UDC Discuss Dungarvan's Future In Private

HILE MONTHLY MEETING

What was scheduled to be the April monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban District Council turned into a non event last Monday night.

The meeting was cancelled at short notice, when it became obvious that the sheer volume of information being presented by a series of consultants to officials and members was such that the meeting would extend long after the 7.30 p.m. deadline.

Rather than dealing with the scheduled monthly agenda, members of the Council continued on with issues relating to the Draft Town Development Plan behind closed doors.

This meeting was originally convened at 6.20 p.m. when all but one of the nine elected members were present and finally finished up shortly after 10 p.m.

As the 7.30 p.m. monthly meeting deadline passed and with the media waiting outside, councillors decided to defer the April meeting business to tonight, Wednesday 19th April.

Reporters, who had already

given up time and made commitments to attend Monday's meeting, were the last to be informed of the situation.

Surely members and Council officials were aware that the complex issues involved in the Draft Development Plan would warrant a lengthy meeting which should have been held on a separate night.

Let's hope this obvious lack of planning on a very basic level will not auger badly for many demanding and controversial decisions that lie ahead of the Council as it prepares for the planned development of the town in the new millennium.

The 'Leader' has always enjoyed a good relationship with the Urban Council and prides itself on its balanced reporting and slowness to deliberately controversialise meetings. However Monday night's debacle showed a surprising lack of organisation and planning on the part of the Council. In hindsight it all becomes clearer...

One wonders if the press corps suddenly decided that they had more important issues to cover, where would this leave the Council and their monthly meetings?

National Development Plan for South Eastern **Health Board**

The South Eastern Health Board has been notified that it will receive a sum of £156.96 million from the National Development Plan (NDP) for the years 2001 to 2006. The Board is currently in discussions with the Department of Health and is anticipating an additional £20 million for the year 2000. This funding will go towards enhancing the capital and technology infrastructures of the South Eastern Health Board including voluntary organisations involved in providing services to people with disabilities.

This funding will seek the implementations of several hospital plans including the South Tipperary Hospital Plan, the Board's Cancer Strategy, Cardiovascular Strategy together with further developments at Waterford Regional Hospital, and childcare services.

In undertaking these developments emphasis will be placed to ensure every effort to integrate services as far as possible and thereby maximise the health gain outcomes for persons availing of services into the future.



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I heard that I may be entitled to an old age pension based on social welfare contributions that I made before 1953. Could you give me more information?

Answer

A new pension will be introduced for people who have insurance contributions of which some are from the period before 1953. Although it will come into effect from 5th May 2000, payment will not be made until October 2000. Payments will be backdated to May where relevant.

To qualify you must have at least 260 paid full-rate contributions, of which at least one must be from before January 1953 (women) or July 1953 (men). All or some of the contributions may be from before 1953, and these will be reckoned as three contributions for every two paid.

There will be a standard rate of payment of half the maximum rate of Old Age Contributory Pension, with half the rate of Qualified Adult and Child Dependent payments where appropriate. From May 2000 these rates are

Personal Rate £48.00

Qualified Adult (under 66 years) £30.10 Qualified Adult (over 66 years) £32.30

Child Dependent £6.60

If you are already getting either a contributory or non-contributory old age pension at a higher rate, you may remain on that pension. This pension will be of most benefit to those people who either failed to qualify for a contributory pension at all, or qualified for a pro-rata pension at a lower rate

If you are already getting a contributory pension at a reduced rate your case will be automatically reviewed by the Pension Services Office in Sligo, and you will receive whichever is

MONEYMATTERS

CREDIT: There are many types of credit available and most are easy to use. Credit cards, hire purchase and other types of credit can all be availed of by simply filling in a form.

When you sign a hire purchase agreement you enter into a contract. Most people do not inspect their hire purchase agreement closely enough when buying goods to ascertain their obligations and entitlements under the contract.

For instance, if you purchase a car under a hire purchase agreement, ownership of the car passes to the purchaser when the last payment has been made. People often only realise this when they want to change their car a couple of years later. Also if you fall behind in your repayments the hire purchase company may go for repossession of your car. Therefore, it is very important that you inspect your hire purchase agreement, whatever you are buying, before you sign the contract and check out the penalty clause.

It may be more in your interest to consider getting a personal loan for your purchases, but whatever type of credit you use always check it out beforehand and choose the one that suits you best. If you have any financial difficulties the Money Advice & Budgeting will be glad to help you solve them.

THE LIVING WORLD

THE ANIMAL KINGDOM

Animals make up the biggest kingdom of living things. They include familiar pets like hamsters and goldfish, farm animals such as cows and sheep, and common wild creatures like bugs, slugs, birds, bats and rats.

But the animal kingdom also includes very strange living things which look more like space-aliens than Earth creatures. Some live their entire lives in dark caves, inside rocks or tree trunks, or in the ooze of the sea bed.

Many animals can move around actively — but not all. Barnacles and mussels are stuck to seashore rocks.

Most animals have sense organs such as eyes or ears — but not all. A sponge cannot hear or see. The key feature of an animal are that its body is made of many microscopic cells; it eats or consumes other living things or their parts, to obtain energy; it grows or develops; it can move about at some stage in its life; and it reproduces to make more of its kind.

WHY ANIMALS DIFFER

Each kind of animal has a special body shape and features which help it to survive in its habitat. For example, a camel in the desert has thick fur to protect against hit sun, wide feet to

prevent sinking into sogt sand, and a huge stomach to drink vast amounts of water.


It long eyelashes keep windblown sand out of its eyes and it hump contains stored food in the form of body fat, which the camel can use when other food is scarce.

The camel also prod§uces very dry droppings and concentrated urine, to help conserve precious water.

ANIMAL EVOLUTION

- Very rare fossils show that the first animals were probably simple, blob-like jellyfish and worms, in the sea more than 700 million years ago.
- By 500 million years ago, animals with hard body cases, such as trilobites and limper-like shellfish, inhabitated seas and lakes.
- Around 400 million years ago, the first animals followed early plants on to dry land. These first landdwelling creatures were probably millipedes and small insects.
- By 350 million years ago, amphibians walked on dry land.
 Myriad fish, including sharks, swarmed in the seas.
- The first reptiles evolved by 300 million years ago.
- A great extinction 250 millions ago, killed off many kinds of amphibians and reptiles, and many types of sea creatures.
- Around 200 million years ago, reptiles called dinosaurs spread across the land. The first mammals. small and shrew-like, hid from them.
- Another great extinction 65 million years ago killed off dinosaurs and many other reptiles, as well as sea animals such as ammonites.





BASIC STEW RECIPE

(Serves 6)

Ingredients:

1.5 1bs/675g of beef shoulder, neck, chuck or shin I tin of chopped tomatoes

12 pt./300 ml water added to I tsp of mixed herbs (herbs optional)

2 tbsp plain flour

1 tbsp pure vegetable oil

1 large onion, chopped

1 clove of garlic, crushed (optional)

1 1/4 pints/750ml water

1 beefstock cube

2 large carrots, pared and sliced

1 parsnip, peeled and diced

1/4 Swede turnip, peeled and diced

A little salt and pepper

To serve: 8oz/225g rice or pasta, or 6 medium potatoes

METHOD:

- Set oven at 325°F/170°C, gas mark 3.
- 2. Cut the beef into cubes and dry on kitchen paper.
- 3. Heat the oil in a pan.
- 4. Dust the beef with flour and brown in the oil in batches, putting the browned beef into a casserole or heavy saucepan.
- 5. Add the onion to the pan, with a little oil if necessary, and cook until lightly browned - about 5 minutes -Stir in the garlic, if used.
- 6. Add the water and stock cube and a sprinkle of salt and pepper, bring to boiling point and pour over the meat.
- 7. Cover the saucepan or casserole and simmer for 1 hour on top of the stove, or in a casserole dish in the oven. Add the prepared vegetables and continue to cook until the meat is tender 1/2-3/4 hour
- 8. Taste for seasoning and serve with freshly cooked potatoes, rice or pasta.

14oz/400g lean, thinly sliced pork or beef

1 tbsp pure vegetable oil

6oz/175g white cabbage, thinly sliced

6oz 175g broccoli florets

1 clove garlic, finely chopped.

Sauce:

METHOD:

- 1. Combine sauce ingredients in a small bowl and leave to one side.

- 3. Heat oil in wok or large frying pan and stir fry meat for 7-8 minutes.
- 4. Add remaining vegetables and continue to stir fry, adding a little water if mixture is too dry,
- 5. When beans and other vegetables are cooked through, pour in prepared sauce and stir to coat evenly. Serve with boiled rice.



ance and zoning of land for housing.

The 'Leader' understands that a further committee briefing may well be considered prior to the Draft Development Plan becoming part of the Council's monthly agenda. This would be followed by the statutory public consultation process where the public will have an input into the development

The current development plan for the town runs out this year and the new plan will set out the development policies for Dungarvan up to the year 2005. Included in the new plan will be specific objectives for the achievement of these policies and a framework for public and private sector investment relating to land

The 'Leader' has learned that Frank Harewood of Harewood Associates, James Howley, a spokesperson from Reid Associates and another representative from an architectural firm all made separate presentations to the Council which could obviously not have been accommodated in the original timescale of 90 minutes.

Glanbia site was of massive significance to Council members as this site will influence the town well into the next number of decades. Indeed many people are referring to the Glanbia site as the most significant development since Grattan Square and the Devonshire Bridge.

From previous UDC meetings it is clear that the traffic situation in Dungarvan is chaotic and it is confidently expected that significant pedestrianisation and one-way proposals will be forthcoming in the coming weeks and months.

CONCERNS OF LOCAL BUSINESSES

The development of the Glanbia site also has implications for traffic and the historical shopping areas of the town.

The 'Leader' will be doing its best to keep readers and existing businesses up-to-date on these projects over the coming weeks. However it is clear that the first significant steps have been taken.

It is obvious that there are demanding times ahead for the Council and consultants as they deal with the complex and important issues relating to the Town Development Plan and the development of the Glanbia site.

Deasy Queries Proposals For Irish Sea Tunnel

Speaking in the Dail recently, Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy asked if any proposals have been put forward to the Minister for Public Enterprise regarding the provision of a tunnel linking Ireland and Britain.

Minister Mary O'Rourke revealed that in 1997 she received a letter from a UK based engineering company seeking financial support for a feasibility study into the proposed construction of an immersed tube tunnel between both countries.

The proposal was referred to a technical assistance committee to consider whether it had any merit. This committee concluded that an Irish Sea Tunnel was unlikely to generate adequate revenue to renumerate costs in the foreseeable future and that financial assistance should not be provided for the proposed feasibility study. This information was conveyed to the company concerned in June 1998.

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

True Taste Of The Orient

SEVERAL Oriental brassicas are usually cooked. are now being introduced to the

They have many features in common with Western brassicas but tend to be faster growing and have a wider range of uses. If given the right conditions they are highly productive. They are grown as annuals or biennials.

Oriental brassicas are cultivated mainly for the leaves and leafy stems but also for the sweetly flavoured flowering shoots.

The plants are best suited to climates with cool summers and mild winters although komatsuna and some of the mustards are extremely hardy.

In temperate climates Oriental brassicas grow best in late summer and autumn although they can also be grown under cover as a winter crop from Autumn to Spring.

PAK CHOI

This is succulent and mild in flavour and may be eaten cooked or raw. The vegetable is a biennial usually grown as an annual. There are many types, the most common being whiteribbed, or green-ribbed, available as F1 cultivars.

Pak Choi grows best at cool temperatures and will tolerate some frost in the open but are best grown under cover in the winter as cut-and-comeagain crops. Plant from seed in modules then in late summer transplant under cover for an autumn crop.

CHINESE BROCCOLI

These annuals, also known as Chinese kale, form stout plants with thick blue leaves. They grow up to 18 inches tall and the chunky flower stems

Chinese broccoli tolerates higher temperatures than other brassicas and also withstands light frosts. They are best sown from late spring to early summer for an autumn crop. They can also be planted in the autumn and grown under cover during the winter. Seeds should be sown in modules and the small plants grown about five inches apart. Large plants take nine to 10 weeks to mature.

MIZUNA GREENS

These can be eaten cooked or raw. They have dark green feathery leaves forming a rosette up to 18 inches in diameter and nine inches tall. They are highly decorative especially when grown as an edging or in blocks.

They are very adaptable - capable of tolerating both very high and very low temperatures down to minus ten. They may be sown throughout the growing season. Bolting resistance is good so seeds may be sown in trays or modules.

Mizuna greens mature eight to 10 weeks after sowing and may be harvested at all stages


KOMATSUNA

Also known as spinach mustard, komatsuna is a large, productive, and robust plant with glossy leaves that grow up to 12 inches long and seven inches wide.

The flavour of the leaves resembles cabbage mixed with spinach. They can be cooked or eaten raw in

The plants tolerate a wide range of temperatures and will survive minus 12 degrees. Komatsuna can be sown in the spring and grown as a

summer crop or planted in the autumn and grown under cover in the winter. Leaves maybe harvested at all stages and mature plants should be ready eight weeks after sowing

ORIENTAL MUSTARDS

The mustards are a varied group of annuals and biennials forming large, often coarseleaved plants. They are very robust and less prone to pests and diseases than most Oriental brassicas.





Oriental Mustard

Several survive at least minus 10 degrees. The leaves are used cooked but can also be eaten raw in salads when young or if sliced. They can be sown from midsummer to late autumn for harvesting from autumn to spring. Seeds can be sown in modules or in situ. The plants should be grown about six inches apart. Depending on the variety Oriental mustards can mature from six to 13 weeks after planting.

All businesses, he added, are legally responsible for the footpath outside their premises and are liable to be fined if they sweep the litter out onto the street.

Mr. Landers said that while many parts of Dungarvan are now rid of the majority of litter, problem spots still exist such as the coastal area at Quann's near the Cunnigar Pitch & Putt Club where builders have been indiscriminately dumping building material such as doors and shop replacement items.

Proposed Road Improvements In Ring/Old Parish

County Council proposes to spend £279,260 on improving the roads of the Ring and Old Parish Gaeltacht in 2000 has been warmly welcomed.

O Ceilleachair said he would continue, along with Comhairle Pobail na Rinne and Coiste Forbartha na tSean-Phobail, to ensure that this and increased levels of attention would be paid to the infrastructural needs of the Gaeltacht community.

Subject to approval from Council members Cllr. O Ceilleachair said a sum of £12,810 has been put aside to maintain the 6.2 kilometres of the N25 relevant to Ring and Old Parish. The main Cantwell's Cross-Heilbhic regional road has been allocated £7,965 to maintain the 8.7km involved there. At the Old Sweep £23,040 has been included in the recommend report for surface restoration. Local road surface dressings costed at £6,720 for 1.2km at Moin Breac and £5,600 for 1.0 km at Crossaire Ui Chathain/Lag na gCaithi Si in Ring are also recommended for this year. In Old Parish, a sum of £8,400 for 1.5km at Droichead Baile an tSIe, another £8,400 for 1.5km at Cruabhaile and £8,288 for 1.4km at the approach to Crossaire Lios Caoilte will also go on local road surface dressing. A further sum of £76,165, inclusive of £2,395 for street sweeping, has been put forward for local road maintenance for areas throughout Ring and Old Parish. Finally, another £120,308 is recommended for local road strengthening in



The Science of Farming and Food

DAIRYING: Meals At Grass:

Because the response of meal feeding during this period is poor then aim to feed very little meal when you have plenty of grass. The response: 1 Kg meal gives 0.45 to 0.69 Kgs of milk. You are spending 14p to get 10p to 14p worth of milk.

Keep the meal until later in the year when the response is twice as good and milk prices (due to constituents) are 10-15 pence better.

So the advice is to think "no meals". But when should meals be fed? If grass becomes scarce (should not happen with silage ground available). If weather is wet, resulting in reduced grass intake (easily identified by the amount of grass left behind). If herd RBI 2000 is greater than 110, then 2-4 Kgs of meal may be justified, depending on yield, but there is not many of those herds out

Which type of meal is best at grass: The following responses were got at Moorepark (Kgs of milk per Kg of meal). Barley (12p per Kg) 0.44 Kgs Milk (= 9.5p). Beet Pulp (11.5p/Kg) 0.68 Kgs Milk (= 14.6p). Brewers Grains (10p/Kg) 0.69 Kgs Milk (= 14.8p)

And in the terms of milk solids produced per kg, pulp was twice as good as barley and 11/3 times better than brewers. A clear message to feed beet pulp at grass (citrus is nearly as good).

How much protein in the ration ? (if pulp is not available). Hillsborough has shown that increasing the protein from 10% in the ration resulted in decreased cow intakes, no change in milk yield or protein percentage but a decrease in fat percentage.

Decreasing the cows intake would result in greater weight loss and no help to getting cows incalf.

Too much protein in the cows diet results in the cow using up extra energy (which could be used for more milk or weight gain) to break down this surplus protein which is passed out in the urine. Therefore, if feeding a ration, feed one with 15%-16% Crude Protein and a high proportion of pulp.

Include magnesium (2-3 oz per cow per day) plus lodine with other minerals.

TILLAGE

The fourth Teagasc Tillage Crops Report of 2000 was published on the 12th of April.

Headlines

Sowing of the major spring crops is completed.

Cold harsh weather has stalled crop growth and development but no serious damage is evident.

Pest and disease levels are low but yellow rust on w. Wheat and crown rust on oats are still a threat.

Spring Cereals

Sowing of spring cereals is completed. The most advanced crops are at the 3-4 leaf stage. January sown wheat is at mid-tillering. Growth is slow. Little problems are reported except for occasional leather jacket attacks.

Recommendations

 Monitor cereals for leather jacket damage. Spray with Dursban. Clinch, Pontoon, Grubber, Sipynfos, Atlas Stewart, Gammalin, etc., if more than 10 leatherjackets per 10x30cm drill length at 13cm spacing (ADAS threshold).

2. Apply N topdressing to spring barley at the 1-3 leaf stage where appropriate. Topdressing of spring wheat can be applied up to 95

3. Aphid numbers are similar to last year. Teagasc Oak Park aphid counts in the first week of April are 97/m2 in unsprayed winter barley plots.

Trial work by Dr. Tom Kennedy, Oak Park clearly indicates best results are achieved by application of aphicide at the 4-6 leaf stage of spring barley. Suitable contact synthetic pyrethroid aphicides include: - Cypersect, Decis, Sitrine, Sumi Alpha, Toppel, etc., at the 4-6 leaf stage. A single properly timed application is adequate for March sown crops.

4. Weed Control In Spring Cereals - Not Undersown

Timing: There are numerous herbicides available which can be applied from the 2-3 leaf stage to flag leaf. Contact your Teagasc Adviser for advice.

Physiotherapy

WHAT IS A PHYSIOTHERAPIST?

Physiotherapists are specialised members of the health care team. They use physical means such as exercise, massage, mobilisation, manipulation and electrical modalities to treat pain, injury and disability. The title physiotherapist is not yet protected, so it is recommended that referrals are only made to Chartered Physiotherapists who hold a university degree and are members of the Irish Society of Chartered Physiotherapists (M.I.S.C.P.) or the British Association - Chartered Society of Physiotherapists (M.C.S.P.)

HOW DO I FIND A CHARTERED PHYSIOTHERAPIST?

Chartered physiotherapists, like doctors, work to a rigid code of ethical conduct set by their professional association, and are only permitted limited advertising. You can be referred by your doctor/consultant to a physiotherapist in the public health service (hospital), or see a private physiotherapist. Access to a private physiotherapist is direct - you do not need a doctors referral. You can get immediate assessment, diagnosis and treatment for your problems or injuries.

WHAT DOES THE PHYSIOTHERAPIST DO?

The initial visit will consist of a comprehensive assessment with treatment and usually includes a home exercise programme to maintain your improvement and avoid causing the same damage again. It is advisable to seek treatment as soon as possible as this can lead to optimum recovery with reduced number of treatments needed. 





From The Archives

This extract is a continuation of the Senior Football County Final against Kill in 1972. Stradbally 3-4

"Stradbally full of enthusiasm were a goal and a point up within a minute of the game starting. Kill, hardly knowing what had hit them fought back brilliantly, and within minutes both sides were even. In this half the Villagers gave away many frees and if Kill had availed of all these chances, they could have been a few points ahead at the end of the half. John Power played well for Kill in the first half, while the main instruments for the Kill lead were Michael Lalor who scored the only goal for Kill, Bill

Harty and Monty Guiry. Going into the second half it was clear to see that Stradbally were on the road to victory. Many of Kill's short passes were intercepted by the Stradbally men which proved to be the reason for the Kill defeat. Pat Clancy was a tower of strength in the Stradbally defence and, in the second half, when switched from centre to full back, was one of the main instigators of the Reds victory. While J. Kiely, at right full back, made three vital saves and brought down Martin Kennedy in the last few minutes to save a certain goal, at the expense of a free, which McMahon sent wide. Kill seemed to have lost touch with the game in the second half and were unable to stop the onward march of Stradbally

towards victory.

Councillor Tom Cunningham's Section 30 motion to stop the pig factory at Rathnaskillogue was narrowly defeated at last Monday's County Council meeting. The vote was 13 to 9. For Tom there were two disappointing aspects to that vote, one being that Fine Gael decided to block vote against the proposal through their whip, and secondly that all of his colleagues in Fianna Fáil did not support him.

For those of us who support no political party, it was unacceptable that any votes were politically motivated. It was not about politics, it was and is about health. The voting on Monday can be seen as a clear indication to the people of Stradbally and Bunmahon that their voices do not count. The motion was not even supported by all the local County Councillors, Pat Leahy voted against it, which would lead anyone outside the area to assume that the majority of people are not opposed to this piggery.

The case must now be made to the E.P.A. by Community Groups and individuals, if our health is to be protected. Interestingly, the case against landfills west of the County, is being made by Councillors, on exactly the same health grounds, and in one particular Councillor's case he is quoting Cllr. Cunningham's speech word for word to support his argument and yet he did not support the motion on the day.

In Co. Cork there are so many pig farms that new Cork applications are including spread-lands in Kerry, Clare, Kilkenny and Waterford. Disposing of vast amounts of animal waste in this way is just an environmental disaster.

Under the current regulations farmers have enough difficulty disposing of their own animal waste, without adding huge excesses which end up in our water. This is not about attacking standard farming practises it is about animal factories expecting communities to accept their waste products. There is no other industry that I know of that can take so little responsibility for waste disposal, even private septic tank owners appear to have more restrictions placed on them.

Personally I support Development and Enterprise, but I cannot support any endeavour that causes damage to the environment and ultimately our health, through excessive nitrate contamination of our drinking water supplies. Our ground-water is a limited resource, if we ignore our responsibility to protect it, then we will reap the rewards of that neglect.

Burgery Ambush -More Reprisals

The Abbeyside Burnings

After the events of the Burgery Ambush the military rule in the district was enforced in a more vigorous manner. Martial Law was proclaimed throughout Abbeyside and the surrounding districts and the curfew was enforced vigorously. People were obliged to retire to their homes at an early hour and the streets were patrolled throughout the night by the military.

On the night of the 12th of April 1921, the tramp of armed men could be heard at intervals passing up and down the streets and this activity continued until the early hours of the morning. Close on midnight Verey lights of great brilliancy were set off from Dungarvan Castle towards Abbeyside. No one could venture out and it was not until morning that the people of Abbeyside could discover the reason for all the activity.

Gradually it was learned that many of the houses in Abbeyside had been fired and destroyed by the Black and Tans. 'The Strand Hotel' owned by Miss Minnie Fitzgerald was a mass of charred ruins. This premises is now 'Minnies Bar and Lounge' run by the O'Brien family. Miss Fitzgerald withstood the ordeal with commendable bravery. Also gutted by fire and completely destroyed was Mr. T. Fahey's fine business house in Sexton Street. He had shortly before that spent a lot of money on improvements to the premises. The houses alongside were also completely destroyed for the petrol can was used freely to ensure the maximum destruction possible.

Terror

Tales of horror abounded regarding the night in question. In the case of Mrs. Fahey - whose husband was in prison at the time - arrested on suspicion, she escaped with her infant child over a high back wall because she was in fear of death. It was a night of terrible suffering for the inhabitants of Abbeyside.





Report of Fire Safety — On Friday 31st March the local Fire Brigade Officer and the chief fire officer came to talk to the pupils about getting out of their homes, if a fire started there. We should have a fire alarm in our home, and even if the toast burnt the alarm should go off and there should be a meeting point outside our home. One person should be appointed to go and phone 999.

Every fire officer has a bleeper to call them when they are needed at the station. When your call gets through their bleepers go off and then they have five minutes to get to the station. They then have to get ready, and they have to wear steel toe capped boots and protective clothing. They have oxygen to wear going into a fire.

We were then taken out to see the fire engine. There we meet Mary McNamara, Mary is the only fire woman in Co. Waterford and we are very proud of her as she is from Lismore. It would be nice to see more girls join the Fire Brigade service. We were told about the engine and the fact that the hosing is one and a half miles long. It takes 30 minutes for a house to burn down. If the fire brigade is contacted immediately they will be at the scene within ten minutes. They would then have twenty to save as many in the house as they could. They have a big pump for water, to pump it up hill from a steam or river. This pump is so big it would take at least four men to carry it down and up a hill.

They also have cutting equipment as they are often called out to traffic accidents. This cutting equipment is used to cut doors off

cars and to release people from crashed cars.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the officers who came to our school and gave us such an interesting talk on the running of the fire brigade and for their inspection of our fire drill and evacuation procedure in the event of a fire on the premises.

Young Jockey With A Future

Waterford's main county town Dungarvan is synonymous with the world of Horse Racing for a long number of years. Included in the current crop of trainers in the vicinity are the Kiely brothers, John, Paddy and David, while John Queally, Michael O'Connor, John Flynn, Ron Curran of Ring are also names that spring to mind. If we move five miles further past Dungarvan we come to the picturesque area of Cappagh. Within a mile or so of another we also have licensed trainers Declan Queally and david McGrath. Lisroe Farmhouse housess the Queally clan where young trainer Declan Queally trains a number of jumpers from the National Hunt and Point to Point season. His winners under rules in the past couple of years include Quayside Buoy and Hill Diamond. In this competitive world of horse racing however it could well be Declan Queally's eldest son Tom who could certainly make a name for himself in the years to come. Tom is only fifteen years old, attends school at the Christian Brothers in Dungarvan but the last twelve months have seen his racing career take a major step forward. The pony racing season in this country is in full swing between the months of June and October and while Tom only joined the circuit half way during the season he amassed a healthy ten winners by the end of the year. Riding winners at meetings in Cork and Kerry the highlight of which was booting home a treble at Brosna races. Quite a few famous names from the equine world have come through the pony racing scene and have gone on to bigger and better things namely Charlie Swan, Jamie Spenser and Tommy Carmody and many more. As soon as the Pony racing season concluded it was on to the Cross County racing for young Tom. These events take place over all sorts of terrain and obstacles and range in distance from four and a half miles to seven miles. Needless to say Tom Queally adapted to these events like a duck to water and he recorded seven victories in a row. It came as no surprise to hear that Tom models himself on top National Hunt jockey Norman Williamson and Norman himself won two of these same cross country events back in 1982 and 1983.

While most of the jockeys riding today have difficulty in keeping their weight down this young man has no such problems as he weighs in at just under six stone which makes him the ideal height and weight for an apprentice flat jockey. Tom recently took out his apprenticeship with well known Rathgormack trainer Pat Flynn.

Tom whose younger brothers Jack, Declan jnr and Louis are all interested in the horsy game rides out work at 6.30 am every morning before going to college, has also benefitted from the close guidance of former ace amateur Nicky Dee who ruled the roost in the point to point fields a number of years back. Many of us recall Nicky as a fearless pilot and Tom Queally couldn't have a better mentor.

A dream come true though at Clonmel races last Thursday afternoon as young Tom having only his fourth ever ride on the racecourse proper partnered his first ever winner guiding 8/1 chance Larifaari for Tramore trainer John Roche to two lengths victory in the one mile two furlong Nenagh Handicap.

This was a great performance by this young man and I am sure many more winners will flow his way.







It was something of an anticlimax for the 6,000 who came to Fraher Field with high expectations of seeing a thriller and great expectations among the huge home crowd that history would be made following our win over Kerry in the replay at Killarney. History was made but it will record that Limerick and not Waterford were the first Munster county to break the stranglehold of the super powers on this particular championship.

The performance of the team and the result was a massive disappointment to Waterford and an historic occasion for celebrating for Limerick. The singing of "Limerick You're My Lady" by the big following from Limerick was their way of expressing their delight and jubilation in the immediate aftermath of the game. It did not matter to them that the game never came to life as a splendid contest (as we had expected). All that mattered to them was that on the night, they were the better team and won deservedly because they played the more purposeful football.

Waterford, on the other hand failed to produce the splendid form and football which saw them account for Kerry in the replay in Killarney one week earlier. Their short passing play and severe miss-placed passes as well as their hard luck of hitting the woodwork with near-misses on five occasions during the game, all told against them and combined in bringing about their defeat. All the 'hype' etc., after the replay in Killarney had the public believing that they were unbeatable and the players had very likely become effected by the high expectations of their supporters and then found themselves unable to deliver. That is one of a number of explanations being put forward for the under par performance on the night.

PLAY

Solid defences on both sides dominated the opening 13 minutes before Tommy Stack pointed for Limerick. Three minutes later, Gary Hurney equalised from a free and that was to be their halftime score while Limerick added 2 points to give them an 0-3 to 0-1 halftime lead.

David Kirwan had a splendid point from play after 3 minutes of the restart. We had to wait for 18 minutes before we had our next score and this came from a Michael Walsh point just nine minutes from time. At this stage it was double scores (0-6 to 0-3) in favour of the visitors. After this Jason Stokes for Limerick and Edmond Hogan for Waterford exchanged points to end the scoring for the evening. We kicked over 11 wides.

And so ended the big dream and the big chance and while the supporters were disappointed, the result was agony for the players.

It was a missed opportunity of playing against the reigning ran for D. Kirwan. champions, Westmeath who

won the Leinster final by also scoring just 7 points against neighbours, Meath on Sunday. That would be an All Ireland!

After the final, Munster Council chairman Sean Kelly presented each player on both sides with a special medallion to mark the occasion and the first provincial final of the new cen-


