be reduced by £1 for every £1 by which the child's income exceeds £2,500.

If a child is between 2 and 16 years of age and is so severely, physically disabled or handicapped as to need care and attention which is considerably greater than that normally required for a child of the same age then you should apply for the Domiciliary Care Allowance from the Health Board. The means of the parents are not taken into account but any income of the child is taken into account. From August, 1999 people getting Domiciliary Care Allowance may also be entitled to the Carer's Allowance.

You may also claim tax relief in respect of medical expenses incurred by yourself, your spouse and dependent children.





It's Enough To Set Tongues Wagging

Children do it - and even monkeys get in on the act. The thing they all have in common is sticking out their tongues.

They're not being rude, say experts, it's simply their involuntary reaction to stressful situations. Children, when they are asked to perform a demanding task like writing or drawing a picture, out pop their tongues. Monkeys, strange to relate, also fall prey to this habit when the going gets tough.

Recently researchers in New York have been getting their teeth in the tongue poking phenomenon. One case they encountered was that of an old lady crossing the road. When she was half-way across, the lights changed - and out came her tongue. The American team even studied pool-hall players and found that their tongues came out when they were steadying their cues for difficult shots.

As an experiment they asked a girl to sit on a front door step with a book. She would look up at every alternate passer-by. Whenever she did so, the person stared at generally put his tongue between his lips. In another experiment, students were handed examination papers with one page missing. Nearby was a supervising professor engrossed in a book. The students immediately got up to ask for the missing page - except when his tongue was shown. That made them hesitate.


At mid-day, on arrival in

GROW PLANTS I HIMNEY

PERIOD chimney pots look great, make superb planters and also create a focal point in your garden.

Chimney pot planters can be placed just about anywhere to achieve that statuesque effect.

Try a single pot at the end of a pathway, or use them in pairs either side of an arch or doorway.

In borders, they provide height and colour, and because they are separate from the main flower beds, you have the opportunity to change the planting as flowers come into season.

Try also using a chimney pot planter to mark

the number of your house. Use a simple plant, and plant it in gravel mulch, which looks good, helps retain moisture and is better suited to a stand-alone pot.

Planting a chimney pot can be a lot of fun - let yourself go and use plants in an abstract way to create a theme (for example red and darker coloured plants can create fiery or smoky effects).

The height provided by the pots makes them ideal for trailers and climbers, or for bringing specimen plants nearer to eye level.

You can buy chimney pots from architectural salvage yards or garden centres and builders' merchants that deal in reclaimed materials.

You should expect to pay around £25, but prices can be anything up to around £80 for decorative and exceptionally large pots.

Before planting, prepare the pot by cleaning out any soot or debris using a stiff brush and mild disinfectant. Position the pot on firm, even ground and make sure it

Short chimney pots can be filled directly with compost. With taller ones, fill the inside with blocks of wood, rocks or old bricks. Fit a plastic pot in the top to hold compost for planting.

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
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COUNCIL SEEK GAELTACHT ASSISTANCE FOR RING/OLD PARISH LIGHTING

Old Parish areas. That's the proposal emerging from discussions between Councillor Fiachra O' Ceilleachair and officials of Waterford Co. Council.

The Council has sought detailed quotes from the ESB regarding essential works and will soon be sending a proposal to Roinn na Gaeltachta for contributory funding from that source. When all locations and their ducting supply implications have been considered, it is likely that the works concerned would cost in the order of £12,000. 'End of budgetary year surplus funds from Roinn na Gaeltachta have proven vital in realising important infrastuctural necessities in the Ring/Old Parish area in the past.

If the Council considers it likely to get progress on the lights issue in this way, then I'd be pleased to see whatever progress ensues. The poor levels of primary local authority funding allocation to public lighting, however, will inevitably impinge on progress".

No Change In Disadvantaged **Area Payments** System For

Waterford IFA Western Development Chairman James Devine has welcomed the proposal of the EU Commission to defer for one year any changes to the system of headage payments in Disadvantaged Areas until 2001.

Mr. Devine said that the EU Star Committee is likely to confirm the Commission's proposal on 8th October next, which will allow for the continuation of the payments of headage on a per head of livestock basis rather than on an acre payment basis. The deferral is a result of Agenda 2000 transitional rules which have been put forward by the Commission for CAP Rural Development Measures which include headage payments in Disadvantaged

The Waterford IFA Western Development Chairman said that the deferral is necessary to allow further discussions to take place to put a fair and equitable system of payments in place to protect the incomes of cattle and sheep farmers which are most vulnerable to a change to an acreage payment system.

Meanwhile, Mr. Devine called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to ensure that sufficient national funding in provided to top up the recent allocation of EU funds to the CAP Rural Development Measures which includes Disadvantaged Area payments. IFA has set down a clear marker that a total EU and national budget of £115m is required annually to maintain and improve Disadvantaged Area payments over the 7 year period (2000 - 2006).

November **Deadline Should Be Set For Milk Quota Overhaul**

Dairy farmers should now be planning for the likely major overhaul to the Milk Quota System next April. However, no firm decision can be taken by any dairy farmer in the absence of definite decisions by the Minister for Agriculture. This was stated recently by Jackie Cahill, Chairman of ICMSA Dairy Committee.

The ICMSA Dairy Committee Chairman said that while he accepted that many complex rules had to be examined, he was disappointed at the slow rate of progress.

ICMSA are strongly of the view that the Minister should be in a position to publish all the new rules by 1 November 1999. This would give farmers a mere five months to prepare for the necessary changes and to arrange for finance to purchase additional quotas.

Mr. Cahill said that the National Council of ICMSA has agreed its dairy policy last April, and the Eu Regulations were published last May. There is no justification for any further delay on the Ministers behalf.

Mr. Cahill said that the broad thrust of ICMSA policy was to put the quotas in the hands of active milk producers. I am convinced that a permanent home must be found for the 25 million gallons, which has been continuously leased for a long period through the Temporary Leasing Scheme.



The Science of Farming and Food MAIZE

A very successful Teagasc Maize Walk was held last week on the farm of Pat and Lar Looby. The principle topic discussed was the anticipated harvest date of the 1999 crop.

Adviser Brian Hilliard said that a sample across the Department of Agriculture variety trial growing on this farm the cob dry matter was 40% on September 23rd. On average the cob matures at a rate of 4% dry matter per week and therefore, this crop which was sown on May 3rd will be fit for harvesting on October 10th, when the cob dry matter will have reached 50%.

A crop of Hudson in the Dungarvan area which was sown on April 18th had a cob dry matter of 46% on 23rd September and should be fit for harvest on September

All of these crops have been sown without the aid of plastic covering.

- ☐ To make good investment decisions you need to know
- Silage and soil should be tested now.
- Why is silage analysis necessary?
- You should only fatten cattle if your silage is good enough.
- If it is not over 70% DMD don't feed meal to fatten cattle because you will go broke.
- The amount of meals you will feed to Autumn calved cows, dry cows, weanling or in calf heifers totally de pends on the quality of your silage.
- If the silage is shown to be dry by the test then you have more feed in the pit and so need not worry about buying feed or selling cattle.
- If the pH shows that the silage is sour, then you can identify the reasons why.
- At £26 cost per pit this represents great value for money, considering the benefits accruing to the farmer.
- A soil test is a must if one wishes to save money and protect our waterways.
- For £17 per sample (5 10 acre lots) it is very good value.
- You will then know the exact amount of Phosphate, Potash and Lime to apply.
- In many situations little or no P and K will be necessary, which can be a saving of £14 - £21 per acre.
- In other situations it will be possible to grow more grass by applying extra P or K where this is shown up as necessary.
- For a small charge extra you should identify the Copper, Molybdinum, Cobalt and Selenium in about 10% of the samples.





Thank you very much indeed for submitted with your entry form, all

of which was very useful and appreciated on adjudication day. Last year's adjudicator gave you an indepth report. The following should be read in the context of that report and by way of comment on progress made during the year. It is good to see that you have 25 members and 6 officers. You are successful at fund-raising which is no easy task. As remarked in last year's report, it is a wonderful Committee. Excellent work is being done on behalf of the community and should be appreciated by all concerned. It was noted from your entry form that you have new members participating in the clean-ups and the maintenance of the flower beds. Well done to all concerned in Lismore for your approach.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

In the plan you have outlined in great detail the tasks, responsibilities and the year in which it is to be done. It certainly is an outstanding example of how a plan should be presented and laid out. It was also noted that you intend to redouble your efforts over the next few years to maximise your marks. Well done. As last year all the public buildings continue to be maintained in very good condition. It was great to see that work has started on the ESB sub-Station and when the screening and climbers are planted it certainly will look very well. The railings of the School are rusty and do need attention. Both Banks in the town are presented to a very high standard as is the Heritage Centre. The Grotto continues to look magnificent and the seating was freshly painted. The railings were painted in a lovely silver colour. I note that the old CBS buildings at the back of the CBS House are to be knocked. I note that you have met with the GAA officials regarding the landscaping of the grounds in the Community Centre. This is a major task but it will be a challenge to you. It will be interesting to see what the water feature at the monument will look like and one does look forward to seeing this being completed some time in the future. Again the commercial premises in the town continue to improve and congratulations to all concerned. Hopefully, those who have not yet come on board will do so in the near future. A wonderful all round effort by those concerned.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

I note from the progress report that, with any clearing and planting work being carried out, everything possible was done to conserve the natural environment and wildlife and this is to be commended. The ducks continue to flourish on the Canal by the Cappoquin road. You will continue to work on the report received from the Conservation Volunteers of Ireland. If the proposed development of the Millennium Park goes ahead you will incorporate and preserve any wildlife that there is. You might find some useful information in the Tidy Towns Handbook under the section on wildlife and natural amenities (see page 65). This could be used side by side with your other report. Also, no doubt, you will incorporate and preserve wildlife areas along this walk. One could see huge scope and opportunity for enhancing or creating nature areas there.

continues to be well maintained throughout and this is all the more commendable since you have a considerable amount to work on. Flower beds at the Church of Ireland and tubs of flowers were very well maintained and there was a delightful use of colour here. The green area in the North Mall continues to be kept in a neat and tidy condition. Geraniums surrounding the award plaque were stunning looking. The flower bed at Hospital Lane looked most attractive and again has a lovely selection of plants and shrubs. The Pump area continues to look very well. Trees planted in the open green spaces throughout the town are maturing and are cared for very well. The maintenance of the planting done on the Tallow road some years ago is again, very good. It was good to see that the amalgamated Primary School took your advice on landscaping and also on the wildlife aspect. It might be helpful to you to have a look at the Tidy Towns Handbook, which was sent to you this year. It has an interesting section on landscaping (see page 55).

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

This year almost all the residential properties throughout the

town are presented to an excellent standard. It is good to see that there is a change of ownership taking place with regard to properties which were a major problem for you, and which are now undergoing renovation. This certainly will improve and upgrade those areas for you. The Chapel Place houses were excellent in almost all cases, with some lovely flowers, hanging baskets, boxes, tubs and pots etc. Again, the Parks Road properties are extremely well maintained for the most part. When the building of the Ashley Court new houses is completed it is hoped that the landscaping will be of a high standard. The bungalows of the Bank Field area were painted in some delightful colours and almost all were well kept. Those who have work to do will hopefully do so over the next few years. Some boundary walls/fencing do need attention. The problems which you had with dereliction thankfully are at an end and one does look forward to seeing the new improvements.

TIDINESS

The control of weed growth at the kerbs and base of the buildings throughout continues to be very good. The maintenance of the street furniture is commendable. The measure being taken for the cleaning of chewing gum from the pevements and streets is a worthwhile one.

LITTER CONTROL

Your management of litter is working well throughout. You have got the assistance and the co-operation of the schools which is great to see, and have harnessed their energy and interest in many ways. Perhaps other youth organisations might give you a hand as well. They include Macra and junior sports clubs. Some litter observed in the Canal, on

the green area in the Parks Road housing estate, some at the entrance to North Mall and the ditch side of the Bank Field housing entrance. Perhaps the provision of more litter bins in the right places could be considered. Frequent emptying is also necessary. Well done to you for promoting the An Taisce clean-up during April. Also congratulations to the local Foroige Club and your own members for doing the daily, evening and weekend litter patrol. Also well done to the students on the CESP Course and the Transition Year girls in the Secondary School. You have a large area to control and it needs the support of the entire community.

CENERAL IMPRESSION

You continued to put in a tremendous effort over the past 12 months. Congratulations to everybody. The town is continuing to look well and you are making great efforts to overcome the problems you have. Your work has contributed considerably to the presentation of the town. It is hoped that this is appreciated by the community at large. asure to visit and it can be seen by just looking around, the pride most of the inhabitants of the town have in their environment. The efforts of your Committee are being reflected in the progress which Lismore has made in the Competition over the last couple of years. No doubt, you will continue to do well in the Competition. What you have achieved to-date is outstanding and hopefully success of some kind will come your way in the future. Trusting that the fun and enjoyment which you have got from participating and in making your town a better place to live in, will return to all of the people on the Committee.

ROADS, STREETS & BACK AREAS




