Tax Boost For West Waterford Towns

Four towns in Co. Waterford are set to benefit from what has been described as 'an unprecedented opportunity for Ireland's small towns'.

Cappoquin, Tallow, Kilmacthomas and Portlaw have all been designated under the new Town Renewal Scheme which was unveiled last week by Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal Robert Molloy.

The four Waterford towns are among the 100 towns nationwide set to benefit from lucrative tax incentives in what is the broadest based renewal scheme ever

introduced. The scheme aims to restore and improve local buildings and in particular to promote new residential development to revitalise these towns.

Cappoquin, Tallow, Kilmacthomas and Portlaw were each involved in the preparation of a Town Renewal Plan which were submitted by Waterford County Council to the Department.

From now on, residential tax incentives will apply within parts of these four towns to attract the construction of new accommodation and the development of

derelict areas.

Up to now, priority has been given to addressing the problem of dereliction in inner areas of cities and towns. Successive urban renewal programmes in Dungarvan have transformed and revitalised long neglected parts of the town including the entire quay area.

Smaller towns such as Cappoquin, Tallow and Kilmacthomas also experience the problem of dereliction and have suffered from the high rates of depopulation brought about by emigration and migration to larger urban

centres. These towns have many vacant or underutilised buildings as well as some derelict or vacant sites.

PROPERTY VALUE TO RISE

Chairman of Waterford Co. Council Cllr. Willie McDonnell has welcomed the town renewal scheme for all four towns.

"It's a great achievement for Waterford Co. Council and all the committees concerned to get so much of the towns included in the scheme", he told the 'Leader'. "I have a particular interest

Natural Gas For Dungarvan

Initial Design Completed

As previously reported in the 'Leader', the country's first power generation plant is expected to be up and running on the former Glanbia site in Dungarvan by October 2001.

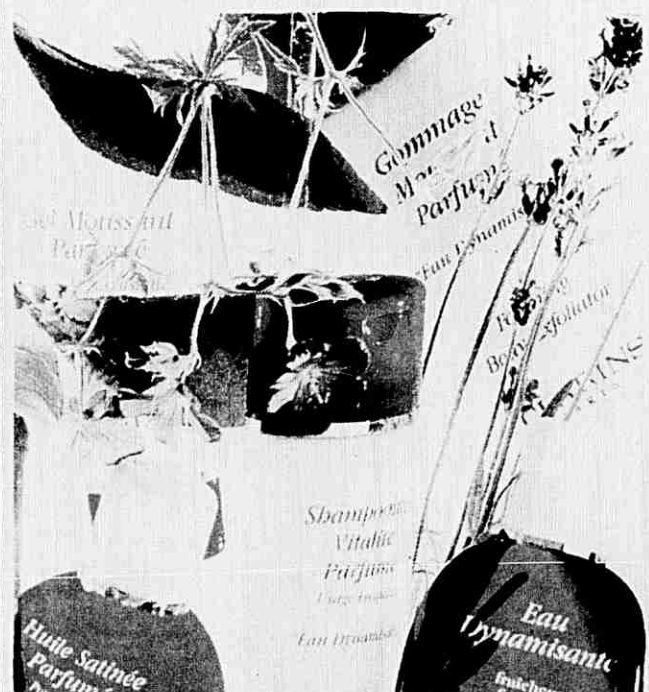
The £60 million plant will produce in excess of 800 million units of electricity a year which will be sold back into the national grid. One of the most exciting aspects of the project is the introduction of a natural gas supply to Dungarvan by August of next year.

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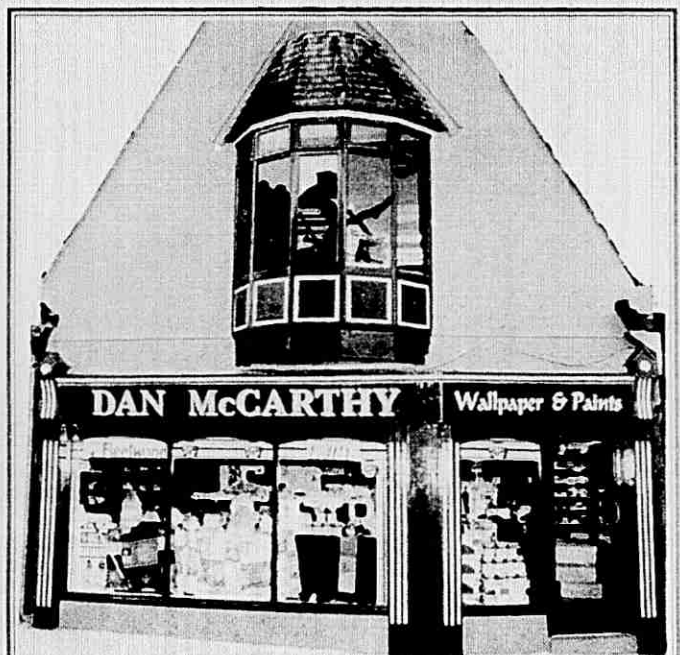

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THE HUMAN BODY

LUNGS AND BREATHING

The Respiratory System

This body system consists of the nose and throat, the wind-pipe or trachea in the neck, the main airways or bronchi to each lung, the lungs themselves in the chest, and the main breathing muscle, the diaphragm.

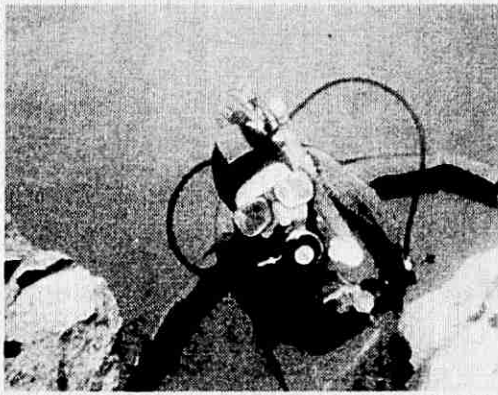
The lungs are light and spongy and contain smaller airways, bronchioles. The bronchioles branch and divide many times, becoming smaller and smaller, like an upside down tree

Each breath draws in air through the nose, or the mouth, or both. Breathing through the nose helps to moisten and warm the air, while nose hairs filter out bits of dust. This helps to keep the lungs clean and working efficiently.

A SUPPLY OF OXYGEN

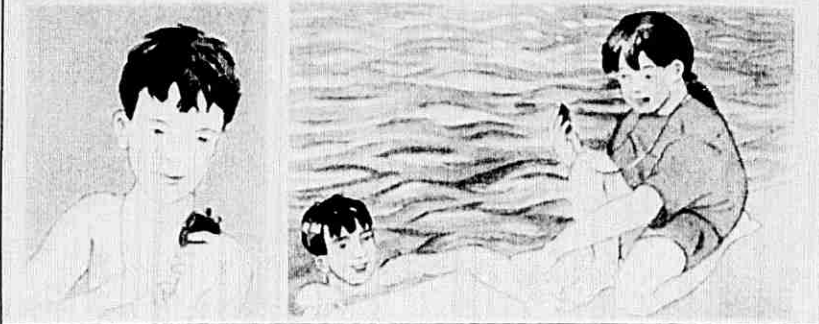
All animals, including those in water, need oxygen. There is oxygen dissolved in water. Fish have gills, which are specialised to obtain the dissolved oxygen.

Our lungs cannot obtain this dissolved oxygen. So divers take their own supply, in scuba tanks on their backs, or pumped down a long tube from the surface.



HOW MANY BREATHS?

How fast do you breathe? And how fast can you breathe? Using a stopwatch, time the number of breaths you take in one minute. Do this first after resting quietly for 10 minutes. Then swim a race. Count the number of breaths every minute afterwards, until it returns to the resting rate. This is the breathing recovery time. It tends to be shorter in people who are physically fit.



BREATHING PROBLEMS

In the condition called asthma, the small airways called bronchioles in the lungs get narrower and clogged with fluid. This may be due to an allergy or response to a certain substance, such as house dust or plant pollen, or sometimes due to emotional stress. Breathing grows wheezy. Modern medical drugs, breathed directly into the lungs, such as the fine spray from an inhaler, can relieve the problem and make breathing easier again.

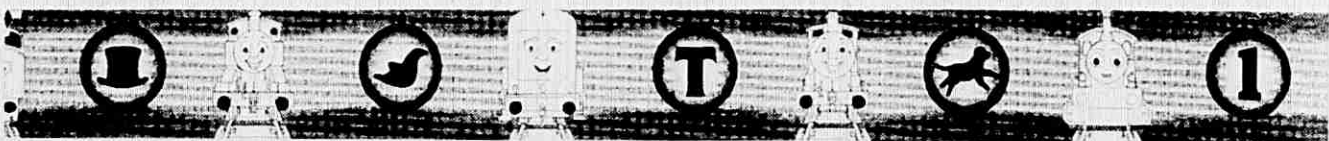

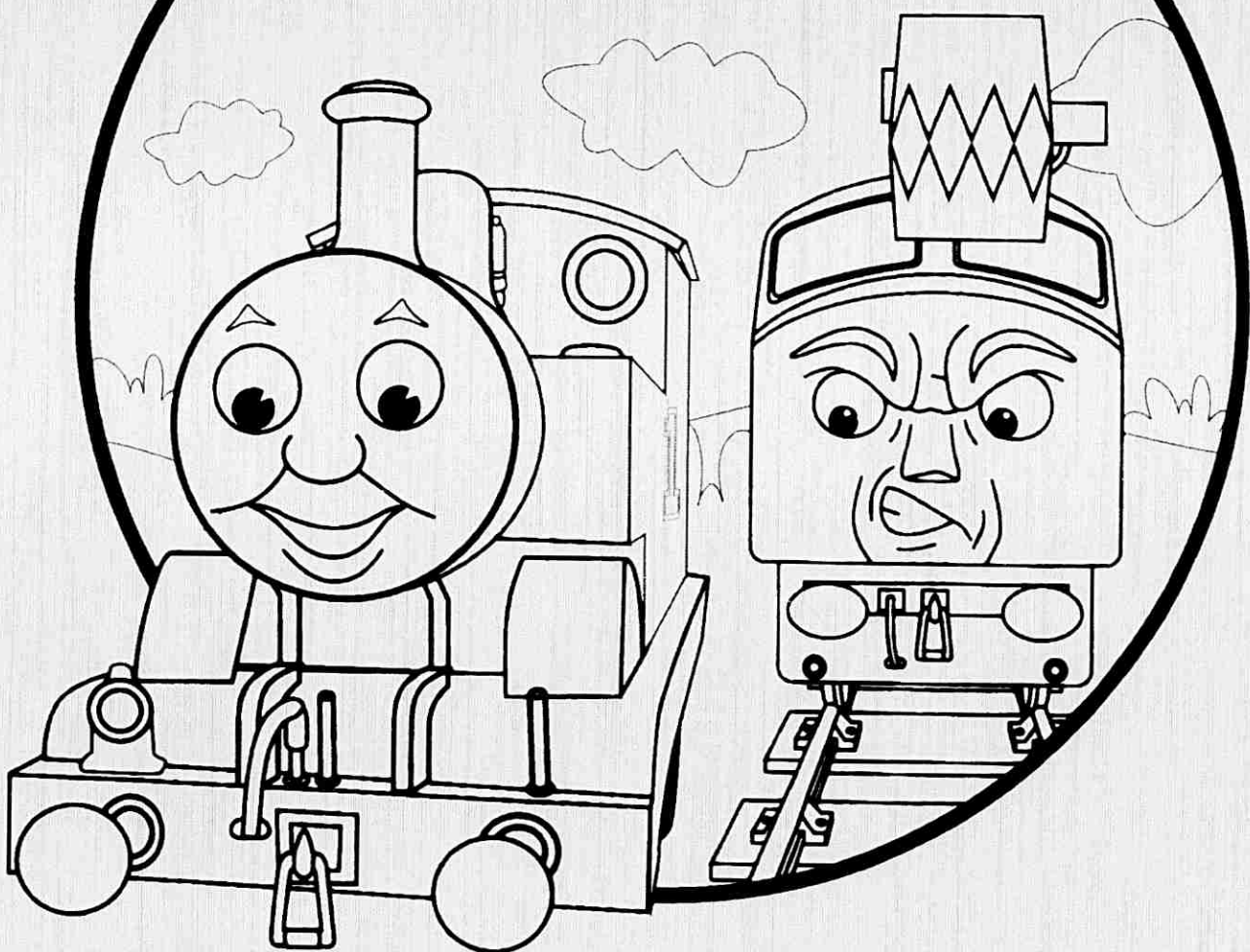

Gardai Appeal For Information

Gardai investigating the finding of an unidentified body at Clondonnell, Rathgormack on Wednesday 5th July seek information from the public regarding the following activities.

Two young men seen on mountain bikes in Clondonnell Wood between 6 p.m. and 6.30 p.m. on Saturday 17th June. Both youths were dressed in good class cycling gear, including glasses. They stopped close to the place where the body was found and then cycled towards the Rathgormack/Clonmel road. The Gardai would like the youths to contact them.

A white Ford Transit van, fitted with a black roof rack, seen parked on the Rathgormack/Clonmel road close to the entrance to Clondonnell Wood at 3.30 p.m. on Tuesday 27th June. The Gardai wish to hear from the driver/passengers of this van.

White Jeep and grey Citroen car, with 93 registration plates, seen parked on the Rathgormack/Clonmel road close to the entrance to Clondonnell Wood on either Thursday 29th or Friday 30th June. The Gardai wish to hear from the drivers and passengers of both vehicles.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I rented a flat for six months while studying at college. I left it two months ago having given a months notice. The landlord has refused to return my deposit although I have written to him twice requesting it. How can I get it back?

Answer

A deposit is a refundable sum of money paid by the tenant to the landlord at the start of a tenancy. It is held by the landlord as security to compensate him in the event of the tenant causing damage to the property over and above normal wear and tear, or leaving outstanding bills, or rent.

You can use the small claims procedure to apply to get your deposit back. It is a special mechanism for dealing with small claims of less than £1,000 within the District Court structure. It is designed to handle consumer claims speedily, cheaply and informally without involving a solicitor.

You should make a claim for the return of your rent deposit on a special application form which may be obtained from the Small Claims Registrar at your local District Court Office. You will be given assistance in completing the form. The fee (non-refundable) for making a small claim is £6.

COOKERY CORNER

Feast From The East

THIS is an ideal dish for an end-of-summer barbecue – it's so simple and tasty that it's sure to become a favourite!

Ingredients:

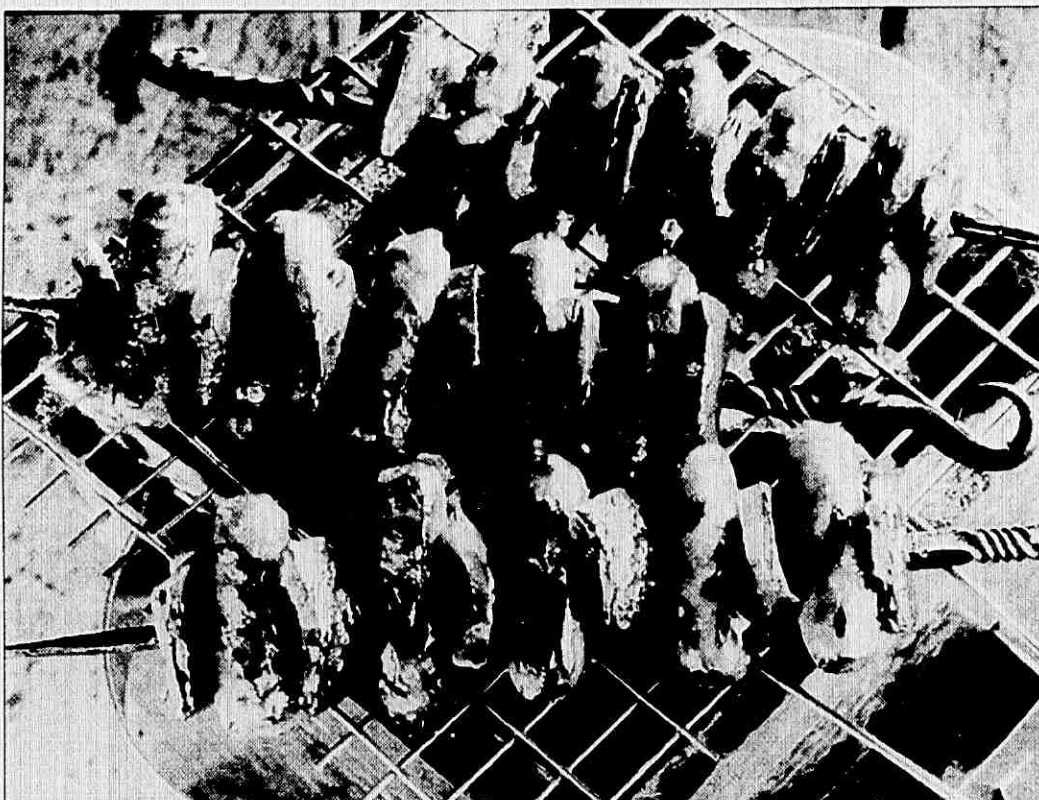
- (Serves 4)
 12-16 cocktail sausages, or 6-8 chipolata sausages
 1/2 red pepper, seeded and cut into chunks
 1/2 green pepper, seeded and cut into chunks

FOR THE GLAZE:

- 3 x 15ml sp (3 tbsp) Hoisin sauce
 2 x 15ml sp (2 tbsp) honey
 1 x 15ml sp (1 tbsp) tomato puree

Method:

If using chipolata sausages, twist each sausage in the middle to form two cocktail-sized sausages, and then cut to separate. Thread the sausages



and pepper alternately on to the skewers. Mix together the glaze ingredients.

cook on the barbecue or under a preheated grill for 8-10 minutes, turning frequently and basting with the glaze.

Serve with noodles or jacket potatoes and mixed salad for a truly tempting barbecue feast.

Tasty Meatloaf, Australian Style

Ingredients:

- Serves 8
 1/2kg ground lean beef
 1/2 cup water
 1 onion – finely chopped
 1/2kg sausage stuffing
 2 x 15ml sp vinegar
 1 x 15ml sp parsley – chopped
 1 cup breadcrumbs
 1 x 15ml sp instant coffee
 1 beaten egg
 1/2 cup tomato ketchup
 2 medium onions – chopped
 1/4 cup brown sugar
 1 cup crushed clove
 1/4 cup dry red wine or beef stock
 25g margarine
 1/2 cup milk
 1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
 1 x 15ml sp curry powder
 2 x 5ml sp lemon juice
 Salt and pepper to taste.

Method:

Combine the meats, breadcrumbs, onions, salt, pepper, garlic, parsley, curry and egg in a large bowl. Mix well. Mix milk and water and add to the meat mixture a little at a time until smooth but firm. Shape into a loaf shape and put into greased baking pan. Bake 30 minutes at 375°F. For the sauce, sauté the onions in margarine until golden and add all the other ingredients. Bring slowly to the boil, lower the heat and simmer 10 to 15 minutes. After loaf has cooked for 30 minutes, pour half of the sauce over the meat, return to oven and bake 45 minutes more, basting often with remaining sauce. Serve loaf hot in thick slices with remaining sauce. Also makes great sandwiches.

Rich and Sweet Cherry Bread

Ingredients:

- Makes 10
 1 packet active dry yeast
 3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 1/3 cup sugar
 3 eggs
 3/4 cup warm milk
 2/3 cup butter
 1 x 5ml sp salt
 1 x 5ml sp almond flavouring

Method:

Soften the yeast in warm milk. Beat in one cup of the flour. Cover and let rise until double in bulk, about one hour. Cream together the butter, sugar and salt until smooth and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Stir in flavouring, then remaining two cups of flour. Add yeast-raised sponge, blending well. Pour into greased 22cm spring-form tube pan or 22cm angel food cake pan. Let rise until triple in bulk. Bake in moderate

(375°F) oven for 25 to 30 minutes. Remove from pan; cool on rack. Prick ring with fork. Place ring on large serving plate. Baste with warm cherry rum sauce. Just before serving, arrange glazed cherries over ring. Fill centre with scoops of vanilla ice cream, if desired.

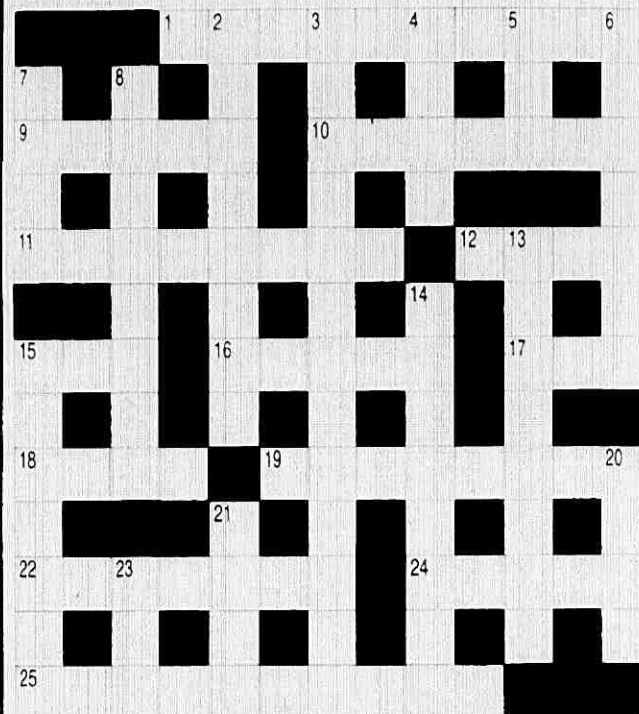
Cherry rum sauce: Drain one can of cherries. Reserve cherries. To cherry juice add enough water to make two cups of liquid. Combine cherry liquid and two cups sugar in saucepan. Boil for 5 minutes. Remove from heat, cool to lukewarm and add two tablespoons rum or 1 1/2 teaspoons rum flavouring.

Glazed cherries: To the cherries, add 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 cup corn syrup, and 2 or 3 drops red food colouring. Heat until sugar is dissolved.

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Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Simple Guide To Growing Roses



OLD FAVOURITE: The ever-popular romantic rose has been around for a very long time

Roses are estimated to be around 35 million years old – the romantic flowers are linked with many events, past and present, including Valentine's Day and the War of the Roses in the 15th century. If you follow the rules of growing roses to the letter, it is easy. If you neglect one aspect of their growing needs, you are punished with a disease-ridden, insect-infested mess. It is essential to choose the right location for roses. They like full sun, preferably all day. They need a rich fertile soil which drains well. Slight variations from this makes them more susceptible to pests. Some roses are easier to grow than others. Shrub and climbing roses are ideal for the perennial or

many insects and diseases. Try using rose dusts and sprays to protect your plant from black spot, caterpillars, aphids and beetles. Roses are usually bought as bare root plants packaged in plastic bags containing moist peat moss. They might have a waxy feel to the stems if they have been sprayed with a protective wax before being put in winter storage. Before planting bare root roses, soak them in a bucket of warm water for a couple of hours. This will plump up the roots and get them ready for growing in the soil. Hybrid tea roses are best pruned in the spring. A properly pruned rose will have three or four strong shoots growing from the main stem. Climbing and shrub roses are pruned less aggressively – leave a network of older stems from which flowering shoots will emerge. Roses should be fertilized three times a year. Apply just after pruning and removing the mulch in the spring. Rose fertilizer should be high in phosphorous which is good for flower bud formation. In June, top-dress the roses with a high nitrogen fertilizer to keep the plant strong and healthy and encourage constant flowering. In July, apply a high phosphorous rose fertilizer again.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Sow stocks for the greenhouse
Make sowings of both Beauty of Nice and Brompton stocks for flowering in pots in the greenhouse. The Beauty of Nice will bloom from Christmas until February or March, while the Brompton stocks will follow on in late spring. Sow very thinly in well drained trays filled with John Innes seed compost or equivalent and germinate in a frame, shading until the seedlings appear. Prick off or pot the seedlings separately as soon as they have two true leaves each.

Pot freesias for early flowering
Provided the corms are ripened, the earlier freesias can be potted the better. The beginning of August is usually about as soon as you can buy the corms, so if you want a supply of flowers for Christmas pot up some now in 13cm pots. You can place six corms in one pot. Sow in a peat-based compost. Bury the corms 2.5cm deep and stand the pots in a frame. Water moderately and shade from direct sunlight.

Pot Lachenalias
Lachenalias for winter flowering in the greenhouse should also be potted or placed in hanging baskets, a delightful method of growing these beautiful South African bulbs. The method of culture in pots is the same as for freesias. If you are going to grow them in hanging baskets, the basket must be well-lined with moss and then some of the bulbs placed at the bottom and around the sides of the basket, as well as on top. Hang the baskets up in a cool place for the time being and water them moderately.

Prune summer fruiting raspberries
By now the summer fruiting raspberries will have finished cropping and the sooner they are pruned, the better. Cut out, right to ground level, all the canes that have just fruited, and train in the young canes in their place.

SLAUGHTER PREMIUM 2000 - PRODUCER STATEMENTS

The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Mr Joe Walsh TD, announced recently that the distribution of the first Producer Statement, covering the period January - May 2000, in respect of the New Slaughter Premium 2000 Scheme, has commenced.

The new Slaughter Premium Scheme was agreed in the Agenda 2000 negotiations and provides for payment in respect of bovine animals including cows, heifers, bulls and steers aged 8 months and over slaughtered in Licensed Meat Abattoirs within the EU or ex-

ported live to non-EU countries during the period 1 January to 31 December 2000.

The premium is payable to producers who are registered herdowners under the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication (BTE) Scheme and who held the animals in question for a minimum period of two months ending less than one month prior to the date of slaughter within the EU or ending less than two months prior to the date of live export to a non-EU country.

The Department will be using data collected under the Cattle Movement Monitoring System (CMMS) to

assist in the establishment of eligibility under the Scheme.

This is the first time that the CMMS is being used to assist in the establishment of entitlement to bovine premia. The Department is committed to the wider use of CMMS in relation to bovine premia schemes in accordance with the recently agreed Protocol on direct payments to Farmers. Consequently, farmers do not have to complete application forms for the new Slaughter Premium in respect of animals slaughtered within the State or exported live to non-EU countries. In addition the Department is able to verify slaughterings in Northern Ireland by electronic transfer of data.

Applications are only required in respect of animals exported to other Member States (excluding Northern Ireland) for immediate slaughter.

Each Producer Statement will include a detailed listing of animals under three separate headings. The first section will list animals identified as meeting the eligibility requirements of the scheme, the second section will list animals that are ineligible and the third section will list animals for which the Department is unable, at present, to establish eligibility. Each producer should carefully check his/her statement and

- write to the Slaughter Premium Section if they dispute any of the details listed;

- supply to the Slaughter Premium Section in Portlaoise purchase and/or sales dockets for the animals under query listed in the third section of the producer

statement so that the Department can establish eligibility.

- As the computer systems for the Slaughter Scheme are still under development, information will not be required from producers in respect of all query animals. Therefore the producer should not, at this stage, submit documentation for animals marked with an asterisk(*);

- be conscious that the input of historical data on the CMMS is ongoing and that some animals slaughtered within the State or exported live to non-EU countries may not appear on this first statement but will appear on the second Producer Statement due in September;

- be aware that eligibility for the National Envelope payment (top up payment on beef type heifers slaughtered) will not be indicated until the issue of the next Producer Statement.

During May/June every registered herdowner was issued with a producer acknowledgement asking whether they wished to participate in the new Slaughter Premium Scheme. Those producers who wish to participate should note that payment in respect of eligible animals cannot be made until such time as the producer acknowledgement is returned to the Slaughter Premium Section in Portlaoise. Any producer who wishes to participate in the scheme and who has not already returned the producer acknowledgement should do so immediately.

It is proposed to issue the second Producer Statement in September prior to the commencement of payments on 16 October, in line with EU Regulations.

GRASS SUPPLY AND QUALITY IS VITAL FOR WEANLINGS

Up to about three months of age, suckled calves get most of their feed requirements from the cow's milk. From July onwards, the Spring born weanling is increasingly dependent on its own foraging. This is a time when grass quality is deteriorating and the supply can also be limiting.

MILK SUPPLY

At present, the suckler cow herd is about 50% continental bred, although there is considerable variation. The more pure the beef genetics in the suckler herd the poorer the milk supply. As a target, a Spring calving suckler cow should produce about 10kg milk per day (2 gallons) during the Summer grazing period.

The lower milkers may only produce about 6kg and consequently a well bred calf will perform well below potential if dependent on the cow's milk. Beef cross dairy cows should produce 12-14kg (2.25-3 gals) milk per day on grass which is more than adequate to keep a calf thriving up to September.

GRASS SUPPLY

Apart from the milk supply, the grass supply and quality is important to maintain weaning performance from now to the end of the season. Creep grazing (allowing calves access to good grass ahead of cows) will give a small extra growth response and it has other benefits as well.

Calves become more independent of cows by learning to be away from them for a period of hours and this makes weaning less stressful.

Furthermore because cows and calves are separated, the calves can be introduced to meal and fed separately in the creep area. Calves start feeding on meals faster when fed in troughs in a creep area than when creep feeders are put in to a field with cows and calves.

It is also easier to identify the ones that are not feeding and to limit the meal intake per calf. Cows can be a problem for the first week or so but once the calves take to the meal, the cows cannot compete at the trough.

The easiest way to get calves to creep is to replace an ordinary gate between two fields with a creep gate. It may take time to get calves to use a creep gate placed in an electric fence because of fear of the fence.

If the herd can be driven through and cows turned back to the original field, then the creep gate closed, the calves will initially use the creep gate to get back to the cows and become less frightened of the gate. Leaving the herd a while longer in the grazing field will also encourage calves to use a creep gate in order to get at the better grass.

CHANGING LINERS FOR BETTER PERFORMANCE

Teagasc, Moorepark recommend that milk liners should be changed after 2,500 cow milkings. This is usually 4 months into the milking season on most Irish farms. Therefore, most dairy farmers should have changed their milk liners in the past month.

Sales of milk liners are always greater in the Spring time in comparison to the month of July. This means a July liner change is skipped on many farms. What are the effects of not changing your milk liners as recommended? — A reduction in milk yield of 6%; An increase in Somatic Cell Count (SCC) due to under milking from July onwards

Help Available To Improve Literacy

I received a booklet today from the National Adult Literacy Agency (NALA) which gives details of the centres in each county where adults can receive literacy training. There are four centres in Co. Waterford: Lismore, Dungarvan, Portlaoise and Waterford. Tuition is given on a one to one basis and is totally confidential.

There are many farmers and farm family members who have difficulties with literacy and numeracy. In most cases it is a reflection on the education system they went through rather than the individuals themselves. The difficulties for those people get worse each year as the amount of form filling required at farm level increases.

If you have a family member or friend who would appreciate some confidential help to improve their situation, ask him/her to phone Mary Walsh, Adult Education Organiser, Co. Waterford V.E.C. at 058-48950

Learning to read and write will make an enormous difference to the life of any adult.

O'Rourke Demands Farm Incomes To Be Part Of PPF Review

Pat O'Rourke, President ICMSA, speaking recently at the Programme For Prosperity and Fairness 2000 Plenary Meeting demanded farm incomes be part of the review of the current programme given the farm income problem and escalating costs due to inflation and other factors.

Farmers are the only Social Partners to suffer an actual income fall during the last Agreement — in fact 20 per cent declined. Mr. O'Rourke stated that farmers are seeking further measures to curb inflation and are seeking a total embargo on any increased costs or charges by the Government or Public Agencies for the full duration of the PPF.

Mr. O'Rourke said: "The Programme For Prosperity and Fairness clearly sets out to ensure that farm families have increased living standards in line with the norm in our economy. To date, this has not happened and farmers have seen little Government action to tackle the problem. This problem is clear. Farm incomes declined by 12.3% in 1999, which is unprecedented in modern times. Even with a recovery in 2000, farm incomes are now about 7% lower in real terms compared to 1998. Wages generally in other sectors will increase at the rate of between 8 and 14% following the 2000 Budget. This is a major problem facing farmers," Mr. O'Rourke stated.

Farmers in County Waterford will be among those in the running for one of forty seats on a special FBD backed IFA European fact-finding tour which will take in Spain and Portugal, over eight days next Autumn.

Forty farmers from IFA branches throughout the country will be heading to Europe to view European farming in Spain and Portugal, following the announcement recently by the farmers' insurance company, FBD, that its Trust Company is to continue its sponsorship of the very successful Scholarship, launched eight years ago.

The European Scholarship tour, made possible with the generous sponsorship of FBD Trust, promises to be an extensive one, entailing an eight day itinerary of visits to farms, research institutions, food processors, advisory services and farm organisations. A study of the Irish Live Export trade to Spain will be part of the itinerary.

The forty farmers will be selected from an IFA members competition, which will take place over the coming weeks. It is open to the Associations 925 Branch Officers, who have had gained entry into the draw on the basis of their hard work to increase membership in their locality. Members for the Associations branches in Waterford will be included in the draw. Those qualifying will be notified by post and a selection will be made by public draw, under independent supervision.

RETENTION PERIOD PROPOSAL WOULD BE DISASTROUS FOR LAMB PRICES

Waterford IFA Sheep Chairman Harry Gray has said the Department of Agriculture's latest proposal on the ewe premium retention period for 2001 would be a disaster for the spring lamb market next year.

Following a meeting with Department of Agriculture officials, Harry Gray said the 13th of April end of retention proposed by the Department would destroy the market for spring lamb and cost lamb producers dearly. He pointed out that as April 13 2001 is Good Friday, farmers could not move hoggets until Easter Tuesday April 17.

Following the breakdown of the latest meeting, Harry Gray stated that IFA is now insisting on a face to face meeting with Minister Walsh to resolve the issue.

Mr. Gray said IFA was demanding a mid March end to the ewe premium retention period so that the disposal of hoggets would be completed before spring lamb was marketed next year.

Harry Gray said "Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh has the power to set mid March as the end of retention which would allow spring lamb prices achieve their full potential."

IFA APPOINTS FARM FORESTRY DEVELOPMENT OFFICER

The IFA has appointed Pearse Gath as its new Farm Forestry Development Officer.

Pearse who hails from near Kinnitty in County Offaly graduated from the Scottish School of Forestry in Inverness in 1999, qualifying as a professional forester. He also completed the Agri-Forestry Certificate Ballyhaise Agricultural College in Cavan.

Pearse previously worked with the forestry contracting company Green Belt Ltd.

This appointment by the IFA is part of its new initiative to encourage farmers to integrate forestry on their farms as an additional enterprise capable of increasing overall farm income.

Commenting on the appointment, IFA Farm Forestry Chairman Pat Lehane said "that in excess of 10,000 farmers have already planted their land. With the new increased grants and premiums, there is significant scope for farmers to plant some of their farms and increase their farm incomes."



SUCKLER COW AND EWE PREMIUM QUOTAS NATIONAL RESERVES FOR 2001.

Farmers who intend to apply for the Suckler Cow Premium Scheme and/or the Ewe Premium Scheme in the year 2001 on more animals than their existing permanent quotas are invited to apply to the National Reserves for an allocation of quota.

Ewe Premium Reserve.

It is expected that there will be sufficient quota in the Reserve to make an allocation to all eligible applicants. Because of this, there are no priority categories or income limits and it is NOT necessary to have the application certified by a Teagasc Officer or by an Agricultural Consultant.

Reserve quota will be allocated on the basis that the applicant needs extra quota to ensure payment on all his eligible ewes in 2001.

Suckler Cow Reserve.

There are four categories as follows:

- First Time applicants for the Suckler Cow Premium Scheme in 2001 who are under 35 years of age. (Farmers who qualified under this category in the year 2000 may also be eligible under this category)
- Farmers with holding on off-shore islands
- Farmers already holding suckler cow quotas who require additional quota to ensure the future viability of their holdings.
- Farmers who do not qualify under a), b) or c) above.

A total income limit of £19,417 and an off-farm income limit of £14,200 will apply to categories a), b) and c).

Applicants under category a) must not have more than 30 Livestock Units while applicants under category c) must have at least 10 but not more than 30 Livestock Units. No Livestock Unit criteria applies to category b).

Because of the limited amount of quota available, it is unlikely that there will be sufficient quota to enable allocations to be made to applicants under category d).

Natural Gas For Dungarvan

Bord Gais will supply the gas to the power plant and in turn will own the energy output which will be linked up with the ESB sub station on the Military Road near Radley Engineering. The gas supply will be brought into the town from either Middleton (via Youghal) or Clonmel.

Dungarvan Energy Ltd. is the company formed to develop the project and is made up of a number of Irish investors together with Rolls Royce Power Ventures (RRPV).

With the deregulation of the ESB, there is now a window of opportunity for Dungarvan Energy and the company will be the first of several national energy proposals to sell electricity back into the grid.

Waterford Fine Gael TD Austin Deasy has been informed that Bord Gais has completed the initial design/routing on a pipeline to Dungarvan which is sized for the power plant and other

potential loads in the area.

The recently enacted Gas Act provides for a scheme to allocate scarce capacity in the natural gas network to power producers for the purpose of fuelling new power plants. The allocation scheme provided for in that Act will be conducted on an independent basis by the Commission for Electricity Regulation (CER).

It is expected that the CER will be inviting applications from prospective power producers in the coming weeks and Dungarvan Energy and any other prospective power producer may apply for capacity in the natural gas network under that scheme.

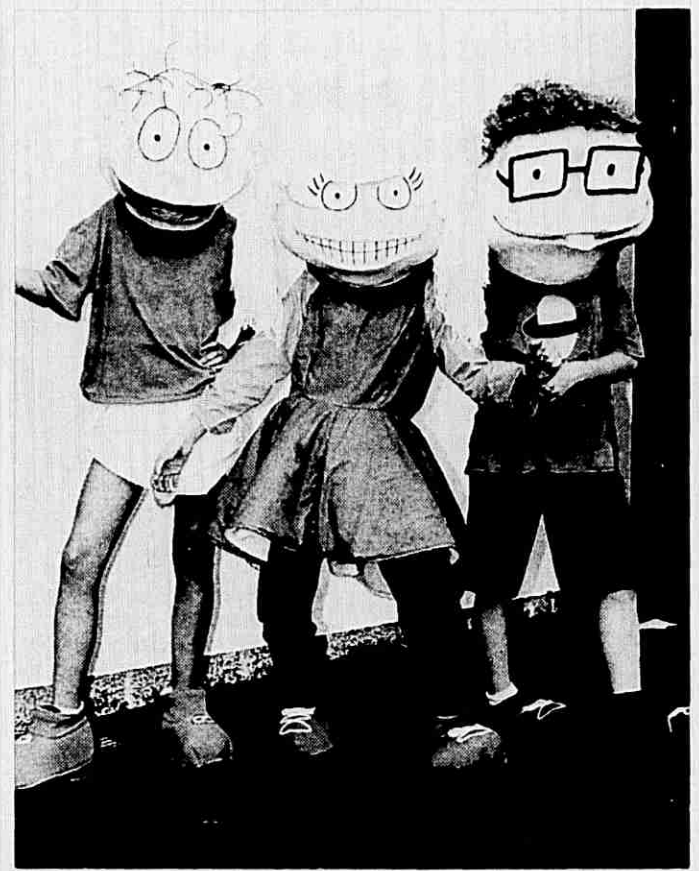

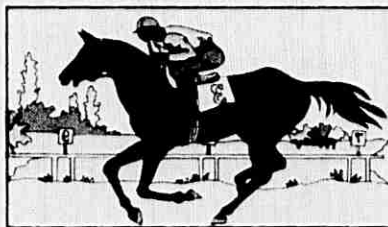

Late Michael Walsh

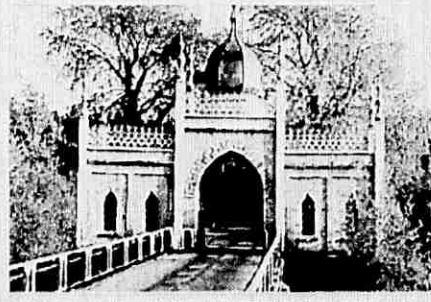

Ballymacarbry News

FOURMILEWATER PARISH PRIEST REINTERRED

Rev. Fr. David Hearn was appointed Parish Priest of Fourmilewater/Newcastle on the death of Rev. Fr. Thomas Finn P.P. in 1884. Fr. David Hearne P.P. was translated from Kill/Newtown where he had served for many years, during his time there he came up with an idea of building a temporary church at Kilmacthomas. He procured the building material from the buildings of the defunct Bonmahon Mines, and erected onto the convent on the side of the proposed stone church.

This temporary Chapel lasted until quite recently and served the purpose of a convent church and a public chapel of ease for the people of Kilmacthomas.

Fr. Hearne was described as a very hard working, zealous and singled minded pastor. He lacked worldly prudence, however he was an indifferent accountant and a bad financier with results unsatisfactory to parochial and private credit. He died on the 22nd November 1889 at Fourmilewater Church, as his

remains lay in Newcastle Church awaiting burial on the following day, that night they were stolen and brought to the convent in Kilmacthomas which were the wishes of the people of Kilmacthomas. The horse and cart which was bringing the remains of Fr. Hearne P.P. was met by a huge crowd and escorted through the village by a torch light procession and laid to rest in the nave of his own timber church in Kilmacthomas. His grave there was marked by a large limestone flag of stone in front of the altar.

Recently the convent in Kilmacthomas was sold and the body of Fr. David Hearne P.P. had to be exhumed and was buried in the convent cemetery beside the little chapel that he erected over one hundred years ago. The exhuming was carried out by contractors from Dublin.

WELL KNOWN NURSING HOME TO CEASE TRADING

Well known nursing home, The Cottage Hospital, Clonmel, has given elderly patients six weeks to vacate the premises. Last Friday twenty two residents of the Cottage Hospital and their families were told that the nursing home would cease trading from August 31.

The Cottage Hospital nursing home which has been in operation since 1973 has been on the open market since November 1999. It is owned by Sean Melody from Ballina, Co. Mayo, who is brother of the late Paddy Melody, Ballymacarbry who was one of the best business people in the South of Ireland. Mr. Melody states he has been unable to sell it as a going concern, and that they had given the families of the residents ample notice of the decision to cease trading on August 31.

Families of patients there have called on the South Eastern Health Board to come to their assistance and purchase this facility. The South Eastern Health Board has been asked to comment on the matter but so far they have not released a statement.

Sean Melody, the owner of the home, states that this premises has been on the market since November '99, that's nine months. "We will be evacuating this building on the last day of August, the residents, staff, everybody, we will cease trading from that date. The people involved have been given ample notice. It will be put on the market as an unoccupied building for any purpose that any prospective buyer has in mind," stated Sean Melody.

SUICIDE - Emotional Disturbance And Prevention



Society has varied notions on suicide. North American Indians particularly the Crow encouraged their elderly and sick to seek death by their own hand. However from early times strong religious and legal sanctions were held by most cultures. In today's more understanding world we need to look at suicide more from a human compassionate point of view and realise that suicide is not the result of a character weakness but rather our shortcomings in the understanding of those that fear reaching out for help. We also need to look at ways to heal the hearts and minds of those left behind in its dreadful wake.

SUICIDE IN THE YOUNG

Suicide in our young is without question one of society's serious problems. In the U.S. a study drawn up in 1995 found that one in ten college students considered suicide and had actually drawn up a plan. The figures for high school students are even more frightening. Research reports that a suicide is completed every 15 minutes.

A suicide attempt is the single greatest predictor of suicide and completion of suicide is the finality of suicidal thoughts and behaviours. Suicide for the victim suggests a peace the world cannot give and I believe this is a primary motive for the suicidal. The suicidal goes through a hell and his suffering before the act is private and inexpressible. Suicide carries for the suicidal confusion and devastation beyond description. There is the compelling guilt of leaving family. There is torment by fear, sorrow, shame, anguish and guilt and although the suicidal battles against these emotions he cannot forget them and as he finds no comfort in life so ends it himself. Families need to know more so that they can come to terms with it. Above all we need to know how a person who exhibits risk taking behaviour moves from suicidal thinking and attempts to complete the act.

DEPRESSION AND SUICIDAL THOUGHTS

Suicidal thoughts are very common and it is not uncommon for most at some point to declare life is not worth living — or I wish I were dead. Studies in Europe report that one in ten boys in France and one in ten girls thought about suicide fairly often. As disturbing as these and other reports are it is alarming that many parents don't actually notice these thoughts or behaviours. In fact few parents are aware of their children's experiences — children are secretive — and they greatly underestimate the existence or gravity of their children's depression especially their adolescent children. Parents find it difficult to accept that their children are in such emotional pain and wish to die. Children worry a lot about their parents and family and that something might happen to them and children have often told me how when they are shouted at or get put down they wish they were dead. It is a cause for concern when children bang their heads or fists on walls out of anger and frustration. This is a positive indicator of a disturbed young mind and should not be minimised.

The line between suicidal thoughts and completion is hazy. Many young people are ambivalent about wanting to live or die. They may see suicide threats as a tool to get back at their parents for a rejection. Gender plays a major role in whether thoughts are turned into completion. Women think of suicide more than men as women suffer more from depression but women are more likely to externalise their emotions than men.

Depression is at the heart of suicide and it is in the terrible pendulum of despair and helplessness that suicide becomes an option in order to escape. Depression shatters the capacity to cope. It immobilises the mind's flexibility and ability to adapt to pressure. This is further compounded if a depressed person uses alcohol or drugs. Depression retards the cognitive processes and exaggerates negative experiences and failures. Depressed people are unable to generate solutions to problems and their thinking is rigid and narrow.

Depression increases in intensity of sadness until the sufferer hits rock bottom. Each loss or failure is so strong that it constitutes a fresh experience of loss and failure. Depressed people use a selective abstraction and over interpret loss and failure. The depressed person also uses this selectivity in recalling past experiences. As a result of this tunnel vision depressed people block any positive feelings. They exclaim "I don't deserve to be happy" and they are so negative that even funny situations are not funny to them. They have difficulty in expressing anger because they see themselves as responsible for and deserving of all the bad things in their life. They think in absolute terms "Life is meaningless — Nobody loves me — I'm inadequate."

Suicidals become locked in a time warp, they perceive the future as futile and their thinking becomes paralysed. This sense of hopelessness and helplessness cracks the mind of a depressed person, making suicide the only viable option. Once the individual regards death as more desirable than life he becomes attracted to suicide.

Depression paralyses and leaves its victims in a deadened state. Victims lose their mental compass and they become drained of feelings. When this condition coexists with alcohol and/or drug abuse the condition worsens. Victims then plunge into utter futility and they become drowned in morbid confused thoughts. They are robbed of the will to live and everything seems an effort but sadly an effort not worth making. The victim becomes weary and although consumed by the need to sleep, sleep becomes elusive and fitful. Depression is at its deepest in the early morning. On waking the depressed person feels that this is another day of unchanging pain, the pain subsides during the day only to resurge again during the night and early morning. Unfortunately many people do not have the comprehension of the profound sense of hopelessness depressed people suffer. Their pain is not an identifiable pain like a broken leg or broken arm. As a psychologist who treats depressed people day in and day out without doubt the balance lies in the hope that for the depressed person things will improve.

HIGH RISK PERIOD

One of the highest risk periods for suicide is when victims are apparently recovering from their depression. It is during moments of energy that depressed people complete the act. It's as if there is a volatile combination of erratic mood, morbid thinking and an exaggerated level of energy, products of unhinged thinking. This transition from hopelessness to normal existence is punctuated by rapid mood swings. This opens the latent suicide thoughts and desires. Unfortunately many who have died have been reported by their doctors as being in better spirits than usual. This is the calm before the storm and they may be deceiving their families and doctors in the knowledge that anxiety and pain are about to end.

The causes of suicide lie in many factors and the misdiagnosing or underplaying the gravity of a suicide risk has tragic circumstances. Those who have completed suicide have often repeatedly made their intentions to kill themselves known to others. Anyone who minimises a suicidal statement as an 'attention getter' lacks understanding. Such statements are profound expressions of deep-felt emotions and make the possibility of treatment and prevention allowable. This is perhaps the suicidal's last cry for help.

Assessment of suicide risk must precede any attempt to treat depression. All risk factors need to be evaluated and I always ask depressed people directly about suicidal thoughts. Other areas that need to be documented are mood states, sleep disturbance, drug or alcohol abuse, stress exposure such as marital problems, job loss or a death in the family. Many individuals involved in dysfunctional and violent situations may consider these situations as part of their lives and may not consider them as unusual but indeed people with a violent temper or those exposed to vitriolic abuse are known to jump out of their moving cars.

Research into suicide is unequivocal in stating that in every investigation of completed suicide depression was under diagnosed. There is a responsibility on all clinicians to evaluate the risk factor of imminent suicides. Hospitalisation may be necessary and rather than be seen as a stigma should be viewed as a necessity in dealing with a serious problem. Furthermore suicidal need care, time and emotional understanding and commitment in the long term.

Suicide is a nightmare for those who have to live with its reality. Those who are left behind bear the guilt, the anger and the pain of understanding why the tragedy happened and what they could have done differently. Survivors are left with memories and threads of a life connected to their own.

Each person who completes suicide has long prepared his own end. This painful secret remains private and terrible because the suicidal sees his act as the final and best of bad possibilities. Thus suicide, though an irrational choice, seems the best way to end the pain and futility in the mind of the suicidal. Suicidals by dying they feel they hurt their loved ones less than by living.

"I wish I could explain it so someone could understand it but there's just this heavy overwhelming despair — empty inside. I can't bear it anymore. I'm sorry." — note left by a 17 year old boy.

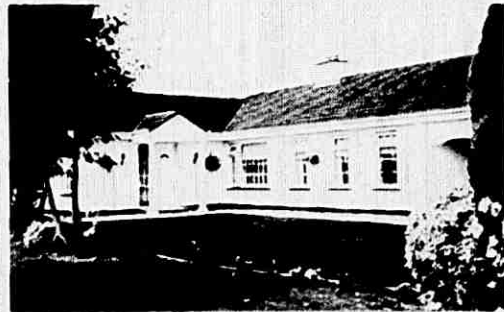

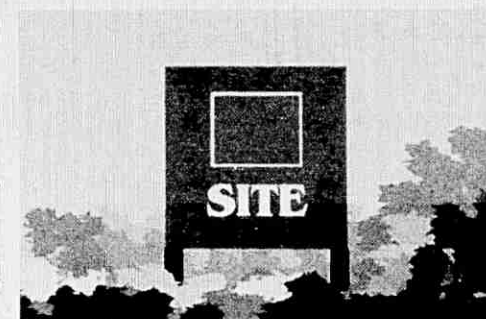

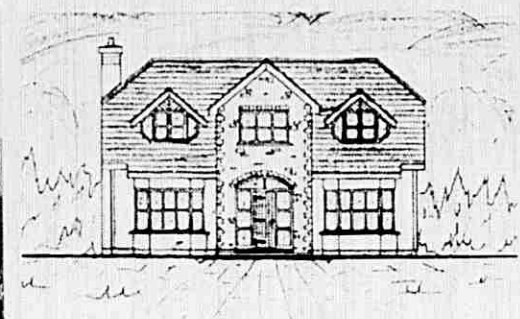

Like all community groups finance plays a very important part in our affairs. It must also be said that a major sponsor plays a huge part in how committee makes progress. Stradbally

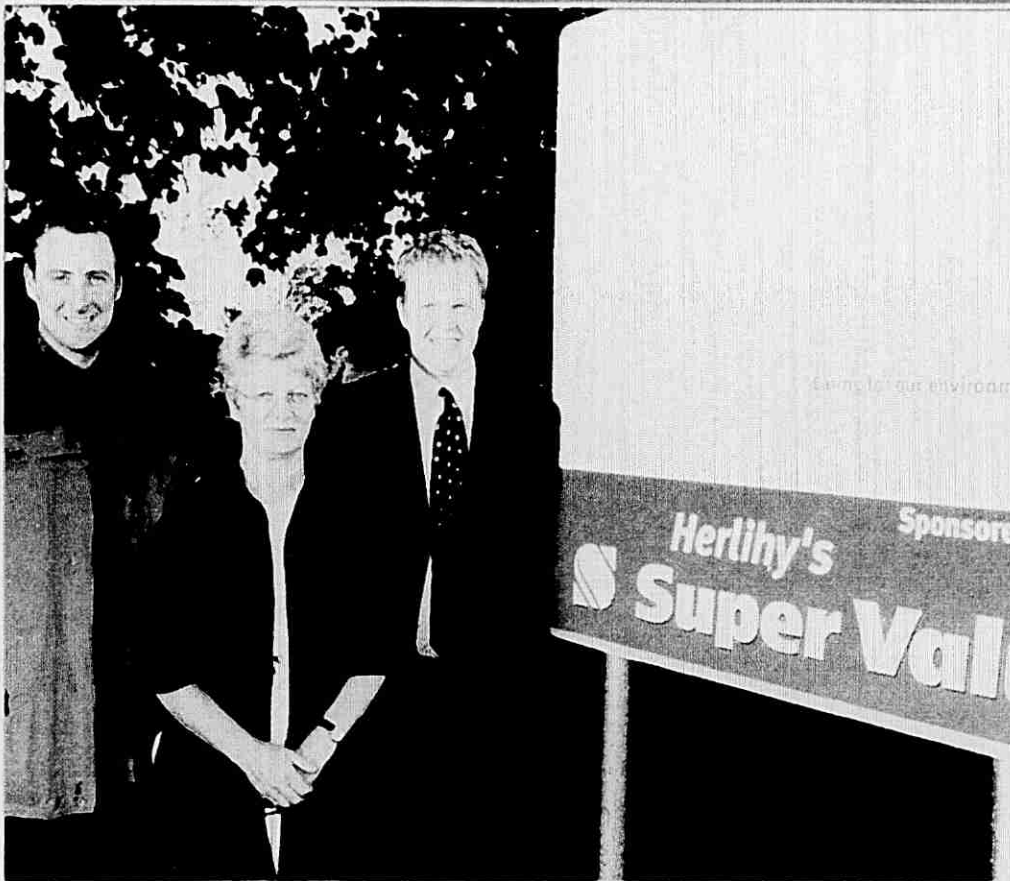

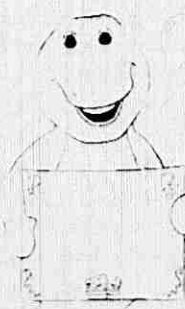

MONEYMATTERS

FIRST STEPS IN BUDGETING

There are some simple things to bear in mind, when you start to account for your income and expenditure. Decide whether you want an annual, weekly or monthly total first and apportion your figures accordingly. If you are paid weekly, budget weekly, if you are paid monthly, it is best to budget monthly.

To start off your budgeting, the following steps will lead you on the right road:

- List all income coming into your house.
- Count all spending — even occasionally or once a year. Babysitting costs for social activities, for example, should be listed, no matter how seldom.
- Keep a notebook in which you record everything spent even over a two week or three week period — it can be a real eye opener.
- Estimate clothing needs, for yourself and any other dependents for a year. It does not have to be exact and is much better than making no provisions at all. Involve as many household members as practical. It is everyone's responsibility to some degree. It is important to show older children the cost of running a family, and will prepare them for when they are responsible for their own budgets.
- Allow for Christmas and birthday gifts.
- Once off expenses can blow a budget apart. It is advisable therefore to have an emergency fund if possible to meet unexpected expenses.
- Get to grips with impulse spending. Many of us are amazed at the level of spending on lunches, clothes, lottery, flowers, etc. when we take the time to keep a record for a few weeks.

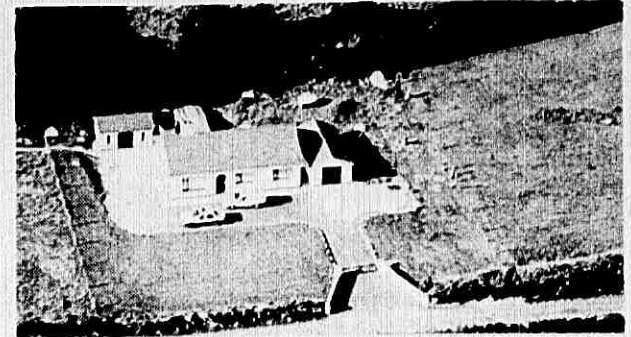

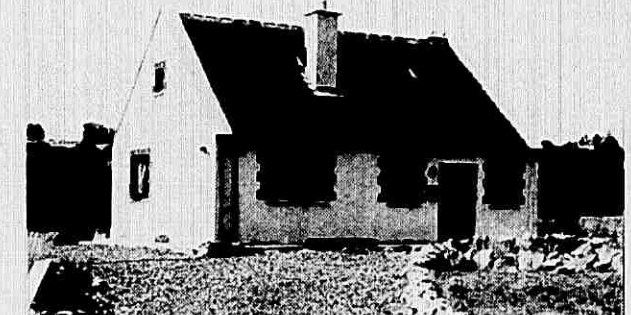

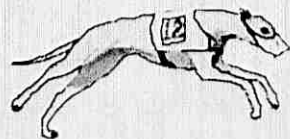

Red House League

RULE CHANGES FROM THE A.G.M.

There were several proposals for rule changes at the recent Annual General Meeting. It is important for all clubs to be fully aware of these changes. Some of the changes were very minor with just a slight rewording necessary. Thirteen rules came under consideration and as each club delegate will have been notified of the changes already, we will just concentrate on the more important ones.

The fines for not fulfilling a fixture have changed. In the case of the home team, this is £50 while the away team must pay £30 plus the match fee. In future, the referee must receive the full team panel before the kick-off and names may not be added up to half-time as was the case before. A club will now be fined £20 for not attending meetings and the fine will now be £10 when a club does not contact the P.R.O. before 5 p.m. with their match result.

All clubs who intend to run tournaments must seek permission from the Red House

League and the Munster Football Association in writing. In the absence of the appointed match referee, only a registered referee can take control of a game. One of the rules that causes most controversy is Rule 41 which deals with kick-off times. While the referees and the committee feel very strongly about late kick-offs, it is ultimately up to the clubs to remedy this situation. The general feeling is that referees should wait approximately fifteen minutes before leaving the venue. Any team that is late will be reported by the referee and the management committee can take action. All fines must of course be paid in time and looking at last year's balance sheet, the amount of fines more than doubled from the previous year. This was due, I feel mainly to the introduction of our disciplinary committee but also to the increased number of reports made by the referees. While referees would prefer to just turn up at the match and go home without any trouble, some clubs continue to break the rules and let's hope that we

see an improvement this coming season.

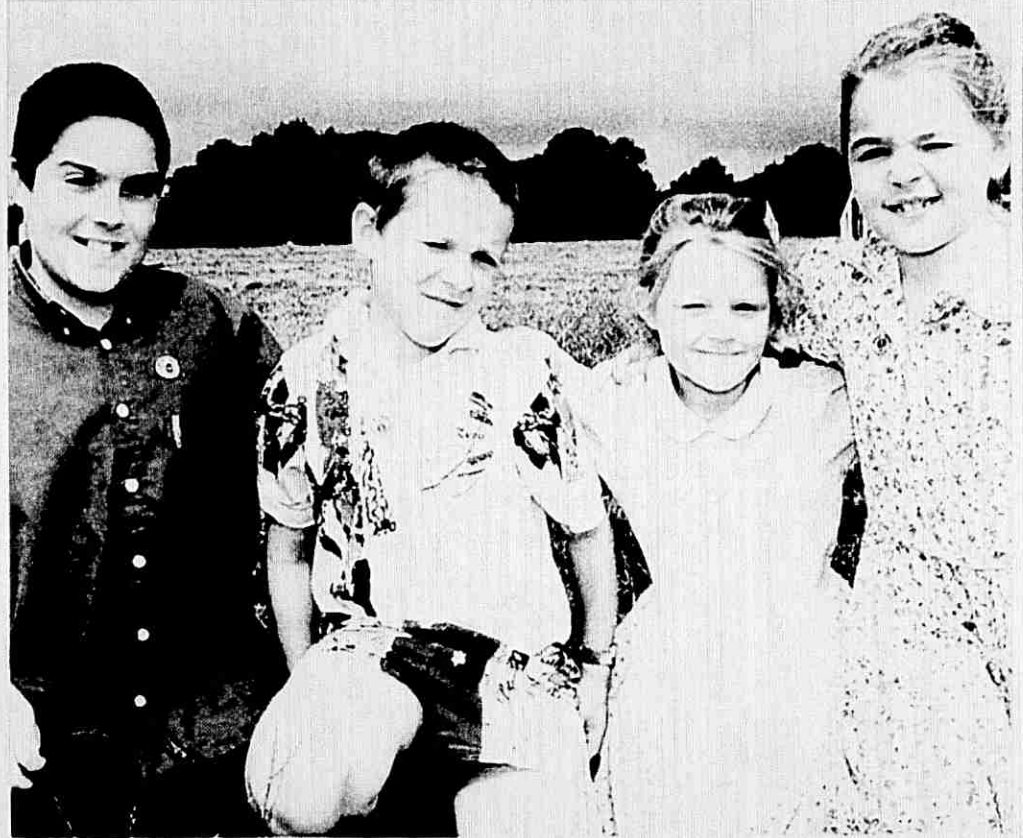

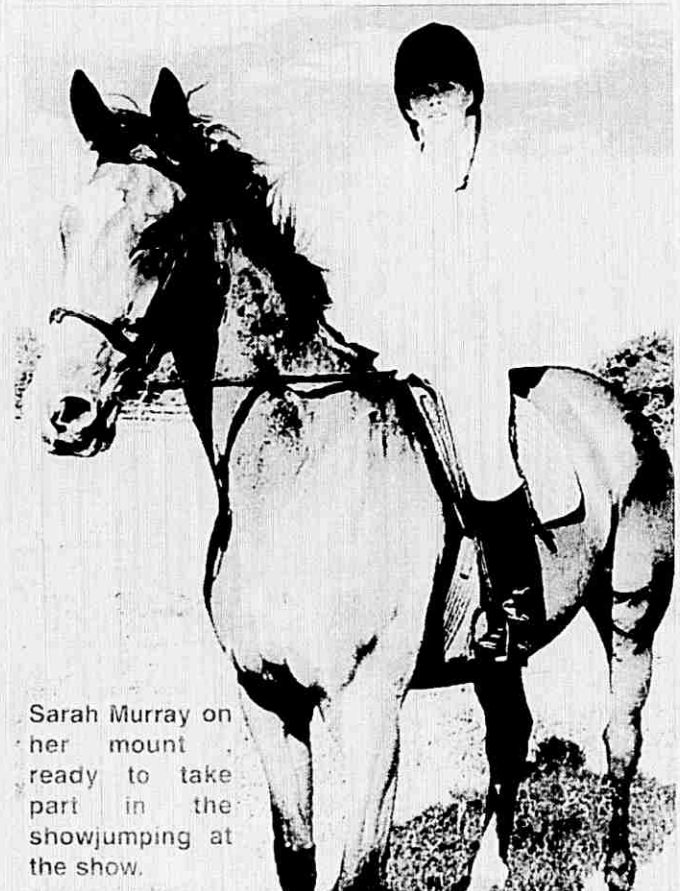

Everyone with football interests seem to agree that this is an exceptionally attractive fixture. They are the two dominant clubs in this grade in football and both are flying high at the moment.

Stradbally are the reigning divisional and county champions and going for their third title in four years.

Ardmore are perceived as being the rising power in football and will come into this one with all guns blazing. They have done very well at underage level over the past several seasons and will be strongly fancied here and I believe that they will take the title this time.

St. Olivers v. An Gaeltacht
This will be another splendid game of football between two very committed teams who have made wonderful progress at underage over the past several years.

People who have followed their progress so far this season will tell us that there is little difference in standards between the good teams in the 'B' championship and the top sides in the 'A'.

We look forward to seeing if this is so. It should be a splendid curtain raiser and it will commence at 2 p.m.

John Keane Honoured

Waterford's John Keane who was named at centre half back on the Centenary Team selected in 1984 was again honoured last week when named in the same position on the Team of the Millennium as announced in Croke Park on Monday, July 24th.

John Keane, who was Mount Sion's brightest star, had an illustrious career as a hurler winning every available award (except national hurling league).

He began his career as a juvenile with Mount Sion and spanned a continuous and outstanding service to Waterford from minor through to senior. He was a dynamic personality, one of those mighty figures whose colourful exploits, mastery of the game and sportsmanship, helped so nobly to further enhance the great game of hurling.

He captained Waterford in seven Munster senior hurling championships and he won 7 inter provincial medals in a 12 year Railway Cup (1937 to 1949) career. As a minor he played at fullback in the junior hurling All Ireland team in 1934 and in the following year he played senior and in 1938 he won a Munster senior hurling medal (the first) with Waterford.

He won a Munster and All Ireland medal in 1948. John Keane captained Mount Sion on 11 occasions from 1941 to 1951 and during this period he collected 8 senior hurling county championship medals. He won his first senior hurling medal in 1938 and his last in 1951. He won a junior football medal in the Munster final of 1948 and also collected junior football championship medals with Mount Sion.

He was a county selector and trainer of the team when Waterford reached the All Ireland final in 1957. This truly great sportsman will forever remain a hurling legend in Waterford and far beyond.

LISMORE 2-14**

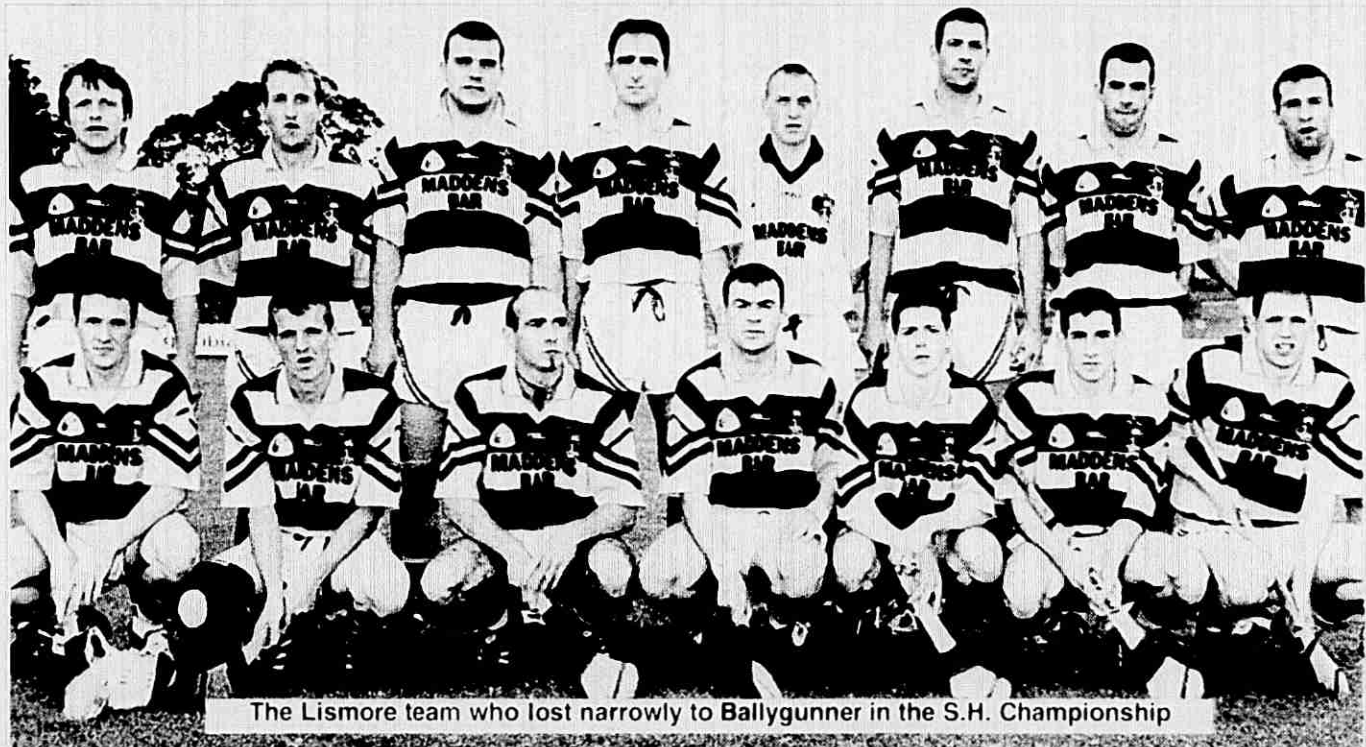

SECOND HALF

Paul Flynn pointed the free that then left it necessary for the challengers to get two scores (one of which had to be a goal). Dave Bennett's free taking brought the gap back to 3 points, but time ran out on them and the champions survived and took the semi-finals and county final out of the West.

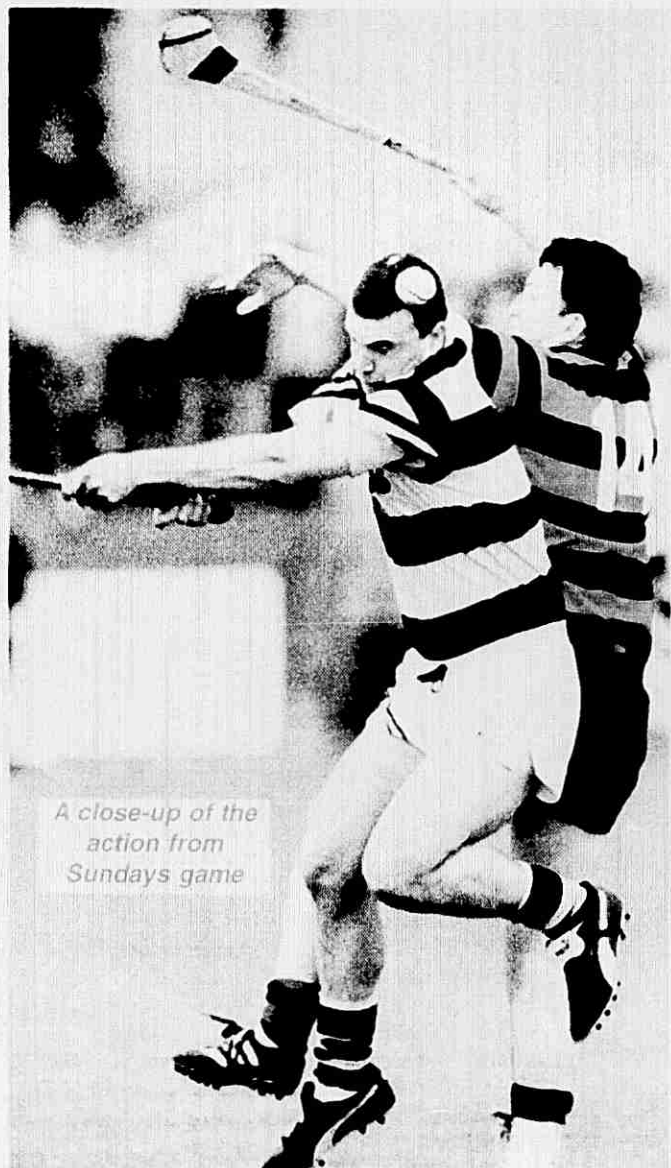
