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Know Your Rights

QUESTION

I own a 1992 registered car, will I have to get my car tested under the National Car Test in January 2000?

ANSWER

No, but 1992 registered cars will have to be tested in 2001. The National Car Test (NCT) began on 4th January, 2000. This test is required under an EU Directive 1996/96EC. Testing will be phased in for all 'liable' cars between 2000 and 2002. 'Liable' cars are all cars except those classified as vintage cars for motor tax purposes and cars permanently based on islands not connected to the mainland by road or roll onroll-off ferry.

It will be an offence to use a car liable for testing in a public place, without an NCT certificate. The penalty for an offence may be up to £350. Motor Tax Offices will not tax a liable car (including a second hand import) unless it has passed its NCT.

All cars that were first registered before the 1st January, 1992 are due for testing in 2000; Cars first registered from 1992-1996 will be due for testing under the National Car Test in 2001; all four year old 'liable' cars will be due for test in 2002. In the relevant year car testing will be due on the anniversary of the first registration date and subsequent tests will be due every 2 years.

Under the National Car Test the items to be tested include suspension equipment, steering, lighting and signalling, vehicle identification (e.g. proper registration plates) wheels and tyres, transmission, bodywork, chassis and chassis components, braking, exhaust emissions. There are 43 dedicated NCT Centres. If you want more information, you should contact Customer Enquiries, National Car Testing Services (NCTS), Lakedrive 3026, Citywest Business Campus, Naas Road, Dublin 24 Tel; 1890 200 670.

The fee for an NCT will be £35 with a retest costing £19.80 (both inclusive of VAT). If a retest only covers minor items such as replacement of brake light bulbs or windscreen wipers, the retest may be free of charge.

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

JOURNEY UNDER THE SEA

About two-thirds of the Earth's surface is covered by oceans. Imagine a journey from one continent to another along the ocean floor. You submerge beneath the waves at the coastline, and sink gradually deeper as you move along a gentle slope called the continental shelf.

Suddenly, the water becomes much deeper as you meet an underwater cliff about 200 metres into your journey. The cliff is huge — perhaps five or six kilometres — and you drop down to the deep ocean floor.

Much of this floor is fairly flat, but in some places there are underwater mountains and volcanoes, some high enough to reach to the top of the ocean.

When you are near to the other continent, the ocean floor slopes steeply upwards, and you find yourself on another gently sloping continental shelf, before you finally reach the coastline.



The waves that beat on the shore gradually wear away, or erode, the rocks of the shore.

This erosion creates the interesting shapes of coastlines.

Huge chunks of coastline may erode, leaving a rock 'stack' out in the sea. Waves beak up rock into smaller and smaller pieces.

Sand itself is amde from tiny pieces of rock that have been ground down by the waves.

Remedial repairs are to be carried out by the Urban Council to sections of footpaths at Murphy Place, Abbeyside where exposed tree roots are causing problems for pedestrians.

TAXI LICENCE **NUMBERS INCREASE**

Dungarvan UDC has decided to increase the number of taxi licences to eighteen.

Thirteen licences have already been awarded by the Council, 12 of which were awarded to hackney operators licensed in the urban area, while a wheelchair accessible taxi licence was awarded to a hackney operator licensed in the county.

Applications have been invited by the Council for the purchase of five additional licences and these will be adjudicated on the basis of a points system. The closing date for receipt of applications is 21st January.

Members of Dungarvan UDC had tried to accommodate all thirteen hackney operators licensed by the Urban Council but two local operators lost out.

At their meeting last month members impressed upon the Manager the importance of including the remaining local operators.

Donal Connolly however said he cannot absolutely guarantee anything as all applicants will be subject to a points system.

"We're fairly sure from the exercise we carried out and based on the applications we received earlier that there is every chance the two remaining taxi operators will get a licence", he stated.

CRITICISM OF URBAN RENEWAL SCHEME

UDC Chairman Lar Hart has strongly criticised an 'oversight' in the latest round of urban renewal designation in

Dungarvan which excludes the rear of buildings from the scheme.

The scheme, which offers tax incentives for commercial and residential development, fails to include the entire

Cllr. Hart feels that this lapse in the scheme, whereby land behind buildings are not included, will hold it back. People who extend their property to the rear will not benefit from the tax breaks.

The Department of the Environment has drawn a tight line at the rear of designated buildings and in some cases

existing extensions are not included in the designation.

Speaking at last month's meeting, Cllr. Hart proposed that the Council call on the Minister for the Environment to review the areas designated in the town under the scheme to include the entire area of each property and not just the main building.

His proposal found the support of Cllr. John Deasy who said this is a serious Cllr. John Deasy issue for many people.

Ltd. have been granted planning permission by the UDC for an extension to their manufacturing plant at Clogherane, Dungarvan.

Elsewhere, the Urban Council has granted outline planning permission for the construction of four single storey dwellings, a new entrance and roadway at Skehacrine (Marquis), Abbeyside.

Further information has been sought by the Council in respect of an application for outline permission to moor and operate a floating bar/restaurant at Davitt's Quay, Dungarvan.

Additional information has also been sought in respect of an application for the change of use to licensed premises at Scanlon's car park to the rear of 41/42 Mary Street.

Lights Out In Shandon

A recent black-out in Shandon where public lights along the street were out for a considerable length of time has been strongly criticised by Cllr. Damien Geoghegan.

Speaking at last month's meeting of the Urban Council. Cllr. Geoghegan said the lights were out for over ten days

and ESB repair crews had to come from Waterford. This, he stressed, is completely unacceptable as residents in this entire area were left in the dark each night.

Cllr. Lar Hart also expressed his disappointment at the situation as he had previously been informed by the ESB that when public lights in a large area are out, the ESB will fix it the next day.



Our Minted Tandoori Chops Are Hot Stuff

A TANTALISING variation from traditional tandoori – try this delicious recipe for minted spicy tandoori lamb chops.

Ingredients:

Serves 2

250ml plain yoghurt

1 x 15ml sp ground cumin 1 x 15ml sp ground

coriander

2 x 15ml sp mild curry powder

4 lamb chump chops, each cut into three pieces 1 x 15ml sp fresh mint, chopped

Method:

PREHEAT the oven to 180°C/ 355°F/gas mark 4. In a small bowl, combine the plain yoghurt, ground cumin, ground coriander and mild curry powder.

Mix together these ingredients well.

Toss the pieces of chops in the yoghurt mixture and coat them evenly.

Place the lamb on a rack which is standing inside a baking dish.

Bake the lamb in the oven for 45 minutes, turning occasionally.

Sprinkle chopped mint over the lamb pieces and serve immediately with rice (optional).

TIP: Try using some of the specialised rices for curries. Ask for these at your local supermarket.

SUGGESTED WINE:

South Australian Cabernet Sauvigon. A dry, rich wine with a blackcurrant flavour and a lingering taste.



BEEFY BURGERS

Ingredients

(serves 4)

1 slice stale bread 500g lean beef mince 2 spring onions, finely chopped

1/2 x 5ml sp salt

1 x 5ml sp Worcestershire sauce

1/2 x 5ml sp dried mixed herbs

1 clove garlic, crushed 1/4 cup milk

1 x 15ml sp oil Hamburger buns

4 slices cheese Lettuce leaves, washed

Method

Crumble the bread by scrunching it in your hand.

Put the bread crumbs into a large mixing bowl, and add all the other ingredients, except the milk.

Mix thoroughly. Add some milk – you need to add enough so that the mixture will form into patties without cracking around the edges.

Shape into large patties – about the same size as

your hamburger buns. Choose a heavy pan,

choose a heavy pan, pour the oil into it, and heat it on the element.

Add the patties, brown them on each side, and then turn down the heat and cook for another 5-8 minutes on each side.

Mince patties should be cooked right through, not pink in the middle.

You can test if the pattie is cooked by pricking the centre with a small knife.

If the juice that runs out is pink, the pattie is not cooked yet. When the juice is clear, the pattie is cooked.

While the patties are cooking, slice the hamburger buns in half and toast under a medium grill for 2-3 minutes each side until golden. Spread the bottom halves of the rolls with tomato sauce or relish.

When the patties are cooked, add a pattie to each bottom half, top with all your favourite fillings, add the lid, and enjoy!

Ingredients:

Makes 12 slices 275g caster sugar

175g soft-tub margarine 3 eggs

1 x 5ml sp vanilla essence 175g low-fat natural yoghurt 225g self-raising flour

50g cocoa 1 x 5ml sp bicarbonate of soda for the icing:

50g soft-tub margarine 50g cocoa

3 x 15ml sp milk 350g icing sugar

12 walnut halves to decorate Method:

PREHEAT the oven to 170°C/325°F/gas mark 3. Grease a 23cm spring-form tin and line the base with greaseproof paper. Dust the inside of the tin with flour, then tap out the excess.

Beat the caster sugar and margarine in a mixing bowl until smooth. Beat in the eggs, vanilla essence and yoghurt. Sift in the flour, cocoa and bicarbonate of soda. Stir until fully combined. Spoon the mixture into the prepared tin and level the




surface. Bake the cake for 40-45 minutes, or until a skewer inserted into the centre come out clean. Put the tin on a wire rack. Cool for five minutes and then turn the cake out on to the rack to cool completely.

For the icing, melt the margarine in a saucepan. Stir in the cocoa. Heat gently, stirring until combined. Remove from the heat and stir in the milk and icing sugar until the mixture is smooth and blended.

Spread the icing evenly over the top and side of the cake.
Arrange the walnuts around the top edge and leave the icing to set for 10 minutes before serving

Make-overs For Dreary Fences

DOES your garden contain a bare and drab fence which lets down the rest of the features?

Most gardens do. But rather then go to the cost and hassle of replacing it, why not disguise it with a clever cover-up?

Before you start work on any of your fences, carry out any minor repairs that need doing. Make sure they are sound - especially if you are going to add any extra weight to them.

Fences protect your garden by sheltering your plants and provide security for your home. They need to be strong, durable and long-lasting, but that's no

Any timber you use outdoors needs pre-treating with a preservative.

A fence make-over can be completed in less than one weekend once you have all the materials you want to use.

One cheap way of dealing with a dull fence is to divert the attention away from it. Place a Moroccan-style screen in front of it to hide the plain panels behind.

Scour junk shops and car boot sales for bargains. You

might find old garden gates useful, with their twisting patterns wound into the metal, or you could make a wooden alternative by joining together three narrow trellis pan-

Another idea is to make a feature of your fence panels by placing a trellis in the centre of each one. They are easily attached without splitting the wood, using fencing staples, wire or small nails. Make your fences instantly

tropical by fixing a bamboo screen to them. The screen usually comes in rolls, costing about £20. It can easily be fixed to a plain fence using staples, and manufacturers claim it has an outreason for them to look bor- door life expectancy of five

> If you are a little bit wild at heart, you might want to try a natural brushwood screen over your panels. The screens are made from pieces of dried tree heather woven together and have an outdoor life expectancy of around 10 years. Prices start at around £35 for a 5m roll.

The modernist approach is the use a simple sheet of galvanised metal, which is particularly effective in a sunny position.

This idea is particularly good for family gardens.

This Week In The Garden

Order seeds and seed potatoes

The very first task of January should be to compile a list of all the seeds you will need over the coming months. Get these ordered without delay. Many seeds cannot be sown after March or April. Later on producers are inundated with orders and even the biggest companies get bogged under. Set potato seeds in shallow travs as soon as they arrive, eved ends up, and place them in a light, frost-proof room.

Bring shrubs and roses in pots to the greenhouse

Roses well established in pots should be brought into the greenhouse now. Give them a light airy place preferably above ground level not too far from the glass. Water the soil regularly and spray them every morning with a little lukewarm water. All the roses must be pruned and previous year's growth shortened to within an inch of the older wood.

Prune climbers in the greenhouse

Several permanent climbers commonly grown in the greenhouse should have been pruned by now. These include plumbago capenis and the passion flower. The plumbago is pruned by cutting last year's growth back to 23cm. This also applies to fully developed plants. With young plants, some shoots may be left unpruned. The passion flower must have all weak shoots removed and last year's growth cut back to around two buds each.

Start early peaches, nectarines and apricots

With the aid of a heated greenhouse it is possible to have ripe peaches, nectarines and apricots throughout the summer. If you want ripe fruits in June now is the time to start. Maintain a temperature of 8°C at night and 13°C during the day - leave all doors and ventilators closed. Spray the plants every morning with luke warm water and keep the floor wet to maintain a moist atmosphere

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
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
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
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
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
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LATE NOEL KIRWAN



Cappoquin Wind **Test Mast** Gets Go-Ahead

OBJECTORS TURN TO BORD PLEANALA BY AISLING CONROY

Waterford County Council has granted planning permission for the erection of a 40 metre wind test mast at Coolnacreena, Cappoquin.

Local developers Ned Morrissey and Seamus O'Donnell are to proceed with their plans for the mast on an elevated site owned by Mr. Morrissey.

The mast will monitor the wind over a 12 month period and will provide the promoters with information on whether or not a wind farm would be suitable in the area.

The promoters eventually hope to erect a small scale wind farm which would produce less than 5 megawatts of electricity and would be connected into the nearest power line on Mr. Morrissey's land.

A decision on a separate planning application for a wind test mast on the Knockmealdowns, lodged by Charles Keane of Cappoquin Estates, is expected by January 19th.

BORD PLEANALA TO HAVE FINAL SAY

The Coole Action Group however, which had opposed the original planning application, have stated their intention to appeal the permission to An Bord Pleanala. They collected over 560 signatures supporting their objection including the monks of nearby Mount Melleray.

The group was established to oppose the Coolnacrena development and is chaired by John Kiely. Speaking to the 'Leader', Mr. Kiely said the Coole Action Group are now in the process of putting their objection together and lodging it with the Planning Board before 21st January.

Again, the group are appealing the permission for the mast on the grounds of its visual impact. They claim that a 40 metre mast would be seen for miles around. Possible health risks are also cited in their ob-

Bord Pleanala will take three months to examine the appeal and arrive at a final conclusion. During that time the project will not be allowed to proceed.

In relation to the health concerns, one of the promoters behind the venture, Ned Morrissey previously stated that heavy duty pylons used in some wind farm developments are the only source of possible risks to health. These, he stressed, will not form part of the Coolnacrena project. As the father of five young children and the family in closest proximity to the development, Mr. Morrissey said that naturally he would not back the project if there were any health risks involved.

WILKINSON CALLS FOR

ANSWERS

Meanwhile Waterford County councillor Ollie Wilkinson has requested that a written report on wind farm projects be submitted to members in which Council officials would deal with issues such as devaluation of property and possible risks to health. He said concern has been expressed by members of the public at claims that some insurance companies refuse to insure properties near wind farms.

"A lot of people are extremely worried and maybe there is no need", he stated. "I would ask that these questions be answered in time'

KNOCKMEALDOWN PROTECTION

The Knockmealdown Protection Committee has made public two elements of the formal objection it has lodged with Waterford County Council against a proposal by Charles Keane to install wind turbines on the Knockmealdown mountains.

The committee has identified 80 homes that would be in line of sight of the proposed wind turbine installations and has interviewed their residents. The vast majority - 64 out of 80 are firmly opposed to the wind turbine scheme. The committee has signed documentation of that fact and has submitted it to the Council. Of the remaining 16 householders, only 9 were in favour and seven were undecided. A map outlining the location of the 80 homes, with the opinions of their owners in colour code has also been submitted to the Council.

The committee has collected over 1,000 signatures to a petition opposing the turbine development, most of them obtained by going house to house. The vast majority of the signatures have been obtained in villages and the countryside within a five mile radius of the proposed development.

According to the committee this petition indicates the strength of opinion in the local population against the scheme.

"The Council and the local citizens elected representatives should not ignore the opinion of those whose lives would be most directly affected by the proposed scheme", stated the committee. "We rely on the Council to take note of their views, along with the many other reasoned arguments against plans for this development".

ICMSA Receives Legal Opinion On Direct Payments

ICMSA has received Senior count for 100% of a farm fam-Counsel opinion that certain rules governing the direct payments schemes to farmers seriously undermine the European Courts concepts of fairness and justice and may be in breach of the Irish Constitu-

ICMSA are considering a direct legal challenge to those rules unless there is a fundamental change of approach by the EU and the Minister for Agriculture.

Direct payments in some farming circumstances can acily income. Current rules of the Department provide for penalties of up to two years loss of premium where a farmer makes a mistake.

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President ICMSA, said, "There is growing anger among farmers in the way that they are treated by the Department as if they were all involved in fraud. The current rules for direct payments impose very severe penalties for very small errors".

Mr. O'Rourke continued, "No Civil Servant would ac-

which would mean that he could lose up to two years salary if he made a mistake. Yet this is what the current rules for direct payments for farmers contain'

He added, "The penalties in various livestock premium schemes and REPS are completely disproportionate. The rules make no real distinction between mistakes, carelessness or down right fraud. This does not stand up to natural justice".

By this time all farmers will have received a booklet in the post from the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Development entitled "Your Guide to Agenda 2000 Changes". Also included with that booklet is a form headed "Extensification Premium for Year 2000". This form must be completed and returned to the Local District Livestock Office by Friday, February 4th, 2000.

On this form if you wish to be considered for extensification premium this year you must choose the simplified system or the Census system.

If you chose the simplified system your stocking rate must be less than 1.6 Livestock Units (L.U.'s) per hectare (ha) or less than 2.0 L.U.'s per ha., depending on whether you choose the higher or lower rate, on every day of the year in order to

If you choose the Census system your stocking rate must be less than the above limits on average over 5 census dates during the year. You will not know in advance when these

This farmer is eligible for the low rate of extensification payment as the stocking density of 1.75 L.U./ha. is less than 2.0 and greater than 1.6.

He will be paid an additional ?26 for each suckler cow and 10 month premium claimed.

Under the Census Scheme the farmer is eligible for the high rate of extensification payment as the stocking density is less than 1.6 L.U./ha.

He will be paid an additional ?52 for each suckler cow and 10 month beef premium claimed.

The extra income to this farmer because of choosing the census system is ?1,040 to ?1,500 in 2000.

Mr. Gray pointed out that Irish sheep farmers are being short changed by £8.20/ewe in premium payments. He said this is the difference between the EU ewe premium of £17.76 and a premium based on Irish prices which would be worth £25.96/ewe.

The Waterford IFA sheep farmers leader also pointed out that sheep are totally discriminated against under the extensification premium rules. "The latest blow is that the Minister has told flock owners their ewes will be counted for the full 5 census dates even if some are disposed of after retention. This is total discrimination."

Mr. Gray called for a full parliamentary debate on the income crisis in the sheep sector.

ICMSA Call on Minister To Address Nitrogen **Issue In Reps**

Mr. John O'Connor, Chairman of ICMSA's Farm Services and Environmental Committee speaking recently after a meeting with Senior Officials of the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Development where the future of the REPS Scheme was discussed said that the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development should seriously consider introducing a REPS Scheme for intensive farmers.

"These farmers are unable to participate in the current scheme, due to the restrictive nature of the nutrient limits", said Mr. O'Connor.

He continued "The ICMSA's proposed REPS scheme for intensive farmers suggests that the nitrogen limit be set at the rate recommended under the Code of Good Agricultural Practice to Protect Water From Pollution by Nitrates, which represents good farming practice.

"This would encourage more intensive farmers into REPS with the subsequent benefits for the individual farmers, the environment and the rural area in general".

Mr. O'Connor said, that ICMSA again raised the issue of penalties and the appeals system which, Mr. O'Connor said, are no longer acceptable. The Minister must, Mr. O'Connor concluded, look seriously at these two issues without delay and introduce a reasonable system of penalties.

HORSE HEADAGE PAYMENT WELCOMED **BY IFA HORSE CHAIRMAN**

The Chairman of Waterford "It is unfair that horse in IFA Horse Committee Gabriel Foley has welcomed the Department of Agriculture's late payment of horse headage. Payments were issued this week which is almost two months earlier than previous years, following representation from IFA.

"This money will be a boost for horse breeders and it is long overdue" he said.

Mr. Foley went on to point out that over £600,000 in horse headage was paid to horse farmers by the Department and while this was welcome, it was important that these payments were made earlier next year.

breeders should have to wait for their payments until Christmas while all other sectors have been paid. I believe this is a point of principle and I would call on the Department to process horse headage at the same time as cattle and sheep headage in future" he said.

Mr. Foley said that in future years all payments should be made in November as per the Charter of Rights.

"While the total amount paid out in horse headage is not as much as under the other headage schemes it is equally important to those who are entitled to it" he said.

ICMSA Calls For Establishment of Waterways Authority To Reduce The Impact of Flooding

ICMSA President, Mr. Pat O'Rourke, has stated that much of the country's flooding problems could be avoided if the Government established a National Rivers and Waterways

Mr. O'Rourke said that the present strategy to tackle flooding black spots in urban and rural areas was totally uncoordinated because there were too many different authorities involved in trying to tackle the problem.

"A National Rivers and Waterways Authority, backed up by proper funding and resources, would be in position to come up with an effective national strategy to minimise the problems of flooding", said the ICMSA President.

He called on the Taoiseach, Mr. Bertie Ahern, T.D. to honour his commitment given to ICMSA two years ago to establish a National Rivers and Waterways Authority.

Mr. O'Rourke said farmers were losing millions of pounds every time a major flooding problem occurred in Ireland. He said the current spell of bad weather would result in substantial income losses for farmers in the worst hit areas.

Parlon Calls on Minister to Deliver On the Real Issues in Farming

In a New Year's message IFA President Tom Parlon said that a serious political rift is opening up arising from the rapid decline in farm income in the past two years while other sectors of the economy are powering ahead. He said that farmers on the ground are seething with anger at the Minister's insensitive and dismissive response to the recent CSO farm income figures. He called on the Minister to acknowledge the problems and apply himself in 2000 to delivering on the real issues in farming that are well known to him.

Tom Parlon said: "The overall farm income decline of over 20% in the past two years is bad enough, but in particular income, farmers are accumulating debts, and their viability is seriously at risk. It is a matter of deep concern to IFA that the Minister seems to be so much out of touch with reality.

In a New Year statement to the Government the IFA President has set out a six-point priority agenda which must be delivered by the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh in 2000. Mr Parlon said: "These issues are within the Minister's own area of responsibility and are key requirements of IFA in the immediate months ahead".

The following priority agenda was announced by the IFA

Reopening The Live Cattle Trade

The IFA President said that the Minister's main responsibility to livestock farmers is to ensure adequate competition between the various market destinations. He said that if we had an active live cattle trade to Libya and Egypt in the past year, the factories would not have succeeded in holding down prices to farmers. The Minister also has responsibility to ensure an adequate ro-ro ferry capacity to service the growing EU market for store

An Immediate Initiative On Incomes In The Sheep Sector

Mr Parlon said, "The inyears. An immediate and practical measure that could be taken is a temporary suspension of the "7% stabiliser" until the review of the CAP for sheepmeat takes place. This stabiliser can no longer be justified by the Commission because sheep numbers in Ireland and in the EU are falling. This would be worth an additional £4.35 in the ewe premium. Also the first 30 livestock units of sheep should be excluded from the extensification premium stocking rate calculation.

An Effective Young Farmer Installation Scheme and Adequate Capital Grants to Meet must be satisfactory on two

Environmental Investment fronts. First, the taxation ar-

Tom Parlon said, "IFA has estimated that there is a total investment requirement by farmers of about £1,000m. to meet environmental demands arising from (a) EU requirements, (b) nutrient management plans which are being written-in as a condition of various structural schemes included in the National Development Plan, and (c) demands of Local Authorities and national environmental legislation. The £147m. allocated to the new Waste Management Scheme for the next seven years in the National Development Plan is seriously inadequate. Mr. Parlon called for a proper Government installation scheme to encourage young farmers as this was a vital requirement to restore confidence in farming.

New Milk Quota Management Arrangements

Tom Parlon said that IFA supports the Minister's recent announcement to favour active milk producers and to restructure available milk quota to small and medium sized producers. However, the changes

rangements must be reformed to accommodate the changed status of milk quotas. Second, the situation of farmers currently dependent on temporary leasing must be accommodated in the change.

Effective administration of EU direct payments by the Department of Agriculture

The IFA President said that in the context of a 20% reduction in real incomes from farming over the past two years, farmers expect a serious response from Minister Walsh. In particular, there is an overwhelming case to pay in January a further 20% of the suckler cow and special beef premiums, the final instalment of the ewe premium, and the sation package. This would improve farmers cash flow by £150m. Also, the overall Charter of Farmer's Rights must be seriously reviewed in the partnership negotiations.

Bovine TB Eradication Scheme

Mr Parlon said: "The current TB eradication scheme is a cause of enormous frustration to farmers. The results show that it just is not working, and farmers are carrying a major cost for an ineffective scheme. IFA is seeking real changes to the design and administration of the scheme in the current negotiations on a new National Partnership Programme".

SOUTH EAST ICMSA NEWS

FARM INCOMES - KEY TO NEW AGREEMENT

Farm incomes and the tax treatment of farm families are the key issues which ICMSA are seeking real commitment on during the discussion on a new National Agreement.

Farm incomes will decline by 8 per cent while incomes generally will increase by 16 per cent during the three years of Partnership 2000.

Farmers could not be expected to agree to a new National Agreement against this income decline unless there are significant and definite measures to improve farmer's incomes. This will require public policy measures to improve prices, reduce costs and promote investment and restructuring of the agricultural sector.

ICMSA have sought Government action under the National Development Plan and the budget on farm taxation and investment aids and will then judge the Government's real commitment to farm families and agriculture.

THE OBJECTIVES OF AGRICULTURAL POLICY AT EU AND NATIONAL LEVEL

The agreement reached at NESC (Report No. 104, November 1999) should form the basis for the Government's approach to agricultural and rural development policy. Specifically, ICMSA is proposing that;

Ireland should endeavour to ensure that the EU achieves full accommodation for the European model of agriculture in the upcoming World Trade Organisation (WTO) negotiations.

Domestic policies and supports should also be focused on improving the sectors capacity to meet the challenge of increased competition on EU and third country markets arising from the liberalisation of trade.

Structural change that facilities the entry of trained young farmers and increases the proportion of viable farms is a key requirement in his Ireland's food exports need to be increasingly redirected to the EU consumer market as this offers more secure long term prospects for Irish farmers and the food sector.





G.A.A. HISTORY MILESTONES

1903 - Scoring area reduced to 45 feet. Ulster Council is formed at Armagh. Junior championships established. Kerry win the All Ireland football final. Cork beat Kilkenny by 8-9 to 0-8 at Dungarvan in the All Ireland Home Hurling final. Although this was the 1903 final it was played on 16th July

1904 - rules for a new game called Camogie were drawn up by the Craobh an Cheithnigh Gaelic League Club. The first competitive match was played between two Dublin clubs, Keatings and Cuchulanns. Kerry beat Dublin by five points to two in the All Ireland football final. Even back then Kerry had the upper hand on Dublin. Some things never change. Kilkenny beat Cork by a point in the 1904 All Ireland Hurling final. Incidently this match was played at Carrick-ion-Suir in June, 1906.

1905 - June 12th Scotland V. England inter provincial takes place in Liverpool. Gaelic football takes off as a spectator sport with three matches to decide the All Ireland football final of 1903. Kerry beat Kildare and no Mick O"Dwyer did not score the winning goal. In the All Ireland Hurling final Kilkenny got revenge for the 1903 final, trashing Cork at Dungarvan in June 1907. One thing we can learn from those days is that they were not in the greatest of hurry to play the final. Now a days we would complain if a final was delayed for a month neither mind two years.

DID YOU KNOW?

Dublin beat Waterford by 2-8 to 0-4 in the 1898 All Ireland Football final held in Tipperary on April 8th, 1900.

One of the most important aspects of any training program, but yet often overlooked or skimped on, is rest and sleep. Body growth and repair of muscle tissues occur only during rest or sleep, never during training. Successful development of an athlete is always a delicate balancing act between three variables - 1) A training program of progressive overload, 2) the correct nutrients to maintain and repair tissue and build new tissue and 3) sufficient rest and sleep to allow the repair and new growth to take place.

The general rule for rest is to get 7½ to 9½ hours sleep a night for athletes who train twice a day and you should if you want the maximum training effect, a 30 to 60 minute nap after your first training session is invaluable. This is especially important when you commence anaerobic training and racing when you will actually be tearing down muscle tissue, which can only be rebuilt by rest.

Short sleep athletes are the first to succumb to the big killer of sports careers - overtraining. Recent studies show that the overtraining syndrome occurs primarily because of insufficient rest. You can't beat overtraining with more work because, by the time it becomes noticeable, your body is already knackered.

Having only his second race outing May Aylward's Mays Zabarjad (Skip Pass - Spring Power) registered a handy 30.29 victory in the fifth event at odds of 1/1. Despite steering a wide course from his trap two starting position "Mays" powered his way clear of a challenging Coolclough Sandy out of the second bend running out a three lengths winner over Marian's Flame.

The D. Dunphy and G. McDonald owned and Jimmy Frisby trained Narabane Kitty (Moaning Lad - Narabane Lucky) 6/4 came from well off the pace to capture the sixth race in 30.21. The winner was some way in arrears as Lynn's Beauty and Come Home Safe battled it out up front but knuckling down to the task in hand "Narabane" produced a big finish up the home stretch to outstay Come Home Safe by two and a half lengths.

A disappointing field of three for the seventh contest with victory going to 4/6 favourite Knockdrinna Wood (Fortunate Man - Brian's Gold) in 29.82. Knockdrinna Wood burst clear of Karen's Pride early on and with Next Lap being denied racing room at the third bend as

the winner cut back in for the rails the favourite enjoyed a free run in to beat Next Lap by four and a half lengths.



SMALL RECREATIONAL CRAFT

An interim report, to regulate the use of small powered recreational craft, was presented to the Minister for the Marine and Natural Resources, Dr. Michael Woods T.D., in November 1999. A full summary of the report can be seen in the club house. Briefly, the action group has finalised its initial review on the issues posed specifically by the use personal craft (jet skis) and fast power craft in Ireland.

New legislation will govern the use of such craft in the areas of competence, age limits, avoidance of substances which might constrain safe usage, etc. An awareness campaign aimed at increasing knowledge of the dangers of irresponsible use of such craft will commence, along with training and other programmes aimed at bringing user competence to levels which will minimise human error/judgment based accidents. Appreciation of meteorological, sea conditions, awareness of other water users will be included to ensure maximum safety for all persons, the new legislative regime will be handled by a combination of national and local authority.

PROTECTION OF THE YOUNG

The action group agrees that a requirement which is already emerging is the paramount need to ensure the safety on the water of children and young people, particularly as they are becoming more and more involved in water based activities. All possible measures must be put in place to safeguard and protect children and young people.

At this stage, and as a first step, it is agreed that all persons under the age of 16 should have to wear appropriate life jackets on board water craft and also should not be allowed drive personal water craft or fast power craft. The action group stresses the need for all craft to carry life jackets sufficient for all persons on board and furthermore strongly recommends the wearing of such life jackets by all persons when on deck or on board open boats.

In relation to the issue of children and young persons being towed by fast personal water craft or fast power craft on inflatable or other items, the

group has identified the need for operators of the craft concerned to appreciate the differences in how to handle craft while towing such items.

The action group is continuing its deliberations on other small recreational craft and will report on this in it's final report in February 2000.

The county finalists go forward to play in the Regional Finals and one or two players are chosen to represent their county in the Mini-Sevens which are played in Croke Park on the All Ireland Semi Finals and Finals day. In the Primary Game, we usually have a girls' football team every second year.

Since the publication of my proposed formula for the next senior hurling championship, I have heard two further pro-

One relates to a straight knock-out with a losers group added to give teams a second chance. I hope that this will be defeated as it only guarantees two matches to a club who have trained for months.

The other proposal is to have all twelve teams play in one section of the league with the top four (Ballygunner, Mount Sion, Lismore, Ballyduff) qualifying for the knockout stages. I hope that this, too is a non runner.

One club has contacted me expressing strong support for my proposal.

Also during the week, I was asked why no proposals are being made for the senior football championship.

As previously explained, the footballers are being well catered for in the Ryan Super Leagues. These are taken very seriously by clubs and are efficiently run. I understand that a senior club intends to propose that the football championship be confined to twelve teams, with no group teams and that the championship be

played in four groups of three. The bottom team in each group dropping out and the 8 survivors go into a knock out championship.

The County Board meeting to decide on championship format will take place within the next three weeks, so clubs will need to be making their minds up in the meantime.

It is expected that Coisde na Peil will issue the full programme of matches for the Ryan Super Leagues in time for publication next week.

The programme is being worked out over several weeks and was nearing completion when I made enquiries over the weekend.

JANUARY: A TIME TO PLAN A YEAR'S PROGRAMME

Many clubs are now holding the Annual General Meeting and are no doubt making plans for the new year. Now is the time to stock up with hurleys and sliothars. Bulk buying is a thing to think about now. For juvenile clubs plenty short, light hurleys are a must for young hurlers. A hurley that's too long or too heavy will turn many a good young lad away from the game. A bountiful supply of sliothars is essential at every training session. Six/seven year old boys and girls enjoy hitting tennis balls. On a fine summers evening on a well trimmed pitch these light balls will travel. The aim of every club coach should be to improve the skill level of every player. The only way this can be achieved is by hurling, hurling and more hurling. Coaches should be well able to perform the basic skills of hurling and correct children who are making mistakes. Adults who are coaching, or starting to coach should complete a Foundation Level Hurling Course as soon as possible. How often have we heard this phrase? "Pity he wasn't shown the basics when he was a young fellow".

We are fortunate in Waterford City and county, there are so many dedicated men and women who give their time so unselfishly to under age games. But year after year it's the same people, ow is the time, at the start of a new century to get more people involved and share the load. We owe it to our youth.
