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UDC Countdown To Abolition

STILL NO AGREEMENT £2 REFUSE CHARGE

As reported in last week's edition of the 'Leader', the introduction of a £2 refuse charge for wheelie bins in Dungarvan is proving to be a major source of contention for members of the Urban Council.

Having failed to strike a rate on the County

Manager's recommendations at their meeting last Monday, members will meet for a second time this weekend in an attempt to reach some sort of last minute compromise.

The past few days will hopefully have given members time to reflect fully on the Manager's proposals and

examine the threat to their continuing existence should they fail to strike a rate within the allotted time by midnight, Sunday 12th December.

According to the Co. Manager Donal Connolly, a £2 tag per bin is the only option open to the UDC to make up the Council's loss in income owing to the cessation of business on the former Waterford Foods site.

The income generated by the introduction of such a refuse charge in the town is estimated at £200,000. This in turn would make up for the shortfall in rates and water charges to the Council of £240,000 caused by the closure of the

Waterford Foods site. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 11**

In a time of major economic progress and increasing financial activity in the local community, the news has come completely unexpected.

At a meeting in Dublin yesterday (Tuesday), First Active details of a major restructuring plan in a bid to bolster investor confidence.



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



Leftover Turkey with a creamy dill sauce

IF you have some leftover turkey and don't fancy sandwiches, or want your turkey done in a different way for Christmas this year, try this recipe for turkey with creamy dill sauce and steamed vegetables.

Ingredients: (Serves 4)

4 white turkey breast steaks,

1/2 x 5ml sp garlic powder, Salt and black pepper, if desired,

1/4 cup sour cream,

1 x 15ml sp fresh chopped dill or 1/2 x 5ml sp dried dillweed.

2 x 5ml sp prepared horseradish,

1 cup julienne-cut zucchini,

1 cup red pepper, 1 cup summer squash.

METHOD:

Sprinkle the turkey with garlic powder, salt and pep-

Spray a large nonstick skillet with a nonstick cooking spray.

Heat over medium-high heat until hot and add the turkey. Cook for 10 to 15 minutes or until the turkey is golden brown, tender and no longer

pink in the centre, turning

Add the sour cream, dill and horseradish to the skillet and cook until heated through, but do not boil.

Bring 1cm of water to boil in a large skillet to steam the vegetables.

Add the zucchini, red pepper and summer squash to the skillet.

Cover and cook over medium heat for five to 10 minutes or until vegetables are crisp-tender. Drain the vegetables.

Place the turkey steaks on a warmed plate and pour over the dill sauce.

Place the steamed vegetables on the side of the plate and serve immediately.

a leafy lettuce.


METHOD:

voluntary redundancy package will be in place for affected staff members.

Before Tuesday's meeting concluded First Active branch managers from around the country registered their complete rejection of the proposals by walking out of the meeting en bloc.

In a statement, the branch managers later stated that as major shareholders, they will not accept branch closures as proposed.

"We are being asked to shoulder all the blame for the compa-

ny's present difficulties", they stated.

"We now call on the Board to apportion the blame to those who are responsible. Only then and following full negotiations with the new management team will the managers cooperate with, or accept, any rationalisation plan.

The former First National Building Society has proved to be a major disappointment to shareholders following its stock market flotation last year. It has come under intense pressure in the mortgage market following the entry of Bank of Scotland which forced it to reduce rates. It is also under pressure on the deposit side following the entry of Northern Rock.

First Active is expected to forfeit £15 million in profits due to the intense competition.

Geraldine Carroll and Tony & Maureen Reynolds were the only B&B's in Co. Waterford to receive Family Homes awards.

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

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Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Strange fruits of he autumn

YOU may have noticed some strange goings-on in your garden in the past few months.

Yes, the autumn months don't just mean red and yellow leaves clinging to tree branches, but also the opening of various weird and wonderful fruits. So get digging now, and plant some in time for next year. Some seemingly normal and innocent plants transform into curious pods and berries for the winter months.

One such plant is the Paeonia cambessedesii. Its beautiful rosepink flowers from the spring, fade away and are replaced by clawshaped seed pods which contain shiny round black seeds and kidneyshaped red ones.

Rosehips also make an appearance at that time of year - and in many different shapes. Choose Rosa Rugosa for fat hips, Rosa Scabrosa for long hips and Rosa Glauca for tiny red currant-shaped

Try planting a group of Akebia for a garden full of their spicy, vanillascented purple flowers and bizarre cigar-shaped purple fruit, which split to reveal that the pods are full of jelly-covered seeds.

If waiting around for results isn't your bag, then try planting some fast-growing annuals. Try Scabiosa stellata. The pale lilac flowers of the spring will turn into globe-shaped seedheads made up from what looks like paper cake cases stuck edge-to-edge, each with a central star.

For a frosted fruit sensation check out the Euonymus europaeus. Its lipstick-pink seed cases hang from the branches, and open up to reveal bright orange seeds. This plant will cover a huge amount of space in the garden, so be sure to leave it plenty

If it's strange-coloured pods you're after, try the brazen blue pods of Decaisnea fargesii, offset against the bright yellow leaves of the autumn.

If strawberries growing on trees sound peculiar, then take a look at the authentic evergreen strawberry tree Arbutus unedo. Its crusty round crimson and orange fruit are edible and are used to make a liqueur.

So if you want your garden to look just that little bit more interesting next autumn, get planting now! Pick out the plants which have out-of-thisworld autumn fruits for a colourful cold season

This Week In The Garden

Protect all delicate and tender plants

Plants such as gunneras, eremuruses, escallonias, evergreen ceanothuses and crinodendrons are not damaged by early autumn frosts. If they happen to be growing in very exposed spots it is advisable to protect them during the harshest frosts of mid-winter. Those not overly exposed will need some protection too. Wall shrubs and climbers can be protected by hanging sacking in front of them. The plant must not be closed off entirely to the air. The top of the cover should be left open to let the

Care for hardy plants

Christmas roses are not tender, but the flowers will benefit from protection from the elements. Just protect them from heavy rain and being splashed with mud. Late celery may be harmed by the weather cover with straw or bracken held down with wire netting and dig a trench either side for excess water to drain into.

In preparation for January

With Christmas on its way, now is the time for gardeners to think about new equipment for next year and include it on their list of gift wishes. How about a new spade, a sharper knife, a pair of secateurs or some decorative pots? Include the essentials such as gloves, wellington boots, a small hand shovel and fork and, if you are a complete novice, a gardening book or

Birds need more food

Put up a bird table within sight of your windows, between five and six feet high. It will need a rim to stop the food rolling or blowing away. Put out proper bird mixes daily, for example nuts and bread. If squirrels prove to be a problem, invest in a squirrel-proof bird-feeder. Avoid inferior quality peanuts as they may be poisonous to the birds - look for a quality seal on the packet. A food bar made of suet and seeds is particularly good for the

UDC Countdown To Abolit

After much difficulty a second meeting to strike a rate has been arranged for 11 a.m. on this Saturday, 4th December. It is quite unusual for members of the Council to meet outside normal working hours and is indicative of the obstacles which have been faced in trying to get an agreement on an actual date. All nine elected members together with officials have indicated their agreement to meet on this date.

The difficulties experienced in fixing a date for a second meeting will pale into insignificance if the shortfall of almost £240,000 cannot be **CONTINUED FROM FRONT PAGE**

accommodated without striking a refuse charge.

Even if the Manager were to cut the deficit in half to £100,000 there would still be little room to put forward an estimate that could realistically bridge the gap as indicated by the Manager's estimate report.

While this type of stand-off did occur on at least one occasion in the past with regard to water rates, most observers bearing in mind the adverse reaction to refuse charges at the initial Council meeting, would see little room for successful manoeuvre in the

We understand that if Saturday's meeting does not resolve the situation a subsequent meeting is being tentatively fixed for the evening of December 10th. Will it be third time lucky? Or will Dungarvan start the new millennium with a Department appointed Commissioner at the helm?

Of the nine elected Council members five have already voiced their opposition to the introduction of a £2 refuse charge, namely 'councillors Teresa Wright (Lab), Damien Dillon (Ind), Nuala Ryan (FF), Billy Kyne (Lab) and Paddy Power (Lab).

The Labour block of Kyne, Wright, Power and UDC Chairman Lar Hart are expected to vote together against the introduction of any refuse charge which leaves the final decision with the remaining five members - Dillon, Ryan, Damien Geoghegan (FG), John Deasy (FG) and Michael O'Riordan (Ind), two of which have already indicated their opposition to a £2 charge.

REAL THREAT **OF ABOLITION**

If the Estimate of Expenses as proposed by the Manager are not passed or if a counter proposal is carried by the majority of members which, in the Manager's view, is insufficient to meet the financial needs of the Council, the next step is for the Manager to contact the Department of the Environment who would then appoint a Commissioner to examine the Book of Estimates.

This could lead to the appointment of the Commissioner to take over the functions of the elected members in the day to day running of Dungarvan UDC. The Urban Council, as elected by the people of Dungarvan, would effectively be abolished until the next local elections in 2004. The irony of this situation is that the appointed Commissioner would quite likely introduce the recommended refuse charges.

The functions given to a Commissioner would not reflect the ongoing daily demand of the public to councillors but would instead reflect budgetary needs and demands on various spending programmes of the Council.

Almost ten years ago Naas UDC were abolished when they failed to strike a rate, again because of controversial service charges, and a Commissioner was appointed by the Minister for the Environment to run the affairs of the local authority for over a

It is with deep regret and a deep sense of loss that we here in Tallow and surrounding areas bear witness to the recent death of our former Parish Priest Rev. Fr. Michael Walsh. It would be a relatively simple task to record that he spent a large portion of his priestly life amongst us here in Tallow and served us well, but it would be an almost impossible one to recount his many true charitable deeds unknown to all but some.

Born outside Cahir in Co. Tipperary Fr. Walsh came from farming stock and was ordained to the priesthood in 1941. Of the land was born his great love for the simple things of life, a love he shared with many right through until the moment of his death. Never a man to shy from any form of hurdle, he was always and ever there to reach out to those in most need, his work being carried out with a firm belief and deep faith in God. He was without doubt, a deeply religious and holy person and few if any would be aware of his many charitable deeds towards many a fellow human being or entire family within the parish and beyond. In his 83rd year and the 58th of his priesthood Fr. Walsh passed to his eternal rest most peacefully and just hours previously imparted a blessing to many of his friends whom had visited him as they had done on many occasions during his final days.

Fr. Walsh arrived here in Tallow from Abbeyside as Parish Priest in October 1974 having served in both the U.K. and Ireland and for the next 25 years extended his helping hand to anyone who wanted it. It didn't matter to the man whether you were king or pauper, his unmovable and absolute belief that we are all Gods children guided him without falter.

Apart from those in his care he had a great love for many activities within the parish. I can still see him standing on the back of a lorry welcoming home the victorious senior hurlers in 1980, or addressing the gatherings at the Annual Senior Citizens Christmas Party where once I remember him jokingly inquiring why all of a sudden we are now known as senior citizens and not old folks. Many his interests were but top of the list were surely our own church of the Immaculate Conception, our local Scoil Mhuire, St. Patrick's Parish Hall and Society St. Vincent de Paul and the Legion of Mary. To all of the above Fr. Walsh gave great devotion and dedication over many years.

His beloved Church was packed to capacity during the funeral Mass which was concelebrated by his grace Rev. Bishop William Lee and Rev. Fathers Thomas Nugent, William Carey and Michael Farrell. Also present were a total of almost 70 priests from within the dioceses and far beyond to pay due respect to a true apostle. Amongst this large gathering was also Rev. Michael Russell, former Bishop and long-

In a beautiful celebration of Holy Mass the life of Fr. Walsh was indeed encapsulated by the many and varied gifts brought to the altar during the offertory. A hymnal - representing the Parish Choir and the Church, the minute book of St. Patrick's Parish Hall, from the keys of Scoil Mhuire, a token from the St. Vincent De Paul Society, Bread and Wine - soon to be the Body and Blood of Christ - Father's lifelong friend and spiritual food which sustained him all of his life and finally his breviary, presented by the Legion of Mary, his constant companion through life to which he was so loyal and faithful. Indeed there is not a person locally who over many years didn't see Father reading and praying from his breviary as he walked the Mill Road.

Following Holy Mass which was indeed a celebration of his life, Fr. Walsh was laid to rest amongst the people of Tallow whom he has served so well. He was buried next to his long time housekeeper and friend Annie Cummins. He is survived by his sister Bridie and other relatives to whom we extend our deepest sympathy. On behalf of our present Parish Priest Rev. Fr. Michael Farrell (who cared for Father greatly over the last number of years), I take this opportunity to thank all and everyone who were so kind to Fr. Walsh and who turned up in large numbers to offer their final gestures of respect.

In his many long years of service and devotion to others Fr. Walsh never once took a break or holiday. I've no doubt he is being repaid right now at the right hand of God. May you rest in peace Father.

Town's Competition every year since 1991. From the name stone of Woodview Park in 1991 to the planting of trees and shrubs down the years, the committee worked patiently to enhance the environment of the town. A further investment of £50,000 for the walls and approach roads is currently being delivered. The community were required to contribute £8,000 towards this project. Kay Murray was the coordinator of the fund-raising committee. The full amount was collected and paid in full to Waterford Co. Council. This was a great achievement for a small town.

Great credit is due to the residents, business people and clubs for their efforts in presenting their homes and premises to a very high standard over the years. Thanks are also due to Tallow Area Credit Union, Allied Irish Bank, The Enterprise Board, Waterford County Council, Councillors McDonnell, Ollie Wilkinson, Bernard Leddy and Brian O'Shea for their help and assistance in supporting the Tidy Town's Committee's efforts over the years.

On her retirement the committee presented Kay with beautiful bouquet of flowers as a token of their appreciation for her work over the years. The hope was expressed that Tidy Town's Committee and take the place of the retiring members.

DEATH the unknown deadline — recovery from grief

The death of a loved one is the most this - the land of tears". profound of all sorrows. It creates a rawness of feelings - anger, longing, fear deprivation, anguish and regret. One is overcome with post-traumatic denial as you so desperately need assurances that it is a mistake and that at any moment the dead person will phone or reappear to prove that the news is a lie. Coupled with this intense longing there is an overwhelming sense of loss. Death leaves so many gaps and changes in a home - the empty chair or place at the dining table, the old worn slippers, laying sadly in their last place of deposit by the departed

Every aspect of the survivors' lives is thrown into turmoil. The feelings are intensified if the death is sudden. In my own life I have had to deal with the trauma of sudden death on two occasions. Some twenty five years ago my wife, Mary, died suddenly and her death ripped through my life like a tornado. It also devastated the lives of her eight young children as they had to face life without the love of their mother and I had to deal with the loss of affection and companionship. At that time God looked wrathful and frightening to me. As her young body was lowered into its final earthly resting place I embraced the depth of our union.

Again on Wednesday, September 9th of last year, the messenger of death was again to deliver at my door. A long distance phone call was to inform me

that my second son John was dead. The news was too much as I recalled just a few short hours before I was speaking to him on the phone and his soft but gravel voice still rang in my ears.

On the journey from Shannon airport to Toronto I went through the motions of living as I wrestled with feelings of hopelessness. I was caught in the mysterious pendulum of life and death - in my heart lay the sombre pain of death and at my side was the consolation and joy of my two year old daughter Alison. Knowing that she would never know her big brother compounded my pain.

It was not until I had to identify my son's body in the Toronto coroner's morgue that I acknowledged the truth of his death. As his body was uncovered for identification flashbacks to his mother's death tortured my soul. As I gazed at the remains of my son I would retreat into denial. John invaded my thoughts and dreams and each morning my sense of loss was revived. On September 16th as his young body was lowered to rest beside his mother I was forced to accept the truth of his death. I envied intact families but I knew as the droning of the pipes played "Danny Boy" at the graveside I would find in John's death a pouring out of how I would help my family and others to cope with death.

Well-meaning friends expressed condolences - "I know how you feel" "It's God's will" "Each new day you'll feel better". I knew that these people felt helpless and in sincerity were repeating hackneyed expressions of sympathy. Did they really know what I felt? - of course not unless they too had experienced the death of a loved one. Antoine De Saint Exupery wrote in "The Little Prince" 'I did not know what to say to him - I felt awkward and blundering. I did not know how I could reach him where I could overtake him and go hand in hand with him once more. Its such a secret place

Shock masks the sorrow and pain but anger causes survivors to lash out at those around them. Each stage requires overlapping tasks as emotions fluctuate so that there may be a balance between stabilisation and the dissolve. Survivors must see recovery as sudden change. Grief can be best described as somatic distress, preoccupation with thoughts and images of the deceased one intermingled with guilt and hostile feelings towards the deceased. Survivors in the early stages have difficulty in sleeping and often lose contact with reality. Many withdraw from social interaction for although the need for companionship and understanding is enormous this is subconsciously perceived as an intrusion into the sacrosanct communion with the departed loved one and so this "intrusion" is often met with hostility and irritability. Many bereaved comprehend their loss at one level but deny its reality at another level. In this stage of mourning they may experience alarm and anxiety, restlessness and loss of interest in personal appearance.

They may call out to the deceased and focus attention on things and places where the departed may have touched or been. This searching often creates reflections and dreams of the dead one and activities and roles become disorganised.

I often sit in my office and commune with my son - his portrait hangs on a wall opposite my chair. All that remains of any physical contact with him sits under my chair. I ask am I deluding myself as I sense his presence and do I really feel him giving me peace of mind?

Grief and depression are bedfellows and some survivors think of suicide. This is a wish to join the dead loved one. Being a survivor provokes guilt as we regret some harsh word spoken or some omission. Survivors become tormented by minute details of the last encounter or conversation and are driven crazy by 'if only's'. When someone we love dies we become obsessed by having something precious taken from us and the world seems so

When survivors go through the stages of capacity to survive. mourning they gradually begin to reorganise their lives. Two main psychologi- my life. His untimely death remains a cal tasks need to be dealt with during the tragedy for all who loved him. From time mourning period - acknowledging and accepting that a death has occurred and a relationship is over; secondly the need to experience and to deal with all the emotions the loss evokes. However if survivors inhibit their feelings they become somewhat incapacitated and distorted. Delayed or postponed grief causes many problems and these feelings may be experienced later with much more severity.

The bereaved must give themselves time to talk and cry as much as they need to. People often fear that grief will bowl them over completely and indefinitely. However grief does dissolve - the only grief that doesn't end is grief that has not been faced. Others see perpetual sorrow as a testimony to their deep love and they

After death survivors must learn to restore themselves and resume life. The emotions and the body are one manifestation of a larger whole and although love never fades the pain of the loss can an essential goal. When some one we love dies we must experience all the feelings evoked and then say good-bye to the loved one.

The bereaved will show their acceptance of their loss when they can talk about the deceased in terms of death and their aloneness. When death becomes real the pain of being alone begins to be expressed. Bereaved clients often exclaim "the house is so empty". This is the acceptance of reality. By creating this reality as they disengage from the deceased they will want to talk about him or her. This helps bereaved people describe their life before their loss and it helps establish a boundary between what was and what is. It also helps to reinforce feelings of self esteem and to ameliorate the hostility or anger which may inhibit interaction with others. This is essential particularly if the relationship with the deceased was problematic. They may feel angry about what they perceived as a waste of time. Their self esteem may be damaged and they blame themselves for real or imagined faults. I frequently tell clients to live as if each day were the last they had on earth. In doing this we spend our precious time doing only what is essential and meaningful. We would never take any one for granted and we would take care of unfinished business.

Death is the final journey of life. We will all die, each one of us with an unknown deadline. Bereavement is the deepest initiation into the mysteries of life and grief is an integral part of the human life cycle. Each one of us must face sorrow and ending but in order to survive we must learn to face loss and grief fully and to trust we can and should recover and recreate our lives. Though life has a great capacity to inflict pain humans have an amazing resilience and

John's absence will always overshadow to time things remind me of him and I double up with the pain of it. Tuesday of last week, November 16th, was his birthday and just over a year ago since he died and I wept again. I feel so much suspense since he died - perhaps I am waiting to awaken from this nightmare. And so as I struggle to find meaning in the death of my beloved son John, let me in my tears embrace all who are grieving at this time.

Kahlil Gibran wrote -- "Your joy is your sorrow unmasked -- and the self-same well from which your laughter rises -was oftentimes filled with your tears"

Beef -TEAGASC BEEF SEMINAR

Paddy O'Brien, Teagasc Adviser, addressed a very well attended Beef Seminar in Dungarvan last week on the impact of Agenda 2000 changes next year.

The changes in the special beef premia rules can be summarised as follows:-

Animals will be eligible one month earlier (7 & 20 months). The two month retention period remains. Existing 2.0 L.U./ha limit still applies. 180 Herd limit on both 10 & 22 month premia.

Suckler Cow Premium

20% can be filled with dry beef heifers. Dry heifers must be at least 8 months old. Existing 6 month retention period remains. 30,628 gallon quota limit for premia eligibility.

New Extensification Rules

STOCKING RATE 2000 - 2001 1.6 - 2.0 L.U./Ha — £26 Less than 1.6 L.U./Ha — £52.

All bovines over 6 months of age and all ewes on which premia are claimed will be counted when calculating the stocking

There are many other changes to the extensification rules and Paddy O'Brien advised all farmers to discuss and plan their own situation with their Teagasc Adviser, as soon as possible.

Dairying

At a recent Dairy Conference in Adare, Co. Limerick, it was refreshing to hear Colman Deely, a young dairy farmer from Co. Limerick speak very positively about his job and his lifestyle as a full-time dairy farmer.

Colman organises and prioritises his work so that he has time to engage in his sporting and other social interests.

He broke down his work into three categories and put an economic value on each: Manual Labour - £5 - £10/hour; Skilled farm work - £10 - £20/hour; Farm Business Management - £20 - £50/hour. He then priorities his work so that sufficient time is allocated to business management which gives the highest return and he uses contractors where necessary for the manual Other labour saving practices adopted on his farm include:

Compact calving; Automatic calf feeders and calves deep bedded in shavings; Tail painting for heat detection and running maiden heifers with cows.

Colman concluded his talk by saying that he is optimistic about the future of Irish dairy farming. He believes everyone has a future in dairy farming either through Increased efficiency, Expansion, Off-farm income, Partnerships/share farming or a combination of all of these.

"We have", he said, the opportunity to provide ourselves and our families with an attractive income and lifestyle through dairy farming.

Application forms for the year 2000 Reserve Suckler Cow Quota are now available. The closing date is Thursday 23rd December 1999.

Applicants must own between 10 and 20 livestock units and not more than 30 for first time applicants under 35 years of age. It is estimated that 10,000 premium rights will be allocated through the National Reserve.

ICMSA WELCOMES WORKING GROUP ON THE TAX TREATMENT OF MILK QUOTAS

The Chairman of the ICMSA Dairy Committee, Mr. Jackie Cahill, welcomed the setting up of a Working Group to examine in detail the taxation treatment of milk quotas. Mr. Cahill said that ICMSA has consistently put forward proposals to the Government that the purchase of milk quotas through the restructuring scheme should be allowed as an expense for income tax purposes.

At the pre-budget meeting between the Minister for Finance, Mr. Charlie McCreevy, T.D. and ICMSA, the minister agreed to an ICMSA proposal for the establishment of a high level Working Group involving the Department of Agriculture and Finance, Revenue Commissioners and Farm

Group will commence work next week.

Mr. Cahill said that the pro-

posed changes to the management of the quota system to be announced shortly by the Minister demands that actions is now taken by the Minister for Finance to remove the tax disincentive on quota purchase. The tax treatment of milk quotas will be a significant demand by the ICMSA in the context of the new National

demand by the ICMSA in the context of the new National Plan currently being negotiated by the Social Partners. Mr. Cahill concluded by stating that ICMSA will be seeking definite commitment from the Government that changes will be made to the tax treatment of quotas by way of the Finance Bill 2000.

NEW REPS MUST BE

NEW REPS MUST BE

Mr. John O'Connor, Chairman of ICMSA's Farm Services and Environmental committee commenting on the Ministers announcement regarding the introduction of a new REPS Scheme said that the Minister must ensure that the new REPS Scheme is introduced as soon as possible in the year 2000 and that the REPS Scheme is suitably amended to take account of farmer concerns.

In particular Mr. O'Connor said that an increased payment is necessary for farmers with small acreage's given that in general these farmers have a higher compliance cost on a per acre basis than farmers with larger farms. A 10% increase on the first fifty acres, Mr. O'Connor said, is not sufficient. ICMSA believe that all farmers should get at least an additional £1,000 on the first fifty acres to help those farmers meet the higher compliance costs. In addition, ICMSA believe that the Minister should relax the nitrogen limits to encourage

REPS.

Regarding the 30 November deadline for the submission of REPS plans in 1999, Mr.
O'Connor said that all these plans must be accepted and paid. ICMSA, he said, will not accept a situation where a farmers losses out due to delays in processing by Department.

Waterford IFA News

IFA CRITICISE REPS TRANSITION RULES

Waterford IFA Rural Development Committee Chairman Mr. Mossie O' Connor has criticised the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh on the new transition rules that apply to REPS plans between now and the end of the year.

Mr. O' Connor said that it is totally unacceptable that the cut off date for new REPS plans is the 30th November. This only leaves just over a week for REPS planners and farmers to submit valid applications to the Department of Agriculture.

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman called on Minister Walsh to extend the period of the transition up to the end of December as it is not possible in all cases for farmers to submit valid applications within such a short space of time.

IFA is advising farmers who wish to join REPS to do so immediately as the scheme will not be available in the early part of 2000 while the National Development Plan is being agreed by the European Commission.


So far, over 44,000 farmers have joined the REPS scheme and these farmers will be allowed to continue with their plans for whatever length of time is left. For farmers who have finished their plans towards the end of this year and into the first number of months of next year, they will be allowed to continue to remain in the scheme on an interim basis until the new scheme is agreed.

IFA EXPRESS CONCERN ON TIGHT FINANCIAL ALLOCATION FOR NEW EARLY RETIREMENT SCHEME

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Mossie O' Connor has expressed serious concern with regard to the tight financial allocations in the National Development Plan for the new Early Retirement Scheme which will apply next year.

The Waterford IFA man pointed out that the EU Early Retirement Scheme is a demand led scheme and the allocation to the new scheme over the next seven years of £565m is inadequate as a significant number of current applicants continue to be paid from this amount. The scheme cost £73m in 1999 and this is now set to rise to £80.3m in 2000 and increase further in the years ahead due to increased demand.

Mr. O' Connor said that the level of interest in the EU Early Retirement Scheme is still significant and IFA estimate that up to 1,500 farmers will join the scheme each year over the next seven years. However, unless additional funds are provided the scheme will have limited impact in addressing the severe structural problems which exist in agriculture where over 45% of farmers are greater than 55 years of age and 12% are less than 35 years of age.

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

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
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

OUR LOCALITY

Kyne Park is one of the new housing estates and is named in memory of the late Tom Kyne who was a local T.D. for Waterford for many years.

McCarthyville was so named in honour of another local Dr. Dan McCarthy who performed many an operation at Dungarvan District Hospital. Strangely enough the road between these two estates does not have an official name. It is often called "The New Road" which also encompassed the pathway which leads to the beach and is lined on either side with Japanese Spruce.

Stuccolane is comprised of a single field - the one on the left as you walk down to the beach. "Callan's trunk" is the translation of this. It is often called "Dogleaf Park", the home of Abbeyside United Soccer Club.

Garranbane, "The White Grove" is the largest townsland in our parish. It is nearly three times the size of Abbeyside. It stretches from a little north west of the Pike southwards to marshland below Garranbane Church. You enter the townsland having passed Garranbane School on your way to Waterford. The school itself is in the townsland of Clonloskoran (Coskran's Meadow).

If you take the south fork off the main road leading to the Church you also enter the townsland of Garranbane at a borheen which leads to a farm on the left. However, continue on past the hill to the church and soon you are in Kilbeg. Only a tiny portion of Garranbane is south of this road. Parallel to the main road stream rises in the dip south of the Pike. This stream feeds a reservoir near the main road. The stream flows on down by the Church and into the marsh below. It bounds Dunsalagh ("The Fort of the Willows") on the East and Clonea Lower on the West. The stream crosses under the Clonea Road east of the "Crooked Bridge" and can be seen at the sluicegate entering the sea near the car park.

MORE TREASURE IN THE TROVE

Having savoured Fr. lain Duggan's first anthology of poetry The Sleeping Place', I greeted with joy the news that a second anthology was on its way. I am glad to report that it has now arrived. Entitled 'Beautiful Country', this delightful anthology explores seasons of nature and of life.

The opening sequence of poems, set in the Winter season examines what Christmas means to child and adult. It's title poem, the previously published 'Angels We Have Heard' retains its original power, conveying with magical force the awe of a young child's encounter with the Christmas crib. Forty years later the encounter remains vivid and its startling impact is registered in the lines.

'......there will never again be a Christmas like it, however many come"

This poem, along with others in this section, encapsulates the joy and wonder of Christ's coming into the world of man. One is left in buoyant mood rejoicing with the poet that "....by benign decree God became flesh for you and me'

The same celebratory mood pervades the second section Greet the Spring. Striking in its simplicity this is a spring bouquet of snowdrops, croci and daffodils. In all the poet draws our attention to the beauty of nature and in particular God in nature. Snowdrops are his "soul friend" and God is in "everything that can delight".

A total change of mood and theme occurs in Part 3, Beautiful Country. Contrary to our expectation that the natural world will feature here, we find that the poet's focus is instead on people. From personal accounts of his own parents to imaginary characters from legend, he delves into the complexities of life, the meaning of existence, the futility of war, the inevitability of death, the majesty of after-life.

The concluding section No Continuing City appropriately takes journeys as its theme. History is re-awakened, the present brought before us, the future dreamt of. The striking notes are of change, growth and promise. As with previous sections this one is enriched by fine adaptations taken from Irish poets including Sean Mac Fheorais and Sean O Leachain.

Reflection is the essence of all these poems which makes reading them a real treat. It is certainly a volume to consider for your Christmas stocking. Priced at £7.99 it may be obtained in local book shops and at Abbeyside Reference Archive, open every Sunday between 2.30p.m. and 5.30p.m. 1 can think of no better venue for reflection.

SEAFIELD NATIONAL SCHOOL

Breda Kiely and Ed (Parents Council) organised a meeting County Waterford Council to discuss the emergency situation with the contaminated water at Seafield National School. The meeting on Thursday last week was also attended by Brian Environment Waterford C.C., Eamonn Mansfield Sanitary Dept. Waterford C.C., County Councillor Tom Cunningham and Roisin O'Shea P.R.O. Stradbally Tourism Enterprise Group.

Although the County Council are not responsible for the maintenance of private wells, they do have a statutary obligation to protect the groundwater in the County, and where possible, to identify the cause of the contamination, and to effect remedies. It was agreed that the tests carried out by Claire Devine (South Eastern Health Board) showed an alarming increase in contami-

nation in the one week period between Sept 6th and 15th, from 53 total Coliforms in 100 mls to 880 total coliforms in one week and 1 E.Coli in 100 mls to 30 E.Coli in 100 mls.

Although the accepted standards by WHO are nil in both instances, Eamonn Mansfield pointed out that realistically all water in the County will be contaminated at some point until a major overhaul is done, which is why the Council have applied for 69 million pounds. Claire Devine also noted in the tests that the nitrate levels exceed the maximum safety parameters and states that the water is not recommended for babies or infants.

The County Council have agreed to carry out an investigation into the cause of the recent contamination and will assist the school in dealing with the problem to the best of their ability, in conjunction with the Department of Education. The County Council will be giving their findings this week and a further meeting will be scheduled as all agree that this is a matter of urgency and cannot be put on the long finger.

CCI WARN OF STRAIN LABOUR SHORTAGES ARE PLACING ON BUSINESS

The Chambers of Commerce of Ireland (CCI) of which Dungarvan Chamber is a member, has expressed strong concerns about the strain being placed on businesses fighting to remain competitive in an environment of an ever tightening labour market and has called for a range of measures to be introduced to alleviate the situation. CCI was responding to the results of the latest labour force survey by the ERSI. The Chamber movement favours a number of measures to tackle the issue of labour shortages Childcare needs to be addressed in Wednesday's budget through the introduction of a range of initiatives to increase the supply of childcare including tax reliefs for the construction and adaptation of childcare facilities and the introduction of a specific tax allowance in respect of earnings derived from childminding. Greater support for business to invest in re-skilling the workforce. The establishment of a legislative framework for the granting of employment visas to non-EU national to meet specific skill shortages and the speeding up of the processing time for initial and renewal applications. Stronger business-education links to ensure that education and training remains in tune with the needs of the economy, in particular measures to tackle early school leaving and the high drop-outs at third level.





Whether you are contemplating riding next year's 'Ras' or a leisure cyclist interested in keeping a reasonable level of fitness, the following tips may be of use to you. The first month of winter work on the bike should be looked upon as conditioning, not training. You are preparing your body for the beginning of real training

and should be aiming for steady spins, preferably in a group, and the normal club spin is ideal. Pedal revolutions should be at about 100 rpm, spins should be non-stop and as you will be riding at a comfortable pace at which you can talk to your riding companions without being totally out of breath, the seniors and the juniors should be able to ride together.

Avoid 'Burn-ups' as you have yet to prepare your body for them. Talk to the more experienced riders and store away the advice for future use. If a stop is unavoidable, the rest of the group should ride for about two miles, then turn until they meet the delayed rider, before continuing with the spin. In this way riders are not hanging around becoming chilled and risking various ailments.

The mileage for conditioning work will vary according to the age of the rider and the amount of time available, but for the first month riders in the 12 - 15 year old group should aim for about 100 miles a week, 16 -18 year olds 180 miles and the older riders in the region of 200 miles. Cover 40% of your weekly mileage on Sunday, 25% on Saturday and the remainder over as many nights as you have available in the week. Always taking into account the time required for your "off the bike" work. Even at this stage, it is important to map out the amount of time which you have available every week for your cycling, and then ensure that this time is used wisely. This will become even more important when you progress to more serious training and may be in a position where you have toallow time for studies and exams, etc.

FINANCE

Income for the year is an alltime record at £26,701 and it leaves the board in a strong financial position. receipts are up by about six and a half thousand pounds and this, in the main, results from income from attractive replayed games, like the Geraldines/Lismore hurling replay and the Kilgobnet v. Clashmore J/H replay. League revenue also showed an increase. Income from sponsorship at £2,650 was more or less unchanged

With gate receipts increased, there was a corresponding increase in field rents which at £6,364, showed an increase of

Gate receipts at Fraher Field amounted to £13,248 and rent paid to the field committee £4,416. amounted to Cappoquin gates amounted to £4,885 and the club received £1,610 in rent for the year.

Gate receipts from 11 other venues in the division are also listed, but with far smaller gate receipts.

OTHER EXPENSES

Clubs got £1,297 as their share of gate receipts for games played. Medals, etc. cost £3,855 and referees' expenses came to £3,740. DONATIONS, ETC.

A sum of £3,000 was given to Deise Development Committee, £500 to Western Bord na nOg, £500 to Ladies football, £500 to An Rinn Gaeltacht championship and photography cost approximate-

After all this, the Board shows Board assets to be £15,817. Other items of income and expenditure which were 'in and out' and not part of the board's accounts, are also clearly listed. They include tickets, affiliations, coaching fees, which were passed on to the county board. The accounts as usual are

professionally presented and very easily readable.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

This has to be described as a first class report and in my opinion the best submission by the Runaí, Anthony Walsh since he took over as divisional Secretary from his predecessor Vincent Mulligan.

The report deals with every aspect of GAA activity in west Waterford for the 12 months under review. It is fair and factual with no punches pulled and some critical comment on certain topics.

He states: "In submitting a report for adoption, I am fully conscious of my obligation to be factual and as comprehensive as possible and also to avail of the opportunity to make reference to any possible defects in our operations and structures and to put forward suggestions that might be deemed necessary in the best interests of our Association, as we face the new Millennium.

"As customary, is Convention involves, in addition to the election of officers, a time for review, analysis, appraisal and planning for the future.

"As we review the final year of the twentieth century, we can be happy in the knowledge that Gaelic games are as strong as ever and in good shape as we face the new Millennium. The organisation as a whole is now widely acclaimed as the foremost Sporting Organisation in the country, with clubs established in every parish and district, yet we cannot hide the fact that in this Division a number of defects cannot be glossed over for the sake of expediency.

"The absence of additional clubs in our expanding environment, coupled with the failure of two existing clubs to affiliate and participate in the showed a profit of £892 for the local championships, must year and the Balance Sheet surely be a cause for concern. Despite the extraordinary volume of work at underage level, one must beg the question what becomes of the large numbers of young boys who annually participate in school and Bord na nOg competitions. Minor teams have actually declined in modern times and unless the present trend is arrested and quickly, the future remains far from secure.

"With so many other influences at work and enticing demands made on our youth, the task of persevering with the promotion and development of the national games was never more daunting. No longer can we expect young people to

play hurling, football, etc., simply because they are part of our heritage that they do so. We must continue to make them more attractive, appealing and more competitive and it is not good enough to restate over and over again that our games are best".

The Runaí went on to point out the defects in our club structures and standards and referred to the many lob-sided games played this season

and the inordinate number of walk-overs conceded already this year. Dealing with the league programme, he states: "Despite the best efforts of the board officials and a small number of clubs, leagues failed to materialise. The involvement of players at intercounty level, examinations, etc., resulted in clubs being unable to play. A structured League programme was forwarded to all clubs and this contained 143 matches. As I go to Press, 29 walk-overs have been conceded and 21 games remain unplayed."

The Runaí also reports on championships in great detail, social activities, referees, discipline, sponsorship, An

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
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
