Clancy On Track For Shandon Site Development BY AISLING CONROY According to Waterford

Kyne says power plant is more "immediate return" the site can deliver

County Manager Donal Connolly, Clancy Construction is still on track with plans for the major development of the former Waterford Foods processing site at Shandon in Dungarvan.

The regional construction company are expected to lodge a planning application with the Urban Council within 'a couple of months' for the first phase of the development which involves a shopping complex and significant car parking facilities.

Mr. Connolly said the overall plan for the 40 acre site has not changed in any material way since Billy Clancy met with Council members last year to discuss proposals for the development of the property.

Mr. Clancy had indicated that the site, which was sold for close on £5m, will be developed as a mix of retail, cinema, restaurant, hotel, car parking, warehousing, technology and business park as well as local amenity and residential areas.

When the draft development plan for the town is in place, said Mr. Connolly, it will not set out Clancy's regulations for the development of the site, rather the plan will set out general planning guidelines.

DEASY RAISES LOCAL CONCERNS

The Co. Manager was speaking at Monday's UDC meeting where Cllr. John Deasy said he was concerned that many

local people are not aware of the current situation with regard to the Shandon site.

"Many locals aren't aware of what's going on", he stressed, claiming that sites in the development are being "pre-determinedly sold".

Mr. Connolly however said all developments will be subject to the planning process and he was not aware of any sales by Clancy of parts of the site.

In relation to the proposed £60 million power plant on the former creamery site, Cllr. Deasy requested that the developers meet with the Council and discuss exactly what the project entails. He said that while the project seems very positive for the town with the introduction of a natural gas supply, electricity costs however are expected to fall by 10% over the next few years as a result of deregula-

"This is a massive project and means so much to the town", he stated. "The townspeople deserve to know what is happening"

PROJECT IS NO SECRET

Mr. Connolly stressed there is 'no secret' about what is involved in the proposed power plant.

The key to the project is the combined heat and power plant (CHP) located at the weigh bridge entrance to the Shandon site. Dungarvan Energy Ltd. is the company formed to develop the project. Continued on Page 37

Manager Denies Planners Are Too Tough On Applications

Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly has rejected claims by some members of the Council that planners are being too hard on people seeking planning permission for residential houses throughout the county.

While stating that he understands the disappointment of those for whom permission was refused, Mr. Connolly said that in general the level of refusals in the county is quite low by national standards, particularly having regard to the County's high scenic amenity.

In January the Council's planning department refused ten separate planning applications encompassing a total of ten residential houses, an extension and a conversion while further information was sought by planners in the case of 35 applications.

'Little Prospect' For Future Of Tallow Company

As reported in a recent edition of the 'Leader', serious concerns have been expressed about the future of Flair Plastics, a Dutch company located in Tallow.

The company currently employs 12 people in the Brideside town from a previous high of 60 workers in the manufacture of a range of plastic garden furniture.

In the Dail earlier this month, Waterford Fine Gael TD, Austin Deasy, asked the Tanaiste Mary Harney if her attention has been drawn to this serious reduction in employment. He also asked if she will request the IDA to intervene to secure the present level of employment at the plant.

The Tanaiste and Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment, Mary Harney, said she was originally advised of a crisis at the company in October 1998.

By that time, the company had been experiencing difficulties since June 1995 when the parent company went into receivership. Another Dutch investment group, Badine BV, then acquired Flair Plastics. The owner of Badine BV died in October 1998 which in turn led to a series of financial complications for the company. This resulted in a critical cash flow position which ultimately led to a series of takeover attempts to maintain employment.

Minister Harney confirmed that Flair Plastics is now in the course of winding down its operations following the failure late last year of a potential rescue through a takeover by a Canadian company

She revealed that an attempt in January by the IDA to negotiate an extended life for the Tallow operation was unsuccessful, when the company failed to respond to an IDA initiative to resolve its financial difficulties.

"There is little prospect of successfully continuing operations and the IDA is now seeking full recovery of its grants from the company", she stated.

"The IDA will continue to work with the existing owners in an attempt to maintain employment for as long as possible".





GREENHOUSE **EFFECT**

Burning fossil fuels such as oil, coal and natural gas, releases carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Carbon dioxide is called a greenhouse gas, because it collects high in the atmosphere and traps some of the Sun's energy underneath it, like a greenhouse.

This 'greenhouse effect' is natural, and controls the Earth's temperature. But too much carbon dioxide in the atmosphere could lead to the Earth warming up too much.

This could cause the polar ice caps to melt. Sea levels would then rise, flooding many cities.

We need to use less electricity and to share public transport to reduce the discharge of polluting

up through large factory chimneys, like that pictured below. Some of these gases can mix with water in the air and produce 'acid rain,' which can damage trees and other plants. Large enough amounts of gases can change the atmosphere forever.



SUN FACTS

- The Sun gives out huge amounts of radiation including ultraviolet, visible light and infrared.
- The radiation from the Sun travels across 150 million kilometres of space, and warms the surface of the Earth.
- The Earth gives out infrared because it is warm. This is how it loses heat, and retains a proper temperature balance.
- Extra amounts of greenhouse gases such as carbon dioxide prevent some infrared from leaving the planet, making

And, how can it be justified to identify sites in Dungarvan, Grange, Old Parish and Ring Parishes that are either clear an present water tables and water supply sources or are earmarked for such a purpose in the near future?"

Road Safety Concerns At Youghal **Bridge**

Road safety in the vicinity of Youghal Bridge was highlighted yet again at last week's meeting of Waterford County Council when Cllr. James Tobin pointed to a recent serious traffic accident which occurred at the bridge in which a number of people were badly injured and two cars written off.

Cllr. Tobin asked that a 20 mph speed limit be installed at the dangerous bend until new signs are erected.

Cllr. Willie McDonnell requested that traffic lights be erected at the bridge. He claimed that crashes occur at this location 'every week'.

Supporting their views was Chairman Cllr. Paddy Kenneally who agreed that it was 'about time something was done'.

Construction work on the multi-million pound sewerage treatment plant for Dungarvan harbour is expected to commence before the end of this

The £10.8 million project will be located on a 2.8 hectare site of the former Pfizer plant in Ballinacourty near the local lighthouse. Once up and running, the plant will be able to service all areas surrounding Dungarvan harbour.

The project will be complet- ronment by the end of May. ed in two separate contracts one for the construction of the treatment plant itself and a second contract for the construction of pipelines and pumping stations, etc.

According to Waterford Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea, it is anticipated that the contract documents for the pumping station contract should be ready in April or May and be submitted to the Department of the Envi-

The plant is being procured by way of a design, build and operate contract and the relevant documents are expected to be completed in May or June and submitted to the Dept. for approval by the end of June.

Following the Dept.'s approval to the documents in each case the tender process can then proceed and it is hoped to have both contracts commenced before the end of 2000.



Add the meat back in and simmer gently for approximately 1 hour. Stir in the yogurt, cream and apple and continue cooking for a further 20 minutes.

Meanwhile, prepare the topping. Melt the butter in a frying pan and saute the garlic for a few minutes. Stir in the breadcrumbs and continue cooking until the breadcrumbs become crisp. Add the chopped parsloy to the pan.

When the meat is cooked remove the lid and sprinkle on the topping. Preheat the grill to high and put the casserole under it until nicely browned.

Pineapple Gingerbread

Preparation time: 15 minutes.

Cooking time: 1 hour

Makes: 20 squares.

Ingredients:

100g/4oz plain flour 150g/5oz self-raising flour 1 tbsp ground ginger 2 tsp ground cinnamon 250g/9 oz soft margarine 175g/6oz muscovado sugar 75g/3oz black treacle 50g/2oz golden syrup 5 eggs, size 3, lightly beaten 50g/2oz chopped stem ginger 1 (432g/15oz) can pineapple chunks, drained well and chopped 7 tbsp pineapple jam.

METHOD:

Preheat oven 180C/350F/Gas Mark Grease and line the base of an 18 x 28cm/7 x 11in baking tray, at least 2.5cm/1in deep.

Sift both the flours with the ground ginger and cinnamon into a large bowl and set aside. In a separate bowl put the margarine, muscovado sugar, black treacle and golden syrup. Using an electric whisk, beat until smooth and creamy.

Gradually beat the eggs into the margarine mixture, a little at a time, until thoroughly blended (adding a bit of flour if the mixture starts to curdle). Fold in the flour mixture.

Fold the stem ginger and the pineapple chunks into the cake mixture and spoon into the prepared baking tin. Gently level the surface and bake in the preheated oven for 1 hour until a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean.


Cool cake in tin for 10 minutes, then turn out on to a wire rack and leave until cold.

Crime Rise In Waterford A Cause For Concern

-KENNEALLY

Waterford Fianna Fail T.D. Brendan Kenneally has promised to continue lobbying his Government colleague, Minister for Justice, Equality and Law Reform, John O'-Donoghue T.D. in a bid to secure an increase in the number of Gardai deployed at stations in the city and county.

Deputy Kenneally has learned that there was a 10% rise in reports of serious crime in the Waterford-Kilkenny Garda Division during 1999 a figure he feels is at least partly linked to under staffing in the area's Garda stations.

"While I am pleased to see that the current Government's anti-crime drive is working nationally, I'm afraid that Waterford may not have benefited as much as other areas. Indeed, the fact that this significant increase in crime comes at a time when antisocial behaviour is becoming less of a problem nationally is particularly disturbing and I discussed this matter in a meeting with the Minister"

The Fianna Fail T.D, was also keen to stress that he is in no way criticising the fine efforts of those Gardai serving in Waterford. "I know that Gardai in my constituency are working flat out to deal with ture.'

all types of crime and indeed I understood that there are a considerable number of suspects due before the courts in connection with alleged drugdealing in the weeks ahead."

"However, I am aware from my constituents that there are considerable areas of the city and the urban areas of the county where gangs are apparently creating havoc for residents with many elderly people particularly fearful that any intervention on their part may prompt retaliation from these young thugs. I am also often struck while in Dublin for Dail sittings by the more visible Garda presence that's evident in the capital," continued Deputy Kenneally.

The Waterford T. D. has been in regular contact with the Minister for Justice on the question of Garda manpower in his constituency but says it's now a matter of considerable urgency. "I made my views on this very clear to Minister O'-Donoghue and while I accept that deployment of Garda personnel is strictly a matter for the Commissioner, Mr. Pat Byrne and his colleagues to decide on, I'm reasonably confident that my efforts will bear fruit in the relatively near fu-

Beat The Gloom With A Bloom

You think we are still in the depths of winter but the days are getting longer and the soil warmer -February is a surprisingly sunny month.

So start thinking about this year's bloomers.

Lily of the valley may not be the first bloom you think of but now is the right time to plant the crowns of this much under-valued specimen.

It loves to carpet those awkward damp and shady locations which other plants hate and you will later be rewarded with tiny and fragile flowers which somehow give off one of the strongest and finest scents in the gar-

It is also worth cutting a few of the blooms on occasions, popping them into a small vase indoors. They won't last long but quickly freshen up a room.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

It's Not Too Early To Get Things Done

Been lazy? Feeling guilty about all that digging you should have done? Well, it's not too late and even if February can be bitterly cold, it's at least dry and sunny enough to get out there and do some catching up.

Admittedly, the ground will be hard and difficult to break up but just do your best and leave the hard February frosts and bitter winds to do the rest - they'll soon crack and

As it does break up, work in some well-rotted manure, compost or other organic fertilis-

While the fork and spade are in hand, dig peas. Fill these with manure or composts and then mould over and allow to settle ready for planting later on.

The lawn is still dormant but the worms may not be, so brush away any casts which might encourage moss and weeds to gain a foothold before the lawn starts to grow.

But be careful when walking on the grass. If it is frosty or wet then the blades will be badly damaged by your tread.

By the end of February the lawn will benefit from a top dressing: 2 part fine loam, 1 part sharp sand, 1 part fine peat.

Brush or spring rake it lightly onto the surface of the lawn when conditions are dry and bright.

It's a good month for brassica growth but the slugs also enjoy it, so deny them shelter by quickly clearing leaves and other debris which may collect in the vegetable patch.

Then try to eradicate them the 'green' way, without resorting to expensive pesticides. All you need is a few flower pot trays or saucers filled with sweetened milk or beer - the slugs will either drown themselves or hang around the bait, allowing you to dispose of them.

Start your early crops of onions and potatoes now. Buy potato seed tubers and stand in wooden trays with the eyes facing upwards before placing in a cool, light and ventilated place to sprout ready for planting in March.

Sow onion seeds under glass so that they can be ready for May and use this job as a reminder to overhaul the greenhouse, repairing any leaks, broken glass or fittings such as automatic watering or ventilation - you'll need it for starting more

And remember that the greenhouse does need ventilation on sunny days or mould, fungi and other infection will soon invade and cause problems when you start sowing and planting.

If you have any fruit trees you must complete pruning this month. Help them prepare for a good crop by feeding with dried seaweed or other fertiliser rich in potassium.

Generally, just use the sunny days to check around the fences, garden furniture and garden buildings and put right any winter damage - it won't be long before the garden comes alive again and then those jobs will be forgotten in the race to keep pace with plant sowing and care.



BALLYMACARBRY ARMY SERGEANT SURVIVES LEBANON HORROR

of Ballymacarbry, Clonmel who is on peace keeping duties in Lebanon from Kickham Barracks, Clonmel, had a miraculous escape from death in a horrific tragedy that claimed the lives of four of his comrades on Monday 14th, February on a coastal highway outside Beirut. There was relief in Clonmel, and South Tipperary when it became known that none of the thirty seven soldiers from Kickham Barracks serving with the 86th Infantry Battalion on duty in Lebanon had been killed in the accident, it was the worst incident involving Irish troops in their twenty one years in Lebanon. Minister for Defence Michael Smith has assured the families of the five injured soldiers that they are receiving the best possible medical attention. The injured soldiers were travelling in a fourth vehicle of a six car convoy bringing soldiers to the tober '99 when a UNIFIL

Thailand. The personnel carrier in which they were travelling crashed after it skidded on an oil slick and went out of control before turning over several times. Sgt. Whyte who has had several tours of duty overseas has been in the army for nineteen years, he is the youngest son of the late company Stg. Mick Whyte, is married and has a family of three, two boys and a girl. His wife Patricia hails from Lismore and they reside at Upper Ballymacarbry. Sgt. Whyte had returned from leave last Friday after spending two weeks at home. He was on escort duty in a convoy travelling from the Irish base in Tibnin to Beirut with soldiers who were to fly to Cyprus and Thailand for a holiday. All of the soldiers were part of the 650 strong 86th Irish Battalion 9.30a.m. with a Eucharistic which has been in Lebanon on Mass at 7.30p.m., the Mission United Nations duty since Oc-





Could you give me some information about the centenarian's bounty?

Answei

The centenarian's bounty is a special once-off payment to people who reach 100 years of age. The first President of Ireland Douglas Hyde introduced the centenarian's bounty in 1940. The payment continues to be administered through the Office of the President.

Those who reach 100 years during the year 2000 will receive a special centenarian's bounty of £2,000. This is a once-off payment for the Millennium. In subsequent years the centenarian's bounty will revert back to its normal value of £500 (was £300 but from 1st January 2001 will be £500).

In a further gesture to senior citizens in the Millennium year and thereafter, the President will also, from 1st January, mark the birthdays of those who reach over 100. They will, on his or her 101st and subsequent birthdays, receive a special commemorative coin in a presentation box. A new coin will be designed for each year.


The centenarian's bounty is paid when details regarding age are sent to the President's Office from the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs. A relative may also apply on behalf of a senior citizen, but they must provide supporting details such as birth or baptismal certificate.

Mrs. Dolores Ui Cheallaigh, press officer at Helvick Lifeboat station has returned home from completing the first training course for volunteer press officers, which was held at RNLI headquarters in Poole, Dorset, last week.

Ten press officers from throughout the UK and Republic of Ireland, where the RNLI operates 223 lifeboat stations, took part in the two-day course, which includes lectures and practical training in media skills. The volunteers' role is to provide their local media with immediate information as soon as their lifeboat launches, to act as the first point of contact and to maintain good relationships with the newspaper, radio and television journalists in their area.

Georgette Purches, Deputy Head of Public Relations says, "The RNLI relies on volunteers to crew its 306 lifeboats and help raise the £88 million necessary to operate the lifeboat service in 2000. The more aware the public is of the work of the lifeboats, the more likely it is that people will support the RNLI both financially and with practical help. The course aims to provide the press officers with the relevant knowledge and media skills that they will require to carry out this vital role".

The RNLI relies on volunteers to act as shore helpers, to fundraise and work in specialist roles, such as press officers and medical advisers, as well as manning the lifeboats themselves.

Business Is Booming For Waterford's Young Entrepreneurs

The 1999/2000 Young Entrepreneurs Scheme (YES) is currently underway in 19 Waterford schools, city and county-wide. Waterford is one of the most successful counties nation-wide when it comes to school participation in Youth Enterprise. This year over 600 students from 1st - 5th year have taken up the challenge posed by the Schools Enterprise Programme. In this, they have set up over 150 businesses' have learned new skills and generally enjoyed the challenge of being businessmen and women for a short while.

All students have been busily working on their various enterprises and business reports since last November. The ideas include everything from candle making to mirror decorating to wood products to delicious, tasty and tempting food products. Each participant has worked hard and can be pleased with their efforts in the programme.

Two groups of students recently took part in the "Start Your Own Business Exhibition", which was held in the Tower Hotel, Waterford. They included "Madhatters" from St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan and "City Pulse" from De La Salle, Waterford.

All business reports have now been completed and are in the hands of the different judges prior to the competitions. The students are now busily preparing for the two semi-finals as follows: Western semi-final: Thursday March 2nd, The Park Hotel, Dungarvan (this involves all schools from the county). Eastern semi-final: Friday

The 1999/2000 Young Entrepreneurs Scheme March 3rd, Jury's Hotel, Waterford, (this involves YES) is currently underway in 19 Waterford all schools from the city and Tramore).

At each semi-final, students have to mount a display and be interviewed by the judges, who will already be familiar with their reports.

8 teams will qualify from each semi-final and advance to the County Final, which will be held in Jury's Hotel Waterford, on Sunday March 12th. From this, 7 teams will go forward to represent Waterford in the Regional Finals, which will be held in Enniscorthy, Co. Wexford in April. The teams to represent Waterford in Wexford will include 5 senior teams (transition year - sixth year), 1 intermediate (2nd & 3rd years) and 1 junior team (1st year only). All competitions will be open to the public from noon on each day, so come along and show some support for our intrepid young entrepreneurs.

The programme was initiated and funded by the Schools Enterprise Group Waterford Area Partnership, Waterford Leader Partnership, Waterford City & County Enterprise Boards and Waterford Chamber of Commerce.



The overall winner was Tom Keevers, Coolbagh, Clashmore. The prize winners were chosen from over 350 farmers who had their 1990

silage analysed through Teagasc or Glanbia

The factors which the judges took into consideration when selecting the winner were the analysis, results, the physical appearance of the silage, management of the pit face and pollution control.

CATTLE

Weanlings: With over 300,000 young cattle exported live last year there will be fewer weanlings and yearlings available. There is an improving trade for quality weanlings heifers for export to Europe. These should be kept thriving at about 0.7 kg per day if intended for sale (good silage ad lib plus 2 kg meal per day).

Strong yearlings going to grass on the same farm need no meal from now on if good silage is available to appetite. Lighter yearlings of 300 kg or less should continue to get 1-2 kg meal per day. If silage is of low quality, meal supplementation is recommended for all types of weanlings/yearlings.

Breeding/Bull Selection

The live export trade clearly signals that there is a reward for well-muscled animals that will give a high meat yield. (The signals coming from the meat trade are more mixed).

Suckler producers should aim for the best priced beef market. The basis for such production is continuous selection of breeding stock for the desirable traits of growth rate, muscling, leanness and fee efficiency.

Progress is being made on identifying the better bulls at sales through the BLUP rating system and through linear scoring of young pedigree bulls in the main continental beef

If you intend buying a bull this spring look for this information before you buy.

Meal For Cows

There is a huge increase in the cows energy demand after calving compared with before calving. The cows digestive system finds it hard to switch from a silage diet to one dominated by meal.

It is best to feed 1-2 lbs meal for 2-3 weeks before calving. This allows you to increase to full meal within a few days of

Otherwise it will be necessary to do so gradually over 14 days post calving so as to avoid ketosis.

Include a little straw pre calving to increase the activity and

We are aiming for a condition score at calving of 3.25 to 3.5 Nothing much you can do now about this if cows are within 4-5 weeks of calving except make sure they have good silage as easy access to the feeding face.

Thin cows that are calving from mid March onwards should get 2-3 lbs meal (barley) with good silage.

After calving feed 7 kgs dairy ration with 70% DMD silage for a herd yielding 1300 gallons.

For every 5% change DMD increase or decrease the meal by 1 kg of meal.

Increase the meal feeding by 2-3 kgs for cows yielding 1400-

For every 6 kgs of grass intake by the cow reduce the meal feeding by 3 kgs.

Continue to feed 3-4 oz of pre-calving mineral.

Pre-calving minerals are much more important where cows get reduced meals post calving due to being fed large quan-

So don't stop pre-calving minerals near the end of the calving season, otherwise, deficiencies of selenium and iodine well result.

MILK QUOTA PURCHASES TO COST NO MORE THAN TEMPORARY LEASING

IFA National Dairy Committee Chairman Pádraig Walshe has said that, lower priced Restructuring, the favourable tax treatment of quota purchases obtained by IFA, and the favourable finance packages currently being negotiated by IFA with financial institutions, would make milk quota purchases affordable for small producers. He predicted that they would be able to buy milk quota for a price below the current temporary leasing price of 25p/gallon/year after 1st April, with the advantage of owning the quota in the end.

"I am confident that the price of milk quota in the Restructuring scheme will be lower than it has been this year, possibly in the region of £1.30 or £1.40/ gallon. A producer purchasing this quota or buying out an existing lease with an attractive finance package over 7 years, to match his cash flow with the likely 7-year tax write off at the standard rate of 22%, will pay less than 25p/gallon/annum, and will own the quota at the end of the period," Pádraig Walshe said.

"It is vital for producers' via-

bility to build up their quota. The new regime after 1st April will present small producers with an unprecedented opportunity to do so at a very affordable cost. Also, farmers must not lose sight of the fact that Agenda 2000 price cut compensation payments post 2005 will be based on an active pro-

ducers' milk quotas, " he said.

"Small producers who have used the Temporary Leasing scheme will be able to afford to purchase this quota. They will also benefit greatly from the certainty of owning the quota, compared with their dependency on a variable scheme through which they often are allocated quota long after peak production period," he added.

"We in IFA have demanded that those producers should have first priority to purchase from Restructuring the portion of the quota they used to lease in the Temporary Leasing scheme which will have been sold into Restructuring. Of course, they would retain their priority status within the Temporary Leasing scheme for the balance of their entitlement," he added.

IFA CALLS ON MINISTER WALSH TO REVERSE CHANGE ON CATTLE GRADING STANDARDS

IFA National Livestock Committee Chairman Derek Deane on Monday called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to intervene and reverse the apparent tightening of grading standards by beef classification officers in the meat factories.

Mr. Deane said farmers are reporting that the classification officers have tightened standards and it is much more difficult to achieve the higher grades since the IFA beef factory blockage which resulted in graded prices.

The newly elected IFA Livestock leader said farmers who fall victim to the lower grades by the Department could loose out financially to a very serious degree. "Five cattle downgraded from a U grade to an R grade will cost the farmer £150 to £200 depending on the fat class involved".

Mr. Deane said this latest difficulty on beef classification comes on top of an ongoing problem where the Department of Agriculture were incorrectly downgrading heifers as cows, inflicting heavy losses on individual cattle farmers. He said IFA was told that the Minister was undertaking an investigation to get to the bottom of this problem but to date there has been no response from the Department of Agriculture.

The IFA Livestock leader said it is up to Minister Walsh to insist that a fair and equitable classification scheme operates at factory level. He said "This was never more important than in the current climate. The Department of Agriculture can play a positive role in this area by ensuring that they operate an even and fair hand in their classification results".

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Management Of Milk Quota Regime

The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Mr. Joe Walsh TD, today referred to the changes, which he proposes to make in the management

of the milk quota regime in Ireland.

The Minister stated that the amendments introduced as part of the Agenda 2000 had made it possible to make adjustments to the operation of the quota system which would be of major benefit to the development of the Irish dairy sector.

Minister Walsh said that his fundamental objective in introducing the new arrangements is to put milk quota in the hands of active milk producers, particularly small and medium scale producers who have shown their commitment to the industry and who will be an essential part of its future development.

The new regime will provide for balance between the requirements of the different categories of producers and will, in particular provide for:

(i) More flexibility and certainty for milk producers;

(ii) Greater access to additional permanent quota for small and medium category producers at a reasonable cost;

(iii) The retention of as many dairying enterprises as possible;

(iv) The retention of milk quotas in less favoured areas and

(v) Greater competitiveness within the Irish dairy sector.
Wide ranging consultations

had taken place both within the Milk Quota Review Group and bilaterally with

Group and bilaterally with interested parties and organisations prior to the announcement of these changes. He believed that the general reaction to the


changes proposed had been very positive. A further meeting of the Milk Quota Review Group is planned for later this month to consider practical details of implementing the new system such as the new Restructuring Scheme.

The Minister said he was very pleased that following his discussions with the Minister for Finance a decision had been taken to allow favourable tax treatment on The new arrabe a vital electron and to enable meet the chapter of the properties of

the purchase of milk quota. This was a very welcome development which should ensure that the new arrangements will operate all the more effectively.

Minister Walsh stated that detailed discussions had taken place between his Department and the Office of the Attorney General and also with the Legal Services of the EU Commission prior to his announcement of the broad details of the proposed changes. The drafting of national legislation is now under way and in that context any legal matters in relation to the detailed implementing measures are being dealt with in a similar manner.

In conclusion, Minister Walsh said that the proposed new quota management system which would be in place from 1 April, 2000 would be a major benefit to the future of the milk sector in Ireland. The new arrangements would be a vital element in helping to underpin competitiveness and to enable the industry to meet the challenges in the years ahead.

THE BURGERY AMBUSH

Last week we discussed the black and tans and their efforts along with the normal military auxiliaries to defeat the republican forces who were fighting for Irish freedom. One episode in that war between Irishmen and Englishmen was the ambush at the Burgery, Abbeyside, Dungarvan. The area is situated on the main road to Waterford about a mile to the north - east of the town of Dungarvan. It is a pretty suburb, well sheltered with trees and along the road there are good fences topped with hawthorn and privet on either side.

THE ARREST

On the evening before the ambush a force of military left the Castle in a motor car and a lorry. There were about twelve soldiers in the lorry and the car contained Captain Thomas (in command), Lieut Griffiths, Sergeant Hickey of the R.I.C. and two soldiers. their destination was Clonea on the Ballyvoile Road the object being to make the arrest of a man named Murphy who lived there. The military succeeded in finding the "wanted" man at home and in making the arrest. The reason Sergeant

Hickey accompanied the party was that he knew the location of Murphy's house. Having secured Murphy the military set out for home, but they made a detour to come back to Cloncoskraine, where some military were stationed and with whom they wanted to have an exchange of views. Having remained for a short time at Cloncoskraine (Cushcam) they proceeded homewards, it being then about eleven o'clock at night. The motor car went first followed at a little distance by the lorry containing the soldiers guarding the prisoner.



The house in the picture is the dwelling house of Maurice Fennell and family. It was a licensed bar at the time of the ambush. The home of the Fives family across the road from the house in the picture was once a staging post where the stagecoach was given a fresh team of horses. Owned by Benjamin Green, Michael

Fives grandfather, it was a two storey house in the early days and it was in this house that the passengers of the stagecoach had a drink while the horses were being changed. However, when Mary Catherine Green (Michael Fives mother) moved across the road to the house in the picture on the occasion of her marriage to

Pat Fives of Tourin she brought the bar licence with her. The licence was later transferred to town to Green's Pub in the Square, Dungarvan, next door to Tommy Powers. A wall was built in front of the house in the picture in the year

It was the first competitive win over Mt. Sion in any grade of hurling - but not enough, for they scraped into the second round by two points on the aggregate of scores.



Tom Cunningham said that he would offer an opportunity to all County Councillors to be properly briefed on the background to the Section 30 motion, and that if other Councillors also wanted to hear the full history of the planning application, he would organise this.

Well, if your memory of how you celebrated in your town or village, or of the major event which was held in Dungarvan's Grattan Square in the afternoon or evening of Millennium Eve is already growing dim, you can refresh all your recollections through the pages of a new book being launched this Friday night.

Entitled 'Déise 2000, The Millennium in Pictures', it captures for all time the images of that historic - if somewhat exaggerated - special New Year's Eve and travels, through its pages, from Tramore and the dedication of their special Jubilee Cross, through Dungarvan with its hectic street party to Lismore and Ballyduff where the people gathered in Church and Community Hall to wish each other well in the New Millennium. Areas in between have not been missed either with Rathgormack, Portlaw, Ardmore, Abbeyside, Cappoquin, Modeligo, Aglish and Villierstown all having some pictorial record included.

The majority of the material is from the Dungarvan events, with pictures from the special joint meeting of the four Councils in the Civic Offices, the unveiling of the Commemorative Plaque, the Ceremony of Last Light, the Parish Celebrations in St. Mary's, the build-up to the countdown in Grattan Square, the fireworks and the New Year's Day International Peace Day ceremonies at the Civic Offices. 





The piece this week relates to the 1936 Western senior final. In that time the Western champions meet the Eastern champions in the County final. It appears as a match report in the press on Saturday the 4th of July 1936. As it is a very long report, there will be the first half and the second half. Have you heard that phase before? It's unbelievable.

"Stradbally 1-9 Dungarvan 1-4. Stradbally's Sensational Victory. Stradbally made history by its wonderful achievement in the Gaelic field, Dungarvan, last Sunday. All current football form was upset and the critics were left open mouthed with astonishment at the decisive manner in which Stradbally wreaked the senior championship ambitions of the Old Boro' footballers. Though it was widely known that Stradbally football was on the up grade this year and that splendid raw material was available in plenty, yet few, if any, seriously considered them as holding a winning chance against Dungarvan's redoubtable fif-

"Tradition dies hard and tradition, in this case, was all on the side of the townsmen who had, more especially of late years, made practically a habit of squashing Stradbally hopes in senior football competition. But grit and perseverance can overcome the greatest obstacle as the villagers triumphantly proved in Sunday's

"The play provided a remarkable contrast of styles. 

PIPE LEADS THE WAY AT FESTIVAL

Martin Pipe, who last month became the most successful British trainer in history, is also rapidly working his way up the table of all-time leading trainers at Cheltenham's National Hunt Festival.

Since saddling Baron Blakeney to win the 1981 Triumph Hurdle, Pipe has trained a further 23 Festival winners. Only four trainers have sent out more winners at the meeting -Fulke Walwyn (44), Fred Winter (28), Fred Rimell (27) and Tom Dreaper (26).

Little Buck ran in this country for Wexford permit holder Stephen Cullen but having been sold at the sales some years ago he is now trained by Laurie Wells. Little Buck was an above average handicapper when trained in Ireland winning his fair share of races with Charlie Swan in the plate. Stephen Cullen the trainer is also the racing manager at Enniscorthy Greyhound track and he is also a keen amateur jockey.







CHAMPIONSHIP **FORMAT**

If the county team are doing well it will increase interest in and support for the club championships.

If there is over emphasis on the county scene, the clubs, who are the mainstay of the whole association, will be pushed into the background.

The matter of players on county panels and who will not get a place on the team for championship are missing out in that they are not allowed play with their clubs in secondary competition such as leagues, etc.

Oifigeach Gaeilghe, Seamus O hAongusa said it was a shame and a disgrace that the county did not field their best intermediate hurling team in the Munster championships and that this type of situation should not be tolerated. He said he was referring to several top senior players who were eligible to play intermediate, but who were held on to as members of the senior panel. Jim got very hot on the subject and his contribution was applauded.

Jimmy O'Gorman made the point that clubs who were supplying players to the county teams, had nursed those players along for years and were it not for the work being done at club level, there would be no supply lines for county teams.

The debate on this aspect of the matter under discussion was aimed at "club protection" and was in no way intended as an anti-county team affair.

The county chairman said it was an open and frank debate and some very worthwhile and interesting points were made.

Four different systems were proposed for the senior hurling championship and on a vote the system proposed by the chairman was adopted. It received 27 votes as against 16 votes for the Ballyduff proposal which was moved by John Jackson. Two other motions were given little support.




