Concern At Private Housing Schemes In Ring/Old Parish

Increasing demands on housing in the Ring Gaeltacht area have led to widespread concern at the effects of future large scale private housing developments in the area.

Waterford County Councillor John Deasy claimed this week that Gaeltacht areas throughout the country are being 'decimated' by such developments, which, he claimed, are thinning out the Irish speaking population.

The Fine Gael Councillor proposed at Monday's meeting of the local authority, that the Council consider the effect that private

multi-unit housing developments could have on the health and vitality of the Ring/Old Parish Gaeltacht.

Cllr. Deasy said three tracts of land in the local Gaeltacht area have been zoned for residential purposes in the County Development Plan. The price of land in these areas has increased considerably so that local people cannot afford to buy sites.

"It seems only private housing developers can afford the land", said Cllr. Deasy adding that these

private houses are then sold to people from outside the Gaeltacht area.

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Aer Corps Helicopter Makes Emergency Landing In Ardmore

An Aer Corps helicopter attempting to rescue a woman who had fallen from cliffs in Ardmore last Sunday afternoon, October 10th, was forced to land after rescue equipment snagged the rotor blades.

During the 70 feet lowering of the helicopter's winchman onto a cliff ledge at Ardmore Head a

thermal blanket hit the main and rear rotors.

The helicopter was forced to make an emergency landing in a field at the top of the cliff.

There was no damage to the machine and the woman, who had suffered serious head injuries, was eventually airlifted to Cork University Hospital.

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

I heard that there are to be changes in eligibility conditions for Community Employment Schemes. Could you give me information on the changes?

ANSWER

The Community Employment Programme which is operated by FAS offers a number of options to certain unemployed people, lone parents and those referred by the National Rehabilitation Board (NRB) to take up part-time employment with a sponsor for one to three years without losing their secondary benefits (if total income does not exceed £250 a week).

To be eligible for a Community Employment Scheme a person must be aged 21 or over and getting an unemployment payment or a One Parent Family Payment for 12 months or more; be a traveller (a traveller of any age in receipt of UA/UB or One Parent Family Payment), or be referred by the National Rehabilitation Board (NRB).

New rules were implemented in September, 1999 which expand the eligibility conditions to allow the following people to participate on CES: widows and widowers who are 25 or over; adult dependents (25 or over) of long-term unemployed people.

There will be further changes in eligibility for CES from January, 2000 and the details of these changes are still being formulated by FAS.

Water Shortage In Ballinclammer Area

At a recent Waterford County Council meeting, Cllr. Nuala Ryan moved a notice of motion on what permanent action is proposed to rectify the problems associated with the water shortage in the Ballinclammer area.

In a written reply County Engineer John O'Flynn stated: "The source of the water supply to the Ballinclammer area is the Council's Deelish Scheme. This scheme has suffered problems with excessive demands on the available quantity over the last few years. During the peak demand period in sum-

mer part of the Deelish network, namely, the Ballinacourty area supplied from the Dungarvan Town supply, which is a low-pressure supply, and this results in water shortages in the Ballinclammer area.

"During 1998 improvement works were carried out at Deelish to increase the available quantity of water. It was found in the current year however, that the pipe network was unable to supply the ever-increasing demand even though the quantity was available at the source. In July of this year we installed a temporary booster pump

which enabled the demand to be satisfied.

"Works are continuing on this scheme in an effort to keep abreast of demand. Mains replacement is presently being undertaken in the Garranbane section to reduce water losses and permanent pumping arrangements are being made at Deelish.

Ultimately the scheme will have to be supplied from a regional water supply network as outlined in the Needs Assessment Report approved by the Council at its meeting on 13th instant. In the meantime it is hoped that the works now being carried out will cater for demands in the short-term".

Countywide Projects Receive Go Ahead

Waterford County Council granted planning permission last month to Ryan & Guiry Ltd. for 8 dormer style dwellings and ancillary works at Deerpark, Ballymacarbry.

RTE were also granted permission to erect an 18.3 metre tower and install broadcast equipment to improve the television reception at Knocknaree, Ballymacarbry. Elsewhere, John Connery of Ballinamultina, Clashmore was given the go ahead for 6 sites at Ballingown, Villierstown.

Rev. C. Kelleher was also granted permission for a parking area for the primary school at Touraneena.

In Cappoquin, John Brendan Murray of Allen Street, was granted full planning permission to convert premises to 6 apartments at Barrack Street in the town.

Again in September the Council sought additional information from Cablelink Waterford Ltd. with regard to their application for a control building, television signal, receive and transmitting antennae and supports at Croughaun Hill, Kilmacthomas. Additional information was also sought by the Council from Novacourt Construction for their application to construct 51 houses at Ballinroad, Dungarvan.

CHAMBER CALLS FOR RATE INCREASES NOT TO SURPASS INFLATION RATE

One pound in every four in current expenditure of local authorities comes from commercial ratepayers!

Since the abolition of Domestic rates in 1978 and a successful Supreme Court challenge to the payment of rates on agricultural land in 1984, business is the only sector that pays rates on its property to local authorities.

Businesses must also pay for water, disposal of commercial waste and charges linked to planning permission for the provision of parking and connection to water and sewerage schemes. In 1997, domestic users of water and sewage disposal facilities were relieved of their obligation to pay.

The total collected in Commercial rates in 1984 was £114 million, in 1989 it was £230 million and this year businesses will have contributed over £411 million in rates.

Businesses and Industry in Dungarvan are not opposed to paying their fair share of rates. In view of the imminent closure of the old AWG site, pressure will be put on the Local Authority to increase their income from existing sources. The Chamber requests on behalf of

local businesses that any increases in commercial rates do not surpass the existing rate of inflation.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING SUB-COMMITTEE

As part of the Chamber's programme of improving the skills level of local businesses, the education and training sub-committee are carrying out a survey to ascertain the education and training needs of all businesses in the area.

Once the overall needs are ascertained, the Chamber will then look at the training courses relating to customer care, e-commerce, the Euro etc.

We would ask for all businesses to co-operate by taking a little time to complete the survey and returning it to the Chamber office.

PROPOSED DUAL CIRCULATION PERIODS

The eleven EU Member States that have joined the Euro are currently determining exactly how long the period of dual circulation of their national currency and the Euro will last. EU legislation provides for a period of dual circulation of six months, but most of the Member states are looking toward shortening this period significantly.

A recent study carried out in Ireland favours a dual circulation period of four to eight weeks.

DUAL DISPLAY OF PRICES

While Euro coins and notes will not be introduced until January 1st 2002, it is important that consumers become familiar with the new currency during the transitional phase. Minister for Consumer Affairs, Tom Kit recently launched a new Code of Practice on Dual Display of Prices. The aim is to assist customers to become familiar with pricing in the new currency and to ensure that there is transparency in the pricing of goods.

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JUNIOR WORLD

Astronomy

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Hold the magnifying glass at arm's length and hold the other lens about 5 cm in front of your eyes.

Move both lenses nearer or farther from your eyes until you can see a clear image. The object will look much closer than you see it with your eyes.

The specially designed lenses in a refracting telescope can make things look much closer than the lenses you have used.



Astronomy is the study of the stars, planets and other objects in space. You can see stars, the Moon, some of the planets and the Sun, using just your eyes, but a telescope gives a much better view.

The telescope was invented about 400 years ago, but astronomy is much older than this.

Ancient astronomers in China and Greece could predict when certain events such as eclipses would take place. The ancient astronomers identified patterns in the stars which they called con-

stellations. They thought that the patterns were pictures of characters from the myths and legends, so they have names like 'Taurus, the Bull,' and 'Ursa Major, the Great Bear.'

Modern astronomers still think of the stars in constellations, but only for the purpose of identifying stars.

Today's astronomers use telescopes that detect radio waves and other rays, as well as light, coming from outer space. They can even study stars and planets using remote controlled telescopes in space.

GALILEO

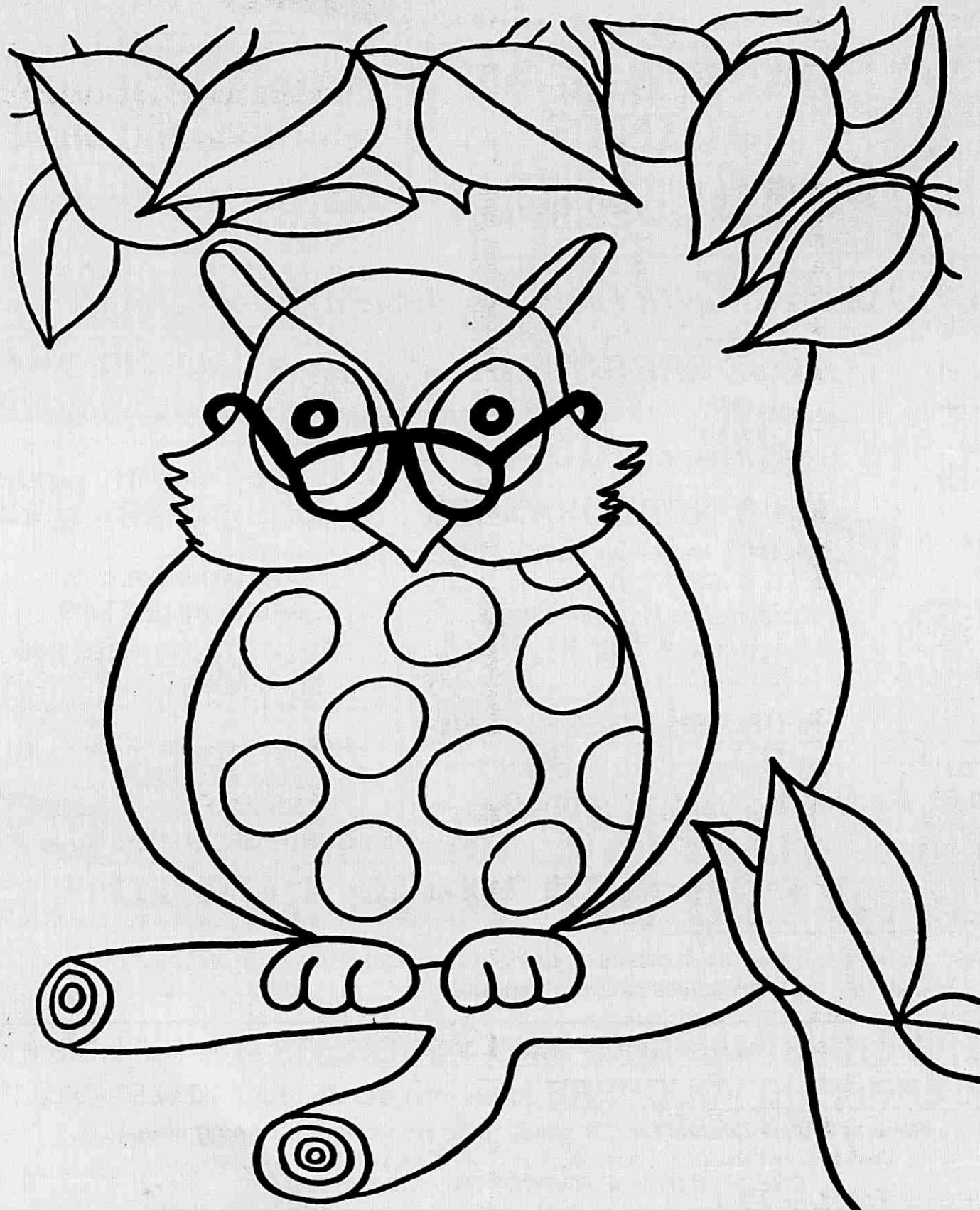
Italian scientist Galileo Galilei was born in Pisa in 1464. He first looked at the night sky through a telescope in 1509, and



described the craters on the moon, the moons of Jupiter and the millions of stars in the Milky Way.

He was put in jail by the Catholic Church for suggesting that the Earth orbits the Sun

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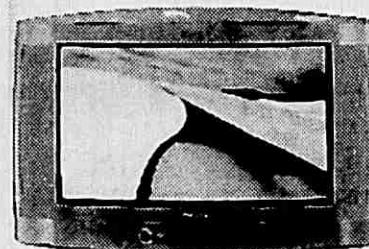

Cookery Corner



Double Chocolate Bombe

Preparation: 25 minutes + Freezing.

Cooking: 3 minutes.

Serves: 8.

INGREDIENTS:

3 eggs, size 3, separated.

40g/1 1/2 oz caster sugar

100g/4 oz milk chocolate, grated

450ml/3/4 pint double cream

100g/4 oz plain chocolate, broken into pieces

1 egg white, size 3

2 tsp cocoa powder, sifted

Strawberries, raspberries and sprigs of mint to decorate.

METHOD:

Whisk the egg yolks with 15g/1/2 oz caster sugar until frothy. Stir in milk chocolate. Whip 300ml/1/2 pt cream. Fold

into the chocolate mixture with a metal spoon. Whisk 2 egg whites until stiff. Gradually whisk in the remaining sugar. Fold into the chocolate mixture. Spoon the mixture into a 1.1 litre/2pt freezer bowl and level the surface.

Press a 300ml/1/2pt freezer-proof bowl into the mixture until it comes up to the top of the bowl. Freeze until firm.

Heat the plain chocolates in a pan with the remaining cream until smooth. Turn into a bowl and cool slightly. Whisk the remaining 2 egg

whites until stiff. Whisk the chocolate mixture and cocoa powder until frothy.

Carefully fold in the egg whites. Remove the bowl from the freezer and twist out the inner bowl.

Pour the chocolate mixture into the centre of the ice-cream. Cover and freeze for several hours or overnight until firm.

To turn out, dip the bowl quickly into hot water then invert on to a serving plate. Serve decorated with strawberries, raspberries and sprigs of mint.

Spaghetti Surprise

Preparation: 5-8 minutes.

Cooking: 20-25 mins.

Serves: 4.

INGREDIENTS:

225g (8 oz) capelline (angel hair spaghetti)

75g (3 oz) broccoli florets

45ml (3 tbsp) olive oil

1 onion, chopped

2 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed

100g (4 oz) back bacon, cut into strips

75g (3 oz) frozen peas

270g (9 1/2 oz) jar mixed peppers and sundried tomatoes in oil, drained, salt and pepper.

30ml (2 tbsp) pine kernels

15ml (1 tbsp) chopped basil

Some grated parmesan cheese to serve.

METHOD:

Cook capelline in boiling salted water for 8 mins, adding broccoli for last 2-3 mins. Drain pasta and broccoli and rinse well.

Heat oil in a frying pan, then gently saute onion, garlic and bacon for 5 mins. Add peas, drained peppers and tomatoes and the broccoli florets and mix.

Stir in cooked pasta, seasoning to taste, pine kernels and basil. Heat through gently for 8-10 mins or until piping hot. Sprinkle with grated parmesan cheese and serve immediately with hot garlic or herb bread.

Chicken with a Bacon and Sage Stuffing

Serves: 4-5.

31/2lb (1.75kg) oven-ready chicken

4 oz. (125g) leeks, washed and finely sliced

4 oz (125g) medium oatmeal

2 oz (60g) suet

1-2 rashers bacon, chopped

1/2 level teaspoon chopped sage

Salt and ground black pepper

Wipe the oven-ready chicken.

To make the stuffing:

Mix the leeks, oatmeal, suet, and chopped bacon pieces. Add a sprinkling of water,

about 1-2 tablespoons, and the sage, then season well.

Spoon the stuffing inside the body cavity. Truss with string or skewers — the oatmeal will swell and absorb moisture and juices as the chicken cooks.

Set the oven to moderately hot, gas mark 5 375°F/190°C. Place the chicken in a lightly oiled roasting tin and cook for about 1 1/4 hours or until the juices run clear when the thickest part of the chicken is pierced with a skewer.

How To Soup Up The Pie

A tasty sauce made with condensed soup and the addition of tiny force-meat balls make our chicken pie extra nourishing and really delicious.

INGREDIENTS:

For 2.

2 chicken joints

1/2 can condensed pea and ham soup

14 oz (400g) packet puff pastry

1 egg, beaten.

Forcemeat balls:

6 oz (175g) sausage meat

3 oz (75g) fresh white breadcrumbs

1 tsp mixed herbs

Salt and ground black pepper
Pinch ground nutmeg.

Method:

Cook chicken in roasting bag at 400°F 200°C, Gas mark 6, for 45 minutes to 1 hour. When cool, cut flesh into bite-sized pieces.

Place in pie dish. Mix soup with equal amount of water and add.

Mix ingredients for forcemeat balls. Roll into walnut-sized balls. Put a few in dish with chicken. Place remainder on baking sheet lined with baking parchment and put in oven during the last 15 mins of cooking time for pie.

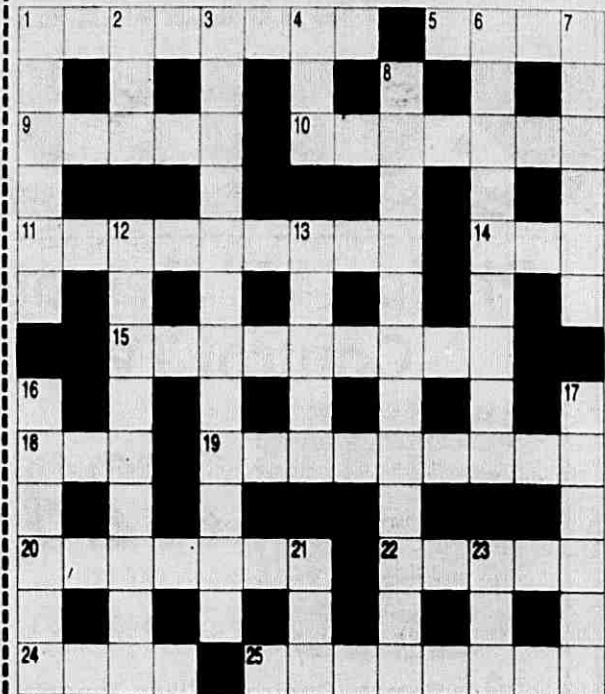
Roll pastry 1 inch larger than dish. Trim off a strip and press onto moistened edge of pie dish. Moisten pastry edge, cover with pastry lid and press down well. Flute edges and cut steam vent in centre. Decorate with pastry leaves. Glaze with beaten egg.

Stand dish on baking tray and cook at 425°F, 220°C, Gas mark 7, for about 40 minutes, until pastry is golden and well risen.

Health Tips from Remedies

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The colourful name of this African plant is derived from the appearance of its tough barbed fruit.

The medicinal properties of Devil's Claw were first discovered by various southern African peoples who used an infusion (tea) of the tuber (underground stem) to treat digestive problems and arthritis. In the West the herb is now widely available as a remedy in health stores.

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RE-ITERATING THE CASE FOR BALLINACOURTY ROAD IMPROVEMENT

The EU Co-Financed Specific Improvement Scheme has been identified by Waterford Co. Council as the only source of funding likely to effect the

widening/straightening and general improvement to the stretch of road between the "Gold Coast" and Barnawee bridge in Ballinacourty. In a written response to representations by Councillor Fiachra O' Ceilleachair, the County Engineer cited a previous proposal included in the Council's programme of works for completion under the scheme in 1997 in the amount of £200,000. Councillor O' Ceilleachair points out that even this sum would not have completed full realignment works on the 2.2 km section of road but would have permitted a significant start. In the event no funding was received for this particular project in the grants allocated by the Department of Environment. "With proposals presently being sought, this section of road should again be submitted for consideration under the EU scheme. It is accepted that the roadway concerned is an important and heavily trafficked route serving housing and tourist development and is in need of upgrading. I look forward to the Council stressing this point to the Department".

No Plans for Waterford Radiotherapy Unit

Waterford Labour Deputy, Brian O'Shea tabled a question in the Dail recently asking the Minister for Health if he had any proposals to establish a radiotherapy unit at Waterford Regional Hospital in view of the severe shortage of facilities nationally.

Minister Brian Cowen however said there are no plans to develop such a service at Waterford Regional Hospital. As part of the National Cancer Strategy it is planned to develop radiotherapy services at University College Hospital, Galway to complement services already available from the other regional centres at Cork and Dublin. The National Cancer Forum will be reporting to the Minister on the question of radiotherapy requirements in the near future.

Following this reply to his Dail question, Deputy O'Shea is now pursuing the matter of the provision of radiotherapy services at Waterford Regional Hospital with the Chief Executive Officer of the South Eastern Health Board. He is also seeking information as to what the Regional Cancer Strategy is for the South Eastern Health Board.

A.T. & G.W.U. Launches £5 Per Hour Campaign

The A.T. & G.W.U., launched its "£5 Per Hour Campaign" on Monday 20th Sept. last at a press conference in its Dublin Office attended by the Regional Secretary Michael O'Reilly, Republic of Ireland Secretary Ben Kearney, Chairperson of the Unions Women's Committee Breda Fell, The Industrial Officer of the Irish Congress of Trade Unions Liam Berney, the Unions Full Time Officers and Branch Chairpersons.

Ben Kearney stated that the Trade Union Movement had an obligation to seek to improve the position of the weak and disadvantaged in our society. The continued exploitation of such workers, many of whom were women, was a disgrace when one took into account our booming economy.

Liam Berney, I.C.T.U. congratulated the A.T. & G.W.U. on its initiative and advised that it was coming at the right time as following years of representations by the Trade Union Movement through the I.C.T.U., a "National Minimum Wage" would be introduced by the Government in April 2000 and pressure would have to be maintained in order to ensure that a proper monitoring system would be put in place to ensure that the new legislation would be effective.

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This Week in The Garden

LIFT AND BOX MINT

A supply of young mint shoots is usually welcome at Christmas and can be obtained easily by lifting a few roots now, laying them thinly on fairly light compost spread in deep seed trays, covering them with a further 3cm of the same compost and bringing them into a warm greenhouse. Any temperature over 10C will secure growth – the higher it is, the quicker the growth. Keep just moist at first, but when shoots begin to appear water more freely.

PLANT HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS

On light, well drained soils October is a good month for planting most herbaceous perennials, but it is better to do the work in spring on all heavy or wet soils.

Make lily of the valley beds Choose a cool, semi-shady position with good rich soil with plenty of humus. Plant the crowns 8cm apart in rows 15cm apart in shallow trenches – and just cover the crowns.

SOW SWEET PEAS

The best exhibition sweet peas are obtained from sowings made now. Some growers sow outdoors where the plants are to bloom. A better method in most areas is to sow in pots, about five seeds in an 8cm pot, and to germinate them in an unheated frame. Once the seedlings are up they can be ventilated freely – you will only need the lights in very frosty or windy weather. The advantage of this method is that the seedlings are much more under control and can be protected from excessive cold or wet if necessary.

PRICK OFF CAULIFLOWERS

If you sowed cauliflowers last month you must now transfer them to a frame. Prepare a bed of finely broken soil in the frame and dibble the seedlings 8cm apart each way.

GATHER ALL REMAINING APPLES AND PEARS

Complete the gathering of all apples and pears. It is not advisable to let them hang once the weather gets really wintry. Apples keep well packed in boxes in a cool but frost-proof place, preferably with a slightly moist atmosphere.

Pears keep better in a dry atmosphere. Lay them thinly in a room with an average temperature of 10C. Never pile them one on top of the other. Watch carefully for ripening.

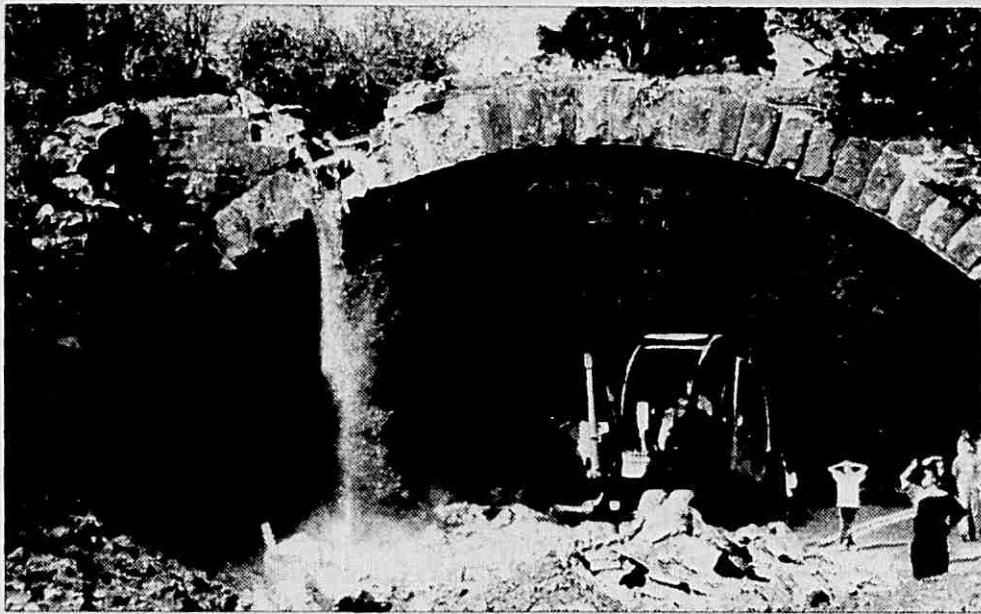
GATHER FALLEN LEAVES

Sweep up all fallen leaves from time to time during the month. Leaves are a particular source of danger in the rock garden, for if they lie thickly on the plants they may kill them.

TURF AND REPAIR THE LAWN

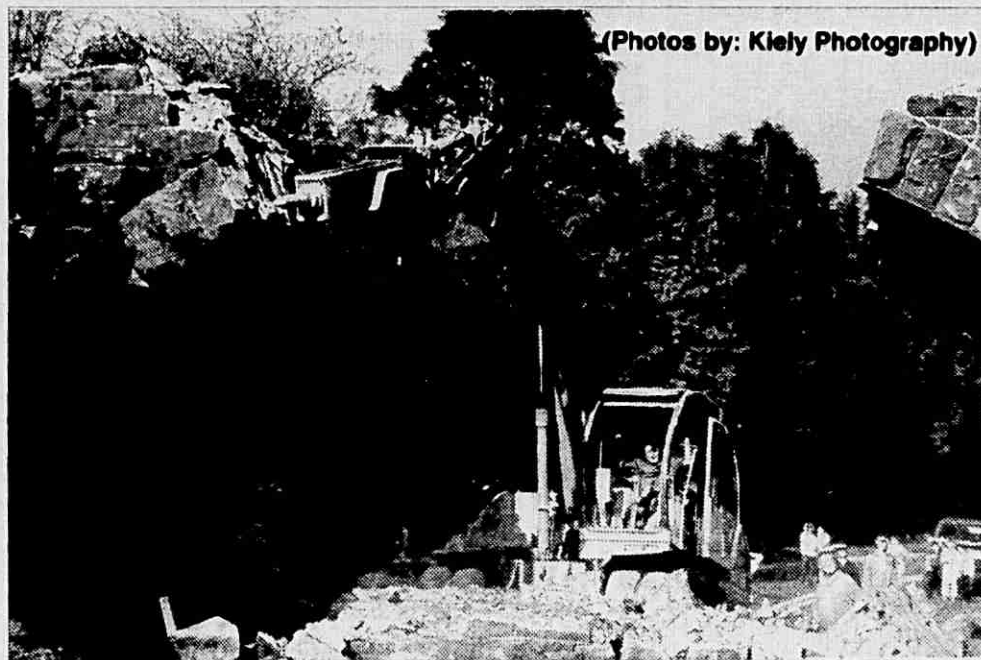
This is an excellent time to lay new lawns from turf or repair worn patches. Cut out the turf from worn places with an edging tool and lift with a sharp spade or turf-lifting tool, making all sides straight. When laying a number of pieces of turf side by side, stagger them like bricks in a wall so that the joints do not come together in both directions.

COUNCIL TO DRAW UP ACTION PLAN

Supporting Cllr. Deasy's notice of motion was Labour's Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who concurred with his views on the negative effects of private housing estates and the threat to the Irish language. He also highlighted the local infrastructural problems involved with such large scale developments such as water, sewerage and roads, etc.

In response to the concerns raised by both members, County Manager Donal Connolly said an area action plan for the Ring/Old Parish Gaeltacht will be drawn up almost immediately by the Coun-

cil. This plan will ascertain the best balance in favour of the development of the area and the protection of its unique character.

In the County Development Plan, Mr. Connolly said land is zoned in the Ring/Old Parish area for balanced development and for the expansion of the indigenous population.

LOCAL PUBLIC MEETING

The future development of the Waterford Gaeltacht will also be the subject of a development plan to be drawn up by Udaras na Gaeltachta in conjunction with Comhairle Pobail na Rinne.

A public meeting to discuss how the plan will be prepared and put in place

will be held at 8.30 p.m. tonight (Wednesday) in Halla Pobail, Ring. A facilitator from Udaras will be in attendance and interested members of the public are invited to attend.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair has welcomed the cooperation between Udaras na Gaeltachta and Comhairle Pobail na Rinne/Coiste Forbartha an Sean Phobail in the composition of a development plan for the Waterford Gaeltacht.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair, who is the only selected candidate yet put forward for the Udaras elections in Ring on November 26th, said this whole subject is an extremely sensitive issue that will be 'no. 1' in the upcoming elections.

It took just half a day to demolish what for decades has been the cause of countless traffic accidents on the main Waterford road.

Known locally as 'Union Bridge', the overhead railway bridge at Scrahan, just outside Kilmacthomas, was demolished last Saturday, much to the satisfaction of local residents.

While a sharp bend still remains on the road, flashing lights will urge motorists to proceed with caution. Waterford County Council is currently reviewing safety measures in the area and it is envisaged that the existing rumble strips will be extended to cover the entire width of the road while signage will also be improved.

Saturday's demolition job was sub-contracted out by French company BEC Freres to Kilmacthomas contractor Tony Kirwan. The County Council, which had to indemnify both CIE and Irish Rail, only received clearance to proceed with the work late last week.

While the demolition and clearance work took place, the Gardaí and Civil Defence directed traffic to various alternative routes.

Local councillor Tom Cunningham praised all involved in removing the bridge last Saturday, in particular Tony Kirwan, the Gardaí, the Civil Defence and the Council.

The hazard posed to motorists at the former bridge led Cllr. Cunningham to recently propose that the area be declared a 'Black Spot'.

The disused bridge allowed trucks only up to a maximum of 12 ft, 3" to pass underneath. This forced large vehicles to move out into the centre of the road when passing under the structure.

Only a fortnight ago, Michael Mulcahy of Kill, died when his car collided with an articulated lorry at the bridge.

SCRAHAN TO BE COMPLETELY BYPASSED

When the N25 Kilmacthomas realignment project is fully completed, the new bypass will completely divert round the existing stretch of road at Scrahan.

BEC Freres/Priority Construction Ltd. were recently awarded the contract for the project which is due to commence in November. Costing in the region of £14.5 million, the project is expected to be completed in mid 2001.

TALLOW TIDY TOWNS REPORT

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

The GAA and Soccer clubs are continuing to improve their properties which is most welcome. The Church continues to look well and when the gates are painted it will certainly look good. The new tarmac and kerb does improve the overall appearance of the Church area. The Parish Hall is well presented but again, the seats need to be painted. The shrubs in front of the Waterford Foods building continue to mature and provides good screening for that building. The Grotto had some weeds in the rose bed and also in the stone ground. The Community Centre building does need to be improved. It could be enlivened by the use of a suitable colour. The pubs

and shops overall continue to be maintained well and Keniry's Pub in particular looks very well with black front and gold coloured lettering. Again, one would encourage the owners of shop fronts who have plastic signage to replace them with more traditional type signage. No doubt they will have plans to do this in the coming years. When using signage of any kind try to encourage business people and the community to use bilingual signage in the Community Hall, shops, club houses, public amenities etc. The public toilets were maintained well on the outside but the two plastic barrels had weeds in them that would need to be maintained well on the outside but the two plastic barrels had weeds in them that

would need to be repaired. I would suggest that the advise of a colour consultant be sought for a colour scheme to be used on all commercial, community and private dwellings throughout the town.

LANDSCAPING

Trees and shrubs throughout the town continue to mature and are maintained in good condition. The grass on the Youghal road in the open space needed to be cut, and seats should be painted. The green area in front of the Bride Valley Stores was well maintained, but the area down from the stores does need some attention. Overall the open green spaces need careful attention at all times and that includes keeping the grass cut and the shrubs in good condition.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

Tallow Angling Club continue to maintain the river Bride by cleaning and restocking it. The river area apart from the fish could be a very important habitat for wildlife. The hedgers and the grass verges along the approach road are also important wildlife habitats. As a Tidy Towns Committee you have an important role to play in protecting and increasing the wildlife value of your community. Again, I would suggest that you contact a local environmental expert or the Irish Wildlife Conservancy would be glad to be of help and advise. Also, do please consult the towns Handbook which was sent to your committee last year.

LITTER CONTROL

The overall management of litter was reasonably good. There were small amounts to be observed in areas throughout the town, also on the Middleton road and in front of the depot.

There was also some small amounts in the open green space in the Woodview area. One has to work very hard to control litter and it needs the cooperation of all the community. It is also important to involve the schools and young people in anti-litter campaigns.

TIDINESS

You did indicate the difficulties with untidy and derelict sites and that you have been making representations to overcome this difficulty. The control of weed growth at the kerbs and the base of walls and boundaries was good throughout.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

Many of the houses in Woodview are maintained well and have some delightful displays of flowers and shrubs. Some of the properties need repainting and also boundary walls need attention. The houses on the main street going towards the Monastery are very well maintained. In New Street, again, some wonderful displays of plants and flowers in the gardens and with nice colours used in the properties themselves. The hedges on the approach roads throughout were well maintained overall. The new housing estate off the Middleton road looked good and the landscaping was of a very high standard.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS

The new stone wall from the town to the bridge is coming on nicely and when completed will look attractive. The seating throughout the town needs to be painted. The approach roads were clean and tidy. Remove overgrowth from top of stone walls and also repair the railing on top. On the Middleton road repairs to the railing and the stone wall are necessary.

LATE GERARD GREENE 1916 - 1999

Gerard Greene, Knocknacreeha, Rathgormack, passed away as he would have wished quickly, quietly, while driving out the avenue of his home. One of his greatest pleasures in life was visiting his friends and knowing that his visits were enjoyed by all. He could be controversial, argumentative, persuasive, knowledgeable, deep-think-

ing, gentle and kind but never boring. He was the personification of the old Gaelic custom of ceidhling. In recent times he availed of the local elections to visit many people, renewing old acquaintances whilst successfully vote gathering for his daughter Mary. Gerard was especially delighted and proud to see Mary's election to Waterford County Council 100 years following his own grandfather Matt Walsh's election to the first council.

Gerard was born in controversial times and as a small child the ravages of Civil War politics was inflicted on his household. His father Godfrey had been selected to stand for the Farmers Party in the General Election of 1922, against the expressed wishes of Sinn Fein, and in an effort to scare him out of politics his house was raked with gunfire which seriously wounded him. Though prevented from running for national politics, Godfrey later topped the poll in the 1928 County Council elections.

Gerard was the only child of Godfrey & Maria Greene (nee Walsh) of Knocknacreeha, Rathgormack, where he grew up. Having attended Rathgormack National School, he completed his education at Castleknock College where he acquired his great interest in rugby. On leaving school he returned to Rathgormack where he commenced his lifelong career in farming.

Gerard was a founder member of the Carrick-On-Suir branch of Macra Na Feirme (1947). But it was to the Co-op movement that Gerard gave a life time service. His father had helped establish it with many other far seeing farmers from the Rathgormack area in 1918. Rathgormack Co-Op was registered as a Society in 1919. Godfrey was its first chairman which went on to start the first creamery in Millvale in 1926 followed by branches at Mothel, Rathgormack and Carrick-On-Suir in the late twenties. The first amalgamation of Co-Op's took place in Waterford in 1964, which was the first major amalgamation in Ireland. Gerard campaigned and canvassed for its adoption. He was a member of the first board and served as chairman in 1968/69. He remained on the board for many years until his retirement.

However for many people Gerard will be remembered as the historian of Rathgormack, of the Comeraghs and of Mid Waterford. It gave him great pleasure to attend historical functions, be they in Carrick, Dungarvan, Ring, Waterford or farther afield. He was a mine of in-

formation on families in the locality and innumerable requests arrived to his address for family information, which he handled in his careful and gentle way. He always went to great trouble and spent many hours visiting people, libraries and archives for no reward other than the satisfaction of forming links between long lost relations.

Gerard was a gentleman to his fingertips. He would never utter a wrong

word about anyone and he was always prepared to understand the other person's point of view while retaining his own beliefs. His sincerity shone through and his kindness was evident to all who came in his path. He loved children and they in turn took to him. His ability on the piano was a great breaker of barriers and it gave him great pleasure to sit and play tune after tune.

His greatest love was of books. He was a voracious reader and he was up to date on all the latest biographies, diaries and novels as well as having read all that was available on his favourite topic of Waterford/ Tipper-

ary/ Kilkenny history. In a special way he was deeply interested in Irish history and politics. His knowledge of current affairs could not be surpassed and his razor sharp insight enabled him to eliminate the dross and get right to the heart of the problem. He was great company in any gathering and could be at home with academics or country people.

Gerard is survived by his wife Angela, daughters Mary and Gemma, sons Godfrey and Matt, daughter-in-law Barbara, son-in-law Arnie and four grandsons John, Brian, James and David.

We shall miss him greatly.

NURSES STRIKE

The South Eastern Health Board wishes to advise that trade unions representing nurses have that they intend to engage in Strike action with effect from 8.00 am on Tuesday next, 19th October.

In the absence at this time of any indication from the Trade Unions involved of a willingness to withdraw the threatened strike action the South Eastern Health Board has commenced implementation of contingency plans.

The impact of the industrial action will involve severe disruption, curtailment and deferral of certain services, including non-emergency hospital admissions, day care services for the elderly, out-patients appointments (cancelled from 18th October) nursing services to persons with a mental disability, community nursing services and services for people with a mental illness.

In co-operation with the nursing staff a full accident and emergency service, emergency community, emergency in-patient and essential services will be provided. A 999 service will be provided. However, inpatient enquiry services will be severely restricted and the general public is being asked to co-operate in restricting calls to essential calls only.

All routine outpatient services and planned inpatient services are being cancelled. Patients who have received a letter cancelling their appointment and who are concerned or whose medical condition deteriorates are advised to contact their GP. Please contact your local hospital or community care services if you have not yet received a cancellation letter.

The South Eastern Health Board wishes to reassure you that emergency and essential services will continue to be provided.

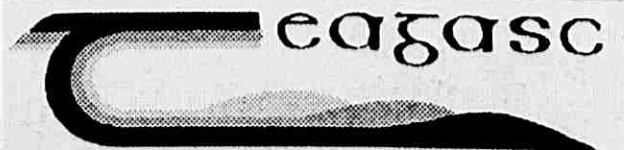

Cattle: AGENDA 2000

People at this stage are anxious to find out how the new CAP reform measures under Agenda 2000 might effect their livelihoods. Although some information on the changes to the various schemes is known some details have yet to be finalised. Some of the proposed changes are outlined below.

SPECIAL BEEF PREMIUM (9 & 21 MONTHS)

The new rate of S.B.P. in 2000 will be £96.45p/hd. The age at which the animal can draw down the premium has now been reduced to 9 & 21 months. So an animal can be applied on once it reaches 7 or 20 months of age. The two-month retention period after application will still apply and it appears likely that the 90-head limit under each category will also remain.

The bull premium will increase to £126.01/hd in 2000 which is payable once in the animals lifetime.

SUCKLER COW PREMIUM

The basic rate of suckler cow premium in 2000 will be £148/cow.

Under Agenda 2000 up to 20% of the suckler cow premium can be claimed using heifers on your holding.

Eligible heifers will have to be:

- at least 8 months old
- of beef breeding stock

The six-month retention period will remain.

Provided heifers do not reach two years old before the end of the retention period, they will count as 0.6 of a livestock unit for basic premia but they will use 1 full cow quota. It appears that heifers can be sold within the retention period provided they are replaced with similar type animals.

NEW SLAUGHTER PREMIUM

A new slaughter premium will operate on a year round basis from the 1st January 2000. It will be paid at a rate of £21/hd for the year 2000.

Animals over 8 months old such as bulls, steers, dairy cows, suckler cows and heifers are eligible if slaughtered or exported live to a third country.

Some criteria for a retention period prior to slaughter are likely but details have to be finalised.

STOCKING DENSITY LIMIT

The same stocking density limit of 2 LU/ha (0.8 LU/ac) still applies under Agenda 2000 for basic premia. As with the current situation only animals applied on for Special Beef Bull Premium, Suckler Cow and Ewe Premium will be counted for stocking density purposes. Animals under 2 years will count as 0.6 LU and over 2 years at 1 LU.

From 2000 a two-tier extensification scheme will operate at the stocking densities outlined. All livestock on the farm over 6 months will now be counted for extensification including heifers.

Producers will be asked to indicate on their 2000 Area Aid form if they intend to claim extensification. Producers can then be assessed for extensification by either of two methods:

- a) A declaration.
- b) An average basis.

With the declaration the producer undertakes not to exceed the extensification stocking limits on any day throughout the year. Producers opting for this method will be subject to random checks.

Using the averaging method it is planned to have five census dates throughout the year to assess an average stocking rate. Census dates will be announced retrospectively to avoid producers temporarily adjusting their stock numbers. For those claiming extensification cereal and maize acreage

will no longer qualify as forage area. These areas will count however as forage area for non-extensification farms.

Sheep will only be counted on the number applied for within quota and each ewe will count as 0.15 LU.

MANAGING HIGH OUTPUT EWES AT MATING

Mating is starting on many farms around now. Ewes on grass of 9 - 10 cms in height in dry weather at mating time and for 25 days after mating should be stocked so that they are maintaining their bodyweight and condition (score 3.5). Problems occur in wet weather where:

- (a) the grass is very watery and dry matter goes down to 14%
- (b) ewes shelter by ditches and walls - their energy intake drops.

In this case, feed some hay, big bale silage or a small amount of whole barley or high energy feed buckets. The feed buckets are the easiest to manage but the ewes need to be used to them. This extra feeding may only be needed for a few days until the weather improves.

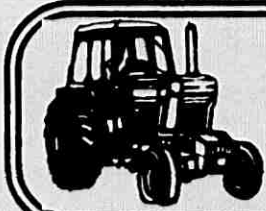
DEATH OF FORMER REGISTRAR

FARMING LEADER

Delays In Dept. Of Agriculture FDS Offices Unacceptable

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Mossie O' Connor has expressed extreme dissatisfaction at the delays in processing of farmer files at local Department of Agriculture Farm Development Service (FDS) offices in some counties.

Mr. O' Connor said that IFA has got numerous complaints from farmers whose applications for REPS, Early Retirement, Control of Farmyard Pollution and other schemes are being held up many offices throughout the country.

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to immediately intervene with his Department to introduce a fast track system of processing applications and also to ensure that sufficient flexibility applies in local

offices to deal with backlogs that are arising in certain areas.

Continuing, the Ardmore man also called on the Department of Agriculture to reduce the number of compliance checks under the REPS scheme from the current level of 50% to

about 20%. This is necessary as the REPS scheme has now attracted 43,000 applicants and unless a more flexible arrangement is put in place for compliance and monitor checks farmers face further delays as the scheme is set to expand post 2000.

Mr. O' Connor said that agricultural schemes are of critical importance to thousands of farmers and any delay has a significant impact on their income. "It is not acceptable that delays are leading to financial hardship on some farmers", the IFA man concluded.

ICMSA Meeting With The Taoiseach

The President of ICMSA, Mr. Frank Allen welcomed the thrust of the new National Development Plan (2000-2006) as unveiled by the Taoiseach to farm leaders recently. Mr. Allen welcomed in particular that the National Development Plan has a central aim of bringing about balanced regional development. This should improve the incomes and the services available to people in the rural areas particularly farmers. Mr. Allen also welcomed the fact that the Taoiseach is committed to ensuring that all Government policies will have to be in future rural proofed.

On the specific funding available for on-farm investment, accompanying measures and rural development initiatives, Mr. Allen said that his organisation had major reservations particularly in relation to farm grants. The proposed allocation for farm grants fell substantially short of what will be required over the 7 year period of a new National Plan concluded Mr. Allen.

Minister Must Get Off The Fence And Show Commitment To Sheep Farmers -ICMSA

Mr. T.J. Nally, Chairman of ICMSA's Sheep Committee speaking on the current serious income situation on Irish sheep farmers said that the Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mr. Joe Walsh, must take immediate action to alleviate the income problem on sheep farms if he is seriously committed to maintaining a sheepmeat sector in Ireland.

APS alone, Mr Nally said, will not solve the current problems. The ewe premium, as currently structured as evidenced by the projected premium for 1998 will not provide producers with

adequate compensation for the poor prices either. The Minister, Mr. Nally said, will have to realise this and take both short and long term measures to overcome the problems in the sheep sector.

In the short term, the Minister, Mr. Nally said, should secure the extension of the Rural World Premium to non-disadvantaged areas and also a significant increase in ewe headage in disadvantaged areas as was achieved in the mid 1990's when similar problems arose. The proposals would put additional money in

farmers pockets which is required to help them overcome their current difficulties. In the long term, the implementation of recommendations of the Sheepmeat Forum will be critical to the future success of the industry.

All sectors of the industry have responsibilities in this regard, Mr. Nally said. In this regard, Mr. Nally said that he hopes that the Minister will secure the necessary sheepmeat policy changes without delay. These are necessary to secure the future of the sheepmeat sector, Mr. Nally concluded.

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ICMSA Welcomes Increased Forestry Premiums For Pre 1993 Plantings

Mr. Maurice Harvey, Chairman of ICMSA's Rural Development Committee speaking has welcomed the announcement by the Minister for State at the Department of Marine and Natural Resources. Mr. Hugh Byrne, T.D., that the premia payments for forestry planted between 1989 and 1992 are being increased by on average 15%.

Mr Harvey said that ICMSA lobbied for increased premiums for farmers who planted land during this period as these farmers had not benefited from any premium increases in the past even though they were the pioneers of farm forestry in Ireland.

Mr. Harvey said that the Minister must be complimented for recognising the important role played by these farmers and for securing additional premium for them. Mr. Harvey said he hoped this increase is only the start and that the Minister would eventually bring these premiums into line with current levels. ICMSA, Mr. Harvey said, will continue to lobby for this increase and also to ensure that all forestry premium increase on an annual basis at a rate greater than the rate of inflation.

Farm forestry, Mr. Harvey said, has an important role to play in maintaining rural populations and promoting rural development provided it is carried out in a planned way. ICMSA will continue to lobby for increased incentives for farm forestry and will also insist that large non-farmer investors are not allowed to displace farm families and rural population, Mr Harvey concluded.

RELAXATION OF REPS TRANSITION RULES EXPECTED -IFA

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Mossie O' Connor has expressed confidence that farmers whose REPS applications were lodged with the Department of Agriculture before 30th July of this year, will not now have to conform with transition rules which came into operation at that time.

It is expected that the EU Star Committee at their meeting on Friday next, 8th October, 1999 will agree that the transition rules will only apply to plans lodged after 30th July.

Mr. O' Connor said that 1,100 farmers had applied for REPS or had amended their plans for additional land, before 30th July, but their plans had not been processed by the Department of Agriculture. As a result, they were asked by the Department of Agriculture to sign a form that they would abide by conditions and payments in 2000 which have not yet been agreed as well as joining REPS for an interim period of one year. IFA had rejected this ruling at the time.

The new arrangements which will now be put in place is satisfactory in so far as the transition rules will not now apply to these 1,100 farmers.

Mr. O' Connor called on the Department of Agriculture to immediately notify all planners and farmers who have already been sent a form on the transitional arrangements.

Stradbally And Rathgormack To Fight For The Final Senior Football Title Of The Century

ARDMORE HOPEFUL OF RETAINING MINOR FOOTBALL TITLE

This is the 97th and last county senior football final of the present century with Stradbally seeking their 10th. title and Rathgormack attempting to win their 8th. In a game that is somewhat unique as these teams who have been around for most of the century, are meeting for their first time ever in a senior decider.

This will be the 15th match of the present championship and for the most part the clashes were forgettable events with mediocre standards and very little to excite the crowds whose expectations were seldom satisfied.

Towards the end, there were a few exceptions with a little drama and excitement. Maybe the best is to come and in the battle to hold the final title of the century and become the team to lead the county into the next millennium, Stradbally and their opponents Rathgormack will each produce something special on the day.

Both represent traditional football strongholds.

Stradbally made the headlines as long ago as 1940 when they won the first of their now famous five-in-a row titles. Reading their profile we find that they had to wait for a further 28 years before winning their next county title. They won their last and 9th county title in 1987 when beating the Nire by 1-9 to 1-5. If memory serves me correctly, they were trained then by Sean Ahearne (footballer of the year in 1980) and are now being trained by the same great clubman. Their last appearance in a county final was in 1991 when they lost by 1-9 to 1-6 to Dungarvan.

They had lost by a single point (1-6 to 0-8) to Dungarvan in 1990.

Rathgormack have gone into the winners enclosure twice already in the nineties and while their championship victories in 1995 and 1996 put them into the record books for their seventh time, their never to be forgotten three-timer against Dungarvan in the 1992 epic decider was the event which brought them back to prominence as a football stronghold. The club records had to reach back to 1918 for their previous county senior football victory.

In the county final on Sunday, both have a lot going for them. Rathgormack have already won the senior league — a title which they retained. Both reached the county under 21 final and which was won by Stradbally who had three points to spare at the finish.

In the championship, Rathgormack struggled to beat Ring in the first round but made no mistake when heavily defeating Kill in the next round.

Luck was very definitely on their side when they converted a penalty to force a draw with the Nire in the semi-final and in the replay they luckily held on for a one point victory.

Stradbally won a splendid under 21 football championship this year, taking all their Western opponents in their stride. The best of their very fit and skilful young players are members of the senior side who accounted for Faughs in the first round, the reigning county champions St. Saviours in the next, before defeating Ballinacourty in a semi-final which took an extraordinary twist in the second half, reducing their lead from 15 to just 4 points.

ON THE WAY BACK

I know that the feeling down Stradbally way is that they are well on their way back and while they may not take over completely as they did almost sixty years ago when led by such stalwarts as Kevin Whelan, Tom and John Veale, John Curran, Paddy Skehan, Dick McKeon, Danny Morrissey and many others who were to become household names in the football scene in the county, went on to capture five championships in a row.

It is interesting to record, that way in the distant past, Rathgormack looked on course to win a five in a row series until Lismore stepped in.

However, all this is history and what matters now is the game on Sunday.

Rathgormack, who, for some reason, are regarded as favourites, will have to field without their full back, Declan Power, who is under a month's suspension following his sending off in the first match against the Nire.

In the replay the full back position was filled by Jason Power who acquitted himself very well and is sure to be left there for the final. Pat Fahy will be in goal again (he was there when Rathgormack won their two titles in the nineties) and Kevin Power and Victor O'Shea will play as corner backs. The halfback line should be Dan Crotty, Noel Murray and Denis Hassett.

In the middle of the field, Tony Bolger and Richie Power will be selected and in an attack led by Martin Power, Rathgormack will have Joe Murray, Ger Power, Ed Hogan, Frannie Halpin, Pat Crotty, etc. and an experienced panel of reserves on the substitute bench.

Stradbally have no player problems and are likely to field the team which defeated Ballinacourty in the semi-final. There may be adjustments as the game progresses.

Kevin Cunningham will be in goal and Oliver Coffey will hold the full back position and will be flanked by Kevin Coffey and Tom Walsh.

Liam Walsh, George Walsh and Dean Keane will likely

form their half back line and John Hearne and Trevor Costello will be given a vote of confidence as their mid-field pairing.

Attack has proved to be Stradbally's strongest sector so far, but coping with the very experienced Rathgormack defence (even without Declan Power) will be their real big test. So far Stradbally have scored a total of nine goals, giving them a three-goal average per game. I'll be surprised if they score three majors against Rathgormack. The points scoring record of the two is about equal.

THE RESULT

Trying to find the answer to this question becomes a guessing game, as either side can win. It can end in a draw (and this is by no means out of the question). Rathgormack are the most wasteful team in the championship and have more wides to their credit (or discredit) than any other of the present football teams. When they manage to get their 'shooting' right they can become the most difficult team in the county to beat. Their wastage against the Nire was a first class illustration of the point I am making here.

Stradbally may lack the experience of their opponents, but their youthful enthusiasm, their hunger for a win at this level, the greater speed of their forwards who have the ability to accelerate to greater effect than their opposite numbers here, must mean something worthwhile in their favour.

For this reason, I give the Cove men a good chance of winning, but without making them favourites.

Champions Ardmore To Play Exciting Curtain-Raiser

Almost amazingly, this will be Ardmore's fourth minor football county final in a row. Last year they won the title beating Gaultier by 1-12 to 0-4.

In the previous year they took county honours when defeating Rathgormack by 2-8 to 0-10 in a thriller. In the previous year again, Ardmore lost the county final to Gaultier on a scoreline of 5-7 to 3-5. They now represent the division for the fourth successive season after scoring against three of the better minor clubs en route.

In the first round they played a draw with the Nire on a score of 1-7 to 2-4 and won the replay decisively on a scoreline of 1-12 to 1-3. They defeated St. Olivers by 0-12 to 0-7 and in a splendid western final they accounted for neighbours, Clashmore by 2-5 to 0-9.

Ardmore have lots of skill, they function very efficiently as a team and as an underage side they have good experience, all of them having come through from under 12 grade.

Their line out is certain to see Derek Cronin in goal with Conor O'Connor, Declan Prendergast and Seamus Flavin forming the full back line behind Jason Lenane,

Noel Hennessy and Eoin Foley in the half line of defence.

Team captain, Wayne Hennessy and Philip Beausang will once again team up in the middle of the field and up front Gary North, Richie Hennessy David O'Reilly, Nial O'Brien, Billy Harty, Declan O'Donnell, etc., will complete the side who hope to make a big bit of history for Ardmore, whom I have long described as the rising power in Waterford club football.

Ballyduff/Butlerstown provide the opposition and they have come through after just two tests.

Having received a first round bye, they met Tramore and beat them by 3-10 to 1-13 in the semi-final before accounting for Rathgormack by a single point, 2-7 to 2-6, in the eastern decider.

Reports about the eastern champions give them a high rating and by all accounts they will be no push over.

But if Ardmore play to their best form, I feel confident that they will achieve that elusive three-in-a-row county titles.

Guests at the dinner included Most Rev. Dr. William Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, who spoke about the quality of this great hurling team and described them as the best team of the century. Having stressed the role

played by the GAA in the life of the nation, Dr. Lee paid tribute to the very high standard of sportsmanship displayed at all times by this group of players.

His Worship, the Mayor, Alderman, Pat Hayes; County Board Chairman, Paddy Joe Ryan; Most Rev. Dr. Russell; former president in Waterford GAA, and former President of the Association, Pat Fanning, who was chairman of the county board at the time in 1959, also spoke.

Pat traced the history of

the team and he said they did not come together overnight. He described them as a group of dedicated and fully committed players who from the start were sincere in their resolve to win an All Ireland for Waterford.

Very well known RTE broadcaster and commentator, Michael Ó Muirceartaigh, was also a guest speaker and gave one of his customary outstanding performances. Local radio commentator, Kieran O'Connor, gave one of his virtuoso performances as master of ceremonies on the night and kept the party going very smoothly and successfully for hours.

The outstanding success of the celebration was due in full measure to the organisational ability of 1959 team captain, Frankie Walsh. It was Frankie's brain-child and he certainly left absolutely nothing undone in his meticulous planning of the entire celebration.

Cork and Kerry will be seeded at the initial stage.

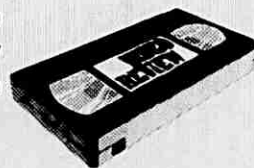

Michael Ryan's worst fears were confirmed when the Waterford Senior Ladies Football team were beaten by young newcomers, Mayo on a scoreline of twelve points to eight in the Bank of Ireland All Ireland Championship Final. From a Waterford perspective it was a disappointing performance and result, but no one, least of all the Waterford camp, would deny that Mayo were worthy champions. They clearly played with much more fire, commitment and hunger than their Waterford opponents, but equally, many of the Waterford Ladies felt that their lack of sharpness was responsible for their own misfortune.

Ever gracious in defeat, Waterford Manager/Coach, Michael Ryan said after the game that his side needed to win the match in the first fifteen minutes, but missed two golden chances of goals. He warmly congratulated the young Mayo team and their Manager John Mullin, who had fashioned a historic Connacht victory on the eve of the new century.

It had not been an easy month of preparation for the Waterford team, as misfortune after misfortune piled up on them, both collectively and individually, but all were agreed that the basic

reason they had not won this encounter, was their failure to register enough scores on the day.

From the outset, Mayo served notice that they were not merely fulfilling a fixture and having held the Waterford girls scoreless in the first eight minutes and allowing them an advantage of just two points at the end of the first quarter, many felt the Deise writing was even then on the wall.

At seventeen minutes, the sides were level and, realistically, Mayo were in the driving seat from then on. Even one of Michael Ryan's legendary team talks at half-time failed to save the day and in the end, with just a margin of four points to spare, Mayo nevertheless ran out convincing winners.

This encounter will be looked back on by the Waterford camp in frustration and sadness, mixed with a tinge of anger, for there is a feeling among them that they did not get all they were entitled to during this campaign, a fact which was made only too clear to them in the last month. That said, they are already on record in

loud praise of this young Mayo team, who bear more than a passing resemblance to the breakthrough Waterford team of 1991.

Michael Ryan was philosophical in the aftermath of the game. "Next year starts tomorrow", he said, "and we will, God willing, be back fighting for another All Ireland in the year 2000. If we cannot end one millennium with a title, then maybe we can start the next more successfully."

"We did not play anywhere near our potential," he said, "and we paid the price. I wish this Mayo team and their Manager, John Mullin, every success in the future, I feel our paths will cross again and again."

Asst Trainer, Bridget Grant was disappointed that the girls had not been able to reap the rewards of a long and hard year's work. "They

have shown great commitment to their game and their county," she said, "and I am proud of each and every

"The absence of our two girls, Rebecca Hallahan and Caitriona Casey was a big loss, but in fairness, the Mayo team were very focussed, organised and determined and that carried them through."

Up in the Ard Comhairle, Mayo Captain, Diana O'Hora, brimming with confidence, was telling the 15,000 strong crowd and the TV audience that their victory had

been 'a panel effort' and that they had trained and prepared as a panel for the full duration of the campaign. As she accepted the Cup she went through a ceremony which has been denied to her male counterparts on ten occasions and it will prove a memorable and historic scene for the people of Mayo.

National President of Cumann Peile Gael na mBan, Dungarvan's Noel Murray said that he had mixed emotions on the day. Clearly it had been a fantastic day for womens football, with fine display by two committed teams and could only further promote the game countrywide. He would have been less than human if, in his final year of his presidency, he did not have some little regret that it was not to his native Waterford he was presenting the magnificent Brendan Martin Cup.

On behalf of the National Sponsors, Bank of Ireland, General manager, Sales and Marketing, Des O'Reilly said that the Ladies Football Sponsorship had been a very successful one for them and

he looked forward to 'many more years' of association with Cumann Peile Gael na mBan.

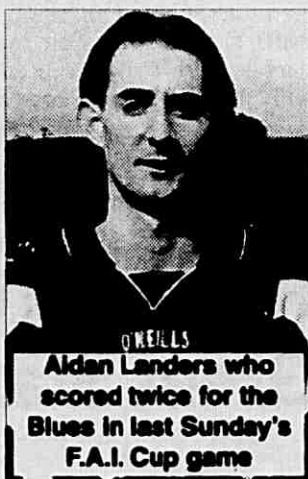


Michael Downey who opened the scoring last Sunday for the Blues

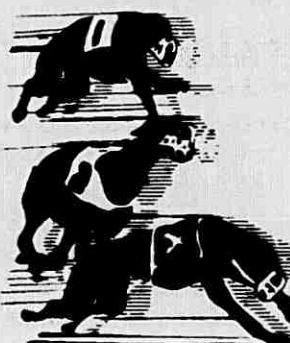

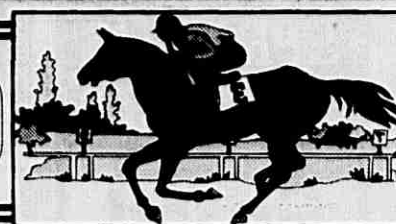

FINE REDUCED

French based trainer John Hammond made a flying visit to the Curragh last Thursday to attend an appeal with the Turf Clubs Appeals and referrals committee and the journey was a profitable one as he saved over £8,000 when the recent fine by the Leopardstown stewards was reduced from £15,000 to £6,750. The fine was imposed when trainer Hammond withdrew his horse Montjeu from the champion stakes in favour of the Prix Niel at Longchamp. At the end of the appeal which took less than an hour the Turf Club also refunded the trainer his appeal deposit. Just in case readers are wondering where the £6,750 came from, well in fact it is one per cent of the total prizemoney.

DAVID'S FIRST

Waterford born David Casey enjoyed his first winner in England since going to work for Lambourn trainer Oliver Sherwood when guiding the 11/8 on favourite Lightening Strikes to a clear cut victory in the opening hurdle event at Bangor last Saturday afternoon. The Sherwood runners are just starting to emerge from their winter quarters and we can expect a steady stream of winners to flow from this establishment over the coming months.

TIPPERARY ABANDONED

The heavy rain of recent week's took its toll on Tipperary Racecourse at Limerick Junction last Thursday where the seven race programme was abandoned due to parts of the track being unfit for racing. The feature event on the programme, the group three Concorde Stakes over seven furlongs was added to the Cork meeting last Saturday. The remaining races were run off at Dundalk track on Tuesday of this week.

MONTJEU TOPS LIST

Last Sunday week's Prix de L'Arc winner Montjeu was this week provisionally rated one of Europe's best ever performers. European and Far East officials compared notes over the French race where Montjeu came with a late thrust to deny the Japanese trained El Condor Pasa by the narrowest of margins. Going back to 1986 and coming forward from that year only four horses have been rated higher than the 135 he is set to be credited with. They are Dancing Brave on 141, Generous and Peintre Celebre on 137 and Suave Dancer on 136.

FRANKIE BANNED

Top Italian born pilot Frankie Dettori who recently became a father for the very first time was dealt a severe blow by the York stewards last Wednesday when they dished out a four day ban for excessive use of the whip on Strahan. After viewing this six furlong two year old race Frankie appeared to give the John Gosden trained Strahan an inspired ride to snatch a last gasp victory. The local stewards however, took a dim view of the force with which Frankie applied his whip to Strahan and duly dished out an unwanted holiday to this world class jockey.

The ban runs for October 15th, 16th, 18th and 19th. The first two days take in the Newmarket meeting featuring the Dubai Champion Stakes in which he was due to take the ride on High Rise. Initially Frankie indicated that he was unlikely to appeal the ban but he had a change of heart over the weekend as the U.K. jockey Club confirmed that Frankie had in actual fact lodged an appeal. If Frankie is not successful in overturning the decision of the York stewards French jockey Olivier Peslier is lined up to take a number of his choice mounts.

ONE FOR THE NOTEBOOK

Keep an eye out for a horse called Wide Reflection. A winning Point to Pointer here in Ireland, this five year old had his first outing for his new trainer Josh Gifford last Friday at Huntingdon and he ran a cracker to finish a fast finishing runner-up in a novice chase partnered by one of Britain's best chase jockeys, Co. Kildare born Brendan Powell. Wise Reflection made a hash of the second last fence and would probably have won but for that error. Only a five year old Wide Reflection looks a horse to keep on one's short list over the coming months.

ROSCOMMON OFF

Racing failed to get the green light at Roscommon on Monday of this week as an inspection by the Turf Club's inspector of courses found the track unraceable due to adverse weather.

DOWNPATRICK REPORT

Despite drifting in the betting market from an opening show of 4/6 out to 5/4 the Dermot Weld trained Gordi had little difficulty despite a last hurdle scare in opening his account in the bet with the tote Maiden Hurdle. The winner was ridden by David Evan's who spent the last six weeks riding in Italy. The winners trainer confirmed that the six year old Gordi will next go to the horses in training sales at Newmarket.

CHARLIE IS BACK

Charlie is back, Swan that is not Haughey. After a recent holiday in Portugal Charlie is all set to make his comeback after injury on the opening day of the Gowran Racing Festival. Charlie has been riding work over the past couple of weeks and he is looking forward to full time action. His first ride is likely to be Pately in a Maiden Hurdle.

RUNNER UP FOR THUNDER

The Velka Pardubrika steeplechase was decided in the Czech Republic last Sunday. Two Irish horses lined up for the big race and Risk Of Thunder finished in second spot behind Peruan Wao who captured this race for the second successive year. Risk Of Thunder was supposed to be ridden by Ruby Walsh but Ruby was forced to miss his intended mount having gone to hospital earlier in the afternoon as he sustained a suspected broken right shin following a heavy fall in another race. Ken Whelan deputised aboard the Enda Bolger trained Risk Of Thunder. Ireland's other entry Dennistown Thriller finished in eighth spot while Adrian Maguire got no further than the sixth fence having been unseated from Irish Stamp.

CIRO AWARDED GRAND CRITERIUM

The Aidan O'Brien trained Ciro was beaten into second place in the three runner Grand Criterium Group One event at Longchamp on Sunday but after a lengthy stewards inquiry he was awarded the race after the winner Baratheas Guest was found to have crossed the Irish Colt before going clear in the straight. Under a strong drive from Mick Kinane Ciro rallied in the closing stages to reduce the winning margin to a neck at the winning post.

FESTIVAL OF RACING AT GOWRAN

All roads lead to Gowran Park in County Kilkenny where they stage an excellent three day fixture on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week.

Early entries for the opening day of the Festival have confirmed that Top Irish rated Steeplechaser Imperial Call will open his 1999 - 2000 account in the £32,000 Powers Gold Label champion chase against last years winner Doran's Pride. The opposition is tough with Paddy Mullins charge Siberian Gale, Jessie Harrington's Ferbert Junior, Mouse Morris's His Song, Noel Meade's Hill Society and Francis Crowley's double entry of Promalee and Moscow Express to challenge.

The Kilkenny Racing Festival is only in its second year and the entries for this year's races has confirmed that it is already established as the new start of the National Hunt season.

Aside from the feature race on Wednesday Ulster Harp Derby winner General Cloney owned by John Brennan is entered to make his jumping debut in the Kilford Arms three year old hurdle. The only reservation I have about General Cloney is his ability to stay the two mile distance at full racing pace but trainer Willie Mullin's is certain to have his charge cherry ripe for this assignment. National Hunt favourites Anabatic, Ajar, Dromineer, Manhattan Castle and Miss Emer are all entered for the Nolan Ryan qualified Riders Cup.

There is a jackpot carry over on the opening day of the Festival of £1,651. Gowran Park Racecourse is expecting its largest ever attendance over the three days.

When young jockey Neil Pollard rode Toleration for his boss David Elsworth at Windsor last Monday it marked his final winner as a claiming rider guiding this two year old to a narrow victory.

RUBY OUT UNTIL CHRISTMAS

Leading owner J. P. MacManus flew jockey Ruby Walsh home from the Czech Republic in his private jet on Sunday night after breaking his right tibia near the shin. The County Kildare rider was treated in Cappagh hospital but he could be out of action until next Christmas.

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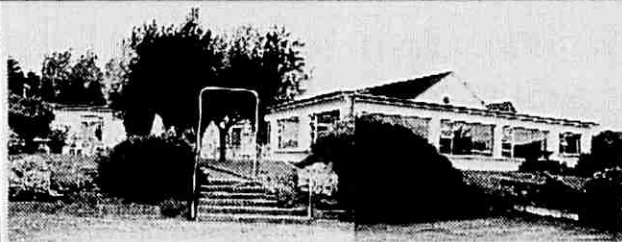

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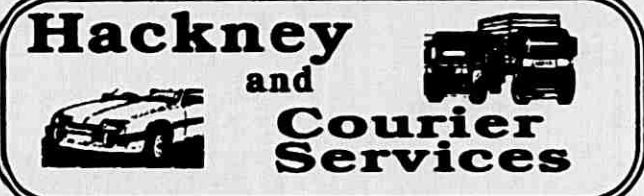

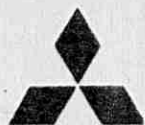
