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IDA Gets Go-Ahead For Major Dungarvan Development

As reported exclusively in the 'Leader' earlier this year, we can now confirm that the IDA have been involved in a

major land acquisition in Dungarvan.

Outline planning permission has been granted by Waterford Co. Council to the

state body for an industrial development on a 36 acre site on the outskirts of the town.

The substantial parcel of land has been acquired in the

Lisfennell and Knockbrack area of the town, on both sides of the main Dungarvan - Cork road.

The land was acquired by Waterford Co. Manager Donal Connolly in trust for the IDA who plan to develop the land for industrial purposes.

The site is adjacent to the existing industrial estate at Youghal road where existing companies such as Stafford Miller, SmithKline Beecham, Century Homes, Microchem and Microbrush are located.

Welcoming the news, local Labour councillor Billy Kyne told the 'Leader' that this again is a welcome response to the body blow suffered by the town through the closure of Waterford Foods.

Cllr. Kyne had previously requested that the Urban Council should emphasise the need of manufacturing industry as part of the strategic growth of Dungarvan.

"I did have concerns that the original draft of the Dungarvan Development Plan seemed to ignore the real so-

cial and economic benefits of manufacturing industry", said Cllr. Kyne, "so this granting of outline planning permission to the IDA will hopefully be the first step in the deliverance of high quality and high paying jobs to Dungarvan".

The IDA are already active promoting the advance factory at Dungarvan Busi-

ness Park at the rear of Frater Field. The £1 million building is a ready-made facility similar to the advance factory at Clogherane which is now occupied by Century Homes.

The County Manager has already expressed confidence that, through the good offices of South East IDA official Pat Loftus, the IDA would secure a good tenant for the factory, thus creating additional employment in Dungarvan.

County Manager Stands By Controversial Landfill Decision

"NO CHOICE" OTHER THAN TO PROCEED

Despite mounting criticism from protest groups and members of Waterford County Council, the County Manager has this week defended his decision to proceed with the next step on the road towards a combined city and county landfill.

Donal Connolly has already ordered the Council's consultants, J.B. Barry & Partners, to proceed with an Environmental Impact Study of the site at Garrynagree/Pulla which is located off the main Cork road, a few miles outside Dungarvan. The site,

which is mainly Coillte owned, has been identified by the consultants as the most suitable site in the county to facilitate a 200 acre superdump.

Mr. Connolly's decision was taken independently of Council members' majority opinion on the matter. Only eight weeks ago the local authority voted 12 - 10 that the search for a landfill in the west of the county should cease.

Speaking at Monday's monthly meeting of the Council, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said he finds it difficult to accept the situation where-

by councillors democratic decision was not accepted by the Manager. Together with fellow Fianna Fail members, James Tobin and Tom Cronin, Cllr. Wilkinson had originally tabled the motion that the Council cease its search for a landfill site in West Waterford.

Likewise Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair pointed out that under the 1997 Local Government Act, it is the councillors who make the policy of the Council. The Labour councillor added that the '96 waste strategy document adopted by members does

not specify where a landfill would be located.

"But Council policy does", he added.

'NO CHOICE'

Mr. Connolly however said the Council has a legal responsibility to provide waste disposal facilities and he has no choice other than to proceed with the EIS for the Garrynagree site.

He told Monday's meeting that there are functions in law reserved for elected members. Based on legal information he received from the Council's legal advisor Howard

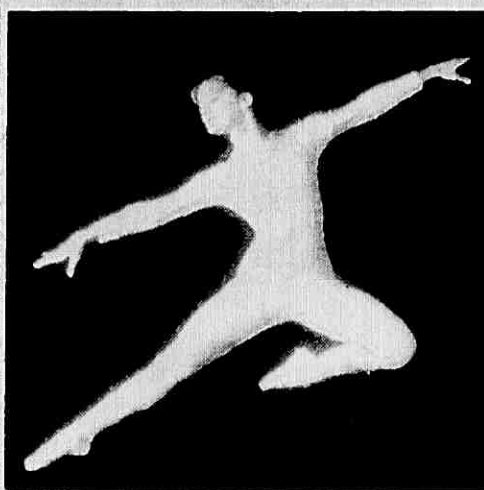

THE HUMAN BODY

BONES AND JOINTS

Most body parts, such as the guts, nerves and blood vessels, are soft and floppy. The body gets its strength and support from its skeleton. This is an inner framework of 206 bones. Many of them are linked at flexible joints, so then can move when they are pulled by muscles. There are many different shapes of bones, depending on the part of the body they support, and the jobs they do. Long bones in the arms and legs work like stiff girders, so we can reach and hold objects, and walk and run. The skull is a dome-shaped bone that surrounds and protects the delicate brain. The ribs form a moveable cage. This protects the heart and lungs within, yet also allows breathing movements. Without our bones, we would just flop on the floor like a heap of jelly!



FLEXIBLE JOINTS

Bones and joints, like other body parts, stay healthy if they are used properly. Exercise and activity can help to develop strong bones and smooth, flexible joints. But if a joint is regularly forced beyond its natural range of movement, it can eventually suffer problems of over-use such as pain and stiffness.

X-Rays

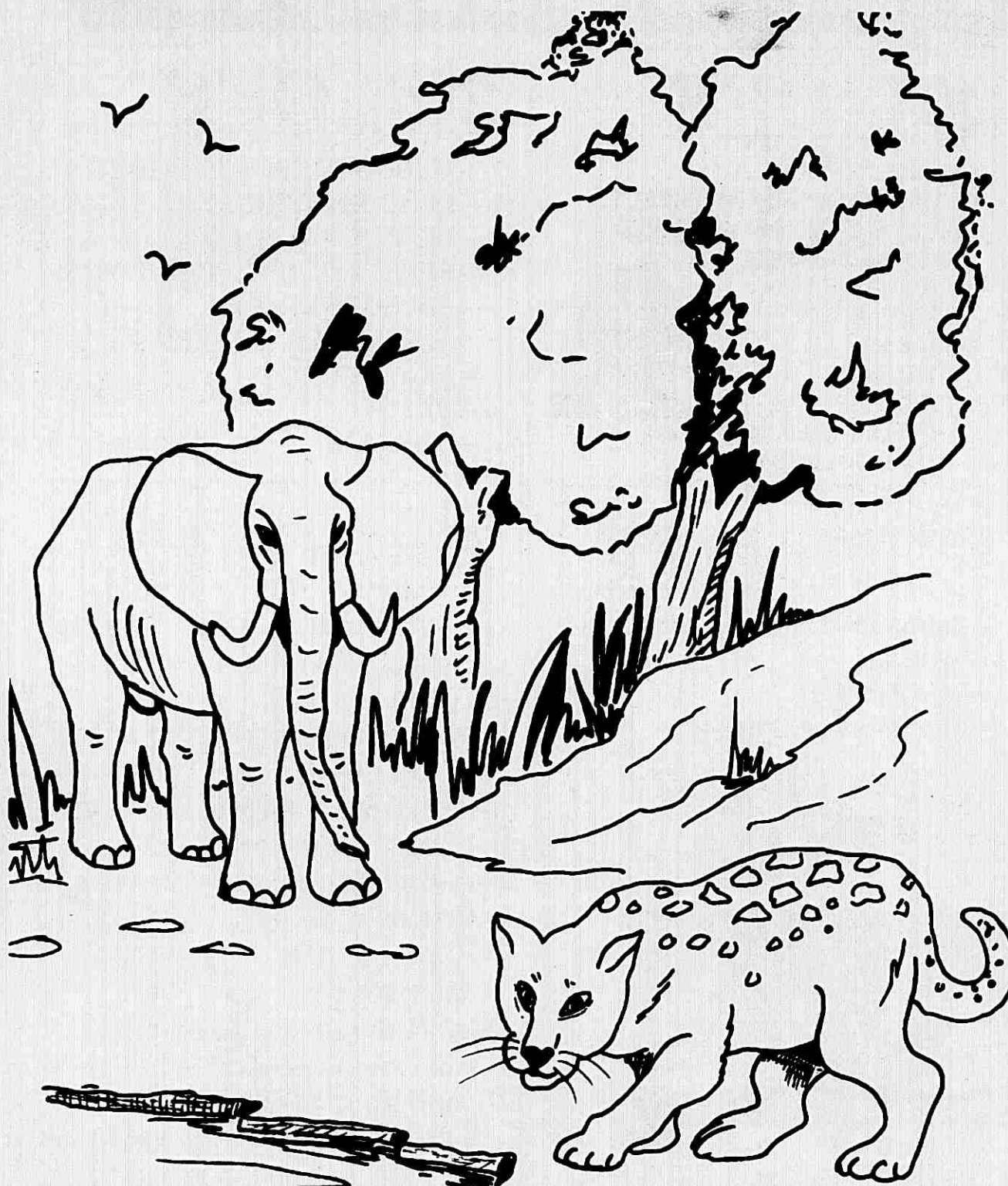
The invisible waves called X-Rays can pass through the body's soft tissues, like muscles and nerves. They expose or darken a sheet of photographic film placed on the other side of the body. But the rays are stopped by dense tissues, mainly bone and cartilage. So these show up white. This X-ray reveals the bones in the wrist, palm and fingers.



HOW MANY BONES?

- Skull and upper jaw 21 bones
- Three tiny bones in each ear
- Lower jaw
- Front neck bone (hyoid)
- Backbone or spine (26 separate bones or vertebrae)
- Ribs (12 pairs)
- Breastbone
- Each upper limb has 32 bones: 2 in shoulder, 3 in arm, 8 in wrist, 19 in hand and fingers
- Each lower limb has 31 bones: 1 in hip (one side of pelvis), 4 in leg, 7 in ankle, 19 in foot and toes.

£10,000 Allocation For Dungarvan Family Centre

The Minister for Social, Community and Family Affairs last week announced that he has allocated £88,400

for marriage and bereavement counselling groups in the Waterford area. While the bulk of the allo-

cation will go towards groups based in the city, Dungarvan Family Centre at Mitchel Street, Dungarvan will receive £10,000.

Welcoming the announcement, Minister of State Mar-

tin Cullen said he was pleased that the Minister has recognised the importance of the work that these groups perform and the outstanding contribution they have made to the Waterford area.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION: Since January I have been on a Community Employment scheme having been on Unemployment Assistance for two years. I live alone and I was told I could keep my rent supplement of £240 a month for up to 3 years while I was on the scheme. I have just heard that other people who started on the scheme in April can only keep part of their rent supplement. Can you explain what the difference is?

ANSWER: With effect from April 2000 the following changes were made to the conditions for the retention of Rent or Mortgage Interest Supplement by people who are on schemes such as Community Employment, Back to Work Allowance and Revenue Job Assist.

The retention of the supplement will be tapered over four years as follows: 75% in Year 1, 50% in Year 2, 25% in Year 3 and 25% in Year 4 (instead of 100% for three years). Back to Work Allowance and FIS are disregarded for the purposes of the £250 gross weekly income limit. The £250 per month limit on the maximum amount of supplement has been abolished.

These changes affect different people in different ways.

Example 1: Someone on a weekly income of less than £250 who started on a back to work programme after 6th April 2000 can only keep part of their rent supplement and this will be tapered over four years. If they had started before 6th April 2000 they could have kept their full rent supplement (maximum £250 a month) for three years.

Example 2: Someone with a family whose weekly income including Back to Work Allowance or Family Income Supplement is over £250 who starts an employment scheme after 6th April 2000 will be able to retain part of their rent/mortgage supplement. If they had started on the scheme before 6th April they would not have been able to retain the rent/mortgage supplement at all.

Also people who had started on an employment scheme before 6th April can choose whichever arrangement for the retention of rent/mortgage supplement is the more favourable (i.e. 100% for three years, or tapered over four years, no £250 limit on payment).

UDC Missed Out In Sale Of Glanbia Site Says Cllr.

Dungarvan UDC missed out in not buying the former Glanbia site in the centre of the town.

Urban Council's Vice Chairperson Teresa Wright who feels that a portion of the former creamery site could still provide an ideal location for

housing Dungarvan's elderly citizens.

"We could be developing all sorts of community facilities if the UDC had it", she

stated. "It is a pity that much of that area (i.e. off the Square and O'Connell Street) has been lost to public ownership".

Cllr. Wright previously criticised the County Manager's plans to locate a housing estate for the elderly at what she regards as an isolated and unsuitable location on the sea front at Quann's.

Having talked to many local people since making her position known, Cllr. Wright said Dungarvan wants a viable alternative to Quann's and that part of the former Glanbia site has been cited as a preferable location.

"We need extra houses for the elderly in Dungarvan. In their design and location, we should take example from previously successful initiatives such as Rices Court. Anyone with an appreciation for older people, who in their golden years deserve a peaceful environment, can see that siting a housing development next to the open elements in Quann's is poor planning", she stated. "That area of the town is clearly an amenity area where facilities for young people and sport should be the priority".

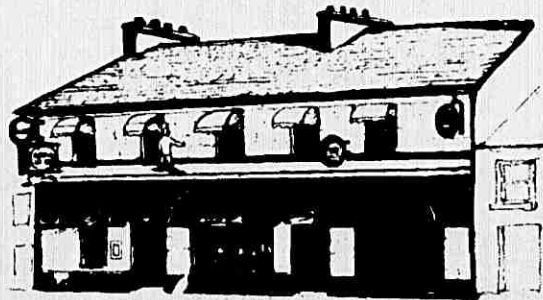

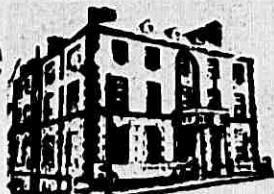

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Dungarvan Leader Gardening

It's The Apple Of Everyone's Eye!

Apples are as old as man. Many fascinating stories involve them – wasn't it an apple that tempted Adam in the Garden of Eden?

The apple probably originated in central/southwestern Asia, and the earliest writings of Egypt, Babylon, and China mention the apple as far back as the 4th century BC. These early apples were probably small, like wild or crabapples.

Apples were introduced to Britain during the Roman invasions in the 1st century BC.

They provide a vital source of food and drink, and were even used medicinally as anaesthetics, antiseptics and sedatives.

Apples are traditionally grown on large trees, but if you only have a small garden, don't worry! Tree sizes have been considerably reduced thanks to the dwarf and miniature varieties that are widely available.

Apple trees can also be trained into almost any shape. Fan-shaped forms



are particularly useful for growing against walls and fences.

The many types of apple tree ripen anytime between mid-summer and late winter, but we usually associate autumn with apple-picking time.

For a tree to flower, it must be subjected to at least 900 hours below 7°C (usually provided by the winter season). Apples tend not to be grown successful-

ly in tropical regions because they don't get enough chilling.

When you are planting, check first how big the tree can grow to, and make sure that it has enough space to develop. A sunny, sheltered site is essential for good crops. Walls for trained fruit should be in full sun.

Apple trees will grow in most well-drained soils. But the more dwarf and miniature varieties prefer more

fertile soil. Keep up a regular maintenance programme to make sure your trees stay healthy and produce lots of apples. Feed and mulch as needed – make sure you read the instructions for the variety of tree you have purchased, and follow them. Blossom and fruit thinning are annual tasks needed to produce lots of fruit every year. Check the tree regularly for signs of pests or diseases.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Prick Out Perennials And Biennials
Perennials and biennials sown in June will be in need of pricking out into a nursery bed. This should be in an open position except for violas, pansies, primroses and polyanthus, which grow more quickly in partial shade.

The ground must be well forked and reasonably rich but not recently manured with dung. Get the seedlings up as carefully as possible (if the ground is dry it is best to give it a through watering the day before you intend to move the seedlings.)

Peg Down Strawberry Runners
The runners of strawberries are most conveniently propagated by pegging them down into pots of compost sunk into the ground. When rooted they are easily transplanted.

Protect Vines From Mildew
Thinning of the fruits will now become general with outdoor vines. A thick mulch of well rotted manure spread over the border will help the vines a lot at this time of year. If there is the slightest sign of mildew, dust the foliage and fruits with flowers with sulphur.

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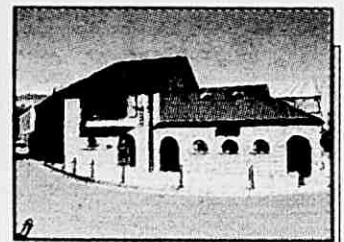

Development Of Ardmore Boat Cove

Waterford Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea tabled a question in the Dail recently asking the Minister for the Marine what proposals, if any, he has for the further development of Ardmore boat cove.

Marine Minister Frank Fahey said the harbour infrastructure at Ardmore is owned by Waterford County Council and development or maintenance works are therefore the Council's responsibility.

He said grant aid totalling £84,000 has been awarded to the County Council in 1999 and this year for pier improvement works at Ardmore with a total cost of £112,000. The Minister added that the Council has not made any proposal to his Department for further development at this location.

"Any proposals which the local authority wishes to put forward will be considered carefully having regard to available funding mechanisms and overall infrastructure investment priorities", he added.

Further to this reply, Deputy O'Shea has taken the matter up with the Council as to when they will be making a further proposal to the Dept. of the Marine for further development at Ardmore.



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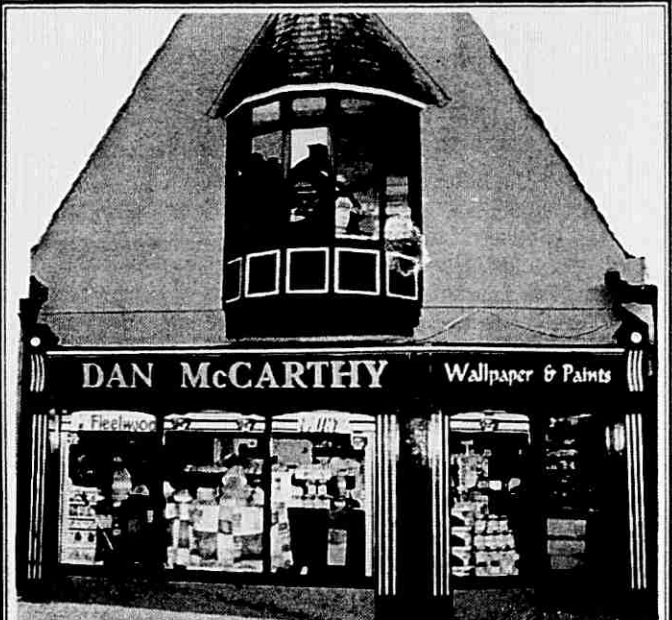
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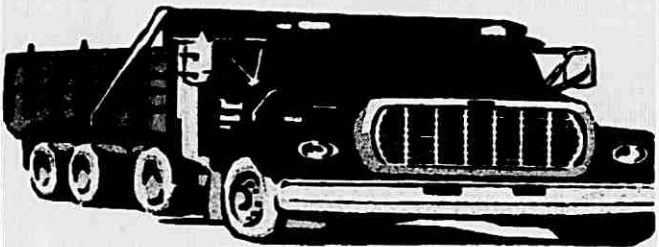

Shellfish Poisoning Alert In Dungarvan

The South Eastern Health Board yesterday advised the public of a serious health alert regarding bivalve shellfish harvested from the Dungarvan area. Bivalve shellfish applies to mussels, oysters, clams, scallops and similar types of shellfish.

During routine monitoring by the Department of the Marine, diarrhetic shellfish poisoning (DSP) toxicity has been detected in mussels from the Dungarvan area by the Marine Institute's Fisheries Research Centre.

The Health Board has therefore advised the public not to

eat bivalve shellfish from this area which were gathered on or after 2nd July.

Restaurateurs and fishmongers are also advised not to offer for sale shellfish harvested from these localities.

Additionally the public has been advised not to collect and consume shellfish from Dungarvan until further notice. Cooking does not destroy the toxins. DSP can cause severe gastrointestinal symptoms which would include diarrhea.

The toxins are produced naturally by microscopic marine plants which are eaten by

shellfish. The shellfish can occasionally accumulate the toxins to a level which render them unsafe for human consumption.

Any member of the public who has consumed shellfish from Dungarvan and who has developed any gastrointestinal symptoms should seek medical attention.

The Health Board has stated that monitoring in all areas will continue and the public will be advised when the harvesting, sale and consumption of shellfish from Dungarvan can be carried out safely.

ESB Plan Multi-Million Investment For West Waterford

The ESB has plans underway to put in place a 220kV development in West Waterford to reinforce the high voltage networks in the area. This investment is necessary to maintain adequate supplies to farming, commercial and industrial customers and to permit continued growth in the area. The budget is currently being finalised and it is expected to be a multi-million pound investment in West Waterford.

The proposed investment is part of the ESB Capital Programme for the next 5 years involving an overall investment in the region of £2 billion, the

bulk of which will be dedicated to the enhancement of the electricity network generally.

In a recent letter to Waterford Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea, the ESB regional manager of the southern region, Chris McNally revealed that since 1997 the company has invested £4 million in upgrading the medium and low voltage networks in the greater Waterford area.

Deputy O'Shea raised the matter in the Dail recently asking the Minister for Public Enterprise the proposals, if any, she has to ensure an adequate supply of electricity in West Waterford.

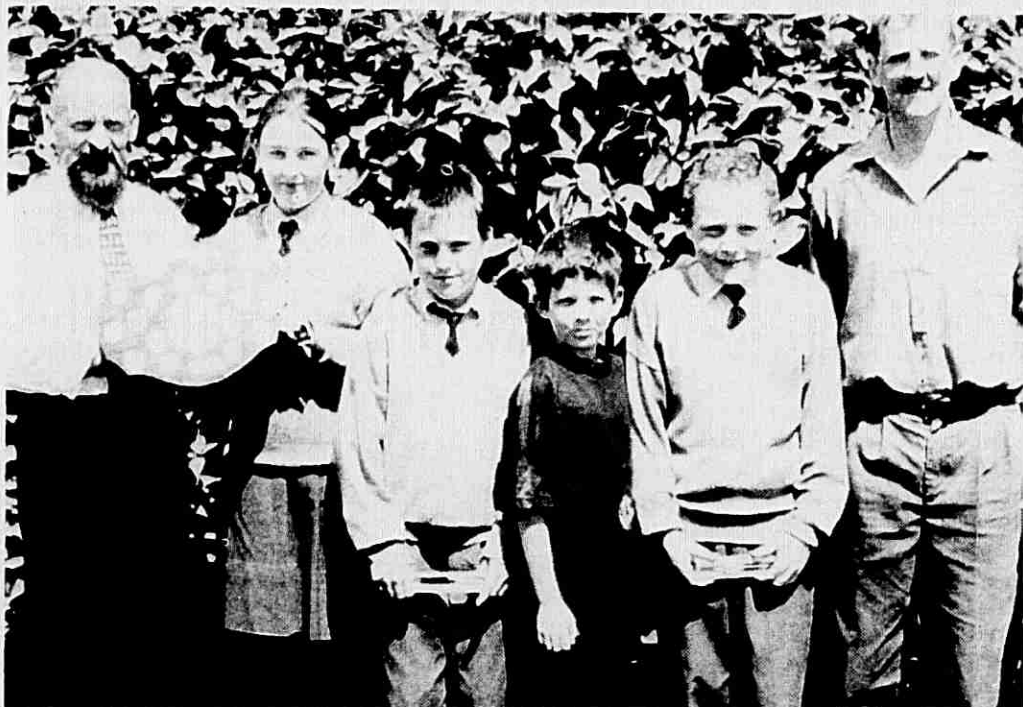

He took a special interest in the handicapped, got them into special schools where they trained to trades and to day they are in permanent employment, thanks to men like John. In the early 40's John organised a turf cutting scheme in Moneaha Bog under taken by Clonmel Corporation. In the 40's he was first elected to Clonmel Corporation and in 1969 he was elected Mayor of Clonmel. He was also a member of South Tipperary County Council. One of the big jobs he undertook was the clean up of old grave yards in South Tipperary, all the fallen grave stones were taken up and reset in their proper place. He helped to get the scheme to the Ancient Church yard at Kilronan where all the fallen stones were erected and a record of the gravestones was compiled. When the second World War began John joined the LDF and later became a member of the FCA where he held the rank of Sergeant, he took part many times in the Command Competitions that used to take place in Youghal.

He was a wonderful husband and father and some time ago he was predeceased by his wife Eileen (nee Kirwan). His conscientious application, unflinching good humour, courtesy, integrity and kindness were readily acknowledged by all who were privileged to have made his acquaintance. His presence amongst us will be very much missed and his memory long cherished by a host of friends.

Many tributes have been paid to this fine gentle, but perhaps the finest was paid to him on Monday evening by the large concourse of mourners who were present when his remains were removed from Melview Nursing Home to S.S. Sport played a very big part in Tom's life. In his early days he was a keen hurler with his local team Tourin. He was noted for his skill and agility on the pitch and he was a member of the Tourin team that won the 1963 County Championship. Even after he stopped hurling his passion for the game never waned and he followed the progress of the county team with avid interest. When he was younger he was also a great bowler

and loved nothing better on a Sunday after Mass than a game of bowls on the Melleray or Tourin roads. In this sport he also won many awards of which he was very proud. Later on athletics took over a big part of life. He was chairman of the local N.A.C.P. and a member of the community games board for which he also acted as coach. All six of his children competed in many events and in later years he coached his daughter to national success in the Long Jump.

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The Science of Farming and Food

DAIRYING: Dairy Cow Fertility

The Moorepark 2000 Open Day took place at Solohead Research Farm, Co. Tipperary last week. Researcher John Mee spoke to the large attendance on the latest research results on dairy cow fertility.

Calving Rates are Declining Over the Recent Years

Teagasc data shows that between 1991 and 1998 overall calving rates declined by 0.5% per year. During this time, compact calving patterns were maintained by culling cows that were bred and using an increased replacement rate. A 10% difference in replacement rate equates to a 5p difference in margin/gallon in a milk quota environment.

Pregnancy Rates are Low on Dairy Farms

A recent survey of 6,000 cows across 73 herds showed that the average first service pregnancy rate was 48%. This, combined with an average submission rate of 70% has resulted in a calving to conception interval of 89 days and 14% of cows not in calf at the end of a 15 week breeding season. This performance is not compatible with compact calving.

Embryonic Mortality is a Command Problem

Detailed sequential examination of 1,000 cows showed that 7% of cows scanned in-calf at approximately 30 days will suffer embryonic mortality over the subsequent two months. Possible causes include infectious agents, nutrient imbalances and genetic wastage.

Genetic Merit Affects Egg Quality

Imported, high genetic merit cows had poor quality ova (eggs) and fewer embryos than medium genetic merit cows. Poor ovum quality, which was significantly affected by body condition score, is likely to contribute to reduced fertility in high genetic merit cows.

Neosporosis Can Cause Severe Foetal Losses

Investigations in herds with high levels of late foetal losses associated with abortions and mummified foetuses has revealed the presence of a new parasite, Neospora caninum. Diagnosis is based on blood samples and examination of the foetus. Control involves improving vigilance in relation to people and animals in contact with the herd.

Milk Testing for Herd Infections is Now Available

Bulk tank sampling for infectious agents which may cause reduced fertility (Leptospira hardjo, BVD virus) can now be carried out to provide herd level surveillance of these infections. A recent Teagasc BMT survey of 57 herds showed that 70% of herds had recent exposure to BVD virus. A nation-wide Leptospira BMT survey is currently underway.

SHEEP: Lamb Weights

A reasonable growth rate target for twin born lambs is 275 g/day from birth to 14 weeks with the result that they should average 32 kg at weaning. This target should be achievable on grass only without meal supplementation.

During the year Teagasc has been monitoring lamb performance on a number of farms and based on the results to date about half of these farms will not achieve the above target. At the 10 weeks weighing there were about 20% of farms between 2-2.5 kg under target.

Possible causes are inadequate grass in early lactation:

- late autumn closing
- late or no "early" nitrogen
- pastures grazed earlier with other stock (early lambing ewes, finishing store lambs)
- Poor ewe condition at lambing
- Lameness (scald) in ewes and lambs
- Poor grass quality particularly 5/6 weeks after lambing
- Parasite infection in lambs

Consequences

There is the potential to achieve at least 2 kg/week pre-weaning while after weaning it is difficult to achieve more than 150g/day or 1kg/week from pasture alone. It takes twice as long to recover deficits that occurred pre-weaning in the post weaning period.

CATTLE: Breeding Performance

At this stage the majority of the cows should be back in calf. If you want to keep the calving patterns compact next Spring then the bull should be removed from the cows by July 20th. This will ensure that all calvings will be completed by early May of 2001.

At a cost of approximately £2 - 2.50/cow scanning the cows and replacement heifers is cost effective and has a number of advantages. It will identify cows that have not yet gone in calf some of which can be treated and rebred. It will also pinpoint barren cows that can be culled once weaned if in fit condition rather than having to carry them over the Winter where they will consume between 5 - 7 tonne of silage as well as clocking up stocking density L.U.'s for extensification.

Apart from giving an indication of when the first cows might calve which is important if cows are to be vaccinated next Winter to prevent scours, it will also identify cows carrying twins which you can then give extra attention too before calving. Scanning can usually be carried out as early as 30 days after breeding.

Keep Cattle Thriving

If you want to come close to the Teagasc Cash in on Grass target of achieving 200 kg liveweight per animal over the grazing season then grass quality for the remainder of the season is important. Although grass quality on silage after grass should be excellent, the quality in the grazing fields is more variable. Growth this year has come in several bursts which has made grass difficult to control and many fields have gone very stemmy. Over the next few weeks these fields should be topped in a bid to stimulate a leafy regrowth which will be required for good animal performance.

South East ICMSA Notes

Co. Waterford Farm Safety & Environment Award

The County Waterford Farm Safety and Environment Award 2000 which is promoted by ICMSA/Teagasc, was launched recently. Application forms are available in Teagasc offices and should be in by 21st July.

The winner will receive a Waterford crystal lamp and £500. The main sponsors of the Award this year are Hibernian Insurance.

ICMSA DISCUSS MILK PRICE INCREASE WITH TAOISEACH

ICMSA has expressed concern to the Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern TD, over any attempt to prevent a planned increase in milk price to retailers.

The ICMSA led by President, Mr. Pat O'Rourke, met the Taoiseach to discuss farm issues. Mr O'Rourke reiterated his view to the Taoiseach that the planned price increase to retailers for milk was fully justified and that it should not necessarily lead to an increase in the price to the consumer. Mr. O'Rourke said that farmers and processors of milk are entitled to reasonable margin of profit and to pass on increased costs. This is normal and is allowed in all other sectors.

"Even if a price increase to farmers results in a price increase to consumers a sense of proportion is required.

Milk expenditure only accounts for 1.7 per cent of the average household budget. Meals away from home were five times more important than milk in terms of contribution to inflation last year, which reflects the increased cost of labour. However, no one is suggesting that these increases are unjustified or should be prevented. The same laws of the market place should apply with regard to milk and other basic food items", concluded Mr. O'Rourke.

ICMSA also discussed with the Taoiseach the erosion of farm incomes due to inflation. Mr. O'Rourke said that farm incomes have declined by over 20 per cent in the last three years. The Government and Social Partners, as part of the Programme for Prosperity & Fairness, accepted this as fact. Furthermore, the programme contains a commitment to bring about a substantial improvement in the income position of farmers in line with other sectors of the economy.

"While there will be a recovery of farm incomes this year the reality is that it will do no more than to restore farm income to their 1998 level. Against this background the huge increase in the price of farm input and inflation generally will see farm income down 8 per cent in real terms compared to 1998", said Mr. O'Rourke.

ICMSA propose a number of measures to alleviate the cost of inputs particularly fuel and sought an assurance

from Government that there would be no increase in Government charges on agriculture over the next three years.

IFA Says Lamb Factories Should Be Paying Minimum Base Price of 108p/lb. For Lamb

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Harry Gray has said that lamb factories should be paying a minimum base price of 108 p/lb for lamb. He said the French market was returning 19 FF/kg, equivalent to 108 p/lb IRL. "Taking account of the high value of the 5th quarter, the factories should be returning the full French price to Irish farmers."

Mr Gray said there was some indications that lamb supplies were tightening and factories were not able to reduce prices as fast as they would have liked. He said "some factories adopted an unscrupulous approach and attempted to lower prices to £1 /lb early this week but did not succeed because of tighter lamb supplies. This action was totally unjustified considering the stability of the French market at 19 FF/kg."

Mr Gray pointed out that the UK market was returning between 84 and 85 p/kg live weight, the equivalent of 106 p/lb IRL.

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Understanding The Fears Of The Phobic

Perception is the organisation of sensation. However perception is often distorted by anxieties. Under normal circumstances situations are perceived and integrated as reality. However anxious, phobic or other depressed persons misperceive situations irrationally and their appraisal of feared situations becomes unrealistic due to cognitive distortions. Phobias that are linked to a certain danger can spread to other objects or situations linked to a traumatic situation that would produce similar fear. Thus certain phobias can cause post traumatic stress disorder. Phobics fall into three groups - those that fear social rejection - those that fear travelling alone, heights and crowds - and those that fear blood.

Studies show that fears have a common denominator - they produce physical and psychological fears rather than superficial attributes of the feared object. Traumatic phobias develop as a result of an unpleasant or injurious experience. Many children develop fixation phobias which are intense fears in childhood that they do not outgrow in adulthood. The reason for this is that these children's maturation in respect to the feared object was fixated at an early stage in their development. Typical examples of these fears are fears of water, thunderstorm, doctors and blood. Studies show that children who remain fixated on their fears have learned to avoid the feared object by observing their parents' avoidance behaviour and that these fears and avoidance behaviours are then reinforced by their parents. The child did not have to master the fear because he was conditioned to avoid the feared situation. Thus with each subsequent avoidance this phobia became more deeply entrenched. Incidentally I must point out here that every child has active normal fears that he outgrows.

RATIONAL V IRRATIONAL FEARS

Many people ask what is the difference between realistic fear and a phobia. Fear is created in the mind and when it is a distortion of reality then it is not real. Healthy fear is triggered when we are exposed to outside dangers and is triggered in non-phobic and phobic persons. Some individuals are exposed to dangers through their occupations - like fire fighters, police or military personnel, yet appear to experience no anxiety. These individuals adapt to dangerous stimuli through repeated exposure and so develop an adaptive mechanism and by focusing on the work that needs to be done. This adaptive mechanism is in fact the very skill developed in cognitive behaviour therapy by the use of exposure and desensitisation techniques.

Phobics are paralysed by a dual belief system, the probability of harm when in the feared situation and the belief that the situation is harmless when removed from the feared situation. When a phobic encounters the feared situation he becomes anxious and perceives the situation increasingly dangerous. This danger value increases until the threat dominates appraisal of the situation. The situation now shifts from harmless to dangerous. When children with normal fears - such as fears of unfamiliar strangers or dangerous environments - grow and develop into more mature patterns they learn to reduce the exaggerated consequences to a more appropriate level. However at times under strained conditions or illness the erstwhile fears can be triggered and reactivated. Severe depression or prolonged insomnia may trigger or reactivate old fears.

Often people with agoraphobia are puzzled as to how they passed through their childhood and teens without symptoms but then in their adult life develop this fear of going into public places or riding in cars etc. One of the theories from studies is that these victims don't manifest this disorder until they experience a change of circumstances. Studies show that these individuals have separation issues and have difficulty in managing their emotions. Many factors precipitate agoraphobic symptoms such as the birth of a child, the loss of a loved one through death, or increased pressure at work or at home. These pressures increase performance responsibilities so if someone believes they perform inadequately their fears may be activated. As self confidence or support is eroded the victim feels a loss of self control and begins to perceive a variety of external dangers such as getting caught in a wood or losing control whilst driving. The fears expand irrationally so that leaving the house becomes a serious threat.

The victim's automatic reflexive reactions produces symptoms of serious internal chaos and the victim has no reliable defence against those attacks. This loss of control and competence convinces the victim that he or she is a

victim of internal and external forces of which they have no control often causing the victim to seek the help of a caregiver and enter a stage of total dependency. This creates panic and a deeper sense of inadequacy.

AGORAPHOBIA

Recent studies suggest that distressing imagery plays a role in the psychopathology of agoraphobics. Agoraphobics operate on the premise that an overwhelming disturbance can happen at any time, that there is nothing that can mitigate this occurrence and that they are vulnerable to disaster if easy access to their home is blocked. In fact agoraphobics feel trapped and they are concerned with free movement. These feelings amplify the threat and often victims feel faint. Their conflict revolves around dependency, autonomy and control, their need for self sufficiency and need for help. Many agoraphobics perceive themselves as frail individuals who require a strong person to lean on when they enter the emotional danger zone and in my opinion the agoraphobic has latent fears of situations developed in early childhood such as crowded stores or open spaces. In adulthood agoraphobia may be based on activation of these latent fears.

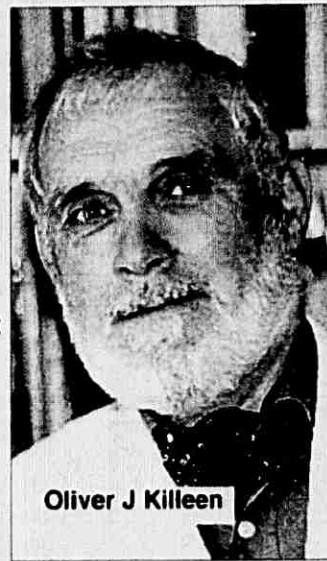
SOCIAL PHOBIA

Social phobics are concerned with an exaggerated fear of being the focus of attention and devaluation by others. The diagnostic and statistic manual on mental disorder states that social phobia is a persistent irrational fear of a compelling desire to avoid a situation in which the individual is exposed to possible scrutiny and humiliation by others. An important aspect of social phobia is the sufferer's expectation that his poor performance will cause rejection or negative events to occur. The social phobic believes he is being scrutinised by others when engaged in one on one encounters and is sensitive to rejection and acceptability by others. Social phobics experience great anxiety when meeting people in authority, they experience the feelings of a child subjected to the evaluation of others. The agoraphobic experiences difficulties that resemble the child who has been put in a strange place for the first time. The agoraphobic is consumed by a cluster of fears that something disastrous or some physical damage or attack will occur.

The social phobic is usually consumed by shame issues. Shame is the exposure emotion and it is in effect related to a persons thoughts of his public image. Social phobics see themselves as inferior, flawed and weak. The social phobic feels his only recourse is to withdraw. Shame is often a tool of control used by others. When others produce shame the memory is stored and it influences approaches to similar situations in the future. A particular condition is set up by the phobic - if I behave in such a way I will be ridiculed - leaving the victim no option but avoid the shame that would result from it. My next article will deal with how the fear of loss or abandonment leads to social phobia.

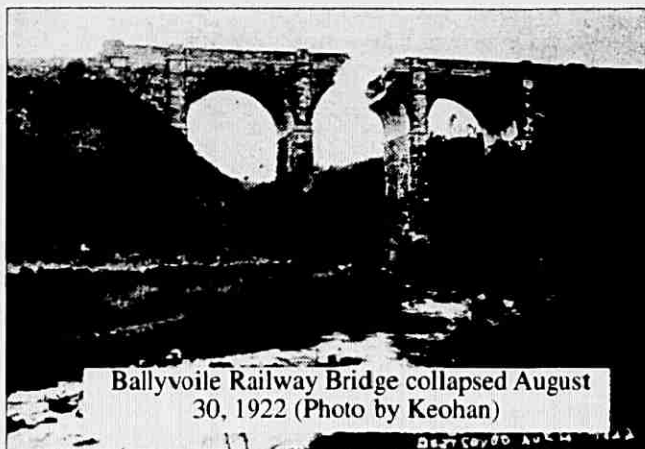

DESTRUCTION OF BALLYVOILE BRIDGES

Last week we described the destruction of Ballyvoile Railway Bridge and our photograph showed the one arch that was blown up on August 4, 1922. As this week's photograph shows that was not the total end product of the explosion. Just three days following the blowing up of one of the nine arches, a second arch fell down and the bridge remained like this for nearly a fortnight.

After this period of time a third pier fell falling against the next one and tumbling it. One pier after another collapsed in this manner until the Dalligan Valley was a mass of debris.

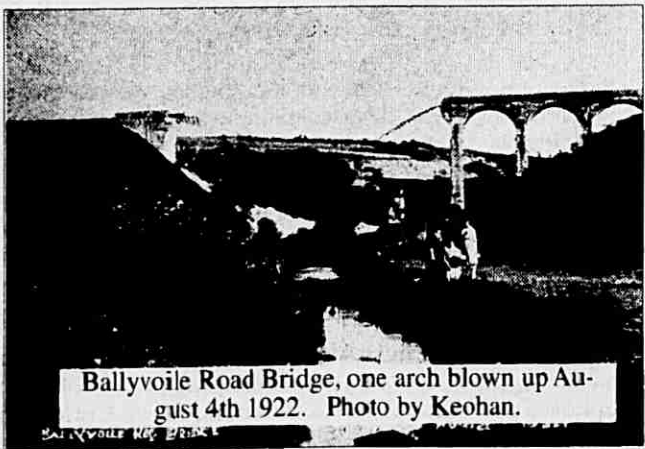


Ballyvoile Railway Bridge collapsed August 30, 1922 (Photo by Keohan)

ROAD BRIDGE

In the absence of the road bridge which was gradually slipping away and had moved out a couple of inches, Mr. Bowen, the county surveyor, took the matter promptly in hand. He arranged to have stout baulks inserted between the middle piers to prevent them collapsing. He also inserted strong wire cables at the ends and he thus saved the bridge. The expense of this preservation work cost about £100 but should the bridge have collapsed, the cost of restoration would have amounted to £8,000. Before Mr. Bowen undertook these steps to save the bridge, he was obliged to procure a permit from the officers of the Irish Republican Army.

Recipes



COOKERY CORNER

Tasty Tuna Fishcakes

Preparation: 20 min
Cooking: 10 min

A TASTY supper dish for the family this summer – little pastry parcels with a ham and asparagus surprise inside!

Ingredients:

(serves 6-8)

- 4 medium sized ham steaks
- 4 sheet-ready rolled short crust pastry
- 2 x 5ml sp prepared mustard
- 8 thin slices cheddar cheese
- 440g can asparagus spears, well drained
- Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste
- Oil for deep frying.

Method:

CUT each sheet of pastry in half, so you end up with eight strips of pastry.

Cut the ham steaks in half. Fill a large pan or deep fryer

two-thirds full with oil.

While the oil is heating, prepare the parcels.

Place a ham steak half on one strip of pastry

Spread ham steak with mustard. Top with a slice of cheese and two asparagus spears.

Season to taste with salt and pepper. Brush the edges of the pastry with a little water. Fold the pastry over the ham steak to form a parcel.

Seal the edges by pressing all around with a fork. Repeat with the remaining pastry and ingredients. You will end up with eight parcels in all.

Place the parcels seam-side down in the hot oil. Fry until they are golden brown and crisp.

Using a metal fish slice turn over and fry until golden brown on the other side – about two minutes' frying time for each side. Serve with a crisp green salad.



Lasagna, spicy sausage style

Ingredients:**FOR THE SAUCE:**

- 1 x 15ml sp dried oregano
- 1 x 15ml sp olive oil
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 x 5ml sp dried crushed red pepper
- 3/4 cup peeled carrots, diced

FOR THE LASAGNA:

- 2 x 15ml sp minced garlic
- 15 lasagna noodles
- 200g lean ground beef
- 750g ricotta cheese
- 150g spicy Italian sausage, skinned
- 1 cup grated parmesan cheese
- 1 700g can crushed tomatoes
- 250g frozen chopped spinach 1/4 cup tomato paste
- 2 large eggs
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh basil
- 4 3/4 cup grated mozzarella
- 1 x 15ml sp golden brown sugar

Method:

FOR SAUCE: Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add onion, carrots and garlic and saute. Add beef and sausage; saute until cooked through. Add remaining ingredients, cover and simmer until sauce measures about 5 cups. Discard bay leaf and cool.

FOR LASAGNA: Preheat oven to 350°F/175°C. Cook noodles in boiling salted water for about 7 minutes. Drain and cover with cold water. Combine ricotta and 3/4 parmesan cheese in a bowl. Mix in spinach and season. Mix in the eggs. Drain pasta and pat dry. Spread 1/2 cup sauce in the bottom of a 33x22 cm glass baking dish, then five noodles, overlapping to fit. Then 1/2 the spinach mix, 1/2 the mozzarella and 1/4 of the sauce. Repeat layering, end with noodles. Sprinkle remaining cheese evenly over the lasagna. Cover with foil, bake for 40 mins. Uncover and bake for 40 mins. Let stand for 15 mins before serving.

Mouth-watering chocolate bars

Ingredients:

- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 2 cups packed brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 x 5ml sp vanilla
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1 x 5ml sp baking soda
- 3 cups quick-cook rolled oats
- 1 x 350g can sweetened condensed milk
- 1 x 300g pack chocolate pieces
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 2 x 5ml sp vanilla

Method:

Set aside 2 x 15ml sp of the butter or margarine.

In a large mixing bowl beat the remaining butter or margarine with an electric mixer on medium speed for 30 seconds.

Add the brown sugar and beat until well mixed. Beat in eggs and 2 x 5ml sp vanilla.

In another large bowl stir together flour, baking soda and

oats. Gradually stir dry mixture into beaten mixture. Set aside.

In a medium saucepan combine the reserved butter or margarine, the sweetened condensed milk, and chocolate pieces. Cook over low heat until chocolate melts, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Stir in walnuts and the 2 x 5ml sp vanilla.

Press two-thirds of the oat mixture into the bottom of an ungreased 38 x 25 x 2 1/2cm baking pan. Spread chocolate mixture over the oat mixture. Using your fingers, dot remaining oat mixture over the chocolate.

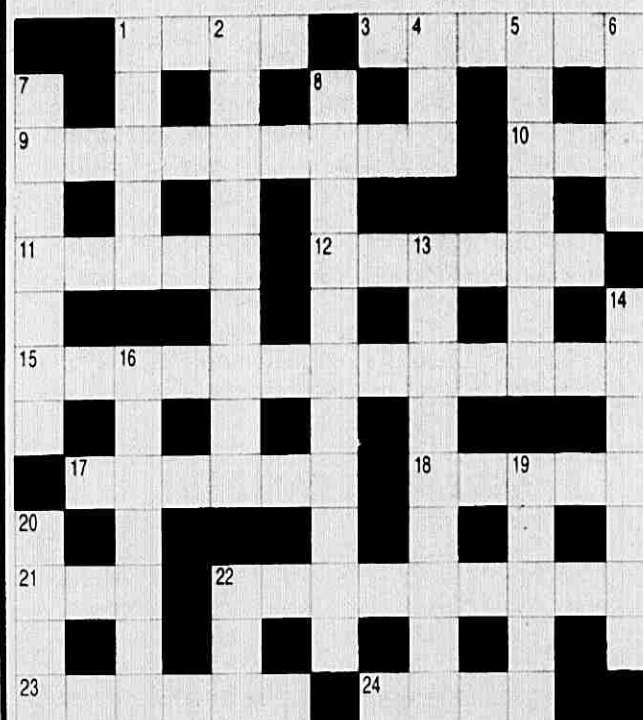
Bake in a 350°F/175°C oven for about 25 minutes or until top is lightly browned (chocolate mixture will still look moist).

Cool on a wire rack. Cut into 2x1-inch bars. Makes about 75 bars.

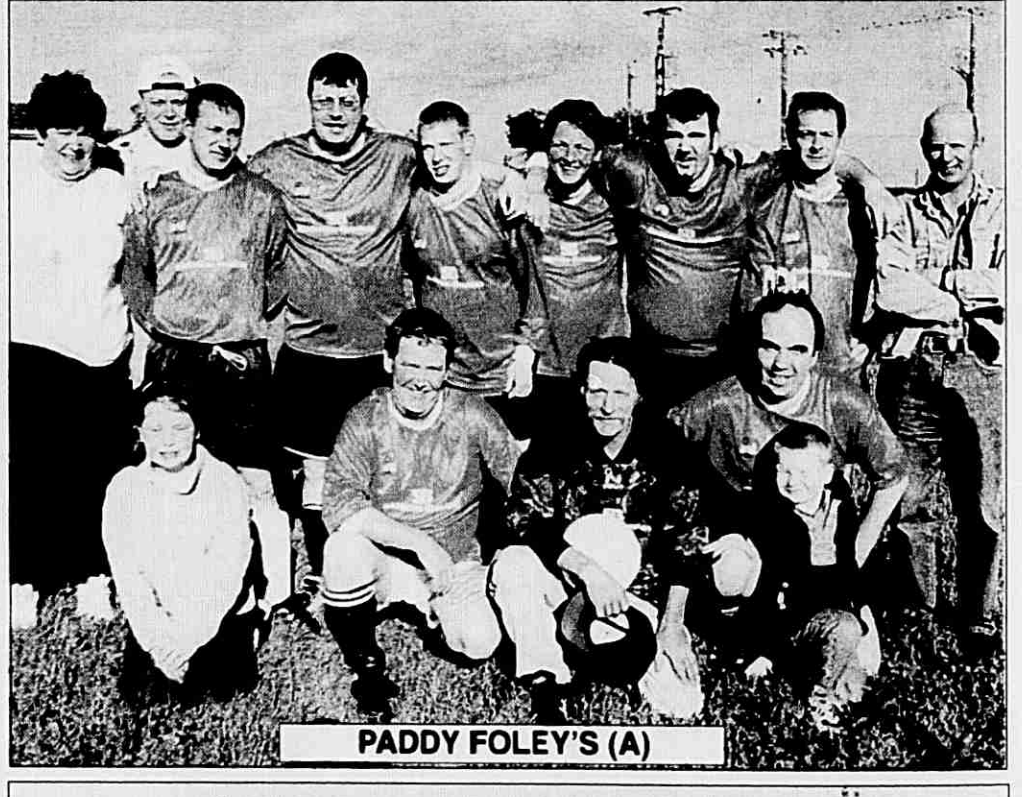

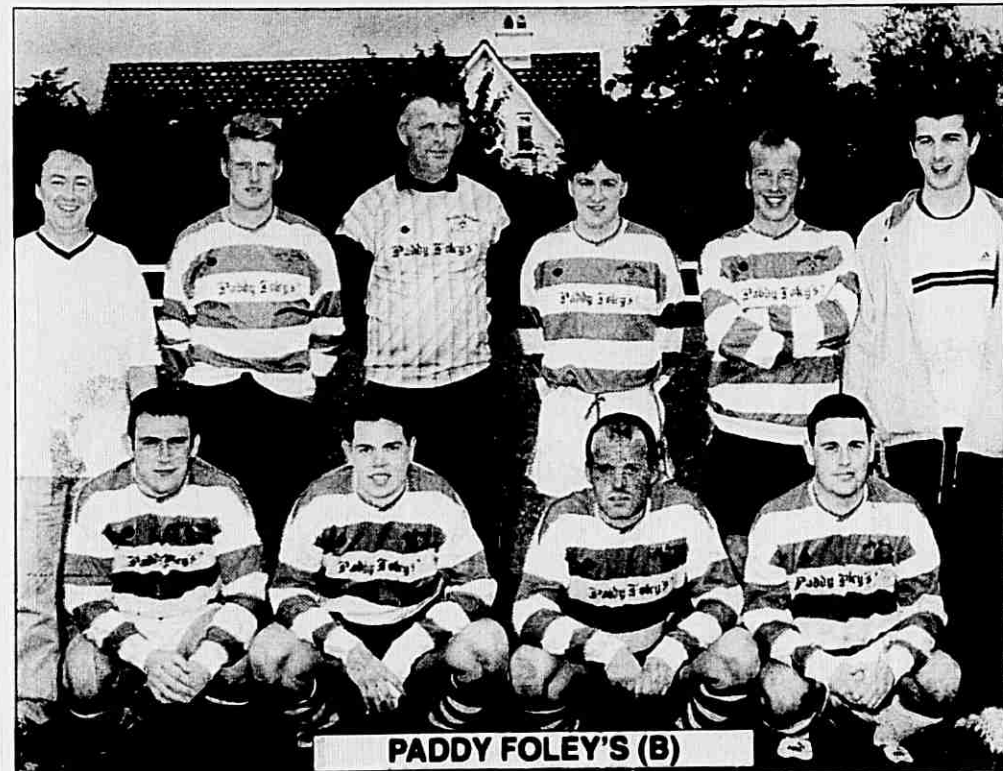

New Licensing Laws Mean Longer Pub Opening

The Government's new licensing laws came into effect last Thursday. The main provisions of the Intoxicating Liquor Act are longer opening hours and a major clamp-down on underage drinking.

Commenting on the new laws, the Minister for Justice John O'Donoghue said the new Act is the most important piece of liquor licensing legislation to have been enacted by the Oireachtas in 4 decades. He continued: "The Act introduces a system of permitted hours in line with public expectation and demand on terms that are socially and economically acceptable".

Minister O'Donoghue said it sweeps away decades-old restrictive legislation and puts in place strict penalties against those who sell or supply alcohol to under age persons.

The new opening hours for licensed premises are as follows:

Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays - 10.30 a.m. to 12.30 a.m. (and half hour drinking up time) all year round. The previous pub opening time was from 12.30 p.m. to 11 p.m. with the holy hour of 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. These have now been abolished. Sunday closing time on the eve of a public holiday is 12.30 a.m. and a half hour drinking up time.

Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays are 10.30 a.m. to 11.30 p.m. and half hour drinking up time all year round except on the eve of a public holiday when closing time is 12.30 a.m.

In addition, any premises license to sell alcohol such as supermarkets and grocery stores may sell alcohol from 7.30 a.m. on all weekdays.

In the case of nightclubs, the need to provide a meal as a condition for special exemption is abolished as well as the requirement that a premises be a hotel or restaurant. Special exemption orders will now be granted in normal circumstances to 2.30 a.m. with 30 minutes drinking up time.

New measures to clamp down on under age drinking also came into effect last Thursday. These include convictions for under age drinking leading to temporary closure of a premises. There is now an obligation on licensees to be satisfied as to the age of a person before supplying alcohol. The national voluntary age card is the method of establishing proof of age.

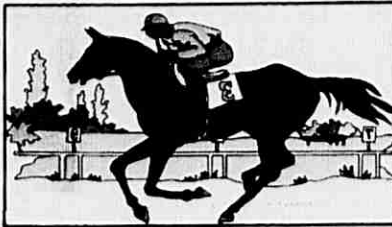

This is also where the first tournament was to take place on Friday 16th of June. In the mean time there were several training sessions in the local boxing gym. This was a great benefit for the Dungarvan Boxers to be in a pre fight environment with boxers and coaches of this caliber, indeed when Friday came round all the boxers were really up for it. James Cawley was selected to fight on the second tournament in the Bronx on Tuesday so he could relax and help out with getting the boxers ready. Disappointment for Jeremy O'Mahoney as his opponent Chris Traietti Quincy B.C. was unable to show. A replacement was brought in, but on inspecting his record

book his age is sixteen, and as Jeremy is only thirteen his coaches would not allow the contest and rightly so. But Garry Collins did fight and what a fight it was, he took on Detective Greg Tragar of the N.Y.P.D. 43rd Precinct, this was a cracker of a contest from start to finish which earned Garry the respect of his team mates and the crowd and also Greg Tragar. It was a tough close contest but Garry was the sharper boxer on the night and won the contest unanimously. He seems to be improving with every bout. The N.Y.P.D. requested a rematch for the Bronx, this was no problem as it was hoped to have all the Irish boxers on that show, the Gaelic Park being an Irish venue. Coincidentally the referee for Garry's contest was Gerry O'Mahoney so there were two Dungarvan men in the ring at the same time, this did not matter as they were part of a team and not a club.

Incidentally both teams were paraded into the ring by a colour party from the State Police, the American, English and the Irish flags were displayed, the National Anthem for the three countries were sung by Sergeant Dan Clark. He sings at all the

Football and Baseball games but he did not realise there were Irish on the team until the day before the contests so he learned Amhran Na bhFiann as Gaeilge and did an excellent job.

Of the fifteen bouts the Anglo Irish team won ten, the upset of the night was the defeat of English middle weight champion Steven Swales on a majority decision to Chad Dawson from New Haven. English Light Weight champion Andrew McClean was to win his last Amateur Contest against Edwin Rosado Y.M.C.A. Andrew from Birtley Boys B.C. is to turn professional in September so watch out for his name you never know he might be the one to beat Nazeem

The whole team headed off for New York on Sunday and stayed at the Milford Plaza Hotel just off Broadway. Two days viewing the sights and then back to business on Tuesday at the Gaelic Park, the Bronx. More disappointment for Jeremy O'Mahoney as his opponent Jose Rodriguez Clinton B.C. refused to box him because of Jeremy's high number of fights in his record book. Garry Collins's opponent Greg Tragar broke his toe while train-

ing for the fight, he still turned up but the doctor would not allow him to compete and a replacement was found, Tim Heechin from the N.Y.P.D.

James Cawley was also matched, he was drawn against Fireman John Montez.

But first the two teams were paraded onto the pitch and up to the ring by the N.Y.P.D. Pipe Band to the tunes of "Let Erin Remember" and "Sean South", a beautiful summers evening and all the right ingredients for an open air tournament.

The first Dungarvan boxer was Garry Collins and he put on a brilliant display against Tim Heechin, the first round was close but Garry just about got it. At the end of the second round Garry was caught with a right cross and a left hook which sent him to the canvas, he got up within the count and recovered before the bell as he went back to his corner Chumba Wumbas "I get knocked down but I get up again" was appropriately being played over the P.A. system. Garry came out in the third round and left Heechin no where to hide, he boxed him all over the ring, a great come back by Collins, but not all the judges saw it

that way and he lost on a majority decision. Next saw two Dungarvan men in the ring again, James Cawley and referee Gerry O'Mahoney. James was up against John Montez a very big fireman who seemed a lot bigger than James but none the less James was not deterred and had a very good first round and possibly won it, but Montez strength got the better of James and he won it unanimously. This was a light middle weight contest and James is really a light welter weight but he stepped up for this trip and did very well and should be very proud of the fact that he

boxed so well in America, indeed the whole team did Dungarvan proud. They contributed greatly to this Anglo Irish Tour and hopefully it's the first of many such Tours. Already the Americans were making plans to come over here and to bring us back out there.

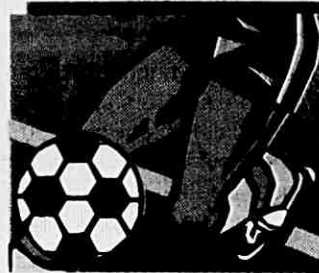

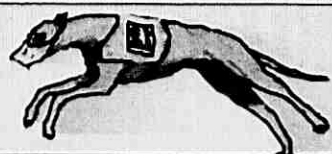


Pictured above is the Downey's team who put up a gallant effort against the Shandon Arms side in the Amstel Pub League recently.

Unlucky Waterford Pipped By Kerry In Thriller

A marvellous second half display by Waterford after everything seemed lost at the halfway stage certainly won them the admiration of the 2000 crowd in Fraher Field on Thursday last but it did not win the right to a replay which they very richly deserved on the night.

It was one of those agonising results that disappointed our huge support at the venue. Losing by 0-10 to 1-2 at halftime after Kerry had given a dazzling display of precision football, Waterford having missed a 7th minute penalty, were not expected to make a match of it in the second half and the only issue now seemed to be the size Kerry's winning margin.

A very spirited second half performance which yielded a goal and six points and contained the hot favourites to 5 points, or half what they scored in the first half, brought us to within a single point of the winners after 60 minutes and 25 seconds. The little bit of time added on was not the only issue that Waterford supporters found reason to complain about in the refereeing of the game. Certainly it was difficult to understand a few of his decisions in the closing six or seven minutes.

The result puts an end to our football championship prospects for the season and from an underage point of view it will be recalled as the season on which we almost make the long, long overdue break through, defeating Kerry in a replay in

Tralee in under 21 semi-final and being pipped against Kerry in the Munster minor semi-final after qualifying through the round-robin competition.

It has been a long hard season for the minors and for the selectors who are to be complimented on their marvellous effort. We did not win trophies, but they have certainly brought underage football a long way in spite of numerous difficulties.

In this regard it is worth noting that nowhere on the team or the full panel can we find the name of even one city player. Out of 45/50,000 population this should certainly be a matter of serious concern.

John Hennessey, trainer, Pat Nugent, manager, Michael Monahan with John Kiely and Tony Corcoran (both of whom were added to the committee this year) have done a tremendous job and it can be expected that the benefits of their labours will be reaped in the not too distant future.

Points by Barry O'Sullivan, Declan Quill and Mark O'Connor opened up an early 3 points lead for Kerry in the first 6 minutes.

In the 7th minute Waterford were awarded a penalty which was unfortunately saved by the Kerry 'keeper

Shane O'Neill and the resultant '45' was sent wide.

Billy Harty opened our account with a pointed free in the 12th minute.

Following some delightful movements by the swift Kerry forwards they added a further 2 points and at the end of the first quarter were certainly not flattered by their 0-5 to 0-1 lead. Declan Quill added another point before a Waterford raid yielded a splendid goal by Bob Costello who took a pass from Michael Walsh. This brought some respite for an out-classed Waterford. Further Kerry scores brought their halftime total to 0-10 and a 30th minute Billy Harty point took Waterford to 1-2;

Waterford On Top

John Hurney and Tom Cooper had been introduced for Waterford and Michael Walsh had a point within seconds of the restart. Donal O'Sullivan replied for Kerry. Declan Quill and Billy Harty exchanged points as did Fleming and Harty in the next few minutes to leave the score at 0-13 to 1-5. In the 42nd minute Quill and Eoighan Walsh exchanged points and by this time Waterford were on top and Kerry defending. Costello and Harty had Waterford scores and then only 3 points separated the sides in the 52nd minute. Exerting enormous pressure Waterford continued to barrage the Kerry goal and a couple of good saves by Shane O'Neill denied them a goal before a combined effort

saw Shane Walsh through for the equalising goal with 7 minutes remaining. The alarm bells were ringing around the Kerry camp, but they did not panic. In the 58th minute a Kerry free fell short but was subsequently converted by D. J. Fleming.

Waterford in making one final attack saw Eoighan Walsh fouled but the advantage was allowed and a free awarded seconds later when the ball was out near the sideline. Billy Harty was instructed by the referee that he had to score from play. The angle of the shot was too great and the ball went just wide

After the game Kerry county secretary Tony O'Keefe said: "we were given the fright of our lives for the third time by Waterford footballers this year. They are on the fringe of a breakthrough that no one will begrudge them."

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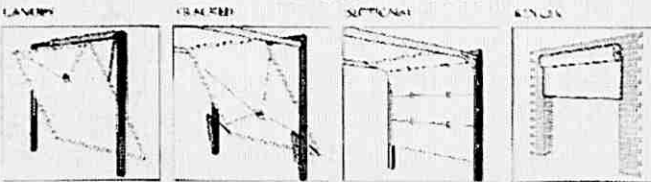
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
