More Furore As Cllrs Divided Over Guidelines For U.D.C. Meetings

"Labour-led majority moves to silence critics in UDC". So reads the catchy heading of a press release issued earlier this week by Dungarvan Urban Council members John Deasy and Damien Geoghegan.

Proverbial sparks are set to fly at next Monday's meeting of the Urban Council when members will try to come to some form of agreement on how their monthly business should be formalised.

Again it's a case of newcomers - Fine Gael's Deasy & Geoghegan together with Labour's Teresa Wright - versus the remaining six UDC members. The new Council has been plagued by heated exchanges and verbal altercations since its first meeting last summer. It was hoped that through the introduction of guidelines (standing orders), agreed upon by all nine members, meetings could be held in

an orderly fashion.

However this latest conflict has been fuelled by these same procedural draft guidelines that have been put forward by Labour members Billy Kyne, Paddy Power and Lar Hart, together with Fianna Fail's Nuala Ryan and Independent members Michael O'Riordan and Damien Dillon. The draft rules will be presented to members for discussion at next week's meeting.

The controversial guidelines however have been rejected out of hand by Cllr. Wright and the two Fine Gael members Deasy and Geoghegan who, incidentally, were all absent from

the recent meeting where the standing orders were decided upon.

They claim that the draft guidelines will prevent reasonable debate at UDC meetings, reduce transparency and limit the pub-

lic's say in the operation of the town's Council.

Search For Landfill Extends To West Waterford

Considerable surprise and speculation has been expressed at the announcement this week that the search for a 200 acre landfill site will now be extended to cover areas in West Waterford.

Due to the need for the landfill to be located close to Waterford city, the western end of the County did not originally figure in the search.

However only nine remaining sites can be considered in East Waterford, all of which could eventually prove to be unsuitable.

County Council consultants John Barry & Partners Ltd. believe it is possible that areas in West Waterford will be more geologically suitable for use as a landfill.

Speaking at this week's meeting of Waterford County Council, Brendan

Fehily of John Barry & Partners recommended that a second level screening be carried out in the West Waterford area and a number of sites be shortlisted. He expected to come back to the County Council with a report on the revised countywide situation in 3 months time.

Potential sites for the landfill will be arrived at through the process of elim-

ination involving such factors as population density, land use, geology, scenic value, proximity to water supply, coastline etc.

"NO COMPELLING REASON"

Giving his reaction to the extension of the landfill search to West Waterford, Cllr. Billy Kyne said the Council has already gone through the process and continued on page 37

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ANSWER: A special Pro-Rata Old Age Contributory Pension will be introduced in October, 1999 for self-employed contributors who were over the age of 56 when social insurance was introduced for the self employed and therefore did not qualify for a contributory pension. You may qualify for this pension if you were aged 56 or over on 6th April, 1988 (ie born on or before 6th April, 1932). You must also have started paying PRSI contributions as a self-employed person on or after 6th April, 1988 and have 260 paid contributions since 6th April, 1988.

The pension will become effective from 9th April, 1999 but it is expected that there will be a delay in payments due to a heavy administrative effort involved in processing the claims involved. However, arrears due will be backdated to 9th April, 1999 (arrears will only be paid to those who apply for a Pro-Rata Old Age Contributory Pension for self employed before the 9th April, 2000).

Applications should be made by completing an Old Age Contributory Pension Claim form (RP/CP1) which is available from local social welfare offices or from post offices nationwide.

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Dr. Denis Meany

1834-1892 - CLONEA

CONTINUED FROM OCT. 29

The concluding episode of the life and times of Dr. Denis Meany, who died April 2, 1892, compiled from the diaries of Dr. Meany by Eddie Cantwell, Sea Park, Abbeyside

Another bone of contention with the good Doctor throughout his stay on the Islands was the drinking habits of the Indians. In his Journals he constantly berates them for their abuse of a "Home Brew" which they called Quash. Some of his entries relating to their abuse of the "Quash" are quite humorous. On one occasion a new President was about to take his seat in the Whitehouse, the Man in Question would probably have been Rutherford B. Hayes. Dr Meany writes, "The Aleutes up here, they keep talking about the new President, they think little of him for the reason that he did not give them a couple of barrels of Whiskey or some Brandy to drink and get drunk". On the 17th March he rather amusingly notes, "The poor Aleutes up here say that St. Patrick was as good a man as the 4th of July, that is if they got a drink of liquor". Earlier entries declare "The Aleutes make a home brew called Quash, this is made in great quantities apparently, and of course drank with relish" and "A great many Natives drunk and several fights and cuts", referring to one incident in which he seems to blame the abuse of the drink being responsible for the death of a prematurely born child. "The parents of the child are much given to drinking this vile stuff they call Quash". Many more entries are made in his Journals relating to the abuse of and overindulgence of the home made brew.

As time progressed Denis would come to a better understanding of these indigenous people. His initial judgment of them would, towards the end be reversed and writing in his Diary during 1876 with some compassion he records "The Aleute is not an altogether destitute of gratitude, they appreciate good done to them, kindness in instructing them. They don't forget we white people (Americans) frequently say to one another "There is no gratitude in their people". I have said so myself but I think I have wronged them, the fault perhaps was mine, I did not understand them properly".

Denis spent a very harsh five years on the Islands, the oldest living Aleute on the Island of St. Paul said that it was the harshest in his living memory. The Doctors task was by no means an easy one, apart from being the Islands Medical Officer he was also Agent for the Alaska Fur Company, writing as early as August 1873 he says "Was left alone on the Island of St. George, with a steward and cook and an Officer on the part of the Government". At that time of writing he had just shipped out 68,000 Seal furs for San Francisco. Denis was also appointed Commissioner for the United States Government, by this time his salary had increased to \$100. Nevertheless his writings of 1856/7 betray his feelings of loneliness and longing for home, he was towards the end of his stay suffering quite bad with a hip pain and on occasion confined to his bed for up to a week at a time. Several entries in his journal of 1876 bemoans the late arrival of the Steamer which would carry his mail from home, each entry would close with the words "Good night Frank". It took me some time to discover that Frank was in fact his sister, Ellen Francis who was a Nun at Lismore Convent.

Dr. Denis Meany became adept in the art of survival, he became a keen hunter and actually made his own clothing from Seal and Fox skins. In fact he was busy engaged during his last few Months on the Island making two coats. "I am now at work making a fur skin over coat for self of dark skins and when finished I'll make another of light skins. It takes 43 skins to make". He goes on to say, "It's a big job, I'd rather do it myself than pay a woman \$10 for making one, so she'd expect \$20 for the two.

During the final six weeks of his exile, the Island was completely surrounded by a sea of solid ice, he states "There's not a single blade of grass to be seen, on St Patrick's Day 1877 he declares "Please God I'll be in ould Ireland this time next year, I want a change, ice all around the Island only a little open water, I treated our boys to some congress water (Whiskey) today, they drank to holy St. Patrick.

On Monday 14th May, the steamer finally arrived to return Dr. Meany to the mainland.

An interesting aspect of Denis's stay in San Francisco was the people that he visited while he remained there. I include some extracts here because of their relevance and content, which may be of interest to some local people, and perhaps there are some relatives of the people mentioned still living in the Dungarvan area.

Hannigan Michael. "I called to see Michael Hannigan of Dungarvan, Tom's son, he is in a splendid way, he has \$100 a month, he is without exception one of the smartest young men I ever came across. He has a brother out here in another dry goods store or shop doing well. Before they got those good places they both worked in Limestone quarries for two and a half dollars a day, but now they are independent to any man".

The Thomas Hannigan he refers to here is probably Thomas who had shops on the main street.

Landers, David and Pat. "I called to see David Landers, who was at Ms Odham's some years ago, he is out here doing well in a cloth shop, his brother Pat is in the hardware line, he was formerly with Keatings of Dungarvan. They command great respect.

I believe that the Landers that he refers to here are most likely the Carrigroe Landers, and David may have shared his business interests with a partner named Byme.

O'Brien Bob; Bob O' Brien of Dungarvan is gone up the Country and taken a large tract of land with nearly 2,000 horses. If they don't get killed by the Indians or the minors they should do well.

Connell; There is a son of Mrs. Connell's of Cappoquin here in a liquor store, well I'll see him tomorrow.

Other people he mentions as having visited are; Father O' Gorman of Abbeyside, Fr. Prendergast who as with him at Melleray, from near Ballylooby, Fr. William Walsh, Philadelphia, went to see Fr. Walsh of Dungarvan, remained a day and one night with him.

Fr. John Kiely; "Crossed over to Brooklyn to Fr. J. Kiely, here I remained for my stay in New York. I had a Cead Mile Fáilte from the noble hearted and Dungarvan Sagarth, who spared not himself or his carriage to show me around.

O' Brien Anne of Fruit Hill who was an aunt Kate married in Canada.

Dr. Meany eventually returned to his native Clonea where he purchased a farm, and married Maria Barry. He did not however, become a gentleman farmer, he took a keen interest in the welfare of the poor in the community, served on the board of guardians, and worked at the dispensary in Dungarvan. In 1883 he was appointed to a special committee to deal with the acquisition of suitable sites for the erection of labourers cottages in the Dungarvan and Ballinacourty area. He worked up until the time of his illness and passed away five days later on April 2nd 1892.

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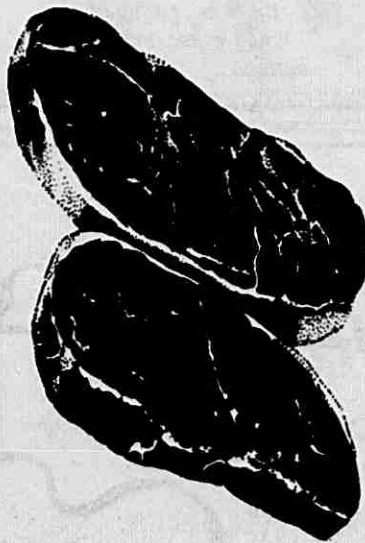
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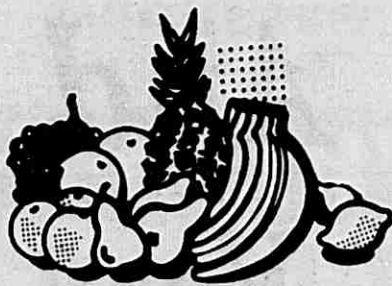


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THE SOLAR SYSTEM

You are living on one of nine planets that together with their moons, the Sun, and millions of chunks of rock and ice, make up what is known as the Solar System.

The chunks of rock and ice are called comets, asteroids and meteoroids.

Comets have been described as 'dirty snowballs,' which is accurate, except that they are probably made of rock at the centre.

There are millions of asteroids, the largest of which is about 1,000 kilometres in diameter.

Meteoroids are small pieces of debris left over from the formation of the Solar System some 4,500 million years ago.

Every day, tonnes of meteoroids enter

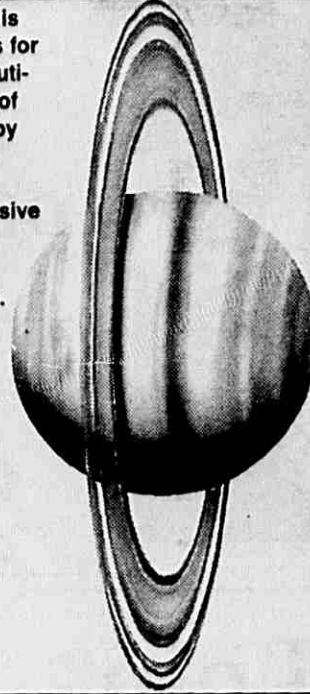
the Earth's atmosphere at high speed. Friction with the air heats the meteorites to white hot, and most vapourise completely in an eye-catching display known as a meteor, or shooting star.

The sun sits at the centre of the Solar System. The other objects, including our own planet, Earth, move around the Sun in paths called orbits.



Earth is the only planet we know to have life. Its atmosphere is rich in oxygen, and there is plenty of liquid water on its surface.

Saturn is famous for its beautiful set of rings, by far the most impressive in the solar system.



ORBITS

The closer a planet is to the Sun, the less time it takes to complete each orbit. So, while the Earth takes one year, Venus, which is closer to the Sun, takes less than five months.

Orbits are shaped like slightly flattened circles called ellipses. All the bodies of the Solar System are held in orbit around the Sun by the force of gravity.

Gravitational attraction between the Sun and the Earth is what stops the Earth moving off in a straight line, out of the Solar System.

Just as the Earth orbits the Sun, the Moon orbits the Earth, and there are moons orbiting most of the other planets.

KEY FACTS

- The Earth spins around once every 24 hours.
- The Earth takes one year to orbit the Sun.
- The Moon takes onemonth to orbit the Earth

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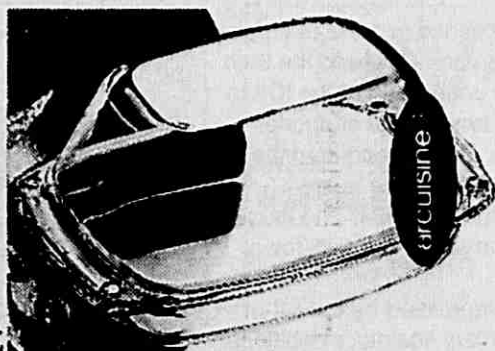
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Local Primary School GAA Wins Major Award

Special Education In West Waterford

The A.G.M of St. John's Association for Children with Special Educational Needs was held recently in Dungarvan. The meeting, at St. John's Special School, was told of the continuing success of the school.

Catering mainly for pupils of second-level age, the school is now preparing pupils for exams, especially the National Council for Vocational Awards (N.C.V.A) Cert which isss is matched to individual ability and needs.

Much work is done in literacy and numeracy, along with many other subjects from the Primary and Secondary Curriculum. With the support of part-time teachers and many ancillary staff, the pupils and their parents find that there is, at St. John's, something to suit everybody.

Apart from working at classroom subjects, both theory and practical, the pupils engage in a range of sports, including swimming, athletics and football.

Having travelled to school by special buses, from Youghal and locations throughout West Waterford, the pupils learn in a relaxed atmosphere where special needs are addressed in a positive way. And, once pupils reach sixteen they engage in work experience for three-week block periods. These valuable placements, six times during the final two years at school, ease the transition from school to work.

At the A.G.M. votes of sympathy were passed to teachers Sheila Curran and Helen Forde on recent family bereavements. The Chairman, Michael Power, spoke of the hard work of all concerned with the school, and committed the association to grant aiding the school as generously as before.

Michael also spoke of William Harty, a St. John's pupil who participated in athletics alongside secondary school pupils throughout Ireland. He congratulated William on representing Ireland both on the track and in crosscountry.

Paul Clerkin, Hon. Treasurer spoke of the association's healthy bank balance, which led to a discussion on the annual church gate collection which now includes Youghal. It was felt that the collection is important, particularly as many in the community appreciate the opportunity to support such a worthy cause as Special Education.

In his address to the meeting the school principal, Noel Brennan, spoke of the changing nature of special education. He referred particularly to the fact that St. John's School now enrolls more teenage pupils than previously. He spoke of close links with other schools in the area, involvement with special schools throughout Munster, and the importance of happy pupils with high self-esteem. He concluded by saying that parents are always welcome to visit St. John's, without commitment, to sample for themselves the warm, affectionate and industrious atmosphere.

Council members visited these sites to see how they are laid out and run. The homes will be able to accommodate two in comfort. Such a scheme will maintain and enrich the village and help to maintain rural Ireland. No longer will people be forced from their community.

This proposed development is a continuation of the work that the Council is

already doing for the elderly community of the parish and surrounding area. Already the Community care sub-committee of the Community Council look after some of the needs of the elderly. There is the annual Christmas dinner and the summer 4 day trip and the autumn 1 day trip. These events are always fully booked and eagerly awaited.

Last year householders were issued with alarm systems to make them feel safer in their house. These alarms work on a pendant basis and the holders may contact a circle of neighbours just by pressing the pendant if they require assistance.

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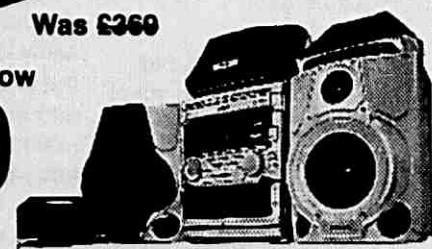
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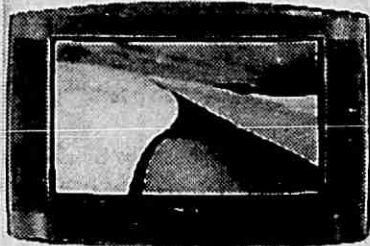
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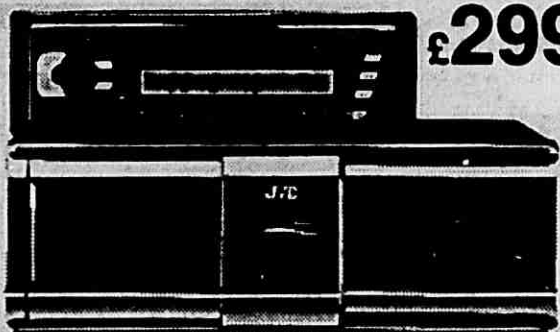

Cookery Corner



Pork Pot with Fennel, Garlic and Tomatoes

POT roast of pork with fennel, garlic and tomatoes.

Ingredients:

Serves 4

1.5kg boned, rolled and tied loin of pork, rind intact
Salt and pepper
2-3 x 15ml sp dripping
2 x 15ml sp Pernod
100ml white wine
2 large bulbs fennel, quartered
12 medium tomatoes, halved
16-plus cloves garlic, unpeeled and bruised with back of knife
2-3 bay leaves
1 or 2 sprigs thyme
Sprinkle fennel seeds
3-4 pieces lemon peel, no pith
Juice of 1 lemon

Method:

Put a cast-iron pot over a flame to become hot and preheat the oven to

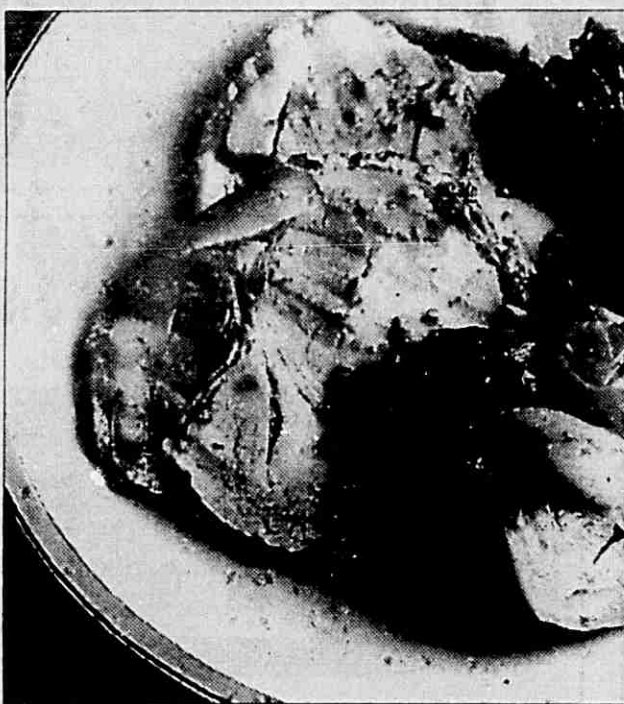
300°F/150°C/gas mark 2. Rub the pork all over with a little fat or oil. Add the dripping to the hot-pot, allow to smoke slightly and put in the pork loin. Turn and burn the meat for several minutes until the skin turns gold. Lift on to a plate.

Tip off most of the fat and discard, pour in the Pernod and wine. Allow to bubble together, using a whisk to pick up the brown bits at the bottom of the pot. Return pork to the pot and tuck the fennel, tomatoes, garlic, bay and thyme sprigs around it. Spoon over some of the meat juices, and sprinkle with fennel seed. Put pieces of lemon peel among the vegetables and squeeze lemon juice over everything.

Bring the pot up to a mod-

erate heat, put on the lid and place in the oven. Cook for 2-2 1/2 hours, turning the meat once during this time.

Serve the pork carved into thick slices, with the vegetables around it, plenty of juices and plain boiled potatoes.



Honey-glazed Carrots For KIDS

AN excellent way of persuading stubborn children to eat their carrots - these honey-glazed carrots are also delicious served with roasted meats.

Ingredients:

Serves 4

450g carrots, peeled and sliced diagonally
20g unsalted butter
1/2 x 5ml sp chopped summer savoury or soft thyme leaves
1 bay leaf
Pinch ground nutmeg
1 x 15ml sp liquid honey
Salt and ground black pepper
1 x 15ml sp snipped chives

Method:

Place the carrots in a medium-sized saucepan and add just about enough water to cover them. Add the butter, summer savoury or soft thyme leaves, bay leaf and nut-

meg to the saucepan. Cover the pan and bring the carrot mixture to the boil. Simmer for about six minutes and then remove the lid and increase the heat.

Add the honey to the pan and cook the carrots until all the liquid has evaporated, leaving a shiny glaze on the carrots. If you want your carrots to be caramelised or golden, you should cook for a little while longer, stirring them from time to time. But when you do this the butter will separate, creating a much more greasy dish.

Season with the salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste and then stir in the snipped chives. Serve your carrots immediately while they are still hot, with a roast meal of your choice, other seasonal vegetables and gravy.

CRÈME ANGLAISE - PROPER CUSTARD

THIS recipe will make you come over all wobbly - it's the stuff custard dreams are made of.

Ingredients:

Makes 500ml/serves 4
500ml milk
Vanilla pod, split open
5 egg yolks
75g caster sugar

Method:

Put the milk in a saucepan with the split vanilla pod and bring slowly to the boil. When the milk looks as if it is on the point of boiling, remove from the heat and leave for around 20 minutes - this lets the vanilla flavour the milk. Lift out the vanilla pod and scrape the little black seeds into the milk with the point of a knife. Whisk the egg yolks and sugar together until they are thick and pale in

colour, then add the milk to them and stir.

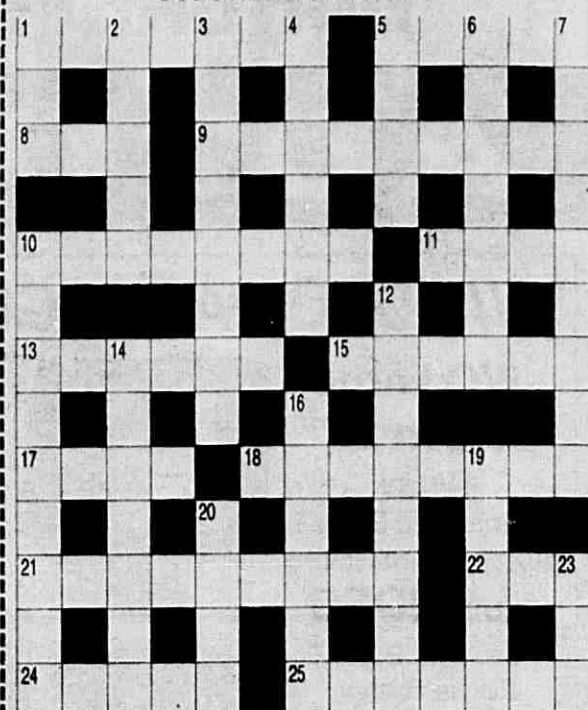
Pour the custard into a clean pan, and put over a low heat, stirring almost constantly until it thickens slightly. The consistency should be that of double cream.

On no account let the mixture get too hot - if it boils it will curdle, so remember to keep stirring. Pour the mixture into a clean bowl and use immediately or cover loosely with clingfilm and cool.

TIP: For a traditional banana custard, add thickly sliced, slightly under-ripe bananas to the custard once you have sieved it, then keep warm for a few minutes while the fruit gives flavour to the sauce. The slices of fruit will soften slightly, which is why it is best not to use ripe fruit.

AESCULUS or HORSE CHESTNUT

The Horse Chestnut was first documented as a medicinal plant in 1585.

Horse Chestnut is astringent, anti-inflammatory and helps to tone the vein walls, which, when slack or distended, may become varicose, haemorrhoidal or otherwise problematic.

Aesculus also reduces fluid retention by increasing the reabsorption of excess fluid back into the circulatory system.

The herb has been taken internally in small to moderate doses for leg ulcers, varicose veins, haemorrhoids and frostbite.

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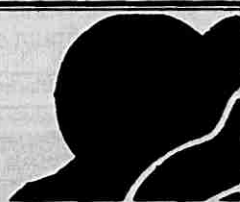
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STRADBALLY NEWS

Mother Nature's Millennium Bug

Having created a beautiful display of plants, the last thing the gardener wants is the latest thing in garden pests - the real Millennium bug.

Vine weevils will produce between 500 and 800 offspring in a generation. In a mild year, they may produce two clutches in the same season.

They are expert at camouflage and hiding, so gardeners seldom see them until the damage has been done.

The vine weevil has been topping the charts at the Royal Horticultural Society's help line.

Everyone is scrambling to find out how to protect themselves from this minuscule menace.

The latest fashion for potted plants provides ideal conditions for the beastly bug to breed and feed.

The vine weevil comes top of the danger list for pests because it combines prolific breeding with a voracious appetite.

The offspring eats at the plant's roots, while the adults attack the leaves. This has a devastating effect on the plant's life support system.

A recent survey showed that gardeners are more likely to blame themselves, slugs or snails for failing plants when in fact the vine weevil is the hidden peril responsible for reaping havoc on a flower bed.

You need to be alert. Vine weevils can be very distressing for a gardener, because at best they stop a plant thriving and at worst, they can kill it.

The solution to the problem is largely down to good pot-keeping.

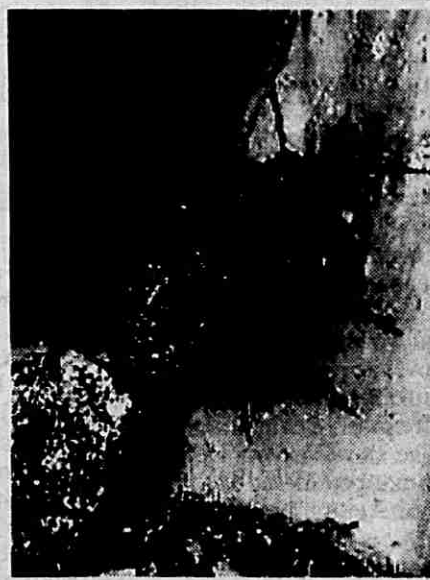
The best tip for preventing and solving a vine weevil pest problem is not to try re-using compost.

When re-potting, clean off as much of the old soil as possible before using a new weevil-free potting medium. In planting decorative plants, try to use one of the new composts that are pre-treated to control the vine weevils over one season.

Earlier this year the Vine Weevil Advice Centre in London launched the Vine Weevil Awareness Campaign, aimed at warning people to protect the investments they have made in their garden from what it described as "a potential population explosion in a pernicious pest - the vine weevil".

Gardeners can contact this centre for more information about the vine weevil.

This Week In The Garden

Pick and store grapes

There is no longer any point in leaving grapes hanging on the vines. If you have a cool, dark and dry room to store them in, all the better - but they should be picked by now anyway. Cut each bunch with about 23 centimetres of the vine still attached. Put the vine end in a jar full of clean soft water with a few pieces of charcoal in it making sure the grapes are hanging freely outside the jar.

Prune the vines

By now the leaves of early or maincrop vines should have started to wilt or fall off. Outdoor vines can be pruned. The method for cutting both back is the same. Cut off the two nearest new shoots to dormant growth buds stemming from the main rod or spur. Tear off or remove all loose bark from the main rods and rub in Gishurst compound, made up of soap and sulphur. It kills bugs and parasites that live in the gnarly parts of the plant. When finished, remove any ties you have

keeping the plant upright and lay it as close to parallel to the floor as possible. This will help encourage an even growth.

Plants in frames

From now on until early spring, plants kept in frames will require very careful handling. Some, such as rooted violets, pansies, violet cuttings, sweet pea seedlings and violet clumps are quite hardy and only need protection from heavy frosts and beating rain.

They also need ventilation. Lights should be placed on the frames when the sun sets. Plants such as pelargoniums, marguerites and choice fuchsias are likely to be damaged by the smallest amount of frost and need to be protected by sacks at night. Remove and burn any yellowing leaves and poke the soil around with a stick to aerate it.

Cauliflower protection

The curds of the cauliflower should be starting to form. To protect them from frost, bend some of the outer leaves over them.

LATE COLONEL SIDNEY WATSON

The death occurred at Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel on Saturday 30th October of Colonel Sidney Watson, Ballingarrane, Clonmel. He was a senior member of one of the towns oldest families. Col. Watson was 79 when he died after a short illness. He was a noted Author, historian, a farmer and a high ranking officer of the British Army. His family originally came from Carlow and could trace their arrival in Clonmel in 1750. They were Quaker Bankers in Gladstone Street. Sidney Watson enlisted with the British Army as a private and rose through the ranks to become Military Attache at the Court of the Shah of Iran. A life threatening illness hastened his retirement from the army. On his retirement he returned to Coolbeg, Ballingarrane a few miles from Clonmel on the Cahir Road. Before his retirement he had seen service with the Royal Engineers during the second World War. He also served with the Army in the Korean War 1950-1953. A well known breeder of short horn cattle, he was an active member of Clonmel Horse Show, he served as Chairman and President. An Taisce and the local historic society were organisations that were close to his heart. He was very much dedicated to the refurbishment of St. Mary's Church of Ireland and the surrounding town walls. He believed that the Church and its grounds should be enjoyed by and be made available to all the people of the area. He wrote many books, his last major book was "A Dinner of Herbs", a history of Clonmel. On Wednesday night his remains were removed to St. Mary's Church of Ireland, Clonmel. The funeral service took place on Thursday followed by private burial. "The day the Lord gave you has ended".

The Science of Farming and Food

New Plans Must Be Submitted by Christmas

The Department of Agriculture has said that new REPS contracts entered into during the remainder of the year 1999 will be for a transitional period under the existing rules and followed by a further five years period under the new rules. However, it seems that no new plans will be accepted from January 1st 2000 until the new rules are published which may not be until the second half of 2000. If you are planning on going into REPS next year, do it now before Christmas or you are likely to experience significant delays. Contact your Teagasc adviser immediately for more information.

Pollution Control

CHECK YOUR WINTER FACILITIES

It is vital for all farmers and especially for REPS farmers that your farmyard and winter facilities are in good order before the winter to avoid subsequent pollution problems. Here are a few checks which you should carry out. While straw is still available, make sure you have an adequate supply for bedding.

Check that your storm drains are functioning properly so that surface water can be easily diverted from yards and houses. Repair your gutters and down pipes and ensure that they divert to the clean water drains. Houses without gutters will have clean water entering at the eaves and doors and emerging polluted from the bedding.

Ensuring that all your slurry tanks have been emptied by the end of September leaves you with maximum storage capacities for the winter months.

Ensure channels and diversion drains are in good repair and not blocked and seepage tanks are empty.

Provide a clean storage space for your silage plastic from where it can be easily loaded for recycling.

Consult with your Teagasc Adviser as to whether it would be more profitable to sell some of your stock rather than over winter them.

Move stock from sensitive pastures to drier areas. While supplementary feeding is allowed on pastures, excessive poaching is to be avoided.

Soil Testing — Special Offer

Now is the most suitable time on most farms for soil testing. Fields should be tested for P, K and lime at least once every 5 years and the results acted upon.

Farms deficient in these nutrients are operating well below optimum production levels, whereas, farms applying too much of them are a risk to the environment and are wasting money on nutrients they don't need.

The cost of sampling, analysis and fertiliser recommendations is £17 per sample. Teagasc are offering 6 samples for the price of 5 until the end of December 1999.

Cattle

PRODUCING CLEAN CATTLE

The issue of dirty cattle being rejected at factories is likely to cause as much concern this winter as it did last year. Although there is no quick fix solution to this problem there are a number of guidelines that can be followed as an aid to keeping cattle clean.

DIET

Wet feeds such as low dry matter silage and roots tend to produce dirtier cattle. If at all possible avoid these types of feed in the final weeks before sale. Build up concentrate levels slowly and avoid sudden changes in the diet. Small quantities of straw in the diet (up to 1 kg) can be beneficial particularly if feeding a low dry matter highly digestible or acidic diet.

HOUSING

Overstocking of pens can increase dirtiness. Where there are concrete aprons in slatted pens these should be cleaned regularly. If dung is not moving freely through slats then these also may have to be cleaned during the finishing period. Leaking water troughs should be fixed immediately. Where there is a supply of straw on the farm putting finishing cattle on straw bedding for a month to six weeks before sale may help to reduce dirtiness. Though this may be an expensive option.

HUSBANDRY PRACTICES

Dose animals at risk to fluke or stomach worms and treat mineral deficiencies. Trim tails at housing. Shave a four inch strip along the backbone from the tail head to the shoulders to reduce sweating.

When selling the cattle do not have them out in the rain or dirty yards for prolonged periods before loading.

Teagasc has published a booklet on the issue of clean cattle which outlines in detail what guidelines to follow. This booklet is available at the Teagasc office.

IFA Lobby Politicians On Sheep Farmers Income Crisis In Dail Debate

Irish sheep farmers are being short changed by £8.14/ewe in premium payments from the failure of the ewe premium system according to Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman, Harry Gray. Mr. Gray said this flaw in the ewe premium system amounts to a national loss of £38 million per annum to the Irish sheep sector.

A delegation from the IFA National Sheep Committee met the three main political parties and key independent deputies in the Dail today to highlight the severe income crisis in the sheep sector. IFA undertook this work before tonight's Dail debate on agriculture in the Oireachtas.

IFA called on the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh to face up to the income problems on sheep farms. He said "IFA has put a comprehensive set of proposals to Minister Walsh, which have subsequently been accepted by the National Sheep Forum. It is past time that Minister Walsh faced up to his responsibilities in the sheep sector and implemented the Sheep Forum recommendations on policy."

The Waterford IFA Sheep Chairman said sheep farmers have come through a particularly difficult income crisis in 1999 resulting from collapsed lamb prices and reduced ewe premium payments. "For the main selling season, lamb prices are back between £8-10/head. At the same time, the ewe premium has not increased with producers left facing a severe income crisis."

Mr. Gray pointed out that Irish sheep farmers are being short-changed by £8.14/head in income loss compensation on ewe premium. He said this amounts to £38 million on the country's 4.6 million ewes. "Since the method of ewe premium calculation was changed in 1992, Irish sheep farmers have lost a staggering £244 million in premium payments. He said these ongoing losses were driving Irish sheep farmers out of business at an alarming rate.

The IFA presented a comprehensive set of policy proposals to the political parties in the Dail. In summary, the IFA proposals involve the following:

- Ewe Premium - a fairer and more equitable level of Ewe Premium payment for sheep farmers in line with other sectors.
- Stabiliser - abolition of the 7% stabiliser which would be worth an additional £4.35/ewe in premium.
- Extensification - exclusion of the first 30 livestock

units of sheep from the extensification premium stocking rate calculation.

- Imports - no increase in sheepmeat imports (New Zealand) into the EU under the next WTO round.
- Headage - sheep farmers must be given priority to benefit from future changes in headage payments.
- Retention Period - IFA is proposing a staggered retention period for ewe premium with the 100 day retention beginning when applications are lodged.

John Quigley Area Officer with ICMSA in the South-east region outlines below ICMSA's advice to dairy farmers on the dairy herd cert-

(a) You are entitled under

EU rules to have your herd inspected for the Dairy Herd Cert when the vet visits your farm for the annual round test.

(b) The Department Of Agriculture and Food informed ICMSA in writing in 1997 that the dairy herd inspection should be "Implemented alongside the annual round test to minimise the costs and bureaucracy for all concerned." The Department has recently confirmed, again in writing, that the dairy herd inspection is confined solely to specific animal health matters and has nothing to do with water quality, hygiene practices, farm buildings or facilities. These are being dealt with by the Department's Dairy produce Inspectorate, completely separate from the animal's health certification.

(c) As soon as you are notified of your annual round test, you should make contact with your vet to agree the total cost of carrying out the annual round test together with the dairy herd inspection.

(d) It is the ICMSA view that the vet engaged to carry

out the annual round test should not charge an additional fee for the dairy herd inspection.

(e) You are entitled under EU and Department of Agriculture and Food rules to engage any registered vet to undertake this work.

(f) The official dairy herd cert has been issued by the Department and carries the State's Harp emblem. No other cert may be used.

ICMSA President Mr. Frank Allen asked was the Tanaiste proposing to discriminate against our most important native industry by denying farmers the right to benefit from the proposed 12.5% corporate tax rate. Mr. Allen continued, "Does the Tanaiste want to drive people out of a culture even faster than they are going at present? Radical tax reform is a key priority to encourage investment and development on farms. We all know that it is more tax efficient to invest outside the farm that in the farm at present.

Back in June 1997 our good friend Tom Veale from Dublin 9 sent us a bound copy of some of the research he had done for us in Dublin.

It was extracts of surnames from the following street and trade directories: 1662 - Subsidy Roll - Waterford; 1824 - Pigot; 1846 - Slater; 1856 - Slater; 1867 - Henry and Coughlan; 1881 - Slater; 1894 - P. M. Egan, Waterford; 1909 - Thom's, Waterford.

It contained 169 records on 6 pages including occupations and addresses and was described as a resource for the family researcher seeking roots in Abbeyside.

Among those listed in it were William Connell, Nail Maker, Abbeyside, Slater 1856; David Mulcahy, Sail Maker, Abbeyside, Pigot 1824; Walter Power, Husbandman, Ballinrode, Subsidy Roll 1662.

This Sunday evening Seamus O'Brien will be "minding the store" when these records and all our other treasures will be on display at the Parish Office, Strandside South.

The book's striking cover features the 'Greccio' sculptured panel and the 'Cantic of Canticles' tapestry from the transept of the Franciscan Church, Wexford, by Dublin mother and daughter artists, Elizabeth Keenan Ryan and Erica Jane Ryan. Illustrations are by Aine Duggan, a niece of the author and native of Ballinroad, Dungarvan.

THE PARISH OF CLONEA

SITUATION - This Parish is situated in the Barony of Decies without Drum, and is bounded on the North by the Parish of Kilrossanty; on the East by Kilrossanty and Stradbally; on the South by the sea and on the West by the Parishes of Kilgobinet and Dungarvan.

NAME - This Parish is called by the natives in Irish Cluain Eich, meaning the Clon or Meadow of the Horse, pronounced as if written Cloon-Eye.

The old Church of the Parish is situated on the rising ground to the North of a large tract of low marshy land. It consisted of nave and choir but it is now nearly destroyed. The nave was forty three feet three inches in length and twenty three feet four inches in breadth but the dimensions of the choir cannot be ascertained as its east gable and side walls have disappeared. The North wall of the nave was also destroyed but a modern wall four feet in height now occupies its place. The choir arch is pointed and formed of cut sandstone of a brownish colour and is ten feet in height and seven feet in width. At the distance of one foot from the middle gable the south wall contains a round headed window formed of cut stone, measuring on the inside five feet six inches in height and three feet five inches in width and on the outside where it is eight feet from the level of the ground, one foot ten inches in height and nine inches in width. This window is a very beautiful one and looks ancient. The doorway was on the South wall at the distance of nine feet eight inches from the West gable but it is now destroyed except a small part of its sides on the inside, from which it appears to have been formed in a very

elegant style of cut stone, like the window above described, it was four feet five and a half inches in width on the inside.

The West gable is featureless. All the quoin stones are chiselled. The South wall is three feet six inches in thickness and twelve feet in height and built of large and small stones cemented with lime and sand mortar.

This Church is at least six centuries old. It has a small graveyard attached, not much used at present as a cemetery.

Clonea Castle, now demolished was the residence of a Mr. Maguire and was not an ancient building, but it stood near the site of an old military castle said to have belonged to a branch of the Fitzgeralds.

Fifth Year and Transition Year will travel to Cork on Tuesday 16th of November to partake in an exciting day of Dance.

DAGDHA Dance Company from Limerick have composed a programme especially suited to young people. 'Looks like Thunder, Feels like Rain', to an imaginative, cleverly involving show that has performance, workshops and discussion.

The full stage professional performance will comprise a number of short choreographic works specifically created to introduce young audiences to contemporary dance theatre, and to bring them close to the language of dance through the experience of live performance. 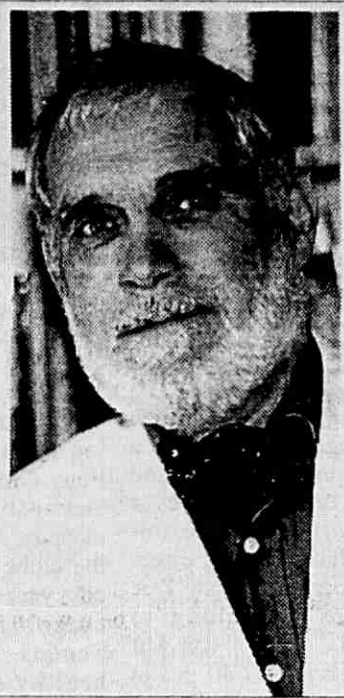
LISMORE CRICKET CLUB NOTES

Cricket followers everywhere were shocked and saddened to learn of the untimely death of former West Indian fast bowler Malcolm Marshall. Aged 41, Malcolm had fought a brave fight against cancer.

He was truly one of the greatest bowlers to represent his Country, also Barbados, Hampshire and the South African side Natal where he signed off with a batting average of 60!

Compared to other West Indian bowlers he wasn't very tall, but his record speaks for it's self. His test record shows that he bowled 2,930 overs, took 376 wickets at an average of 20.94 runs. He took 1,651 first class wickets 823 of those for Hampshire. He was a cricketer of utter dedication and supreme skill. Graham Gooch thought him the finest bowler he played against. Off the field he was a genial character, I had the honour to spend some time with him at the Mardyke in 1997 he was in great talking form and the jokes flowed. I reminded him of a 1992 Benson and Hedges match against the county I support - Essex, when he had them on the ropes at 5 for 3, dismissing Gooch, Stephenson and Mark Waugh in double quick time. He shook my hand and for one moment I thought he was going to apologise! We at Lismore will have a lasting memory of him in the form of a cricket shirt he so kindly and painstakingly autographed on the sleeve. Just in case the ink faded Jackie Ind took the time and trouble to embroider the signature. He will be a sad loss to cricket.

What Children Need In A Dad



The mother must not only tolerate this, she must wish and support this separation. A man's issues with his mother go much deeper than those with his father. One of those relates to the separation process in infancy and his post-adolescent relationship with his mother. Emotional intelligence helps a man to recognise inappropriate reactions to his wife and that these reactions have nothing to do with his wife but rather his mother. How many mothers make never-ending demands on their sons for attention, particularly if they have been widowed or how many men tell their wives to take it easy when they become enthusiastic about something — their subconscious triggers a fear of their screaming mother. A good father is there to be loved, imitated and introjected. Children need time from their dads and a good Dad understands his children's needs from the child's perspective but all the time maintaining his protective parental role. To create a life is the most responsible action we take. The information necessary to become a male is encoded in our D.N.A. but it takes all the institutions of a culture to produce a man. It's difficult to convey everything I feel about how a man becomes a father. There are many ways to be a father and I hope some of the points I covered will help men on this their most important journey and that they become the Dad they wish they had.

Research shows that boys that exhibit aggressive and anti-social behaviour have Dads that were aggressive and uncontrolled in managing anger. For a boy with no father the infant is denied that early love affair with Dad and he will have ambivalent feelings towards masculinity which can lead to problems with male authority figures. Also a fatherless boy may feel obliged to be his mother's keeper and that often creates an immature permanent adolescent. Boys with absent or ineffective fathers are at risk of contamination if their peer group has one or more anti-social children.

Peer influence is very powerful in shaping the values of children and is more powerful still when family structures are weak.

The relationship between parents is the single most influential factor in child rearing and sadly too many children become the pawns in spousal conflict. This teaches children to become inept at relationships themselves and is the breeding ground for bullying and violent behaviour. When an unhappy couple have a child it makes all that is bad in their relationship worse. A man in a troubled marriage will avoid the children to punish his wife or give them 'over the top' attention that he withholds from her.

Many men feel a painful mix of emotions towards their father. The 'father wound' is a mixture of grief, anger and longing. Those feelings need to be resolved because if Dads have unresolved painful feelings toward their own fathers, untold damage is done to the relationship they have with their own children.

By getting in touch with buried feelings and becoming aware, men take the first step into what Rob Bly calls "the descent into the ashes". When a man can let go of all his anger and pain he can see his own Dad as an imperfect man who tried to do his best by his family. After this, chrysalis forgiveness and healing begins and he finally comes to peace with him. Once Dads come to realise that they can enjoy and appreciate positive aspects of their relationships with their own Dads they will stop torturing themselves in trying to get from their Dad something he cannot give.

To become a separate person a boy must break the chain to his mother.

For many men fatherhood is the most powerful event in their lives. It colours their aspirations, their hopes, their dreams. In the traditional family model of male as breadwinner and mother as caretaker of the home and family fathers and mothers played distinct roles but in today's more equitable society Dads are called upon to get more involved in the dynamic of family. Fathers' interactions with children are different from that of mothers. It's more aggressive but it fosters individuation. Men have to develop the four E's to meet the challenge of being the father their kids desire. They must open the door to emotional intelligence, emotional self awareness, emotional expressiveness and emotional empathy. In discovering emotional intelligence, a father becomes aware of the old gender stereotyping and will strive not to impose those rules on his own children. He will be more inclined to give his sons love and shows of affection including hugs and kisses. He will encourage emotional expression rather than the old "Big boys don't cry" mantra. Instead of chanting to his son "winning is everything" he will encourage the importance of effort and the notion that a real man can accept defeat as well as embrace victory.

In raising his daughters, the aware man will not foster fearfulness and timidity in them but encourage them to enjoy the same freedom as he would allow sons. He will be inclined to praise their intelligence and not just their beauty. He will encourage them to take responsibility for their lives and to accept frustrations and setbacks. Many years ago when raising my first family, I encouraged my daughters to change tires, unplug drains and paint their rooms. When Dads are loving and active in their daughters' lives this is imprinted on their young minds and it bolsters their relationship with men in adulthood. On the other hand if dad is indifferent or abusive, girls will come to believe that men are incapable of love.

FATHERS AND SONS
Boys start bonding with their dad at about a year and a half but it fades at about three. Adolescence is a very challenging period in father-son relationships. At this stage boys begin to have conflicting feelings towards their father. On one level they need him and idealise him but they also become irritated by him. The struggle between needing dad's love and the drive towards autonomy widens the misunderstanding between them. Boys record Dad's behaviour and how he resolves issues whether that be through conflict or inviting co-operation. A boy's closeness with his Dad and his trust in him allows him temper his aggressiveness.

Dept. Examine Next Stage Of New Dungarvan School

The next two stages in the development of a new technical college for Dungarvan are currently being examined by the Department of Education. The Dept.'s planning and building unit is assessing documentation for the 4th and 5th stages (detailed design and bill of quantities) and it is expected that this examination will be completed shortly.

The new £1m plus vocational school will be located on a green field site at the former Presentation grounds at Youghal Road, Dungarvan. The new building will replace the existing school at Wolfe Tone Road and will be run under the remit of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee (VEC). Earlier aspirations were that construction work would begin on site before the end of the year but inevitable delays have seriously altered the initial time frame.

The planned school was a topic of discussion in the Dail recently when two separate questions were raised by Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy and Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea.

Deputy Deasy asked the Minister for Education if he will allow the proposed building project of the new vocational school to proceed to tender stage allowing the inclusion of the physical education hall to be dealt with separately, and if he will ensure that there will be no further delays with the project.

In reply, Minister Micheal Martin said it is a matter for the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee in conjunction with its design team to consider the implications of including a physical education hall in the current proposals and to advise his Department's planning and building unit of its decision.

Promoter To Proceed With Cappoquin Wind Farm Proposal

SEPARATE TEST MAST APPLICATION LODGED

The promoter behind a suggested wind turbine development in the scenic mountain area near the Vee, has announced his intention to proceed with his controversial plans.

Charles Keane of Cappoquin Estate has written to the Knockmealdown Protection Committee stating that he intends to go ahead with his plan and will shortly be applying for planning permission for the first stage of the project which is a wind test monitoring mast.

Mr. Keane previously gave assurances that he would not proceed with plans for the wind farm without the full backing of

the community. He initially wanted support for a 40 metre wind test mast on the mountain to monitor the wind over 12 months, during which time an Environmental Impact Statement will be prepared. Although many in the area are in favour of his proposals, residents of Mount Melleray and surrounding areas are still divided over the planned multi-million pound project.

A separate planning application for a wind test mast at Coolnacreena, Cappoquin was lodged with Waterford County Council on November 3rd. This application is in the name of Ned Morrissey and Seamus O'Donnell and involves a 40 metre test mast on a site over Affane.

A Council spokesperson confirmed that an objection to the development has already been lodged.

'NEVER POSSIBLE TO OBTAIN CONSENT'

In his letter to the Knockmealdown Protection Committee in which he informs them of his intention to proceed with the project, Mr. Keane said "it is never possible to obtain the consent of everyone".

In the same letter he says the community now has the opportunity to "weigh up the advantages of the cash generated from a share in the project against the visual impact on the landscape".

The proposed site in the Knockmealdowns is on the southwest slope of Knocknafalia in the gap near Knocknagau on land owned by Cappoquin Estates. Mr. Keane previously stated that the 200 ft. turbines would be kept off the top of the hills and at least 1,000 m from any household.

15% of the shares in the wind farm company will be allocated to the community while Mr. Keane has forecast a possible £1.5m cash injection indirectly into the community over a 20 year period if the proposed wind farm goes ahead.

PROPOSALS MUST BE CLEARER SAY COMMITTEE

Chairman of the Knockmealdown Protection Com-

mittee, Willie O'Donoghue, said that at each local public meeting when the wind farm was discussed, it was clear that there was still strong opposition to the erection of wind turbines in the area of the Vee.

In a statement to the Melleray community issued by the Knockmealdown Protection Committee, Mr. O'Donoghue urges the community to ask whether the promise of cash Mr. Keane holds out "is as empty as his assurance of not going forward without full public support".

"What is our community to make of this vague offer?" he asked. "How can the community 'weigh up' an offer so vague? Mr. Keane must make himself much clearer before anyone can take seriously his talk of cash advantages to the community".

Mr. O'Donoghue previously called on Mr. Keane to withdraw his proposal and claimed that the committee would fight the development 'to the end', even to the courts and An Bord Pleanála if necessary.

"This committee is opposed to the erection of wind turbines in the area of the Vee. Aside from the blight of the turbines themselves, the hills will be scarred forever by access roads. It may mean fighting for many months. But we must preserve our natural heritage", he added.

Child Benefit Increase Sought By Local Councillors

A significant increase in child benefit has been sought in a budget submission made to the Dept. of Social, Community and Family Affairs by two West Waterford Councillors.

Councillors Teresa Wright of Dungarvan UDC and Fíachra O Ceilleachair of Waterford Co. Council say the Government's December budget should go with such an increase as it will help all parents, whether at work outside the home or not.

Addressing a discussion on the subject on Monday evening November 8th at the monthly meeting of the Dungarvan James Connolly Labour branch, both councillors Wright and O Ceilleachair highlighted instances of where working parents were paying up to £80 a week for childcare. As part of seeking more childcare places, they encouraged support for their party's campaign for a nationwide state subsidised early childhood education system.

Summarising their proposals, Councillors Wright and O Ceilleachair said the current economic climate should allow for a doubling of child benefit payments and were encouraged by initial reactions from the Minister for Social, Community and Family Affairs to suggestions that a significant rise in such payments be sanctioned in the forthcoming budget.

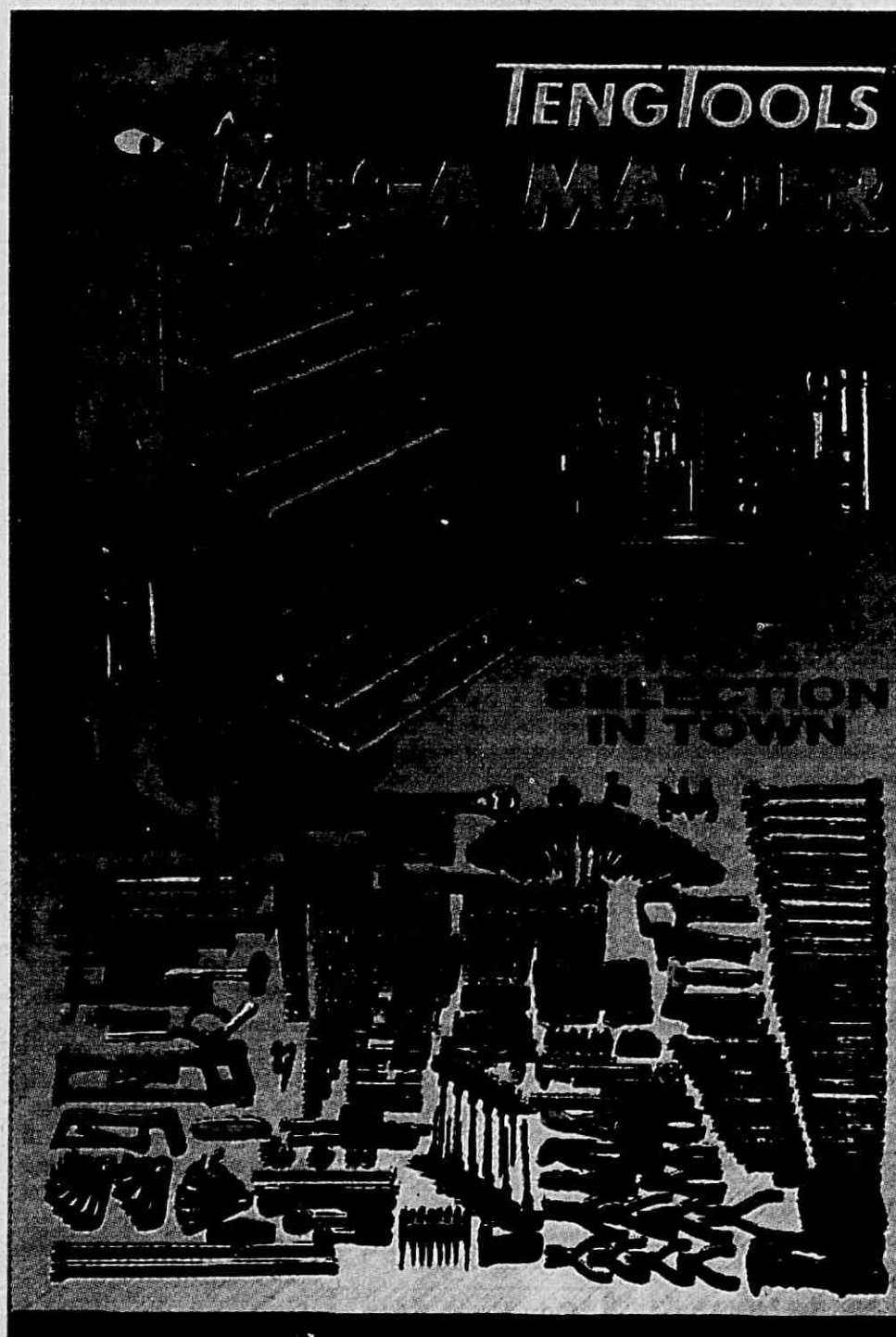
Mary Flavin-Colbert As "Moll" In Ballyduff

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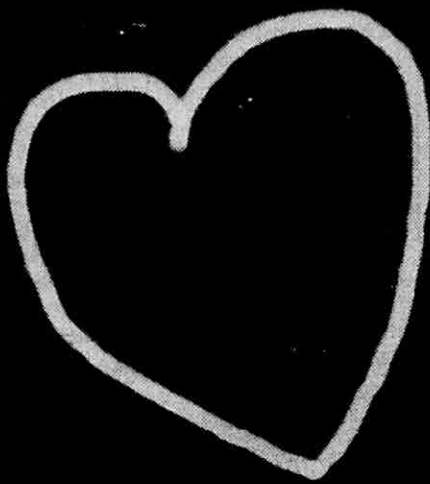

TOMMY'S TROUBLE

The lay out of the countries race tracks raised its ugly head once again at one of the nations grade A tracks, Punchestown. The feature event of the afternoon was the Irish field Novice Chase. Given a patient ride by Tommy Treacy, Montana Glen moved into a challenging position behind the eventual winner Featured Leader going down to the penultimate fence. Montana Glen dived at this fence and while he did jump the fence he landed on top of a temporary running rail which he basically crashed into. Montana Glen continued in the contest to fill the runner up spot behind the easy winner Featured Leader. The acting stewards on the day called an immediate inquiry and promptly disqualified Montana Glen from the runner up spot having deemed this horse to have taken the wrong course. For failing to pull up his mount after this incident Tommy Treacy was suspended for two days and ordered to forfeit his riding fee. Clerk of the Course Joe Collins was then summoned to appear before the stewards and the rail was moved for one of the later races. The matter was then referred to the Turf Club for further investigation. The Turf Club are very quick to send jockeys to the R.A.C.E. school on the Curragh to brush up on their use of the whip. Could I suggest that the Turf Club organise a refresher course for all course clerks in their lay out of courses for a days racing. Of course incidents such as those at Tramore and Punchestown could well be avoided if we had a complete set of running rails around each track for flat, hurdle and chase races.

INTACTA PRINT MAKES HIS MARK

Waterford City owner Eamon Griffin who is also one of the leading lights behind the rejuvenated Tramore racecourse found himself in the winners enclosure as far North as Dundalk last week when his glacial storm gelding Intacta Print after a number of promising bumper efforts came good at odds of 9/4 for trainer Francie Flood and rider C.J. Swords. Eamon won this horse in a raffle at one of the Kerry fixtures and his future career lies over hurdles and then on to chasing.

INJURED JOCKEYS

More Furore As Cllrs Divided Over Guidelines For U.D.C. Meetings

said: "It's hard to believe the majority is going to such lengths to silence us. If we can't continue to debate and raise these issues there's no point in being an Urban Councillor. Before the recent local elections it was hard for every party to attract good candidates. If these measures go through, nobody of any ability will even consider contesting a seat on what would be a rubber stamp body allowing the Labour-led majority and the County Manager do as they please, regardless of what anyone else believes", he stated.

POLITICAL MIND GAMES?

Also giving his strong reaction to the draft proposals, Cllr. John Deasy said: "They don't want the meetings recorded. I think anyone in the town should be able to ask for a recording or transcript of the Urban Council meetings so anyone can check to see what was actually said and by whom. What are they afraid of? All you have to do is check back to see that the newer members have been the ones continually raising the issues. It's time to stop messing about with these political mind games. Nobody's going to stop us doing our job".

The newly elected members, Wright, Deasy and Geoghegan have been the most frequent employers of the notice of motion mechanism to raise such issues as the childrens playground, dredging of the harbour, the development of the former Waterford Foods site, traffic congestion and the completion of housing estates.

Labour's sole female representative on the Urban Council has sided with the FG members on the issue.

Cllr. Teresa Wright believes the measures would curtail debate, discussion and representation by the newer members of the Council. She also believes that democracy would be dealt a severe blow if these standing orders were to be introduced in their entirety.

"I feel that my way of representing people in Council chambers is through notices of motion. It's the peoples voice being heard and it's their issues being brought to the forefront", she stated.

HOGGING MEETINGS!
Vice Chairman of Dungarvan UDC Cllr. Michael O'Riordan wasted no time in giving his no-nonsense side of the argument.

He feels it is time the Urban Council has standing orders and said it was John Deasy who first 'grumbled'

that the Council had no procedure.

"He wants to be the main spokesman, he's hogging meetings and no one gets an opportunity to speak", said Cllr. O'Riordan.

"He, as a sitting councillor, expects special privileges as the son of an ex-Minister. Nine of us were elected by the people of this town to represent them and that is what democracy is all about".

At Monday's meeting, Cllr. O'Riordan intends to ask the County Manager if he will liaise with other Managers and organise a conference whereby newly elected members can learn about the procedures of local authorities.

At the October meeting of the Council which was marred by more bitter exchanges, Cllr. O'Riordan made his own silent protest by leaving the meeting.

"The way the business of the meetings are being run, I didn't get an opportunity since last May to raise an

item under Any Other Business", he said.

WILL MAKE UDC MORE EFFECTIVE SAYS KYNE

Cllr. Billy Kyne said he was opposed to the need for the introduction of standing orders in the past.

"With good principles of debate and good manners we should be able to do our business effectively and without rancour", he stated.

Notices of motion and representation are valuable tools for getting information and trying to get matters processed. However he felt that three notices of motion for each councillor would make an agenda so large as to make the Council inefficient.

"By having too many items on the agenda and questioning the administrative staff on all fronts, we would be totally hindering our delivery to the public. Equally members who wish to have many different projects done should explain where funding for these projects are to come from

and what priority these projects have. There is a definite amount of money and a limited number of new projects we can take on so by having a tighter focus on our notices of motion I believe we're being more effective and more in-line with our budget constraints".

Commenting on the draft proposals, Cllr. Kyne said the model they worked from is taken in principal from Waterford County Council's standing orders.

"We have amended it to try to reflect UDC requirements and I am confident that with the constructive input of all 3 absent members we can still achieve working standing orders that can primarily serve the people by good orderly structured debate.

If of course somebody may prefer to play politics with sensitive issues and continually criticise other councillors in an unprecedented way then standing orders obviously would not find favour of any particular councillor"

SOME OF THE KEY CHANGES

Some of the key changes proposed in the draft Standing Orders and which are the source of such strife among members are as follows:

- The tape recording of UDC meetings would be prohibited.
- The proposal would limit the number of notices of motion from a maximum of 33 per year per member to a maximum of 12. Notices of motion are used by members to raise issues affecting the urban area outside of the Council meetings formalised agenda.
- The time allowed for presenting a motion would be cut from five minutes to three.
- Members who propose motions would generally no longer be afforded the right to reply to comments on their motion made by other members and Council officials.
- Members would not be allowed to raise an issue by notice of motion if that motion is substantially the same as one raised in the previous 6 months.
- Members would be prohibited from debating the previous months Minutes. Members will be allowed question the accuracy of the Minutes but prevented from responding to any reply given by the County Manager or Town Clerk.
- Members would not be allowed debate while a deputation is present in the Council chamber.
- Admittance to the public gallery of the Council chamber in the new Civic offices would be by means of ticket only. Tickets could be obtained in advance of the meeting from the Town Clerk.

Non-Stop Express Train Needed On Waterford/Dublin Line

Waterford should be pressing for a non-stop express railway service to Dublin. That's according to Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy who feels that with the upgrading of the line from Dublin to Kilkenny it should still be possible to get a non-stop express train from Waterford to Dublin in 1 and a half hours. By the year 2003, when the line from Waterford to Dublin is expected to be greatly im-

proved in its entirety, it should be possible to improve on this journey time, he added.

Deputy Deasy raised the matter in the Dail last week when he asked the Minister for Public Enterprise her views on whether Iarnrod Eireann and CIE are capable of providing a satisfactory service with the resources currently at their disposal from the Government and the EU. He also

asked the Minister if she would discuss items such as the condition of the Waterford to Dublin railway line with the board and chief executive of CIE.

In reply, Minister Mary O'Rourke said CIE is being provided with very substantial resources for the maintenance and renewal of the railway infrastructure and the operation of railway services.

spent taxpayers money on fine-tuning the selection down to three sites which were later deemed unsuitable.

"Why at this eleventh hour are we changing our focus again and looking at the west of the county where the population is bottoming out. We're reinventing the wheel!", he declared. "For logistical reasons alone the landfill should be nearer to Waterford. It's not acceptable to me and there has been no compelling reason given".

Likewise Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said that in time and with hindsight it would look 'very silly' transporting waste from the city all the way to Lismore or Tallow etc.

In response to a comment by Cllr. Pat Leahy that the land is extremely rocky in parts of East Waterford, Cllr. James Tobin quipped that the land is "every bit as rocky up in the west as it is in the east!"

Cllr. Pat Daly said he was disappointed that West Waterford was not considered from 'day one'.

"It now seems that a lot of time has been wasted", he added.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair asked that the County Manager give a guarantee that the dump at Ballinamuck, Dungarvan be closed down as soon as a central landfill has been found.

"What guarantee do I have that there won't be an indefinite continuation of Ballinamuck as adjoining lands may be considered suitable as an extension. There is a danger that the adjoining lands could be found suitable for a landfill", he stated.

This ten race card also featured the semi finals of the Dick Murphy sponsored Murco Confined 30.20 stake. Early pace was the vital ingredient in both qualifiers. John Murphy's Ballybray Mick (Minnies Phantom - Wise Slip) 3/1 ran out a clear cut 29.39 winner in the first semi final. Taking control from trap one Ballybray Mick was never in the slightest danger of defeat breezing in five and a quarter lengths clear of Yankee Beauty.

The Elizabeth Maher owned and Liam McCormack trained Minnies Vixen (Frightful Flash - Live Commentary) the evens favourite preserved her unbeaten record in the second semi final with an impressive display of front running to oblige in a speedy 29.15. The quietly backed Narabane Bob gave of his best to fill the runner up spot but Minnies Vixen stayed on strongly to score by two lengths.

Off the track, for over twelve months the John Lynch owned and Ian Seymour trained Scotias Glen (Droopy's Fintan - Moonshine Jewel) 7/4 to 5/2 returned to race action with a vengeance in the opening graded contest making practically every yard of the running for a convincing eleven lengths success over a staying on Kilnaspic Fly in 29.40.

3/1 shot Lobnamna Barney owned by Michael Eustace of Foulksmills in County Wexford came from behind to land a 550 yard contest in 30.79.

Track newcomer Truleigh Coral led for three quarters of the trip but Lobnamna Barney (Airmount Grand - Lobnamna Dolly) finished with a flourish to defeat an equally fast finishing Boher Lily by a head.

Local owner/breeder Michael Casey was on the mark in the third race courtesy of the well bred Europa Express (Batties Whisper - Debs Tick) 3/1 who posted a hard earned but fully deserved 29.52 victory. Slipping into a narrow first bend led "Europa" was challenged throughout by Clock Them but responding to that challenge Europa Express kept on well on the run to the winning line to score by a length.

The three hundred yard sprint saw the Liam Walsh owned and Jimmy Scully trained Ciabatta (Shanless Slipper - Ballyvalican) return to winning ways at odds of 2/1. After a keen tussle with Shan A Kil, Daley Ciabatta prevailed by half a length in 16.80.

The Hanrahan family from Tallow in West Waterford recorded a fifth and tenth race double courtesy of Springfield Miah (Trade Union - Springfield Kate) 5/1 and Come Springfield (Come On Ranger - Springfield Jill) 3/1. The Mick Hoy trained Springfield Miah motored into a first bend lead before racing right away in this 730 yard marathon for a facile ten lengths success over Bolivian Queen in 41.77.

The double was completed in the tenth and final race as Come Springfield came from behind to outstay the front running Jumbos Charlie by one and a half lengths in 29.80.

Michael Gallagher's Dawlish Davis (Lassa Java - Dawlish Olivia) 2/1 made maximum use of his early pace to land the ninth contest in 29.54. NEW ATHLETICS BODY FORMED

The new Athletics Association of Ireland was formerly brought into operation in Dublin at the weekend, following the disbandment of B.L.E. at their special congress.

The 169 delegates in the Burlington Hotel agreed unanimously by applause rather than by vote to do so while still unaware of what was happening elsewhere in the city at the N.A.C.A. congress where a similar motion was being debated.

After three hours of often heated debate, the N.A.C.A. meeting narrowly carried a vote to suspend the association for a two year trial period. Afterwards, some delegates stormed out of the meeting in protest at the result.

B.L.E. introduced their new logo "Athletics Ireland" and the new agreement means that B.L.E. will now join ranks with the Northern Ireland's Athletics Federation with a first meeting in the near future.

Athletes in Northern Ireland will now have the choice of competing for either Ireland or Britain and still be eligible to compete for Northern Ireland in the Commonwealth Games.

for, and as the evening wore on he endeared himself to everyone present.

back in 1848, thirty six years before that eventful

day in Hayes Hotel in 1884 the renowned and skilful orator Thomas Francis Meagher called on the young men of Waterford "to revive hurling, the worlds oldest and greatest field game" and here in 1999 over 150 years later we have a leader in Joe McDonagh whose heart is in exactly the same place as the past great United Ireland man.

In a powerful delivery, in both Gaelic and our adopted (or enforced) tongue Joe spoke of the priceless value of the club at local level.

"It is where everything begins and ends", he said. "It enfolds everyone who care about our being as Irish men and women, and marks us as a proud nation amongst nations".

Such was his wide-ranging and absorbing delivery you could hear a pin drop as Joe spoke and his ability to recall names, dates and events didn't go unnoticed. I don't think I would do the man justice by attempting to put in print his speech.

The pen certainly couldn't capture his eloquence and genuine demeanour. Suffice to say that is one mighty man to have at the helm and he has certainly found a legion of life-long friends down Tallow way. An All-Ireland medal winner with his native Galway during his playing days he also gave us a few verses of "The Fields of Athenry". A truly remarkable man indeed.

We had many other guests on the night. Chairman of Waterford County Board, Paddy Joe Ryan spoke of Tallow's contribution to hurling in Waterford over many years and recalled his own playing days with Four-milewater when he faced our own Blue and Gold. He recalled with dignity that awful day in Cappoquin when Tallow were playing his own team. Another great passionate Gael, Paddy Joe is indeed a worthy Chairman and his remark that; "It is not a lack of success that we should see as fail-

ure, but failure to attempt to succeed, so it is important that we continue to try at all times". True words indeed.

Other guests included Mr. Anthony Walsh, Secretary Western Board and Rev. Fr. Sean Cotter, Club President. Also in attendance was Cllr. Willie McDonnell, our patron Fr. Ml. Farrell P.P. was unavoidably absent as was our club President Harry Ronayne and vice President Jamie O'Brien. As ever we send our best wishes to Harry and Jamie who are in great form but just couldn't make it on the night. Fr. Sean Cotter has long been a great friend of Tallow hurling and it was great to see him present on Saturday last. somewhere. Oh yes, one Mr. Tony Coffey. Troubadour, wandering minstrel, balladeer and out and out nut case. Our Master of Ceremonies for the evening, this fellow should carry a government health warning, or a dog licence or something, or indeed anything. Isn't he something else. From the word go he had everyone in the palm of his hand and is without doubt one of the most naturally funny men you are likely to meet. In goal that day in '74 Joe McDonagh, in his address previously paid a huge and deserved tribute to Ned for his lifetime of work and dedication to our games right throughout Ireland. Ned is as well known in the Glens of Antrim and the fields of Anhenry (no pun intended) as he is here in Tallow and 'tis many a hurler whose success can be attributed to Ned in no small way throughout the four provinces. Next up corner back Ritchie McNamara, a skilful and great striker of the ball and in the match report of the final of '74 got special mention for his outstanding performance. Alongside Ritchie was full-back and captain Billy Sheehan and completing the line up the dashing and powerful Tom McSweeney. Our half-back line and a formidable one on its day, Matty Curley, Liam O'Brien and Jimmy Cronin. Lar na pairce the ever commanding presence and for many years the same duo of John McDonnell and Kieran Ryan. Both still mid-field on the 1984 Senior team which won the County. Wasn't it great to see Ryano looking so well. Now domiciled in London he flew in that morning and was obviously delighted to be back amongst his friends. Our half forward line on the day was Seamus "Trasher" Treacy, one of the greatest Tallow hurlers ever, Eddie Condon a deadly accurate marksman who scored seven points that day and on his right Raymond "Pigeon" O'Brien. Every acclaim that the late Raymond received on the night was justified.

He was without equal on the hurling field and his legion of friends paid him due honour. His brother Donie, former Chairman of our club accepted the memento on his behalf to a resounding round of applause from all those present.

Liam Mulcahy are but a few of many dedicated people who were present also on Saturday evening, and continuing the work more nationwide our own Pat Daly who in no small way is responsible for the higher profile our games enjoy over recent years. A truly great ambassador as well as Joe McDonagh for our national games.

Tallow Win Excellent Contest

Tallow 3-12 Stradbally 2-10

An excellently contested Sean Byrne Photography sponsored Divisional U-21 hurling final at the Fraher Field on Sunday afternoon saw the match favourites Tallow merge victorious, but not before they had to overcome a very strong challenge from Stradbally.

The Reds got off to a dream start when Trevor Costelloe goaled inside 20 seconds of the start and within 60 seconds Trevor Curran converted a free to put them 1-1 up so early on in the game.

The Tallow/Shamrocks combination shot 4 points in a seven minute period to reach parity by the 11th minute, with three of the points coming from Stephen (Buddy) Curley. Ballygunner Face Blackrock In Munster Club Semi-Final

This is an outstanding attraction and the visit of the Cork county champions is certain to boost the attendance at Walsh Park on Sunday afternoon next.

With Cork being the All Ireland champions at the moment, hurling is a red hot subject in the city and county, so much so, in fact, that the hurling fraternity in the Rebel County would deem it a big let-down if their representatives were stopped in their tracks by a Waterford team.

I understand that there was a big Ballygunner presence in Cork ten days ago to see Blackrock hammer the UCC team into the ground.

Blackrock have represented Cork on several occasions and they have not always beaten Waterford teams when they clashed.

Fergal Ryan, John Browne, Wayne Sherlock, Alan Brown are the big intercounty names on their panel and they will be expected to lead the Rebel side to a win.

Ballygunner are playing in their 8th Munster club cham-

pionship game and while they have never won the Billy O'Neill Trophy, they have played in Munster finals. In fact the best of their seven appearances (not including this year) was in 1996 when, after beating Na Piarraig, Cork, for the second year in succession, they went on to defeat Boherlahan in the semi-final and then went on to meet Wolf Tones in the Munster final.

It was rated to be one of the outstanding finals in recent times and it really excited the huge crowd at Sempie Stadium in Thurles. The final score of 4-9 to 4-8 saw the Waterford champions, Ballygunner, lose by a single point. They are now just an hour away from another provincial final and I know that they will not spare themselves in their bid to reach yet another final.

The huge home support can prove a big motivating factor and will bring the best out in the players. Both sides have their stars like those already mentioned on the Blackrock team, with Paul Flynn, Stephen Frampton, Fer-

gal Hartley, Billy O'Sullivan, Tom Fives, etc, with Ballygunner, but here we can have a situation where the match will be won or lost by the performances of the non-inter-county men on both teams.

Hopefully, Ballygunner will pull through, but whoever wins, this is going to be some contest.

For the record, Ballygunner, who have already defeated Ardferf, Kerry, in this year's championship, also represented Waterford in 1966/1967/1968/ 1992/1995 /1996/1997. Mount Sion hold the record, they having represented us on no fewer than 12 occasions in this club championship.

Note — Despite their lack of success in recent years, Cork champions are the specialists in this competition and of their 14 titles, Blackrock are winners on no fewer than five occasions — 1971/1973/1975/1978/1979

In fact, Cork champions made their own of the competition when winning ten in a row between 1971 and 1980.

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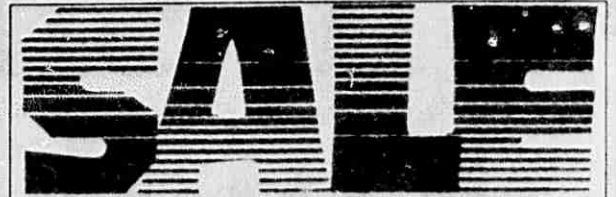
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
