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# Multi-National Company To Locate In Dungarvan

## MAJOR SHOPPING COMPLEX, PUB AND CINEPLEX PLANNED

Details of the first phase in the multi-million pound development of the former creamery site in Dungarvan

have been publicly revealed this week.

A planning application was lodged last Friday by the owners of the Glanbia site,

Clancy Construction, with the planning section of Dungarvan Urban Council.

The Tipperary based construction company plan to demolish the existing creamery buildings on the site at Shandon and construct a major shopping centre comprising of 15 shops and eight retail kiosks, a coffee shop, creche, staff facilities, public toilets and all ancillary services.

The main entrance onto this part of the developed site will be from the Waterford/Cork bypass road. The application also covers associated access improvements and site works. The site will also be linked to Grattan Square via the former Waterford Foods access near the Allrounder.

Clancy has also sought permission for a four screen cineplex, seven commercial units with ten overhead apartments, a public house/restaurant/night club, two commercial/retail units, nine houses, car parking and

an entrance building with a clock tower.

This is the second planning application to be lodged for the Shandon site, the first being a successful applica-

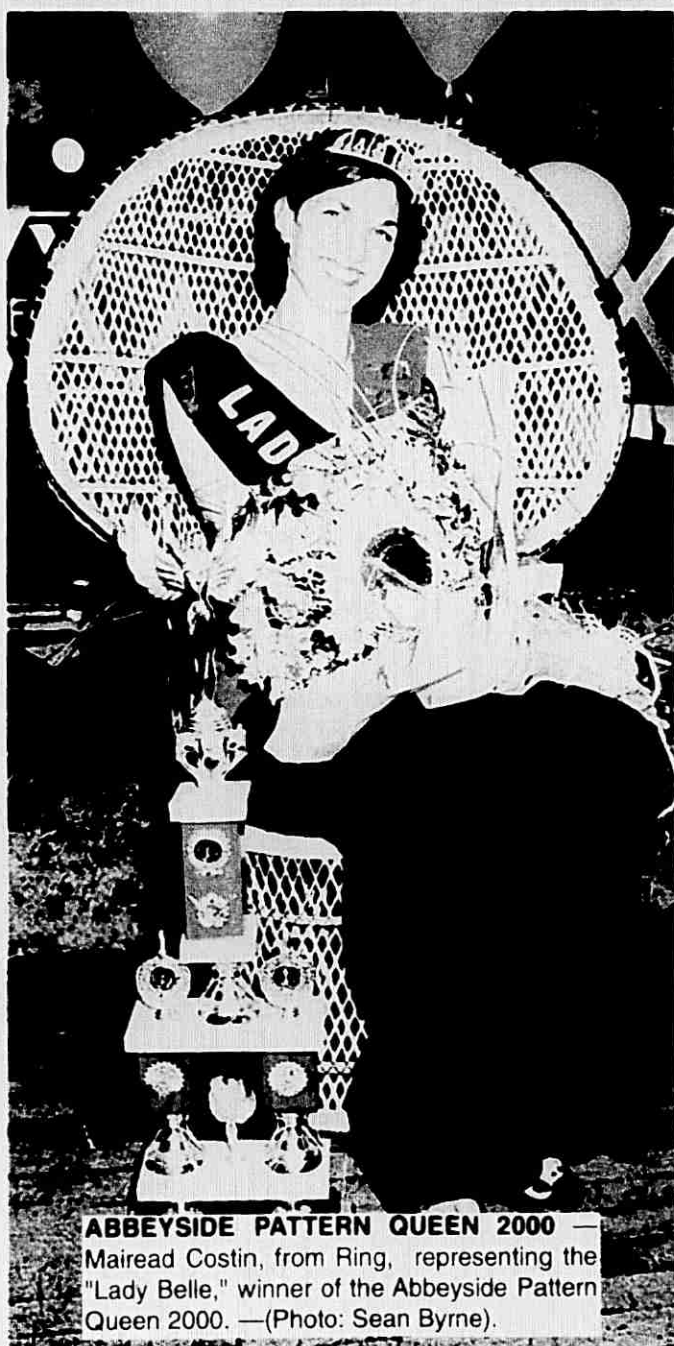
tion by Dungarvan Energy and Rolls Royce Power Ventures for a power generation plant on four acres of the former creamery. Speculation is also rife that the Office of Public Works will be relocated to the near 40 acre site in the next round of Government decentralisation

announcements.

### GOLDEN OPPORTUNITY SAYS O'RIORDAN

Chairman of Dungarvan UDC, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said the planning application is the "biggest thing ever to happen to the town" and will drive the whole of

## Ban Lifted On Dungarvan Shellfish

The South Eastern Health Board has this week advised the public that the serious health alert regarding bivalve shellfish harvested from Dungarvan, is now lifted. Diarrhetic shellfish poisoning was previously detected in mussels from the Dungarvan area during routine monitoring. The ban applied to all bivalve shellfish including mussels, oysters, clams and scallops etc. which were gathered on or after 2nd July.

Follow-up testing and monitoring of the Dungarvan area by the Department of the Marine however has confirmed that shellfish from the area is now safe for human consumption.

Monitoring in all areas will continue as usual. The harvesting, sale and consumption of shellfish from Dungarvan can be carried out safely.

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## Cllrs. Not Liable For Water Pollution

Members of Waterford County Council were told this month that they are not liable in the event of pollution or damage to health from water resources within the county as a result of planning decisions made by the Council as a whole.

Stradbally public representative Tom Cunningham moved a notice of motion that the Council seeks legal advice regarding any individual liability exposure to councillors in relation to the matter.

Cllr. Cunningham raised the issue in view of recent statements made by the Minister for Local Government Noel Dempsey regarding the quality of rural drinking water and the right of private individuals to take legal action against a supplier of contaminated water.

Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly however ruled out any liability occurring on members.

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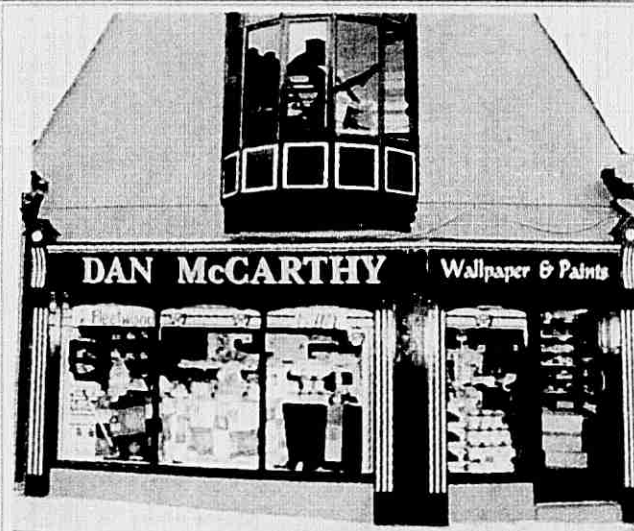

# THE HUMAN BODY

## LUNGS AND BREATHING

**Every animal body, including the human body, needs oxygen. This substance is a gas and makes up one-fifth of the air around us.**

Oxygen is needed because it is an essential part of the life processes inside the body, which break down the food we eat to release energy contained in it.

The energy is used for growth, movement and every other body activity. The body system that obtains oxygen from air is called the respiratory system. Its main parts are the two lungs inside the chest. The movements of breathing suck air into the lungs, where oxygen passes from the air into the blood. The blood flows away and carries the oxygen to all other body parts.

This is a continuous process, because the body cannot store oxygen for the future. So, if breathing stops, the oxygen supply fails. After a few minutes, the body begins to die.

### BREATHING

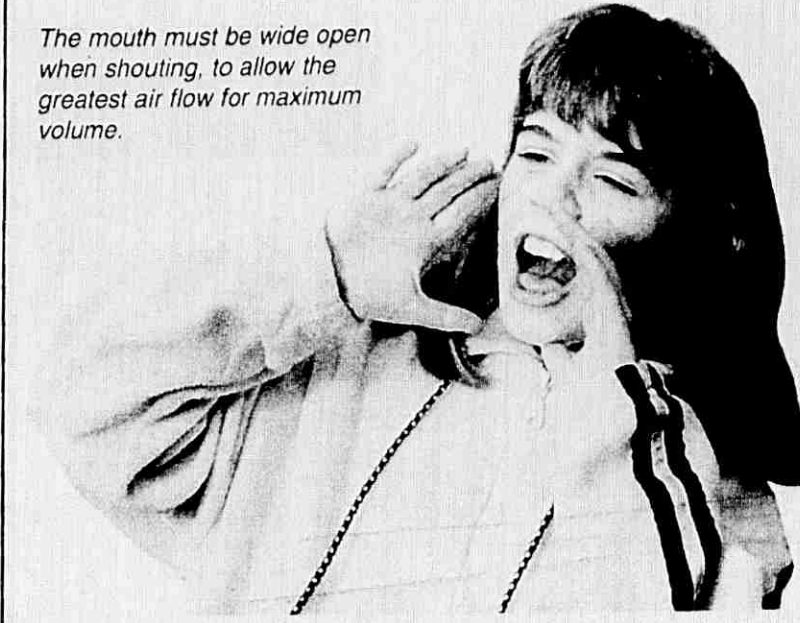
Breathing involves two sets of muscles. One is a large sheet-like muscle in the base of the chest, the diaphragm. This pulls the lungs down. The other set is the intercostal muscles between the ribs, which pull them up and out.

Together, these muscles stretch the lungs and make them suck in air. Then the muscles relax. The lungs spring back to their smaller size and push out the stale air.

### NOISES FROM FLOWING AIR

Just below the throat, at the top of the windpipe, is the voicebox or larynx. Air flows through this during breathing. The larynx has two shelf-like folds of cartilage (gristle) in its walls, the vocal cords. In normal breathing these are wide apart. But they can be pulled together by voicebox muscles to form a narrow slit.

*The mouth must be wide open when shouting, to allow the greatest air flow for maximum volume.*



As air flows through the slit it makes the cords shake fast or vibrate and this produces a noise. Other muscles stretch the cords longer to make the noise higher-pitched, like a squeak.

This is how we talk — and sing, shout and make many other noises, both deliberate and accidental!

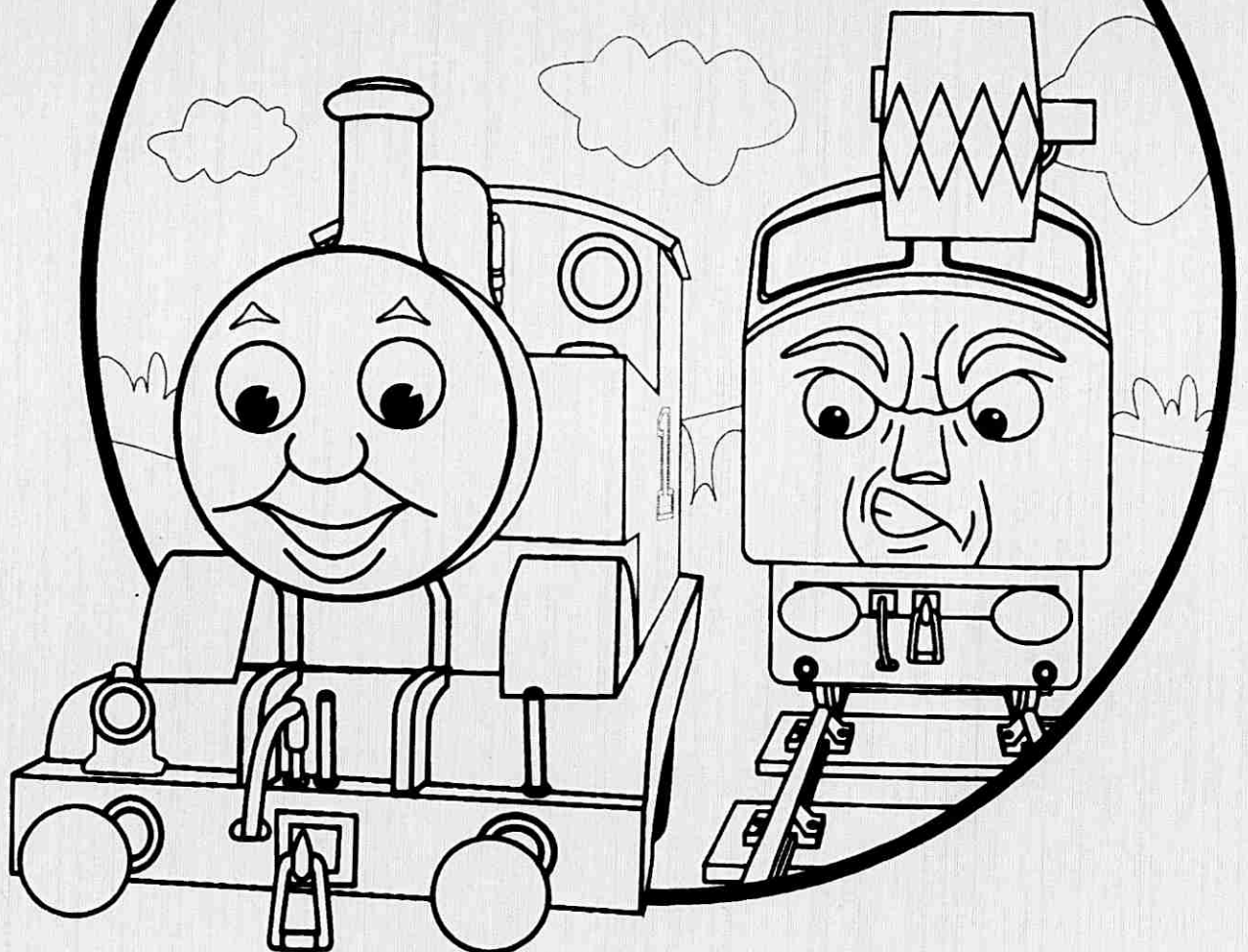

# Multi-National Company To Locate In Dungarvan

Dungarvan over the next 50 years.

While declining to confirm the identity of the anchor tenant involved in the project, Cllr. O'Riordan however did admit that it is a multi-national company.

"This is the first time that a supermarket has had an opportunity to build a supermarket inside the town. It is a vote of confidence in Dungarvan that not only have we have this company looked at the town, they are now prepared to build a major supermarket here", he stated.

Cllr. O'Riordan added that the development of the Glanbia site is a golden opportunity for the Council to finally provide a playground as well as a substantial green area of up to 4 acres. He said the Council will also insist that at least 200 public car parking spaces will be provided on the site together with 300 private supermarket spaces.

"There's a big onus on us as councillors", stressed Cllr. O'Riordan, adding that he will be calling a special meeting of the Urban Council to discuss the proposed development.

The UDC Chairman has called for the unanimous local support of the project, including the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce and local traders.

"No doubt small family grocers will be worried and it's up to us to allay their fears", he stated. With regard to the proposed night club and licensed premises however, Cllr. O'Riordan said members must examine whether the town needs another such facility. "At this point in time I'll be saying no to a night club", he added.

### GOOD BALANCE NEEDED

Naturally, the development of such a large shopping

complex as part of the planning application begs the question whether Clancy Construction has already secured an anchor tenant such as Dunnes, Tesco or Superquinn etc.

The name Dunnes has already been freely bandied about by many local observers while Tesco Ireland and Superquinn have also expressed a strong interest in locating in Dungarvan.

Many agencies have already advocated the advantages of multiple competition to the benefit of the consumer. Equally however, other interests, such as town planners, have consistently pointed out at Council planning presentations, the critical importance of retaining the traditional shopping heart of the town that is currently built around Grattan Square and the adjoining well-established businesses. Likewise, the potential commercial attraction of a major multiple in the town may not be welcomed by local shopping interests.

This type of balance in the proposed development will be borne in mind by Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly who is expected to make a decision on the application in two months time. The views of UDC members will be taken into account by the Manager and

if the project is granted permission, members may be required to vote on a material contravention to rezone part of the site.

The proposed plan for the Glanbia site as lodged by Clancy Construction are currently on public display in the offices of Dungarvan Town Clerk Brian White at the Civic Offices, Davitt's Quay.

### ESSENTIAL EXPANSION

Local Urban Councillor and architect Damien Dillon previously stressed that in the development of this site, it is important to regard it as an essential expansion of Dungarvan town centre. He warned that there should be no conflict between commercial success and good town planning. It is critical that strong links are formed between the original town and any development of the Shandon site, i.e. roads and streets in the new section should follow similar patterns as the original town. Cllr. Dillon feels that there is also scope to solve other problems within the town such as car parking, traffic movements (including public transport) and pedestrian ways. Based on current building costs, he estimated that the site could cost anything between £175m and £350m when fully developed.

## Boost For Council's Anti Litter Campaign

Grants to fund an anti litter campaign in Waterford totalling over £15,000 from the Department of the Environment were welcomed last week by Deputy Brendan Kenneally. Waterford County Council is to receive £6,600 to combat the litter problem.

"This is a significant grant that will help the local authority to further raise public awareness of the environmental damage caused by litter pollution. The campaign will also alert the public to their responsibilities under current legislation to prevent and control litter", said the Waterford TD.

"Litter damages where we live and our tourism industry. So much has been done to keep our communities clean but more needs to be done", he added.

## Access To Church At Templemichael

Problems regarding direct access to the church at Templemichael in West Waterford were raised recently by Waterford Co. Councillor Ollie Wilkinson. Speaking at the July meeting of the local authority Cllr. Wilkinson said direct access by vehicle to the church is no longer possible.

He claimed that a public right of way to the church was in existence "since time began". Bollards and bars however were recently erected on the roadway to the church.

He asked that the matter be looked into as he had been approached by numerous people concerned at the current situation.

County Manager Donal Connolly agreed to further examine the issue of access to the church.

## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

### QUESTION

I am on Disability Allowance and last year I went to the National Rehabilitation Board who assisted me to get a place on a Community Employment Scheme. Now I have been told that in future I have to go to my local FAS office. Is this a recent change?

### ANSWER

Yes. From 12th June 2000 many services for people with disabilities will be mainstreamed. This means that after a short changeover period they will receive services in the same way and from the same organisations as everybody else. Mainstreaming of services for people with disabilities is part of the Government's implementation of the report of the Commission of the Status of People with Disabilities.

So from 12th June 2000 the National Rehabilitation Board (NRB) has ceased to exist and its services are being provided by other organisations as follows:

- Vocational training and employment services for people with disabilities transferred to FAS;
- Comhairle, a new organisation which combines the former National Social Service Board with relevant functions of the NRB, will provide information, advice and advocacy services for all people;
- National Disability Authority (NDA) will oversee the standards of services to people with disabilities;
- Psychological services for children with disabilities are being mainstreamed into the National Educational Psychological Service (NEPS);
- Non-vocational training and audiology services will be subsumed into the health board services.

## Waterford To Benefit From Improved Rescue Service

Ireland's rescue and emergency service will be stepped up with a new plan unveiled to significantly enhance the

Irish Coast Guard's air-sea rescue and marine emergency response helicopter service.

Minister of State at the Department of Finance Martin Cullen TD, said the enhanced service will be of im-

mense benefit in quickly responding to incidents that arise.

"A state of the art aircraft equipped to the same high standards as the Coast Guard aircraft at Shannon and Dublin, will be provided as back-up should either of the frontline machines be out of service for maintenance or other reasons", said Minister Cullen. "A fourth aircraft will be available at all time for further back-up".

The Waterford TD said the helicopter upgrade was unveiled together with an announcement of a new 5 year contract which will continue the Coast Guard helicopter service at Shannon Airport. Extra equipment will be fitted to the Shannon helicopter to enhance its capability for inland and mountain rescue.

"Last year the two Coast Guard helicopters flew 238 missions ranging from air-sea rescue, mountain rescue, medical evacuation, emergency equipment drops to vessels and pollution response. During those missions in 1999 Coast Guard helicopter crews saved or assisted 185 people", added Minister Cullen.

# COOKERY CORNER

## Cajun Coated Steaks

A HOT cajun coating is ideal for kebabs or spread over tasty steaks and chops.

**Ingredients:**  
Serves 2-4  
2-4 beef, lamb or pork steaks/chops  
1 x 15ml sp oil  
2 x 5ml sp black pepper-corns, crushed  
2 x 5ml sp paprika  
1 x 5ml sp dried thyme  
1 x 5ml sp dried oregano  
1 x 2 1/2ml sp cayenne pepper

1 clove garlic, crushed  
Salt  
**Method:**  
IN a bowl, mix together all the ingredients, except the meat. Spread the mixture on to both sides of the meat. Grill or barbecue according to the chart below. This recipe is also ideal for kebabs. Serve with jacket potatoes and salad.  
Note: This mixture is hot. For a milder result spread on to four chops or steaks rather than two.

## Tasty Mushroom and Pea Korma

A VEGETARIAN feast – mushroom and pea korma.  
**Ingredients:**  
Serves 4  
3 x 15ml sp vegetable oil  
1 large onion, chopped  
2cm square of ginger, chopped  
3 plump cloves garlic  
1/2 x 5ml sp turmeric  
1/2 x 5ml sp chilli powder  
2 x 15ml sp ground almonds  
115ml sour cream  
115ml water  
350g assorted mushrooms  
120g green peas  
1/2 x 5ml sp salt  
1 x 15ml sp garam masala  
1 x chopped coriander  
1/2 x 15ml sp chopped mint  
**Method:**  
HEAT the oil in a heavy-bottomed 20-23cm pan and sauté the onion very gently over a low to medium heat for about 15 minutes, stirring to prevent sticking, and adding 1 x 15ml sp water

every five minutes until onions are soft and golden. Meanwhile blend the ginger and the garlic in a food processor for 30 to 60 seconds until puréed. Add the purée to the onions, stir in and sauté for five minutes. Add the turmeric and stir for a minute. Add chilli powder and sauté for another minute, continuously stirring. Add almonds, sour cream and water and bring to the boil. Turn down the heat and simmer for 2-3 minutes until the mixture thickens. Add the mushrooms and cook for five minutes before adding the peas, and then continue to simmer until they are cooked. Bring to the boil, sprinkle on the garam masala, coriander and mint, cover, turn heat down to low for a couple of minutes, then turn off the heat and keep the pan covered until ready to serve.

## Mouth-Watering Savoury Scones

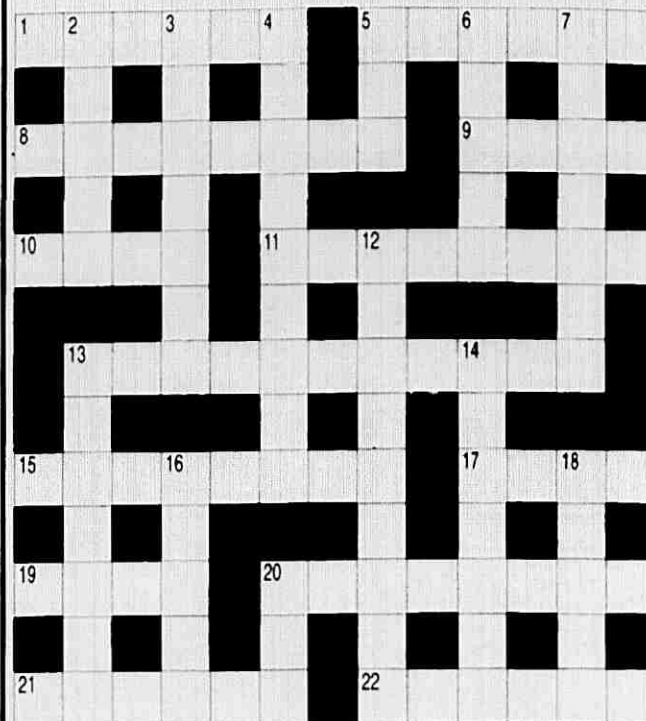
HASSLE-free gourmet savoury scones – they melt in the mouth!  
**Ingredients:**  
Serves 8  
450g self-raising flour  
1 x 5ml sp baking powder  
Pinch of salt  
1/2 x 5ml sp mustard powder  
2 x 15ml sp fresh chopped dill  
180g butter  
2 medium eggs, beaten  
120ml milk  
**Method:**  
PREHEAT the oven to 230°C/450°F/gas mark 8. Sift the flour baking powder, salt and mustard powder, then stir in dill. Rub in the butter. Add the eggs and enough milk to form a soft dough. Knead lightly on a floured surface and roll to 2cm thickness. Using a 7.5cm plain cutter,

cut out eight rounds (roll trimmings again as necessary). Arrange on a baking sheet. Bake for 12 minutes or until the scones are golden and risen. Leave to cool on a wire rack before splitting. The scones can be served as sandwich type bites (with a top and base) or open, with the fillings on display. Try filling the scones with mayonnaise, a little salad and smoked trout, peppered mackerel or finely shredded smoked chicken breasts.

### LINSEED

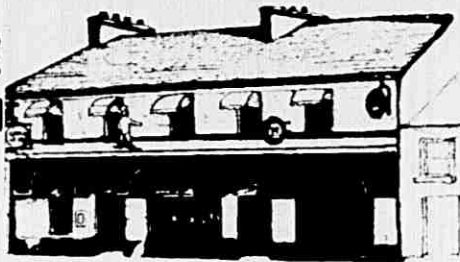

and was coordinated by the South East European Centre (Carrefour), a sub-company of Waterford Leader Partnership Ltd..

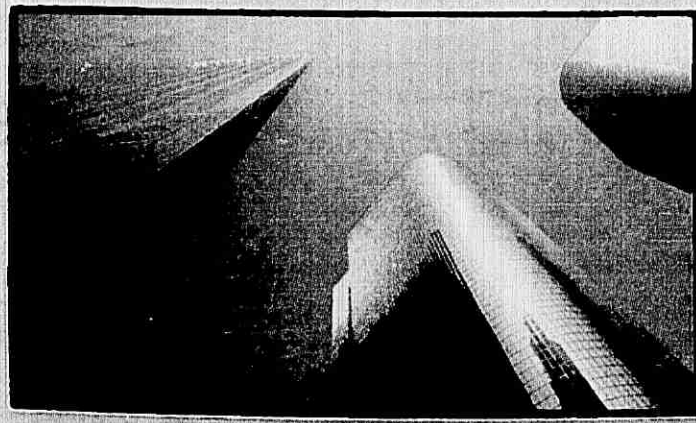
The project also entailed a number of joint exhibitions at which both regions collectively marketed their quality accommodation products; and a number of technical exchanges to discuss future marketing strategies.

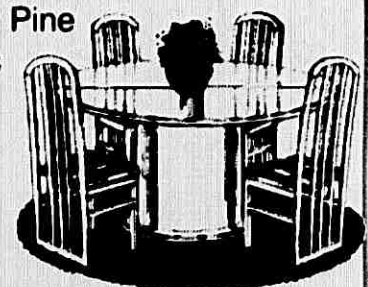

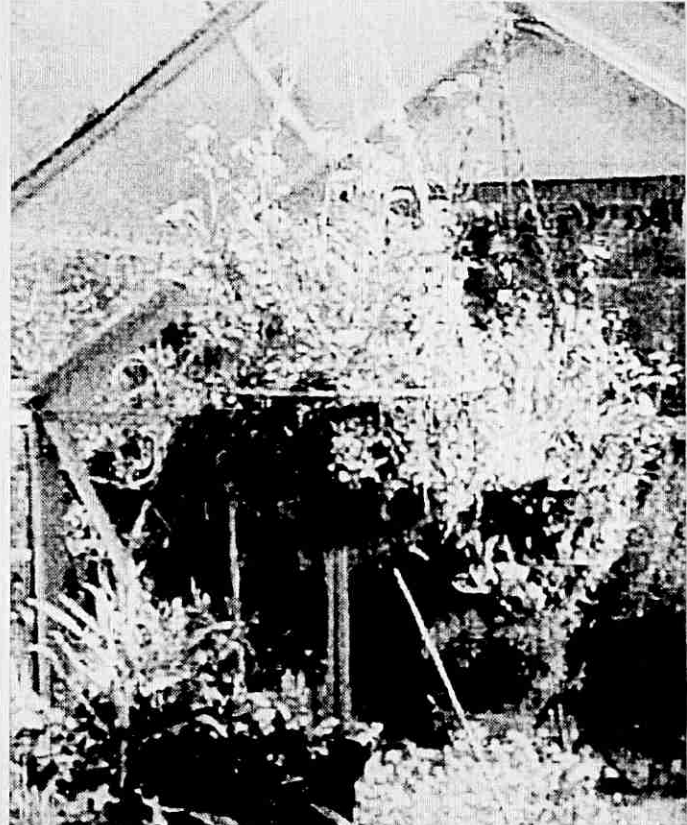

# Last Chance To Hang A Basket

## THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

NOTHING graces a terrace, porch or patio better than a hanging basket with a selection of summer flowers. And a hanging basket in full bloom is a sure sign that summer has arrived. Baskets can be hung from trees, beams, eaves and frames of all kinds. And many a country railway station has won a best-kept competition on the strength of its hanging baskets. The great thing about hanging baskets is that they can be used to grow and display virtually any kind of flower, although geraniums, petunias, fuchsias and shamrock are among the more popular. But if your baskets aren't ready yet, you'd better get a move on. For best results hanging baskets should be prepared in the spring, dressing your

flowers with plenty of fern, climbing plants, moss and foliage. Your basket should then be left in the greenhouse for about a month. Then, when summer is here and all danger of frost is past, they can be hung in the sunshine or shade and you can lap up the praise as visitors express their admiration for your colourful hanging baskets. But even if you did not plan ahead there is still time to get a beautiful display prepared for the height of summer provided you pick reasonably mature plants. Recommended plants include ivy-leaved geraniums, petunias, trailing lobelia, bedding begonias, nasturtiums, spider plants and bedding fuchsias - which grow up to three feet tall and make a particularly impressive centre-piece in a large basket.



**Plant Madonna Lilies**  
This is the ideal time to plant *Lilium candidum*, the Madonna lily. It differs from almost all other lilies in making quite a lot of new growth in late summer, and it should be planted before this starts. Another peculiarity is that the bulbs grow practically on the surface. You should plant them 20cm apart and only cover them with 5cm of soil. After a while they will probably work themselves out until they show, make no attempt to cover them again. This lily prefers a sunny position and reasonably good but not freshly manured ground.

**Lift Daffodils and Bulbous Irises**  
Daffodils and narcissi, also the various bulbous irises, will now have completed their growth and may be lifted and cleaned off if they are overgrown or you need the ground for something else. Otherwise leave them undisturbed for another year. They do not gain anything by annual lifting and drying, as do tulips and hyacinths. If you lift them, get them replanted as soon as possible and certainly before the end of September.

**Start to feed chrysanthemums**  
It is a mistake to begin to feed chrysanthemums of any type too early, but you can start now with safety. The more varied the feed the better. Give very small doses every five days or so, mixed with plenty of water and used in place of the ordinary water. Liquid manure, made by steeping a small sack of cow, horse or sheep droppings in a tub of water, can be varied with soot water and any good chemical fertiliser made for chrysanthemums and used as directed by the manufacturer.

**PLANTING A HANGING BASKET**

1. Line the bottom of the basket with moist, sphagnum moss - available relatively cheaply from most garden centres. Pack it tightly at least 3 cm thick
2. Cover the bottom of the basket with a 5 cm layer of moist loam-based compost
3. Push trailing plants through from the outside base of the basket and bed their root-balls in to the compost. Once the base is covered you should add more compost and moss
4. Repeat the process until the sides and base of the basket are filled with trailing plants
5. Fill with compost until it is about 5cm below the rim. Edge the top with moss and insert upright plants, filling with compost so the surface slopes towards the centre (this helps when watering)
6. Soak the basket and then leave it to drain
7. Hanging baskets are ideally planted in the spring when they should normally be put in a greenhouse for a month - while the young plants develop free from frost
8. Water regularly throughout the summer.

But by now the danger of frost is over and the plants are more mature. Hang the basket out immediately

## Dungarvan's Housing Policy Needs To Be Clarified - Cllr.

Local Fine Gael councillor Damien Geoghegan has called on Dungarvan UDC to clarify its position in relation to the allocation of local authority houses in the new Council estate at the Nursery, Youghal Road.

At last week's Urban Council meeting, Cllr. Geoghegan asked to have the Council's legal position clearly spelt out and clarified in public with regard to the implementation of Waterford Co. Council's traveller accommodation plan.

According to this newly adopted plan, 10% of all new Council houses are to be allocated to members of the travelling community who wish to be housed locally and who have been resident in the county for at least 12 months.

Cllr. Geoghegan is strongly of the opinion that this system of allocation is grossly un-

fair to housing applicants who in some cases, have to wait 4/5 years or longer in order to be housed. He said these applicants then find that houses are being allocated to people on a "special needs list" and not on the Council's regular housing list.

"A system that operates in such a fashion is open to manipulation", warned Cllr. Geoghegan. At a time when there is unprecedented demand for local authority housing in Dungarvan, he feels that a lot of bitterness and resentment will build up towards members of the travelling community housed in this fashion.

## £92 Million Allocation For Waterford

Over £92 million is to be spent between now and 2002 on upgrading water and sewerage services in Waterford. Minister for the Environment, Noel Dempsey has launched a major investment package in public water and sewerage scheme services under which Waterford County Council and the City Corporation will receive £92.5832 million.

Welcoming the announcement was Fianna Fail TD Brendan Kenneally who said the Minister has given him details of how this money will be spent across different areas of the city and county. Funding will be available for important work in Dungarvan, Tallow and Ardmore as well as Ballinacourty/Deelish and Ring - Helvick.

## 'Romeos & Juliets' Littering Abbeyside Promenade

A scenic area of Abbeyside which has long been a favourite haven for young couples is currently becoming an eyesore due to unwanted litter.

Local Urban Councillor Damien Dillon has contacted Dungarvan Town Clerk Brian White regarding the problem of discarded condoms at Abbeyside Promenade.

Cllr. Dillon said there has been a number of complaints about discarded and used condoms at the seafront area.

"While the complainants do not have a problem with the sexual activity aspect, they are offended by the fact that these articles could be picked up by children - not a nice prospect", he said.

"Not alone are condoms being discarded, but also take-away wrappers are also being dumped around the beach and environs by some of these Romeos and Juliets", Cllr. Dillon added.

He has suggested to the Town Clerk that one solution to the problem would be to physically prevent cars from accessing the promenade by means of a lockable barrier.

# Waterford Macra Na Feirme

## CONCERN AT SUGAR BEET PLAN

Macra na Feirme is concerned about the new plan for restructuring the sugar beet industry. Under the plan new entrants are only given 10% of the reserve pool which is too small for a sector long closed to new growers.

The situation where an existing grower can nominate another farmer for his contract is open to abuse and does little to create the transparency that the sector badly needs. Effectively what is being created is an open auction where the highest bidder will be your favourite nominee and where large growers have already secured favourite nominee status for many contracts.

The whole situation where a charge of £30 to £40 per tonne on quota is unacceptable for new growers who were blocked entry for so long and where individual farmers decide the price of quota which is government owned.

Further displeasure is expressed where an existing grower has to have a contract of over 300 tonnes before he can nominate a new grower

and only then if he also nominates an existing grower for part of the contract - a form of legalised sub-letting and a handy way of restricting new

entrants, as over 50% of contracts are of 200 tonnes or less.

The beet industry needs a better deal and this is not it.

## VAT On Sales Of Existing Leases Being Debated With Revenue And Finance

Transactions Less Than £20,000 Not Liable To VAT

IFA National Dairy Committee Chairman Padraig Walshe said that the issue of VAT on the sale of existing leases was currently being examined by the Revenue Commissioners and the De-

partment of Finance, further to representations by IFA to exempt those transactions, he said it had been made clear to him at a meeting with Revenue and Finance recently that in any case, transactions which were worth less than £20,000

would not be liable to VAT.

"We are still in discussion with Revenue and Finance people on the general issue on VAT on sales of existing leases, and are hopeful to get a final answer within a few weeks. Meanwhile, quota holders and existing lessees should not panic, and await the results of our negotiations before making final decisions," Padraig Walshe said.

"Regrettably, there appears to have been bad advice given by consultants, solicitors, accountants and others in charge of advising farmers in these matters. We have even come across situations where quota holders sold their quota into the restructuring scheme in the firm belief that VAT would apply if they sold their existing lessee, even though the transaction would have been worth much less than the £20,000 threshold. It has been made quite clear to us by Revenue that where a transaction is worth less than £20,000, it would not be liable to VAT. Hence, assuming a sale price of, say, £1.40/gallon, the sale of a leased quota of 14,000 gallons or less should not attract VAT," he added.

Padraig Walshe said that, pending a final decision on this matter, the Revenue Commissioners' people had agreed to communicate with their countrywide office that the matter was currently under review.

## ICMSA Call On Minister To Allocate Quota

ICMSA have today called on the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Mr. Joe Walsh TD, to immediately allocate quota from the 5 million gallon Agenda 2000 Scheme.

Mr. Jackie Cahill, Chairman of ICMSA Dairy Committee, said that it is unsatisfactory that young farmers are still unaware of their allocation from this scheme. The Minister should finalise these allocations as a matter of urgency.

Mr. Cahill also said that if a farmer is unsure about his allocation of 690 gallons from the 15 million gallon Agenda 2000 scheme that he should make contact with his co-operative to clarify the issue.

Mr. Cahill also reminded farmers that there is a 0.5 million gallon hardship pool available for farmers who, for various reasons, did not qualify for the 5 and 15 million gallon schemes. Application for this hardship pool may be made to the Milk Quota Appeals Tribunal and forms will be available from co-operatives shortly.

## ICMSA - No Farmer Must Lose Out Under New Disadvantaged Area Scheme

ICMSA has stated today that no farmer must lose out under the new area based system for disadvantaged area payments. Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA, said that according to Department data, an estimated 37,000 farmers are in danger of losing under the new proposed scheme.

At a minimum, Mr. O'Rourke said, these farmers will have to receive the same level of headage as they have done in the past. The net result of this was agreed, Mr. O'Rourke said, is that no farmer will lose out financially as a result of moving from a headage to area based system, while others would gain.

Under the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness, Mr. O'Rourke said, that the Government gave a commitment "to introducing a system which will protect the payment levels to the categories of farmers for whom Disadvantaged Areas payments are an important element of their total incomes". Many of the possible losers, Mr. O'Rourke said, are in this category and it will be totally unacceptable if the Government renege on this commitment.

"Headage is an extremely important source of income for over 100,000 farmers. Farmers in these areas simply cannot afford a loss in their headage payments", said Mr. O'Rourke.

Concluding Mr. O'Rourke said, that no farmer should lose out financially as a result of the movement to an Area Based System. Any losses would not only have serious implications for the family farm in question but for the rural areas in general.

## FARM ROADWAYS

Whether you are in dairying or beef a good farm roadway is essential for good grassland management and to maximise the grass intake of the stock. Where a farm roadway has a good walking surface, the cows will use the whole width of the roadway. Hoof marks will be clearly seen across the width of the roadway. Why is it that some roadways work out very well and others become a problem either from the very start or six months later? How do you go about making a good roadway and ensuring that the cows use the full width of it and that it is free from a lot of maintenance?

The first essential requirement is that the roadway is made in good weather when the soil is dry. Next you have to decide whether you should remove the top soil. Generally, a 4 - 5 in layer of top soil should be removed. The reason for this is that the hardcore will now be placed on a solid foundation.

The amount of hardcore used will depend on subsequent use. The nearer the roadway is to the farm building, the more machinery it will carry, and farm roadways are being asked to carry heavier and heavier machinery. Generally 8 - 10 inches of hardcore should be enough. The type of hardcore is also important. When ordering, you should specify hardcore from 4 inches down. If you don't specify, you can be liable to get boulders the size of car wheels. Assuming the right material has arrived, put on the 8 - 10 inches. The next job you have to do is to get a fall off the roadway.

Falls can be from side to side or from the middle of the roadway to the side. It is crucial to have a fall in a farm roadway. It will allow water to run off and it will mean fewer potholes and less maintenance.

The next job is to bring in a vibrator roller to compact the hardcore. This is where you will find out how good the surface beneath the hardcore is. Farmers tell me they use the Hy-Mac to do this job. The tracks of the Hy-Mac will level the roadway, but it will not compact it.

The next job is a very important one: what type of finish do you want? The finish will generally consist of 2 inches of a fine dust type material. The material used should ideally have only a very low proportion of pebbles at most 4 - 5 mm in diameter.

In any case, the pebbles in this layer should be brittle rather than hard, e.g. shale (slig, pencil) sandstone as opposed to hard limestone. Ideally, this fine material should be laid and rolled on a wet day. Again the vibrator roller should be used.

If you don't get the wet day doing this job, you always have the option of getting a vacuum tanker of water and spraying the roadway.

## ADVANCED CERTIFICATE IN DAIRY HERD MANAGEMENT

Teagasc Co. Waterford is running an advanced certificate in dairy herd management course beginning in October 2000. The course will take place at the Teagasc Centre, Dungarvan and will attract progressive dairy farmers who wish to develop their technical and management expertise and ultimately increase their profits. It is planned to run the course from 10.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m. on one to two days per month from October 2000 to March 2002. The topics which will be covered include:

- Nutrition
- Grassland
- Breeding/Fertility
- Milking Technology
- Financial and Quota Management
- Animal Health and Farm Safety
- International Aspects of Dairying

At a time of increasing pressure on farm profitability it is essential that all dairy farmers update themselves on all new technologies and changes affecting their business. This course provides an excellent inservice training opportunity for the dairy farmers of Co. Waterford.

Course tutors will be Teagasc advisers, researchers and specialists as well as industry personnel and each day will be divided equally between indoor and outdoor sessions. The cost of the course is £450, which is totally allowable as a tax expense, and places are limited to the first 25 applicants.

## South East ICMSA News

### ICMSA AND GLANBIA DISCUSS MILK PRICE

Representatives from the south area which included Pat O'Rourke President ICMSA, Jackie Cahill Chairman ICMSA Dairy Committee, Cathal Buckley Policy Officer ICMSA, John Hempenstall Chairman Wicklow ICMSA, Tim Fitzgerald Chairman Laois ICMSA, Kevin Connolly Chairman Kilkenny ICMSA, John Sheehan National Council Waterford, James Hennessy National Council Kilkenny and John Quigley South East regional officer met with senior Glanbia officials, which included Tom Corcoran Chairman Glanbia; Michael Walsh vice-chairman Glanbia; Eamonn Power vice-chairman Glanbia; John Moloney Food Ingredients Manager and Michael O'Neill Milk Assembly Manager.

Glanbia has reaffirmed its commitment to pay 3 pence per gallon over the weighted average of those participating in the Craig Gardner milk price audit.

However Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA, said that ICMSA stressed to Glanbia that when the legal agreement expires at the end of this year their suppliers expect them to pay a market leading milk price on an on-going basis.

"Given their economies of scale there is no reason why Glanbia cannot be among the market leaders for milk price", said Mr. O'Rourke.

Mr. O'Rourke also said he was encouraged to hear that Glanbia are in the process of putting a mechanism in place to ensure greater transparency in the setting of milk price with direct linkages to the market. Glanbia will meet ICMSA later in the year to discuss this new process. Other items discussed included milk collection and trading.

### CLOSURE OF BANKS A HUGE CONCERN TO RURAL COMMUNITIES

ICMSA has expressed concern regarding the closure of rural bank outlets. The local branch has played a huge role in the development of rural areas and its continued existence is critical to rural areas, and in particular, to the development of the town in question.

Mr. Maurice Harvey, Chairman of ICMSA's Rural Development Committee, said today that according to the White Paper for Rural Development one of the main elements of the Strategic Framework would be: "service and infrastructure provision to support the objective of viable rural communities and to ensure that rural areas are competitive for investments".

"A banking service is a critical element in ensuring a viable rural community", said Mr. Harvey. "If the Government is serious about rural development, action will have to be taken to ensure that a banking service is, at the very least, maintained in their current location. In addition, it is now time for the Government to look at measures to expand banking services in rural areas".

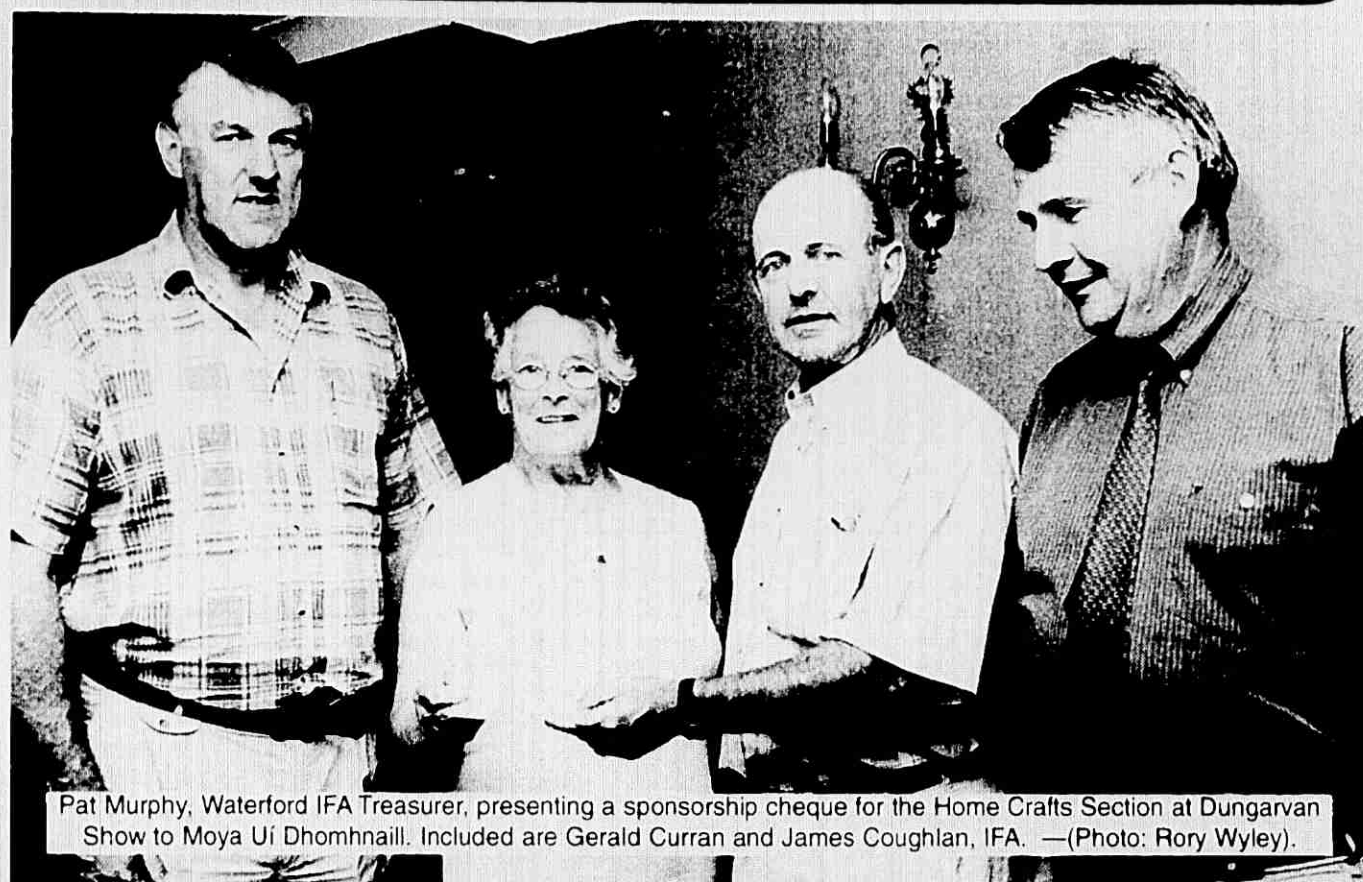
"One possible option is the expansion of the banking services provided by An Post. Considering that there is a Post Office in most parishes in Ireland, such an initiative would provide a major boost to these areas and also a much improved banking service for those in isolated areas", Mr. Harvey said.

"The expansion of services and the improvement in infrastructure are critical to the survival of rural areas. If services decline in an area, a domino effect will occur with a resulting population decline. The Government", Mr. Harvey concluded, "have a major responsibility in ensuring that the services required to maintain a rural population are available to all rural areas".

## New Teagasc Rural Viability Service Must Target All Low Income Farmers —I.F.A.

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman, Mossie O'Connor said the new proposed Teagasc Rural Viability Service due to be launched later this year must be in a position to target all low income farmers, not just those who are clients of Teagasc.

Following a meeting with Teagasc in Portlaoise, Mr. O'Connor said that the new service is an opportunity to target a section of farmers who have been neglected by Teagasc in the past. The new rural viability advisory service which is part of the National Development Plan and funded to the tune of £54m over the next seven years is due to be officially launched in October.

# Glanbia Must Increase July Milk Price —WALSHE

Speaking after a meeting with Glanbia Chairman and Chief Executive late last week, IFA National Dairy Committee Chairman, Pdraig Walshe, called on the Glanbia board members not to underestimate the depth of feeling of their milk suppliers, who are concerned the price paid for their milk remains adrift from that paid to fellow-farmers in others co-ops, even after the June 3p increase, which was merely a return of the cut implemented in March.

"Glanbia has had the benefit of cheap milk for the months of March, April and May after their 3p/gal March milk cut price — this has been very beneficial to their cash flow. Meanwhile, most other processors either maintained or increased prices over the same period, having apparently no difficulty in passing back some of their margin improvements," he said.

"I am particularly concerned that, when decisions are made in a couple of week's time on the July price, Glanbia should not be tempted to do nothing, hiding behind the merger Milk Price Audit commitment. The company's commitment to paying the top up early next year was categorically reiterated to us by the new Glanbia Chairman, Tom Corcoran and by CEO Ned Sullivan. However, in the meetings held in the last number of weeks, Glanbia producers have left us in no

doubt that they would not accept to see their cash flow endangered to facilitate the company's," Pdraig Walshe said.

"I expect that a producer price increase of at least 3p will be justified for July, based on the Irish Dairy Board skimmed milk powder price

increases to date. Indeed, Golden Vale, who have not increased their May or June price, have already announced that their July price would go up by 4p including VAT (3.8p net of VAT)," he added. "Should Glanbia do nothing in July, a gap of just under 4p/gal would open up between Gold-

en Vale and them."

"I call on Glanbia board members to see to it that their fellow-milk suppliers have the just returns from the market place fully passed back to them in real time. Producers incomes should not be used as short term cash flow reserves," he concluded.

## ICMSA Call For Establishment Of National Code Of Practice For Compulsory Purchase Orders

ICMSA has called on the Minister for the Environment and Local Government, Mr. Noel Dempsey, TD, to establish a National Code of Practice for the compulsory purchase of lands.

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA, said that £4.7 billion is to be spent on road development over the next six years and the majority of these developments will require the compulsory purchase of land. Many problems will arise during the development and to overcome these a National Code of Practice should be established setting out the procedures for the implementation of CPO's.

A National Code of Practice for CPO's, will need to outline the mechanism for calculating a fair level of

compensation for farmers, and also, other very important issues such as fencing, drainage, the provision of underpasses and reinstatement of land. These are just a few of the many issues, Mr. O'Rourke said, that should be agreed under a National Code of Practice.

"This Code of Practice should apply to all State Bodies with compulsory purchase powers, and should result, if agreed, in a system which would see fair treatment for farmers", Mr. O'Rourke said.

"Farmers want to be treated fairly in terms of road location, compensation and also in ensuring that they can continue to viably farm their remaining lands. The problem is that in order to improve roads and other infrastruc-

ture, the impact on individual farmers can be very significant and damaging. Given this, farmers must be fairly and fully compensated for the problems caused by CPO's.

Mr. O'Rourke continued, "The situation cannot be allowed to continue where a farmer may be put out of business without a fair level of compensation. This infrastructural development will bring huge economic benefits to these areas. The farmers who own the land and allow these developments to take place are surely entitled to their fair share of these economic benefits".

Concluding, Mr. O'Rourke said that he has written to Minister Dempsey seeking a meeting to progress this very important issue for farmers.

## CURATE CELEBRATES HIS GOLDEN JUBILEE

Rev. Fr. John Cahill C.S.S.P. was ordained to the priesthood on the 15th July, 1950 and fifty years later on the 15th July 2000 he celebrated the 7.15 p.m. Vigil Mass in Saint Mollerans Parish Church, Carrickbeg. It was an emotional occasion as Fr. Cahill entered the sanctuary to a packed church which contained a surprise element in the first seats, his brother Jim and members of the extended Cahill family from Cork, Dublin and Clonmel had been invited, unknown to him. The Mass was concelebrated by Rev. Fr. Tom Flynn P.P. Carrickbeg, Windgap, Rev. Fr. Michael Mullins, Maynooth, Rev. Fr. Reidy and Fr. Cleary of the Holy Ghost order. Fr. John gave an account of his life since he left his native Cork in 1941 to study for the priesthood in Kilshane Seminary, Co. Tipperary. When he arrived at Limerick junction, there was no one to meet him owing to a misunderstanding and he had to walk the ten

miles to Kilshane, outside Bannsha. He later continued his studies at U.C.D. and at the Holy Ghost Scholasticate in Kimmage where he was ordained. Following, he was sent to Rockwell College, Cashel where he did teaching before starting his Foreign Mission ministry which started and ended in the diocese of Owerri in Nigeria. He worked closely with the late Rev. Fr. Michael Frawley. Fr. Cahill returned to Ireland in 1969 and taught in St. Mary's, Rathmines for twenty years, after which he was appointed to parish work in Athy, Co. Kildare. In the meantime, Fr. Michael Frawley also returned to Ireland and was appointed curate at Carrickbeg, Windgap. The two priests continued their close friendship and visited each other regularly. In 1986 Fr. Frawley was appointed parish priest at Kilrossanty/Fews and Fr. Cahill appointed curate at Carrickbeg, Windgap. Fr. Cahill spoke in glowing terms

of the friendliness of the people of Carrickbeg and Windgap. Following the golden jubilee Mass, the parish priest Fr. Flynn P.P. presented Fr. John with an inscribed Tipperary Crystal bowl and a cheque on behalf of the parishioners. John Dowley paid tribute to Fr. John on behalf of the parishioners and hoped he would serve them for many more years. Fr. Cahill said he was overwhelmed by the tributes paid to him both in the church and in the hall and he thanked the parishioners for their kindness to him for the past fourteen years.

## A NEW BOOK ON SCHOOL

Tom O'Donoghue is fondly remembered by ex-pupils from his teaching days at St. Anne's Cappelquin in the 1970's and 1980's. Tom a native of Lismore, is now a Professor of Education at the University of Western Australia and his first book has just been published. No doubt, some will recall his work on the history of An Rinn and his pioneering research on the Bilingual Programme in the Irish Primary Schools at the start of the last century. However, in the book entitled The Catholic Church and the Secondary School Curriculum in Ireland 1922-1962 Tom manages to be provocative, informative and above all very readable. In so doing, he manages to highlight a topic which up to now has not received sufficient attention.

Change in the Irish primary and secondary schools has recently become so rapid that the current generation of school-goers will be the first to leave the system without ever being taught by a Catholic religious. The passage of time and increasing prosperity makes it very difficult to explain that up to relatively recently, secondary education in Ireland was only provided for those who could afford to pay for it.

It is in this regard that Tom O'Donoghue presents a very stark statistic. In 1924, the numbers enrolled in secondary schools represented about 5% of the numbers enrolled in the primary schools and by 1960 it only stood at 16%.

Tom argues that the secondary school curriculum was characterised by a religious atmosphere, which was all pervasive. In a sense that the schools were really Catholic schools and that the Church's need for literacy in Latin and English ensured that while the Church supported the various government attempts to expand the use of Irish, it did so only so long as it did not threaten the primacy of what the Church considered to be core subjects. The most controversial argument is that the secondary curriculum of this time was only concerned with development in the very narrow sense with critical thinking being particularly neglected. Finally, he attempts to show that the Church was most successful in preventing other educational interest groups in particular parents from contributing to the development of curriculum policy and practice.

He also focuses on the theory that the education system can help to bolster the power of the dominant class in society and leaves one wondering whether the stability of the Free State and the success of the Catholic Church was intimately tied up with ensuring that most of the nation's children did not receive the great gift of a second level education.

Tom O'Donoghue's book is part of a series called Irish Studies and is published by Peter Lang, New York. It is a hardback and retails at \$44.95 and can be ordered from Peter Lang AG Jupiterstrasse 15, CH Bern 15, Switzerland or e-mail from peterlang@access.ch.

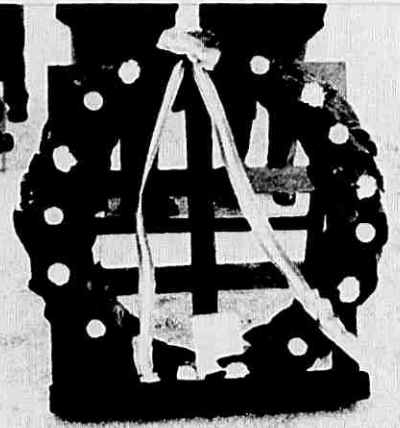

The ceremony is held annually in honour of all those Irishmen and Irishwomen who died in past wars or in service with the United Nations.

It takes place on the Sunday nearest to the anniversary of the 1921 truce on 9th July in Ireland at the end of the War of Independence.

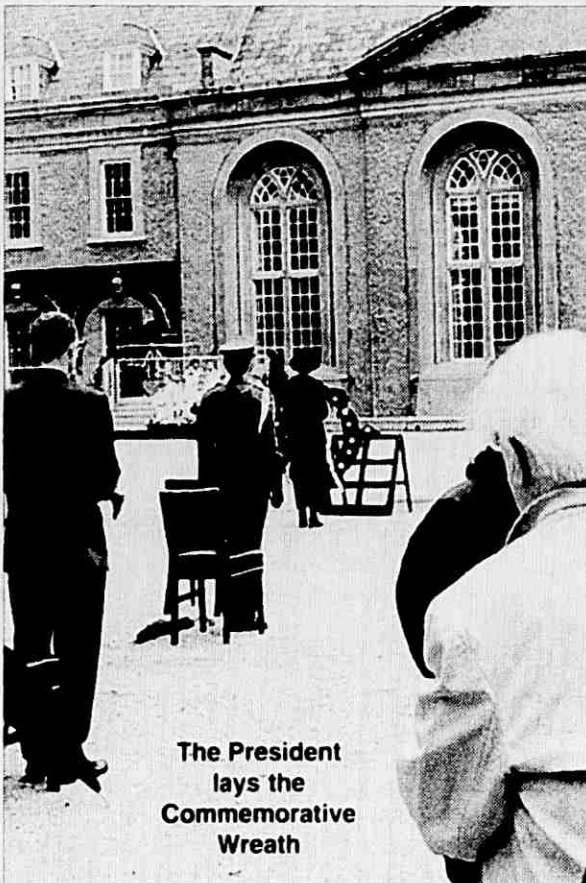

After the religious service, a Wreath of Honour was placed by the President at the commemorative plaque, which is set into the ground in the middle of the quadrangle. Everyone stood or sat, following the lead of the President. The National Flag, which was a half-mast, was hoisted followed by a minute's silence, and the "Last Post". A rendering of "Amhran na bhFiann" by all present closed the official ceremony.

There followed an informal reception in the Great Hall, which used to be the Dining Hall for the old soldiers. Red and white wine, cocktail sausages and chicken were freely available. Old veterans loaded with medals rubbed shoulders with national figures such as Liam O'Murchu, RTE presenter, and many others.



The President lays the Commemorative Wreath

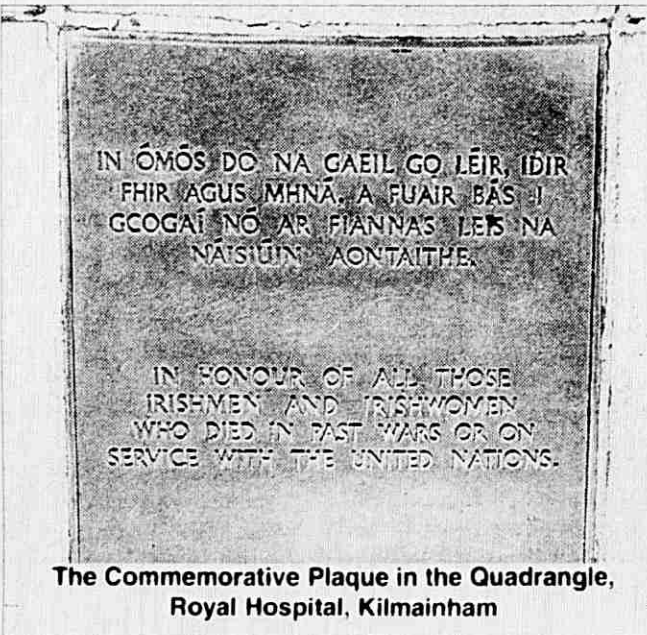
The Royal Hospital is a very appropriate venue. King Charles II built it in the 1680's as a home for old soldiers. It was used for this purpose up to 1922, when it passed to Saorstát Éireann. It was in poor condition until some years ago, but was renovated using European Community funds and now is in magnificent condition, being used for various art displays and public functions.

The form of religious service is multi-denomination-

al, including Presbyterian, Church of Ireland, Methodist, Islamic, Jewish, and, of course, Catholic representatives. It draws support from all over Ireland.

The President, Mrs. Mary McAleese, led the ceremony. She looked resplendent in black suit and hat with white blouse. The Taoiseach, Mr. Ahern, led members of the Government including Mary O'Rourke, Michael Smith, Minister for Defence, and many other politicians such as Mr. P. De. Rossa. Waterford men, Willie McDonnell, Chairman of Waterford County Council, and Davey Daniels, Mayor of Waterford City, were in attendance with their chains of office.

The Army Number One Band, conducted by Commandant Joe Ryan, with Bernadette Greevy, and members of the Palestrina Choir and the St. Patrick's Choir provided music.

# Death - how do we tell the children ?

Recently I was approached to counsel a young woman and her small children. At first glance there was nothing unusual about this request. However what had just happened was to change their lives forever. When the children got home from school they found their house full of family members and learned that their beloved father who used to play tickle and tease with them had died in a road accident. This devastating news naturally left this young lady and children bewildered and as I talked to them my mind began to drift back to a similar sad time in my own life.

If my children had known that they would never see their young mother again they might have hugged her with greater fervour, but on that cold night in January 1974, my six sons and two young daughters gave their mom a peck and a worried goodbye as she was taken from our home by ambulance. There was every belief that in a matter of a day or so she would be home again. What they didn't know was that in the space of a heartbeat their young lives would be traumatically changed forever that night. In a matter of a few short hours my house was filling up with priests, relatives and friends. I can't honestly remember what I said to them because I couldn't think straight, never mind give them a thoughtful explanation. It is hard for parents to help their children cope with death when they themselves are shell shocked by grief. For a parent the word - dead or killed - may ring so harshly that they can hardly bear to say them to themselves let alone to their children.

As a psychologist, thanatologist and someone who has experienced the sword of death I suggest to parents and other bereaved that children do need some kind of explanation. For a child the death of a loved one shakes the very bedrock of their young life it is such a frightening, out of control experience. Parents may want to shield their children from the cruel pain that death delivers but open and honest communication is the healthiest pattern after a death.

The experience of grief is universal from the youngest child to the most senior person. The feelings of loss and absence, the longing and missing the loved one are the same but how children express what they experience is different. Most children grieve intermittently. A child may sob uncontrollably one minute and in the next breath go to play at a friend's house. Adults may be immersed in grief for many months but children may attend the funeral and then race out to play. This is normal grieving behaviour for children and should not be considered to be disrespectful.

Children under the age of four do not comprehend the finality of death. They may look in rooms and ask when the departed loved one is coming back. But although they don't understand death fully young children feel the absence of a loved one. They can't verbally express their grief so they are left with a tremendous amount of feelings and no place to put them. They may suffer night terrors, separation anxiety and temper tantrums but these reactions should dissipate in time and the length of time depends on how close the relationship with the deceased was. Other children may talk of the death throughout their lives often reassessing the facts.

Children can go through a period of emotional turbulence when they realise that the loved one is not coming back. They may bombard their parents with questions about why the loved one had to die or why they weren't able to save them. Children do not intend to hurt parents with their questions, they are merely trying to understand. Young children get quite confused if parents unwittingly make comments such as 'grandpa is sleeping' - statements like these have serious psychological ramifications as they may make children fearful of bedtime. Other explanations such as 'God took him to heaven' may create fears of God as a kind of bogeyman. I believe the best approach is to use direct factual statements like 'grandpa has died and he's not coming back'. It's also important to tell children that nothing they did or did not do caused the death. Children's reactions to death don't set in for a long time and they develop many anxiety disorder symptoms. Adolescents feel vulnerable, they experience a sense of

insecurity and a lack of safety. One of the primary emotions of grieving is anger at why the loved one had to die and abandon them and unable to emote this feeling children often act their feelings in on them selves.

#### Serious Illness

Children should also be informed when a person they love has a life threatening illness and although it may be a parent's initial reaction to down play the seriousness of an illness this approach could lead to trust erosion. issues. When parents minimise the seriousness of the illness children may react with shocked responses, when they learn the truth. Parents don't have to eliminate hope but by being open with children parents give them time to say goodbye in their own way. Children are very astute and they sense something is wrong if parents are going around in whispers. The bottom line is no matter how unpleasant the details are, as in a suicide for example, children need to be gently but honestly and reassuringly told the truth. By hiding information parents are creating a family secret and if they are told by a third party they will not forgive or trust the parents. For children their fears are worse than reality and by being up front parents have some control over when and how they get that information.

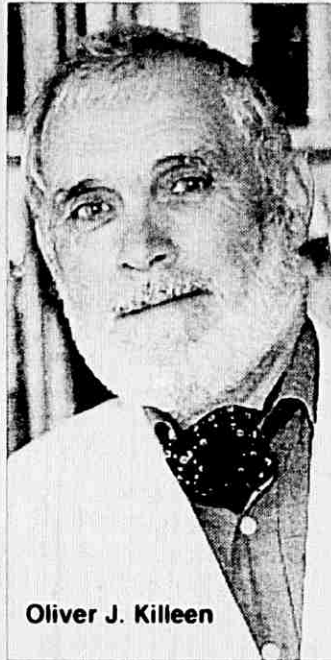
Grief is an intensely personal experience and every child should be encouraged to grieve in his/her own way. Children should attend a loved one's funeral no matter how young. Later on in life it is important to know they were there. Children can be told of the funeral service in advance and it should be explained that although the loved one may look like he's sleeping, he is dead and is not suffering anymore.

#### Building a Memory

When my first wife died I introduced them to what I label - CAN WE TALK? My children and I would sit around the family table and talk about our feelings. Later on I encouraged them to commune with their mother by writing her letters. This created a theme I call 'Building a Memory'. When a child dies parents and family can create a special reminder of their lost child. They can create a memory box and put some of the child's favourite toys and a book of photographs in it. That kind of ongoing attachment comforts children. Continuing attachment with a departed loved one assures them that the bond still exists and will always exist. They will always have a grandpa, grandma, mom, dad, brother sister - they are just not here. When my son John died just over a year ago I placed in his casket a copy of a family portrait and an Irish sweat shirt he had purchased in Waterford a few months before his death. Each day I look at the family portrait hanging in my office and have many thoughts of him. Sometimes nothing too profound, just reminisces of his impish cocky smile and his exasperated reaction of - WHAT- to my statements.

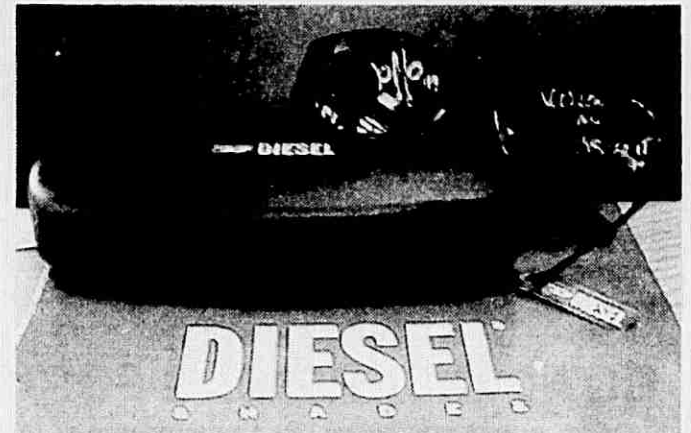
I miss you John particularly and as I visit your brothers and sisters this summer they miss you too! Every day you miss them a little, you think of them a lot.

Dr. Killeen is an accredited thanatologist and will be facilitating a workshop on death and grieving in October. He has produced tapes on stress management, self esteem and deep relaxation. ## Seabed Survey Begins Off Waterford Coast

The first step towards determining the true potential of Ireland's seabed was taken last week with the start of a £21 million survey. The first of a number of vessels which will be employed to carry out the seabed survey departed from Waterford harbour last week to begin its data acquisition.

According to Waterford TD Martin Cullen, the survey has a planned seven year duration and seeks to map the entire extent of the Irish seabed.

"Ireland is fortunate that it has a very extensive seabed area, estimated to be 10 times greater than our land area. However until now we have had little knowledge of its nature, its environment and its resources", he added.

#### HELVICK DRILLING PROGRAMME ON SCHEDULE

Meanwhile Providence Resources Plc are reported to have made good progress during the past year. The Helvick drilling programme, which commenced on 1st July, is on schedule and progressing as anticipated. Speaking at the company's annual general meeting in Dublin, Chairman Dr. Brian Hillery said the drilling programme, combined with the continuing re-development activities on the company's other Celtic Sea assets, means that Providence has a unique opportunity to realise the full potential of the Celtic Sea discoveries.

"We believe that the phased approach being adopted on the Helvick development represents a major step forward for Providence and its shareholders", he stated.

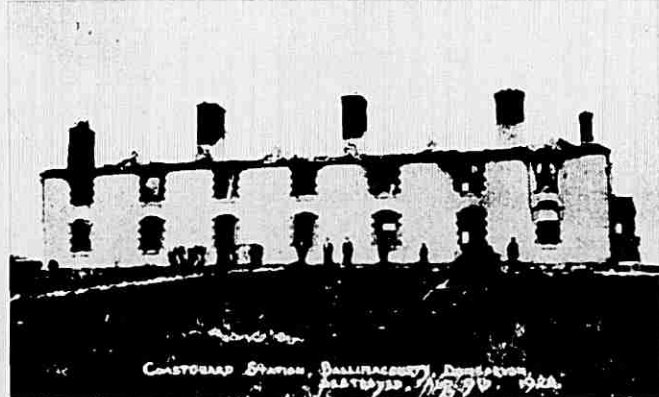

## DESTRUCTION OF BALLINACOURTY COAST GUARD STATION

Last week we wrote about the burning of the barracks situated within the walls of the old castle. While the barracks were burning, those who looked from the "Look Out" could see smoke issuing from the coastguard buildings at Ballinacourty. In the 1870's, this row of buildings was erected as a habitation for the coastguards. They looked very pretty; they were ornamental and useful. Forcible representations were made to spare these buildings but without avail. The marine's had been stationed there during the war of Independence so it was urged by the Republicans that the burning of them was a military necessity. Hence, they were burned on August 9th 1922. Only the walls and chimneys remained as can be seen from the photograph.



This building was later renovated by Dungarvan Golf Club and was their clubhouse for many years until it was accidentally burned down a few years ago.

The republican forces now withdrew from the castle, the dwellings there being unfit for habitation. The ruins were left derelict. However, after some weeks, a representative of the provisional government came along and took over possession, giving directions that the place should be made secure and the entrances built up. This was done. The forces of the republicans now quartered themselves in the hotels and remained there until the coming of the national army. (more next week)

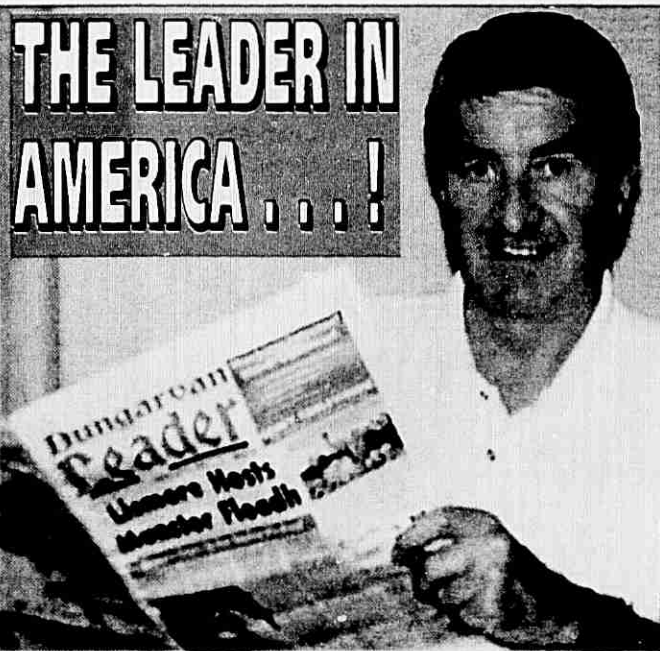

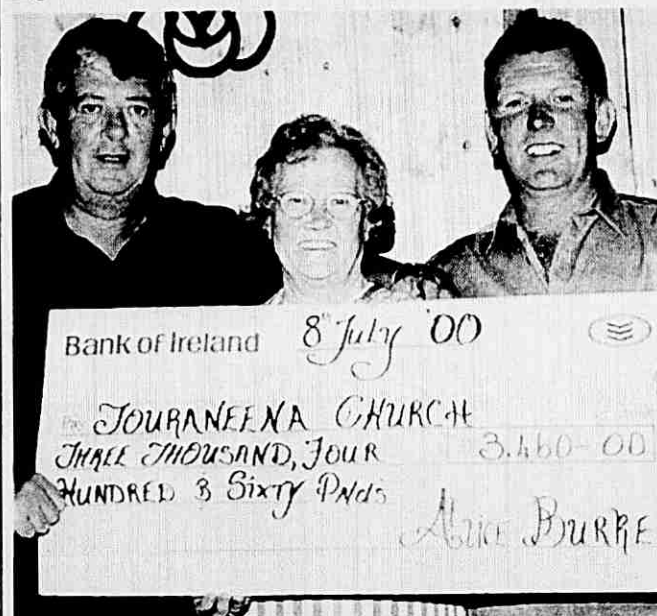

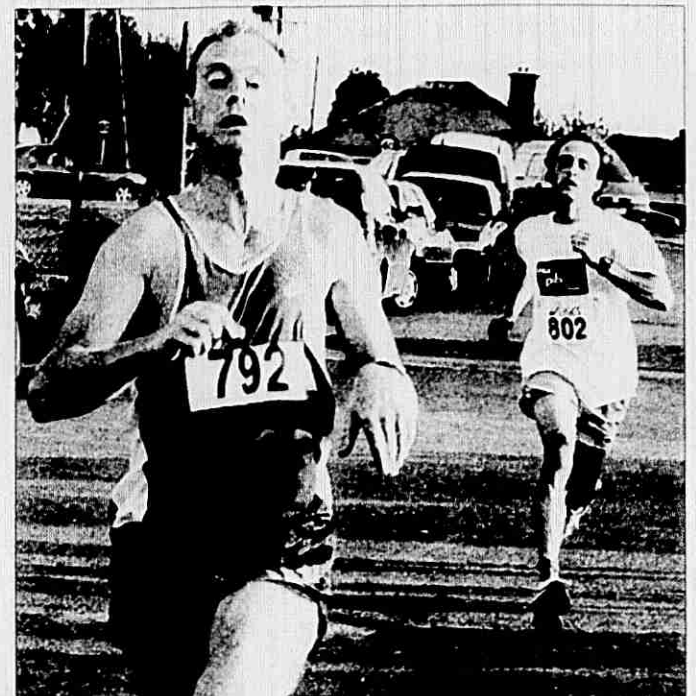

There was a happy outcome to this story however as 6/1 outsider Vigilant Suella (Droopys Fintan-Vigilant Katie) left trap four like a scalded cat to make every yard of the running for a facile four and a quarter lengths success over the 7/4 favourite Second Fancy in a career fastest 29.49.

This was a gross exaggeration and in order to stem the growth of a controversy, the board officers moved quickly and gave the controversy a very short life-span.

**PUT TO BED**

It is good for the county that this issue has now been put to sleep and that appointment of people to manage the senior hurling team will not arise for another 12 months.

Now the county board can direct its attention to other important matters like completing the championships on schedule and making sure that the football is completed well in advance of the start of the national league on the second Sunday in October and the start of the Munster Club championships around the same time.

A discussion on the timing of the championships in all grades next year is a matter that will be debated at the October meeting of the county board and this is a matter that should occupy the thinking of the county executive as well as all clubs in the weeks and months ahead. The basis of this thinking must have serious regard to the fact that club standards are falling in every grade and putting this right has to be given the priority that it deserves.

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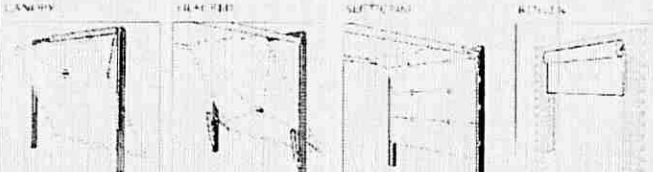
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
