Local Teenager Excels At Galway Races



TOM QUEALLY

Fifteen year old Tom Queally of Cappagh, Dungarvan became the youngest ever rider to win a major race at the prestigious Galway Races last week.

Son of Declan and Bernie Queally (nee Power), Tom rode a brilliant race from start to finish to win the £70,000 McDonagh Handicap in style.

To cap off his successful outing, Tom also rode a winner in the Compaq Software Acquisition Handicap and was placed fourth in the Compaq Installation Handicap the next day.

Despite his obvious youth, the teenager has a wealth of racing experience. He was declared the national pony racing champion last year having ridden over 40 winners and was also one of the twelve finalists nominated for the 1999 Pat Noctor Young Sports Star award in Dungarvan. The Cappagh jockey has only been riding on the track for four months and had six successes prior

to Galway.

His father Declan is a member of the well known Queally family of Barracree, Ballinamult who have been very involved in hunting and point-to-point meetings over the years. Tom's mother Bernie hails from 'The Hill', Kilmacthomas where his grandmother, the late Anne Power was well known in greyhound and horse-racing circles.

Although attached to Pat Flynn's stables in Rathgormack, Tom rode the Mc-Donagh Handicap on



JMAN BODY

Every year, an average person eats about half a tonne of food. But we do not put on half a tonne of weight! We need to eat so much because there is a constant turnover within the body. Cells wear out and die, and new cells are made to replace them.

The food we eat is broken down, or digested, into its many and various nutrients. Some of these are used as raw materials for growth, body maintenance and repair.

Other nutrients are split apart to release the energy inside them, which is used for moving, breathing and hundreds of other life processes.

Any undigested or leftover bits of food, along with various bodily wastes, are then removed from the body at the end of the digestive process and by excretion.

Since the body is made from the food it eats, a balanced diet of good foods is important for health,

THE DIGESTIVE SYSTEM

The main part of the digestive system is the digestive tract. This is a long tube, some nine meters in total, through the



middle of the body. It starts at the mouth, where food and drink enter, and finishes at the anus, where leftover food and wastes leave the body.

Some parts of the tract are wide, such as the stomach. Others are narrow and coiled, like the small intestine. Each part has an important digestive task. Also involved in digestion are the liver and pancreas.

FAST FOOD, SLOW **EATING**

Thorough chewing mashes any kind of food into a pulp, and makes it easier to digest in the stomach and intestines. Food that is bitten and swallowed with hardly any chewing cannot be digested as well.



TYPES OF TEETH

The adult human body has 32 teeth. The eight chisel-like incisors at the front bite food. The four pointed canines tear and rip it. The eight premolars and twelve molars at the back of the mouth are flattened to crush and chew it.

Before the adult teeth grow, the body has a first or 'milk' set of 20 teeth. These begin to grow soon after birth, and are replaced by the adult teeth from the age of about six or seven years.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am a pensioner aged 72 on a Non-Contributory Old Age Pension. My husband died last year and I want to sell my house in order to move into a retirement home. I have just found out that the house is worth over £120,000. Will the money I get from the sale affect my pension?

ANSWER

No, if you sell your house and use the proceeds to buy or fund the renting of alternative accommodation or fund the payment of fees to a registered nursing home, the proceeds from the sale, up to a maximum limit of £150,000, may not be counted as means. From 5th July 2000 the maximum limit has been increased to £150,000 (previously it was £75,000).

This exemption applies to people over the age of 66 on noncontributory social welfare pensions. After you have bought or paid for your new accommodation there is a limit of £150,000 on the exemption - any figure above that is taken into account in the usual way. The exemption does not apply to interest earned on the proceeds.

Apart from this exemption other capital such as savings are assessed in the means test for non-contributory social welfare payments. The method for assessing capital will change in October 2000 and will be dealt with in this column next month.



Labhras O Cadhla spent most of his working life in Ring College area and retired to Cappoquin where he spent his final years. As a young boy Labhras was taught many

songs by his mother, his aunt and the older Irish speakers of his homeland. From this he gained a rich and varied store of songs and poetry many of which stem directly from the cultural milieu of the Sliabh gCua region including the songs of Padraig O Milleadha e.g.'Sliabh Geal gCua na Feile'. He was an Irish language teacher in the area for many years up to his death in 1961. He was recognised as a superb singer by many including celebrated music collector, Seamus Ennis who believed him to be one of the best he







Pansies Provide Plenty Of Colour

Fancy growing a few colourful flowers in vour garden? Check out the tips below and be the best pansy grower on your street!

Pansies are not hard to grow - you don't even have to worry about cold weather. They love cool winter weather and will go on blooming until the hot weather appears next summer.

They like a really rich, well drained soil. Adding steer manure, your own compost or peat moss will help your soil to become loose and easy to work with.

Poor drainage, planting too deep, planting too close together - any or all of these can cause diseases which will make your plants die.

After you plant your pansies six to eight inches apart, water them in well. Don't fertilize them until later. Always wait a week or so to allow the roots to settle in. Then give them a good dose of Miracle Grow or another good fertilizer.

MARIGOLDS: The Facts

Type: Annual Light: Full sun

Flower colour: Orange and yellow, also mahogany and crimson for French mangolds.

Soil requirements: Well drained.

Marigolds they're easy to grow and great to look at!

MARIGOLDS are a gardener's dream come true - beautiful and easy to grow,

Marigolds have a long flowering period. African marigolds have a upright growth and can reach a height of 30-40 inches, while French marigolds grow to only 8-16

The scent is strong and quite unpleasant, and is effective in repelling many garden pests. African marigolds come in shades of yellow and orange, while French marigolds are often multicolored in shades of orange, yellow, mahogany and crimson.

They are attractive as cut flowers if the scent isn't a problem. Change the water in the vase frequently.

Marigolds can be grown in all but the coldest climates.

Once your marigolds have been planted, water deeply and regularly, especially in hot weather. Mulching between plants will help to conserve moisture.

If you give them an early start, they will bloom throughout summer and autumn. In warmer areas, they will flower into winter. Marigolds are sometimes attacked by whiteflies and mites. Regular hosings keep pests from becoming established.

Ripen off onions

Onions from January and March sowings will now be approaching ripeness, and you can hasten this by bending over the leaves just above the neck of each bulb.

Pot winter flowering begonias

If you were able to root cuttings of winter flowering begonias in late winter, the plants should now be about ready for potting on into their flowering pots. Cut back violas and pansies for propagation

It is an excellent idea to cut back a few plants of any good violas and pansies you may have with a view to encouraging basal growth which will provide cuttings next month. Scissor off the present flowering shoots to within 2.5cm of the roots. Then scatter a little fine soil mixed with sand and sifted leaf mould over the plants.

Sow cyclamen

It is possible to raise cyclamen from seed sown very early in the year and flower the plants the following winter, but the best results are obtained by sowing about the middle of August. Keep the seedlings growing steadily throughout the following autumn, winter, spring and summer so they make fine big corms for flowering the following autumn

Take pelargonium cuttings

You can take cuttings of both zonal and ivy-leaved bedding pelargoniums (geraniums) at any time during August. Choose shoots 10 to 13cm long that are not carrying flowers. Sever them cleanly just below a joint and insert the cuttings around the edge of well drained pots filled with sandy compost. The cuttings will root quickly if you stand them in a frame and shade them from direct sunshine, but they can also be rooted in any reasonably sheltered place indoors or out.

Continue to remove faded flowers and runners

Throughout August continue to remove faded flowers from roses and bedding and herbaceous plants.

Lisfennel/ Springmount Area Of Dungarvan **Needs Attention**

An area transcending the urban and county boundaries in Dungarvan has been highlighted as a community in need of facilities taken for granted in other parts of the town.

Cllr. Fiachra O Céilleachair, a Labour representative for the Dungarvan electoral area, says people living in Lisfennel and Springmount deserve attention for their part of the town - particularly as it is separated out from the rest of Dungarvan by the N25 by-pass. Whilst Cllr. O Céilleachair is hopeful that the present review of the Dungarvan town development plan may incorporate a future strategy for a community presently divided by the urban/county boundary, he feels there are pressing issues for the present such as the widening of the Lisfennel road and the provision of a footpath between the Lisfennel Close housing estate and the Dungarvan GAA grounds.

"Over recent years it is possible that the boundary situation has complicated local development in Lisfennel. Neighbours on the same road in the same townland are living in different jurisdictions. Two substantial housing estates, Lisfennel Close and Spring Meadow are served by separate authorities - with one being officially regarded as not being part of Dungarvan town at all - despite being only across the road from each other. This situation may well have to be examined between the County and Urban Councils in their deliberations in regard to the Town Development Plan review underway at the moment. Whatever local authority is responsible, the fact of the matter is that among other local issues in the area - there should at least be a footpath leading from the GAA grounds down towards the interface with the by-pass. The GAA grounds are a focal point for the whole town. Local residents are anxious that I pursue this and other outstanding issues, in addition to seeking acceleration of promised or as yet incomplete initiatives. Both authorities will be aware of the priorities."

OPPORTUNITIES FOR ORGANIC FOOD PRODUCERS

Minister Walsh recently launched An Bord Bia's report on organic food markets. which is one of the fastest growing segments of the European food market. Speaking at the launch he emphasised that opportunities exist for Irish organic producers to significantly increase market share, both on the domestic and export mar-

He pointed out some £1.5 billion earmarked for the new REPS in the period to 2006 will enable up to 70,000 farmers to participate in the measure and at the same time have significant impact on the growth of the organic sector. In addition funding of £6 million is being provided for the development of the organic sector under the Regional Programmes for the Border, Midland and Western Regional and the South and East Region.

"In order to draw up a coherent strategy for the development of the sector, I am now arranging for the establishment of an Organic Development Committee. The Committee will have representatives of the widest interests in the organic sector including those involved in production, marketing and distribution as well as in the areas of research, training, advice and regulation. I am confident that these initiatives will further assist the growth of the organic sector and ensure that it is in a good position to exploit the new opportunities presenting themselves", the Minister added.

SPECIAL TREATMENT FOR LOCKED UP HERDS UNDER THE **EXTENSIFICATION** PREMIUM

The Minister recently announced that the EU had agreed to changes in the extensification premium system for locked up herds.

Under the new rules, farmers whose herds are locked up because of disease outbreak will have the number of livestock units on their holdings for the duration of the lock-up period reduced by 20% for the purposes of calculating stocking density for the extensification premium. This change was made following representations from the Department to the EU Commission and fulfilled a Government commitment under the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness. "The changes, which are

backdated to the beginning of the year, will be of very considerable benefit to the many farmers whose herds are locked up for disease reasons and who, for that reason, would find it difficult to comply with the stocking density requirements of the extensification premium", the Minister explained.


MINISTER LAUNCHES **NEWLY STRUCTURED** IRISH CATTLE BREEDING **FEDERATION (ICBF)**

Speaking at the formal announcement of the newly structured Irish Cattle Breeding Federation (ICBF) Minister Walsh said that the occasion was momentum in that we now have a very broadly based and strongly supported commercial national cattle breeding body with a suitable permanent structure in place. This will give ICBF the platform of stability needed to assist in providing a more secure future for Irish farmers.

Emphasising the point that the Irish cattle breeding industry now has a unique opportunity to work together within the ICBF framework and to establish a world class cattle breeding programme, the Minister said that the whole objective of cattle breeding and ICBF is to produce better quality cattle for our dairy and beef farmers. "As far as the beef sector is concerned, there has been a decline in the carcase classification scores of our cattle in recent years, with the result that the majority of our cattle do not meet the requirements of premium customers in the European Union. This is a most unfortunate development particularly in view of the fact that Ireland and the development approximately 50% of Irish

beef comes from the suckler herd. We need a significant improvement in the classification scores of our cattle if we are to fully recover and further increase our share of the EU beef market", the Minister pointed out.

Concluding, the Minister said "I have long held the view that our meat factories should pay better price differentials in the procurement of their supplies and I am pleased to see that they are now moving in that direction. By doing so they not only encourage better breeding and, in turn, more suitable product for their customers in Europe, they also help secure their supply of raw material for processing in of their businesses"

The Science of Farming and Food **GRASS RE-SEEDING DEMONSTRATIONS**

This column has already given advice some weeks ago on the merits of re-seeding at least 10% of your grassland each year. Many farmers now use the minimum cultivation method of reseeding in order to eliminate the problem of stones.

A demonstration of this re-seeding method will be given on the farm of Dan Leahy, Monatrea, Kinsalebeg on Thursday August 10th at 11.00 a.m. Teagasc advisers Ruth Nolan and Tom Fallon assisted by Mark Nunan, Glanbia will give advice on all aspects of re-seeding. So come along and see for yourself. A second demonstration will take place next week, on a date to be arranged in the Kilmeaden area.

DAIRYING: Putting Your Houses In Order

Every farmer should carry out a farmyard assessment. Ask yourself is your farmyard and housing

- A pollution free and safe workplace?
- Healthy and comfortable for animals?
- Enabling your animals to make best use of feed?
- Enabling you to make best use of labour in pleasant surroundings?

If the answer to any of the above questions is no, now is the time to take action so as to have work completed before winter.

A good easy-feed layout should normally prevent pollution, improve animal performance and reduce labour requirements. This of course costs money but if you have a large leaky farmyard layout or bad housing, some changes have to be made. The type of changes to be made depends on what you can afford and your present and future requirements.

If your farming plans are uncertain and money is scarce substantial improvements can very often be made by tidying up the farmyard operations and the separation of clean and dirty water. Temporary easy-feed set ups, which reduce the amount of dirty yards, the erection of eave chutes and the channelling of clean water to soakways and waterways will drastically reduce the storage requirements for slurry and soiled water. As a temporary solution some straw-bedded housing will also help.

BEEF: Weanling Management

Maintaining good performance from August to weaning/housing or sale is vitally important to profitability and is a weakness on many cattle farms. As well as quality grass other factors should also be considered:

- Separate bull and heifer weanlings at grass bull weanlings will give a better return to creep meals than heifers.
- Creep meal feeders are suited to starting weanlings on meals but should be replaced with trough feeding when weanlings are eating over 1.5 kg per head per day. With good quality grass, a feeding level of 1 - 1.5 kg per day is adequate. Meal feeding before weaning will help maintain high growth rates. have calves trained to meals and therefore less dependent on cow resulting in a much less stressful weaning.
- Introduce creep grazing for weanlings ahead of cows by moving the creep feeder or troughs to the field ahead of the cows.

Reducing Stress at Weaning

- Weanlings should be weaned before sale or housing, with creep feeding started at least 6 weeks earlier. Weaning is least stressful when cows are removed from the weanlings.
- Stress factors effecting weanlings include poor weather conditions, collecting, penning, testing/dosing, dehorning, castrating, weaning, housing, transporting to and from marts. The risk to respiratory problems is increased with exposure to stress and is highest where the weanling is exposed to a number of stress factors together.
- Vaccination is an additional aid to reduce risk from respiratory problems. An effective vaccination programme should commence 6 weeks before sale and should be a part of good weaning management to achieve best results. Viruses most commonly responsible are RSV, IBR and P13. Peak immunity for RSV will not be achieved until at least 4 weeks after first vaccination. Discuss vaccination with your vet in early August or at least 6 weeks before sale or housing.

 Certification of vaccination should be obtained from vet and should be announced at sale together with details of weaning date or creep feeding.

SHEEP: Ram Effect

February lambing flocks should maximise the ram effect to tighten up lambing. It only works at the start of the breeding season. Ewes will commence breeding in late August/September but there will be variation between ewes in a flock. The ram effect will bring individual ewes, which are late, into line with the bulk of the flock, which are starting normal heat.

Procedure:

 Keep ewes away from sight, sound and smell rams for at least 4 weeks. Note where neighbours rams are.

- Put rams in adjoining field for 3-4 days, this will trigger the onset of heat. Vasectomised rams or aprons could also be used where there is no suitable adjoining field. Introduce fertile rams 16-17 days later.

IFA National President, Tom Parlon who led the IFA negotiations with Government over the past number of weeks described the Government announcement of a new area based payment system as "a positive response to an unfair situation introduced at EU level. " He acknowledged appreciated the Taoiseach, the Minister for Agriculture and the Government's handling of the very difficult situation that had arisen for low income farmers in Disadvantaged Areas due to changes in EU regulations.

N.B. Currently 52.19% of Co. Waterford is disadvantaged, 23.10% severely handicapped and 29.09% less severely handicapped. Under the new arrangements for disadvantaged areas from 2001 onwards, 1,400 farmers in Co. Waterford will benefit from an increase of £1.06million (74% increase) bringing the total value of disadvantaged area payments in the county to £2.50 million.

ICMSA Welcomes Increase In Milk Price

Jackie Cahill, Chairman of ICMSA's Dairy Committee has welcomed the increase of 4 pence per gallon in the Irish Dairy Board on-account price effective from August 1.

Mr. Cahill stated that the Irish Dairy Board on-account price has increased by 8 pence per gallon since the end of June and is some 12.4 pence per gallon greater than this time last year, yet some co-operatives are proposing to pay a milk price on a par with this time last year.

"It is quite obvious that milk markets have firmed since this time last year, furthermore all indications are that improved market conditions are set to continue. Against this background I urge all co-operatives to reflect these increased market returns when setting their July and August milk price," said Mr. Cahill.

SOUTH EAST ICMSA NEWS **BREAKDOWN IN** DISEASE ERADICATION

NEGOTIATIONS ICMSA totally rejected the latest Department proposals on disease eradication. Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA, said that the proposals tabled by the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Development could not form the basis for any progress. In fact, the proposals are a backward step and amount to a flagrant breach of the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness

(PPF). The Department are proposing increased costs on farmers which is contrary to commitments in the PPF. This is not acceptable to ICMSA. The Department pro-

posals would do nothing to eradicate TB. The proposals from the Department involve a doubling of the current levies and a compulsory 30 day premovement test for TB. Mr. O'Rourke said that these two proposals, if implemented, would amount to another 'cottage industry' in the eradication scheme funded by farmers. These increased costs would amount to over

£10m annually. Mr. O'Rourke said that he had sought a meeting with Minister Walsh so that political direction can be given to commence serious negotiations so that targets and deadlines set down in the PPF can be achieved.

ICMSA WELCOMES INCREASE IN MILK PRICE

Mr. Jackie Cahill, Chairman of ICMSA's Dairy Committee, welcomed the increase of 4 pence per gal-Ion in the Irish Dairy Board on-account price effective from 1 August. Mr. Cahill stated that the Irish Dairy Board on-account price has increased by 8 pence per gallon since the end of June and is some 12.4 pence per gallon greater than this time last year, yet some co-operatives are proposing to pay a milk price on a par with this time last year.

"It is quite obvious that milk markets have firmed since this time last year, furthermore all indications are that improved market conditions are set to continue. Against this background I now urge all co operatives to reflect these increased market returns when setting their July and August milk price," said Mr. Cahill.


ICMSA CALL FOR TAX CUTS AND A PROGRAMME TO SECURE FARM INCOMES

In light of the Tanaiste, Ms. Mary Harney, T.D.'s, declaration that the Exchequer is "awash with money", Mr. Michael Doody, Chairman of ICMSA's Taxation Committee, called on the Government to follow through its commitment to introduce tax cuts in the next Budget and to introduce an action programme to secure farm incomes.

"Farm incomes declined by 20% over the three-year period from 1997 to 1999. ICMSA is very concerned that farm incomes will come under renewed pressure in 2000 due to increased input costs and service related charges - as well as the spiraling inflation rate", said Mr. Doody.

Mr. Doody stated that much was made of the conclusions and recommendations of the 2010 Report, "The Government must now introduce a programme of action to increase farm incomes. Such a programme must increase the competitiveness of agriculture by reducing the cost of farm inputs, by increasing capital investment allowances for on-farm investment and by introducing a taxation system that takes full account of the uniqueness of farming as a business".

Progress On Computer Related **Industries For** Dungarvan?

The fact that the IDA is including computer and electronics sector companies among sources being lobbied for tenancy of an advance factory in Dungarvan has been welcomed by a local Labour Party representative.

Cllr. Fiachra O Céilleachair - who has been pressing for Dungaryan and the west Waterford region to be promoted as a loc tion for computer related industry - says young people from the area are migrating to bigger urban centres in search of such work. Cllr. O Ceilleachair has received written assurances from the IDA's south east regional manager, Mr. Pat Loftus, that the case for Dungarvan is being made both in respect of the advance factory and in general.

"Dungarvan is developing commercially and residentially. As regards further in-

Liam Lynch Commemoration

On last Sunday afternoon, 30th July 2000, a large gathering attended at the memorial which marks the spot where the hero Liam Lynch fell mortally wounded in 1923. The proceedings were chaired by Dr. Patrick C. Power M.A., Ph.D. Ballyneal who introduced the guest speakers. Sean O'Mahoney spoke on the life and times of General Liam Lynch. He said the net result of the Good Friday Agreement is that the Government has encouraged and led the Irish people to accept the legitimacy of British rule in Ireland. They do not seem to realise that the core problem continues to be that Irish citizens in their own land are subject to British rule. It is clear to me, he said, that republicans are confused by recent turn of events, particularly the fact republicans are now helping to administer the British statelet in Ireland. But the torch of republican idealism must remain alight and the goal of an independent sovereign Ireland must remain an achievable aspiration. Dr. Patrick Power in his address paid tribute to those who died during the past year. Secretary Enda O'Riordan thanked the media for their full co-operation at all times and all those for their support on making this year's commemoration a huge success. Wreaths were laid at the memorial by Matt Doyle on behalf of the National Graves Association and by Kitty Harney on behalf of the National Commemoration Committee, Pat O'Donnell on behalf of all who gave their lives for Ireland and Helena O'Callaghan (niece of Liam Lynch) in her uncle Liam's memory. The Survivors Of Suiside

Death by suicide goes against the grain of intrinsic belief remain - WHY DID HE DIE? Unfortunately when family that arise in the aftermath and wake of suicide often others to deal with the death or discuss it. leaves a legacy of guilt and confusion. A common cry is what could I have done to prevent this?

respond. The act - the suicide is the final word.

Survivors are left with shame, guilt and anger as well as a multitude of unasked and asked questions by others. These others are paralysed by shock and find themselves incapable of experiencing a condolence or they are embarrassed--WHY - ! After all survivors are left like survivors of other deaths - with a hole in their heart. The death of any human being leaves a void, a hole in the heart that can never be filled. All survivors of death are hit with shock anger guilt denial intense lowliness depression and a pervasive sense of loss

However one thing that sets suicide apart from other deaths is that family are not given an opportunity to make amends or say goodbye. Most survivors of death go through defined stages of grieving, denial being one. When death is by suicide and the victim is young parents and family often insist that the death was an accident. This denial is compounded if death is by overdose, drowning or car wreck. Another factor that compounds the gravity of death by suicide is that in most cases police are involved. This introduces a somewhat criminal element with intrusive and often insensitive and offensive questioning.

POSTVENTION

Postvention is about the assistance given to all survivors of suicide, including those that have survived a suicide attempt. Survivors need caring and support in coming to terms with the devastating tragedy that has happened. In fact bereaved survivors of suicide need extra special help to deal with their overwhelming guilt and self blame. If these feelings are not addressed or if they are mismanaged the survivors are at an increased risk of having grave, life long emotional problems dysfunctional relationships and other difficulties.

TORMENT OF GUILT

Death by suicide is not a gentle loss for it rips lives apart. To compound the pain there is a diminishment in community support and compassion, a kind of societal whispering that imprints the stigma of suicide. As in all death family survivors experience guilt but when death is by suicide family are devastated by all the things done and undone. They go over arguments, rejections and unreturned phone calls. They beat themselves up for fractured or severed relationships. Many survivors are tormented by haunting last minute memories and visions of seeing their loved one and with wondering what was going on in their head,

Parents of young people are shattered by guilt of having in some way failed their child at some point in their life or of overlooking or dismissing signals and cues. Sadly and erroneously these parents feel a deep sense of shame anger and guilt and are further terrified that because of their parental inadequacy and incompetence another child may also commit suicide. They become overprotective of their surviving children causing further problems. Parents grieve differently. Women are more external in expression of pain, men more internal but both are mortally and irrevocably wounded. Fathers talk of the lost future of the child, this is based on the premise he has no more future with this child. Even his work has lost meaning. Mothers on the other hand are more involved in the day to day activities of the child so her loss is in the present. Only parents who have gone through this nightmare of disbelief and bewilderment can describe the pain and trauma. Siblings experience enormous loss and guilt and in fact some may be crippled by a sense of responsibility They feel stigmatised and vulnerable that they too might kill themselves. They very often experience great depression as for many siblings the question will always

SPOUSAL SUICIDE

When a husband or wife commit suicide the very fabric of Suicide has a double edged blade. It is death like no other the marriage is under scrutiny. When a spouse elects to commit suicide it is a persurvivors whether that final message is one of blame or sonal rejection and as suicide is seen by others as a prelove because there is no opportunity for survivors to ventable death the surviving partner is exposed to the malicious tongue of others. As the realisation of loss sets in so does the guilt and blame and another feeling that is carefully masked - a chilling sense of relief. There is a cold reality that the suicide has brought to an end the agony, resentments, hopelessness and sometimes physical abuse. Children, although devastated by the suicide of a parent, all survive the death with professional help but they may experience profound grief that may linger for a long time. Children's reactions may be severe and are commonly characterised by being withdrawn and apathetic. Communication is critical to a child's ability to accept a par-

ent's death and I suggest that children be encouraged to express their feelings after the death of a loved one. It is also important that children be told the truth as completely and as quickly as possible. Parent's attempts at shielding the children come back to haunt them for no matter how well intentioned this shielding is, it produces secrecy and a web of distortions and it makes all involved conspirators in secrecy and silence. When a child knows the truth he can in his own way make sense of all that happened. If children learn of the circumstances of a parent's death from a third party, trust is eroded and the child never understands the reality of the death.

I am asked many times how do adults and children survive such anger and grief and how do they themselves survive not being destroyed by guilt. Society is what we are with each other. Thus people survive through the support of family and friends and professional help. Supports groups and workshops allow those who have been through a suicide to exchange support, information and encouragement,. Effective communication is the exchange of information and suicide survivors can raise awareness about suicide and depression. Throughout my many years as a psychologist I have seen first hand the desolation, confusion and guilt in parents and children and friends of those who commit suicide nor can I shut out the image of seeing the body of my beloved son, John, as his lifeless body lay on a cold slab in the coroner's morque dead from a self inflicted drug overdose. The pain for me then and now is still harrowing.

AWARENESS AND EDUCATION

Can we as a society close our eyes in apathy towards those young violent but unnecessary deaths? With such an alarming rise in the suicide rate we as a society need to view suicide as an act committed by a person who felt an overwhelming ambivalence toward life rather than the act of some 'deranged' or "unbalanced' person. In todays fast moving world there are many people who have grave interpersonal problems and pressures that thwart life satisfaction and happiness. We have many programmes to educate our young in sex, drug and alcohol abuse - all essential. However I also believe it is incumbent on a responsible society to teach children that life is a balance between satisfactions and frustrations, that it's a complex process that prompts disappointments, failures and loss and that they need to develop skills to deal with these experiences. When children are taught early to solve their own frustrations and to use their own thinking skills they will not become locked into what I term cognitive inflexibility. It is this cognitive inflexibility that triggers young people to focus on suicide as the solution to problems. We need to cultivate the skill to see the humour in life situations, to nurture a sense of laughter at oneself. Children that experience a wide gap between - who they are - and who they want to be or are expected to be - are at risk in developing low self esteem, self hatred, depression and eventually suicidal behaviours. High self esteem is the most important preventative against suicide. Boys need to be encouraged to express their feel-

ings so that they may be able to recognise their own cries

for help rather than suppress them. We need to develop

programmes where young people are motivated to lead constructive and productive lives and where they can learn life skills to cope with their own emotional problems and with the ups and downs of life. A network of treatment and care programmes is needed to help those in a suicidal crisis. Parents and family need to take all

threats seriously and be on the alert for clues to suicidal behaviours and intentions. Rather than dismissing talk of suicide as an attention getter responding to the cries for help and getting professional help and perhaps offering constructive alternatives and taking steps toward resolving the crisis by determining the seriousness of the suicidal intent by asking pertinent questions and by not leaving the suicidal alone.

Research has shown that when family emotional support is inadequate or absent suicide will be completed. Cries of help that are brushed aside with statements of - You'll probably feel better tomorrow - are worthless for to the suicidal there is little hope of a tomorrow. A suicidal's thoughts and behaviours indicate a critical loss of the belief that they are someone who matters. The cries for help indicate that, while intent on suicide, he is experiencing considerable ambivalence about acting out the thoughts. He is still hoping for some kind of intervention as intervention is about sustaining and stimulating the suicidals desire to live. Suicide and its precursor depression is not an Illusion but a common condition that robs us of our young and loved ones. Douglas Dunn wrote - Look on the living -Love them - Hold them.

TO THE SUICIDAL

If you are reading this article and have suicidal thoughts you are open to and are now given another chance at life. Know that help is available. The following list outlines those that are at great risk of suicide:-People who are thinking of suicide or have made previous attempts;

People who are depressed or severely anxious; People who abuse alcohol or drugs;

Males who are living alone;

People who are agitated and exhibit threatening violence to others:

People who have lost interest in usual activities and can't

People who have weight loss or gain and talk of feeling worthless and disappointed with themselves;

People who feel hopeless about the future, are indecisive, can't concentrate and have recurring thoughts about death.

If someone you know exhibits any of the above get immediate help and make sure a supportive person is available to the sufferer. Other warning signs are giving away prized possessions, sudden changes in eating or sleep patterns, changes in job or school performance. If someone you know is in danger of committing suicide, take them seriously. Stay calm but don't under react. Don't try to handle it yourself, involve other people and professionals. Express concern. Listen attentively and ask direct questions. Ask if your friend or family member has a specific plan for suicide. Acknowledge the persons feelings and be empathetic, do not be judgmental. Provide hope that help is available. Don't leavue the person alone. Don't promise confidentiality - you may need to talk to a professional. Reassure and point out suicide is a permanent solution to temporary problems.





Abbeyside Topics

TAKEOVER BY THE NATIONAL ARMY

Having burned the barracks and Ballinacourty Coast Guard station, the republicans quartered themselves in the hotels.

The troops of the National Army arrived in Abbeyside and Dungarvan on the 16th August 1922. However a few days before that event the 300 men of the First Cork Brigade evacuated the town. They marched up the street, made their way to the railway station, where they commandeered a special train to take them off. The train was stopped at Cappoquin on their journey westward. The Republicans got out and blew up the railway bridge there that crossed the Blackwater. They then proceeded further west.

When the National Army entered Dungarvan the Republicans had all gone. Only a few soldiers arrived in the early morning, but at about midday a long line of military lorries approached, bringing with them stores, arms and equipment. They met with a good reception. They took up quarters in Church Street in the Town Hall and at the Union Hospital. There was also another body of them stationed in the Provincial Bank. People felt relieved that there was no fighting. The expected battle did not come off. By degrees a more peaceful atmosphere prevailed.

Subsequently, in November 1923, a special court, presided over by the County Court Judge, sat for over a fortnight in the Court House, hearing applications for malicious injuries and for compensation for goods commandeered and the amounts awarded totalled several thousands of pounds a sizable amount of money in those days. The entire amount of claims for Co. Waterford rose to a total of £800,000.

The sign - the supports of which are blue in colour - is placed adjacent to the steps leading on to the beach. Section one of the sign contains a map outlining Waterford County Council Bathing Areas. Category One are the 'Blue Flag Beaches' ie Clonea and Tramore. Category two mark the 'Designated Beaches' one of which is Ardmore. Category three maps out 'Bathing Areas' such as Helvic and Dungarvan.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPORTANCE

Section two of the sign contains a map of 'Areas of Environmental Importance' as designated by Waterford County Council Category One outlines Special Protection Areas such as Dungaryan.

Category Two shows "Special Areas of Conservation' ie Mahon Falls and the mountain walk between Ballymacarbry and Rathgormack. Category three are National Heritage Areas.

Beach Bye Laws

The sign in lower case writing lists twenty-one Bye Laws in all. For purposes of illustration we list four examples hereunder.

I Do not park a dormobile, caravan or overnight camper on a road or car park at the beach. 2 It is wrong to cause danger, obstruction or annoyance to persons using the beach.

3 It is bad behaviour to damage any grass, sand dunes, plants, shrubs, wall railing or fence on or along the beach.

4 It is illegal to throw stones or any other substance while on or near the beach.

The above is all part of Waterford County Council's Blue Flag Campaign 2000. The Blue Flag Status has to be applied for next year and the stretch of beach concerned is marked clearly on the relevant map.

I am currently working with a group of adult students from Switzerland who are in Dungarvan for three weeks. Every year they visit the show, on our recommendation, by using the courtesy bus from town. You can image my surprise and embarrassment to discover that there was none this year. Why? Surely the entrance fee alone (£4 per adult) would more than cover the cost of running a bus for the day?

I had told them not to walk or cycle as the road is narrow and very busy. So by not putting on a bus the Show lost out on 25 x £4 not to mention all the other people from town who did not go out because the bus was not running. Surely in this Millennium Year every effort would have been made to increase not only the size of the Show but also the number of people attending. It seems like a step backwards to me.

My second problem with the Show lies in the judging of one of the Animal classes. A black Aberdeen Angus bull and a Friesian Cow were being judged for the Best in Show. Both animals were, I am sure, excellent examples of their respective breeds, but I can only express my horror and dissatisfaction at the manner in which the final judging took place. The two judges could not make up their minds on the best animal and so tossed a coin for it! I could imagine the headlines "Best in Show Decided on the Toss of a Coin".

Surely, there had to be an alternative. I have seen and participated in a great many shows for both small and large animals all over Ireland and in England and never before have I witnessed such "judging." My sympathies go to the owner of the magnificent Angus Bull who must surely have felt cheated out of a prize at the toss of a

I remember when this Show was the highlight of the year for both the people of Dungarvan and the surrounding rural community and was held in Shandon. With the passing of the years, the move away from town, while facilitating the expansion of the Show, has led to a loss of its original focus of a good day out for all the family. Not content with charging higher entrance fees, the Show for the most part seems to be an exercise in getting people, especially those with young children, to part with their money as quickly as possible, with the exception of Macra na Feirme who entertain the crowd with their various tests of skill, etc.

This years Show is more an example of Millennium Madness than something of which the Committee can be proud. While I can certainly appreciate that it takes a lot of hard work on behalf of any Committee to organise any event, surely a little common sense would not go astray in future years?

Javas Jet Broke The Clock or Did She?

Last Saturday nights all graded card produced a number of talking points not least the record breaking run of Javas Jet (Lassa Java - Suirside Lass) in a 500 yard race while two owners and trainers also recorded doubles with their runners.

First of all let's concentrate on the exceptional run of the Mary Breen owned and Paul Kervick trained Javas Jet who covered the 500 yard trip in 27.52 which was four points faster than the old record held by Down the Racks. Available at 4/1 Javas Jet displayed dash of early pace from trap four to lead from Ciaras Rocket and although the 4/6 favourite Stage Success showed up well in the closing stages he had no chance of catching the winner who won with some authority by three and a half lengths. This new record time must now be ratified by the Irish Greyhound Board who must decide whether last Saturday nights effort by Javas Jet in a four runner contest constitutes a new record.

Long time patron at both Enniscorthy and Waterford tracks Maura Mahon was present to see her Black Ivory (Matthews Gold - Tiger Milly) 3/1 make every yard of the running in the first race for a three and a half lengths success over Nikkis River in 29.69

A wide open second event produced a hard earned but fully deserved victory for the Saltee Syndicate owned and Martin Butcher trained Double Gun (Ready About Nga - Twinkling Star) 4/1 who tracked cleverly around the third bend slipping into the lead past the long time leaders Graiguenoe Rose and Kellymount Wish before motoring on for a length and a quarter win over the former in 29.53.

An ease in grade was just what the doctor ordered for the Barbara Woodworth owned and Mary Buggy handled Song of Erin, this daughter of Staplers Jo and Seskin Claire driving clear out of trap three taking a graded sprint with plenty to spare by four and three quarter lengths from Dysart Capricorn in 16.68. The winner was returned the 6/4 favourite.

The same connections were back in the winners enclosure after the eighth event as 3/1 chance Derwent Pride ran her best ever race to oblige in an excellent 29.09. This daughter of Spiral Nikita and Dessies Pride destroyed her rivals for early pace going into a clear lead around the opening turn and in a one sided affair Derwent Pride dished out a nine and a half lengths beating to Belesker Lady.

Christine Marlins Scallywagrunaway (Lassa Java - Denmark Darling) 4/1 posted a trap to line victory in the fourth over the testing 730 yard trip. Racing into an early lead Scallywagrunaway enjoyed her 42.19 romp at the head of affairs coming home four lengths clear of a running on Final Secret who came from behind Greenane Mover to claim the runner up spot.

After two recent impressive victories over the standard distance Mo Madra dropped back to a two bend trip in the fifth race but this 11/10 favourite had an off night and failed to figure in the shake up. Victory here went to the highly consistent Lightning Peter (Trader Thad - Celtic Sparrow) this 2/1 shot running for James Mythen and the Baumen Syndicate holding at bay the late rally of Lilac Vintage by half a length in 16.74.

Dave Maltby - Baker who operated from Portlaw in County Waterford saw two of his runners post a short priced but welcome double. Savana Champ (Right Move UK - Paddock Mandy) 5/4 was first into action in a 730 yard marathon and this May 98 whelp made every post a winning one digging deep in the closing stages to withstand the flying late charge of 1/1 favourite Bongo Squaw who tasted defeat by a short head in 41.34.

Kennel mate Savana Whisper (Batties Whisper - Teresa's Collar) 1/1 had a much easier time in the ninth race obliging in 29.63. Gliding past the front running Painter Profile out of the second bend Savana Whisper stayed on strongly to record a two and a three quarter lengths victory. Both "Savana" winners will now continue their racing careers in England.

Local owner Tony Ryan sent out the final race winner of the session as 4/1 chance Field Rock (He Knows - Kingsmeadow Mist) 4/1 displayed sound early pace for trainer Dick Ryan to win out in 29.51. Derwent Star pushed the winner all the way and despite drifting wide into the home stretch Field Rock knuckled down to the task in hand to triumph by half a length.

WATERFORD TUESDAY AUGUST 1ST

The attendance at this the first meeting in August was swelled by a number of holidaymakers so much so that all the race cards were sold out prior to racing. The feature event of the evening was the final of the Added Bonus Sweepstake and it produced an exciting final. The early pacesetter Shanbally Pride appeared on her way to victory leading down the back from Europa Apache but the whole complexion of the race altered in the last twenty yards as Monmahogue Stone came through to challenge Shanballa Pride but in doing so she hampered the leader. As a result the Alan Jaggard owned and Dick Ryan trained Europa Apache (Druids Lodge - Ballygarron Lady) 9/4 seized the opportunity to flash by on the outside for a half a length success over Monmahogue Stone in 29.74.

Well known County Wexford owner/breeder George Roche kindly sponsored the four first round heats of the Up Wexford Unraced stake which carries a winners prize of £700.

Heat one. First Sailor was sent off the 4/5 favourite but despite a flying finish he was unable to peg back the Paul Harney owned and Jimmy Scully trained Tinlough Jerry (Spiral Nikita Ullid Citrate) this 2/1 chance obliging in 29.57. The winner was only in third spot down the back before overtaking Paul's Official on the rails at the third bend. First Sailor made rapid late headway only to go down by a neck.

Heat two. Only three runners faced the starter here with victory going to the Sean Dunphy owned Droopy's Spice (El Premier Droopy's Fiona) who dictated matters from the outset this 2/5 chance making all for a length success over Prince Trio in 29.69.

Heat three. The Tess Power owned Market Rumble (Smooth Rumble - Up The Oris) was all the rage here at 4/6 but after a moderate start the winner showed his mettle coming from behind a front running Cissies Fintan before winning out in 29.60.

Heat four. All the money in this qualifier was for Lukes Banjo and after breaking free from the pack this 4/6 favourite appeared well on his way to victory going into a five lengths lead over 5/2 shot Lonesome Hunter who clipped the running rail at the first bend. The leaders stride began to shorten off the home bend however and Ken O'Neill's beautifully bred Lonesome Hunter (Westmead Merlin - Tá Fáilte Romhat) finished powerfully to land the spoils by two lengths in 29.53.

Despite a slow start in the first graded race the All Trades Syndicate owned and Pat O'Regan trained Westpark Jack (Mustang Jack - Eastpark Mist) 4/1 secured a clear run on the rails at the opening turn when the previously unraced Sadlers Special left a narrow gap on his inside. The latter sent off the 4/6 favourite did his best to reel in "Westpark" but a' length separated the pair at the winning line in 30.10.

There was plenty of money floating around in the sixth as Airmount Jim was supported down from 3/1 to 4/5. The favourite was denied a clear run around the opening bend however as the Michael Hennebry owned and Nicky Grace trained Honchos First (Top Honcho - Ardera Melody) 5/2 sprinted to the head of affairs to race on for a four and a quarter lengths victory over Powerful Royer in 29.80

A graded sprint resulted in a narrow but deserved victory for the Richard Walsh owned Raywee Progress (Batties Rocket - Roan Judy) 5/2 who came from behind a fast starting Premiere Chip to win out by a neck in 16.94.

Savana Bawn (Fifthofnovember - Devon Melody) owned by Kevin Baker and trained by Dave Malty Baker got off the mark at the third attempt in the ninth race obliging at odds of 2/1. Well suited to his rails draw the Portlaw dog powered his way into the lead around the opening turn and going clear he came home in pole position with seven and three quarter lengths to spare over a slow starting Scintillas Iodie in 29.99.

The Patrick Reddy owned Blackstar Bandit (Spiral Nikita - Special Bluebird) 5/2 posted his first race win in the final race of the session making every yard of the running from a middle draw accounting for Gerpats Amigo by two lengths in 29.78.

IRISH GREYHOUND BOARD ANNUAL REPORT 1999

For the fourth successive year the Irish Greyhound Industry has recorded highly satisfactory results with substantial increases in attendances, betting turnover, prize-money and sponsorship - as well as major progress in the implementation of the Boards capital development programme. The Boards Annual Report for 1999, together with interim figures for the first six months of 2000 were presented to Mr. Joe Walsh T.D., Minister for Agriculture, Food & Rural Development at Curraheen Park Stadium, Cork on Saturday 29th July.

Highlights of the Year

Total betting turnover £38m - an increase of 18.2%. Tote betting £10.9 m - up by 9.2%. Bookmaker betting £27.1m - an increase of

22.2%. Sponsorship £791,826 - up 15%. Total prize money pay-out for year £2.6 m

Attendances and Meetings

Aggregate attendances for the year amounted to 756,000 which represents a 13.6% increase in average attendances per meeting.

The total number of meetings held was 1,605 as compared with 1,818 for the previous year - a decrease of 213 meetings. This decrease in meetings significantly affected the overall attendance figure - with the main loss of meetings at Harold's Cross, Navan and Clonmel.

Healthy Statistics

Following a decade of decline which began in the mid '80's there has been a complete rejuvenation of the industry. This change has been spearheaded by the Board's Chairman Mr. Paschal Taggart together with a dedicated Board and Chief Executive, Michael Field. All key statistics have shown the dramatic increases, particularly when compared with 1995. The tote turnover of £10.9 million more than doubled - up 105%. Bookmaker betting at £27.1 m increased by 55%. The attendance figure of 756,000 increased by 29% and total prize money paid out to owners at £1.2 m represents an increase of 49% on the 1995 levels.

AERTEL CHANGES

There is a change to Aertels results service on Greyhound racing in Ireland. The two Dublin tracks Shelbourne Park and Harold's Cross are on page 637 while results from the country tracks are available on page 638.

ODELL DUKE SHINES IN DERBY

Despite the fact that he is probably one of the oldest entries in this years Paddy Power. Com Irish Derby Ned Power's Odell Duke showed his younger rivals a thing or two the Dungarvan greyhound priced at 10/1 in heat 14 of last Saturday nights derby heats sweeping to a head victory in 30.31.

TRACK DEVELOPMENTS

Monday 8th March 1999, was an historic milestone in the development of the Irish Greyhound Industry, when Mr. Joe Walsh, T.D. Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development officiated at the sod turning ceremony at Curraheen Park for Cork's magnificent new greyhound stadium cum leisure facility. The grandstand topping out ceremony took place on 23rd July 1999 and excellent progress on the overall site development had been achieved at years end. The new facility was officially opened by Minister Joe Walsh, T.D. on the 20th May.

The new Curraheen Park Greyhound Stadium is one of the best equipped greyhound racing facilities in the world and has generated excellent returns in respect of attendances, restaurant bookings, bookmaker and totalisator turnover since opening day. This is very evident from the statistics available for the first six months of the current year 2000, which show; Attendances 44,000 (+109%). Tote Betting £679,257 (+194%. Bookmaker Betting £1,845,151 (+153%).

Work on a new development project at Harold's Cross Stadium, Dublin commenced in mid 1999 and the new stadium opened for racing on 14th July 2000. The new facilities include an excellent a la carte restaurant, together with corporate suites, similar to the highly successful Shelbourne Park Stadium facility.

During 1999 the Board also approved major developments at Limerick, Newbridge, Mullingar, Kilkenny and Galway.

CHANGE IN METHOD OF FUNDING FOR IRISH GREYHOUND BOARD AND IRISH HORSERACING AUTHORITY

The proposed changes in the method of funding both for the Irish Greyhound Board and the Irish Horseracing Authority came into operation on Sunday 25th July 1999. Bookmaker turnover at Board licensed tracks for the period 25th July 1999 to 31st December 1999 - amounted to £14.6 m - an increase of 40% on turnover figures for the same period in 1998.

NATIONAL FORMBANK DATABASE

By the end of 1999, the installation of the Board's National Formbank Database has been fully completed. The software and hardware required to run the database has been installed in every track. This includes the three Northern Ireland tracks. The system is of tremendous value to all sectors of the grey-hound industry. The system retains all racing performances at tracks around the country and this information can be accessed by all participating sites. The Irish Greyhound Board has completed the first stage of its web-site development. Further development plans involve providing access to its Formbank database via the web. This would allow owners to access all the race card history of any greyhound.

CONTINUED GROWTH FOR FIRST SIX MONTHS OF 2000

The highly successful performance of the Greyhound Industry in all the key areas showed continued improvement in the first six months of 2000 and interim figures released for the period to 30th June 2000 confirm this progressive trend. Details are as follows; Attendances 395,000 (+12%). Tote Betting £6.103m (+18%). Bookmaker Betting £17.084m (+55%).


