McDonnell Voted In As Council Chairman

OUTGOING CHAIRMAN ADVOCATES VIGILANTE GROUPS

In his final speech as Chairman of Waterford County Council, Aglish councillor Patsy Kenneally pulled no punches when delivering a hard hitting message against increasing crime in West Waterford.

The outgoing Chairman told last Monday's AGM of the Co. Council that vigilante groups will have to be formed against what he described as the 'criminal element'.

He claimed that houses are being broken into and cars are being stolen along the Blackwater River area to Helvick. The majority of these crimes, he maintained, are being carried out by the "protected species".

"All is in favour of the criminal element", said Cllr. Kenneally adding that it was 'sad' that elderly people in these areas cannot open their doors in the summer. He warned that if the situation is allowed to

continue, violence may eventually be used.

"FOREGONE **CONCLUSION**"

Meanwhile the AGM resulted in a majority Fianna Fail/Fine Gael vote for new Chairman Cllr. Willie McDonnell (FG) with the position of Vice Chairman going to Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson (FF).

Independent member Cllr. Betty Twomey who threw her vote in with the Labour party, said the meeting was a foregone conclusion and the whole AGM a 'charade'.

"I wonder why we came here at all today", she stated. "At this stage we nearly know the Chairmen for the next 3 years".

For councillors McDonnell and Wilkinson however the meeting proved to be a momentous occasion and both spoke of the great honour they felt in taking up their new positions.

"It's an honour for me to be Chairman", said Cllr. McDonnell. "Many councillors over the years would give anything to be Chairman"

Likewise Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said he was greatly honoured to be elected Vice Chairman. Over the coming year he hoped that together the Council can face decisions that have to be made through dialogue and cooperation.

The only other nomination for the Chair and the Vice Chair was Labour's Cllr. Billy Kyne who was defeated on both occasions on a 16 - 4 vote in favour of the long standing FF/FG pact. Absent from Monday's meeting were Cllrs. Nora Flynn, Dan Cowman and Pat Daley.

LONG SERVING MEMBER

Cllr. McDonnell is one of the longest serving members on the local authority having been elected to the Council in 1979. At that time he caused a major surprise in political circles when he topped the poll and elected a second Fine Gael


Government Department To Relocate In Dungarvan

It has been revealed this week that Dungarvan is in line to benefit from the Government's decentralisation strategy to move jobs out of the capital.

While the Government is expected to announce the finer details of their ambitious plan within the next few weeks, it has now been confirmed that the Office of Public Works (OPW) will be relocated to

Dungarvan. Announcing the news was Fianna Fail T.D. Brendan Kenneally who said that after months of discussions with the Minister for Finance and An Taoiseach, he is now assured that both Dungarvan and Waterford city will benefit consid-

erably from decentralisation.

Deputy Kenneally said the OPW will provide a massive boost to the town as it is a high profile section of the Department of Finance with a considerable number of staff.

"While the final numbers have yet to be decided on, I know that all of those who have joined me in pushing Dungarvan's case for decentralisation will be delighted with this development", he

Chairman of Dungarvan UDC Cllr. Michael O'Riordan told the 'Leader' that he welcomes the announcement with open arms.

"It will make a major difference to Dungarvan ", he stated, adding that the Department will be located on the former Glanbia site as part of the first phase of its development.

Cllr. O'Riordan said he is delighted that he had an active part in lobbying for decentralised jobs and worked closely on the issue with Minister of State at the Dept. of Finance Martin Cullen.

"Dungarvan needs such an injection at this point in time", he added.

FUNCTIONS OF OPW

The Office of Public Works is currently based at Stephen's Green, Dublin with the accounts division based in Kilkenny, and various divisions throughout the country. The Department is responsible for providing and maintaining property used by Government Departments. OPW staff design and supervise the construction of new buildings and the design and execution of drainage schemes and flood relief. The Dept. is also responsible for the supply of furniture, uniforms, transport and miscellaneous goods including paper and office equipment used by the Government.

MASSIVE PUBLIC

INTEREST

It may take a long time however before the town experiences the tangible effects of the decision. Based on previous experience and the comprehensive preparations involved, the entire process could take up to two years from the date of a decision to relocate staff to their taking up position in the new building.

Almost whole departments will be involved in the move from Dublin with the net result that the majority of the civil service will be based in provincial towns and cities. Public interest in the programme has been huge with officials in the Dept. of Finance - which is overseeing the move - swamped by submissions from almost 100 towns and villages eager to be part of the jobs windfall.

Dungarvan's own submission

was put forward by Waterford County Council, Dungarvan UDC and the local Chamber of Commerce.

Following an assessment carried out by Department officials, the town was ranked in the top ten of 110 submissions made by towns nationwide. The assessment took a huge range of factors into account including the availability of housing, water and sewerage services etc.

Waterford city looks likely to benefit from the entire Land registry section of the Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform, bringing several hundred additional civil servants to the city. The number of civil servants from this department based in Waterford could more than treble under the current proposals with already over 150 personnel at the Government Buildings on the Cork Road.

He felt that a PRO should be appointed by the local authority to deal with these groups and to enhance the image of the Council.

"They'll find that they will be much closer to finding a solution rather than calling in experts", he stated.

COUNCIL'S HANDS ARE TIED

The Acting Town Clerk has outlined to members however that when the travellers have unhitched their caravans and established a site the Council's hands are effectively tied unless there is a properly serviced halting site to which the travellers can be redirected.

The final course of action open to the Council is to seek an expensive court injunction ordering the travellers to move on.

However Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly said unless the local authority has an alternative halting site, relocating travellers can prove to be very difficult. He claimed that the court would simply ask the local authority where they are going to locate the travellers.

Waterford Co. Council has already adopted a plan to provide a number of transient halting sites in the county and until they are provided the situation will remain difficult, he added.

MUSCLES AND MOVEMENT

Almost half the body's weight is muscle. A muscle is a body part specialised to get shorter, or contract, when it receives nerve signals from the brain. Most muscles are long and strap-shaped. They taper at each end into rope-like tendons which attach firmly to bones.

When the muscle contracts, it pulls the bone and moves that part of the body. This sounds simple, but the process of moving is incredibly complicated. There are more than 640 muscles, and they hardly ever work alone. They usually work in teams to pull, tilt and twist several bones at once.

Also, as one part moves, such as when you hold your arm sideways, muscles in other parts need to work too. Your back and front muscles tense to take the strain, and your leg muscles shift weight to keep you balanced. The result is a smooth, coordinated movement, without you falling over!

MUSCLES BIG AND SMALL

- The biggest muscle is the gluteus maximus, in the buttocks. It pulls the leg backwards powerfully for walking and running.
- The longest muscle is the sartorius, from the outside of the hip, down and across to the inside of the knee. It twists and pulls the
- The smallest muscle is the stapedius, deep in the ear. It is only 5mm long and thinner than cotton thread. It is involved in hearing.






About sixty muscles in the face, head and neck produce our huge range of facial expressions. Some of these muscles are joined, not to bones, but to other muscles. For example, the frontalis muscles in your forehead can raise your eyebrows in a questioning way. Smiling is easier than frowning. A grin requires 20 muscles, while a grimace uses more than 40.

POWER AND COORDINATION

In a complicated gymnastic movement, the brain must control almost every muscle in the body. This needs much practice, but gradually the the brain part called the cerebellum takes over the control, and it becomes almost automatic

Record Numbers Of Students Expected In Summer Jobs

of Ireland said today that it expects a record number of school students in Waterford and across the country to take up summer jobs this year, as it began a campaign to raise awareness among young people about their rights in the workplace.

Although Summer jobs can be a positive experience, some employers do take advantage of young people and exploit them, the National Youth Council of Ireland said. This summer is the first since the introduction of the National Minimum Wage. Peo-

pie under 18 are entitled to a minimum wage rate of £3.08. Even though thousands of young people at work should benefit, there is still some confusion according to the NYCI. Young people in work also have other specific rights under the law through 'The Protection of Young Persons (Employment) Act'.

'The Protection of Young Persons (Employment) Act, 1996' outlines rules in relation to the number of hours that can be worked in a week, rest breaks and work finishing times. Recent research published by the Irish Congress

of Trade Unions has shown that over half of people under 18 in the workplace, work for employers who are in breach of 'The Protection of Young Persons (Employment) Act'.

The NYCI said that any young person with concerns or queries about their work situation, should contact the information phone line provided by the Department of Enterprise Trade and Employment which is 01-6313131.

The seventeen inspectors responsible for policing these regulations are also based in the Department.

Succulent Steak In A Beer Sauce



Dillon Gives Feedback On Proposed Estate At Quann's

By aisling conroy

As reported in a recent edition of the 'Leader', Dungarvan Urban Council proposes to construct seven houses at Quann's on the sea front.

It was originally intended that this new estate would facilitate existing elderly UDC tenants who wish to transfer from houses that are unsuitable due to either their location or size. This in turn would free up the Council's stock of family type accommodation.


The single storey houses would be located on a green field site near Dungarvan Sports Centre which is currently owned by the South Eastern Health Board.

The proposal however has been met with strong opposition from several UDC members not least Cllr. Teresa Wright who said the area at Quann's is completely unsuitable for elderly residents and it was "disgraceful" even to consider putting housing there.

The County Manager Donal Connolly has already discussed the proposed estate with the National Building Agency who have drawn up plans for the development. Provided that the houses are built to the highest standards, weather conditions will not be a factor. The flooding problem in the area was also taken into ac-

count with the result that the sea wall could be raised.

Mr. Connolly has stated however that the two bedroom houses could be used for other people on the housing list and the project is now proceeding to the public consultation stage.

SIZE OF ROOMS SHOULD BE INCREASED

On close examination of the estate, UDC member and local architect Damien Dillon has contacted Council officials with regard to the exposed nature of the site at Quann's.

Cllr. Dillon feels that there are a number of possible ways in which this might be addressed. In a letter to Assistant Town Clerk Joe O'Flaherty, he suggests that daytime access to the estate could also be allowed through St. Mary's Parish graveyard. If the houses were done as a cluster, this would create better enclosure and a better sense of security for the resi-

With regard to the gardens, Cllr. Dillon said a small yard or a patio would suffice for many of the senior citizens.

"I would question the wisdom of such large plots in this instance. The gardens are 65 feet long in some cases. No harm if they were for people capable or interested in gardening", he stated.

However in the case of the room sizes, Cllr. Dillon points out

that times have changed and people now have more appliances such as washing and drying machines, dishwashers, stereo units and computers etc. The main bedroom in the proposed houses is 11 ft by 11ft, which he feels is too small for a double room when taking beds, wardrobes and furniture into account. This, he claims, is not a wheelchair accessible

Other points raised by Cllr. Dillon relate to the need for a garden shed, poor kitchen arrangement and the lack of shelter on the outward opening door.

At the next meeting of the Council in July, Cllr. Dillon intends to move a notice of motion that the Council call on the Department of the Environment to increase the size of rooms as set out in their 'Design Guidelines' (Social Housing Guidelines) as published in 1999. As he already outlined in his letter to the Council, room sizes should have regard to the provision of access for the disabled and additional space is required to accommodate electrics and electronic gadgetry, such as washing machines, dryers, dishwashers, fridges, deep freezers, television set, stereophonic equipment and personal computers, which, he added, are an educational tool and owned by a large proportion of houses in this state.

Growing Herbs In Your Home

If you have a window that gets at least six hours of sunlight, you have the most important ingredient for successfully growing herb plants inside your house.

First, choose a container. There are many different types, so choose the right one for the conditions of your

Ceramic - Great for any plant. Available in a variety of styles, often with watering saucer . Helps retain water in the soil. But they are breakable and heavy.

Plastic - Usually cheaper and lighter weight but just as hard-wearing. Available in a wide range of colours and finishes. Completely waterproof - helps keep the soil moist. Generally resistant to breakage. Sometimes sold with wa-

Unglazed clay or terra-cotta - Traditional outdoor pots. Look attractive when first bought, but soon develop water and salt stains. Porous material soaks up water from the soil. Break easily.

Metal - Attractive, but you need an inner pot to separate the metal from the plant, otherwise it will poison them. Never plant directly into a metal con-

Recycled - Margarine tubs, milk cartons or coke bottles. Cheap option. Check the container is free from chemicals that go into the soil, and drainage is provided by holes in the bottom.

Your chosen pot should allow at least an inch between the side of the pot and the plant roots. Always give herb plants six inches' depth for the roots.

Tulips and hyacinths will now have completed their growth and can be lifted and cleaned. Lay the bulbs in shallow trays and stand them All remaining celery in a dry, cool, airy place, but seedlings should now be not in full sun. Dead tops can be removed.

Spray **Potatoes**

Do not wait until disease attacks your potatoes. Spray them now with Bordeaux mixture. The potato blight disease is common and some plants are likely to betake this precaution.

Sow Carrots

A small sowing of carrots made now is often justified, especially if the season happens to be a bad one for carrot fly. This fly does all its damage early in the summer and seedlings from a July sowing usually escape. Sow stump rooted or intermediate varieties.



The Science of Farming and Food SECOND CUT SILAGE

Cutting 42-46 days after the first cut will give a DMD of 68-72%. Yield won't increase much if cutting is delayed longer than 50 days. As new leaves grow leaves at the base die off.

Again, collect silage effluent.

Make sure to empty all slurry tanks onto these silage fields: It is your last chance to get it all out together without spoiling grass; Dilute the silage effluent before spreading on grass.

With 2000 gallons of slurry apply 50-60 units of Nitrogen for af-

Check how you are "fixed" for silage.

Per month during winter, a cow needs 1.3 tons, a weanling needs 0.6 tons, and store cattle or incalf heifers need 1.2 tons.

If you are tight or short put extra Nitrogen on the grazing and cut area so as to generate extra baled silage.

CONSIDER RE-SEEDING

The opportunity to re-seed is possible when making second cut silage. Teagasc/Kerry Monitor farms have shown tremendous improvements in milk production and in particular milk protein content by reseeding. By spraying the silage crop about 5 - 8 days before cutting with e.g. Roundup, it will be possible to reseed after cutting. Reseeding can be carried out successfully by

traditional ploughing and tilling or by shallow surface tilling with a power harrow or rotospike. These minimal cultivation techniques can be used where stones are a problem or where land terrain is difficult. If considering this technique, some lime (about 1 - 2 tons/ac) should be spread. This is because decaying thrash releases organic acids which may inhibit the grass seed germinating. A surface seeding demonstration will be on view at the Solohead Open Day next Thursday, July 6th.

Choice of variety is important. Recent Research at Moorepark has shown large differences in milk production from different grass varieties. Later heading varieties produce grass of higher quality. Cows eat more of this grass and therefore produce more milk and milk of higher protein content. They are also easier to manage particularly in mid season.

DAIRYING:

JULY MILK YIELD TARGETS

Let's set some milk yield targets for July:

- 1,000 gallon herd should average 3.5 gallons per day
- 1,100 gallon herd should average 4.0 gallons per day
- 1,200 gallon herd should average 4.5 gallons per day 1,400 gallon herd should average 5.0 gallons per day

What is an acceptable milk yield reduction per week?

- 4 gallon: less than 0.8 pints.
- 4.5 gallon: less than 0.9 pints.
- 5.0 gallon: less than 1.0 pints.

If the reduction is greater than this, it indicates: Grass was too stemmy.

Or that cows were forced to graze too tight because grass is There is no excuse for losing milk and money by forcing cows

to graze too tightly. This can also happen if a "butt" of grass has been left from ear-

If the 'tall grass" area in the field has increased dramatically topping must be done: Set the topper to 5-6 cms.

Drive in 1st high gear, but make sure to have blades edged.

Too much topping is cosmetic and a waste of time - disc mowers are probably best and give flexibility in that strong paddocks can be cut out for "bagging".

If grass is scarce and the second cut has not been taken then a few days grazing on the second cut will probably relieve short-

The rotation length will have to be 22-25 days with normal

If it is greater some paddocks may have to be taken out for silage.

FARMING LEADER

IFA HIGHLIGHT DISADVANTAGED **AREA PAYMENTS PROBLEMS TO** DAIL AGRICULTURAL COMMIT

Waterford IFA Western Committee Chairman James Devine has called on the Government to ensure that under new arrangements for Disadvantaged Areas currently being discussed with the EU Commission, that farm incomes must be protected in the changeover in the payments to an area basis.

Mr. Devine said "the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness (PPF) commitment must be fully honoured to ensure that the payments are protected to those farmers for whom Disadvantaged Area payments are an important element of their total

Following the initial rejection by the EU Commission of the Irish proposals on Disadvantaged Area payments, Minister Walsh must strongly lobby the other Member States to insist on an area based system that is acceptable and the July Council of Ministers' meeting is crucial in this regard. IFA will hold the Government to the PPF commitment and if additional money is required to ensure that payment levels are not reduced to 15,000 farmers then the Government must provide this funding", warned Mr. Devine.

Disadvantaged Area payments are worth £140m to over 100,000 low income farmers who farm in 75% of the land area of the country.

FARM GRANTS

Meanwhile, Waterford, IFA Rural Development Chairman Mossie O' Connor states that the IFA National Rural Development Committee raised the delay in the implementation of key farm schemes like REPS, Early Retirement, Farm Investment Schemes and Young Farmer Installation Grants. The Ardmore IFA man said that these schemes which are worth up to £500m annually to Irish farmers are being held up due to delays in getting final EU Commission approval. He called on Dail Deputies to put maximum pressure on both the Government and the Commission for an early start up date for all schemes.

PREMIUM **PAY OUT**

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman Harry Gray has said that the Department of Agriculture has issued payment of the first ewe premium advance amounting to £4.22/ewe in nondisadvantage areas and £8.93/ewe in disadvantage areas. He said the payment in disadvantage areas includes £4.71/ewe in rural world premium.

Mr. Gray said the first ewe premium advance is based on an estimated ewe premium for 2000 of only £14.06/ewe compared to £17.07/ewe last year. "This 20% cut in ewe premium is a devastating blow on hard pressed sheep farmers this year".

Mr. Gray was highly critical of the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh for his failure to tackle the blatant discrimination against Irish sheep farmers at European level in the calculations of the ewe premium. "Irish farmers are been short changed by up to £9/ewe in premium payments and Minister Walsh has failed utterly to make any impact on this issue at Brussels".

The Waterford IFA Sheep Chairman called on the Minister to get tough at the negotiating table in Brussels on behalf of Irish sheep farmers. He said "it is Minister Walsh's job to stand up for Irish sheep farmers at the Council of Ministers in Brussels and stop the discrimination against our industry".

Farmer Related Support From Leader Companies

Following a recent meeting between IFA and the Department of Agriculture, it has been confirmed that the process to implement the new Leader programme is due to commence shortly with an invitation to areas to submit their plans.

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Mossie O' Connor said all areas will be invited to submit broad outlines of their plans by the end of July. Following on that more detailed plans will be required and will be submitted to the Department for approval with a start up date planned for 1st January, 2001 for the new programme.

Mr. O' Connor said that a total of £116m has been provided for the Leader programme over the next six years, with £57m coming under the EU's Leader Plus programme and £55m under a National Programme. IFA has told the Department of Agriculture to apply the Leader programme in all parts of the country either under the EU or National Programme.

Concluding, Mr. O' Connor said that the Leader programme to date has been, in general a success mainly due to the fact that it involved bottom up development. This must be continued by ensuring that local people and communities have a say in the future of their areas.

Abbeyside Topics

Destruction Of Ballyvoile Bridges

Last week we highlighted the feelings of the townspeople as civil war loomed and the fear for life and property that existed among ordinary hard-working people. Though Dungarvan is mentioned in the articles, the same feelings of fear and apprehension must have been experienced by the people of Abbeyside and indeed surrounding areas. It might just give us some small insight into the life experience of the people of Northern Ireland for a long time now or indeed any country ravaged by Civil War in this disturbed world of ours.

Before the impending struggle for possession of the town took place, the focus of attention turned to the Ballyvoile Bridges which cross the deep ravine as the river Dalligan makes its way to the sea. They are situated within the parish of Abbeyside, Ballinroad and Garranbane. Here were constructed two important and beautiful bridges - one, the viaduct which carried the railway across this broad and rugged chasm, the other, the road bridge. Both were substantial works, consisting entirely of masonry. The road bridge was one of three arches with a height of 88 feet above the little river; the railway bridge consisted of nine arches, and rose to a height of 108 feet. The road bridge was one of much symmetry, gracefully turned arches and very important to the district for traffic. It was built under the Grand Jury in 1868. The railway bridge, both from its height and design was a novelty in itself and had been very carefully tested for its strength and suitability for the purposes of heavilyladen trains with powerful engines passing over it. It lay on the line that made up the Rosslare system in the south of Ireland:

EXPERTS DO THE JOB

On the 4th August, the army stationed at the castle could be noticed to be very active. Commandants and others held councils in the streets and at about mid-day a body of them set out in motor cars and lorries in the direction of Ballyvoile, bringing with them fuses, bombs rifles and implements of destruction. They proceeded to the bridges of Ballyvoile. There they set to work. Experts in the art of destruction gave directions as to the means of setting the explosives so as to break the bridges and when all was ready, the bombs were fired. That evening loud explosions were heard for many miles around there were nine or ten rumbling explosions in all and not





long after the news reached Dungarvan and Abbeyside that the bridges at Ballyvoile had been blown up. Residents in the district gave accounts of the methods employed for the centre arch of the road bridge

hurling of massive stones for hundreds of yards around. When the smoke had cleared away, the evil was done. The destruction, of the thunderous was cut clean across and one

roar of the explosions and the arch near the centre of the railway bridge was also destroyed.

The reason given for the destruction was that it was necessary for military purposed but whether this was correct or not, the destruction of the bridge did not impede the entry of the free State army into Dungarvan. (more next





Youthreach Dungarvan

Offering A Segond Change Education

WHAT IT'S ALL ABOUT

Youthreach is a training and educational centre for early school leavers between the ages of 14 and 18 years. It is a second chance for students who have left school with little or no qualifications. It is managed by the County Waterford VEC, and funded by the Government with trainee allowances paid by

Youthreach should always be a first contact for early school leavers because of their social and emotional needs. It is a first step towards gaining the confidence and life skills required for making choices about their future - whether it be to return to second level education or gain full time employment.

BACKGROUND

Youthreach was established in Dungarvan in January 1997. Initially they were based in the Youth Club premises at Quann's.

Recalling the background of the centre, Liam O'Rourke Youthreach Coordinator said: 'We started with ten students and three teachers. By the summer of that year we had relocated to the Presentation Convent School in Mitchell Street. It contains a new computer room with ten computers, and Art & Woodwork room, two other classrooms, one with cooking facilities and an office. We have carried out many improvements to the building and we now have 25 trainees on the books and employ a Coordinator and 8 teachThe centre at Mitchell Street is open between 9.30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday to Thursday with a half day on Fridays to 1 p.m.

CATCHMENT ÁREA

The Youthreach catchment area runs from Kilmacthomas to Lismore including Stradbally, Learnybrien, Aglish, Cappoquin,

Ring, Old Parish, Ardmore etc. SUBJECTS COVERED

Art, woodwork, maths, communications/English, Irish, home economics, health & fitness, computers, work preparation, personnel effectiveness, child-care, music appreciation, personal and interpersonal skills.

Youthreach also has trained literacy staff and is supported by the Adult Literacy Centre, Main Street in offering classes to those who have literacy problems.

The festival promises something for all the family and this year, Tuesday 15th (which has been rescheduled as an afternoon meeting) will be Ladies Day when glitz and glamour will be the order of the day. A huge entry is expected this year for the Best Dressed Lady Competition. The prize money of over £1,000 is sponsored by See Saw Boutique, Georges Court, Waterford. Supervised creche facilities, bouncy castles and face painting will ensure that the kids are entertained, however the fun won't finish when the racing ends. Entertainment in the Inside Track Bar will continue long after the winners have past the post.

Corporate entertaining is proving to be a huge success at Tramore where business and pleasure mix easily and this year the Harrison Partnership will once again be overseeing the catering in the corpo-

rate marquee and full details are now available from the racecourse.

TRAMORE UPDATE

A large sun drenched crowd enjoyed last Tuesday nights seven race mixed programme at Tramore. The tote aggregate figure of just under £50,000 was encouraging and far better than a lot of the midweek meetings at other venues around the country.

Dual Grand National winning jockey Ruby Walsh was in sparkling form riding a brace of winners. In the opening maiden hurdle he had a comfortable ride aboard the Willie Mullins trained Barts Choice this well supported 5/2 shot coming home seven lengths in front of Lisadobber Lady.

Victory number two arrived courtesy of the Dolores Keating owned and Paul Lenihan trained Little K 7/2 this course and distance winner coming with a well timed run to out pace Honey Trader and score by two lengths.

There was some inspired early morning support for the Paul Lenihan trained Cuanin Tain in the one mile six furlong handicap but with very little to recommend him on the form book it came as no surprise to see him finish well down the field behind the Charlie Swan trained 9/4 chance Aboriginal. The John Flynn trained eleven year old Clonagam stayed on well close home to snatch the runner up spot from Liffeydale whose rider appeared not to ride out for second place. This error by Emmet Stack the rider of Liffeydale saw him forfeit his riding fee and also incur a four day suspension. Tarasi also ran in this contest for the Kent family but after racing up with the pace he faded out of contention and is obviously better suited to hurdle races.

Waterford horses dominated both the market and the race itself in the two mile six furlong maiden hurdle. When Brancardier last raced at Wexford he appeared not to stay but on reflection it now looks like he is best suited to a longer trip. Given a supremely confident ride by senior jockey Conor O'Dwyer the Gerry Halley owned Brancardier gave his fourteen rivals the slip early on and showing no signs of weakening in the final half mile he cruised to a nine lengths win over the John Roche trained Ballinarrid, the evens favourite. I am sure if this race was run again Ballinarrid's young jockey would ride his mount closer to the pace but having said that the John Berry trained winner was the best horse on the day. No doubt Brancardier will be launched over fences in the not too distant future and given his experience should pick up a novice chase without to much bother.

Young seventeen year old Rodger Quinlan who is attached to the Eddie O'Grady yard rode his first ever winner in the bumper guiding 10/1 chance Miss Information to an easy victory for his master. Frankie King of Tramore Amusement Park presented £30 to the groom in charge of the best turned out in every race at the meeting.

Tramore Racecourse are offering great value in admission for their upcoming August Festival of racing. For just £35 you can gain admission for the four days plus admission to the November meeting. Considering admission to the August four day meeting is £10 per day and admission to the November fixture is £8 this represents a saving of £13. Tickets can be purchased directly from the racecourse or from Sinnotts Record Shop, Michael Street, Waterford.



This is too many games for our young players. It's an old hobby horse of mine - full time professionals would not be asked or allowed to do this. We will ruin or turn off our most willing and most talented players. The fixtures committee cannot do much about it, as they have a maze of fixtures to run off, and they are hamstrung by the 6 day inter county bye law, as well as some county team managers closing off their players from all matches, whilst in training.

Maybe we should restrict under age teams to two year age groups i.e. only under 17s and 18s can play minor and only 15s and 16s can play under 16, no minors playing under 21, etc. Then if that was the case, Eoin Kelly (a minor) would not have been on the Waterford Under 21 team, nor would Ardmore have won any Minor championships in the last five years, since we had under 16s, and indeed under 14s on all those teams. So the outcome would be that rural clubs would be unlikely to field under age teams, at all. But we would have less teams and less fixture pile-ups. From under 8 upwards, we would not have a team at any age this year, except under 21. Amalgation with our neighbours, would mean that many players would not make group teams, so would never become involved and thereby, in time, would weaken our great association.

TRAINING

Under 16s and minors are now training on Tuesdays and Thursdays, for hurling and football. It is important, that all panel members attend all these sessions, as our numbers on each panel are very small. We need all hands on deck.

Adult training is now in full swing and I'm glad to report good attendances at each session. There are still one or two who need to increase their effort and input.

It has now become a dirty word in the G.A.A. as well as becoming the subject for argument, disappointment, discontent, rows at almost all levels.

One of the problems is that because of the increasing popularity of the games, the crowds wishing to attend are getting bigger with each succeeding year while the stadia in the country are staying the same size.

That is only one of the problems. Another is that the share-out by the Provincial Council seems very unfair to the non-competing counties. Last week, for instance Waterford received only about 2% of the tickets for Thurles which as a 52,000 plus capacity. Assuming that the other three 'neutral' counties got a like allocation, that left over 90% for Tipperary and Cork. That seems very unfair and is something that should be given urgent attention by the Council members.

Distributing the tickets in a county like Waterford is a nightmare for the officers involved when we have several hundred applicants who must be refused.

Now there is going to be further disappointment when All Ireland time comes round as there is to be a further reduction in the allocation in September.

At the last meeting of the county board it was announced that the All Ireland hurling and football allocation of tickets would be the same as last year, in accordance with a decision of Central Council. County boards have now been informed that this was a premature decision as the Rredevelopment programme at Croke Park is further behind than was estimated when this decision was made. County boards have now been officially informed that there will be a 12% reduction in tickets for both finals.




