THE HEART IS USED as a symbol of courage, strength and love. But it's not really involved in any of these. It is simply a hollow bag with muscular walls, which contract about once each second. The contractions squeeze blood from inside the heart, out through the bodywide network of tubes known as blood vessels. The heart, blood vessels and blood are known as the circulatory systems, because the same blood goes round and round, or circulates. A typical person has about four or fives litres of blood. This thick red fluid carries oxygen from the lungs, and nutrients from digestion, to every body part. It also collects bosy waste and takes them to parts such as the kidneys and lungs for removal. In addition, blood carries substances called hormones, which control body processes, and antibodies to fight invading germs.

SEE YOUR **PULSE!**



The heart must pump blood very forcefully, especially up to the head, to overcome the downward pull of gravity. This powerful pumping motion can be felt. using the fingertiops as shown, just beneath the thin skin inside your wrist. To see the effect of your pulse, attach a drinking straw to the inside of your wrist with plasticence. Hold your hand still and you can see that the straw moves in time with the rhythm of your pulse.

Blood Transfusions

If someone loses a lot of blood, through a wound or other injury, one part of the treat ment may be a blood transfusion. Blood previously given or donated by another preson, the donor, is transferred or transfused into the ill person, or recipient. The blood must be matched. This means making sure it is the correct blood group for the recipient, by laboratory tests. Different people have different kinds, or groups, of blood. If blood of the wrong group is given, it may clump together and clot in the recipients body, making the illness worse or even causing death.

Measles Outbreak Continues In The South East Resid

Within the SEHB there has been a continuing number of young children and babies who have been diagnosed with measles. To date 97 cases have been notified to the Board within the past five months compared to three cases in 1998 and two cases in 1997.

The South Eastern Health Boards team of professionals has been monitoring the outbreak and implementing the most effective way of reducing the numbers of children who contract the disease. Increased awareness of the disease, public campaigns and targeted clinics have slowed down the rate of infection. However as the outbreak is continuing the team is recommending that the age of immunisation for measles be reduced from 15 months to 12 months. This will ensure that younger children have access to the vaccine as soon as possible.

The vaccine is suitable for use for children 12 months upwards.

Dr. Maire O'Connor, Public Health Specialist, says 'Measles is a highly infectious disease and is easily spread through contact with an infected person. At this time of year working parents are often considering placing their children in play-schools and creches. We would recommend that children, aged 12 months or

older, receive their measles vaccination before attending these services. Measles can have serious side effects including deafness, lung disease, encephalitis and in severe cases, even death".

The SEHB is calling on all parents of young children, over 12 months of age, who have not yet received their childhood vaccination to act swiftly. Contact your local GP for an appointment and further information.

County Council Estimates Controversy In The Offing?

Waterford County Council's Book of Estimates – due for authorisation by members in November – may be the subject of controversy due to its implications for the development of a landfill site west of Dungaryan.

That's according to Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, a Labour representative for the Dungarvan electoral area. Funding for the establishment of the county's new landfill site during 2001 will be provided for in the Book of Estimates, a document about to be pre-

pared by the County Manager in consultation with his officials and the Council's Corporate Policy Group (comprising the Cathaoirleach and the four Special Policy Committee Chairpersons). The local authority's budget takes legal effect only after receiving the approval of a majority of its elected members. Whereas the County Manager in June of this year effectively overruled a majority vote from Councillors which sought to exclude areas west of Dungarvan from the search for a new landfill site, Cllr. O

Ceilleachair says present proceedings could be stopped in their tracks if the same group of representatives refused to mandate the Book of Estimates and its decrees.

"Due to concerns over what I consider to be unbalanced and unnecessary

implementation of refuse collection charges, I have been the sole dissident in the last three years in votes on our Book of Estimates. This year's vote, however, could see others having difficulty with the funding provisions for waste

management.

No doubt we need a new landfill site, and at a cost effective location. The strategy pursued by our consultants prior to November of 1999 seemed to be good enough in that respect. The change of strategy facilitated by the Council since that point may escalate the costs accruing to the local authority and may have fiscal implications for householders in its jurisdiction. It will be interesting to see how this matter is addressed in the lead up to and aftermath of this year's

Speed Limit Extension For Abbeyside

Waterford County Council is to extend a 40 miles an hour speed limit on the Clonea road at Duckspool, Abbeyside Dungarvan area. Councillor Fiachra O Ceilleachair has welcomed confirmation that the limit is to be stretched from it's present starting point nearer Abbeyside to beyond the junction serving the Friary College, Gaelcholáiste Aibhistin and Scoil Garbháin. Appropriate "repeater" signage will accompany the alteration. Waterford County Council recently completed a survey of all built up areas in the county, featuring a review of the adequacy of existing speed limits. The approval of the relevant Superintendents of the Gárda Síochána was received for changes. Cllr. O Ceilleachair said the Council, not before time in Duckspools' case, utilised 1977 Dept. of Environment guidelines to take account of the speed of 85% of vehicles approaching Abbeyside at this location to justify a new limit. Such guidelines also enabled a speed limit to be placed in an area where development is not continuous or is on one side only.

"I have raised this matter several times before, at the request of parents whose children are accessing the schools off the main Dungarvan-Tramore coast road by bike or on foot. I'm glad that something is finally being done about it. In addition to improving matters as regards traffic safety at nearby Barnawee bridge and Ballinroad, the next outstanding issue in this developing area is the installation of footpaths and public lighting on the slip road between Duckspool and the Waterford road at the Burgery. I understood that the development of the Tournore and Skehacrine estates would lead to these essential amenities coming on stream. There's a need to press for progress on this question. In the meantime, I'm sure there will be relief that the Council's case for the speed limit extension has been successful."



Cucumbers transplant badly so seed should be sown in situ after all risk of frost has passed. Alternatively they can be sown in small pots or modules

If sowing outside prepare holes at least 12 inches apart and 12 inches deep with plenty of well-rooted compost or manure as you six inches of manured soil made into a small mound to ensure sharp drainage.

Seeds should be planted on their sides, two or three together about one inch deep. Seeds germinate at a minimum soil temperature of 68°F. Thin to one seedling after germination.

Seeds sown in pots need seedlings are planted out (about four weeks after sowing). Climbing varieties should be placed about 18 inches apart. In cool climates plants should be protected using a cloche or fleecy film.

The vines should be grown up supporting nets, fences or canes. Nip out the growing point after five or six leaves have appeared and rein the resulting stronger growths may be tied if necessary.

As fruiting continues, feed plants every two weeks with a high potash fertilizer or an equivalent organic liquid feed. Regular watering is essential during the growing period. Cucumbers may be affected by snails, aphids, powdery mildew, cutworm, glass house red spider mites, white flies, cucumber mosaic virus or root rot and these problems should be treated in the usual

Harvest cucumbers regularly from about 12 weeks after sowing when the sides of the fruit are parallel and about six to eight inches long. Gherkins should be harvested when they are between one and three inches long or when they have reached a size suitable for pickling.

SOW SCHIZANTHUS FOR **SPRING FLOWERING**

Sow now in order to have really large schizanthus for spring decorations in the greenhouse or conservatory. Sow seeds thinly in well drained seed boxes using a seed compost and germinate in a frame. The cooler the conditions the better.

SOW WINTER SPINACH AND SPINACH BEET

Choose a sheltered place and make a sowing of prickly-seeded spinach to stand the winter. Sow the seed thinly in drills 2.5cm deep and 30cm apart.

You can make a sowing of spinach beet now for use in winter and spring. This useful variety of beetroot is grown solely for its leaves, used as a spinach substi-

START TO GATHER MUSHROOMS FROM OUTDOOR BEDS

If you were able to make a mushroom bed in the open in July you should examine it now for the first mushrooms. Gather the buttons (young mushrooms) as they form. The bed should continue well into the autumn.

MAKE NEW STRAWBERRY PLANTATIONS

Strawberry runners pegged down early last month should have made good roots and can be severed from their parent plant. A few days later, lift them carefully and plant them in new beds. Choose a good open position and soil that has been deeply dug and well manured. Plant 30cm apart in rows 60cm apart.

PICK AND SUMMER PRUNE **APPLES AND PEARS**

During this month and through September you should continue to pick apples and pears as they ripen Continue to summer prune the trees but strive to complete the work by the end of the month.

TREAT VINES

Vines, indoors and out, will be in various stages of growth. Early vines from which you have gathered the crop should be ventilated freely and sprayed with water if there is any sign of red spider on the leaves.



AGRICULTURE SCHEMES MUST BE INDEX-LINKED TO INFLATION

Mr. Maurice Harvey, Chairman of ICMSA's Rural Development Committee today called on the Government to immediately introduce a system to ensure that all agricultural schemes are index-linked to inflation.

"Many farmers have joined schemes and now find themselves in very difficult situations due to inflationary pressures. This is unacceptable and the Government should take steps to prevent it from continuing.

Farmers are hugely dependent on direct payments for their income, with some farmers depending on these payments for 100% of their income. Many of these schemes pay the same rate today, and indeed some less. than they did in the early 1990's.

The Early Retirement Scheme is a very good example of this. A farmer who joined this Scheme in 1994 received £9,764 that year. Today, that farmer is receiving £9,509. This represents a cut of £255 per repeated promises to the conof these people are fully dependent on this pension for their livelihoods and thus have suffered a 16% drop in their real income over the past six years. Given that inflation is running at 5.5% at present, these people are facing a further significant drop in income.

"At the very least", Mr. Harvev said, "the value of agricultural schemes should increase in line with the rate of inflation. In the case of the Early Retirement Scheme, this would be worth £12,300 today compared to its current value of £9,509. Farmers incomes must be protected and improved"

Mr. Harvey called on the Government to ensure that all sections of the farming community are fully protected from the impact of inflation.

GLANBIA'S FAILURE TO RAISE JULY MILK PRICES LETS DOWN SUPPLIERS — MURPHY

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murphy has said the failure by the Glanbia board to increase milk prices at their board meeting yesterday was a serious. let down for suppliers. Glanbia milk producers have been denied all improvements in the IDB price, despite Chairman Mr John Duggan at a public meeting in Kilkenny a few months ago.

"The Irish Dairy Board have increased their return on July milk by a full 4p/gal, after a May 1.6 p increase, and a further 4p/gal increase will also be payable on August milk. Todate, all Glanbia has done is to increase June prices by the 3p/gal they had cut back in March," Michael Murphy said.

"Glanbia suppliers can only conclude that they have contributed extremely cheap milk to the company in the peak period, and now find themselves subsidising its cash flow with their own. This is just not on,"

"It is simply not acceptable for Glanbia to hide behind their merger Milk Price Audit commitment, as Glanbia suppliers

are left with a milk price well adrift of that paid to producers in most other co-ops. During the merger negotiations, suppliers were repeatedly assured that the merged company would continuously pay a competitive price, and that producers would not have to wait till the end of the year to get the full benefit annum at a time when inflation trary by the outgoing Glanbia of the Milk Price Audit com-

"It now appears that an end of year top-up of as much as 5 to 6 p may be necessary just to meet this obligation if the company persists in refusing to pay a competitive milk price on an ongoing basis," he said.

Further increases are due for July and August milk, which other co-ops will also have to pass on, and the gap between the Glanbia price and others must not be narrowed urgently," he said.

"We already know that Golden Vale will increase their July milk price by 3.8 p/gal (net of VAT), and we expect most other co-ops to raise their July price too, as they rightly pass back the hugely improved protein market returns they enjoy from the Irish Dairy Board. Glanbia may have to make some difficult decisions to ensure that its suppliers are not being discriminated against any longer," he concluded.

IFA SAYS MORE FARMER SUPPORT REQUIRED FROM LEADER COMPANIES

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Mossie O' Connor has advised farmers to ensure that they get greater support under the new Leader Programme which is due to commence shortly

Mr. O' Connor said that farmers must ensure that they have a strong input into the plans which are currently being devised by both Leader and Local Development Boards for the next six years. This can be done by encouraging local Leader companies to take into account projects promoted by farmers in each sector as well as the provision of training courses for low income farmers to secure off farm job opportunities.

The Science of Farming and Food CATTLE: Grass Management for Autumn

A plentiful supply of quality grass into the autumn will ensure that cattle continue to thrive and that spring calving cows can build up body condition before winter. Adequate supplies of quality grass. will also save costs in keeping meal feeding to the minimum and postpone the start of the expensive housing period.

Grass Supply

Controlled rotational grazing can provide quality grass on an ongoing basis and also allows an easy assessment of grass supply available on the farm. Building up grass from late July/August can ensure that grass supply will continue to be dequate when daily grass growth falls below daily grazing requirement. By late August approx. 25 days grazing should be available and this will increase to the mid 30?s by mid September. Research at Grange show that grass can keep for up to 8

weeks in autumn. Increasing rotation length allows grass to build up. Introduction of aftergrass to the grazing cycle, sale of cattle and use of nitrogen will facilitate increasing rotation length and building up of grass supply

Nitrogen

The sooner nitrogen is spread the better the response will be Each £1 spent on nitrogen in mid to late August will produce enough grass to support £3 worth of cattle liveweight gain. Ensure that N application is within the REPS limit on REPS farms. Fields deficient in nitrogen (silage/hay fields) or fields that received little N to-date will give the best response. 1-11/4 bags CAN per acre is adequate. Topping or bare grazing at closing will ensure best quality grass at following grazing. Ensure

maximum benefit from quality grass by having animals free from stomach worms, hoose and fluke.

Reducing Labour

Certain jobs e.g. shearing, feeding over winter, vaccinating, dosing at 5, 10 weeks, weaning, etc need to be done? It is the organisation or rather the lack of organisation which creates additional work. Have a think about the following points.

In most situations farmers will be grazing up to 8 paddocks during early March before grazing the silage fields, so work backwards from that assumption.





and display car parks to service the complex. This obviously will get critical examination during the planning process.

Another part of the first phase strategy proposed for the Shandon site would see the development of retail warehousing, an entrance building with clock tower, a 4 screen cineplex and seven commercial units. The proposal also includes the development of nine town houses and ten apartments at this initial stage. There are also plans for a pub. restaurant and nite club would serve between 600 and 700 patrons.

Some of the larger developments may be developed by design, hurld & finance packages which could take some time yet to come to fruition.

While the general public and local tetath outlets will all view the development with different emphasis, one aspect should appeal to the younger generation as the global fast food company. McDonald's, may locate a drive thru facility on the Shandon site at a later stage.

Mr. Clancy has confirmed that he has had many in-depth discussions with the County Marrager and the Council's planning staff and he is of the opinion that significant progress has been made. He would also hope that a final decision would be emanating from the planning department sooner rather than later.

In a questions and answer session with councillors, Mr. Clancy said the construction method used in the proposed development will reflect a 21st century development that will serve Dungarvan and the West Waterford hinterland well into the future.

The project, he added, is not a traditional shopping centre such as Grattan Square which was built over 150 years ago in a different age.

HUGE PUBLIC INTEREST

Town Clerk Brian White has contirmed that there has been tremendous interest shown by the public in the planning application and no formal objections were lodged at the time of going to press. One submission was received from Tom Power on behalf of people with disabilities.

The general shopping public will obviously welcome enhanced modern shopping services and the resultant competition factor. Understandably however, the existing retail sector will harbour concerns about increased competition and indeed some of the existing retailers may even eventually consider relocation.

This proposed development is the first phase of the eventual transformation of the 37 acre site and is therefore a critical one for the development of the county and the town. Time will tell how beneficial this will be increating employment, in servicing ever demanding customers and above all, in creating a shopping complex that compliments the historical town shopping centre of Dungaryan.

Technically, eight weeks is the time period in which a decision on a planning application is made. Given the complexity of this particular application however, requests by the Council for further information will inevitably delay a final decision by the County Manager beyond the initial 21st September dead-line.

IMPORTANT CHALLENGES FOR MEMBERS

Complimenting UDC Chair man Michael O'Riordan on organising the briefing with Clancy Construction, Cllr. Billy Kyne proposed that a well organised, intensive meeting now be arranged for councillors with the County Manager, County Engineer, senior planning staff and other consultants. This meeting, said Cllr. Kyne, would make councillors fully aware of the many opportunities, but more importantly, the challenges that this development places on elected members.

Speaking to the Leader', Cllr. Kyne said; "While I acknowledge that we've had a briefing several months ago, I'm disappointed that as we move into this critical stage of the planning application that an in-depth consultation which the executive and the developers had, was not communicated to members.

"There are questions on the road layout, building design and signage that need further examination and I welcome Mr. Clancy's initiative but it must be built upon by Council officials in the immediate future", he stressed. This is a major development that consumers will look at favourably and we are all consumers", he added, "but there must also be a balance with other criteria such as design and layout which are part of the planning development structure that people expect us as elected councillors to protect".

He went on to say that the development of strategic piers along the Gaeltacht coast is an important part of his commitment to provide the Gaeltacht with top class infrastructure.

ARDMORE PIER DEVELOPMENT CONTINUES

Meanwhile development work is presently in hand to greatly enhance the utility of the pier at Ardmore. The County Council currently has a contractor on site completing works on a major extension to the pier costing an estimated £112,000 which is being grant assisted by the Dept. of the Marine to the tune of £84,000.

The project initially began as a smaller proposal, but following local representations, the Department agreed to fund a larger project.

The Council is also stabilising the cliff face over the pier to prevent collapse of the road.

According to Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea, the Council has no funds at present to carry out further development of the pier but, should grant funding be available, the Co. Council would be willing to work with local people and the Department of the M barine to the completion of any necessary further improvement works.





The unexpected announcement that a select group of hurlers and footballers were chosen (because of their high profiles) to promote certain products following a very lucrative deal with a Dublin based Plc company, was made at a Dublin hotel on Wednesday of last week. According to the announcement the ten selected players will each receive a figure reported to be £4,000 for just 4 appearances during the year. Waterford's Paul Flynn is one of the 8 players named so far, the remaining two were expected to be named over the weekend.

The shock announcement made the headlines and was described as an unprecedented development that is likely to bring about major changes that will damage the whole association as an amateur body.

Donal O'Neill, who is the new association's chief administrator has declared that players have not been getting a fair slice of the GAA cake up to now. At the Westbury Hotel launch on Wednesday last it was revealed that the 10 players will receive 80% of the sponsorship and the remainder will go to the GPA.

The official group, known as the GAA Players Advisory Group, which was set up from within the Association and which has approved of commercial endorsements

by players and have named Murray Consultants as agents for the players, have pledged to stay within the Amateur Status guidelines which were agreed by the association last year.

Under these regulations the player will receive 50% of the sponsorship with 30% going to his county panel in either hurling or football, with 10% to the county board and 10% to a hardship fund for players.

The chairman of the Advisory Group, Down's Jarlath Burns, claims that the share out from the official side is much fairer to all players and he also pointed out that All Ireland tickets as well as

Provincial tickets for matches and increased mileage. etc. are also a part of the official deal.

As the controversy raged over the days since the announcement, many conflicting opinions have been voiced by players, officials and by supporters who seem generally, to view the situation as a sad development within the GAA

I believe that players should be well looked after and that there should never be a case where they are out of pocket because of their playing activities. With so much money now being generated by the Association it should be possible to

But I also believe that players should be treated equally. I believe that the strong element of discrimination that is now being introduced will prove very harmful in the long run and that the "all for one" and nothing for the rest policy being introduced is bound to effect player relations.

I feel too that the tens of thousands of 'blue-blood' GAA players and club and county officials who have worked themselves almost to the bone in the interests of the club and county over the century or more, will feel let down by this new development, which is going to change the whole ethos of the GAA.

I can visualise this new select group of players who are being remunerated in

the way which is outlined in the new charter, being regarded as a breed of professionals who are a 'cut above' the other great players on a team (but are commercially worthless in the estimation of the business moguls).
