Cappoquin Delegation To Meet With A.I.B.

Following last week's shock announcement of the pending closure of the AIB sub-office in Cappoquin, a high powered delegation from the town are to meet with AIB officials this Thursday.

One of the delegation members is Waterford County Councillor Ollie Wilkinson who told the "Leader" that the delegation will look for a complete reversal of the bank's decision to close the Cappoquin branch on June

16th

Cllr. Wilkinson who is Chairman of the Cappoquin Community Development Company, said there is a lot of anger in the town over the bank's decision to close the local sub-office.

"We know it's a very busy bank and we believe it's very profitable", he stated. "No logical decision has been given by AIB for the closure".

A public meeting was held in the town last week where residents met to voice their disappointment and anger at the bank's decision.


The meeting was held in the Parochial Hall on Thursday night organised by the Cappoquin Development Company and chaired by Cllr. Wilkinson

Over 200 people attended the meeting including representatives of various organisations, businesses, clubs and groups. The meeting also attracted national media attention in the form of RTE who aired some 12 minutes of the issue on the Morning Ireland programme.

Local County Councillor Nora Flynn who last week urged people to "speak with their feet", was away on Council business. Her apologies however were not relayed to the meeting.

The majority of AIB customers expressed their anger at the bank's decision to close the local outlet and move all accounts to the Lismore branch.

Deasy Raises Waterford Foods & Avonmore Merger

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy tabled a question in the Dail recently asking the Minister for Agriculture if he has satisfied himself with the present structure of the milk processing industry. In particular, Deputy Deasy asked if the Minister has satisfied himself that the merger of the two companies Waterford Foods and Avonmore is in the best interests of the industry.


In reply, Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh said it is generally accepted that in order to respond to the increasingly competitive environment on the EU and world markets, further rationalisation in the dairy processing industry is essential.

The Minister admitted that mergers of particular companies, including Waterford Foods and Avonmore may give rise to certain initial difficulties. However he said this does not take away from the overall view that the dairy sector will be best served by an industry structure which has the strength and capacity to match that of major competitors and meet the challenges which lie ahead.

He added that the process of rationalisation is well advanced amongst Ireland's competitors. In Holland two companies handle 85% of their country's output; in New Zealand two companies handle over 90% while in Denmark one company handles 87% of its output.

Commenting on the Minister's response, Deputy Deasy said it was regrettable that the Minister did not address Glanbia's problems in some detail.

"In particular, it would be interesting to know if he and the other relevant Government Ministers feel that shareholders in Waterford Foods were misled at the time of the merger," he added.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question: I am separated with two sons aged 18 and 16. 1 get One-Parent Family Payment- and until last year I have been getting the Back to School Clothing Allowance. Can I still claim the allowance for my son now he is in college?

Answer: The Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance is a special payment to assist with the costs of children's school uniforms and footwear at the beginning of the school year. It may be claimed for a child aged 18-22 in full-time education for whom a child dependent allowance is payable.

Families claiming a social welfare or Health Board payment are eligible for this scheme if their income is below certain thresholds. For example the weekly income limit for a one parent family with two child dependents is £ 128.10.

The payments have been increased this year to £63 for each child aged 2-11 and £78 for each child aged 12-17. The payment for a child aged 18-22 in full time education for whom a Child Dependent Allowance is payable is £78.

Those taking part in a Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme (VTOS) or in receipt of Back to Education Allowance or in receipt of an area allowance in a Partnership area are also eligible. The allowance is also available to people on Community Employment, Back to Work Allowance, and Revenue Job Assist who retain their secondary benefits.

The Scheme runs from 1st June to 30th September and is administered by the Health Board as part of the Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme. Families should apply to the Community Welfare Officer at their local health centre.

ANIMALS AND PEOPLE

Evidence from fossils, our own body structure and our genes shows that humans evolved as part of the living world. About two or three million years ago, our very distant ape-like ancestors lived in Africa, hunting animals for meat, and gathering fruits and other plant parts for foods.

Our world is now very different. We have clothes, computers, cars and other marvellous inventions. Yet we still rely on animals. We use domesticated species for all kinds of work, such as carrying and pulling.

We enjoy the companionship of our tame pets. We appreciate the beauty, sights and sounds of wild creatures such as birds and insects. And billions of people depend on animals for food — whether from the wild or reared on farms.

WORKING ANIMALS

Machines such as trucks and tractors do heavy work and haulage in some countries. In other places, animals do this type of work. Llamas, horses, cattle, donkeys and even elephants can be pack animals, carrying heavy loads over rough ground. Horses, oxen, water buffaloes and elephants are used as draught animals, pulling ploughs, carts and carriages, or dragging logs. Sometimes, animals go where machines cannot. In cold places, dogs or reindeer pull sleds over bumpy snow and jagged ice. In the sandy desert, camels convey loads easily over the soft ground.



A number of these works will be performed in Lismore Cathedral on Sunday 17th June as part of the Lismore Bach Festival. Among Bach's most popular works are 'Jesu,

The concert on 17th June begins at 8 p.m. and is sponsored by Lismore Hotel and financially supported by Waterford County Council Art Grants Scheme 2000. The admission fee is £6 (concession £5) and tickets can be obtained from Lismore heritage Centre tel. (058) 54975 and at the door on the evening of the concert.

As Bach composed mainly for the church, a special service will be held in Lismore Cathedral next Sunday at 11.30 In this service the Dean of Lismore, the Very Revd. William Beare and the alto Pauline Frizelle will sing sacred arias and songs by Bach. Cathedral organist and choirmaster Jan van Putten will play organ music by Bach (Prelude in E minor and Komm Gott, Schopfer, Heiliger Geist) and by the North German organist Dietrich Buxtehude by whom the young Bach was greatly inspired. 



Government **Grants For** Ring Roads

The Gaeltacht area of Ring is to benefit from an allocation of almost £9,000 as announced last week by the Minister of State at the Department of Arts, Heritage, Gaeltacht and the Islands, Eamon O Cuív.

Minister of State O Cuív said he was pleased to be in a position to provide this money as it is his intention to ensure that adequate access is provided to every house in the Gaeltacht.



A Taste Of The Pacific With Marinated Fish

IN the Pacific, Tahiti is the home of raw fish, or poisson cru. Follow the recipe below for a tasty way to prepare raw fish in a traditional way.

Ingredients:



Dust the pork cubes with the flour, then add those to the skillet as well. Brown the pork cubes over a high heat, turning them so that they brown evenly. Pour in the beef broth and stir up any browned bits in the skillet.

Add the tomato paste, soy sauce, lemon juice and two 15ml spoons of chutney. Stir the mixture well. Cover the skillet and simmer for 10 minutes. The mixture will thicken remove the smashed garlic and discard. Stir in the pineapple.

Season to taste with salt and pepper. Cover and simmer for another five minutes. Serve over hot cooked rice or pasta.


Bake in a moderately slow oven for 20 minutes at 160 degrees C (325 degrees F), covering with brown paper if tops begin to brown.

How To Plant A Butterfly Border

Butterflies make a lovely ornament in a garden, and creating a butterfly garden is fun for the gardener and rewarding for the but-

Butterflies have a few simple needs: food, water, and shelter.

Food has to be available for the adult butterflies, which sip nectar, and for their caterpillar offspring, who eat specific plants.

Caterpillars are really picky about what they eat. Butterflies lay their eggs on the appropriate plants, so if you want butterflies in your garden, you will have to put up with caterpillars munching on your plants from time to time.

Some species of butterfly larvae (caterpillars) only eat one species of plant. A butterfly book or insect guide will list the various host plants. Generally, caterpillars like parsley, carrots, dill and beans.

Butterflies travel from flower to flower in the garden, eating the nectar found inside the flower, so try and grow flowers that make lots of sweet nectar for them to

They are usually attracted to purple, yellow or orange coloured blooms.



Butterfly Garden: Beautiful butterflies are attracted to purple, orange and yellow flowers.

Experts have found that they like Rudbeckia, Joe-Pye weed, Aster, Butterfly Weed, Liatris, Coreopsis, Purple Coneflower, Zinnias, Hollyhocks, Marigolds, Nasturtiums, Violets, Asters, Butterfly bushes and Lilacs. But gen-

erally, any flower with short petals or flat tops as they are easy to land on. Most flowering herbs are also popular with butterflies.

Like all creatures, butterflies reguire water. They also need the minerals and nutrients they get from mud and muddy water. If you don't have a naturally wet or boggy area, water the same spot in the garden every day to create a small puddle

Butterflies are most active in morning and afternoon before it gets hot. Since their enemies,

such as birds, are active during the same time, butterflies need the shelter of shrubby plants where they can take refuge. They also like to sit on large, flat stones where they can enjoy the

beautiful creatures, they are still insects, so don't go over the top on the chemicals in the garden.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN Repot **Auriculas**

If you grow auriculas in ,now is he time to repot them. Shake the old soil from the roots and make certain these have no woolly aphid on them. If it is present wash the roots in a solution of derris or HCH, then repot either in 9 or 10 cm pots, reducing the size of the plants if necessary. Use a compost of four parts of loam, one part of dried cow manure, one part of leaf mould and one part of mixed sand and crushed oyster shell. Pot firmly, water freely and place in a frame or sheltered place outdoors. You can remove offsets with roots if you wish and pot them separately.

Divide Auriculas, polyanthuses and primroses

These plants growing in the open may be lifted and divided if they are good selected varieties. With ordinary mixed strains it is better to raise a new stock each year from seed, as the old plants get weakened by attacks from greenfly, red spider mite and other pests.

Dig early potatoes

Potatoes planted at the end of February will probably be ready for digging. Lift one or two roots and see what kind of a crop there is. There is no point in waiting for the tubers to mature. So long as they are big enough to be used, lift them, but only as you actually need them. It is a mistake to dig too many early potatoes at once for they lose quality rapidly out of the

Start to thin apples and pears

You will now be able to see how many fruits have been formed on your apple and pear trees. It is no use leaving too many - they will be misshapen, small and poor in quality. Usually one per spur is enough, and two should be regarded as the maximum. If there are more than this the weakest or least satisfactory will have to be removed. You can begin to do this now, but do not complete the work yet for there is usually a fairly heavy natural fall later in the month.

Plans To Relocate Dungarvan **Welfare Office**

The Community Welfare Offices at Mary Street, Dungarvan are to be relocated by the South Eastern Health Board to St. Joseph's Hospital. At present the local Welfare Office is separate from other Community Care Services located at the Dungarvan Hospital.

According to Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy the current premises are completely unsuitable and he hoped that a new office would be sited in another central location in the town. However the Minister for Health, Brian Cowen said the Health Board plans to incorporate the Community Welfare offices within the proposed upgrading at St. Joseph's Hospital where it will be integrated with other community care services. The project will be funded under the National Development Plan.

Commenting on the relocation, Deputy Deasy said St. Joseph's Hospital is 'quite a bit remote' from Abbeyside and the eastern end of the town. He added that the proposed move does not live up to the expectations of the reply he was given in the Dail last year when the Minister said the Health Board was also considering the establishment of an out-reach Community Welfare Officer clinic in the town centre.

Call For Public Ownership Of Rezoned Land

for all newly zoned building land to be taken into public or the National Housing Authorownership to has been backed by a member of Waterford windfalls to develope County Council. Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, speaking at the Waterford constituency Labour convention in Kilmacthomas on Thursday June 1st, said the measures contained in his party's forthcoming Dáil private members bill would bring house prices under control, allow for better planning and more public housing and prevent windfall profits accruing to developers.








Abbeyside THE PACT

Last week we wrote about Michael Collins visit to Dungarvan. Soon after this time the elections for the Irish Parliament were coming on, and the intensity of the division among the people made it absolutely certain that no elections could be held. It was feared that around the polling booths there would be warfare and with an army armed on both sides people shuddered to contemplate what would happen.

It was evident in the existing state of things that the elections would not be an indication of the real feeling of the country, for timid people would not venture to face the polling booths in view of the existing strife. In these circumstances a pact was entered into between Michael Collins and De Valera by which the existing representatives would be supported for election, so that the Dail would be much the same as before the dissolution.

Both sides pledged themselves to support this pact, and while many viewed the arrangement with disfavour, it was conceded that it was the best that could be done for the purpose of securing an election that would be free from blood-

OTHER CANDIDATES

But there was one article in the pact which made an essential difference. It was "that each and every interest was free to come forward for election" and taking advantage of this clause, in many places farmers announced their intention of coming forward as candidates, and the Labour Party proposed also a number of candidates, so that in many constituencies the Pact did not work, for still there was opposition.

In one instance, that of Mr. Godfrey Greene, a farmer living near Carrick, because of his coming forward for election he was attacked, shots fired into his house, while he from inside returned the fire. In the encounter Mr. Green was so severely wounded he was obliged to desit from his canditure. Similar cases of intimidation were reported from different parts of the country.

The elections were carried on peacefully. There was no disturbance anywhere and this was an agreeable surprise.

RESULTS

For the County Waterford the members elected were Dr. White (Treaty), Cathal Brugha (Republican). Messrs. Sean Butler and T. Phelan (Labour). The voting was on the proportional representation principle, the general result through the country being that the Treaty Party were augmented in strength, as a preponderance was recorded in their favour.

CATTLE

BREEDING

- Continue to check the performance of the bull.
- Record cows that are seen in heat and observe for repeats.
- Quality replacements are scarce and expensive. Consider using AI on your best cows to produce some of your replacements.
- Late calvers can be compacted by separation of calves from cows at about 30 days of age and allow restricted suckling once or twice per day. Normal ad lib suckling can be resumed when cows are served.
- If using AI only, it is essential to use every convenient technique to improve heat detection and reduce the trouble in getting cows into the yard for Al.
- Use a few light steers plus tail painting.
- Make sure any early born bull calves are with the late
- calving cows still to come in heat. Observe cows early in the morning and late in the evening and at least once in between.
- Look out for signs of heat when herding.
- A clear slime indicates the cow is about to come in heat.
- A blood slime may mean the cow has been in heat.
- Keep a breeding notebook of your observations. GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT
- A full supply of leafy grass daily can give 1 kg per day liveweight gain on cattle from now until early September.
- This level of performance is not easily achieved but it is the cheapest gain available and leaves you well ahead going into the autumn and winter.
- If you have no surplus grass now or are slightly scarce there should be no trouble with stemmy pasture for the next few weeks.
- Give the best grass to the yearling and finishing cattle.
- Don't force them to graze too bare (less than 7 cm (2*"). the suckler cows to clean up stemmy paddocks occasionally or top down to 5 cm during June and put in cows to graze the clippings.
- Walk paddocks weekly and do an assessment of grass supply and growth rates.
- Too much grass, (more than 20 days grazing ahead of stock): take out some paddock for bales of silage or hay.
- Too little grass, (less than 10 days ahead of stock): try to slow the rotation and spread nitrogen.

Every 1,000 gallons is worth £25-£30 when fed to cows or £14 when applied as a fertiliser. It is your responsibility!

We have been doing some lamb weighings on farms to get a measure of lamb thrive. So far, on most farms, the performance is good. The following table from one farm, shows the kind of information we are getting.

After just 7 weeks, you can see (i) the big variation in growth rate of individual lambs (ii) the huge difference between singles and ins. Obviously the single lambs will reach sale What about the twin lambs? Growth rate is just about alright and would need to stay at a minimum of 250 grams/day over the next 45 days to reach 30 kgs average by 100 days. Quality grass 6 ?9 cm in height will achieve this but a check on the weights should be made again around June 6th.

The big variation in growth rate between lambs is very clear. A lot of this is down to the amount of milk from the mothers. Now is the time to select your ewe lamb replacements? select the ones with the

ICMSA WARNING ON CPO's

The ICMSA President has stated that his organisation will defend in full the Constitutional right of farmers to private property. He said that he was shocked that the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Dempsey, had given the impression recently that Local Authorities could acquire land by CPO below it's full actual market value.

Mr. O'Rourke said that calls from ICTU about the use of the CPO would be ridiculous if they were not so serious. The Constitutional protection of the rights to private property is the bedrock of our society and our economy and applies to every citizen, be he/she an industrialist, shopkeeper, farmer or trade unionist.

The Constitution has always provided for a Compulsory Purchase Order system to be exercised by the Government for the common good provided always that full compensation, based on open market valuation, is paid.

ICMSA will not allow any legislation to go unchallenged in the Courts if any attempt is made to change any part of this principle of Irish Constitutional Law.

Mr. O'Rourke continued that his organisation has constructive working relationships with Local Authorities and other public bodies such as Bord Gais on the acquisition of land or rights over land.

Finally, Mr. O'Rourke said that he would be seeking to-day clarification from the Taoiseach in the context of the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness.

IFA Confident Target of 70,000 Farmers With Environmental Contracts Will Be Met

Speaking following the presentation of the ESB/IFA Millennium Farm Landscape Initiative Awards IFA County Chairman Gerald Curran said "The joint ESB/IFA initiative has provided farmers and rural dwellers with a unique opportunity to participate in a major national project to improve the appearance of the Irish countryside and mark the Millennium for future generations".

Mr. Curran congratulated the County winners Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Carroll, Portlaw and Mr. and Mrs. Eamon Walsh, Cappagh and the Regional winners Claire Blake, Imelda Newman and Joan Rayel, Castlecove Munster Regional winners on their achievement in this major Millennium initiative which was launched by the IFA in late 1998 to encourage farmers and rural dwellers to mark the Millennium on their properties for generations to come by undertaking a project to enhance the farm landscape. Kindly sponsored by the ESB a prize fund of £50,000 will be awarded with

Speaking following the pre- a top national prize of entation of the ESB/IFA Mil- £12,000.

"The success of this project can be judged from the level of participation with nearly 1,500 entrants throughout the country. The standard of the entries has been extremely high showing the level of commitment among farmers to enhancing our environment and improving the farm land-scape".

Pointing out the commitment of farmers to environmental protection, Mr. Curran highlighted the success of the Rural Environment Protection Scheme where farmers enter contracts with the Government and EU to farm in an environmentally sensitive and sustainable way. He said, "The Government's 1997 target of 30% of farmers participating in REPS has been exceeded with almost 50,000 farmers now participating in REPS. I am confident that the new National Development Plan target of 70,000 farmers within the next 5 years will also be met".

"Furthermore, over 115,000 farmers are now practising extensive livestock farming under EU rules introduced as part of the Agenda 2000 reform of the Common Agricultural Policy. This is by far the highest rate of extensive farming in Europe and ensures the future protection of our uniquely attractive green countryside".

Mr. Curran said that while society as a whole is grappling with a serious litter problem farmers and industry have uniquely collaborated, with the support of Minister Dempsey, on a waste plastics collection and recycling scheme which, this year, will remove over 6,000 tonnes of waste farm plastic from the rural environment. This Scheme is unique in Europe and presents a recycling model for the wider community to follow.

While acknowledging the environmental challenges that confront the farming community, the county chairman highlighted that farmers have clearly demonstrated their

commitment to environmental protection by upgrading farmyard storage facilities, with gross investments totalling over £1 billion in the last 10 years, including £400 million under the Farm Improvement Scheme, £400 million under the Control and Farmyard Pollution Scheme and further non grant aided investments of £300 million.

He added, "The success of this Millennium Farm Landscape project, together with these other initiatives are achievements which farmers can be proud of and demonstrates farmers' total commitment to a clean rural environment for the production of top quality Irish food. IFA as an organisation, is delighted to collaborate with the ESB and The Farmers' Journal on this important millennium initiative".

SLAUGHTER PREMIUM 2000

Minister Walsh has advised herdowners that a copy of the Slaughter Premium 2000, Helpsheet & Terms and Conditions is currently on its way to every registered herdowner in the country. Included in the mail will be a form entitled "Producer Acknowledgement". Any registered BTE Herdowner wishing to participate in the Slaughter Premium 2000 Scheme must complete this form and return it immediately to the Slaughter Premium Section, Department of Agriculture Food and Rural Development, Portlaoise.

The Minister points out that producers of animals slaughtered within Ireland or exported to third countries do not have to complete traditional application forms to receive Slaughtered Premium but must complete producers acknowledgement. He also advised that producers of animals exported for slaughter to Northern Ireland should defer completing applications for animals until further notice as the Department is developing an electronic transfer of data system which will be announced shortly.

DAIRY HERD CERTIFICATION

Speaking in the Dail recently on the subject of the on-farm certification of dairy herds, Minister Walsh emphasised that the Scheme is an important one for the industry as a whole and needs to be completed as quickly as possible. The Scheme was relaunched in May of last year following negotiations with all the parties involved and is now operating reasonably well. "While progress in having certification provided was slow to begin with, I am pleased to note that more recently there has been a significant upsurge in activity. I therefore have no proposals for the postponement of the 30th June deadline", stated Minister Walsh. He strongly urged producers to have the necessary certificate completed and submitted to their dairy/co-operative as soon as possible.

EARLIEST IMPLEMENTATION OF ON-FARM SCHEMES

Commenting on the Rural Development Plan 2000–2006 which was submitted to the European Commission in December last, Minister Walsh said his objective is to secure the earliest implementation of each measure, including the new REPS and Early Retirement schemes. The Commission have six months from the time of submission of the Plan to consider it. Formal negotiations on the Plan with the Commission are now well under way, though it is not possible to indicate at this stage when the Commission will be in a position to approve it. When the Plan is approved, the implementation of each measure will commence immediately.

Commenting specifically on the Scheme of Early Retirement from Farming, the Minister said that a very large number of applications for the existing Scheme were received at the end of last year because the closing date for entry to the Scheme was 31 December. The backlog of applications is being dealt with by local office staff and the Department is making every effort to expedite the processing of these applications. The Minister stressed that when the processing of an application is delayed in this way there is no financial loss to the retiring farmer. The operational procedures for the Scheme specifically ensure that the date of receipt in the Department of a valid application determines the date from which payment is made.

PROSPECTS FOR THE BEEF INDUSTRY Speaking about the prospects for the Irish beef industry, Minister Walsh pointed out that while we have built up cattle numbers to record levels, the huge increase in numbers has been accompanied by a marked deterioration in the grades of our beef cattle as measured against the EUROP Grid. "I want to make it clear that I am not saying that Irish beef is of inferior quality in terms of food safety or eatibility. What I am saying is that the majority of Irish cattle do not meet the requirements of premium customers in the European Union in relation to fat cover and conformation. These are aspects which can and, indeed, must be overcome through better breeding and husbandry practices and the payment of appropriate price differentials by processors. Indeed, these areas are already being addressed by Teagasc, the Irish Cattle Breeding Federation and within the Beef Task Force Monitoring Group".

The Minister said while some progress has been made in the last six months, a substantial gap remains between Irish and EU prices. It will be difficult to narrow this gap further unless the Irish beef industry reduces its dependence on third country markets. While third country markets will always remain important, they are vulnerable to changes in export refunds in the dollar/euro exchange rate. In addition, subsidised exports to third countries will continue to come under pressure from the WTO. The EU beef market is expected to be relatively balanced over the next few years and the Minister urged the beef industry to avail of this last real opportunity to gain a firm foothold in European markets in advance of further enlargement.

Department Still Examining Kilmac' College Extension

The long awaited extension project at St. Declan's Community College, Kilmacthomas is currently progressing through architectural planning. That's according to the Minister for Education Michael Woods. He said a revised submission for stages 4 and five of the project which involves a detailed design of the extension and bill of quantities, has been received by his Department and is currently under consideration.

Minister Woods said the question of proceeding to tender will be considered when this submission has been examined fully.

Meanwhile Waterford Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea who recently raised the matter in the Dáil, said he and Waterford County Councillor Ger Barron will be continuing to pursue the earliest possible commencement of the construction of the much needed extension project to St. Declan's College.

ENVIRONMENT TODAY

River Water Quality in County Waterford, 1999

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) was established in 1993 and it has a wide range of statutory duties and powers. It's main responsibilities include the licensing and regulation of activities with significant polluting potential.

Presently, the EPA has a network of regional laboratories which monitor water quality throughout Ireland.

In 1999, the EPA monitored 32 rivers in Co. Waterford. Details of the findings on the rivers monitored are given in the 1999 Annual Report, where the river sampling stations are divided into three groups, as follows;

1. Generally Satisfactory Quality.

2. Slight to Moderate Pollution at times.

3. Serious Pollution at times.

There are some 92 sampling stations in County Waterford and during 1999, 70 of these were generally satisfactory and 13 were moderately polluted at times. Only 1 sampling point, on the river Suir, was seriously polluted and this was at Kilsheelan bridge where there was a high dissolved oxygen (DO) content.

Dissolved Oxygen is the amount of oxygen in the water and is essential for the survival of fish and aquatic life. It is also an excellent indicator of pollution in rivers. High levels of DO indicate that there is a presence of excessive plant life which results in too much oxygen in the water by day and too little by night. Eventually, these alternating conditions result in fish kills

The main sources of pollution in our rivers are agricultural effluents, particularly slurry and effluents from silage pits. Other sources include untreated or inadequately treated industrial effluents or municipal sewage.

All of these reports, are available to the public, in the Environment Section, Civic Offices, Dungarvan.

LANDFILL

Q. Traditionally, County Council dumps are awful places with litter, vermin, smells, birds and other nuisances. What guarantees can the Council give that this landfill won't be the same as of old?

A. The new landfill will be subject to rigorous control by the EPA and will not be granted a licence unless provision has been made for dealing with all the nuisances listed. Certain measures will have to be taken when depositing waste in the landfill. These are as follows; The waste will have to be deposited and compacted thoroughly with a landfill compactor. Each day waste will have to be covered with cover material. This material can be pit-run gravel, hessian, clay or a plastic medium. The fact that the landfill is covered daily discourages the production of odour and flies. It also suppresses litter and makes the landfill unattractive to birds because their food source has been eliminated.

In addition to compaction and covering vermin and flies will be controlled regularly by the application of fly sprays and rat bait at regular intervals. Bird scaring techniques will be used to scare off birds such as raptors (falconry) and many other bird control techniques.

The present proposal is that leachate, which is produced in the rubbish as it decays, will be controlled and collected on site for transportation off-site and disposal at a sewage treatment plant. A final decision on this will be made as part of the detailed design.

Methane gas will be controlled on site by proper venting, subsequent flaring and, if quantities generated warrant it, exploitation as an energy source.

Dust will be controlled by ensuring dust-free roads and by providing a water-tanker on site during dry periods which will spray water onto site roads.

Noise will be controlled by fitting muffling devices on all machinery and byZ attenuation through the screening belt of trees around the landfill.

A.I.B. BANK CLOSURE

On Thursday last a public meeting arranged by the Cappoquin Development Company was held in the CYMS Hall in Cappoquin. The packed meeting was called to discuss and plan to reverse A.I.B. bank's decision to close its bank in Cappoquin. Mr. Ollie Wilkinson M.C. chaired the meeting. He welcomed all present and outlined the present situation with the imminent closure of the Cappoquin A.I.B. Branch.

He outlined the facts that A.I.B. bank were providing an ex-

cellent service and a great help to Cappoquin Development Company. Ollie went on to say he was inundated with people contacting him complaining most strongly of what was felt to be a disaster for the area. He also stressed that A.I.B. had given no reason for the branch closure on June 16th but the bank had agreed to meet a delegation of people from the Cappoquin area to discuss the closure, he then asked for views from the floor.

From the outset people speaking from the floor were highly critical of A.I.B. Bank with bank bashing the order of the evening. It was suggested that the future for both banks in Cappoquin was slim as what one would do, history dictated the other would follow. People representing the widows association, spoke of their absolute disgust of this decision, highlighting the fact that 95% of senior citizens have no means of transport but will now be forced to travel to at least Lismore. Fr. Arthure P.P. expressed dismay at the lack of notice from A.I.B. of the closure highlighting also the fact that if you're in Lower Main St. on a Friday morning and blinked, you would miss the public transport passing.

Delegates from the different sports organisations also expressed a pessimistic view. With the Cappoquin Salmon & Trout Angling Association spending up to a quarter of a million on a fishing development at Cappoquin to attract thousands of anglers who then will have to leave the area for banking facilities.

Many spoke of the fact that Cappoquin was never going so well with huge housing developments under way and more planned. One delegate, in particular, described it as a red letter day and a test for the Cappoquin people. If the bank branch closed business, tourism and housing developments would be greatly restricted. A number of delegates spoke of the moral obligation of A.I.B. Bank to the Cappoquin area. The bank also came in for criticism for not representing themselves at this meeting even though they were invited to. Also, while A.I.B. bank enjoyed unprecedented profits, they were closing profitable branches.

Mr. Wilkinson praised all who spoke in a constructive manner. It was decided to pick a delegation to meet A.I.B. bank. The elected delegates would report back to the Development Company of their progress and everyone in the meeting wished them will.

Also, at the meeting were many people from the press including R.T.E.'s Morning Ireland Programme. On Friday morning a full report of the meeting held in Cappoquin including interviews were broadcasted. Once again, A.I.B. bank refused to send a representative to this programme and gave no reason for the bank closure only what has been described locally as a fudged statement.

Deasy Highlights Threat To Irish Wildlife

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy has expressed his deep concern over the many difficulties facing Irish wildlife. He has claimed that many indigenous species including the Skylark, Yellowhammer, Hen Harrier, the Barn Owl and even the Cuckoo are all becoming rare birds in Ireland. His facts were based on a recent report in the Sunday Times and again in the Irish Times titled: "Rare Birds Flying Swiftly To Extinction In Ireland".

Deputy Deasy made his comments during a debate in the Dail on the Wildlife Amendment Bill which is an amendment to the 1976 Wildlife Act.

"The situation has worsened considerably in the 24 years since I last spoke on this legislation with additional wildlife species becoming extinct and endangered", he stated.

Describing Co. Waterford as a mirror image of Ireland, Deputy Deasy said it contains two mountain ranges and a great deal of moorland and only one wildlife ranger to supervise it. Legislation, he added, is irrevelant if its provisions cannot be enforced.

"The Bill is not worth the paper it is written on unless its provisions can be implemented and that is not happening", he stated.

Continuing Deputy Deasy said that where there was all sorts of wildlife such as woodcocks, partridges and grouse, now there is nothing.

"If one walks to the top of the Comeragh Mountains one will not see any wildlife", he claimed.

A survey was conducted jointly by BirdWatch Ireland and the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds in Northern Ireland. They listed all the birds which are in danger of extinction such as the barn owl and the skylark. The combunting has already become extinct in this country while the number of yellowhammers has declined by 50% in recent years and the cuckoo is also under threat.



Cllr. Condemns Woeful Neglect of School Bus Fleet

Cllr. Mary Greene has described the level of investment in school buses as "woeful" saying that the state of the old and often dilapidated fleet is a disgrace. "The school bus fleet is old and lacking in investment and is afflicted by overcrowding and often dangerous conditions," says Cllr. Greene who is a secondary school teacher and Chairman of County Waterford Vocational Education Committee.

The situation is not the fault of CIE according to Councillor Greene who says that lack of funding by the Department of Education has led to the current position.

She says that the average age of the large school buses in the fleet (both CIE and private) is 17 years while CIE and the private contractors who operate the buses have only received a 3% increase in their allowances over the last 10 years.

"Overcrowding is the norm on school buses where the Department of Education consider it acceptable to seat three young people in seats designed for two passengers. This regularly leads to instances where buses with seats for 55 carry over 70 teenagers."

Cllr. Greene says that the time for action is now. "It will be too late to invest in the fleet if it only comes about as the result of a disaster or major accident."

Waterford Allocated £1,700 Millennium Award

The Wheelchair Association branch in Co. Waterford has been allocated an award of £1,700 for a county recognition event. At this event, a local person will be chosen from each decade of the century, ideally a person with a disability, but certainly a person who has contributed voluntarily to the whole Disability Movement. It is intended that ten Co. Waterford people will be presented with a bronze statuette of Cuchulain, the symbol of valour and heroism.





Shock Win For Roney Point

Finals often produce bizarre results and that's exactly what happened in the final of the Liam Flynn sponsored Harney's Bakery Marathon at Waterford track last Saturday night with victory going to the John Byrne owned and George Roche handled 6/1 outsider Roney Point. This September 98 son of Mustang Jack and Metric Penny hanging on for dear life to beat the hot favourite Class Nikita by the minimum distance in 41.77. While the winner glided by the early leader Feohanagh Flash out of the second bend the poorly drawn Class Nikita T6 found herself in all sorts of trouble at the rear of the field, working her way into contention up the inside rail the favourite made rapid late headway but the winning line came to the aid of Roney Point.

The four first round heats of the Smurfit Golden Jacket event produced some exciting fare.

Heat 1— The unbeaten No Blocks was a warm order here at 6/4 but after showing up well to the first corner he was clipped from behind by Korveya and lost his action as a result. Meanwhile the Sean Bourke and Pat Ryan owned Mustang Miller (Smooth Rumble-Mustang Annie) 6/4 to 2/1 pinched a second bend lead from Gaffers Peer to race on for a six lengths success over 10/1 outsider Korveya in 29.43. The winner is trained in Tipperary by

Dermot Ferncombe who boasts an excellent strike rate with runners at this venue.

Heat 2 — Local owners Jim Quinlan and Doni Ormonde were on the mark here courtesy of 6/4 favourite Quarrymount Rory (Staplers Jo - Ballinaboola Pol) who made all to oblige in 29.58. Going clear early on the winner had to be at his strongest in the closing stages to repel the flying finish of Mahout who tasted defeat by a neck in 29.58.

Heat 3 — Backed in from 7/4 to 1/1 Sean Dunphy's home bred Droopy's Graf (Top Honcho-Droopy's Fergie) made no mistake here with a convincing 29.26 victory. Powering her way into a first bend lead Droopys was never in any subsequent danger coasting to a five and a quarter lengths victory over the always well placed Moonveen Toby.

Heat 4 — Making his debut from trap one The Eddie Moore owned Captain Java (Lassa Java-Leave Them All) impressed all present with a pillar to post no nonsense 29.17 victory. The early paced Captain Java had this qualifier in the bag a long way from home bolting in five and a quarter lengths clear of 5/4 favourite Rightful Minx.

Racing opened with an all the way victory for 5/1 chance Tawny Beryl (Mustang Jack-Tawny Velvet) who led all the way in a career fastest 29.44. The result was never in doubt here as the early paced "Tawny" cruised to a three and a quarter lengths victory

The bookmakers were taking no chance with the James Goold owned and Bernard Goold trained Attykitt Hero (Ready About Nga-Hazy Shannon) in the second event over 550 yards and racing straight into the lead this 4/6 favourite enjoyed the proverbial solo up front romping to a seven and a quarter lengths success over Joannes Joy in a red hot 30.27.

For the second week in a row the Sink The Black syndicate owned and Ger O' Dwyer trained Light The Rocket (Top Honcho-Crossieigh Gabby) 2/1 hit the jackpot with a well deserved 29.33 victory. After a fast start Light The Rocket had her rivals snookered from an early stage and despite the constant presence of 6/4 favourite Tramore Lad Light The Rocket kept going in fine style to triumph by a length and three quarters.

Brenda Seymour's Mo Modra (Droopy's Fintan-Moonshine Jewel) must be one of the bookmakers favourite dogs to compete at this track. Whenever he is a warm order he always seems to get beaten but when he is a price he often clicks for the layers. 

Munster The depression which set in after our defeat by Tipperary in the Munster hurling championship certainly set a shadow of gloom over the entire county all last week with supporters etc. trying to come to terms with the situation which leaves us without a substantial contest until the national league commences next March. Championship Defeat

The comments by several top line hurling officials and media personnel has helped to expose what is described as the crazy structure on which the championships are designed.

Never before have I read so much outside concern about the plight of Waterford after losing this first round. Foremost among these was Nicky English who spoke about Waterford having trained with this game as their prime objective for six months and then go out for the year, after just 70 minutes. Most of the newspapers took up the point and are obviously in agreement that the system needs changing. After Limerick's 2-17 to 1-12 defeat by Cork at Thurles on Sunday, team manager Eamon Creegan did not hide his anger in a scathing attack on whoever is responsible for the bizarre situation which leaves Limerick without a game until next Spring. He described the national league as 'just a joke.'

Quite a lot of thought seems to have been given to the suggestion of Munster Council chairman, Sean Kelly who described the present situation as tragic and recommended a second chance for teams such as Waterford. He did wisely point out that just a puck of a ball, a wrong decision by referee or umpire, etc. could mean defeat for a county who had undergone 100 nights training. He suggested a double round a system which would have us play Tipperary again on last Sunday in the second leg. This would give a second chance

to Waterford, it would generate huge additional revenue and do an awful lot to promote the game of hurling. Presumably a double round arrangement would have a 'home and away condition attached in order that the competing counties (and not Pairc Ui Caoimh, etc. etc.) would be the beneficiaries. Having listened to views expressed on Sean Kelly's pro-

posal, I found a very big number of people in favour. However, a friend of mine also pointed out that there could be a negative side to this proposal. If, for instance, Waterford defeated Tipperary by 3 points, would we feel very happy about playing them again on the following Sunday and risk being defeated? It seems to be an idea which would suit the very strong counties.

However, a change of some kind is needed to give counties a second chance, like having first round losers play off for the right to play in the quarter final stages of the All Ireland. Such a system could encompass defeated first rounders of Leinster as well and ignore the provincial boundaries. There must be other

systems that could be tried. One thing I feel sure about is that a restructuring of some tried out before very long. Council will discuss the Sean Kelly proposal. Because of a Congress decision a new formula cannot be experimented with, but provincial councils do have the authority to introduce

And so the whole discussion goes on about our defeat by Tipperary with the different analysts giving a variety of reasons why and where the game was lost. High up on the list of reasons is the Ken McGrath factor. The brilliant Mount Sion forward contributed three great

Ken has become a hero this year and is now recognised as our outstanding player. The double fracture of his ankle which landed him in Ardkeen hospital and necessitated an operation on Tuesday attracted great media attention and had the family inundated with 'get-well' messages from Waterford people far and near. It is now unlikely that he will play again for the remainder of this year.




