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Glanbia Site Proposals 'Disappointing' Claims Maynooth Lecturer

A senior lecturer at the National University of Ireland, Maynooth has made a written submission to Dungarvan UDC with regard to the planning application by Clancy Construction for the development of the former Glanbia site in the town.

The submission was made to Dungarvan Town Clerk Brian White by Abbeyside native Prionnsias Breathnach who is a senior lecturer with the Department of Geography in Maynooth.

Mr. Breathnach maintains that the £30 million proposed overhaul of the site "is extremely disappointing" and, in his view, very much at odds with the civic design aspirations of the Draft Development Plan.

The Tipperary construction company propose to

demolish the former creamery powder plant and construct a major shopping centre in conjunction with Dunnes Stores as well as a 4 screen cinema, apartments, car parking, pub/restaurant/night club and various access points including a main access road opposite the Civic Offices at Davitt's Quay.

Outlining his views on the application, Mr. Breathnach said he would urge that the application be rejected as not being in keeping with

the proper planning and development of the area.

The Maynooth lecturer added: "the planning application is unimaginative in its very conventional design of the central shopping centre, incorporating major supermarket, department store and associated shop units. Access to the adjacent car park would be provided by a new road... at the rear of O'Connell Street. This means that patrons existing from the mall on its south side will be presented with a

vista of the rear yards of O'Connell Street - not the most pleasing of vistas.

"My suggestion", stated Mr. Breathnach, "is that the enclosed mall should be replaced by an open street, leading directly westward from Grattan Square. This street should be pedestrianised, perhaps with a glass roof. It is important that this new street would have the same terrace type three storey design as the rest of the old town centre".

He continues: "The planning application is also out of kilter with the Draft Plan in proposing a large surface car park instead of the civic square proposed in the Draft Plan. The application is, in my view, far too glib in its dismissal of the idea of a multi-storey car park on the site as being too expensive and architecturally unattractive".

Co. Council Action On Ring Water Supply Concerns

As efforts continue to improve the water supply serving the west Waterford Gaeltacht community of Ring, it has been confirmed by the County Council that an automatic monitor is to be installed on that locality's system.

This measure - which is among several featured in a written report recently com-

missioned from the Council by local Udarás na Gaeltachta representative Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair - is intended to enable a quick shut down of problematic source intakes in the event of pollution. It also incorporates a call out system which will alert a caretaker in the event of a close down. Cllr. O Ceilleachair feels

that had such an operation been in place in recent years, the controversies in regard to contamination of supply may not have been so pronounced.

"The standard method of detecting pollution is by measuring the ammonia levels in the raw water. This is done by a caretaker each

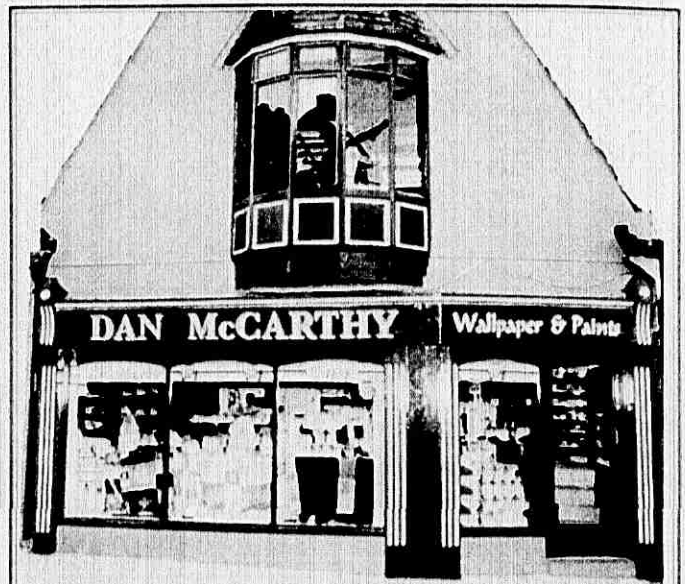

THE HUMAN BODY

HORMONAL SYSTEM

The body has two overall control systems to make sure that its many parts and processes work together smoothly. One is the nervous system. This is based on tiny pulses of electricity called nerve signals. The other is the hormonal or endocrine system. This is based on natural body substances called hormones.

There are more than 50 different hormones, and they are all chemicals that 'carry messages.' They are made in hormonal or endocrine glands, and travel around the body in the blood system.

Each type of hormone affects a certain part or parts of the body, like the heart, liver or stomach. These parts are called its target tissues, or organs. The hormone makes its targets work faster (or slower). The higher the level of hormone in the blood, the faster (or slower) its target parts work. In this way hormones control or regulate the activities of many body parts.

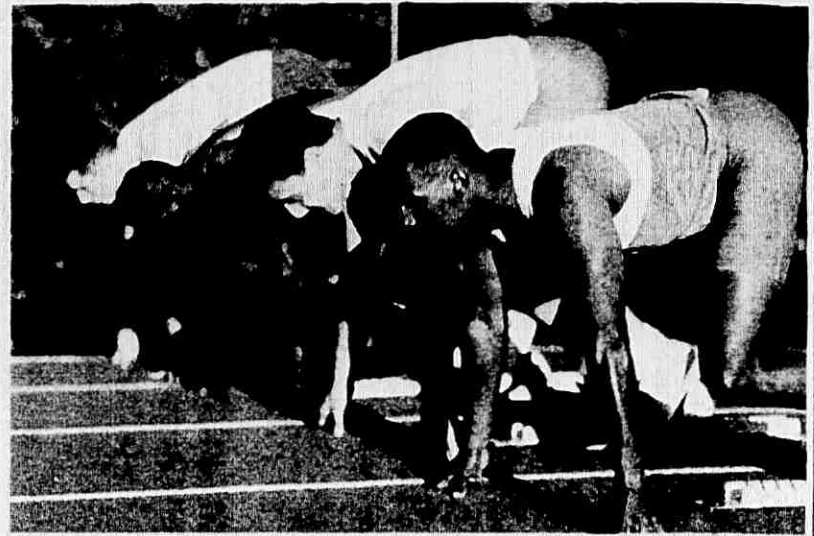
WHAT DOES ADRENALINE Do?

When the adrenal glands release adrenaline in a fight or flight situation, the following things happen to the body to enable it to react properly:

- Blood pressure rises.
- Muscles receive extra blood.
- Digestive and other organs receive less blood.
- Skin receives less blood and so goes pale.
- Heart rate increases.
- Breathing rate increases.
- Tiny airways in lungs (bronchioles) widen.
- Liver releases high-energy sugar into bloodstream.

READY FOR ACTION!

In a stressful or frightening situation, the brain tells the adrenal glands to release their hormone adrenaline. This acts in seconds to increase blood pressure, heart rate, the level of blood sugar, and the blood supply to muscles. These changes prepare the body for physical action, to cope with stress or danger. It's called the 'fight or flight' reaction because the body is prepared to fight or confront danger — or to flee (run away from) it).

WHITHER DUNGARVAN'S PLAYGROUND?

A case of Waterford coming off second best to Tipperary and Cork once again is how a Labour Councillor has described confirmation that Carrick on Suir is to go the recent route of Youghal and provide a childrens' playground in their town whilst similarly sized Dungarvan remains without one.

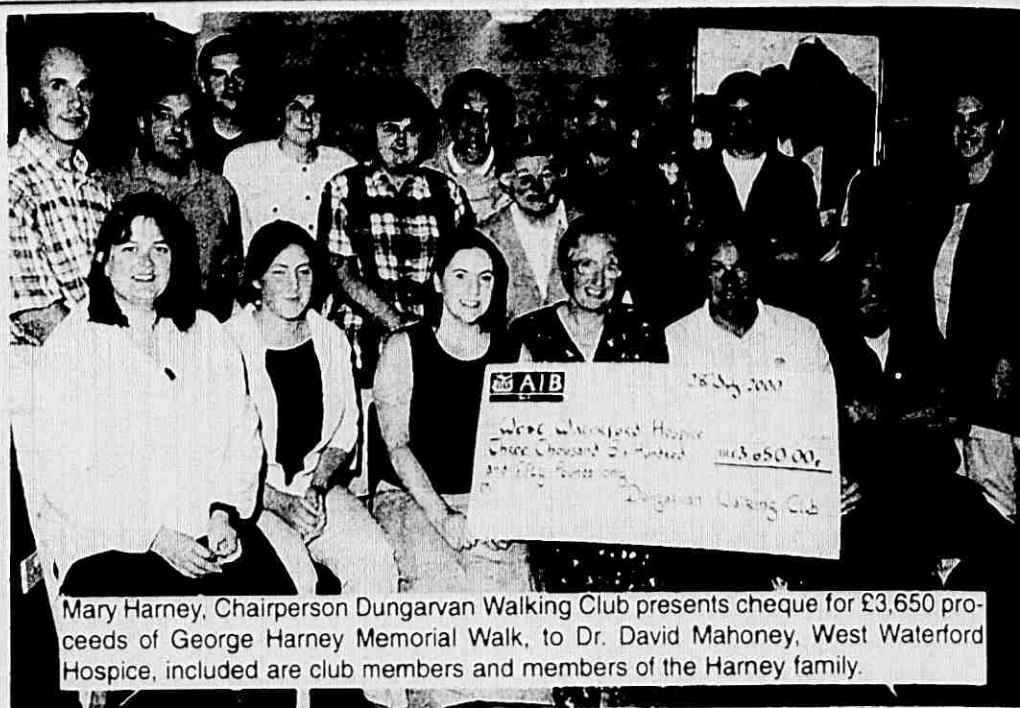
That's according to Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who says local people in Dungarvan and Abbeyside are very disappointed that their local authority has refused to develop a playground -

despite a written commitment to do so in

the last town development plan. Cllr. O Ceilleachair says the promise to "investigate the possibility" of a playground contained in the new draft town development plan is not strong enough and that there is now a need for a community based campaign to put Dungarvan and its social environment on a par with the likes of Youghal and Carrick on Suir.

"A Community Development Project in conjunction with Carrick on Suir UDC

was granted £20,000 in funding by their County Council, and along with £5,000 benefit in kind from the UDC have now set about developing a facility that Dungarvan and Abbeyside does not have. Specific issues such as ownership, type of equipment, location, security and insurance were satisfactorily negotiated. The Carrick on Suir town clerk last month confirmed that their playground would be maintained and covered under the Council's own insurance scheme.

Glanbia Announces Grain Price

Glanbia to-day announced its 2000 harvest feed barley price. It is IRE74 per tonne on account for green barley at 20% moisture plus a post

harvest review. The review will provide growers with the benefit of any improvement in the dried feed barley market following harvest.

The official price from the company was announced following talks with the I.F.A.

Commenting on the price

announced, Chairman Tom Corcoran said it was a strong price in a big harvest which reflected market conditions for both green and dried barley. Additional determining factors included Glanbia's extensive catchment area, its commitment to purchase volumes beyond its own requirements and the transport costs being incurred in serving deficit markets.

"Glanbia is deeply committed to the grain sector, supporting farmers in a huge and disparate catchment area from Louth to Cork, utilising 41 intake points," he said.

COOKERY CORNER

Pasta The Italian Way

SAMPLE Italian food at its very best with this marvellous traditional recipe for Cellentani with plum tomatoes, artichokes and mozzarella.

Ingredients:

- Serves 4
- 350g Cellentani
- 30ml good olive oil
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 plum tomatoes, cut into wedges
- 45ml sun-dried tomato paste
- 75g Parmesan cheese
- 400g can artichoke hearts in oil, drained and halved
- 1 x 150g pkt mozzarella cheese, drained and cubed
- 50g pitted black olives, halved
- 15ml marjoram leaves (to serve)
- salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method:

Cook the pasta according to the instructions on the packet.

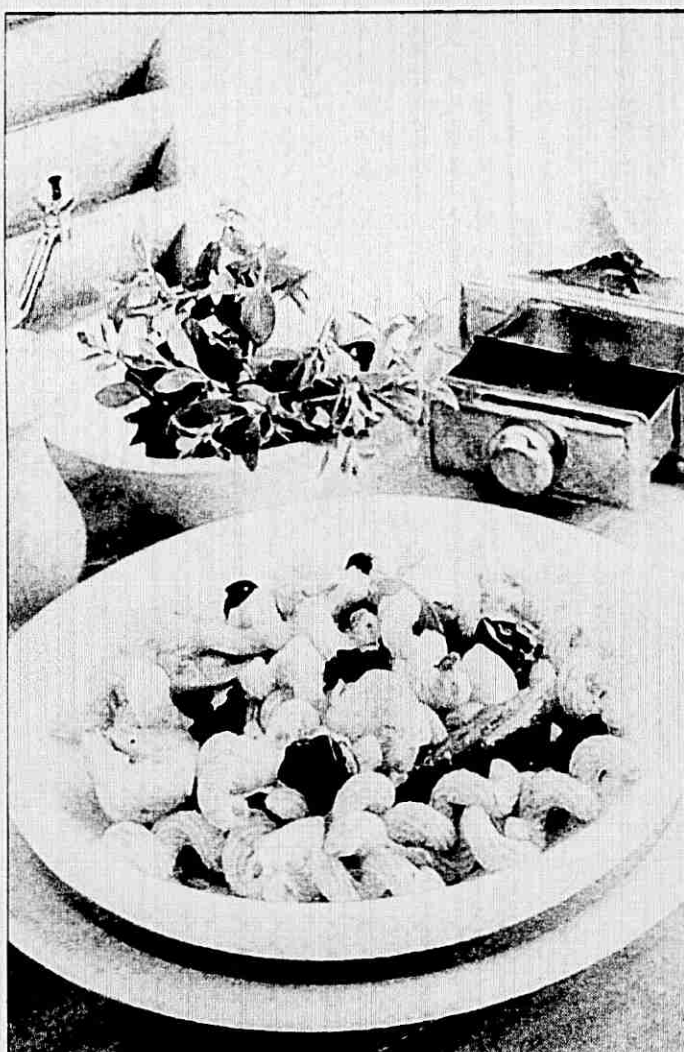
Meanwhile, heat the oil and fry the garlic for one minute until golden brown. Add the tomatoes to the garlic and oil and cook over a high heat for about two to three minutes.

Drain the pasta and return to its pan.

Stir into the pasta the sun-dried tomato paste and Parmesan cheese, and toss until the ingredients evenly coat the pasta.

Stir in the tomato and garlic mixture, artichokes, mozzarella cheese, olives and marjoram. Season and serve immediately.

Serve with mixed green salad and a wine of your choice as a main meal.



Rich and Crisp Apple Dessert

A dessert rich in depth of flavour and texture.

Ingredients:

- Serves 8
- Unsalted butter for preparing the baking dish
- 45g unsalted butter
- 1kg cooking apples, peeled, cored and cut lengthways into 8 even wedges
- 2 x 15ml sp freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1/2 x 5ml sp ground cinnamon
- 11/2 x 5ml sp pure vanilla extract
- 2 large eggs
- 75g sugar
- 250ml crème fraîche or double cream

Method:

Preheat the oven to 400° F/200° C/ Gas 6. Generously butter a 27cm baking dish, then set aside. In a

large frying pan, combine the butter, apples, lemon juice and a quarter teaspoon cinnamon and cook until soft, about 7 mins. Stir in half a teaspoon of vanilla extract.

Transfer the apples to the baking dish, evening them into a single layer with a spatula. In a large bowl, combine the eggs and sugar and whisk until well blended. Add the cream, the remaining vanilla extract and cinnamon. Whisk to blend and pour over the apples in the baking dish. Place the baking dish in the centre of the oven and bake until the top is a deep golden brown, 30 to 40 minutes. Do not underbake or the results will be soggy rather than crisp.

Serve cut into wedges, with a dollop of crème fraîche. The dessert is best served the day it is made.

Pork and Roast Pepper Noodles

CREATE a stir with this oriental dish.

Ingredients:

- Serves 2
- 1 x 5ml sp five spice powder
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1 x 5ml sp grated ginger
- 3 x 15ml sp dark soy sauce
- 1 x 15ml sp sherry
- 225g tenderloin pork, in strips
- 1 red pepper, deseeded, cut into six strips
- 2 x 15ml sp olive oil
- Salt, pepper
- 100g noodles
- 3 x 15ml sp sunflower oil
- Fresh coriander to garnish

Method:

Preheat the oven to 400° F/200° C/ Gas 6. Mix together the five spice, garlic, ginger, soy sauce and sherry.

Add the pork and marinate for one hour.

Lay the red pepper in a baking tray, coat with olive oil and season. Roast for 30 minutes, turning once, until soft and brown at the edges. Cut the pepper into thin strips.

Prepare the noodles according to packet instructions.

In a wok or frying pan, heat two x 15ml sp sunflower oil. Add the pork (reserving the marinade) and stir fry for four minutes.

Add the rest of the oil and the noodles and two x 15ml sp marinade.

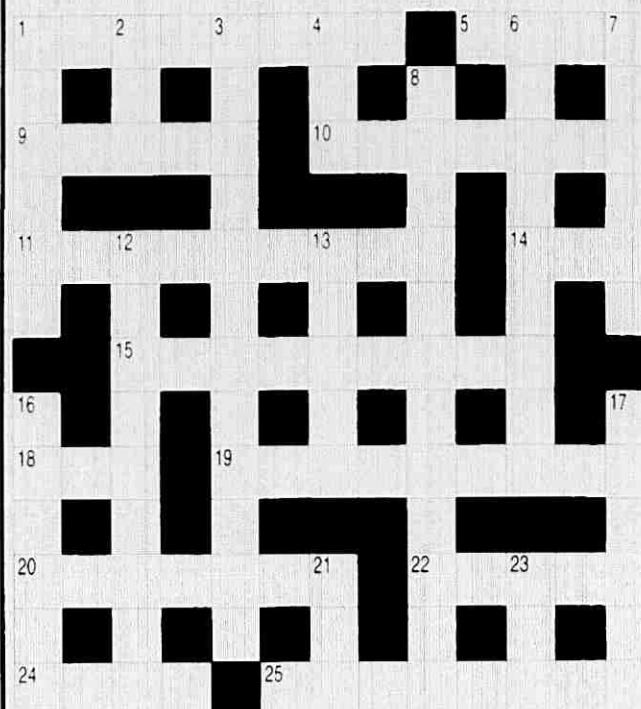
Stir fry for two minutes, adding more marinade if the noodles stick. Add the roasted peppers and cook for one minute.

Sprinkle with coriander and serve immediately.

There are two types of cholesterol: HDL, high density lipoproteins and LDL, low density lipoproteins. HDL is considered good and LDL bad cholesterol.

The total amount in the body of a person weighing 70 kilograms (11 stones) is around 140 grams, and the amount present in the blood is 3.6 to 7.8 m.mol per litre or 150 to 250 milligrams per 100 millilitres. A blood-cholesterol level above 6 m.mol per litre (238 mg per 100 ml) is considered high. (Source: Black's Medical Dictionary)

To lower Cholesterol eat/take:

- Beans - organic porridge oats - two apples a day - artichokes - milk thistle combination, which is a liver tonic. Over 60% of the cholesterol is produced by the liver.
- Special aged garlic extract (Kyolic 600).
- Lecithin, to help break down fats. - oily fish like salmon, tuna, mackerels / fish oil capsules.
- Unsaturated fatty acids, like unrefined sunflower and olive oil.
- Cut down on eggs, meat and butter.

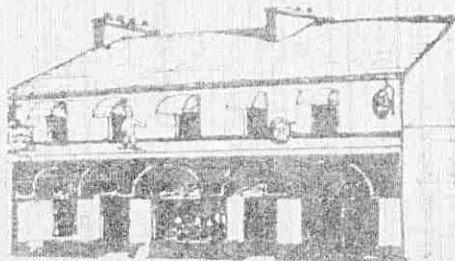

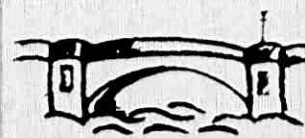

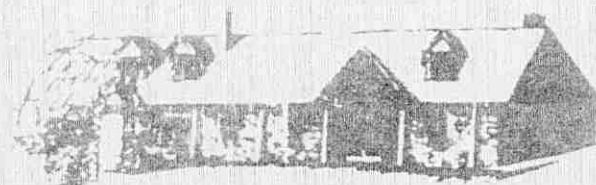

Art of Growing Cauliflowers

CAULIFLOWERS are a cool-season crop and do not usually grow well in areas with high summer temperatures.

But they are an ideal vegetable for the British climate. Several cultivars are frost hardy but cauliflowers may only be harvested all-year round in areas with frost-free winters.

Over-wintering cauliflowers need a sheltered situation outside and all types need a moisture retentive soil with medium nitrogen levels.

Grown as annuals or biennials, cauliflowers form an average head (also known as a curd) of about eight inches in diameter.

They are classified by the main season of use - usually winter, early summer or summer/autumn. Most types have creamy or white coloured curds but there are attractive, distinctively-flavoured types which have purple or green heads.

Success with cauliflowers depends heavily upon sowing the correct cultivar at the appropriate time. Plants should be allowed to develop with as few checks to

their growth as possible. The main sowing times and spacings are given in the chart below.

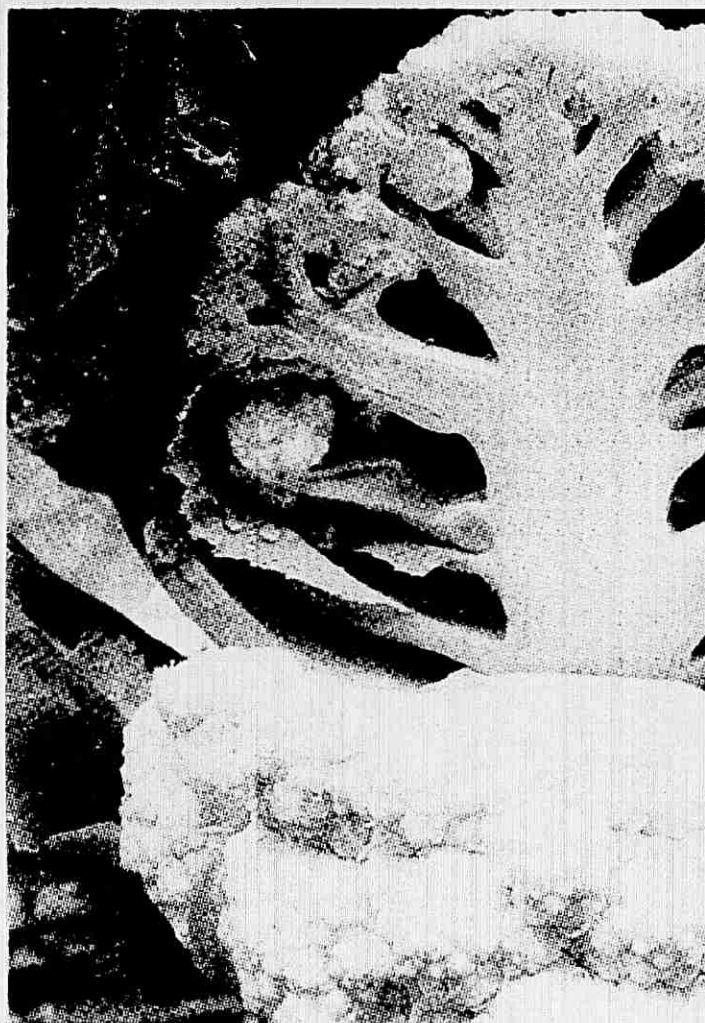
Cauliflowers are usually sown in seed trays, modules or a seedbed for transplanting although they may be sown in situ and thinned to the correct spacing. Generally the later the planting the larger the cauliflower will grow and the wider the spacing required.

Seed germinates best at a temperature of about 21 degrees centigrade (70 degrees F).

For an early summer crop the seeds should be sown in the autumn in modules or seed trays then seedlings should be reared in small pots. Pots should be put under a well-ventilated frame or under cloches for the winter. Harden off the seedlings before planting them out in the spring.

For a later crop sow indoors in gentle heat early spring and prick out into small pots. For summer/autumn and winter groups sow the first batch indoors in seed trays or modules or in situ under frames.

Cauliflowers need regular water throughout the growing



period. In dry conditions water maturity varies from about 16 at a rate of five gallons every weeks for summer/autumn square yard every two weeks. cauliflowers to 40 weeks for The time from sowing to winter ones.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Sow Schizanthus For Spring Flowering

Sow now in order to have really large schizanthus for spring decorations in the greenhouse or conservatory. Sow seeds thinly in well drained seed boxes, using a seed compost and germinate in a frame. The cooler the conditions the better.

Sow Winter Spinach and Spinach Beet

Choose a sheltered place and make a sowing of prickly-seeded spinach to stand the winter. Sow the seed thinly in drills 2.5cm deep and 30cm apart.

You can make a sowing of spinach beet now for use in winter and spring. This useful variety of beetroot is grown solely for its leaves, used as a spinach substitute.

Start To Gather Mushrooms From Outdoor Beds

If you were able to make a mushroom bed in the open in July you should examine it now for the first mushrooms. Gather the 'buttons' (young mushrooms) as they form. The bed should continue well into the autumn.

Make New Strawberry Plantations

Strawberry runners pegged down early last month should have made good roots and can be severed from their parent plant. A few days later, lift them carefully and plant them in new beds. Choose a good open position and soil that has been deeply dug and well manured. Plant 30cm apart in rows 60cm apart.

Pick and Summer Prune Apples and Pears

During this month and through September you should continue to pick apples and pears as they ripen. Continue to summer prune the trees but strive to complete the work by the end of the month.

Know Your Rights

QUESTION

A month ago my wife and I went on a two-week bus tour of Italy. We found that the accommodation in different hotels was not up to the standard that was described in the brochure. We complained to the firm's representative at the time but we were not given better accommodation. Are we entitled to any compensation?

ANSWER

Under the Package Holidays & Travel Trade Act, 1995 when you book a holiday you have a contract. All the information in the brochure must be accurate and you must be given details about the holiday including the type, location and description of the accommodation. The travel agent and tour operator must provide you with what was set out in the contract.

As you already had reported the problem to the local representative and you were not given the correct standard of accommodation you are entitled to compensation from the tour operator. You should send a written complaint to the tour operator within 28 days of your return home together with any supporting evidence you may have such as photographs.

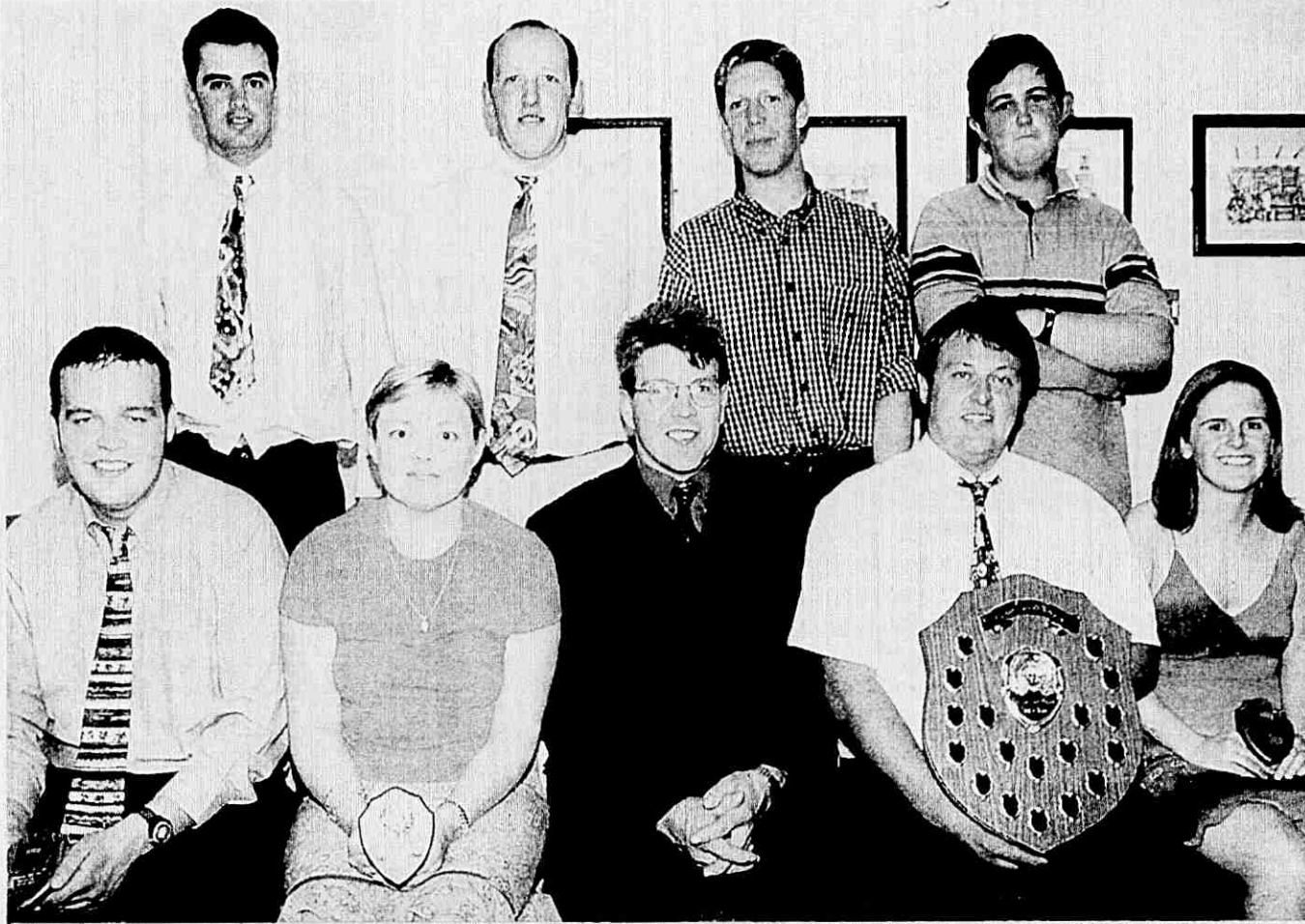
RAINBOWS

ICMSA News

O'ROURKE DEMANDS EARLY DAIL MEETING

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA, demanded the Government convene an early meeting of the Dail and prepare a mini-budget to prevent spiralling inflation from further eroding farm incomes.

Reacting to figures released today by the CSO, Mr. O'Rourke said, "These figures indicate that inflation has risen by 6.2 per cent in the last twelve months. This figure is almost three times the EU average and the highest figure in fifteen years. Government action is urgently required to stop spiralling inflation from further eroding farm incomes".

Mr. O'Rourke predicted that even with a partial recovery to 1998 levels, real farm incomes will still be down by 10%. A mini-budget could effect an immediate reduction in VAT and excise duty to bring inflation down as rapidly as possible.

Mr. O'Rourke repeated his call for a complete embargo on all additional costs from Government and public bodies to farmers. "If the Government does not act now to address this issue and reduce inflation they will be in breach of their commitment under the Programme For Prosperity & Fairness".

ICMSA WELCOME 500,000 GALLON MILK QUOTA ANNOUNCEMENT

Mr. Jackie Cahill, Deputy President, ICMSA and Chairman of ICMSA's Dairy Committee, welcomed the 500,000 gallon milk quota reserve announcement by the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Rural Development, Mr. Joe Walsh, T.D.

Speaking after Minister Walsh's announcement that arrangements have been made for the distribution of the 500,000 gallon Agenda 2000 Hardship Pool, Mr. Cahill said: "I would like to remind the Minister that

2,000 young farmers failed to benefit from the 5 million gallon scheme and ICMSA is aware that a significant number of farmers failed under the 15 million gallon quota scheme. It is vital that this reserve is sufficient to cater for all those who failed to qualify due to Force Majeure."

Mr. Cahill also reminded farmers that the Milk Quota Appeals Tribunal is, as usual, available to producers who have endured hardships under the quota regime.

Dept. of Agriculture Over £12m In Payments To Farmers In County Waterford

Minister Walsh has published details of direct payments to farmers on a county basis during the first six months of 2000. A total of £12.356m was paid to farmers in County Waterford on structural measures and on headage and premia schemes.

In respect of structural measures, the following amounts were received by farmers in the county.

SHEEP Buying Rams

August and September is the time to buy, not in October when choices are limited. Buy from pedigree flocks, which are recording. Rams in these flocks have Estimated Breeding Values (EBV's) for growth rate, muscle depth and fat depth. These three EBV's are put into an index to give overall merit on a ram, the lean meat index (LMI). This index is based on the average for all recorded rams in that breed in 1998. Buying a ram with a positive index (greater than 100) indicates that this ram performed better than the 1998 breed average. An accuracy figure accompanies this index. It tells how reliable the EBV is for growth. A second index, the LMI-SR means that these flocks are sire referenced (SR) and their accuracy figures will be very high.

Culling Ewes

Every lamb sold carries a ram and ewe depreciation cost. A ram kept for 4 years will mate about 160 ewes producing 240 lambs. If the ram cost approximately £300 then the cost/lamb sold is £1. A ewe flock requiring 20% replacements (£50/hd)

and rearing 1.5 lambs/ewe will have a depreciation cost of £5-6/lamb. Therefore the point to consider is are we spending too much time buying rams and not enough time selecting ewes?

DAIRY QUOTA DECISIONS?

Your quota position will determine most decisions made on your farm this Autumn. If you are over quota:

Cows should not get meals this Autumn.

Cattle (weanlings and cattle for fattening) should get access to the best grass. That means grazing these animals in front of cows on the best grass. If under quota with enough left for the Spring then: Feed cows 3-5 lbs of meal from late September (pays well). Continue to give cows priority access to the best grass.

Over quota farmers must:

Dry off early young cows and older thin cows.

Identify cows for culling, dry off and put on extra flesh on them

Animal Care

Watch out for hoose and stomach worms in weanlings because they are now back grazing paddocks already grazed by calves this year.

Because, they are now grazing tighter.

Because the effectiveness of boluses and convenience doses is not wearing off.

Don't let any calves graze the fields near the calf house for the remainder of the year.

This will facilitate early let-out next Spring (March). The risk of parasite carry over will be greatly reduced. Inject weanling replacement heifers for leptospirosis at 6-9 months of age.

Must be done if cows are being injected. Otherwise forget about it if cows are not on a programme. Order your Dry Cow Mastitis tubes now.

Until Irish research proves otherwise, dry cow treatment represents the best way of reducing mastitis spread and S.C.C.

By shopping around now you should be able to get reasonable value. Order your end of year dose for Stomach Worms (Type 11), lice treatment and Fluke dose if necessary.

Castrate weanlings now if not going for Bull Beef.

Grange work has shown that weanlings castrated in September compared with next March will weigh 4 Kgs lighter at turnout (mid April) but will weigh 3 Kgs heavier at the end of October.

Early castration reduces stress.

A local anaesthetic must be administered when castrating calves older than 6 months. Lame cows will carry this problem into the house unless treated now. The Farm Relief Service offers a very good preventative service for lameness.

Have a chat with your Vet about an Animal Health Care programme for your farm this Autumn and Winter. He may have some interesting ideas at a small cost.

Cows in a condition score of 2.7 or less should get special attention to improve body condition. Feed them 4-6 lbs of meal from now. If quota doesn't allow meal, dry them off immediately and after 2 weeks dry give them good grass.

IMPORTANT DATES TO REMEMBER

For those of you opting for extensification via the census system, you should have received notification of the third census date, which was Sunday the 30th of July. Your census form must now be completed and returned to the Local District Livestock office not later than the 1st of September. If you have any difficulty completing this form then contact your local Teagasc Advisor.

The closing date for applications for the 2001 Reserve Suckler Cow Quota is the 1st of September. Applications can be obtained from your local Teagasc office or from the Department of Agriculture.

IFA Notes

IFA NEGOTIATE WITH GLANBIA ON HARVEST PRICES

Following an IFA protest at Glanbia's headquarters in Kilkenny on Wednesday, 16th August and talks with top management, the company has agreed to withdraw its £71 per tonne price for barley and further intensive discussions are to take place with IFA over grain harvest prices in the next 2 days.

The IFA protest was mounted by grain growers, led by IFA Grain Committee Chairman Ruaidhri Deasy, following news that Glanbia were setting a barley price of £71 per tonne which is far below growers' expectations and market prospects.

Talks were held this morning between IFA President Tom Parlon and Glanbia top management including Chairman Tom Corcoran and Chief Executive Ned Sullivan.

At the talks Mr Parlon pointed out that the Glanbia price was totally out of line with the market and in stark contrast with the £76 per tonne announced this morning by Dairygold. Prices at this level or higher are also being paid by some other purchasers.

As a result of the discussions with Tom Parlon, Glanbia has withdrawn their £71 per tonne price.

O'CONNOR CALLS FOR MAXIMUM RETIREMENT PENSION

Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman Mossie O' Connor has called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to seek EU approval for the maximum allowable pension of £11,813 per year under the new early retirement scheme due to start this Autumn.

Mr. O' Connor's call for the maximum pension came following the European Commission's rejection of an Irish proposal for a 2% per year inflator on a base pension of £10,015 in 2000.

The Department is now proposing a flat rate pension £10,644 per year, but Mr. O' Connor said "this would be worth over £3,000 less than the Department's original proposal over ten years".

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman continued "the only way now to protect retiring farmers against inflation is to pay the maximum pension of £11,813 per year flat".

"With inflation running at 6%, the Department's proposal of £10,644 per year means the real value of the pension would only be maintained for the first year. From the second year, farmers would lose out as inflation erodes the real pension value. If inflation averages 4% over the next 6 years, the loss would be over £2,500.

"IFA's proposal to pay the maximum of £11,813 per year would protect the value of the pension against inflation of up to an average rate of 3.6% over ten years", Mr. O' Connor concluded.

GLANBIA INCREASINGLY ISOLATED ON MILK PRICES AS BIG RISES NOW DUE

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murphy has said that July milk price increases by a number of co-ops were entirely justified in view of recent substantial increases in the Irish Dairy Board SMP/Butter price to 121p/gal from 1st August. He said that Glanbia was increasingly out of synch with other co-ops' milk prices, and that its suppliers would not let it off the hook for the price increases due to them.

"Golden Vale and Town of Monaghan have already announced July price increases of 3.8p/gal and over 1.5p/gal respectively, and many co-ops are expected to announce price increases further to their board meetings later this week," Michael Murphy said.

Following a second 4p/gal price increase announced by the Irish Dairy Board on 1st August, he said "substantial milk price rises are now justified, not only for July milk, but for August milk also".

"The IDB is now paying the co-ops 121 p/gallon for SMP and butter from 1st August. This is 12.4 p/gal above their weighted average for 1999," he added.

Michael Murphy stressed that producers need to contact board members and co-op management right now on July milk prices.

"The key facts are that IDB returns to the co-ops have increased by 1.6 p in early May, 4p for all of July, and now another 4p for August milk. All co-ops must now lift prices, July should be 102p/gal plus VAT, with 106 p/gal plus VAT due in August," he said.

The Waterford Dairy Chairman concluded by pointing out that these prices would allow the co-ops "a temporary increase in their processing margin this year to a generous 15p/gal to counterbalance last year's lower margin".

STAND FOR CLONMEL SPORTSFIELD

Work has started on the new stand that will greatly enhance facilities for spectators at Clonmel GAA Sportsfield. The first sod has been turned on the new stand that's being built on the Albert Street side of the Western road venue by contractor Eugene Fallon, Clonmel, while the steel fittings are being supplied by Norris Brothers, Stradbally, Co. Waterford. The all-seater stand will seat 1,000 spectators and it will be ready for occupation by early November 2000. It will be 45 metres long, with a depth of 7 metres, it will have a height of 9 ft at the rear, raising to 15 ft at the front. It will include seating for the media. The stand is being provided at a cost of €100,000. Saint Mary's and Clonmel Commercial GAA Clubs are grateful to Munster Council of the GAA for a grant to the tune of €50,000. The remainder of the money will be raised through local fundraising. The two Clonmel GAA Clubs haven't received any funding from the National Lottery, despite making an application some two years ago, but they remain hopeful that they will get some assistance toward the end of the year from the lottery. The sportsfield has been a GAA venue since the early 20's. It is hoped with the improved facilities that the sportsfield will attract more high-profile fixtures, including National Football and Hurling matches.

A lot of water had passed under the Old Bridge since they last met. Sadly her brother died three months later. BALLYMACARBRY TIDY TOWNS

THE DEAD OF REIGH CHURCHYARD REMEMBERED

From Father Sheehy's execution at Clonmel in 1776 to the 1800's living conditions were extremely bad for Irish Catholics. There were some minor famines long before the Great Famine of 1845/47 which reduced the Irish population to severe poverty and ill health. The Landlords of the time instead of paying the labourers a wage gave them a small amount of land on which to grow potatoes for themselves and their families, and some had the use of a Mud Cabin but no money, then in famine times if food was for sale, the labourer hadn't the money to buy same, so they starved from all kinds of illnesses including the dreaded Famine and the fever which followed.

Emigration schemes were organised to Canada, North America and Australia. This meant free travel to those countries and our healthiest and strongest availed of this offer to seek their fortune in far away places. The weak ones and the fathers of families who remained at home joined whatever schemes became available locally. Some were so under nourished that they died at work and were buried by the side of the road where they died. As the fever got worse in the early 1800's the people were dying in great numbers, sheds were erected in a field over the Graigue Road from Clogheen, to provide shelter to the unfortunate dying, and to give a little comfort and peace to them in their last moments, if they were lucky enough to receive the last Sacraments. At the height of the fever it wasn't unusual to have fifteen deaths every second day, two fields from the sheds, a field called the Reigh was acquired as a burial ground. Bodies were loaded on a cart, and taken up the two fields where a large hole had been dug and into which would be heeled the bodies. Such burials occurred every second or third day, so this Holy Ground has several such Mass graves with the bodies of hundreds of nameless Holy Souls.

In 1810 the Quakers formed a Charitable Association and by their efforts and a government grant, a fever hospital was built in Cockpit Lane in 1811. Doctor Tom Gallagly was the first doctor. He was a very good doctor, he eventually died of fever and is buried in Shanrahan Church yard, this fever hospital finished with the use of the sheds, but the burial of paupers continued in the Reigh for many years.

On July 14th 1999 the first Mass in living memory was celebrated there by Rev. Fr. Sean Nugent P.P., Parish Priest of Burncourt and Clogheen. Since then the Parish Priest Fr. Nugent has arranged with the Health Board, Coillte, Galty Vee Valley, Agritourism FAS Scheme under the supervision of John Pyné a new direct entrance from the Mountain Road at the back of the Old Forrester's House, in addition to the new entrance the FAS workers have built a concrete Altar with a commemorative plaque for the Millennium on the front of it and also erected a statue of Our Lady of Fatima. On Wednesday evening, 9th August the feast of Saint Romanus (Martyr) they had their second Mass celebrated at the Reigh. Many thanks to Fr. Sean Nugent P.P. for reactivating the memory of the Reigh.

PREVENTING DEVIANCE IN CHILDREN

On Thursday night last in his acceptance speech at the Republican National Convention Presidential hopeful George W. Bush stated that there was an urgency in dealing with the alarming rise in juvenile crime and he said if government fails to do something about it then society fails.

Here I would like to focus on children who exhibit anti-social behaviour, why they develop this behaviour and ways to identify possible problem children before they become small criminals. There is an urgent need for society to prevent children who exhibit antisocial traits from becoming criminals. I believe that if parents, teachers and other authority figures can identify the warning signs in defiant children there is a great possibility that they can prevent antisocial behaviour taking root and therefore change the climate in which it grows so that criminal behaviour can be prevented.

As a criminologist and penologist I know that penitentiaries and jails are bursting at the seams with young inmates who were never taught pro-social values and behaviours based on understanding and feelings. We are what our thoughts are, thoughts determine feelings and when feelings are triggered particularly the feelings of guilt and empathy, inroads can be made to change problem behaviour. Most children have strong feelings for their family and are affected by what family thinks of them so when empathy - which is a prerequisite for guilt - and guilt are aroused they will provide motivation for change. It is so important for parents to teach their children empathy as it's an important component of love.

Case History

The parents brought their daughter "Sheila" to see me. Both parents worked and had a genuine interest in raising their two girls to be responsible successful adults. Sheila's sister, "Maura" was three years older than her sister and was pleasant, responsible and helpful. Sheila on the other hand was angry and moody from the "day she was born", exclaimed her mother. She insisted on sleeping in her parents' bed and most mornings she woke up angry, screaming and demanding. She fought continually with her sister, often throwing things at her and claiming her sister said hurtful things. The parents showed no favouritism and were confused as to why the girls were so different. At school Sheila acted out in class but despite her unacceptable behaviour the teacher was reluctant to isolate her and instead placed her in the front row in class. However, the bad behaviour continued when the teacher turned her back. When her mother picked her up after school Sheila would begin to scream and claim the children in school weren't nice to her so she didn't want to go back to that school again. For the remainder of the evening Sheila would continue to act out and when her father came home from work she would bombard him with complaints about how every one treated her so badly. Confused as to why she appeared so sad her dad comforted her.

Sheila's skills at power and control became more and more expert. Bedtime was a nightmare. Sheila would again go into tantrums so she was allowed to sit up much later than her sister. Sheila had succeeded in controlling and manipulating her parents and this need for power and control would only escalate, if left unchecked.

Social, Emotional and Moral Intelligence Skills

Will parents of a child exhibiting these behaviours be able to stop them? The answer is No - unless the bad behaviours can be replaced with positive traits and behaviours. The earlier parents can identify and acknowledge inappropriate behaviour the better the chance they have of preventing a cultivation of antisocial behaviours. Some of the behaviours that may indicate potential problems are self centredness, (selfishness means me first, self centredness means, me only), low frustration tolerance, poor self discipline, lack of empathy, lying, stealing and a strong need for power and control.

One of the most serious errors parents make is denial - after all what parent wants to admit their child is antisocial? Children who respect their parents, siblings, peers, teachers and others have learned and developed the skill of social intelligence integration. This skill remains with them through life. However a child who acts out in tantrums in public or at home is attempting to gain control and get what he wants. These children have low social intelligence skills.

Children who can get in touch with their feelings and express them in a spontaneous way have developed emotional intelligence skills. These children are more natural and more than likely have grown up in an environment that fosters emotional space and freedom to express feelings. This skill allows children to recognise and accept the feelings of others and to better manage their own emotions, allowing them to use their emotions to determine their behaviour and handle relationships with others.

A child who has respect and is able to empathise with others has acquired the skill of moral intelligence. This child has no problem sharing and is not jealous of siblings or others. Children who have not learned moral intelligence never share, they scream when frustrated and make noise and create distractions when they don't get their own way.

Moral Values

The best prevention against children developing antisocial behaviour is by instilling moral values in them at a very young age. In fact this moral training should begin in early infancy. Parents should teach their children empathy in order to replace selfishness and hurtful behaviour. When a child first sees how his bad behaviour disturbs his parents, empathy is reinforced. When parents openly show anguish at misbehaviour the child connects the misbehaviour to the hurting of his parents and from this he learns how misbehaviour hurts others.

Young children learn by doing and by imitation. Children should be encouraged to share as early as the first year. If a child is an only child the parents should engage the child in sharing with them. Play is an important medium in reinforcing that skill and parents who provide an opportunity for children to explore their environment by playing different games with them have less discipline problems. Very many parents emphasise punishment rather than replacing negative misbehaviour with positive behaviour. I suggest the more parents are able to teach pro-social behaviour early in childhood the less likely the child is to develop antisocial behaviour and the less likely it will be that parents will need to use punishment later.

All parents hope and aspire for their children to be successful and 'good' but when some children grow up failures or exhibiting antisocial behaviour parents ask Why? What did I do Wrong? Today with so much child crime society should be asking the same questions and finding solutions. We are what we are with each other and when one human being fails so does society. When families, schools and communities work and interact positively these positive actions become the foundation and catalyst for change.

Every moment of life people are growing into more or retreating into less, they are expanding themselves or diminishing themselves. Man's search for a purpose and mission is a search for a plan in the development of his life story. The secret of a successful person lies in the frustrations he has faced over his life and the action he develops in meeting these frustrations.

TIPS TO MAKE YOUR £ GO FURTHER

Fish is quick to prepare and very nutritious and can be good value depending on the season. You can always ask what offers the best value at a particular time.

Tuna is a very versatile and popular fish. Serve it with a stir-fry and pasta for an interesting evening meal.

Eggs are cheap, easy to cook and full of nourishment.

Fresh vegetables are much cheaper than processed/frozen vegetables, e.g. potatoes are cheaper than ready-made chips, but they take time to prepare. Fresh vegetables tend to be cheaper in vegetable shops and open air markets than supermarkets.

Cheapest vegetables are generally cabbage, carrots,

broccoli. Vegetables in season will be cheaper too. Fresh tomatoes will be much cheaper in the summer time and more expensive in winter. When fresh vegetables are not in season, frozen or tinned ones will be cheaper.

Meat is usually cheaper in a butcher shop than the supermarket and you can choose the exact amount you want. Mince is low in cost, and has no waste from bone or gristle. It may however be high in fat, it is a good idea to buy a smaller quantity of leaner mince.

While the book itself dates from the mid 1940's, many of the catalogues it contains go back much further. One is an Instruction Book and spare parts list for a Pierce No. 1 Tractor Plough dated 1949. The second is a retail price list for the I.V.I. Foundry, Athy, Co. Kildare dated 1944. The third is the "Star" catalogue of the Wexford Engineering Company Ltd dated 1938. The final one is a catalogue for water pumps produced by an English manufacturer and dated 1929. This Sunday evening Jenny Power will be at the Parish Office minding all things both rural and urban. Visitors will be most welcome to come along and browse a while.

NEWSPAPER SUPPLIES

During the months when there was no train service the Cork and Dublin newspapers were brought to town by motor. The Cork Examiner came daily from Mallow by motor, and reached here at between ten and eleven o'clock. The Dublin papers were transported from Waterford by motor - reaching the town about 2 pm. The service in this way was very regular and satisfactory. By the end of the year 1923 there was a marked change for the better in the condition of the country. The law was observed. The Civic Guards, the new police force, took up duties for the first time on the 17th January 1923, when Sergeant Jones appeared with five men. Another five men supplemented them on the 15th February following, and peace seemed to be on the return. The old castle, even in its ruins, brought back to one's mind the history of the past centuries, it's varying fortunes being at all times the reflex of the condition which prevailed. The wave of unrest, of bloodshed, had all but passed away. In the moving changes, which the people hoped would be for better things, the old castle walls would continue to cast its spell of antiquarian richness upon the locality.

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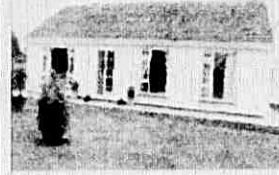

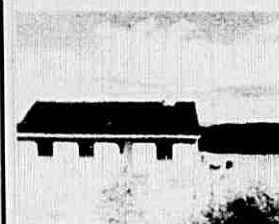

Glanbia Site Proposals "Disappointing" Claims Maynooth Lectured

"It seems to me that the planning application is only interested in providing parking for patrons of the new shopping centre, whereas the Urban Council needs to keep the broader picture in view. The proposed conversion of Grattan Square from a car park to a civic amenity with enormous potential appeal requires the installation of substantial car parking space nearby which will provide for people seeking access to the older part of the town centre as well as the redeveloped Glanbia site. I therefore urge the Urban Council to stick to its proposals for a multi-storey car park and a separate pedestrian-friendly civic square for the Glanbia site".

Mr. Breathnach said the redevelopment of the Shandon site offers a unique opportunity for the Council to "finish off" the streetscape largely put in place by the Duke of Devonshire in the early 19th century. He said the UDC can decide to create an integrated and unified urban core which will add greatly to the towns appearance and stimulate pedestrian movement throughout the town centre. Alternatively, the Council could facilitate a modern shopping centre aimed at diverting shoppers from the historic urban core, with inevitable negative consequences for the remainder of the town centre.

"Whatever form it takes, it is certain that the redeveloped Glanbia site will become the main shopping area for convenience and comparison goods in Dungarvan. I see the older part of the town centre - Grattan Square, O'Connell, Mary and Main Streets and the Quay area - increasingly specialising in office-type functions, pubs and restaurants and speciality shops. This district could become a very attractive "browsing" precinct for tourists, out-of-town shoppers and local residents alike. For this to happen, the area must be attractively refurbished and pedestrian-friendly, and properly linked with the redeveloped Glanbia site where the main parking facility for the town should be located".

In conclusion Mr. Breathnach added: "For me, the Clancy Construction planning application lacks the broad overall vision which can accommodate the proper long-term planning and development of the town of Dungarvan, and therefore should be rejected in its current form".

morning. However, if the pollution occurs late in the day it may not be picked up. Hopefully, the new measure will address that. I also note that the Council's survey of the present two extractory sources show that some diversionary works can be done at the supply intakes. I'm particularly interested to learn that the Council's consulting engineers, O'Sullivan & Co., are utilising intensive hydrological assessment criteria not previously used in the area and are now establishing the feasibility of tapping a lower groundwater source. This would be preferable to the present dependency on peaty streams from Lag na gCaithi Si and Cloch na Fear Breaga, which are sent through the starting intake points at R6 Meánach and on to the filtration base at Rath na mBinnineach. The people of Ring have continuously complained about the quantity and quality of their water supply, so I hope this comprehensive report indicates that their local authority is progressing along the way to addressing those serious concerns.

Are You Open to a Challenge

Are you open to a challenge is the new recruitment campaign being launched by the fostering dept. in the Waterford/West Waterford Community Care team.

At present there are approximately 70 families fostering with in Waterford Community Care. These families provide care for someone else's child in their own home, providing the experience of family life for a child, who for one reason or another cannot live with their own parents.

The concept of fostering is not a recent phenomenon but has in fact been in operation in Irish society for over a thousand years. During the twelfth and thirteenth century Irish sons were frequently fostered out to other families, where strict rules were laid down in relation to their upbringing and where strong bonds of affection and loyalty were developed. Under the old Irish code of law there were four ways of ending the fostering relationship: 1. Death 2. Crime 3. Marriage or 4. Entry into the religious community.

To-day, in contemporary Ireland, the fostering process is very different. To-day a child is only fostered when all efforts to support and maintain a child in his/her family and community have failed.

Foster carers to-day come from all walks of life, some are young but very mature, others are much older but young at heart. You are eligible to foster regardless of whether you are unemployed or have a part-time job, are married, single, separated or divorced.

What is most important is that you have a stable lifestyle, connect with children, possess an open mind, are good and patient with people.

There are a variety of ways that people can foster from short term to long term, day fostering to respite to emergency foster care or shared care.

Becoming a foster carer is about joining a team whereby the foster carer, social worker and the child family work together for the child's well being.

And that is how the first of the three Munster Champion teams from Waterford had booked a place in an All Ireland Final this year. When the Waterford girls run out onto the turf of Parnell Park next Saturday week in the Bank of Ireland Championship they will need all the support they can get. The fans at the Minor game gave them heart when the going got tough and no less will be expected for the Senior girls.

"The support in the stand may well be the deciding factor in this game, so closely are they matched," says Michael "and we would love to see a sea of blue and white to inspire the girls on the field. It will be almost a home fixture for the Meath team, so we are appealing to everyone to make an effort to be there."

That is nothing more than they deserve and the people of the Déise should respond to the call. The reality of three Munster titles this year and the possibility of three All Ireland crowns is worthy of support. They are depending on YOU.

Europa Apache Won The War

In common with other tracks such as Shelbourne Park and Cork Waterford was on fire last Saturday night where three of the seven winners in 525 yard races dipped under the 29 Second barrier. The sooner that all tracks are standardised with similar racing surfaces and starting traps etc. the better as its really proving difficult to compare performances from track to track.

Back to the racing however, where race goers were treated to three competitive finals. The first of these over the standard trip The Waterford Plumbing and Heating 30.30 stake was kindly sponsored by owner Maurice Jackson who campaigns his runners under the Valentia prefix. The Peter Bates owned and Michael

Gallagher trained Charity Blondie (Spiral Nikita - Charity Rose) stopped the clock at a best ever 29.01 in the third contest. Available at odds of 3/1 "Blondie" glided past the early paced Crobally Joker along the back stretch before scooting clear for a facile ten and three quarter lengths victory.

The Betty Loftus owned Vigilant Joe (Droopy's Fintan - Vigilant Katie) the 6/4 favourite took full advantage of an ease in grade in a 300 yard sprint shading the first bend from a challenging Gardean Rocket eventually scoring by two and three quarter lengths in 16.39.

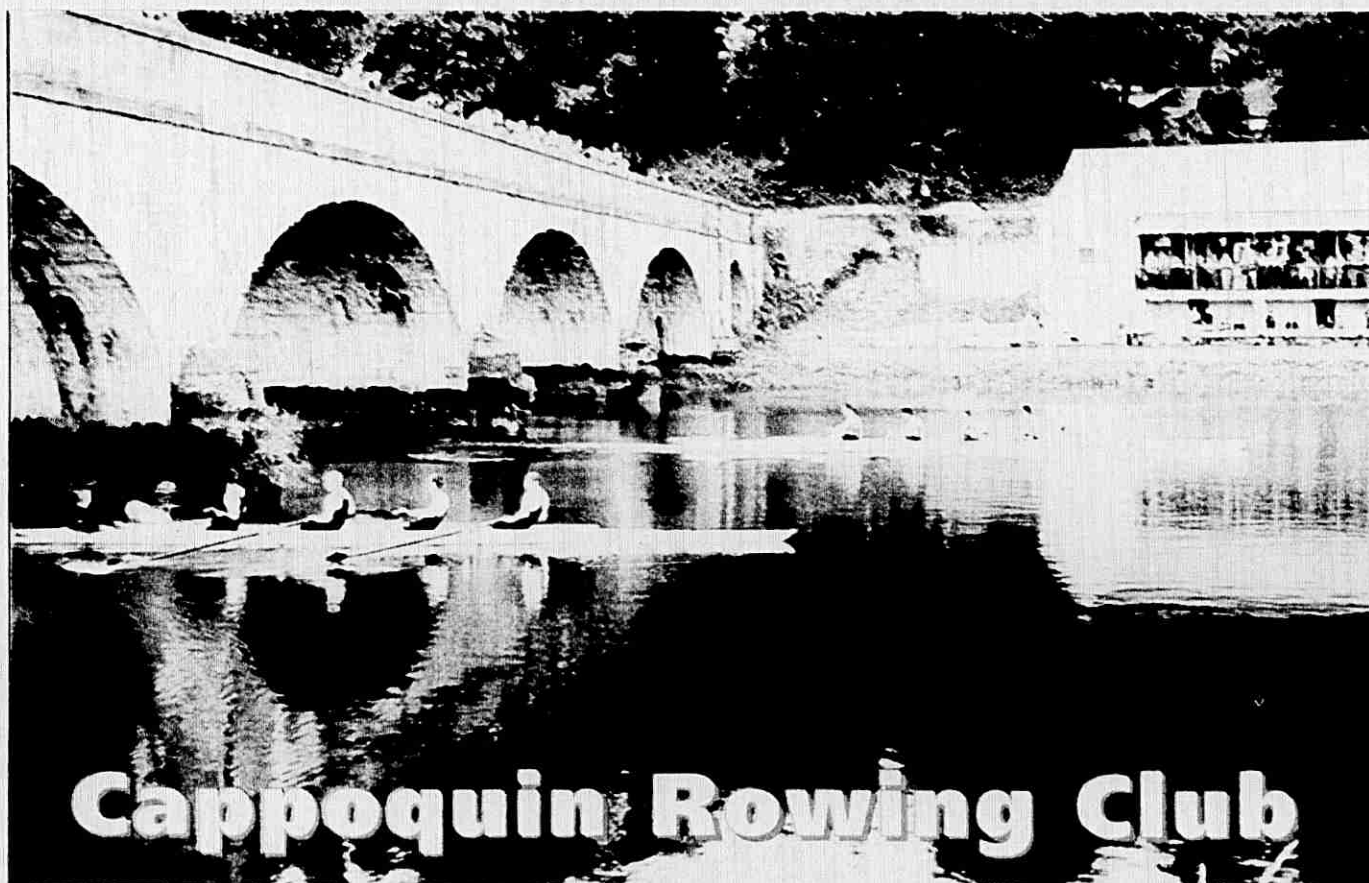

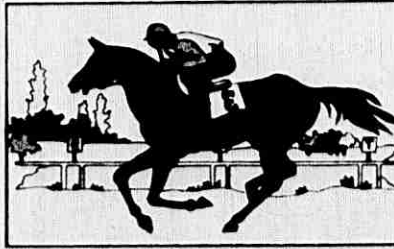

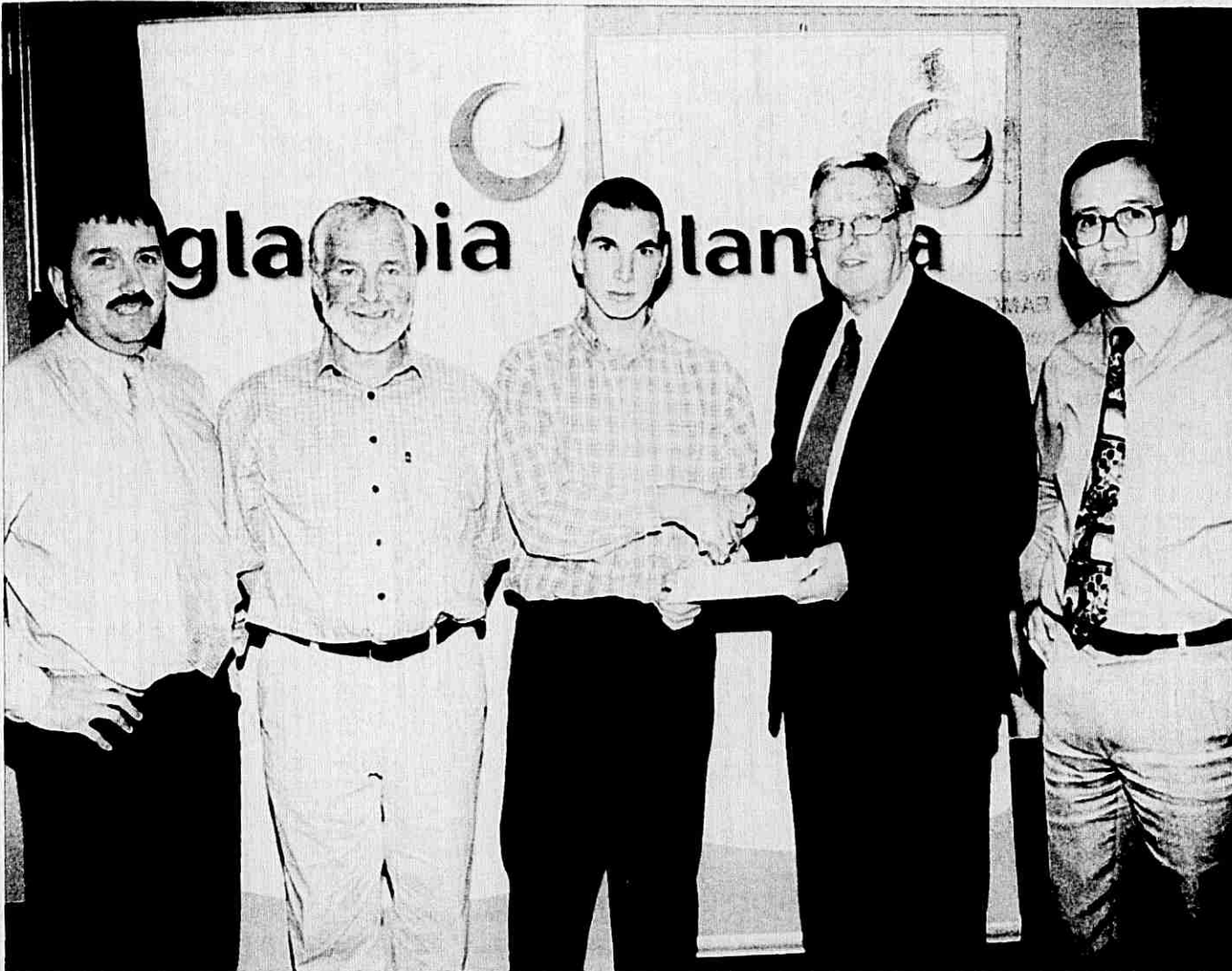

Who cares, the game we played was fair (from our side anyway) quite close and most enjoyable never the less.

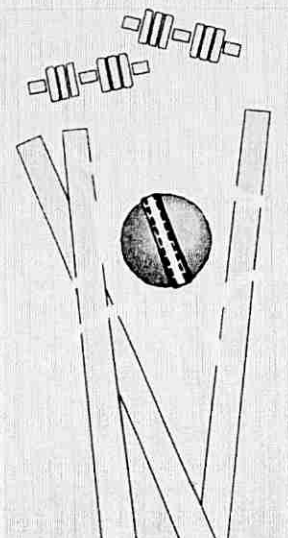
Lismore have a policy of "giving every one who tries a go". This

Cash For Coaching Row

While the big controversy relating to the payment of high profile players on television commercials, etc. and the row between the GPA and Croke Park which raged for about ten days, has not burned itself out by any means, the whole affair was to an extent overshadowed last week by the Mick O'Dwyer/Pat Spillane row over an alleged payment for coaching.

Pat Spillane, who is something of a cynic and feels that he knows more about football than every one else, alleged in his match analysis programme on television that Micko was being well remunerated for coaching the Lilywhites.

In response, Micko denied the accusation and said he was getting nothing beyond the normal travelling expenses and said that Pat Spillane "is getting a 'hell' of a lot more out of the game than I am."

The accusation brought comments from all over and these left no doubt about which of the two won the popularity stakes as everyone spoke in support of O'Dwyer. Many will likely have viewed it as begrudgery on the part of Spillane.

My feeling on the matter is that if Pat Spillane has no proof or evidence that O'Dwyer is being well paid, he should keep his mouth shut (however hard that would be).

I know it would be difficult, if not impossible, to convince every one that coaches at county and club level all over the country are not being remunerated. The general rules declare that such a practice is illegal. But until such time as one can prove that payments are being made they should refrain from making wild comment.

Minor Football Semi-Finals

The last remaining teams in the minor football championships (A & B) will play the respective semi-finals on tonight, Wednesday, leaving the way clear for the divisional finals which will be played in early September. All going well, the minor 'A' county minor football final will be played in conjunction with the senior county final on September 24th.

AFFANE V. ST. OLIVERS

This game is at Bushy Park and it should be a fight to the finish between teams of equal standards. St. Olivers may start slight favourites but if repeating the good form displayed against Kilrossanty and Lismore, the Cappoquin based club can be given a good chance.

This is the game fixed for Fraher Field and it should produce a good display of football for this grade as both teams have played very well in their early rounds.

Dungarvan, having drawn with Kilgobnet, defeated Brickeys and Ballinacourty to qualify, and An Gaeltacht survived comfortably from a three team section (Kilrossanty and Ardmore were the others).

Having seen Dungarvan in two of their matches, I was impressed and consequently give them the vote to win.

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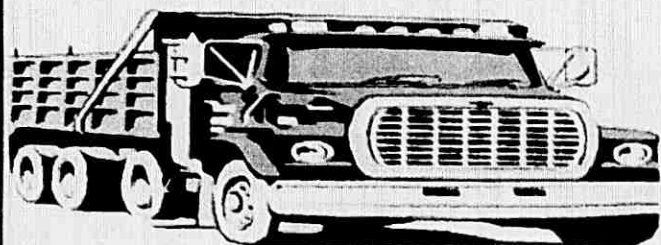
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
