Court Action Possible Over Incomplete Dungarvan Estate

The developers of what has been described as an incomplete housing estate in Dungarvan could face legal action from Dungarvan UDC in a matter of weeks if they fail to comply with certain conditions of their planning permission.

The developers, Lanro Luxury Homes Ltd. of Kilmacow in South Kilkenny have been warned by Dungarvan UDC that they could face legal prosecution through the courts if they do not finish the work.

Residents of GealgCua, Kilrush on the outskirts of Dungarvan, have described the area as a bomb site. Ten attractively designed homes, costing upwards of

£95,000 have been developed on the site since 1996 but residents claim the estate still looks like a building site.

Although from the main road the estate appears well maintained apart from the absence of a roadway, this picture deteriorates badly as one rounds the bend.

The new home owners say they have been abandoned by the construction compa-

ny who left the site without laying a proper roadway. An unprotected deep hole in a green area opposite the houses is dubbed locally as 'the grave'.

LANRO REFUTE ALLEGATIONS

A spokesperson for Lanro Luxury Homes has com-

pletely refuted all reports that the housing development is incomplete.

Speaking to the 'Leader' the spokesperson said that each one of the houses was sold prior to being built on a one-off basis and built to individual specifications.

The company expect to start construction on the

Ring Gaeltacht Action Plan

Dear Editor,
It is with great interest that I read in your report from the latest council meeting that Waterford County Council are to prepare an Area Action Plan for An Rinn. I would like to commend Councillors John Deasy and Fiachra O Ceil-leachair for proposing that the Area be treated as a unique cultural Gaelic speaking area which does make it different to other parts of the County.

The people of An Rinn always welcome any individual who decides to build a home in the area, let it be to live in or as a holiday home. There is however one major decision to be decided by Waterford County Council and hopefully with an input from the community who do live in the area.

The question is 'Are Housing Estates suitable for this area. An Rinn is a elevated peninsula with limited infrastructure and beautiful scenery. There is sufficient land rezoned to facilitate any new applications for housing and as stated in the recent Waterford County Development plan land rezoned in the 1992 plan has yet to be developed. If this is the situation why do we need housing estates if no shortage of rezoned land for individual houses exists.

I believe that the Waterford County Development plan was designed to rezone sufficient land in the area for individual applications which should have stabilised site prices because of the amount of sites available.

What can destroy this plan is when wealthy developers with no interest in the area other than profit, buy large areas of the rezoned land for housing estates thus causing a shortage of individual sites and site prices to escalate beyond the budget of the individual.

I wonder what is meant by Mr. Connelly's term Balanced Development. We will have to wait and see his proposed Area Action Plan which he states has to be provided because of the demands on the authority for housing development on the peninsula. Demands by whom I ask, Individual home seekers or Developers.

E. Commerce Seminar In Waterford

Companies in the south east are among the most enthusiastic supporters of the use of the Internet for business, as the sizable attendance at last week's 'Success in E-commerce' seminar in Dooley's Hotel, Waterford clearly showed.

Businesses of all sizes explained how they were using e-commerce to an equally diverse audience where organisations with customers all over the world sat side-by-side with small local companies. The overwhelming message was that no

company could afford to ignore the opportunities available via the Internet.

The Internet has undoubtedly increased the cost efficiency of taking bookings from overseas, particularly since it removes the commission charged by agents.

Several other speakers at the seminar (which is jointly promoted by IBEC and the Information Society Commission with EU support) explained how they have used the Internet to the benefit of their business. These included Fergal

Wall, electronic services manager at Glanbia, who spoke about the Farmlink programme that the company has initiated.

"Farmlink is an initiative of our agri-business division that allows our farmer shareholders to make all queries relating to milk business online. The scheme was launched on a pilot basis earlier this month and is just one way in which we are using the Internet to deliver a more efficient service".

There was also great interest in the workshops, which demonstrated how business can get the most out of e-commerce.

final three houses of the project within the coming weeks and when the entire development is fully completed, the roadway will then be finished. The residents, claimed Lanro, are fully aware of this fact and there is even a £20,000 bond on the road.

With regard to street lighting, Lanro said they had the required lamps, as recommended by the ESB, on-site at Kilrush last April but following a request by local residents, it was agreed that different standards would be used and these would be obtained by the residents. The spokesperson said these new standards only arrived on site in September thereby causing the delay.

"Each house is fully finished and each house has a certificate of compliance by an engineer", said the Lanro spokesperson.

When asked about the deep hole in the development, Lanro denied that they had left any hole on the site and said they have a responsibility to children in the area. They are fully aware of their obligations to safety regulations.

"Our reputation stands for itself. We have done all that has to be done at this stage - it's still a construction site", said the spokesperson.

"We will have all the conditions completed by the November 21st deadline. There are 12 people on the list for the three new houses at Kilrush and we are still working all over the county. I'm very surprised at these allegations", said the spokesperson.

DEADLINE FOR LANRO APPROACHES

Lanro were issued with an Enforcement Notice by the Urban Council on September 21st and were given two months - until Nov 21st - in which to complete certain conditions which were attached to their original plan-

ning permission. These include the provision of public lighting, water supply control units on each domestic supply and gullies which were expected to be installed prior to the occupation of the estate.

If the stipulated work is not completed by Lanro to the satisfaction of the local authority by the Nov. 21st deadline, the Council's solicitors will be instructed to initiate legal proceedings against Lanro for non-compliance with the Enforcement Notice. A summons will then be prepared and the Council would hope to get a Court Order from the District Court ordering the developers to complete the estate.

"TOTALLY UNACCEPTABLE"

The Chairman and Vice Chairman of Dungarvan UDC, councillors Lar Hart and Michael O'Riordan believe that action should be taken against the building company by the Council.

"It is one of the worst cases of an unfinished housing contract that I have ever encountered", declared Cllr. Hart. "The residents who are all having to cope with mortgages to own their dream home have been let down in a scandalous way".

Cllr. Hart added that people are buying houses in good faith while developers leave important items such as roads in the estates to the last minute in their rush to sell the houses.

Likewise Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said that as a public representative he is astounded that contractors could walk away from a housing project and leave it in such a deplorable condition.

He said that the clauses written in to the planning permission such as street lighting were completely ignored and he highlighted

the danger posed to children by the unprotected manhole.

"It's completely unacceptable", he stressed adding that he hoped the Minister for the Environment will include a condition in the upcoming Housing & Planning Bill that contractors who leave projects uncompleted and who apply for permission elsewhere be refused until they have brought all projects up to standard.

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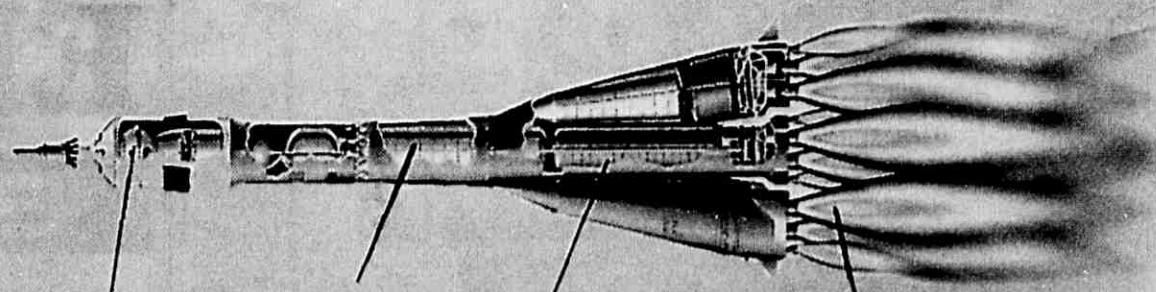
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SPACE EXPLORATION



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The fuel is normally a liquid, and is carried in huge tanks

The exhaust gases push-out behind the rocket at high speed

ROCKET ENGINES

Inside the engines of most rockets, liquid fuel burns with liquid oxygen, producing huge amounts of hot gas. The gas can escape only through the nozzle at the bottom of the engine, so it is forced downwards. This pushes the rocket in the opposite direction — upwards — with a great force, or thrusts. In order to escape the Earth's gravitation

pull and not to crash back to Earth, a about 39,000 Kilometres per hour. This is called escape velocity. At this speed, the rocket travels more than 10 kilometres every second! The job of rocket engines does not end with a spacecraft clears the Earth's upper atmosphere. Smaller rocket engines, or retro rockets, are used to steer craft as they moved through space.

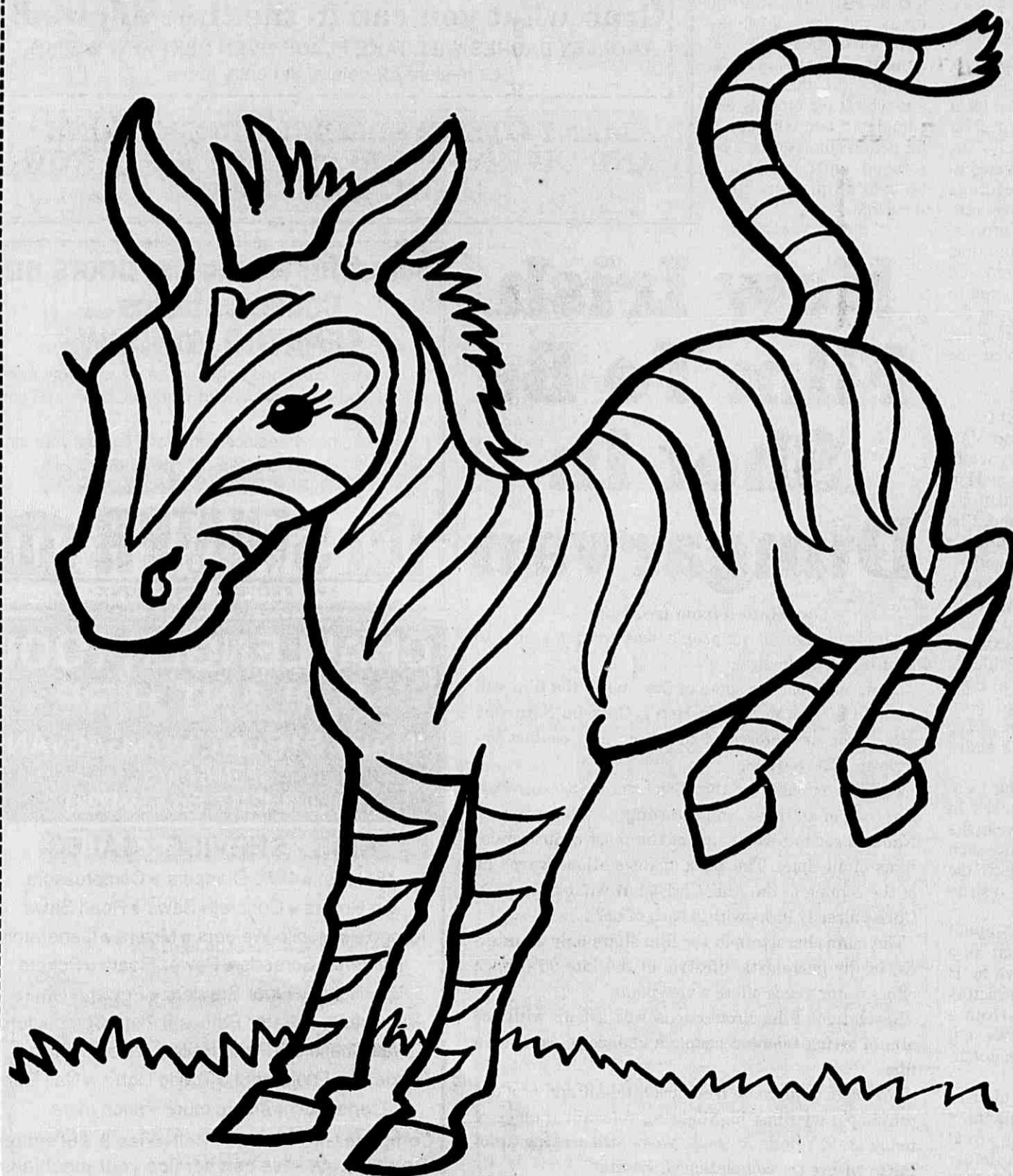

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Council To Monitor Parking At Causeway

Dungarvan UDC is to monitor parking patterns at the Causeway in Abbeyside. Although parking was banned some time ago on the seaward side of the Causeway, the absence of double yellow lines or signs indicating same, has led to some motorists continuing to park on both sides of the road.

The matter was raised at the October meeting of the

Urban Council.

"It's working most of the time but really needs to be cleared up", said Town Engineer Joe Brennan. He told members that the Council has three options, namely to introduce double yellow lines and signage along the waterfront between the Devonshire Bridge and Strandside; a single yellow line or to introduce disc

parking in the area.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan expressed her disappointment that some drivers are still parking on the seaward side

of the Causeway.

"It's very poor civic spirit when there are free long stay car parks available elsewhere", she stated.

Planning Permission Granted To Dungarvan Projects

Last month Dungarvan UDC granted planning permission to the South Eastern Health Board to erect a prefabricated unit and all associated site works at St. Anne's Ward, St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan.

Permission was also granted to John Byrne of Grattan Square for a new shop front, extension to the rear at first floor level and change of use from electrical shop to a public house at 10 Grattan Square.

A. Halley of Lower Main

Street received permission to construct five dormer style dwellings at Wolfe Tone Road, Dungarvan.

Meanwhile further information was sought by the Council from Glanbia in respect of a planning application for the demolition of the former convent building at Church Street.

The UDC has accepted a tender by T. McCarthy Building Ltd. for the construction of ten local authority houses at the former Council nursery site at Youghal Road.

Tribute To Late Fr. Jack O'Regan OMI 1923 - 1998

The following is a tribute to the late Fr. Jack O'Regan formerly of Dungarvan who died in Australia last year. The excerpt was taken from the 'Oblate Missionary Record'.

Born; 18 November 1923. Place Kilkenny City. Education; Abbey-side, Dungarvan. C.B.S. Dungarvan. Novitiate; Cahirmoyle, 1945/46. Ordination; Piltown, 24 June 1951. Australia 1952 - '70. Manila, Philippines; 1970 - '77. Australia 1977 - '87. Indonesia 1987' - . Died on 8 October 1998.

After a long struggle with cancer, Fr. John O'Regan died recently in St. John of God Hospital, Subiaco WA, the same hospital where he had spent time during his early days in Australia. He never forgot the kindness of the Sisters, and it was appropriate that they cared for him in the last months of his life.

After ordination in June 1951, John continued his studies in Rome before coming to Western Australia in July 1952. Later he went on to do post-graduate work in Ottawa.

John was a noted retreat master and missionary who spent much of his life in formation - as a secondary teacher at Iona College, Brisbane, and a lecturer in the Oblate Seminary and Catholic Theological College, Melbourne.

As a psychologist he worked in the field of counselling and psychologi-

cal testing, especially when he was leader of the Oblate Education Centre in Hurstville, NSW. In the 1970's he spent seven years lecturing in the East Asia Pastoral Institute in Manila.

In 1987 he volunteered for Indonesia where he was attached to the Oblate seminary in Yogyakarta. He soon mastered the language and even lectured in Indonesian at the local university.

Fr. John will be long remembered by the many who have benefited from his wisdom, and especially by his Oblate brothers in Australia and Indonesia.

Fr. John O'Regan was buried in the Oblate plot at Fremantle cemetery on 14 October, after the Funeral Mass in the Lesmurdie Church where he had been a member of the Mazenod community. In life he lived as a strong, prayerful religious; in suffering and death he witnessed to what he had lived and preached.

May he rest in peace.

A PERSONAL TRIBUTE

We would all like to be remembered for the life we brought others through friendship rather than for the money we made, for the buildings we erected or for our measurable achievements. John O'Regan erected no building nor can I think of any other material achievement he left behind. Like Jesus, he came and went that others

might have life and have it more abundantly. So many of us are much more alive for having known him.

All of us who met him remained his friends forever. Each time we left him we came away enriched and happier for the encounter. He loved Ireland and felt the pain each time he parted from it. Yet he radiated life and love easily among the international communities while he worked at universities in Ottawa and Manila. Then in his beloved Indonesia to which he generously gave a great part of his missionary life, neither language nor culture hindered his ability to relate warmly to his younger Indonesian brothers. He will be sadly missed in the seminary where he exemplified Oblate life to so many young men. He was always at ease with the people and they with him; their common humanity mediated their love for one another.

In his life he radiated the 'gentleness and kindness of Christ' (2 Co. 10.1) to whom he listened deeply in daily prayer and whose way he reflected so faithfully in the three exiles of his missionary life. Like Jesus, Johnno was good news and he lives on in all of us.

The late Jack has written a number of religious booklets, which are published in Australia.

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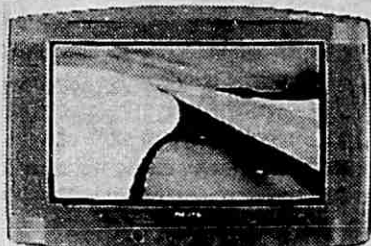
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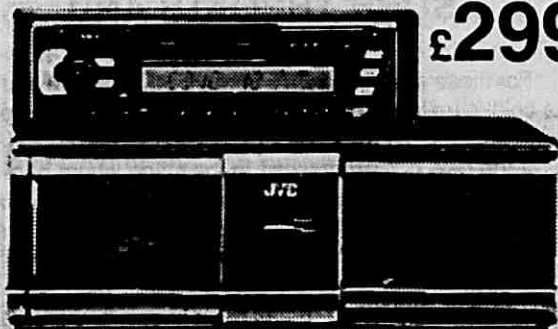

Authentic, Spicy And Never A Dhal Moment

THIS traditional Singhi dish will spice up any meal.

Ingredients:

Serves 4
200g yellow lentils
50g fresh ginger
6 tomatoes
2 stalks curry leaves
1/4 x 5ml sp turmeric
4 x 15ml sp ghee or butter
1 x 15ml so garam masala

Method:

Wash the lentils and, if necessary, soak (according

to instructions on the packaging). Give the ginger a whizz in the blender, then put the lentils, ginger, tomatoes, curry leaves, turmeric and a pinch of salt into a pan with enough water to cover.

Bring to the boil, then turn down the heat and simmer for 20 minutes or until the lentils are soft.

Remove from the heat, cool, remove curry leaves

and purée until smooth. Reserve until required. Just before serving, reheat the lentil purée gently until it starts to bubble. In a separate pan,

heat the ghee or butter. Sprinkle the garam masala on the dhal but do not stir. Pour the hot ghee or butter over the top and cover. Stir before serving.

HOMEMADE GARAM MASALA

If you're not using mango chutney, squeeze 1 x 15ml sp lemon juice over the garam masala when added to the dhal.

- 2 x 5ml sp cumin seeds
- 2 x 5ml sp coriander seeds
- 2 x 5ml sp black peppercorns
- 2 x 5ml sp ground turmeric
- 2 x 5ml sp dried mango powder (optional)

Grind the whole spices together, then mix with the ground spices. Sieve, then grind the residue and sieve again. Discard any residue remaining. Keep in an airtight jar for 6-8 weeks only.

Salad of pepper and artichoke

COLOURFUL and tasty – this pepper and artichoke salad is an excellent light lunch dish.

Ingredients:

Serves 10 with other dishes
4 red peppers
2 yellow peppers
290g jar artichoke hearts, in oil, drained and sliced, oil reserved
1 x 15ml sp fresh lemon juice
1 x 5ml sp wholegrain mustard
Salt and pepper
Crisp lettuce leaves, such as cos or Webbs, to serve.

Method:

Preheat the grill to high. Quarter the peppers and remove the seeds and stems. Place, skin-side up, on a grill pan and grill for five to

seven minutes until blackened all over, then remove them from the heat.

Transfer to a plastic bag for 10 minutes to cool. Pour the pepper juices into a bowl. Skin the peppers. Cut the flesh into strips and mix with the artichokes in a separate bowl. Add the lemon juice and mustard to the pepper juices, then gradually whisk in about five tablespoons of oil from the artichokes.

Season, toss with the salad and serve on a bed of lettuce leaves. **TIP:** This salad recipe can be made up to two days ahead, but ensure it is covered and stored in the refrigerator.

Transport in a rigid container (pack the lettuce separately).

BAKE YOUR OWN CHEESE WHIRLS

THESE cheesy whirl rolls are simple and yet effective as pre-appetiser bite-size snacks for your party guests or hassle-free hamper delights on a picnic.

Ingredients:

Makes 12
145g packet pizza base mix
75g mature Cheddar cheese, finely grated
2 x 15ml sp fresh snipped chives

Method:

Stir 130ml water into the pizza base mix. Cover the dough and leave for about 20 minutes until the ball has doubled in size. Knead the dough and then use a rolling pin to roll the dough into a thin 20x40cm rectangle.

Sprinkle the grated Cheddar cheese and the chopped chives over the rectangle to within about 2cm of the edges.

Roll up the rectangle along the longer edge into one long roll and then cut into 12 small rolls. Arrange the individual rolls in a buttered 16cm square tin.

Cover the tin with oiled clingfilm and leave the rolls to rise for around 30 minutes.

In this time, preheat the oven to 220°C/450°F/gas mark 7.

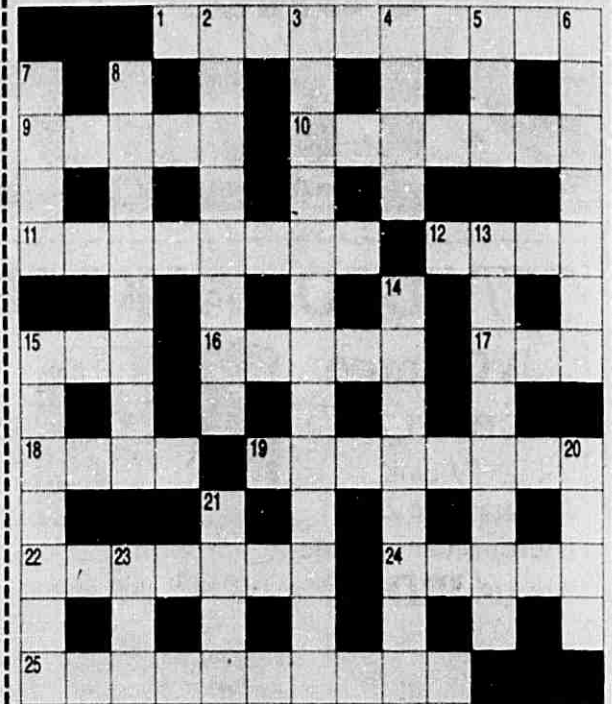
After the rolls have risen, bake them for 20 minutes or until the rolls are golden brown.

Serve your cheese whirl rolls while they are still warm.

Taxation On Car Owners

— OUTMODED AND UNFAIR SAYS SIMI

The SIMI is spearheading a car owners campaign designed to highlight the huge groundswell of popular opinion against excessive motor taxation and traffic congestion. This initiative culminated in a national Car Owners Protest Day last Thursday 28th October. According to Tom Murphy, President of the S.I.M.I. "We introduced a national day of protest as a climax to our campaign, where we encouraged car owners to complete leaflets or log onto the S.I.M.I. website to air their views on current car taxation levels, traffic planning and infrastructure".

The S.I.M.I. has committed itself to this initiative in order to make politicians aware of car owners views. Car owners are currently contributing IR £2.5 billion tax revenue to the Government and are subjected to transport policies that are unreasonably anti-car and seek to blame car owners for the inadequacies of investment in road and public transport infrastructures over the past 20 years. Motorists in fact contributed in excess of 14 per cent of all Government Revenue last year.

The classification of the car as a taxable luxury is inequitable given the necessity of such a vehicle for personal mobility.

Mr. Murphy added, "The society sees a number of problems facing car drivers today. Car owners are the customers of our industry, and as such, we feel compelled to support and give voice to their concerns. We

are delighted that car owners are utilising the facilities and expertise of our organisation and we will carry their views to Government in as strenuous and forthright a manner as possible".

Local Victim Support Branch Formally Launched

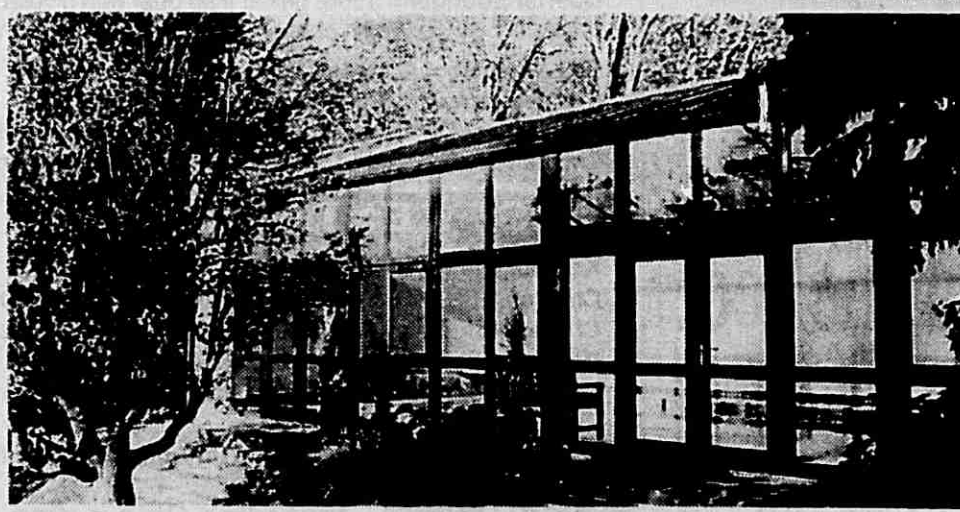

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Handy Guide To Proper Pruning

In natural environments, trees grow perfectly well without intervention from people. Over 350 million years, trees have evolved in to highly complex organisms. So why do we need to prune them?



Keep Them Healthy: Follow the pruning tips and give your trees some tender loving care.

Trees have developed effective mechanisms for dealing with injury. Under normal circumstances they are able to deal with any life-threatening problems. In nature, trees are the largest organisms and they are continuously under siege from the smallest organisms - fungal, bacterial or viral microbes. But the evolution of plant life did not account for human actions. When we prune, we wound. Incorrect pruning can have a severe effect on trees. To avoid unnecessary injury and maintain healthy trees, it is essential to prune properly. Done the right way, pruning is the most helpful thing you can do for your tree. The best time to prune living branches is late in the dormant season or very early in spring before leaves form. Dead and dying branches can be pruned at any time. Use sharp tools and make clean cuts. Be careful with all the tools you use - always think

of safety first! Research shows that dressing a wound on a tree by adding chemicals and other supposedly medicinal substances does not stop decay or rot. Trees respond effectively to their wounds without the aid of additional chemicals, so you don't need to interfere with this natural process. Keep your tree healthy and it will be able to take care of its wounds on its own. In a short time the wound surface will blend perfectly with the tree bark.

If your tree is wounded, remove the injured bark with a sharp knife. Try to make the cuts as shallow as possible. Make all the margins rounded, but do not enlarge the wound. Do not paint over the wound. Try to do everything possible to maintain the tree's health - water, fertilise and prune. If you need to fill in any cavities, don't clean them so thoroughly that the boundary between decayed wood and sound wood is broken. Fill the cavity with nonabra-

sive materials and leave it for the professionals. If you do plan to have any chemicals injected or implanted in your trees, make certain that it is done only by highly skilled professionals, otherwise it could harm your tree rather than improve it. Check the injection and implant holes after one season to make certain they are closed. Injection and implant holes should be very small and shallow at the tree base, not in the roots.

This Week In The Garden

COVER ALPINES WITH GLASS

Some alpine plants suffer in the winter months because of the excess water in the air. The water works its way into the leaves and makes them rot. To protect from rain, keep them covered by sheets of glass kept aloft with sticks or bent wire. Leave the sides of the shelter open as air circulation is essential.

DIG UP EARLY CHRYSANTHEMUMS

Border chrysanthemums are quite hardy during the winter, but they can rot and die. To avoid losing your collection take a couple of examples of each variety and pack them in a box with a little light soil. Cut off the stems five to eight cm above soil level and leave them in a greenhouse.

FINISH PLANTING TULIPS AND HYACINTHS

There is still time to plant your hyacinths and tulips. Hurry though, because they should have been planted in the last week of October.

GREENHOUSE EARLY BULBS

Take a close look at bulbs boxed/potted in September. A few developed plants can be brought forward into a moderately heated greenhouse. Heat to around 16 degrees during the day and let it fall to around 10 degrees at night. Once flower buds are well formed you can raise the temperature to around 21 degree centigrade. Before bringing them into the greenhouse, make sure the roots are well established. Uproot a few to have a look or examine the drainage holes at the base of the pots for signs of growth.

FORCE INDIAN AZALEAS

To get really early flowers on your Indian azaleas bring them into a slightly warmer environment. An average of 18 - 21 degree centigrade will do. Spray them every morning with lukewarm water. Other early flowering shrubs such as forsythias, ornamental cherries and even lilac can be brought into a greenhouse as long as the temperature gets no higher than 16 degrees.

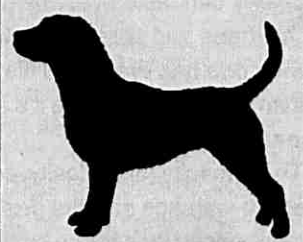

GROWING OLD

The Golden Years or Over the Hill?

The only requirement of this enhanced lifestyle is a commitment to live with focus and awareness which indeed is a good prescription for all of us. This requires the person to be fully engaged in the present and actively in touch with the past.

Occasionally I forget to put my watch on and I find myself desperately glancing at clocks or asking others for the time. How much more healthy it might be if one became more in tune with nature like the changing daylight or the pulse of the environment and rhythms and flow of life. Time talks out of both sides of its mouth because as it brings growth it also brings decline. No one can turn the clock back and time squandered in search of youth is

The tragedy of old age is that it has been made unnecessarily painful, humiliating and isolating through ignorance and insensitivity. Seniors with much wisdom and experience find themselves in a new identity crisis - I am what survives of me and like a Greek tragedy, in trying to preserve their integrity and identity they lose often lose it in a disinterested world.

Crises such as loss of physical health and the death of significant family members are a part of aging. Other crises like retirement and the feeling of decreasing social status place enormous stress on older peoples emotions leaving them emotionally drained. When problems emerge, prompt treatment is crucial in order to prevent full-blown functional disorders. Therapy is especially useful in old age as it helps seniors overcome fears and worries. I have found that at the core of many seniors' distress is an isolating loneliness, a feeling of being discarded.

One of the great esteem boosters we have as individuals is choice as choice supports self respect. When it is denied it promotes a helplessness and this is one of the major fears of seniors. The loss of choice cultivates anger, dependence and depression. The word senility is directed at many in a rather indiscriminate fashion but yet the word is not a medical diagnosis but rather a blank term for forgetfulness, a lack of concentration and emotional unresponsiveness. Some seniors may appear withdrawn and forgetful and are often labelled depressed but are really preoccupied with inner thoughts and reflections.

Memory

In the senior years the behaviour has not changed, just the perception of behaviour. Most memory problems are a product of the mindset you bring to them, how you take life in and organise it in your mind. Memory is like an oil painting. Each individual determines what personal history is stored or etched on the mind and most people remember what matters to them. Part of one's past is deciding what to leave out. Humans have several defence mechanisms to protect against overwhelming emo-

tional feelings, one of which is repression where painful feelings are pushed down into unawareness. The French have a saying when they forget something. Translated it states they have a hole in the memory. Forgetting and remembering are critical issues of aging because they trigger fear of dementia. Some seniors have told me they have become overly concerned when the mind forgets something and remembers other things more clearly. However, as people get old they expect more of themselves and often forget that throughout their life they were absent-minded.

Possibilities

No one knows whether they have already had the best years of their lives or whether the best is yet to come and its never too late to be what you might have been. The greatest of human possibilities remain to the end of life, the possibilities, for love, reconciliation and resolution. There is no way humans can avoid their ultimate destiny but they can taste everything in life and explore the many challenges and possibilities without a sense of limits. When one has lived a full life, a life with meaning, fear of death is diluted because it's not death we fear but rather a meaningless life.

The capacity for curiosity, creativity and change do not decline with age and the desire to change and grow can be enhanced by seniors by the realisation of life drawing to a close. For many seniors serenity and wisdom come from resolving personal conflicts and from having met the challenge of doing one's best.

An important issue in later years is knowing when to hand over the reins and give over power. Some hand over power too quickly whilst others cling to power long after they can no longer exercise it in their own interest or the interest of others. When seniors continue to deny their declining capacities and persist in 'running the show' they may destroy what they have built up over the years and bring themselves to a humiliating end. Other seniors sadly, are institutionalised and are deprived of their power without consent but seniors are capable of making their own decisions including the decision to let someone else decide for them. Sadly our culture holds that growth does not take place in the golden years. In the life cycle the child is available and ready for growth, seniors have experienced that growth and can reap its fruit. Until the very end of life there is the wonderful potential for the expansion of the personality and the good news is that this expansion does not require major physical strains. Seniors have much to offer in group relationships and can pursue friendships and interests with a new freedom. The expectation of life's end can dissolve a lifetime of shyness and expose the end as a meaningless preoccupation.

"With mirth and laughter let old wrinkles come." (Merchant of Venice).

Let us approach old age with humour and fearlessness.

Thomas Lonergan RIP - Tribute

It is indeed with a deep sense of sorrow that I learned last Sundayweek, of the death of Thomas Lonergan. Thomas was more affectionately known as the 'Tailor' as was his father before him. His shop not only catered to the tailoring needs of Cappoquin and the surrounding communities but also provided a forum for discussion and conversation on all GAA, sporting and political events

through the years. For returning immigrants a visit to the tailors shop was like a homecoming to get up to date on all the news as well as relive the history of Cappoquin and its people as recounted by Thomas and his brother Noel. Sharp minds and keen wit kept the conversations lively and humorous. Even though time and distance kept many immigrants away for long periods no trip home was

complete without several visits to the tailor's shop where generosity and caring were hallmarks of their business practices.

It seems in this life we are always saying farewell, always standing at the edge of losing another friend, reliving his memory and trying to get some meaning and something to cling to from it. Thomas lived with both feet on the ground. He showed interest and sym-

pathy in the everyday concerns of ordinary people. He was a humble man who loved people and delighted in a chance to befriend them, listen to them and try to ease their concerns. He loved life and he lived it without letting down his family, his church and his community. He now has left a fine personal heritage of loyal friends. He will be greatly missed in Cappoquin but the town will

never be entirely without him for his spirit is incorporated in the thought that death is but a short pause between the companionship of yesterday and the happy reunion of tomorrow.

He will be remembered for his uniqueness as Irish tradition dictates. We will remember his personality, his stories, his eloquence, his humour and the events of his life. That of course will be part of his

legacy. But now the curtain has fallen and his earthly life has come to a close.

Thomas now enjoys peace and happiness where there is no pain, only joy in the presence of Almighty God. So now I want to say 'Thank you Thomas dear friend. You have indeed touched many lives by our association with you'. Sincerely, Kevin Moloney, Lake San Marcos, California.

ACTION NEEDED ON FALLEN ANIMALS —EGAN

IFA National Animal Health Chairman Liam Egan has called on the Department of Agriculture to review current arrangements in relation to the disposal of dead animals. The call comes in the wake of reports that farmers in the West of Ireland are now being charged £60 for the removal of dead cows and £40 for younger animals.

Mr. Egan has described the situation as reaching crisis

point and has called on the Department of Agriculture to intervene to come up with a better system.

"I believe that it is now time for the State to ensure a fallen animal collection service which would be more cost effective and consistent. It is quite simply unacceptable that farmers should have to pay £60 to have an animal which he has lost taken away" he said.

In the interim period he believes that DVO's should grant burial licences on a more regular basis.

"It is unfair and unacceptable to introduce laws and regulations which farmers cannot comply with at a reasonable cost. Either the regulations must be changed or they must be made easier for the farmer to comply with".

Mr. Egan went on to point out that in some places collection services are not even

available and with burial certs only granted in exceptional circumstances, this matter is now proving a major headache for some farmers.

"It is bad enough for a farmer when he loses an animal without having suffer additional hardship and financial loss" he said.

Mr. Egan concluded by saying that IFA would be seeking a meeting with the Department of Agriculture to find a solution to the problem as a matter of urgency.

Farmers pay a disease levy, in order to fund a compensation scheme for farmers who are unfortunately hit by an outbreak of TB or Brucellosis in their herds. It is intolerable and unacceptable that even one farmer would fraudulently take money from this fund — this fund is needed and must be totally devoted for genuine cases only.

ICMSA Call for Immediate Processing of CFP/DHS Applications

Pat O'Rourke, Deputy President of ICMSA has called on the Minister for Agriculture and Food, Joe Walsh, T.D. to immediately put in place sufficient staff to ensure that all applications under the Control of Farmyard Pollution and Dairy Hygiene Schemes are processed without delay and that REPS payments are made within the commitments set down under the Charter of Rights.

As it stands, the Charter of Rights, Mr. O'Rourke said, is not being honoured by the Department of Agriculture and Food. Farmers are experiencing long delays in obtaining their REPS payments and farmers who wish to carry out pollution control works cannot do so because their application for a grant has not been

processed by the Department. This situation, Mr. O'Rourke said, is totally unacceptable to ICMSA. A Charter of Rights is in place but the Department are not meeting their commitments. If a farmer is late with an application, he/she is heavily penalised but yet there is no sanction on the Department.

Mr. O'Rourke said that the Minister must allocate sufficient staff to operate these schemes so that the Charter of Rights is fully honoured. It is ridiculous, Mr. O'Rourke said, that the same number of staff are dealing with these Schemes now as in 1994 when these Schemes were put in place. We now have 43,000 farmers in REPS, nearly 10,000 in the Early Retirement Scheme, but yet the same number of staff are operat-

ing the schemes. The Minister, Mr. O'Rourke concluded, must allocate additional staff immediately to ensure that farmers are treated fairly.

Milk Quotas Highlighted As a Factor In Ensuring Equity Within Farming

The manner in which milk quotas are distributed needs reviewing, in order to ensure equity in farming and to safeguard the agricultural viability of smaller and medium sized operators, according to a member of Waterford County Council.

Labour's Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair says methodologies can be devised to ensure that extra allocations of quotas can end up benefiting farmers who presently have in the region of fifteen to twenty thousand gallons of an annual milk quota, as opposed to further enriching those who have in excess of a hundred thousand gallons.

"If quotas and support mechanisms are to mean anything in Irish agriculture, if such policy is to actually result in people remaining in the industry, alleviate the present drain from the land and ease the financial and productive strain being placed on smaller and medium sized farmers, then an inclusive focus should be developed, he said."

Deasy Queries Minister Over Geography Exam Format

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy raised a question in the Dáil last month asking the Minister for Education if his attention was drawn to the fact that the format of this year's leaving certificate geography honours paper created difficulties for students. Deputy Deasy also asked if the Minister had the matter investigated.

The Minister for Education Micheal Martin replied that following the higher level geography exam in

June, concerns were expressed by some candidates, teachers and parents that the compulsory question 1 had been reduced from a three part to a two part question. There was also comment that in the regional geography section, which contained four questions of which candidates had to answer one, the candidates were asked to divide a country into regions using one of five given countries as an example rather than allowing them

to choose one country themselves from among the 14 countries stated in the syllabus.

As is normal in the case of comments received about an examination paper, the Minister stated that all concerns regarding this Geography paper were referred to the Chief Examiner who considered them and discussed them with the Advising Examiners before the marking scheme was finalised.

Welcome For Carer's Allowance Regulation Changes



Rule changes enabling people to avail of the Carer's Allowance have been welcomed by a Waterford County Councillor who is also pressing the Government for further reform on the issue in December's budget.

Whereas Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair is pleased that regulatory changes taking effect this month will lead to over 80 new recipients of the allowance throughout Co. Waterford, he says some of the most important work in society is being done by carers often with little reward and that this fact needs to be further recognised in the forthcoming budget and it's allocation of an almost £2 billion surplus.

"Widening the scope of the carer's allowance is an issue I'm

constantly coming across. I would encourage carers throughout the county - both those presently in receipt of the allowance and those who might now be entitled to it - to familiarise themselves with the changes. Up to now the allowance could only be paid to someone living in the same house as the person being cared for, so the relaxation of the residency condition is most welcome. A further improvement has been whereby the allowance can now be paid to carers of all people from 16 to 65 who require full time care and attention but who are not strictly family members. Carers can also avail of free telephone rental allowance, free travel in the company of their charge and a £200 annual payment for respite care.

£1.4 Million Job Investment For Carrick-On-Suir

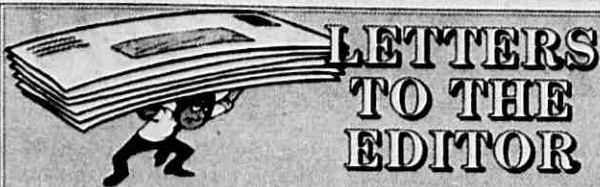
IDA Ireland has successfully concluded negotiations with a Taiwanese company, Chia Cherne Cable Company Ltd, to locate an operation in Carrick-On-Suir. The company will create 30 new jobs over the next three years in the production of cable and cable housings for use in bicycle brakes and gear changing applications. Three-quarters of the jobs will be at production level

and about 15% will be filled by graduates.

Chia Cherne Cable Company Ltd, a small family owned company specialising in a niche market of the worldwide bicycle industry, is investing £1.4 million, with the support of IDA Ireland, in establishing its European manufacturing facility in Carrick-On-Suir.

Chia Cherne is establishing the Irish operation in order to improve delivery times to its

European customers, and to provide additional capacity to enable it to increase its share of the growing European market. The company has started to carry out building modifications and to install new custom designed equipment at an existing 20,600 sq. ft. building in the town, which is ideally located to supply two of its principal customers in Ireland - Sram in Carrick-On-Suir and Trek in Carlow.

I was appalled last week to see a mother with a young child in a buggy splashed as a car drove through a puddle in O'Connell Street. It wasn't just a little splash, as it had been raining heavily for a while and there was quite a deep puddle, so you can image the "torrent" of water that splashed on this poor child in the buggy. The buggy didn't have one of those plastic covers, and the child only had a rain coat on. The child was so surprised when the cold water hit that it took a second before he got upset. Of course, the car just drove off not even realising what had happened.

It's not the first time that I've seen people splashed by cars driving quickly through puddles. It has happened to me a couple of times, with a particularly bad splashing a few weeks ago as I was walking down the quay to the library. A car drove up the quay, straight through a big puddle and I was drenched. As you can imagine, it's not even clean water, but very muddy so my legs were covered in dirty, brown spots and my coat was sodden. I was none too pleased! HEPATITIS C COMPENSATION TRIBUNAL

1. The Tribunal is currently dealing with applications from:

- (a) persons who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C resulting from the use of Human Immunoglobulin Anti-D within the State.
- (b) persons who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C as a result of receiving a blood transfusion or blood product within the State.
- (c) children or spouses of persons referred to in (a) or (b), who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C.
- (d) diagnosed relatives (i.e. parents, brothers, or sisters whether of the whole blood, the half blood or by affinity of persons referred to at (a) and (b) above.
- (e) persons responsible for the care of any of the persons referred to in (a), (b) (c) and (d) and who have incurred financial loss or expenses as a direct result of providing such care arising from the person being cared for having contracted Hepatitis C.
- (f) where persons referred to in (a), (b), (c) or (d) have died as a result of having contracted Hepatitis C or where Hepatitis C was a significant contributory factor to the cause of death, dependants of such persons.

Persons described at (a), (b), (c), (d), (e) and (f) above may make application for compensation on the prescribed form, which may be obtained from:

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEETS WITH COUNTY MANAGER

On Wednesday last, representatives of the Chamber of Commerce met with County Manager Donal Connolly to discuss issues pertinent to the Business Community and local Community at large.

Within the coming weeks a new car park will be made available to the public in the O'Connell street area which should relieve some of the congestion visible in the town centre. Chamber President Mario Flavin stressed that it was imperative that the car park was accessible as soon as possible with the advent of the Festive Season and the increase in trade associated with this period.

The development of the old AWG site was also discussed and the Chamber expects to view the plans proposed by developer Clancy Construction Ltd.

The Chamber also noted that it was pleased to see that re-surfacing work had begun on the quay-front starting at King John's Castle as far as the Moorings.

The Chamber is currently responsible for the erection of the Christmas lights and while Council support is received in the form of a subvention, the Lights are draining the Chamber of it's resources. It was agreed that the Chamber would be responsible for the erection of the Lights for 1999. County Manager outlined that with the imminent loss in revenue from rates of the Glanbia site, the Council was not currently in a position to take full responsibility for their erection.

ACCOMMODATION URGENTLY REQUIRED

The Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform is seeking to compile a list of suitable accommodation which could be used to accommodate asylum seekers.

Owners of hotels, guest houses, bed and breakfast premises and persons with apartments or other self catering accommodation for letting should write/fax the officer named below.

The details provided should include:

- nature of accommodation (i.e. whether bed and breakfast, hostel, full or partial board, private rented, self-catering, etc.)
- capacity of the accommodation
- the terms on which it is being offered including the period for which it is available.

Persons offering accommodation are reminded that under the Fire Services Act, 1981 persons having control over premises have a duty of care to take appropriate measures to guard against the outbreak of fire. In this regard the owner should state in writing that the premises meets appropriate fire precautions, including the installation of fire detection systems and be in a position to provide evidence of this on request.

Asylum seekers will be allocated to such accommodation in co-operation with the local authorities and Health Boards.

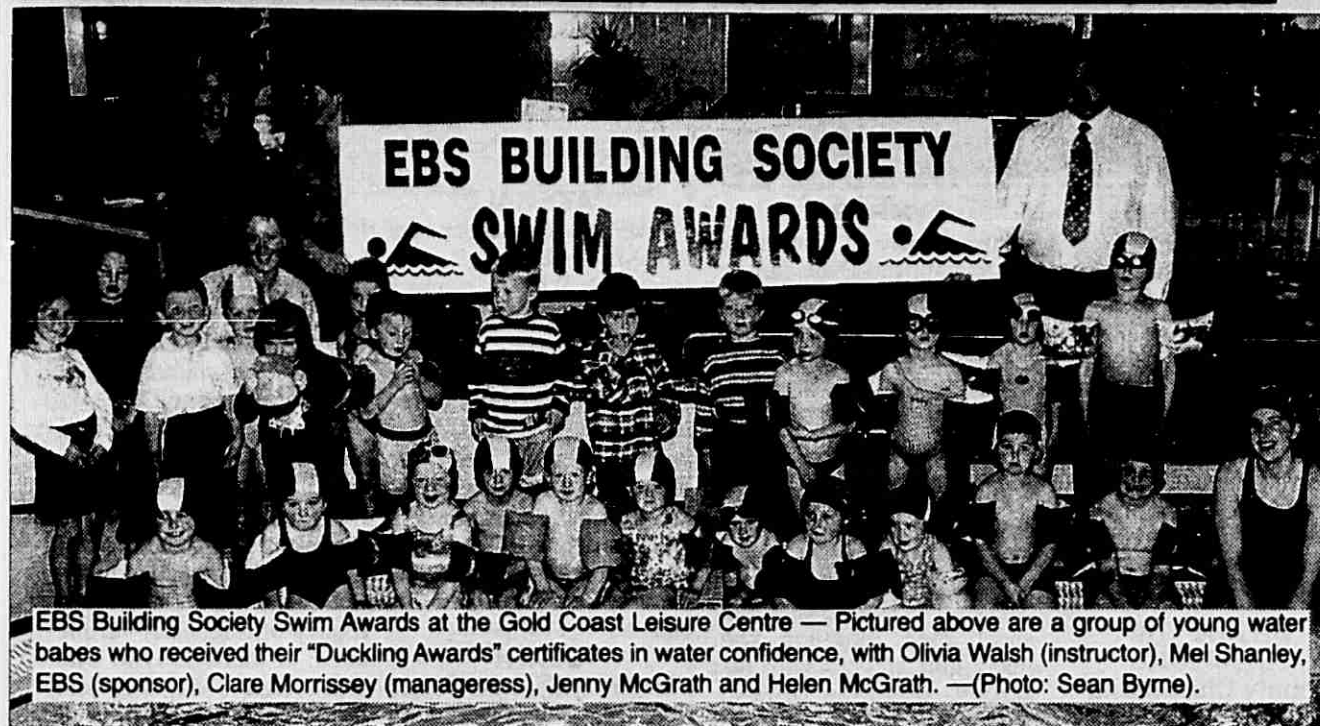

MAMMOTH

The discovery of the remains of a Mammoth in Russia recently reminds us that in our Archive in Abbeyside we do have a slight connection to the event. No, we don't have an actual Mammoth (as you know our space is limited). What we have is a six page document entitled 'Notice of the Occurrence of Mammoth and other animal remains discovered under limestone in a Cone cave at Shandon, near Dungarvan in the County of Waterford by Edward Brennan. Esq.

Dublin printed at the University press by M. R. Gill 1859. (Read at the extra meeting of the Royal Dublin Society, held on the event of the 22nd June 1859 - Rev. Joseph A. Gabraith, M.A. F.T.C.D., Erasmus Smith's Professor of Natural and Experimental Philosophy in the University of Dublin in the Chair - and reprinted from the "Natural History Review" for October 1859).

THOMAS LONERGAN - AN APPRECIATION

The unexpected death of Thomas Lonergan has left the people of Cappoquin and surrounding areas very sad. Thomas and his brother Noel were pillars of the community, and gave an extra dimension to a town which was attempting to cope with all the changes of the present era. Their tailors shop was a little island of tranquillity, an oasis where all were welcome-wide ranging discussions, political debates, crosswords but never a cross word, were interspersed with asides about how a particular garment might be altered, to fit more snugly the bulimic, anorexic, the binger, or reckless shopper. Feats of tailoring undreamt of, even in the haute couture centres of Paris and London were achieved without the blink of an eye. The tailors clientele ranged from the expensive all the way down to the hand me downs, they were entrusted with the most classical of clothes in their time and all these customers were treated with the same gentle respect and effort. One person who had extensive alterations to a Rocha garment, could not distinguish the recent stitching from the original Painstaking, time consuming, mind bending work, done cheerfully for a nominal pecuniary stipend.

Then the hurleys had to be fixed or banded. Carpentry-Joinery miracles were the result. They developed new techniques, new gadgets to perform their wizardry. Through the decades they kept many a marginal hurler out there swinging. The mister fix-its of Cappoquin GAA unheralded, unsung, but warmly remembered by generations of young fellows many of whom no longer grace any playing fields. Their reward was to see faces aglow with the heat of battie, skills developed, talent honed. Athletic ability of any quality was given to be used. Down through the years the shop was the nerve centre of the Cappoquin GAA. The Tailors' window, before the age of mass communication, televisions and most radios, was our billboard, the harbinger of a weekend challenge. Teams gathered there before away matches, and for weeks afterwards preened themselves by reliving past glories in the shop, or recounting the misery of so many missed chances. Outlandish claims about ones own contribution in a match were accepted at face value, unless an abrasive customer/visitor returned us to reality. "You were no good".

Their beekeeping exploits were extensive and remarkable. This brought within their ambit another very different coterie, in which the sporting gene might well have been totally extinct. Michael Moynihan of Dungarvan baptised them into this profession and he had terrific pride in his acolytes' achievements. Cult like they went about their business, very early in the morning or late at night, this hive of industry was a joy to watch. Again they used the best machinery, streamlined the process and became experts. They in turn helped many budding beekeepers, and the camaraderie generated here made failed or non beekeepers envious.

Behind all of this they had their family and private lives. Their interests ranged far and wide across the human spectrum. They had definite views on politics, coming from a proud tradition. They read widely, and loved nothing better than to chat on the qualities of different writers, artists or film directors. Cryptic crosswords were easy meat. The shop itself was a focal point for the town. All the visitors to the town who had any links with previous generations, ended up there and were ably assisted to rediscover their roots. They were very interested in such happenings, and most recently received notable mention in Anthony Breen's book about the rebellion in Cappoquin 1849. Old photos of the town and earlier inhabitants frequently surfaced, and extensive efforts were made in the shop to identify the silent faces. A Heritage cum Community Centre was emerging. The entertainment was for free, and we appreciated it. Yarns, good ones would make the rounds. Laughter made the rafters ring. Characters were two a penny.

Thomas and Noel loved the game of hurling. Thomas excelled at the game and was one of the best hurling forwards in the county when Cappoquin itself was a great hurling town. He represented Waterford up into the mid-fifties and possessed all the skills in the arsenal of a great hurler. His love of the game stayed with him through his life. In spite of his Tipperary roots, he was a loyal Waterford supporter. The presence of huge numbers of hurling men at his removal and burial gave testament to this reality.

Thomas' death leaves us all so much poorer. We were shocked at the news of his sudden illness. We offer Rose and Noel our heart felt sympathy. We are finding it difficult to come to terms - how must it be for them? Ar dheis Dé go raibh ananam. Ní bheidh a leithéid arís ann.

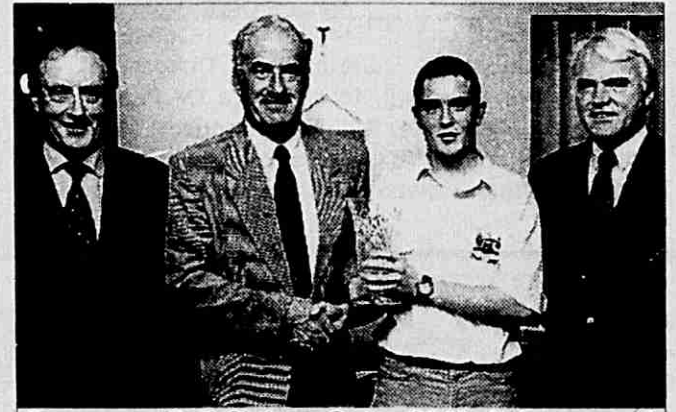

CLONMEL REPORT - MONDAY, NOVEMBER 1ST

Despite the inclement weather in the morning a large attendance came to Powerstown Park, Clonmel for the first of two fixtures this week at the County Tipperary venue. The feature event on Aer Rianta day was the Captain Christy Beginners Steeplechase. This was a grief stricken affair but the John Power owned Clash of the Gales (Strong Gale - Glen of Hawthorn) put in an excellent round of jumping for Dungarvan amateur P.J. Crowley obliging at odds of 10/1. The seven year old Clash Of The Gales

went to the front at the third last and although the favourite Lyreen Wonder and Super Franky crashed out at the always difficult second last fence Clash Of The Gales was still in command and most observers feel that she would still have won anyway. It must go on record that this victory by Clash Of The Gales marked a great training achievement by trainer Garret Ducey who trains near Ardmore in County Waterford. The winner hasn't been seen in action for nearly a year but was produced spot on for this event. On a sadder note Co. Kilkenny trainer Eamon Sheehy lost his good servant Blackburn who shattered a leg when bang in contention at the third last fence.

Elsewhere on the card Kevin Manning picked up a two day ban for failing to ride out the very disappointing odds on favourite French Style for third place behind 5/1 shot Sesame Heights who got the full treatment from Pat Smullen before seeing off the challenge of the front running Mighty Term.

Charlie Swan who nowadays only rides over hurdles took a horrible fall in a maiden hurdle from Pately when brought down by the always prominent Aleapone. Happily Charlie rose to his feet as did Shane McCann none the worse for their tumble. For an outsider Aleapone ran a nice race here, this son of Roselier should pay his way over the Winter months. The easy winner here was the 5/4 favourite Ellenjay who ran right away in the closing stages for Conor O'Dwyer to beat Gypsy Melody.

The final race of the day a thirteen runner affair produced a thrilling finish. Carrigeen Lily should really have won striking the front inside the final furlong for her lady rider but the Robbie Walsh ridden and Paddy Mullins trained Yas A Tina 3/1 came with a renewed challenge to short head the often placed Carrigeen Lily. This was yet another pleasing training performance as the winner had been off the track since last February

Racing concluded with a victory for the Tom Kent owned Karakam (Rainbow Quest - Karaleya) this 4/1 shot being guided to a cosy victory by Philip Fenton. Karakam is now a six year old, he too having suffered his fair share of injuries. He is trained by the winning owners daughter Aoife who trains a small string, three miles outside Waterford City on the Kilkenny side.

It was nice to be Le Coudray return to winning ways over two and a half miles at Navan last Saturday. Considered an unlucky loser at Cheltenham last March being forced to come wide into the straight Le Coudray (Phantom Breeze - Mos-Lie) the red hot 1/2 favourite easily accounted for Limestone Lad by three lengths. Still only a five year old Le Coudray will stick to jumping hurdles for the foreseeable future and he is sure to plunder plenty of valuable prizes throughout the coming season.

PUNCESTOWN UPDATE

After a number of good efforts over the larger obstacles Michael O'Connors Feathered Leader (Supreme Leader - Here She Comes) justified 1/2 favouritism in the £20,000 Irish Field Novice Chase with consummate ease for jockey Conor O'Dwyer. A runner up in the Irish National earlier this year Feathered Leader appears to have matured mentally as well as physically and the seven year old is a fine prospect for the upcoming National Hunt Season.

Lismore jockey Ken Whelan enjoyed an armchair ride aboard Sean Connerys highly consistent Risk Of Thunder, this 1/3 favourite simply toying with the opposition cruising to a distance victory in the three and a half mile cross country Kevin McManus Punchestown Cup. Waterford hope Trip To Dicks despite losing ground over the banks ran a creditable race to finish fifth. Risk Of Thunders next outing is likely to be the Sporting Index Chase at Cheltenham.

HARTY APPETITE FOR WINNING



The following appeared in the recent issue of Irish Runner.

On the first Sunday of September, young William Harty capped what was by any standards an extraordinary summer of racing by convincingly winning, for the second consecutive year, the Community Games Mini Marathon. What's more, he is eligible again next year.

The previous Friday evening he was crowned victor of the Summer Series organised by his own club, West Waterford, having wrapped up the title long before the ten race league concluded. He also won the four-race Ballycotton Series, although here it came down to the last night, when he turned a one-second deficit into a 24 second advantage over James McGee.

The prodigious 16 year old ran over 20 open races since mid April ranging from 5k to 7 miles. He won eight, placed 2nd or 3rd in eight others. His lowest place was 7th in the Clonmel 10k back in May.

In June this talented and most unassuming youngster was named the Park Hotel Waterford Sports Star of the month, joining a select group that includes Susan Smith and John Treacy.

TERRY FOX RUN HELP SUPPORT CANCER RESEARCH

Terry Fox, a young Canadian who had his leg amputated because of cancer died in 1981, during his famous attempt to run across Canada to raise funds for cancer research. Today annual runs are held across fifty eight countries worldwide making The Terry Fox Run the world's single biggest fund raising event for cancer research. The Irish Cancer Society, the major fund raiser of cancer research in Ireland introduced the run in this country in 1993 and to date has raised over 3/4 million pounds for Irish cancer projects.

MARATHON OF HOPE
Before Terry started his marathon of hope on April 12th 1980 in St. John's Newfoundland he had run over 3,000 miles in training. After dipping his foot in the Atlantic ocean Terry started on a journey that would take him on a journey through six provinces, for the next 143 days he ran an average of 26 miles "THE FULL MARATHON DISTANCE". A day before he had to stop outside Thunder Bay Ontario on September 1st 1980. Cancer had spread to his lungs long before that day. Terry had captured the hearts and imagination of the nation, he had become a Canadian hero.

Terry Fox died one month before his 23rd birthday. He left us with a legacy

of hope that continues to inspire us and so many today.

Championship Draws

The draw for the provincial championships, which was to have been made on television on Sunday night last, was deferred for two weeks because of problems related to the fact that three of the councils had acted in the expectation that Central Council approval would be given for a Losers Group or a Round Robin system.

The Central Council, having examined a motion passed at the last annual Congress declared that a Losers Group was not permissible, but a Round Robin system is acceptable. The problem as far as Munster Council is concerned is that they will now have to cancel their arrangements for a Losers Group idea and they cannot now substitute the Round Robin system as proposed by Waterford because that proposition was defeated in favour of the one which they accepted.

It all sounds a bit complicated, but all it all means is that the Munster football championships for 2000 will be run on an open draw knock out system..

In the new system for the Leinster hurling championship and where Kilkenny are seeded, it is possible for a county, like Offaly to be beaten in the first round and come back into the championship, reach the Leinster final and if beaten here, they qualify for the All Ireland quarter final. The thing to note about this is that Offaly were one of the counties who bitterly opposed the 'back-door' system..

Revamped Accident
Scheme

Central Council gave approval to a new Accident Insurance Scheme proposed by the Insurance Work Group at their meeting in Croke Park on Saturday last.

The new scheme which will come into operation on February 1st next year, will see most of the benefits increased by over 100% and all the capital benefits will be doubled. What is most important about the scheme is that dental and medical expenses have been increased, more or less in line with modern day costs. The painful side of the scheme is that the premiums to clubs will increase from £120. per team to £230 per team (including under-21 teams) and £90 per team for underage teams.

At the recent meeting of the Waterford County Board, delegates voted unanimously to oppose the scheme because of the cost factor. All the other counties were in favour of its acceptance.

In line with the above there is a player personal accident scheme and for which similar benefits will apply. The cost per player is £20 and this has been described as a 'giveaway'. When it comes into force on February 1st it will mean that an injured player (no benefits in the first seven days) will receive his personal insurance and the same insurance from the club premium.

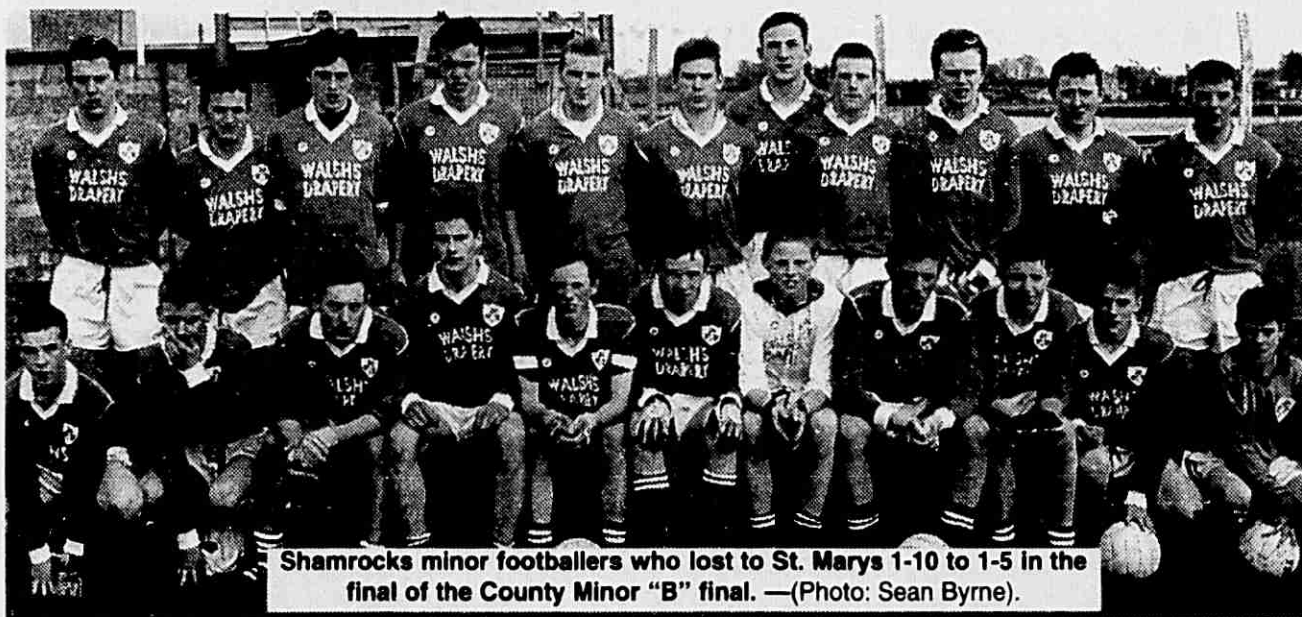

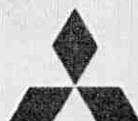
SYMPATHY
