As controversy continues to surround two separate planning applications for wind test masts in the county, the Waterford County Manager has stressed that each application will be dealt with on its own

Speaking at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council, Donal Connolly said he will keep members fully appraised of both projects pending.

He said that while wind is an acceptable method for production of energy, the Council's planning department will take into account all of the points raised in relation to the applications.

A notice of motion was put forward at the meeting by Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson who asked that members be kept fully informed of the Council's policy on wind farm developments in the county.

When asked by Cllr. Wilkin-

son if the Council can accept a wind farm application on the southern slopes of the Knockmealdowns in view of the County Development Plan, Mr. Connolly replied that he cannot preclude any applica-

SEPARATE TEST MAST **APPLICATIONS**

Last month Charles Keane of Cappoquin Estate lodged an application for a 40m wind test monitoring mast on the Knockmealdowns.

This test mast will monitor the wind over 12 months, during which time an Environmental Impact Statement will be prepared.

If successful, Mr. Keane plans to eventually develop a wind farm on the southwest slope of Knocknafalia on the mountain range.

Although many in the area are in favour of his proposals, residents of Mount Melleray and surrounding areas are still

TALLOW CREDIT UNION REPORT ON SUCCESSFUL YEAR

It was a case of standing room only as members crowded into the Community Centre in Tallow on Thursday night last to hear the Directors, Supervisors and Auditor give a full and comprehensive report on the years activities.

Chairman John Lyons told of the growth in membership, savings and loans "We started in 1968 with £14. At the end of the current year in September last between us we had over 7 million in assets. With over 3714 members now, we must be the most significant community development of this century in this area. The Credit Union has enriched the lives of so many of us through the encouragement of thrift, the giving of loans at a fair and reasonable rate of interest and the support Community Enterprise and Job Creation. The opening of the Conna suboffice every Friday and Saturday has been an outstanding success and is increasingly being supported by the members of that area and also Castlelyons and Ballynoe. During the past year our Credit Union have contributed their initial payment of £25,000 to the Central Credit Union technology system, this system which will be up and running within the next two years will ensure better access to more services for our members. Work on the new Car Park in West Street is scheduled to commence early in the New Year and will be up and running by the end of March 2000. John told the members that in relation to this they must publicly pay tribute to their local Councillor James Tobin who has helped us to progress

Tributes were paid to outgoing Directors Nora O'Brien, John Hogan and Hugh Geary for their work and support throughout their teams of office, "but I know the men won't mind", John said, "if I single out Nora for special mention as she has given over twenty seven years of outstanding service on the Board, thank you Nora". John also thanked the other Board members, the Supervisors, the Ballyduff and Conna Volunteers and staff for their work and support throughout the year. Mairead Sheehan, Treasurer gave a detailed explanation of the Income and Expenditure throughout the year. She answered a number of questions in relation to depreciation, investments and reserves. In proposing a return to the members of £% dividend on savings and 10% rebate on Loan Interest Paid she received unanimous support. "This" Mairead explained "is a return to you of £201,000 this year a return that indicates the prudent management of the Credit Union funds for our mutual bene-

The Auditor, Mr. Brendan Ferguson outlined the responsibilities of the Directors and Supervisors and congratulated them on an excellent year. He particularly complimented them on their astute management of Investments and indicated an increase of £40,000 over last year, proved they had adopted a good strategic plan to manage investments in an increasingly difficult environment. Mr. Ferguson assured the members that all the information given in the Directors Report is consistent with the financial statements.

Reporting on behalf of the Supervisory Committee Sean Twomey assured the members that Directors, Manager and Staff

are carrying out their duties in accordance with the Credit Union Act and the Standard Rules of Credit Unions. The committee during the past year carried out unannounced and random checks on members accounts, bank statements, investments lodgements, foreign exchange etc. and all times found everything to be correct.

On behalf of the Credit Committee Chairman Kieran O'Brien told the members that a total of 1033 loans were considered by his committee during the past year. Of these 1006 were granted totalling almost 3 million pounds. Interest rates had once again been reduced and with the further 10% rebate of interest which had just been accepted by those present, it meant Credit Unions loans were the best value around. Kieran gave examples of the cost of the loans and compared them to other forms of credit on offer to prove his point. He urged all members to check out the total cost of borrowing before entering into any commitment, as many members have found themselves swamped by other charges of which they were unaware at the time of borrowing. Your credit Union is the best place - check with us first.

The Promotion and Development Committee Report was presented by its Chairman Nora O'Brien who outlined the many responsibilities of this committee. She once again thanked the teachers for their continued support and wished Mrs. Betty Gillen who retired from Knockanore N.S. during the year a long and happy retirement. The Credit Union support many local clubs and associations by way of sponsorship, and continue to co-ordinate the fund raising for our adopted charity, Daffodil Day each March. She thanked all the people who so generously donated daffodils free of charge and the many volunteers who helped raise an amazing £2,300 this year. The committee are also responsible for the educational role where Directors, Committee members and staff are all trained to ensure they are aware of, and capable of carrying out their roles in the most professional manner. At the end of her report Mr. Bill Twomey N.T. Knockanore congratulated Nora on being such an excellent ambassador for the Credit Union, and asked for a standing ovation for the tremendous work she had done over the past twenty seven years. He was delighted to hear that while Nora is no longer serving as a Director she will remain on as a member of the Promotion and Development

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question: I pay nursing home fees for my widowed mother-inlaw. Am I entitled to claim tax relief on my contribution to her nursing home fees?

Answer: To claim tax relief you must be able to claim a Dependent Relative Allowance. The Dependent Relative Allowance is a tax allowance which is available to those who are maintaining either; A relative who is so incapacitated by old age or infirmity from maintaining him/herself. A widowed mother or mother-in-law, whether she is incapacitated or not, a son or daughter who lives with you, the tax payer and on whose services the taxpayer is dependent because of old age or infirmity. The amount of the allowance is £110 per year but it is reduced if the person being maintained has an income above the current rate of Contributory Old Age Pension for a person over 80 and living along (£100.00).

If you are maintaining a person in a nursing home, and you are in receipt of Dependent Relative Allowance for that person you will qualify for tax relief on the nursing home fees you pay. This tax relief is given at your highest rate of tax. The tax relief may be claimed by more than one relative if they are jointly claiming the Dependent Relative Allowance.

To apply for your tax relief you must complete a Med 1 Form. which is available from your local Tax Office.

If you require more information you should contact the Citizens Information Centre below.



Baked Normandy Apple Cheesecake

Preparation: 20 minutes. Cooking: 1 hour, 10 min-

Serves: 8

For The Base:

75g (3 oz) butter, softened. 75g (3 oz) caster sugar. 1 egg

30ml (2 tbsp) milk. 75g (3 oz) self-raising flour. 7.5ml (11/2 tsp) baking powder.

5 ml (1 tsp) ground cinna-

For The Filling:

450g (1 lb) full-fat soft cheese

150 ml 1/4 pt) soured 4 eggs, separated.

225g (8 oz) caster sugar. Grated rind and juice of 1

25g (1 oz) plain flour. 50g (2 oz) ground almonds. 75g (3 oz) sultanas

2-3 small, red-skinned apples. 45ml (3 tbsp) marmalade.

METHOD:

Preheat oven to 160°C/325°F/Gas Mark 3. Grease a 23 cm (9") springclip tin lightly.

Cream together the butter and the caster sugar until the mixture is fluffy, then add the egg and milk. Sift over the flour, baking powder and cinnamon. Mix well to combine and spoon into the base of the prepared tin. Bake for 10 minutes. To prepare the filling, put the cheese, soured cream, egg yolks, caster sugar, lemon rind and juice into a large

Beat the ingredients together until the mixture is smooth and creamy. Sift over the flour and fold in gently using a metal spoon. Then fold in the

ground almonds and sultanas, if using, until evenly combined.

Whisk the egg whites in a grease-free bowl until they just hold their shape, but aren't too dry. Stir half into the cheese mixture - this will slacken it slightly - then gently fold in the remainder of the egg white. Pour the mixture over the cooked base and level off the top. Core the apples and cut them into thin slices.


Arrange the apple slices around the top of the cheesecake. Bake in the oven for 1 hour, covering the top with foil after 15-20 minutes to prevent it from overcooking.

Switch the oven off and leave the cheesecake in the tin to cool. Heat the marmalade with 30 ml (2 tbsp) of water and use it to glaze the apples. Chill before serving.

Household Hints

- 1. Place a saucer full of ammonia in the bottom of the warm oven after use. When the oven is cool, remove the saucer and wipe inside the oven with hot water and detergent. Grease will come off easily.
- 2. When lambswool slippers become too shabby for further wear, open each one down the back and turn inside out. They make excel-lent polishers for furniture, floors or shoes.
- 3. Clean and condition leather furniture by applying a mixture of two parts linseed oil and one part vinegar. Leave for about ten minutes and pollen thoroughly with a dry cloth
- Avoid paint running down your hands when paintceiling by pushing the paintbrush handle through a paper plate. Protect hair with a shower.
- Fix masking tape or clear adhesive tape around the edges of windows to protect the glass when painting the frames. Or rub the edges of the glass with a little petroleum jelly or a bar of moistened soap.

Roast Leg of Lamb With Garlic Crust

Preparation: 25 minutes. Cooking: 1 hour, 40 minutes.

Serves: 6.

175g/6 oz dried figs. 2 small red onions. Salt and black pepper. 1.4kg/3 lb boned leg of lamb. 5 cloves garlic.

60ml/4 tbsp pine nuts. 30ml/2 tbsp chopped fresh

15ml/1 tbsp olive oil. 300ml/1/2 pt lamb stock. 150ml/1/4 pt white wine. 15ml/1 tbsp mint jelly.

METHOD:

Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4. Reserve three figs and

halve remainder. Chop one onion and mix with halved figs and seasoning. Stuff in cavity of lamb, tie with string and weigh.

Slice onion. Place in base of a roasting tin and lay the lamb on top. Blend the reserved figs in a food processor with garlic, nuts, mint and oil. Spread over lamb.

Roast for 25 minutes per 450g/1 lb plus 20 minutes. Cover with foil if overbrown-

Transfer to a plate, cover with foil and keep warm. Spoon 30ml/2 tbsp of the juices into a pan. Add stock, wine and jelly. Boil for 2 minutes, stirring. Strain and serve with lamb.

Orange and Coriander Joint

Serves: 14.

1 boneless half gammon joint weighing approx. 3.2kg/7 lbs, soaked.

- 1 bay leaf.
- 6 black peppercorns.
- 1 small carrot.
- 1/2 onion, peeled.
- 1 large orange.
- 4 tbsp coriander seeds, lightly crushed.
- 3 tosp clear noney Sprigs of fresh thyme and bay leaves to garnish.

METHOD:

Drain the gammon and place in a large pan with the bay leaf, black peppercorns, carrot and onion and cover with water. Bring to the boil and skim off scum; reduce the heat and simmer for 3 hours. Drain and cool slightly.

Remove string from the gammon and cut away the rind to leave a layer of fat. Score a crisscross pattern in the fat with a sharp knife.

Preheat oven to 200°C/ 400°F/Gas Mark 6. Using a fruit zester, remove orange rind in small strips and mix with the coriander seeds. Squeeze the juice from the orange and mix with honey,

Place the gammon joint on a large sheet of aluminium foil in a large roasting tin. Use half of the orange juice and honey mixture to brush over the scored fat. Then press the coriander mixture onto the fat. Brush the exposed areas of meat with the honey mixture and then fold up the foil to cover the exposed areas.

Bake for 30-45 minutes, basting frequently with the juices, until golden.

Remove from the tin and transfer to a serving plate: garnish with sprigs of thyme and bay leaves. Serve warm or cold, carved into thin slices.



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Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Even the mags will relax you!

READING your favourite magazine is a relaxing pastime for many people - but does it help lower blood pressure and relieve headaches?

Apparently it does - as long as it's a gardening magazine.

The latest research from the Texas A&M University has shown that looking at images of plants can reduce stress and help relieve common ailments such as headaches and colds.

Just five minutes of looking at pictures of landscapes was shown to have a soothing effect, reducing physical stress symptoms like high blood pressure and muscle tension.

The belief that looking at plants and images of plants promotes restoration from stress dates back many centuries.

Since at least the 12th century in Europe, these beliefs have played a massive part in encouraging healthcare institutions to have gardens and other natural areas for patients to relax in and have justified building many parks, gardens, landscaping, and other natural

features in cities.

Until fairly recently, scientists suggested that people were 'culturally conditioned'. meaning that they were programmed to like plants and other nature, but conditioned to dislike cities where nature was lacking.

Another explanation which has been considered is that of arousal. They argue that stimulating environments such as cities - with high levels of noise, intensity, and movement - can affect people negatively by producing high levels of psychological and physiological excitement.

But during the last decade, researchers have shifted to evolutionary explanations for human benefits from plantation. A small but growing number of studies have analysed the effects on stressed individuals of viewing different types of outdoor settings, including views dominated by green vegetation such as trees, bushes, and grass.

The studies support the conclusion that looking at settings containing a lot of vegetation can often encourage stress relief. Findings suggested that the views with vegetation held attention more effectively and made the viewers feel more relaxed. indicated by declines in feelings of fear and anger and increases in positive feel-

Further studies found that stress relief happened very fast. After less than five minutes of exposure to a setting dominated by vegetation, a person would be significantly more relaxed. This was discovered by measuring blood pressure and

A study in 1993 suggested that the benefits of viewing vegetation may be greatest for people already experiencing stress, but that people who are not may gain a feeling of relaxation and general well-

So, if you're feeling a little stressed or you have got a bit of a headache coming on, forget the pills. Sit back and relax in the garden with your plants, or brush up on your gardening knowledge with a gardening magazine!

This Week In The Garden

Begin taking chrysanthemum

cuttings Some enthusiastic garden-ers will take their cuttings a lot earlier than this, but now is the time for amateur gardeners to start taking cut-tings from their chrysanthemum plants.

Start on those varieties that are grown for second crown buds and particularly on November incurves and sin-

The best shoots to cut are ones that rise directly from the soil from the root below. These should be severed just below soil level when they are a couple of inches or so in length.

Cut off all the lower shoots with a very sharp knife and trim off the base cleanly just below a joint. Then place them half an inch deep in sandy soil

It does not matter whether they are in boxes, pots or directly in a bed made up on the staging in the greenhouse - as long as there is ample drainage.

Regular watering is necessary and they need enough heat in a greenhouse to protect them from winter frosts. They can be sprayed every morning with tepid water.

Bring some more bulbs into the greenhouse

Bring in further batches of bulbs from the outdoor bed and frame them. This will enable you to make a good crop next year.

Continue to force seakale and rhubarb

At intervals of about two weeks, bring some roots of rhubarb and seakale into can force them.

Lift and blanch chicory Further roots should be

lifted now and treated by packing them close in soil and putting them in a warm and dark place.

Keep on protecting your cauliflower

Continue to bend down leaves over the curds of the cauliflower to help protect it from some of the harsher weather.

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Council U-Turn Allows Introduction Of Refuse Charae

As of next January, householders in Dungarvan will join the growing mass of towns throughout the country who have to pay a charge for refuse collection. Ever since the wheelie bins were introduced in the town two years ago, it was always on the cards that a collection charge would eventually be introduced. This scenario has now come to pass and Dungarvan residents are staring down the barrel of a £2 tag per bin col-

lection fee, starting from next month.

The tough decision to introduce the charge was made by six UDC members last Wednesday. Faced with the real threat of abolition only 6 months into its five year term, it was 'make or break' time for the local au-

A surprising change of mind by Labour's Paddy Power saw him propose the adoption of the Book of Estimates with certain amendments. His proposal was seconded by Independent Cllr. Michael O'Riordan and the ensuing roll call revealed a tightlipped Fine Gael support in the form of Cllrs. John Deasy and Damien Geoghegan, both of whom had previously voted against the Estimates. They were joined by Fianna Fail's Cllr. Nuala Ryan and Independent Cllr. Damien Dillon.

Labour members Teresa Wright and Chairman Lar Hart voted against the Estimates based on the controversial refuse charge. However it would have been interesting to note on which side the Chairman would have placed his casting vote if a tied vote had emerged.

FUTURE INCREASES NOT FULLY RULED OUT

The amendments to the County Manager Donal Connolly's original Book of Estimates allow for a waiver scheme for old age pensioners living on their own. The Manager has also agreed to examine individual hardship cases involving low income families and will also look at a reduced annual charge for schools in the town.

By introducing the waiver scheme, the UDC will lose approximately £15,000 which will be offset by reducing the provision for doors and windows by £10,000 and the provision for the rights of way by £5,000.

In proposing the Estimates, Cllr. Power put forward a resolution that the £2 charge will not be increased in the next budget

However, Mr. Connolly was making no guarantees on that score although he did agree to try to take the resolution on board. At the time of the next UDC Estimates in December 2000, he said he will then take into account the Council's needs and resources at that point in

Cllr. Teresa Wright however was fully confident that the refuse charge, once introduced, will be increased up to £2.50. then £3 and so on.

Elsewhere in the county, householders currently pay £2.50 per wheelie bin tag. Following Waterford County Council's recent Estimates meeting this figure is set to increase by 50p - an increase which incidentally was supported by county councillors Billy Kyne, Nuala Ryan and John Deasy.
THIRD TIME

LUCKY

Last Wednesday's meeting followed the axiom of 'third time lucky' with members having failed on two previous occasions to strike a rate. The deadline by which a Book of Estimates had to be agreed upon was midnight on last Sunday, 12th December.



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


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


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Dungarvan Millennium Celebrations Announced


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
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Commitment In Relationship

Shakespeare wrote: "The course of true love never did run smooth" and almost everybody can testify to the Bard's wisdom in this.

Choosing a partner is a process of discovery of the self and relationships exist in how they satisfy the physical, emotional, psychological and intellectual needs of the partner. Many believe love should be magical and that it should change everything. They hope to meet the perfect "stranger", fall in love and their whole world will be transformed in the blink of an eye forever. In fact creating a loving relationship means revealing yourself to your partner through your actions, words and feelings and this is a decision made to become deeply involved in the life of the other person in the long term.

Relationship exists when one is connected with another. Humans do not do well outside of relationships and there is nothing more painful than being incapable of forming a committed relationship. When people are unable to commit they forever find and seek partners who are also incapable of commitment. They may choose partners with built in unavailability like being already married or living far away. It's like searching for someone who doesn't really want you and becomes a sort of self-flagellation exercise. In the world of love and relationship people can be their own

worst enemies and this happens because they find it difficult to be trusting, vulnerable, faithful and honest as a result of their own insecurities.


Common questions from both men and women are - why do I get scared in relationships? - I keep meeting people who are afraid of commitment - is there something wrong with me? - How can I deal with a partner who is afraid to commit? What I say to these people is that they need to change the way they think and act within themselves and in their relationships.

Relationship is all about tying pieces of yourself to another and at times it means struggle where some of these connections seem to come apart but the retying of these connections and resolving conflicts knits the fabric of relationship. Those who deny this process and do not totally reveal themselves to their partner just dance on the surface of real intimacy. They have fragile connections and lack the depth and richness to remain truly connected.

Sometimes people are so anxious to find love that they are seduced by the possibility of a commitment long before it's made. Others, exhausted from attempts to form lasting relationships are unwilling to take on the challenges relationship presents. When they hit a bump a voice in their head goes maybe this relationship is not for me maybe I'll find someone more suited to me maybe I'm not ready for a relationship - or maybe I'm making a mistake. They may blame the people they go out with - she's too intense----she's a neurotic---He's not---something---! These are defensive positions and are not constructive because they are not acknowledging they had a part in the choices and outcomes.

It is worth remembering that no matter what we have to do in life we have to take certain risks and this process is non-negotiable. The first challenge on the road to relationship is to look inside yourself, examine your relationship patterns and accept responsibility for your relationship issues. Relationship by definition means there will be conflict. Conflict is part of the human condition and it moves relationship to greater depth and understanding. It is not conflict in itself that presents the problem but how you handle it. Fear of conflict comes from fears within the

self based on conditioned shame. Part of love is being human and having fear and anxiety and working through these fears creates stability and emotional maturity. People who are



afraid of commitment usually hang out with others who have similar issues and they feel uncomfortable in the company of connected and grounded people. In their minds these connected and committed types are 'cosy' but have short changed themselves by choosing to live in a small world where their lives are mundane and boring. Those who fear commitment exclaim that they want a larger "specialness." They expect the right love to hit them with certainty and this right partner will make them part of a special bond. I say to anybody who thinks like this DON'T HOLD YOUR BREATH.

These same people are also looking for the perfect job, the right place to live etc. and are forever resistant to all forms of commitment. They avoid making decisions and continually burn their bridges. One lady I worked with exclaimed - I've been involved in many relationships with men that were afraid of commitment - the last guy I was with made me believe this was the real thing, then he did a complete u-turn - what is there about me that lets this happen?

The issue is not why partners like this are finding you but rather why you are getting involved with them. Each person that gets involved in such a relationship should first make a personal assessment. The first thing to look at is why you appear vulnerable and what you do to get rejected. There are three fundamental qualities necessary for a relationship to flourish- have - trust, truth and clear realistic expectations.

Courtship is often the term used to describe the process by which partners get to know each other on the road to commitment. In this partners consolidate their concept of themselves in relation to the other. At the beginning of relationship one interacts with a little caution and distance as it could be foolish and dangerous to open out fully. The first time you date someone should not be an inquisition but as the attraction develops it is important to find out your partners' relationship past before you take down your emotional boundaries. When people are so desperate for relationship and commitment they don't see pitfalls. Rather they create myths about the relationship and the future and avoid reality. One of the most common ways of avoiding reality is hoping to change a partner after marriage.

Real commitment with someone you love, and who loves you back is magical and will transform your life. It is about accepting all parts of your partner - the flaws as well as the good points, just as we accept our own imperfections. This kind of love gives you more than it takes.

Carl Rogers wrote - "When I can discover or come closer to more of what I am deep inside, feeling sometimes angry or terrified, sometimes loving and caring, occasionally beautiful and strong, wild and awful without hiding those feelings from myself, then I can let myself be all of this complexity of feelings and meanings and values with my partner." At one and a half times the limit, he is four times as likely to be in a crash. Even the slightest intake of alcohol can affect judgement of distance and speed of oncoming vehicles.

45 lives were lost on the roads last December. There were 158 serious injuries and five times that number suffered minor injury. On average one person is injured every hour at Christmas time, resulting in a Christmas 'of pain and anguish for countless relatives and friends.'

Younger drivers are a highrisk category on the roads and are very susceptible to the effects of alcohol. At the legal limit, a 18-24 year old driver is almost four times more likely to become involved in a crash than if he or she had consumed no alcohol.

conjunction with the plant were also discussed such as the extension of the sewerage line to Pinewood and Kilrush etc.

The Council and the Department will liaise closely with each other and hold regular meetings in the run-up to the development. Mr. O'Flynn said it is hoped that work will be started on the project before this time next year.

The up-to-date position on the treatment plant has been raised by Cllr. Billy Kyne at practically every monthly meeting of the County Council. Speaking at this week's Council meeting, Cllr. Kyne said the local authority will have to push the project at any meeting with Government representatives and he appealed to all four T.D.'s in the constituency to push the project forward in a proactive way.

The new treatment plant will be located on a 2.83 hectare green field site at Ballinacourty which was once home to the giant Quigley Magnesite plant between the Gold Coast 18 hole golf course and the local lighthouse. Once up and running, the plant will be able to service all areas surrounding Dungarvan harbour.

divided over the planned multi-million pound project.

A separate planning application for a wind test mast at Coolnacreena, Cappoquin was lodged with Waterford County Council on November 3rd. Ned Morrissey and Seamus O'-Donnell have applied for a 40 metre test mast to monitor the wind, again over a 12 month period. The two local promoters hope to erect a small scale wind farm which would produce less than 5 megawatts of electricity and would be connected into the nearest power line on Mr. Morrissey's land.

QUESTIONS NEED TO BE ANSWERED

Having attended a number of public meetings concerning the wind farm proposals, the most recent being in Melleray, Cllr. Wilkinson outlined some of the concerns expressed by resi-

He requested that a written report be submitted at the next meeting of the Council in which officials would deal with some of these issues such as devaluation of property and possible risks to health. He said concern has also been expressed at claims that some insurance companies refuse to insure properties near wind farms.

'A lot of people are extremely worried and maybe there is no need", he stated. "I would ask that these questions be answered in time".

FARMING LEADER

Cattle Tag Arrangements For The Year 2000

The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Mr. Joe Walsh TD, has announced that notices have recently been issued to over 100,000 farmers advising them of their cattle tag allocation for the year 2000. Under these arrangements farmers will received the first 15 tags of their requirements free of charge provided orders are received by 31st March next.

The Minister urged farmers to pay particular attention to their responsibilities in relation to the identification and registration of cattle. Under EU requirements, from 1 January 2000, all calves born on a holding must be tagged in each ear with official tags within 20 days of birth. The birth of these calves must be notified to the Calf Birth Registration Agency, SWS, Bandon, Co. Cork within 7 days of tagging.

Minister Walsh said that because of the increasing importance of the proper identification of cattle in the context of the traceability of movement of cattle, it is vital that farmers carry out these tasks in the prescribed manner. Failure to do so could also result in penalties being imunder posed Premia/Headage Schemes.

The Minister stated that any herdowner who has not received a notice of a tag allocation for the year 2000 or who requires additional tags over and above the annual allocation indicated in the notice should contact the local District Veterinary Office.

Government Must Ensure Adequate Shipping Facilities For Live Cattle — ICMSA

of ICMSA's Beef & Cattle Committee, speaking recently said that the Government must ensure that the live cattle trade to Continental Europe is not hampered by inadequate shipping capacity. The live trade to Continental Europe, Mr. Heverin said, has been crucial over the past year to the price of calves and weanlings and has taken over 300,000 head of cattle already this year. What price would we have received for our cattle without this trade? Mr. Heverin said.

The Government, Mr. Heverin said. will have to recognise this and ensure that the trade is at all times facilitated. ICMSA, he said, has worked tirelessly on this issue over the past number of years and the trade has gone from strength to strength. The current loss of the Venus can be addressed quickly, Mr. Heverin said, by overcoming the problems associated with that ship or by licensing new carriers. It should not lead to long term problems.

The Science of Farming and Food

CATTLE:

ilage Intake:-

Now that cattle are settled into full winter diets it is sensible to keep a check on performance. The intake of good silage fed to appetite on its own should amount to 1.6 per cent to 1.7 per cent of animal bodyweight on a dry matter basis, i.e. a steer would consume about 10 kg sitage DM/day (50 kg silage @ 20 pc DM)

When meals are fed, silage intake is reduced by between 0.35 kg and 0.45 DM for each kg of meal fed. Therefore, feeding 4 kg meal reduces silage intake by about 1.6kg DM (or 8 kg silage @ 20 pc DM). Digestibility has a big effect on intake. There is a fairly constant fall in intake as silage gets more stemmy. With group feeding, only a rough estimate can be made of intake. Where diet feeders are used. the weight of silage at each feeding can be recorded and more accurate estimates done per animal. Where block cutters or shear grabs are used, the volume of each block can be measured and the weight of silage estimated.

Each cubic metre of silage weighs about 0.75t. Count should be kept over about 1 - 2 weeks of the number of blocks consumed in order to get a reasonable estimate of intake.

Another way of estimating intake might be to measure the volume of silage removed from a silo over a two-week period, converting this to weight and calculating the quantity consumed per head per day. Before going to all this work, a good stockman is likely to be able to make a good judgement on intake, e.g. if cattle are content and look full, if they are not rejecting silage overnight and if they are not being selective when fresh silage is put in the troughs, then intake should be

Preservation:-

Even small changes in preservation can affect intake. Preservation quality is measured mainly by pH and ammonia nitrogen. Direct-cut (non-wilted) silages should have a pH between 3.8 and 4.2, with ammonia of not more than 10 per cent of total nitrogen.

Management:-

Apart from factors in the silage itself, housing and feeding management can influence intake. Make every effort to encourage high silage intakes. Keep fresh feed before the stock. Secondary heating or stale silage in troughs will reduce intake and contaminate fresh silage. Heavy cattle need about 0.4 metres (15") of feed length for ad lib feeding. Once silage goes out of reach of cattle in feed passages, it should be pushed in again.

DAIRYING:

Hoof Paring:-

The early dry period is an ideal time to trim the hooves of cows. There are a number of reasons for this:

Cows are in mid-pregnancy. Heavily pregnant cows can be more dif-

If drastic hoof trimming is needed, there will be an ample period of time for the hoof to repair itself before the start of the next lactation. Dry cows are normally fed a forage based diet. Little or no concentrates are normally fed during the period. High levels of concentrates, particularly starchy ones, tend to weaken rather than strengthen the hoof hom. Corrective hoof treatment is best done during the dry period. Early rather than late in the period is the best time to tackle the task.

COW CONDITION

Are thin cows putting on extra weight?

If not it would be best to move with more meals now rather than later. Cows in condition score 3-3.5 will be fine on average quality silage (less than 67 DMD).

Cows in score 3.5 or greater should be restricted on silage that is 65%

They would only require 35-37 Kgs of fresh (65% DMD) silage per day (or 7-7.5 Kgs dry matter).

This preaching goes over the head of most farmers because they think and won't do anything about it. It is so wasteful of food but also can and does lead to health problems

When restricting silage, cows need 2 ft. each of feeding face each.

EARTHQUAKES AND VOLCANOES

DANGER ZONES

Volcanoes and earthquakes occur most often along the boundary between two of the Earth's tectonic plates. Cities built near these plate boundaries are most likely to have volcanoes and earthquakes.

Children who go to school in these zones have to practice earthquake drills as well as fire drills.



BLACK SMOKE

An underwater volcano (left) is sometimes called a black smoker, because huge plumes of black underwater smoke form where magma leaks out through the sea floor.

This can kill some living creatures, while others thrive on it.


Some earthquake zones are in the middle of oceans, others are on land, where people live.

Make Seismograph

Inside a modern seismograph is a pendulum. You can see how this can monitor the vibrations of the earth for yourself. Hang a weight from the end of a string to form your pendulum's bob and tie the other end of the string to the top back of a chair.

Now gently rock the chair to and fro, to mimic the vibrations of the Earth. The pendulum stays motionless as the chair moves.

If you attach a felt-tipped pen to the bob, and place some paper beneath it, you can create a record of the vibrations.




Local Trainee Jockey On R.A.C.E.

Brian Duggan from Dungarvan, Co. Waterford, left home on August 15th 1999 to start on his chosen career - a career in the exciting world of horseracing! He had heard about the Racing Apprentice Centre of Education in Kildare from his Career Guidance Teacher. He attended an Open Day at the centre with his parents in April and decided to apply in May. Because he was the correct weight (6 st. 4 lbs.) and aged 15 he was called for a 2 week residential trial in July along with 59 other candidates. "The trial was held in the National Stud and Punchestown Equestrian Centre, it was a great experience and very enjoyable."

He was very happy when he was offered a place on the course proper starting in August, even though it meant leaving home and school as the course is 42 weeks long and residential. After completing the initial 12 week riding and stable management course, Brian is now placed with trainer Michael Grassick on the Curragh for on-the-job training. Each morning he rides out 3 racehorses as well as helping out with routine tasks like feeding, mucking out and sweeping the yard. Each afternoon he has classes in English, Maths and Stable Management. An hour of P.E. follows classes, and evening activities include computers, art, football, swimming and French. Brian says "The course is demanding and also very educational." The facilities at the centre are excellent and you never get bored." When asked about his ambition Brian says without hesitation "I want to be the next champion apprentice."

With the completion of a months conditioning work, the rider should now be in a position to commence serious training as we build up towards the start of the racing season. In considering the training methods to be

son. In considering the training methods to basic adopted, one must bear in mind that there are two basic styles of training. Aerobic work is the general term applied to steady riding and anaerobic work applies to the short, flatout effort. Road racing demands that the body cope with a very wide range of race situations and these, in turn, require the rider to make efforts of both aerobic and anaerobic nature. The object of your training should be to prepare your body to handle these situations and it should be obvious that this demands that your training must be of a similar varied nature. To worship one training method to the exclusion of others will result in a rider only being able to handle certain situations and being completely out of his, or her depth in others.

Aerobic work does, however, have a large part to play in the formation of any training programme since this work provides the endurance base, without which speed work would be counterproductive. It develops a large powerful heart, an efficient blood transport system and produces a lean efficient body by burning fat reserves.

But even in this work it is important to find the line where leisure riding ends and training begins, since it is not simply a case of spending time on the bike. Time is a most valuable commodity and the bike rider must ensure that it is spent wisely.



ON LINE BOOKMAKERS

The Irish National Bookmakers Association (I.N.B.A.) recently announced plans to play a bigger role in the promotion of Irish racing. A new look for the betting ring is in the pipeline and an agreed code of practice for on course bookmakers will be introduced. The first step in the process is the introduction of computerisation in the Bookmakers Ring.

The code of practice will be displayed in the betting ring at all meetings and is expected to include the maximum amount each bookmaker is willing to lose.

PRIZE MONEY ON THE INCREASE

The minimum value of all races will jump to £5,000 in January following the Irish Horseracing Authority's announcement that the total prize money fund will be £25 million next year an increase of over £4 million on the

Peter McCarthy who is Chairman of the Association of Irish Racehorse owners had this to say, "We have been two years asking for the £5,000 level to be reached, so while it's great to start the new year on the right foot a figure of £6,000 should now be the target". He noted that racehorse owners will be contributing £7.4 million or almost 30% of the total prize fund next year. Peter is keen to see the owners contribution drop to 25% which is in keeping with International standards.

To begin with there is good news about money and as will be shown on the Statement of Accounts, the board made a profit in excess of £60,000 this

Apart from one contest and a year, leaving the county in a few interesting motions, the sound and solvent position. This is an amazing turn about in our finances which were approximately £170,000 in the red, five years ago. This requieter, so much so in fact that sulted from a variety of causes including astute management, clearly defined financial policies, total co-operation from the clubs who were prepared to make sacrifices as part of their contribution, very generous sponsorship and good support from the public.

Gate Receipts showed an in-

measure can be attributed to the fact that last year the public spent so much money following the county hurlers, that there was a falling off in support for the club games.

Receipts from games this year amounted to £99,317 (£78,423 last year)

The total income (including transfer income) was £486,922 expenditure £424,750.

INTERESTING FIGURES

The amount spent on coaching and development in excess of £30,000 shows the importance which the board attributes to this aspect of their activities.

The cost of preparing each of our 8 intercounty teams plus the expenses of the trainers is £141,316. (about £24,000 less than last year). They are as follows: Senior Hurling £63,587; Senior football £28,368; Junior Football £13,529; Minor Football £9,920; Minor Hurling £6,044; Intermediate Hurling; £8,708; Under 21 Hurling; £4,582; Under 21 Football, £1,269 The expenses of the trainers were

A figure of approximately £3,000 a week for team training is something that must be looked at. If the entire gate receipts for the year were given for team training, there would be a shortfall of nearly 50%. It is difficult for any board to sustain this kind of spending.

Recently the Waterford county board were complimented by Croke Park on the turnabout in the management of their financial affairs. All county board accounts have to by a special finance committee in Croke Park each year.

MOTIONS

The Mitchells won three titles before merging again with the mother club, Kilrossanty. Noel was an individual with a delightful personality and was popular all over.

The Kilrossanty Club gave him the traditional GAA send off and his coffin, which was shouldered by his former colleagues, bore the Kilrossanty green and gold colours. There was a massive turn out at his funeral and the concourse included a huge GAA presence.

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
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
