### **MONEYMATTERS**

### SMALL CLAIMS COURT

Anyone who has purchased goods or services for private use from someone selling them in the course of business may take a Small Claims Court action. The Small Claims Court is a special procedure within the District Court structure and is available nationwide.

Claims can be made for faulty goods or bad workmanship, minor damage to property and the non-return of rent deposits. Claims cannot be made for Debts, Personal Injuries, Goods bought on hire purchase, or breach of leasing agreements. It designed to deal with consumer claims up to £1,000 speedily, inexpensively and without involving a solicitor. The cost of taking such an action is £6 and each party to the action is responsible for their own costs and witness expenses. It is important to note that an individual must first attempt to come to a satisfactory resolution to the problem (i.e. with shop, company, or individual concerned) if unsuccessful they may then have no option but to take a Small Claims Court action.

# SKIN, HAIR AND

When we look at a human boy, nearly everything we see on the outside is dead. In fact, it ceased living weeks ago. This dead outer layer is skin, tough and yet flexible. It protects the body from knocks, wear and tear, dirt and germs, ran and snow, and possibly harmful rays from the Sun. It also keeps in vital bodily fluids, salts and minerals.

Just beneath this dead surface, skin is very much alive. It is one of the busiest organs. It contains tiny blood vessel-s to keep it nourished, and nerves that detect touch and pain.

Skin also helps to control body temperature. When the body is too hot, skin goes flushed and sweaty, to help the body cool down. And the inner layers of skin continually replace the worn-away outer layers, so that the body stays covered and protected.

### HAIR AND NAILS

An average person has about 100,000 head hairs. Like skin, they are made of dead cells. Each hair grows from a pit-shaped follicle in the skin. At he hair's base, or root, living cells multiply rapidly.

Gradually they get pushed upwards, cemented into a rod-like shape, filled with keratin, and die.

Nails form in the same way, but as a flat plate. this grows from the nail root and slides slowly along, over the living skin below it.

A baby's skin has had little wear and tear. It is soft

and smooth. and its hairs are tiny and bendy. Gradually the skin becomes tougher, and body hairs grow larger and thicker.

After many years, skin begins to lose its natural strethciness. **Patches** which bend



### **Prick out** perennials and biennials

Perennials and biennials sown in June will be in need of pricking out into a nursery bed. This should be in an open position except for violas, pansies, primroses and polyanthuses, which grow more quickly in partial shade.

The ground must be well forked and reasonably rich but not recently manured with dung. Get the seedlings up as carefully as possible (if the ground is dry it is best to give it a through watering the day before you intend to move the

### seedlings). Peg down strawberry runners

The runners of strawberries are most conveniently propagated by pegging them down into pots of compost sunk into the ground. When rooted they are easily transplanted.

### **Protect vines from** mildew

Thinning of the fruits will now become general with outdoor vines. A thick mulch of well rotted manure spread over the border will help the vines a lot at this time of year. If there is the slightest sign of mildew, dust the foliage and fruits with flowers with sulphur.

### Plant winter greens

Plant out all manner of winter green crops as you clear the ground of early crops such as dwarf peas, early potatoes and the first sowings of turnips and salad vegetables. As far as possible, choose showery weather for this work. If July is persistently dry, push on with the planting and then water freely for a few days.

### Cut off faded flowers

From time to time during the month of July you should examine all the flowering plants in the garden and remove any blooms or flower spikes that are so faded as to be no longer decorative. This will allow the plant to generate

### Trim hedges

Trim evergreen hedges and topiary specimens as necessary to keep then neat and tidy in July.





The Science of Farming and Food

### TILLAGE

The most recent Teagasc Crop Report was published on the 21st of June. Crops are growing well and yield prospects at this stage are good in winter and spring cereals. Disease levels are generally low but significant Septoria and Yellow Rust infestations have occurred where there were problems with fungicide spraying programs in winter wheat. Rhynchosporium levels have increased recently in winter barley. Disease levels remain low in spring cereals. Rhynchosporium and Net Blotch are reported at low levels on susceptible varieties of spring barley. Mildew levels are low on spring cereals. Aphids are reported on spring and winter wheat. Crop event at Teagasc, Kildalton College on Tuesday the 11th of July from 2pm-5pm. Event includes cereal fungicides evaluation on winter wheat and spring barley, cereal varieties of winter and spring wheat, oats and barley, upcoming courses and new crops including lupins and maize Arable Silage:-

The cereal component of arable silage mixtures should be treated as per cereals on their own right for diseases and pests. BYDV, Net Blotch and mildew will need attention. Weed control is constrained by constituents of mixture. Control is only warranted where infestations are bad. Pulsar (from BASF) can be applied to arable silage mixtures including peas. The recommended rate is 4L/ha for use from 2 leaf to first node detectable stage of the cereal (gs 12-31). Use on peas from 3 fully expanded leaves until before flower buds can be found enclosed in terminal shoot.

Harvesting - The crop usually requires a growing period of 12-15 weeks to mature. Ideally the cereal grain should be at the milky to early dough stage of maturity. The bottom pea pods are formed but not completely swollen and are 3-4cm long. The first flowers are beginning to drop off and other flowers are coming into bloom. Acid application is essential to ensure good fermentation at a rate of 25% more than for grass silage.

### SHEEP Ewe Premium

The value of the ewe premium for 2000 has been fixed at £14.06 per ewe. The first payment of £4.22 will be made in the next few weeks. Also for everyone in the disadvantaged areas, the first instalment of the Rural World Premium of £4.71 will be made at the same time. Therefore farmers in the Disadvantaged Areas will get a total payment of £8.93 per eligible sheep by late June. The value of the premium is very disappointing. It is lower than '99 because of the high price for

hoggets early on but this did not benefit many producers.

The report of the consultant who reviewed the premium has been lodged in Brussels. It will be later in the year before we will know if any changes result from this report.

### Markets

Lamb prices are disappointing at present. Given that skin prices are worth about £5 each up from £1.50 last year this should have helped the trade. There is no doubt that ewe numbers have dropped so there will be less lambs available. Also store buying is beginning already as cattle prices continue to be very strong. A good store trade would help to strengthen the market over the next few months.

### GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT

Sulphur Application:-

Willie Murphy, Teagasc, Johnstown, says that between 30 and 40% of Irish soils are sulphur deficient.

Deficient soils are mainly the lighter soils found in inland areas. This deficiency results in a poorer response to fertiliser nitrogen particularly where more than 200 units N/acre are applied each year. In sulphur deficient areas, around 25 units per acre of sulphur are required annually. Many of the high N fertiliser, and a large number of the compound fertilisers contain sulphur. Analysis of the grass plant is the most accurate means of determining sulphur deficiency. Weedless Pastures:-

This must be our aim: They can reduce grass yield by 17%. It is more difficult for cattle to graze pastures with weeds. Results in more topping. Fertiliser is wasted in growing weeds. Some weeds, ragworth and buttercups can be poisonous to animals.

July is a very good month to spray. Active growth and a lot of heat in the ground. Spraying with 3-5 pints per acre of MCPA or 2.4.D will kill most grassland weeds. However, both sprays will check, if not kill clover.

Cereal growers spray their corn every year even though they achieve lower profits than dairy farmers. Grassland farmers must put more care into their grass. Nettles are developing into a major problem. They should be spot sprayed with a specific nettle spray.

### DOCK SPRAYING TIME!

From now until early September is the best time to spray docks. They are growing actively while grass growth has slowed down, therefore, subsequent reduction in grass yield due to the spray will not be great. The best time is 4-5 weeks after a silage crop. One Dock in every 35m2 reduces grass growth by 1% per acre.

As a rough guide for every dock per acre a dairy farmer loses £5-£8. As you know docks are difficult to control and will almost certainly require a 2-spray programme.

Spray now and again next year. Each dock plant produces 40,000 (curled dock) to 60,000 (broad leaved dock) seeds per year. So open, poached swords produce new dock plants every year.

If you have clover you must not kill it with sprays.

Azulox, Prospect and Eagle will not kill clover.

Azulox, will damage some old grasses, such as Cocksfoot, Yorkshire Fog etc. Prospect will not kill the curled leaf dock.

Where clover is not important all other sprays can be used, such as, Dockstar, Foundation, Bandock, Condox, Dockmaster, Grazon, CMPP etc.

# ICMSA CALL ON GLANBIA TO INCREASE MILK PRICE

Mr. John Hempenstall, Chairman of ICMSA Wicklow Executive called on the Board of Glanbia to increase milk price paid to producers by 5 pence per gallon.

"Increasing milk price by 5 pence per gallon would accurately reflect the increase in market returns as indicated by the Irish Dairy Board on-account price", said Mr. Hempenstall. Mr. Hempenstall stated that the Irish Dairy Board on-account price has recently increased and is some 4.6 pence per gallon milk price of 3 pence per gallon less than was paid last year.

In conclusion, Mr. Hempenstall said in light of the increased Irish Dairy Board on-account price the Board of Glanbia should increase their milk price by at least 5 pence per gallon as this would Glanbia them back in line with all of the other major co-op's.



They quartered themselves in the hotels which they commandeered. Visitors were obliged to vacate their apartments and find other lodgings. The entry of this force into Dungarvan led the residents to believe that when the Free State troops came along, they would contest every available approach. Fearful of the consequences, many people had made arrangements to fly from the town for shelter or barricade themselves in their homes. Troops of the I.R.A. patrolled the streets by day and night and in all respects they appeared to be a very formidable force. It was believed that when the battle would come on, the troops would vacate the castle which was good enough for defence in the days before the invention of gunpowder but now a shell fired from Abbeyside would lay the old fortification in ruins. In this state of things, matters moved along with a good deal of uncertainty.

### COMMANDEERING

The supply of provisions in the town was now severely tested. Bakery shops were bread, butchers should provide meat, groceries and other necessaties should be provided and all these were procured by the seizures of goods which were being carried out. While matters were in this unsettled state, an alarming rumour came from Cork that the Free State troops had taken possession of that city and routed the Republicans. It was stated that the Republican forces were also driven out of Youghal where the national troops had also landed in the morning. And in confirmation, about mid-day of this memorable day an aeroplane flew up from Waterford and passed over Dungarvan on it's way to Youghal. The appearance of the aeroplane caused a flutter of uneasiness to take possession of the republicans in the town and preparations were being made for the evacuation of the barracks.

### **RETURN JOURNEY**

The aeroplane returned towards evening. It flew at a lower altitude and as it passed over the castle, the machinegun was turned on and several shots fired but without effect. The machine continued on it's way unharmed, having discharged a volley or two into the barracks but no harm was

### **Clancy Brothers Tribute On RTE**

Two documentaries with a spe-salute at the graveside. cial local flavour made by Clonmel native and cameraman with RTE Waterford, Donal Wylde for TG4 are to be seen by the wider audience of the flagship RTE 1 channel over the next two weeks.

The television specials deal with the lasting influence that two different generations of emigrants from the south-east counties made, first on Newfoundland and its culture from the 18th century, and later on the American folk singing boom of the 1960's which made international recording stars of the Clancy Brothers from Carrick-On-Suir and their musical side-kick Tommy

Donal Wylde returned to Newfoundland in 1999 because of his fascination with the Irish settlement there which retained its music, dance and folklore and even the accents associated with Waterford, Wexford and Kilkenny. He had first filmed the transplanted Irish community of hardy fisher folk for a 3 part RTE series in 1980 and returned to record how the Irish colonies of Newfoundland had been shattered and scattered by unemployment and emigration. The story of the Irish in Newfoundland who once made the Irish language the dominant tongue of the St. John capital, is told in "An Boithrin Glas" which goes out on Thursday, June 29th at 11.05 pm on RTE 1.

A second Donal Wylde documentary follows a week later, when the tribute to the Clancy Brothers gets the latest of its repeat showings. Telling how the Carrick-On-Suir brothers who wanted to make it as actors in New York found stage fame and fortune instead with their rousing style of ballad singing, "Carraig an Cheoil" was inspired and woven around the amazing scenes at the funeral of the late Paddy Clancy when generations of balladeers and musicians joined in a spontaneous musical

The Clancy Brothers special includes archive footage from the White House performance for President John F. Kennedy on the St. Patrick's Day prior to his November assassination in 1963, as well as rare film of a breakthrough appearance on the "Ed Sullivan Show" which launched the career of Elvis Presley and a farewell concert at Clonmel's Regal Theatre. Also included are interviews with Paddy Clancy's widow, Mary; brother Liam talking of the friction which was healed before Paddy Clancy died, as well as sister and actress, Peg Power and broadcasters including Ciaran Mac Mathuna, Shay Healy and Sean Duignan. "Carraig an Cheoil" goes out on RTE 1 at 11.05 pm on Thursday, July



In the last year the Council has found that we have improved our global position with regard to taxation, unemployment and the percentage of SME's that export but that our ratings have fallen when it comes to the cost of labour and telecom costs.

However regarding telecommunications and e-business, the report highlights

that in cost terms, Ireland is falling behind our main competitors. Internet access costs here are three times those of Greece while there are seven times as many internet hosts per 1000 capita in Finland compared to Ireland.

The report concludes that in the absence of decisive action in these areas, Ireland risks becoming uncompetitive and therefore unattractive for enterprise attempting to compete on the ever more ICT driven world market.

Thanks to sponsorship by the Paddy Power Bookmaker organisation, this year's Irish Greyhound Derby, entitled 'The paddypower.com Greyhound Derby', will have a total prize fund of £135,000. Welcome news of the 'Derby sponsorship by Ireland's leading bookmaking firm was announced earlier this year when Managing Director, Mr. Stewart Kenny pledged support for the premier classic, over a three year period. The new sponsors are committed to Irish sport in general and greyhound racing in particular, having previously sponsored the Irish Grand National and the National Puppy Stake at Shel-

bourne Park. They intend to promote this years greyhound classic in a major way through their betting shops chain and following the recent launch of their internet betting organisation, the prospect of showing the Derby action from Shelbourne Park on the internet, seems very likely.

The total prize fund, including trial stakes, amounts to £135,000, making this years Derby one of the richest grey-hound racing contests in the world and provides a £60,000 winners prize (Breeder receives 10% and special breeders trophy). If the recent William Hill English Derby winner, Rapid Ranger, currently quoted at 8/1 second favourite for the Derby by Paddy Power Bookmaker (Moyne Rebel, 6/1 favourite), is successful in this years Shelbourne Park classic, his connections will be rewarded with an additional £40,000 bonus - making this a whopping £100,000 pay-out.

Second prize in the paddypower.com Irish Greyhound Derby is £10,000; third £5,000; three unplaced finalists £2,500 each; six beaten semi-finalists £800 each; twelve unplaced in quarter finals £400 each and twenty-four greyhounds unplaced in second round £200 each.

In addition, the derby prize fund includes - for the first time ever payments to heat winner of £200 each - up to and including the semi-finals.

The paddypower.com Greyhound Derby Consolation for beaten semi-finalists will carry a winners prize of £2,000, second £300 and third £200.

This years Derby also sees the return of regional Trial Stakes at tracks throughout the country, together with two cross-channel trial stakes at Wimbledon and Walthamstow. The winner of each trial stake will receive £500 and trophy plus free entry to the Derby.

Once again there is a very attractive prize of £10,000 for the breeder of the highest placed greyhound in the classic which was entered at litter stage.

The paddypower.com Greyhound Derby 2000 will provide for 96 entries and reserves. Reserves will be allowed for the first round of the Classic only. Reserves, which will be drawn and listed in order, will be used to replace non runners - observing the seeding rules.

The closing date for receipt of direct entries is Thursday 27th July. The entry fee for direct entries is £250 per grey-hound.

The first declaration date for greyhounds entered at litter stage is on Monday 3 July. (entry fee £15 per single greyhound, or £10 each for two or more greyhounds in the same ownership).

The second declaration date for greyhounds entered at litter stage is on Thursday 27th July and the fee payable is £100 per entry providing these greyhounds were entered at the first declaration stage.

The draw for the paddypower.com Irish Greyhound Derby 2000 will take place on Monday 31st July.

The first round consisting of sixteen heats will be run on Thursday 3rd and Saturday 5th August. Three greyhounds will qualify from each heat throughout the classic.

### A.I. REGULATIONS

Bord na gCon, at its meeting on Wednesday, 7th June, 2000, approved regulations providing for the introduction and use of Artificial Insemination in greyhounds. These regulations are largely modelled on the Australian A.I. Regulations. The most salient features of these regulations are:-

- (1) In relation to frozen semen there will be a sunset period of two years after the death of a stud dog during which time his semen may be used.
- (2) All sires are limited to a maximum of 14 registrations (breedings) per calendar month.
- (3) These regulations will be reviewed after an operational period of two years.

The regulations have been approved by Bord na gCon following widespread consultation within the greyhound industry and having received legal opinion on all aspects of the regulations.

Bord na gCon will forward these regulations to the Department of Agriculture, Food & Rural Development for Ministerial approval.

The second Irish success came in the final race of the afternoon as Derby winning jockey Johnny Murtagh brought the John Oxx trained Katihkha 10/1 with a well timed challenge to out stay Gallery God by a short head.

### **DUBAI MILLENNIUM EXCELLED**

American jockey Jerry Bailey had an armchair ride on the Godolphin owned Dubai Millennium who stamped his class in the Prince of Wales stakes. None of his opponents could live with Dubai Millennium as he maintained a relentless gallop up front drawing clear up the home stretch to defeat the German entry Sumitas.

County Meath trainer Tony Martin who has plundered a number of prizes in England this year was on the mark once again in the Ascot Stakes coming with a sustained run for Johnny Murtagh to deny Seliana in the shadow of the winning post.

### KAYF TARA - A LUCKY WINNER

As we informed readers last week Irish Jockey Mick Kinane had only one ride for the Godolphin outfit and it was a winning one on 11/8 favourite Kayf Tara in the Gold Cup. Kayf Tara cannoned into a weakening San Sebastian in the home straight and was a shade lucky to hold on to the contest in the stewards room.

## Waterford Shock **Munster Champions** In Under-21 Thriller In Thurles

#### **WATERFORD 0-16 TIPPERARY 1-11**

To say that the unexpected happened in this first round Munster under 21 hurling championship tie at Semple Stadium on Wednesday last, would surely be the understatement of the year. The result must be recorded as one of the greatest shocks in the provincial championships this year and it was all the more pleasing and satisfying to us because of the manner in which it was achieved.

For Waterford it was a matter of everything going right on the night with every one of the 17 players playing to his full potential. It was a matter of the team showing tremendous character and fierce determination after the reigning Munster champions Tipperary had eroded our seven points lead and drawning level with 12 minutes remaining.

It was a matter too that the three selectors getting their strategy right and masterminding the correct approach to the game.

Waterford went in as rank outsiders and the great lack of confidence in our prospects was well reflected in the disappointing attendance of Waterford supporters in the crowd of approximately 1,000 who came to Semple Stadium for the game.

On the day before the match bookmakers were offering odds of 7/2 against Waterford and 1/5 on Tipperary and this assessment of their prospects together with the fact that their line out included six of the senior side who had defeated Waterford and Clare in the previous weeks must have made their supporters over confident as they were not present in big numbers either. The perceived imbalance in standards certainly made the fixture a low-key affair which was very much to our advan-

As one official of the board commented, it was all a matter of the team being well prepared, well tuned for the occasion and everything going right on the night. It was a credit to all concerned.

Throughout the match there was no obvious difference in standards and it was gratifying to see that we were able to match our much vaunted opponents in all departments. The same could conceivably be said about our meeting at the same stage last year when we went under by just 2 points after having to field without one or two players who were not available on the night. Tipperary then went on to win the Munster final.

Following our huge disappointment and the depression which set in following our first round senior defeat by Tipperary, this result was a real tonic for the county and gave morale a big and badly needed lift and without going too deeply into the matter, the result did emit certain signals that require careful considera-

#### THE GAME

Weather conditions were dismal at the start and a heavy shower did not help. Tipperary were out on the ground well before Waterford and the cheering which greeted the arrival of our players was in

stark contrast to what we have come to boast about in recent years. It was muted and mod-

We played into the moderate breeze and within 15 seconds we had a point on the scoreboard. It was a well hit point from play by John Mullane.

Two minutes later Pat Fitzgerald pointed a free.

By the 7th minute there were 7 scores on the board. Paul Kelly opened for Tipperary in the 2nd minute and in the third, man of the match, Eoin Kelly made it 3 for Waterford. The same players, Paul and Eoin Kelly exchanged points in the 4th, and 6th minutes and senior player Paddy O'Brien from a free made it 3 for the home side (0-4 to 0-3).

With further scoring efforts going astray because of enormous Waterford pressure, Tipperary were not to score again during this first half while we added a further 4 points to leave it 0-8 to 0-3 at the break. Our scores came from Kelly and Fitzgerald.

A lot of the credit for the halftime lead must go to our defence who held out solidly in the face of great Tipperary pressure. Also, we were holding control in the middle of the field with Eoin Kelly in spectacular form and being well helped by Ger Power.

SECOND HALF

An early Tipperary point helped Tipperary get back into the game, but Eoin McGrath promptly restored our 5 points lead with a splendid 33rd minute score. Eoin Kelly extended our lead to six points before Paul Ryan and John Mullane exchanged scores in the 37th and 38th minutes. A mighty point from Pat Fitzgerald gave Waterford a seven points lead in the 41st minute and Tipp. were struggling to

contain this unexpected challenge.

Then, what might have been disaster struck when a long sideline ball was doubled on by corner forward Paul Ryan to give James O'Donnell no chance in the Waterford goal. The goal sparked off a Tipperary revival and within a further 7 minutes they were level (0-12 to 1-9).

The local crowd of supporters now got behind the home side and the situation began to look ominous for Water-

But it was at this juncture that the real character of this Waterford side began to show and as if throwing caution to the wind, they continued to fight back and had three points 'on the trot' per Eoin McGrath, Eoin Kelly and Pat Fitzgerald to knock some of the growing confidence out of the opposition. Paddy O'Brien and Donnca Fahy had points to narrow the gap to a single score by the 58th minute. A really splendid Eoin Kelly score in the 60th minute gave what was a dangerous 2 points lead as Tipperary rallied and tried frantically to snatch a winning score. What seemed to be this opportunity came two minutes into injury time when Liam Kearney sent a sideline ball to the Waterford net, but the score had to be cancelled because of a ' square' infringement. Waterford were attacking when the final whistle sounded to the great relief of the Deise supporters.


