Staffing Situation At Dunabbey Must Be Changed Says UDC

Dungarvan UDC is to write to the South Eastern Health Board highlighting the need to change the current night-time situation which exists in Dunabbey House, a welfare home for the elderly in the town.

The matter was raised at last Monday's meeting of the Urban Council by

Chairman Lar Hart and was previously reported exclusively in the 'Leader' last month.

Cllr. Hart said it was brought to his attention by a family member of a patient in Dunabbey that only one staff member is on duty for the duration of the 12 hour night-time shift.

He claimed that in his

opinion the Health and Safety standards in Dunabbey House are not up to standard.

"There are 40 patients in Dunabbey House and at night there is just one attendant from 8 p.m. until 8 a.m. to give out medication and anything else that is required. There is a security issue here. Through my limited knowledge of the nursing profession I always thought that a nurse would have to give out medication", he told last Monday's meeting.

On his proposal members unanimously agreed to write to the South Eastern

Health Board and its representatives on the County Council to examine the situation.

"It's not fair on patients or continued on page 9

Manager Rules Out Extension Of Boundary As Answer To Rates Shortfall

The extension of Dungarvan's urban boundary along the western side of the town to include the SmithKline Beecham factory has been suggested by local councillor Damien Geoghegan.

Cllr. Geoghegan said the Council should explore all avenues and possibilities before attempting to impose a refuse charge on local townspeople in next week's estimate of expenses

for the coming year.

The rate charge levied on SmithKline Beecham, he felt, would make up the huge shortfall in the Council's revenue caused by the closure of Waterford Foods.

At Monday's meeting of the Urban Council, Cllr. Geoghegan moved a notice of motion that the UDC consider extending the urban boundary to include industrial users, before considering a charge on refuse continued on page 9

Udaras Commitment To Build Advance Factory In Old Parish

A decision by the outgoing board of Udaras na Gaeltachta to allocate monies in their capital allocations for 2000 for the building of an advance factory in Old Parish has been welcomed by Waterford County Councillor Fiachra O'Ceilleachair.

Cllr. O'Ceilleachair and both Coiste Forbartha an tSean Phobail and Comhairle Pobail na Rinne have been lobbying the Udaras to industrially develop a site owned by the authority adjacent to their existing factory unit at the Priest's Cross in Old Parish. Following discussion of the matter at the most recent Udaras board meeting in Ring, the authority has agreed to arrange preparatory work on the site beginning with an access driveway. Cllr. O'

Ceilleachair, however, has pointed out that an existing commitment from the Udaras in their 1999 budget to develop a site in their possession at Baile na nGall in Ring for the purposes of an enterprise units centre remains outstanding. Therefore, in Cllr. O'Ceilleachair's view, the need remains for the local community organisations and elected members of the Udaras's board to push the authority to deliver.

Tanaiste Disallows Question On Dungarvan Industry

The Tanaiste and Minister for Enterprise, Trade & Employment Mary Harney disallowed a question tabled by Austin Deasy in the Dail earlier this month.

The Waterford Fine Gael Deputy had asked Minister Harney if she could explain why no major industry has been cited in Dungarvan to replace the major job losses created by the closure of Waterford Foods.

Deputy Deasy also asked if the Tanaiste will use her offices to see that the Task Force which she set up and/or the IDA would come up with alternative industries as quickly as possible.

His question however was disallowed by the Tanaiste as she felt that the question was not her responsibility and was a matter for the IDA and semi state agencies.

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

I am in full-time employment and due to have my first baby at end of December. Could you give me some information about Maternity Benefit?

ANSWER

To qualify for Maternity Benefit you must be in employment immediately before the first day of your maternity leave. You must have at least 39 weeks PRSI paid in the 12 month period before your maternity leave or you must have at least 39 weeks PRSI paid since first starting work and at least 39 weeks PRSI paid or credited in the relevant tax year. The relevant tax year for a December, 1999 birth is 1997/98.

Maternity Benefit is a payment made for 14 weeks. At least 4 weeks, and not more than 10 of these weeks must be taken before the end of the week in which your baby is due.

Your weekly rate of Maternity Benefit is calculated by dividing your gross income in the relevant tax year (1997/98) by 52 weeks. 70% of this amount is payable, subject to a minimum payment of £86.70 and a maximum payment of £162.80 per week.

Until recently there was a facility for Maternity Benefit to be claimed in stages, i.e. where a newborn infant was kept in hospital and the mother may wish to return to work and 'save' her Maternity Benefit until the the baby's discharge. This facility has been withdrawn from 18th October, 1999.

Under the Maternity Protection Act, 1994, the woman must give her employer at least 4 weeks written notice of her intention to take maternity leave. She must also advise her employer 4 weeks in advance of returning to work and confirm this notification (in writing) two weeks before she expects to return.

County Council Estimates Passed In Record Breaking Time

"MICKEY MOUSE MEETING" SAYS SPECTATOR

Waterford County Council's £24 million-plus budget for the first year of the new millennium was agreed upon in record breaking time last Friday.

Despite the inclusion of a 50p increase in the price of wheelie bin tickets to £3, it took only a few minutes for the Chairman Paddy Kenneally to call for a proposer (Pat Leahy FF) and a seconder (Pat Daley FF) for next year's budget. There being no amendment, Cllr. Kenneally made to close the meeting but instead acceded to the County Manager Donal Connolly's request that he go through his recommended estimates with members.

Indeed, the Estimate of Expenses was passed so rapidly that it completely escaped the attention of Independent councillor Betty Twomey who complained that she may as well have not been in attendance at all.

Likewise Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair who arrived late from a meeting with Ring residents to find the budget 'signed, sealed and delivered' expressed disappointment that he had not been given the opportunity to cast his democratic vote. However Cllr. Kenneally said members had had adequate time in which to discuss the estimates at an earlier meeting held behind closed doors.

Despite calls for a roll-call to ascertain whether or not members were in favour of the estimates, Cllr. Kenneally did however allow Cllr. O Ceilleachair to record his opposition to the increase in refuse charges.

"MICKEY MOUSE MEETING"

Prior to Friday's meeting, Tramore Town Commissioner Eddie Walsh led a lone protest against refuse charges outside the new Civic Office building at Davitt's Quay. After witnessing the estimates meet-

ing from the public gallery, Mr. Walsh described it as a 'Mickey Mouse of a meeting'.

"It was like Frank Hall was ahead of his time and the County Council was like Ballymagash Urban District Council", he stated. "Our elected members weren't clued in!"

Mr. Walsh confirmed that he will be staging a protest on November 22nd again outside the civic offices when Dungarvan UDC will meet to decide on its budget for the coming year. Speculation is rife that the County Manager may introduce a charge for wheelie bins to make up the shortfall in rates caused by the closure of Waterford Foods.

Mr. Walsh said he would call on people in Dungarvan to come out and voice their opinion and join him in his protest on November 22nd.

He also intends to form a countywide committee against what he views as an 'unjust' refuse charge.

WHAT HAS BEEN INCREASED

The County Council estimates provide for expenditure of £24.49 million - an increase of £1,855,000 over that provided for in 1999. The new rate in the £ for 2000 is £44.75 an increase of 5% over last year's figure.

In addition to the increase in wheelie bin tickets, the cost of metered water will also be increased from next January to £2.10 per 1,000 gallons while the rental charge for meters will be increased from £48 per annum to £60.

The costs of disposal of waste at landfill sites will also be increased from £25 per tonne to £35 as of January and to £40 per tonne from 1st July next.

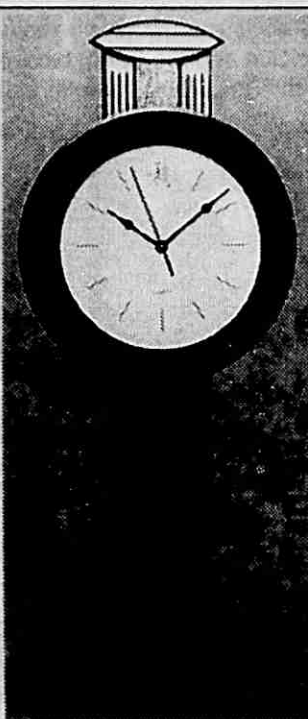

O'Shea Finds Ministerial Response Unacceptable

A statement by the Education Minister with regard to the appointment of additional educational psychologists for primary schools has been described as unacceptable by Waterford TD Brian O'Shea.

The Labour Deputy tabled a question in the Dail recently asking Minister Micheal Martin whether additional psychologists will be appointed to primary schools in the current year.

Minister Martin replied that he has accepted a recommendation that 131 additional psychologists be appointed on a phased basis over a period of five years.

He said that in 1999 a competition to appoint 25 additional psychologists for the National Education Psychological Agency (NEPS) has been organised by the Civil Service Commission. The recruitment of these 25 psychologists, he felt, will increase the capacity of NEPS to provide a service to primary schools.

Commenting on the Minister's response, Deputy O'Shea said the position remains that there is no guarantee that educational psychologists for primary schools will be appointed for the Waterford constituency in the current school year.

EARTH IN SPACE

Imagine holding a ball in a dark room and shining a torch at it. Half of the ball would be lit up and half would be in darkness. In the same way, the Sun lights up only half the Earth — when you are in daylight, it is night for the people on the opposite side of the Earth.

The Earth spins as it moves through space once every 24 hours, and this explains why we have day and night.

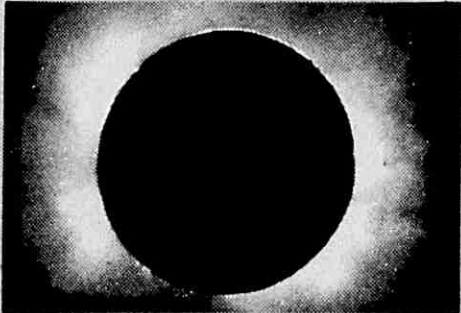
Other measurements of time are also determined by the Earth's position in space.

For example, a year is the length of time it takes for the Earth to complete each lap of its orbit around the Sun.

Similarly, the Moon travels around

the Earth, taking about a month each circuit. During that time, the shape of the Moon varies from a thin crescent to a full circle.

Sometimes the moon moves between the Sun and the Earth, blocking our view of the Sun. This is a solar eclipse.



The Shadow of the Earth

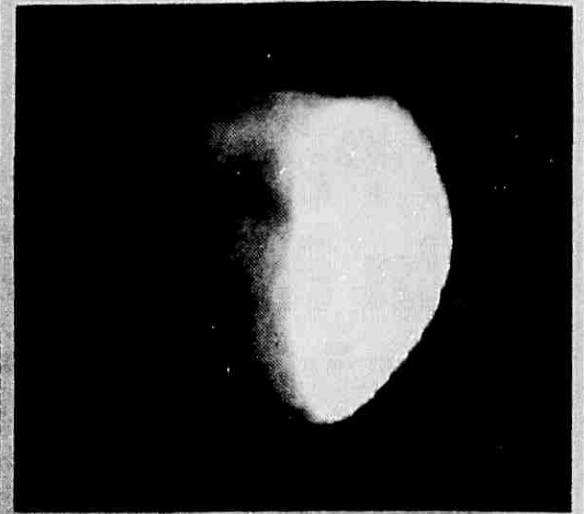
Occasionally, the Moon seems to disappear from the sky. It doesn't really disappear: the Earth blocks light from the Sun, so we can't see it.

These occasions, when the shadow of the Earth falls on the Moon, are called lunar eclipses.

FACT FILE

- The different shapes that the Moon has are called its phases.
- During the solar eclipse, the Moon passes in front of the Sun.
- The Sun lights up half the Earth.
- The seasons occur because the Earth is tilted.

Lunar Eclipse



During a lunar eclipse, the size of the shadow on the moon constantly changes, as the Earth moves.

Cookery Corner



Apple and Sage Roast Pork

Preparation: 20 minutes.

Cooking: 2 hours, 35 minutes.

Serves: 6.

Ingredients:

15g/1/2 oz butter
1 small onion, peeled and finely chopped
1 small cooking apple, peeled, cored and finely diced
50g/2 oz fresh white breadcrumbs
1 tbsp fresh chopped sage (or 1 tsp dried)
1 tbsp fresh chopped parsley
2 tbsp finely chopped nuts
1 egg, size 5, beaten
1 (4kg/3 lb) boned loin of pork
3 tbsp olive oil
2 tsp salt
4 red-skinned onions, peeled and quartered
2 tbsp lemon juice
sprig of flat-leaf parsley to garnish.

Preheat oven to 190°/375°F/Gas mark 5.

Heat the butter in a frying pan, add the chopped onion and apple and fry for 5 minutes. Stir in the breadcrumbs, sage, parsley, nuts and beaten egg and season well. Leave to cool.

Lay the pork, skin side down, on a board and, using a sharp knife, cut a deep slit under the eye of the meat.

Spread stuffing along the length of the loin. Roll up the pork tightly and secure with string. Score skin at narrow intervals. Weigh the joint, then place it in a shallow roasting tin.

Rub 1 tbsp of the oil and the salt into the scored skin. Place in the preheated oven and cook for 30 minutes per 450g/1 lb plus

30 minutes. A 1.4g/3 lb joint with stuffing will take about 2 1/2 hours.

About 30 minutes before the end of the cooking time, place the red onions in a separate roasting tin.

Mix together the rest of the oil and lemon juice and

pour over the onions, tossing to coat well. Roast for 30-40 minutes. Allow the pork to stand for 10 minutes then transfer to a warmed platter and arrange the onion quarters around it. Garnish with a sprig of parsley.

Banana and Berry Brulee

225g/8 oz strawberries, hulled and sliced
2 large bananas, peeled and sliced
2 tbsp caster sugar
300ml/1/2 pt double cream
1 (200g/7 oz) carton Greek-style yoghurt
2 tbsp demerara sugar

METHOD:

Arrange the strawberries and banana slices in 4 heatproof glass serving

bowl and sprinkle with the caster sugar.

Whip the double cream until soft peaks form, then fold in the Greek-style yoghurt. Spoon the mixture over the fruit, then sprinkle the demerara sugar on top and place under a pre-heated, medium-hot grill until the sugar begins to caramelize and bubble.

Beef Chow Mein

Preparation: 15 minutes

Cooking: 20 minutes

Serves: 4.

Ingredients:

225g/8 oz thread egg noodles
350g/12 oz lean beef steak
2 tbsp cornflour
2 tbsp oil
2 garlic cloves, chopped
2.5/1 in piece fresh root ginger, peeled and finely chopped
1 large red pepper, seeded and cut into large chunks
225g/8 oz flat mushrooms, quartered
6 spring onions, cut into 2.5cm/1 in lengths
225g/8 oz bean sprouts
75ml/3 fl oz beef stock
2 tsp hot chilli sauce
1 tsp light soy sauce
Hot chilli sauce to serve.

METHOD:

Place the noodles in a large pan of boiling water. Bring back to the boil. Remove from the heat,

cover and allow to stand for 4 minutes until tender. Drain.

Meanwhile, cut beef across grain into thin 5cm/2 in strips. Coat with cornflour.

Heat the oil in a large frying pan or wok and fry the garlic and ginger for 1 minute.

Add the beef and stir-fry for 5 minutes until browned all over. Remove with a slotted spoon and keep warm.

Add the pepper and mushrooms to the pan and stir-fry for 3-4 minutes. Stir in the spring onions, mangetout and bean sprouts. Stir-fry for a further 2 minutes. Mix the stock with the chilli and soy sauces.

Stir into the vegetables. Add the beef. Bring to a simmer, gently mix in the noodles and heat through. Serve with extra hot chilli sauce.

CHERRY CAKE

Preparations: 25 minutes.

Cooking: 45 minutes.

Serves: 4-6.

Ingredients:

Butter to grease
100g/4 oz soft brown sugar
50g/2 oz margarine
1 egg, size 3, beaten
175g/6 oz self-raising flour
1/2 tsp baking powder
1 tsp cinnamon
7 tbsp milk
Few drops vanilla essence
175g/6 oz glace cherries, halved.

For the topping:

50g/2 oz butter
4 tbsp plain flour
75g/3 oz granulated sugar
50g/2 oz finely chopped blanched almonds
25g/1 oz whole blanched almonds.

Preheat the oven to 190°C/375°F/Mark 5. Grease and line the base

of a 20cm (8in) loose-bottomed square cake tin. Cream together the sugar and margarine until light and fluffy.

Gradually beat in the egg. Sift the flour, baking powder and cinnamon into the mixture and fold in, using a metal spoon.

Mix in the milk and essence. Spoon the cake mixture into the prepared tin, spreading the mixture out evenly. Wash the cherries and pat dry on kitchen paper. Scatter over the cake.

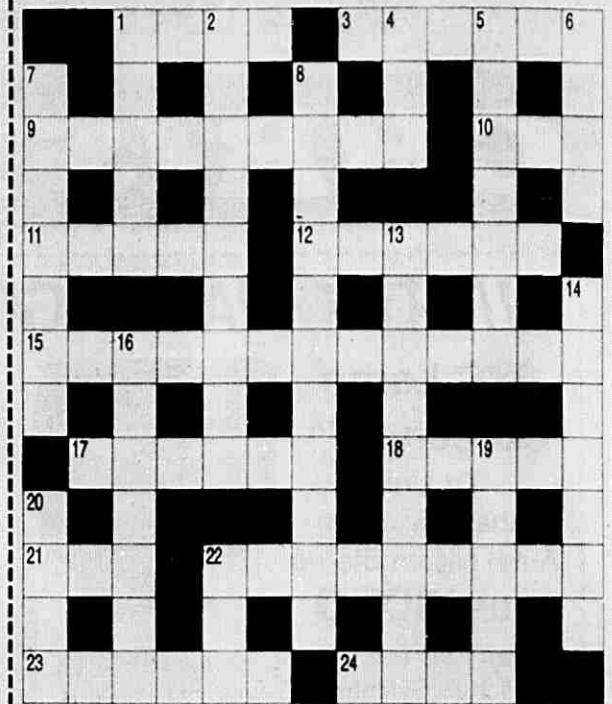
Rub the butter into the flour and stir in the sugar and chopped almonds. Sprinkle crumble mix, then whole nuts on the cake and bake for 45 minutes.

Remove from the oven and cool in the tin. Lift cake out of the tin and serve.

the attendant", he stated adding that many of the patients are mobile and could easily open a door.

Cllr. Hart said the last time the Council wrote to the Health Board representatives in relation to the need for security at St. Joseph's Hospital in Dungarvan, he was disappointed that he did not receive a reply. He hoped that this time these same representatives would raise the matter at board level.

Supporting Cllr. Hart's proposal was Cllr. John Deasy who visited Dunabbey during his election campaign and said the staffing aspect at the facility is an ongoing problem.

He felt that the SEHB should be notified as it is difficult for nurses working excessive hours with no proper back-up.

HEALTH BOARD AWARE OF PROBLEMS

Meanwhile the Chief Executive Officer of the SEHB, John A. Cooney, has written to the Council regarding security arrangements at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan.

In his letter, Mr. Cooney said the Health Board have been aware of security problems arising within the hospital campus, particularly at night.

He said discussions have taken place with unions representing staff to detail the problems and to develop a plan of action to deal with same.

"Arrangements are being made to provide a secure facility for staff cars parked over night. This work is being done in conjunction with other work in the area associated with the installation of an electrical generator and remedial works associated with the vandalised workshops".

Mr. Cooney continued that lighting arrangements within the campus were improved considerably and a further review of same is underway.

With regard to the provision of security at the front gate of the hospital which was suggested by the UDC, Mr. Cooney felt that this is an issue which needs further examination particularly in light of measures now being taken.

"I assure you we are particularly conscious of the security needs of our staff and indeed our property and we will be keeping them under review", he added.

Over £300,000 To UDC For Sale Of Land At Youghal Road

Dungarvan UDC has disposed of almost 5 acres of land at Youghal Road in the town to the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee. The land, which was formerly owned by the Presentation Sisters, will be the site of the VEC's new £1m plus vocational school.

The site was sold to the VEC for a sum of £225,000 as well as the transfer of 4 acres of land at Ringnasillogue, Dungarvan to the Urban Council.

Meanwhile just over .3 acres of land again at Youghal Road was sold by the Council to a private Dublin based individual for a sum of £83,000. The site is adjacent to the new dwelling houses occupied by the Presentation Sisters and was advertised for sale by public treaty.

Pay Per Use Toilets Not Feasible For Dungarvan

The possibility of introducing pay per use toilet facilities in Dungarvan has been ruled out as being financially unfeasible for the local Urban Council.

Instead of purchasing more

modern public toilet facilities for the town, the Council should be looking at what resources it can put into the existing facility on the quay.

That's according to County Manager Donal Connolly who was responding this week to a notice of motion raised by Cllr. John Deasy that the UDC investigate the possibility of purchasing more modern toilet facilities including pay per use models.

Mr. Connolly said that although automated public conveniences are hygienic, modern and self cleansing, they are also very expensive at a cost of approximately £50,000 to install and annual maintenance fees of between £13,000 and £15,000 thereafter.

Cllr. Deasy had suggested that the Council consider purchasing newer, modern facilities, perhaps on the quay, to replace the outdated building near the bridge.

Likewise Cllr. Paddy Power said the current toilet facilities are obsolete by a long number of years but acknowledged that the money involved in the pay per use toilets is enormous.

Mr. Connolly however felt that the problem does not lie with the existing toilet facilities themselves but rather the need that they be manned on a full-time caretaker basis.

collection.

He also highlighted what he described as a 'ludicrous' situation involving two new side-by-side estates where one (namely Spring Meadows) is not within the town boundary.

DISADVANTAGES FOR COUNTY

County Manager Donal Connolly said while such a scenario would present certain advantages to the Urban Council it would also be disadvantageous for Waterford County Council.

The County Council, he explained, has a very low rate base of £2 million countywide on which to draw its revenue while the

Urban Council has an income of over £1 million in rates.

"I don't think it's a solution", he stated.

Any extension of the urban boundary would have to be the subject of an agreement between Dungarvan UDC and Waterford Co. Council and would also require Ministerial approval.

While he agreed with Cllr. Billy Kyne's suggestion of an overview of the town and its hinterland, the Manager however said the Urban Council has quite a significant amount of underdeveloped land within the urban boundary.

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

It's A Good Time To Lay Lawn Turves

November is a very good time indeed for all matters concerning the lawn, especially laying turves.

Yes, I know that lawn turf can be laid any time up to the end of March, but I've always found they knit together so much better in the wetter winter days.

Prepare the site as carefully as you would if you were laying seed, even down to the raking of the surface to a fine tilth. As the new lawn is going to be a permanent feature, it always pays to buy the very best turves you can afford. Good quality weedless turf is what you want.

There is a definite knack to laying down turves: position them so that the cross-joints in one row don't come into line with the cross-joints in another.

Get your row down and then, with the new one, don't start at the extreme edge of the site, but about six inches from it. This means, obviously, that each cross-joint in the second row will be six inches farther along than

the cross-joints in the first row. With your third row, start at the very edge; the fourth row six inches in, and so on.

Because all your turves are the same size, there will be a six inch length projecting at the far end with each alternate row. Simply cut them off and use them for filling the gaps at the beginning of these rows.

If you have trouble in fitting the turves right close up to each other, don't worry. Fill in all the crevices with some fine soil and press it in firmly with the edge of a thin piece of board.

If there isn't any prospect of rain in the next couple of days, give the turves a reasonable watering in.

Now, let's take a look at your established lawns. After all the summer wear and tear it's more than likely the edges are looking very ragged. It isn't always practical to cut away enough of the turf to provide a neat line because that would possibly mean it would be well away from

a neighbouring path or bed. You can easily renew damaged lawn edges by taking off the turf in a foot-wide strip all down the lawn edge, and replace it with new turves. But before you lay the new turves, make sure the hard soil you have revealed is softened up by digging, or, better still, by replacing with new soil to about a depth of four inches.

Another way you can repair ragged edges without buying new turves is to cut out the damaged edge in a neat square of lawn and turn the square round, relaying it with a straight edge along the existing lawn edge.

That'll mean your damaged edge is now inside your lawn and all you have to do is sprinkle it with some fine soil and it will soon heal itself by next spring so as not to be noticed.

Finally, don't forget to spike your lawn now, about four inches deep with a garden fork, or you can buy a special tool for the job. For large lawns you might want to consider hiring a spiked roller.

This Week In The Garden

Sow hardy peas
Some gardeners take culinary peas, plant them outside to mature and are very successful at it. To have any chance whatsoever you must choose a sheltered spot with well drained soil. To improve your chances further, choose the hardiest variety of pea you can such as Pilot Improved or Meteor.

Dig up seakale for forcing
The top growth of the plant should have died back by now and this means the ideal time has arrived to lift the roots for forcing. Dig them up carefully and cut off the side sprouts of the root bundle and leave in a sheltered position outside for planting in March. Face the central roots against a wall and cover them with sand until only the crown is visible.

Force rhubarb
If you start your roots at once in a 21°C greenhouse you should get good sticks in time for Christmas. Strong roots should be lifted and left in the open for a few days. If the weather is frosty it will actually improve the growth of the plant later on. Plant in the greenhouse, in deep soil close together, cover them with bin liners so they are in complete darkness, water moderately and try to maintain a temperature range of 13-24°C.

Tidy herbaceous borders
Most herbaceous perennials will have finished flowering and the borders should be made ready for winter. Cut off all of dead or dying leaves and stems but leave all the evergreen leaves alone. Give the ground a dusting of bone meal and prick the surface of the ground with a fork, being careful not to disturb plants or bulbs in the process.

Turn over all free ground
By this time there should be lots of free ground for digging. Most of the garden should be attended to with a spade at this time of the year. Most of the vegetable garden should be dug over to two or even three depths of a spade.

Cut back deciduous hedges
All deciduous hedges such as hawthorn, blackthorn, myrobalan plum, sweet brier, beech and tamarisk can be pruned in November. This is also a good time to do any hard cutting you think may be necessary to keep plant growth within bounds. The base of the hawthorn or sweet brier sometimes gets a bit bare, but this can be rectified by pinning the longer shoots into position.

Small Scale Wind Farm Envisaged By Local Backers

As reported in last week's edition of the 'Leader' a planning application for a 40 metre wind test mast at Coolnacreeena, Cappoquin was lodged with Waterford County Council earlier this month.

This application is separate to a similar proposal put forward by Charles Keane for a wind turbine development in an area near the Vee.

The two local promoters behind the application are Ned Morrissey and Seamus O'Donnell who hope to eventually erect a small scale wind farm in Coolnacreeena.

If their application for a test mast is successful, the 40m structure will be erected on an elevated site owned by Mr. Morrissey, where it will monitor the wind over a 12 month period. The test mast will provide the promoters with information on whether or not a wind farm would be suitable in the area. The small scale development would produce less than 5 megawatts of electricity and would be connected into the nearest power line on Mr. Morrissey's farm.

Local opposition however has already manifested itself in the form of the Coole Action Group which has been

established to oppose the development.

Chairman of the Coole Action Group, John Kiely told the 'Leader' that 25 people are involved in the group and a number of meetings have already been held. At the group's third meeting last Thursday it was decided to lodge an objection with the Council against the proposed test mast.

MORE INFO NEEDED SAY OBJECTORS

The Coole Action Group met last week with Seamus O'Donnell and Ned Morrissey but Mr. Kiely still feels that further information is needed on a number of issues such as the health risks associated with wind turbines; is there another backer; and the question of pylons etc.

Mr. Kiely said the group are objecting to the proposed test mast on the grounds that if it is granted planning permission, a wind farm will be the next step. He claimed that a 40 metre mast at Coolnacreeena would

be seen for miles around from areas such as the Comeragh Drive, Clashmore and Youghal.

With twenty houses and many young families and children in the Coole area, Mr. Kiely said the community has built itself up over the last 3 years but warned that many young farmers have threatened to move out if the wind farm gets the go ahead.

"EU policy is to put people back in rural areas", said Mr. Kiely. "This will ruin the area - it's untouched at the moment".

He further stated that the roads servicing the area are only wide enough to service a milk tanker and would pose enormous difficulties for large trucks during any construction phase.

DEVELOPERS RESPOND

Speaking to the 'Leader', Ned Morrissey denied the existence of any 'mysterious backer' behind himself or Mr. O'Donnell.

He remains hopeful that local people will get involved in the project by investing in it.

"This is an opportunity for all of us to get involved", said Mr. Morrissey adding that bankers would consider

such an investment as a very safe bet.

Following their recent meeting with local residents, both promoters made a note of all the concerns expressed and expect to get back to residents with answers within the next week or two.

At a national wind energy conference in Dublin yesterday, Mr. Morrissey hoped to learn of new sources of information.

"There are no health risks associated with wind masts to my knowledge", he stated. As the father of five young children and the family in closest proximity to the proposed development, Mr. Morrissey said that naturally he would not back the project if there were any health risks involved.

Heavy duty pylons used in some wind farm developments are the only source of possible risks to health but these, said Mr. Morrissey, will not form part of the Coolnacreeena project.

He again hoped that local residents will support the project and get involved and he would be more than happy to have their concerns dealt with by a relevant specialist.

The impact of television on the young

By the time the average American child reaches 18 he will have spent 22,000 hours watching T.V. - double the time spent in the classroom. In 1993 a survey carried out in the U.S. found that there were three violent acts during prime time viewing and eighteen during Saturday morning programs. I don't consider myself the T.V. police - television is here to stay and is a great source of entertainment and information - but we shouldn't underestimate the power of television and the damage that unlimited, unsupervised T.V. watching can do to children's minds.

Over forty years ago the Katzen Jammer kids took America by storm. The two boys, Hans and Fritz, engaged in anti-social behaviour, playing pranks on authority figures. The psychological message was that boys will be boys

and that having a strong resentment towards authority was fun.

Hanz and Fritz embodied the psychopathic character:

1. Their outward appearance was not mean - mommy called them her little angels - so they passed for something they weren't.

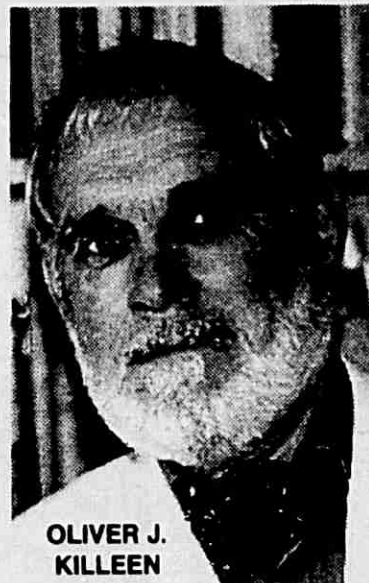
2. They participated in violent anti-social behaviour.

3. They seemed thrilled in the face of danger and didn't fear the consequences.

We can find many similar examples in modern T.V. and very often the messages are so subtle, yet so dangerous, that we don't notice them.

Early adolescence is a time when young people begin to question who they are. It's that time when they begin to discover a private self, different from the person they act in public. It's the time in adolescents' lives that they explore images of who they are and who they might become. These flights of fantasy in solitude provide the opportunity for exploring different selves. Young people who are bombarded with T.V. imagery imprint the pictures on their minds and in so doing they are forming in their abstract intellect a reality that is filled with violence, sex, degradation and so on.

The brain is very fragile although it does have self protective mechanisms. T.V. stimulants move faster than the brain can process and analyse them. T.V. relies on fixated eye movement - this visual consciousness slows the brain and numbs it into relaxation, making it more susceptible to virtual realities and confusing them with reality. A T.V. show with constantly changing short sequences holds the attention by a sensory bombardment that maximises optical responses. We are drawn back to the set to process each new sequence of information as it's presented. With continual watching, an addiction is developed which affects these parts of the brain - the reptilian or survival oriented brain - the cerebral cortex which controls intellectual functioning and creativity - and the limbic centre which is the emotive centre of the brain. In the child the limbic system is fragile and its function is to enable him to experience and to express emotions and to value and trust

them. T.V. watching can delay emotional experience because it cultures emotional laziness, also reality's challenges are escaped - sadly, because these challenges exist.

VIRTUAL REALITY

Children spend a lot of their time relating to people in virtual reality but are starved for relationship with their family. They bond with the people they meet on T.V. and make them part of their interior family.

Unfortunately, children learn from this interior family to do things that are against the law - like violent acts and underage sex. Television has deformed the minds of so many of our young as it provides a smorgasbord of violent and sexual material inappropriate to children's minds. Seeing scenes whilst in a passive position retards brain development and this has been attributed to learning difficulties. T.V. viewing demands few of the cognitive skills considered important, in particular the levels of attention and problem solving required are low. Indeed researchers are interested in investigating the difference in brain development between children who have a continuous diet of T.V. and less frequent watchers.

Video games or play stations are used mainly by 7-17 year olds and it's proven that these games handicap the corpus callosum and pre-frontal areas of the brain. The corpus callosum connects the brain's two hemispheres, allowing the integration of the brain's left and right brain processing. The prefrontal areas enables reading for meaning and problem solving.

Adolescents need cognitive activities to challenge them to master skills needed later in life. They also need physical activities to bring awareness and control of the motor skills and

awareness of emotions to facilitate empathy and understanding.

Hormone levels are affected by the media - testosterone in males and in females oestrogen. When watching something intensely on T.V. hormone levels, including cortisol, the stress hormone rise. This makes viewers anxious, irritable and agitated. Aggression is viewed as normal and is an ever present human potential when internal and social controls are weak.

Acts of violence are the result of certain forces - external stimuli which lower inhibitions on aggression and the inability of individuals to withstand these influences due to inadequacy. Young people today through T.V. are motivated to do things without accepting full responsibility for their actions. The American Psychological Association, in a study on violence and youth, concluded that higher levels of viewing violence on T.V. correlate with increased acceptance of aggressive behaviour and attitudes.

WHAT CAN WE DO?

By allowing children to watch unlimited unsupervised T.V. we teach them by default that violence and promiscuous sex is OK. and in doing so we promote their emotional alienation. Parents must take personal responsibility and monitor T.V. viewing.

They must have rules in the home and enforce them with consistency. They must emphasise and encourage more family interaction and more interpersonal skills. Television shouldn't be present in every room in the house and I strongly discourage parents from putting T.V.'s in children's bedrooms. Parents must restrict T.V. with the same rigour as they would alcohol or drugs.

CAN WE TALK?

The brain is ravenous for stimulating conversation - it needs slow, quiet conversation so that it can interpret the images of language. Unfortunately, the level of conversation in some homes is limited to - Who's got the remote control? I suggest that you turn off the T.V. for conversation. Encourage interactive activities like family board games and hobbies which require active participation.

There should be no T.V. watching during meals. If we want to promote a balanced moderate attitude towards T.V. viewing we must practice what we preach. When family life fails, society crumbles. We are what we are with each other and one of the most precious things we can have with our children is being actively present with them. This means that we mustn't allow television to dominate family life

SILAGE

PREVENT SILAGE SPOILAGE

Once the silage pit is opened the quality deteriorates because of exposure to air. Very dry silage spoils much more rapidly than wetter silage, but the width of the pit and speed of usage also affects it. The result is heating and mould growth. This leads to a lot of waste of an expensive, scarce commodity.

It is difficult to totally prevent spoilage but it could be minimised by the following practices:

Keep the silage face as undisturbed as possible. Rough or careless handling will allow air to penetrate deeply. The shear grab minimises face disturbance.

Make sure the cover remains tight across the top and sides of the pit. But, do not pull the cover down over the face of the pit, because this increases the rate of spoilage by increasing the temperature around the face resulting in mould growth.

Move across the face of the pit as quickly as possible - difficult with wide pits.

Do not put out a lot more silage than the animals will eat each day. Uneaten silage will go stale thus decreasing animal intake, as well as more wastage.

CATTLE HEALTH

RESPIRATORY DISEASE RISK

Severe outbreaks of respiratory infection are occurring on many farms. The result is loss of income due to poor animal performance and extra veterinary bills. The incidence of respiratory disease increases significantly in mild, calm weather. This type of weather leads to poor air movement in cattle sheds. Good ventilation is essential, otherwise stale contaminated air will build up around stock and this increases the risk of infection.

It is vital to open up sheds as much as possible in calm weather. Air inlets and outlets areas (11/2 sq. ft./cow for both) should be checked to see that they are adequate and functioning properly.

Check cattle daily for symptoms of infection - coughing, runny noses, running eyes, feed refusal, dullness. If in any doubt consult your vet.

Draughts, caused by broken doors, windows and even open doors, lead to pneumonia and respiratory problems.

EXTERNAL PARASITES

Lice do not transmit any disease but can cause irritation and skin damage. A severe lice infestation can reduce animal performance by up to 30 per cent. Yet lice are easy and cheap to control.

Spraying with a Tixol type solution is cheap and effective (30 - 50p per treatment) where the animal is sprayed all over. This method of control is however labour intensive and must be completed a number of times throughout the winter. The use of pour-on products are more expensive (80 - 160p per treatment) but these products are very convenient and only need to be applied at most twice during the winter.

The Avermectin based products are the most expensive way to control lice (£1.50 - £7.00 per treatment) but these do control stomach worms, lung worms and adult fluke also. These products are only an aid to controlling biting lice.

Lice problems can re-occur after treatment, due to animals not being treated properly and/or new untreated animals being introduced. So always watch out for lice symptoms on animals even after treatment.

NEW PREMIA RULES

April 1998 Calves — Male calves born in April 1998 that have not had their 10 month premium drawn down yet should have it applied for before January 1st.

Under the new rules this premium can be applied on up until 19 months of age (ie. one month earlier than up until now). For these cattle this period runs out at the end of this year where previously it would have ran into January 2000.:

Minister Walsh Announces 27% Increase In Agriculture Vote

The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Mr Joe Walsh TD, has announced the record expenditure provision of £879m gross for agriculture in the Book of Estimates for the year 2000. "This represents a 27% increase in net terms and is an important indicator of the Government's commitment to the agricultural and rural development," said the Minister.

The Estimates make major provision for Rural Development, Livestock improvement, on farm investment, research and training and the Food Industry.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT

Over £400m is being allocated to a Rural Development Programme encompassing the Rural Environment Protection Scheme (REPS), the Early Retirement Scheme, and headage. This is one of the successes of the Agenda

2000 negotiations, which secured these measures for the period 2000 to 2006. The Programme will require EU Commission approval. The monies, both national and EU, are substantial and the Minister said that he was committed to delivery of quality schemes and high standards of accountability to ensure that the monies were spent to good effect.

● **REPS:** The enthusiasm of the farming community for REPS is well established. Over 40,000 farmers are participating in the measure, which encourages environmentally friendly farming and a sustainable agriculture for the future. The allocation of £212m for the year 2000 is over 18% above that in 1999.

● **Early Retirement:** Over £80m is being provided for the year 2000. With over 9,000 participants to date, the Scheme provides a regular income to partici-

pants and is a vehicle for transfer of land and restructuring of agriculture.

● **Installation Aid:** Funding is also provided in the Vote for payments under the national scheme of installation aid for young farmers, which was approved by the European Commission during 1999.

● **Headage:** The Minister was particularly pleased with the provision of £122.4m for headage, which, he said, is an important contribution to cash flow in rural areas.

STRUCTURAL MEASURES INCLUDING ON-FARM INVESTMENT

With the ending of funding under the 1994-1999 OPARDF Schemes the 2000 Estimates will provide funding of £14m for commitments under the national schemes introduced in 1999. In addition, it is proposed to provide nearly £36m in structural support measures for agricultural

and rural development within the new National Plan.

LIVESTOCK IMPROVEMENT

Expenditure on livestock improvement measures will increase by 12% to over £69m. This includes a significant allocation of funds amounting to over £12m to the National Beef Assurance Scheme and Cattle Registration. The total allocation for animal health measures, including disease eradication amounts to £56m.

RESEARCH AND TRAINING

There is continued commitment of substantial funds to research and training at national level and at levels to be agreed with the European Commission in the context of the National Development Plan.

In particular, the Estimates include a special allocation of £2m for upgrading of facilities in Teagasc and private agricultural colleges.

SOUTH EAST ICMSA NEWS

ICMSA Meet Minister For Finance

Mr. Frank Allen, President of ICMSA who met the Minister for Finance, Mr. Charlie McCreevy, T.D. said that he fully agreed with the Minister's grave concern about the lending institutions.

Mr. Allen said that the banking sector played a vital role in the business and domestic life of the country. As can be seen from the recent events no effective control on banks exists. In this vacuum unfortunately the trust placed in the banks by the general public and by the Government in licensing the banks has been grossly abused.

"I am not convinced that the voluntary Credit Ombudsman system is adequate or appropriate. I have proposed to the Minister that he should establish a statutory Ombudsman for the credit sector and that this should be funded directly by the credit sector," said Mr. Allen.

Mr. Allen called on the Central Bank and the Government to publish the retail credit rates available to customers in the other Euro economies. He said that farmers had total borrowings of £2260 million and last year paid £197 million interest the highest on record. Concluding, Mr. Allen said that ICMSA has calculated that farmers are being over charged some £33 million a year by banks.

Residents Concerned Over Ardmore Treatment Plant

Waterford County Councillor Billy Kyne made representations to officials recently when he highlighted concerns expressed by Curragh residents with regard to the siting of the Ardmore treatment plant.

At the October meeting of the local authority Cllr. Kyne requested a written report on whether the Council has given the consultants for the scheme any brief to consider an alternative location for the plant. He raised the matter in response to concerns expressed by the residents in the Curragh Action Group. Cllr. Kyne also asked if an alternative site can be positively pursued at

this stage with the Department of the Environment. In a written response to his request, Co. Engineer John O'Flynn said the Council has sought proposals from consultants for the preparation of a preliminary report for a new sewerage scheme for Ardmore. In seeking submissions from suitable consultants, the Council prepared a brief which set out the difficulties encountered at Ardmore along with the issues to be addressed.

Mr. O'Flynn continued that the submissions received by the Council will now be examined and the consultants will be interviewed by an independent assessment panel. He said it is expected that the consultants will take about 5 months to prepare the preliminary report which will then be forwarded to the Department of the Environment for approval.

"It would be a matter for the consultants to assess the optimum location for the siting of the proposed wastewater treatment plant and whether this will be in the Curragh area or not is not known at this stage", said Mr. O'Flynn. "Earlier assessment by the Council had indicated to us that the Curragh area had potential for such siting but it is obviously not the only area available".

He stressed again that there is currently no final location identified for the proposed sewage treatment plant.

Art Needed At Roundabouts

Cllr. John Deasy has suggested that the County Council examine strategically placed roundabouts in the county with a view to having monuments or some form of art work as their centrepiece.

Speaking at last week's meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Deasy said statues of famous local people could be erected on suitable roundabouts and sponsorship could be sought from local companies.

He said the new roundabout at Kilrush was a perfect example of the type of roundabout which could benefit from such a proposal. Monuments and statues are common features of roundabouts on the continent, he further added.

However while County Engineer John O'Flynn said this would cut out the need for maintaining flowerbeds etc., if people 'plow through' a roundabout 'they won't get killed by a blade of grass'. He said there are problems associated with Cllr. Deasy's proposal such as monuments impeding the driver's sight-line and being a distraction.

NEW WATERFORD CANCER UNIT

The Mayor of Waterford Alderman Pat Hayes recently called a meeting of all the various local authority heads in the county to discuss a vitally important health project for Waterford.

Among those in attendance Waterford County Council Chairman Paddy Kenneally who said it is hoped to fund a cancer unit at Waterford Regional Hospital costing approximately £5 million. The project will be officially launched in January.

Cllr. Kenneally has appealed to all South Eastern Health Board representatives on the Council to support this worthwhile venture.

BALLINAMEELA CAR PARK

At last week's meeting Chairman Cllr. Paddy Kenneally moved a notice of motion that the Council provide a car park on Council owned property at Ballinameela Church. His proposal was seconded by Cllr. Nora Flynn.

TOLL ROAD FOR KILMAC' PROJECT?

The introduction of a toll road as part of the overall Kilmacthomas realignment project is currently being considered by the National Roads Authority.

Work on the multi million pound project is expected to commence at the end of this month by Bec Freres/Priority Construction Ltd.

According to County Secretary Peter Carey the idea of a toll bridge is merely being considered by the NRA and if it was to be included there would first be a public consultation process.

IMPROVE GRAVEYARDS

Cllr. James Tobin raised a notice of motion that the Council clean and reopen to visitors all graveyards under its control.

TRAFFIC CONFUSION AT RING CROSS

The turn-off to Ring at Cantwell's Cross on the main N25 is the source of some confusion to drivers.

Speaking at last week's meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair said cars travelling to Ring are often competing with trucks using the slow lane leading up to the crossroads.

"There is confusion as to whether trucks are entering Ring or not", said Cllr. O Ceilleachair. "The slow lane doubles up as the entrance to Ring".

County Engineer John O'Flynn said he will look at the situation and see if something can be done although he added that not many accidents have been reported at the Cross.

EDUCATION FEES CRITICISED

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair moved a notice of motion last week that members of Waterford County Council register their disapproval of exam fees at second level and registration fees at third level education.

He said registration fees are a back door way of introducing college fees while second level exam fees are punitive for families with several children who have to pay for free education.

His proposal was seconded by Cllr. Ger Barron.

PROJECTS GRANTED PERMISSION

During October the County Council granted planning permission for the following projects:

Matt Power and John Flanagan were granted permission for renovation and restoration works to the coastguard station at Dysert, Ardmore and its redevelopment into four houses and an apartment.

Rev. Nicholas O'Mahoney P.P. Dungarvan was granted permission for the erection of a temporary classroom at Carriglea national school.

At Ballinroad, James Moroney was given the go ahead for the construction of a licensed public house, three shops, six 2 bedroom apartments in a dormer style building and car parking.

RECYCLING BINS AT KNOCKANORE

Waterford County Council will concentrate on providing recycling facilities in more densely populated areas in West Waterford before considering such smaller villages as Knockanore. Local councillor James Tobin however feels that recycling bins should be provided at Knockanore where a site is available. He moved a notice of motion to that effect at last week's Co. Council meeting.

Cllr. Tobin claimed that rural villages should be treated the same as small towns and pointed out that Knockanore is 12 miles away from Cappoquin and Lismore where bins are already made available.

Agreeing to keep Cllr. Tobin's request under review, County Engineer John O'Flynn said the Council intend to provide recycling facilities in bigger areas first.

STRADBALLY NOTES

CONTAMINATED WATER AT SEAFIELD NATIONAL SCHOOL

On the 6th of September the drinking water was tested in Seafield National School and again on the 15th September by Claire Devine, Environmental Officer from Waterford. The drinking water in the school was found to be contaminated by ecoli, coliforms and has a high aluminium content.

Disturbingly this water is coming from a private well for the school which means that the ground-water in the area is contaminated. Research in America through

W.H.O. has indicated that high aluminium content consumed in water is linked to Alzheimers disease in later life. Breda Kiely is requesting that the water is turned off immediately, and has brought the situation to the attention of the Stradbally Tourism and Enterprise Group.

PRIVATE COMPANY TO MANAGE ROCKWELL COLLEGE

Rockwell College, Tipperary's 135 year old school run by the Holy Ghost Fathers, will be ringing in the changes in the coming months when it hands over its day to day running to a private company. The Holy Ghost Fathers surprised many at the weekend when they announced that their five Irish Schools would be involved in a management restructure due to the dwindling vocations. The four other schools are in Dublin, Blackrock College, Templeogue College, Rathmines and Saint Michaels College, Ballsbridge. Rockwell's pupil numbers have steadied off at around 450 in recent years. In the early days, there were up to 500 boarders at any one time. Today there are 150 boarders and 300 day students, Rockwell has no plans to phase out the boarding part of the School. The School at Rockwell is subsidised to the tune of £100,000 a year by the Orders own funds. There were only three vocations to the Order last year and only twelve world wide. Today there are five Holy Ghost Fathers teaching in Rockwell compared to 30 or 40 in early days. Previously the Earl of Lismore's hunting lodge, Rockwell was converted into a seminary by the Holy Ghost Fathers in 1864. It was initially established to train seminarians for missionary work in England and Scotland.

"Moll" by Ballyduff Drama Group

A John B. Keane play will always be at least good; a play performed by Ballyduff Drama Group will also, always be at least good. Combine the two and it could turn out to be great. This particular production has all the feeling of something which could indeed be great and something which should certainly not be missed.

John B. Keane writes about the soul of a rural Ireland which is fast fading. He regularly writes about that Ireland with tenderness, with wit and, even sometimes, with anger and harshness. No anger here, though, or any harshness for that matter. "Moll" is, without doubt, Keane's comic masterpiece and a fair tribute to the power of woman. The parish priest might hold the reins but it's the housekeeper who dictates the pace and also does the steering. The power to fatten or to starve is indeed a weighty authority and, put in the right hands, could well be put on a par with the power to save souls.

All this comic material, if dropped into poorish hands, would still come out only as words. Put into the hands of the likes of Mary Flavin-Colbert, who plays the title role, and you can be assured that it will come out as verbal gold. Anyone who saw her cameo role as the maid in last year's "Out of Order" will vouch for that. Add in Padjo Ahern, John Leamy, Sean Ahern, Phil McGrath and Henry O'Keeffe (the latter three being the hotel manager, the nurse and the body from last year) and a guest appearance from Fr. Eamonn Barry and the comic plot thickens to a brilliant stew. As Fr. Berry, on accepting the role, was heard to declare: "God gave me a vocation, The Bishop of Cloyne gave me a ministry and John B. Keane gave me a parish". Or words to that effect.

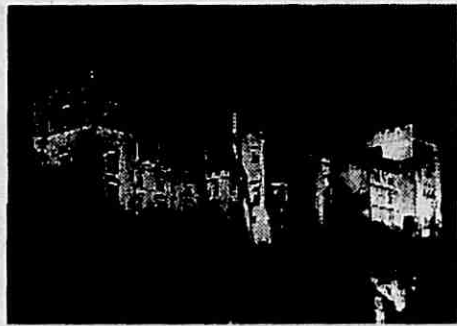

Lismore Notes



END OF AN ERA

On Monday last 15th November 1999, Rev. Bro. Patrick Ryan, the last remaining link with the Christian Brothers in Lismore left Lismore for Nenagh, Co. Tipperary.

Very Rev. Canon Fogarty who died in 1869 had requested the Christian Brothers to open a school in Lismore. On the 6th February 1871, the Brothers came

to Lismore and for twelve months worked from Main Street before moving to their present school at the top of Gallows Hill.

From then until January this year the Christian Brothers have provided primary and secondary education in the town of Lismore for students from Lismore, Cappoquin, Ballyduff, Tallow, Knockanore etc.

On the 15th January 1999 a civic reception was accorded the Brothers on their departure from the town. Bro. Ryan acted in a caretaker capacity until last Monday 15th November. On Friday last 12th November a public auction was held of the contents of the Monastery. The Monastery has now been purchased by Waterford County Council. So with Bro. Ryan's departure a link has been cut and an era has ended, an era that has lasted almost 130 years.

For all of us who can thank the Christian Brothers in Lismore for our education, last weekend was indeed a very sad occasion. But life goes on and when we pass our Alma Mater in the future maybe we can think of all the happy hours we spent there, and also say a quick prayer for all of the brothers who gave so much of their time to us.

IAIN DUGGAN'S 'BEAUTIFUL COUNTRY' LAUNCHED

Abbeyside born poet, Iain (Sean) Duggan a Franciscan priest attached to St. Francis' Church in Cork and brother of popular local man Phil Duggan launched his second collection of poetry entitled "Beautiful Country" in the Bank of Ireland, Wexford town on Tuesday November 9th.

On entering the bank one was greeted by beautiful music played by a group of classical musicians. The catering company commissioned for the night provided a lovely array of savouries tastefully laid out befitting the importance of the occasion.

At 8.30 pm the formal proceedings commenced when playwright, actor and novelist Billy Roche approached the podium and stated that he was loud in his admiration for Fr. Iain as with little backup and little money he had produced a book that was artistically worthwhile. The cover, he went on to state tells us a lot about the contents of the book as it depicts the sun, moon, stars

and all that mother nature had to offer. The only element missing he reflected were human beings themselves. Some of the poems were prayers and others like the poem 'St. Anthony' reflected the superstitions inherent in the Church. Good humouredly he pointed out that when we stand under the Mistletoe we expect to come away with something. The book is a journey maybe of loneliness but not hopelessness. It reflects the joy of Christmas and also the ups and downs of people's lives.

Part One - Angels We Have Heard

Marion O'Leary regarded it as an honour to be present. She selected the title poem of part one for her first reading.

"No way could you not believe it.

I heard him. One of the angels spoke.

As true as God I saw the lips moving

And when finally the talking broke

I left the altar rails like a

shot from a gun, out the chapel door and home.

I thought, there will never again be a

Christmas like it, however many come".

Her other selections were 'Painting by Robert Stubner' from part two and 'The Harvest Home' from part four.

Other Readings

Tomas Murray's first selection was the poem Noel which was a translation from the Irish of Maire Mhac an tSaoi. He also chose 'St. Anthony' and 'Mothers of the World'. Fr. Iain himself chose 'The Mathematics Man' a translation from the Irish of his own brother Pilib O Dugain. The Mathematics Man was Bro. Tomas O Cathain who was principal of Dungarvan Secondary C.B.S. in the 1950's.

'You had your other side, You could say to every mother,

We won't even talk about fees,

Simply send them on the double!"

The large audience were treated to a rendering of the title poem 'Beautiful Country' sung by Anthony Duggan in ballad form. The music was composed by the poet himself who intended Beautiful Country to be 'Words for a Song'.

Conclusion

Fr. Iain writes from the viewpoint of a believer, who is also an astute observer of life as it happens, and reports back to the reader with a rare degree of simplicity and freshness. The warmth and beauty of Christmas time is succeeded by the new hope of spring, with Easter at its heart.

In the title sequence we encounter Death and other intruders; we experience human fragility, with all that entails. The final section is concerned with the balance between success and failure, with the notion that one's existence is bound up with continually straining to do better, in as Patrick Kavanagh suggests, 'our search for that which has no stain'.

WORLD WAR ONE & WEST WATERFORD

On 11th November 1918 - 81 years ago - World War One began its final phase as the Armistice terms were accepted by the German Government and fighting came to a halt on the Western Front. No one will ever know how many men and women perished while on military or naval duty. An estimate is nine million on all sides of the conflict. Over seventy million men were mobilised and about one in every eight died.

Throughout the world, countries remember the Fallen of the Great War on special days Armistice Day in France, Anzac Day in Australia and New Zealand, Memorial Day in the United States of America, and Remembrance Day in Britain.

After the War, the Poppy became the symbol of the tragedy of war and the renewal of life because poppies bloomed on many French battlefields. In the United States, local communities chose one day as Poppy Day, and the proceeds of the sale of poppies are used for the benefit of disabled and needy veterans.

In Ireland, too, the Poppy is increasingly worn on 11th November each year in special remembrance of the 50,000 Irishmen who gave their lives unselfishly in World War One. The Great War was almost over, but when did it end for their families?

Here, in our own County Waterford, friends and families mourned the loss of over 700 men. Almost every household had lost a relative or friend. The following is contributed by Michael Desmond of Ballymacarbry.....

"It all ended eighty-one years ago and is now consigned to the history book as a far away war in a far away time fought in our grandparents and great-grandparents time. Yet this war affected all corners of the globe and even an area like Fourmilewater. The Great War touched Newcastle and Ballinamult. No fewer than eight from this area were killed between 1914 and 1918. Yet outside of their immediate families very few know anything about them.

Three men from Fourmilewater and Newcastle were killed on the same day, the 21st of March 1918. In the early

In memory of those men of Munster who died fighting for freedom. A tribute erected by the people of the Province and Cork its Capital City.

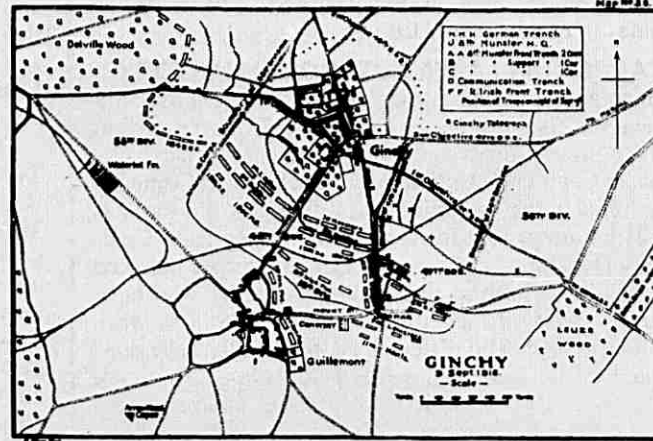
hours of that morning the German army began what would be their last great onslaught against Allied lines along the Somme. The Germans managed to deceive the Allies into believing that the attack would take place much further north than transpired, leaving the British 5th army to take the full brunt of the attack that morning. Shelling commenced at 4:40 am; the Germans using 6,000 heavy artillery pieces and 3,000 mortars kept up a five-hour barrage before sending men over the top and across no-mans land. Some of the heaviest fighting took place against the 36th and 16th Irish Divisions. One company was annihilated with another suffering fifty-percent losses. Among the dead was John Hickey, Private 10359, from Rathokelly, Newcastle and J. Mansfield. Private 527, Largewood, Newcastle. Both are commemorated at Pozieres Memorial on Panel 6. The Germans encountered stiff resistance four miles West of St. Quentin around the Village of Savy. The 30th division was defending the line at Savy. All day they held out against heavy artillery and land attack but were withdrawn that night.

Among the dead at Savy was a Ballymacarbry man. John Nugent Private 43299, 30th Bn., Machine gun Corps (Inf.). John is buried at Savy British Cemetery, Aisne, France. Grave I.H. 23.

His brother, Maurice Nugent, Private 10798, 2nd Bn., Royal Irish Regiment, died on Friday 2nd June 1916 aged 19. He is buried in Plot 1. Row A. Grave 20. Corbie Communal Cemetery Extension Somme.

The Irish had taken Ginchy on September 9th, 1916 after heavy fighting with serious losses. They lost 224 officers and 4,090 men between September 3rd and 9th. On September 15th, with the aid of the Tank (first time used in battle) the 1st and 2nd Irish Guards launched an attack on remaining German positions in and around Ginchy. They captured their objectives. The losses, however, were horrendous. The 1st and 2nd Irish Guards were almost destroyed. Among the dead on that historic day was Peter O'Brien, Private 9338, 2nd Bn., Irish Guards. Peter was son of Patrick and Catherine O'Brien Fourmilewater, Ballymacarbry. Peter is commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial, Somme, France at Pier 7 Face "D". Other casualties included Irish Nationalist Tom Kettle, Raymond Asquith, and son of the British Prime Minister - badly wounded was one Harold Macmillan, future Prime Minister of Britain. Surviving that day was Emmet Dalton, later a general in the Irish Army in the war of Independence and Civil War.

While the Somme may be the most famous field of conflict in WWI, the battles around the Belgium town of Ypres must also rank up there for the loss of life that took place. A bulge was formed by the Allies at the Front early in 1914

near the Belgium town of Ypres. The fields around Ypres were fertile and would be the envy of any farming community. However, they hid the years of hard toil Belgium farmers had put into draining this area that was once bog. The war destroyed the drainage system and soon the salient was turned into a morass. By 1917 the 3rd battle of Ypres was about to take place; it would be better known for Passchendaele and Messines Ridge. All through July the Allies built up their forces for an attack which was to take place on 31st of July 1917. For days beforehand artillery duels were waged across no-mans land and perhaps in one of these rounds of shelling a Newcastle man was wounded and subsequently died.

John Dunne, Driver 31735, Royal Field Artillery, Ammunition Column, died of wounds 28th July 1917. He was the son of William and Margaret Dunne, Middlequarter Newcastle. John is buried at Dozinghem Military Cemetery, Westvleteren, Poperinge, near Ypres, in grave I.H. 12. John left Newcastle for the war with John Mansfield and John Hickey.

Others who died included William Flynn, Private 7874, died on Thursday, 24th January 1918 aged 20. He was with the 5th Bn., Royal Irish Regiment and was buried at sea. He is commemorated at the Chatby Memorial, M.R.41 Alexandria, Egypt; William was from Ballinagulkee, Ballinamult. He was son of William and Ellen Flynn. The 5th Royal Irish were serving in the Holy Land at the end of 1917 beginning 1918.

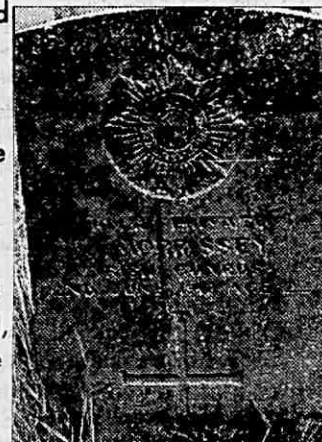
Not all are buried in some foreign corner, James Morrissey, Private 10438, is buried in Kilcreggane graveyard. James was in the 3rd Bn., Irish Guards and died on Sunday 2nd June 1918. He was son of Mrs M. Morrissey of Castlequarter, Ballymacarbry.

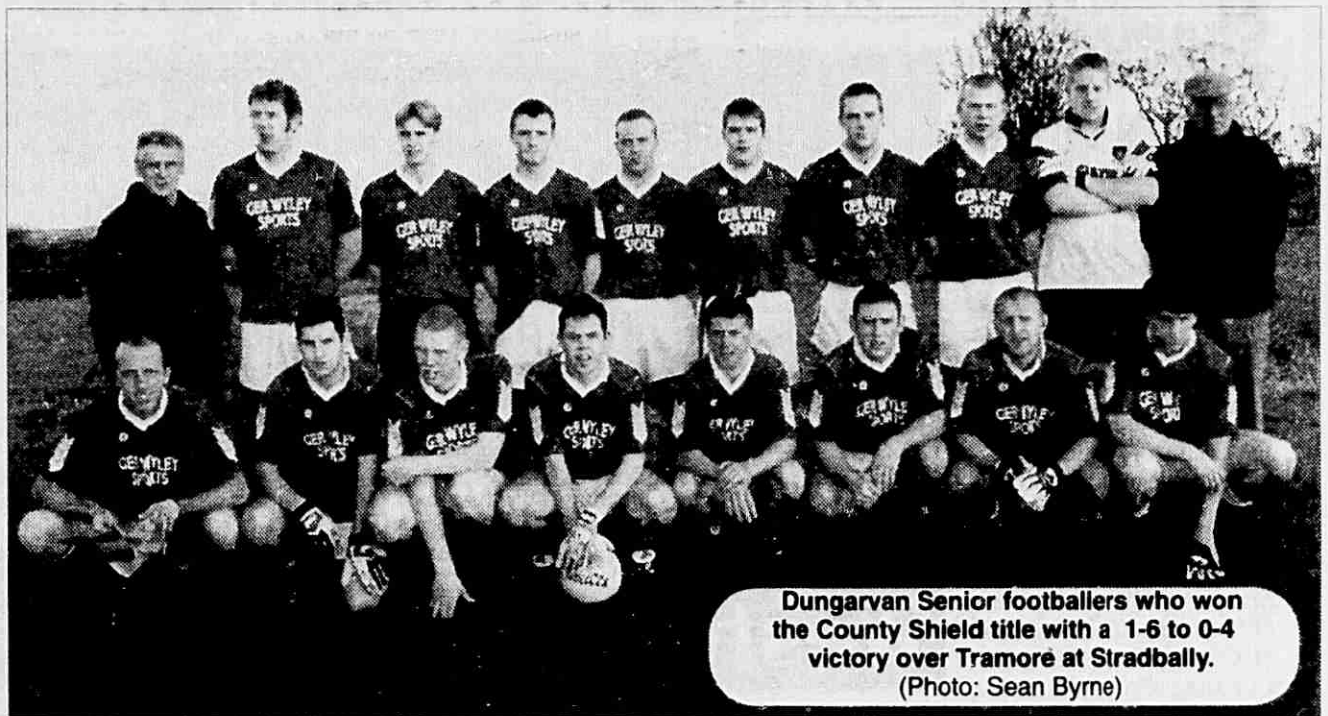

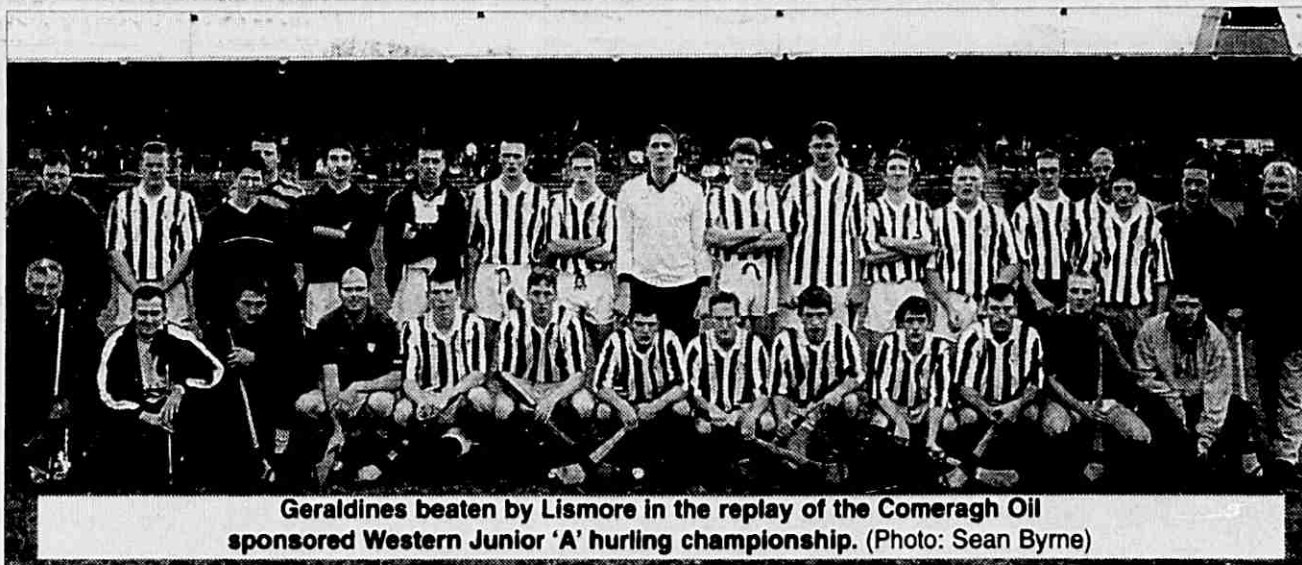
CLUB LOTTO

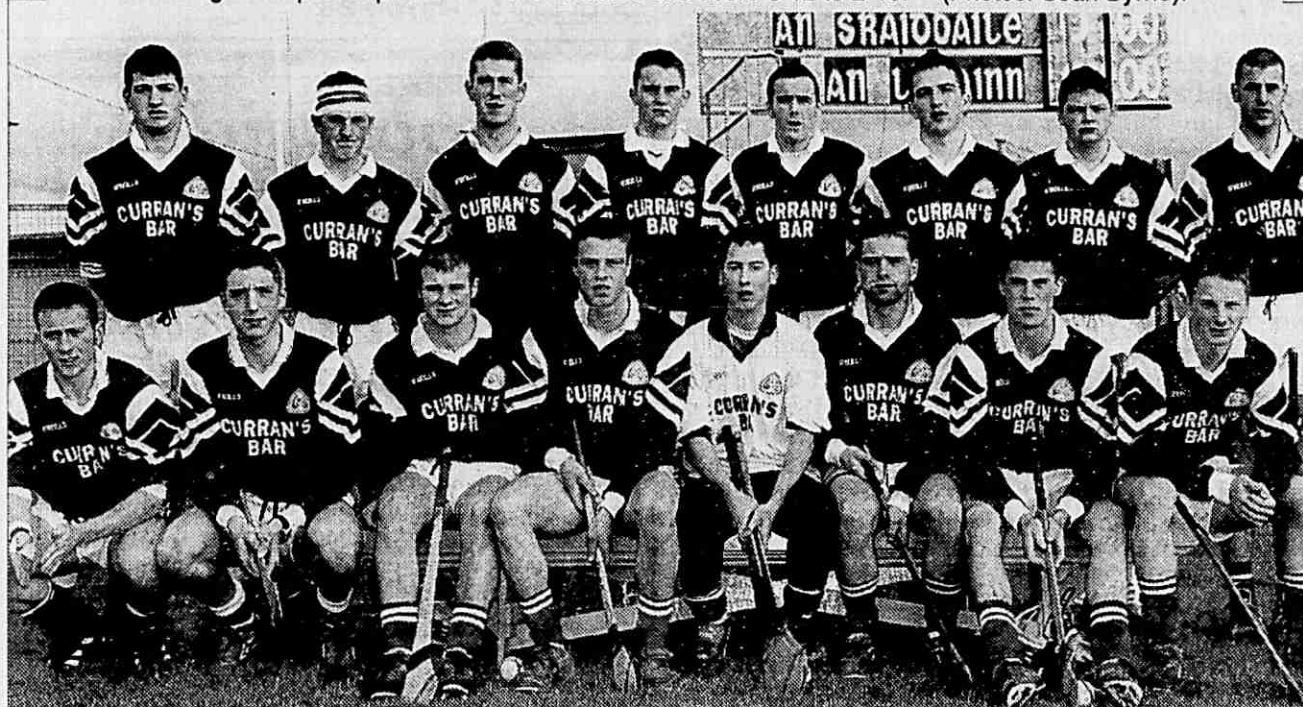

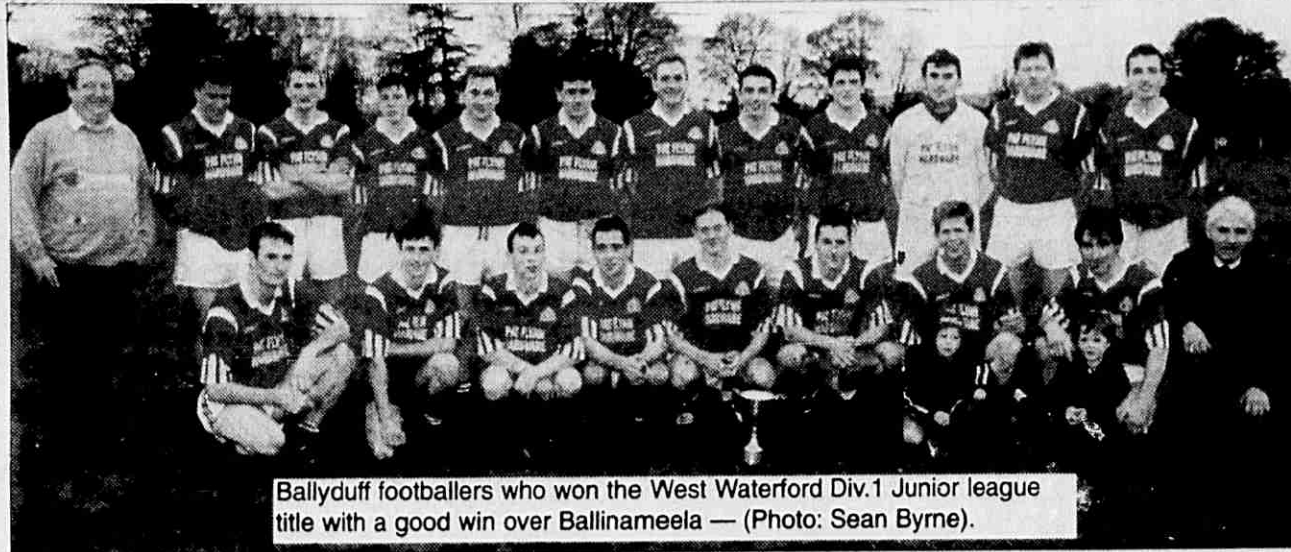

NEW FOOTBALL PROPOSALS

The Football Development Committee set up by Association President, Joe MacDonagh two years ago, have come forward with rather revolutionary proposals that will change the whole structure of things and ensure that all counties will have meaningful competition in a whole new concept which was outlined to all counties in Croke Park on Monday week last.

These proposals relate to the year 2001 and will have to be approved by Annual Congress in Galway in April of next year.

In essence, the proposals will have the national league amalgamate with the early qualifying stages of the championship. The championship will provide a minimum of 10 games for all counties between March and June. Finishing positions will then provide 16 teams to go forward to contest the provincial semi-finals and finals and thereafter to the All Ireland series.

The proposals are to set up an all Ireland series as follows: Section 1, Eleven teams, 7 from Leinster and 4 from Munster; Section 2, Eleven teams from Ulster and 4 from Connaught; Section 3, Eleven teams, not included in sections 1 and 2, but including London.

Each section will play off on a 'home and away' basis giving 5 home and 5 away matches to every county. At the end of the league stage, teams go forward to the knockout stages of the provincial championships, declared as follows:

Section 1 — The 4 Leinster teams with the most points advance to the Leinster semi-finals. The 3 Munster teams with the most points go forward. Top team into final with the second and third teams playing a semi-final

Section 2 — Same system for Connaught and Ulster (4 Ulster and 3 Connaught teams.)

Section 3 — The top 4 teams qualify for semi-finals to decide two teams which will participate in the All Ireland quarter finals and in a separate competition against New York and the North American Board.

At this early stage it's too soon to pass judgment on the proposals which must look very inviting to counties such as Waterford who are likely to support them

Waterford were represented at the Croke Park launch by Greg Fives, Chairman Coisde na Peil, Rev. Fr. Moran, Tom O'Neill and Seamus Fitzgerald.

We are sure to hear a lot more on the proposals in the coming months.

It was a travesty of justice as far as reigning county champions, Ardmore were concerned, but it was a reward for absolute perseverance as far as the Eastern champions and challengers, Ballyduff/Butlerstown were concerned at the end of this splendid minor football final replay at Fraher Field on Saturday last.

With 62 minutes of play gone, Ballyduff/Butlerstown snatched the goal that brought them the title and even though the match winning score came in time added on and very much against the run of play, it was the score that counted and the one which brought them their first ever county title.

Ardmore were in front and in command of the game from the 20th minute to the 62nd. minute and to lose it in such circumstances was an agonising experience for the lads who had given it their all and looked like celebrating their third successive county championship victory.

On the day, Ardmore were the better team, but to be fair to the Eastern champions, they never gave up trying and their perseverance was rewarded when Derek Ryan kicked home the winner from a ruck in the square just seconds before the final whistle was due to be sounded.

The agony of defeat was written all over the faces of the defeated Ardmore team in the immediate aftermath of the final whistle. It was a shattering blow for a team that deserved to win.

HIGH STANDARD

From start to finish the standard was excellent and I cannot recall having seen a

better minor football county final for a long number of years and I would go so far as to say that the performance of these two teams augurs well for the future of football in their respective clubs, as well as for football in the county.

PLAY

Ardmore played with the breeze and within a minute Wayne Hennessy pointed a free. Seven minutes later Stephen O'Leary did likewise and the teams were level. In the 10th. minute several players had a hand (foot) in supplying Nial O'Brien with ball which he dispatched to the net to give the reigning champions a 3 points lead.

The lead survived for six minutes until Jack Kennedy, sent all the way to the net for the equaliser in the 16th. minute. Another splendid point from man of the match Wayne Hennessy put the champions ahead again and a David O'Reilly point, also from play, left them two points clear by the 21st minute.

Richie Hennessy was proving a big thorn in the side of the opposition and had good scores from play in the 22nd and 23rd minutes to leave Ardmore ahead by 1-5 to 1-1 until Stephen O'Leary had Ballyduff/Butlerstown's second point in the 25th minute. The first half scoring ended when Wayne Hennessy pointed a 28th minute free. Score 1-6 to 1-2.

SECOND HALF

Jack Kennedy had an early point to reduce the gap, but a fisted score by Philip Beausang and a point from a free by Wayne Hennessy

gave Ardmore a 5 points advantage by the 40th minute.

At this point, the champions looked to be reasonably safe. At the start of the final quarter Jack Kennedy had a point for the challengers and 5 minutes later they were awarded a penalty which was kicked by S. O'Leary and saved by Ardmore goalkeeper Derek Cronin.

Stephen O'Leary came back for two points and Ardmore, who had failed to score in the last 20 minutes of the final, were under severe pressure.

By the 60th minute the score was 1-8 to 1-6 and the champions looked like being able to hold out. Wayne Hennessy was judged to have over carried the ball and a free into the square saw the ball descend into a crowded goal mouth and when Derek Ryan got his kick in, the Ardmore keeper had no chance. It was the winning score and the kick which robbed Ardmore of a deserved third title in a row.

As I have written, it was a splendid exhibition of minor football and a contest which reflected credit on both teams. It was a final in

which every player played his part and while a few might have enhanced their reputations by their performances it would be invidious to single out some for special mention.
