

Strong Criticism Of Dungarvan's New Traffic Liahts "We looked for a pedestrian crossing and what we got was a monstrosity", he claimed.

The modern traffic light system recently installed by Dungarvan UDC at the main intersection in Grattan Square has been strongly criticised by members of the Urban Council.

One irate member even described the new system as a 'monstrosity' and urged that the Council admit that it has made a mistake.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said

he has received numerous complaints about the new system which has caused backlogs of traffic up Mary Street and along Mitchell Street with traffic queues also stretching from the Square along the Causeway. "We looked for a pedestrian crossing and what we got was a monstrosity", he claimed. "The Council should now be big about it and admit we made a mistake".

Cllr. O'Riordan said there are now so many traffic lights at the Mary Street/O'Connell Street intersection that drivers "don't know whether to stop or go".

Welcome For Speed Limit Review

Waterford County Council has undertaken a comprehensive review of speed limits for the county. The review recommends new speed limits for five areas, while nine areas are to get extensions or changes. Kilmacthomas Labour Councillor Ger Barron has welcomed the changes and in particular the news that Ballyduff lower, Ballylaneen and Fenor are to get 30 mph. speed limits. In his opinion, the present situation which allows motorists to speed through these villages must be changed in the interest of safety. "On a week when a new nationwide advertising campaign has been launched on the effects of speeding especially when young drivers are involved, this initiative by Waterford County Council is very welcome news indeed," he stated.

Council Making Good Progress On Housing

A progress report on housing issued by Waterford County Council has revealed that forty new local authority houses for West Waterford are currently at planning stage.

Fourteen of these houses will be constructed in Tallow, twelve in Lismore, four each in Leamybrien, Ardmore and Ballyduff Upper with two new houses planned for Touraneena.

Among the Council's housing schemes already under construction are four houses in Kilmacthomas which are scheduled for completion in October. Construction also started this month on two Council houses in Ring which are due to be completed in January of next year. The number of local authority houses completed last month was four while it is hoped that two more houses at Leamybrien will be completed by the end of next month.

Meanwhile eleven additional new houses (nine in Cappoquin and two in Stradbally) are also in the pipeline and are currently at the tender stage.

QUESTION

My husband and I have been working in London for a number of years. We are both from Ireland and now we are thinking of moving back there to live as we hear there are good employment opportunities. Where can we get more information about living in Ireland?

ANSWER

There is a very useful booklet called 'Returning to Ireland' which is published by Emigrant Advice and the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs. An updated edition has just been published and it contains essential information for people who are thinking of moving back to Ireland. It covers a range of topics such as accommodation, health care, getting a job, tax, education, social welfare and employment rights.

Eco-Tourism

The idea of eco-tourism is that people pay money to experience rare species in the wild - visit gorillas in their mountain home, stroke whales at sea, or feed sharks on a coral reef. The tourism is carefully controlled so that it affects the wildlife as little as possible,

POLLUTION

Vast areas are polluted by unnatural, artificial chemicals. Acid rain damages-trees and soil, gets into streams and ponds, and harms fish and other water creatures. Chemicals from industry and our own rubbish and refuse soak into the soil or poison water-ways. Intensive farming also pollutes land and water, with pesticides and concentrated fertilisers.



SETTING UP SANCTUARIES



National parks, wildlife reserves and nature sanctuaries conserve some wild places. People may be allowed into certain areas, to enjoy the scenery, plants and animals, while other areas are fully protected.

Such areas range from a small wood or pond to a vast area of land or sea, the size of a country. In 1994 the Southern Ocean around Antarctica was declared a huge sanctuary where the hunting of great whales and other threatened animals is

But sanctuaries must usually be large. A single tiger needs 50 sq. km. or more of forest to hunt in. And several dozen tigers are needed for a sustainable population that avoids the problems of inter-breeding among close relatives. So a small tiger reserve of a few hectares is less useful for the long term.

Waterford County Council is currently examining the possibility of laying a new water main to improve the water supply in Clonea and Ballinacourty.

Waterford Fine Gael Deputy Austin Deasy recently made representations to the Council concerning low water pressures

In reply, Eamonn Mansfield, senior executive engineer said the lower pressure in the Ballinacourty Clonea area occurs during high periods of demand in summer.

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What Progress On Provision Of Dungarvan Playground?

A member of Dungarvan UDC has said that the town's Development Plan, currently being reviewed, cannot be a credible document without providing for the construction of a basic community facility such as a children's playground.

Speaking to a monthly meeting of her Labour Party branch in Dungarvan, Cllr. Teresa Wright said she and countless

others in Dungarvan and Abbeyside regarded a playground as an essential facility for the benefit of over 1,500 children under the age of 12 in the urban area. Cllr. Wright said many people were saying to her that candidates who canvassed their votes in last year's local elections had given the impression that they were favourable to delivering on the issue and that it was now time for action. Cllr. Wright particularly noted that nearby Youghal had got their act together and provided a playground as a millennium project whereas Dungarvan continued to drag its feet. Cllr. Wright said it was wrong to be looking for as much money as possible to dredge Dungarvan harbour, to turn it into a maritime playground, whilst at the same time being miserly about providing a few thousand pounds to benefit the kids of the town.

Review Of Speed Limits Throughout County



A survey of all built-up areas in the county has been completed by Waterford County Council to establish the adequacy of existing speed limits and the request for additional limits to be introduced.

The review incorporates all existing speed limit areas, all towns and villages and all requests and submissions received from the elected Council members since the last speed limit review.

The results of the review were announced at last week's meeting of the Council where they were generally welcomed by members.

A 30 mph speed limit is proposed for Ballinroad, on each of the approach roads to the cross at the Church. The existing 40 mph limit on the Clonea Road at Dungarvan will be extended to just beyond the Friary junction. Elsewhere in Dungarvan a speed limit of 30 mph is to be introduced on the Clashmore road beyond the new McInerney estate.

Following repeated requests for a lower speed limit

through the village of Bally-macarbry, the Council proposes to change the limit from 40 mph to 30 mph.

Touraneena will also benefit from a speed limit of 30 mph while the existing speed limit on the N72 at Lismore will be extended to beyond the entrance to Green Road. The 30 mph limit will also be extended on Union Road to beyond the hospital.

In Ardmore, the existing 30 mph speed limit will be extended on the Youghal Road to a point west of the existing location.

This proposal arises because of the impending developments on the lands on the southern side of the road.

A speed limit of 30 mph will be introduced for the first time at Ballylaneen on the three roads leading to the church junction.




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

Goulash

A Hungarian dish made at home in your English kitchen.

Cooking time: 11/2 to 2

Ingredients:

(Serves 3-4) 450g lean beef lamb or pork, cubed 400g can chopped toma-

toes 300ml stock 150ml red wine

1 onion, sliced 2 x 15ml sp tomato pureé 1 x 15ml sp paprika

1 x 21/2ml sp caraway seeds

Dumplings:

100g self raising flour 50g beef suet 1 x 21/2ml sp caraway Salt and black pepper Water to bind

Method:

In a large casserole dish place the meat and sauce ingredients. Season and

Transfer to preheated oven (Gas mark 3, 170°C, 325°F) and cook until the meat is tender. Meanwhile. make dumplings. Mix the flour, suet

and caraway seeds and season. Add cold water and mix into a soft dough.

20 minutes before the end of cooking time, divide the dumpling dough into 4-6 pieces and drop into the casserole. Return to the oven, uncovered for the final 20 minutes.

1 cauliflower, divided into

florets 225g small broccoli florets 75g frozen peas

FOR THE SAUCE: 40g butter 40g plain flour 450ml semi-skimmed milk 100g half-fat double Gloucester, coarsely grated 2 x 21/2ml sp Dijon mus-1/4 x 21/2ml sp salt black pepper

Cook carrots in boiling immediately.

GIVE plain vegetables an water for 3 minutes. Add exciting twist, serve them cauliflower, broccoli and peas.



Carnations Add Lasting Colour

THE word 'Carnation' comes from an old Italian word meaning 'complexion', the earliest carnations bore flesh coloured flowers - which gave rise to the name.

White carnations mean 'pure and ardent love' and are good luck to give to a woman.

Carnations are most famous in their 'cut-flower' variety. They have been one of the most important of the commercial cut flowers for a long time, as they can be stored longer than any other flower - and can be opened to very high quality flowers from tight buds.

But it nipping down to the local supermarket or florists to get your bunch of carnations seems just a little too easy, try growing your own. Carnations go by two other

names - Dianthus and pinks. Pinks are the easiest type of carnations to grow, they are tough plants that need very little attention. They are smaller than regular 'carnations', and always coloured pink.

Dianthus is the botanical name for carnation, this is where you will find information in a botanical encyclopedia.

When you are growing these plants, remember that they need plenty of space. Plant them between 8 and 9 inches apart.

Sow Forgetme-nots

This is a good time to sow Forget-me-nots for flowering outdoors next May and June. It is possible to germinate the seeds in the open, sow in drills 1 cm deep and 15 cm apart. Cover the seeds very lightly with sandy soil and water mod-

Divide mossy saxifrages

Old clumps of mossy saxifrage may be divided and this is a good policy if they are tending to get brown in the centre. Discard the brown pieces and replant the green clumps in a semi-shady place in soil that contains plenty of leafmould or moss peat. Water freely for a few weeks.

Lift and divide June flowering Irises

This is the ideal time for lifting and dividing all the May and June flower flag irises as most of the plants will be starting to make new roots. It is not wise to lift and divide clumps every year, but after four or five years

they get overcrowded and exhaust the soil. Then you should dig them up carefully with a fork, cut off the old central portions of bare rhizome, discarding them altogether, and replant the healthy outer growths with 8 to 10 cm of rhizome attached to each.

Plant in well prepared soil dusted with superphosphate of lime. If you use animal manure, work it in rather deeply, so it does not come in contact with the rhizomes.

Start to bud roses

It is usually possible to start stocks at abou this time, though much depends on the weather. If June is very dry one may have to wait until well on into July whereas if the weather is wet it is sometimes possible to start budding even earlier than this.

Trim hedges

Trim evergreen hedges lightly at any time during this month. If you grown Berberis darwinii as a hedge the best time to trim it is immediately the flowers fade. Cut the flowering shoots back to give the hedge a neat appearance.

ENVIRONMENT TODAY

PROPOSED LANDFILL

The Councils Consultants reported back to the June Council meeting, as promised, on the outcome of the preliminary site investigations on the three proposed candidate areas for a new landfill. The report concluded that the site at Garrynagree/Reamanagh was the most favourable area for further investigations.

After a heated debate, the elected members for the West Waterford area expressed their opposition to a landfill in their area and requested the County Manager to cease work there. The County Manager however informed the members that, as he is under statutory obligation to provide a waste disposal facility in the county, he had no option but to proceed while acknowledging the genuine concerns expressed by the members.

The work on preparing an Environmental Impact Study (EIS) for the Garrynagree/Reamanagh area will commence shortly and will, it is hoped, be completed by the end of 2000.

Beach Cleaners During the months of July and August a number of students will be assigned to five beaches in the County. These are Tramore, Ardmore, Bonmahon, Clonea and Whiting Bay.

The students will work in teams of three, on a rota system, to ensure that the beach is cleaned seven days a week. The teams will also be responsible for the roads and entrances adjacent to the particular beach.

Waterford County Council appeals to all those who visit the beach during the summer to take their rubbish home. In particular, disposable nappies pose the greatest problem and already six have been found at Clonea beach.

Individuals (including children) who are caught littering

beaches will be fined £50

On The Spot Fines

From January to May of this year Waterford County Council issued twenty-three on-the spot fines to individuals found dumping rubbish. Furthermore, the Council is proceeding with eight prosecutions, with the first of these cases appearing in court in June of this year.

Composting

The oxygen within a compost bin facilities the growth of bacteria, which are essential for the composting process. Air is usually provided by the bulky "brown" materials, (eg hedge clippings and paper) that provide structure to the heap, keeping open the pore spaces, which store the air and moisture essential to the composting process.

Since your units do not have air holes in the walls of the bin it is imperative that oxygen is mechanically introduced. This can be done by A turning the entire pile every few weeks. B Poke holes in the pile with a handle of a sweeping brush or C Agitate the mixture with a garden fork by dragging the material from the side of the compost bin to the centre and then push

If air is prevented from entering the compost pile, the composting process will slow down and an unpleasant smell similar to rotten eggs will be emitted. Applying any of the three remedies previously mentioned can easily rectify this.

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



COUNCILLOR'S MOTION SENDS SUPERDUMP BACK TO EAST OF COUNTY?

from the Stradbally Anti-dump committee: There may be some concern in the community that the resolution from last week's County Council meeting could mean the spectre of a landfill dump revisiting the Stradbally area.

This will not be allowed to happen. In the first instance the actual selection of the Stradbally site was a contravention of the Council Groundwater Protection plan. The area is sited on a regionally important aquifer and should have been automatically excluded.

For example all landfill selection sites in the West of the county, which we have closely monitored, automatically excluded the Walsortian and Kiltorcan aquifers. Stradbally rests on the Ordovician ing footnote to this issue. The aquifer, which yields the high-

The following is an update in the county, and extends from Ballyvoile head to Tramore (generally south of the N25).

Site investigation also concurred with the earlier hydrogeological investigation that the Stradbally aquifer was extremely vulnerable to pollution, as the depth to bedrock was very shallow, bedrock being encountered on average at a mere two metres, and groundwater is encountered at less than that depth.

Essentially this means that even if a landfill dump could be constructed, the E.P.A. would not be in a position to grant a licence as it could not realistically be satisfied that such a development would not pose a significant threat to the environment.

There is however an interestinvestigations carried out by est volume of drinking water Waterford County Council and

their consultants confirmed that (a) the aquifer's status is regional and (b) that the ranking vulnerability to pollution was confirmed as extreme. Reference to the E.P.A. guide on siting of commercial pig units states that prime consideration should be given to the protection of surface and groundwater in the site vicinity and land-spread areas.

An application to the E.P.A. (Environmental Protection Agency), for an operating licence must confirm the aquifer status and vulnerability rating, which is now known to be regional and of extreme vulnerability. It would now appear that the results of the investigations carried out by the County Council, that eliminated Rathnaskillogue for a landfill dump would also preclude the siting of a large scale greenfield piggery.

The Science of Farming and Food **GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT**

The big problem in June is that grass gets stemmy and also the dung pad area increases from 10% in May to 20-30%. If nothing is done things get worse. Cows milk poorly and cattle thrive is

A lot of tall grass areas around dung pads represent a huge loss of grass. Why? Animals do not eat it, the grass decays and is lost. If it represents 30% of the area and it gets Nitrogen that means nearly 30% of the nitrogen per acre is wasted (nearly £2 per acre each rotation). One solution is to force the animals to eat it. Animal performance suffers if we graze below 5.5 to 6.0 CMS. Not a recommended solution.

The best solution is occasional topping of the grazing area. Once or twice during the season. Moorepark has shown that topping gives more milk later in the year.

Effective topping means cutting off the tall grass down to 2.5 to 3 inches. A lot of topping is cosmetic and a waste of time because it is not done low enough.

Many farmers graze off some of the toppings with the animals. Minimise the amount of topping done in very dry weather.

Instead of topping use a disc mower to precut the grass before grazing by the cows. Done once during the year this can work very well in dry weather. Only cut enough for one day.

Apply 5-10 units of Nitrogen more per acre if embarking on this

Do not do too often as it decreases the amount of grass grown. The best solution is to take out strong paddocks for bagging and use minimum topping, unless a paddock has more than 30% of the area in tall grass.

SAFETY ON THE FARM

Over the past five years 106 people lost their lives on Irish farms. Of these 106 people 79 were adults and 27 were chil-

These frightening statistics confirm that an Irish farm is one of the most dangerous workplaces in the country. The main factor involved in the accidents are as follows:- Unsafe machinery and tractors. Unsafe practices in livestock handling. Children present in the vicinity of work activities involving tractors and machinery.

The Health and Safety Authority have designated the 19th -23rd June as Farm Safety Week and will focus on these issues. Teagasc are holding a Safety and Health Walk in Kildalton Agricultural College on Thursday the 22nd of June at 7p.m. where all aspects of safety will be featured. Why not come along with the family, all are welcome - it could save a life.

Registering your foal:

If your mare is worth breeding a foal from then your foal is worth registering. Buyers, both foreign and domestic, are increasingly looking for foals and horses that are registered.

- 1. For foals to be registered in the Irish Horse Register (IHR), the foal must be the progeny of a sire classified in the IHR and out of a registered mare at the time of covering.
- 2. The stallion owner must provide a Certificate of Covering to
- 3. Application to register the foal is received by the IHR before the last day of October in the year in which the foal was born, with the registered fee.
- 4. If (1) to (3) above are not complied with, it may still be possible to register but this will require blood typing / DNA test-
- 5. Application for registration should be made on the prescribed foal return form with the prescribed fee (£45 for non-members or £25 for members), unless otherwise directed by the issuing authority.

ICMSA Call On Government To Reduce The Rate Of Duty On Fuel Prices

ICMSA has repeated its call for a substantial reduction in the VAT and excise duty rates on motor fuels following the release of the latest inflation

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President ICMSA, called for a substantial reduction in the VAT & Excise duty on fuel, particularly diesel. "A reduction would

the CPI and would substantially moderate the inflationary pressures now evident in the economy'

"In addition the increase in the price of fuel used by consumers is indirectly affecting the CPI. The cost of motor fuel has increased by 20% in the last two years and this has

have an immediate impact on directly added about 1% inflation. The Government must immediately reduce both the excise duty and VAT on motor fuels to curb these inflationary pressures", said Mr. O'Rourke.

Mr. O'Rourke said that given that the current rate of duty on diesel is about 26p/litre and even higher on petrol, it is very much within the Govern-

ment's remit to bring about a reduction in energy costs to the consumer A substantial reduction in the current rate of duty would bring about an immediate reduction in energy costs for all consumers and would also improve the competitiveness and income position of the agricultural

Rising Inflation Will Eat Into Farm Incomes

IFA President Tom Parlon today (Wednesday) said the Government must take immediate action to curb Ireland's escalating inflation which will eat into farm incomes for the remainder of this year and will carry over into next year.

Mr Parlon said the Government should reduce its take on petrol and diesel which the exchequer could well afford.

"The difference between the expected 3% inflation rate at the time of the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness (PPF) negotiations and an actual inflation rate of 6% is a cut in real farm income of about 5%. Farmers suffer through both higher input costs particularly for services, and also through reduced purchasing power of farm families as consumers"

"The Government in responding to inflation must not overlook the fact that there is no indexation whatsoever for inflation built into either the CAP price support or direct payments. Through increased productivity, farmers can tolerate an inflation rate of 1.5% to 2%, but not 5% or 6%.

Mr Parlon said this unacceptable inflation would also drive up processing costs, which would impact on product prices, unless corrective action was taken immediately. He said the IFA involvement and support for the PPF was based on a low inflation environment which was essential for the Irish farming and food industry.

LIFTING OF LIVE EXPORT **BAN TO LIBYA A MAJOR BOOST TO IRELAND'S** LIVESTOCK SECTOR -PARLON

on live cattle exports from Ireland to Libya will be a major boost to the country's one billion pounds livestock sector, particularly in terms of cattle price competition.

Tom Parlon welcomed the agreement reached between the Irish and Libyan Government lifting the live export ban which has been in place since 1996.

The positive agreement is the culmination of an intensive campaign waged by the IFA over the last 3 years, including a visit to Tripoli by the IFA President, Tom Parlon and IFA General Secretary, Michael Berkery to Libya in March

IFA President Tom Parlon 1999 where negotiations were has said the lifting of the ban held with senior Libyan Government officials.

The IFA President welcomed the strong initiative by the Irish Government in reestablishing full diplomatic rela-tions with the Libyan Government which he said was essential to reopening the important live cattle trade. He said Libya was potentially a very valuable customer for Irish livestock.

Mr. Parlon said in 1995 Ireland exported 81,000 head of cattle to Libya valued at £50m. He said the Libyans have an annual import requirement of 100,000 head of cattle, which have been supplied from Australia in recent years.

Glanbia Opens **Giant Cheese** Plant in USA

One of the largest cheese production plants in the world was officially opened in Gooding, Idaho, USA by Irish Food Group, Glanbia plc recently. The facility, recently extended at a cost of \$33 million, has an annual output of 180 million pounds of American cheese plus over 88 million pounds of specialised dairy ingredients. It ranks as one of the top facilities of its kind both in the USA and globally - cheese output from the single plant equates to the entire hard cheese production in the Republic of Ireland.

The investment was made in response to continued growth in cheese consumption in the USA and, in particular, in-

creasing demand for ingredient cheeses.

Following a small acquisition in Idaho in 1990, Glanbia has invested over \$100 million to become the largest processor in the State. It is one of the top producers of American style cheese in the USA, supplying major food processors serving food service and retail markets.

South East ICMSA News

ICMSA SEEK LEGAL OPINION ON TRANSFER OF MILK QUOTA

ICMSA has sought legal opinion to clarify the position of quota transferring at the end of a land quota lease.

Mr. Jackie Cahill, Deputy President and Chairman of the ICMSA Dairy Committee, said: "Recent press reports have suggested that quota purchased at the end of a land quota lease is subject to VAT. As far as ICMSA is concerned no such decision has been taken". "ICMSA has engaged Senior Counsel to clarify the issue and we expect to have the opinion by the end of the month. ICMSA will make the legal opinion available to farmers as soon as possible but in the meantime I suggest farmers in this position should consult their solicitor", stated Mr. Cahill.

Mr. Cahill said that the statutory provisions governing the Milk Quota Regulation may need to be changed to deal with this issue. ICMSA will be seeking the necessary changes in tax law from the Minister for Finance to make sure that this quota transfer is exempt from all tax.

ICMSA REJECT DEPARTMENT PROPOSALS ON REPS **PENALTIES**

ICMSA has rejected the Departments proposal on a new schedule on REPS penalties saying that it introduces an even more unfair and unbalanced system.

Mr. John O'Connor, Chairman of ICMSA Farm Services and Environmental Committee speaking after a meeting with Senior Officials of the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Development said that ICMSA totally rejected the new schedule of REPS penalties.

"The proposal which represents a deterioration as opposed to an improvement in the current REPS penalties are not in line with the Government's commitment under the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness to introduce proportionality in the application of penalties in agricultural Schemes. ICMSA cannot accept the situation where farmers will be worse off under the new Scheme than they are in the current Scheme", said Mr. O'Connor.

"Under the current penalty regime, many farmers have been severely penalised for what ICMSA consider small errors. Small errors should be treated as such and should not result in severe financial penalties. Since the start of the REPS Scheme, Irish farmers have lost £5 million to the REPS Penalties".

"Proportionality and a fair system of penalties need to be introduced immediately", Mr. O'Connor concluded.



CIVIL WAR RAIDS

Last week we wrote about the raids the Republicans made on shops in the Dungarvan area when they commandeered goods for their own use.

An exciting occurrence took place in one of those raids. It happened in the case of a merchant of Blackpool whose son kept a depot for the repair of bicycles and had on hands a number of these machines. The republicans demanded the bicycles he had on hands but the owner stoutly refused to give them. They threatened him with force but the merchant defied their threats. Reinforcements were brought from the barracks and they set out to seize the bicycles. They advanced towards the premises in extended formation, taking cover in the doors of houses as they went on and also behind carts and cars on the street. The merchant and his son, armed with loaded guns, watched the attacking party advance and as the republicans approached the

house, they produced revolvers and at that moment it seemed as if there would be a bloody encounter.

TIMELY INTERVENTION

However a local clergyman, who had been called came quickly on the scene, accompanied by a medical gentleman. The clergyman thrust himself between the contending parties. The respect which the people always entertained for their clergy had a soberising effect and no shots were fired though the arms were levelled at one another. The merchant was called upon to surrender to the Republic but he refused. The priest, seeing the serious aspect of things, asked the merchant to give up his gun. "Yes", said he, "I will surrender to the Church, but not to them." He then left himself in the hands of the clergyman but the republicans made him a prisoner and took him in charge to the barracks. He was detained there for a couple of hours, after which he was released. The entire incident was at one time very angry looking and but for the good tact displayed by the peacemakers, in all probability, there would have been regrettable consequences.

THE FIRST CORK BRIGADE

Towards the end of July, the garrison in the castle were largely reinforced. About 300 men who came from Waterford, Carrick and other places on that side, marched into Dungarvan. They passed down the Main Street of the town, fully armed, lustily singing "We are the boys of the first Cork Brigade" to the air which was that inspiring one which served as a battle-cry in the American Civil War, the refrain being "Glory, Glory, Alleluiah." This large force marched on to the barrack and soon after, they scattered themselves around the town. (continued next week)

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80 Council Houses Earmarked For

Shandon

CONROY

Dungarvan Urban District Council has this week revealed its intention to proceed with the development of 40 local authority houses on land recently purchased at Shandon. All going to plan, it is expected that construction work on the new scheme will commence before the end of the year.

The former agricultural land was acquired by the Council last year from the Dempsey family for £2.6m. A loan of £3m was raised to fund the transaction which translates into a cost of £100,000 per

The housing scheme is the first phase in the eventual construction of approximately 370 houses on the 26 acre

A sketch drawing of the proposed housing layout for the first phase was submitted to members at Monday's UDC meeting. The layout was prepared by the National Building Agency and shows that the scheme will be located at the far end of the Shandon site, behind Cork Marts and overlooking the Colligan River.

The entrance to the estate will be situated after the sharp bend on the main road. As well as elaborate landscaping there will be a buffer zone of mature trees between the site and the nearby Cork Marts and halting site.

80 HOUSES IN TOTAL

The Council has been allocated 80 housing starts by the Government between now

and 2003. According to Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly, all of these houses will be constructed on a portion of the Shandon site in two phases of 40 consisting of a mix of 2 and 3 bedroom house types. While the first phase will consist of Council houses catering for those on the current UDC waiting list, the second phase could consist of affordable housing. Under the new measures of the Affordable Housing Scheme, site subsidies of up to £25,000 will be provided. This will give those on lower incomes

the opportunity to acquire a site at nominal value and thereby only meet the cost of construction.

Mr. Connolly said he will meet with NBA officials to develop the house types and overall layout of the first phase within the coming week. He will then report back to members with the house plan and hopes to finally proceed to the public con-

sultation stage before July. **NEGOTIATIONS WITH GAA**

Meanwhile, the Council is still in discussion with the Waterford County GAA Board with regard to a 1 1/4 acre strip of land on the site near Fraher Field. GAA officials previously indicated that this portion of land would facilitate further development works at the pitch.

More importantly however, his time was 59 seconds inside the A qualifying time for the Olympics. The 50k walk event will coming Olympics.

In the 20k walk event there was more good news for Ireland when Rob Heffernan of Togher qualified in a time of 82.43.

Son of Jimmy and Margaret Costin, Jamie is a full-time athlete since last year. Over the past two years his whole aim was to qualify for the Olympics and on Sunday his dream finally became reality. He is reported to be "absolutely thrilled" with his victory following the amount of training and effort he has put in to the sport. Last winter, Jamie trained in Australia over the winter months and he previously trained in New Zealand. His sporting success has earned him numerous awards including the inaugural Pat Noctor Young Sports Star Award in 1993 as well as Munster BLOE awards.

who saved the life of local man Tom Fleming in April 1996. The two men, accompanied by Raymond Beresford, were exercising horses at the Cunnigar beach when the incident occurred. Mr. Fleming fell from his horse and got caught in a current that swept him out to sea. While Mr. Beresford raised the alarm,

Mr. Moloney immediately grabbed the mare which he considered to be the more experienced swimmer and rode into the rough sea. He held the victim's hand to the breast plate of the horse and battled against the strong current to the shore. The victim was unconscious at this stage and Mr. Moloney tried to resuscitate him as best he could.

Mr. Fleming suffered from hypothermia and later made a full recovery at Waterford Regional Hospital.

The Council's Certificate of Bravery claimed that Mr. Moloney showed total disregard for his own life and safety and because of his courage and bravery a tragedy was prevent-

The original proposal to honour Mr. Moloney with a Bravery Award was first mooted by Cllr. Lar Hart four years ago.

ENTERED HOUSE FIRE

Stephen Kennefick of Lismore Fire Brigade was honoured for his "heroic efforts of bravery" during a house fire in November 1995.

Mr. Kennefick was awakened from sleep by two neighbours who told him of a fire in a house nearby. The house was engulfed by flames and the front door was hot with smoke coming out of the top. Mr. Kennefick broke down the door with an axe and crawled in due to the dense smoke. He located the owner of the house and carried her out onto the street. The victim was an 82 year old lady who lived alone. She was overcome by smoke from a fire caused by an electric heater and unfortunately, was already dead when help arrived. Mr. Kennefick tried in vain to resuscitate her and the woman was later pronounced dead at the scene. As a result of his daring rescue bid, Mr. Kennefick suffered smoke inhalation.

Many of his colleagues in the Co. Waterford Fire Service were present as he received the Council's prestigious Bravery Award.

The matter was originally highlighted at this week's UDC meeting by Cllr. John Deasy who told officials that the timing of the traffic lights is "off".

Town Engineer Joe Brennan explained that the major delay in traffic flows is a result of excessive use of the green man as the pedestrian crossing takes precedence over the

As an experiment officials disconnected the pedestrian crossings last Saturday and observed an improvement in the traffic flow over the ensuing days. Special sensors on the lights detect the volume of traffic along the three main routes to the intersection.

"We're trying to find a solution", stated Mr. Brennan. "We will activate it so that the green man will only come on when there is a gap in traffic".

With regard to the two filter lanes, the Council has already moved the traffic light pole on the Main Street side to provide drivers with a better view of the lights. It is also intended to relocate the pole on the O'Connell Street side further along the island.

ICMSA Call On Glanbia To **Increase Price**

John Hempenstall, Chairman of ICMSA Wicklow Executive has called on the Board of Glanbia to increase milk price paid to producers by 5 pence per gallon.

"Increasing milk price by 5 pence per gallon would accurately reflect the increase in market returns as indicated by the Irish Dairy Board on-account price," said Mr. Hempenstall.

Mr. Hempenstall stated that the Irish Dairy Board on-account price has recently increased and is some 4.6 pence per gallon greater than the price paid for the same period in 1999, yet the Board of Glanbia are proposing to pay a May milk price of 3 pence per gallon less than was paid last year.

In conclusion, Mr. Hempenstall said in light of the increased Irish Dairy Board on-account price, the Board of Glanbia should increase their milk price by at least 5 pence per gallon as this would put Glanbia back in line with all of the other major co-ops.

Houses For Elderly At Quanns Is Crazy Idea

Says Cllr

Plans to build seven houses at Quann's, Dungarvan for elderly housing applicants have been described as 'crazy' by local UDC member Cllr. Teresa Wright.

The Urban Council proposes to construct the single storey houses on a green field site currently owned by the South Eastern Health Board near Dungarvan Sports Centre. This area is located opposite the sea wall and adjacent to St. Mary's Parish graveyard.

Plans for the two bedroom houses were submitted to members at this week's meeting of the Urban Council. The seven Council houses were originally earmarked for the former Presentation Convent site at the Youghal Road. However since the arrival of the Kosovo refugees, these plans have been deferred indefinitely. It is intended to use the new houses where possible to transfer existing elderly UDC tenants by consent from houses that are unsuitable due to either their location or size and thereby freeing up family type accommodation in the

Paddy Joe Ryan, chairman, presided at the June meeting of the senior board ar Lawlor's Hotel on Monday night of last week.

GERALD McCARTHY

As was expected, the appointment or reappointment of the senior hurling team manager was high on the agenda and was very well debated without a final decision having been taken.

The discussion began after the letter of resignation from Gerald was read. This was a normal follow up to the end of his second two-year term and in his letter he was profuse in his thanks to the many people who had assisted him in many ways during his 4 years in charge here. He wrote about the progress made and expressed regret that championship or league had not been won during that period. He was at pains to express his thanks to the players and his admiration for the commitment given by them at all times. He expressed the hope that the overdue success for Waterford hurling would come very

Several delegates hastened to lavish praise on the retiring trainer and the many tributes recalled the improvement brought about by him in his 4 years at the helm. There were proposals for his retention for a further term.

There were other opinions expressed also and a number of speakers felt that he had done all that was possible for him to do with the talent available. Some felt that the board should respect his wish to retire, etc.

Following a 60 minute discussion it was agreed to allow the board officers the opportunity of examining the matter of the appointment of a senior hurling coach/trainer, taking on board the views expressed by delegates at the meeting. It is expected that proposals will be put to the July meeting of the county board, as no monthly meetings take place during August.

SMALL **ATTENDANCE**

Less than half of the clubs were represented at the meeting and this is not a satisfactory situation when important decisions have to be taken. We are one of the few counties in which junior and intermediate clubs have the right to attend county board meetings and it seems a pity that clubs do not avail of the privilege.

TICKETS

The issue of tickets by the Munster Council for all the big games was discussed and several delegates were critical both of the quantity and quality of those being supplied to non-participating counties such as Waterford. Members of the board felt that there is a need to have the whole matter examined at Munster Council level and the county board representatives were asked to raise the matter there.

COUNTY BOARD FINED

A fine of £1,200 was imposed on the board by the Munster Council for breaches of the Games Regulations in the Munster senior hurling championship against Tipperary and the league semi-final against Galway. The particular regulation which was broken was the one relating to members of the team party moving out of the dug-out during the games.

Delegates were outraged and angry and highly critical of the system. It was felt that the top brass have gone overboard to the point of being silly with these regulations and one delegate made the point that the GAA, are trying to 'ape' soccer which is professional. It was also pointed out that some of our substitutes had to move out of the dug out because the

TV cameras were in the way. It was also pointed out that it was not necessary for so many Waterford officials to be active outside the dug-out.

It was agreed that the county appeal the fine. Tipperary, Galway and Limerick were also heavily fined.

DEVELOPMENT

The county chairman referred to the development plans which were outlined to the April meeting of the board and said he was now reporting that satisfactory progress was being made in the negotiations. The plans relate to the Curran's Boreen site and the Walsh Park improvements. He said a full report will be available in the near future

TALLOW PROPOSALS

A letter submitted by Tallow Club Secretary, Sean Sheehan referred to the many anomalies in the championships and the problems for clubs in trying to fit in fixtures at unsuitable times.

The letter proposed that a select committee of seven to ten members (with the three board secretaries) be appointed to sit over a few months to examine the whole matter of the playing of the championships, etc. Speaking in support of the idea, Liam Moroney pointed out that his club had no problem with the manner in which the championships are structured but that there are aspects of the running of the championships and leagues that need adjustment and such a committee, having examined the matter, could come back to the board and make submissions/proposals, etc.

Basically, what they have in mind is the timing of the championships leagues. They feel that the senior championships should not commence until July. Championships for second string teams should be a separate competition and played to a finish. The matter of regradings should be closely examined and the leagues should be scheduled for weekends, etc

Speaking to me subsequently, Liam listed the problems about fielding teams and having to travel out on Tuesday evenings when many players are not available He listed the number of Sunday evenings that had gone by without a single game being played. He pointed out that other clubs had all the same problems and he was at pains to point out that this was not a criticism of the fixtures committees or of any of the boards. PROPERTY INSURANCE INCREASE

To say that there was anger at the announcement that the Association's Property Insurance premiums were going to have an immediate increase of up to 100%, would be stating the case very mildly. Describing this as an outrage and a disgrace, several dele-

all round. It was however, pointed out that the reason for the increase was because of massive claims due to fires, storm damages, etc and since this scheme was introduced less than two years ago. The total being paid by councils and units of the association per year is £800 and the claims run into millions.

According to a spokesman for the GAA Insurance Work group, the present value of the property is approximately one and a half billion pounds. Correspondence will issue from Croke Park giving guidelines as to how the matter should be dealt with and making sure that clubs with social centres pay premiums appropriate to the value of their properties.

Delegates were informed that our membership of the scheme is the lowest in Munster as only 48 players from Waterford have joined and in the Youth section only one Waterford player has joined.

The chairmen urged all clubs to familiarise themselves with details of the scheme and inform players of the many benefits. Several delegates noted what they perceived to be drawbacks in the scheme because of the wait for a first payment.

OTHER ITEMS
