## Proposal To Call Off Landfill Search Deferred To June

### MEMBERS DIVIDED ON EAST/WEST ISSUE

A call on Waterford County Council to cease its search for a landfill site in the west of the county sparked a heated debate in the Chambers of the local authority in Dungarvan earlier this week.

The public gallery was packed to capacity as elected members engaged in stormy tirades over the controversial landfill subject that has threatened to create a fateful east/west divide.

Prior to the meeting the

steps of the Civic Offices at Davitt's Quay were crowded with protesters objecting to the three candidate areas in West Waterford which were selected by the Council's consultants as potential landfill sites.

As Monday's meeting progressed, some of the protesters arrived to view the proceedings in anticipation of a notice of motion calling for the landfill search to cease in West Waterford.

## More Staff Needed To Cope With Planning Applications

More staff is needed to deal with the increasing numbers of planning applications in Waterford county. That's according to Cllr. Willie McDonnell who has requested that the County Council take on additional staff in the planning department.

He said numerous people are waiting for their planning to come through. The planning authority have 8 weeks in which to contact applicants

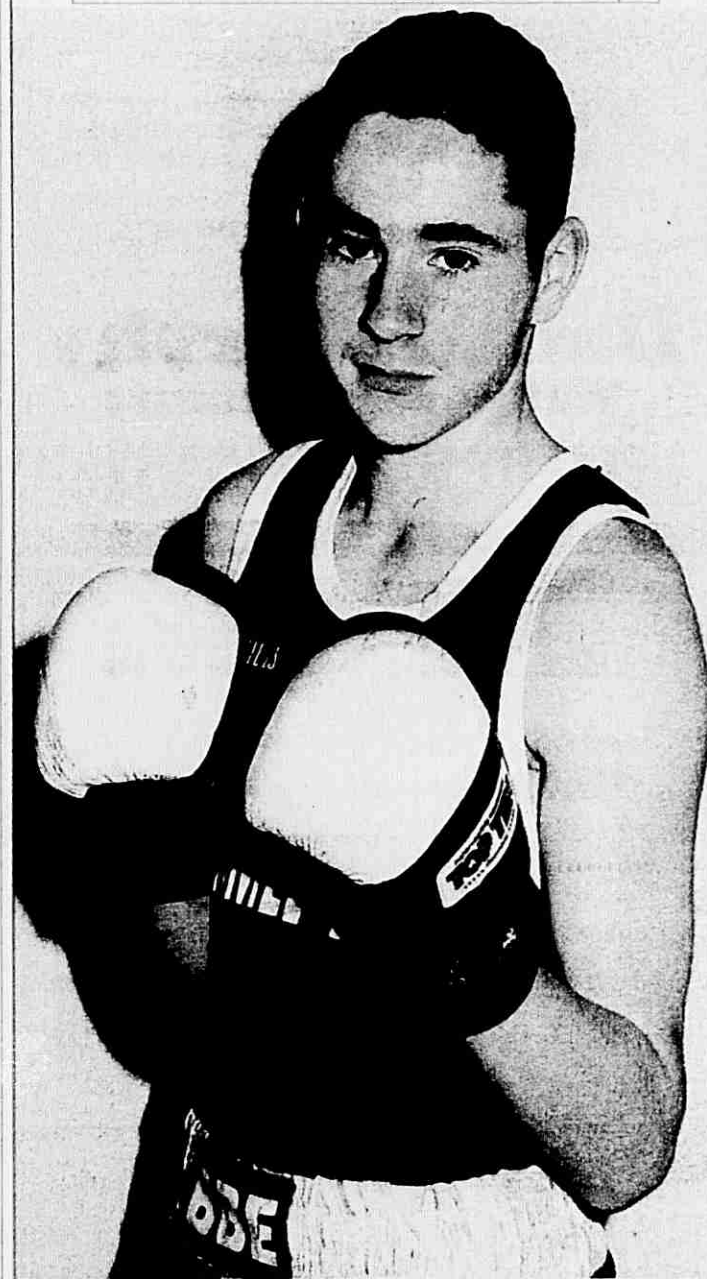
with a decision on their application but Cllr. McDonnell said that it is normally only on the last day or two that the Council gets back with a decision. If the planners have a query, then the process can take another eight weeks.

"This is grossly unfair", he stated.

## All Ireland Champion



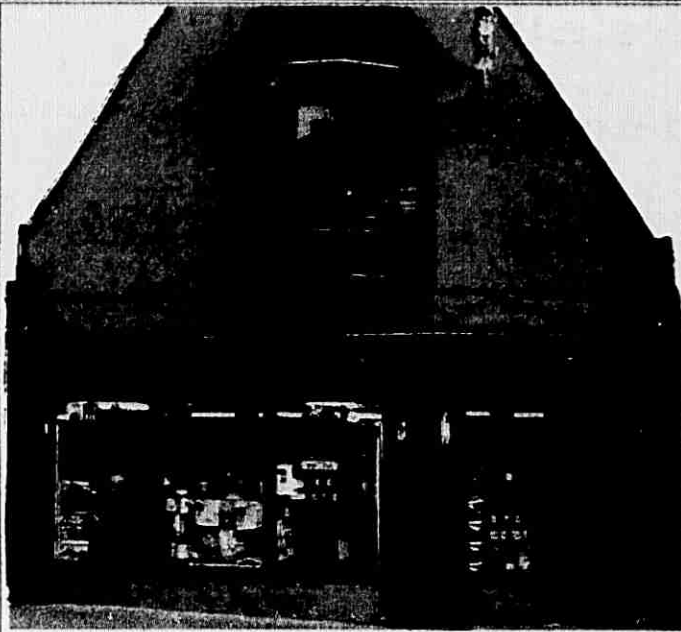

# Geoghegan Highlights Local Traveller Encampment

An unofficial traveller encampment on the Dungarvan bypass road was highlighted by local Urban councillor Damien Geoghegan at last month's meeting of Dungarvan UDC.

Cllr. Geoghegan said the traveller site, located on the roadside between the Kilrush roundabout and the Spring has 'got worse and worse by the day'. He claimed that the travellers are scrap merchants who leave their materials on the site and he asked that the area be kept clean and tidy.

Cllr. Geoghegan also asked officials what procedures can be put in place to move the travellers to a more suitable location.

In reply, County Manager Donal Connolly said there is no spare accommodation in the halting site at Shandon due to ongoing refurbishment work.

"It isn't an easy one to deal with", he stated adding that until such time as Waterford County Council identifies a number of transient halting sites in the county, illegal encampments will be a problem. So far three areas have been targeted by officials as possible locations for halting sites.

These are the general Dungarvan area, the Cappoquin/Lisvan area and the Waterford city area.

# Nora Flynn Denies Resignation Rumours

**Longstanding member of Waterford County Council, Nora Flynn, has reacted angrily to reports that she has resigned from the Fine Gael party.**

Cappoquin based Cllr. Flynn has emphatically denied that she has tendered her resignation in writing, or by any other means, to Fine Gael.

"Could it be that a person, or persons, within the party are wishing that I would go", said Cllr. Flynn. "It is common knowledge that I am considerably less than happy with a lot of things that have been happening within the organisation in the constituency, but it is

patently untrue for anyone to suggest that I have tendered my resignation".

When the rumours of her supposed resignation first surfaced, the Fine Gael whip on Waterford County Council, John Carey, told local radio that he was not completely surprised to learn that she had resigned, given all that had happened in her Lismore electoral area in last year's local elections.

Cllr. Carey's reference was to a 'dirty tricks' campaign, which Cllr. Flynn alleged had been waged against her, including the tearing down of her election posters by people within Fine Gael.

As a result of what happened during that campaign, Cllr. Flynn made it known that she would not support her Lismore electoral colleague Cllr. Willie McDonnell, who will be the party nominee for the chairmanship of the Council in June.

She previously served as Chairperson of the Co. Council in its centenary year of 1998 and was the first woman to hold the position.

"Simply because I have refused to confirm or deny reports of my resignation from the party, some people have decided to go ahead and do the confirming for me", Cllr. Flynn said. "If and when I have a statement to make on the matter I will make it, but what I am saying right now is that I have not resigned from Fine Gael and I would wish that party members, in particular, would desist from stating publicly that I have".

Cllr. Flynn said she was especially upset by the suggestion that her 'resignation' was also precipitated by the failure to adjourn the April monthly meeting of the County Council, which was taking place at the same time that her mother, the late Kathleen O'Donoghue, was being buried in Cappoquin.

"I would have preferred had the meeting been adjourned

to enable Council colleagues to attend the burial, but to say that I have resigned on such an issue is a nonsense. The family is too upset about the death of my mother for me to be engaging in histrionics".

# THE LIVING WORLD

## BIRDS

Only three groups of animals can fly. They are insects, bats and birds. However, the largest bird, the 2-metre-tall ostrich from Africa is one of the few birds that cannot fly at all.

The smallest bird, the bee hummingbird of tropical America, is hardly larger than a bumble bee. Yet it can fly too fast for us to see, hover and even fly backwards.

Birds are vertebrates, with an inner skeleton and backbone, and four limbs. They are warm-blooded like mammals and so active even in very cold weather.

The unique bird feature is its feathers. They form a light, strong, coloured covering over the body, to keep the bird warm and camouflaged.

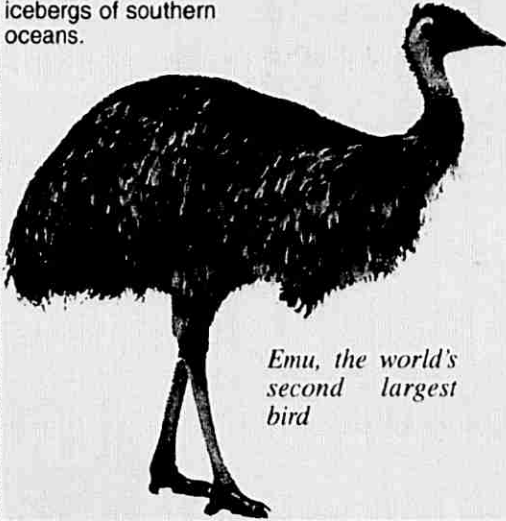
They also form a large, airtight surface on the wings, for flight. And they can be fanned, twisted and tilted for control in the air, so the bird can soar, swoop, turn and view with amazing skill.

## GROUP OF BIRDS

There are nearly 9,000 kind of birds, or species of birds, in about 28 sub-groups. The largest is the passerines, or songbirds, with 5,200 species, including familiar wrens, sparrows, tits, swallows, larks, warblers, finches and blackbirds.

The smallest sub-group has only one species — the flightless ostrich. Other flightless birds include South American rheas, Australian emus, New Zealand kiwis, and 16 kinds of penguins on the coasts and

icebergs of southern oceans.

## FLIGHT FACTS

● The heaviest flying bird is the Kori Bustard of Africa, which can weigh almost 20 kg.

● The fastest flying bird in the white-throated, spine-tailed swift, which may reach speeds of 160 km/h (100 mph).

● The bird with the longest wings is the wandering albatross, at 3.5 m. total span.

● But a prehistoric bird from 10 million years ago, the argen-tavis condor, had wings more than 7 m. across.

## BIRDS NESTS AND EGGS

Most birds breed at a certain time of year, usually in spring or the damp season, when food is more plentiful. Male and female court by singing and displaying their plumage, then mate.

The female lays her hard-shelled eggs, with developing babies inside. Some bird parents put great effort into making a nest for the eggs.

Eagles assemble a huge pile of sticks and twigs, called an eyrie, high on a cliff ledge. Weaverbirds twine leaves, grass and stems together to make a strong flask-shaped hollow nest hanging from a tree.

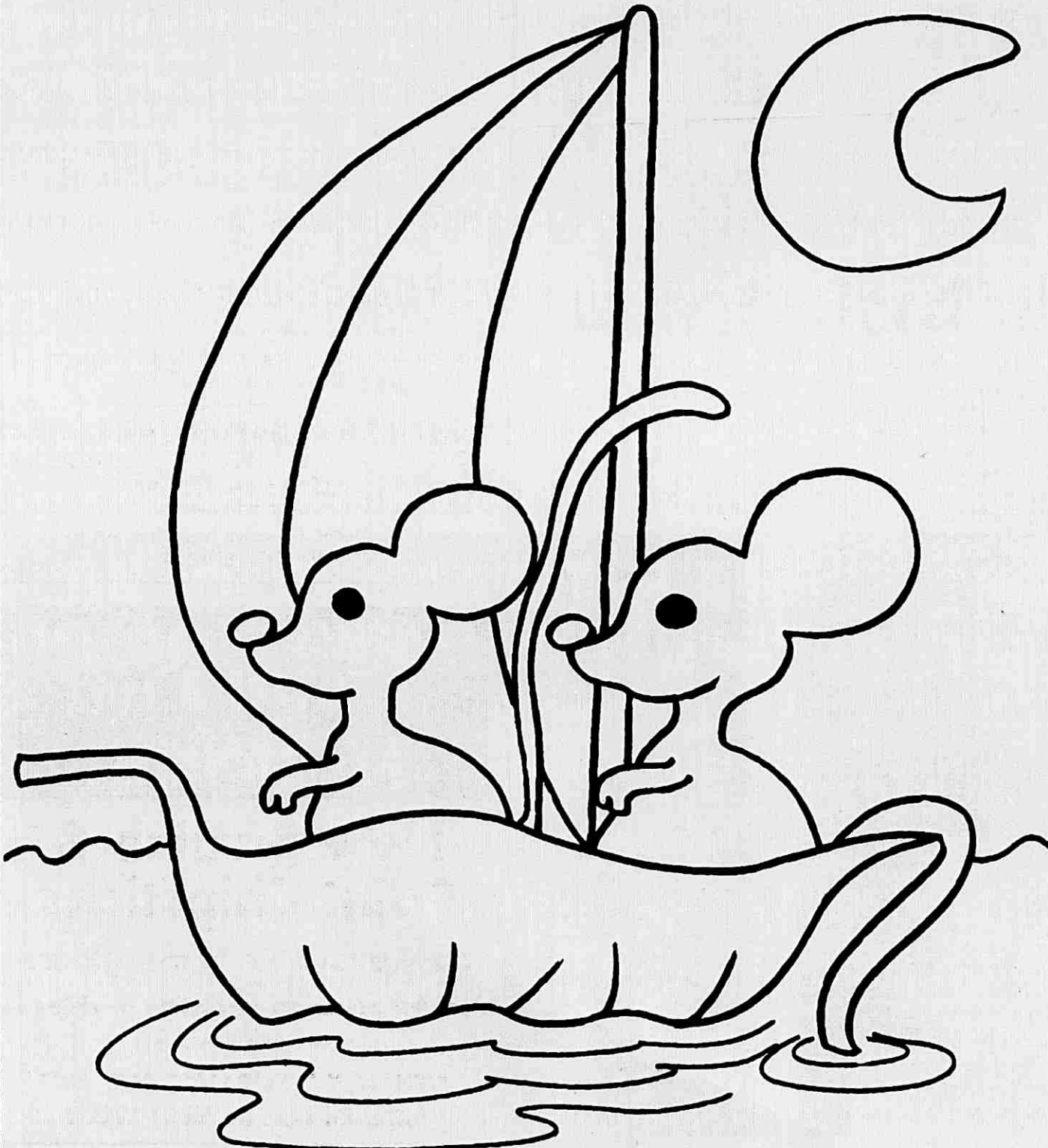
But guillemots simply lay their eggs on the bare, rocky ledges of seashore cliffs. Usually, the female sits on or incubates the eggs to keep them warm, while the male fetches her food, then both parents feed the chicks until they fledge, or learn to fly.

## BIRD PLUMAGE

Birds such as sparrows and owls have dull feathers with mottled plumage, often in shades of green and brown, for camouflage among trees and bushes.

Other birds, especially males at breeding time, have very bright feathers. The include birds of paradise, peacocks, lyre-birds and trogons. the males sing loudly, and shake and fan their feathers, to attract mates. Most birds moult, shedding their old feathers and growing new ones, twice each year.

## Health Board Appoints O Ceilleachair As Irish Officer

The appointment of a full time Irish Language Officer has been announced by the South Eastern Health Board. The Health Board are the first authority in the country to cre-

ate such a position and have appointed Fiachra O Ceilleachair to the office. Based at the Communications Dept. at the SEHB's head office in Kilkenny, Mr. O Ceilleachair's

overall task will be to develop the Board's action plan for the promotion of the Irish language and to implement the state policy on extending bilingualism.

A native of the Ring/Old Parish Gaeltacht area, Mr. O Ceilleachair's background to date featured politics. He served as the National Organiser of the former Democratic Left political party - including the period when they were part of the 'Rainbow' coalition government. Educated locally at Scoil Náisiúnta na Rinne, Coláiste na Rinne and Meán-scoil San Nioclás, Mr. O Ceilleachair went on to Maynooth University to graduate with a Masters Degree in Sociology. He has also taught Irish at secondary school level.

According to the last census of 1996, some 40% of the 375,956 population in the five counties served by the South Eastern Health Board claimed an ability to speak Irish. There are 12 preschool, 12 primary school and 4 secondary schools operating through the medium of the Irish language throughout the Board's functional area. The Health Board's area also features the Gaeltacht communities of Ring and Old Parish.

## Countywide Projects At Planning Stage

Waterford County Council granted planning permission last month to Respond Voluntary Housing Association for the construction of 30 houses, a communal facility and all associated site works at Ballyheney, Clashmore.

Kilgobnet Community Sports Club were given the go-ahead for a sports hall at Bohadon South, Dungarvan while in Ardmore permission was granted for the construction of six 2 storey houses and associated car parking at Duffcarrig.

In Ballymacarbry, Michael

and Bernard O'Grady of Glandaloughlin have received permission from the Council to install a 40 metre wind monitoring mast at Knocknaree.

Elsewhere in Lismore, outline planning permission has been granted for a health centre/doctors surgeries at Main Street.

The Council has requested additional information with regard to a planning application by Quest Contracting Ltd. for the development of 22 house sites and outline permission to erect 22 houses at Stradballymore.

Eircell have also been requested to submit additional information with regard to their application for a 15 metre monopole at Garranurton, Kilmacthomas.

Further information has also been sought with regard to a planning application for 6 dwelling houses at Baile na nGall Beg in Ring and for 16 two storey semi detached houses together with one 2 storey detached house at Main Street, Lismore.

### PERMISSION REFUSED

The Co. Council has refused an application for outline planning permission for five sites and associated works and sewage treatment systems at Shanakill, Aglis.

Council planners felt that the site is situated in a primarily agricultural area and the development would be in conflict with the preservation of such land for future development of

agriculture.

"The proposed development would militate against the preservation of the rural environment and lead to demands for the uneconomic provision of public services and community facilities".

Another reason cited for the refusal was that the site is located in an area where public sewerage facilities are not available. The proposed development would be "prejudicial to public health because it would result in an excessive concentration of septic tanks in the area".

The third reason for refusal was that the proposed development would be contrary to the proper planning and development of the area as it would involve an undesirable extension of ribbon development with a multiplicity of accesses along a county road would give rise to a traffic hazard.

## Waterford Has Third Highest Unemployment Rate

The live register analysis for the South East has shown that the unemployment rate in Waterford is over the national average unemployment figure of 7%. This means Waterford (with 10%) has the third highest unemployment rate after Donegal (14%) and Mayo/Louth (11%).

Barrie McLatchie, Chairperson of the INOU commenting on the imminent loss of jobs in Waterford said; "The regional disparities in unemployment rates should be a major cause of concern for Government. Job creation needs to remain the number one priority for State Agencies in the BMW region and in the South East. In 1999 the number of job losses in state supported industries had returned to 1991 levels, and the vast majority of these jobs were in the lower skills area. People who are currently unemployed, and those in danger of losing their job, need to be able to access decent skills training in order to access the types of jobs being created in Ireland".

# Proposal To Call Off Landfill Search Deferred To June

The motion was put down by Fianna Fáil councillors Ollie Wilkinson, Tom Cronin and James Tobin and the matter was debated for over an hour with proposals, amendments and even amendments to amendments before a show of hands resulted in a deferral of the motion to the June monthly meeting. At that stage, further tests will have been carried out on the three sites in Grange, Knockanore and Old Parish and the consultants will be a step closer to identifying the most suitable site for use as a landfill serving the county and city.

As the meeting dragged on after the 5 p.m. deadline, County Manager Donal Connolly advised members against taking a vote on the notice of motion which he felt should not even be before the Council.

He warned members that it would be very foolish for them as councillors if they allowed themselves to be split on an east/west issue.

He claimed that any site the Council finds as a potential landfill will be objected to and he urged members to take the courageous decision. The matter, he stressed, cannot be determined by political or popular decisions.

"The Council has to take responsibility for its actions", he said, adding that the local authority is shortly reaching the stage where it can't provide a waste disposal collection service as the existing dumps at Dungarvan, Kilbarry and Tramore are running out of space.

He confirmed that the eventual landfill site will be the most suitable and the best in the county and will not be selected if there is any danger to water supplies.

The cost of transporting waste from the city and the east to West Waterford are 'infinitesimal' compared with the overall cost of the landfill.

"We can't change a plan in midstream just because we don't like the results we're getting", he added.

## AMAZEMENT AT SELECTION

Putting forward the controversial motion, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson told Monday's meeting that many people from east and west Waterford have expressed their amazement to him at the consultants, J.B. Barry & Partners' site selection. A walkover survey of the sites together with trial holes have already been undertaken and bore holes will be drilled on the Coillte owned sites within the next fortnight.

"There can be no doubt that the transport of material from the east of the county is not in the best economic interest of the Council or the people who have to pay for it", he stated.

Cllr. Tom Cronin pointed to a fish farm on the river Lickey near the site selected at Grange which has over £3 million worth of fish. He added that the river also acts as a water supply to Ardmore at peak season and is one of the few rivers in Ireland with oysters.

Cllr. James Tobin claimed that the consultants "didn't just break the rules, but made smithereens of them" with regard to the proximity issue which stated that the landfill would ideally be situated close to Waterford city.

He said Knockanore is the most far westerly point in the county, situated 60 miles from the city where 75% of the rubbish will be created. If the landfill goes ahead in his area, Cllr. Tobin said the scenic route signs can be replaced with "Dump this way" signs.

The consultants, he felt, should have stayed with the original guidelines.

## STRONG OPPOSITION

Having put forward their argument against a landfill in West Waterford, the three councillors met with varying degrees of support and opposition. One of the most vociferous opponents to their motion was Portlaw councillor Paudie Coffey. He pointed out that the east of the county has already been looked at by the consultants and Council members had then agreed to extend the search to

the west.

He said some members are acting in a hypocritical manner as they want the existing dumps closed but won't give a modern alternative. He asked the Councillors to show responsibility and to go through the selection process and look at the three sites.

Likewise Cllr. Mary Greene said the notice of motion was worded badly.

"I think it is very unfair that the west of the county is named", she stated. "It may be proven that the three sites aren't suitable at all".

Appealing to the three members to withdraw their motion in the interest of fairness, Cllr. John Carey said there was 'no roaring and shouting from the councillors in the east'.

"We're all Waterford people, we all wear the same jersey on the field of play", he urged.

## "RIDICULOUS SITUATION"

Fully supporting the motion Cllr. Willie McDonnell said it would be a 'ridiculous situation' if the County Council chooses any of the sites in West Waterford.

He said the same scenario is happening all over Ireland whereby local authorities have identified potential landfill sites near county borders and on Coillte owned land.

"I believe there is something in that", said Cllr. McDonnell who claimed that a landfill site in West Waterford could eventually be used to process waste from east Cork as well as all of Co. Waterford.

Also lending his voice to the argument, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceil-leachair pointed out that there were 300 landfills in Ireland just ten years ago and now there are only 50, three of which are in Co. Waterford and 'on their last legs'. He asked members to consider the enormous costs involved in a landfill project and claimed that waste collection costs could rise as high as 400%.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said the Corporation and the industries in the city must be "laughing up their sleeve at us", agreeing to take all the refuse from the county. He added that the proximity principal was always the bedrock of the consultants search and had a vital bearing on the location of the landfill site.

## TOO MUCH OF A COINCIDENCE SAYS DEASY

While stating that he has no problem with landfills, Cllr. John Deasy however said it has gone beyond the realm of belief that the sites were picked indiscriminately. The fact that they are all owned by Coillte is 'too much of a coincidence', he

claimed, given that Cork, Limerick and Wicklow have all identified potential landfill sites on Coillte property.

Cllr. Tom Higgins said he wouldn't blame any community for getting worried about the amount of waste being transported to their area, even if the facility is to the highest standards.

"It defies credibility how suddenly four dumps can become one", he stated. Cllr. Higgins referred again to his previous suggestion that a large sized dump be located in the east pro rata the population and a smaller sized dump in the west.

## DEFERRAL AGREED BY TINY MAJORITY

As the meeting degenerated into a fiery east/west slinging match, Cllr. Nora Flynn appealed for calm on both sides and proposed that the motion be deferred to the June monthly meeting allowing members some reprieve.

Her proposal was seconded by Cllr. Lola O'Sullivan.

A show of hands then took place resulting in a very close decision - just 10 votes to 9.

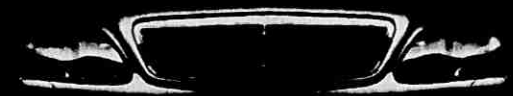

# Coconut Mousse With Raspberry Coulis

**Ingredients:**

- Serves 2
- 50g fresh ground coconut
- 4 eggs
- 100g sugar
- 284ml cream
- 20g gelatine
- 2 nips Cocoribe liqueur
- 200g fresh rhubarb
- 1/2 pot sour cream
- Angelica garnish
- 4 marshmallows
- 142ml half-whipped cream
- A few peach slices
- Sprig of mint

**Method:**

BREAK the egg yolks into a bowl. Add the Cocoribe liqueur and 50g of sugar. Whisk over a bowl of hot water. Melt the gelatine separately, then add to the egg-yolk mixture. Place in the fridge.

Beat the egg whites until stiff. Beat the cream in a separate bowl. When the egg yolks are cold, fold in half the egg whites, then half the

whipped cream, then the rest of the egg whites and the coconut.

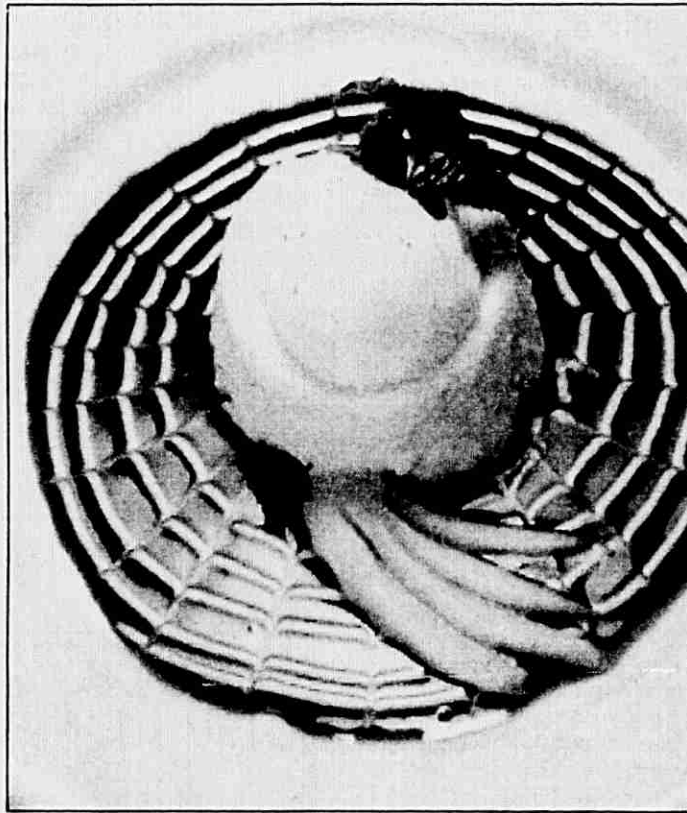
Lightly grease two round moulds with oil, fill to the top and place back in the fridge.

Poach the rhubarb with the sugar and a small amount of water for 30 minutes, cool, then purée in the blender.

In a separate bowl, whisk the leftover cream, add the sour cream and whisk together until stiff.

To serve: First pour the rhubarb mixture on to large white plates and smooth out into a round. Then spoon the half-whipped cream into the middle of the plate, and, with a tooth-pick, move out and around the plate to create the spider-web effect.

Tip out the mousse in the centre. Top it off with a heaped spoon of whipped cream, garnish with mint and two marshmallows on each mousse. Add a few peach slices (see picture). Serve very cold, with wafers.



## Fluffy Amaretto Cheesecake

TRY this delicious recipe for fluffy cheesecake with a light almond flavour and a refreshing fruit topping.

**Ingredients:**

- Makes 10 servings
- 1/2 packet digestive biscuits, crushed
- 1 x 5ml sp vanilla
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 200g cream cheese
- 125g butter, melted
- 1/4 x 5ml sp salt
- 1/3 cup Amaretto liquor
- 4 eggs, lightly beaten
- 375g ricotta cheese

**Method:**

Combine the digestive biscuit crumbs and the melted butter.

Press the biscuit-crumbs base mixture over the bottom and sides of a greased 21cm spring-form pan and leave in the refrigerator to chill.

Preheat the oven to 160°C/325°F.

Beat together ricotta and cream cheeses until smooth. Slowly add the beaten egg and beat thoroughly.

Finally, add to the cheese and egg mixture the vanilla, sugar, salt and Amaretto.

Pour the mixture into the pan with the digestive base and bake one hour and 15 minutes, or until the cheesecake feels firm in the middle.

Cool for about 30 minutes in the pan before removing.

Cool completely, (preferably in the refrigerator overnight) before serving.

Top the cheesecake with a fresh fruit, or jam of your choice.

Some of the best toppings are strawberry or blackberry jam, fresh strawberries, mandarins or kiwi fruit.

## Almond Butter Cookies

THESE almond butter cookies will melt in your mouth, with their smooth nutty flavour – ideal as a light snack or as tea-time treats.

**Ingredients:**

- Makes 30 cookies
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 1/4 cup maple syrup
- 1 cup wholewheat pastry flour
- 1/4 x 5ml sp salt
- 1 cup almond butter
- 1/2 x 5ml sp pure vanilla extract

**Method:**

Preheat oven to 170°C/300°F/gas mark 4. Lightly grease a baking sheet (or use a nonstick one).

Mix together the almond butter and vegetable oil. Beat the mixture until smooth and then mix in the maple syrup and

vanilla extract.

In a bowl, stir together the wholewheat flour and the salt. Add this to the almond butter mixture and mix until just about combined.

Cover the cookie dough with cling film and refrigerate for ten minutes.

Roll the dough into 2cm balls. Place them on the greased baking sheet and flatten with a fork. Bake the cookies in a preheated oven for about 25 minutes, or until the bottoms are lightly browned.

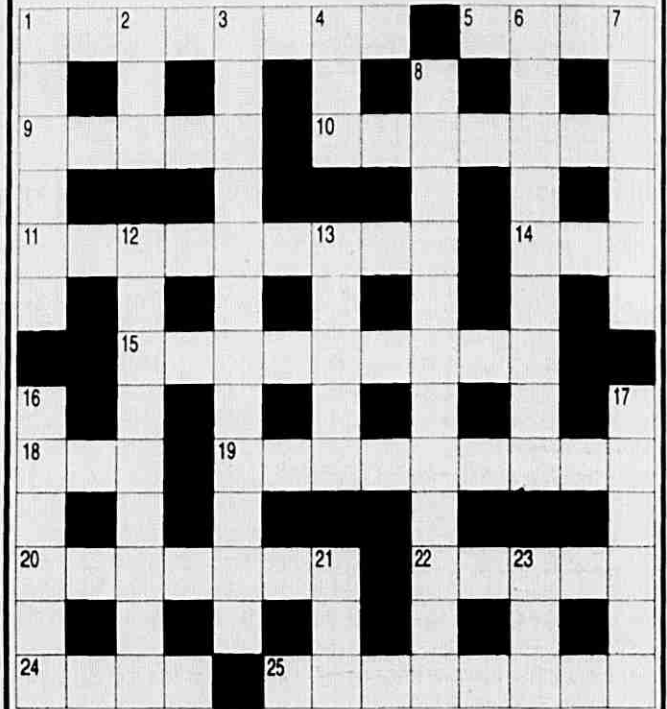
Cool for two or three minutes on the baking sheet, and then transfer to a cooling rack.

## Getting To Grips With The Weeds

Every year your prized garden plants start to grow, and so do the weeds! But most gardeners don't relish the fact that weeding is the only solution.

It isn't all bad. In fact weeding can be quite therapeutic - very little brain energy is needed, and with your hands busy, you are left free to daydream.

So just what is a weed? Weeds are those plants that grow where they are not wanted. They have some/all of these characteristics:

- Fast-growing,
- Compete for space, nutrients, moisture and light,
- Capable of growing in almost any soil or site,
- Difficult to eradicate,
- Resist control.

There are two main types of weed - annual and perennial.

Annuals such as chickweed, complete their life cycle within one year. If they have already set seed, then nothing is better than weeding by hand. This might not be totally effective, but the seed won't be spread around too much.

If they haven't already set seed, then annuals can be controlled easily by regular hoeing. They will dry out and die, especially if it is done on a warm, sunny day.

Perennial weeds survive from one year to the next. Some grow from seed and others by staying dormant in rhizomes, bulbs, tubers or thick roots, which die back to the ground in the late autumn or early winter.

Perennial weeds aren't easily removed. Hoeing and digging breaks the roots into small sections without actually killing them. Perennial weeds such as couch grass are often difficult to remove completely because they get tangled up with the roots from established plants.

You may have to dig up the plant and the weed together, wash the plant's root system, remove the weed and then replant.

The best way to avoid weeding is to prevent the problem in the first place. Keeping your plants healthy will make them more effective competitors. Plants with a spreading foliage and even potatoes compete well with annual weeds.

Mulches are usually effective. In the spring, spread a 2.5 to 5cm layer of organic matter (such as peat) over your soil. This will smother any seeds or seedlings.

Alternatively, lay a sheet of black plastic over the top of the soil. This method is particularly good for vegetable patches, as you can make

slits in it, for your crops to grow through.

Good lawn care is essential. Weeds in your lawn means that it isn't growing as well as it should, usually through lack of regular watering and feeding, too compact soil or cutting the grass too short. For weeds such as dandelions and clover, hand weeding is the most effective.

As for dealing with grass that creeps in from the edge, use an edging tool. This half-moon shape tool has been used in British gardens for hundreds of years to cut clean edges around gardens. The trick is to edge your lawn about once a month.

But even with the best preventative measures, weeds still happen. So keep your best tools handy - your hand fork, hoe and hands.

## THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

**FEED, DISBUD AND POLLINATE TOMATOES**

Tomatoes will be in various stages of growth by now. The earliest will have set some fruits, while later batches are just coming into flower and others will be ready for potting into 13cm pots. With all stages you must remove side shoots regularly. It is advisable to pollinate flowers by hand, tapping the plants or scattering pollen from flower to flower with a paintbrush. The most effective time is about midday when the sun is shining.

**MULCH FRUIT TREES**

Spread a fairly thick layer of well-rotted manure around fruit trees and bushes of all types. This is known as a mulch and is very valuable for three reasons:

1. It provides the trees with much-needed nourishment while in growth
2. It helps to retain moisture in the soil
3. It keeps down weed growth

**VINE TREATMENT**

Outdoor vines will be growing freely by now and you need to regulate their growth. Reduce the number of laterals to one per spur, retaining those that are showing flower trusses. Stop them beyond the truss but before they have grown so far as to interfere with neighbouring vines or laterals from other rods.

**PLANT DAHLIA TUBERS OUTDOORS**

Cover the tubers with 8cm of soil and they will be quite secure against any late frost. It will be some weeks before you see shoots appear above the ground.

**SOW CINERARIAS**

Sow a few seeds if you want plants in flower by December. The seeds will want a little warmth to encourage germination so early, ordinary greenhouse temperature will be ample. Sow thinly using John Innes or a soil-less seed compost. Cover lightly with fine soil and sand and put in the shade until germination.

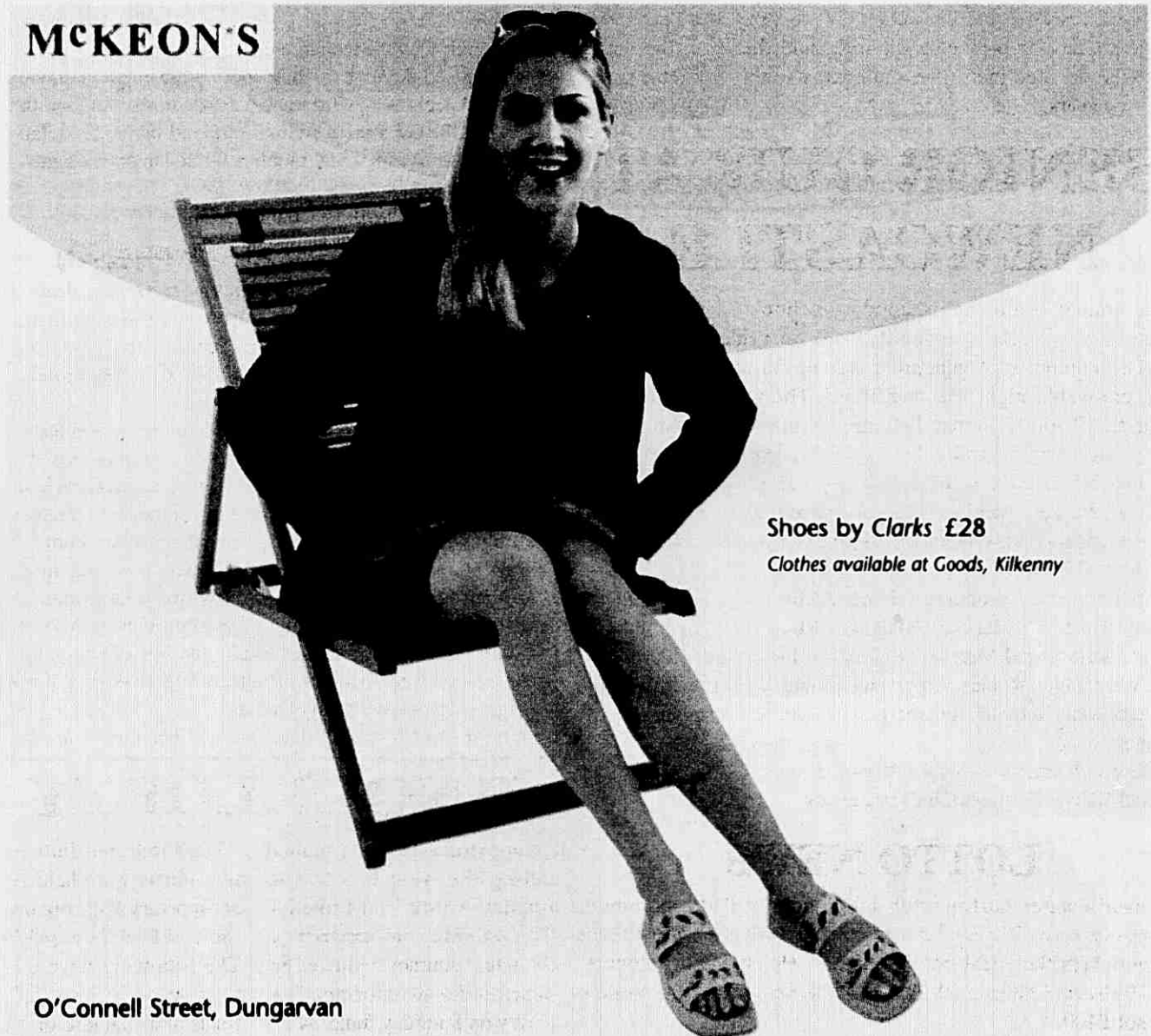

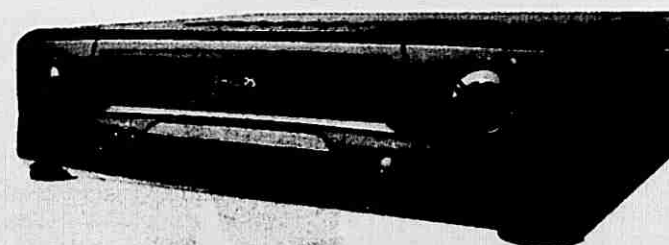

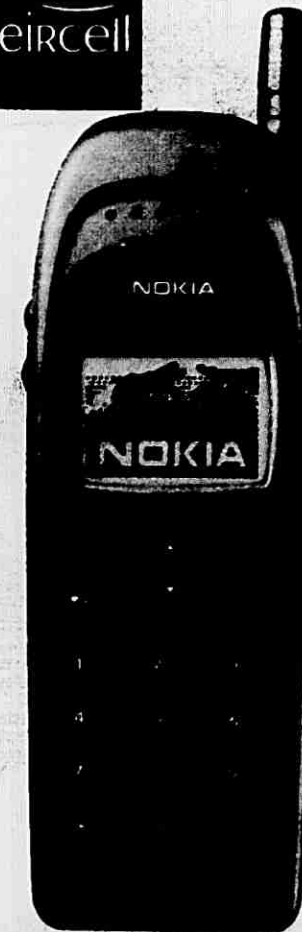

# Installation Aid Scheme Will Be Retrospective, says Macra

Following discussions with representatives of the Department of Agriculture, Macra na Feirme is hopeful that the new Installation Aid Scheme will apply retrospectively

from 1 January 2000 but the organisation is very concerned about the delay in implementing the scheme. Macra welcomes the Department's recommendations that purchases of milk quota under the restructuring scheme during the next two years should not be included in the calculation of income units. Young farmers should therefore feel free to expand their dairy enterprises under the restructuring scheme.

National president, T. J. Maher said, "The National Installation Aid scheme is still in operation and all young farmers who took over their farms before 1 January, 2000 and have not already applied for aid under this scheme, should do so immediately.

"Macra has called on the Department of Agriculture to make the new scheme applicable to those who became installed on their lands in late

1999 as they have not yet finished their first year in production. Macra will await with interest the Department's final decision in relation to this.

"It now seems probable that the Scheme will be up and running by early Autumn. Macra acknowledges the Department's difficulties with respect to finalising the application procedures and rules but any further delays beyond this will impose unfair hardships on young farmers who intend applying for aid under the scheme.

Macra has urged the Department to deal with outstanding cases arising from the operation of the old scheme. Mr. Maher stated that "a small number of young, trained farmers are currently in limbo with respect to the payment under the old scheme. These young farmers deserve to have their cases heard now.

### DAIRYING

#### Poor Grass Growth in April

Grass growth in April was running at 60% of normal for the week ended April 22nd. At Moorepark grass growth for this same week was recorded at 45 kg DM/ha/day while the historic average growth rate for this period was 74 kgs.

The slow recovery of paddocks grazed in the first round and low grass reserves means management must be adjusted to ensure: high grass growth rates and cows are fully fed during the breeding season.

These objectives can be achieved by a combination of maintaining a long grazing cycle while growth is poor (25 days), bringing in extra grazing ground from drystock or part of the silage ground and increasing meal feeding levels to reduce the amount of grass eaten by cows.

Grazing tight coupled with short rotation length depresses grass production by up to 25%. If more than 10% of silage ground has to be grazed then meal levels should be increased substantially for a short term until grass covers recover.

Apply 11/2 bags of CAN/Ac. after grazing. When growth rates return to normal, top every second paddock after the second grazing where post grazing height is greater than 6 - 7 cm.

### SHEEP

#### Teagasc Open Days

Last month two open days were held at Teagasc Sheep Research Units in Athenry and Knockbeg. Here is a summary of the key points.

**Lamb Growth:** This is a key element of making money from sheep. Fast growth rate of lambs means:

increased lamb price  
lower veterinary costs  
less labour

more grass available in autumn for other stock.

The target to aim for with twin lambs is 32 kgs average live-weight at weaning. Grass very well managed will give this target. Do not graze paddocks tighter than 6 cm this month. Creep grazing lambs ahead of ewes will give additional advantage to top quality grazing.

Creep feeding (15 kg) will give at least 3 kgs extra live-weight at weaning but be careful not to allow creep feeding to substitute for poor grassland management.

### SUCKLERS

#### Breed for Europe:-

The European beef market is one of the highest prices in the world - but also one of the most discerning. As a general rule, Continental markets require Continental breeds of cattle. The quality required has been demonstrated by the market demand for well-shaped growthy Continental weanlings for live shipping. The meat trade to Europe requires medium to heavy carcasses that are lean, well shaped and a moderate to low fat cover.

**Bull Selection** — The most rapid progress can be made by choosing the top bulls available with high ratings for the important traits like growth rate, carcass conformation and carcass leanness. Unfortunately, these figures only become available when a bull is progeny tested - through A.I.

If using A.I., choose a Continental bull with an index of 110 or better for these traits. If buying a stock bull look for the son of a progeny tested bull with a high index for the above traits, or a young bull with good performance test figures or good weight for age from the on-farm recording.

BLUP figures are now becoming available. The Limousin breed are the most advanced in this regard but some have still a low reliability figure. Check out these figures and try to get a bull with a high index for muscularity.

### TILLAGE

#### Crop Report:-

The Teagasc Crop Report number 6 was issued on May 2nd. The following are the headlines:- Growth has recovered well in winter cereals but many spring crops are backward. Nutritional problems particularly trace element deficiencies are common.

Disease levels are generally low in winter cereals but mildew levels have increased on oats.

Spring cereals should get an aphicide at the 3-5 leaf stage in areas where there is a history of Barley Yellow Dwarf Virus.

Details enclosed on weed control in potatoes and maize as well as dock control in grassland.

### Spring Cereals

Most crops are at the first leaf to mid-tillering stage but some early sown spring wheat is at first node stage. Growth is backward. Some crops are showing signs of nutrient deficiencies particularly trace elements. There are isolated reports of leatherjackets and slug damage.

**Recommendations** — Monitor cereals for leatherjacket damage. Spray with Dursban, Clinch, Pontoon, Grubber, Sipyntos, Atlas Stewart, Gammalin, etc., if more than 10 leatherjackets per 10x30cm drill length at 13cm spacing (ADAS threshold).

Apply N topdressing to spring barley at the 1-3 leaf stage where appropriate. Topdressing of spring wheat can be applied up to gs 30.

Aphid numbers have dropped to 48/m<sup>2</sup> this week in Teagasc Oak Park counts in unsprayed winter barley plots. This compares to 100/m<sup>2</sup> in week 1 of April 2000 and 1999.

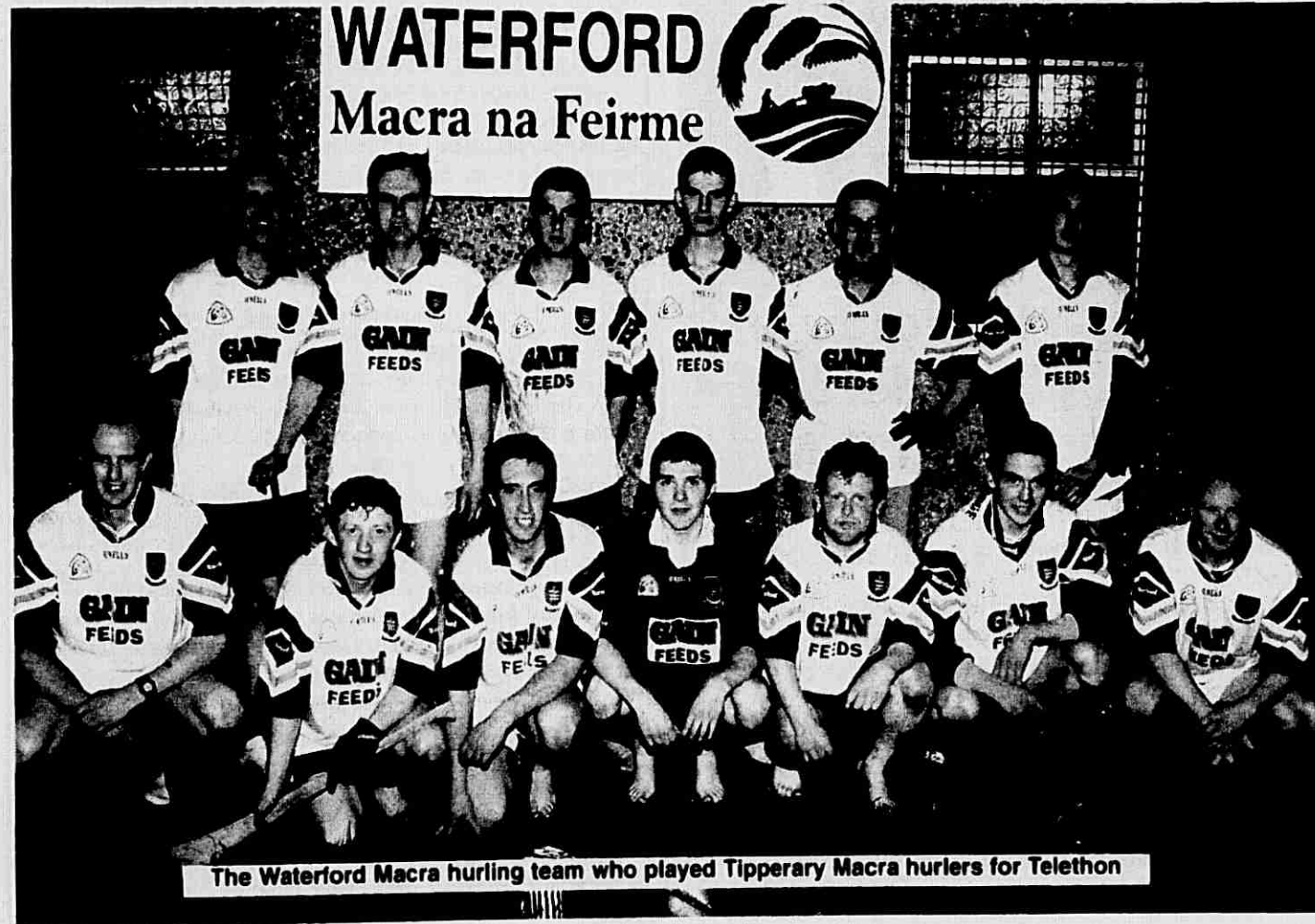
### GRAY SAYS EWE PREMIUM SHORTFALL MUST BE MADE UP BY INCREASED HEADAGE PAYMENT

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman Harry Gray has said the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh would have to seriously look at making up the full ewe premium shortfall of over £8/ewe by national aid through an increase in headage

payments. Mr. Gray said sheep farmers are extremely frustrated and angry at Minister Walsh's continuing failure to deliver anything on ewe premium, extensification premium or the 7% stabiliser at European level.

Mr. Gray said with over 3,000 sheep farmers being forced out of business in the last year the sheep policy situation was now at a critical stage. "Minister Walsh has no choice but to secure substantial additional national aid in

the form of increased headage payment for the sheep sector." For sheep farmers in non-disadvantaged areas, Mr. Gray said Minister Walsh would have to deliver on the abolition of the 7% stabiliser and a ewe premium top-up.



### FACTORIES MUST PAY A EUROPEAN BEEF PRICE TO KEEP IRISH WEANLINGS AT HOME —Parlon

IFA President Tom Parlon has told a beef industry seminar in Dublin that "the future of the Irish beef processing industry depends critically on the factories' ability to return a European price for Irish finished cattle".

Answering the question posed at the IFJ/IMA Seminar, will Irish weanlings be beefed in Ireland or Europe, Mr. Parlon said "the answer is simple. Weanlings will be beefed in Ireland, if the meat factories return a European price for Irish finishers".

"If the factories' failure to deliver a European price continues, Irish weanlings will continue to travel live, be finished in Spain and Italy, and make a European price on the continent. That's the bottom line."

The IFA President said that livestock farmers long ago realised that they need a live trade to provide competition to the meat factories. He pointed out that the trade in Irish weanling cattle to the continent, mainly Spain and Italy, had grown rapidly over the past 3 years from virtually nothing in 1997 to 275,000 head last year, with a potential to go to 500,000 head per year. "In the EU Single Market, this is normal open free trade".

Mr. Parlon stressed that Irish beef finishers needed a decent margin to stay in business. "This margin must come from closing the 20% price gap with Europe", he said. He told the factories "don't tell us to look to cheaper stores and the premiums to get our margins. There's an average price gap of £130/head to be closed with Europe. That's the factories' job."

Mr. Parlon said the Irish beef processing industry must change its approach. He questioned whether the industry was committed to maximising beef exports to Europe or were a number of major players "happy to use Irish farmers as a source of cheap raw material and trade beef as a commodity on third country markets".

"Livestock farmers are entitled to an answer to this question from each and every player in this industry. Generalised answers from the IMA and An Bord Bia are not adequate."

Mr. Parlon described price transparency on both farmer prices and market returns as a key pre-requisite for genuine partnership between producers and processors. He said not enough progress was being made on this issue by the Beef Task Force Monitoring Committee.

The IFA President went on to point out that the US Department of Agriculture has recently proposed new rules for mandatory price reporting for livestock and meat. "Minister Walsh must look at mandatory reporting of Irish prices in Ireland, if more progress on price transparency is not made immediately", Mr. Parlon concluded.

Everybody is earnestly requested to be part of the cele-

bration. There will be no 12 o'clock Mass in Abbeyside on May 21st because of the Mass in Fraher Field on that day at 3.00 pm.

## EVACUATION OF THE BARRACKS

Last week we wrote about the signing of the treaty between Ireland and England whereby the Irish, with the exception of six counties of Ulster, were to have their own Parliament. Notwithstanding these arrangements there was not general acceptance of the Treaty. A striking instance of the first appearance of the division which was about to wreck the country was seen in Dungarvan. The members of the brass band came together and resumed practice in order to jubilate over the victory gained by their leaders. But meantime a letter written by De Valera appeared in which he said that he was entirely against the Treaty, and that it was a document which he would advise the people not to accept. The practices of the band discontinued. Division crept in amongst them and the split observable there in a small way was typical of the larger and fiercer split which

soon widened throughout the country.

### Occupants Of The Old Castle

In accordance with the terms of the treaty, preparations were made for the evacuation of the barracks. All the police from the west of the county, as well as from several stations in East Cork, had been drafted into Dungarvan for security and their force numbered at this time 65. A body of them used to patrol the streets with loaded rifles but their work of usefulness as a police force had ceased.

The occupants of the Castle were now to be changed. The English forces were to leave and the premises were to become the property of the Irish people alone. This old fortress had in times gone by, before the building of Dungarvan Quay, been washed by the waters of the Colligan and the sentries at night could listen to the swish of the waves as they

beat against its ancient walls. In this defensive stronghold were garrisoned the troops of the English King, and stayed there with little intermission for 750 years. Dungarvan Castle was symbolical, in every respect, of British rule in Ireland.

### Actual Evacuation

The evacuation of Dungarvan barracks took place on the 4th March 1922. The large square of the enclosure had been used for the purpose of keeping the lorries and motor cars, and it is from here that the military used issue forth on their raiding expeditions. The Black and Tans had gone away some days before the military had left the town and the castle was occupied solely by the sixty-five members of the R.I.C. They were under the command of Captain Sheehan, an officer who had fought in the Great War.

# Body Dysmorphic Disorder

All of us are concerned by our appearance to a greater or lesser degree but sadly there are some who are crippled by an obsession with their own ugliness. Voices in their head tell them they are unacceptable because of a particular defect - their nose is too big - their ears stick out - their hair is never right. These are the sufferers of body dysmorphic disorder.

Body dysmorphic disorder is an intense pre-occupation with an imagined defect in appearance. Sufferers are consumed by their ugliness or appearance problem and the obsession that others can see their defects.

The disorder's name comes from the Greek word "dismorfia" which means ugliness, relating especially to facial defects. Sufferers regularly wear apparel to hide the offending body part - a hat, cap or scarf which will be worn at all times. People with this disorder use many terms to describe their perceived problem. Those descriptions may vary from a specific defect - such as my hair is too straight, my face is ugly, to the more sweeping if only I could get a new head!

The fears are irrational and overwhelm the sufferer. The severity is measured in how much it impairs and distresses the sufferer and to what level he/she is preoccupied with the fear. This disorder varies from person to person. At the severe end of the scale it makes victims prisoners of themselves. They are unable to go out, work or engage in social interactions and many sufferers develop addictions and compulsive disorders in order to cope with this - alcoholism, drug addiction and eating disorders.

Victims generally suffer from a compendium of emotional difficulties - depression, obsessive-compulsive disorder and agoraphobia. Depressed people live in a time warp filled with thoughts of past failures and the prospect of doom and gloom in the future. Sufferers of this disorder dread the future - they focus on the belief that at one time they looked OK but that their looks deteriorated and they are convinced that their ugliness will get worse over time. These thoughts are always on their mind and they are locked in emotional self-flagellation that makes them feel helpless and hopeless.

Every sufferer has amplified distortions that are unique to them. Their life centres on checking out how they look to the exclusion of anything else. The defects are not seen by others, however victims will go to plastic surgeons to have nose jobs, their ears pinned back and so on but having endured these procedures they will again become obsessed. Voices cripple them, resonating - I'm so ugly - plastic surgery didn't help - and they often repeat surgical procedures several times in an obsessional drive to make themselves more acceptable.

Recently we had a spell of sunny weather. Have you noticed how in this weather the sun casts your shadow? How many of you, childlike, have tried to jump on your shadow but your shadow runs fast. For the sufferer of body dysmorphic disorder their shadow never runs. The control over their thoughts is limited and the more victims try to gain control the more out of control they get. They

imagine others are staring at them and making fun of their defect. In fact victims become so locked in referential thinking that they become paranoid. Many victims avoid mirrors as they act like a trigger

and when they inadvertently glance in one the obsession is switched on. Sufferers are caught between a rock and a hard place in that they want not to see that ugly self but they also have an overwhelming need to check their appearance. For some a trip to the hair salon is a nightmare. As the stylist goes through the routines of cutting, styling and blow drying, they sit glued to magazines as their temptation to look in the mirror paralyses them. Shame is the exposure emotion and many people with this disorder try to keep their concerns secret. When sufferers become aware of their disabling condition and realise that it is much more common than they think they will take the first step by talking to a professional. When sufferers come to terms with the fact that having this disorder is not a weakness or inadequacy they will muster the courage to seek help. When victims come to me I validate their concerns so that they can summon the courage to talk about their concerns. This is very traumatic as sufferers feel that if they talk of their defects it magnifies them. Empathy and validation are important as if this does not happen sufferers will be left with the notion that they are "crazy." I can state emphatically that all emotional disorders are real to the sufferer and indeed often present life threatening consequences.

And the good news is that it can be treated through cognitive-behaviour therapy and desensitisation techniques.

In my next article I will expand more on other aspects of the disorder, therapy and self management.

# LANDFILL CONCERNS IN OLD PARISH

Ba mhaith linn, baill de Choiste Forbartha an tSean Phobail, ár n-inní agus ár míshástacht a chur in iúl maidir leis na suíomhanna áitiúla atá faoi scrúdú mar láthair oiriúnach do lárionad drámhaola (landfill site) on chontae.

Tá roinnt de na suíomhanna atá á scrúdú ar imeall pharóiste an tSean Phobail agus sa pharóiste féin. We in Coiste Forbartha an tSean Phobail appreciate that the question of disposal of the county's refuse needs to be addressed and appropriately dealt with by the County Council. However, we as a community are most unhappy with, and extremely wary of, the Council's proposed plans to deal with these refuse disposal problems. We are concerned about the one-sided and misleading information being provided to the public by the County Council and we have a number of questions, to which we feel we are not getting satisfactory answers from the Council.

Why should a landfill site, to which the waste of the entire county, the vast majority of which comes from the more densely populated east, be located in the west of the county?

What are the environmental implications, such as pollution of ground water and air and vermin infestation? How can we be assured that our water supply will not be contaminated?

Where is it proven that a landfill site of the type pro-

posed by the Council is the most efficient and effective way of dealing with our waste? What about the many proven disadvantages associated with landfill sites of the type proposed?

Are the locations in question 100% suitable for the type of landfill site proposed?

What are the health implications for those living near such a landfill site?

What effect will such a large landfill site have on the infrastructure of the area, with large numbers of lorries and traffic travelling to and from the site each day?

What about the negative effects such a site have on the prospects for future beneficial developments in the area, e.g. tourism?

# Helvick Benefits From £12,000 Grant

Helvick pier in Ring has been allocated a grant of £12,000 under Sceim Muirbreacha Gaeltachta for small piers. £9,000 has been allocated by the Department of Arts, Heritage, Gaeltacht and the Islands together with a contribution of £3,000 from Waterford County Council. There is great demand for works to be carried out on small piers in the last few years which stems from the development of inshore fishing. Helvick pier is also used for recreational and tourism purposes and is the base for the Helvick Head, RNLI Lifeboat station.

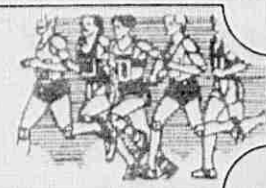

Evening meetings in the UK total 162 for this year. Only six Saturdays are in use for evening fixtures in year 2000.

Ireland's evening meetings got underway last Monday and the season concludes on Friday the 25th August.

### PAUL'S UNLUCKY BREAK

National Hunt Jockey Paul Moloney will be out of action for the foreseeable future having broken his pelvis after a crashing fall at Punchestown last Friday.

### PUNCHESTOWN UPDATE

The feature event on day one was the grade one BMW Chase. Producing a great round of jumping for rider Mick Fitzgerald the Nicky Henderson trained Get Real at 3/1 romped to a comfortable two lengths victory over Kenkos.

Willie Mullins saddled the first two home in the Murphy International Handicap Hurdle as the gambled on Tryphanea 6/1 to 3/1 out sprinted 16/1 outsider Galeogan.

The John Queally trained Truckinabout ran a fine race in the handicap chase, his cause not helped by a last fence mistake before finishing third behind 16/1 outsider Paul's Run partnered by Waterford jockey Shay Barry.

Upwards of 16,500 people attended on the opening day spending over £400,000 on the tote.

Day 2 — The second day of a record breaking festival was ruined by a farce of a race for the featured Heineken Gold Cup. We criticised the layout of the chase course at this track. In the past, remember the Ballyquin debacle some time ago, which robbed the Gleeson families runner of certain victory. What happened last Wednesday was that Micko's Dream came down when in the lead bringing down a challenging Doran's Pride in the process. A number of the following on runners were forced to take evasive action and in doing so they nearly wandered the wrong side of a doll/gate. When they eventually sorted themselves out the Ruby Walsh ridden Commanche Court came through for an opportunist victory over Addington Boy.

When all the dust settled on this event the stewards held their inevitable enquiry. They banned jockey Mick Fitzgerald for two days. This was a disgraceful decision and once again the clerk of the course escaped without censure.

The Paddy Power grade one bumper produced a great Dungarvan victory as 9/1 chance Liss A Paoraigh trained by John Kiely for the Flynn family sprinted clear of her rivals up the home stretch for rider P. J. Crowley to defeat Far Horizon by three and a half lengths. This Husyan mare has obviously gone the right way since her impressive Clonmel bumper success and looks an exciting prospect

when running over hurdles.

Thursday — Lismore jockey Ken Whelan, minus his hair after a charity event enjoyed an armchair ride aboard the Enda Bolger trained Risk of Thunder who ran away with the La Touche Cup for the sixth successive year.

General Cloney's jumping left him down in the Iaws Champion 4 year old hurdle as the Charlie Swan ridden Topacio 10/1 powered his way to an easy win over Lord Brax.

Frozen Groom blundered his way through the Swordlestown novice chase and handed victory on a plate to Cheltenham winner Tiutchev who drew clear after the final fence.

Trip To Dicks picked up some nice prizemoney finishing third in the handicap chase and this ten year old mare appears all set for a rewarding summer campaign.

Friday — The final day of the festival proved a lucrative one for Waterford owned and trained race horses. Henry de Bromhead has done ever so well since taking over from his father at the start of the year and he sent out his sixth winner of the current campaign as Feeling Grand battled on tenaciously in the handicap chase for a hard earned neck victory over a running on Johnny Brushaside.

After a number of disappointing efforts Feathered Leader owned by M. D. O'Connor and trained by Arthur Moore came good in the grade 1 David Austin Memorial novice chase coasting in two and a half lengths clear of Shannon Gale.

The O'Connor clan were back in the winners enclosure after the sixth race as Testify at 33/1 (229/1 on the tote) caused a major shock. The winner was ridden by young Gary Hutchinson from Tramore who is attached to the in form Ted Walshe stable.

The John Kiely Sparkling Gold ran a pleasing race in the bumper to finish a close up second behind the Willie Mullins trained Ballyamber.

The featured Shell champion hurdle saw Grimes make every post a winning one to slam a good class field. It was a pity that Charlie Swan didn't adapt similar front running tactics at Liverpool where he came with a very late effort aboard the Christy Roche trained gelding.

### FREE ENTRY TO TIPPERARY

Tipperary stage a mixed evening of racing next Thursday and the good news is that all race goers will be admitted free to this fixture where the first race is underway for two year olds over five furlongs at half past five.

No luck for favourite backers in the fillies classic on Sunday with victory going to 14/1 shot Lehan. Petruscha the warm favourite could only finish in third spot.

# St. Augustine's Carry Irish Hopes In Finland

It hardly seems like two years since St. Augustine's College played host to the European Superschools Competition and scooped first place against the cream of European Schools and Colleges for the second year in a row. There was much rejoicing in Dungarvan and Duckspool, particularly in the light of the fact that it had been their second successive victory and pledges were made then, that if at all possible, the College would carry the Irish flag when the games were next held in the year 2000.

Next Monday, a representative panel of St. Augustine's students will leave for Helsinki, again carrying the hopes of all Irish schools as they attempt to make it an almost impossible three in a row. However, the students, parents and teaching staff of St. Augustines have regularly found in the past that the impossible can relatively easily be achieved at Duckspool, it is only miracles which take a little longer.

College Principal, Fr. Pat Moran is proud that his students are again carrying the Irish banner in this prestigious competition. "They have a hard act to follow in the two former College teams," he says, "but I have every confidence that they will discharge all their responsibilities well. Whether they win or otherwise, I know that they will maintain the highest standards of sportsmanship, courtesy and good humour, being the best ambassadors for our country. It is an opportunity of a lifetime for them and I have no doubt that the experience they will gain from this trip will stay with them for life."

By any standards, this is a major task for Fr. Moran's charges, but under the guidance of their inimitable coach, Br. Patrick Lennon they

should be capable of meeting the challenge of the other seven Euro-Colleges head-on. This is not a competition for experts, or for one-sport athletes, but demands a commitment from the twenty-strong team across a wide range of disciplines. In the arena of Superschools, the all-rounder is monarch.

"This is an unusual type of competition," says Br. Lennon, "and one which it is difficult to predict. The success or otherwise of the team depends on consistency and their range of talents, but I would be confident our girls and boys can turn in a performance of which we all can be proud."

He will not commit himself regarding a prediction, but with the measure of preparation and his long track-record in motivating athletes, we can be confident that all his team members will give one hundred percent. With eight teams competing from seven countries, the schools from Finland, England, France, Scotland, Sweden and Wales will be looking a little more cautiously at their most westerly neighbours and St. Augustine's will surely be starting as favourites. Certainly, they will be treated with respect and if the careful selection process which is the forte of Br. Patrick,

the rigorous training sessions through which he put his team and the motivation which he has instilled in them count for anything, then Dungarvan might well see the title 'come back to Erin' for the third time.

The Dungarvan College has been glad to carry the Irish flag into this competition twice before, the first being in Wales in 1997, when they were selected by the Department of Education on the basis of their all-round performance in Irish Colleges sport, not least their winning the prestigious College of Science Cup on five occasions and All-Ireland titles in a wide range of disciplines.

That they were a co-educational school was also a factor and that in a short few years their girls had also taken part in All-Ireland finals in several sports being Athletics Champions on two occasions.

The inaugural SuperSchools Competition had been held in Bourbourg in France in 1995 and immediately, the winners of that competition, Pen y dre High School agreed to host the event the following year. There, St. Augustine's took on and beat all opposition and as champions, had the option of hosting the games in 1998. Their only hesitation was cost, as the final bill for the event could reach as high as £100,000. Through generous donations, little enough official assistance and a programme of ingenious fund-raising, they managed to host the event two years ago and it was acknowledged by all present as an organisational and administrative triumph for the school authorities.

Now the St. Augustine's students set out for Finland with high hopes and the knowledge that they are following in the successful footsteps of their predecessors. When they return on Friday evening, with or without the overall

trophy, they will have the satisfaction of knowing that they have competed with the best and have at least held their own.

It will prove as important a part of their education as Junior or Leaving Cert and may well start them on a particular course they might not otherwise have chosen. In a recent interview, Fr. Moran spoke of his philosophy in regard to sport.

"In our school, I have seen students do well in disciplines other than the classroom and I have seen how much it has encouraged their overall performance. If we can improve the whole person, then we have produced balanced individuals, who will be better able to fit in, in whatever slot they find in life." This goes as much for those on the daily playing fields of Duckspool, as for those who compete at the very highest levels, but there is no doubt that combined with the travel involved, the participation of this team at Superschools level is a rare privilege indeed.

Sports included in the competition are swimming, badminton, athletics, relay, long-jump, high-jump and shot-putt, with separate competitions for both boys and girls. With just ten boys and ten girls from each college competing, skills have to extend from water-sports to track and field to indoor games, a combination which would suit only a handful in any college.

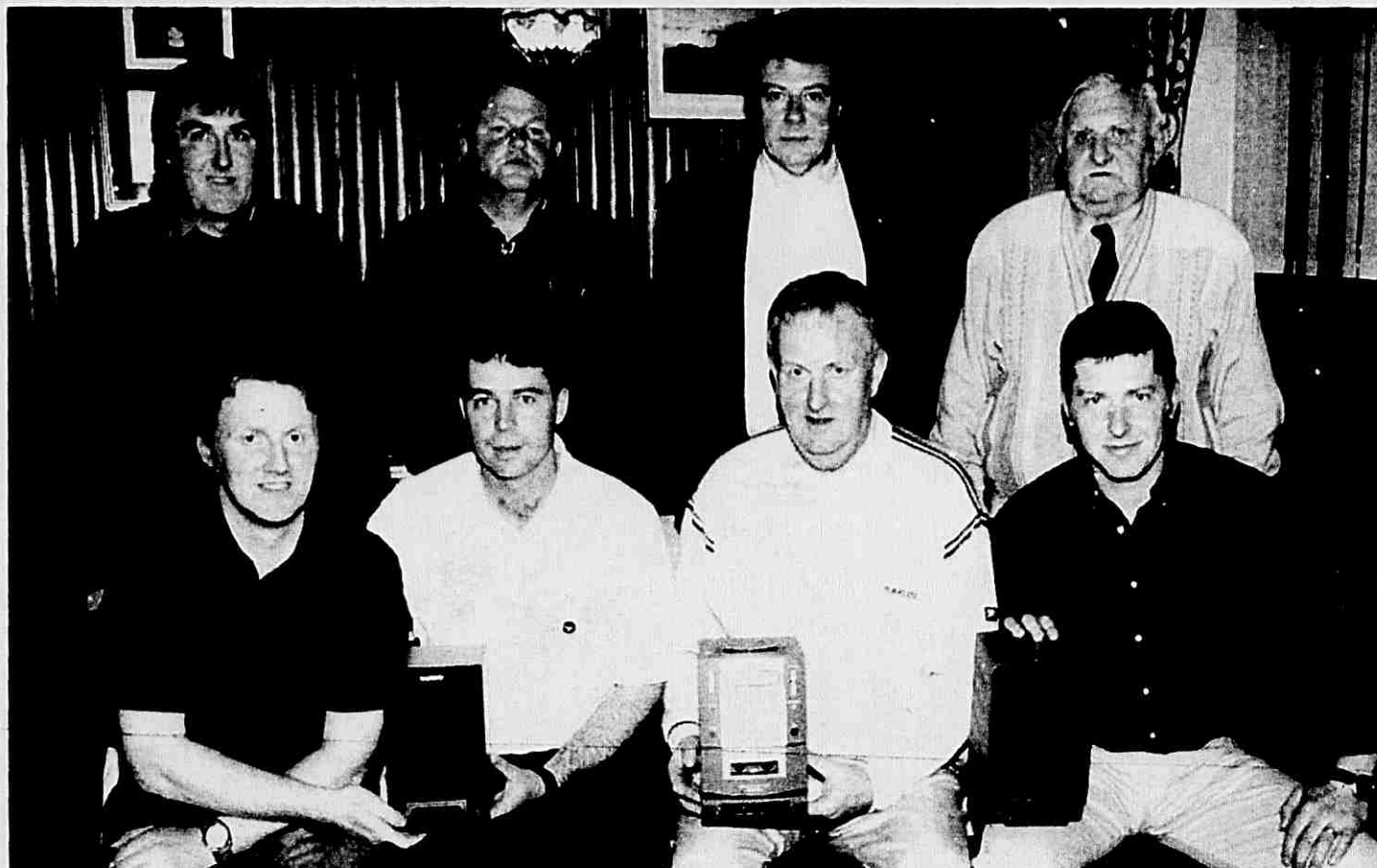

# Senior and Junior Football Championships Against Clare in Ennis

## Waterford Are Outsiders In Both

But this does not by any means say that they are travelling the long journey across the Shannon River as no hoppers. All credit to the selection committee who have openly declared that despite Clare's high profile in the championship, Waterford players have trained with the intention of defeating the Bannermen in their own back yard.

The junior footballers, who are setting out in defence of their All Ireland title, which was won in a blaze of glory last year, cannot field any member of last year's team, but after that they can play their second best team.

Very little is known about the group of players from which the team will be selected, but team manager John Kiely did speak with a degree of confidence that he has quite a good amount of talent available and will field a side

who can put up a very strong challenge to Clare whom we defeated by 0-9 to 0-7 in a tight Munster final last year.

The matter of getting a panel together presented problems, as players were tied up with club fixtures and three or four are committed to the senior hurlers. Yet, manager John Kiely does have the services of an experienced group of very well known players, which includes Alan Power, who will almost certainly operate at full back and Clashmore's Michael Fenton who may be the choice for the centre half back position.

In the same year we went to Ennis for the league and defeated them there. Two years later Clare were Munster senior football champions and pushed mighty Dublin all the way in the All Ireland semi-final. Of course that was at the start of the 'nineties and practically all of the players involved then have now moved away from the intercounty scene.

Since then also, Clare have made far better progress than we have and can be rated a grade above Waterford, as they are in the national league. There seems to be a gradual change on the Munster scene and where we talked about the two and the four, we now begin to think in terms of the three and the three as Clare are moving closer and closer to Kerry and Cork all the time.

It is equally true to say that a measurable improvement is taking place here in Waterford

and the positive signs of this were seen in the national league this year. Our performances against Cavan, Monaghan, Laois, Carlow and a few others were very encouraging and gave an indication

that things are moving in the right direction.

There has been an excellent response to training and all the selected players are reporting fit. I have also been told that the players are eagerly look-

ing forward to the challenge and are in no way overawed by the reputations of their opponents. This means that their attitude is right and this may prove a big factor in our favour.

# Minor Footballers Defeat Limerick At Fraher Field

Although it was a very sporting contest, it was, nevertheless, a foul-ridden game between two sides fully bent on getting through to the provincial semi-final and qualifying for the final of the Round Robin tournament.

Waterford, even though quite wasteful, were clearly the better team and fully deserved to qualify for a meeting with Kerry in the semi-final in Dungarvan and a play-off with Clare which was scheduled for May 11th, but which is likely to be changed to May 14th and played with the senior and junior championship games at Ennis on next Sunday.

The standard was rather mediocre because the match lacked continuity due to the large number of frees awarded. Also there were many

fouls not penalised. We were awarded 23 and Limerick got 18. We shot 11 wides in the match and Limerick (who had no wide in the first half) had only 4 wides. This alone illustrated the amount of control which we enjoyed in the match.

It might also be said that the Limerick goalkeeper stood between his team and a huge defeat as on no less than three or four occasions he executed spectacular saves. Two of these happened in the 23rd minute when Danny Fitzgerald made wonder saves from

0-7 to 0-4. Waterford shot 7 wides and Limerick had no first half wide.

### SECOND HALF

Limerick opened with a flurry and points by substitute R. Hannon and Eoin Kennedy had them within a point of Waterford after only 4 minutes. Gradually Waterford regained control and with points by Eoigean Walsh, Paul Power and Adam O'Loughlin we were back in the driving seat. Then in the concluding 8 minutes we saw 3 goals being scored — the first by Philip Beausang, the next by Eoin Kennedy for Limerick and lastly a penalty shot by Eoigean Walsh in the 58th minute, after which the match

died as a contest, to leave us clear and deserving winners.

There was no man-of-the-match award, but if there was, then corner back Martin Crotty would have been a winner.

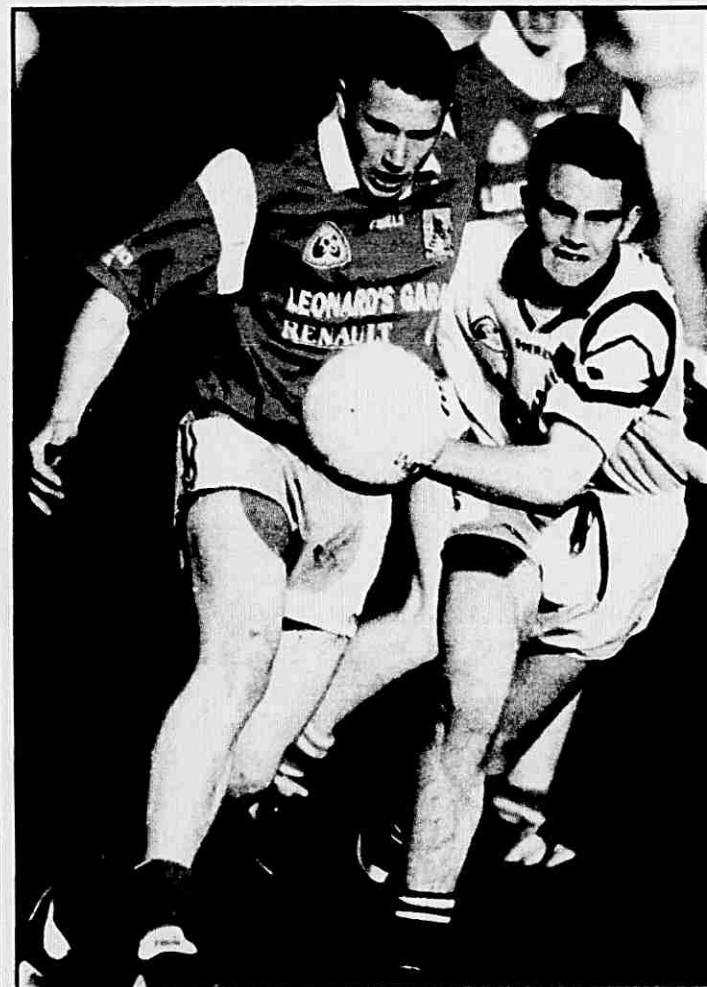
After the game, the county board chairman, P. S. O Riain, in congratulating the players, paid tribute to the selectors whose endeavours are now being rewarded with success.

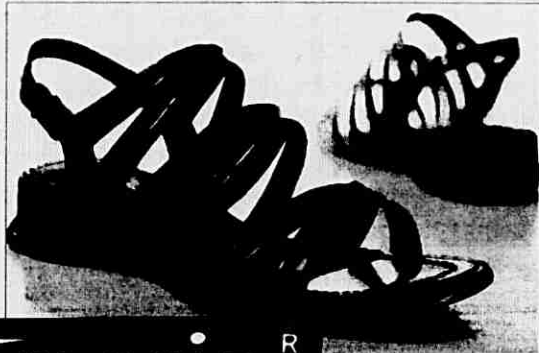
